Keith Bill problems seen by lobbyist

"If any bill has a chance of coming out of the House Labor Committee, then it's 5181. But I may not recognize it. They started out with the Our Father and may end up with the Hail Mary."

"That's the observation of Gerry Dunn on State Rep. William Keith's proposed bill aimed at reducing teacher strikes."

As a lobbyist for the Metropolitan Association for Improved School Legislation, Dunn represents the interests of eight school boards including Garden City, Livonia, Wayne-Westland, Redford Union and Plymouth.

Speaking before the Garden City PTA Council, Dunn last week outlined key proposals of the Keith Bill and explained why it has met opposition.

"There have been 19 or 20 bills introduced to curb teacher strikes," Dunn said. "And I don't have to tell parents in districts like Garden City or Crestwood that we need a change to Public Act 379 (the current bargaining law covering public employees)."

"AFTER 10 YEARS of collective bargaining we've concluded that even collective bargaining isn't working and it's time for a change."

"But that change must satisfy established groups on both sides. That's a delicate balance—it's very difficult to get management and employee groups together."

Since the original Keith bill met with "total opposition," the next step for a group of lobbyists, including Dunn, was to try to write a bill of their own. While the original Keith bill outlined a series of negotiating steps to be followed, it still allowed teachers to break off bargaining and strike at mid-year.

"When we went into our discussions we weren't there representing one interest or another. I'm not even sure that the eight districts I represent are in agreement with what the 10 of us came up with."

"When we finished, we endorsed about 85 per cent of the Keith bill."

Key points of the lobbyists' recommendations are the establishment of 180 school days, 14 vacation days and two days of inservice training.

Under the 1975-76 school calendar, Sept. 19 would be the first day when economic penalties would be imposed for striking teachers. Oct. 3 marks the date when 170 days of school becomes endangered since both the Keith committee and the lobbyists agree that school must end by the 3rd Friday in June.

At the 170 day point injunctive relief must be sought. The court may then

order binding arbitration through itself or the Michigan Employment Relations Commission.

The lobbyists offer a limited right to strike, but strikers must give the district 15-day notice, and then a 24-hour notice, of a strike.

"Under both the revised Keith bill and our recommendations, we have given beefed-up power to the mediators," Dunn said.

"One of the these is the ability to post a listing of an impasse."

"If one side is dragging its feet, the mediator can release the information and obviously if it's going to benefit one party, then that party will publish the information."

Both Keith and the lobbyists would give the courts the power to call for binding arbitration at any time in the negotiations.

Under the original Keith bill, a party could reject an arbitration agreement but under the new guidelines, arbitration is binding.

EVEN FOLLOWING revisions made by the Keith committee and the proposals of the lobbyists, the two largest Michigan teacher unions have come out against the bill.

"The Michigan Education Association is opposed to all Keith bills," Dunn said. "Their major hangup is that they want the bill to include institutions of higher learning since a portion of their membership teaches at colleges and universities."

"The Michigan Federation of Teachers is totally opposed to the legislation. They have been on record as wanting the unlimited right to strike."

"The Michigan Association of School Boards have said they could

agree with parts of the Keith bill but they would like a 'management bill of rights' inserted into the contract."

In fielding questions from his audience, Dunn explained why the bills contain only a limited right to strike.

"Employers, even in the public sector, feel that the way to stop a long strike is to invoke penalties from the beginning. The theory is that people can only afford to strike for so long."

What happens if voters reject a millage for revenues needed to pay for an arbitrated settlement?

"School districts are forced to balance the budget. Their only recourse is to lay off teachers," Dunn said.

If Sept. 19 marks the first day when teachers would be penalized for striking, could a district not begin school until Sept. 19?

"This would be a means of preventing a free strike but as a practical matter they probably couldn't, depending on how the school calendar is settled," he said.

WHAT HAPPENS if 10,000 teachers in the area decide to strike?

"There's no enforceable law for 10,000 people who refuse to work. It's still a problem, but no law will ever take care of them."

What about parents who refuse to send their children to school?

"We have a law for you," Dunn said. "It's called truancy."

Dunn expects the House Labor Committee to pass the revised Keith bill (No. 5181) without any further amendments.

Proposed amendments number 12. Dunn believes the first 11 are "pro management."

They include ending school by the second Friday in June, and adding four more vacation days, which would, in effect, push forward the date when 170 days are jeopardized. The amendments would limit free strikes from Sept. 2 to Sept. 5.

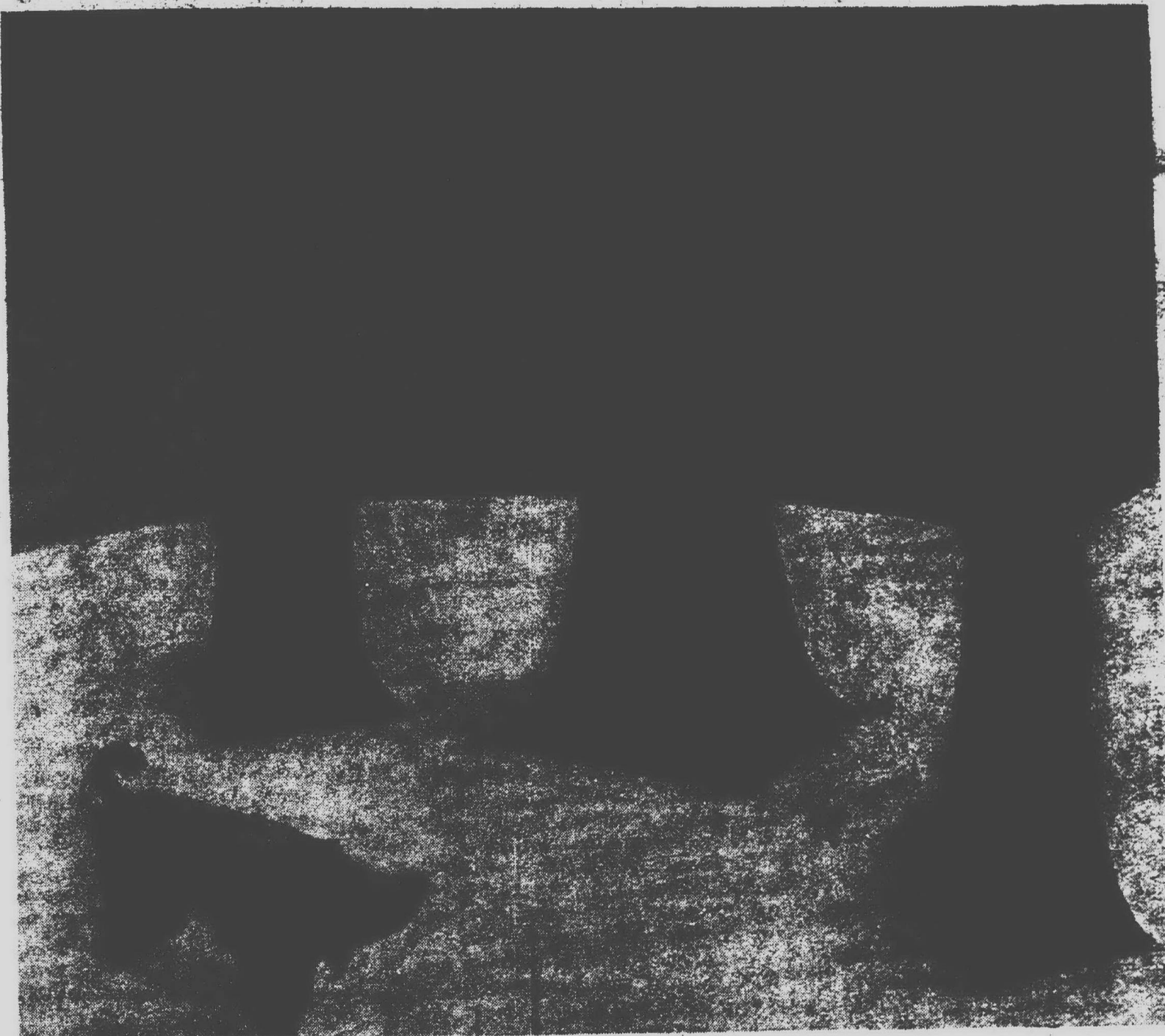
The 12th amendment calls for penalizing salaries of administrator by as much as 25 per cent.

"The fallacy of that proposal is that people are being penalized for something over which they have no control, and in so doing, the bargaining pot would be reduced."

"I made sure, though, that lobbyists salaries aren't touched by this," Dunn joked.

"My guess is that the bill will probably come out of committee without the proposed amendments. Keith will probably try to get the amendments added on the floor before a full House."

"The labor committee is dominated by labor interest groups, and they're just not going to put out a bill which is against their interests."

PCACA offers sculpture as city's bicentennial gift

PLYMOUTH—A modernistic sculpture of an adult, two children and a dog may one day adorn the triangular-shaped park in front of Central Middle School—if the city commission allows its placement there.

Representatives of the Plymouth Community Arts Council (PCAC) Tuesday presented their plans to contract creation of the work and donate the sculpture to the city.

Northville artist John Chaffee would create the work from low-maintenance Corten steel, which eventually would turn a deep amber. An 18-foot oval-shaped stand of tinted cement would support the four statues.

"We wanted to give something bicentennial to the city, and we decided on this," PCAC representative Dorothy Magee told commission members. "We want something that will reach out to the future and depict our love of children."

"Corten is absolutely maintenance-free," she said. "It's child-proof. We don't want children to be able to climb all over it and enjoy it."

Pledges from residents will finance the project, she said.

Commission members questioned the PCAC's proposed location for the project. Commissioner John Moehle moved to refer the location question to the planning commission and involve the bicentennial commission in the plans.

Looking at a sketch of the modernistic sculpture, Commissioner Norbert Battermann said, "I'm concerned about the public acceptance of the

sculpture. It doesn't fit in with the rest of the art in the community. We don't really know what the people want, particularly in art."

Commissioner Harold Guenther added, "I think it would be approaching a sinful situation if a group proposed to do something like this, and we lost it because of our personal feelings. I must admit, it is entirely different. It should be placed in a setting that has to do with colonial overtones."

Commission members will take action on the matter, after the planning commission recommends a location for the sculpture.

Mettetal hearing set for Wednesday

CANTON—Talk of runways and planes and air traffic patterns will fill the Plymouth Canton High School auditorium at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, when Canton Township officials hold a public hearing on the township's proposed purchase and expansion of Mettetal Airport.

Reaction to the proposal will help shape the decision of Canton officials to purchase or forego ownership of the facility.

Canton Township Supervisor Robert Greenstein has repeatedly cited the noncommittal stand of officials.

"We have an open mind on it," Greenstein said, "and it will stay open until after the hearing."

The board of trustees will present the findings of an airport feasibility study, conducted by R. Dimes and Speas Associates, on the possible purchase of the airport by Canton Township.

If the township does not purchase the privately owned facility, the land on which the airport stands could be doomed to another type of devel-

opment. Owners of the airport are faced with rising taxes and subsidized competition from municipal airports and say Mettetal is no longer a viable private enterprise.

Many Canton and Plymouth residents say the township's purchase of the airport would lead to expansion, safety hazards and environmental problems and contend the township should forego the purchase agreement.

Local businessmen, on the other hand, say the airport is a necessity to the attraction of an industrial tax base and the economic well-being of the community.

According to the financial study, it would cost the township about \$500,000 to buy Mettetal. General obligation and revenue bonds could be floated to purchase the facility as it is. Annual income would exceed expenses by \$2,000 annually, the report says.

Federal funds could help finance part of the purchase price if the township submits a plan to expand the airport, according to Greenstein.

3 escape injury in auto crash

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP—Three men escaped serious injury May 22 when a Buick Riviera met a Pinto head-on on Ann Arbor Road, east of Ridge.

According to State Police reports, the westbound Buick, driven by Reg Ion, 19, of Ypsilanti, crossed the center line and hit the eastbound Pinto, driven by Raymond McIlwain, 25, of Ann Arbor shortly before 10:30 p.m.

A Canton Township resident, Terrence Serman, 20, was a passenger in the Ion car.

All three men were taken to St. Mary Hospital in Livonia. Ion and Serman were treated for facial lacerations and shoulder injuries and later released. McIlwain suffered facial lacerations, scalp wounds, broken ribs and other chest injuries. He was also treated and released.

Plymouth Township firefighters were called to the scene of the accident to extinguish a fire in the Buick's engine compartment.

According to a witness at the scene, Dan Kennedy, the Ion car was "swerving back and forth across the road" as it approached the Pinto. "The Pinto tried to get out of the way, but the Riviera was in the wrong lane and hit him head-on."

No charges were filed against either driver, pending further investigation.

Deficit may force county layoffs

WAYNE COUNTY—Steps to cut \$6 million from the county budget received approval of the Ways and Means Committee of the Wayne County Board of Commissioners in a special meeting Thursday morning.

However, the matter of exactly which county employees will feel the pinch proved to be a difficult hurdle for the commissioners to overcome.

The committee voted unanimously to authorize and direct that the present procedure for freezing vacant positions in departments having line-item budgets be continued and stringently enforced, because it may prove necessary to eliminate those positions next year.

Included in the voting were 17 commissioners present during the special meeting, among them Mary Dumas (R-Livonia), Richard Manning (D-Redford Township) and Royce Smith (D-Bellefonte). Commissioners John

Barr (D-Dearborn Heights) and Tom Taylor (D-Westland) were absent.

MRS. DUMAS hesitated about the resolution, because of a provision that in special circumstances, a review committee would decide whether certain vacancies would be left unfilled.

"The special committee is an illegal committee, that would overstep its bounds," said Mrs. Dumas. "I never understood I was giving the committee that kind of authority."

Although Mrs. Dumas said she didn't like the idea of a review, or "freeze," committee taking policy matters out of the hands of the board, she later went along with the vote to approve.

Manning said the resolution would "test the mettle of the various department heads and will show whether they can run their departments without the manpower they were originally budgeted."

"They'll have to re-think the wheel."

THE COMMITTEE next authorized that the use of Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA) employees be expanded and intensified to alleviate staff shortages resulting from strict adherence to the vacant position freeze and moratorium on hiring.

Manning asked if it would be possible to apply CETA funds to the hiring of persons in more advanced positions, with the county making up the rest of the employee's salary. He was instructed that CETA persons must be hired as "entry-level" employees, according to federal guidelines, and that CETA funds cannot be supplemented by county funds. CETA jobs are non-promotable classifications.

The resolution carried unanimously. A THIRD resolution, authorizing that \$3.5 million in capital improvement project funds remain uncommitted for possible re-allocation to operating accounts if belt-tightening measures should fail to eliminate the county's \$6.7 million deficit, was passed by a voice vote.

Mrs. Dumas said she did not want the capital funds to become a "pot of money that we can dip into at any time." Manning feared that not earmarking the funds for capital improvement could jeopardize the county's position with the Congress, now considering labor-intensive capital building programs.

"Those in Congress who represent us might conclude that if we don't think a capital improvement project is important enough to put our own money into, they won't put their money in, either. I think we should look at each individually, rather than putting it in the bank in case something happens," said Manning.

"We cannot spend this money until it goes to the full board, anyway. If we get to a position where we have to get at it, we can vote for a transfer of funds," countered Smith whose district includes Plymouth and Canton.

IN A REGULAR meeting that followed the special meeting, nearly the full board, including Dumas, Manning, Smith, plus Barr and Taylor, heatedly discussed the matter of where the buck stops.

What brought about the controversy was a resolution to approve an agreement with members of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME). The contract would grant a general salary increase of 4.5 per cent effective July 1, 1974, and an additional 4.5 per cent effective July 1, 1975.

"We were talking about biting the bullet, but this is nibbling the bullet," Mann said, referring to the committee's alleged inability to develop guidelines in negotiating union contracts.

Mrs. Dumas said that she sympathized with the AFSCME employees under consideration, "but I feel we should make no more new salary adjustments."

Meijer's fight continues

For 12 years, two retail unions have been battling for representation of retail employees at Meijer Inc. and the

latest move by the group that wants in is a charge of unfair labor practices against the company and the recognized union.

A coalition of the Retail Clerks, Amalgamated Meat Cutters and International Brotherhood of Teamsters filed the charge earlier this month with the National Labor Relations Board (NLRB). They charge Meijer and the Consolidated Independent Union Local 951 with denying almost 8,000 Meijer employees the right to another representation election.

The complaint represents another attempt by the Retail Clerks to gain representation of Meijer employees, failing in three previous elections.

Votes, once in 1963 and twice in 1972, to gain status were defeated.

THE COALITION contends that Meijer's has forbidden employees to talk with Retail Clerks' representatives in the stores (one of which is in Canton Township), while granting Local 951 "free store access to Meijer employees."

Meijer Labor Director Paul Boyer explains that Local 951 representatives are allowed access "to administer the current contract." That contract expires in August this year.

"These charges can be made by anybody in an organizing campaign," said Meijer Vice President Earl Holton. "They are attempting to displace a union we have a contract with and we're confident the NLRB will find the charges completely without merit."

Retail Clerks President Paul Novicoff, however, also expressed confidence in the NLRB ruling. "We feel confident that the facts revealed by the NLRB investigation will vindicate the rights of Meijer employees to support labor unions of their choice and not be forced into a labor union supported by the company."

ACCORDING TO Boyer, Meijer employees "are paid a comparable wage, and in many classifications, are paid higher than in the rest of the retail industry."

Novicoff counters that Local 951 has negotiated contracts favoring the employer which are "not in the best interest of the employee."

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City declines stand on Mettetal issue

PLYMOUTH—The city commission last week turned down a resident's request to step across Joy Road and intervene in Canton Township's proposal to purchase Mettetal Airport. Dr. Ralph Atchley, 480 Auburn, Plymouth, presented commission members with a petition signed by 240 city residents in opposition to Canton's acquisition and expansion of Mettetal.

The petition asked city commission members to take a stand against the expansion of Mettetal and submit a resolution of opposition to the Canton Township Board of Trustees.

Atchley presented the commission with a suggested statement, asking

Canton "that serious consideration be given to the resulting possible detriment to the environment of the residents of the City of Plymouth as well as surrounding communities in terms of increased noise levels and the hazard of planes crashing in a residential area."

City commission members turned down the invitation and unanimously agreed to receive and file the petition and accompanying request.

"I don't know what we can do about the airport," said City Commissioner John Cummings. "Canton is a separate municipality and doesn't have to be responsive to what we say. It's not their duty to listen to us."

City Commissioner Norbert Batter-

mann added, "I personally feel that if this meant increased air traffic over the city, I would object. I can't tell from the plans whether the traffic would increase or not. But I think commission members are reluctant to do this, regardless of what their personal feelings might be."

Responded Atchley, "I think you should hold our welfare in consideration. When an action is taken outside of Plymouth that will affect the welfare of the people of Plymouth, I think it behooves you to take a stand."

Commissioner Joseph Bida said, "We don't know the facts yet. I don't believe in acting on a petition without studying it myself."

Community groups meet to map bicentennial plans

Community involvement in bicentennial plans and celebrations became a reality Wednesday night, when local residents, officials and businessmen met for the first communitywide planning session of the Community Bicentennial Commission.

Representatives of 24 organizations, the Plymouth Community School District, the City of Plymouth, and Plymouth and Canton townships brainstormed project ideas that express the three facets of the bicentennial celebration—heritage, festival and horizons—and kicked off planning to a communitywide start.

Members of the heritage committee, chaired by Earl Gibson, hope to formulate projects commemorating the past. Members suggested the establishment of an old farm tool exhibit and the establishment of a traveling gallery of art works, depicting America's heritage.

The festivals committee, chaired by Frank Briggs, hopes to focus on parades and festivals and stress total community involvement and sharing. Suggestions for festival celebrations include historical dramas, musical celebrations, exhibits of American industry and craft displays.

The horizons committee, chaired by Brian Kidson, looks to the future in

its planning. Members suggested numerous projects, including the beautification of Ann Arbor Road; the planting of trees in Canton Township; the development of park sites and more recreation throughout the area; the funding of Youth, Inc. and Our House; and the establishment of more retirement housing for senior citizens.

"It's important to get as many activities for as wide an age group as possible," said John Dillon, who recently served on the Sesquicentennial Executive Committee for Ann Arbor. Bicentennial celebrations, he said, would be "injecting another dimension into the already busy life of people."

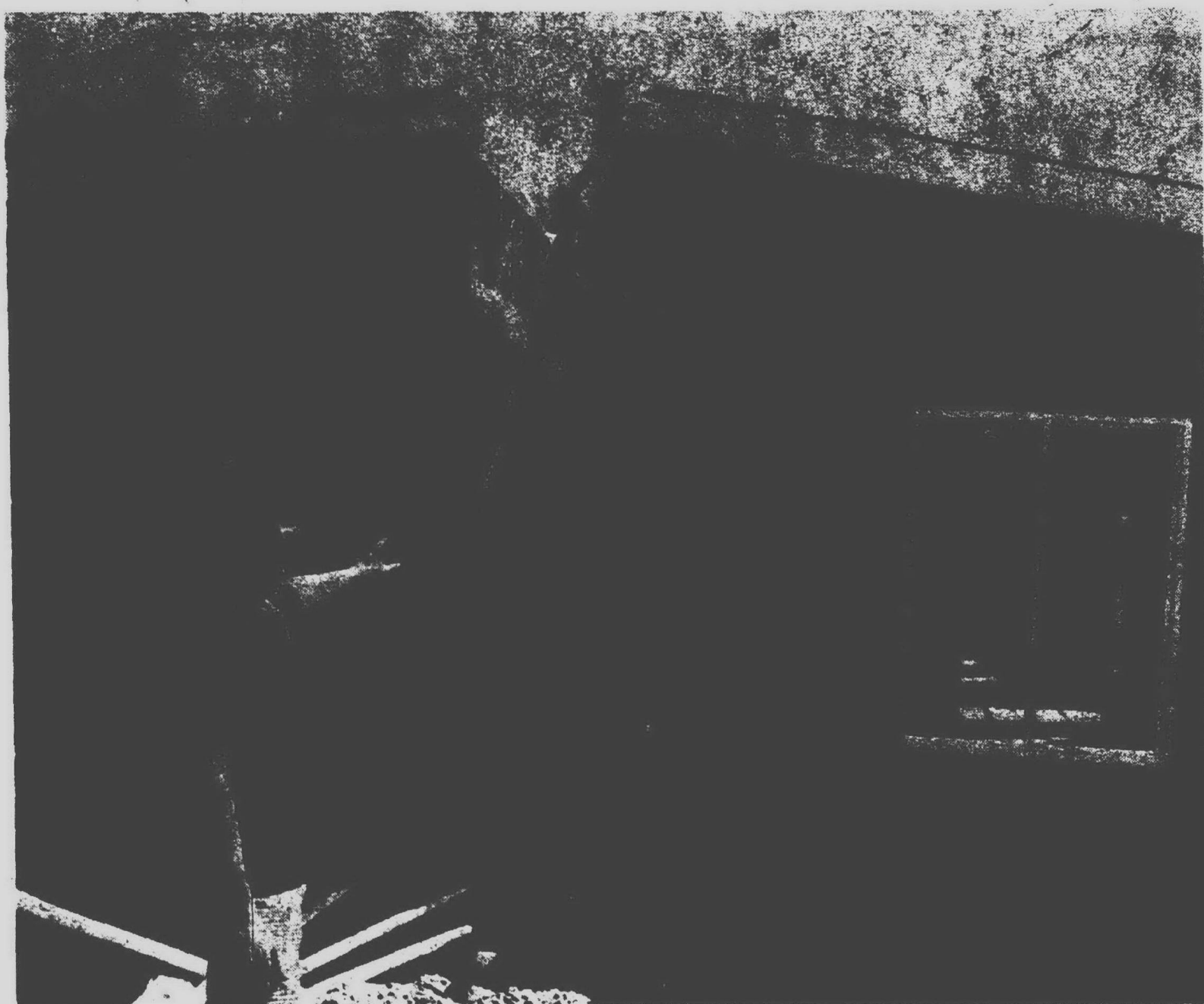
Among projects already endorsed by the Community Bicentennial Commission are the publication of Sam Hudson's book, relating the history of Plymouth; the purchase of 1776-style uniforms for the Plymouth Fire and Drum Corps; a videotape of local history, produced by the American Association of University Women; the sewing of a heritage quilt by the Soroptimists; and a taped oral history for the library.

To help stimulate community interest and involvement in the bicentennial, the commission last week opened a bicentennial headquarters in the Bidwell Building at 859 S. Main in an of-

fice donated by Atty. Thomas Healy. If enough volunteer help is available, the office will remain open from 9 a.m. to noon Monday through Friday.

New members of the Community Bicentennial Commission, who attended last week's meeting, include representatives from the Plymouth Community Arts Council; the Rotary Club; Business and Professional Women; the Lake Pointe Garden Club; the League of Women Voters; the Daughters of the American Revolution; the Girl Scouts; the Plymouth Newcomers; and Plymouth Children's Nursery, Inc.

Other members include representatives from Our Lady of Good Counsel Catholic Parish; the Plymouth Jaycees; Western Suburban Junior Woman's Club; the Plymouth branch of the National Farm and Garden Club; the Plymouth Jayceettes; the Fall Festival Committee; the Lions Club; the Veterans of Foreign Wars; the Plymouth Homeowners Improvement Association; the American Association of University Women; Plymouth Grange 389; First United Methodist Women; radio station WSPD; the Plymouth Historical Society; and the Woman's Club of Plymouth.

Public hearing set for no hunting law

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP—Opponents and advocates of a proposed no hunting ordinance may air their feelings on the matter at a public hearing, scheduled for Wednesday at 1 p.m. in township hall, 42350 Ann Arbor Road.

If the township's present ordinance is extended from Beck to Napier, hunting and target practicing will be prohibited throughout the township under punishment of a maximum \$500 fine, 90 days in jail, or both.

Under the ordinance, residents can engage in archery practice on their premises. The township hopes to exempt the Western Wayne County Conservation Association, a rifle club on Napier, from the target practicing ban.

Township Treasurer Joseph West and representatives from the Department of Natural Resources (DNR), the Michigan State Police and the Wayne County Sheriff's Department will conduct Wednesday's public hearing.

The hearing will be the first of two on the matter, according to township Clerk Helen Richardson. Another will be conducted during evening hours.

The four-member panel charged with the investigation of the hunting

question will submit its recommendation to the board of trustees, after both hearings are conducted.

"The final decision will be ours," said Mrs. Richardson. "How the board will react I don't know. It will depend on the facts presented to us."

A group of residents living west of Beck prompted the no hunting issue, when residents presented the board

with a petition in favor of the ordinance extension because of safety reasons.

According to Mrs. Richardson, the township board had to make fairly sure it wanted the no hunting ordinance extended before it asked the DNR to sponsor the public hearing.

The board submitted that request in April.

Two are named to honors group

Socrates stands guard

PLYMOUTH—A wise old philosopher has risen from the grave and taken up residence at the door of Allen Elementary School.

Molded from plaster with hemlock glass in hand, Socrates is welcoming students, teachers and visitors alike to Allen's classrooms and books.

"I hope he lasts 'til June," confided teacher Carol Welsh, whose fifth graders created the five-foot high statue. "He'll stay at the door until he breaks."

SOCRATES grew out of the fifth grade classroom's Greek history lessons.

"The students decided they would like to do a Greek statue, because Greek art and architecture was so good," Mrs. Welsh explained. "I think something like this motivates them and keeps them interested in their lessons."

Since Greek art is based on the ideal and perfection, the selection of a perfect model was the first hurdle the students had to surmount. Fifth grader Brian Lee was voted as the "per-

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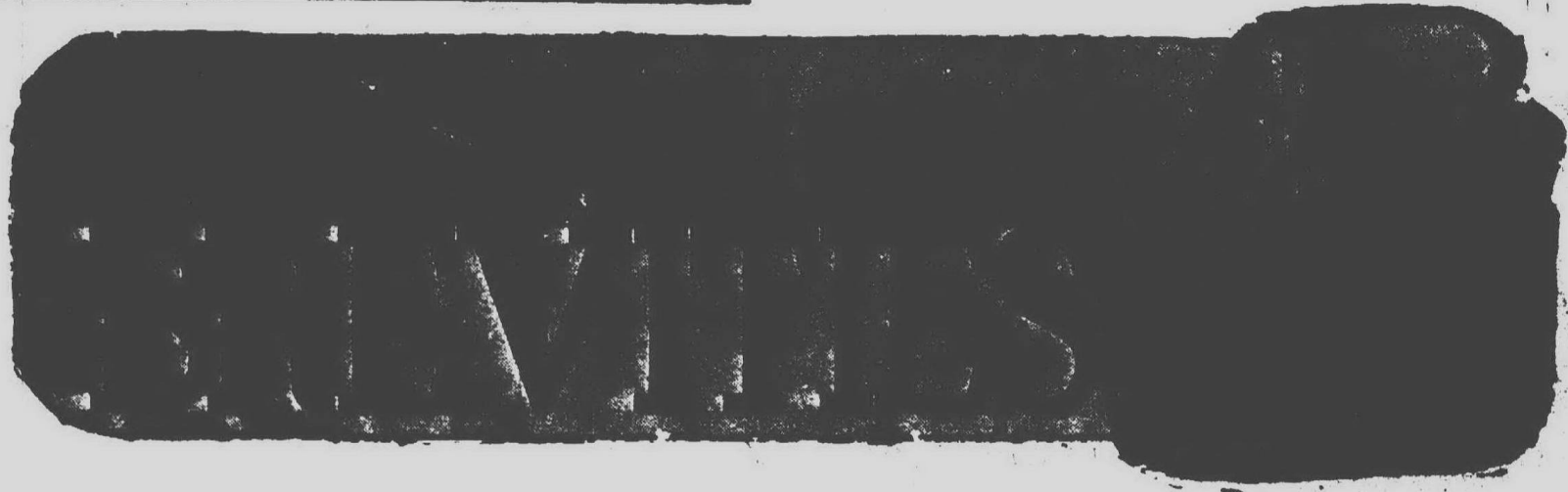

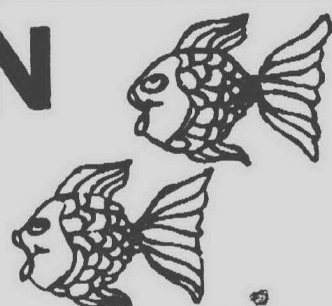

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S'craft hopefuls split on expansion options

One difference of opinion amongst candidates for the Schoolcraft Board of Education emerges on the issue of whether the college ought to establish more satellite campuses or expand facilities on campus.

In interviews with the Observer & Eccentric, most agree the satellite concept brings the college closer to the community, but some express concerns about loss of student identity and the campus as an educational focal point.

ROBERT CADOTTE of 30125 Grandon, Livonia, doesn't rule out the use of satellite campuses but places high emphasis on construction of some type of fine arts building on campus.

"Maybe past ideas for the fine arts building were on too grand a scale. But a performing arts facility of some type is necessary to the community and school."

"Schoolcraft has had a fine fine arts program so far with its limited facilities, but the program can have more variety and involve residents as well as being a learning experience."

Cadotte says there is a danger of students losing identity with the college by attending a satellite, but he won't rule out the annex approach as a viable option.

He sees the use of the former child development center in Northville by Schoolcraft and Wayne State University as being very helpful. "Here's a physical plant you couldn't reproduce at any reasonable cost that can be put to use at minimum expense."

RONALD COWDEN of 15577 Westbrook, Livonia, an incumbent, doesn't believe there should be any more buildings built on campus. "It would be a waste of money."

"All local school districts within the college district, except Plymouth, are suffering from declining enrollment, he explains. "The state is discussing setting up an umbrella approach to community college education. With the WSU consortium proposal for the child development property, there are buildings available to be used which will require some funds for renovation."

"The students I know attending the Garden City center are proud of that facility. If the instructors are top caliber, I don't see any problem. We did, however, get \$100,000 from the state extra to get the Garden City center going and may not get those funds for renovating other elementary buildings in the college district for satellite campus use."

Cowden feels making classroom space available in local municipalities is important. "It is easier to ride bikes to a learning center near your neighborhood than to drive to the main campus. Many older persons will take classes if a center is closer to their neighborhood. The idea of driving keeps many persons from enrolling."

Cowden would like to see a fine arts building constructed on campus but says realistically the Legislature won't provide the funding. The types of money available, he adds, will be for the WSU consortium project.

Depending on the rate of growth in the future, he concludes, the college may have to expand on campus or

make the satellite centers more permanent. Hayward would also like to see a fine arts building on campus.

"The concept of a community college is that Schoolcraft is available to the community. It is a different approach entirely than the four-year universities and this is why the satellite campus approach has merit."

HARRY GREENLEAF of 35936 Pinetree, Livonia, agrees with the concept of the satellite centers because it "brings education to the people."

He sees a potential problem in that proper administrative control must be maintained over the quality of education offered. "But the reduction of classrooms in use in local public districts gives Schoolcraft the opportunity to bring classrooms to its communities."

Greenleaf does see a need for a fine arts building on campus, though. "We need a focal point for the fine arts and, traditionally, colleges service that kind of need. I've heard of a case of a student having to practice the harp in the ladies lounge. That shouldn't be."

"I endorse the satellite center concept as one to be used to complement classrooms and programs on campus."

RICHARD HAYWARD of 17159 Loveland, Livonia, sees the satellite approach as a wise one economically.

"It's a way of getting classroom space without large capital expenditures, plus the centers are mainly staffed by part-time faculty which is more convenient for students."

"The satellite approach is sound as long as it doesn't detract from the overall quality of instruction. It may result in a loss of student identity, but I believe you can still have satellites and identity if the college gets its message out so the general public knows what Schoolcraft can be."

The satellite program shouldn't be disjointed, Hayward added, and probably is best viewed as a temporary approach for the college's present time of rapid growth in enrollment.

"I don't think the driving distance to the main campus, however, is any major problem. It's only a 15-20 minute maximum drive from any point within the district."

Madonna sets open house

Wondering about a career in public administration, health care or teaching? Madonna College is planning an open house for adults and graduating seniors to answer job and college enrollment questions.

Scheduled for 7:30 p.m., Thursday, May 29, the program will be in the Science Lecture Hall at the college, 36600 Schoolcraft, Livonia.

Included will be a presentation on the new public administration program to be introduced at the college in the fall. It is interdisciplinary, requiring selected courses in history, political science, sociology, economics and business administration.

Leading to either an associate or bachelor's degree, the program is intended for those planning careers in local, county or state government.

Other Madonna programs set for discussion are allied health professions such as medical technology, dietetics, operating room technology and radiologic technology, and teaching careers with specialization in learning disabilities and vocational education.

"There is also a lack of togetherness with students solely attending the Garden City Center, or the facility at the former child development center — if that comes to be. We need the exchange of views which a college atmosphere on campus can provide. You can learn as much from other students outside the classroom as inside."

McQuesten is concerned Schoolcraft might become spread all over the district without any identity established. "I would hope Schoolcraft would

never become a credit resource center to pick up course credits only."

"We should put the emphasis on the students first, and money second. Schoolcraft does indeed need more money for equipment and facilities. Without money we are in trouble. But we cannot compromise the quality of our education for a desire to increase our income."

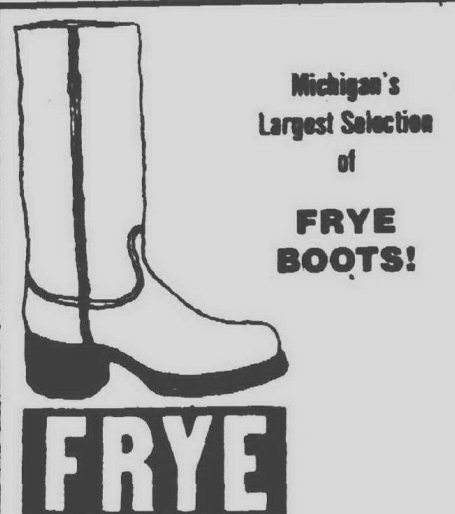

Group asks 'Y' to remain in community

PLYMOUTH—A YMCA building to serve Plymouth, Canton and Plymouth townships will be proposed by the recently formed inter-governmental committee.

Robert Greenstein, Canton supervisor and a member of the committee, suggested the group approach the Y board to get its feelings on joining the Plymouth Community Inter-governmental Recreation Committee and on constructing a facility in the area.

"The perfect location would be where Plymouth and Canton and Plymouth townships come together. In fact," Greenstein said, "Canton might be in a position to donate land for the structure."

The Y has been considering building a facility in Northville.

MARDA BENSON, vice-president of the Plymouth Community School District, said she would contact the Y board with the proposal.

The committee, at last Wednesday's meeting, felt a new Y in this area would be a big boost to its ambitious hopes to expand recreational facilities.

"If we can interest the Y in building in our area rather than in Northville, it would be an ideal situation for our communities," Ms. Benson said.

The new recreation authority, composed of representatives from the Plymouth Community School District, City of Plymouth and Plymouth, Canton, and Superior townships, is an outgrowth of the parent inter-

governmental committee.

Beside plans for outdoor swimming facilities, additional softball diamonds, mini-bike trails, bicycle paths and indoor archery and range facilities, the committee is studying the need for tennis courts.

Richard Gornick, trustee for Plymouth Township, said the growing popularity of tennis brings a need for increased facilities in all areas.

"These could be added fairly quickly because it is not too expensive a project," Gornick said. "There are several sites in the area that could be turned into courts."

GREENSTEIN said Canton is hoping to have a civic complex and plans are under way for a major recreation area in the township.

"It is hoped we will eventually have an ice arena."

The intergovernmental council, which spearheaded attempts to resurrect last year's defunct recreation authority, has charged the new group with implementing a pilot recreation program.

All new facilities and programs would be open to the public, regardless of city and township boundaries.

A report on Ms. Benson's contact with the Y board will be given at the intergovernmental group's next meeting, Wednesday, June 4.

911's chances look slim

PLYMOUTH—It appears, for the present time the emergency telephone number 911 is battling "000" in the Plymouth area as well as in the townships of Plymouth and Canton.

While Plymouth Mayor Beverly McAnich is interested in the system, nothing has been firmed up as yet.

City Manager Fred Yockey said the city has written Michigan Bell asking prices on installing the system in the city.

"We have been investigating the system for the past six months but no decision has been reached," Yockey said.

He added that when the investigation of the system is completed, it will be presented to the city commission for formal action.

The Plymouth Township board has learned it would cost an estimated \$200,000 to convert to the 911 system.

Fire Chief James Gignac said, how-

ever, the township is investigating it on a countywide basis.

"It is in the talking stage yet, but we doubt the township will convert to the system unless Wayne County puts up the money," the chief said.

Canton Township sees the system as "too complicated" to let into.

Supervisor Robert Greenstein said the township wasn't interested in joining the system.

"We are tied in with Wayne,

Plymouth, Ypsilanti and Bellevue numbers and unless this can be straightened out, we aren't interested," the supervisor said.

Canton Township Fire Chief Mel Paulin said "it isn't feasible for us to have it. We are better off to stay the way we are."

He said Canton residents would have to go through either the Wayne 911 or Livonia 911 to complete an emergency call.

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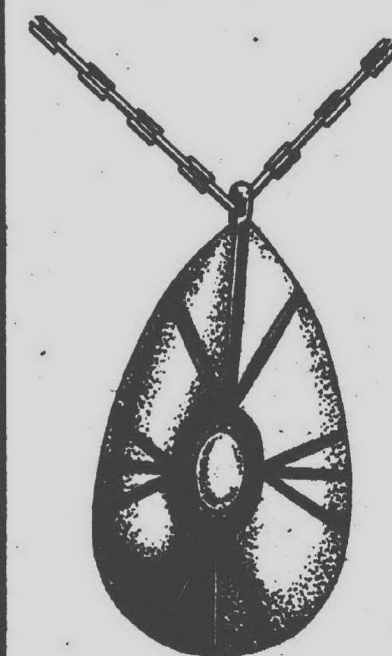
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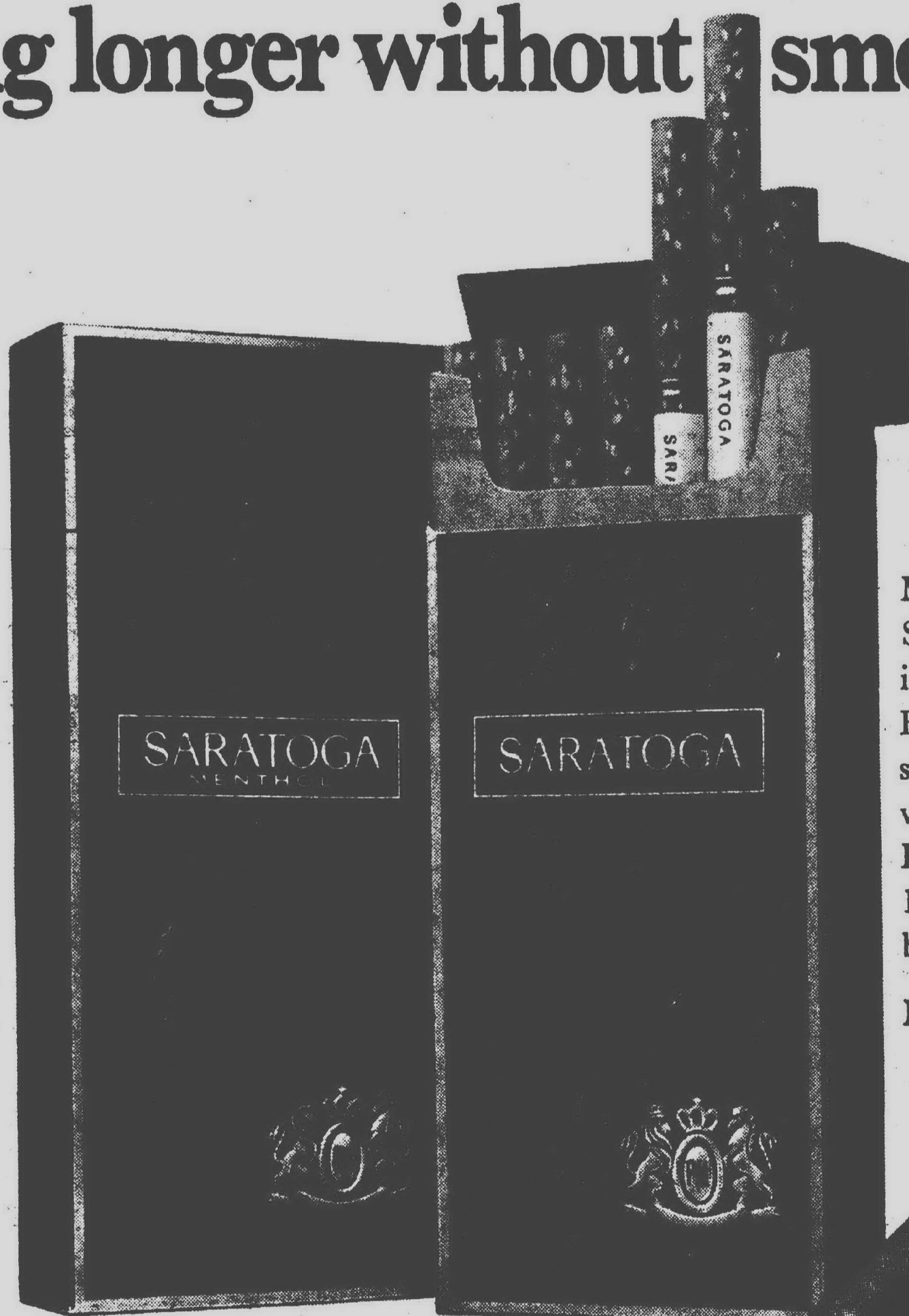
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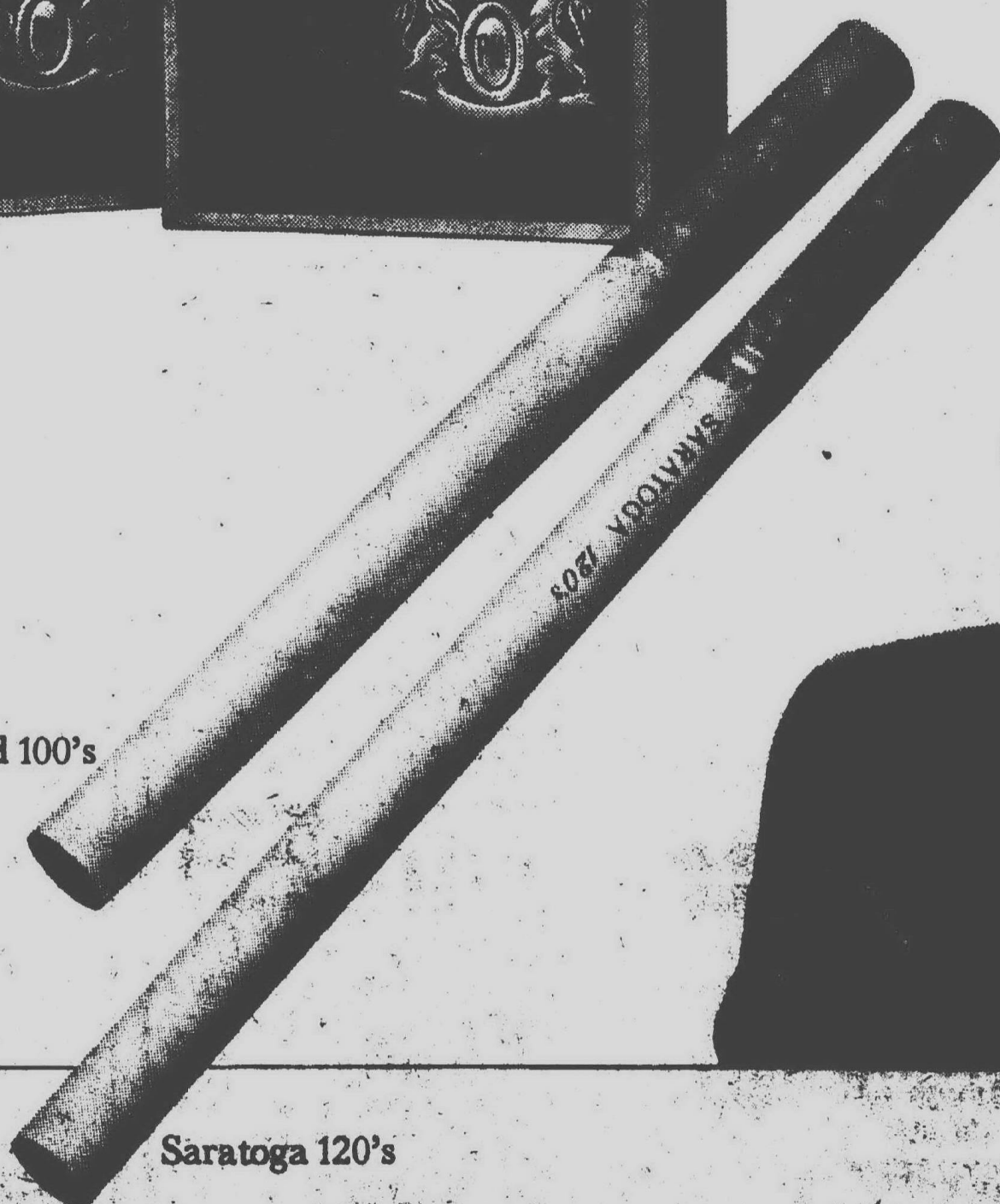
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Learn to clean a squid for Italian soup

By ETHEL SIMMONS

Watching Nell Benedict clean and cut the seafood that goes into Spezzato Zuppa de Pesce (Special Fish Soup) is probably the most fascinating part of her cooking demonstration on "Italian Specialties."

In a two-hour workshop at Birmingham's Community House, Mrs. Benedict recently put together an entire meal, with the help of four assistants in the kitchen.

Mrs. Benedict worked at two long tables, her ingredients for the soup and salad displayed in large bowls. An overhead mirror showed her activity.

Cleaning the squid, she explained, "You have to have a heart bolder than a surgeon. You pull the eye and the ink sac out."

SHE CUT the squid into half-inch pieces, adding, "I love them stuffed. They're really a delicacy."

Mrs. Benedict had wanted to get an eel, too, but it wasn't available now, she said. She ordered octopus but through a mixup it was sold to another customer.

Also into the soup went small Danish claws, large lobster tails, scallops, shrimp, clams and mussels.

She cut the lobster tail with scissors, clipped it down each side and pulled the shell off "like a zipper."

SHE CAUTIONED to get clams tightly closed when you buy them and said you can butterfly the shrimp and the fish, too. She used sea bass and trout.

"I had the man at the fish market butterfly the striped bass," Mrs. Benedict said, as she cut off the fins with scissors. "I didn't want anyone eating bones. But it's better if you cook the head and bones with it, for flavor."

Using a big knife, she hacked the fish into two-inch pieces, explaining that if cut smaller it would disintegrate in the broth.

Mrs. Benedict said that every country with a mile or more of coast can boast of seafood soup. She said she has never had it served twice the

same way in Italy, which she visits every summer.

"IT DEPENDS on the local catch. Any fish can be used, depending on the whim of the cook."

The attentive audience of women made notes on the recipe sheets that were passed out. Mrs. Benedict added and corrected ingredients, gave translations of some that were in Italian (four minced aglio refers to garlic, two limone to the juice of two lemons).

The teacher conducted her classroom in a practical fashion, ringing a dinner bell to hush conversations that would spring up during a lull.

From the vegetable bowl, she removed a leek and said these are never served raw. If very sandy, leeks should be washed well. Use one-quarter inch of the green at the bottom and then cut in half.

LEEKs, CELERY, green pepper and garlic were chopped and then sautéed until transparent.

"Never overcook vegetables," she stressed. "They take on a bitter taste."

Mrs. Benedict showed how to make the Marinara Sauce, which includes canned whole tomatoes cut up (The California ones are sweeter than those from the Midwest) and fresh herbs ("Use twice as much"). She passed around fresh thyme for everyone to sniff. She used Italian parsley, describing it as having more flavor.

The fish was added last in the cooking process. The completed dish was spooned on a large serving platter. It resembled more of a fish mixture with sauce than what you think of as soup. The taste was most pleasing.

ALSO PREPARED and served (samples only, ladies so there is enough to go around) were Risotto Alla Milanese, a rice side dish; Insalata Misto Con Gorgonzola, a salad of greens, mushrooms and dressing with gorgonzola cheese; Blue Cheese toast; zinfandel wine; and Glace Cioccolata Con Amaretti, a rich dessert.

Mrs. Benedict said, "Rice is a staple of northern Italy as pasta is a staple of southern Italy. Italy is now the largest-producing rich country in Europe."

The saffron that went into the dish

is the world's most expensive herb, she said.

"But we are only using 29 cents worth in this recipe."

PREPARING THE salad, she said in answer to a question from the audience, never wash mushrooms but just wipe them with a damp cloth if sandy. The top is where all the flavor is.

Salad greens can be covered with a damp cloth or wrapped in a towel to refrigerate. If you are feeding 20 or 30 guests, you can put the greens in a pillowcase and run them through the spin dry cycle of your washer.

The "luscious dessert" she made combines Galliano to give it character, chocolate to give it texture and whipped cream to give it calories, according to Mrs. Benedict.

When she folded in egg white, with macaroons chopped in a blender, she said don't overfold, as it deflates the egg whites.

THE DESSERT can be made as long as a month ahead of time, frozen in a soufflé dish and taken out an hour before serving, like ice cream.

Mrs. Benedict has studied with master chefs in the U.S. and abroad. She has attended cooking classes in England, France—including Richard Olney's of Provence—and Italy.

Her forte is simplicity in preparing elegant, colorful foods. A resident of Lathrup Village, she has taught in Michigan and Ohio, through personal appearances and on radio and television.

In June she will conduct a workshop "Elegant Brunch" with French dishes at The Community House.

SPEZZATO ZUPPA DI PESCE

1 tablespoon salt
4 tablespoons butter
4 tablespoons olive oil
1 large chopped onion
1 chopped leek
½ cup chopped celery
½ cup chopped green pepper
4 minced garlic
2 No. 2 cans of peeled tomatoes
1 6-ounce tomato paste
Juice of two lemons
¼ cup chopped parsley
Mixed herbs: ½ teaspoon each of oregano, basil, thyme, sage, rosemary, 6 white peppercorns
1 bay leaf



Fresh fish and seafood for Special Fish Soup

2 cups Marinara Sauce
1-¾ cup good dry red wine
¼ cup dry Marsala

MARINARA SAUCE

2 tablespoons oil
2 cloves garlic
1 teaspoon oregano
1 teaspoon basil
1 20-ounce can tomato puree
1 teaspoon parsley
1 teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon pepper
1 tablespoon sugar
Simmer 20 minutes

Suggested fish: 2 pounds of any of the following: Halibut, bass, squid, haddock, smelts, turbot, anquilla; 1½ pounds of raw shrimp, oysters, mussels, scallops or lobster.

1. In a large kettle, heat butter and oil. Add leek, celery, green pepper, garlic and onion. Sauté until translucent.

2. Add the remainder of ingredients, except fish. Cover, bring to a boil, turn down and simmer for 1 hour.

3. Add the 2 pounds of the fish suggested. Cover and again bring to a boil. Turn down and simmer for 10 minutes.

4. Add the additional 1½ pounds suggested. Bring to a boil and simmer for six minutes.

To serve: Toast some slices of Italian bread and rub with garlic. Place two slices in individual bowls and pour over some of the fish and enough broth for the bread to absorb.

It seems that when a fellow dies, no matter what he's been—A saintly chap, or one whose life was darkly steeped in sin—That folks forget the bitter words they spoke but yesterday And seem to find a multitude of pretty things to say.

And maybe when I go to rest, some- one will bring to light some kindly word or goodly act, long buried out of sight. But if it's all the same to you, just give to me instead, the bouquets while I'm living and the knocking when I'm dead.

Don't save your kisses to imprint upon my noble brow While countless maledictions are hurled upon me now. Just say a kindly word to me, as I mourn here alone, and don't save all your eulogy to carve upon a stone.

What do I care if when I'm gone, the whole newspaper world gives me a glowing writeup and the nation's flags are furled? Why, it won't flatter me a bit, no matter what is said. So kindly throw your flowers now and knock me when I'm dead.

It may be fine, when one is gone, to have the folks talk so, And have the flowers come in loads from all the guys you know. It may be nice to have these things for those you leave behind But, as far as I'm concerned, I really will not mind.

I'm quite alive and well today, and while I linger here,

Give me a helping hand at times, give me a word of cheer. Let's change the game a little bit, just sort of swap the decks, For I will be no judge of flowers when I cash in my checks.

THESE VERSES, written by Fritz Howell, a former Associated Press sports writer, come to The Stroller's mind quite often these days as he is approached by the bicentennial committee members in the various suburban communities for suggestions on what can be done to help celebrate the nation's 200th birthday.

There isn't a community that doesn't have someone someone—or some group—that has done an outstanding job to better the places in which they live. They should be honored now, rather than be given some posthumous recognition in the years to come.

It isn't asking too much to name a park after such a resident or honor him or her by naming a street for them. And it wouldn't be asking too much to call attention now to some of the historic markers that have been taken for granted.

The longer we wait to honor these people the more the risk is that the reward will come too late. No better examples can be found than the failure to honor such men as Sidney Strong, first city manager in Plymouth, and Karl Starkweather, the walking historian, before he was called to his reward. And how many people know that the Mayflower Hotel is the site of the first house built in Plymouth. It's time these things were brought to light and let the younger generation know what has been done for them by the previous generations.

The same is true in Livonia where some of the early city officials have passed on and have just about been forgotten. These things shouldn't happen. The time is ripe now to remember those who are still living. And there is nothing that would be nicer, or more appropriate, than to honor them now—while they are living. As the old saying goes, "You cannot read your tombstone when you are dead."

How simple it would be to pay these community leaders some sort of an honor during the bicentennial. It would cost very little and yet the honor being bestowed would be priceless.

At the present time it would be well worth the effort to have some of our present buildings and major areas preserved with pictures. Several of the committees now at work on various phases of the celebration are complaining of the difficulty of getting old pictures. This is too bad. Our past should have been preserved. The value of an old picture is best portrayed by the mural on the wall of the Historical Museum in Plymouth. It shows the main intersection as it was in 1924.

None of us will be around when the 300th birthday celebration takes place. But we can be helpful by leaving our heritage in pictures in our public libraries and in the various other buildings set aside for such purposes.

But, best of all, the celebration now taking place, could mean much more if we would honor some of those who played the leading roles in making our present community possible.

The Stroller's friend, Fritz Howell, did a masterful job with his poem, "Flowers for the Living".... It is well worth following...

Are their children losing the better part of the summer? Are their families being split, due to having children on several different schedules at differing schools? Are they going to have to readjust their lives to accommodate the four 3-week to 38-day breaks during inclement weather periods?

I feel that the people in the Miller attendance area agree on the basic issues: preservation of the neighborhood school and keeping all children in the Miller attendance area at Miller, busing no one.

The disagreement lies in the best way for all concerned to solve the problem. I, for one, don't feel the best way is to implement a program that is totally unacceptable to half the people involved in the Miller experience.

Food co-op opening flops; YW trying again today

Jessie White was mad. She arrived ahead of time for a meeting on food co-ops sponsored by the Northwest Branch YWCA in Redford Township. The Y was hoping to start such a co-op for unemployed persons.

But no one else came. The Y was down but not out, however, on its co-op plans. Quickly it scheduled another try Tuesday, May 27 at 1 p.m. in the Y at 25940 Grand River. If an unemployed person is unable to attend the meeting, he can indicate his interest in joining a food co-op by contacting Ruth Duey.

"Everyone is complaining about prices and no one is doing anything about it," spluttered Mrs. White, a resident of the area. "Here was a chance to set up something that might save money and they don't show up. 'It's time we started organizing. I feel they are doing things to fight the recession in the inner city, but not out here. Yet we have the same problems they have."

"I came out to learn something today, but there will be no meeting because no one else came. I'm disgusted with people."

BOBBIE SKOVGARD, formerly on the staff of the Northwest Branch, was a bit upset, too.

She had arrived with fruits and vegetables to contrast the difference in prices between what can be bought at a local store with what can be purchased through a food co-op.

"All this cost me \$5.38 at a nearby store," she explained. "In a food co-op the same things could have been purchased for \$4, and in addition three pounds of bananas, 1½ pints of strawberries and an eggplant would have been thrown in."

Mrs. Skovgard, who will continue her efforts to organize a co-op Tuesday, pointed out that only a modest beginning would be made at first. Produce only would be purchased.

"I hope once it gets started and people learn the ropes they will be able to go into meat, cheese and eggs," she said, adding that the food co-op she helped organize in Walled Lake over a year ago has already expanded to include these products.

"OUR MEMBERS put \$10 down for 10 pounds of ground round purchased fresh that morning," she said. "We can get 11 ¼ pounds of bologna for

\$7.50 — that's 69 cents a pound. In the stores bologna costs 89 cents for half a pound.

"On cheese we save about half the price and it is the kind of cheese you get at a delicatessen. Paying \$12 for aged cheddar, we get 10 pounds at \$1.20 a pound. In the stores it costs from \$1.80-\$2.40 a pound for the same cheese. Buying in a large quantities, we get things for a good price.

Mrs. Skovgard regretted that people living near the Y were not getting involved.

"There are many values to joining a food co-op besides saving money," she explained. "Because members must give about four hours a work a month buying food, bagging it and babysitting for those who are working, a friendly group spirit develops.

"I'm not discouraged. People just haven't heard about it. But there is potential here and I know they will enjoy the benefits."

Because the food co-op was designed to help the unemployed, the salary of its director, Mrs. Skovgard, is to be paid by United Community Services, an arm of the United Foundation.

For this reason, the program can accept only those who are unemployed.

The scholarships were donated on the basis of academic average, leadership, need and potential for college work.

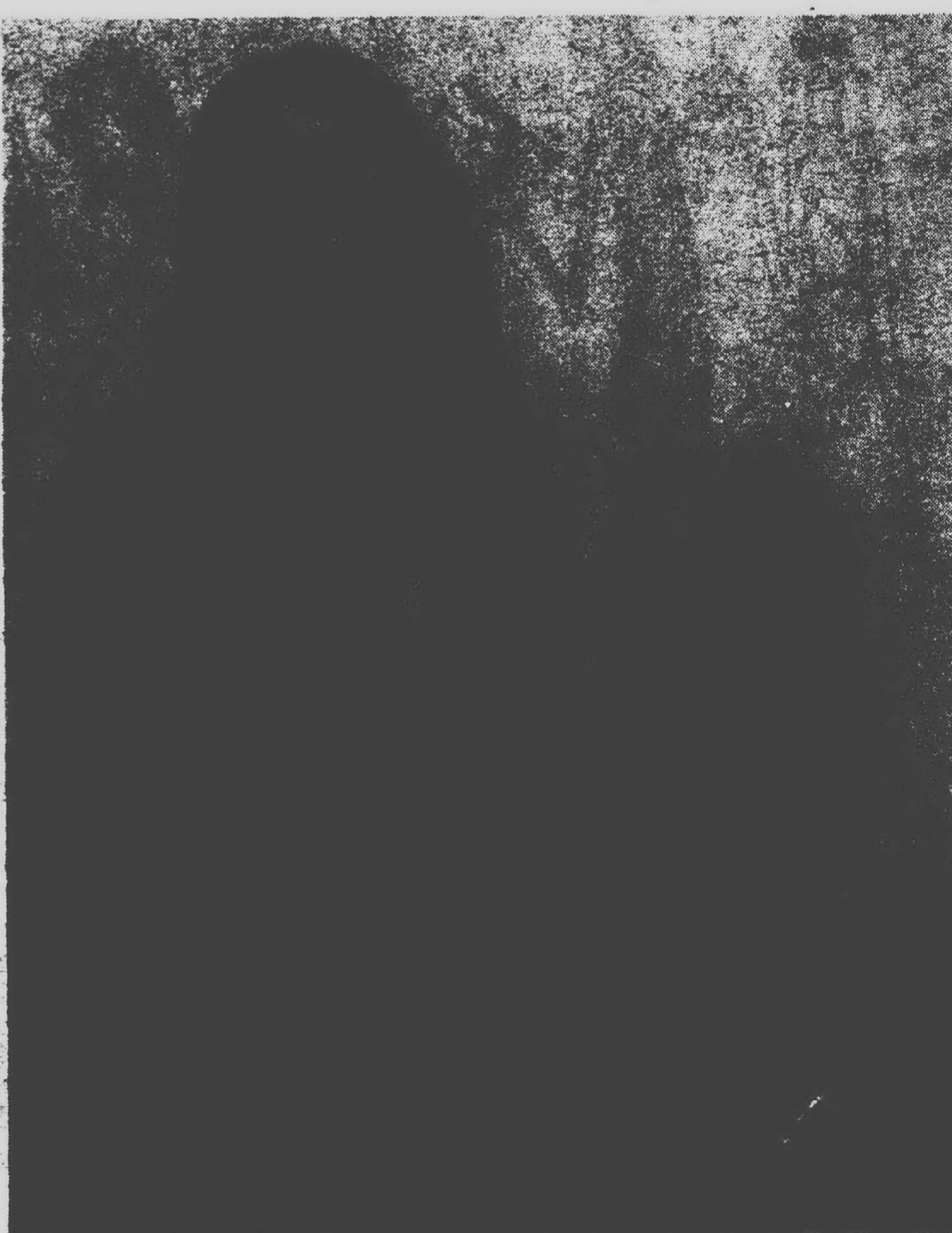
Daughter of the Rev. David Cox, pastor of Plymouth Wesleyan Church, Miss Cox has had an active part in the activities of her father's church.

HAPPY SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS are Debi Miller (left) and Robin Cox. (Staff photo by Art Emanuel)

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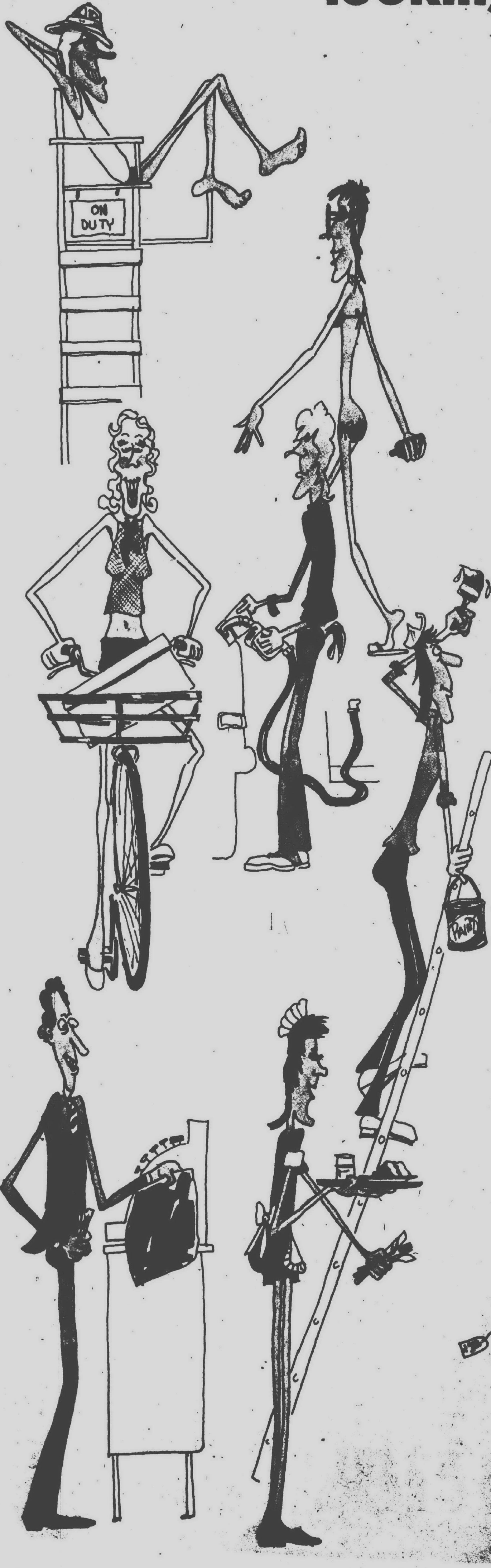

Rockets race to league track title

Coach Barry Basel credited gutsy performances by every member of his Rocket squad for bringing Westland John Glenn its second consecutive Northwest Suburban League track and field championship Wednesday at Livonia Franklin.

"Tom Jakubowski took three firsts and set a league record of 14.4 in the high hurdles to set the pace," Basel exuded after the meet. "But gutsy performances by our men in the field events gave us 23 points going into the track events."

"That set the tone for us. We felt if we could get 20 points in the field events we'd be in good shape. When we got 23, I knew we would be hard to beat."

Paced by the flying spikes of superstar Jakubowski, Glenn rolled to five first place ribbons in running up its winning total of 58 points.

Host Bob Holmes of Franklin which took six firsts, brought his club in second with 52 points, followed by Thurston and North Farmington (tied with 44), Oak Park (24) and Garden City East, (19).

Individual brilliance abounded as Franklin's Dan Quinn captured both the 100 and 220 yard dashes and anchored the winning 440 relay squad. Teammate Greg McGuire also turned in a sparkling effort in breaking the tape in the 440 and running on the Patriots' victorious 880 yard and mile relay teams.

Thurston's Doug Korzym placed in four events, second in the high jump, third in both the long jump and low hurdles and fifth in the high hurdles.

Holmes was very pleased with his team's effort as well as the entire meet. "It was a very exciting meet as the finishes show," he said, "and I'm satisfied with our finish. It was as well as we could hope for."

Big Mike Alimpich started Glenn off on the right foot with a first in the high jump and teammate Dave Johnson took an unexpected third. Basel praised Johnson also for running the best 880 of his career in 1:59.1 to take second in that race.

North Farmington took two firsts in the field events. Tom Moore won the

shot put at 49-10 and Dave Marchiori soared 12-6 to take pole vault honors.

Garden City East's standouts, Doug Sweazy and Art Kitz, swept their races, Sweazy breaking the 880 yard tape in 1:57.8 and Kitz taking the grueling two-mile with 9:50.6.

Jakubowski, labeled by Basel as the finest track man ever to run for Glenn in its 11-year history, also won the low hurdles and long jump and took fifth in the 220.

The other first place finishers was Glenn sophomore Ted Unold, the first Rocket 10th-grader ever to win a league title in track.

Franklin's strength was in the relays as it swept all three. In the 880, Greg McGuire, Jim Casey, Dave Smith and Phil Yuhasz won in 1:32.

The 440 quartet of Dave Smith, Phil Yuhasz, Jim Casey and Dan Quinn showed their heels to their opponents, winning in 44 seconds flat. In the mile relay, Clint Hall, Mike Rochowiak, John Sames and Greg McGuire paced

the pack with a time of 3:31.3.

Glenn won the Northwest League title outright by sweeping all five dual meets as well as the conference championship, totaling 12 points. Franklin's second in the league meet gave it nine points for second place in the final conference standings.

Undeclared Glenn has also won the Wayne Memorial, Western Wayne Relays and the Dearborn Elks Club events this season.

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Yawn! Chargers win league again

Ho hum.
Another Western Six league track meet, another team title for Livonia Churchill.

The Chargers, who are beginning to make the team title a redundant annual affair, did it again Wednesday, easily outdistancing Walled Lake Western 81.5 — 57 to take the title for the fourth consecutive year.

It was not nearly that close as Churchill took seven firsts and set two league records to win going away.

Charger Bill Reardon's performance in the shot put wasn't unexpected.

What was a surprise, however, was the record setting performance of half miler Craig Gully.

Gully covered the distance in 1:57.1 and nobody was more surprised than Price.

out and set a personal best for himself. I think the competition really helped," Price said.

Rick Powers took the pole vault for the Chargers, easily clearing 13 feet for the winning margin. Churchill's Paul Schultz finished second in that event with a vault of 12-2. After Powers had cleared 13 feet, the bar was immediately moved up one foot and he narrowly missed at that height.

Other Churchill firsts came in the high jump, where Joe Kline cleared 6-1; the mile run, where Keith Stoddard had a personal best of 4:36.5; the high hurdles where Jim Packard and Brian Hanna ran one-two with Packard winning in 15.2, and in the two mile run where Todd Wint went 9:51.2.

Wint's effort may have been the most unexpected of all. He took more than 10 seconds off his previous best with that clocking.

Price said that indications are good that the Chargers may be back next year to run the string of consecutive

championships in the Western Six to five.

He will lose only five seniors who produced points in this meet.

And if Price can keep developing talent the likes of Reardon and Powers, the team title might stay a ho-hum affair for years to come.
