Plymouth studies adoption of non-returnable can ban

The days of the returnable pop bottle with kids collecting bottles for cash may return to the Plymouth-Canton community. With them may vanish some of the litter and trash.

That is the hopes of intergovernmental committee members, representing the Plymouth Community School District, the City of Plymouth, and Canton, Plymouth, Salem and Superior townships, who are studying the possible enactment of ordinances to ban the sale of non-returnable bottles and cans.

THE ORDINANCES still in the discussion stage would erase scenes of pop bottles littering city streets and beer cans strewn across rural areas, according to hopes of intergovernmental members. A string of ordinances, enacted in municipalities within the school district could, hopefully, control the litter problem.

The ordinances would impose deposits on soft drink and beer bottles and cans, enticing residents to return the containers to stores. The laws would encourage children to scour neighbor-

hoods for the litter of bottles and cans.

Intergovernmental representatives last week appointed Canton Trustee Robert Myers and Plymouth Township Trustee Richard Gornick to formulate a plan of action for enactment of returnable ordinances.

The two will study bills, introduced and stymied by the Michigan Legislature, that would have imposed deposits on bottles and cans.

Myers may invite a representative of the Public Interest Research Group in Michigan (PIRGIM), who has studied the bottle issue, to speak to intergovernmental representatives.

INTERGOVERNMENTAL members, suggested Myers and Plymouth City Commissioner Norbert Battermann, could send letters concerning the bottle issue to neighboring municipalities, the Michigan Municipal League and the Michigan Township Association.

Intergovernmental representatives last week returned to the committee table with reactions of governing bodies toward the proposed ordinance plan.

Although local officials agree on the desirability of a returnable ordinance, officials disagree on the law's effectiveness at the local level.

Plymouth Township officials, Gornick told intergovernmental members, feel the Michigan Legislature should enact the bottle ordinance. City officials are awaiting township action, according to Battermann.

THE CANTON Board of Trustees, Myers told representatives, would enact a returnable ordinance, if other municipalities did the same.

"The question is what's the most effective way of doing this," Gornick said. "Our board feels the best way is at the state level."

Battermann questioned the legality of imposing deposits on soft drink and beer cans without deposit requirements on soup and vegetable containers.

"A ban on non-returnable bottles would be upheld in court, Battermann said, "but I think you might have a problem with cans. The courts would support the bottles for safety reasons."

Soup and vegetable cans, inter-

governmental representatives pointed out, do not constitute a litter problem.

Myers and Canton Supervisor Robert Greenstein feel bottle and can ordinances enacted in the Plymouth-Canton community might catch on in other communities.

"You have to start the ball rolling someplace," Myers told intergovernmental members. "If we do it and get ruled out by the courts, then we can blame the state."

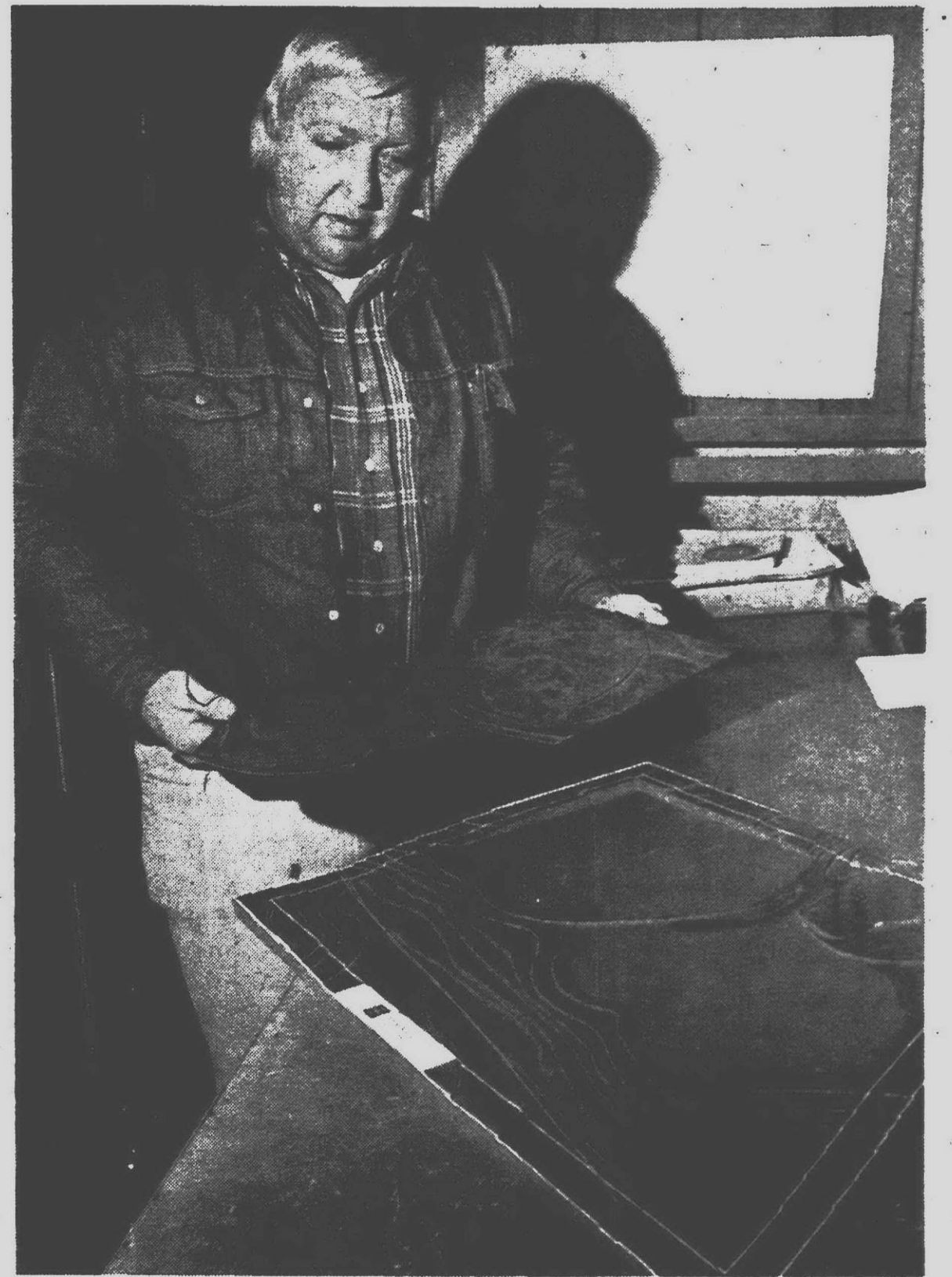
Said Greenstein at a recent Canton board meeting: "If a group of municipalities do this, we might ultimately shame the Michigan Legislature into doing the same thing on a statewide basis."

THE PLYMOUTH City Commission, according to Battermann, approved an ordinance requiring bottle deposits in 1971.

Commission members rescinded the ordinance, when Canton and Plymouth townships failed to follow suit.

Commission members, Battermann explained, felt the Plymouth-only law placed an undue stress on city merchants.

Intergovernmental representatives will further discuss the proposed ordinances at their Oct. 15 meeting.

Sand removal plans alarms township hall

Contractor Douglas Roe received permission to dig 12 test holes in Plymouth Township property owned by Donovan Associates, Inc., largest property owner in the township.

The sand was to be taken to testing labs to ascertain if it would be suitable for fill on expressway interchanges.

The permit stipulated that only four holes be open at one time. They must be filled overnight to prevent accidents. The project must be completed within 10 working days, with Oct. 19, opening day of the hunting season, set as deadline for completion of the dig.

Amount of sand to be removed was limited to no more than 300 cubic yards—about 60 truckloads.

AS NEWS OF the sand removal spread, alarmed township residents flooded township hall with telephone calls, demanding to know what was going on.

Township Supervisor J.D. McLaren, Building Inspector James Briggs and Treasurer Joseph West visited the property on Ann Arbor Road just east of Napier to check it out.

They found two bulldozers and a mobile office on the site.

"They had not removed any sand," said McLaren. "They had moved some to prepare a roadway."

It seemed the crux of the matter was not 12 test holes. An agreement in 1971 between the township and Loren Gould, former owner of the 87 acres, was brought to the attention of the township officials.

After meeting with Don Morgan, township attorney, McLaren said: "We are trying to resolve it. We should have a definite decision Monday afternoon or Tuesday."

Roe has the sand rights to the Donovan property and he says: "My stand is that the township should make good on its agreement and carry out what they promised."

ON MARCH 2, 1971 Gould asked the township for permission to supply sand for the I-75 interchange. His ap-

plication was presented to the township planning commission at its March 3 meeting.

The matter was tabled at the March 17 meeting but on May 19 Gould was asked to prepare a topographical map of the property and present it to the board.

On June 16, 1971 Gould appeared before the group with the map, prepared by Norman Deitrich who is now township planner. Gould was asked to contact adjacent property owners for their reaction to the land balancing plan and on July 21 he presented letters from the property owners saying they did not object.

At that time Gould's appeal was approved. He was given permission to apply for a permit for the sand removal.

DONOVAN BOUGHT the property in November of that year.

Need for hospital will be assessed

How does one lure a hospital to a community?

That question faced members of the intergovernmental committee last week, as they looked at the growing Plymouth-Canton community and need in the future for additional hospital facilities.

Representing the Plymouth Community School District, the City of Plymouth and Canton, Plymouth, Salem and Superior townships, intergovernmental committee members have placed the hospital question on their list of goals for the 1975-76 year.

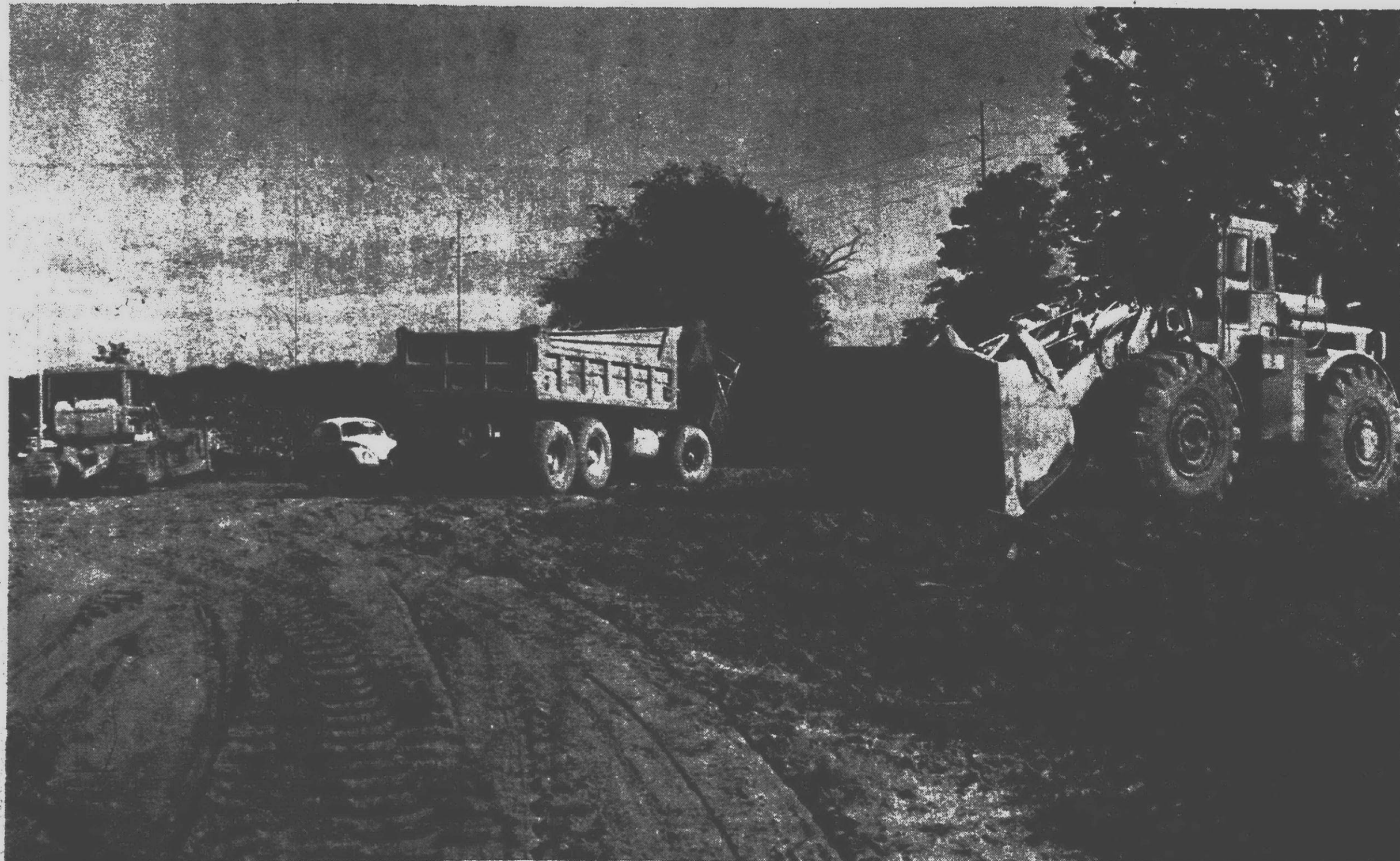
Plymouth Township Trustee Richard Gornick, who volunteered to research the procedure used in attracting hospitals to communities, noted a

population of about 70,000 persons in the Plymouth School District and a lack of hospital facilities.

Most emergency runs from the City of Plymouth, noted Plymouth City Commissioner Norbert Battermann, take residents to St. Mary Hospital in Livonia or St. Joseph Hospital in Ann Arbor.

"As Canton grows, the need for a hospital in this area will grow," said school board Treasurer Tom Yack.

The construction of a hospital in the Plymouth-Canton community could comprise a long-range goal of the intergovernmental committee, said chairperson Marda Benson, president of the Plymouth School Board.

Cahalan in Plymouth to sell program on deterring crime

Wayne County Prosecutor William L. Cahalan carried his message that certain punishment deters crime to Plymouth Friday to a full-house in the Mayflower Meeting House.

Cahalan was guest speaker for the weekly meeting of the Plymouth Rotary Club and impressed many with his scholarly approach to the emotionally-charged topic of crime.

"CRIME IS the number one domestic issue in the United States and has been for a long time," the prosecutor began. "Sometimes you get to feeling helpless and hopeless."

Cahalan used the premise that the fundamental purpose of law enforcement and criminal justice systems is to deter persons from committing a crime.

"But, our system has deterred few, if anyone, from committing crimes because we aren't using the deterrents we have to deter, or the punishments we have to punish."

"Sentences aren't mandated by the legislature, except for certain maximums. So the courts are reflecting the thoughts of society down through the years."

Backing his point with statistics, Cahalan said two-thirds of persons

convicted of felonies never spend a day in jail. If it is a first offense, he added, the odds are 10-1 the convicted person will never see the inside of a correctional institution.

"IN OUR DEMOCRATIC system, we must treat all persons equally and provide due process of law. But the system has even failed to do this. "Equal protection under the law is also the very basis of the whole system of criminal justice. But at the most critical point in the whole procedure—that point when the sentencing judge decides whether to deprive a convicted person of liberty—it all goes out the window."

"It doesn't depend upon the U.S. Constitution, equal protection, or due process, but depends upon the whim of the sentencing judge who is limited only by the maximums set by law."

This almost totally unchecked sweeping power given to judges, Cahalan added, is terrifying and intolerable for a society which professes to be living in a nation of law.

Studies indicate, he added, that it doesn't much matter what crime you commit, but where it is committed when it's sentencing time. It also depends upon which judge is drawn, he added, pointing to a Los Angeles study which showed one judge in one year sentenced 57 per cent of all convicted persons to jail while another in the same district sentenced only eight per cent.

"In sentencing, the judge has no more training in future human behavior than this podium. He's a lawyer by profession, not a sociologists."

CAPITAL PUNISHMENT was declared unconstitutional, Cahalan explained, not because it was too cruel

but because it was so seldom imposed and when it was it was imposed in a discriminatory fashion. "The same type of ruling can happen in the area of sentencing."

The philosophy of our society for the past couple decades, Cahalan added, was that the person who committed a crime was sick and needed treatment.

"The judge doesn't think about treating the convicted person in such a way as to deter others from committing crime, but thinks about how he can best help rehabilitate this person."

"Well, the idea of rehabilitation has proven to be a total failure. Some 45 per cent charged with crimes in this area last year had a previous felony conviction. It's 85 per cent in Washington, DC."

Speaking on rehabilitation, Cahalan

said he had serious questions about whether society had the right to "force" an individual to rehabilitate. "This process is best handled on a voluntary basis. I'm not against rehabilitation, but just don't believe you can force a person to change behavior. He must want to change."

"I suggest the Legislature enact laws defining what acts will be crimes and specifying the penalty that must be imposed, and there'd be no parole or no probation unless parole and probation was given to everyone who committed that crime."

"I DON'T criticize the parole board or the judges for this predicament, because if you give people discretion to predict future human behavior you can expect there will be mistakes. The key is—don't give them the discretion."

"I'm convinced that certainty of punishment is the best deterrent. And I stress that it's certainty of punishment, not severity, that's important. I am also sure that the certainty of no punishment deters no one."

"We would not abandon rehabilitation entirely, but shift the primary emphasis to deterring crime."

"We are in difficult times living in a urban society and in a free society with constitutional democracy and changing times. I get impatient with those who preach about better times in the past, which exists only in their minds."

"We cannot, and must not, despair because we are a nation which has done and will do great things," Cahalan concluded.

He urged the audience to write legislators asking their support of bills to make sentencing mandatory when persons are found guilty of a crime.

KINGDOM "6-6," under the reign of King David Schendel and Queen Patty Dee, emerged as the "best in the land" at the conclusion of the chivalrous event, thanks to knight Todd Smith, "horse" Todd Keeney and squire Brian Miller, who received the title of knight for his participation in the event.

The seven sixth-grade classes at East Middle School last week staged the medieval parade and jousting tournament in the dress of chivalrous times as the fun conclusion of a medieval history unit.

"We thought this was an excellent way to end the unit," said sixth grade teacher Linda Lalonde, who wore a medieval costume of green felt for the event. "We found medieval history was of great interest to the students

"It is my understanding that the agreement between the township and Gould was transferred to the new owner," said Roe.

"The intentions were that it would be in the future. When the expressways came would be the appropriate time to start."

Could said Friday it had been his understanding that the agreement was transferable to the new owners when they needed the sand.

Donovan Associates, Inc. has had a difference of opinion with Plymouth Township on other occasions.

The township board voted 4-3 to extend sewer service to Ridge Road after Donovan threatened them with a lawsuit in the name of the Mormon Church.

Township residents voted 1,389 to 673 against extending the Byron Drain to Ridge Road in September 1973.

WE'RE WAITING for proper connections to deliver the test samples," said Roe. "There is no danger, no hazard. We are preparing in a proper fashion."

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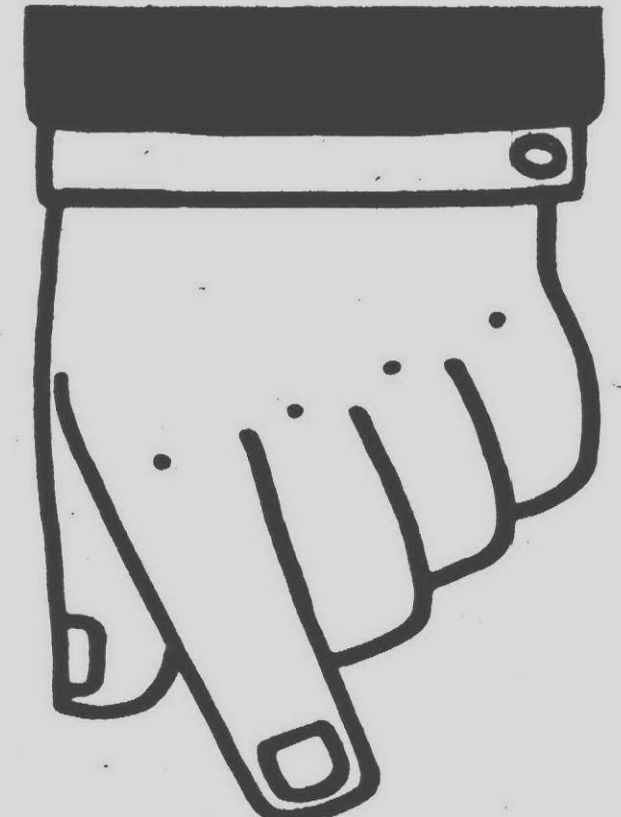
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Hearing slated on Smith's bill

Two public hearings have been scheduled on a bill introduced by Rep. Roy Smith (R-Ann Arbor), whose district includes Plymouth, which would require the state to pay money to local governments in lieu of taxes on state-owned lands.

The first hearing will begin at 10 a.m. in the McKenny Union on the Eastern Michigan University campus in Ypsilanti and the second will begin at 2 p.m. in the Ann Arbor City Council chambers in city hall. Both will be held Tuesday, Oct. 7.

The Smith bill requires the state to pay an amount equal to 25 per cent of the amount that would be due in taxes if the land weren't owned by the state. Recreational lands and facilities would be exempt from this requirement.

"These funds are designed to compensate cities and townships for providing essential services such as police and fire protection for state property and buildings," explains Smith. He will be attending both hearings to answer questions on the bill.

C-C adopting sales controls

A door emblem reading "Caution Solicitors—We honor only solicitations approved by the Chamber of Commerce" will be issued to each member along with a review of the chamber's solicitation policy.

Janet Curlee, executive secretary of the chamber, notes all service groups or associations should be aware of the policy and may obtain a copy from the chamber office at 878 Wing.

Solicitations are approved if these requirements are met: Headquartered in this community; benefit community at-large; register with the chamber of commerce; obtain a permit from local government when necessary; not solicit for private profit; not be a beneficiary of any fund or charity.

Groups requesting approval should allow two weeks to receive chamber approval. Approved solicitations are reported in the chamber's monthly newsletter. Local merchants are encouraged to verify all solicitations by calling the chamber office.

On the data processing committee, Hoben will assist the increasing number of user districts now receiving data processing services from the intermediate district.

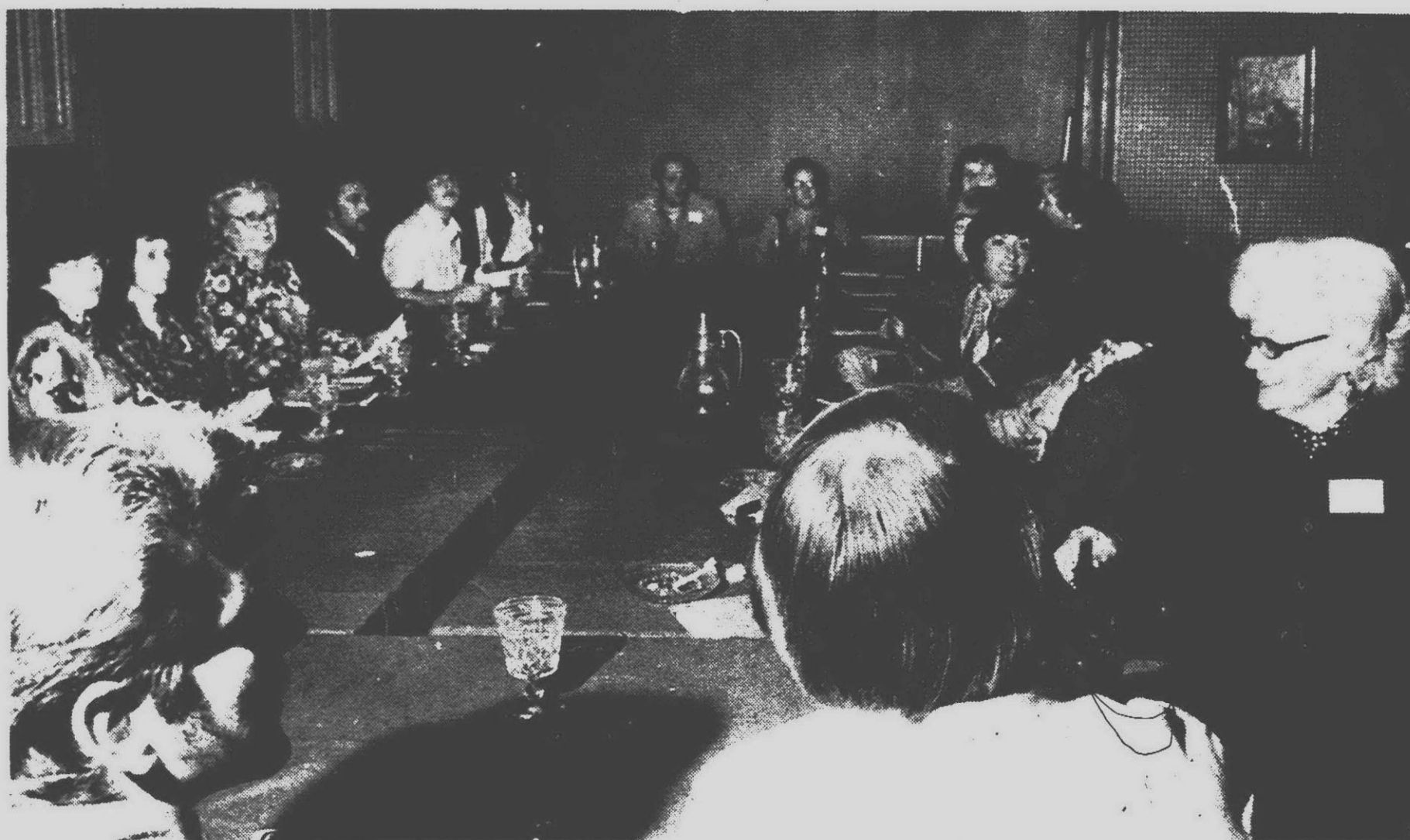
The committee will assist the data processing superintendents users group by informing them of changes in technology, improvements to the system, and new services which become available.

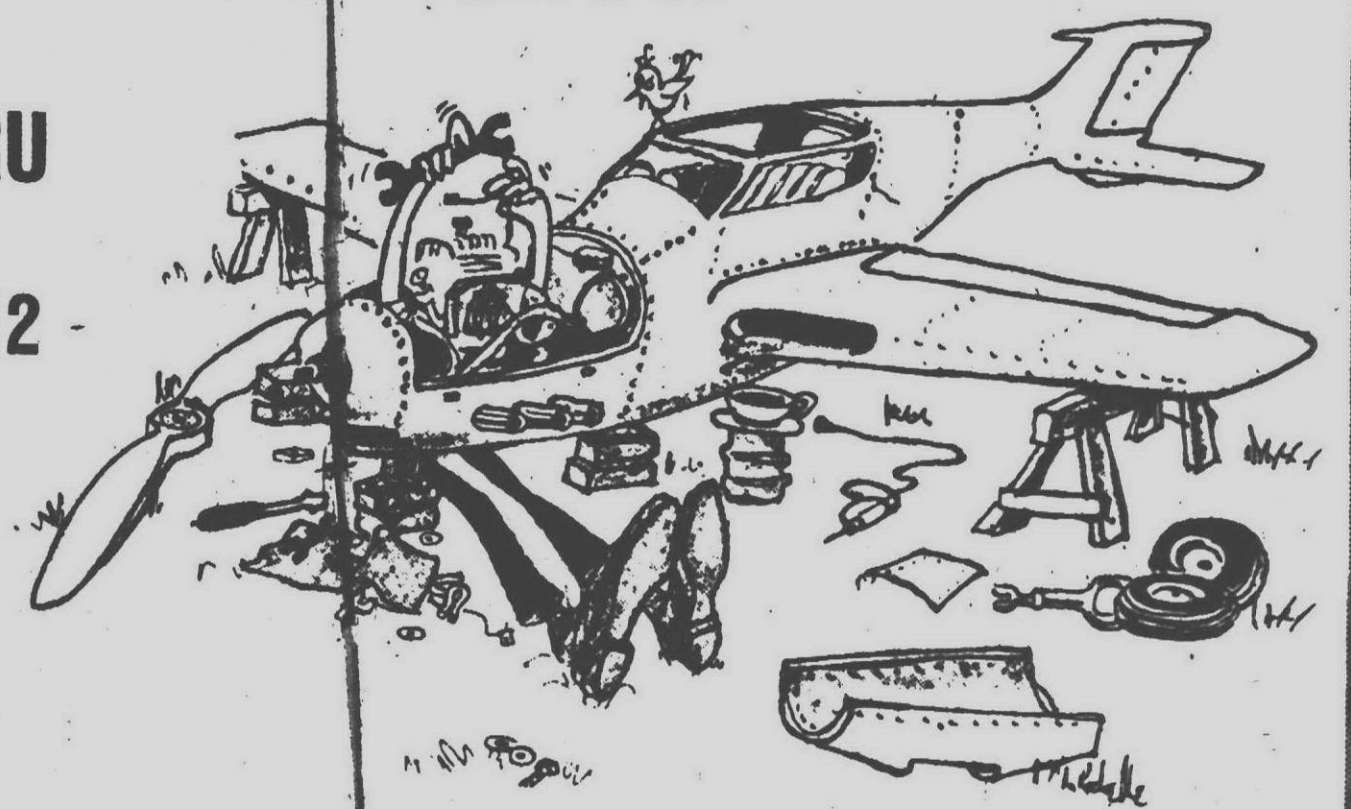

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SC-WSU won't abandon consortium

Schoolcraft College (SC) and Wayne State University (WSU) officials will ask the Wayne County Board of Commissioners for further consideration of the SC-WSU consortium, according to Dr. C. Nelson Grote, SC president. The consortium, which planned to expand programs at the Wayne Coun-

ty Child Development Center in Northville, had been the county board's favored plan until recently, when the Sacred Heart Rehabilitation Center submitted a plan to use the facility as an alcoholism treatment center.

Following an emergency meeting Sept. 25, the county board gave the consortium 30 days to come up with an acceptable lease for the center, and apparently the consortium wheels already are moving.

"We may have lost a skirmish, but we haven't lost the war," said Grote, who along with George E. Gullen Jr., WSU president, presently is evaluating the consortium's position.

GROTE WILL present his findings Wednesday to Schoolcraft trustees at an 8 p.m. study session. Operating under a two-part direc-

tive voted by SC trustees on Sept. 24, Grote is working with Gullen, gathering arguments and support to convince the county board of the consortium's benefit to residents in western Wayne County.

"There already has been a number of discussions held," explained Grote. "I have met with President Gullen and other meetings also have been held."

Grote also intends to reveal the results of his investigation of reported opposition to the SC-WSU consortium.

Grote refused to comment on whether he had uncovered any opposition. "It will be discussed at the meeting."

GROTE SAID he hopes the county will take another look at the WSU-SC consortium and its long-range benefits.

"The county can't just look at who can relieve overhead expenses at the center in the coming year, but what will be the best use of the facility in 10 to 15 years."

"The consortium would move in gradually. We couldn't occupy all the buildings in one year," added Grote.

"I do think the long-range plan will benefit the residents of western Wayne County, but the county can't, because of its financial condition, or won't see that."

"They (county board) shouldn't allow the present to cloud the future," said Grote.

The SC-WSU consortium plan was one of eight proposals submitted to a special county subcommittee last fall. Complications set in when the consortium had problems negotiating a lease and legislation was passed which prohibits such an agreement without state approval.

The Sacred Heart plan was submitted last summer. Grote and Gullen were invited to a county board meeting in August to hear representatives of Sacred Heart Center review its plan.

"We were still preparing our master plan and lease agreement," explained Grote. "The board invited us to review and become acquainted with the new proposal."

On Aug. 27, Grote and Gullen sent the county board a letter stating that the alcoholism treatment facility was not compatible with the consortium plan.

Schoolcraft trustees did not learn of the proceedings until they met in a regular board meeting Sept. 24. Many expressed surprise and disappointment over news the consortium was in trouble. For most trustees, it was the first they had heard of any problems brewing.

Grote said he felt it was not proper to raise the question to SC trustees before the county board had considered it. The county board was not scheduled to meet until Sept. 25, the day after the SC meeting.

Grote added he sent copies of all correspondences between his office and the county board to Paul Kadish, Schoolcraft board chairman.

"It my job as the president to keep the chairperson advised of the problems of this college," said Grote.

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Another park eyed

'Park board safe from take-over'

"The Cockeyed Archer" took aim at the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority (HCMA) and may have hit its real target: a Detroit riverfront ribbon park.

Under prodding by state legislators, James Clarkson, a member of the HCMA board from Oakland County, promised to have his seven fellow board members consider a series of "people access" points on the Detroit River from Belle Isle southward.

The prodding came from State Rep. Warren Goemaere (D-Roseville), chairman of the House special committee investigating the structure and operations of the five-county HCMA.

Specifically, the committee is considering a bill by Rep. Morris Hood Jr. (D-Detroit) to reapportion the HCMA board to population and to require HCMA to develop a metropark inside the Detroit city limits.

But Goemaere, a veteran of five terms in Lansing, said the Hood bill hasn't a chance of passage. "This is the old 'Cockeyed Archer' technique, where you look in one direction and shoot in another," he chuckled in a conversation following a public hearing Sept. 29 in Pontiac.

OAKLAND COUNTY residents generally supported HCMA's existing board structure (one representative from each county, two named by the governor) and lavishly praised its programs.

But there was sharp criticism of HCMA's plans to develop new metroparks in the outlying reaches of Washtenaw, Oakland and Macomb counties.

Robert (Bud) Slingerland of Lake Orion, regional vice president of the Michigan United Conservation Clubs (MUCC), was first to propose a "walking, biking, sitting park along the Detroit River."

Such a ribbon park would utilize unused patches of land that are now slag and rubble heaps. Instead of buying land, he said, officials could negotiate easements from industries that would allow the public access to narrow strips of land along the river.

"It would give fishermen access to the biggest trout stream in the world," said Slingerland, referring to the frequent spottings and occasional catches of chinook salmon in front of Detroit's skyline.

Prodded by Rep. Goemaere to comment, HCMA's Clarkson called it "a very fine idea, if it can be worked out. Back in the 1930s, the theory was to have such an area on the Huron and Clinton rivers," he recalled, noting that the original theory was abandoned in favor of metroparks of 1,000 acres and up.

"I've found our board most receptive to new ideas," said Clarkson, as he promised to start discussion on the idea at the next meeting.

BRIAN BLAESING, a staff member of the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments, said SEMCOG staff members saw possibilities to the riverfront ribbon park idea, although actual implementation could come from Detroit itself, Wayne County or the state, and not only HCMA.

Blaesing outlined SEMCOG's 1990 parks plan for the seven-county southeast Michigan region which called for an "inner ring" of regional parks closer to the urbanized area than existing Kensington or Stony Creek metroparks.

Henry W. Hoot, an Oakland County commissioner whose district includes Troy and parts of Bloomfield and Avon townships, said the board's general government committee opposed the reapportionment formula in the Hood bill.

"The practical effect would be to give Wayne County and Detroit control of the board," Hoot said.

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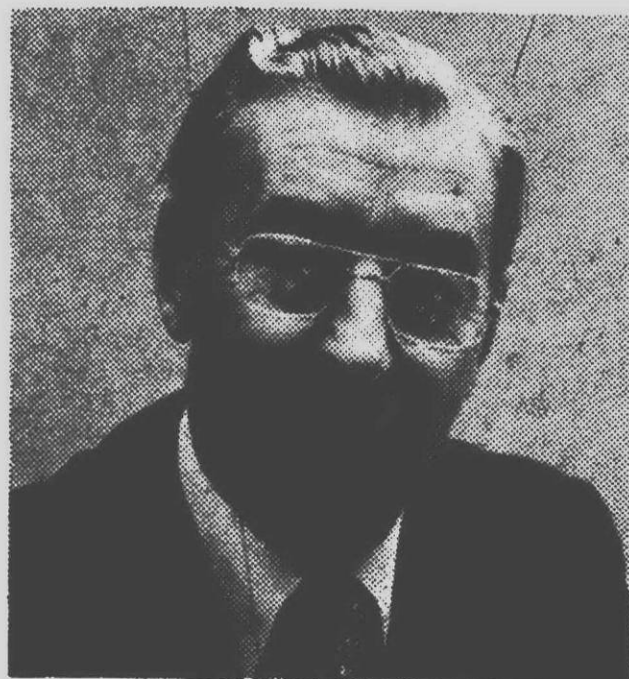

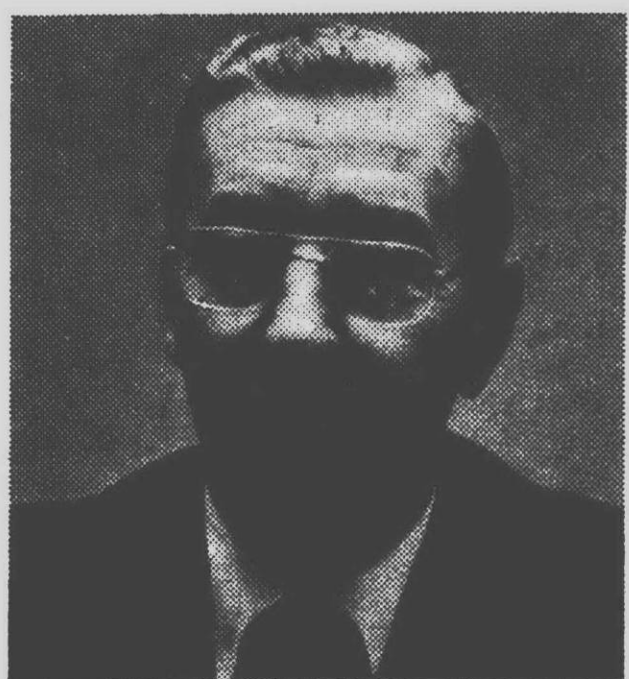

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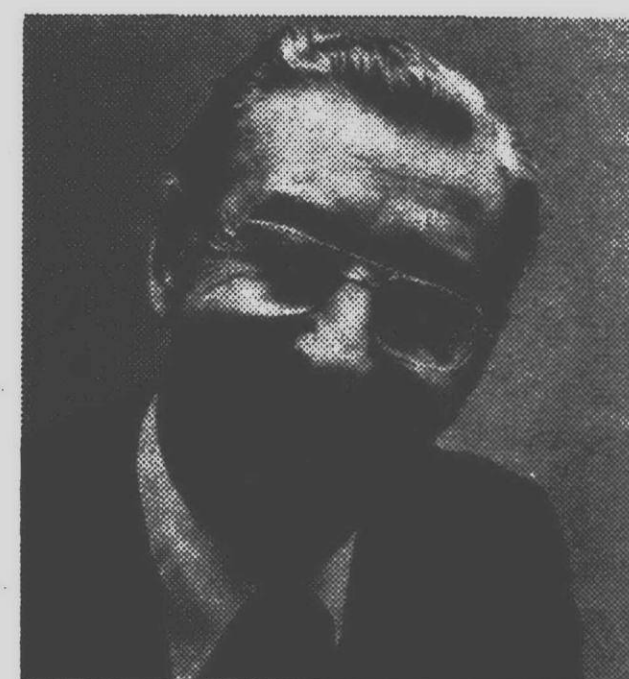

Hats off to work crews who contained emergency

What could have been a major catastrophe was averted by a group of Canton Township employees who handled themselves and a dangerous situation like a team of old pros.

The recent train derailment, which ruptured a gasoline pipeline, resulted in inconvenience for some 1,200 persons uprooted from their apartment homes for nearly 24 hours.

It could have been a different story. With fumes from thousands of gallons of gasoline drifting around the Stoneybrook complex, a single spark could have generated a holocaust.

CANTON RELIES on the Wayne County Sheriff's Department for police protection. The township's civil defense coordinator had resigned a few weeks ago.

Who takes over when several thousand residents are sitting on a veritable powder keg? There had been no trial runs—so they improvised.

The Canton Township Fire Department—16 regulars and 16 volunteers—spent 625 man-hours at the scene of the wreck. As metal freight cars were moved, a threat of explosion was ever present.

Chief Mel Paulun brought in the Willow Run Airport spray tanks to cover the area with foam. The chief ripped all the buttons from his uniform when he and firefighter Jim Davison narrowly escaped a toppling boxcar.

MEMBERS OF the Plymouth Township Fire Department were on standby at the apartment complex with a pumper and rescue wagon from 9 a.m. Friday until 7:30 a.m. Saturday.

Sheriff's deputies set up roadblocks and handled traffic tieups.

Coordinating the operation were Township Supervisor Robert Greenstein and DPW Director Jake Dingledey. Just three months ago, radios, spotlights and PA systems were installed in DPW and building department cars. The supervisor's car also had a radio channel to the sheriff's department.

The investment paid off during the emergency with the complete cooperation of all units.

Greenstein and Dingledey were on location from noon Friday until midnight. They were back at 6 a.m. Saturday and stayed until the all clear sounded at 12:30 p.m. When they were away from the scene, they remained in radio contact.

Building department employees spent 146 man-hours on the job. DPW personnel contributed 50 man-hours. Dog Warden John Swalley was there from the beginning, through the night and the next morning.

It was a case of everyone's pitching in and doing what had to be done with no quibbling.

Canton Township came through its state of emergency with flying colors.

A word of advice, though, to those attending which will help the sessions be more meaningful. It is quite easy to yell "no, no" about expenditures just because we might be personally against that particular program or item. But what would be more helpful, and harder to do, is to offer a suggestion about how existing programs could continue at less cost.

If the sessions are to be productive, those attending should not merely be against something, but have ideas to offer. There are lots of things which could be cut out which you and 200 people might agree on, but there could be 2,000 people who would take an opposing position.

CUTTING EXPENSES might have to result in programs being reduced or eliminated.

But there is no need yet to panic, yank out the sword, and slash away at programs. It's time to take out the surgeon's knife and gently slice away particles whose removal won't harm the body itself.

Please give this some thought. Come with ideas and don't be afraid to make suggestions. The administration and school board are anxious to hear from you. Don't dissappoint them by staying home.

The great editors

Strolling along the journalistic trails, a fellow encounters many interesting characters. And surprisingly, some of the most interesting are found right in the newsroom of the newspaper offices.

Over the years, The Stroller has walked with the kings and queens of the sports world and has met up with some glamorous characters who seem to come right out of a fiction writer's imagination.

The fight industry is filled with colorful characters such as the late Jack Kearns who came out of the Klondike to guide Jack Dempsey to the heavyweight championship of the world. And on the other end was a short, chunky fellow, with a black patch over his eye, who made a practice of gaining admission to all major events without paying. He even advertised himself as "One-Eye Connolly, the world champion gate crasher. His kind has long since vanished from the scene.

Over this period, the most fascinating were several of the editors with whom The Stroller toiled.

NEVER CAN HE forget "Old Charlie" Weiser, the last of the once colorful brown derby brigade who

gave The Stroller his start in the sports writing field.

He was a kindly, yet stern individual who was the central figure in a story that still makes the rounds among newspaper folk.

On this occasion, he had written a rather scathing editorial ridiculing the city council back home. The next day the city fathers stormed the office with the headline that read:

"Half of the city council is crazy."

After listening to their angry comments, "Old Charlie" promised that he would give the matter some thought and if he deemed it fit, he would apologize. It was the first time his staff members ever heard him backing up.

But the laugh was on again when the next day's paper appeared with the headline:

"Half of the city council isn't crazy."

When The Stroller arrived in Detroit to continue his career, he worked under the watchful eye of Harry Bullion, a quick and hot-tempered Frenchman. Warned in advance about his short fuse, The Stroller never can forget that Bullion ripped three telephone receivers off the hook and threw them out the window in one

week when he received the wrong numbers.

THEN THERE WAS Hal Mitchell, a tall, white-haired scholarly individual who was news editor at the Detroit Free Press. Hal had been educated at Oberlin College and was a good editor, with one rare peculiarity: He always wore a hat even while working. And he never swore.

When irked at any one, he would shout "TLNI." No one knew what he meant. Then one day The Stroller happened to be at the luncheon table with him.

"Hal, I hear you shout TLNI when you are upset with anyone," The Stroller said, "and none of us knows what you mean."

Hal smiled for a moment, adjusted his nose pickers (old fashioned spectacles) and answered: "Total loss and no insurance."

Come to think of it, that was worse than any cuss words he could have used.

The king of them all, though, was Malcolm Bingay, the famed "Ify the Dopester" when the Tigers were ruling the baseball world.

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Young unites suburbs with McNamara firing

As with cross-district school busing and Watergate, there seems to be no end to the continuing saga of the Detroit Metropolitan Water Board and its western Wayne County representative, Mayor Edward H. McNamara of Livonia.

McNamara was removed from the board Thursday in a letter from Detroit Mayor Coleman Young who has the power under the new Detroit City Charter to appoint and remove board members to serve at his "will and pleasure."

Apparently McNamara's actions and comments in the past six months have upset Young's political pleasure.

The removal of the Livonia mayor, one of three suburban members of the seven-member board, may give McNamara more time to devote to city problems Monday afternoons instead of driving to downtown Detroit for board sessions.

But the mayor's removal still leaves many unresolved issues on the table and generates a few other interesting political questions.

When all is said and done, it may be that Young did more to unite the suburban interests than anyone since four years ago when the cross-district busing issue began.

The unanswered questions are:

1—How can the majority of Detroit water department customers have a guarantee of board representation when only the Detroit mayor has the authority to appoint and removal members?

2—What voice will a majority of water customers have in stopping unjustified water rate increases?

3—How will the metropolitan area, which has 91 cities and townships getting their water from Detroit, have any voice in the operations of the water board, which has a majority of its members from Detroit.

When the controversy was initiated by McNamara last April, the Livonia mayor made it clear that he wasn't opposed to a potential 35 per cent water rate hike for the sake of opposing a rate hike.

McNamara insisted that the budget figures prepared by the water depart-

ment staff didn't justify a rate hike and that the budget itself was questionable.

In the ensuing controversy, McNamara provided the leadership for suburban officials to discuss the problem and possible solutions.

There were many meetings of suburban leaders in Southfield and Livonia locations and the consensus was that suburban representation on the water board should be guaranteed.

Their argument was sound. Two-thirds of the Detroit water department revenues come from outside of Detroit and those consumers should have a fair share of the water board control.

During the heat of the controversy, State Rep. John Bennett (D-Redford Township) asked for the creation of a special House of Representatives study committee to look into the water department's operations and learn how rates are set.

That committee, which had suburban members in the majority, agreed to have an independent audit of the department's books and records by the state auditor general's office. The House went along with the recommendation but Detroit officials prevented the state from even starting an audit.

In the meantime, the water rate increase was first approved—without suburban board members present—and then rescinded three days later.

The water issue has been dormant since last summer—until Young's removal of McNamara from the board.

That action created a special set of circumstances for McNamara, campaigning for a third two-year term in the Nov. 4 election.

The removal gives McNamara a million dollars worth of free publicity in newspapers, radio and television four weeks before the election.

The mayor isn't losing any sleep about his re-election chances since he captured 66.4 per cent of the Sept. 9 primary vote.

There are persistent political rumors that the mayor will run for the Democratic nomination for the U. S. House of Representatives next summer. The congressional seat is now occupied by Marvin Esch, Ann Arbor Republican, who is planning to seek the party's nomination for the U. S. Senate seat now held by Philip Hart, a Democrat, who announced earlier this year he won't seek another term.

If McNamara decides to run for the congressional seat, the water rate exposure in Plymouth, Ann Arbor, Ypsilanti and other Detroit water customers may prove to be priceless to a candidate trying to get his identity known outside his own community.

Young, who has his own shrewd political instincts, probably realized the dual benefits McNamara would gain if he were removed from the water board at this point.

Young could have waited another month or even a year and then replace McNamara.

But the public will get the obvious impression that McNamara was removed by Young because the Livonian was messing up the Detroit mayor's plans for a rate increase.

It was about this time two years ago that another chief executive, Richard Nixon, fired Archibald Cox for apparently getting too close to the truth on the Watergate investigation.

Cox became an instant martyr and a symbol of political power abused or misused.

McNamara may be in the same situation in the eyes of suburban leaders who feel that Young has ripped them off on the water issue.

Churchill defense stops Mott, 6-0

You really can't blame Livonia Churchill coach Ken Kaestner for being defensive about his team's chances of winning the Western Six football title.

With an offense such as the Chargers have displayed lately, defense is the only subject worth mentioning at the Newburgh Road school.

More than worth mentioning, though, the Churchill stoppers might deserve a whole book. Friday they showed why as they blotted out everything but the sun from visiting unbeaten Waterford Mott and rolled to a 6-0 victory.

Not only did the Churchill defense account for all the points in the game, the stingy unit stopped Mott on first downs within the Charger five yard-line twice in the first quarter and then held the visitors without a first down in the entire second half.

And despite an offense that stammered and sputtered before an impressive defense of Mott, homecoming turned out to be a happy affair.

THE VICTORY made the Chargers a solid favorite to win honors in the Western Six loop as their record

climbed to 3-1 overall and 2-0 in league play.

Defensive end George Bielis made the play of the game on Mott's third play from scrimmage when he intercepted an attempted lateral by Mott quarterback Tim McKay on the Waterford 12 yardline and sauntered in with the game's only score.

The conversion attempt was blocked and with the game less than a minute old, the scoring had been completed.

Not that the excitement was over, however. Shortly thereafter, Mott's McKay, now on defense, stepped in front of a Mike Stretcher pass and returned the ball to the one-foot line.

Mott took four cracks going inside with McKay trying for the score himself on the final attempt. But the Charger interior line of Pat Fabian, Tim Curran, Mark Dewitt, Bielis, Kurt Pitcher and John Curran, with some healthy pushing from middle linebacker Mike Welsh, was up to the task and the Chargers held.

Later, a Mott drive got the ball down within the Charger five again. Three plays again netted nothing. And a fourth down field goal was wide.

Those two stands seemed to take a lot of steam from the Mott attack. Nei-

ther offense generated a serious drive thereafter.

Although Churchill gained yardage consistently on the ground throughout the game, it could never put together a drive of any duration.

Matt Foster, switched this game from slotback to fullback, led the Charger offense with 131 yards in 21 carries. Virtually every millimeter was earned on the inside as Foster powered his way through the trenches.

Junior Bill Coyle added an outside threat, gaining 86 yards on 19 carries, mostly sweeps.

The passing game, however, was non-existent.

"Our game plan called for a lot of passing in the first half," said Charger coach Kaestner. "You just have to credit Mott's secondary."

And Kaestner was about to take no one lightly in conference play including Walled Lake Western, which went into Friday's action with an 0-3 record and which is next on the Churchill schedule.

"The team may think we're going to take it easy after this week's win, but we can't afford a letup," Kaestner said.

THE CHARGER mentor gave credit to his assistants for preparing the team in key areas.

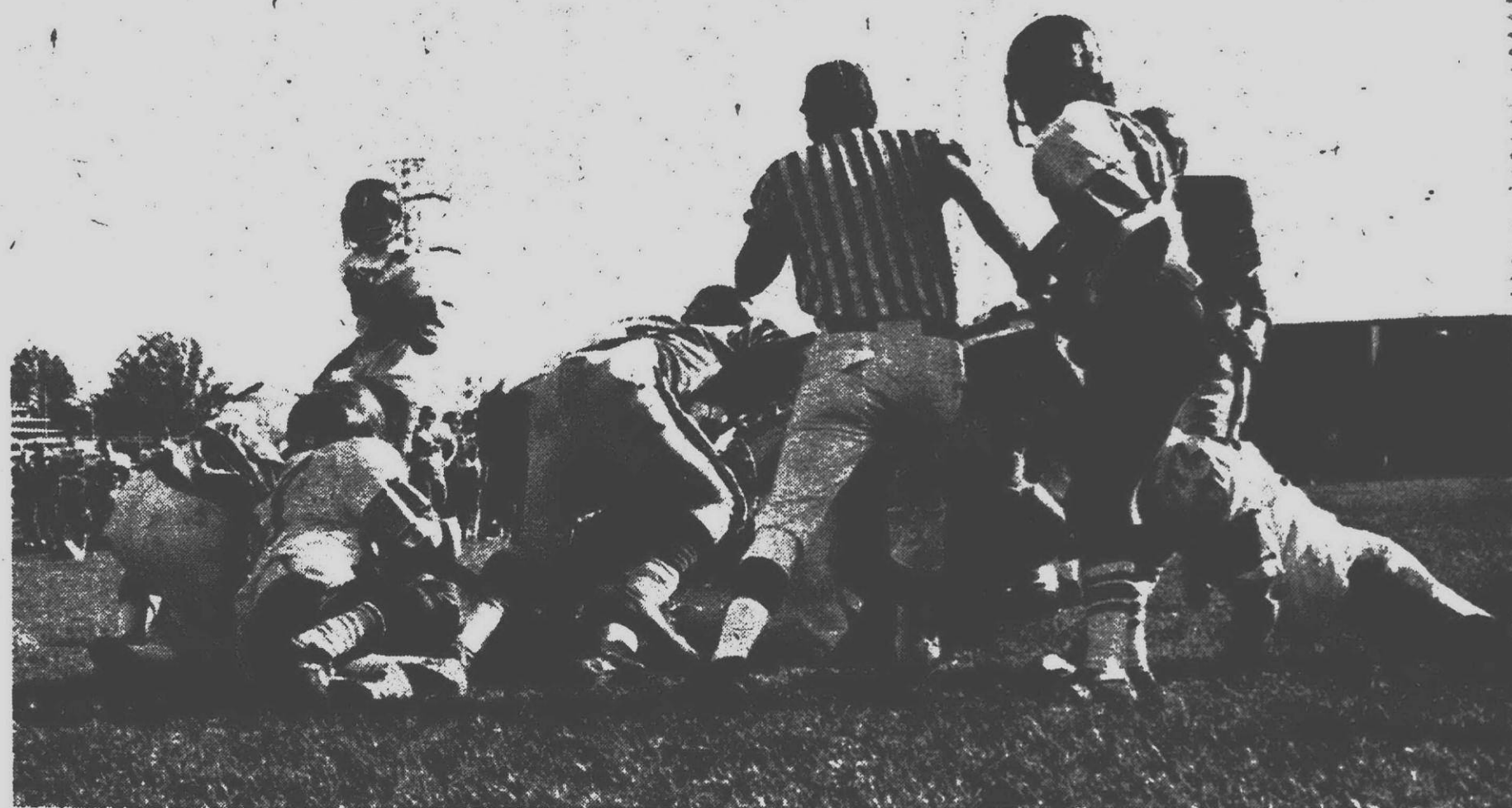
"Line coach Bob Armstrong and de-

West stays atop league, beats Cherry Hill

Garden City West's defensive unit, led by brothers Dale and John Stupyra, thrilled a large parents' night crowd Friday evening with a record-setting performance, in the Tigers' tough, 14-0, victory over Cherry Hill in Tri-River League play.

While the offense sputtered most of the night, the defense was called upon to do yeoman work in giving Coach Charley Elmquist's squad its third straight Tri-River triumph and a 3-1 overall record.

John Stupyra converted and West led, 7-0, with 6:52 left in the half.

West's outstanding defense, which held Cherry Hill to a record 31 yards

gained against them, held Riverside to only 86 total yards the week before. Coaches Bill Parker, who became a father this week, and Chuck Howton raved about the fine defensive work.

Some of the luminaries in holding Cherry Hill's offense to a minimal 31 yards were Dale Stupyra, who punted 75 yards to set up West's last TD; John Stupyra, who intercepted a pass; end Tom Parks; tackle Bruce Becker; linebacker Mark Chidester, who recovered another fumble; end Wayne Hard; and linebacker Matt Dunnigan.

The defense sealed the Spartans'

It was a case of Belleville's Kevin Barnes' legs against Livonia Bentley's Russ Hodges' arm Friday night in a Suburban Eight football matchup. The Tigers' junior sensation won.

Admittedly, however, there was not much to choose from in the offensive battle won by Belleville 36-19.

Tailback Barnes riddled the Bulldogs all night as he racked up 207 yards in 18 carries and three touchdowns to pace the Tiger attack.

Bentley countered with Hodges, who hit on 10 of 22 passes for 220 yards and an identical three touchdowns.

The game was closer than the score might indicate as the teams fought to a near standstill in the first half with Belleville emerging with a slight 14-13 advantage.

Belleville scored first as Bentley hurt itself by losing a fumble on its own three yardline in the early goings. Two plays later, Tiger quarterback Dan Scripser dove across for the score.

Bentley countered in the first quarter when Hodges hit Mike Robbins from 22 yards out to pull within a point.

The Bulldogs enjoyed a short-lived lead in the second quarter when

Hodges connected on a nine-yarder to Rick Shepard, but Belleville took the lead for good moments later when Barnes swept end for a 54-yard scoring jaunt.

A Belleville safety in the third quarter, when the ball was snapped over Mark White's head and he was caught in the endzone, began the downfall of the Bulldogs.

And when Barnes rushed for consecutive touchdowns of 29 and 34 yards, the game was all but over.

Hodges completed his third touchdown pass in the fourth quarter—a 57-yard affair to Robbins, but it was too little and too late. Belleville wrapped up the scoring when it completed its only pass of the night, a 16-yard scoring toss from Scripser to Harold Dennis.

Belleville had 316 yards total offense to 304 for the Bulldogs.

Tim Oakley led all Bentley rushers with a 51 yards on seven carries.

But the inability of Bentley to contain the Belleville sweep gave the Bulldogs their second consecutive loss in the Sub Eight and dropped their overall record to 2-2.

Bentley will host Plymouth Salem next Friday in a 7:30 p.m. contest.

Livonia Franklin and the West Bloomfield Lakers battled on almost even terms during the first half of Friday night's nonleague game at West Bloomfield, but the Franklin gridders came back from the halftime intermission in better form, rolling to a 33-0 victory over the winless Lakers.

"We had a tough time in the first half," said Franklin coach Armand Vigna whose Livonia team is coming off of an undefeated 1974 season. "We had a couple of guys (fullback Tim Hollandsworth and tailback Jim Casey) who were hurt and we only played Casey on defense."

That strategy worked well, though, as Casey picked off four Laker passes, including one theft that resulted in a 15-yard touchdown for Franklin. FRANKLIN TAILBACK Al Acton opened the scoring in the second frame when he swept around left end for a 70-yard touchdown run with 7:02 left in the half. Calvin Beer's extra-point kick made it 7-0 in Livonia's favor at the intermission. The Franklin offense was marching again as the second period came to a close with the Lakers' Kevin Kowalski intercepting a Wilson pass attempt.

The third quarter opened on an ominous note for Franklin when Pollard bobbled the kick off, but Livonia held onto the ball and launched an 83-yard scoring drive that ate up almost four and a half minutes of the period with Casey going over left tackle for the last five yards and a TD. Beer's kick made it 14-0.

West Bloomfield took the ensuing kick and, on the second play, Casey intercepted at the Laker 45. Franklin started another march toward the end zone that ended when Kowalski covered a fumble for the West Bloomfield team at the Laker 14. Kowalski then went into the game at quarterback for Coach Don Eivedotti's team and, again on the second play, threw a pass that was picked off by Casey in

the right flat and returned for a touchdown. Beer connected for his third conversion of the evening, giving Livonia a 21-0 edge with 3:42 left in the quarter.

THE LAKERS BEGAN a new drive in good field position near the 50 but Casey stepped in again and picked off a Negley pass at midfield that started Franklin on a scoring drive that was capped on the first play of the fourth quarter when Dennis Smith found Mike Kaseta in the end zone with a 12-yard TD strike for a 27-0 advantage.

West Bloomfield mounted its best offensive attack of the night, aided by three defensive pass interference calls against Franklin, before Pollard stepped in front of a Kowalski pass at the Livonia seven for another interception.

Franklin added its final touchdown with 36 seconds left to play as Dave Smith scampered into the end zone from 17 yards out on the seventh play of a 68-yard drive. The extra-point kick was wide, making the final score 33-0.

THE VICTORY WAS Franklin's third of the season against one loss, while the Lakers suffered their fourth straight defeat and their third shutout of the campaign.

The statistical edge also went to the Livonia squad as Franklin notched 14 first downs to West Bloomfield's nine; 208 yards rushing compared to the Lakers' 39 yards on the ground; and 71 yards passing on four completions in 10 attempts, while West Bloomfield managed 54 yards on eight completions in 19 attempts and the six interceptions.

Acton paced the Franklin ground game with 78 yards—70 of which were marked off on the second-period touchdown run—on four carries and Phil Yuhasz gained 54 on 11 attempts. Craig Casman led the Laker rushers with 37 yards and John Hodgins added 25.

Franklin coach Vigna cited Casey's 15-yard interception touchdown as the turning point of the game, while Laker coach Eivedotti praised the play of middle linebacker and captain Mark Tootalian. Apparently the only serious injury during the game was suffered by Van Gorder who hurt his ankle in the third period.

West Bloomfield will travel to Bloomfield Hills Andover (2-3 and 1-4 in the Greater Oakland Activities League) at 8 p.m. Friday for a GOAL game, while Franklin hosts Westland John Glenn on Saturday in a North-west Suburban League match. Livonia is 1-0 in the conference and Glenn is undefeated, as of our press time.

Debbie Pozan led the winners with 17 points while J. Isanhart took game honors with 18 for the Spartans.

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

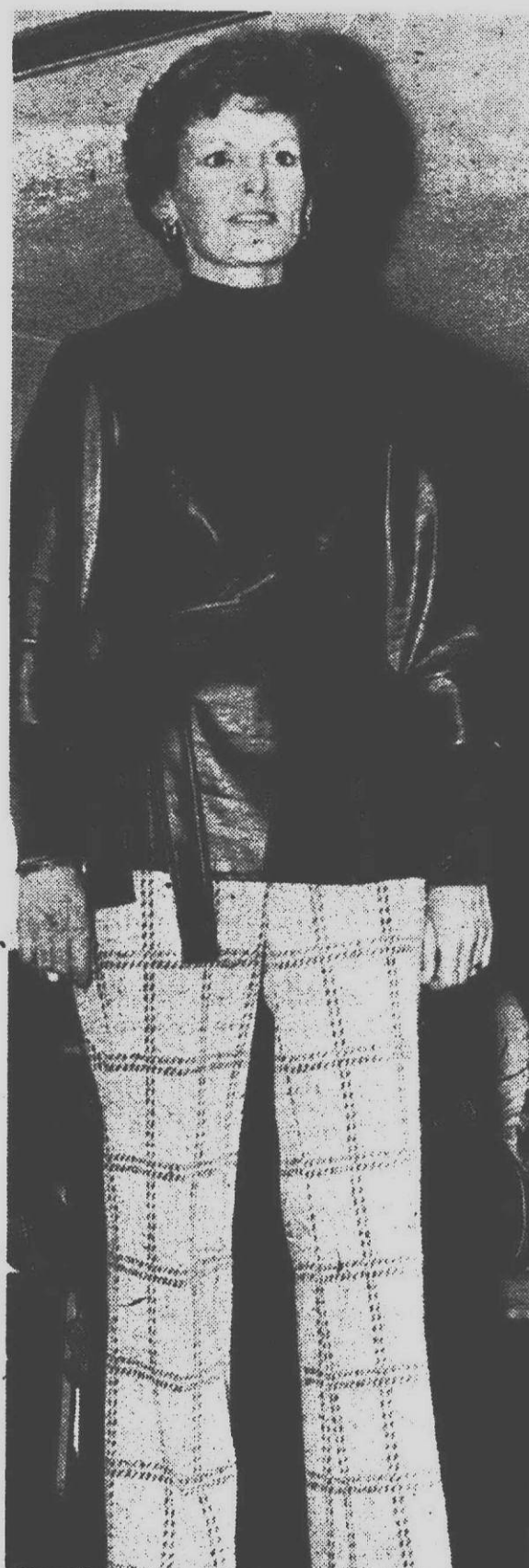
Another new color combination Ms. Murphy recommended was sea green with wine. It was shown in an ultrasuede jacket and skirt with a wine silk shirt.

Center holding women's talks

Cancer service questions? Put them to Mildred Dely

Mildred Dely is a font of knowledge about the Michigan Cancer Foundation—its history, services, volunteers. But ask her why she's been working with the agency, without pay, for over 10 years and she's stuck for an answer. Quitting is something she has never considered.

"You get attached to the people," she explains. "The patients aren't just a list of names, because you get to know their families. You hear about their progress and setbacks. You want to be helpful."

The MCF branch office at 173 N. Main Street is a second home to Mrs. Dely. She makes certain it is open from 1 to 3 p.m., Monday through Friday as a distribution point for beds, wheelchairs, walkers, dressings and other sickroom supplies. These items are on loan without charge to all area cancer patients because of support from the Plymouth Community Fund.

AFTER HOURS, Mrs. Dely often delivers supplies that can't be called for, and handles telephone inquiries, donations and memorial requests from her home.

She now is preparing for the foundation's annual Christmas card sale.

"We serve about 40 patients here, including 24 from the City of Plymouth," she reports. "Last year, the dressings distributed by this office represented a savings of almost \$1,500 to area patients. Loan of beds, wheelchairs and other equipment was valued at \$3,000."

The costs are held down further through the efforts of about 15 volunteers, who staff the branch office, transport patients and deliver supplies.

Last year volunteers logged 2,100 miles, driving patients to therapy centers. Senior citizens, church and other groups helped prepare more than 3,000 medical dressings.

Sixty volunteers worked in the 1974 pap and oral test clinics. Many area physicians and nurses also volunteered their time, saving the 675 participants more than \$10,000 in examination fees. One positive cancer was discovered during the pap tests, while 24 abnormalities were found as a result of the oral clinics.

THE MICHIGAN Cancer Foundation is often confused with the American Cancer Society, Mrs. Dely notes. The main difference is that ACS fund-raising efforts, resources and expenditures are spread across the nation, while MCF concentrates its efforts in Michigan.

Money allocated by the Plymouth Community Fund is used directly to help local patients.

The Main Street branch office has an active educational program, including a variety of talks, films and brochures available to clubs and schools. Like the ACF the Michigan organiza-

Payments due some women veterans

Some of Michigan's 9,000 women veterans who served in the armed forces and left service since Feb. 1, 1955 may be eligible for a new special payment from the Veterans Administration.

To receive the approximately \$30 a month for each month they were in training on the GI Bill between June 1, 1966 and Oct. 24, 1972, they must have been married at the time.

During that period, women veterans who were married did not receive the increased allowance extended to male veterans who were married.

A recent VA ruling made this eligibility retroactive to June 1, 1966. Those who trained after Oct. 24, 1972 have already been paid on the same basis as their male counterparts.

Women veterans can file claims for the money at the VA regional office, but there is a cutoff date of July 1, 1976. Claims cannot be accepted after that date.

Proof of marriage while in training must be furnished in connection with the claim. The additional amount for husbands cannot be paid to women who trained under the other World War II and Korean conflict GI bills.

The MCF also welcomes volunteers, even if they can donate only an hour or two a month.

Mrs. Dely warns, "Hardly anyone quits once they start here. It's a very rewarding job."

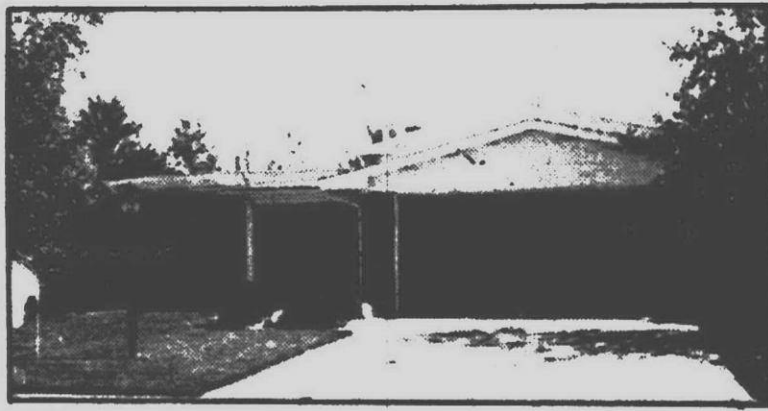

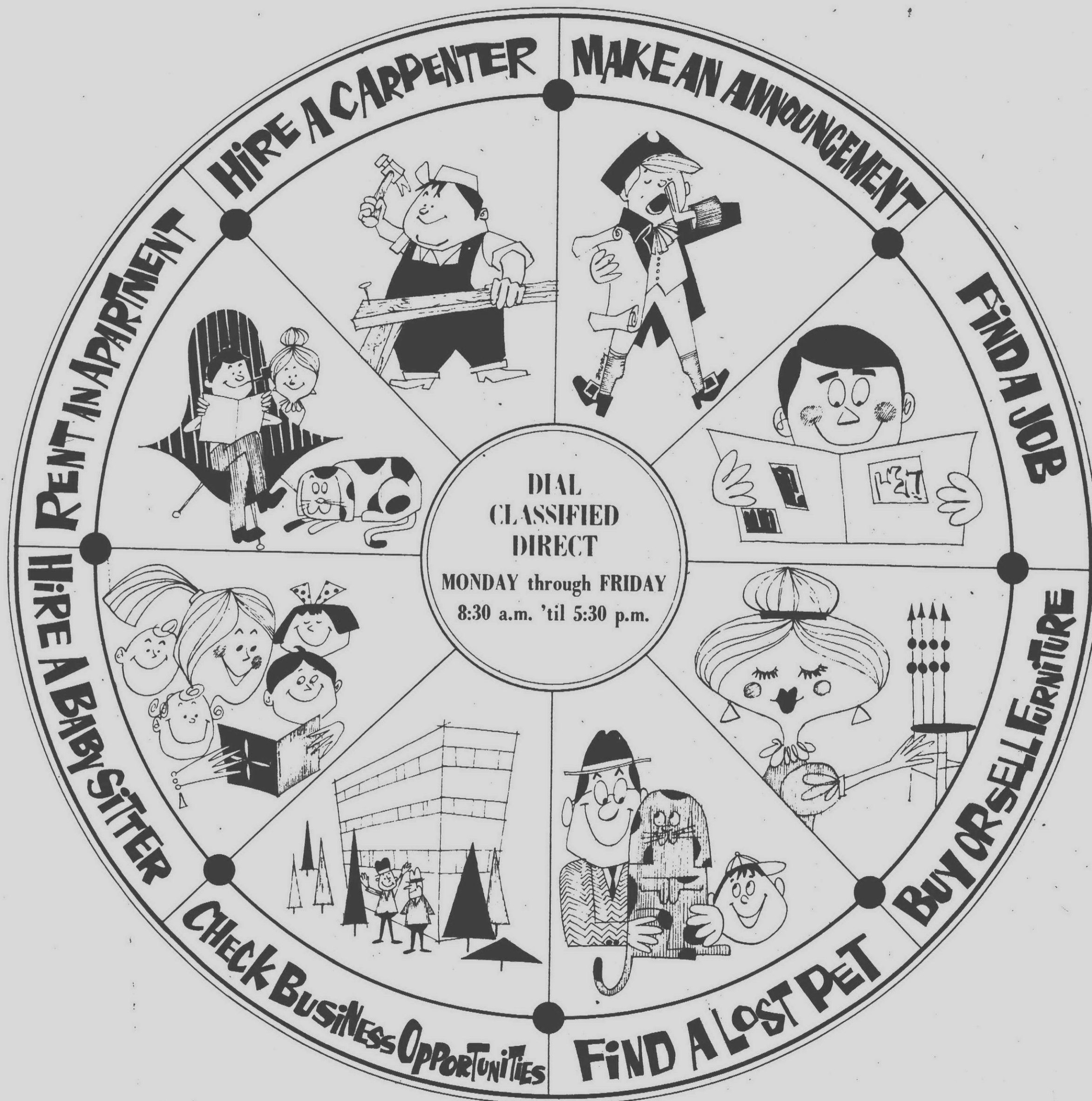

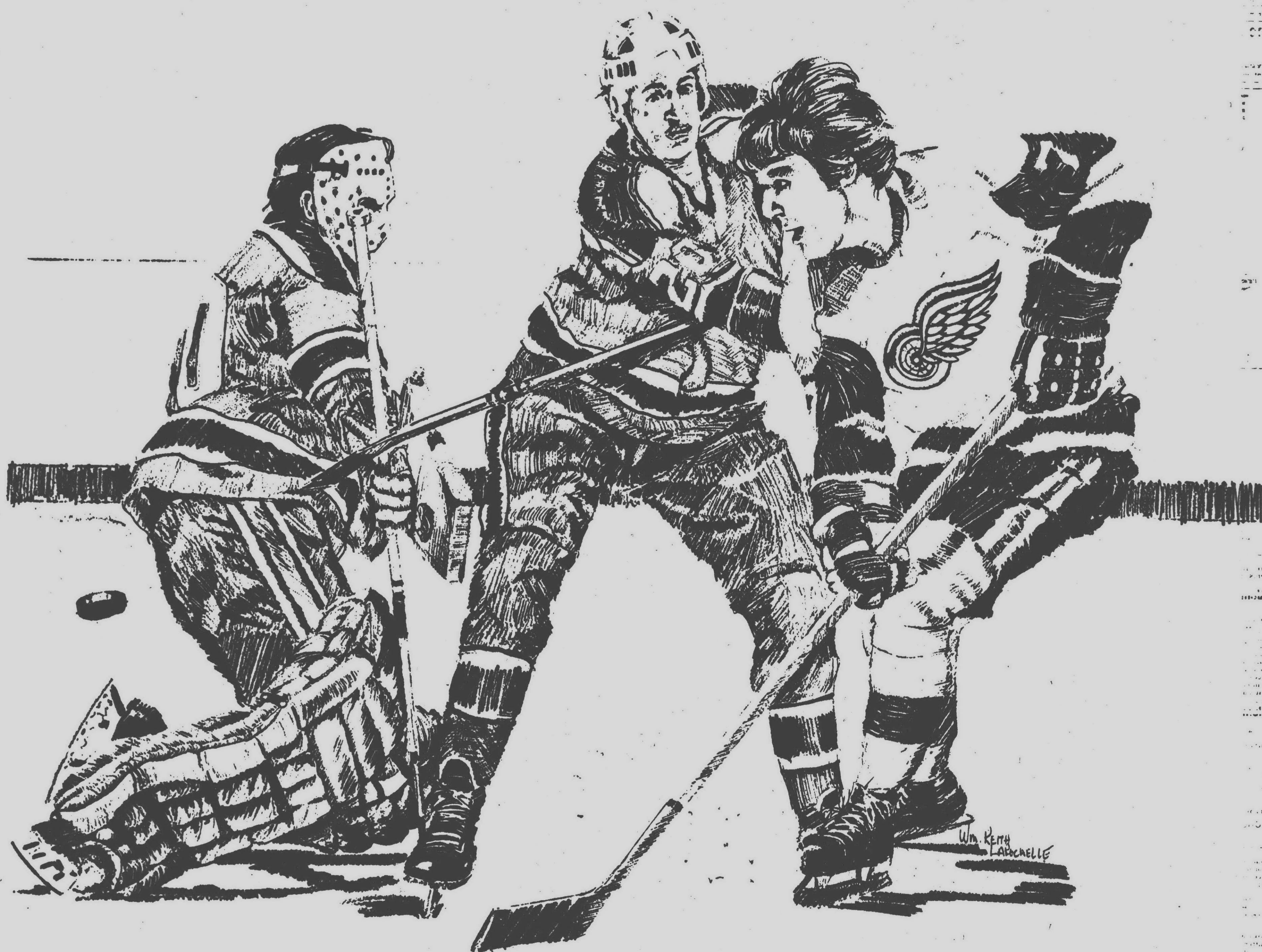
