Students will help tape area's history

PLYMOUTH—Memories of Main Street and schools and the Plymouth-Canton community "way back when" may soon be recorded on tape for future generations to study and enjoy.

Staff members of the Dunning-Hough Library and four volunteer students from the Centennial Educational Park are ready to kick off an oral history project to celebrate the bicentennial.

THE GROUP hopes to tap the memories of 25 or 30 older persons in the Plymouth-Canton community and preserve those memories on tape.

"A history of a community isn't just comprised of the written word," said head librarian Beth Simescu. "So much of the cultural traits of a community just can't be written down. We're not talking about dates. We're talking about the culture, the background and what people remember from their lives."

"People are rich in that kind of in-

formation but how many people sit down and write a book?"

Mrs. Simescu, children's librarian Patricia Thomas and high school students Barb Yockey, Dan Goepf, Gary Sieber and Mike Macocha soon will begin "writing those books" on tapes. The project, is endorsed by the Community Bicentennial Commission.

Original tapes will become property of Plymouth's historical museum, while one set of copies will remain in the library. Mrs. Simescu plans to give another set of tapes to the Centennial Educational Park.

MRS. SIMESCU and other library staff members have already begun compiling lists of persons with historical knowledge of the community.

Hopefully, the tapes will contain memories of many aspects of the community, including its government, schools, churches, farms, businesses and medical practices.

Volunteer high school students will

conduct taped interviews, after Mrs. Simescu makes the initial contacts. The interviews will take place in interviewees' homes.

Mrs. Simescu expects the interview portion of the project to take all summer. Students will probably complete the project next fall, after completing editing tasks.

"We want people to do this as a really important part of heritage and the bicentennial," Mrs. Simescu said. "So many people have really seen the community and know about it. It would be a crime to let these people pass away without putting their memories on tape."

Mrs. Simescu expects cost of the project to total \$250. That amount will cover the costs of tapes and photographs of each interviewed person. Persons willing to donate financial contributions toward the project should contact the library.

State 'surrenders' on public airport in Plymouth area

Chances of a public airport in this area have ended.

The Michigan Aeronautics Association (MAA), after speaking to the Intergovernmental Council Wednesday night, has given up on locating a public airport in this area and will begin to look elsewhere.

"The whole thing is now dead, and I won't pursue it any further. I'm sorry I couldn't convince you," said Les Andrews, chief engineer for the MAA—a division of the Michigan Department of Highways and Transportation.

That declaration immediately followed a 4-0 vote, with two units of government abstaining, against studying whether an airport should be located in this area.

Area governments voting against conducting the study were Canton, Plymouth and Salem Townships and Plymouth Community School District. Abstaining were the City of Plymouth and Superior Township.

THE MAA was invited to address governmental leaders on why a public-owned airport is needed in western Wayne County.

The Intergovernmental Council earlier had sent a letter stating its opposition to a study, and the MAA wanted the chance to make a full presentation on the need.

"There are only four public airports in this six-county area—all the rest are privately owned," Andrews said. "In this area, Mettetal in Canton Township and National Airport in Westland will be out of business soon, and the area won't have any airport facilities."

Private airports are going out of business throughout Michigan, he added, because rising land values boost taxes to the point where they cannot operate profitably.

"But there are a lot of private planes and aviation activity in this area which must be taken care of. Public officials here in the short future will be severely criticized by their own constituents for not planning properly for the future."

"There's bound to be repercussions regardless of what you decide. The question is do you wish to take the risk to make a study."

RICHARD GORNICK, Plymouth Township trustee, challenged the need: "We have been in government around here for a number of years and nobody, until now, has ever ap-

proached us to say there's a need for a public airport."

Gornick added that industry can use Willow Run or Detroit Metropolitan airports, the railroads, trucks or Great Lakes shipping.

"We are not talking about landing large aircraft with freight but small one or two-engine planes for businessmen's use in travel," Andrews answered. "There are 1,300 registered aircraft at public airports and 1,300 registered at private airports in the metropolitan Detroit area, he added."

Gornick said he had serious reservations about the propriety of spending public money to serve only a small portion—about one per cent—of the populace who are licensed to fly.

Andrews said that of those who do fly, 60 per cent fly for business purposes.

Gornick noted Wayne County's population will decline over the next two decades. "I cannot see the need now for an expanded airport. And with a declining population in Wayne County, how can we be expected to believe a larger airport facility will be needed in the future?"

The trustee was told that the airport envisioned would serve pilots from perhaps four counties, at least the corners of Washtenaw, Oakland counties and northwest Wayne County.

HELEN RICHARDSON, Plymouth Township clerk, asked how much the study would cost and who would pay for it.

Andrews said he had no idea what the cost would be, but the Wayne County Road Commission as willing make the study and pay for it with profits from aviation uses at Metropolitan Airport.

Thomas Yack, Plymouth school board member, commented: "I am very uncomfortable with governmental agencies making studies when they already have a vested interest," referring to the road commission's control over Metropolitan Airport.

"The road commission has only

agreed to make the study," said Andrews. "I can bet you that when it comes to developing a project, the road commission will back out and the local governmental units will pick up the project."

ROBERT GREENSTEIN, Canton supervisor, commented: "I'm a pilot myself but will never go along with the one group I distrust the most—the Wayne County Road Commission."

He suggested the \$100,000 to \$300,000 which might be spent on a complete master plan study for a public airport would be better invested if it were handed over to Mettetal to allow it to keep operating another five to 10 years.

Gornick asked if the airport would pay for itself. Andrews said the number of aircraft (about 250) expected to use the facility would be sufficient to pay for the operation and might pay part of the local share for capital improvements.

Andrews said a public airport was more financially feasible because it would be eligible for state and federal funds for capital investment.

An airport would require between 600 to 1,000 acres, he added, based on unmet needs once Mettetal and National airports close down.

"That's 600 to 1,000 acres that will be taken off the tax rolls which could be developed industrial or commercial," Greenstein quickly responded. "Let's talk about preserving Mettetal or National airports, but don't try to take 1,000 acres from Canton or Plymouth townships because you'll have some trouble on your hands. For that reason I'm opposed to the study."

Gornick observed that residents see airports as a bad thing for the community. "Two dispersed airports may be better than a larger airport. You want to put more of a bad thing in a concentrated area."

Andrews admitted that Mettetal doesn't meet state standards and is unsafe from the standpoint of approaches.

"We represent our citizens who don't want an airport," said Mrs. Richardson. "The only ones who seem to want an airport expanded are the pilots. And at our hearings only three were from Plymouth, Plymouth Township or Canton Township."

County Commissioner Royce Smith, whose district includes Plymouth and Canton, suggested the state spend its money for a study in an area where people want an airport.

Plymouth High graduate is now teaching in Colombia

Peanut plants and earthquakes and students' pet boa constrictors were never features of Lidia Menchaca's student and teaching days in Plymouth and Livonia.

But a tropical climate, a city of 5 half-million and a year spent in Baranquilla, Colombia's brand new missionary school brought the colorful scenes alive for the former western Wayne County resident.

MISS MENCHACA, a 1956 graduate of Plymouth High and a teacher of four years at Livonia's Hayes and Cooper elementary schools, last year

realized her dream of teaching in a foreign country.

Although Miss Menchaca is eagerly awaiting her return to the Colombian school next fall, her summer stay in Plymouth and the northern Michigan community of Rock will be breezy with talk of her South American experience.

Miss Menchaca's journey began last summer, when she toured Colombia with members of the Brethren Missionary Church. Talk of starting an elementary school for missionary children enticed her to stay.

"While I was there, the need for teachers was expressed. I always wanted to teach in a foreign country, and this seemed to be the opportunity."

"Some of these children had been taught at home and others had been taught in Spanish-speaking schools or other boarding schools. Their parents wanted a church-oriented curriculum. The primary purpose of the school was to give the kids a North American culture, so they could adapt when they returned."

Road commissioners get flak from area officials

The Wayne County Road Commission took it on the chin when the Intergovernmental Council met in Plymouth to hear a presentation from the state on the need for a public airport in this area.

Plymouth and Canton officials expressed the opinion that an airport in this area might have been suitable in years past, but was unacceptable now that the area is developed.

For the past quarter century, the Michigan Aeronautics Association (MAA) has been considering the needs for airport facilities in Wayne County, but the Wayne County Road Commission—which controls and operates Detroit Metropolitan Airport in Romulus—has always opposed state efforts to conduct studies.

The road commission was the prime objector in years past to forming an airport authority, but now is willing to sponsor a study because it wants to get rid of the smaller aircraft at Metropolitan Airport.

Governmental officials were told Wednesday night that the road commission wants to get rid of the smaller aircraft at Metro because they are hard to intermingle with the large airplanes.

LES ANDREWS, chief engineer for the MAA, confirmed the road commis-

sion is willing to sponsor the study and, if it did, would decide which planning firm would do the work.

After Andrews said the road commission would only make the study but would not develop the project, Canton Supervisor Robert Greenstein snapped:

"That's nonsense. The local units of government here don't have the money to finance such a project, and the road commission in its entire life has never given up control of anything."

"The road commission, as always, has a selfish motive. Now that this area has built up, the road commission in its majesty has reversed itself on the need for an airport and will undertake a study, then pull out and let the communities take over. Never!"

"If any criticism is leveled in this area about poor planning, it must be directed towards the Wayne County Road Commission and not the small units of government that will never have the money to go into this type of project."

"Maybe the road commission is afraid that someday it will be called before its Great Maker, whoever that might be," quipped Greenstein, "and have to explain its past actions. I for one won't go along with the road com-

mission—the one group I distrust the most—conducting the study."

Greenstein asked why the MAA didn't tell the road commission 10 years ago to get behind an effort to locate a public airport, and Andrews admitted: "Nobody had the guts to do it then."

"Is it possible now that a study is being asked only because the road commission has given its blessing?" asked Greenstein.

THE CANTON supervisor admitted there is a need for an airport in this general area.

"But the ones with the obligations—the state and road commission—haven't done their job in this area." He later laid the blame entirely on the road commission.

A Superior Township official complained about how obstinate the road commission had been about having its own way on an improvement project in that community, and other officials joined in to complain about the road commission's independence and arrogance.

Wayne County Commissioner Royce Smith, whose district includes Plymouth and Canton, commented that the county board's only control over the road commission is to approve its annual budgets and any bond issues.

SC increases tax slightly to help pay debts

Residents in the Schoolcraft College district, which includes Clarenceville, Plymouth, Livonia, Garden City and Northville school districts, will experience an increase in their 1975-76 tax bills.

The Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees at a special meeting Wednesday voted 8-0 to levy 0.36 mills in addition to the district's 1.77 voted millage, to meet the college's debt retirement payments for 1975-76.

The district's tax levy, including debt retirement, will be \$2.13 per \$1,000 of State Equalized Valuation (SEV).

BEFORE ADOPTING the tax levy, the board held a public hearing and voted unanimously to accept the \$9 million 1975-76 budget.

The new budget, a \$1 million increase over last year, includes sever-

al full-time faculty positions and an office of research and development.

Taxes will yield nearly \$4 million for the college. Of that, the 1.77 voted millage will produce \$3.3 million to be used for special maintenance and special equipment funds, and for operating purposes.

The 0.36 mills, up over last year's 0.225 mills, will generate 1986 and 1988 debt retirement funds, according to Dr. C. Nelson Grote, Schoolcraft president.

According to state law, the board may levy in excess of voted millage only as much as is needed to meet its

debt retirement payments for the year. Schoolcraft presently has an outstanding debt of \$6.7 million.

The increased millage for debt retirement funds was criticized by several trustees, but the decision was unanimous.

7 students earn health scholarships

Earning \$225 grants were Mary Beth Williams of Ladywood Catholic High in Livonia, Linda M. Haggerty of Livonia Bentley High and Janet Lynn Mason of Garden City East High.

THE AWARD winners were chosen on the basis of need and scholastic ability. Each applicant was required to be a senior and accepted to enter a regionally accredited higher learning institution as a fulltime student in the fall of 1975.

Miss Kuras is enrolled in Washtenaw Community College and plans to study inhalation therapy. Her father, Joseph Kuras, works for Scott Paper Company.

Miss Heather plans to attend Eastern Michigan University to study occupational therapy. Her mother, Lucille Heather, is a secretary for the Garden City School District.

Miss Watson is enrolled in University of Michigan and plans to enter physical therapy as her health field. Her father, Herman Watson, is self-employed.

Miss Clements will attend Eastern Michigan University to study speech pathology-audiology. Her father, Charles P. Clements, works for Consumers Power in Livonia.

Miss Williams will attend Madonna College in Livonia on a nursing curriculum. Her father, Leon Williams, works for Manley, Bennett & McDonald.

Miss Haggerty plans to enter Mercy College in Detroit to study nursing. Her father, Connel F. Haggerty, is employed by the State of Michigan.

Miss Mason will attend the University of Michigan to study nursing. Her mother, Christine Mason, is currently unemployed.

THE SCHOLARSHIPS given by the March of Dimes have increased over the past five years from six to 25 and from a total of \$1,800 to \$8,000.

"More and more persons are needed every day in the all important fields of health care service," says Richard T. Kelly, chairman of the Wayne County Board of Auditors and chairman of the Metropolitan Detroit Chapter March of Dimes.

"The areas in which we've awarded the scholarships are directly related to the March of Dimes which is the major voluntary health organization in the country leading the on-going battle against birth defects and assuring proper care and medical assistance to those children already afflicted."

Information on the scholarships and the applications are sent to high school counseling departments in November of the previous year. The scholarships are awarded annually.

Cycle crash injures 2

PLYMOUTH—A head-on collision between a car and a motorcycle at Northville Road and Edward Hines

Drive has left two Westland youths hospitalized with multiple cuts and broken bones.

The incident occurred at 10:40 p.m. June 17 when a car driven by Russell Brown, 17, of Northville, struck the motorcycle as the car crossed the center line on Northville Road.

Both the driver of the cycle, Bill Jasewicz, 16, of Westland and his passenger, John Murray, 17, also of Westland, were listed in satisfactory condition at Wayne County General Hospital over the weekend.

Neither Brown nor a female passenger in the car was injured. Wayne County Sheriff's deputies report that Brown was ticketed for crossing the center line of the road.

Jasewicz suffered a dislocated pelvis and several cuts while Murray suffered multiple fractures of his left leg along with multiple cuts. Both are juniors at John Glenn High in Westland.

PLYMOUTH—Everything from the story of "Jerome the Frog" to a string trio from the Plymouth Symphony has been placed at the fingertips of students within the Plymouth Schools during the past school year.

It's been done through the energetic efforts of the Plymouth Community Arts Council (PCAC).

MORE THAN 200 classrooms from first through 12 grades have enjoyed one or more of the 11 amateur programs offered through the PCAC.

Begun four years ago under the guidance of Janita Hauk, the program provides a greater appreciation of the performing arts to almost half of the 13,000 students within the district.

Dance, music, story-telling, and a social history discussion filled the program bill for this year. The most popular among teachers were the social history talks by Marjorie Mitchell, a Plymouth area housewife.

Close to 100 classes have heard enriching talks on the early colonial days, Williamsburg, American Indians, Michigan Indians, and traditional Oriental culture.

Mrs. Mitchell has incorporated the use of dolls and toys from the past to reconstruct the period for her listeners, ranging from first graders

through high school students.

DANCE WAS also an important part of the PCAC's program with an appreciation session offered by University of Michigan students, actual dance participation led by Pam Carlson, and performances offered by the Polonaise Society Dancers.

Allen School Principal Thomas Workman, who made use of many of the PCAC programs throughout the past school year, notes:

"We are extremely pleased with the variety and quality of programs available to our children on such an easily arranged schedule. The programs most certainly broaden the experience of the youngsters, without long bus trips outside the school."

THE BULK of the programs are offered free to the schools with a lot of flexibility built in so either a large assembly or small group can take advantage of the programs.

Mrs. Hauk noted the program has continued to grow each of the four years it has been in existence, with more volunteers offering their talents for the students to enjoy.

The program got a great boost two years ago when the amateur program was joined by four musical programs

offered through the Plymouth Symphony Society under the guidance of Jean Braun.

The addition of the Symphony programs brings in a brass ensemble, a horn demonstration featuring everything from a tuba to a French horn, a high school woodwind quintet, and a string trio featuring Mrs. Hauk, Mrs. Braun, and Janet Holt.

While Mrs. Hauk handles the "bookings" for the amateur programs, Mrs. Braun coordinates the "bookings" for the symphony programs.

An added musical treat offered through the PCAC's side of the program includes a performing arts ensemble featuring ballet accompanied by a string quartet and a harp. The program is provided through the courtesy of the group's director, Frank Henderson.

SOMETHING WHICH may give an even greater boost to the program and create a larger demand for programs in the coming year is the beginning of a humanities program within the elementary schools throughout the Plymouth School District.

After bringing in a storytelling program of "Super Pickle," "Jerome the Frog," and "Old Black Witch" by Eastern Michigan University drama

student Diane Easdon, Starkweather Elementary humanities teacher Jacquelyn Miksa noted:

"The humanities program initiated in February in the Plymouth schools has been most successful. My aim is to integrate the arts."

"Children find they can communicate through creative art forms, and we have experienced many forms of self-expression including dance, drama, and story telling."

"The PCAC amateur programs have enriched this program for me."

WHILE Mrs. Hauk states she is pleased with growth of the program and the demand for the arts in the schools, she would like to encourage more local talent to participate and volunteer their talents for the students to enjoy.

The amateur program of the PCAC in cooperation with the Plymouth Symphony represents about half of the work done in the schools by the arts council.

Other ongoing programs include the "Picture Ladies" who bring in reproductions of fine art for demonstration, and the professional performing arts program which includes items like this winter's "Opera Week" in the schools.

Area rail routes included in plan

Southeast Michigan Council of Government officials clarified an apparent oversight in the 1980 transportation plan for the seven-county region during a June 18 meeting with suburban officials.

The meeting was called by Livonia Mayor Edward McNamara, who expressed concern that the plan failed to mention the development of the Chesapeake & Ohio or the Baltimore & Ohio railroads, now extending from Detroit to Plymouth, as rapid transit lines.

Other concerned officials who attended the meeting were Beverly McAninch, Plymouth mayor; Lawrence Wright, Northville Township supervisor; and Eugene McKinney, Westland mayor.

According to Michael Tako, transportation program manager for SEMCOG, McNamara's concern was justified, because a summary of the SEMCOG transportation plan omitted the C&O and B&O lines on maps in its June 1975 publication of the plan.

However, the publication did mention development of the lines, which cross through Livonia and Plymouth.

TAKE SOAD the rail lines would be improved if the plan is adopted at SEMCOG's General Assembly meeting June 26.

The railroads would be "regional commuter rail" systems and would be flanked by two other major rail routes, one from Detroit to Pontiac, the other from Romulus to Ann Arbor.

Though the Detroit-to-Plymouth line is still under study, CORD (Committee on Regional Development) has approved the transportation plan, including the rail routes.

IMPROVEMENT OF Ford and Middle Belt also will affect western Wayne County communities. Ross Childs, SEMTA (Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority) general manager, said additional lanes would be added to those roads to handle heavier traffic anticipated in the area.

Special bus and commuter lanes are being considered for the Jeffries Freeway, sections of which are to be opened in the fall, according to Childs.

Childs described the transportation plan as a "super bus service," which he said would not be all bad if "the state of the art" of buses is good when the plan is implemented.

"If we fail to build a transit network, then the highway network must be redesigned to meet needs."

CHILDS CALLED the SEMTA plan "an overall effort to find and meet the needs of the people. This is the first regional network in the nation—or in the Northern Hemisphere, for that matter. It covers 4,500 square miles.

The Toronto mass transit system was used as a model for the SEMTA plan, he said.

Commuter rails are expected to handle an increasing number of commuters, from the present several hundred now using rails from Detroit to Ann Arbor, for example, to several thousand passengers daily by 1978.

He said the C&O line has good signalization, but the roadbed needs repair, and the C&O now is primarily interested in its freight, rather than passenger, business.

Y to emphasize home pool safety

A child's life could be spared because of a program to be sponsored for the 10th year by the Livonia Family Y.

To prevent tragic drownings in swimming areas, particularly backyard swimming pools, the Y will offer classes on water safety to youngsters three years old and up. Registration is open now.

Classes will be given in 29 neighborhood pools by qualified, certified instructors and aides. The 45-minute lessons will involve exposing the child to water and teaching him respect for it, with emphasis on avoiding panic.

"Our principal aim is to make the youngsters in the community a little more water-safe than they were before we came in contact with them," said Shirley Ritter, assistant physical education director at the Y, who is in charge of the program.

"If you drive through the neighborhoods, you will find that backyard pools are becoming common — Michigan has more of them than California.

"Then when you look at the fact that there were 18 drownings in Michigan over the Memorial weekend, you will see that there is a definite need for this kind of instruction.

Instruction is at two levels, beginner and advanced beginner. Six lessons will be given in each two-week session. The sessions will run from June 24-July 4, from July 8-July 18, from July 22 through Aug. 1 and Aug. 5-15.

Cost is \$12 per child. The Y will provide

all floatation and teaching aids. Parents may observe the first and last lesson only. Classes will be held on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursdays. Lessons missed because of rain will be made up on Monday or Friday.

It is not necessary to be a member of the Family Y to participate.

ROBERT L. ISRAEL of Livonia has been appointed president and director of Michigan National Bank-Dearborn. PLYMOUTH—A wide variety of physical fitness programs for kids and adults are planned to begin June 30 at the Canton-Northville-Plymouth YMCA.

Adults and young adults can take advantage of a "Run for Your Life" jogging club, an AAU track club, golf, tennis, and women's fitness.

All four trips will offer wild plant identification, map and compass reading, first aid, and a solo survival experience.

DAILY HIKING and biking experiences for the younger set will be offered to boys and girls age nine through 13. The four two-week sessions will begin each day at 9:30 and run to 3:30 p.m.

Hikers will pack a lunch and explore local recreational areas with an emphasis on hiking and biking instruction and safety.

For kids in kindergarten through fifth grade, the 'Y' will offer day camp programs at four schools within the area. Supervised by trained teach-

ers, the two-week sessions will include games, arts and crafts, field trips and other activities.

SCHOOL SITES for the day camp programs include Tanger, Allen, Starkweather, and Bird. Staggered sessions begin on June 30 and run in two-week blocks through Aug. 15.

Costs for the day camp program are set at \$30 per person with a 'Y' membership and \$35 for non-members. For families with more than one child attending the cost is \$25 per person.

Fee for the six-week course, open to all ages, is \$19. A picnic area is available for family outings.

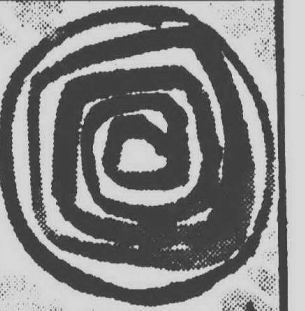
Bowling instruction and league play begin June 30 and end the last week in August. The \$1.90 fee per session includes three games of bowling, shoes, awards and refreshments.

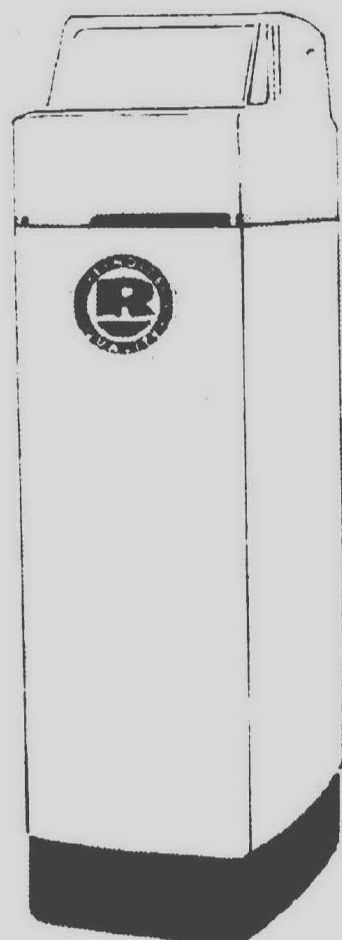

Nature trails lead to outdoor learning

Let's take a walk.
Anytime is a good time to explore nature, but in the summer you've got sunny weekends (mostly) to venture in the out-of-doors.

Getting back to nature is becoming increasingly popular. State and regional park systems offer walks along their nature trails. Environmental centers are springing up or expanding, with nature hikes available in addition to indoor programs.

The Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority's Metroparks system offers Sunday morning guided nature walks for you and your family. These begin at 8 a.m. on scheduled dates at Kensington Metropark near Milford and at Stony Creek Metropark near Utica/Rochester.

THOMAS H. SMITH, chief naturalist for the system, explains, "The naturalist takes advantage of the season of the year and what's available. If you were to go on every walk, theoretically, you would see something different. This time of year, the naturalists deal a lot with insects—mosquitoes—and plant life of the area."

Kensington's trails have been open since the park was built around the 1950s; Stony Creek's trails opened in 1964.

"You can see dried-up stems of plants from last year and new ones just starting to come up, such as the wild cucumber vine," Smith adds.

UPCOMING DATES for walks along Kensington's four trails are July 13 and 27 and, tentatively, Aug. 10 and 24 and Sept. 14 and 28.

The three Stony Creek trails can be hiked during the next months on July 13, Aug. 10, Sept. 14 and 28.

In addition to the two-hour Sunday walks for individuals or families, Kensington and Stony Creek offer group field trips by appointment Tuesday through Sunday.

At Kensington, a toll booth leads to the Nature Center. Only charge is \$5 annual fee for a car to enter the park, or \$1 a day. At Stony Creek, there is no toll booth to the Nature Center.

FOR DO-IT-YOURSELFERS, maps are available at the Nature Center, or you can trek the trails alone.

"The trails are well marked," Smith says. "You can't get lost." He adds, "They are open seven days a week, from 8 a.m. to dusk."

To get to Kensington, take I-96 to the Kensington Road exit. Stony Creek is reached by taking the Twenty-Six Mile Road exit off the Van Dyke Freeway and following the directional signs to the Nature Center.

Smith explains the booming interest in nature, "With increased populations, industrialization and urbanization of our land, people are reaching out to regain an understanding and ap-

preciation of what a good, clean, healthy environment is. Certainly more leisure time is available to enjoy the out-of-doors."

THE DRAYTON Plains Nature Center for Environmental Education is privately owned, by its membership. Douglas Covert, director and naturalist, and naturalist Kathleen Dougherty alternate conducting Sunday morning walks for one to a dozen persons.

Walks leave at 9 a.m. sharp from the Interpretive Center, 2125 Denby Road, Drayton Plains (take Dixie Highway to Hatchery Road, to Edmore Street, to Denby).

Walks are open to members, but prospective members are invited to join in, according to Covert. Individual membership is \$7.50 yearly, \$15 for a family.

Covert is proud of the 137-acre sanctuary and its programs of environmental education. The center has been open since 1967, and its nature walks began this January.

WOODS, HARDWOODS, conifer forest, marshes, ponds and rivers are visited on the walks.

"Wear your hiking shoes," Covert cautions. "Some nature trails might just as well be a city park. Ours are real nature trails through the real woods."

He suggests, "Bring insect repellent, too. I'm sure we don't have an exclusive on mosquitos."

Covert says the discovery hikes are ready to go whatever the weather, rain or shine. A walk lasts two to three hours, returning "when we feel like returning, depending on the mood of the group."

THE HAVEN HILL Environmental Education Center at the Highland Recreation Area, 5200 Highland Road, Mil-

ford, offers 17 miles of trail system.

Hartley Thornton, park naturalist, says most of these walks are self guided. Guided group walks are by special request, a month in advance, by mail or phone.

"Three trails are marked in color," he says. "These are through swamp, climax forest of beech maple, cedar swamp, rolling hills and lakeshore."

A special one-mile trail, related to the environmental education program, covers five basic nature resources: Life, climate, water, land use, and minerals or geology.

There are also riding trails on horseback.

ANOTHER ATTRACTION is a man-made ecologically balanced pond community, with turtles, salamanders, frogs and snakes.

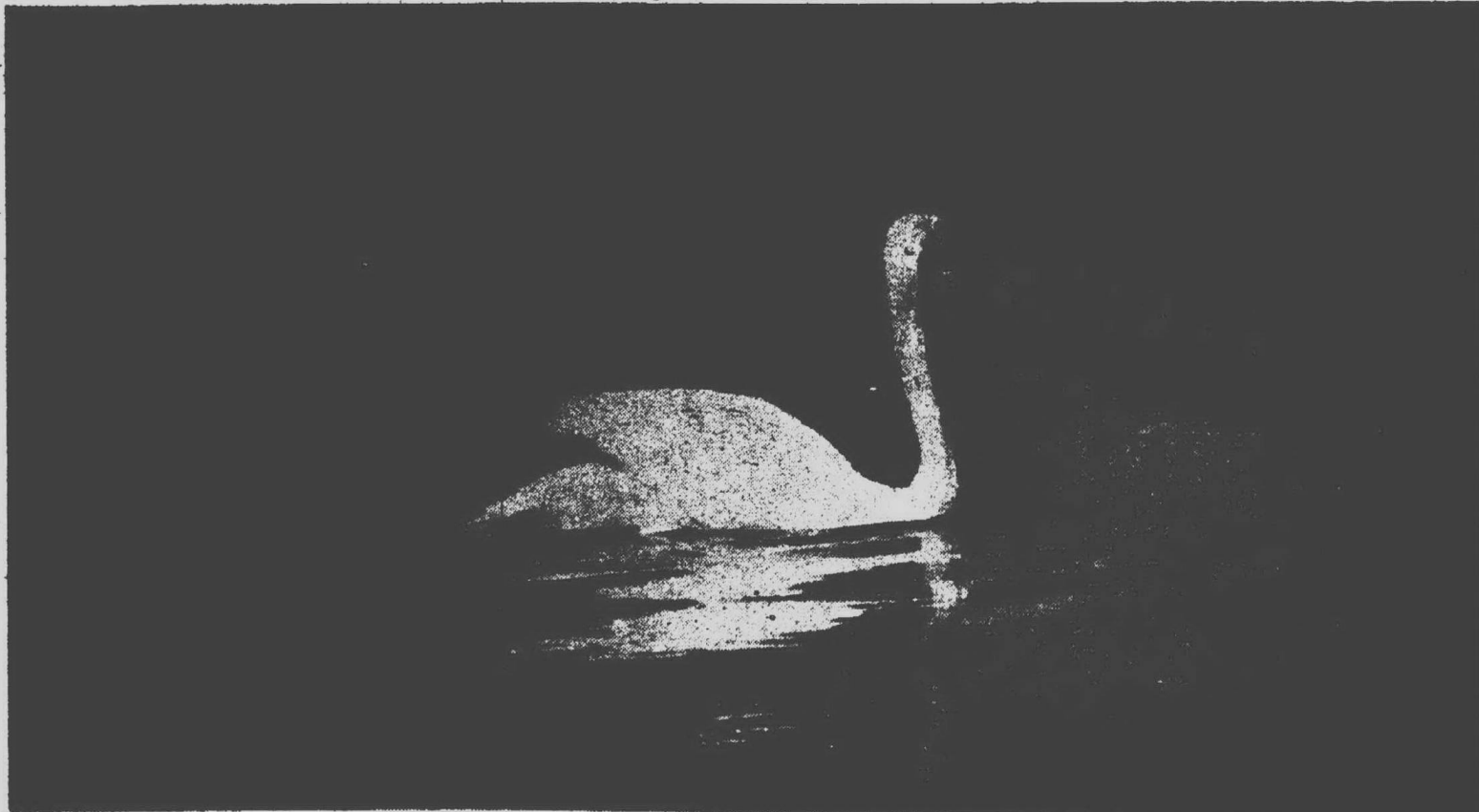
The environmental center is located at Edsel Ford's former country retreat, Haven Hill Farm, or Lodge. The property became part of the 5,402-acre Highland State Recreation Area in 1943, and the lodge was opened as a conference center in 1949.

The one-mile nature trail opened along with the environmental center in February of this year. So far, 5,635 persons have visited the nature center and walked its trails.

Thornton says, "The trails are open seven days a week, all the time, even in the winter. In bad weather, we have an inside program."

THE NANKIN Mills Nature Center at 33175 Ann Arbor Trail in Westland is located in the Middle Rouge Parkway, Wayne County.

The William P. Holiday forest and wildlife preserve is adjacent to the nature center and has about 12 miles of trails. Guided nature walks are available by reservation for groups only, of 20 persons or more.

The debate on band is matter of priority

The discussion on whether Centennial Educational Park should have two marching bands is a healthy one for the entire community.

The debate centers on an issue which ought to be discussed. Even if there is no immediate resolution, at least residents can join school officials in coming to grips with an age-old question.

The current debate about Plymouth-Canton High having its own marching band will certainly

Similar arguments are made about whether school sports programs should be limited to varsity sports for a select few, open to all students with only intramural competition, or a mixture.

Each resident must answer for himself whether money spent on the bands is best invested in building and maintaining excellence, or in providing a learning experience and appreciation for music.

THE EXCELLENCE of the marching band — or any other high school bands, for that matter — certainly cannot be questioned.

The music program has given the community a source for great pride. Everyone can enjoy the fine talent in the bands when they perform evenings in Kellogg Park. Plymouth is better known throughout the nation and state with the bands travelling to the Orange Bowl and Rose Bowl, and for Gov. Milliken's inaugural. You can't argue with success, and this is one big success story.

But neither can you seriously argue that the main function of any school program should be to provide a learning experience for its students. Being a member of a band not only helps a student learn to play an instrument, but gives him an appreciation for music which will make him a better adult.

Because of the costs of instruments, uniforms and sheet music, bands may never be open to all who wish to join. In this regard, the band program is not the same as an "open door" policy for English, social studies, chess, drama or other extracurricular activities.

But the desire for excellence should never be given higher priority than the need to educate. That is the priority the community must wrestle with and someday find the middle ground.

students were six: American and Canadian boys, many had lived most their lives in the Baraquilla and brought many Colombian cultural habits to the missionary classroom.

"Some of the children were really well-versed in Colombian culture," Miss Menchaca recalled. "The seasons, for example, were difficult to teach because many of them couldn't remember snow."

There was the time an elementary student brought his 33-inch boa constrictor to class, and the time the whole class planted peanuts to make peanut butter for sandwiches.

"Then there was the day of the earthquake," Miss Menchaca laughed. "I was taking a siesta when my bed began rocking. I quickly turned to tell whoever was shaking my bed to stop it. Instead, I saw the lampshade waving in the 'breeze.'"

Miss Menchaca, who took a leave of absence from the Upper Peninsula's Rock School District to teach at the missionary school, believes the experience will help her teaching when she returns to the States.

"It was a really good experience and I'm looking forward to going back. I think it will put vim and vigor in my teaching. Working with a small class helps you pinpoint individual needs. I think it will really enrich my life."

MISS MENCHACA also expects to enjoy her stay in Michigan this summer. She plans to visit her parents, Leo and Margaret Menchaca of Plymouth, visit old friends in Rock and show her Colombian slides to all who wish to see them.

"By being away, you do learn to appreciate the United States with all its faults. I appreciate going to the faucet and not having to wonder if I should boil the water for 20 minutes. Maybe it's just because it's my native land, but it's basically a really nice place to live."

Miss Menchaca's plans are firm through next May, when the Colombian school year ends, but plans beyond that point are fuzzy with uncertainty.

"I know I'll be going back this year. By next March or April, I'll have to let my school system know what I plan to do."

Miss Menchaca holds bachelor and masters degrees in education from Eastern Michigan University. She has taught elementary school in Livonia, Rock, Mount Clemens and for South Dakota's Bureau of Indian Affairs.

William E. Barrett, "Lady of the Lotus," Yasodhara. Her name means Companion to Fame, and it is apt, for she was the wife of Prince Siddhartha Gautama, who was to become the Buddha, the Perfectly Enlightened One. To veteran novelist William Barrett, Yasodhara's was one of the great untold stories of the world, one which took him decades to write. "There have been at least one thousand books written about Siddhartha," he writes, "and not a single book on the life of Yasodhara, who married him."

Theirs is one of the great romances of world history, a love story unlike any other." In doing research for "Lady of the Lotus," Barrett built a personal library of hundreds of volumes. He talked to many Buddhist scholars, Buddhist monks, and missionaries of other faiths in Buddhist countries. He walked the footsteps of Siddhartha. It is, Barrett says, "a story that I know well in lands that I know. I have built many intuitive bridges but I believe that the bridges are sound, that this is the story as it was."

2 friends of retarded could win national honors

Clifford Page, a man whose name in this area has come to mean friend of the retarded, soon may be known nationally for his compassion and skill in that kind of special education.

Page, principal of two schools housing programs for the retarded and handicapped of six school districts, has been named Educator of the Year by the Michigan Association for Retarded Citizens and will be considered by the National Association of Retarded Citizens (NARC) for its highest honor.

At the same time, Mrs. Kathleen Uhlig, a member of Page's faculty, is in the running for National Teacher of the Year in the area of retardation.

Both were nominated by the Northwest Communities Association for Retarded Citizens, which has members from Livonia, Garden City, Plymouth, Redford Union, South Redford and Northville, and both were selected by the Michigan association to represent the state.

National winners will be announced in August.

THE NATIONAL ASSOCIATION specifies in its criteria for top awards

that those named must have furthered NARC goals of "full educational opportunities for all mentally retarded persons" and also must have prompted awareness of these goals among parents and in the community.

Page's qualifications in this regard were stated in letters from many who had worked closely with him.

"Mr. Page's personal philosophy of treating every individual, regardless of his handicap, as a first class citizen, and providing the maximum educational opportunities for him is widely known by educators and parents alike," wrote Gus Kaselemis, Redford Union district director of special education.

"This message is carried over into the communities where he serves on various committees and speaks at many functions."

"He has never felt that the children must fit our program," wrote Mrs. Leonora LaPyrne, teacher aide in the trainable program at Harrison School, "but rather that the program fit the needs and capabilities of the children."

CHARLOTTE NICHOLS, who has worked under Page in the newly-developed Northwest Wayne Skill Cen-

ter, providing vocational training for the educationally handicapped, told in her letter of his leadership in gradual development of a wide range of services for the retarded and handicapped.

"Mr. Page," she wrote, "has consistently worked toward this goal: to provide for every special education child from birth through adulthood the opportunity to learn according to ability and potential, becoming

Don Grabowski, special education director in South Redford, said Page "has always been willing to go an extra step, beyond the call of duty, to assist a handicapped child or his family."

Barbara Moore, past president of the Northwest Communities Association, pointed to his "steadfast and kindly work with parents to encourage them to let their child become an adult and not overprotect at home."

"I have found that he is very fair and will go to whatever lengths necessary to see that every child in his program is given every opportunity to succeed," wrote Mrs. Sylvia Kloc, newsletter editor for the Northwest Communities association.

COMMENDATIONS also came from leaders of related programs in which Page has played a vital role.

Jan Plas, president of Community Opportunity Center, told of Page's assistance in establishing first a sheltered workshop and recently a group home for retarded adults in Plymouth and said in the latter project he had provided "invaluable background as to the needs and future expectations for each potential resident."

Delora Yori, president of the board of the Northwestern Guidance Clinic for retarded citizens, said he had had "great impact" in developing clinic programs. Judge James E. Mies of 16th District Court reported Page "willingly undertook another role—that of a volunteer probation officer working with mentally handicapped probationers."

One other facet of his impact on special education was mentioned by Nancy Gould, a teacher in the Harrison trainable program, who said he has "done much to attract and prepare teachers for careers in special

education by his willingness to talk to others about the rewards of such a career."

PAGE, A GRADUATE of Drake University in Des Moines, taught first in Greenfield, Iowa, and then went to Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., where he began special education work.

He came to Livonia in 1967 to teach an experimental program with the trainable mentally-retarded, the first in Wayne County. It involved with 22 retarded persons who met in St. Andrew Episcopal Church.

That program ended in 1969 and Page, while teaching the educable retarded in the Livonia district and earning a master's degree in retardation at Wayne State University, helped the Livonia Association for the Retarded organize a school for the trainable.

In 1963 the Michigan Legislature passed an act making it permissible, but not mandatory, for a school district to operate a trainable program, and the Livonia district took over the Clifford Page School. The following year the program went regional to include Redford, Garden City, Plymouth and Northville retardates.

LATER CAME development of a day care center, sheltered workshops, work activities centers and finally today's trainable program and skills center. Page has been a leader throughout the developments.

He also has been active in church work, currently teaching a bible class, and in Great Books groups. He and his family make their home in South Lyon.

He has said his one great ambition is "to live long enough to see this nation a nation where special laws and grants are not needed to ensure the retarded, the lame, the blind, the poor and the helpless the right to live in dignity anywhere, to work anywhere where qualified, to have access to all public recreational activities as a right, not out of pity."

KATHLEEN UHLIG, a teacher in Livonia's special education program for seven years, currently is doing "early intervention" work as part of the Harrison staff.

This involves going into homes of

young retarded children to help their parents learn to live with their problem, making referrals for further assistance where necessary.

Her work also extends into all the districts covered by the trainable program.

"I receive referrals from teachers, neighbors, members of the Northwest Communities Association, sometimes from the parents themselves," she said. "The number of visits I make varies with the family, but it is, in all cases, a continuing program."

Mrs. Uhlig also has taught a preschool program for children three and four years old at Harrison, but next year will expand the early intervention program and devote her full time to it.

A graduate of State College of New York at Potsdam, she also has a master's in special education of the mentally retarded from Buffalo State Teachers College.

She taught in New York State, Pennsylvania and Baltimore before coming to Livonia.

'Don't abuse wilderness'

It's the attitude that counts in backpacking

Prospective campers in the Livonia Family Y backpacking class are getting a lesson in something they probably never thought about—attitude.

While teaching camping and survival techniques, instructor Bill Halvangis stresses that having the correct attitude is as important as having adequate equipment.

"It's terrible to get out on a trail with all kinds of garbage and areas where there is complete abuse of wilderness," Halvangis said.

"People can learn to pack their own garbage and watch where they're walking."

"Instead of woodcraft and tearing down the environment, I teach people to make just a small firecircle. Then, the place will look good in just a couple of weeks after they've left."

ANOTHER THORN in Halvangis' side is the number of beer cans he finds on wilderness trails.

"There's nothing worse than to have really worked for four or five hours to get to your destination, only to find a ton of beer cans."

"How they get that far out into the country I don't know. And why they come this far to drink that much beer I don't know."

Halvangis has several years of camping experience. He is a graduate of Outward Bound, a camping survival

program in Colorado, where he survived temperatures of 18 degrees below zero with only a poncho, steel and flint, jackknife, a whistle and a compass and map.

A social group worker with Brightmoor Community Center, Halvangis said backpacking has become popular for many reasons.

"I THINK IT'S the solitude and the escape," he said. "It's a totally different environment that's so much more simple than the highway and concrete environment we see every day."

"It's also a sport that everyone can do. One time when I was out, I ran into a family of seven. The youngest child was about six, and she was carrying a tiny daypack."

"They were at the end of their second week of camping. They were careful to map out their route near resupply points."

HALVANGIS DEBUNKED the myth that backpacking must be expensive.

"You can find a lot of this stuff you'll need in the house. Of course, you can buy a tent for \$180 or you can buy sheets of plastic or a poncho and use that for a tent. It's more of a hassle, but you'll probably save \$175."

"Where you have to pay the extra price is in terms of carrying the extra weight."

"Freeze-dried foods are expensive, but they're light and compact. What

you can do is try a combination of maybe freeze-dried hamburger and a box of hamburger helper."

"The supermarkets carry a pretty wide range of dried foods that you can get along with."

Does the backpacker have to be in top physical shape?

"Being in shape helps. But all you have to do is go according to what you can take. At the Colorado survival trip, there was a tiny, frail woman

who didn't look like she could do much, but by the end, she was carrying a killer pack of 55-60 pounds."

"You toughen up as you go along."

IS IT WORTH IT to backpack in Michigan?

"There are some fine areas near Pinckney and Holly. But for the most part, this area is flat with shrubs for greenery. It's good for day hikes."

"You have to go north of Clare be-

fore you get into a change of scenery—rolling hill and pines."

"The Manistique forest area is really nice, and I like the Traverse City area for backpacking."

Do novices have to know much survival technique?

"You don't need to know a lot of the particulars. The best thing to know is precaution. You don't take chances. If you're walking along ledges or overhangs, you're inviting danger."

A backpacking or bike hiking trip will conclude the course.

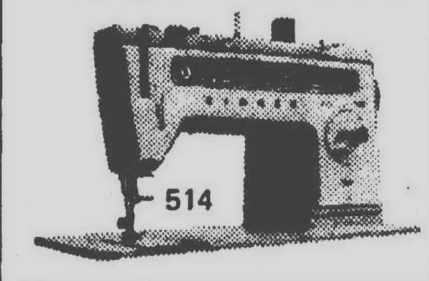

A motion was made by Parsell and supported by Schwall and unanimously carried that a 30-Day moratorium be placed on the issuance of Land Fill permits.

A motion was made by Parsell and supported by Flodin that the question of Canton Township's participation in the Plymouth-Canton Development Commission be tabled for investigation and evaluation.

The following resolution was introduced by members Flodin, Cheske, Myers, and Parsell and supported by member Greenstein.

WHEREAS the R. Dixon Speas Associates has prepared a feasibility study on the proposed purchase of Mettetal Airport by the Charter Township of Canton and;

ORDINANCE NO. 60

TREE PLANTING AND PRESERVATION

Section I. INTENT AND PURPOSE

Whereas trees moderate the effects of sun and wind; pollution; whereas human and animal life depend upon the capacity of trees to absorb carbon dioxide and supply oxygen in our atmosphere; whereas trees filter out pollutants from the air; whereas trees serve to reduce the hazards of flooding; whereas trees assist in the stabilization of soil and in the prevention of erosion; whereas trees help decrease the storm runoff and replenish ground water supplies; whereas trees act to moderate extremes of temperature and provide shade; whereas trees provide a haven for birds which in turn assist in the control of insects; whereas trees are physiologically, sociologically and aesthetically necessary counterpoints to the man-made urban settings; whereas trees tend to conserve and increase property values; whereas there is an organized body of knowledge concerning tree planting and preservation known as arboriculture; whereas there is an established art of landscaping architecture; whereas it is the policy of the Township of Canton to conserve, develop and utilize its natural resources; whereas it is the policy of the Charter Township of Canton to protect its atmosphere, lands, and waters from pollution, impairment or destruction for the benefit, enjoyment and general welfare of its people, it is, therefore, the purpose of this article to regulate the removal of trees from public and private property within the Township of Canton in order to preserve, protect and enhance a most valuable natural resource entrusted to the Commonwealth and to protect the health, safety and welfare of its citizens. It is the purpose and intent of this article to establish a comprehensive master plan for planting, for the purpose of regulating, developing, and providing for a uniform and standard regulation for the protection of trees.

Also to establish standards limiting the removal of and insuring the replacement of trees sufficient to safeguard the ecological and aesthetic environment necessary to a healthy and happy community. It is further intended that this article serve to dissuade the unnecessary clearing and disturbing of land so as to preserve insofar as is practicable, the natural and existing growth of vegetation; and to replace when necessary the removed foliage with new foliage indigenous to the area.

Section II. DEFINITIONS

A. Tree. Any self-supporting woody plant growing upon the earth which usually produces one main trunk measuring no less than 3 inches in diameter and 4 1/2 feet from the ground and which produces a more or less distinct and elevated head with many branches.

B. Person. A public or private individual, group, company, firm, corporation, partnership, association, society, joint stock company, or any other combination of human beings whether legal or natural.

C. Park. The word park shall include all public property within the Township of Canton and being owned by the Township of Canton.

D. Right-of-Way. All land lying between the right of way lines on either side of all public highways, including, but not limited to, streets, roads, boulevards, alleys, or parts thereof. In the absence of any formal dedication or platting of any highway, the right of way of any such highway shall be rebuttably presumed to be 33 feet on each side of the center line thereof.

E. Public Places. Shall include all other grounds or property owned by the Township of Canton or under its control or supervision.

F. Public Utility. Shall mean any person, owning or operating any pole, line, pipe or conduit, located in any public street or over or along any public or private easement or right of way for the transmission of electricity, gas, telephone, telegraph, or television service.

G. Permits. A written permit from Canton Township is required for any work on or affecting trees. Canton Township shall specify the work to be done, according to this ordinance, and shall inspect the work in progress and make a final inspection upon the completion of the work.

Section III. EXCLUSIONS

The requirement of a permit as set forth in Section II G above shall not apply to the following activities:

1. Cutting down, killing or otherwise destroying trees by the owner, or his authorized tenant or agent, of any tract of land no larger than 2 acres. This exception shall not be interpreted to allow said owner to cut down, kill or otherwise destroy trees in anticipation of subdivision or other development of the land by himself or some future owner of the land.

2. Cutting down, killing, or otherwise destroying trees which have become or threaten to become a danger to human life or property due to accidental causes, acts of God, or other emergency.

3. Cutting down, killing or otherwise destroying trees by public utility companies, performing normal construction and maintenance pursuant to applicable state or federal safety or construction laws and regulations, or in any emergency which threatens normal service.

4. Cutting down, killing or otherwise destroying trees by the Canton Township Recreation Department or D.P.W. pursuant to park management plans.

Section IV.

No person shall (except subject to the conditions of a permit issued as set forth in Section II G above):

A. Cut down, remove, replace, kill or otherwise destroy any tree.

B. Fasten any sign, card, poster, wire, or other material to, around or through, any tree or its guard other than to support its growth to maturation.

C. Break, injure, mutilate, kill or destroy any tree or shrub, or permit any fire to burn where such fire will injure any portion of any tree.

D. Permit any toxic chemical to seep, drain, or to be emptied on or about any tree.

E. Deposit, store, place or maintain, on any street, highway or other public place, any brick, sand, stone, concrete or other material which may impede free passage of water, air, and fertilizer to the roots of any tree growing therein.

F. Fail to erect a suitable protective barrier around trees apt to be injured during any building operation.

G. Knowingly permit any electrical wires to come into contact with any tree.

H. Excavate any ditches, trenches, or lay any drive with a radius of fifteen feet from any tree, without first having obtained a permit therefor.

I. Move any building or other large object that would break, injure, mutilate or kill any trees.

Section V. Tree Protection During Development

A. During any building or renovation, the builder shall erect a two-by-four box-type protective barrier four feet around all trees specified to be maintained so as to prevent damage to said trees and shall not allow storage of equipment, materials, debris or fill to be placed in this area except as may be necessary for a reasonable time if no other storage space is available.

B. Tunneling under or adjacent to existing trees or trenching adjacent to existing trees for any purpose shall be done in a manner which will minimize damage to the root structure of any such tree.

Section VI. Planting Restrictions

No tree shall be planted in any of the highways, parks, or public places in the Township of Canton unless the tree is on the approved list and free of infectious disease.

Section VIII. Subdivision Planting Between Sidewalk and Curb

Before a permanent certificate of occupancy may be issued, the builder or de-

veloper who has completed the building of any residence shall be required to plant one (1) or more trees of the size and number specified in this section, in the area between the sidewalk and the curb.

One tree of one-and-one-fourth (1 1/4) to two (2) inches in diameter and at least 10 feet in height shall be planted in residential subdivisions for each lot of 75 foot frontage or less. For corner lots, at least one (1) tree shall be required for each street and at least two (2) trees shall be required for every lot in excess of 75 foot frontage to be placed in staggered intervals on opposite sides of the street to produce overlapping shaded areas. Canton Township shall furnish the subdivider a list of acceptable trees and a copy of the regulations and policy regarding the planting of trees. The subdivider shall be responsible for fulfilling these requirements.

The Planning Commission or Board of Trustees can, by Board action elect a single variety of trees to be planted between the sidewalk and curb in the subdivision. Nothing in this section shall limit the right of the developer to plant other trees of other species elsewhere in the subdivision (except Dutch Elm or Box Elder).

Section VIII. Submission of Site Plans for Development

A site plan for the development or improvement of any tract of land located in the Township of Canton shall be submitted to the Township along with the application for a building permit. No building permit shall be issued until the site plan has been reviewed and approved in writing by the Township and a permit as provided in Section II G has been issued.

Section IX. Tree Replacement

A. As a condition of granting the permit required by Section II G the Township shall require replacement trees for every tree that is destroyed. If a destroyed tree is larger than three (3) inches, each additional three (3) inches in diameter will require another replacement tree. Example: 3 inch diameter tree, one replacement tree; 6 inch diameter tree, two replacement trees; 9 inch diameter tree, three replacement trees. The builder, subdivider or other person securing a permit shall be responsible for fulfilling these requirements.

B. Replacement trees shall be 1 1/2 to 2 inches in diameter, 10 feet in height, caliber nursery stock, balled and burlapped for late spring, summer and early fall planting, and bare root if desired for late fall and early spring planting, wrapped the first year and no branches lower than five (5) feet.

C. The replacement requirements of this Section may be modified by the Board of Zoning Appeals where the land remaining after permitted development is left in a heavily wooded condition such that on site replacement of destroyed trees would not be feasible.

Section X. Dutch Elm Disease - Boxelder Bugs

Conditions as nuisance to be abated upon notice.

Any elm tree affected with the fungus Ceratocystis Ulmi, Dutch Elm Disease, so-called or any dead or dying elm tree, stored elm logs which have not been debarked or elmwood which could harbor or become a breeding place for the American and European bark beetles is hereby declared to be a public nuisance.

Any female Boxelder tree which is or could be the breeding place for Boxelder bugs is hereby declared to be a public nuisance.

Section XI. Notice to Remove

Whenever any public nuisance exists contrary to the provisions of the sections in this ordinance, the Supervisor or his authorized agent, shall give notice to the owner or his agent or the occupant of the property describing the tree, its location and the nature of the nuisance and ordering the owner, agent or occupant to cease such nuisance specifying the measures required by law.

It shall be unlawful for any person to permit, cause or suffer the existence of a public nuisance from and after fifteen (15) days following the date of the notice provided for unless arrangements for removal can be verified.

In any case where notice is given and not complied with the Supervisor is hereby authorized and empowered to order the removal or abatement of said public nuisance and shall have authority to call the necessary assistance therefor. Contracted work shall be submitted for bids and approved by the Township Board.

Upon completion of the abatement or removal of said public nuisance, the supervisor shall certify to the cost of said removal of the public nuisance. The owner or other persons to whom the notice was directed shall be notified by mail of the removal or abatement and the cost incurred for such work, together with a statement that the cost of the work must be paid within 60 days or cost incurred will be assessed against the owners' property.

It shall be the duty of the owner of the property or other person to whom notice was directed to pay the cost of such removal within sixty (60) days after the date of mailing of the notice of completion, and in case of this failure to do so, the Township shall have the right to make assessment against any property for the purpose of collection in the same manner as general taxes are collected.

Section XII. Inspection - Interference

No person shall prevent, delay or interfere with the Township of Canton or its employees in the execution or enforcement of this ordinance; provided, however, that nothing herein shall be construed as an attempt to prohibit a public hearing or to deny any remedy legal or equitable in any court of competent jurisdiction for the protection of property rights by the owner of any property within the Charter Township of Canton.

Section XIII. Penalties

Any person, whether as owner, lessee, principal agent, employee or otherwise, who violates any of the provisions of this chapter or permits any such violation or fails to comply with any of the requirements hereof or who uses any land in violation of any detailed statement or plan submitted by him and approved under the conviction thereof, shall be subject to punishment as provided by law. Each day upon which such violation continues shall constitute a separate offense. Any use of any land which is conducted, operated or maintained contrary to any of the provisions of this chapter shall be, and the same is hereby declared to be unlawful.

Section XIV. Appeals

In the event any person is dissatisfied with a decision adversely affecting such person involving the application of this ordinance, such person shall have the right, within a reasonable time, to appeal to the Canton Township Zoning Board of Appeals. Upon completion of the hearing, the appeal to the Canton Township Zoning Board of Appeals. Upon completion of the hearing, the appeal board shall enter its written opinion affirming, over-ruling or modifying the order as may be fit and proper under the circumstances.

Section XV. Legality of Ordinance or Parts Thereof

Should any section, clause, or provision of this ordinance be declared by the courts to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or parts thereof, other than the part so declared to be invalid.

Section XVI. Option

In lieu of replacing trees as provided in Section IX or planting trees in a subdivision as provided in Section VII, a developer or other person under the obligation to plant trees in accordance with either of the above provisions may, at his option, pay to the Charter Township of Canton the sum of money sufficient to cover the cost of planting required trees and deliver to the Charter Township of Canton appropriate easements for the entry upon private property for the purpose of planting trees where necessary. In such event, the Charter Township of Canton will assume the responsibility of planting the required trees.

A motion was made by Schwall and supported by Flodin and unanimously carried that the following Resolution be adopted:

The Canton Township Board having reviewed the summary analysis and work program for community planning activities and has found said summary analysis and work program to be in keeping with the needs and objectives of the Township, hereby authorizes the submittal for an urban planning assistance grant to the Michigan Department of Management and Budget.

It is understood that the total cost of the planning activities are estimated to be \$25,000 with the Township's portion not to exceed one-third of the estimated total, which portion the Township Board hereby authorizes the expenditure, assuming funding the remaining two-thirds by the State of Michigan. ("701" Program)

A motion was made by Parsell and supported by Cheske and unanimously carried that:

WHEREAS, under Section 131C of Act 206, Public Acts of 1903, as amended, the owners are permitted to further redeem properties of which the State becomes the owner on May 6, 1975.

WHEREAS, the municipalities in which the properties are located must approve the application of the owner to pay the 1974 and prior year's taxes, and, WHEREAS, the convenience of the taxing public demands that the information be obtained and arrangements to pay said taxes be accomplished in one office,

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

1. That, Louis H. Funk, Wayne County Treasurer, is, by this resolution, authorized to act as representative and agent of the Canton Township for the purpose of approving the application of the property owners to pay the 1974 and prior years' taxes and accept the necessary monies, the same to be forwarded to Lansing, Michigan by him.

2. That the County Treasurer is further authorized by: Canton Township to request of the Department of Natural Resources, Lands Division, the withholding of properties from the auction sale until November 3, 1975, provided that sufficient monies are deposited with County Treasurer to effect redemption.

3. That the County Treasurer is to periodically report to: Canton Township the properties withheld by him and redeemed.

4. That a copy of this resolution be mailed to the Department of Natural Resources, Lands Division, Lansing, Michigan.

Patterson here to ask parole reform help

PLYMOUTH—Plymouth area residents and businessmen were urged Friday to write their legislators to support a bill to require persons sentenced for serious crimes to serve the minimum sentence imposed by the judge.

That appeal was made by L. Brooks Patterson, Oakland County prosecutor, speaking to the Plymouth Rotary Club on the subject of reforming the parole system in Michigan.

Patterson, a 1967 graduate of University of Detroit Law School, was elected prosecutor 2½ years ago when he defeated then incumbent Thomas Plunkett.

He has since gained a statewide reputation for his calls for welfare reform, consumer protection, and parole reform.

PATTERSON TOLD Rotarians the problem first came to his attention five months after he was elected prosecutor when an Oak Park police officer was killed by two men—both of whom had been released early from prison for good behavior.

One man was paroled 7½ years early after being sentenced for murder in 1955. The other was sentenced in 1971 for armed robbery and was released a year early.

"I asked myself then how a man sentenced for murder could be released early for 'good behavior' and

then in a short time commit another crime."

A month later, Patterson continued, a high school senior working as a waitress in Highland Township left for home at 2 a.m., stopped for gasoline on M-59, and the next morning was found dead in the trunk of the car she was driving.

The gasoline service station attendant arrested for the crime, Patterson said, had been out on parole only 37 days. In 1971 that same man was working the night shift at a gasoline station and was arrested for assaulting a young girl.

In 1971, the prosecutor said, the man was sentenced to three to five years for attempted kidnapping, was released a year early after serving two years, and got a night job at a gasoline station.

"At that point, I began keeping records of crimes of murder, armed robbery and rape committed by parolees and the list now fills eight pages."

PATTERSON CITED a number of other individual cases of examples of what he considers bad judgment by the state parole board.

One he referred to most often was the Sept. 6, 1974, murder of Carol Seitz, 22, who graduated from Michigan State University and was about to take her first job as a physical education teacher.

To get in shape for her new job, Patterson explained, she would jog two miles a day near her home in White Lake Township. One afternoon a man killed her with a pistol and seriously injured a teenager who had witnessed the shooting.

The assailant had been on parole only 11 days, Patterson said, and within those 11 days had raped his sister's babysitter and committed a robbery in Flint. "He had a two-page sheet of convictions on his record and in 1966 was committed to Ionia State Hospital as a criminal sexual psychopath. He escaped in 1970 and was ar-

rested shortly after for breaking and entering the home of a nurse employed at Ionia. This man was sent home two years early.

"After the Seitz case, the chief of the parole board issued a public apology and admitted a mistake had been made. Well, I can get no satisfaction from a public apology. What would be better is if the parole board would tighten up on its practices and be more careful about who they parole and when."

A LAWSUIT was filed by Patterson against the parole board, but that suit was dismissed.

Patterson has been in a running debate with the parole board since. He told Friday of how one member of the board decides who should be released on the basis of a "gut feeling" during personal interviews. "It takes more than a 'gut feeling' to decide whether a person sentenced for a serious crime should be turned loose on society."

"What is happening is that we are being raped, murdered and robbed by the same persons over and over again."

Patterson explained the "Good Time Law" which allows prisoners time off for good behavior. "Included in this is special good time which is granted at the warden's discretion. It was started in 1931 and was to be used on rare occasions to release prisoners for exemplary behavior—such as saving a prison guard's life.

"The first year, only a dozen inmates were released on special good time. Last year, 80 per cent of those released early were let go on special good time.

"The parole board tells me if everyone served their minimum sentences the prison population would increase, and the state would have to build a new jail at a cost of some \$200 million."

"My only answer to that is a comment in a letter from Carol Seitz's mother, who wrote: 'I'd rather feed one than bury one.'"

PATTERSON quoted 1968 statistics which showed that of those inmates paroled in '68, some 46 per cent were back in jail within four years.

"You in business know you cannot survive in business with a 46 per cent failure rate—that can only happen in government."

He ended his remarks by quoting from FBI Chief Clarence Kelley: "About four per cent of all babies born in Detroit in 1974 will eventually be murdered."

"Babies born today in Detroit are more likely to die than a soldier in World War II. We cannot accept this. There's got to be an answer."

RU's John MacKenzie O&E track and field coach of year

After 13 years as head track coach, it takes a lot to get Redford Union High School's John MacKenzie excited.

During nip and tuck dual meet finishes or down-to-the-last-event drama in the big meets, the 39-year-old MacKenzie remains unflappable and cool, eyes on the ever-present stopwatch, taking victory or defeat as part of the continuous string of events that makes up high school track and field.

But one thing that will get the veteran coach going every time is talking about the group of kids he is coaching at any particular time.

"THIS YEAR'S GROUP was a fine bunch of kids. They were good, loyal

and hard working. It was a very satisfying year," MacKenzie said.

Satisfying for MacKenzie not only because his team finished with a fine 7-4 dual meet record while competing in the tough Suburban Eight Conference, but also because his team won both the Observer & Eccentric Relays and the state regional title.

For his fine showing this year, MacKenzie has been named Observer & Eccentric track coach of the year.

MacKenzie, who has coached some great teams in his career including the 1969 RU team which won the state championship, has developed a philosophy of coaching which is not dependent upon winning.

"In the end, whether you win or lose really doesn't affect the season that much. It's what you do out there

every day and the effort you put forth that's important," he said.

Redford Union's secret to success in the big meets was its depth. With a large group of talented athletes such as captain and shot-putter Brad Ross, and seniors Doug Milne, Mike Hasty, Joe Austin, Jack Helzer, Dane Eschamcher and Ron Pawlack, the Panthers had point-getters in virtually every event.

And in junior Jim Lalonde, the team not only had an athlete who will be among the best in the state next year, but also an inspiration. Lalonde recovered from a case of scarlet fever early in the year to come on as a top-flight quarter miler toward the end of the year.

LALONDE'S TEAMMATES VOTED the potential state champion captain of next year's squad.

But because of the numerous talented seniors who will be lost via graduation, MacKenzie realizes that the prospects of repeating as Observer & Eccentric Relays and state regional champions next year are not bright in spite of the return of Lalonde - a fact which doesn't particularly bother him.

"As I sit here rocking in my chair, I would say we won't be as good next year as we were this year. And again this was a very satisfying year but not necessarily in comparison to last year. You have to take each year as it comes. I really don't dwell on the past. This year was nice, but I'm always looking ahead," he said.

Churchill's Cheadle, Spartan duo are area prep tennis standouts

For Livonia Churchill's Mark Cheadle and Livonia Stevenson's Jeff Johnson and Kip Nickel, early defeat in the state tournament could not affect what was otherwise a fine season for the area's top prep tennis players.

And though both the best singles player and doubles team in the area suffered the first round defeats in state tournament held at Kalamazoo two weeks ago, the potential that they showed throughout the season makes them good prospects to help out their college teams.

The senior Cheadle won the regional title last month with a convincing 7-5, 6-3 victory over Canton's Steve Preuter.

THROUGHOUT REGIONAL PLAY Cheadle was never taken to three sets as he advanced through five rounds.

Cheadle went through the regular season with a 12-1 record and led the Chargers to an identical record and a Western Six championship.

"Mark was very coachable. I don't think that he received the quality of competition I would have liked to see this year, however," said John Jason, the Churchill coach.

Jason pointed out that the player Cheadle lost to in the first round of the state tournament, Tom Hackenberg of Kalamazoo Loy Norrix, advanced to the semifinals of state com-

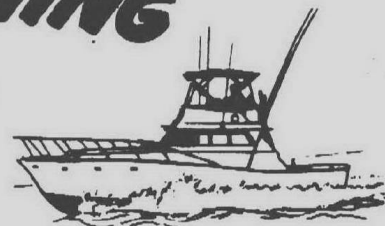

Redford jumped to an early 2-0 lead on Gary D'Ascenzo's first inning home run and then finished Bidwell with an 11 run outburst in the fourth.

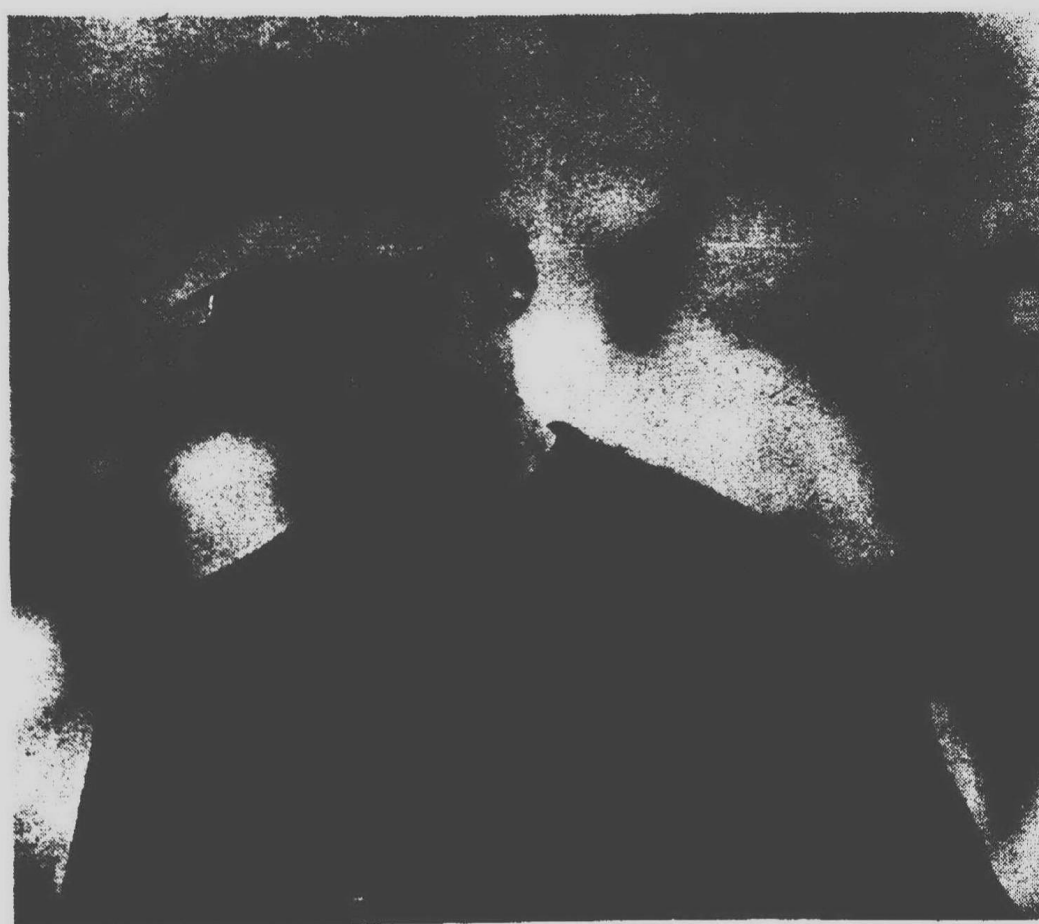
Mike Kalil picked up a single and a three-run homer in the fourth to pace the rally. Kalil went three-for-three and drove in six for the day.

Some 372 fish from Belleville Lake were taken by the Department of Natural Resources as part of the DNR's Fisheries electroshock survey. Results of the survey were as follows:

LARGEMOUTH BASS: 126 taken 10 per cent legal size.

SMALLMOUTH BASS: 27 fish taken, 59 per cent legal size.

WALLEYE: 45 fish taken, 17 per cent legal size.

TIGER MUSKELUNGE: Two fish taken, 26 and 32 inches, one legal size.

BLUEGILL: 40 fish taken, 73 per cent legal size.

Small numbers of other species such as suckers, pumpkinseed, sunfish and carp were also taken.

Since Belleville Lake was treated in 1973 and first planted in 1974, the fish have had phenomenal growth and survival according to the DNR.

Maintenance pays

Air, tread gauges can save money

Last year there were 45,534 traffic fatalities. Some of these accidents were caused by worn out or damaged tires. Tires that are bald, improperly balanced, under- or over-inflated are potential hazards. And at the least, they can be the source of delay and inconvenience.

Not only that, improperly cared for tires can cost you money. The Better Business Bureau suggests that a few minutes spent each month caring for your tires will be time well-spent.

The correct pressure for tires should be listed in the owner's manual. At this pressure, tires will carry the specified weight and provide maximum traction when turning corners. This pressure will provide maximum resistance to damage from potholes or rocks, and the tires will run cooler than at lower or higher pressures.

UNDERINFLATED TIRES flex more so they tend to run hot. They also cut down gas mileage. Tires with too much or too little pressure give the car less traction and can cause loss of control.

Check tires once a month, before a long trip and always when tires are cool. Use a pocket tire pressure gauge. They're more accurate than the air tower gauges at gas stations. According to the National Bureau of Standards, approximately three out of five air tower gauges are wrong by two pounds or more. (You can obtain a tire gauge, tread depth gauge, four valve caps and a tire manual, offered through the Tire Industry Safety Council, by sending \$2, check or money order, to Tire Safety, Box 726, New York, N.Y. 10010).

The tread of tires also gives a clue to proper tire inflation. An underinflated tire will wear more at the outer edges of the tread. Over-inflation will cause more wear at the center of the tread.

A feathered edge on the tread design indicates the tires may be out of alignment. Alignment is the angle of the wheel in relation to the direction of travel (like the angle of your feet in relation to the direction you walk).

WHEN YOU NOTICE uneven or excessive wear on a tire, take the car in for inspection. It probably needs service. The problem could be misalignment or poorly adjusted brakes, out-of-balance tires or some other situation that needs attention.

Keep an eye on the tread depth of tires. Watch for the built-in wear indicator which appears as smooth narrow bands across the face of the tire when tread depth gets down to 1/16 of an inch. Beyond this point, it's dangerous to continue driving on the tire, particularly on wet pavement. And in many states, where cars are periodically inspected, you will get a "rejected" sticker.

Check the owner's manual to determine your car's maximum safe load. The Better Business Bureau cautions that overloading your car can damage not only tires, but springs and shock absorbers as well, and it can make your car harder to control.

Brakes designed to warn driver

Worn-out brakes show up in 40 per cent of auto accidents involving a car malfunction caused by owner maintenance neglect, according to a recent study by Indiana University.

Engineers at Ford Customer Service Division explain that when you step on the brake pedal, you push brake fluid through tubes and hoses to the brakes at each wheel. The fluid pushes pistons which force the brake linings against a drum (or disc) attached to the wheel, retarding its rotation.

When service is needed, your brake pedal can tell you—if you know what to look for. The Ford service experts offer the following tips.

Short Pedal Travel—The surfaces of the linings and drums (or discs) may be riding too close to each other. Your emergency brake may be adjusted too tightly or the self-adjusting mechanism in one of your brakes may be malfunctioning.

Excessive Pedal Travel (or spongy pedal)—Fluid for the brake system is stored in a master cylinder in the engine compartment. An inadequate fluid level can allow air to get into the brake system, causing the brake pedal to travel

excessively (or feel spongy) and the brakes to operate inefficiently. Have a service technician check for external leaks, add brake fluid and bleed the air out of the system.

Excessive pedal travel also can result if the linings of either the front or rear brakes are worn or are riding too far from the drum (or disc).

Hard-to-push Pedal—A pedal that feels firm but gives little braking power when pressed usually indicates that your foot pressure is not being transmitted to the brakes. A binding pedal linkage, kinks or obstructions in the hydraulic hoses, a faulty power brake unit or low engine vacuum could be the problem.

Pulsating Pedal—If brake drums (rotors on disc brakes) are out of round, the linings—attempting to meet the uneven surface—can jiggle, transmitting a pulsating feeling through the pedal to your foot. Have the drums (rotors) inspected and replaced if necessary.

Pedal Goes to the Floor—The brake system has no fluid, the master cylinder has an internal leak or the pedal linkage is disconnected. Have the car towed to a service garage.
