## Proposed budget makes some deep cuts

The proposed Plymouth Township budget submitted by Supervisor Maurice Breen is a good indication of what happens to a community when an important millage request fails.

Township voters in July turned down a four-mill request. As a result, the township government must operate on two mills. The township was not even able to get a one-mill renewal for police operation.

Breen sharpened his knife following the millage defeat to come up with a \$3.04 million balanced budget for fiscal 1986, which coincides with calendar 1986.

Unless the township board of trustees makes another, this time successful, bid for more millage before the end of the year, Breen's proposed budget will stand if approved by the board.

In submitting his budget, which is on view in the clerk's office, Breen stated that there would be no wage increases for recognition of performance; no library support; reduction of township parks usage to seven months; no capital improvements; no equipment replacement; minimal property maintenance; shifting of clerical and parks personnel financing to the enterprise fund; reduction of police and fire department personnel by not filling two fire and two police vacancies; and the imposition of a property tax administration fee.

**SALARIES OF** department heads will remain about the same.

Breen's salary will increase from \$31,612 to \$34,564. The police chief's salary will barely increase from \$33,784 to \$34,054. The fire chief's salary will stay the same, at \$31,145.

The parks director's salary will decrease, from \$22,671 to \$20,000. The clerk's salary will remain the same, at \$27,269. The treasurer's salary will remain the same, also at \$27,269. The planning director's salary will stay the same, at \$31,612.

Big reductions are proposed in many departmental areas from 1985 to 1986.

The township board budget dropped from \$32,500 to \$20,100.

The assessor's office saw a decrease from \$56,264 to \$46,670.

The clerk's office was cut \$83,429 to \$76,569.

The treasurer's office was cut from \$88,936 to \$63,569.

There was a large reduction in general administration costs, from \$152,000 to \$143,500.

In the engineering department, costs were slashed from \$15,000 to \$10,000.

The biggest reduction comes at the library. Because the library is now on its own, with the voter approval of a Plymouth District Library, the township does not have to provide it with funds.

As a result, Breen's proposed budget calls for the elimination of the \$120,000 that had gone toward library operation. The township will provide only the

\$26,713 for library debt retirement.

The allocation for the library takes a dramatic drop, from \$146,713 to \$26,713.

**BUT THE** proposed budget also contains some increases.

The supervisor's office will get an increase, from \$57,473 to \$63,879.

The township hall and grounds budget goes from \$110,150 to \$145,550.

The parks and golf course budget increases from \$62,171 to \$77,968.

And the biggest dollar increase of all is in insurance and benefits for township employees.

Insurance and benefits will receive \$455,800 in 1986; in 1985, \$318,900 was allocated for insurance and benefits.

In that area, Social Security contributions will increase from 1985's \$75,000, to \$100,000 in 1986.

Hospitalization insurance goes from \$80,000 to \$98,000.

Pension costs go from \$75,000 to \$125,000.

Workers' Compensation insurance goes from \$20,000 to \$35,000.

Long-term disability insurance increases from \$10,500 to \$18,000.

Municipal risk insurance jumps from \$32,800 to \$50,000.

There is a decline in the amount allocated for law enforcement. So far in 1985, \$655,018 was spent on the police department, but much of that went into the new police municipal complex, which cost \$215,738.

The amount projected for the police department in 1986 is \$512,258.

There will be an increase in fire department expenditures for 1986, from \$611,422 to \$621,966.

**THE ADDITIONAL** expenditure in the fire department will be caused by overtime for firefighters, which is expected to amount to \$55,000, compared to the 1985 figure of \$45,000.

The planning and building department also will show an increase for the coming year, from 1985's \$159,662, to \$167,112.

Although the planning supervisor's salary will remain the same at \$31,612, there will be increases in inspector's fees, from 1985's \$38,000 to \$53,000.

Also in planning, a consultant's fee of \$25,000 in 1985 will not be carried in 1986.

For solid waste disposal, the township will pay \$217,000 in 1986, compared with \$185,000 in 1985.

The planning commission allocation will increase from \$4,030 to \$9,990.

Block grant contracts and administration will cost the township a projected \$130,000 in 1986, compared with \$100,000 in 1985.

Capital improvement costs will decline to \$92,600 in 1986, from \$129,210 in 1985.

The above are highlights from Breen's proposed 1986 budget.

The final budget will be determined after workshops and Plymouth Township Board of Trustee meetings beginning tomorrow.

## State Court of Appeals rules against Ballenger

In its latest ruling, the appellate court said the Michigan attorney general had already issued his opinion and the appellate court agreed with that opinion.

Ballenger, who said he is entitled to a full four-year term, expiring in 1986, said late Friday that he would appeal the lower court's ruling to the Supreme Court. He has up to 20 days to file an appeal to the high court.

Ballenger said he would "absolutely" be in his Plymouth office Monday.

Michigan's two racing commissioners "conducted business" in an air of peaceful coexistence last week in Plymouth, waiting for the courts to rule on whether the office belongs to Ballenger or Cahalan.

**THE PAIR** apparently have de-

clared a state of detente, while occupying separate offices in the Mayflower Meeting House Building on Main Street.

Ballenger, reached last Tuesday, said Cahalan had made an appearance earlier in the day and was expected to return in the afternoon.

The racing commissioner job, which entails the overseeing of operations at Michigan tracks and the all-important granting of racing dates to the tracks, has been the object of controversy since Michigan Attorney General Frank Kelley late last year ruled that Ballenger, an appointee of former Michigan Gov. William Milliken, could legally be removed from office at the behest of the Gov. James Blanchard.

Kelly ruled that Ballenger was merely filling out Van Tiem's unexpired term.

**BLANCHARD EXERCISED** what he thought was his option by appointing Cahalan racing commissioner Sept. 1.

Ballenger claimed the appointment was made, in part, because he had forced the owners of the Detroit Race Course (DRC) in Livonia — and owners of the Hazel Park race track — to sell a track. The owners, Herbert Tyner and Bernard Hartman, sold DRC to Ladbroke Racing Corp.

Ballenger also issued racing dates well in advance of the deadline.

Both Blanchard and Ballenger had sought action by the Michigan Court of Appeals. The court once before ruled in favor of the appointment of Cahalan and dismissed Ballenger's lawsuit.

Ballenger then appealed his case to the Michigan Supreme Court. The high court last week returned the case to the Court of Appeals. In doing so, it asked for a second opinion from the appellate court, but this time with a written statement detailing the reasoning involved in reaching that opinion.

"The earlier decision by the Court of Appeals no longer exists," said Ballenger last week. "It must give a writ-

ten decision as to why Cahalan should be commissioner. But we can still appeal the Court of Appeals decision."

He said he would appeal any decision by the Court of Appeals that names Cahalan racing commissioner — to the Supreme Court.

"I have been here consistently," said Ballenger.

**TWO WEEKS AGO**, Cahalan and Ballenger stayed out of each other's way, mainly because Cahalan chose to meet with his deputy commissioners and executive secretary in places other than the Mayflower Meeting House office.

Cahalan never showed up at the Plymouth office of the racing commissioner.

But last week, the two commissioners crossed paths in Plymouth.

The actions of the parties involved follows party lines. Cahalan, a Democrat, was appointed by Blanchard, a Democrat, with the legal stamp of approval of Kelley, a Democrat.

Ballenger, a Republican, was appointed by Milliken, a Republican.

William Cahalan

He never owned a horse. He never rode a sulky. But William Cahalan, the newly appointed racing commissioner, has been a keen follower of the races for more than 40 years.

While waiting for the legal feud over his right to the job to end, he leaned back in his chair in the Plymouth office and recalled his interest in watching the horses bringing their sulks down the stretch when racing was featured at the State Fair Grounds.

"My father took me to the track when I was just 18 years old. That was the legal age, and I soon became fasci-

nated. So I went to the track as often as possible."

The new commissioner didn't confide on his winnings, but did admit that he was a good handicapper.

"Give me the race sheet, and I'll bet I could pick three winners each day," he said with an air of confidence.

He calmly admitted that he expected to enjoy being the racing commissioner.

**HE HAD** served as Wayne County Prosecuting Attorney for 17 years and then retired several months ago to engage in private practice.

With that background and knowledge of the law he had hoped to become a

busy attorney in private cases. But after months of that he yearned again for public service.

"With that yearning, when I was offered the racing commission job I gladly accepted, and I hope I can fill the position with my years of following the races at the State Fair Grounds."

While sitting at his desk he recalled one of the funniest things he had heard.

"I often sat across the track, just above the railroad where we could see most of the entire race. One day I wanted to make sure of the place of the horse I had chosen."

"The chap sitting next to me smiled and answered, 'It is two box cars behind.'"

The new commissioner firmly believes that the racing in the area can be high-grade, and he intends to work hard on the job.

He is certain that the track in Livonia will be an asset, and he plans to see the races as often as possible.

"My years of watching the horses and their sulks gives me an idea of how the races should be run. And we will be watchful at all times."

The former prosecutor is looking forward to an interesting time. And he confides that he will keep a close eye on what goes on.

"It sure will be different from what I have been doing. But I will enjoy it."

# No open interviews to pick fact-finder

Chairman John Hertel's special committee to hire a fact-finder to probe conflict-of-interest charges in the Wayne County Executive's office managed to select its man without conducting public interviews.

"There were no collective (committee) interviews so it wouldn't be obvious whom we had rejected," said Hertel, D-Harper Woods. He chairs the Special Committee on Governmental Integrity that recommended Richard Strichartz (see related story on this page) and the full County Commission.

The state Open Meetings Act requires that "all interviews by a public body for employment or appointment to a public office shall be held in an open meeting."

"We conducted interviews by phone, one-on-one," Hertel said following the County Commission's hiring of Strichartz. When one committee member had finished a conversation, another would place a call.

The Open Meetings Act also requires that applications be reviewed publicly unless the candidate asks for confidentiality.

Hertel said there were no applications. "We made a list" of prospects, said the chairman, declining to say how many persons were considered. The commission's profile for a fact-finder called for a person with legal experience, academic standing and no recent partisan political involvement.

# Pre-Columbian bones unearthed in Plymouth

A Plymouth Township resident discovered the apparent remains of three to five Indians who lived in the area from 1200-1300 A.D.

Shane Cash, the son of Doug Cash, and his cousin Chris Hutter were helping with the digging of a septic tank when the pair discovered the group of bones.

"There was a big leg bone," said Doug Cash. "I thought it was a cow bone because we're across the street

from a farm. But then I saw this jaw with teeth."

Cash's property, covering three acres, is located at Ann Arbor Trail near McClumpha Road, across Ann Arbor Trail from Plymouth Township Park.

Cash was excavating to lay a foundation and install a septic tank, when his son and nephew found the bones.

The bones were turned over to the University of Michigan Archeology Department, which gave them a preliminary time frame of 1200-1300 A.D., pending more extensive carbon testing.

Cash said there were three skulls in-

tact, two fragmented skulls, and enough bones to make up at least three skeletons.

Jeff Parsons, director of the U-M Archeology Department, said curator John O'Shea is studying the find.

"There are fairly complete skeletons," said Parsons, "a lot of bones, although some were disturbed by the construction taking place. I'd say there were about two or three people discovered."

PARSONS SAID the bones were probably those of "late woodland Indians" that populated the area.

According to Cash, the discovery site also included charcoal remains from a campfire.

Cash has retained several skull pieces and leg bones, which will be donated to the Plymouth Historical Museum.

"They're thought to be Indians that were here before Columbus," said Cash. "I can't relate back that far."

Cash said the property will be designated an archeological site. He also is trying to get one of the houses on his property, a Greek Revival design that dates back to 1876, in the National Historical Register.

"The heads of the skeletons were fully grown men," said Cash. "They were all adults."

Cash, who has owned the property since 1970, said the U-M archeologists gave the find a "four" on a scale of one to 10.

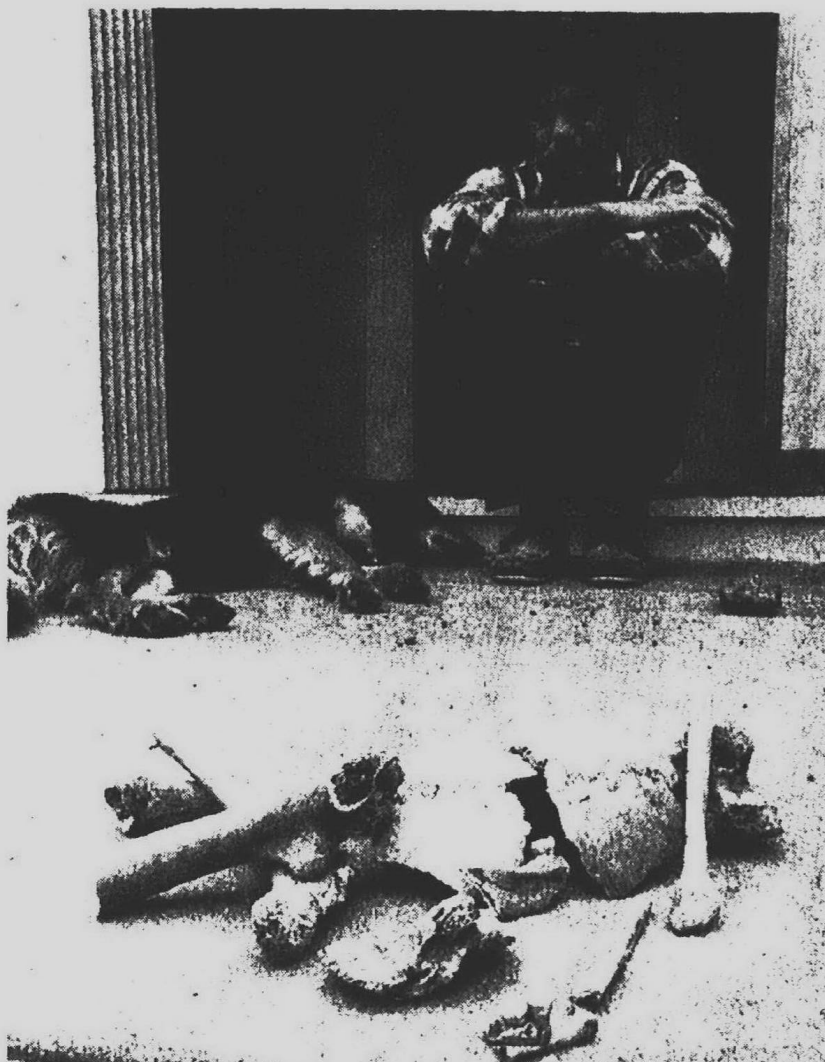
"The discovery of charcoal shows there was evidence of some sort of a fire," said Helen Gilbert, Plymouth author and columnist. "Their heads were separated and punctured, showing some evidence they may have been killed. This was not a friendly burial. There were no pots in the grave, so I'd say they were killed somewhere else and buried here."

Gilbert said tribes in the area included Ottawa, Potawatami and Hopewell. The last Indian pow-wow took place here in 1827.

Cash said he often found Indian arrowheads on the property. He showed a six-inch Indian tomahawk axhead in perfect condition.

Parsons said it would be "quite some time" before the bones could be dated through carbon analysis.

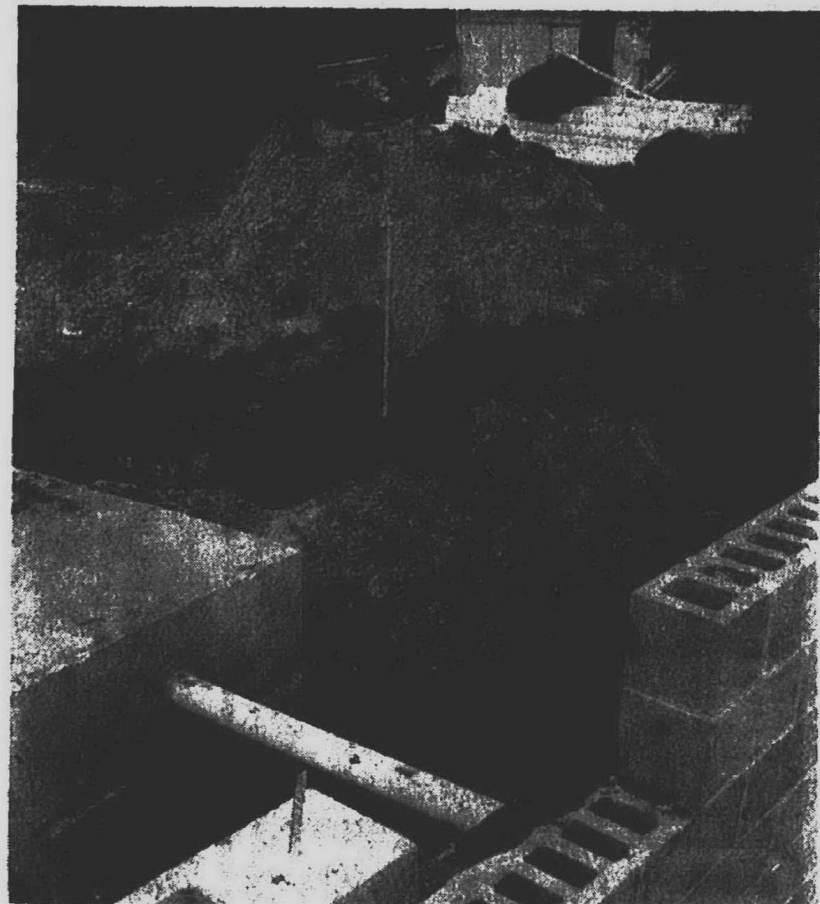
Meanwhile, Cash will continue construction on the site. Make no bones about it.

# Board to review Breen's budget

The Plymouth Township Board of Trustees will discuss the proposed 1986 budget in a workshop meeting Tuesday in Township Hall.

Township Supervisor Maurice Breen's \$3.04 million budget includes sharp reductions of expenditures in several areas.

The board will decide whether to approve the proposed budget or make changes.

Some areas that are expected to be under scrutiny are the police and fire

departments, library contribution, parks operation and the updating of voting equipment.

During the board's regular meeting, at 7:30 p.m. and preceding the workshop, it will discuss the millage question. The board will try to determine if the township should try again, to obtain authorization to levy up to four mills. A previous request was defeated by voters in July.

The board also will be asked to implement Chapter 12 of the joint library agreement. Chapter 12 allows the township to terminate its agreement with the library Jan. 1 following notification of termination.

Under the agreement, the township has been contributing \$146,000 toward the operation of the Dunning-Hough Library.

The board also has been asked to deregulate the basic rate for Omnicon Cablevision one year ahead of schedule, or to allow Omnicon to increase the basic rate by \$1.70.

The board also will be asked to establish the tax rate for Plymouth Township for 1986 on the basis of allocated and voted millage.

The agenda also addresses a request for the elimination of weeds east of Beck Road on N. Territorial, and at Five Mile and M-14.

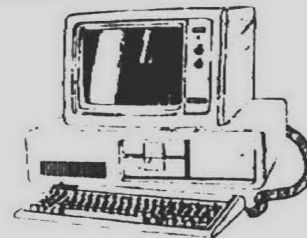

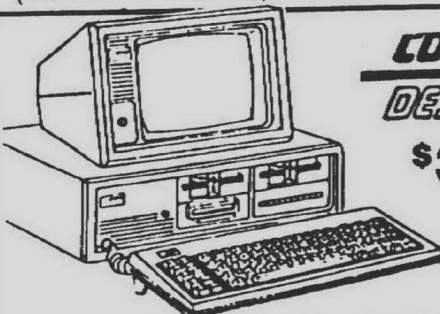

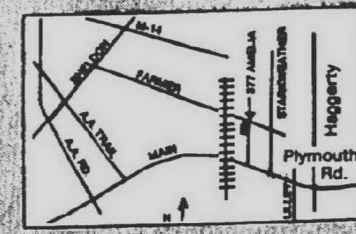

# Group home residents win over former foes

For the residents and staff of one group home in Plymouth, some common sense approaches to neighborhood relations brought quick results.

The Lexington home in the City of Plymouth faced strong community opposition before it opened in July 1984.

Fear concerning the safety of their children was one of the major apprehensions expressed by neighbors.

Some people said children would no longer be able to walk or play near the home.

Yet, three months after the group home opened, more than 100 neighbor-

hood children visited the home to collect Halloween treats from the six men who live there.

THE HALLOWEEN experience was a meaningful one to Richard Snyder, executive director of New Worlds Inc., the agency which operates the Lexington home.

"So many children stopped by that we ran out of the McDonald's coupons we were giving out and had to switch to nickels," said Snyder. "Having this number of 'trick or treaters' indicated to me that people were no longer afraid

of us and accepted us."

According to Snyder, a complete turnaround in neighborhood attitudes started to evolve soon after the home opened.

"I went to the neighborhood notification meeting before the home opened," said Snyder. "I would guess that 80 percent of the 100 people in attendance were opposed to the home, 10 percent were favorable, and 10 percent were neutral."

"I'd bet that the percentages now are completely reversed, based on how well we get along with the neighbors."

BEING VISIBLE, open and involved in the community seemed to be three of the major factors which helped gain acceptance for the Lexington home.

Snyder cited a number of activities which he thinks promoted neighborhood and community acceptance:

- "One thing we started doing was taking walks through the neighborhood. We said 'hello' and introduced ourselves to the neighbors we'd meet. People are frightened because they haven't been exposed to persons with mental retardation. If we had just stayed in the

home, neighbors would still be afraid."

- "We joined the Neighborhood Watch Program and attend meetings regularly. Even though only 40 percent of the other families have joined, we wanted to show that we desired to be good, civic-minded neighbors."

- "We have invited the local police and fire departments over so they could be familiar with the home."

- "We make regular, almost daily trips downtown for exercise and to patronize local businesses."

- "One of the residents has become an active member of a local church."

- "On Christmas Eve we participated in the neighborhood candle-lighting tradition. Families place candles spaced about one foot apart in a line along their property. The candles are lit at nightfall and burn for three hours. It's beautiful."

- "With staff assistance and cooperation from the State Police, one group home resident helped to initiate a bicycle safety program for other disabled persons living in Plymouth."

- "Recently, an open house was held. A number of neighbors we hadn't met previously attended. State Sen. Robert Geake also came."

- "We are open and friendly with neighbors and encourage their involvement. One man visited to see how the inside of the home was maintained and he was pleased with what he saw. Another neighbor recently visited and donated several wooden patio chairs to the home."

Concerning the Lexington home, a board member of New Worlds recently commented: "It is a place where people live harmony within its doors and in harmony with the world outside."

## Jobs for youth available

**TENDONITIS: CAUSE AND TREATMENT**

You may have experienced pain in a shoulder, hip or knee that you thought was arthritis, but which your doctor called tendonitis. The distinction is important as, in general, tendonitis is likely to be easier to treat, and not as long lasting as arthritis.

In most cases, the cause of tendonitis is injury, though the original tendon strain may have occurred so long ago that you forgot the incident. The usual site of strain is where the tendon anchors into bone. As this insertion takes place near the joint, particularly in the shoulder and hip, it is common to believe that the problem is coming from the joint itself.

Treatment may consist of injection or use of medication; the choice depends on the severity of the tendonitis, the preference of the patient, or other medical conditions present. One drug often used is butazolidine, known to race horse fans as "but". Veterinarians, seeing how useful the drug is in people, prescribe it for thoroughbreds with achilles tendonitis.

## Graduations in '90s featured student orators

(Part 22)

When Carvel Bentley was principal at the Plymouth High School (1951-1969) he kept a historical file into which he put, among other memorabilia, printed programs of the graduation exercises held at the school throughout the years.

I was browsing through his collection recently and was struck by the number of orations and essays delivered by students during the early days when relatively few attended high school and the number of graduates could be counted on the fingers of one hand.

The use of orations and compositions at high school graduations was undoubtedly derived from the universities at Oxford and Cambridge in England where Latin orations and the recitation

of prize compositions in prose and verse had long been a feature at commencement exercises.

IN AMERICAN high schools, the oration was delivered in English and the compositions usually took the form of inspirational essays.

The essay, which had a revival in England during the first quarter of the 19th century at the time of Charles Lamb, and later in America under the influence of Emerson and Thoreau, was still a popular part of graduation exercises in Plymouth in the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

At the commencement exercises held at Plymouth High on June 21, 1895, for example, the program included two orations and one essay. At the

Class Day exercises on June 13, 1905, there were three orations and three essays.

The class of 1895, the 14th to graduate in Plymouth, consisted of four students — Samuel Alexander Ableson, Edward Samuel Corwin, Ada Murray Safford and Bessie Francis Taft. The principal that year was George S. Curtiss, the preceptress was Lina Durfee and the assistant was Delia Entrican.

The board of education included C. A. Frisbee, R. C. Safford, C.A. Fraser, N. T. Sly and L. C. Hough. Frisbee had taught at the school and been its first principal; Hough was one of the founders of what later became the Daisy Manufacturing Co.

The first oration, "An Apostle of Liberty," was delivered by Edward Corwin. Judging from its title it may have foreshadowed some of the ideas the young man was to develop in his distinguished career in later years. Corwin went on to achieve national recognition as a teacher, writer, author and authority on the U. S. Constitution and the presidency. More about him later.

The second oration, "The Character of Queen Elizabeth," was read by Bessie Taft. The valedictory was by the school principal, George Curtiss. The invocation was given by the Rev. J. B. Oliver. Entertainment was provided by the Normal Conservatory Lady Quar-

tette under the direction of Mrs. Frederic Pease.

trustee of the First Presbyterian Church for 16 years.

WHEN A class numbers only four, everyone has to participate in all the school events. Such was the case regarding the high school publication. In 1895, Corwin was its editor-in-chief, Ableson was business manager, Taft was fashion editor, and Ada Safford did the society notes.

The class day exercises 10 years later, on June 13, 1905, were held at the Opera House over the Old Village Hall on Main Street opposite the high school. Commencement exercises were held the next evening.

On class day, the Rev. T. B. Leith of the Presbyterian Church delivered the invocation. The class, which totaled 15, included Leigh Markham (president), Laura Bell (vice president), Genevieve McClumpha (secretary-treasurer) and Roy Armstrong, Dora Beckhold, Anna Brown, Gilbert Brown, Louise Gentz, Una Gunsolly, Claude Henderson, Clara Lyon, John J. McLaren, Stella Thompson, Vera Townsend and Sadia Walker.

The first oration, by Gilbert Brown, was called "Only the Darkness Brings Out the Stars." Brown, Plymouth's first Village Manager (1918-20), later became an official with the Michigan State Highway Department. He was a

THE SECOND oration, "Try, Trust, Triumph," was by John J. McLaren. McLaren later owned a Ford automobile agency in Plymouth. He formed the St. Clair fish and frog spear company here, giving that up to run the McLaren Coal and Lumber Co. which his father had established. J.J. was also one of the founders of the Plymouth Artificial Ice Co. When he died in 1968, at age 81, J. J. McLaren had been president of McLaren and Co. for 53 years.

The third oration, "The Benefits of a High School Education," was by Roy Armstrong. The first essay, "Foundations," was read by Stella Thompson; the second, "Perseverance," by Sadia Walker; and the third, "Opportunities," by Vera Townsend.

Louise Gentz was the salutatorian and the class poem was recited by Una Gunsolly. Una was probably related to John Gunsolly who built the Plymouth Carding Mill in the 1850s near the Middle Rouge River off what is now Hines Drive, north of the Plymouth Road overpass. The Mill, restored by Henry Ford in the 1920s, is now one of the attractions at Greenfield Village in Dearborn.

## Squirrels had right idea

Sitting out on the lawn in the rear of the little white house with the green shutters watching the squirrels store their food for the winter, the pages of history suddenly turned back.

As each squirrel whizzed by, The Stroller recalled the days of his youth when all of us children had to take part in building up a supply of food for the cold months of winter.

Mother was a great believer in having food on hand so that we children didn't have to battle the snow and ice.

To make sure we were safe, she had two large earthen crocks ready when Labor Day passed and the cabbage was ready to be picked.

Each of the crocks was large enough to contain almost enough for the long months until spring arrived.

IN ONE, she had sauerkraut and in the other she had pickled tongue. And aside from these two, she had a smaller one for such satisfying meals as pickled pigs feet.

On a given day when she was ready for work, she assigned each of us to a job. And it wasn't always the same one. First she had one cut and slice the cabbage. She took pains to show us how. Then we had another job of cleaning it and placing it in the crock.

When the crock was filled, she brought in a large stone and placed it on top of the kraut and closed the lid. Once the lid was on, she would say, "Now they can bring on the snow and cold. We are ready for it."

Much the same system was used with the pickled tongue. Mother knew the butcher for years and he always picked out the largest beef tongue for her. Once she had it home she would boil or stew it. And she seemed to know the exact moment it was ready to be sliced.

Once she made up her mind, she went to work with a large carving knife. And she was a master.

She had the vinegar, or whatever it was to pickle the tongue, and we would help get the slices in the right place.

WHEN THE CROCK was filled, she would place a stone on the slices and then place the cover on the crock.

The pigs feet were not large and they were easy to handle. She always would smile and say, "Some folks eat higher on the pig, but these will be fine when the cold weather comes."

Once this job was finished the three crocks were placed in the corner of the basement (we called it the cellar) and we often were so hungry for the sauerkraut and mashed potatoes we wished the cold and snow would come.

Many were the times the neighbors laughed when we told them we were having tongue for our meal. Sometimes this irked us until mother smilingly told us to remind them that they eat eggs and they don't come from the chicken's mouth.

So watching the squirrels the other day was most interesting and brought back many fond memories of the days of our youth back home in the Pennsylvania Dutch country.

## Night officer sees the light

Robert Scoggins enjoys one of the most unusual careers of any member of the City of Plymouth Police Department.

Standing in the lobby of the City Hall the other afternoon, he told of a visit he made to Kent College in Ohio with designs of being a music teacher.

"That idea went out of my life when I was drafted during the war, and I served in the U.S. Air Force with two years in Korea. Meanwhile I was married, had two children and needed work when I came out of service."

"I applied here in Plymouth and was given a place on the night shift where I

remained for nine years. And now I finally have a police officer's duty during the daylight hours and enjoy it very much."

Still a bit upset because he couldn't finish his college career at Kent, Scoggins used his spare time to earn a degree in criminal justice.

HE HAS reason to like the day shift because, as he says, it is like two different positions.

"At night you get all sorts of calls and can expect anything. On the day shift you get very few dangerous calls. It is all a sort of checking affair during the entire shift."

As he looks back now on his career as a night officer, Scoggins recalls one

bad time and that came one night on the far east side when he had a gun pointed at him.

"It sure was a scary night and a position no one would relish," he recalled. "But I got myself together, wrestled the man and took his gun from him. And it was a moment that I always will remember. I often think about it and shiver."

With his experience of 3 1/2 years in the Pacific area in the war, two years of that time in Korea, he feels that he has served his country and now is in a position (on the day shift) where he enjoys his work. And with this career in criminal justice, he has been most fortunate, even though his career seems one of unusual twists and turns.

# Canning from City to Country



**C**lassic American cooking is taking the nation by storm. From the spicy specialties of the Southwest to the robust soups and stews of the Northeast, regional recipes are gaining national popularity. What better way to re-create the flavor of the heartlands than with home-grown produce, canned to preserve its flavorful goodness.

According to Ball Corporation and National Presto Industries, you don't have to be a rural resident to undertake a canning project. Rooftop gardens are sprouting up in cities coast-to-coast. In the suburbs, grow-your-own has always been a hobby. Even if you don't have a green thumb, you can still can it, using selections from the farmstand or supermarket.

With the right equipment, like home canning jars and a pressure canner, pressure canning is easier than ever before. The secret to successful canning is to select the freshest produce available and carefully follow the manufacturers' directions that accompany the canning jars and pressure canner.

A variety of foods, including meat, vegetables, fruit and herbs, are excellent for canning. As the following recipes demonstrate, an entire meal, from Squash Soup to Herbed Vegetables to Beef in Red Wine, can be prepared, canned and enjoyed later on. Meat sauce is a make-ahead topping for spaghetti or other pasta. Peachy Chili Sauce, eaten on the side or atop a meat dish, and Dilled Zucchini Sticks round out the dinner menu. Take advantage of summer's bounty to create a smorgasbord for the future.

### CANNING TIPS

- To reduce jar breakage, use a non-metallic utensil such as a plastic spatula, to remove air bubbles from jars.
- Process 1/2 pint jars for the same length of time as pint jars and 1-1/2 pint jars the same amount of time as quart jars.
- Always use canning recipes from a reliable source, such as the United States Department of Agriculture.
- Prepare home canning jars and lids according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- Follow manufacturer's instructions for operation of pressure canner.
- Vent the pressure canner to remove air from the unit and jars. This allows processing to be done at an accurate pressure. When processing at 10 pounds, vent for 7 to 10 minutes; at 15 pounds pressure, vent for 5 minutes.
- Before tasting canned foods, check foods for spoilage indicated by broken seals, seepage, mold, gassiness, spurted liquid when jar is opened, sliminess, cloudiness and disagreeable odors. Even if no signs of spoilage are obvious, canned meats, vegetables and other low acid foods should be boiled for 15 to 20 minutes before tasting. Or pour canned food into a pressure cooker and heat to 15 pounds pressure. Let pressure drop of its own accord.

## Squash Soup and Sauce Base

Combine vegetables and chicken broth. Bring to a boil and cook 3 minutes. Add seasonings. Ladle into clean, hot jars, leaving 1/2-inch head space. Add additional boiling chicken broth, if more liquid is needed. Remove air bubbles. Adjust caps. Process in a pressure canner at:

10 pounds pressure—Pints 30 minutes  
Quarts 40 minutes

15 pounds pressure—Pints and Quarts 20 minutes

Yield: 9 pints

**CREAMED SQUASH SOUP**—Boil 1 pint jar Squash Soup and Sauce Base for 15 minutes. Puree mixture in food processor or blender, adding chicken broth if desired. Add 1 cup yogurt or sour cream and blend. Serve hot or chilled. Makes 2 servings.

## Beef in Red Wine

Bring to a boil and cook until all pink is gone from meat. Ladle hot mixture into clean, hot jars, leaving 1-inch head space. Add 1/2 teaspoon thyme to each pint or 1 teaspoon to each quart. Remove air bubbles. Adjust caps. Process in a pressure canner at:

10 pounds pressure—Pints 75 minutes  
Quarts 90 minutes

15 pounds pressure—Pints and Quarts 50 minutes

Yield: 6 pints or 3 quarts

Remove air bubbles. Adjust caps. Process in a pressure canner at:

15 pounds pressure—Pints and Quarts 20 minutes

Yield: 12 pints or 6 quarts

## Dilled Zucchini Sticks

Pack zucchini sticks lengthwise into clean, hot jars, leaving 1/4-inch head space. Add 1 garlic clove and 1 dill head to each jar. Pour hot liquid over zucchini, leaving 1/4-inch head space. Remove air bubbles. Adjust caps. Process 15-minutes in boiling water bath.

Yield: 8 half pints.

## Casbah Meat Sauce

10 pounds pressure—Pints 75 minutes  
Quarts 90 minutes

15 pounds pressure—Pints and Quarts 20 minutes

Yield: 8 pints or 4 quarts.

## Peachy Chili Sauce

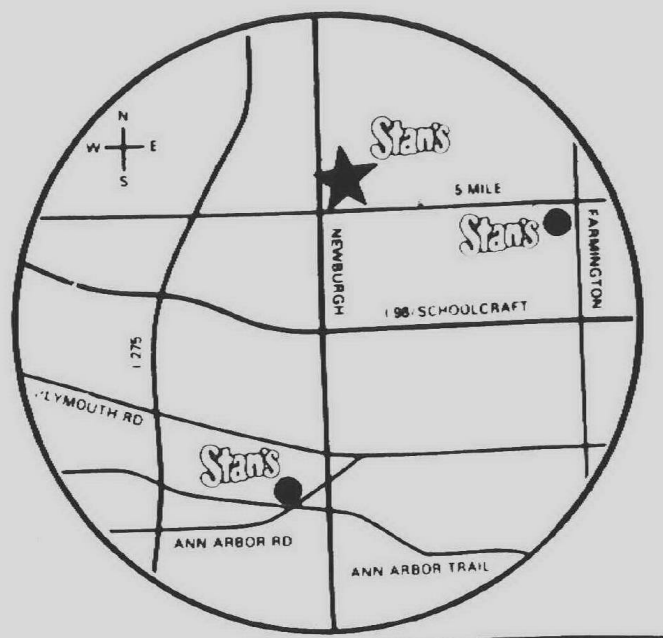

## 2 ways to make bean soup

Before I knew beans about beans, I was hot and cold on the subject. That's because:

When I was a kid, my dad made a soup with great northern beans, refrigerated it overnight, sprinkled on some black pepper and squeezed a little lemon over it. I really loved that soup.

When I was in the Army, I ate cold beans out of a can many times on maneuvers in West Germany, rain often dripping from my helmet. I hated that, and for many years wouldn't eat beans cold, soupy or not.

I didn't know what I was missing. Sure, I still love hot bean soup. But I have found my way back to the cold.

Since I'm older, I eat many things that are good for me that I once turned up my spoon at. Beans are loaded with nutrition: calcium, iron, niacin, phosphorus, protein, thiamin and zinc.

**MICHIGAN RAISES** most of the crop produced in a dozen states, from the red kidney beans to the white navy beans. In fact, Michigan accounts for about 95 per-

cent of the total navy bean crop.

All varieties of dried beans are among the most economical staples around.

You can refrigerate bean soup about a week, but freeze it up to six months.

I prepared a large pot of navy bean soup and set aside half of it for the cold soup base. Four of us enjoyed the hot soup.

Then I went to work and prepared the cold soup base. It's simple. Just make sure the container is airtight. Place it in the freezer and forget about it.

I forgot about it for four weeks.

**HOT NAVY BEAN SOUP**

2 cups dried navy beans, soaked overnight and drained

5 cups water

2 medium onions, coarsely chopped

2 carrots, diced

2 celery ribs with leaves, chopped

1 garlic clove, minced

1 bay leaf

1 lb. salt pork, diced

1 Tbsp. vegetable oil

Place beans in large pot, add rest of ingredients except oil, bring to boil, reduce

heat to low, add oil, cover and simmer 1 1/2 hours. Reserve half of bean mixture, removing to saucepan with slotted spoon, and 1/4 cup cooking liquid for cold soup base. Serve remainder hot, adding salt and black pepper if desired. Serves 4.

**COLD NAVY BEAN SOUP**

Half of cooked navy bean mixture, cooled

1/4 cup cooking liquid

3 Tbsp. margarine, cut in bits

1/2 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. black pepper

1 1/4 cups chicken broth

1/4 cup light cream

2 Tbsp. chopped parsley

1/4 tsp. dried marjoram

1/4 tsp. ground nutmeg

Puree bean mixture in blender or food processor a little at a time, gradually adding cooking liquid. Stir in margarine, salt and pepper; place in airtight container and freeze. When ready to use, defrost and pour soup base into large bowl. Stir in broth, remaining ingredients and adjust salt and pepper seasoning to taste; cover and chill. Serves 4.

1/4 cup chopped green onion

1/2 medium green pepper, chopped

2 tsp. red wine vinegar

1/4 tsp. sweet basil

1/4 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. black pepper

Dash of cayenne pepper or to taste

1/4 cup bread crumbs

1/2 cup grated Swiss cheese

Grated parmesan cheese

Cut zucchini in 1/2 inch cubes. In large skillet, heat oil over medium heat. Add zucchini; saute until tender, about 4 minutes. Add lamb, onion, green pepper, garlic, tomato, vinegar, sweet basil, salt, black pepper and cayenne; cook over medium heat, covered, for 20 minutes, or until vegetables are tender and most of the liquid absorbed, stirring occasionally. Stir in bread crumbs and Swiss cheese. As soon as cheese melts, remove from heat. Using a slotted spoon, transfer to serving container. Top with Parmesan cheese. Serve hot with pita bread wedges or saltine crackers. Makes 1-1/2 to 2 cups.

\*In shallow roasting pan, roast lamb at 325 degrees F. for 25 minutes per pound, or until meat thermometer inserted in thickest part of meat reaches 150-155 degrees F.

Cooking time: 25-30 minutes

**MEXICAN LAMB MEATBALLS**

1 can (1 lb.) pureed tomatoes

2 Tbsp. minced onion

1 can (4 oz.) green chiles

2 Tbsp. catsup

1/2 tsp. black pepper

1/2 tsp. salt

1 lb. lean ground lamb

1/4 cup minced onion

1/4 cup finely chopped parsley

1/4 cup picante sauce (red chili salsa)

In large saucepan, combine tomatoes, 2 Tbsp. onion, green chiles, catsup, pepper and salt; simmer uncovered for 20 minutes. Meanwhile, in medium mixing bowl, combine ground lamb, remaining onion, parsley and picante sauce. Form meatballs using 1-1/2 tsp. mixture per meatball. Broil 5-8 inches from the source of heat for 5 minutes. Add meatballs to sauce; simmer uncovered for 10-15 minutes. Makes 6-7 dozen.

## Is it a victory or what?

Plymouth Canton's soccer team snapped a three-game losing streak Friday with a 5-1 win at Livonia Franklin.

Or did they? Livonia Franklin coach Doug Marks believes his team will get credit for a forfeit victory.

"Their coach (Mike Morgan) was thrown out of the game and they didn't have a legal representative of the team on the bench," Marks said. "Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA) rules say that if a team doesn't have a legal representative on the bench, the game is forfeited."

Morgan was booted from the game after drawing two yellow cards from the officials.

SAID MORGAN: "The rule states that there has to be a representative from the school on the bench. We had one. A security guard from Canton was on the bench and Tony Shiner, my assistant coach, ran the team. The security guard was on the bench. That's why we brought him. Our athletic director (Paul Cummings) was there, too."

Shiner, although a state licensed coach, is an unofficial member of the Canton team. He is an unpaid assistant.

Marks said that the officials planned to file a petition with the MHSAA to award a forfeit win to Franklin.

"I guess the MHSAA will have to rule on this," Marks said.

Morgan was livid over the officiating.

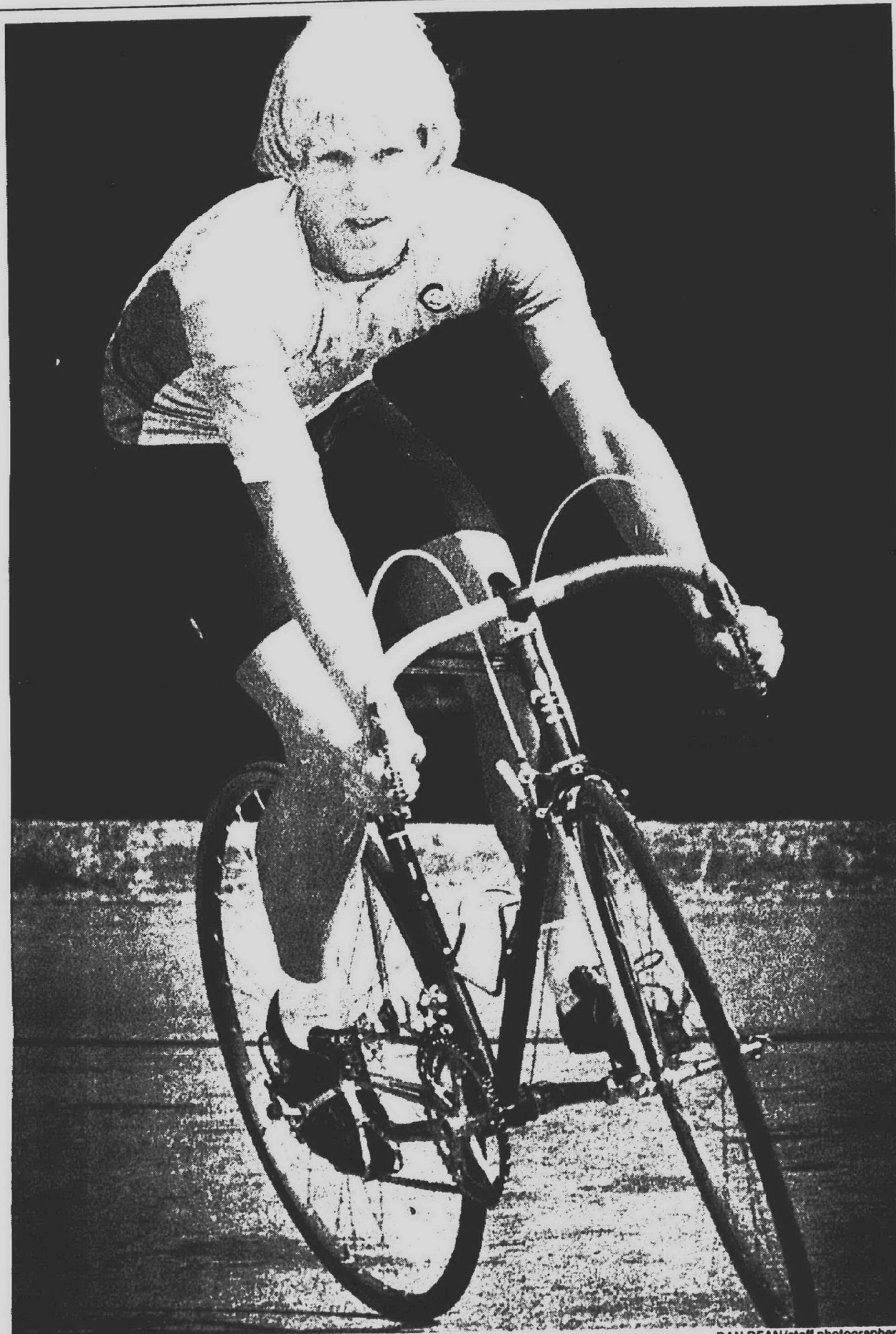
"The referees were terrible," he said afterwards. "It's just not fair for the kids. All you have to do to become a high school official is pay \$15 and take a test. The state doesn't certify these guys. They couldn't even coach Bonanza Leagues, they're not qualified."

CANTON (3-3), which had been in a horrendous goal slump, got goals from Pat Frederick, Tony Shiner Jr., Todd Nichols, Ivan Escobedo and Brad Neville. Shiner also picked up two assists.

Bob Neumann picked up the lone goal for Franklin (1-4-1).

Canton lost to Catholic Central 2-0 on Wednesday. CC's John Rama, a Plymouth resident, scored one goal and assisted on the other.

## Pedaling out of obscurity

Meet Plymouth Canton's anonymous athlete.

His name is Rob Daksiewicz. He's a cyclist.

"Most of my friends know what I do because I tell them and show them pictures," the soft-spoken Canton senior said. "But other people, I'll tell them I'm a cyclist and they'll say, 'Oh, you have a BMX.' Or they think I ride motorcycles. I tell them I race bikes, that kind of confuses them."

Daksiewicz shouldn't feel bad. Greg LeMond is a world champion cyclist and makes more than \$1 million a year, and he's hardly a household name in this country.

Anonymity sort of comes with the territory for the competitive cyclist, even after the widely successful movie "Breaking Away" and an Olympic gold medal in the summer of 1984 helped introduce the sport to America's general public.

"I GUESS (the lack of recognition among peers and classmates) bothers me a little," he said. "But, it's not a school sport. I'm not that concerned about it."

He is concerned about getting recognized by such national cycling teams as 7-11 in Colorado Springs, G.S. Mengori in California, C.E. Turin in Chicago or the Schwinn National Team in St. Louis.

For the past two summers he has done his best to attract their attention.

On Aug. 3, Daksiewicz placed 18th in the United States Cycling Federation (USCF) Junior National Road Race Championship in Milwaukee out of an international field of 170.

He completed the grueling 75-mile course in 3:14.0. That's a 25 mph pace.

In his next competition, Aug. 17, Daksiewicz won the Waterford Hills Critterium — a 20-mile circuit race. It was his first USCF victory.

"THAT WAS a great feeling," he said. "Breaking away from the pack and crossing the line."

The win capped off quite a summer for the young man. He placed third in the Johnny Bench Coors Prestige Classic in Cincinnati, third out of 200 in the Milwaukee Road Classic's National Prestige Event and sixth in the lucrative Wheat Thins Mayor's Cup in Troy. The summer's racing netted

Daksiewicz roughly \$1,500 — which more than paid for his \$1,200 Conti racing bike.

It's been a fast two-year climb.

His cycling career began innocently enough. His neighbor Jeff Krolicki, a junior at Canton and a defensive starter on the football team, convinced Daksiewicz to join him in a 24-hour marathon bike race on Belle Isle.

The two rode for 20 hours. Krolicki stuck with football. Daksiewicz was hooked on cycling.

"I had seen some racing before and read some magazines. I figured I'd like to give it a try," he said.

He promptly got his USCF license and joined the Great Lakes Cycling Club, a developmental club housed in Ann Arbor.

"THE GUYS in the club, the older guys, really helped me get started," he said.

And Daksiewicz did the rest virtually on his own. He competes nearly every weekend during the spring, summer and fall. He has organized a strenuous weekly training schedule which encompasses about 250 miles.

During the off season, he trains on a stationary cycling apparatus in his basement and partakes in cross country skiing and ice hockey.

"Right now I'm classified as a level three junior. Four is the highest and I have to compete internationally before I can be a four," he said.

Daksiewicz is hoping to travel to Italy this fall to compete.

He has one more year of junior eligibility, then he'll join the senior circuit (ages 18-34).

"As far as the national class seniors, I'm far away from them right now," he said. "But, I've raced against two- and three-level seniors (at the Ada-Lowell Stage Races) and placed seventh. Those are pretty much the cream of the crop around here."

In October, Daksiewicz will attend a four-day cycling course at the Olympic Training Center where he hopes to gain additional national exposure. He has also applied for acceptance on the 7-11 Junior Development Team in Colorado — the team from which the U.S. Olympic Team is formed.

Folks around the Plymouth-Canton Community School District may not know much about Rob Daksiewicz now, but he's working on it.

## Canton, Salem 0-for-1985 on gridiron

The glory days, for now anyway, are long gone for the Centennial Educational Park football teams.

Salem managed just 11 offensive plays in the first half.

"Our defense deserves a lot of credit," Moshimer said. "They did a heckuva job when you consider they were on the field nearly the whole game."

Central (3-0) ran 59 offensive plays to the Rocks' 25. In 52 rushes, Central gained just 140 yards. They completed one pass for 26 yards.

Kurt Urban, Ron Piwko and Joe Jouppi were the defensive standouts for Salem.

The two Central TDs came on 1-yard runs, one by Joe Gregart and the other by Tom Farr.

"I'll tell you what, I've been coaching for 27 years and I've never started a season with three straight losses," Moshimer said. "But I'm not about to quit so my players better not either."

**WALLED LAKE WESTERN 6, CANTON 6:** A headline in last Monday's Observer said something about the Canton

soccer team being inoffensive in terms of scoring goals. Compared to the Canton football team the kickers are downright productive.

The Chiefs could muster but two first downs Friday night. They gained 33 yards rushing and 21 yards passing — 54 yards total offense.

"It doesn't help that we lost Tony (Aiken, Canton's starting quarterback) and it doesn't help that we lost a starting guard before the season," said Canton coach Richard Barr. "It's just a struggle. It seems we're getting outmuscled up front and the defense is on the field too much."

Hall's third quarter 1-yard run was the game's lone tally.

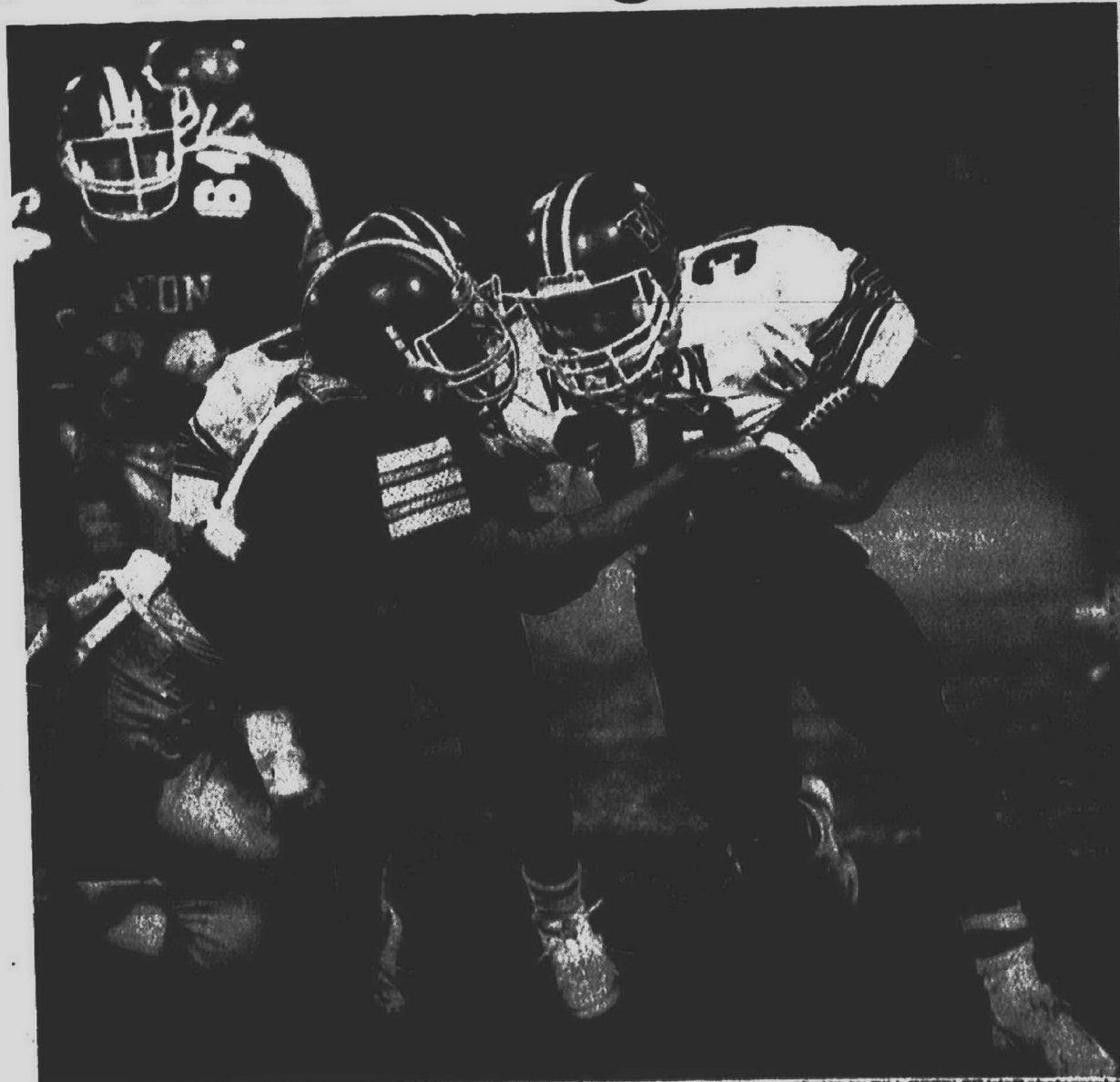
Numerous times the Canton defense shut the doors on Western drives inside Chief territory. One time the Chiefs held inside the 2 and blocked a field goal.

## Wayne's early boundaries

Not much is known of the original officers of the county, but records show land being purchased in 1799 from Louis Bond, sheriff of Wayne County. On May 3, 1802, when Detroiters elected their town officers under United States rule for the first time, women as well as men were permitted to vote.

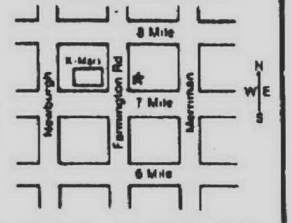

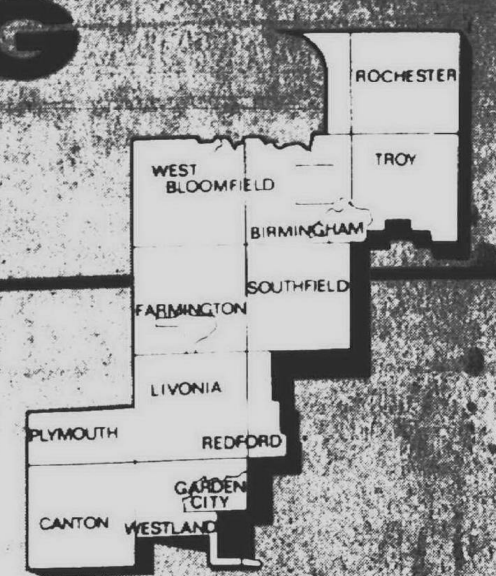
