## plymouth pipeline

**COMMISSIONED:** A few years back, quite a few, Jack Wilcox of Plymouth was commissioned an officer in the U.S. Naval Reserve. Last week Wilcox was commissioned again — this time as a member of the Plymouth City Commission. Wilcox, who owns the house at Union and Penniman popularly known as the "Wilcox House," was appointed and confirmed to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Jack Kenyon who had to resign after being elected to the Plymouth District Library Board. Wilcox will serve until a successor is elected in the Nov. 5 election.

**STEPS DOWN:** Lou LaRiche of LaRiche Chevrolet, Plymouth, recently was presented with an engraved silver tray and goblets upon stepping down as president of the Detroit Auto Dealers Association. LaRiche served as president of the 240-member dealer group during the 1984-85 term.

**MORE TALES:** Tonquish Tales, the history of the Indians in the Plymouth-Canton area, is almost sold out. Author Helen Gilbert of Plymouth, who pens the Tonquish Tales column which appears in the Plymouth Observer, says more than 1,000 copies have been sold and the edition soon will be out of print as the first printing was limited to 1,050 copies. A few may be available in local book stores.

**ILLEGAL SIGNS:** During October, the Plymouth Department of Public Works (DPW) will be collecting illegal signs placed in front of businesses. An illegal sign, says DPW Director Ken Vogras, is any type of sign considered temporary which has not been approved by the city, such as A-frames and promotional banners. The DPW will be picking up illegal signs on a monthly basis. If a business thinks its sign has been stolen they are advised to call the DPW at 453-7737 to arrange to pick up the sign at the DPW Yard. If the sign is picked up a second time, cautions Vogras, it will be destroyed.

**HALLOWEEN:** With Halloween just a short time ahead, Helen Smith of Plymouth would like to make a safety suggestion. Why can't Halloween be on the last Friday or Saturday in October, she asks, which would place the holiday before the clocks are placed back. Thus the little ones will be out collecting during daylight hours, and they would be out on a non-school night.

## Canadian money promotion ends

The continued slide in the value of the Canadian dollar has forced Plymouth merchants to abandon their practice of accepting Canadian currency at par value to American money from Canadian visitors.

The Canadian dollar was valued at 82-80 cents American when the par value program was launched in 1981. As of last week, the Canadian dollar had sunk to 73 cents American.

In the end, the gap in the exchange rate proved to be too much for most proprietors to absorb. The Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce indicated that more than 100 merchants participated during the promotion's heyday.

"It was one of those things," said Scott Lorenz, general manager of the Mayflower Hotel, who conceived the par-value plan. "All good things must come to an end, I guess."

More and more merchants dropped out of the highly publicized program as the exchange rate grew.

"RATHER THAN get bad PR, we felt we'd better let people know we're out of business," Lorenz said. "Let's go out in style."

Canadian media outlets and travel agents have been notified that the city-wide, par-value program has ended, Lorenz said.

However, the Mayflower will continue to accept Canadian money at par from foreign visitors, he added.

"I can't speak for the rest of the mer-

chants, but in a hotel, any room I didn't sell last night, I can't sell again," Lorenz said. "It's a perishable commodity. It's always better to sell it for something."

Rex Tubbs, owner of Engraving Connection, agreed that the par-value promotion was a good idea which had run its course.

Canadian traffic has been down most of the year, Tubbs said, and not being a high-volume store, his business was hurt by a steadily growing exchange rate.

Still, he said, "It was a terrific program."

Margaret Slezak, president of the Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce, said members wanted to let Canadians know about the discontinuation of the program in advance of

any future visits to prevent misunderstandings and ill will.

"RATHER THAN have people travel from Canada and not see (par-value) participation, it was decided to announce it publicly," she said. "They felt it was better to terminate it while it was still a good program."

"It is too bad it had to end, but we did want to end on a happy note."

Nancy Ball, owner of Hands on Leather, said she also has noticed fewer Canadian visitors recently.

"Now, I think it's time to treat people who are closer to us," Ball said.

Lorenz conceded that the local economic picture has brightened considerably since the par-value program began. "It came in the middle of the recession," he said. "Nobody was lining

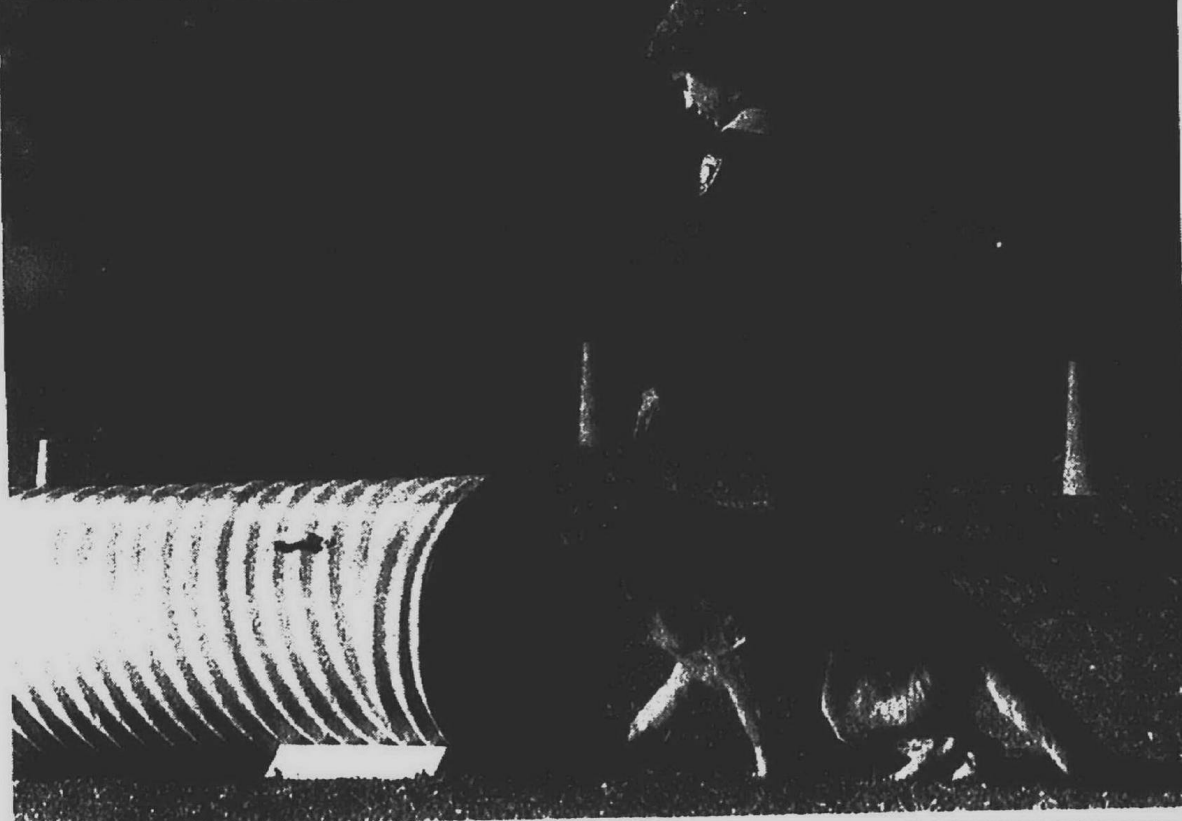
up outside anybody's door."

Lorenz said he's hopeful that Canadians will still find the par-value at his hotel worthwhile to make a trip into town. "Most (vacation) dollars go to motel, food and beverage," he said.

NEITHER Lorenz nor Slezak were willing to definitely project a revival of the program if the gap in exchange rates were to narrow.

Patrick L. Anderson, a staff economist at Manufacturers National Bank, said differences in the value of currencies result from the confidence level in a nation's economy, specifically its inflation rate.

"The major reasons currency is devalued and worth less in countries run an inflationary monetary policy. They print too much money," Anderson said.

## Public defender work put up for bid

More persons lacking the financial resources to hire their own defense attorneys have had brushes recently with the criminal law in 35th District Court.

And, because court administrator George Wiland expects a 20 percent increase in the number of public defender hours next year, he'll bid that work among area law firms in an effort to get the best possible deal for taxpayers who foot the bill.

The Canton law firm of D'Avanzo & Meconi has provided legal services to poor defendants in 35th District Court since July 1, 1983. Only 300 hours of annual service were required.

Now, 360 hours of work are expected annually.

"They do a good job — I would be more than happy to let them continue," Wiland said of D'Avanzo & Meconi. "But, because the condition of the bid has changed . . . we feel in all fairness, bids should be open."

ONLY TWO conditions — other than being duly licensed — have been established for attorneys who want the job of representing indigent defendants in the 35th District Court.

Bidders can't be a single practitioner due to the inevitable conflicts in availability which result in the practice of law.

Bidders also must reside or have an office within the jurisdiction of the court, which includes Canton, Plymouth, Plymouth Township, Northville and Northville Township.

"We felt if they are taking money out of the district, they ought to be paying rent or taxes in the district," Wiland said of prospective public defenders.

"What happened was they (D'Avanzo & Meconi) put in more hours than they agreed to and petitioned for greater

fees," Wiland said of the decision to re-bid the work now.

LAST YEAR, the firm won the job with a bid of \$7,140 for 300 hours. That averages to an hourly rate of \$23.80 — well below the going rate for private legal representation.

Wiland says he doesn't anticipate a dearth of bidders. As many as nine have sought the work in previous years.

While the initial public defender fee may be low, more lucrative spin-off business may result.

"What happens is there's ancillary work to be had," Wiland said.

"THEY MIGHT represent (court-appointed cases) in a driving under the influence of liquor case, then down the line, they might want you to handle a divorce (on a fee basis)."

"Some of these firms have a young lawyer who may have been with them a year or so and add this to his hours at no additional cost to the firm, pick up additional revenue and maybe pick up some new clients," he added.

District Judges James Garber and John MacDonald will make the ultimate selection, Wiland said.

The U.S. Supreme Court has ruled that all defendants are entitled to representation in criminal proceedings — at public expense if necessary.

THE 35TH District Court has jurisdiction over ordinance violations, drunk driving offenses and less serious crimes classified as misdemeanors.

Lawyers provide representation during pre-trial hearings, during trials themselves and during sentencing.

Persons who claim they're indigent usually are determined to be so after a few cursory questions about their employment status and property owner-

ship, Wiland said. "We don't go into any investigation."

Taxpayers who foot the bills shouldn't feel unduly burdened paying for legal fees for the poor, Wiland added.

"In the event of conviction, part of

the sentence is restitution for defense fees. We have relatively good success getting court-assigned counsel fees back," he said.

Wiland attributed the increase in public defense hours to an increase in

court cases generally. "The sheer increase in numbers itself will result in more people asking for representation."

Law firms have until Nov. 8 to get their bid in to Wiland.

## Bars going 'bare' in insurance crisis

If you're injured by a drunk driver and think you can collect a million off the bar that served him, think again.

"Seventy percent of Michigan tavern owners no longer carry liquor liability insurance," said Ronald Y. Gutman of the Farmington Hills firm of Kaufman and Payton.

The reasons: Jury awards against tavern owners have been so steep that insurance companies will no longer sell them policies. Or else the premiums are so high that the "drum shop," as lawyers call it, can't afford them.

The liquor situation is part of what Lansing calls the "liability crisis." The Michigan Legislature also is looking at problems in medical malpractice and governmental liability.

A special state Senate committee has issued a series of recommendations not only to ease the pain of lawsuits but to help keep taverns, doctors and governmental agencies from getting into trouble.

SEN. R. ROBERT Geake, R-North-

ville, introduced bills to implement part of the committee's recommendations. They provide:

• "Minors caught trying to buy alcohol would have their drivers' licenses suspended 30 days for a first offense, 60 days for a second and 90 days for a third."

• Licensed establishments — bars and package liquor stores — which sell to minors would be hit by a series of fines and could ultimately lose their licenses. Currently the state Liquor Control Commission may fine violators \$300. The Senate panel suggested a new limit of \$2,000.

Another part of the committee report suggested that the state encourage "organized programs of self-insurance" so that taverns wouldn't have to "go bare." Townships, cities and educational institutions have set up such self-insurance systems.

"IN MY district," said state Rep. Lyn Bankes, R-Livonia, "many tavern owners are reorganizing their businesses as two corporations — one owning

the land and building, the other owning the business."

"Then if they're sued, they can just turn over the keys to the business but keep ownership of the land and building."

Even prestigious spots such as the Park Place in Traverse City can't afford insurance. Park Place discontinued serving drinks.

"Francesco's on Michigan Avenue closed its doors rather than go bare," reported state Sen. Patrick McColough, D-Dearborn, whose district stretches to Garden City.

"PLAINTIFFS THINK they can get more money from a tavern owner with a high insurance policy," attorney Gutman told a state Senate committee recently. "But they may end up with nothing if the trend of liquor establishments going without insurance continues because carriers refuse to write policies in Michigan."

"Reasonable caps must be set on

dram shop awards to woo insurance carriers back to Michigan," Gutman said. The state must require mandatory "reasonable and affordable" insurance coverage for sellers of alcohol, too, he added.

He urged that Michigan's dram shop law be changed to prevent "double recovery," where a plaintiff is paid damages by both the drunk driver and the tavern owner.

Gutman's law firm, which also has offices in Detroit and Grand Rapids, conducts annual seminars on dram shop law and litigation. Its attorneys frequently contribute articles on the subject to legal and business journals.

Gutman testified at hearings before a subcommittee the Senate Select Committee on Civil Justice Reform, which adopted his recommendation that bartenders be trained in how to recognize drunken behavior.

THE SENATE panel wouldn't recommend ending dram shop liability entirely. The liability is based on old case law holding that the person who serves a drunk driver can be sued for damages done by the drunk driver.

In its report — part of a larger booklet also covering medical malpractice and governmental liability — the senators said "the dram shop system of liability must be preserved. (But) the dram shop liability system is breaking down."

The committee proposed limiting the legal concept of "joint and several liability," in which the defendant with the "deepest pockets" could wind up paying the full judgment.

It noted dram shop law was enacted to make taverns "a secondary source of compensation for innocent victims" injured by drunk drivers. "In practice, however, these licensees have become the primary source of compensation."

TAVERNS losing lawsuits would be allowed to pay off non-economic (pain and suffering) damages over \$100,000 in installments. The installments would cover only the injured person's lifetime.

Suppose a person drinks at several bars before causing an accident. Should all be subject to lawsuit?

No, said the Senate panel. "Only the last licensee patronized by an alleged intoxicated person is liable for damages caused by that person," it suggested — adding that would be a "rebuttable presumption."

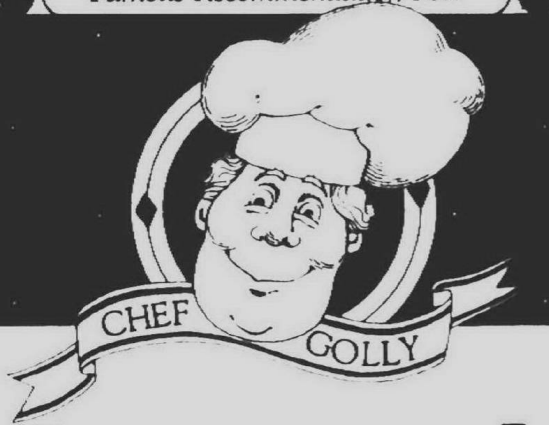

# UM-D unveils Ford powerhouse

Saturday tour: restored powerhouse, boathouse of Henry Ford

"When you finish one thing," says David Conrad, "all you have to do is look around and find something else that needs fixing."

Since 1977, Conrad has volunteered time and work to restore the powerhouse next to auto pioneer Henry Ford's residence on the University of Michigan-Dearborn campus.

The powerhouse and boathouse, on the Rouge River, will be the sites of tours and presentations when the campus holds open house Saturday, Oct. 19. UM-D is on Evergreen just south of Ford Road. Hours are 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

CONRAD BEGAN work at the powerhouse when he was a UM-D engineering student.

Another student, Burt Burley, had submitted a detailed proposal to the university to renovate the building, which had stood dormant since the death of Clara Ford in 1950. With the university supplying materials and the volunteers donating their time, the students began work.

Volunteers found frozen control gates and accelerator controls, 10 feet of water covering the turbines, and various other states of disrepair as a result of 25 years of non-use, Conrad said.

Still, major pieces of equipment didn't need to be replaced, but only inspected, cleaned, or modified.

THE POWERHOUSE, built in 1914, was completed before the actual Fair Lane mansion, so that construction workers could use the services of the building when working on the mansion.

Among the five floors of equipment are electric generators, an air compressor, brine and ammonia pumps for refrigeration, water filters for the swimming pool, a 12-car garage, boilers, phone equipment, the centralized vacuum cleaner, and more.

In 1983, the first major result of volunteer efforts came into being, with the restoration to working condition of both of the turbine engines. Since that time, Conrad and his co-workers have continued to work on the remaining components.

The university has also renovated other areas of the powerhouse to become the Henry Ford Estate's visitor center, and the starting point for general tours.

WHEN THE DIRT and slag were finally removed, workers found the earth-integrated structure to be in generally good condition.

Werling envisions many uses for the boathouse once the renovation is complete.

Werling would like to show historic Ford films on video cassette players, install a model of the "Callie B" (the Fords' boat, and nickname for Clara Bryant) on the ground floor, and possibly even hold chamber music concerts there.

Still further in the future, the Estate director would like to institute canoe rides and pontoon boat rides on the cleaned-up river in front of the boathouse.

JACK SMILEY, a 1973 U of M-D graduate, continues to assist in the boathouse restoration.

Admission is free for the Oct. 19 Open House to view the beauty of the boathouse, and the engineering wonders of the powerhouse. Also included are tours, demonstrations, lectures, and exhibits on every other part of university life.

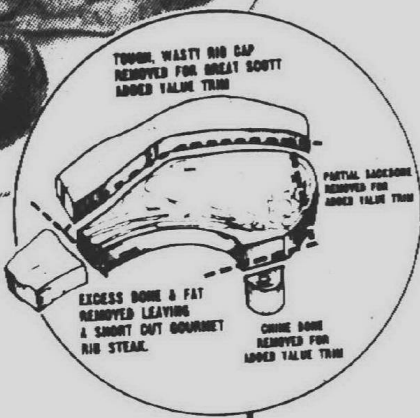

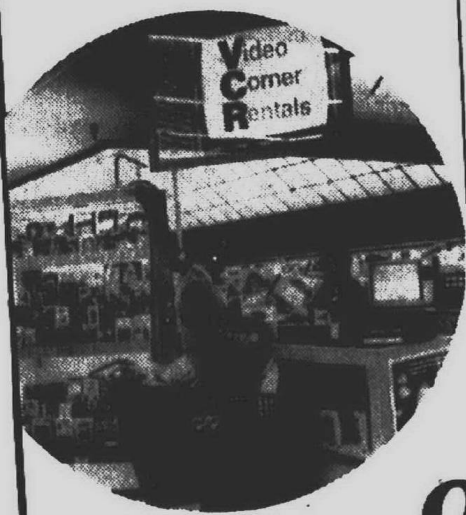

# Jobs: name of the game in SC placement office

They get pretty aggressive at Schoolcraft College when it comes to touting the Career Planning and Placement Service for students and townfolk.

Dr. Jim Tunney, a National Football League referee and motivational speaker, will be on campus at 8 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 17, in the Waterman Center on campus at 18600 Haggerty, Livonia.

"It helps attract business attention to the college," said Dr. Jean E. Pike, who directs the Career Planning and Placement Service.

"And he'll teach students how to sell themselves to prospective employers."

Tunney's speech is entitled "Here's to the Winners." Tickets are \$10 each.

He will cover success through visual imagery, a positive winning attitude, overcoming failure, goal setting, teamwork and the value of giving. An educator for 27 years, Tunney is president-elect of the National Speakers Association.

"Tunney fits these lectures in between games," she said.

LAST SEMESTER the CPPS presented Morris Massey, popular management lecturer, to a sellout

crowd. He was the first in what is expected to be an annual series. Pike's current budget allows her one such speaker a year.

Pike's office will help any student find at least a part-time job to help pay college expenses to the commuter campus. "We also do career counseling, for students, alumni and the community. We can help you look up information on careers and do career testing," she said. "You can come in off the street, or make an appointment."

Schoolcraft has two certified career counselors. Pike, who has a Ph.D. in counseling and guidance from U-M, taught three years at Kellogg Community College in Battle Creek and joined the new-born Schoolcraft College in 1984, organizing and teaching secretarial science courses and coordinating student advising.

She also has been in the offices of student activities, admissions and counseling and has headed the CPPC since 1982.

THE CPPC has been expanded in recent years, reflecting President Richard McDowell's emphasis on service to industry and the public's concern with jobs in southeastern Michigan's changing economy.

Pike and the CPPC also hustle prospective employers, talking up the college's nearly 50 career programs in allied health, business, liberal arts, public service and technical fields.

Often throughout the year, CPPC announces seminars and workshops for people seeking jobs or career changes.

Among the topics are resume writing, interviewing techniques, job searches and career planning. They're free.

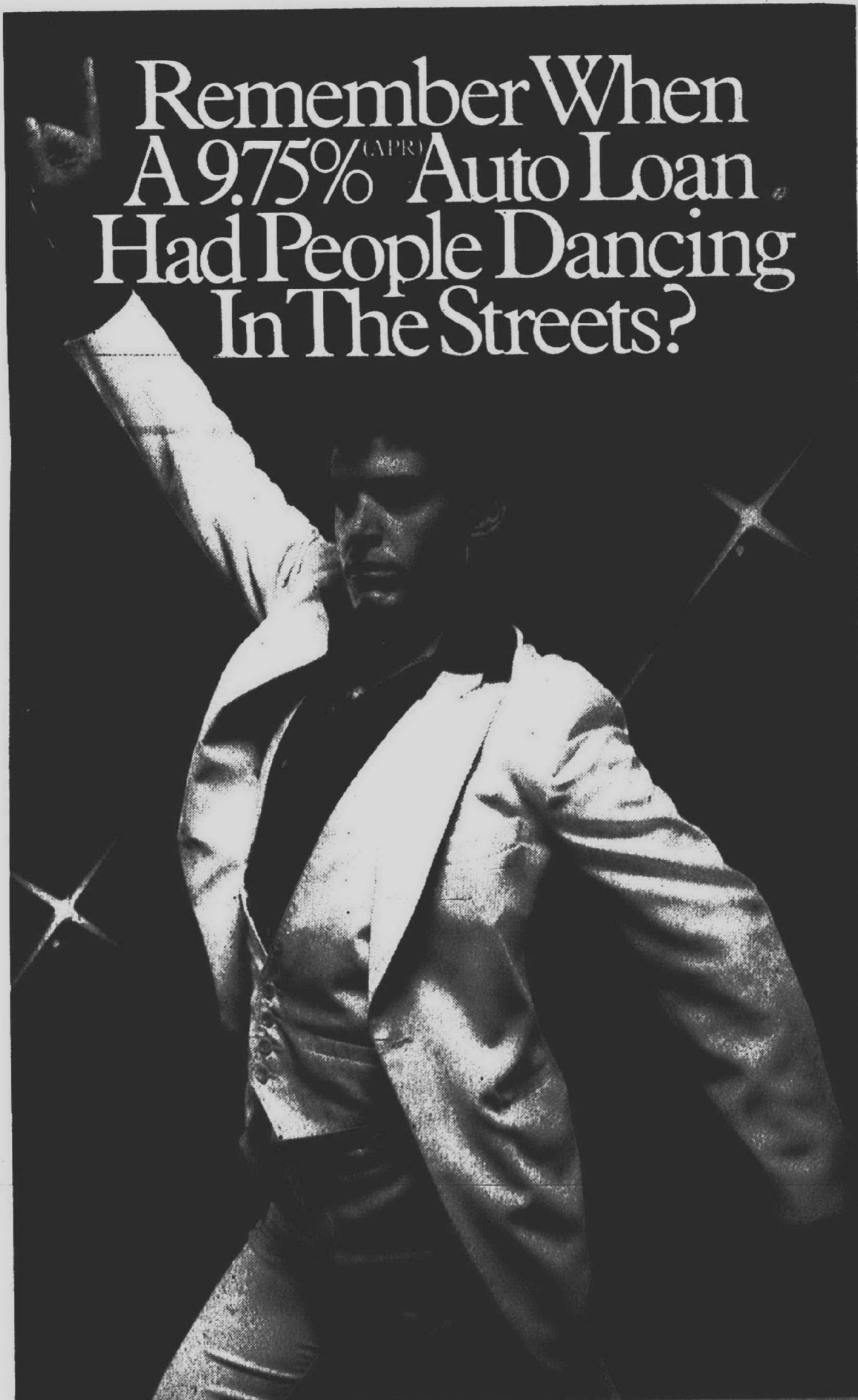

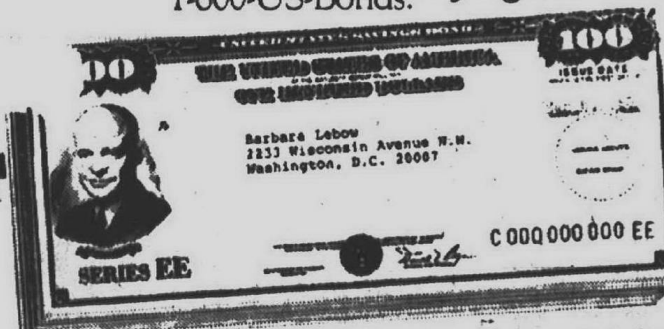

# Clarence Moore: hard work was his strength

THE LANDMARK farm where Clarence Moore raised clean-faced Montadale sheep in the heart of the city for almost 40 years is about to become a thing of the past.

First Clarence died, then the sheep were sold and now comes word that a housing development will soon spring up on the pasture where Clarence once tended his flock.

He would call "Hey, Nannie!" and his ewes and lambs would run toward him for their handout of apples.

"Sheep love apples," he told me when I visited the hide-away farm in 1979 to interview him for two articles that appeared in the Observer that year.

THE DISAPPEARANCE of the sheep and the farm are much easier to take than the disappearance of the man. Moore, who died at age 89 in July 1984, was one of a kind.

I first met Clarence in Hillsdale on a winter's night almost 20 years ago. We were participating in a conference sponsored at Hillsdale College by the Plymouth Chamber of Commerce. It was part of a community-wide effort to promote more cooperation between the City and the Township of Plymouth.

During an intermission, Clarence suggested that we get a breath of fresh air. It was quite dark out, and the snow was falling at a brisk pace.

As we walked around the campus, I learned something about Clarence's origins and life before he came to Plymouth, where he was a prominent part of the industrial scene for more than 30 years.

BORN OF Scottish/Irish parents in 1895, Moore was brought up on his father's 640-acre farm in Newton, N.J. Thirteen mountain peaks were visible from the farm where the Moores milked 80 cows, used six teams of horses during the plowing season, and had four tenant houses on the property.

While on the farm, Clarence married and had two children. Tragedy came to him during the terrible influenza epidemic that ravaged the U.S. in 1918 and 1919. Among the 500,000 deaths brought on by the disease were those of Clarence's young wife and their two children.

He was in his 20s when his first family died. When he told me about it on that snowy night on the Hillsdale campus he was 71. It was apparent that the passage of half a century had not eradicated the sorrow he felt at the loss.

At loose ends, Clarence left the family farm in 1922, spent two years on the West Coast, returned to Newton in 1924. He and a brother established a wholesale and retail ice business. In 1928, they opened a garage.

MEANTIME, IN 1928, Clarence married for the second time. His bride was Lula Mae Aspell who still lives in their home on Burroughs Street. They had two children, Helen and Richard, both residents of Plymouth.

Clarence brought the family to Plymouth in 1932. He and his wife's cousin, Albert Curry, became partners in the Plymouth Stamp- ing Co. They began the firm in the old Mark- ham Air Rifle Building, then owned by the Daisy Manufacturing Co. After Curry died in 1937 Clarence continued to run the company, moving it to a new building on Ann Arbor Road in 1952.

The Moores acquired their home on Burroughs in 1932. They bought the remainder of their seven acres from a neighbor, William Bake, just after World War II.

BEFORE buying the adjoining Bake property, Moore asked City Manager C. H. Elliott if it was permissible to raise farm

animals on it. He was told yes. He made sure the reply was in writing. The letter was still in his files the day I interviewed him.

Moore retired from business in 1963 at age 68 — but not to a rocking chair.

I don't know whether he had ever read Thomas Carlyle, the Scottish philosopher, but they had something in common: they both believed strongly in the work ethic.

Clarence worked diligently all of his life. He worked hard for his family, for his church, for the Salvation Army, for his service club, for the Plymouth Historical Society, and for the sheep he kept as a hobby.

HE PUT in many hours a week as chairman of the Christian Science Church's building committee, and negotiated the sale of the old church on Main Street when one was built on Ann Arbor Trail. I often saw him pruning the trees in front of the new church that was built on the property where the John Kellogg house once stood.

He was an active member of the Kiwanis Club of Plymouth for 47 years and its president in 1949. When the club sold fruitcakes to raise funds for charitable purposes, no one outdid Clarence — one year he personally sold almost 1,800 cakes. I remember his visiting our house and asking, "How many do you want this year, one or two?"

When the Plymouth Hall of Fame was es-

tablished in 1980 by the Kiwanis Club, Clarence Moore was one of the first to be elected to it.

MOORE SERVED as finance chairman of the Plymouth Historical Society during the early 1970s when its museum was under construction. It was Clarence who raised money for the land and for the interior designing of the museum.

Along with Louis Norman and others, he labored 40 hours a week for 13 months on a volunteer basis to help build the museum's display units and "Main Street" facade.

He was 84 when I visited him on the farm in 1979. He told me that between 1945 and 1979, he had raised about 350 sheep. He averaged about 10 lambs a year from his ewes.

"I got five sets of twins and one set of triplets from six ewes last Spring," he told me with a sense of great achievement.

A tall, spare man without an ounce of fat on him, Clarence grinned when I asked him how he managed to tend sheep, feed chickens, cultivate fruit trees and a berry patch, hoe his extensive vegetable and flower gardens and still find time for civic projects.

"My father used to tell me that hard work kills no one," he said, "but worry will." Clarence Moore never had time to worry.

## World of travel waits for verdict on hijackers

USED TO BE the troubles that accompanied intrepid travelers ranged from the ravages of "tourista," to lost traveler's checks or missing baggage.

No more. That kind of inconvenience is strictly bush league.

Ask a returning traveler about his foreign trip, and he may tell you about an airline hijacking, a bomb scare, or, yes, even the pirating of a love boat cruising in usually quiet waters.

The outrage of last week's sea-jacking of an Italian cruise ship, the Achille Lauro, and the murder of an American tourist still rankles. But you find yourself pondering: "What next?"

Travel agents are right in the line of fire, some being pummeled by cancellations left and right, others taking a calm, collected "this will blow over, too" attitude.

Marilyn Klein, chief of the Sunrise Travel agency in Southfield, says the clients who have been flocking to Europe because of the strength of the American dollar most of this year are thinking twice before booking trips.

"We've seen media lists published of where not to go. That kind of information is bound to make clients nervous," Klein says.

"It's just been one thing after another. We had a storm of cancellations after the TWA

flight was hijacked and since the Mexican earthquake. Now, we're taking calls to cancel cruises, too."

FOLLOWING the hijacking of the TWA flight in Athens earlier this year, most travel agents suffered a backlash. Perry Huellmantel, president of the Paul Henry Travel Agency in Lathrup Village, said, "This is off-season for cruising both in the Caribbean and in the Mediterranean. The Mediterranean cruise market is the smallest. Those cruises are for seasoned travelers, who have done Europe and other cruises already."

As far as Huellmantel is concerned, "As a fatalist, if I get safely to the airport, I feel 90 percent of the battle is over."

"Remember, just a few years ago, no one did the kind of travel that's common today, and some that did came home with incurable diseases."

Huellmantel believes that the finest side benefit of tourism is to make Americans appreciate what they have at home. He's optimistic that the travel business will overcome the latest problems "though the ports of Alexandria and Port Said may be uncomfortable for some for quite awhile."

"TRAVEL today is still very safe," he said. Yolanda Jimenez, president of Doneson Travel, says it's fortunate that the Palestinian terrorists who hijacked the Achille Lauro quickly found it almost impossible to control the large ship, hundreds of passengers and crew members.

"But it's awful to think that people feel they can't vacation anywhere in the world they choose," she says.

"I had a call from a man who booked a Caribbean cruise for December, and he's very concerned. Others calling are also fearful."

Jimenez tells clients if they're uncomfortable they shouldn't travel. "Maybe this is the time to travel the good old U.S.A.," she comments. "People will base their decision on

what happens to the hijackers."

IN THIS CRAZY quilt world of ours, the fate of the terrorist hijackers isn't as open-and-shut as it should be. It remains to be seen just what kind of justice will be meted out to the four Palestinians now apprehended and imprisoned in Italy.

I vote for the kind of world Jimenez longs for — where all people may travel wherever their dreams persuade them to journey.

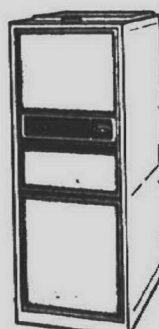

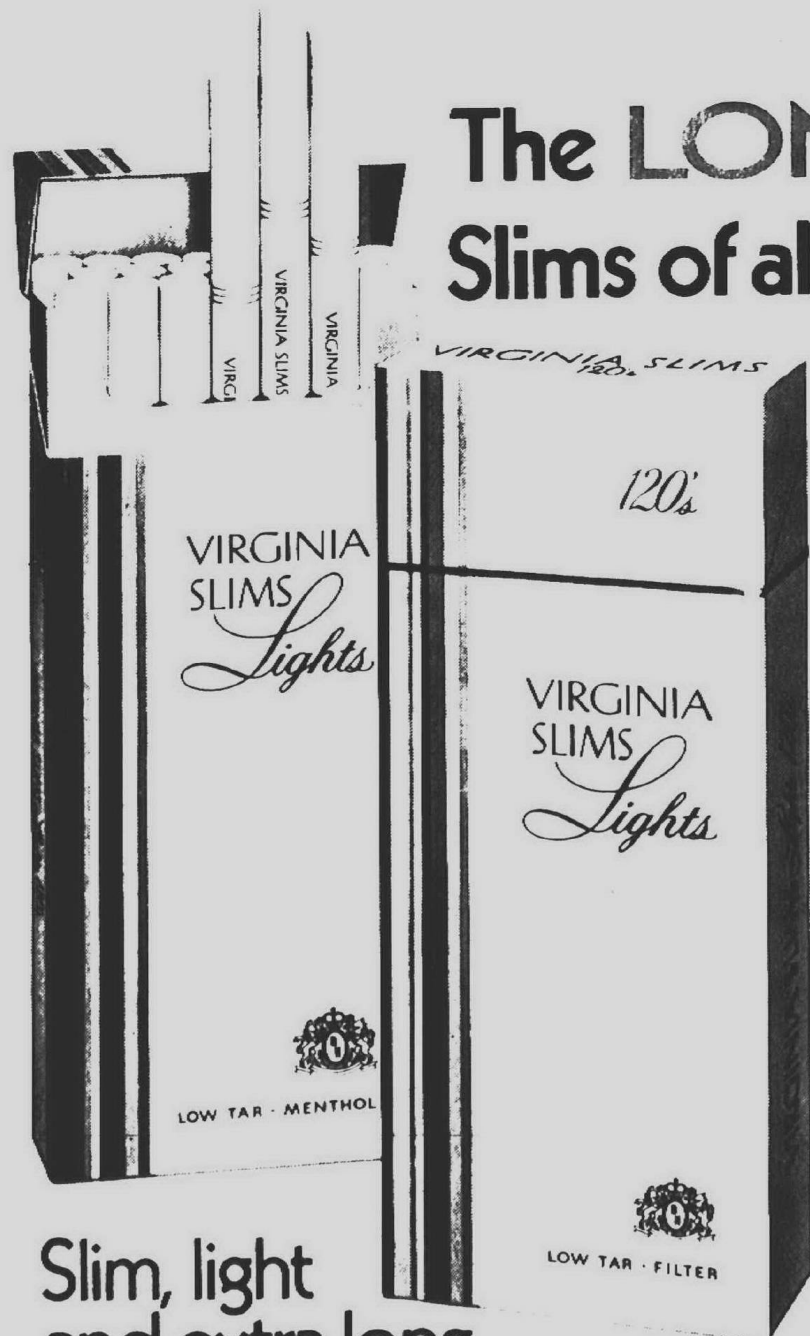

### LO-CAL CHEF'S SALAD

- 4 large chicken breast halves
- 1 cup water
- 1/2 cup dry white wine
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 carrot, cut in half
- 1 small onion, quartered
- 1/2 cantaloupe, cut into thin wedges
- 1/2 honeydew melon, cut into thin wedges
- 1 red or golden apple, cored and cut into thin wedges
- 2 oranges, peeled and sliced
- Red and/or white seedless grapes
- Lettuce, shredded
- Soybean Oil Vinaigrette Dressing\*

Place chicken in a single layer in a 10-inch skillet. Add water, wine, bay leaf, carrot, and onion. Bring to a boil, reduce heat, cover, and simmer 15 minutes, or until chicken is fork tender. Cool. Remove from broth; skin and bone. Cut into thin slices. Arrange chicken and fruit attractively on beds of shredded lettuce. Drizzle each salad with 2 tablespoons dressing. Garnish with kiwi slices and strawberries, if desired. Note: Any combination of fresh fruit may be used.

### VINAIGRETTE DRESSING

- 1-1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1 tablespoon mustard powder
- 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 2/3 cup white wine vinegar
- 2 cups soybean oil
- 1/4 cup finely chopped onion
- 1/4 cup finely chopped parsley
- 1 hard-boiled egg, finely chopped
- 1 tablespoon finely chopped capers
- 1-1/2 teaspoons minced chives
- 1/4 cup chopped pimientos
- Tarragon leaves to taste

Dissolve seasonings in vinegar. Add oil and mix vigorously. Stir in remaining ingredients. Makes about 3-2/3 cups.

### GRILLED CHICKEN, RICE, AND SPINACH SALAD

- 4 large chicken breast halves
- 2 cups cooked rice
- 2 cups shredded fresh spinach leaves
- 1/2 cup sliced fresh mushrooms
- Dressing\*

Skin and bone chicken breasts. Wash and pat dry. Pour 1/4 cup of Dressing\* over chicken. Marinate at least 30 minutes, turning once or twice. Meanwhile, combine rice, spinach, and mushrooms. Cover and refrigerate. Remove chicken from dressing; drain well. Discard the marinade. Pan broil chicken pieces in a 10-inch non-stick skillet or ridged griddle 5 minutes over medium-high heat. Turn and cook 2 to 3 minutes. Cut into long strips and arrange attractively on top of salad. Serve with remaining dressing. Makes 4 servings.

\*Dressing:

- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon ground white pepper
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons white wine vinegar
- 1/2 cup soybean oil

Combine salt, sugar, pepper, lemon juice, and vinegar in small jar. Shake until sugar dissolves. Add oil and shake well before using. Makes 3/4 cup.

### COCONUT AND RICE CUSTARD

- 1 cup cooked rice
- 2 tablespoons flaked coconut
- 5 egg whites
- 2 cups skim milk
- Artificial sweetener to taste
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

Divide rice evenly among 6 custard cups. Add 1 teaspoon coconut to each. Beat egg whites and the milk until just combined—do not overmix. Stir in vanilla. Pour into custard cups. Set them in a pan of hot water. Bake at 375° for 40 minutes, or until knife inserted comes out clean. Chill. If desired, spoon 1/4 cup fruit sauce onto each serving plate. Unmold custard and place on top of sauce. Garnish as desired. Makes 6 servings.

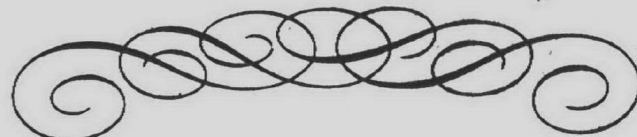

### CHICKEN ALMONDINE WITH RICE

(Not Illustrated)

- 4 large chicken breast halves
- 2 tablespoons soybean oil
- 1/2 cup unsweetened pineapple juice
- 1/2 cup unsalted, fat-free chicken broth
- 1/8 teaspoon granulated garlic
- 1/8 teaspoon ground white pepper
- 1-1/2 teaspoons cornstarch
- 1/4 cup slivered almonds, toasted
- 2 cups hot cooked rice

Skin and bone chicken. Remove all visible fat. Heat soybean oil in wok or 10-inch skillet on medium-high heat. Add chicken and saute until brown on both sides. Pour off all fat and discard. Add pineapple juice, broth, garlic, and pepper to skillet. Simmer, basting frequently, about 15 minutes, or until chicken is tender. Dissolve cornstarch in 1 tablespoon water. Stir into skillet. Cook, stirring, until sauce is clear and thickened. Sprinkle in almonds. Serve over beds of fluffy rice. Makes 4 servings.



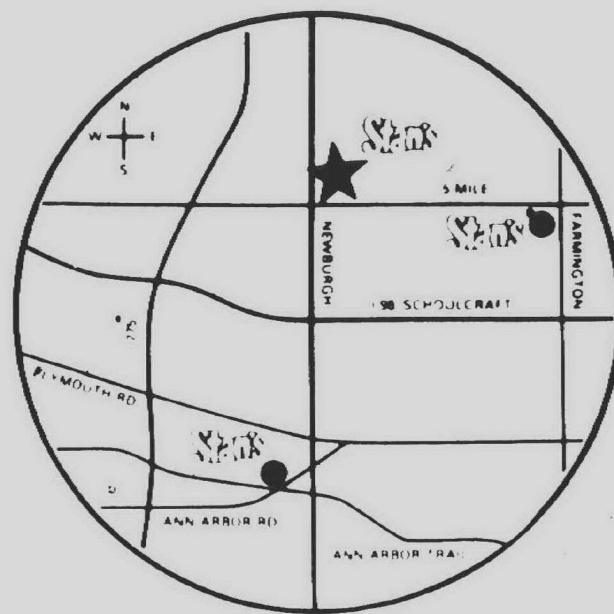

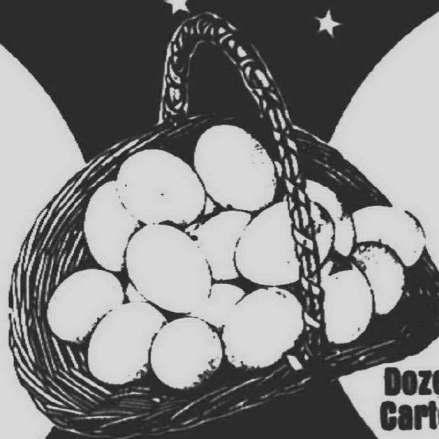

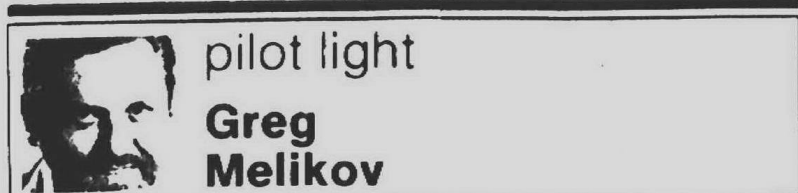

## Red beans are quick to make

I'd like to nominate my wife for bean-cooking queen. Red or white, Anita really knows her beans.

Unfortunately, she belongs to the pinch-of-this, pinch-of-that club. So you have to persuade her to join the measure-this, measure-that circle for a spell.

She did, one Sunday afternoon, so I could share with her friends and you the fantastic recipe for red beans. She says the concoction is a cross between Cuban and Puerto Rican red beans.

Anita also cooks on unusual settings — such as a little higher than medium or a little lower than medium high — on our electric stove. For convenience, I've rounded off the burner designations.

Alas, she has her own method of beanmanship. First, she does not soak beans overnight.

"You don't have to," she contends. Secondly, Anita snubs the quick-boil technique.

She just washes the beans, picks out any foreign particles and plunks them in a large pot, such as the bottom half of a pressure cooker.

You know, the beans come out great.

Anita usually adds a little salt, depending on how salty the beans end

up. Actually, most of the time, they need none.

### ANITA'S RED BEANS

- 1 package (14 oz) kidney beans
- 1 bay leaf
- 2 ham or pork hocks
- 1 soup spoon bacon fat
- 1/2 lb salt pork, sliced and halved
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1/2 green pepper, chopped
- 3 garlic cloves, minced
- 1/4 tsp dried oregano leaves
- 1/4 tsp dried parsley flakes
- 1/4 tsp cumin
- 1/2 tsp black pepper
- 1 can (8 oz) tomato sauce

Wash beans, place in large pot half-filled with water, bring to boil and cook loosely covered on medium-high heat 30 minutes. Add bay leaf and hocks, reduce heat to medium, cover and cook about 1 hour, until fork-tender, adding water if needed. In large skillet, melt bacon fat, brown salt pork on both sides, add onion, green pepper and garlic, stir in seasonings and fry several minutes; stir in tomato sauce, bring to boil and let bubble several minutes, stirring. Stir mixture into beans. Cook beans covered on medium heat another 15 minutes. Serve over white rice. Serves a crowd.

## These soups are low-sodium

Most menus planned for low-sodium diets don't contain many soup recipes. That's because soups usually taste flat without salt. There is, however, some hope. For many, the nip of ground black pepper — the world's most popular spice — seems to help fill the void. (Many dining tables now carry only the pepper shaker for seasoning to taste without adding extra sodium.)

This low-sodium pea soup with carrots and celery (plus its leaves) can be made by spicing with minced onion, dill weed, thyme, garlic powder and the black pepper. It's a marvelously satisfying yet low-cost winter dish.

A Meat Borscht using only a half-pound of lean beef makes another filling, low-cost winter soup. In addition to beets, it's made with potatoes, fresh carrots and cabbage. The traditional spices are minced onion and caraway seed, plus the black pepper.

For those who aren't cutting out salt entirely, a quarter-teaspoon of salt added during preparation to either recipe is enough to give it a well-seasoned taste.

- ### HEARTY SPLIT PEA SOUP
- (low-sodium)
- 10 cups water
  - 1 package (16 oz) split green peas, sorted and washed
  - 1/4 cup instant minced onion
  - 2 bay leaves
  - 1 tsp dill weed
  - 1 tsp thyme leaves, crushed
  - 1/2 tsp garlic powder
  - 1/2 tsp ground black pepper
  - 2 cups sliced carrots
  - 2 cups sliced celery
  - 1 cup coarsely chopped celery leaves
  - 2 tsp lemon juice

In a large saucepan combine water, split peas, onion, bay leaves, dill weed,

thyme, garlic powder and black pepper. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer, covered, for 45 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add carrots, celery and celery leaves. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer, covered, until vegetables are tender, about 15 minutes, adding more water, if needed. Stir in lemon juice. Remove bay leaves. For a smoother texture, puree half of the soup (4 cups) in an electric blender or food processor. If reheated add more water, if needed.

- ### MEAT BORSCHT
- 2 tsp vegetable oil
  - 8 oz boneless lean beef (shoulder or round) cut into 1/2-inch cubes
  - 6 cups water

- 1 cup diced unpeeled potatoes
- 1 cup shredded carrots
- 1 cup shredded cabbage
- 1 can (16 oz) sliced beets, drained
- 2 tsp tomato paste
- 1/2 cup instant minced onion
- 1/4 tsp caraway seed
- 1/4 tsp ground black pepper
- 2 tsp vinegar

In a large saucepan heat oil until hot. Add beef. Cook until browned, about 5 minutes. Add water, potatoes, carrots, cabbage, beets, tomato paste, onion, caraway seed and black pepper. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer, covered, 15 to 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. Stir in vinegar. Simmer, covered, for 1 minute.

## Recipes for singles

Most recipes are written for four or more servings. But what happens when there's only one at the table. Unless the single cook is a math wizard or quick with a calculator, reducing ingredients and cooking times in recipes can be a real challenge.

To help solve the "proportion problem" that is faced by the ever-growing singles population (now estimated at nearly 25 percent of U.S. households), Maytag enlisted the help of its lonely repairman in producing a cookbook especially for singles titled "Ol' Lonely's Guide to Cooking Alone."

The 16-page booklet contains dinner menus ranging from a basic cheese omelet to Fettuccine Alfredo, and culminates in a "Romantic Dinner for Two," featuring shrimp spread, broiled steak, cheese baked potatoes and Bananas Foster.

### BANANAS FOSTER FOR TWO

- 2 small bananas
- 2 tbsp butter
- 2 tsp brown sugar
- 1 tsp rum extract
- Whipped topping (optional)

Peel two small bananas and quarter. Set aside. Put 2 tbsp butter and 2 tsp brown sugar in glass pie plate. Microwave at full power for 1-2 minutes, stirring once or twice. Remove from microwave and stir in 1 tsp rum extract. Put bananas in mixture and roll to coat. Microwave at full power for 30 seconds. Serve in individual dessert dishes with whipped topping and, if desired, a small cookie.

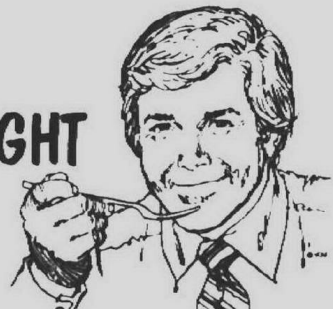
A social consciousness found expression as the earliest publicly support institution for the indigent in Wayne County,

## Patsy Cline's life comes to screen as soapish drama

"Sweet Dreams" is OK but not much more. The whole enterprise is rather boring, in spite of some pretty good performances, notably Jessica Lange as country/western singer Patsy Cline, Ann Wedgeworth as her mother Hilda Hensley, and Ed Harris as Patsy's second husband, Charlie Dick.

Producer Bernard Schwartz ("Coal Miner's Daughter") and director Karel Reisz ("Night Must Fall") seem intent on avoiding the cliched Hollywood struggle to show-biz success. Instead they present a maudlin domestic tragedy that overwhelms the music as the characters put their worst foot forward.

Patsy Cline was a talented Virginia girl whose singing career was characterized by a somewhat unusual popular appeal for a country/western star. Her career was cut short by a tragic 1963 plane crash when she was 30 years old.

Patsy sang at the Grand Ole Opry, the Hollywood Bowl, Carnegie Hall and on the "Arthur Godfrey Show" — only the first and last are seen in the film — as well as in a lot of bars and roadhouse joints, in real life and in the film.

**HER DOMESTIC** life was not as successful. Since her first husband, Gerald Cline (James Staley), was a boring old stick-in-the-mud, she divorced him in favor of Charlie Dick, a hard-drinking, lovable but sometimes brutish boor.

Their lives, which fill most of "Sweet Dreams," had ups and downs, mostly the latter if the film is to be believed. Typical of the downs was her disfigurement in an auto accident while going to get more beer for her sister's graduation party. After much rehabilitative therapy, the ugly purple scars disappear.

Charlie's beatings didn't leave visible scars.

Patsy's particular throaty and sentimental style, a blend of romantic ballads and country/western, is pleasant to listen to. The "Sweet Dreams" soundtrack contains many of Patsy's recordings made between 1960 and 1963. Lange's contribution to this film includes excellent lip synch with those recordings, with only one slight miss — a considerable effort considering the large number of musical numbers.

But the continual alteration of domestic conflict (occasionally a little love) with Patsy's solos is not the stuff of which great films are made, or even particularly entertaining ones. It seems that producer Schwartz, director Reisz and screenwriter Robert Getchell ("Alice Doesn't Live Here Anymore") never decided clearly what kind of movie they wanted to make.

If this were to be a show-biz spectacular, then the film needs more than Lange's solo performances as Patsy, no matter how well done those sequences may be. The Hollywood Bowl, Carnegie Hall and the Grand Ole Opry have a lot more show-biz excitement than "Sweet Dreams" does.

**THE ARTHUR** Godfrey interlude is almost embarrassing, as Bruce Kirby mugs his way through playing it like the last-place contestant in an Arthur Godfrey-Look-Alike Contest.

By-and-large, Patsy ambles on through, however slowly, to a successful singing career with no real struggle, except with her husband Charlie who beats her quite regularly. Their struggle is also apparent on the psychological level.

"The Patsy Cline Story," as told in "Sweet Dreams," never rises above its materials, no matter how hard and how well Lange and Harris try.

Country-western fans will enjoy this rendition but I got tears in my ears from lying on my back and crying over big-budget films that waste a lot of talent on a weak story.

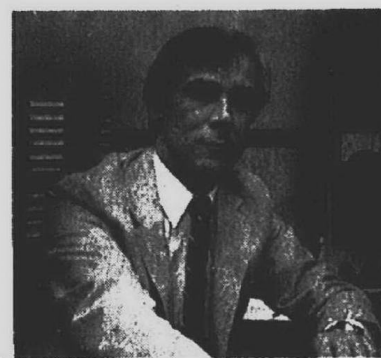

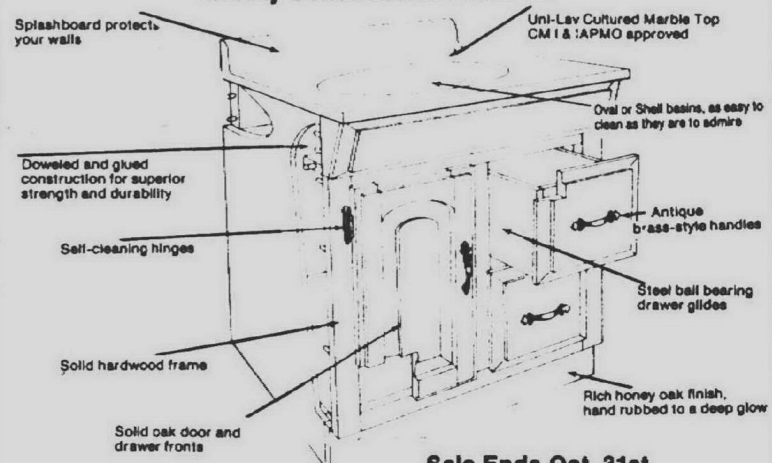

## If you still believe in me, save me.

For nearly a hundred years, the Statue of Liberty has stood on the edge of the New World, America's most powerful symbol of freedom and hope. Today the ravages of almost a century of weather and pollution have left their marks. Corrosion has eaten away at the iron framework. New holes continue to appear in the copper sheets that form the exterior.

Less than a mile away, on Ellis Island where the ancestors of nearly half of all Americans first stepped onto American soil, the Great Hall of the Immigration Center is a hollow ruin. Rooms are vandalized, passageways overgrown with vegetation, walls crumbling in decay.

Inspiring plans have been developed to restore the Statue and to create at Ellis Island a living monument to the ethnic diversity of this country of immigrants. But unless restoration is begun now, ceremonies marking the hundredth anniversaries of these two landmarks in America's heritage could be held in commemoration of

national treasures that no longer exist. Sections of the statue have already been declared unsafe and closed to visitors. The 230 million dollars needed to carry out the work is needed now.

All of the money must come from private donations; the federal government is not raising the funds. This is consistent with the origins of the Statue. The French people themselves paid for its creation. And thousands of American school children contributed to its construction and to the pedestal.

The Statue of Liberty-Ellis Island Centennial Commission appointed by President Reagan is asking every American business, every American citizen to join in raising these funds. The torch of liberty is everyone's to cherish. Could we hold up our heads as Americans if we allowed the time to come when she can no longer hold up hers?

One hundred years ago school children gave their pennies to put her up. Your dollars can keep her from falling down.

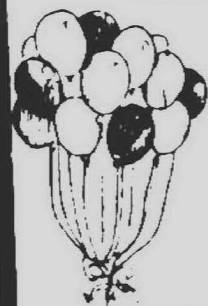

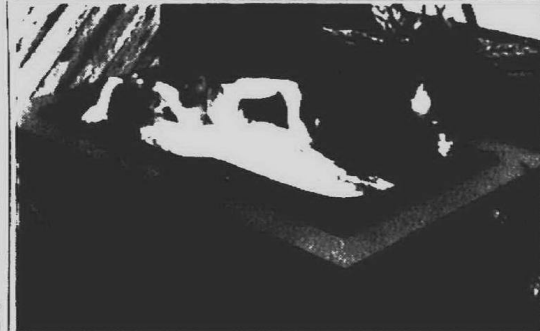

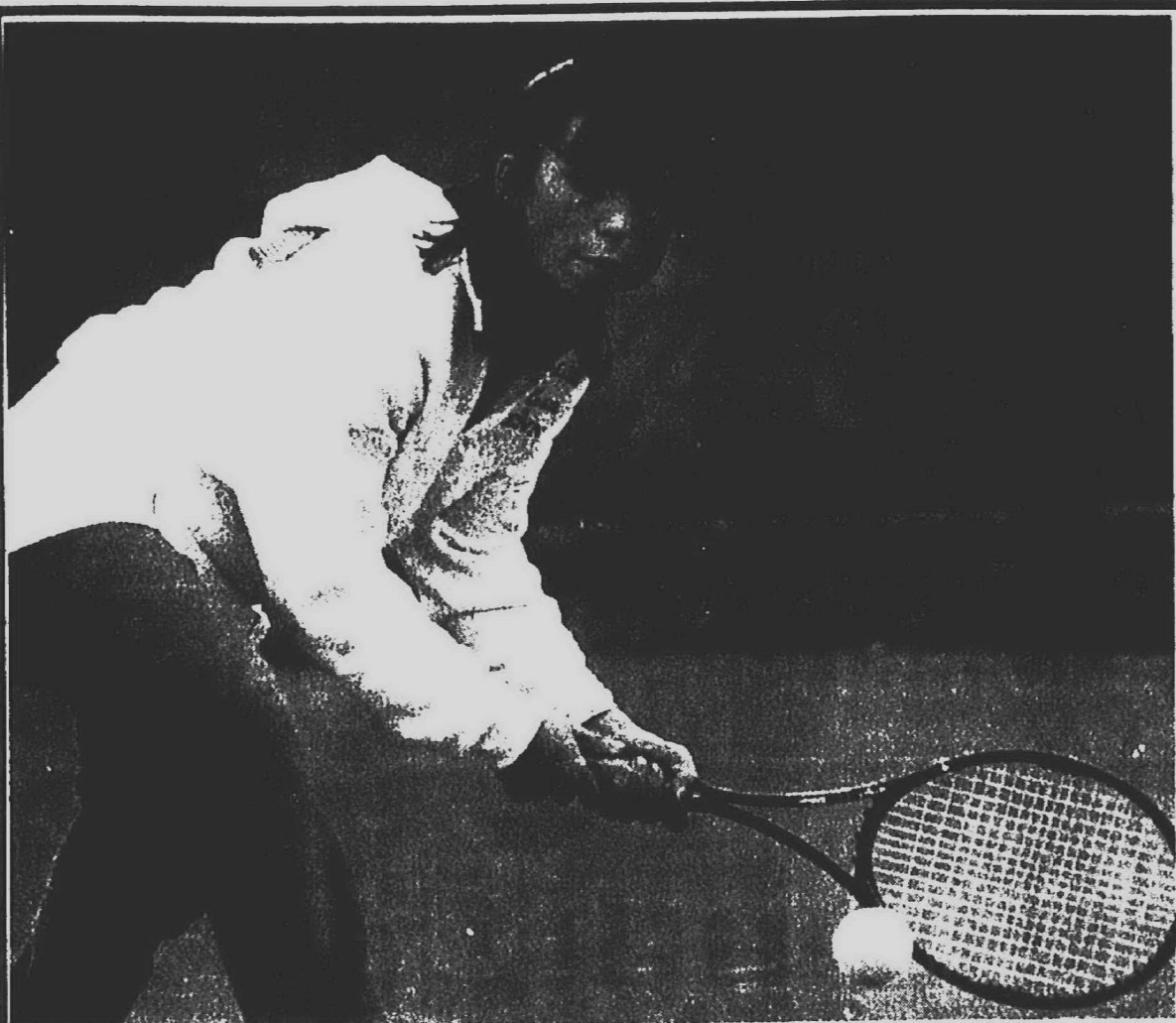

## Doubles trouble? Rocks take WLAA tennis title

It was no secret that the doubles matches would go a long way in deciding the winner of the Western Lakes Activities Association (WLAA) division and league tennis meets Tuesday and Wednesday.

Likewise, it was no real secret that Plymouth Salem would dominate singles play and, barring major disaster, win the overall title.

But few people would have guessed that Salem would both win the meet and earn significant points in doubles.

But that's what happened. "The turning point of the whole thing, I felt, came in the first round of our division meet (Lakes Division meet Tuesday)," said Livonia Stevenson coach George Croll. "Salem drew Walled Lake Central in both No. 1 and No. 3 doubles. If Central would have won those matches it would have been a real rat race."

THE MEET was no rat race, but still it was relatively close. Salem, the Lakes Division champ, amassed 23 team points to Northville's 17. Western Division champ Plymouth Canton placed third in the league meet with 16 points and Stevenson was fourth (14). See statistical summary for complete results.

The Rocks, by virtue of the league meet win and their perfect 11-0 conference dual meet record, won the WLAA championship outright. Canton, 11-1 in duals, was second overall.

Salem's No. 3 doubles team, Jeanine Rappette and Janet Turner, earned significant points by advancing into the division finals, but the big story was the Rocks' No. 2 team.

Kelli Theard and Lara Wiklund stunned Stevenson's Susan Ting and Kelly Cascaden in the division meet, then won the conference medal Wednesday with a stirring 4-6, 7-5, 8-6 win over Northville's Jennifer Millgard and Lisa Felicelli.

"That match went to 7:05 Wednesday night," Croll said. "The Salem kids really did a super job. Northville was favored to win that match."

THE ROCKS also won all four singles events in the conference finals: Wendy Gilles at No. 1, Anita Toth at No. 2, Lisa Belsky at No. 3, and Missy Smith at No. 4. All four championship matches were settled in straight sets.

Other league champions were: Stevenson's No. 1 doubles team of Laurie Lenox and Tanya Petouhoff, who knocked off Northville's Dorothy Zeigler and Lisa Felicelli 3-6, 6-2, 8-6, and Northville's No. 3 team of Kathleen Katarski and Heidi Robins, who bested Stevenson's Emily Snow and

Mary Pelloni, 6-3, 7-6.

Katarski and Robins went undefeated through the season. Snow and Pelloni have lost only twice — to the Northville duo each time.

"It's been a great year for tennis in this league," Croll said. "We had a 12-team league for the first time, and we had no problems. Tennis is a game for ladies and gentlemen and that's the way the teams performed this year. It was a super experience for everyone."

Say what you will about the Plymouth Canton football team — and certainly its 0-6 record speaks volumes — but the Chiefs play a mean, miserly defense.

The Canton defense forced three Harrison turnovers — two fumbles and a Boucher interception.

The Harrison defense got interceptions from Geoff Witte and Sean Norton.

The Hawks will take a 5-1 overall record into Friday night's showdown.

## Shamrocks pull out win over Brother Rice

Maybe they ought to rename it the Men's Bowl.

Fighting in the trenches for nearly 48 minutes, Redford Catholic Central remained unbeaten with a hard-fought 7-3 football victory over rival Birmingham Brother Rice before an estimated 5,500 fans Sunday at Pontiac's Wisner Stadium.

The 41st annual Boys' Bowl clash was contested yard by yard in a rugged defensive slugfest.

And the outcome remained in doubt until the final 16 seconds when CC's

Mike Valvona stepped in front of Chris Plunkett and picked off a Chris Sullivan pass in the end zone.

"The defense came through and they showed a great deal of poise at the end," said CC coach Tom Mach. "To beat Rice is the greatest feeling in the world because they're so well coached and it's a traditional game."

"It's always a tough, physical game — nothing dirty — and that's the way it should be played."

The Shamrocks seemingly had the game well in hand down the stretch, only to have the strong-armed Sullivan, who was bottled up much of the game, rally his team in the final two minutes.

THE TWO TEAMS battled to a scoreless standoff in the first half, but Rice got on the board with 5:15 left in the third quarter when Jim Schramm booted a 29-yard field goal, set up by Dave Geraghty's 22-yard punt return.

CC was stymied on the next offensive series, but Shamrock defensive end Joe Mackiewicz came up with the play of the game, stripping the ball out of Rice ball carrier Bill Fitzpatrick's hands at the Warriors' 20-yard line, and returning the fumble 15 yards to the CC 5.

Three plays later, Chris Kassa scored the game's only touchdown on a 3-yard burst up the middle and George Daraban kicked the extra point with

1:05 left in the period to give the Shamrocks a 4-point advantage.

Early in the fourth quarter, Rice drove down to the CC 27, but Sullivan's 4th-and-8 pass fell incomplete as he was pressured by CC lineman Paul Linenberg.

The Shamrocks took the ball and consumed nearly seven minutes of the clock, marching down to the Rice 5. Along the way CC was helped by Rice penalties for too many men on the field (on a fourth-down punt), face masking and pass interference.

JUST AS THE Shamrocks were ready to score, fullback Jeff Schwartz

fumbled and Rice's Keith Stonestreet recovered, giving the Warriors one last chance with 2:09 remaining.

Sullivan, who came into the game with over 1,000 yards passing, suddenly got hot, hitting a pair of sideline passes for 17 and 16 yards, followed by a 39-yard bomb to Plunkett, who carried down to the CC 10 with just under a minute to go.

From the 10, Sullivan missed on his first two passes and then was sacked for a 4-yard loss on third down by CC tackle Nick Varajan.

Valvona then ended the suspense by picking off Sullivan's final attempt in the end zone.

"It was a tremendous thing for our defense to come down and suck it up for four downs," said Mach. "The last thing I thought after the fumble would be Rice driving down the field on us. They showed a lot of poise as well."

The defeated Rice to 1-6 on the season, but the Warriors' record is deceiving. All five losses are to unbeaten teams, including the No. 2 ranked teams from Illinois and Ohio.

It also marks the first losing season ever for veteran coach Al Fracassa, who hurried off the field and was unavailable for comment following the game.



# N'ville snaps Canton win string

Plymouth Canton ignored that Thursday night and consequently saw its 10-game winning streak snapped by Northville, 32-29, in a Western Lakes girls basketball game at Canton.

Laura Darby (10 points) helped rally Canton in the second half but to no avail.

"Hopefully we can come back and learn from this," Neu said.

The loss puts added emphasis on Tuesday's showdown at Salem (as if that game needed added emphasis). Canton (7-1 in the league, 10-1 overall) leads the Western Division by just one game over Livonia Churchill (6-2).

**PLYMOUTH SALEM 35, JOHN GLENN 24:** To put this into quick perspective, Salem survived this Lakes Division tumble at John Glenn.

"It was kind of a rough game," said

Salem coach Fred Thomann. "Very physical and hard fought. Glenn is a big, physical team. It was one of those games where we had to fight our way out. Our kids didn't back down at all."

Especially not Jessica Handley. The junior guard registered the best scoring night of her varsity career with 16 points. Ironically, Handley moved into the Salem district from John Glenn last year.

Dena Head also contributed by scoring 11 and snaring 17 rebounds.

The key for the Rocks, as always, was their defense. Glenn didn't score in double figures in any of the four quarters.

## Showdown: Canton vs. Salem

**H** EY, CHRIS, who's going to win the big basketball game Tuesday night, Canton or Salem?

"Ask me Wednesday morning."

"Wise guy. Don't you know?"

"I have my opinions. If you must know, I think Salem will win. But, as soon as I say that, all the Canton boosters get up in arms. 'See, I told you he favors Salem. I told you.'"

"Those people still getting on you for that, eh?"

"Constantly. The funny thing is, I get it from both sides. I'll get a call from Canton saying I favor Salem. Two minutes later someone from Salem will call wondering why I favor Canton. I should start covering Plymouth Christian."

"Well, tell me about Tuesday's game."

"THE TWO rivals always put on a good show when they lock horns, but this game could be the best of them all."

"Why do you say that?"

"There are more spicy ingredients. No. 1, both teams are on top of their respective divisions which means there's more at stake than just park bragging rights. Also, in the past few years, Salem has always had sort of a monopoly on talent. This year, the two teams are more equally matched."

"What else?"

"The emotion factor may be stronger than ever before, for two reasons. No. 1, Canton hasn't completely erased the memory of the 43-41 loss to Salem that bumped it from the state tournament last year."

"And No. 2, Canton coaches Rob Neu and Bob Blohm are close personal friends with, and former assistants of Salem coach Fred Thomann. They team up on scouting reports. They have helped coach each other's players. But, on the court, the three are fierce competitors. It's my guess that for 32 basketball minutes Tuesday, the friendship will be terminated."

"You mentioned that you thought Salem would win. How come?"

"BECAUSE, I think that the Salem kids have performed in the pressure cooker more often than the Canton kids. And I also don't think Canton is physically equipped to defend against Salem's star sophomore Dena Head. She is averaging 15 points a game this year, after a relatively slow start, and has pulled down more than 10 rebounds per game."

"Who do you think Canton will put on Head?"

"I asked Rob Neu that Tuesday night and he said he didn't really know. Canton will live and die with its man-to-man defense, but they'll probably try to double up on her somehow and keep the ball away from her. If I had to guess, either Laura Darby or Diana Knickerbocker may get the challenge. Canton will probably press a great deal also and try to exploit Salem's backcourt. Teams like DePorres and Ladywood had great success doing that to Salem early in the season."

"What does Canton have to do to win?"

"CANTON, PURE and simple, is going to have to score. Points haven't come all that easy for the Chiefs lately and nobody scores points easily against Salem's defense. The Chiefs, when forced to beat teams with perimeter shooting, have struggled. Neu will probably try and turn speedy Beth Frigge loose and lure Salem into a run and shoot game."

"Canton also has to keep Salem from attacking them inside. They cannot afford to let Salem dominate the boards."

"There's another factor for Canton. The loss to Northville Thursday has to be wiped from the players' minds. Rob Neu will have his hands full trying to regroup his team's confidence. It's a shattering thing to win 10 straight games then lose to a team of lesser ability."

"What about for Salem, what do they have to do?"

"Fred Thomann told me this: 'Big games come down to little things.' Basically, Salem has to just play their game and eliminate mistakes. The teams match up well in terms of size: Salem's Kerri McBride and Laura Clifford match well with Canton's Penny Piggott and Vicky Ferko. Salem, though, with Head, Kristen Hostynski and even Stacy Sovine, might have an edge in strength."

"I EXPECT Salem to play a controlled offensive game against Canton and, as much as possible, work the ball inside. If that fails, Salem has a perimeter gun: Jessica Handley. Her shooting ability causes serious problems for the Chiefs. They don't want to get beat up inside, yet if they sag too much, Handley can beat them from outside. Frigge, again, plays a key role here. She will probably be matched with Handley. She will have to pester Handley and keep her from getting uncontested shots."

"Is the fact that the game is at Salem significant?"

"No, both sides of the Rocks' gym ought to be packed. There's no home court advantage here."

"So, give me a bottom line."

"Salem wins because of it's H-power."

"H-power?"

"Handley, Head and Hostynski."

"Salem lover."

"Give me a break."

## '84 Olympics was smashing

Thirty new Olympic and 10 world records were smashed at the 1984 Summer Games in Los Angeles. The U.S. men's 400-meter relay ran 37.83 seconds to eclipse the 1980 world mark. Swimming also set the pace with a dozen new Olympic records. American athletes topped the medal list with 174, and the largest Olympic crowd ever — more than 5.5 million — attended the 16-day festival of amateur sports.

To develop a mobile security force, Olympic officials enlisted the aid of more than 400 motorcycles and all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) for Olympic sites

and villages. ATVs allowed the security force to maneuver in heavy foot traffic and use fewer people to patrol large stadiums such as the Rose Bowl or Coliseum.

Specialized motorcycles helped ABC Sports film every grueling mile of cycling as Americans swept the gold for the first time. Film couriers used other motorcycles to ferry more than 10,000 rolls or 144,000 photos to meet critical deadlines around the world. The motorcycles even rushed medical samples to the Olympic labs for testing.

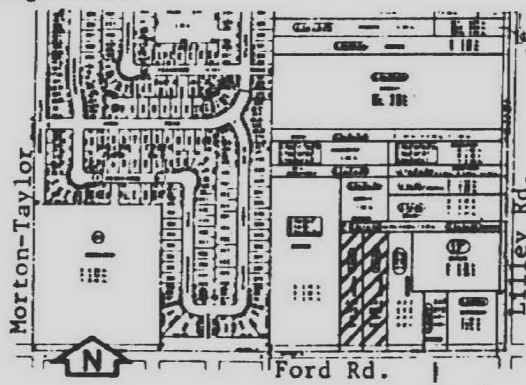

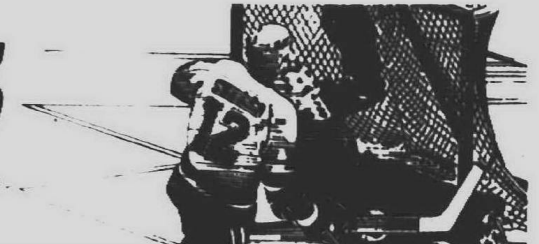
