Fight's on to rescue Supersewer funding

Last ditch efforts are being made to save 75 percent federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) funding for the proposed \$120 million North Huron Valley-Rouge Valley wastewater sys-

Late last week the EPA announced 1984 fiscal year grant funding wouldn't be available for the project, commonly called Son of Supersewer.

But a show-cause hearing is scheduled for tomorrow morning in Wayne County Circuit Court as the townships of Canton and Plymouth seek an injunction to prohibit disbursement of the EPA money reserved for the project.

Likewise, the Wayne County Executive's office has announced plans to seek a similar injunction in U.S. Dis-

After 1984, all EPA funding drops to a maximum of 55 percent - most likely placing the project financially out of reach for many of the 17 participant communities. Also included in the project are the communities of Livonia, Redford, Garden City and West-

FUNDING FOR the massive sewer project ran aground earlier this month when the EPA refused to certify engineering plans.

Besides increasing sewer capacity, the project was intended to solve pollution problems with the existing Rouge Valley sewerage system. (Original Supersewer plans didn't involve the Rouge Valley work but when Supersewer was split into north and south projects last year that work was added

The EPA won't certify the project because the pollution problems, as well as others, aren't addressed, according to Charles Sutfin, regional EPA water

In a Sept. 5 letter to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR), which sets the statewide priority for EPA funding, Sutfin outlined EPA concerns with the project.

"It would be unfair to other communities on the project priority list that are ready to proceed if we were to offer any additional special considerations to Wayne County," Sutfin wrote.

Yet, the EPA agreed to consider additional information after Vice President George Bush's office intervened. But the additional information failed to

was made to bypass the project and fund others on the priority list.

"Our final decision is basically based on the same reasons in the earlier letter," Sutfin said Monday.

Even if the pollution problems are corrected and the Detroit treatment plant's ability to handle the additional sewage confirmed, Sutfin said the project isn't guaranteed 55 percent funding in 1985

"It is up to the state where they would end up on the priority list," he

THE EPA now is in the process of certifying other projects on the DNR's list, according to Richard Hinshon,

DNR community assistance chief. The \$21 million reserved for Son of Supersewer has been allocated for sewer projects in the city of Monroe in

Monroe County, Montrose in Genesee County, Richmond in Macomb County, Sturgis in St. Joseph County, and Brighton in Livingston County.

But Plymouth and Canton townships may stop those plans Friday.

Circuit Judge Sharon Finch has ordered the DNR or EPA to show cause why an injunction shouldn't be issued.

The two townships have pending litigation involving the project and claim a funding decision can't be made until that lawsuit is settled. The townships' lawsuit seeks assurances for many of the same concerns as the EPA, as well as reimbursement for planning money for the original Supersewer.

Wayne County will argue in federal court that the EPA's decision to not fund the northern project jeopardizes already approved funding for the southern project because of the town-

ships' lawsuit, according to Jamil Akhtar, assistant county executive.

"If we get stopped by a court injunction, whoever gets the injunction runs the risk of being held liable for dam-ages if we can't fund the other projects," Hinshon said.

Officials in Canton and Plymouth township apparently are willing to take the risks to have the Supersewer flasco

"The Zilwaukee bridge and the Midland nuclear plant are two of the finest examples of modern technology in the western world - two of the best managed and administered construction projects in the history of the world in comparison to Supersewer," Canton Supervisor James Poole said.

Party workers buoyed by candidate's campaign stop

There were some swirls of clouds in

an otherwise blue sky when Democratic presidential candidate Walter Mondale visited the area Monday after-

The weather seemed to sum up the opinions of some Mondale supporters who were on hand to greet him at the airport and a citizen's forum at Wayne Memorial High School that sunny day: a few concerns, but overall optimism, confidence and determination that the former vice president would win the election in November.

"We're working hard on it," said Tom Anderson, a Mondale delegate from the 15th District to the Democratic National Convention two months ago.

"One of our keys is a registration of Democrats and Democrat leaning peo ple for this election," he said.

"I think the present administration is completely insensitive to the needs of the middle and lower economic class."

ANDERSON DISAGREED with a poll in a Detroit newspaper that indicated a victory for President Reagan. He said Mondale and running mate Geraldine Ferraro are planning to visit the western Wayne County area more than once, which the delegate called a key part of the state in this election.

Right now, it's nip and tuck," Anderson said. "We'll go for Mondale."

"I don't think it's over at all," agreed Mary Newberg of Beveriy Hills, as she waited outside the high school. "(Michigan) is going to go for Mondale. Keep Wayne Memorial students Mary

Wethington, Beth Lounsbury, Kris All and Wendy Barthold, all Westland residents, answered almost as one when asked for their opinions on the candidate and the election.

"I think he'd do a better job than Reagan, definitely," Wethington said. "I think Michigan will support Mondale." Lounsbury said.

BEFORE MONDALE arrived at the school, workers were busy moving up and down the line of people waiting to go inside, selling pins and asking for volunteers. Josephine Pruchnik was one such worker. She traveled from Dearborn in a bus to be present

"I am here because I'm a confirmed Mondale supporter," said John Fannion of Westland. "Anything to help beat Reagan, I'm willing to do."

McNamee kills con-con measure

It would have been nice to sail smoothly out of office.

But in her final days in the Michigan Legislature, Rep. Ruth McNamee, R-Birmingham, faced one of the biggest

challenges of her career.

The five-term lawmaker's decision was such a tough one that U.S. Sen. Carl Levin, a Democrat, pointed to it as an example of courage. Speaking to the Michigan Municipal League last Friday, Levin said public officials must

speak out on their beliefs.
"We must have the courage to do what is right, despite the risk - the courage of a former mayor of Birmingham who cast a very difficult vote in the legislature yesterday."

LIKE OTHER Republicans, the Birmingham legislator supports a man-

date to balance the budget.

But she objected to the idea of a national constitutional convention and the 'political atmosphere" with special interests that would come into play

"That Constitution is flexible and there is a procedure for amending it," explained McNamee

'I don't believe in tampering with the Constitution.

McNAMEE DREW both praise and criticism for her committee vote which killed a resolution calling on Congress to hold a constitutional convention to draw up an amendment requiring a balanced federal budget.

"The pressure up here was tremendous," said the legislator.

Michigan would have been the 33rd

state to pass a resolution demanding a balanced budget. Thirty-four states are needed to force Congress either to call a convention or start the approval process itself.

McNamee parted company with other Republicans — including President Ronald Reagan - on the issue when it came before the House Constitutional Revision and Women's Rights

Committee. Earlier in the year, the state Senate had passed it 23-15. If approved by that committee, the measure would have gone to the full House for action.

House Minority Leader Michael Busch, R-Saginaw, talked of seeking a discharge petition to force the measure out of committee. Such measures are frequently discussed, rarely tried and even more rarely successful.

THE MICHIGAN Legislature drew national attention over the Labor Day weekend as the committee vote drew

Democrats, who generally oppose the balanced-budget amendment, control the committee by a 5-4 vote. The National Tax Limitation Committee targeted a Democrat, Rep. Jerry Bartnik of Monroe County, as a "swing" vote who might join the Republicans.

In nationwide radio commercials, the group gave Bartnik's home telephone number, urging listeners to call him and urge him to vote for the balanced-budget amendment.

As it turned out, however, they guessed wrong, and Republican McNamee cast the deciding vote against it.



Starkweather School shifts from children to area adults

Starkweather School opened its doors once again Monday but with different students.

Playground equipment has given way to a parking lot, while desks have been replaced with computer tables and typewriters.

The school library now houses medical tables and equipment instead of story books and pint-sized reading tables.

Starkweather, long known as an elementary school for the Old Village neighborhood, has been turned into a community education center for adults.

The new Starkweather students are studying computer programming, secretarial skills, government, word processing, medical assistant skills and the traditional subjects of math and Eng-

Primarily, the school is being used for daytime instruction, according to Sharon Strean, assistant director of community education.

In the past, daytime classes for adults were limited to portable class-rooms behind Central Middle School. With the addition of Starkweather, the community education program has in-

creased the daytime offerings.
"With the larger facility, we can offer five times the classes to adults during the daytime," Strean said. (Strean was promoted to assistant director this fall when David Dursam resigned that job to take a position with another school district.)

THE KEY to the program is offering "barrier free" education, she said. This includes two important elements busing to the center and daytime care for students with children.

A bus system has been developed for adults needing transportation to

Starkweather, with a stop every morning at Canton Commons. The system uses school district buses, according to Larry Masteller,

The child care center is available to students at the cost of 25 cents an hour. The center will provide supervision for children six months and older.







Scott ready to expand

Dick Scott is planning a \$2 million expansion of his Buick dealership on Ann Arbor Road.

According to the plans he announced this week, Scott will enlarge the service shop in the rear, add to the showroom and develop more parking to accomodate customers.

"Right now," he said, "the site is valuable. But it will be more so when that area develops with the homes that are bound to come when the population moves north."

"I like Plymouth," he said, "and the way it is expanding, both in the city and township, is proof that there is room for a lot of action. And the American cars should play a big part in the future — and that is not too far ahead."

The expansion of the Buick dealership will take place in the spring, with the possibility it may be sooner if weather permits.





Oakland U celebrates its 25th anniversary

Some folks will never forgive Oakland for not becoming the "Harvard of

Dedicated to the ideal of a small liberal arts school catering to select stu-dents, they are upset that OU is now a mid-size university educating mainly commuters from Oakland and Macomb

And they object to those diverse students learning not only philosophy but also such practical skills as how to take a temperature or use a computer.

BUT PRESIDENT Joseph Champagne contends that OU, at a quarter century, is doing just what its founders intended - serving the needs of the community that nurtured it.

"It's kind of a fun expression, but why would we want to aspire to be the 'Harvard of the Midwest?'" asks Champagne.

"All we need to be is the Oakland of the Midwest."

Twenty-five years ago this fall, Michigan State University-Oakland opened its doors to 570 commuter students. Meeting in classrooms that were once chicken coops on Matilda and Al-fred Wilson's Meadow Brook Farm, they took basic courses taught by 24

faculty members. The Wilsons donated their mansion, horse farm and \$2 million to Michigan State University in 1957.

NOW AN independent university serving more than 12,000 students, the £500-acre, Rochester-area campus has 36 buildings. Some of those even need new steam pipes, they've been around

With 1,400 full- and part-time employees, OU offers 60 undergraduate majors, 26 master's degrees and doctorates in engineering, reading and biological sciences.

Over time, the school's annual operating budget has grown from \$1 million to \$43 million in 1983-84.

Glenn Stevens, executive director of the Presidents' Council of State Colleges and Universities, credits OU with successfully addressing the needs of a rapidly expanding area. While offering a balanced educational program, it

reaches out into the community with cultural and academic offerings, he explained.

"It is a multi-purpose institution," said Stevens. "Oakland has been responsive to the demands and needs of the area. And I expect that to contin-

AS OU celebrates its silver anniversary, the school's backers tout vast achievements.

They cite steady student growth and program expansion and the fact that only four Michigan schools attract more research money. Last year, its professors brought in \$4.5 million for research projects, coming in just behind the Big Three and Michigan Technological University.

Through the adjacent Oakland Technological University.

nology Park, the university is helping its home county attract high tech firms to the area.

Champagne calls these accomplishments "nothing short of a miracle."

"I'm very optimistic, very bullish on the university," he added firmly. Detractors, though, contend OU was supposed to be a very different place.

They say the institution — dubbed by an early public relations man the "Harvard of the Midwest," — has lowered its academic standards, moved away from liberal arts to professional and technical offerings, and even added sports programs. As evidence, they cite the fact that OU once was so tough that half the first class dropped out before

the year's end.

THE SCHOOL has changed over the years. And like most 25-year-olds, it's still changing — and will probably be much different by mid-life.

But the school's goals today aren't that far from what the founders intend-

"The original intent was to have a balanced institution here. And by the 1980s we achieved that," said Keith Kleckner, senior vice president for university affairs and provost.

A brainchild of the Oakland County Planning Commission, Michigan State University-Oakland was to offer professional programs in business administration, education and engineering.

All programs would be "suffused with the spirit and substance of the lib-

eral arts" and "characterized by devotion to basic academic principles rather than immediate job application."

Continuing adult education was to be closely linked to credit courses and there were to be no "extracurricular distractions" such as ROTC, fraternities and sororities, and intercollegiate

Striving for a "rigorous academic tone," Oakland was kiddingly known as "Egghead U." Students laughed about spending all week in the library and heading to Michigan State to party on the weekends.

The institution took pride in the facts that all its courses were taught by teachers with doctorates, and almost half of the courses were mandatory. To be "well rounded," everyone took mu-sic, art, science and math and a lan-

ACTUALLY, MOST of those liberal arts graduates also left OU with very practical teaching degrees. That fact escapes most folks who bemoan the

shift away from the "ivory tower." "Throughout the 1960s, most of our graduates looked like liberal arts majors — but really they were education majors." said David Beardslee, director of OU's Office of Institutional Research.

"They were preparing for profes-

Through the 1960s, more than half of

the university's grads left with teach-

ing degrees.
"The myth grew up that Oakland was a liberal arts school," recalls Beardslee, in his 25th year with OU. "Statistics prove otherwise, but statis-tics don't undo myths."

THE NEXT decade brought the most change to OU, which gained independence in 1970. In a hard-hit economy, the country university became an attractive place for area students to drive to.

Oakland Intermediate Schools Superintendent William Keane calls it a "beautiful blend" of commuter and residential school.

"Many, many kids go to community college and then switch to OU. It offers commuter students a residential school

Rapidly expanding enrollments, a more diverse student population and pressure to offer "more relevant" courses resulted in an "educational

There was a shift in student values to more immediate job concerns and an opening of opportunities for women.

Once a traditional school attracting mostly young men straight out of high school, OU's typical student became a

Afterwards they had a more thorough discussion of the education-dee issue before a news conference of high school and college journalists. The students explored their disagreements over spending priorities, prayer in pub-lic schools and the line-item veto.

"WE MUST BE strong, but we've been wasteful," said Levin, pointing to Reagan's proposed 13 percent real warhead missile. Levin stopped short, however, of advocating the federal government provide local school districts one-third of

the operating funds. That position is advocated by the National Education Association, which nevertheless supports

Lousma, 48, a retired astronaut, said defense is only 26 percent of the federal budget and "human needs, including education," are 50 percent. He's sup-ported by the NEA, which wants more

federal control of education, not less.
"I'm for the MX. Carl would go to Geneva (usual site of disarmament talks) with an empty basket and give the basket away. I want something in the basket and to bring something back," said Lousma, calling the MX a "bargaining chip" in dealings with the Soviet Union.

LEVIN TOLD the students he supported supplemental education opportunity grants, which Reagan recommended be cut to zero. He cited several college student aid programs "which Congress kept going" against White House recommmendations.

"The federal government should not take over local education," Levin said. "I support education as we know it in the U.S.," said Lousma, referring to the state-local funding pattern with local school boards. The Ann Arbor aeronautical engineer said he supported student loans and creation of the U.S.

Department of Education, but opposed federal controls and general school aid. "The federal government messes it up," Lousma said.

THEY CLASHED over the question of amending the U.S. Constitution to give the president power to veto line items in a budget bill. Since 1787 a president has been able to veto only an entire bill, not an individual appropria-

Reagan wants line-item veto power for the presidency. The Michigan Constitution gives the governor such pow-

"I am opposed," said Levin. "It would give the president significant ad-ditional power. A president could tell a member of Congress, 'Vote for the MX or I'll cut a program in your district.'

"I support the line-item veto," Lous-ma replied. "The president could cut out pork barrel items. Levin has been, by his voting record, a taxer and spender. He has voted 62 times either to raise your taxes or avoid tax cuts."

THEY SPLIT over the controversial proposed constitutional amendment to allow prayer in public schools.

"I oppose structured, organized prayer in public schools," said Levin. "Local governmental officials would select and write the prayer, would determine whether kids would sit, stand, kneel or hold beads.

"Nobody objects to a moment of silence. But do you allow prayer shawls or hats?" asked Levin.

"I'll support voluntary prayer in pub-lic schools," Lousma said.

They agreed on the question of "equal access" to school facilities.
"I voted for equal access," said Lev-

in. "This is not for outsiders coming in. This is kids on their own. It does not interfere, dictate, dominate. It is freely

"I favor equal acces," said Lousma.
"When I was in high school, we had that. It's healthy. It did not compromise separation of church and state."

THEY AGREED to oppose tuition tax credits — granting parents a deduction from taxable income for tuition paid to a private school.

"I do not support tuition tax credits at this time," said Lousma, "not be-cause I don't approve of those kinds of schools but because of the (federal) need for money. It would take money out of public schools."

We all know what "the last time" means. That's right: 1968. Everybody has a story about the World Series.



Squeeze on the big chains

IF RONALD Reagan is bending over backwards to help his rich corporate pals, the supermarket chains certainly haven't heard about it.

Packer. Great Scott. Chatham. A&P. Kroger. One by one, the big chains have either folded, gone through financial reorganization under protection of the bankruptcy laws, or closed long lists of stores.

What we have seen in southeastern Michigan in recent weeks is by no means an isolated phenomenon. It's a nationwide development obvious in such older big cities as Philadelphia, Baltimore, Cleveland and Kansas City. So writes John Merwin in the Sept. 24 issue of Forbes, a national business biweekly.

The big chains are losing great shares of the market to smaller independents, it seems. You can observe it in your own neighborhood.

THIS DEVELOPMENT was foreseen several years ago. I recall a Wall Street Journal article predicting that supermarkets would lose a lot of business to fast-food restaurants.

More families are eating out. Mom is bringing in good pay and may not have time to cook. A single parent of my acquaintance packs her 10-year-old off to school and picks up her breakfast at McDonald's.

The fast-food restaurants deserve credit for good marketing and management,

holding down costs, providing consistent quality and serving relatively nutritious stuff.

A friend who claims to have done the calculations maintains it costs no more to eat out than to pay for groceries, energy for the stove and energy for heating water for dishes.

THE FORBES article concentrates on the competition for the grocery dollar, particularly in big cities of declining population such as our region.

Clearly, management is a factor. A highly motivated independent store manager can respond more quickly to his local population than can a chain manager, who must go by the book.

But the major factor is unions. Despite years of bargaining over concessions, it seems that many unions refuse to believe it's possible to price oneself out of the market. Or perhaps it's better politics to provide top dollar for 100,000 members than more modest wages for 220,000.

There's a war story about an independent store manager who, on a slow day, can tell a \$3.50-an-hour bagger to go back

and stock shelves. At the Safeway store down the block, union rules require that stockers be retail clerks, who make \$9 an hour.

SENIORITY IS something of a millstone, particularly for older, more strongly unionized chains. Let's say a chain closes a number of un-

profitable stores. Those employees in the closed store with most seniority "bump" junior employees at other stores. Thus, the wage picture at the surviving stores becomes worse.

One way out of the vicious circle, according to the Forbes piece, is to persuade the union to agree that seniority will apply only in a single store, not throughout a region.

When Kroger threatened to abandon metropolitan Detroit if the unions refused concessions, many unionists argued against it, theorizing that many jobs would be lost anyway.

FORBES REPORTS that since the beginning of the year, Kroger has closed 108 stores, mostly in the Great Lakes states. It cited high labor costs. The bottom line of that tale:

"While drawing back in the north, however, Kroger is continuing expansion in the South, where labor costs are lower."

In a business where profit is not much more than 1 cent per sales dollar and labor costs take 11 cents per sales dollar, every little bit counts.

School sports: 'last bastion of discipline'

IF THE late H.O. (Fritz) Crisler, legendary football coach and athletic director at the University of Michigan, were living today, he would enjoy reading the daily papers more than ever — and he was an avid reader.

He wouldn't be interested greatly in the political campaigns, but he would be delighted to read that the government officials from Washington on down to local boards are planning to spend more time in developing schools, especially the athletic programs.

He would smile when he read that Dr.

John (Mike) Hoben, superintendent of the Plymouth-Canton School District, is leading a group to extend the regular school league to create more rivalry and interest, and more desire on the part of young students, to make good in athletics and possibly win a scholarship to an institution of higher learning.

CRISLER'S THOUGHTS on athletic programs in the schools came to light some years ago when budgets were tight and schools were considering dropping athletics.


It was a beastly hot afternoon, and The Stroller was sitting with Fritz under the hot sun in Michigan Stadium when he voiced his reaction.

"It's the biggest mistake they could make," he said with a firmness that let you know he had greater ideas in the other direction.

"The school officials who are fostering the plan to drop sports don't realize the importance of these activities in the young minds."

Then he emphasized his thoughts when he said, "Sports in the schools are the last bastion of discipline."

He sat allent for a moment to allow his houghts to sink in. Then he went into de-



"TAKE THE young boy from one of the poorer families," he went on. "He'd give anything to reach the goal. He'll start by listening to his parents to dress neatly, to act well, and try to be something of a model.

"He'll get his hair cut on schedule without argument. He'll do all the young boy's duties around home 'cause he won't want to be cast aside on the athletic field."

Crisler was a stickler on these thoughts, and he voiced them at every opportunity. And now that the girls' sports are growing, he would have the same feeling about them.

ASIDE FROM all these things, Crisler pointed out that having a boy or girl on the school athletic teams draws a family closer together

"You'll see a proud father at the football games or the girls basketball games, rooting for his offspring and his or her team. It makes a wonderful combination."

And most of all, there are times when the boy from a poor family earns a scholarship that enables him to get a college education that the family couldn't otherwise afford.

Now you know why Fritz Crisier, a stickler for discipline, would enjoy reading in the papers that government and school officials are centering more attention on athletic programs for students.

How to forget Miss America

I HAD LUNCH with Miss America once. Not the current one, nor her immediate predecessors.

It was the Miss America of some year I can't remember. The name Debbie Byrant sticks with me, however. She was a tall, corn-fed girl from Kansas, very charming, very pretty.

I was invited so I could write a newpaper story about Miss America's visit to Westland. Two other intruders were invited because they had something to do with the event that Miss America was helping to promote. I don't recall the event or much of the conversation.

What I remember most was the baked Alaska that topped off lunch. It was delicious. It remains to this day one of the three or four best desserts I have ever enjoyed.

IT WASN'T until the controversy over Vanessa Williams and the Miss America contest that I remembered that lunch.

After thinking about how easily one forgets Miss Americas, I began to wonder: Is anyone as interested in Miss America contests and Vanessa Williams' shenanigans as the news writers, columnists and broadcasters would have us believe?

Or is this another case of the news-entertainment organizations dispensing to the public what they think the public wants to read and hear about?



I can understand that people would be interested in the fact that a Miss America posed nude and the photographs were published in one of America's best-selling male fantasy magazines.

BUT THE ensuing Vanessa Williams publicity barrage and the concern over the fate of Miss America contests are a bit much. If the contest can survive the loss of Bert Parks, certainly it can get over a Miss America posing in risque photos.

What's the preoccupation with the Vanessa Williams/Miss America story? I suspect it is the kind of thing that people who dispense news-entertainment watch for, the way a man marooned on an island scans the horizon for signs of a ship. It is an issue that really isn't important but one that can be packaged in the gaudy wrapping of sexual misbehavior in the celebrity world.

The coverage continues a trend. The Miss America contest wasn't organized by women to benefit aspiring young contestants. It was organized by men promoting

Atlantic City who knew that photographs of good-looking young women cavorting around in bathing suits in the surf of the Atlantic Ocean would surely capture the attention of newspaper editors across the country and that the editors would print the photographs and that husbands would then turn to wife and say, "Hey Betty, Instead of going to the Catskills on our vacation, why don't we go to Atlantic City?" and Betty would think ever so briefly about Miss America and how she would feel being Miss America and would say, "Yea."

THE CONTEST is almost an anachronism and survives as a TV event that allows us folks back home to mildly ogle or root for our favorite contestant. Mostly it is a diversion only somewhat more realistic than the Love Boat reruns it competes with. It is also in keeping with the trend of our society to churn out diversions and entertainments that keep us absorbed during our non-working hours.

The eternal quest for no-risk happiness and the abhorrence of thinking about the vexing world problems that we can do nothing about leads us to the point where we are buffered and aspirined by cotton-candy entertainment and junk TV, media, hype controversies and celebrity scandals, ball games and pennant races.

Maybe even baked Alaska.

egislators approve plan to protect wilderness

Here's how area members of Congress were re-corded on major roll call votes Sept. 6 through

HOUSE

Wilderness area - By vote of 368 for and 41 against, the House passed and sent to the White House a bill (HR 1437) to permanently protect nearly two percent of California as national wilder-

The bill includes 1.8 million of the state's 100million acres in the federal wilderness system, and releases another 1.8-million pristine acres for timbering, recreation and other commercial devel-

This is one of 20 state wilderness bills that Congress has approved or is considering under a 1964 law. The affected states are those with sizeable National Forest Service holdings.

Wilderness advocates say at least 2 percent of the lower 48 states will be protected from develop-ment when the 1964 law is fully implemented.

Supporter James Weaver, D-Ore., said "there is probably more asphaltic surface in this country than there is wilderness."

Opponent Norman Shumway, R-Calif., said the "reflects the trendy fantasy that public lands are sacred only to the degree they escape human

Members voting yes favored the bill. Voting yes: Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth. Dennis Hertel, D-Harper Woods, William Ford, D-Taylor, Sander Levin, D-Southfield, William Broomfield, R-Birmingham.

Extradition - The House rejected, 103 for and 307 against, a bill (HR 3347) to update laws under which foreigners are extradited from the U.S. This is the first proposed modernization in nearly a cen-

Many members who favor modernization voted against the bill because it was debated under a short-cut parliamentary procedure that prevented amendments. They favored amending the bill to make it more palatable to President Reagan.

A leading area of controversy was the bill's "political offense doctrine." This prohibited extradition when the foreign national demonstrated the alleged crime for which he was being called home was political, except when the alleged offense was heinous or severe.

The Administration and many members voting no felt the doctrine was too protective of international criminals under the banner of human rights.

Supporter William Hughes, D-N.J., said U.S. extradition laws "are sadly out of date and in need of

Opponent Dan Lungren, R-Calif., said such an important element of the president's anti-crime package should be subjected to full debate and floor

Members voting yes favored passing the extradition reform bill under a closed parliamentary procedure ;that blocked pro-Administration amend-Voting yes: Levin.

Voting no: Pursell, Hertel, Broomfield. Not voting: Ford.

State board seeks opinions on certification

ber and October on proposed changes in the Michigan Teacher Certification Code.

Locally, a hearing is set for 2-5 p.m. and 7-8:30 p.m. Oct. 2 in the Discussatorium Room, Wayne County Intermediate School District, 33500 Van Born, Wayne.

Other public meetings are scheduled for Grand Rapids, Lansing, Traverse City, Mt. Clemens and Marquette.

State Superintendent of Public Instruction Phillip E. Runkel said testimony at the hearings will be summarized and presented to the State Board be-

fore it takes action on the proposed rule changes.

Revisions have been proposed by the Certification Code Study Commission named by the state Board of Education last year to make recommendations on a broad range of issues concerning teacher preparation and certification.

The proposed changes would:

• Establish a third level of certification, which would be required of teachers providing instruction at the middle grade level. Presently, Michigan has two levels of certification - elementary and sec-

 The elementary level certificate would be valid for grades K-4, the middle level certificate would be valid for grades 5-8, and the high school level certificate would be valid for grades 9-12.

• Require that all teachers seeking certification be required to take a three-hour course in the education of exceptional children.

An experimental program will make 20 under-graduate tuition scholarships available to retired

The "Retired Persons Scholarship Program" is available to candidates who are at least 60 years old, are high school graduates and demonstrate the potential to succeed at college-level studies and have no income-bearing employment outside the

Recipients will be required to pay only \$50 registration fee per term plus any laboratory course

These students will be classified as campus inticulants (CM) during their first year in the profession, and may elect courses for regular credit, for suit/fail credit or for audit credit. They will have the choice of continuing as CM's or seeking admission of continuing as CM's or seeking as CM's or se students will be classified as camp

Banking interest — The Senate voted, 76 for and 20 against, to prevent banks from receiving interest on certain deposits they are required to make with the Federal Reserve, the nation's central

This occurred during debate on S 2851, a major banking deregulation bill that awaited final pas-

The vote killed a provision under which banks and other depository institutions were to begin reaping interest on a portion of their Fed balances. Interest was to be paid on reserves held against

Super NOW and money market deposits.

The Fed requires federally chartered banking institutions to maintain reserves against a percentage of their profits. It uses the deposits to regulate

the nation's money supply.

William Proxmire, D-Wis., said the provision would cost taxpayers \$4 billion over the next six years "with the bulk of the payment going to a


mere handful of giant money-center banks."

John Heinz, R-Pa., defended the payment of interest as a necessary incentive for banks to seek out commercial deposits and thus remain competitive with other financial institutions.

Senators voting no wanted the government to start paying interest on certain balances that banks must maintain with the Fed.

GM's pet trash burner could save fuel oil

The scientific name is "resource recovery." But engineers at a General Motors plant in Detroit call it "making energy out of something we didn't

Ray Tessier and his fellow engineers at the GM accessory manufacturing plant on W. Fort Street have a hard time containing their enthusiasm as their pet \$8-million project nears completion.

The project is a trash-incinerator addition to the existing powerhouse. It's special. It has a designed capability to recover energy from the burning process to do work.

So instead of using fuel oil in the existing boilers to generate steam, GM will use trash. "We are talking about saving over one million gallons of fuel oil a year," said plant engineer Tessier.

THE IDEA is to take solid waste generated at the Fort Street plant strictly the paper, cardboard and wood scrap variety — and burn it in two large, brick-lined ovens.

Heat obtained from a two-stage burning process will be used for heating water to boiling temperatures. The resulting steam will run the manufacturing processes of the plant across the

Plant officials say the only threat to the success of their project would be rejection of the Wayne County Solid Waste Management Plan by local cities and townships.

The plan governs disposal of solid waste throughout the county. It was recently approved by the 15-member County Commission. It still must be approved by 29 of the 43 city councils and township boards in Wayne County and by the state Department of Natural Resources before implementation.

A moratorium on all new waste facilities is in effect until the plan is ap-

"WE ARE HOPING that the solid waste plan will be passed," said Daniel Downey, chief of power plant operation. "We hope to be a part of that plan, and we see no reason why we wouldn't since we are following the intent of Act 641 by doing resource recovery."

Act 641 is the state law that mandates Michigan's 83 counties to develop solid waste plans to provide for safe and effective disposal of non-hazardous garbage. (A separate act governs toxic

"Seventy percent of this facility's capabilities will not be utilized until we become part of the plan," Downey said. The problem, he explained, is getting enough trash because "it is very inefficient for the incinerator to be running below capacity."

The manufacturing plant generates 25 to 30 tons of burnable trash a day. But the incinerator is capable of burning 100 tons a day. "Our idea is to accept trash from other area GM plants,"

Downey said that accepting trash from butside the Fort Street facility is impossible unless the Wayne County plan is adopted. "That (failure of the plan) means 70 tons of trash per day will not be burned but landfilled," he

THE ENERGY recovery plant was originally proposed 1) to save energy and 2) to recover solid waste disposal costs. Plant engineer Tessier ex-


"Solid waste is very expensive to move from the plant. Removal involves paying to have the trash hauled to the landfill and then paying a tipping fee to have the trash put into the landfill." He put the cost of removal as high as \$100,000 a year.

According to plant superintendent James Reynolds, who hatched the incinerator idea five years ago, the new facility would save landfill costs and approximately \$750,000 spent yearly by the company for fuel oil. These projected savings were instrumental in keeping the Fort Street manufacturing operation open after an announced closing in 1982.

"It was determined that this would be one of the projects that would help make us competitive," Reynolds said.

Reynolds described the effort to gain management approval for the incinerator as "an uphill battle. At first, people at the divisional level of the company were aghast at the idea - it was experimental technology."

BIASES AGAINST incinerators had to be overcome, too. "People think of incinerators as smelly and smoky," Reynolds said. "It was hard to break through that mind-set. We had to assure them that we would not be pollut-




Reynolds said that in the lower chamber of the incinerator, where temperatures hover at 1,100-1,200 F, there isn't enough oxygen to burn the waste materials, so the trash is converted to a combustible gas. This gas rises to the upper chamber, where more oxygen is present and burns at temperatures topping 2,000 F. "At 2,000 degrees, there is nothing left," Reynolds said.

Downey added that GM expects a 30:1 reduction in trash volume, coupled with only 2 to 3 percent ash residue. The sterile ash would be landfilled.

BOTH ENGINEERS agree their facility is just the start of many interesting things in resource recovery.

They speak of using the steam to generate electricity sometime in the future. They also speak of plans for regional energy recovery incinerators that would handle trash for groups of


"There is no question that the idea will spread," Reynolds said. "Ford is trying a similar concept in Saline, and the company is planning another facility in Lansing.



Members of the International Plastic Modelers Society (IPMS) take their hobby very seriously.

One club member, for instance, photographed the inside of a helicopter at Selfridge Air Force Base so he could make his model chopper authentic in every detail.

Another member modeled his American P-47 fighter plane after a specific plane that was captured and flown by the Germans in World War II.

This kind of research and attention to detail is typical of club members, said Stewart Bailey of Redford, secretary of the society's Livonia chapter and one of the chapter's founding mem-

"And it makes you great in Trivial Pursuit," added club member Jim Hayes of Canton.

THE MODELERS' art will be on display this Saturday at the Metro Airport Ramada Inn in Romulus as the chapter hosts the Region IV Invitational 1984. More than 300 models will be on dis-

play, including aircraft, tanks, ships, cars and trucks, as well as such unusual items as spacecraft, dinosaurs and figures. A similar convention hosted by the chapter in 1982 drew 400 people, Bailey said.

Registration will be open from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m., and the models will be on display until 5 p.m. A banquet, speaker and awards presentation will follow at 7 p.m.

A total of 175 awards will be given out, including one for best overall ship and aircraft, said convention chairman Skip Temple of Livonia.

'While it's called an invitational it's open to anyone who wants to come down and register a model," Bailey said. "You don't have to belong to

Many of the models are customized from store-bought kits or made from scratch. But the convention also will have a category for models built strictly according to the kit directions.

The average modeler puts 20 to 25 hours into a model, Temple said, although some have been known to put as many as 4,000 hours into an extremely complicated model. Temple himself put 1,000 hours into his motorized river tug, which he built from scratch.

THE LIVONIA IPMS chapter is the only one in the Detroit area. Founded in 1974, it has 36 members, some from as far away as Ann Arbor and Pontiac. The local chapter is part of a national organization that is in turn part of an international organization that includes chapters in Canada, Mexico, England, West Germany, Australia and New Zealand

The meetings give members a chance to discuss new model kits, common problems and techniques. Hayes, for instance, recently gave a talk on weathering a model to give it a more realistic look.

Bailey said any model builder, whether beginner or old pro, is welcome to join the club. IPMS meets from 7:30 to 10 p.m. the second and fourth Tuesday of every month at Holmes Junior High School, on Newburgh between Five Mile and Six Mile roads in Livonia.

EXTRADITE - The House rejected, 103 for and 307 against, a bill (HR 3347) to update laws under which foreigners are extradited from the U.S. This is the first proposed moderniza-

tion in nearly a century.

Many members who favor modernization voted against the bill because it was debated under a short-cut parliamentary procedure that prevented amendments. They favored amending the bill to make it more palatable to President Reagan.

A leading area of controversy was the bill's "political offense doctrine." This prohibited extradition when the foreign national demonstrated the alleged crime for which he was being called home was political, except when

The Administration and many members voting no felt the doctrine was too protective of international criminals under the banner of human rights.

Future coalitions now being formed

To a politician, every election is the "most important in history" or "a turning point.

Not quite so, according to Robert Teeter of Market Opinion Research. But he does say the elections of the 1980s and 1990s "will establish whatever coalition will govern" for awhile.

Teeter spoke to a caucus of the Michigan delegation to the Republican National Convention in Dallas last month. His analysis made it clear why Republican incumbent Ronald Reagan is concentrating on the flag and very broad issues, and why Democratic hopeful Walter Mondale is targeting specific is-sues, in their drives for four years in

"WE'RE IN THE midst of a political realignment that began in the 60s and '70s," Teeter began. "That was when the old New Deal coalition came

But the pollster said it's too early to tell what kind of new forces will control the process because it remains to be seen what the "baby boom" voters will do. "It will take until 1988 or 1990 to tell us what it (the new coalition) will be," he said. For Reagan, Teeter said, the best

strategy is to concentrate on "the simple, big issues: peace and prosperity,

the economy and foreign policy.
"That strategy should be directed at

the whole country geographically.
"The economic issue is dominant. It's

what the voters want to talk about. And foreign policy is more important than it was in 1980 and '82."



Is CEP concept really working?

ERHAPS YOU read about this incident in Monday's Observer. After the Plymouth Canton-Plymouth Salem football game last Friday, a Salem coach went to congratulate a Canton player. The

exchange went like this: "You played a great game," the coach said. "Don't talk to me," the player shouted back.

"Hey, you played a great game."

"Get away from me!

Do you know who the participants in that scene were? The player was Canton's Scott Campbell. The Salem coach was John Campbell. Father and

It was an ugly scene, that is for sure. Feelings were hurt and tears shed on both sides. There are no winners in a situation like that. Everyone loses.

BUT, WHO is to blame? You can't blame the kid. All you can do is feel sorry for the parent. No, the blame is on the system. This system,

unique to the Plymouth-Canton Community School District is known as random selection. What this system does, via a computer chip, is

select which high school a student will attend. The student, when in the eighth grade, randomly draws a chip. If the chip is red, the student goes to

Plymouth Canton. If the chip is blue, the student will attend Plymouth Salem. The computer doesn't give a damn if the student's father is a teacher and a coach at

Plymouth Salem. If he draws a red chip, he's going to Canton. Who cares what effect this has on the The computer doesn't give a damn if three previous family members went to Salem. If the

fourth kid draws red, it's on to Canton. The computer doesn't give a damn about any of those things. And neither, apparently, does the Plymouth-Canton administration. The administration says that the system works well to keep a balance of population in the two schools, that academically and socially, the system is the

best there is. "People just don't understand the frustration that goes on because of this," said John Campbell. "They don't see what it can do to a family."

CAMPBELL TRIED to fight the administration and random selection when his boy chipped out Canton. He didn't get very far.

"John Telford (a school administrator who has since left the district) told me this at the time, and I can quote him almost perfectly, 'John, this will be a very healthy experience for you," Campbell said.

Real healthy experience, his kid won't even talk to him, doesn't even want him near him because he coaches the rival football team.

Now Campbell is about to go through it all again with his eighth grade daughter. She, too, has

"It's going to be tough. She's a Rock all the way." he said. "I'm going to fight it this time. It may not do any good, but I want her to know I'm in her

See, what is happening here is something that normally isn't tolerated in a free society. The school district administration is making decisions that affect the family - and the only recourse the family has is to move away or pull their children out of the school district (something that doesn't bother area private schools at all).

"It's (random selection) a fair and equitable way to balance the school's population," said superintendent of schools Dr. John Hoben. "In many ways, it reduces tension between the schools. The two schools are really carbon copies of each other. They use the same facilities, the same classrooms. It's all part of the concept of the educational park.

"We have no desire to change the system. We haven't heard any major complaints about it. The few that we've had doesn't constitute a majority. If we make changes for a few, we'll just have to open

"THE ADMINISTRATION makes decisions that are good for them and assumes they will be good for everyone else, too. Well, that's not always the case," Campbell said.

Ron Krueger, Salem wrestling coach, will soon be in the same boat as Campbell. His son will soon be drawing his chip. Krueger has said he will quit coaching if his kid draws red.

The Salem football coach is against random selection for another reason. He's tired of playing football games in front of empty stands.

"There's no way for anyone in this community to develop a loyalty to a school. Nobody knows what school they will be going to. If your brother went to Salem, there's no telling where your younger sister will end up," he said.

Hoben, though, argues that in terms of academics, the random selection process works. And few will disagree. The educational park concept is ideal for learning — and yes, that is of the utmost importance.

But, athletics are a major part of the total learning experience. And it's the athletes, their families and the athletic programs that are suffering from the random selection process large segment of the community that should not be

Athletes and their families are forced to ask this question: is it worth going to this school at the expense of family harmony?

Some will say yes, some will say no. Some will have no choice. Those that say no, though, will take their kids out of the district and then everyone

Farmington's cross country team is usually in the money at the Schoolcraft Invitational.

But on Saturday, the Falcons wouldn't settle for just place or show. They found themselves in the winner's circle for a change with 36 points.

Westland John Glenn was a distant second with 76 and Redford Union was third with 36 in the boys

The future, however, looks nothing but bright for Farmington.

Stebbins, running in only his fourth varsity meet, is a sophomore along with Inch. Kratt, who moonlights as a kicker on the Farmington football team, is a junior along with Lawton.

"These kids are just finding out what it's all, about," Young said. "They're just learning the

HOLE NO. 6 - Like No. 4, this is a 386-yard, par-4 that doglegs left but can be played shorter by hitting right at the green (saving 30-40 yards). The green is banked, which allows the player to hit right at the flag without worrying too much about a lot of roll.

An easy birdle hole for the long hitters, No. 6 is an easy par for all

HOLE NO. 7 — A short (135 yards) and straight par-3 shot from an elevated tee to a 7,500-square-foot green.

An easy par with birdie possibilities,

but the putt could come from 60-70 feet

HOLE NO. 8 - A 374-yard par-4, straightaway with out of bounds from tee to green along the left side. Some tee shots will catch a bunker on the right edge of the fairway. Green slopes down from back to front.

This is a good birdie hole as long as you don't have to putt downhill.

HOLE NO. 9 - This is the second best hole on the front nine: 390 yards, par-4 straightaway. A creek crosses the fairway at 240 yards and is down a hill. The creek drains into a lake on the right side of the fairway only 200 yards from the tee.

Don't use a driver off the tee. Long hitters should try a three or four iron, short hitters a four or five wood. The second shot is slightly uphill to a green bunkered on the right, left and left front. The green is a good one, with several tricky breaks in it.

Bogey this hole and you won't lose too many strokes to your competitors.

HOLE NO. 10 - A straight 460-yard par-5 without much trouble other than a green that slopes severely from front

Plays like a par-4 for longer hitters. An easy par for all contestants.

HOLE NO. 11 - Don't let the distance on this par-4 - 356 yards - fool you. Trees line both sides of the fairway, with a small valley 150 yards from the tee.

Don't use a wood off the tee. There's a big green to shoot at, provided the tee shot is in the fairway. Play this one for

HOLE NO. 12 - There are trees right and left and even one in the center of the fairway of this 317-yard par-4. There's also a slight dogleg left.

The tee shot must be in play, 150-160 yards and straight. The green's a small one, but a tee shot in play makes this hole a birdie possibility.

HOLE NO. 13 - This is the easiest hole on the course, only 305 yards for a par-4. A long hitter can drive it on or to the fringe of the green. The short hitter should only have a short pitch shot to

Some good pin positions will make birdies a little more difficult. Still, this hole is no trouble.

HOLE NO. 14 — Play your tee shot to the right and you'll be okay here. It's a 370-yard par-4, straight away, with lots of room to the right but out of bounds to the left. A good tee shot leaves a five iron to the green for the high handicap and a nine iron for the long hitter.

The green has some subtle breaks in

it that make the birdie attempt tougher. But birdies are a definite possibility - just don't hit to the left.

HOLE NO. 15 — This is a super 219-yard, par-3 from an elevated tee to a large green. A creek crosses the fairway 50 yards in front of the tee, where it really doesn't come into play. But it also runs along the left side of the hole, where it can penalize a hooked tee shot. On the right side are trees from tee

to green. Par here is very good.

HOLE NO. 16 — It's out of bounds all the way down the left side and woods line the right side for 185 yards of this 494-yard par-5. The tee shot is most important here; the fairway opens up after 200 yards. The green is well-trapped on right and left and plays very tricky.

Very few will hit this green in two shots. Play it for par.

New insurance policy may be better than old

While most prices have been going up, the price of life insurance policy has been coming down.

Also, the life insurance industry has been introducing a variety of new products. If you have a policy more than two years old, you should look for a better deal.

Lower Costs and More Choice

Insurance companies have been cutting prices for several years. These cuts reflect longer lifespans, insurers' higher investment earnings and intensi-

fied competition. Deregulation of interest rates has pressured insurance companies to design products that give the buyer an opportunity to earn more on policy cash

jor development has been the insurance companies' adoption of the Universal Life (UL) policy. Several companies are expected to introduce this year a new UL policy that will permit you to choose the kind of securities in which the company invests the cash accumu-

Here is a brief description of some of the newer policies (besides UL).

Excess Interest

Premiums are fixed, and the company credits interest at rates that may change. One such policy invests in intermediate-term, fixed-dollar securities. A male age 40 would pay annual premiums of \$613 for \$100,000 death benefit and, assuming an 11% gross yield on investments, would have a cash value at the end of 20 years of

holder has a choice of investments. For example, one popular policy lets holders choose one or more of five funds: money market, intermediate and longterm government bonds, and blue-chip and riskier growth stocks.

A \$100,000 policy would cost a 40-year-old male \$628 a year for 10 years. Then the premium would jump to \$948. It would jump to \$1,588 after the 20th year, when the cash value — assuming a 14% gross yield — would be \$16,823 and the death benefit of \$119,014. There is no guaranteed yield.

The growth in investment-oriented

policies hasn't stopped the insurance companies from devising still more variations on traditional policies. If you need a special coverage, just ask for it. Chances are you will get it.

Compare Old with New Policy

If you have an old policy, it's time to review it carefully. Here are some steps to take to compare old and possible replacement policies:

 You need professional help, so talk to your own or a new agent, or to a financial planner.

 The basic information on any poli-icy and a new one, keep the old. cy is the "ledger statement" showing present and future premiums, cash and surrender values. Your agent should get a statement from each company involved and probably can explain it to





Meadow Brook

Theater's artistic director has enjoyed a long stay

ERENCE KILBURN CAME to Meadow Brook Theatre in 1969 "just to direct two plays. I never expected to stay."

But shortly after Kilburn arrived, John Fernald left as head of the professional theater company and Kilburn became its artistic director. He has continued to guide the theater, started in 1966, to its coming 19th season on campus at Oakland University near Rochester.

Kilburn has seen the regional theater's season subscription memberships go from 10,000 in 1970, when he took over, to a peak of 16,000 in 1979.

It dropped during the recession that hit the entertainment business hard, but subscribers are on the rise again. "We expect to have this year about 12,500, about 800 more than last year," Kilburn said.

During an interview in his office, downstairs in Matilda Wilson Hall where the theater is housed, Kilburn was surrounded by clutter - all of a special kind - magazines about the theater and books on plays abound.

KILBURN, WHO started his career as a child actor in England, will always be remembered for portraying Tiny Tim in one film version of the Charles Dickens' classic "A Christmas Carol."

Coincidentally, a musical version of "A Christmas Carol" is one of Meadow Brook Theatre's all-time biggest

Kilburn said Agatha Christie and musicals are the most popular productions everywhere. "A Christmas Carol," which has been presented for two consecutive seasons at Meadow Brook, will be presented again this Christmas season. For its third year, consummate actor Booth Colman will star.

As Kilburn answered questions about Meadow Brook Theatre, screams punctuated his comments. This was no mystery, however, the cast is in rehearsal for the season's

opener, "Sherlock Holmes," directed by John Ulmer
"The heroine is being tortured by villains," Kilburn explained with a smile. "This is the classic Sherlock Holmes play that Conan Doyle was involved in writing. We're doing it with a slight tongue-in-cheek.

WHEN JOHN Fernald established the theater, "It was the John Fernald Company at the Meadow Brook The-atre," Kilburn recalled. "It never was called the Meadow Brook Theatre. John did a marvelous job of getting the theater started."

There was a difference of opinion between Fernald and the university on what direction the theater was to go, Kilburn said, and Fernald decided to leave.

"I was very impressed with what had already been ac-complished in 1970," he said. But things were not running all that smoothly. "There was a danger the theater would







Fernald had come from England's Royal Academy of Dramatic Art to Meadow Brook, and during his tenure there was an emphasis on classic playwrights such as Shakespeare, Chekhov

"Most people felt it was a bit too heavy," Kilburn said.

Now, by contrast, some theatergoers and critics complain that Meadow Brook's season is too light, with too many crowd pleasers, rather than plays that make you think or suffer.

NOT AT ALL perturbed, Kilburn said, "I've never felt too guilty about the fact that we do popular program-ming. We do a lot of Shakespeare and Shaw. We're not that out of balance."

He said the theater has done "a sprinkling of plays when they were new." These have included "That Championship Season," "When You Comin' Back, Red Ryder," "On Golden Pond" and last season's "The Dining

"What we do have here is an audience that's really enjoying its theater,"

People write Kilburn letters. One letter of thanks for good performances came from a couple of Meadow Brook patrons who were leaving the area after 10 years. Others have come from young people who first attended the theater when they were in junior high school and asked about going into the theater as a career.

"I'm pleased that Meadow Brook has that relationship with the audience. I think that's very much what regional theater is about," Kilburn said.

THIS GENTLE, almost pixyish man declared, "There's a straightforwardness and down-to-earth attitude about people in the Midwest that I really respect." He laughed softly. "I lived very many years in Hollywood."

Asked to name the all-time hit shows during his years at Meadow Brook, Kilburn said, "For me, a landmark play was "The Crucible' by Arthur Miller, done in 1970, the first year I was artistic dirctor. It really took off. We saw the way the audience responded, they didn't just want light fare.'

He said that for each year you'd almost have to pick two hits, one artistically exciting and the other a commercial success

Round the Moon" in 1978.

More are "Charley's Aunt" in 1979 and 1980 ("Charley's Aunt" and "Christmas Carol" are probably the two biggest hits. "We had standing room only for almost every performance."), "A Summer Remembered" in 1979 ("A new play, by Charles Nolte. It appealed to the middle-west audience. People still ask me about that."), "Another Part of the Forest" in 1980, "Othello" and "On Golden Pond" in 1981, "A Christmas Carol" in 1982 and 1983 and 'Cyrano de Bergerac" and "The Dining Room" ("a surprise success"), also in

SINCE ARRIVING at Meadow Brook, Kilburn has appeared as a performer only in "Ah, Wilderness!" — the second play he directed. The actor who was orginally cast got a role in New York, and Kilburn stepped into the part. He found directing and playing in the show a hectic experience.

He also has filled in temporarily when an actor couldn't appear, due to sickness or injury. "It's not something I like to do," Kilburn said. In all instances, it was with plays he directed. In "The Merchant of Venice," he was onstage reading from the script.

MEADOW BROOK has featured

many well-established performers in its productions and some unknowns who later won acclaim as stage, TV and movie stars. Favorites at the theater have included Booth Colman, Jeane Arnold and William Le Massena.

Of Le Massena, Kilburn said, "He was a stalwart in the early days. Then he was in the long-running hit 'Death-trap' five years on Broadway and came back after that. He worked for minimum while we were building up."

Kilburn said Le Massena likes the lifestyle Meadow Brook offers, with opportunity for hiking and relaxing in the suburban, countrylike atmosphere. Actors live in comfortable, big mobile homes on campus during a show's run.

"Good character men, that's the hardest to get." Many able actors who have reached a point in their careers where they are fairly successful no longer enjoy the road, Kilburn said. Meadow Brook's old favorites "real-

ly enjoy working with younger actors. That stimulates the young actor and makes good chemistry.

"A DROP OF energy that makes a performance come alive is what goes on between actors on stage. A good director can only lead them to it," he

Kilburn considers casting one of the most difficult parts of his job. Often there are several actors he would be happy to see in a particular role, but none of them is available at the time.

For "The Little Foxes," he had three or four actresses in mind for the role of Regina but couldn't get any of them.

He cast actress Polly Holliday "on her reputation only. We had never met." Not long after, she became a smash hit as the waitress Flo on TV's "Alice"

For Shaw's "Man and Superman,"

Kilburn was having difficulty casting the leading character, Jack Tanner.
"The part is often played by an actor
much too old," he said. Kilburn went to
New York, auditioned a number of actors, none of whom was right.

The play is about the life force. The last person walked in for the audition, and he looked like the life force." That's how Kilburn cast William Hurt. who has since become an immensely popular actor who starred in the movie "The Big Chill" and is now on Broadway in "Hurlyburly."

IN 1969, Kilburn was teaching at UCLA. When he came as guest director to Meadow Brook, Fernald asked him

to teach at the Academy of Dramatic Art, which was then affiliated with Meadow Brook on campus. "Seven years ago, it became too ex-pensive to continue the academy so it was phased out," Kilburn said. "We

were very sorry." Economics is always a tough part of planning for the future in Meadow Brook's enterprises. Kilburn hopes someday to establish a second theater, perhaps a small 70-seat one, where experimental plays would be produced.

He also would like to see a return to

a more extensive touring season for Meadow Brook shows that go to small towns and communities throughout the state. State funding for the tour, which started in 1974, has been cut, and the tour went from three weeks down to five days, up to two weeks last year. Meadow Brook Theatre seats 608 pa-

trons in an attractive auditorium with good sightlines. General admission tickets are \$10 for a Wednesday mati-nee, \$11.50 the lowest evening price and \$14 tops for Saturday night.

"We have a very lively and intelli-gent audience," Kilburn said.





Across the Sinai Desert to a timeless monastery

RIVING ACROSS the desolate Sinai Desert in Egypt is probably never easy. But those of us on our way to visit the distant St. Catherine's Monastery are finding it rough going as we bounce around on the hard seats of a fast-moving Toyota.

We eight tourists are sitting on two boards running lengthwise in the vehicle, four to a side facing each

The trip originated in Eilat, the southernmost city of Israel. It features a multi-national cast. In the front seat is a Bedouin driver moving the car along in the back are also from many countries. I hear Austria, England, the Netherlands and Denmark mentioned

Not the flat, white sandbox kind of desert, this arid area is more tan of hue, and looked down upon by treeless beautiful mountains. In fact, we are on our way toward the most famous of these mountains. Mt. Sinai, where Moses received the Ten Commandants.

AT ITS BASE in 600 A.D., Justinian the Great, a Byzantine emperor, had St. Catherine's Monastery built. It is said to be near the burning bush where God told Moses to free the Israelites from Egyptian

The monastery will not be our only stop. We will have lunch at a village of the Bedouin, nomadic people who wander through the desert with their animals. From the car we spot them in their flowing robes walking slowly behind their goats.

At about 11 a.m. we ease our suffering bodies from the car and start walking toward the outer wall of the 14-centuries-old monastery whose collection of icons and mosaics has brought to its door, among others, a team from National Geographic.

Unexpected sight: a number of solar panels for heating water are on an out-building. Next we see a lovely, peaceful garden which for centuries has been producing vegetables for the table of Greek Orthodox monks who live here. It offers the reminder that there had to be a local source of water for the monks to survive

Here and there we see Bedouin, who do the work of the religious complex.

WE PASS through the wall by means of a small entryway designed to discourage attacks by local tribesmen in earlier eras. A mosque erected by Moslems, who also honor Moses, helped to further reduce neighborhood hostility. The mosque, together with the nearby Christian bell tower, makes a nice ecumenical picture.



streets paved with local stone. We see lovely arches and architectural variations in the buildings erected

The jewel of these structures is the Church of the Transfiguration, plain outside, but rich inside with ornamental candelabra, and a marble, mosaic floor covered occasionally by rugs. We are then taken to view several icons, religious paintings which are objects of veneration in the Greek Orthodox Church.

The monastery has an unusually large collection of these pictures. Thousands were destroyed in the eighth century when Byzantine leaders began to view them as idols. But St. Catherine was so remote from the corridors of power that its icons were saved.

ACCORDING TO our guide the monastery has a collection of religious books second only to the Vatican. But the library as well as the monks' living quarters are usually off limits to tourists. As they did in 600 A.D., monks still go to St. Catherine's to study and pray in private.

A different way of protecting their privacy and security was used in more perilous times. On an upper floor our attention is drawn to a rope, a pulley and a trap door. Long ago a visitor would stand be-neath the door and call to those above.

A wary monk would drop a basket on the end of a rope. The stranger placed his credentials in it. It was then drawn up and the papers scrutinized. If all was well, the basket was dropped and the visitor hauled

Regrettably our visit is too short to learn much more. Like the Bedouin village to come the monastery is mainly a visual experience, with little time to dig deeply. A final visual experience I could have done without: On our way to the car we are led into a room containing countless skulls and bones of the monks who lived there.

The three-and-a-half hour journey back to Eilat is just as bumpy as the earlier one, but somehow with much to think about it doesn't seem so rugged.

The trip was arranged by Kopel Tours of Eilat, and cost \$50. Eilat can be reached by plane from either Tel Aviv or Jerusalem.



Jay Asquini puts focus on people

People are important to Jay Asquini.

They are the young writer-photographer's favorite subjects for his work. And they were featured in a book he and another artist put together last year, called "DownRiver & UpStream."

"I photograph a lot of equipment in my work," Asquini said. "(When not at work) I concentrate on the people."

ALTHOUGH ASQUINI now lives, works and plays baseball in Southfield, and has done so for the past 31/2 years, he still feels ties to his old Livonia neighborhood. This has inspired some of his poetry and the book.

"I still feel like a Livonian," he said.

Asquini's business is called Asquini Inc. Working from his home, Asquini produces brochures for businesses and consumer products. For one pamphlet, he took artistic shots of screws. He made a special setting on his patio for another about different types of wiring.

"When you have to be creative, everything works," Asquini said.

ASQUINI USES writing skills as well. For example, when preparing a brochure on an architect, Asquini asked the architect to tell him about his de-

Fondness for the close-knit Livonia neighborhood he grew up in prompted Asquini to write poetry about the fictional Peoples family, which consists of Joe and Marge Peoples and their children Joey and Molly. The poems carry those characters' reflections on a variety of things, such as passing a VFW hall or going fishing.

"I wanted to create an Everymantype character that was up-to-date," Asquini said. "I wanted to show that there was some depth to suburban life.

"I grew up in a very unusual neighborhood in Livonia," he continued. "All of us (neighbors) were like brothers and sisters. There are 30 to 35 kids I've known for 28 years. It's still old times. There were no fences, everyone knew

THE IDEA for "DownRiver & Up-Stream" came about when Asquini de cided to put the poems and stories in a book, "in an effort to just give some status to suburbia or to the neighborhood," he said. The book, published in 1983, was five years in the making. Its co-author was William Pelletier, a member of Asquini's writing group.

Pelletier wrote poetry and took photographs from the extreme northeast corner of Vermont for the book. Pelletier's photography subjects were rivers, granite and tree roots.

For his subjects to accompany the Peoples poems in the book, Asquini selected people in the downriver communities of Lincoln Park. Allen Park.

Ecorse, Melvindale, Taylor and Wyandotte. Wyandotte was where he had been doing some carpentry work.

FEATURED IN "DownRiver & Up-Stream" are quiet portraits of people at work or play. They may be in a shop or lounge, or on the street.

"I like eye contact," Asquini said. "It's that Midwest honesty I guess.

"In a real neighborhood, you know the druggist, you know the guy who works at the gas station."

The book was picked up by a library or two and landed Asquini and Pelletier on the cover of "Photoworks," a photographer's trade journal. The two had a showing, with the same title as the book, at the Blixt Gallery in Ann Arbor.

EARLIER THIS year, Asquini was a runner-up in a poetry contest for the Detroit News Sunday magazine. His poem, which was about a girl biker, was meant to be humorous but generated some strong mail in opposition to it.

Other samples of Asquini's photographs are "black-on-black" portraits. These subjects are dressed in black in front of a black background.

Asquini's photographs will be featured at a show beginning in November at the Zoned: Gallery in Ann Arbor. These will be new works, of a "very special and very limited edition," according to Asquini. Their theme? That's secret at this time.

The gallery, which is operated by Pelletier, was named because of its size. Asquini explains with a laugh. Pelletier moved it from a 750-square-foot building to one measuring some 6,000 square feet. It seemed to take up so much space that it was suggested it be zoned for a gallery, as a community would zone an area commercial, or zone it residential.

"It was like moving to Montana," As-

"I blame my dad, he bought me a camera when I was 19," he replied. "And my mother works from slides when she does horse paintings. It was easy for me to operate it (the camera). I've been mechanically inclined. I was a maintenance man all through high school, and a carpenter. You just see how things work. I'm used to what they look like in rectangles."

Sharing your spirit is the key to good art

I really admire people who can get up in front of a crowd and perform, they just seem to love it.

When I was a teen-ager my voice went from squeak to mellow to low. So I sang bass in the church choir. Then the big chance came, when I was asked to sing bass in a quartet. Flattered and feeling quite cool, I accepted. D-day hit when we were to sing out of town. When we arrived in town someone showed us the paper. There it was, the

picture of our singing group. Alkaseltzer time was upon me

I lost all the coolness I ever possessed. I literally and instantly became sick. I had every symptom from Montezuma's revenge to the bubonic plague. The lead singer said to me, "Hey man, you don't look so good, you're probably nervous."

WITH MY last vestige of pride I said, "No, I'm nert novice jusht a lil'l sick n' stuff." So with all the finesse of an under-the-counter pharmacist, he handed me this little pill and said, "It's okay, these are my Mom's tranquilizers just take one about an hour before we go on." As time approached I became a six foot three tower of yellow jello. So I took the pill. From then on I began a yawning spell which lasted through most of our concert. I made it through the 45 minutes of singing, in fact it seemed like a dream. Maybe a bad dream, needless to say I abandoned the art of singing to better pursue another form of art. My short and rocky road of public singing has helped me to always appreciate a good performer.

In the last few weeks my wife and I were treated to some front row seats at Pine Knob and the Joe Louis Arena. By being so close to the performers, you could read and study the face behind the big name. These five well-known stars all equally possessed a vast amount of musical ability. But one performer in particular upon her entry on stage was different. There was a presence transcending her ability, a person speaking louder than the performer. There was an affinity shared by all of us with her in the concert.

Somehow she called to us in a voice unheard and pulled us closed with a hand unseen. Even though she was a lesser star than the one to follow, she is the star I will remember. She like all the others possessed an ability worthy sability only means "able to", then as a

of her hire. But she alone by the sincerity of her performance introduced herself to all of us and we all were thrilled to meet her.

I thought to myself how beautiful are the arts. Whether singing or acting or writing or painting. Whether dancing or scuipting or sketching or rhyming the expression and ability to express, is a God-sent gift.

BUT GIVEN equal ability, what sets the expression of one above the expression of another? Is the performance we viewed unlike a poem that steals your breath away or the actor whose performance catches hold of your emotions? Is the affinity we felt with that singer much different than a chunk of marble, tenderly shaped to an image that evokes our expression of awe? No, all artists possess the potential to share not just their ability but their spirit. That sharing of the spirit is what sets your particular art above the art of those merely going through the mo-tions. It is odd that you can struggle much of your life to acquire and per-fect your ability and then by its case of handling forget to ever share yourself
— the person behind the ability. Since

competent artist your work should show what you intend it should.

If you, therefore, set out with the intention to impress your audience with technical skill, you would then be like the talented performers we viewed who merely "did their thing" and left with applause. Perhaps we should set out intention and ability to a purer me-tive which is an honest expression of our own feelings. And in doing so our audience may not give us an applause but perhaps recall our work and feel an affinity with us - the person behind the ability. For example in my own work, commercial art demands so much of me that when I do paint or draw for myself the subjects will al-ways be geared toward nature (my first love). Nothing could give a purer praise to the creator than the beauty praise to the creator than the beauty and mystery of his own creations. And so hopefully my praise to the creator will be seen in my careful renderings of his creatures. If successful, those who pause to look at them may sense the spirit and intention behind the ability. An artist who stays safe within his or her own stoic art forms though able and talented shares nothing of them selves. So don't hide behind your ast ghine through it.



Stables will become exhibit hall

The riding hall and adjoining stables where Matilda Dodge Wilson and her daughter, Frances Dodge VanLennep, once rode and kept their horses will be transformed into a health/exhibition center for Oakland University.

Constructed in 1929 for Alfred and Matilda Wilson as a major part of the Meadow Brook Estate, the 20,000square-foot riding hall was considered "the Cadillac of indoor rings." It will be restored to keep its historic character and architectural design.

"They (hall and stables) were built for their saddle horses and Hackney ponies,"recalled Vera Donlin McIntrye, longtime secretary for Wilson.

Frances moved the saddle horses to a farm in Lexington, Ky., and took the Hackney ponies to (other) stables in Rochester (in the 1940s). Sometimes, she





Photographers, like all creative artists and top athletes, require practice. A concert pianist works daily on hand and sound techniques. A gymnast practices his or her routines constantly in order to perfect a performance. Photographers need their special kind of practice, too.

First, a photographer needs to practice the technical skills necessary to taking a picture. You must know the operation of your camera thoroughly. Use of shutter speeds, aperture ring, how to correctly focus, characteristics of different films - all these must become second nature to you.

Knowing what each of your lenses will do for you is important. Many shots that require spontaneity may be lost if you have to fuss and deliberate too long over the controls on your camera.

SECOND, and very important, is practice in seeing picture possibilities. A creative photographer sees picture potential in even the most ordinary of scenes. The creative photographer looks for the unusual, picks out small details, sees textures and shadows, responds to color arrangements.

A creative photographer relates to his or her subject, even builds a relationship with the subject. You must learn to let your subject speak to you and, in turn, you must learn to listen. Practice being open and receptive to the world around you.

Famous photographer Minor White once said: "The creative photographer must have a receptive state of mind - not unlike a sheet of film itself

seemingly inert, yet so sensitive that a fraction of a second's exposure conceives a life in it."

Practice looking at things in new ways. Study your subject from all angles and in different lighting conditions. An unusual camera angle or different lens may be just the thing to make your photograph stand apart.

FINALLY, to stay in practice, use your camera often. A tennis player, for example, will develop and keep his skills by spending hour after hour on

Similarly, you must keep in top photographic shape, too, by taking camera in hand and practicing on the abundance of subjects that surround us.

All of your shots may not be masterpieces. Maybe only a few per roll will satisfy you. But this is OK. The important thing is to practice

with your camera and let yourself be moved by the subjects that excite you.

Planning an elegant setting

HE DONALD Hiltys returned to Michigan after living in Europe for many years with a lot of unusual furnishings. These were antiques and treasures they had collected from many countries—treasures to be used and enjoyed. But, to place them effectively in their new home presented a problem.

So when the couple found a condominium they sought the help of Birmingham interior designer Rosanne Schlussel. Her challenge was to design a floor plan and background in which the richly carved, and often leather-upholstered, English furniture and antique accessories could be successfully coordinated into a contemporary architectual dwelling.

While the project is still underway, the already completed dining room is a stunning example of Schlussel's inspired approach.

BECAUSE the table and leather chairs have a grand, baronial feeling,

Schlussel put them in an appropriately regal setting.

She chose a wall covering with a dark background and a small print. The dark is actually a combination of rich, brushed metallic colors with the print moving from gold to copper, depending on the light. The ceiling is copper.

The dark wall covering holds the beautiful, carved furniture in perspective. It would have been too strong and too bold against a light background.

A wide-framed gold mirror over the buffet gives the right touch of elegance and the brass molding framing the window wall to the garden court beyond reinforces that feeling. The mesh, sun screen blind is pulled up, neatly out of sight when not in use.

Schlussel found the large, oval, pewter and brass chandelier in New York City and knew it was right the minute she saw it.

In size and grandeur, it balances well with the long table. The mixture of metals allows the hostess to use silver and

gold accessories together without concern.


SCHLUSSEL said most peple have silver flatware and a lot of brass or gold pieces. By using these metal shades together as they are in the wall covering and the chandelier, many options are automotically built into the table settings.

There are several enclosed outdoor garden courts, but the one directly opposite the front door was reserved for something special.

Schlussel and her clients decided that

"It was one of the first pieces of furniture we


bought," said Kaminsky, "and it's still my favorite."

The English chintz heightens the charm of the French armoire and the Chinese jars.







Accident inspires room decor

HEN GLEN Michaels "inherited" three shattered 18th-century Wedgewood pottery vases, he had no idea he would wind up piecing together the decor for a study around the vases. "It was a freak accident," said the Troy artist who is best known for his

wall assemblages of domino-like tiles, stone, wood, cast bronze and printing "A friend gave them to me, after the

vases had fallen on a marble hearth. She thought I might be able to use the fragments in my art work.

"Every day, I'd glue a couple of pieces together. Then I realized how beautiful the forms were. I asked my friend if she wanted them back and she said no."

That's how his adventure in home decorating all began. The earth green pottery soon became the centerpiece for a library/study in Michaels' spacious Georgian-style country home. The Wedgewood trio is placed on the fireplace mantle.

Wedgewood green has a particular-

ly restful look," he said. "It's soft, yet it has strength.'

MIXING paint colors to match the earth green tones in the pottery, he came up with four varying hues to apply to the fireplace, ceiling and walls of the study. The painting experiment soon spread to the hallway, which also is covered with earth green tones.

"It was a common practice in the Georgian period (of architecture) to use several values of the same color in a room to emphasize the moldings," Michaels explained.

"This room was once green," he noted, pointing to the study. "It was probably the parlor of a very simple farmhouse built around 1830." A small portion of the house was con-

structed in the early 19th century. The remainder was added on by the Stoepel family in the 1920s. Both the furniture and decorative

pieces were incorporated to compliment the walls. But the Michaelses didn't buy any new furniture or art work. They used what they had. Coincidentally, a dark blue design in

one of the Wedgewood pieces matches the color of a Victorian-era camel-back couch in the study.

A Chinese watercolor scroll blends almost perfectly with the soft green

Kazak Oriental rug - yellow ochre, cerulean blue, ultramarine blue and vermillion. Two chairs compliment the

"Most people don't have very much courage with color," said Jacqueline Michaels (Glen's wife). "If you just look at a flower garden, you'll see that all the colors in nature go together."

OTHER antique elements include a late 19th-century brass magazine rack and a grouping of 1920s-era wind-up toys depicting Amos 'n' Andy, Charlie Chaplin, Tom Mix, the Toonerville Trolley (from a cartoon strip), Charlie McCarthy, GI Joe, Li'l Abner and Maggie and Jiggs (cartoon characters).


A fireplace screen (once called a "nursery screen") adds to the 19th-century effect. "We never figured out if it was (intended) to keep the kids away or dry diapers," Jacqueline joked.


Elements from other cultures are

PPEARANCES ARE deceiving. Take, for example, this combination living/dining area in a Southfield home.

What appears to be the ultimate in contemporary living room design is actually an experiment with eclectic motifs.

"We didn't want a period room," explained interior designer Joyce Kraft. "The contemporary accents give it warmth and elegance."

The furniture designs range from period to contemporary and the art is a smorgasbord of Oriental, African, classical Greek and modern American styles. 


