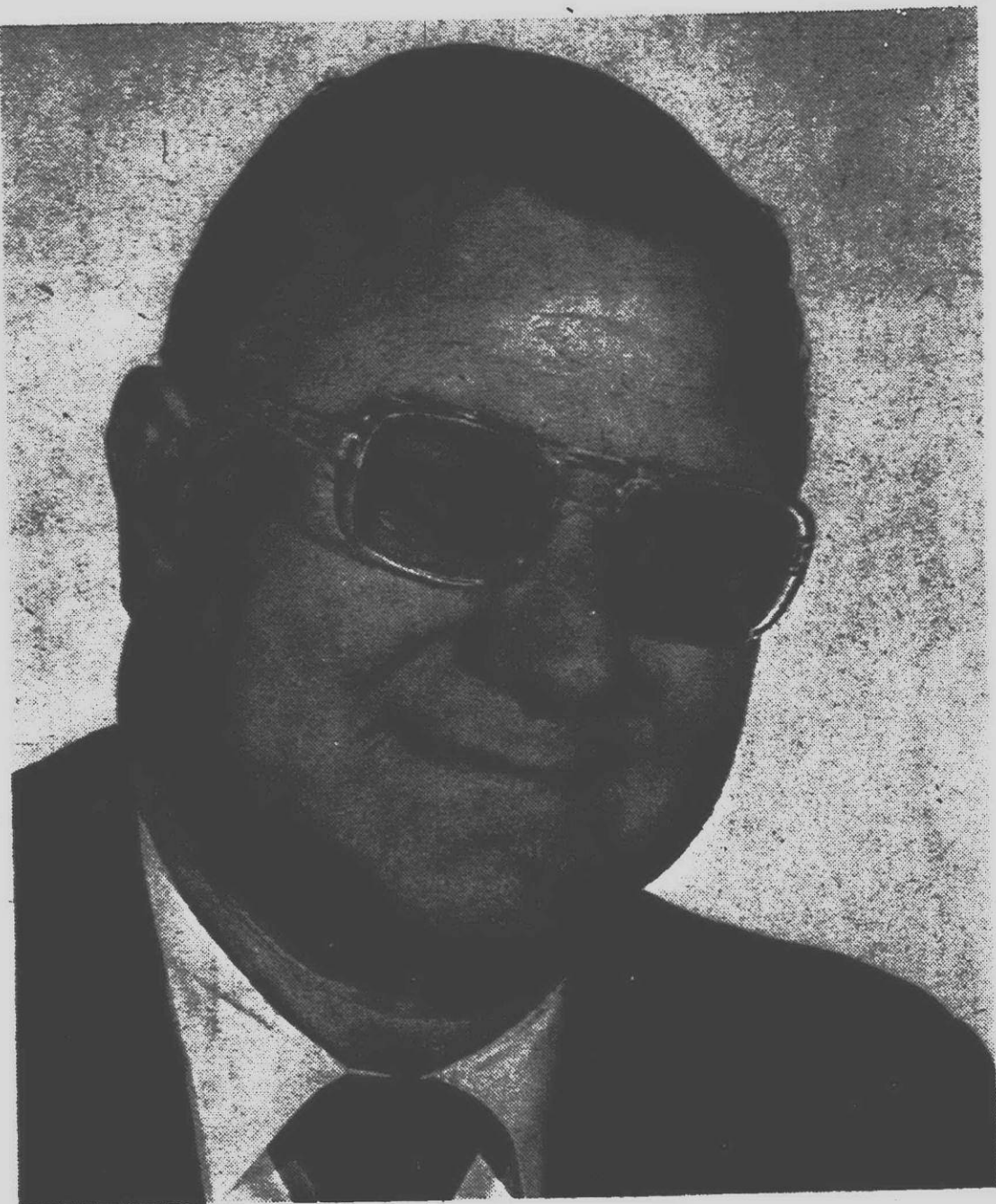

Joe Bida selected mayor 5 ballots break 3-way deadlock

Joe Bida was selected mayor of the City of Plymouth Monday night after four ballots and two caucuses broke a deadlock between three candidates.

After the deadlock was broken, the commission cast a unanimous ballot for Bida and, after four more ballots, selected Thomas Turner as mayor pro tem.

Other candidates for the mayoral position were Norb Batterman and Jack Moehle. Moehle was a last-minute entry into the contest, announcing Monday night his intention to seek the office.

In the early balloting by commissioners, the votes went two for Bida, two for Batterman, two for Moehle, and one for Turner. Once it was known a three-way deadlock would exist, Turner voted for himself as a parliamentary tactic and announced in caucus he would vote for the first

commissioner to receive a third vote for mayor.

The deadlock was finally broke when Batterman and Bida withdrew from the caucus to talk privately.

After that discussion, Batterman announced he would withdraw as a mayoral candidate for the sake of unity on the commission and would vote for Bida. Turner announced his intention to vote for Bida and on the next secret ballot all commissioners voted for Bida.

BIDA of 585 Hamilton is the first mayor selected in recent years to live in the older section of the city.

He had served 10 years as director of the Department of Public Works in Plymouth from 1955-65. Bida was DPW director for Plymouth Township from 1971-73. He was elected to a four-year term in 1973 and was the top vote-getter in that election.

After resigning as DPW director in

Plymouth, Bida worked for Price Brothers of Livonia, Cadillac Asphalt Paving Co., and then joined Leo Calhoun Ford in Plymouth in 1969. He is a new and used car-truck salesman.

Bida moved to Plymouth in 1956. He and wife Irene have three children and a grandson—daughter, Wendy, and sons John and Tom both of who live in Plymouth.

After being selected, Bida commented: "I wish to thank the commission for giving me this position. We all want to work together as a team and I will do all in my power to bring the commission together."

When announcing his candidacy at the beginning of the meeting, Bida said: "I was with the city 10 years as a department head and was faithful in doing my duties. I'm not the choice of some groups in town because I voted against the loop road."

"I represent no special interests. My investments consist of savings accounts in National Bank of Detroit and in the Plymouth Community Credit Union."

"I want this commission to work closely together, and I'm strongly against having a strong mayor form of government here in Plymouth."

AFTER THE new commissioners were sworn-in and the organizational meeting started, Commissioner Beverly McAninch made a statement announcing her intention not to seek the office of mayor she has held the past two years.

"I want to clear the air and deal openly with concerns expressed by some that I have been divisive and ineffective as mayor. These have been the innuendoes around town, although none have been made about my integrity or concern."

"As mayor I tried to emphasize openness in government and stressed involving residents from all sections of the city on our boards and commissions."

"To avoid any conflict on this new commission, and to help us work together, I am requesting that my name not be put in nomination for mayor. I am looking forward to working effectively for the city."

Following that announcement, Moehle announced he would like to be selected mayor. As qualifications, he cited degrees in engineering and business administration and his work duties which include responsibilities in finance, engineering and management.

Moehle said he has lived in Plymouth for 10 years and his public service included being a member of the city's Municipal Building Authority, member of the Plymouth Symphony, member and vice-president of the Plymouth Board of Education and his experience as a city commissioner.

"I have no potential conflicts of interest in either my job or the property I own in town. I ask your support because I believe I can provide the leadership this commission needs."

IN SPEAKING for his candidacy, Batterman said he has served on the city commission 4½ years having been appointed and then elected two years ago to a four-year term.

"I feel well-qualified and feel I can pull this commission together and have members act in unison."

Batterman then addressed himself to rumors floating about town that he is tied to special interest groups in the

Plymouth Townships asks ban on hunting east of Ridge Rd.

Both Plymouth Township residents and the board of trustees show a clean split when it comes to hunting regulations for the township.

A letter from Bruce Andrews of the Department of National Resources informed the board that even if the trustees were unanimous in a request to restrict all discharge of firearms in the township, they could not enact the ordinance.

Andrews' letter stated: "This statute (Act 159), being comprehensive, preempts the field of discharge of firearms and hunting regulations for all local units of government, except cities."

"In view of this expression of the legislature, I can only conclude that political townships are not authorized to enact ordinances prohibiting the dis-

charge of firearms or hunting with bows and arrows."

TOWNSHIP CLERK Helen Richardson told the trustees that she had talked at length with Andrews and he had told her they could not have a referendum on the hunting question.

"Even if the the board agrees that the township be closed to hunting, the DNR would not consider it," said Mrs. Richardson. "He said the Michigan United Conservation Clubs would also challenge the decision."

Township Supervisor J.D. McLaren said he favored open hunting except in the conservation areas.

Trustee Russell Ash said, "I would go further with open hunting west of Ridge—except that portion encompassing the trailer parks—and south of North Territorial."

Helen Richardson said she would be opposed to reopening areas which had been closed to hunters.

"I was brought up on a farm and we fought with hunters all our lives," said Richardson. "But for those who want to hunt, I can't see closing hunting west of Beck Rd."

FRANK MILLINGTON said although he, himself, did not hunt, he had no objections to hunters.

"I don't like to play the numbers game," stated Trustee Richard Gornick. "We're kidding ourselves if we think the township is a rural area. Ten persons are as important as 10,000." He said he wanted to close the township to hunting.

Trustee Gerald Burke said that although he was an avid hunter, he favored closure. "We can't allow anyone to go out with a loaded shotgun—with the possibility that a child could be injured."

Joe West, trustee and also chairman of the Hunting Area Control Committee for Plymouth Township favored allowing the area west of Beck Road to remain open to hunting.

WEST SAID he and the committee drove all over the area, considered it,

and talked to the sheriff before making their recommendation to the DNR.

"Do you have any opinion where the line should be drawn?" asked Millington.

"I think Beck Road," replied West. Ash recommended that the Hunting Area Control Committee be advised that the whole township, to Napier Road, be closed to hunting excluding Western Wayne County Conservation Club property. His recommendation was voted down, 4-3.

Richardson offered a compromise motion that the area east of Ridge be closed to hunting, also the area of the two trailer parks, which are west of Ridge. The motion carried, 5-2. The proposal will be presented to the hunting control committee.

This brought response from the audience of some 30 persons who attended the board meeting. "Mr. West, do we have to kill some kids?" asked Robert Blessed of Powell Road. He called it a "stupid decision" and said "the bullets were flying" while he and son were out spraying strawberries. "When the boy asked them to stop," he added, "He got a spray of buckshot."

Church 'adopts' Vietnam family

The Vietnamese family sponsored by Our Lady of Good Counsel Catholic Parish has arrived and the Christian Service group of the church is hoping for a donation of a dining room table and chairs which will seat a family of 10.

Lien Ngoc Vu and his wife have nine children, but the one-month-old baby won't be joining his parents and eight brothers and sisters at the table for a year or so.

The baby was born in the refugee camp in Pennsylvania where the Vus have lived since their evacuation from their homeland last spring.

A SPONSORING group must guarantee a job for the father and housing for the family.

Nu, a tailor by trade, is working for Dave Henry in the Old Village Upholstery Shop. The family is in temporary quarters in Vista Marie home in northwest Detroit until their house on Kellogg is ready.

A work crew from the parish cleaned the house last Saturday. This weekend they hope to paint the interior.

Rewiring is necessary before the donated stove and refrigerator can be plugged in.

Pat O'Loughlin of the Christian Service organization says they also have received beds, clothing and some appliances.

Clothing is a problem because it is difficult to match sizes to the individuals, according to American standards.

"Mr. Vu has a 14-inch neck size and

21-inch arm length," said Mrs. O'Loughlin. "The 13-year-old weighs just 50 pounds but has a 23-inch waistline."

FRED HILL of John Smith men's wear is going to have the children measured and try to come up with a set of sizes to facilitate outfitting the family with clothing. The oldest child is 15. The parents are in their late 30s.

The local parish decided to sponsor a Vietnamese family in answer to a special national plea by the bishops of the United States.

"The camp in Pennsylvania was almost like a concentration camp," said Mrs. O'Loughlin. "They were not allowed to go out of the camp and no one was allowed in to visit them."

Communication has been a problem because the family does not speak English. They have been able to have some exchange of information through another refugee sponsored by St. Thomas Catholic Church in Detroit. The interpreter is a photographer who has slides taken while they lived in the camp. Mrs. O'Loughlin says she hopes the photographer will give a slide presentation of a typical day in the refugee camp to a local audience.

'Subs' awarded full contracts

The Plymouth Board of Education voted 4-3 Monday night to approve contracts for 10 teachers previously employed as permanent subs.

At an earlier meeting, the board voted to authorize the personnel director to offer contracts to the permanent subs. Monday Personnel Director Norman Kee recommended offering contracts to each of the 10.

Voting against offering contracts were trustees George Lawton, Joe Gray and Gary Mirto. In favor were trustees Marda Benson, Marcia Borowski, E.J. McElendon and Tom Yack.

THE 10 WERE hired as permanent subs last spring when the administration knew climbing enrollment would require a larger faculty but was then unsure how many additional teachers were required.

The philosophy of hiring permanent subs then was to give the district flexibility which would allow it to hire the exact number of teachers needed, and place them where needed, once the official headcount was known.

By the time fall arrived, however, the district was faced with a budget crunch and some board members began to question the wisdom of offering permanent contracts when the district faces probable additional cutbacks in its budget. Cost of the 10 subs getting contracts is some \$102,000.

LAWTON repeated his earlier position on the issue that he would vote no "because I'm not going to support a motion to add staff until we have clarified what the governor's recommendations on cuts in the education budget will be."

Benson asked for Supt. John M. Hoben's recommendation. Hoben said he didn't know how much the local budget will have to be cut once the state reductions are known but he sup-

ported offering contracts to the permanent subs.

Borowski commented: "I really think it is an affront to these teachers to ask them to do their job with an inferior rate of pay and no fringe benefits. I think it's an affront to those children who don't know who will be their teacher tomorrow. I think we are obligated to treat teachers and students fairly and it's grossly unfair to ask someone to do a job under these present circumstances."

McELENDON said there are always questions and uncertainties about any budget, but the district had to provide the needed teachers to operate the educational program the community expects.

Borowski cautioned that failure to offer contracts could lead to future problems at the bargaining table with the Plymouth Education Association (PEA)—sole bargaining agent for Plymouth teachers.

"If we take an enlightened management stance tonight, I think we can keep and protect some of our management rights at the bargaining table."

Mirto commented: "We are facing proposed large cuts in our budget. Our first responsibility is to the persons who pay thousands of dollars into this district—the taxpayers."

"We are faced with uncertainties and a rocky road ahead on the budget. Yet certain board members have already established their budget priorities which is the furthest thing from enlightened management."

In other action, the board heard a report from the administration on a proposal from Wayne State University to do a cost analysis study on the expense of the educational program at the Centennial Educational Park.

Trustees decided to meet with the WSU representatives before making a decision on the study.

The first annual garage sale to benefit the Plymouth Community Fund will be Saturday, Nov. 15, in the cafeteria of Plymouth Salem High School.

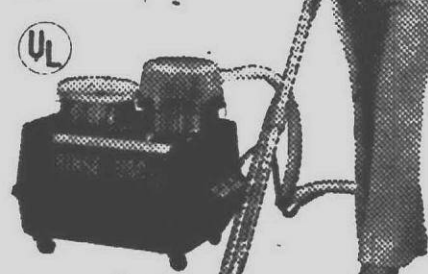

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

Christian school to be opened next fall by Calvary Baptist

Elementary pupils in the Plymouth-Canton community may receive some Christian Biblical training come next fall along with reading, writing and arithmetic.

That's the hopes of members of the Calvary Baptist Church, 43065 Joy, who are planning the construction and opening of the Plymouth Christian Academy in September, 1976.

THE SCHOOL, as envisioned by church officials, will integrate a literal interpretation of the Bible with academic excellence, a traditional mode of teaching and parental participation.

Architectural drawings of the school, submitted by architect Thomas Hansz, are already complete, according to the Rev. G. Douglas Routledge, pastor of Calvary Baptist Church.

Harry Guess, 29, current administrator of Shades Mountain Christian School in Birmingham Ala., and a faculty member of the Southeastern

Bible College's education department in Birmingham, has agreed to serve as the school's administrator.

Church officials, who have not yet received site plan approval from the Canton Township Board of Trustees, hope to begin the school's construction on church grounds next spring.

Routledge says the school will accomplish a three-fold goal of Christian interdenominational education—an in-school consistency with the teachings of a Christian home; the presentation of subject matter from a Christian perspective; and contact with Christian teachers.

"We're seeking to teach our children a select philosophy of life," Routledge explained. "But, when we take our children to a secular institution, that philosophy is often contradicted. We're going to work as an extension of the home. We feel education is the parent's responsibility."

The school's faculty, Routledge explained, will approach all subject matter from a Christian point of view.

"Our philosophy is Biblically-based,

and all subject matter will be constantly filtered through the word of God. We believe every subject ought to be taught from the perspective of God and his revelation—the Bible.

"Often the facts taught in a secular school are the same," Routledge said, "but the interpretation is different." Christian teachers have a tremendous influence on the child.

ALTHOUGH church officials have not yet determined the grade structure for the school's first year, they envision an eventual enrollment of 800 or 900 pupils in grades kindergarten through 12.

The school will begin as an elementary school with a maximum 25 pupils per classroom, explained Guess. Church officials will probably add one grade each year.

Routledge said school officials will screen each student for acceptance purposes. Enrollment, he added, is open "to anyone who is sympathetic to our goals."

"We're talking about academic excellence and the highest spiritual status as well." "We're concerned that the secular institutions cannot do this. We're not hostile malcontents, but we are spiritually discontent."

STUDENTS AT the Plymouth Christian Academy, according to Guess's expectations, should achieve higher levels of accomplishments than those at public schools.

The school's board of regents, headed by chairman Jan Mangan, will outline the school's grade structure for next fall after surveying the community's response to the school concept, Routledge explained.

About 300 parents attended a meet-

ing at the church last week to learn about the school proposal.

"The response indicates a really widespread interest in this area and beyond," Routledge says. "The encouraging thing goes beyond the meeting itself. We've had a tremendous amount of phone calls."

The tuition structure at the Plymouth Christian Academy is tentatively set at \$400 to \$500 for kindergarten and \$600 to \$800 for elementary grades.

The school will hold affiliations with the National Christian Schools Education Association, the Michigan Association of Christian Schools and the American Association of Christian Schools.

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Chief Ford offers winter tips

A series of pre-winter vehicle check suggestions that he believes will help save all motorists time, trouble, and most of all, money, is offered by Plymouth Police Chief Timothy Ford.

With today's high cost of owning and operating an automobile, Ford pointed out the increased importance of annual winter tune-ups in terms of increased fuel economy.

In the chief's opinion, nothing should be overlooked, from the radiator to the tailpipe with complete safety servicing by a mechanic at a reputable service station or garage.

ADDITIONAL items that should be safety serviced by a mechanic for dependable starts and sure going, no matter what winter blows our way, include: radiator antifreeze and windshield washer solutions, the electrical

system, including the battery, brakes and the exhaust system. All worn or defective parts in all systems should be replaced.

Ford offered other checks a motorist can make for himself, including safety and emergency equipment checks as recommended by the National Safety Council's Committee on Winter Driving Hazards and endorsed by the International Association of Chiefs of Police.

Safety equipment checks should include tires for good treads.

"Better yet," the chief said, "equip your car with snow tires for added traction advantages."

"Windshield wiper blades should wipe clear, meaning live rubber in the blades and adequate arm pressure. The heater-defroster should put out enough warm air to keep the wind-

shield and side and rear windows free of frost and ice," he added.

All lights should be checked for proper operation with cracked or broken lenses replaced and kept clear of caked snow or slush off the roadway.

"It is advisable to have emergency equipment stored in the trunk of the car and ready when the time comes. This should include booster cables, shovel, tow chain, flares, traction mat, sand or rock salt and reinforced tire chains.

"Check those chains before they are needed to be certain they are still sound. Replace any broken links."

DESPITE RUMORS to the contrary, Ford said tire chains can be used with radial tires without concern for sidewall damage.

Citing tests by the United States Auto Club, in which chains were driven at a sustained speed of 35 miles an hour on dry, bare pavement, the chief

said the USAC report concluded that even under this exceptionally rigorous test condition, there was no sidewall or tread gouging on any of the radials tested, even after 150 miles of this severe punishment.

"We know the safety and economic aspects of checks such as these for all our department and emergency vehicles," Ford emphasized.

"I hope all Plymouth drivers will use them too, as their best defense against winter's stalling tactics."

Hunter to observe golden anniversary

Louis Buehler, 86, will be leaving for the northern woods Friday for what will be his 50th consecutive deer hunting trip.

Buehler lived at Haggerty and Ford Roads in Canton Township for 54 years until moving to the City of Wayne in 1971. He is well-known in the Plymouth-Canton-Wayne area.

He has been a committed woodsman since 1926 when, following a tip from a sod customer, he and three friends began stalking deer along an old barge-tote road between Seney and Grand Marais in Michigan's Upper Peninsula.

The trip was then two days and two nights in a Model T truck and, from 1926-41, Buehler and a variety of friends spent two weeks tenting in this area each year.

For the next nine deer seasons, hunting trips were conducted to the relatively plush setting of a cabin just south of the Tahquamenon Falls. The

trip was then accomplished through a tractor-pulled trolley out of the Soo Junction, followed by a 16-mile boat trip up the Tahquamenon River.

While the cabin was a little more genteel than sleeping on pine boughs, the glassless windows had to be covered with plastic as protection against the wind.

Finally, Buehler and seven partners invested in a cabin 14 miles north of Newberry on Auger Lake in the UP and deer hunting treks were taken here until the cabin was sold in 1972.

In recent years, Buehler and Bill Conner, 82—a constant partner in hunting and fishing since 1936—have hunted the Beaver Lake area 16 miles west of Alpena. This is where he will be heading for tomorrow (Friday) to mark his golden anniversary of deer hunting. He has always hunted with a rifle and has avoided the more recent sport of bow and arrow hunting for deer.

business community. "My own financial interest is saving accounts in the bank and credit union. I know some business people socially but have no connection otherwise."

"I have always felt this community needs a viable downtown business section, but because I feel its good for the city at-large. I will do my darndest to pull this commission in a direction that will make it one of the strongest commissions ever."

AFTER THE nomination speeches were over, the commission began casting secret ballots and handing them to the board of tellers for counting.

On the first three ballots, the count was two for Bida, two for Moehle and two for Batterman. On a motion by Commissioner Scott Dodge, a 10-minute recess was called and the commissioners moved downstairs to caucus.

During the caucus, each candidate told why he sought the office and why he felt he was the best candidate. When the 10-minutes expired, the commission went upstairs for another ballot with the same result. Turner then moved for a 15-minute recess and they reconvened downstairs again.

This time there was some discussion about where the three candidates had stood on issues in the past, and how they had shown leadership—or a lack of leadership—on particular issues. It was a low-key discussion without any emotional outbursts.

The deadlock continued in the caucus until Bida asked to meet with Batterman in the hallway. When they returned, Batterman announced he would withdraw for the sake of unity and support Bida.

A commissioner asked if a deal was made that Batterman would become mayor pro-tem in return for switching his vote to Bida. Bida replied only that "I will vote for Norb for mayor pro-tem."

After the unanimous vote was cast for Bida as mayor, balloting began for pro-tem. On the very first ballot, it became apparent that Bida was voting for Batterman for pro-tem but that Bida's backer for mayor wasn't.

On the first ballot for pro-tem, Batterman received three votes, Turner two and Dodge two. On the second and third ballots Batterman and Turner received three votes and Dodge one. Then on the fourth Turner was selected mayor pro-tem.

In announcing his withdrawal, Batterman said: "In the interest of promoting harmony on this commission I am withdrawing my name from nomination and am supporting Joe Bida. I hope my friends will forgive me but I'm thinning of the total community."

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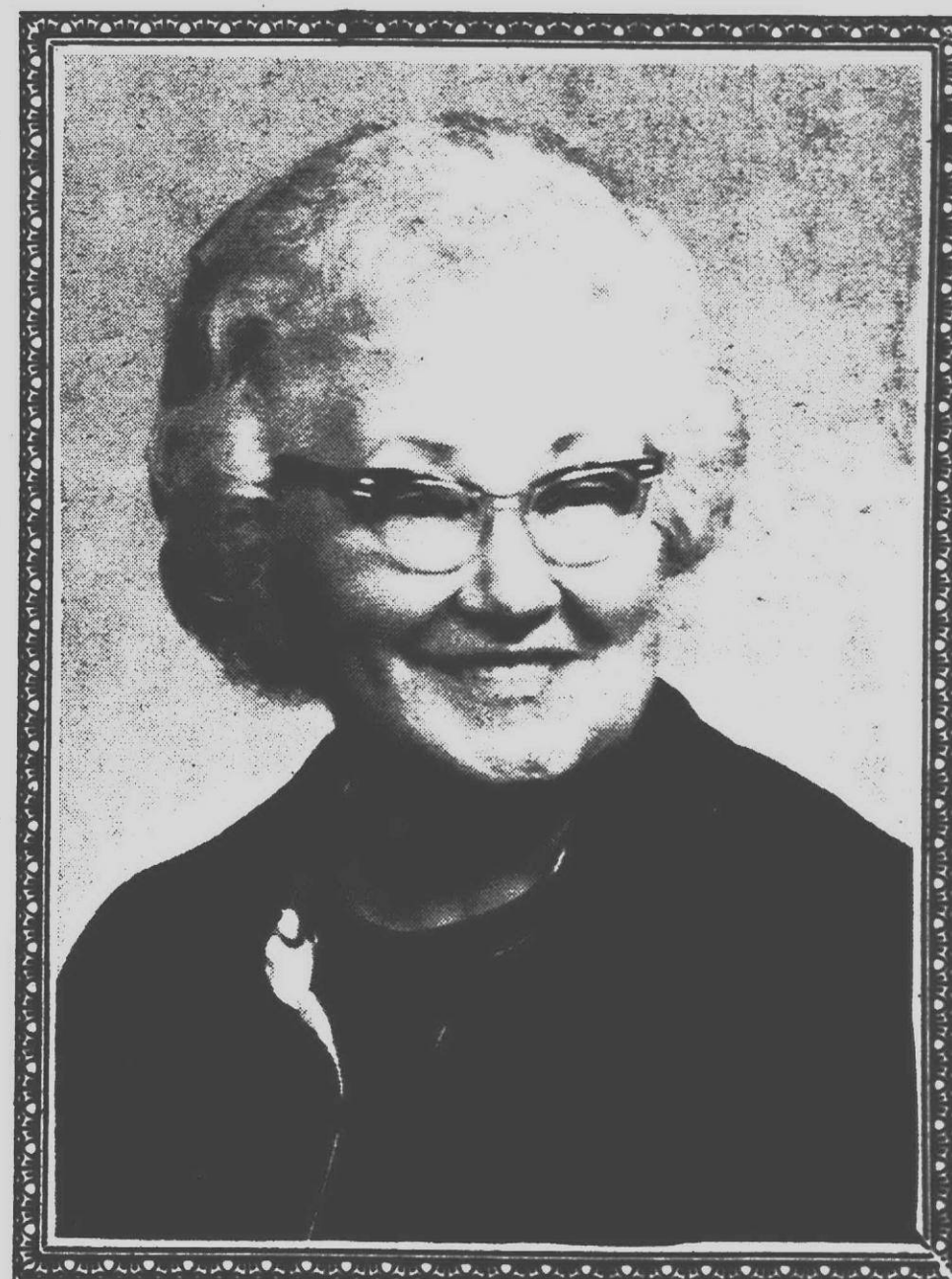

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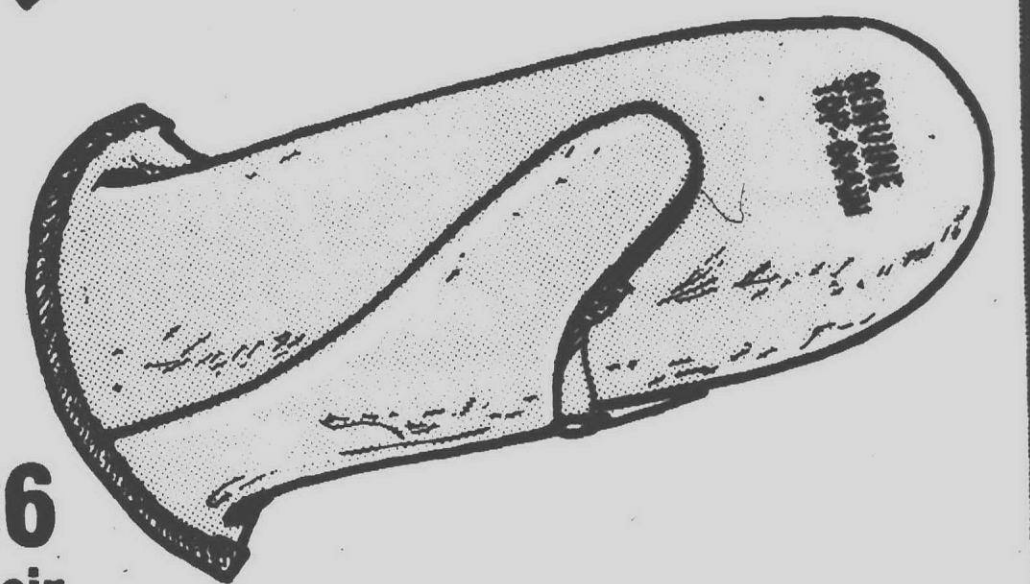

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George Starkweather: 1st white man born here

Among important landmarks still existing in Plymouth is a large, well-preserved house located at 711 Starkweather Ave. at the northwest corner of Liberty St.

Exactly a century ago this year, it was built by the man who was the first white child born in what is now the city—a man who became prominent in the community as a lawyer, farmer and businessman.

He was George Anson Starkweather, whose parents, William and Keziah, established the first home in the village in 1825. George was born here on Feb. 20 of the following year. He attended the University of Mich-

igan for a short time in 1844, leaving when his father died in that year. Later he went to New York City where he studied law.

STARKWEATHER returned to Plymouth to become the village lawyer and to farm part of the 80 acres

left by his parents in the northern part of the village.

In 1864, he was reported to be one of the heavier stockholders in the Detroit and Howell Railroad, which was incorporated in that year but which went into receivership before it got into operation.

In 1865, Starkweather married a girl 18 years younger than he, Amelia Heywood, adopted daughter of Mary Davis. During the same year, he purchased from Joshua Scattergood a general store facing the Village Green (Kellogg Park). Shortly thereafter, he joined with R.G. Hall to form the general store of Hall and Starkweather.

That partnership was dissolved in the fall of 1870. Starkweather continued in business by himself, as lawyer and storekeeper. He was located on the ground floor of the brick building on Main Street, facing the park, which also housed Amity Hall.

IN 1871, the year the railroads came to Plymouth, Starkweather decided that the depot area in North Village was the coming hub of activity in the community.

To capitalize on his hunch, he built the brick building still located at the corner of Starkweather and Liberty Streets, and moved his store from the Kellogg Park area to the new location. Expecting an early sale of building lots, which didn't materialize, he opened a road through his property in 1870. It led north from Main Street and he called it Oak Street. Sometime after his death, the village council renamed it Starkweather Avenue.

George and Amelia Starkweather had two children: Mary Keziah, born in 1866, and Blanche, born in 1868. For a few years, the family lived above the new store. In 1875, 100 years ago this year, George Starkweather built and moved into the house referred to earlier, locating it diagonally across from his store.

Davis B. Hillmer, grandson of George Starkweather (and son of Louis Hillmer and George's oldest daughter, Mary Keziah), told me in a recent interview that his oldest brother Karl, who died a few years ago, was born in that house on Christmas morning, 1889. Another brother, Max Hillmer, had a successful career in automotive manufacturing, rising from draftsman to president and general manager of General Motors' Saginaw Steering Division, before he died at the age of 62.

Davis, the third brother, who is now 79 and a resident of Plymouth, was a well-known commercial photographer in Detroit. Among his long-time clients, during a 50-year career from 1922 to 1972, was the J.L. Hudson department store. There were two daughters in the George Starkweather family, Gertrude and Rose, both married.

George Anson Starkweather died in Plymouth at the age of 81 on Feb. 17, 1907, during the same month in which he was born. A year before his grandfather's death, Karl Hillmer left his job at Daisy to attend the ailing octogenarian. Karl, who was proud of his heritage, and who wanted to perpetuate the Starkweather name, went to Probate Court in 1924 to have his last name changed from Hillmer to Starkweather.

George Starkweather was a prominent civic leader in both the township and the village. He was township supervisor for several terms in the mid-1800s and was village president in 1898.

He led the small contingent of Plymouthites which attended the meeting in Northville in 1898 in an unsuccessful attempt to dissuade the dissidents of that village from seceding from Plymouth Township. Besides the street that bears his name, Starkweather is also memorialized in the name of Starkweather School, where his picture hangs in one of the corridors.

THE BOOKS a man has in his library indicate more than the extent of his education; they are often a clue to the set of his mind.

Cognizant of that, I asked Karl Starkweather, in 1967, if he would provide me with a list of the books, other than law treatises, owned by his grandfather.

Among the list were four by Samuel

Smiles, the Scottish author, who was popular in the 19th century for his lay sermons on industry and honesty. Enlivened with numerous anecdotes from the lives of the virtuous and the successful, Smiles' books exalted the moral qualities of hard work and persistence, and minimized the effects of genius, talent and native intelligence.

Among the volumes by Smiles in George Starkweather's library were Self-Help, Character, Duty and Thrift. These, and a copy of William Matthews' 'Getting On In The World,' are clear indications of Starkweather's leaning toward the Protestant ethic popular in his time.

Books of a less materialistic nature,

About 50 coin phones a week are put in top working condition by Earl Milligan and his co-workers at the Western Electric plant on Sheldon Road.

Western Electric line producing coin phones

Reconditioned old coin phones are rolling off the assembly line at Western Electric in Plymouth at the rate of 50 phones a week.

The coin phones—old models which have been removed from service—are being reconditioned here to become part of Michigan Bell's "Design Line" of decorative phones.

Four styles of reconditioned coin phones and 12 other models of decorative phones are being sold to custom-

ers throughout the state. A display is in the office of Michigan Bell in Plymouth on Main Street next to the Plymouth Observer & Eccentric office.

The exterior housing of the phones—including the coin models—are sold directly to customers. The telephone company, however, retains ownership of the working components and is responsible for their maintenance,

explains Haze Wilson, Michigan Bell local manager.

The old coin phones are given "new life" at Western's Michigan Service Center on Sheldon Road. "At the center the old phones are disassembled, repainted and put in top working condition," says Wilson.

"WHEN THEY leave here, they work like any of our other phones but you don't have to deposit a dime to make a call with one of the Design Line coin phones."

The bell has been relocated in each coin phone "so that if you want to drop change in the coin slots you can still hear the authentic sounds of coins striking the bell. But this way you can get your money back because the interior of the phone has been converted into a bank."

Up until now, Wilson explains, old coin phones were stripped of all recyclable or salvageable parts and the rest was sold as scrap.

"But now we are offering unusual conversation pieces and preventing these old phones from becoming extinct like so many phones from the past."

The coin phones—from \$115 to \$130—are shipped directly from the Western Electric Center to the buyer and can be plugged into a jack if one is available. If not, the company will install a jack. Regular monthly charges and service connection fees also apply.

The housings carry a six-month warranty.

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Deer season could be 'best ever'

Southern Michigan deer hunters should have the best season of the decade when deer season comes along Nov. 15-30.

Dave Arnold, state Department of Natural Resources deer specialist, said southern Michigan has "more farms, giving deer a better opportunity to keep a full stomach."

"But there seems to be a lot of corn standing in southern Michigan cornfields, and deer can easily hide. If the corn is cut, and if hunters get tracking snow, southern Michigan sportsmen should have the best deer season ever."

Last year, 15,960 bucks were taken by hunters in southern Michigan; 5,500 deer were killed by motor vehicles.

Statewide last year, more than

92,000 deer were taken by 685,000 hunters who purchased licenses. That amounts to a success rate of 13.4 per cent.

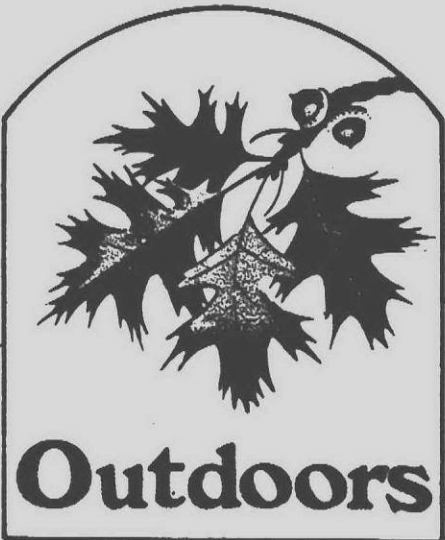

THE MICHIGAN United Conservation Clubs—the outfit suing CBS over that show—has published "The Wildlife Chef," a cookbook containing more than 250 recipes for game and fish dishes.

You can get a copy for \$2 postpaid by writing MUCC at PO Box 2235, Lansing, Mich. 48911. Proceeds will enable MUCC to "carry out programs for the advancement of conservation and outdoor recreation."

The book has recipes and tips on field dressing, caring for fish and game, freezing and otherwise preparing food from forest and stream. A special section is devoted to unusual recipes for breads and beans.

MORE BASS, northern pike and perch are being planted in southeastern Michigan lakes and rivers by the DNR.

One rearing pond at Drayton Plains Nature Center produced nearly 800 largemouth bass that averaged 7.2 inches of growth for only one summer. They were planted in Oakland County's Crescent Lake.

At Camp Dearborn, a northern pike rearing pond produced 900 of the toothy predators which averaged 12

inches in a single summer's growth. One pike grew to 19.2 inches—excellent for a fish that isn't even a year old.

Most of those fish were released into the Huron River just upstream from Kent Lake. In addition, several thousand perch about four inches long were planted there.

Kent Lake, as old-timers know, was once one of the prime northern pike waters in these parts. But fishing pressure, the pike's own sloppy spawning habits and the competition of bottom-stirring carp changed that.

Maybe this new planting will bring the otherwise prolific Kent Lake back as a gamefishing spot. It remains a productive panfishing water and one of the region's most popular ice fishing places.

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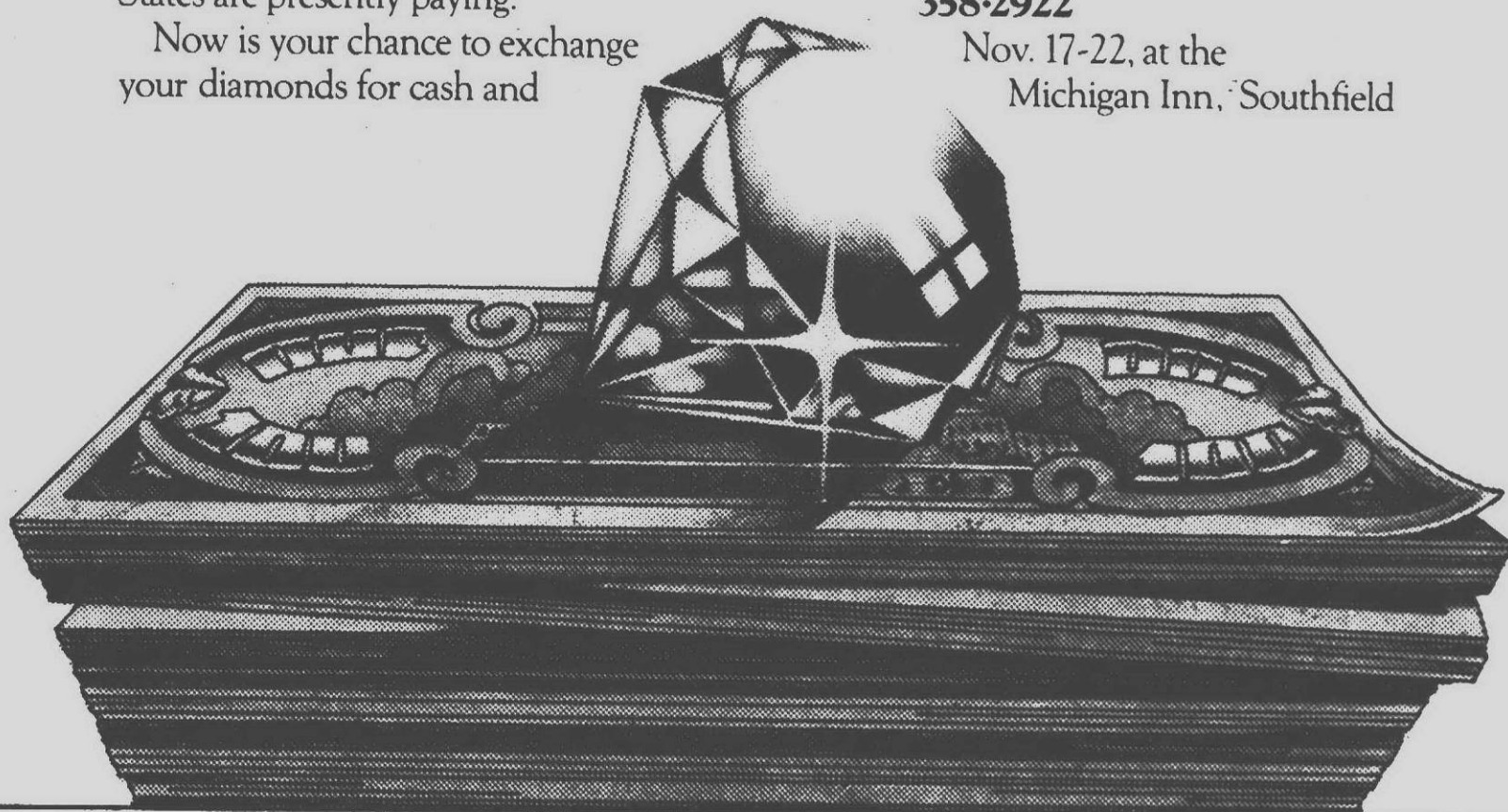

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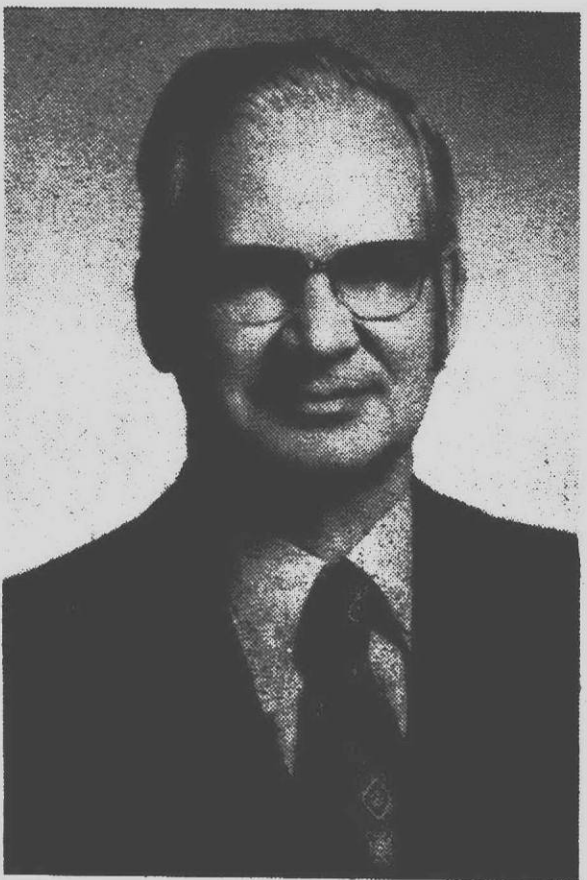

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'Poor man's treacle'—important cure ingredient

Garlic is an herb familiar to almost everyone. The membranous skin of its bulb usually encloses from five to 15 small edible bulbs called cloves. Its flavor makes good food taste better. Many modern cooks use garlic salt.

garlic powder or garlic oil. But a real gourmet still prefers fresh garlic, and it is readily available in all grocery stores.

Recent scientific studies have shown that the fumes from freshly

crushed garlic have the power to kill disease-producing germs. The active principal is known as crotonic aldehyde.

In another report, a Russian scientist claims the essential oil of garlic

contains substances which under laboratory conditions have killed bacteria, protozoa, and even yeast cells and insect eggs.

IT IS IMPORTANT to point out that what works in a test tube may not work in the human body. Nevertheless, garlic has been an important ingredient in home remedies and witch spells for many centuries.

Babylonians used it for medicinal purposes, and Greek and Roman physicians prescribed it for soldiers and slaves as well as for royalty. In ancient times, it was even used as offerings to the gods.

Garlic was mentioned in Hindu and Sanscrit writings more than 3,000 years ago, and we find it referred to in the Book of Numbers in the Old Testament.



My grandmother used to insist that garlic worn around the neck would kill cold germs, and modern science does not dispute that garlic fumes do indeed seem capable of this. (But, it may kill a few friendships as well.)

The folk remedies using garlic are countless, but my favorite is the one that follows. It really seems to stop a cough and let you sleep when all else fails.

GARLIC COUGH SILENCER

In an iron skillet, toast three garlic cloves until they are brown. Crush the toasted cloves in a cup and fill the cup with scalded milk and a spoonful of butter. Stir well, and drink it all while it's still hot.

County OK's budget, 99 hospital jobs gone

Five major law enforcement programs, which were threatened by a county budget crunch, will be maintained in the Wayne County budget next year.

County commissions Nov. 6 adopted a \$332,887,250 budget which continues the Consumer Protection Unit and the Organized Crime Task Force in the Prosecutor's office, plus the Sheriff's Township Patrol and Metropolitan Narcotics Squad.

The four were among the functions the County Board of Auditors had marked for elimination in its annual budget recommendations to the board of commissioners.

While the township patrol will be retained at its present 28-member strength, the other three programs are funded at about half their present levels in the new budget effective Dec. 1.

"WE DID the best we could at this time in view of the fiscal crisis," said Roscoe L. Bobo, chairman of the Board of Commissioners. "We can always make improvements later if the financial situation improves."

Drastic budget cuts were recommended in the midst of the worst county financial crisis in recent years—a crisis resulting from the general economic decline and expiration of millions in federal grants last July 1.

But as county commissioners began their budget deliberations in an atmosphere of gloom, Presiding Circuit Court Judge James N. Canham informed them that a newfound \$3.2 million would be received during the next fiscal year through through the court's Friend of the Court Division. This is federal money to be received through a new program requiring employed fathers of ADC children to support them, thus paring the welfare rolls.

Funds from the same source also reduced the county's anticipated budget deficit for this fiscal year from \$3.1 million to \$2.2 million. Money to eradicate the deficit is included in the new budget.

Also funded for next year was a special probation program for drug abusers in Detroit Re order's Court.

HOWEVER, commissioners did concur with the auditors' recommendations that the Sheriff's helicopter patrol be discontinued and that 86 of the 206 beds at Wayne County Psychiatric Hospital be phased out by March 1.

With the exception of the township patrols, other law enforcement programs were established in recent years with federal grants. The grants expired July 1 and the board of commissioners voted funds to carry the programs through the Nov. 30-end of this fiscal year.

The county auditors had recommended that the helicopter unit, consisting of six deputies and two leased helicopters, be scrapped unless the communities it serves are willing to underwrite its \$201,525 annual cost. The helicopter unit began operating in early 1974 and covers a four-city test area—Wayne, Inkster, Garden City and Westland and along Edward Hines Drive.

The only new program put into the budget is a \$50,000 allocation to be used for development of a senior citizens transportation pilot program.

A specially equipped and staffed bus will take senior citizens on personal trips. The \$50,000 is expected to be used as the local match for federal and state grants.

THE BOARD of auditors recommended that the 86-bed Building "L" at the psychiatric hospital be closed after it was learned that state mental health funds would not be made available to help meet its \$2.5 million annual operating cost. The county receives 90 percent reimbursement for the remaining 120 beds, which are located in another building.

Additional patients requiring treatment will be referred to the Detroit Psychiatric Institute or Northville State Hospital.

The Board of Commissioners ear-

marked \$250,000 for a 90-day phase out of Building "L". Ninety-nine hospital employees will be affected. They are expected to be transferred to other county jobs as vacancies occur. Bobo said.

The board of commissioners earmarked \$250,000 to be used for development of a county youth services program after federal funding of the Wayne County Juvenile Facilities Network (JFN) expires next Aug. 31.

As of that date, three JFN neighborhood youth centers—located in Inkster, Highland Park and the Detroit City Airport area—are due to be closed unless taken over by the three communities.

THE BUDGET adopted by the commissioners is \$1,194,600 more than the \$331,692,650 in appropriations recommended by the Board of Auditors.

The budget represents an increase of \$28,210,540 over this year's projected total spending. The bulk of the increase—\$24.4 million—reflects the increased cost of welfare due to unemployment in the county and will be reimbursed by the state.

Less than one-third—or \$101,382,940—of the budget will be derived from county property tax receipts. The balance—\$231,504,310—will come mainly from the federal and state governments, plus fees and revenues from county services.

THE BUDGET was adopted by a 22-2 vote after Commissioner Samuel A. Turner, chairman of the board's ways and means committee, urged immediate adoption to avoid the danger of a delay in mailing County tax bills. He asked that any commissioners wanting to amend the budget make their proposals within a qwwk.

Commissioners George F. Killeen (D-Detroit) and Ervin A. Steiner (R-Grosse Pointe Farms) voted against the budget. Steiner said he believed the county would run into financial trouble next year because no funds were provided for contingencies.

Consumer advocacy bill splits reps on party lines

Area congressmen split along party lines as the U.S. House of Representatives gave 208-199 approval to a bill to establish a new federal consumer protection agency. The bill earlier passed the senate by a wider margin, 61-28.

Supporting it were 188 Democrats and 20 Republicans. Local backers were Reps. James O'Hara (D-Utica), whose 12th District includes the Rochester area; William D. Ford (D-Taylor), whose 15th District includes Garden City, Westland and Canton; William Brodhead (D-Detroit), whose 17th District includes Redford, Southfield and Farmington; and James Blanchard (D-Pleasant Ridge), whose 18th District includes Troy.

Opposed were 80 Democrats and 119 Republicans. Among them were Reps. William Broomfield (R-Birmingham), whose 19th District includes the Bloomfield area; and Marvin Esch (R-Ann Arbor), whose 2nd District includes Livonia and Plymouth.

BROOMFIELD called the consumer protection agency unnecessary. Despite its impressive title, this legislation would do little or nothing

to aid consumers. Its underlying assumption—that a massive new federal bureaucracy will handle consumer problems better than existing agencies—is simply off base," he said.

Rather, the agency will "slow down the wheels of government, discouraging many businesses from offering new goods and services to the public," Broomfield said.

"There are already 39 federal agencies (with) consumer complaint contacts. Undeniably, these regulatory agencies could and should be more responsive to the public.

"But this can best be accomplished by attacking the problem directly, agency by agency, not by adding to our already burgeoning federal bureaucracy at a cost of some \$10 billion to \$20 billion a year."

BRODHEAD INSISTED that "it's not a new regulatory agency. It has no regulatory powers whatsoever."

Rather, Brodhead said, it's a kind of ombudsman to represent consumers before other government

agencies. "Often in proceedings before the Federal Trade Commission, the Federal Power Commission or the Interstate Commerce Commission, we have only businessmen on both sides of the argument. This will give consumers a voice," he said.

Brodhead said the new agency would be more effective by bringing other consumer offices under its wing—the president's consumer advisor, the consumer inquiries office of the Food and Drug Administration; the consumer liaison division of the Federal Aviation Administration; and other such offices in the agriculture, commerce, HUD and transportation offices.

Consumer lawyer Ralph Nader was in the house gallery when the bill passed, and he praised the house for "overcoming the obstruction and lobbying of big business."

Washington sources expect President Ford may veto the bill. The House vote shows there is less than the two-thirds majority necessary to override a veto.

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Suburbs voted for 'lib'—or was it just quality?

The newspapers call it the women's movement. The critics seek to diminish it by the excessively cute "women's lib." The advocates call it a drive for simple equality.

Regardless of the name, the congeries of ideas and action represented by the movement of women into the mainstream of social equality and political participation certainly constitute one of the most profoundly revolutionary developments of our times.

And it's a real development, not idle chatter. For the biggest news story coming out of last week's local elections was not who won and who lost, but rather the remarkably successful performance of suburban women running for election into the formerly male preserve of local government.

OUT OF 12 women who ran for election in these suburbs, only two lost. And there are now three communities in this area who have more than the single token woman on the city council.

In Plymouth, history was made when Mary Childs moved up from a seat on the planning commission to join Beverly McAninch as members of the city commission. Mrs. McAninch also ran as the incumbent mayor.

Orchard Lake also boasts two women on the city council, as Frances Y. Gadd was re-elected and was the top vote getter. A strong prospect to become the community's next mayor, Mrs. Gadd will have as a colleague on council Katherine M. Baker.

Westland also will have two women on city council, as the virtually unbeatable Justine Barns led the vote-getters, only to be followed as number two by Gail McKnight. Mrs. Barns does not feel two women sitting on council will in itself make anything different. "I look on the council as seven members, not five men and two women. I will not vote as part of any team. If I agree with the rest of the council, then fine. But if I disagree, it will

be on the basis of issues and not what the rest of the council is doing," says Mrs. Barns.

ONE OF THE few women defeated in her election bid was Mary Markowicz, who was the loser in Garden City's race for mayor by only 91 votes. Geraldine Kiessel, previously a member of the commission which wrote the city's new charter, was elected to city council, finishing as the number two vote getter.

In Rochester, Frances A. Weaver won a four-year seat on the city council by one vote. She was the only successful council candidate who opposed a local amendment to allow alcohol to be served at the community house, and she has been a spectator at most council meetings for the past several years.

In a real upset, Lillian Jaffee pushed her way to membership on the Southfield city council. How did she lead all candidates? "I worked hard. I door-knocked. I went to coffees. I studied and I learned the issues. I hope to be able to work with all the people in Southfield as I promised. This was definitely a people's election."

In Farmington Hills, Joanne Smith found her past political disappointment rectified. Two years

ago she ran for the city council, but lost; then when Margaret Shaeffer resigned her council seat to become district judge, the expectation of appointment was not fulfilled. This year, however, Mrs. Smith led the ticket.

THE WOMEN who won election this year did not campaign as "women's libbers." They ran as people, campaigning hard, learning the issues, organizing their campaign workers, turning out the votes. So do men.

They differ politically, ranging from left to right to center on the political spectrum. So do men.

They ran because they were concerned about their community and wanted to do something about it. So do men.

In short, these successful women entered the political process on their own merits and won on their own efforts. They are living evidence that the women's movement has become much more than cocktail party talk, and in their victories they constitute the cutting edge of a long-awaited and much-needed movement toward equality in our country.

Congratulations.

'Pick Your Own' fruit—a sign of bad times

The notion that we had come full circle agriculturally first dawned on me one June Saturday as a farmer—a relative of a relative by marriage—and I drove the back roads of Berrien and Cass counties to a bluegill lake.

"He used to grow 50 acres of strawberries, but he don't no more ... he used to be a big producer, but he don't no more," said the farmer, gesturing with his thumb at his old friends' places.

Come to think of it, my own companion wasn't working his farm except for the vegetable garden. He'd inherited the farm, so it was paid for; his fishing rod, shotgun and deer rifle were paid for; he'd found a chew was cheaper than a cigarette. How come these farmers had quit?

"Can't afford to farm," he answered. "Costs too high. Damn government. Minimum wage for the fruit pickers, all the housing and benefits you gotta give 'em, you can't sell your fruit for enough to make any money. So we're waitin' for the subdividers." Many seemed able to afford the wait.

THE FRUIT PICKERS who were now unemployed hadn't been with Michigan agriculture forever. Time was when most city workers had a relative—parents, brothers, uncles—back on the farm.

Summer vacation was a trip to the farm. Kids rode farm horses instead of going to the riding stable; kids splashed in the deep holes that formed in the bends of rivers instead of going to a civic pool or park beach; and kids picked fruit.

Times changed. Families dispersed. Child labor laws came on the scene, so the farmer couldn't even hire kids to do what his nieces and nephews used to do. Migrant labor came from Texas and Alabama. Then came more laws.

The laws contributed greatly, not to the migrants' welfare but to pricing their labor right out of the market. Another way of looking at it is to say the laws lowered the price of automation. Cukes and green beans are mechanically picked today. The farmers who were into strawberries, however, just went bluegill fishing.

Other farmers came up with a gimmick. They put up signs saying "Pick Your Own." When newspaper and television reporters came by, they said picking your own vegetables and fruit meant you could cut your grocery bills by half, get absolutely fresh produce and have family fun in the fresh air.

We had come full circle—almost.

MEANWHILE, BACK in the cities, the unemployment and welfare rolls are multiplying. The fruit pickers had been lured to Michigan by jobs and wages and were being kept here by good welfare payments.

Had we actually hurt the fruit pickers more than we had helped them with minimum wage laws, housing laws, compensation benefits? How could that possibly be? It says right here in my old economics text that the chief purpose of minimum wage legislation is "the abolition of poverty."

It just can't be that that liberal senator from Dearborn who masqueraded as a pickle picker

was wrong! It can't be that the sociologists and humanitarians concerned with the silent, disadvantaged minority were wrong! There must be a fascist or chamber of commerce plot somewhere!!

Meanwhile, the signs are popping up: "Pick Your Own." And the suburban station wagons pull up.

Was all this in vain?

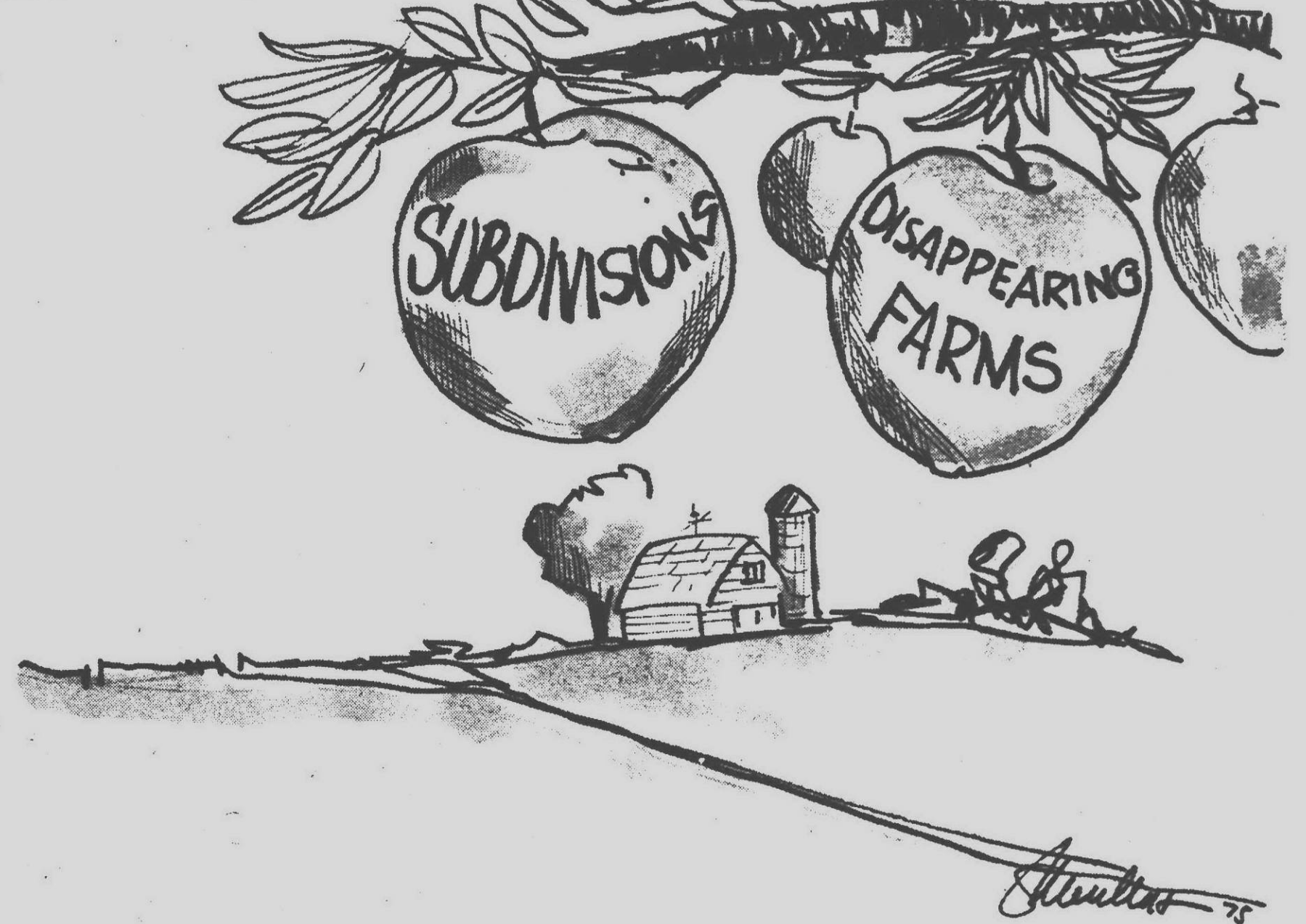
Have we, in 200 years, allowed this land to regress into something as bad as that which these men endured hardship to correct?

State looks to accounting to cover its big deficit

The Michigan Citizens Lobby must feel like the salesman who tried to peddle a man an air conditioner the day before the wind blew down his house.

MCL is the group which in 1974 brought us elimination of the sales tax on food and drugs, an elimination that the fellows in Lansing replaced with an income tax increase. But that's OK because the income tax is fairer than the sales tax.

A few weeks ago, MCL was back, this time with a campaign to pare income taxes for the poor and middle class folks and make it up by socking it to those rich guys who make \$20,000 or more.

NO SOONER had MCL uncorked its new one than the Milliken administration revealed the state was headed for a \$298 million deficit—nearly 10 per cent—unless expenses are cut and some bookkeeping sleight-of-hand employed.

State finances are enormously complex, but at the risk of oversimplifying, the problems can be boiled down to two: (1) Income tax revenue fluctuates enormously during a recession, especially the tax on corporate income; (2) welfare soars as workers exhaust their unemployment benefits.

MCL was right about one thing: Consumption taxes are terribly unfair in economic theory. But they do have the dandy quality of producing stable revenues. Corporations can slash bonuses and dividends, but families still have to buy hamburger and aspirin.

WHAT'S THE WAY out of the state budget dilemma?

Raise taxes? Only the teachers' lobby favors that.

Go back to more sales taxes? They're regressive; MCL no like.

Cut state spending? Tell that to the college students, the Welfare Rights organizers, the teachers, the folks who voted the veterans bonuses, the highway users, the environmental buffs. Virtually all of us benefit from state spending.

Run a deficit? That's a constitutional no-no.

is no longer received by them to be used as they individually see fit. It is taken from them by their government. Some of it is turned back in certain services which they may not want or need, often at high costs, and much is wasted or given to others here and abroad.

The bicentennial year should be a year of reflection.

Have our people given up their freedom and liberty to bureaucracy?

Our Constitution leaves in the hands of the people the decision as to the course of our ship of state. If their voices aren't heard, the country is rudderless.

Besides, if you let a politician run a deficit in a recession year, he'll run one in a good year, too. Ask your congressman. Ask Nelson Rockefeller, John V. Lindsay, Hugh Carey and Abe Beame.

What's going to happen is that the legislature will beat up on Gov. Milliken and his budget director, Dr. Gerald Miller, for not predicting the deficit sooner. There will be a great thrash about more sophisticated economic indicators, faster fiscal prophecies and the like.

The future of our state services and our pocketbooks depends on snazzier accounting. That's fine—IF they can do it.

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'Big money' influence to be reduced

Editor:

The Oct. 16 and 23 editorials on Michigan's new political reform law contained a few misconceptions which should be corrected.

First, rather than favoring incumbents, the law will give all candidates a fair chance at election by reducing the influence of "big money" in campaigns. The limits on individual contributions are reasonable: \$1,700 for candidates for governor, \$450 for candidates for state senator and \$250 for candidates for state representative.

Contrary to the Observation Point view, few citizens before or after the passage of the new law could afford the luxury of "blowing a grand or two on a new, fresh face." What the law will do is reduce the amount of influence a few individuals can have on candidates.

In the same way, the campaign expenditure limits will help ensure a fair chance for all candidates. Observation Point suggests these limits are

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too high, but studies have shown that if the limits are set too low, incumbents would have a distinct advantage.

The financial declaration provisions of the new law are also widely misunderstood. The law does not require public officials to bare their financial souls—instead, only financial interests of over \$1,000 must be reported, with no dollar figures required.

As for reporting of family finances, the law requires a statement of financial interest only from family members living with or dependent upon the public official. Eliminating this provision would open up a major loophole in the law.

The idea that the new law will create a vast bureaucracy and endless paperwork also does not hold up. The law simplifies reporting procedures by requiring candidates to have only one official committee which files two pre-election campaign statements and one post-election report. Only one off-year campaign statement is required. Financial declaration statements will be filed annually.

Of course, paperwork is required, but this has always been true in elections, and it is for a good purpose—giving citizens valuable information with which to evaluate candidates.

As a public official myself, I sincerely do not feel that our new political reform law will result in mass resignations. I personally feel the reporting requirements are not burdensome and will give me an opportunity to show I deserve public trust.

It is easy—and in a certain sense

fashionable—to be cynical about political reform. The new law is not perfect and will require changes, but it represents a significant achievement and real progress.

The public interest citizens group, Common Cause, which is certainly not an "incumbents lobby," has called it "the toughest reform legislation ever passed in the United States." I call on Observer and Eccentric readers to check the facts on the new law, and then help to make it work for a better government in Michigan.

Whose influence is reduced?

Editor:

This letter is in reply to Philip Power's column of Oct. 23 concerning the political reform law backed by Common Cause. It reflects my personal views and not those of Common Cause.

Previously, there were no effective limits on campaign spending for state office, so the new limits could not have an adverse effect on the infusion of "fresh, independent, non-incumbent candidates" into the political process.

His principal objection seems to be the limits on individual contributions. Surely, finding 588 individuals willing to contribute \$1,700 to a gubernatorial candidate will not be difficult. It would be even less difficult to find a thousand people willing to give \$1,000 or 10,000 willing to give \$100 each.

A candidate for state senator, instead of raising \$450 from each of 66 individuals, could raise \$100 each from 300 persons. Someone running for state representative could raise \$75 each from 200 contributors.

If he objects to an officeholder trading "his office for campaign contributions from favor seekers," he should welcome a reduction in the importance of money in political campaigns. The low contribution limits work to produce candidates with relatively broad support.

He asks, "Where are you going to find 60 people to pony up the \$250 limit for a state representative race unless the candidate is already an incumbent?" But where did you find such people in the past? Obviously, you did not. Political history reveals a slow turnover in the State Legislature. This would suggest incumbency was a strong advantage. It certainly does not suggest there were many citizens who felt "concerned about politics" and were "willing to blow a grand or two on a new, fresh face."

The general tenor of his column leads me to believe his real objection is not explicitly stated. He seems to be concerned that the influence of community leaders will be reduced.

The low contribution limits and the provision requiring disclosure of contributions will reduce the willingness of a small businessman to support a candidate. That is the crux of the matter, is it not?

This summer 1975 Common Cause Report from Michigan lists several proposed changes which the organization supports. One change will limit the transferability of funds between an organization and its sub-units. This will reduce party dominance.

To meet some of the objections of the ACLU, it is proposed that the con-

tribution reporting floor should be raised to protect the anonymity of small contributors. Other changes are: shortening the list of public officials required to file financial disclosure statements and eliminating the constraints preventing non-profit corporations from contributing to ballot propositions.

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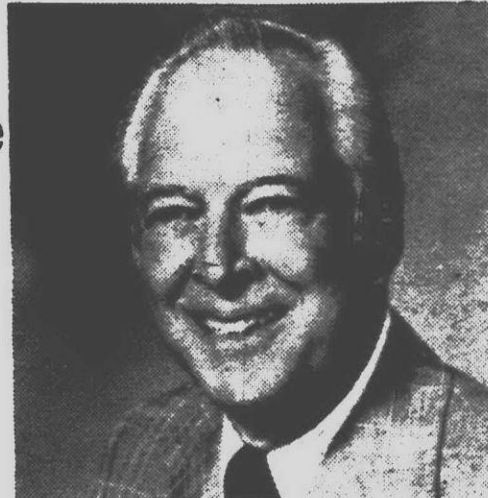
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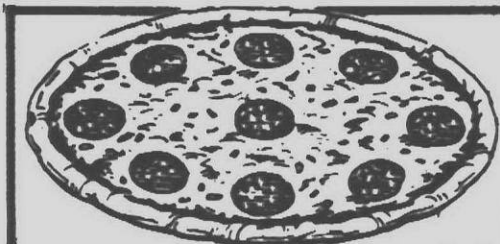


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Generic drug bill backed by 9 reps

A bill that would allow pharmacists to substitute a generic drug without the prescription purchaser's specific request has been passed by the State House of Representatives, 75-24, and sent to the Senate.

Local representatives backed it 9-1 with two not voting.

Rep. Joseph Forbes (D-Oak Park), who supported it, called it a follow-up measure to a law passed last year which allowed consumers to ask a druggist to substitute a generic drug for a particular brand of drug except when the doctor specified the prescription be dispensed only as written.

Rep. Roy Smith (R-Ypsilanti),

whose district includes most of Plymouth, voted against the bill because "it permits the druggist to make the exchange without notifying anyone."

Supporting the bill besides Forbes were Reps. John Bennett (D-Redford), Thomas Brown (D-Westland), Robert Geake (R-Northville), John Markes (D-Westland), W.V. Brotherton (R-Farmington), Mel Larsen (R-Oxford), Ruth McNamee (R-Birmingham) and Sal Rocca (D-Sterling Heights).

Not voting were Reps. William Keith (D-Garden City) and James Defebaugh (R-Birmingham).

Area senators back permits for dogs on black bear hunts

Area state senators voted 3-1 in favor as the state Senate gave 26-7 passage to a bill requiring hunters to get permits before using dogs to hunt black bear. It goes to the governor for his signature.

Voting yes were Sens. Donald Bishop (R-Rochester), William Faust (D-Westland), and Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth).

Opposed was Sen. Daniel Cooper (D-Oak Park). Not voting was Sen. Bill Huffman (D-Madison Heights), whose district includes part of Troy.

"THE ISSUE was that some hunters were turning dogs loose by the dozens to track down bear," said Bishop, whose district includes Birmingham, West Bloomfield and part of Troy.

"When I was assured that the bill would return bear tracking to the sport it was meant to be, it was all right. I don't think we should proscribe this (tracking with dogs) entirely."

The bill requires bear hunters who want to use dogs to get a \$2 permit from the Department of Natural Resources.

The dogs must be immunized, and a pack is limited to six dogs. No more than two packs may be used on the trail of the same bear. The bill was aimed at preventing hunters from collecting large packs of stray dogs and then abandoning them in the wilds after the hunt.

COOPER, whose district includes Southfield and Farmington, voted against the bill because he says bear hunting "is a whole phenomenon that I think is an open question. If there is a species of animal which has to be cut down, we can proceed" to hunt.

"But nobody gave any justification that there are too many bears in this state. Nobody had any facts on the number of bears there are, except that someone had a guess of 15,000. It's not a sport to have a bear run up a tree and be shot at."

"I resent the unfettered position that anyone can hunt anything that isn't human," Cooper said.

The DNR strongly opposed an amendment that would have banned use of dogs entirely in bear hunting. The DNR reported that last year 508 bears were killed in the upper peninsula and 79 in the lower, with an estimated 30 to 40 per cent by the use of dogs. The DNR's position is that hunting with dogs is "good sport and doesn't cut into the bear population."

Madonna deaf program lecture, benefit planned

"Interpreting for Deaf and Blind Persons" will be discussed at an open lecture, Tuesday, Nov. 18 at 6:30 p.m. in the Science Lecture Hall at Madonna College, Livonia.

Jointly sponsored by Madonna College and the National Interpreter Training Consortium, guest speaker will be Art Roehrig of Gallaudet College, Washington, D.C. The lecture will include a practical session with Roehrig and Ken Rust, instructor of Introduction to Interpreting at Madonna.

The free lecture is open to both the hearing and deaf.

A benefit brunch will be served at Madonna College Sunday, Nov. 23, between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m., to raise funds for deaf students enrolled in the college Interpreting for the Deaf Program.

Explaining the need for scholarship funds, Sr. Mary Francilene, Madonna Dean said, "Other sources of tuition aid are not available to some of our adult deaf students, and in some cases we have more than one person in a family enrolled."

The Madonna program in Interpreting for the Deaf began this year and has both deaf and hearing students working toward certificates of

achievement, associate, or bachelor's degrees.

The brunch, which is open to the public, will be served in the Residence Hall dining room on Madonna Court, off Levan north of Schoolcraft. Fruit, scrambled eggs, sausages, baked chicken, hamburgers, hot rolls and donuts, and a choice of beverages will be served for a donation of \$3 for adults and \$1.75 for children under 10 years of age. Reservations are not necessary.

Red Cross to be sole blood supply

The Red Cross southeastern Michigan regional blood center will become the only supplier of blood and blood products in the five county area beginning Dec. 1.

The region's secondary supplier, Michigan Community Blood Center, will cease operations in metropolitan Detroit.

Combining the technical and donor recruitment skills of the Red Cross with the outstanding support of volunteer blood donors, Red Cross is confident that all patient blood needs will be met, said Dr. A. William Shafer, director of the blood center.

"Realizing Red Cross is only a vehicle by which blood is collected, processed and distributed, the burden of providing blood and blood products rests upon the community," Dr. Shafer said.

Individuals between the ages of 17 through 65 may call the Red Cross office nearest them for an appointment to donate.

The Livonia donor center is located at 32316 Five Mile. It is open Monday, Wednesday and Thursday from 2-8 p.m., on Tuesday and Friday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., and on Saturday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Booklet exposes mail fraud

Mail order swindlers are using current economic conditions to swindle people through a variety of bogus schemes for work-at-home opportunities, correspondence schools and even chain letters, the U. S. Postal Service charges.

To help consumers avoid being cheated, the postal service has published a booklet called "Mail Fraud Laws."

A free copy may be obtained by writing Consumer Information, Dept. 54, Pueblo, Colo., 81009.

The booklet says the promise of an "exciting, high-paying job" is the usual lure of the fake correspondence school.

An endless chain-referral plan is a means of selling products for the home at generally exorbitant prices on the grounds that the item will cost the homeowner nothing because, by referring other people to the seller, he can earn enough referral commissions to pay the full cost of his purchase.

The booklet advises consumers who believe mail fraud exists to keep all letters, envelopes and other evidence related to the questionable scheme.



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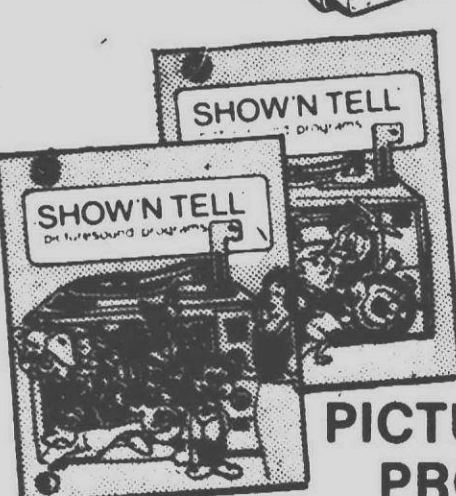

The debate goes on as Schoolcraft women's center makes a new attempt to clarify some issues

"The effects of the passage of the Equal Rights Amendment will be severe, disastrous and harmful to women," claimed Mrs. Elaine Donnelly in a recent debate on ERA at Schoolcraft College sponsored by the women's resource center.

"ERA will protect men and women equally," returned Audrey Perry. "It will require federal, state and local governments to treat each person as an individual."

Mrs. Donnelly is Michigan chairman of the Anti-ERA Committee. Mrs. Perry is chairman of the Monroe County Republican Party and active in feminist causes.

Sitting in for Mrs. Perry after she had to leave was Vicki Toensing, research attorney for the Michigan Court of Appeals, who participated in the question and answer session.

THAT THESE SPEAKERS held for two hours the full attention of 106 women indicated that the ERA pot still is boiling, despite the Michigan legislature's approving vote given in 1972.

Anti-ERA forces, such as those led by Mrs. Donnelly, are saying the approval should be rescinded. Never, say the pro-ERA women.

"ERA has nothing to do with equal pay for equal work," maintained Mrs. Donnelly. "There are already laws on this, as well as laws about equality in credit, education and opportunity. A new law won't give women anything they don't already have."

Ms. Toensing retorted that "they forgot two groups" when the Constitution was written a couple of hundred years ago.

"Later they put in the blacks," she added. "Now it's time to put in women. I cannot see how ERA will take away benefits from women when it will extend benefits to all people."

WHILE MRS. DONNELLY is happy to have equality in credit and pay, she was concerned that legislation that has traditionally protected women would go by the board if ERA becomes the law of the land.

"ERA will outlaw laws that say a husband must support his wife and family," she declared. "If women do not have this right, how can they make long-term commitment to preserving the stability of the family?"

Ms. Toensing indicated her belief that such protection is not always certain today.

"A man can go to California and a woman would have to go there, too, in order to collect support money," she said.

Mrs. Perry observed that children today are usually placed with their mothers after a divorce.

"Alimony or support is given by a judge based on economic needs," she maintained. "The support is based on the needs of the children. The amendment would ban a state from imposing a greater liability on one spouse than on the other. Support obligations would be defined in regard to each spouse."

ANOTHER KIND of protection was also introduced at this point, on-the-job protection for women.

Mrs. Perry felt that laws to protect a woman at work by defining the kinds of jobs they could do and the weight they could carry were often used to produce reverse discrimination. Men used these laws as an excuse not to hire women.

"These protective laws were put in codes by women after a lot of hard work," said Mrs. Donnelly. "Employers were making women carry too heavy a load. But under ERA this protection will no longer be available. If a woman doesn't do what she is told to, she will be fired. Women are physically different from men and need these kinds of protection."

Two popular issues raised by anti-ERA militants were thrashed about by the debaters. They concerned the draft and the question of co-educational toilets.

"Yes, if Congress declared a crisis and said people were eligible for the draft, women could be drafted," said Mrs. Perry. "But who can say they love a daughter more than other parents love their son?"

Mrs. Donnelly, who decried the emotionalism raised on the draft issue, said that if ERA is passed, "Congress would not have the choice to exempt women from the draft even if 80 per cent of the women in the country stormed into their building."

Mrs. Donnelly, in an interview, added that she was for equality of sacrifice during a crisis but not the same sacrifice.

"In World War II, women sacrificed for the war but it was not the same as the men's sacrifice," she said. "Until the majority of people in the country feel that it is appropriate to demand equality of sacrifice, we shouldn't have it."

She reiterated: "Men and women are different."

BUT THEIR PRIVACY is guaranteed by the Constitution, pointed out Mrs. Perry.

"ERA guarantees equality not sameness," she stated. The states have power to require the separation of the sexes in sleeping quarters and toilet facilities. Every public place has to provide a place for both sexes."

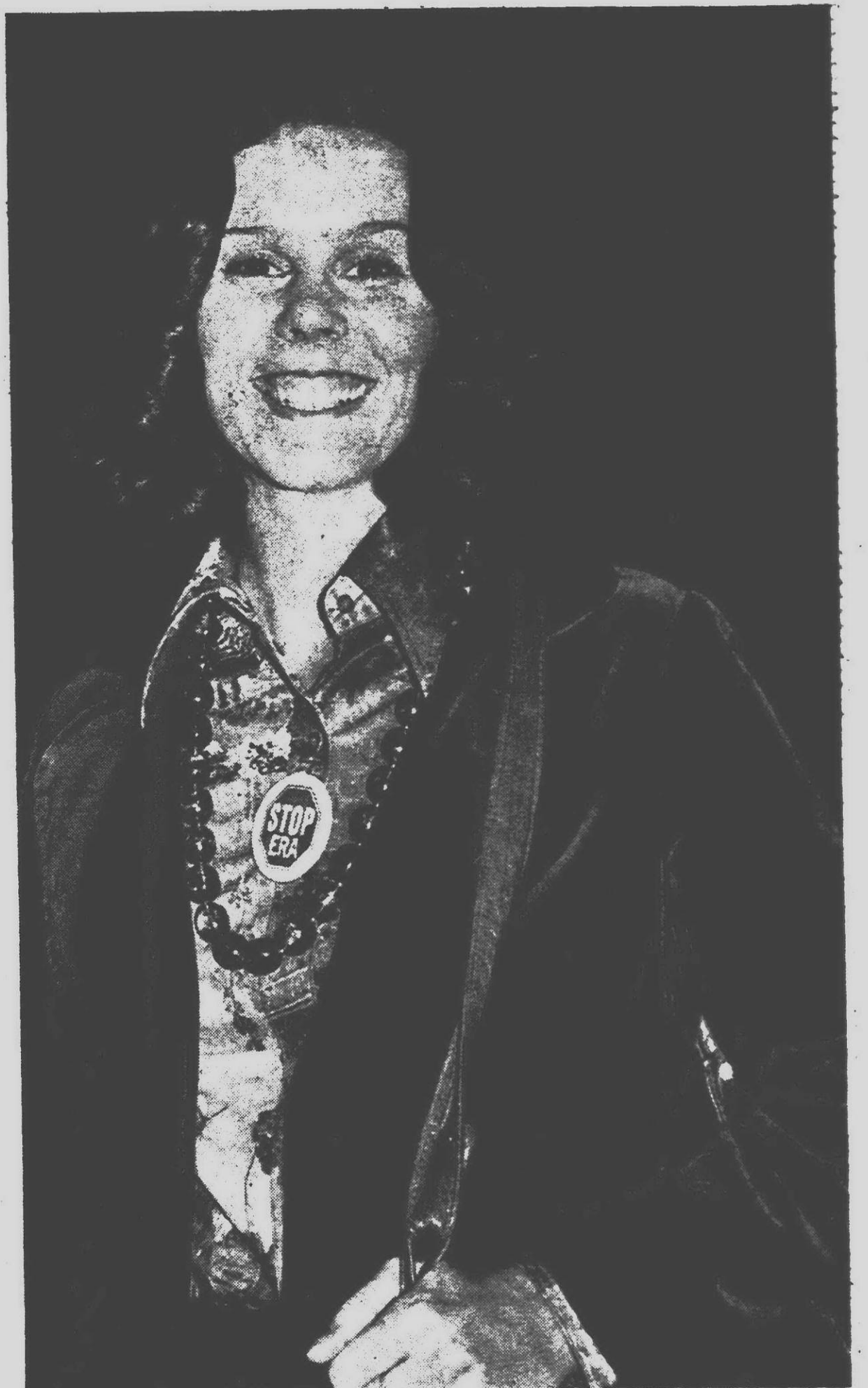
"I don't want to alarm anyone," interjected Mrs. Donnelly, "but a lot of people would like to get in the private areas of the other sex."

She added: "Under ERA you can't predict what will happen."

Mrs. Perry was hopeful that "ERA will have little effect on athletics," referring to the fact that guidelines on sports in public schools have already been published under Title IX by the Department of Health Education and Welfare.

Mrs. Donnelly countered with the fact that in Pennsylvania, which has a state ERA, a court ruled that girls should compete as equals against boys, and men against women.

"Not even Title IX goes that far," she said. "Female athletes ought to be able to compete against each other as women instead of being forced to play on a sexually-integrated team."

Florynce Kennedy's visit— 'it could have been great'

There's got to be a special place for the University of Michigan-Dearborn campus in the memory of feminist lawyer Florynce Kennedy.

And vice versa. Her visit last week involved strong feminist and civil rights ideas expressed in stronger language and a few sharply-worded parodies.

These evoked boos and catcalls from a few white male students on the fringes of the group that gathered to hear her.

And that action led to fast counter-verbage from the 59-year-old speaker, who called herself "offensive and proud of it, because people oppressed are supposed to be offensive."

"I've been to 370 schools, and this is the first campus where there has been persistent hissing and booing at satirical parody," she told her audience.

"It doesn't matter to me—I am capable of walking out and they had better have my check in New York. But it is an insult to the people here interested in feminism and what a nigger has to say."

AND THOSE WORDS somehow set the tone of the speech, although Ms. Kennedy made some powerful points in her inimitable style. Larry Melton of Redford Township

expressed one student's post-Kennedy viewpoint. "I have always believed in the causes she's fighting for, but I think she was offensive and insulted the campus," he said.

A couple of other male students suggested her fee was money badly spent by the college's Office of Student Life. But from women students came the idea that the hecklers caused them to be "cheated."

"I really respected her," said Denise Farrugia of Taylor. "We need more people who will speak out as she does. But I felt somehow cheated, because she talked so long to get the heckling kids off her back that she didn't have time to speak to the issues."

THREE WOMEN STUDENTS, Lynn Crawford and Robin Westby of Dearborn and Shirley Blochman of Miami, Fla., suggested that "a racist and sexist element on the campus was challenged by her mere presence."

But they also agreed that because of Ms. Kennedy's visit "our fellow students are forced to confront social and political realities they would rather ignore."

Judy Phair, of the University relations office, said it was the first time in her memory that kind of hissing had occurred and "you got the impression some had come to heckle."

"I'm glad she put them in their place," Ms. Phair added, "but I somehow wish it hadn't taken her so long to do it."

BILL SHADE, director of the campus office of veteran affairs, had a similar reaction.

"I've had the opportunity to hear Florynce Kennedy at New York University," he said, "and I know she had a lot to say but somehow her emotional self took over before she could say much of it."

"It could have been a really fine experience. But what it did was serve to bring to mind the extent to which we still are so many poles apart. And that's too bad."

Shade said he was sure the students who joined a rap session preceding the speech had a good experience, "and I had hoped the points she would make, later would go beyond what she said then. But it didn't really work out that way."

BUT ALL THE PROBLEMS didn't keep this champion of women's rights from making some points clear.

One involved the Equal Rights Amendment and its defeat in New York and New Jersey referendum votes.

"The media sold us out on that," she said. "It practically ignored the existence of the referenda until after

the voting, and then it called the defeats a major setback."

"That's like pulling a curtain in front of you when a truck is coming at you, and then when it hits saying, 'Look, you just got hit.'"

She suggested that now women "won't sit back and rest."

MS. KENNEDY commented that her life as a fighter probably had its origins in the fact that "I was lucky—my parents did not teach us to bow to authority and they made us feel precious and not just some more pick-aninny niggers."

She also urged women and blacks to "challenge the most powerful interests by dealing with the most powerful oppressor."

"Every institution that damages you can be damaged," she declared, "but direct your indignation where it really matters."

Directing strong indignation toward the church, she said she objects to its anti-abortion stand as a sample of "oppression because it keeps you from controlling your life."

Ms. Kennedy is a graduate of the Columbia University law school and active in both the civil rights and women's movements since the 1950s. She is a co-founder of the National Organization for Women and Founder of the Feminist Party.

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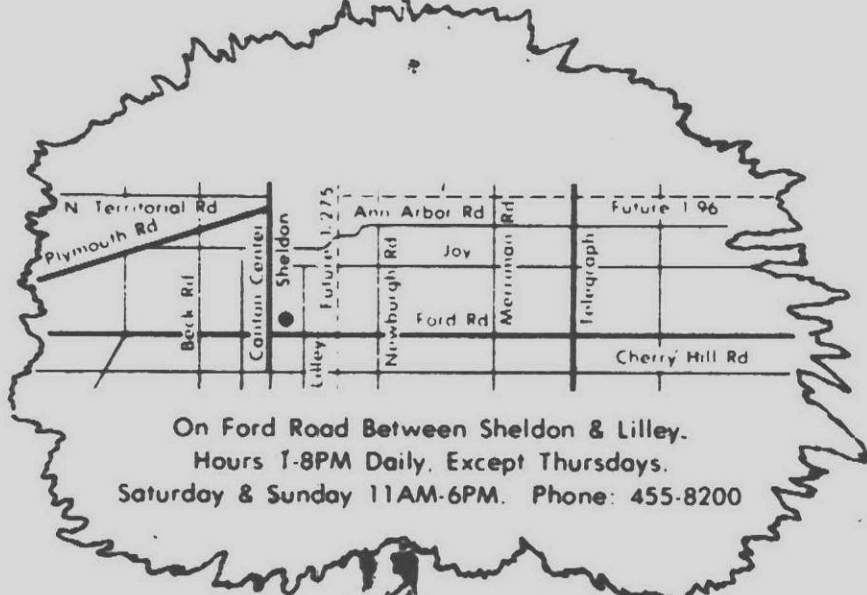

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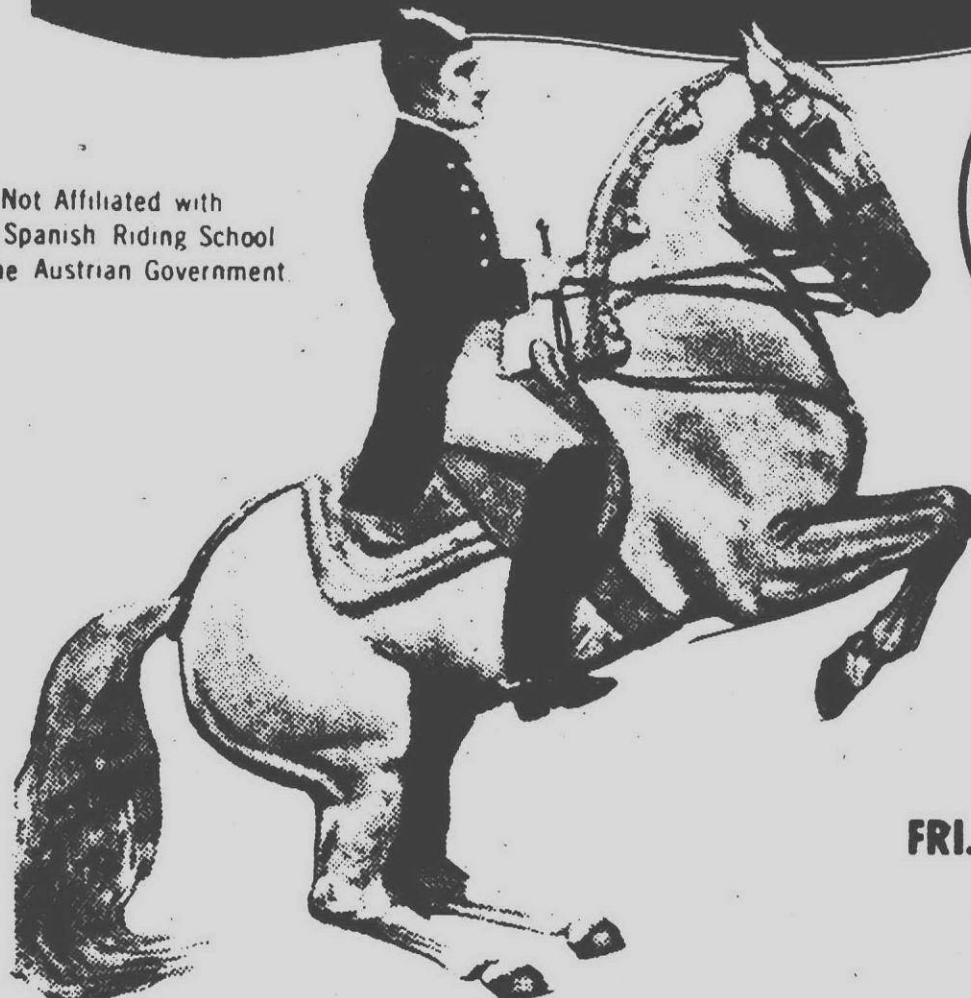

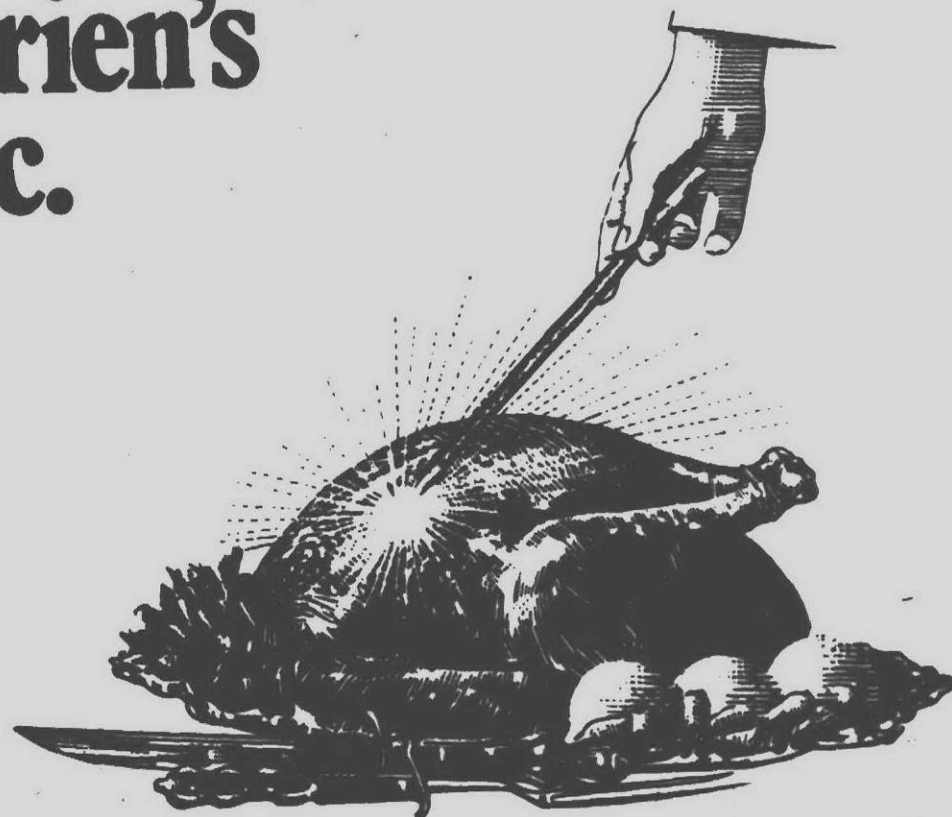

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Family can't solve all its own problems

"Society promotes many problems today that can't be solved in a family situation," said Patricia Key from her desk in Faith Lutheran Church, Livonia, where she works as a counselor.

"People are more willing to admit now that they need help from an outside source. This may be because they are more transient, and don't always have a friend or relative close by to whom they can turn. You sometimes have to have someone to talk to."

Mrs. Key, who is affiliated with the Lutheran Children's Friend Society, counsels at the Livonia church one day a week.

"I think it is very necessary for the church to be involved in giving people counseling help," said the Rev. Roger Schlee, pastor of Faith Lutheran. "We've seen an increase in family problems in the last few years because of pressures of work, school or the economy."

"We need someone to give consistent, regular counseling which is something the pastors do not always have time to do."

THE SERVICE is not just for members of the church, Mrs. Key pointed out. It is available to families teenagers, or people with problems such as child abuse, alcoholism, drugs or pregnancy problems. Fees are on a sliding scale based on monthly income.

"Our clients have to decide what they want to work on," she explained. "We make a verbal contract with them about what to do that day. Then at the end of the session they write down what, if any, progress they've made, and if they haven't made any, why not."

"If they decide we can work together, then we talk about the priorities we will work on first."

In the case of problem pregnancies, for example, Mrs. Key will help the woman sort out what she might want to do, "not what I want to do."

"Usually in this work we need a few exploratory visits," she said. "A family may bring in one of its members whom they think is the only problem. But after a few visits it turns out there are a lot more problems than the one that brought them in."

"In the case of child abuse it is necessary to find out what is making the abuser angry enough to abuse the child. Usually the child's behavior is reminding them of something they can't tolerate."

"The clients who admit they are abusers are mothers. It seems more difficult for men in general to confess they need outside help. Our culture tells them to take care of their own concerns."

MRS. KEY noted that the biggest problem in families today is the lack of respect for each other.

"Parents talk down to their children," she said. "They don't realize they are acting this way. But it interferes with communication. If the family members don't respect each other, they don't bother to talk to each other."

She finds one of the best parts of her job is "seeing people begin to feel confident about themselves."

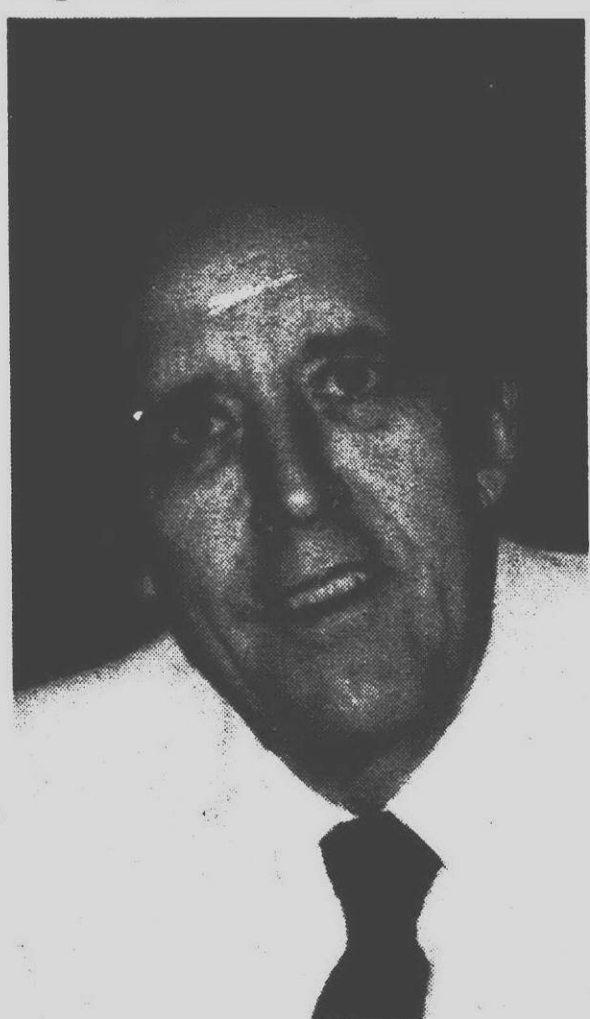
She added: "Building a good self-image is not new. It is one of the chief aims of social work today. You are not judging them. You're just

there to help them deal more effectively with what bothers them."

Clients often believe that because someone does not treat them right, it reflects on them personally, that it means something is wrong with them."

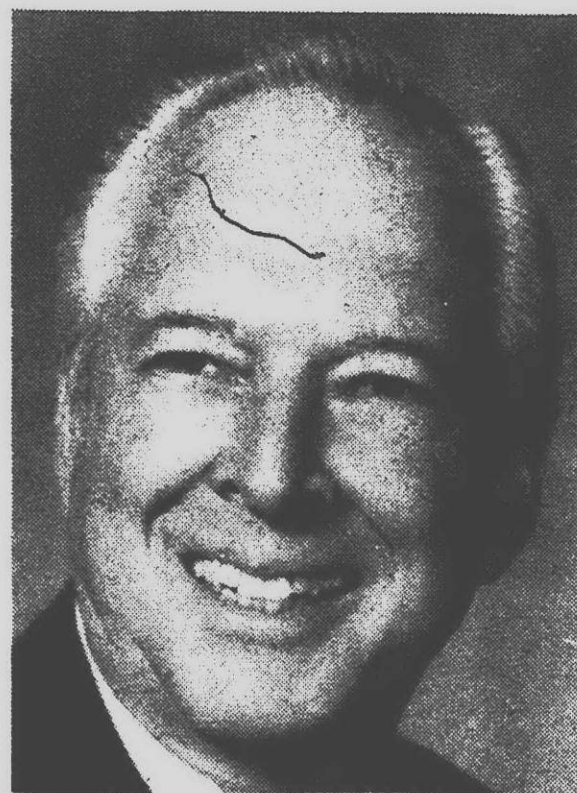
"BUT SOME people take on themselves all the responsibility for what happens," she noted. "If things don't happen right they feel they must be some kind of bad guy. As you talk to them you try to help them see that the lack is not always in them."

"I accept people as they are and help them go where they want to go. I am leading the way but am not setting the goals. The person is."

West Chicago, from Sunday, Nov. 16 through Tuesday, Nov. 18 for a series of talks on the subject "Knowing God's Will."

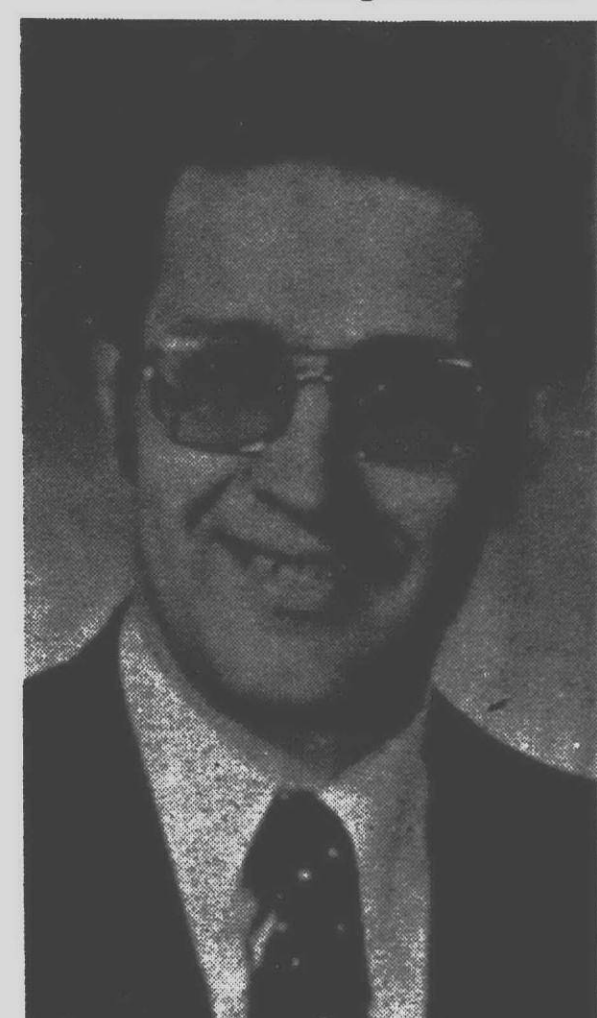

World food problem needs 'good Samaritan,' layman says

If the Christian church takes seriously the story of the Good Samaritan, says one of this area's leading laymen, then it should give its support to birth control and family planning.

The two go together, believes Donald M. (Hoppy) Hanson of Redford Township, because emergency food may save life but only tackling the over-population question can begin to improve quality of life for many in the world's underdeveloped areas.

"I realize an idea like this is political and theological dynamite," said Hanson, a member of Village United Presbyterian Church, "but I feel it's such a serious issue it should go into the Judeo-Christian ethic."

Long active in the distribution of food from this country to the hungry overseas, Hanson said he has become increasingly convinced this is only part of the church's missionary duty.

"Shipping food overseas is dealing with the symptoms rather than the cause of a very serious problem," he said. "We have kept people alive without any thought to the fact that their lives may be almost animal-like."

THE GOOD SAMARITAN story comes into the picture, in Hanson's view, because in that parable told by Jesus the helpful passerby not only gave immediate aid to a needy traveler but also made provision for checking on his future well-being.

Translating that into today's terms,

he suggested that "if we feed people and do nothing about the population explosion in many countries we're responsible for their pitiful existence."

"We must look at what we can do at the other end of the scale in the areas of birth control and family planning."

"There must be more of a motive to help than making ourselves feel good."

HANSON, a retired officer of the U.S. Navy and head of the Naval Junior Reserve Officers Training Corps at Bentley High School in Livonia, was one of the initiators of Operation Handclasp, a program in which U.S. military personnel extended help to starving people beginning shortly after World War II.

Stationed in Asia in 1946 and 1947, he said he and his wife saw first-hand the "desperate need and starvation" in China.

"There were 160,000 refugees on the edge of starvation, and the missionaries there could help no more than half of them," he said.

When Navy men launched Operation Handclasp, he said, "we were dealing with human needs."

"I thought then it had to be done, and I still think it has to be done now," he added. "We have to be responsive to deal with desperate situations. No way could I say cut off the supply of food."

BUT HANSON FEELS the move on

the part of church groups to supply food for the starving has become sort of a race to see who can supply the most.

"I have little doubt," he said, "that we could, if not feed the whole world, then at least make a good stab at it. I note the impetus at this mass shipping of food comes from farm belt leaders."

"But this sort of program, standing by itself may be of more benefit to us than to the people who need help."

THERE HAVE BEEN some first steps toward birth control programs in some Asian countries, Hanson said, "but the idea never has really been able to get off the ground and I see it as a political problem in the church hierarchy."

"It's going to take some hard talk on the part of some religious leaders, but I think some one is soon going to have to take this stand," he added.

Going back to the Good Samaritan, he remembered being in Shanghai in 1946 and seeing terrible living conditions.

"Thousands were starving," he said, "but the Quakers were about the only people doing much to help. Others tended to shy away, because there's an old Chinese belief that if you save a life you are responsible for that person."

That responsibility, he said, is what the church is failing to accept today. "The Good Samaritan went the whole way, and I think we should too," he concluded.

47 church families act against hunger

Forty-seven families who belong to the Geneva United Presbyterian Church in Canton Township recently made personal commitments to do something about world hunger. They also vowed to improve the environment.

They acted because of their belief that Christians have a moral obligation to care for those in need.

They signed a card prepared by members of the church's environmental awareness committee on which they indicated the way they would participate in the struggle against hunger and improve the environment.

Twenty families will give at least \$10 a week to one of the eight organizations listed on the card which fight hunger. Four families will do volunteer work for a organization which deals with hunger. Eight families will raise money for FOCUS:HOPE by walking in their Brotherhood Walk Sunday, Nov. 2.

Thirty-nine families will contribute each month to the church's food pantry, which is used to supply needy families in the area with canned food and staples.

Twenty families vowed to use organic fertilizers in place of chemical fertilizers during 1976. Thirty-one families will avoid using products which come in aerosol cans, and 37 families will recycle bottles, cans and newspapers each month.

Seventeen families will buy beverages only in returnable bottles for three months, and 26 families will write their state legislator in favor of House Bill 4296 which would ban throwaway bottles and cans.

Nineteen families promised to turn in a high protein, beefless recipe to be used in a cookbook containing similar recipes. Forty-seven families will have one or two beefless days each week for at least a month.

Fifteen families vowed to use honey, molasses and so forth as substitute for refined sugar, and 17 families will bake their own bread and cookies.

Thirty-seven families will substitute fresh fruits and vegetables for "junk" foods used in snacks.

"The environmental committee felt that all these items related directly to a change in lifestyle which is needed on the part of the American people," said the Rev. Jeffrey S. Goldsmith, pastor of Geneva United church.

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Medic talks of food production

"It makes no difference whatever how much food the world produces, if it produces people faster," says a consultant for the National Dairy Council.

Dr. Laurence M. Hursh says that "The world as we know it will likely be ruined before the year 2000, and the reason for this will be its inhabitants failure to comprehend two facts."

Fact number one is that world food production cannot keep pace with the galloping growth of population.

Fact number two is that family planning cannot, and will not, in the fore-

seeable future check this runaway growth.

The doctor points out that this information comes from a statement issued by the Environmental Fund in Washington, D.C.

"Basically, the Environmental Fund takes issue with all of us referring to the world food crisis," says Dr. Hursh. "Fund spokesmen believe there is not a food crisis but a population crisis."

The world is divided between nations which increase their food produc-

tion faster than their population growth, and nations that increase population faster than their food supply.

"And family planning doesn't work," he claims. "The fund reports that India, which has spent the most on family planning for 24 years, has accomplished virtually nothing."

"Its population in 1951 grew by 3.6 million. Now it grows 16.2 million each year. Mexico adopted family planning only three years ago and the birth rate has risen abruptly."

'Livonia who?' attitude goads Patriots

Livonia Who?

This seems to be the question in the minds of several grid coaches around the metropolitan area who are loudly voicing the opinion their own football team should be in the state Class A football semi-finals Saturday afternoon.

Livonia Franklin (8-1) is pitted against Detroit Southwestern (8-0) at Pontiac's Wisner Stadium in one matchup while Kalamazoo Central (9-0) meets Traverse City (9-0) at Lansing Sexton's Memorial Field in the other. Both games start at 1:30 p.m.

Coach Armand Vigna's Patriots got the nod when Birmingham Brother Rice was defeated, 7-0, by Dearborn Divine Child Sunday afternoon. The final statistics gave Franklin a 103.22 playoff point average to Rice's 100.88 in Region II.

Southwestern head coach Joe Hoskins thought his Detroit public league champs would play Brother Rice and when the Warriors were upset Sunday he was informed his opponent would be Franklin.

"Who's that?" Hoskins responded. Coach Vigna and athletic director George Lovich, who was Franklin head coach for seven years through 1974, find the recent articles in the metropolitan daily newspapers and other insinuations quite irritating.

Although neither one wants to make an issue of the matter, both have something to say on the subject. Vigna says: "Detroit newspapers have never rated us very high over the years even when we had perfect seasons so it comes as no surprise. But I don't want to make an issue of it, we don't have any explaining to do."

Vigna, whose team took Northwest Suburban League honors this year for the third consecutive year and was the only team to beat Westland John Glenn, feels the system is fair.

"We all knew the rules before the season started and how the points would be given. We played a tougher

schedule than Brother Rice, for example, and our opponents won more games than Rice's did."

"I'll say one thing, Brother Rice and its coach Al Fracassa have a lot of class and have not said one word about the disappointment of not going to the playoffs.

"We've won 26 of our last 28 games and year after year we are ignored in the final ratings. This year, we won it on the field and we'll let our performance Saturday speak for us. Our boys have worked hard and are very deserving of playing in the semi-finals. I think it's a wonderful opportunity to demonstrate how we can play football." Lovich has long been a 'giant' among football coaches in the area, posting a seven-year record of 49-9-1. A local coach said this week: "I've been around a long time and you know that you had to point toward Franklin if you wanted to have a successful season, it's that simple." "Franklin's record for the last ten years is 57-10-1, which should speak for itself," Lovich says firmly. "During that span we have never been shut-out.

"On the other hand, we have posted 27 shutouts, had 16 games in which we allowed one touchdown or less, 15 games in which we permitted two TDs or less, seven contests in which the opposition has scored three touchdowns. Only in two games did we give up as many as four touchdowns and we once were scored on five times. "I'm very proud of that record and I'm sure those who know our brand of football also know these boys deserve to be in Saturday's state playoffs."

Southwestern got into the playoffs with a 119.0 playoff point rating to Warren Fitzgerald's 111.11 in Region I, beating Cass twice in the process and the only team to score on the Technicians this year.

Lovich said Franklin had 3200 tickets for Saturday's game and they would be sold Wednesday, Thursday and Friday at \$2 each until sold out. Round-trip bus tickets to the game

and back can also be purchased for \$1.

For those driving to the game, take Telegraph Road north to M-59. Turn right on M-59 to the second entrance of Wide Track Drive, turn left on Wide Track Drive to the Waterford Exit (this will put you on Oakland Ave. which is a one-way street). Wisner Stadium is on Oakland Ave., about two miles off Wide Track Drive.

Franklin's side is on Cass Ave. Go past stadium and circle to your left past a Chevy dealer and parking lot entrance is on Cass.

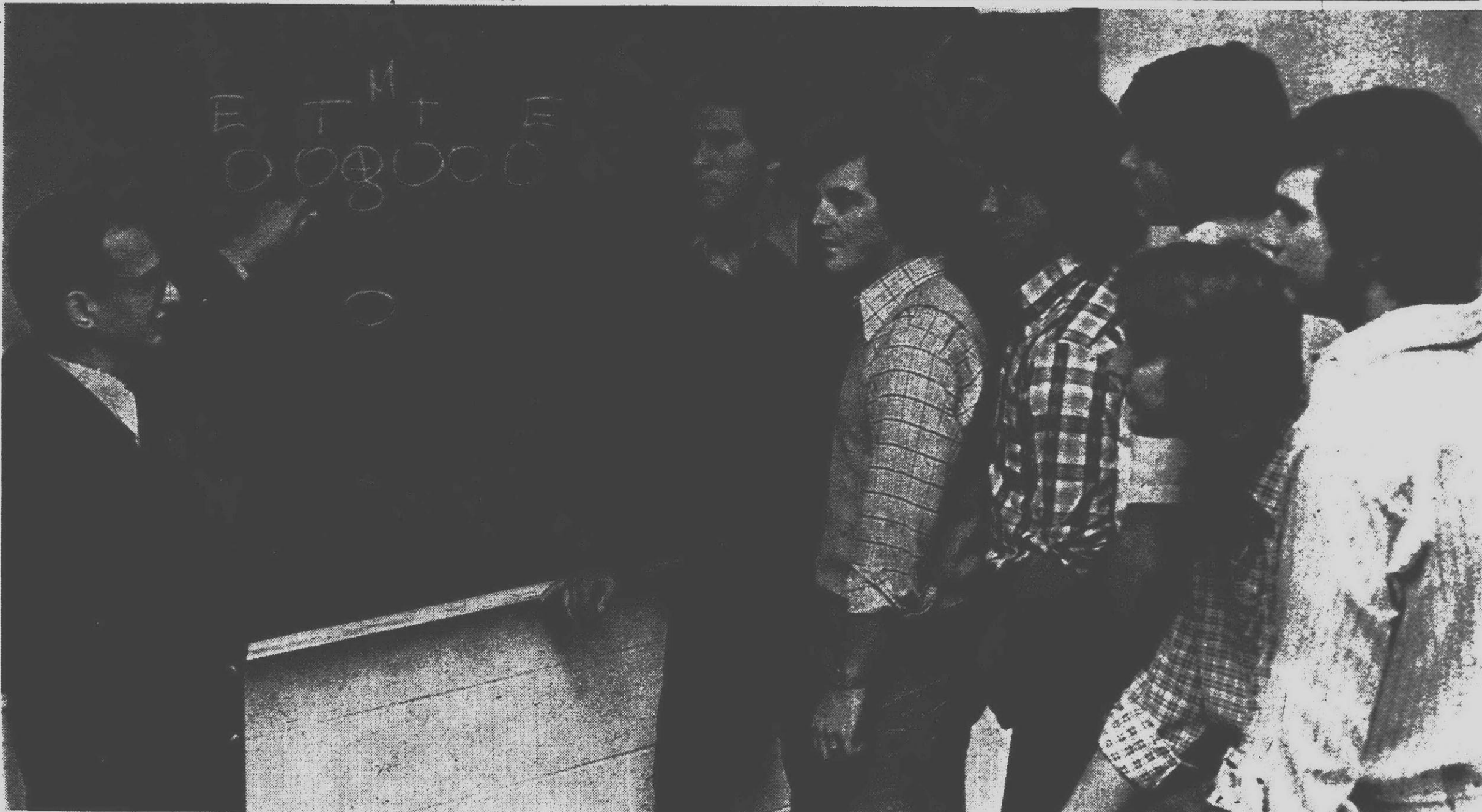
In all the hula-balloo about the semi-

finalists, the game itself has been slightly overlooked. Southwestern will pit its offense, led by versatile quarterback Mike Marshall, who can do everything on a football field, against the rugged defensive unit of Franklin.

Southwestern's 6-2 defense is anchored by linebacker Raymond Cabarris and freshman cornerback Walter Smith.

Franklin's punishing defense posted five shutouts this season, allowed only 44 points and has permitted three points in its last four contests.

If there is a question, it will be how the Patriots will be able to move the ball on offense against Southwestern's quick defense.

Leaps into Grid playoffs

Franklin rips Bentley

Livonia Franklin ran up a three-touchdown lead in the first half against Bentley Saturday, then let the defense take over in its 21-0 victory over the Bulldogs of Glen Gode.

Even then, Coach Armand Vigna's squad had to wait a full 24 hours before they found out they were in the state playoffs when Dearborn Divine Child upset Birmingham Brother Rice, 7-0, Sunday afternoon.

The Patriots scored twice in the first quarter and once in the second to take command. When starting quarterback Dave Wilson got his bell rung early in the game, he had to be removed. But nothing was diminished as Dennis Smith stepped in and fired a pair of touchdown passes.

Smith's first scoring toss was a nine-yard touchdown to tight end Mike Kaseta after the junior signal-caller had moved Franklin 51 yards in 10 plays.

Smith, playing with the poise of a veteran, drove the favored Patriots 66 yards in nine plays, hitting flanker Jerry Pollard with a 19-yard touchdown pass with just one second left in the first period.

Sam Williams, who has played the last two games after being okayed by the doctors to play again after separa-

ting his shoulder, booted all three extra points. He also played outstanding defense, according to his coaches, and has given a new lift to the Patriots in their drive for a state title.

"He looks one hundred per cent," Vigna beamed, "and the whole team just seems to respond when he's back in his regular linebacker spot or at offensive end. He's just an outstanding player."

Tim Hollandsworth, who bulled 36 yards in nine carries from his full-back spot, plunged one yard in the second period for the final home team score.

Valuable Jimmy Casey ramblled 84 yards in 20 carries and Pollard colared three passes for 39 yards and one touchdown. Smith and Wilson connected on 10 of 17 passes for 107 yards.

Bentley was paced by fullback Tim Oakley's 100 yards in eight rushes. Russ Hodges, who was injured and removed in the fourth quarter, and Mark White combined to complete seven of 18 aeriels for 63 yards. Sam Williams intercepted one Bentley pass.

Williams interception ran Franklin's total to 22 for the year and Vigna's

Livonia Franklin won't be the only area team in Saturday's state high school football playoffs which will have solid support from Observer & Eccentric readers.

Dearborn Divine Child, which beat Brother Rice for the Catholic League championship and thus gained the Class B playoffs, also has avid backing in the area, and on the Falcon squad are six players from Garden City and Westland.

In Saturday's Class B semifinals, Divine Child will face Sturgis in a 1:30 p.m. game at Battle Creek. The winner will meet the survivor between the other two semifinalists, Saginaw MacArthur and Flint Ainsworth Nov. 22 in Central Michigan University Stadium for the Class B title.

In the lineup of the unbeaten Falcons are center Eric Ford, cornerback Nick Sabol, linebacker Mike Wiacek, offensive tackle Mike Prevost, all of Garden City, and two players from Westland, offensive guard Duane Sopa and defensive safety Steve Savini.

Ford, Sabol, Wiacek, Prevost and Sopa all prepped at St. Raphael's School in Garden City before entering Divine Child High School, while Savini attended St. Mary's in Wayne.

Over a 15-year period, Divine Child has one of the best football records in the state, losing only 15 games over that span. The Falcons are 9-0 for this season, as Sturgis is also.

Schoolcraft squad eyes national soccer honors

Schoolcraft College's Ocelots have swept to their fourth consecutive state soccer championship and will be in Glen Ellyn, Ill. Friday and Saturday to battle for the inter-regional championship.

If coach Larry Christoff's squad wins this weekend, it will advance to the National Junior College Athletic Association championships at Baltimore, Md. in a double-elimination tournament on Nov. 25 and 26.

"This year's squad is tops in hustle and desire and I believe that will pay off in the end."

Christoff listed Steve Paul, an inside right forward, as a strong choice for all-conference and a candidate for all-American. He is the second leading scorer with nine goals.

Top goal-getter is center-forward Ennio Petralla with 15 goals, including four against Kellogg and three in Schoolcraft's final season 4-0 win over Cuyahoga West Community College of Ohio.

Goalie Craig Brown has also been a standout all year, posting two shut-outs, giving up only four "legitimate" goals and eight penalty shot scores.

Christoff, who coached at Livonia Stevenson High for six years before joining Schoolcraft last year, also named halfback Greg Krutberg and hustling Rick Young as key players.

Mrs. McDonald's only losing season came in her first year and she's had nine winning years in a row, including an unbeaten team last year and another all-victorious string of 14 meets this season.

The affable coach, who loves to wear a shirt with "Superfish" emblazoned across the front, believes she has the swimmers to give powerhouse East Lansing a swim for their money.

"I'm not predicting we'll win, because East Lansing is very deep in talent, but if we're at our best Friday and Saturday, I believe we'll do well both individually and as a team," Mrs. McDonald's aquatic girls are paced by a pair of juniors and a couple sophomores in their quest for state honors.

JUNIOR CAROL EGGERS has been performing in excellent fashion so far this season after taking first in the 50-yard freestyle and 100-yard backstroke events in the state meet last year. She was a double winner in the first Michigan Invitational Swim meet at Wayne State University's pool

as Stevenson's girls won six of 11 events.

"Carol has lots of natural ability and strength, has leadership ability and encourages all the other swimmers," says coach McDonald. "She is an excellent team worker, swims all strokes well and has a delightful sense of humor."

LINDA HEIN, sophomore, finished first in the 200-yard individual medley and 100 fly races in the Michigan Invitational. "Linda will have to drop her times to win at the state meet, but she works hard, tries to do her best at all times and although she's a little quiet, Linda has a strong desire to succeed," said Mrs. McDonald.

JUNIOR LAURA KLOOTE was fourth in the 100 butterfly in last year's state meet and is currently under last year's time in that event. She was second in the 100 fly at the Michigan Invitational last month.

"Laura swims all strokes well and although basically a sprinter, she swims the 200 individual medley well because she has the fundamentals in all strokes," says her coach.

She is very coachable and works hard on stroke drills and training patterns, according to Mrs. McDonald.

SOPHOMORE BECKY STANLEY swims everything well, says her coach but is outstanding in the 50 and 100 freestyle events. "Becky gives her all in every workout and is a real leader at every meet. This team couldn't

make it without her versatility, speed and spirit."

Coach McDonald is very proud of her squad and it reflects in the way she beams about her girls. "Our Stevenson team is fifty percent spirit and fifty percent talent—they're interested in each other. Non-state participants have been elected captains of the team, we change each two weeks, because of their spirit and managerial ability in running the team at a meet."

All the Stevenson girls going to the State Finals have had AAU experience. "Becky Stanley and Nancy Walker swim for the Livonia Y. Liz Hatfield is a Bulldog and Pixie Smith is from Clarenceville."

Coach McDonald mentioned that Lori Loomis, Laura Kloote and Linda Hein work out with the Garden City Parks and Recreation Department. Theresa Sieh practices with the age group program at Oakland University and Carol Eggers and Lori Tobis belong to the Livonia Spartans which Mrs. McDonald coaches at Stevenson.

"Our team, just like all other top teams, can only succeed with the support of parents, booster clubs and school administrators," coach McDonald emphasized.

"Our basic element is pool time and the Stevenson athletic director, Carl Fetz has always been more than fair in providing all girl's teams with a share of the facilities. We appreciate that very much."

The program is open to the public free of charge.

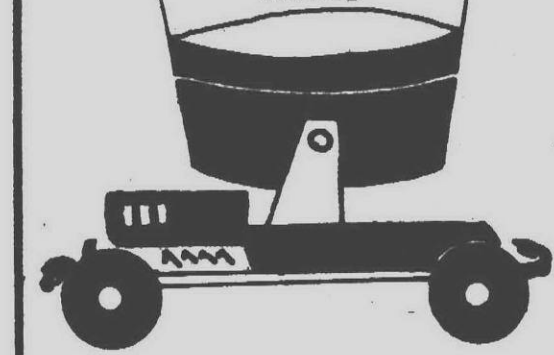


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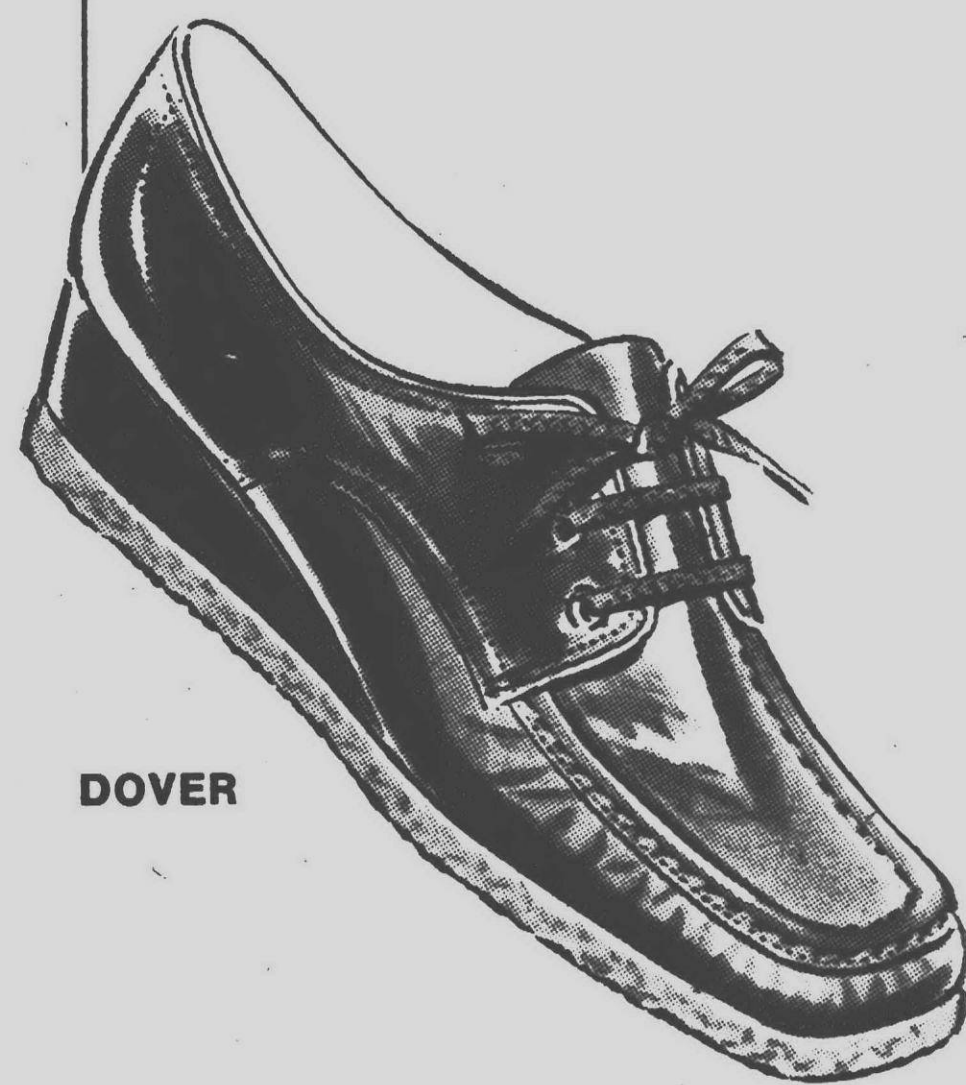


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

THE ROCKS won the league title with a 66-52 win over Redford Union. Salem's league record of 9-0 insures them of the championship.

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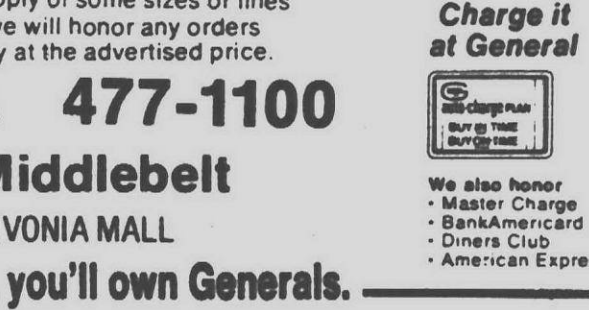
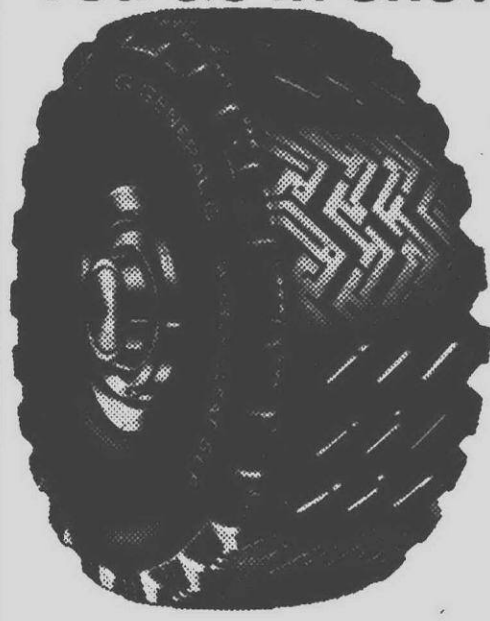
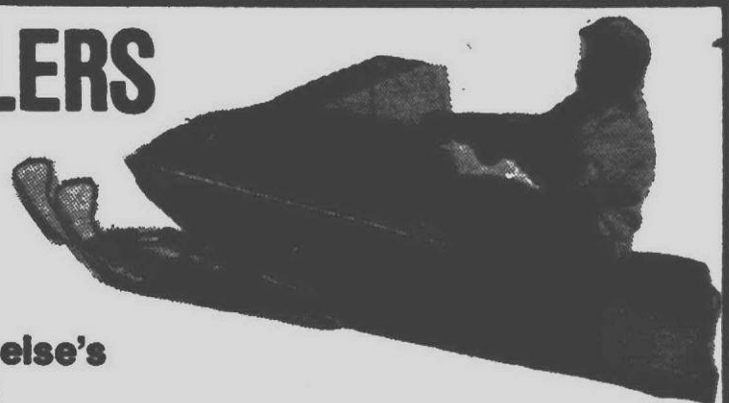

When "Man with a Load of Mischief" opened in November, 1966, the New York Times critic freely admitted that he was prepared for disaster. His fellow critics shared his concern, for the original Ashley Dukes play on which the musical is based had not been a success when originally produced 40 years before.

Also, it was the initial venture of the musical comedy team of John Clif-

ton and Ben Tarver, and the director and cast were relatively unknown. There had been only three preview performances and the advance sale amounted to exactly four tickets.

By the next morning this had all changed. The critics were unanimous in their praise with such comments as "a perfectly charming musical," "instant delight . . . few composers could equal this score," "spritely and ingratiating." There was a rush on the box office and "Man with a Load of Mischief" joined the ranks of only a handful of musicals which have become hits on the off-Broadway stage.

"Man with a Load of Mischief" is a tale of romance and intrigue set in a wayside inn in early 19th century England. A sudden accident to a coach and a gallant rescue bring to this inn four adventurous people - a lovely lady, her maid, Louise, a dashing lord, and his manservant, Charles. The stage is set for romance, something the innkeeper and his wife are eager to encourage so that their guests will extend their stay.

The lord and lady seem perfectly matched. "Such a handsome couple," sighs the wife. And so they are, but it turns out that the lord is more interested in his purse and gaining favor with the prince than he is in romance.

The lady is the prince's mistress, and all too eager to run away and leave behind the kind of life the lord represents. The imminent arrival of the prince brings the intrigues, the stratagems, and the various affairs to a swirling climax.

Cast members are Delores Thomas of Livonia (the lady), Susan Taranowski of Westland (Louise), David MacIntosh of Southfield (the lord), Doug Kerr of Plymouth (Charles), Val Sisto of Taylor (the innkeeper), and Betty Booher of Wayne (the innkeeper's wife).
