**SCHOLARS SOUGHT:** Just a reminder that Friday, Feb. 6, is the deadline for submitting applications for the scholarships offered by the Woman's Club of Plymouth.

The annual scholarship program for local outstanding high school seniors is sponsored by the Woman's Club of Plymouth with the support of the Mayflower Hotel. The scholars are honored later at the annual Scholarship Ball in the Meeting House.

**SEVENTH-GRADERS** in suspense about where'll they'll attend high school can relax soon. Students in the Plymouth-Canton school district will be given their assignments early this month, said Dick Egli, community relations director.

Assignment to either Plymouth Salem or Plymouth Canton High School at Centennial Educational Park will be done using a random process to balance school population by "numbers, racial make-up, talent and socio-economic background," Egli said.

**POOR MAN'S DINNER:** A poor man's dinner featuring beef stew, salad, bread, dessert and beverage will be held from 5-7 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 7, to benefit the Holy Land Fund of St. John Seminary in Plymouth Township.

The meal will be served in the Knights of Columbus Hall, 150 Fair at Mill, Plymouth. Donations at the door will be \$3.50 for adults and \$2 for children. The Holy Land Fund is to help first year seminary students spend an academic term in the Holy Land. Graduate courses in scripture and spirituality are taught by St. John faculty members and scholars living in the area. The fund covers room and board, field trips and faculty expenses. Students pay their own airfare and personal expense.

This is the third year the K of C has sponsored the dinner — the second time as a benefit for St. John Seminary.

**TOO TOUGH?** Plymouth-Canton school trustees don't want anyone getting the wrong idea about the difficulty of the district's swimming classes. So they changed a phrase in some workshop minutes.

Trustee Marilyn Schwinn suggested rewording the sentence "The recommendation was made that the proficiency test be given in the summer, and that middle schools be instructed to indicate the opportunity to pass out of this requirements. Fellow trustees agreed that "test out" might sound better than "pass out."

## Plymouth home values increase

Residential property assessments in the city of Plymouth will rise 6 percent and in Plymouth Township at least 3 1/4 percent across the board this year.

That's good news and bad news for property owners.

"The good side, of course, is people generally have confidence in the community and want to stay here," said Kenneth Way, city of Plymouth assessor.

"The bad side is if tax rates remain the same, it costs us a few

more dollars to live here."

Maurice Breen, township supervisor, echoes those sentiments.

"As a homeowner, I like the fact I live in a community with increasing values because it means it has a good reputation. But I'm not overjoyed my property taxes keep going up."

NOTICES will be mailed to individual property owners later this month.

State law requires property to be assessed at one half of fair market value.

A 24-month sales study — April

through December of 1984, all of 1985 and January through March of 1986 — determined reassessments in the township and city.

Last year, about 80 percent of residential properties in the township were tagged with a 5 percent assessment increase. There was no general increase in the city.

About half of the residential properties in the township will experience an even greater increase than the general 3 1/4 percent, Breen said.

Subdivisions with additional 5 percent increases include LakePointe, Robinson, Riverside, Tomlinson, Plymouth Estates and Bradbury

Condominiums.

Subdivisions facing an additional 3 percent increase include Trailwood, Beacon Estates, Quail Hollow and Plymouth Hills.

IF NOT for the moderating effect of using a 24-month sales study, assessment increases would probably approach 20 percent this year, said John McLenaghan, chief appraiser for the private firm that handles assessment matters for the township.

That's how well housing sales have gone.

Exactly what impact will assess-

ment increases have on homeowners?

The owner of a house with a market value of \$80,000 in the city now pays property taxes of \$2,792.

Assuming no change in tax rates and discounting income tax ramifications, the same property would generate \$2,959 — attributed directly to a 6 percent assessment increase.

In the township, a house with a market value of \$80,000 now generates \$2,273 in property tax reve-

## Undercover Drug agent catches 'those that you can'

"I don't go into a place thinking I'm going to die. If I got in that state of mind I would get out."

Mark, a Michigan State officer for eight years, worked undercover on drug cases in Detroit for one year and last fall was assigned to the newly formed Wayne County Drug Enforcement Team.

The unit covers Canton, Plymouth, Plymouth Township, Livonia, Garden City, Westland and other communities west of Telegraph to Washenaw County and north to Oakland County.

"There's been situations where I've had guns put on me in Detroit, but I don't like to talk about that because it makes you sound like a hero or a cowboy."

AFTER THE unit gets a search warrant, a raid team — usually including five or six officers — makes the arrests.

Mark talked about the "adrenalin rush" when they approach the house and announce they're officers. If someone doesn't answer the door they force their way in.

Within 15-20 seconds the following procedure usually takes place.

The first officer rams the door and moves out of the way for the second officer carrying a shotgun.

That officer is followed by a "cover" and they go through each room ordering everyone to lie on the floor.

The back-up officers handcuff the suspects.

Mark pauses and says, "It's a real rush feeling and a little scary."

Even though he hates the "John Wayne image" some people link to the job, Mark says he's aware of the dangers of walking into a drug deal and not knowing what's going to happen.

IF HE'S going to avoid burn-out, Mark says he has to limit the stress.

"You don't go through life thinking about death constantly or you'll drive yourself insane."

Mark looks like a lot of guys he deals with on the streets with his shoulder-length hair and day's growth of whiskers. But his confident mannerisms, quick smile and references to his wife and child make a drastically different picture of the man he is away from work.

"I'm pretty low key. I don't let too much bother me."

"I go to work eight hours a day and when I leave — if it's at all pos-

sible — I try to leave work at work. I won't devote 110 percent of my identity or I'll lose the rest of my identity. I give it all I can but I'm a father and a husband, too."

At 32 Mark is softspoken when he explains the impact law enforcement will have on drug traffic.

"We're not going to stop drug traffic — if the federal government can't stop it the state and local agencies aren't going to stop it. You take what you can and stop those that you can. In all honesty we aren't having much of an impact on stopping cocaine traffic."

Working undercover can be less dangerous than being on patrol, says Mark, which is not his real name. Undercover officers who "do their homework" know more about what they can expect than an officer on the street who "stops an old lady for a traffic ticket and has a gun pulled on him."

WITHOUT THE uniform, undercover officers lose the feeling of au-

thority.

"You're not a police officer for all practical purposes. You have to become someone that you aren't."

When he deals with street people his language and attitudes have to be rough, and when he's dealing with business people his mannerisms are upgraded.

"There's excitement in police work in general. There's a certain part of you that likes the excitement."

Working as an undercover officer is "constantly challenging you as an individual and you have to react and respond in different situations. Most undercover officers are confident, strong-willed people. Most can make decisions, have their own ideas and have confidence in their own ability."

They depend largely on informants. They "flip" mainly for the money police give them for tips, to have charges reduced or for revenge.

There's always a chance an informant is setting the officer up but it's unlikely, Mark says, because they know there's a back-up crew waiting outside.

"You know what's going on initially and your own intelligence and ability to talk will determine the outcome. You have to have the gift of talk and you have to have the intelligence of mind when you're scared."

## Bleak school funding on tap

As if our weather forecasts aren't bleak enough, Michigan's educational almanac also is predicting gloomy days ahead, according to John Hoben, superintendent of Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

Hoben spoke Monday about the message Gov. James Blanchard will deliver in his State of the State address Wednesday. It's good news for law enforcement — bad news for schools.

"The buzzwords in Lansing are that for the past four years, education has been on the front burner, and social services on the back burner. That will be reversed. It doesn't look good in the ensuing years for education," Hoben said at Monday night's school board meeting.

HOBEN POINTED to several telling indicators.

Early estimates are that school districts should not expect more than a 3.5 percent increase in state aid, Hoben said.

# Cadet to be tried on Canton charges

A suspended Dearborn Heights police cadet has been bound over for trial in Wayne County Circuit Court on charges stemming from a rape and robbery at a Canton Township flower shop last November.

Jeffrey Duncan, 22, appeared before Plymouth District Judge James Garber Friday afternoon in the last of six preliminary examinations on the charges stemming from a series of rapes and robberies at businesses in Westland, Livonia and Canton Township last year.

Duncan has been charged with armed robbery, two counts of first-degree criminal sexual conduct and possession of a firearm in the commission of a felony in the Nov. 11 holdup of Sparr's Florist Shop in Canton.

The one-hour hearing remained open to the public despite requests by attorneys that it be closed.

Michael Lebow, one of two attorneys representing Duncan, argued that pretrial publicity about the cases had endangered his client's right to a fair trial and would "affect the ability of a jury to render an impartial verdict."

GARBER REFUSED to grant the motion, pointing out that it has been his policy for 8½ years not to close a hearing.

"I believe the elements of this hearing are well balanced between the public's right to know and Mr. Duncan's right to a fair trial," he said.

An 18-year-old Plymouth woman, who was working alone in the shop, identified Duncan as her assailant and testified that he was the man she saw enter the store moments after the manager had left and just 10 minutes before the store was to close.

She also testified that the defendant asked for a dozen of the shop's "highest priced roses" and requested she keep the store open another five minutes while he went

to his car to get some money.

WHEN HE returned, she was arranging the flowers in a box and looked up only after he "said no in a weird way" about including a card, she said.

She testified that he pointed a chrome-plated handgun at her, using his coat to shield it from view and, after taking about \$115 from the cash drawer, ordered her to open the safe.

After finding out there was no safe in the shop, she said she was ordered to walk to the back room, while her assailant locked the front door to the shop.

The young woman testified that she was forced to disrobe and perform several sex acts before her assailant took a gold nugget ring she was wearing and left the store.

She added that she screamed during the attack and was told to "shut up or I'll kill you."

During questioning by assistant Wayne County prosecutor Barb Smith, she said she went through with the sex acts because "I knew he had a gun" and that she was crying when her life was threatened "because it hurt and I was scared."

Lebow questioned the woman extensively about the description of her assailant she supplied police and the gun he was carrying as well as how closely she observed him prior to his announcing the robbery.

She said she looked at him "closely because of the very strange way he seemed to walk out of nowhere and into the store."

After her testimony, the judge ordered Duncan to stand trial in circuit court. The \$100,000 cash bond in the Canton case was continued and Duncan was returned to the Wayne County Jail, where he has been held in seclusion since his arrest by Westland police Dec. 19.

A total of 18 charges have been brought against Duncan. He will be arraigned Tuesday on all of the charges in circuit court.

## Police team uncover 'chop shop'

Michigan State Police, the Oakland Sheriff's Department and Canton Township Police, last week uncovered what they believe to be a "chop shop" where truck tractors were stolen, dismantled and sold from Van Buren Township in Wayne County.

Three men were arraigned Wednesday before Judge James Sheehy in 52nd District Court in Rochester Hills on charges of conspiring to steal truck tractors. Two of the suspects also were charged with

stealing two tractors Monday from a firm in Auburn Hills.

Raymond Stander, 40, and Mark Swayze, 28, both of Dearborn Heights, and Russel Larsh, a 31-year-old Livonia resident, were charged with conspiracy. Stander and Swayze also were charged with two counts each of stealing trucks.

The three face a Feb. 9 preliminary exam before Judge Robert Shipper in 52nd District Court.

## Billboard limits OK'd

Guidelines regulating the placement of billboards in Plymouth Township have been approved by the township board.

The township hadn't allowed billboards at all until taken to court by a billboard company.

Limits were established, the text amendment to the township code explains, "to control the number, location and size of signs to reduce their negative effects."

Major provisions:

- Limit billboards to land designated for industrial use along I-275 or M-14.
- Limit billboards to 378 square feet and temporary extensions to an additional 75 square feet.

- Limit billboards to 35 feet in height.
- Require at least 1,000 feet between billboards on the same side of the highway.

"Where they came from is the basic wisdom of township officials who are responsible," said Donald Morgan, a lawyer who drafted the guidelines.

Some provisions also can be found in the court-sanctioned agreement allowing National Advertising to erect billboards in the township, he said.

Morgan told the township board that he didn't know what effect the guidelines would have on another lawsuit filed by a different billboard company against the township.

"The purpose of this ordinance is to define what is allowable in the best judgment of this township and go ahead with it," he said.

Proliferation of signs in the township, the text says, "unduly distracts motorists and pedestrians, creates a traffic hazard, mars the appearance of the township, restricts light and air, negatively affects property values and results in an inappropriate use of land."

The text amendment also specifically defines flagpoles as structures and effectively limits heights in residential and commercial areas to 35 feet.

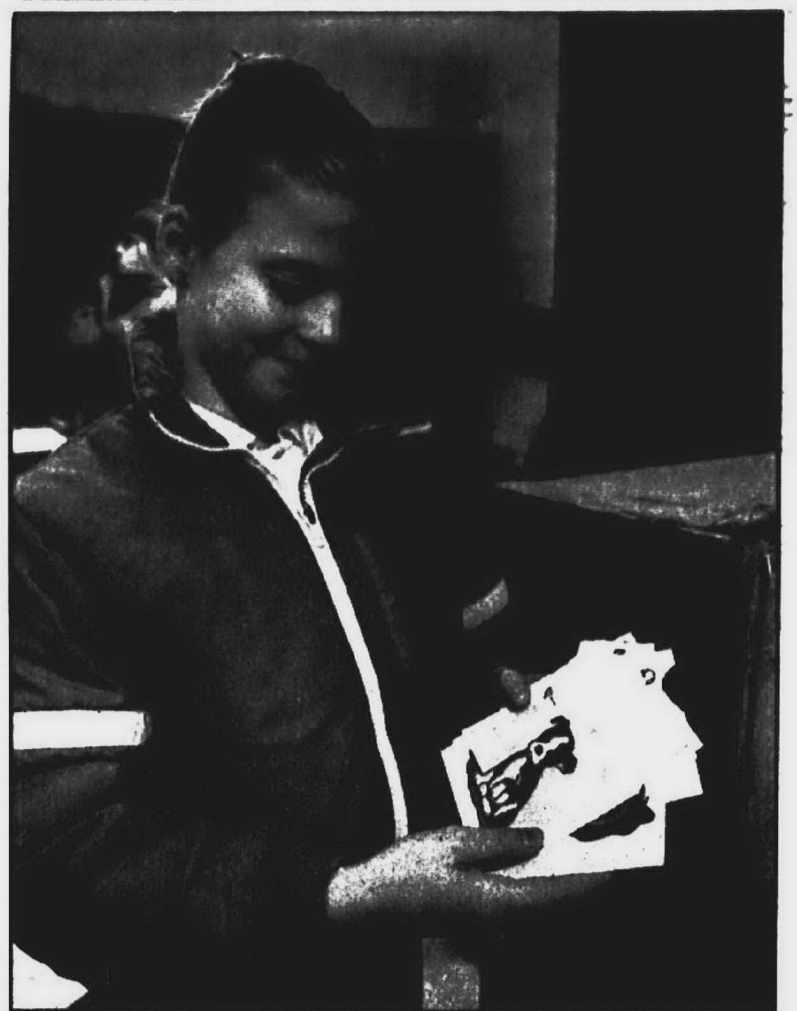

# In Geer

## School to give students an 1880 view

Geer School "didn't look natural" to Howard Walker, 85.

Walker, who graduated from Geer in 1916, along with generations of other Geer School graduates, former teachers, district and Ford Motor Co. officials attended festivities at the 107-year-old building Thursday.

All were celebrating the gift of \$6,000 from Blackwell Ford Inc. of Plymouth. The grant, part of Ford's metro-Detroit community beautifi-

cation project, will go toward the restoration of Geer, on Ann Arbor Road at Gotfredson. Geer was used as a Plymouth-Canton elementary school until 1982.

**PLANS CALL** for the school to be renovated and used by area elementary pupils, who'll be given a week-long taste of school life in the 1880s, said Elaine Kirchgatter, former Plymouth-Canton school board member who serves on the Geer School Committee.

A robust and dapper Walker,

standing erect in the cramped, cold brick school, was regaling a circle of listeners with tales about earlier times.

"Our water was furnished by a pump. We all drank out of the same dipper and water pail. Back in those days, they weren't as particular about the spread of disease," he said. "A lot of us got mumps, chicken pox and whooping cough."

Walker, born on a farm a mile and a quarter from Geer, remembered wearing a suit to school, strict teachers, and studying "orthography. That's the sound of letters. They don't teach that today."

"We had to learn multiplication tables, and I wondered why I had to learn 'em," added Walker. "I thought that was a drag."

When Walker and his classmates were away from their slates, "We played Pom-Pom Pull-Away by the maple trees in the nice weather and Fox and Geese in winter. We had no gym. Our gym was out on the playground."

Walker, who with his wife, Edith, recently celebrated the couple's 63rd wedding anniversary, said he never got spanked and never fell in love during his days at Geer District-Fractional 4.

"I was a good boy. I still have my report cards," said Walker, who majored in rural education at Ypsilanti Normal and for 41 years taught in Plymouth, Lake Odessa and Detroit.

**ELSEWHERE** in the two-room school, a younger Geer alumnus was reminiscing about performing "Macbeth" a few feet away from where he stood.

Scott Breithaup, who attended Geer 1978-1982, said "going here was better than going to a big school. We knew everyone."

There was no mistaking the nostalgia Rita McClumpha, Geer's last teacher, was feeling.

Geer's one-time windows were wooden, its ceiling tile crumbling. A shivering McClumpha was standing amid stacks of desks gazing at ripped and forgotten maps and papers.

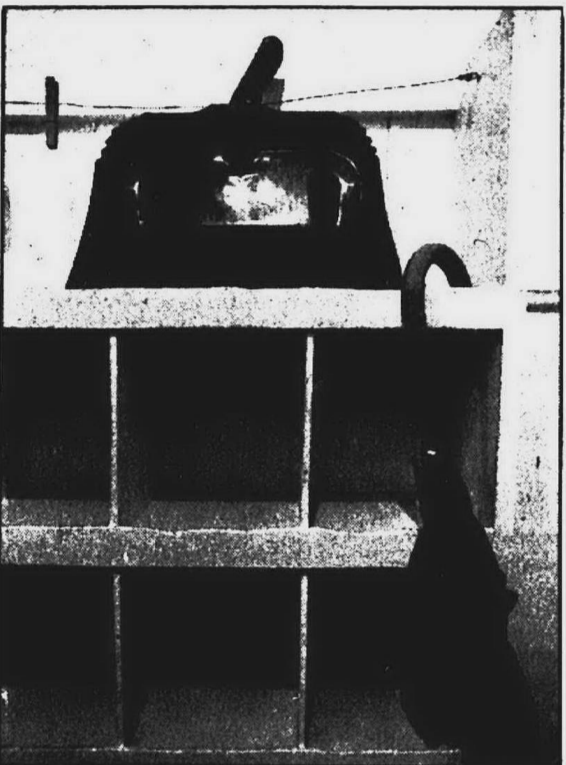
"1982, when the school closed, was the end of an era," she said.

"I knew it was never going to come back again," said McClumpha, whose in-laws homesteaded in the area in the early 1800s.

"It was nice having second and third generations and families in the same room. Parents were very involved in their kids' education."

"It was crowded and cluttered here but it was nice because I could pound a nail where I wanted to and no one cared. Kids had freedom too. They loved reading under the trees."

Folks were clearing out of the school, anxious to jump into heated cars. McClumpha was among the last to leave, almost forgetting her glasses on a dusty desk.



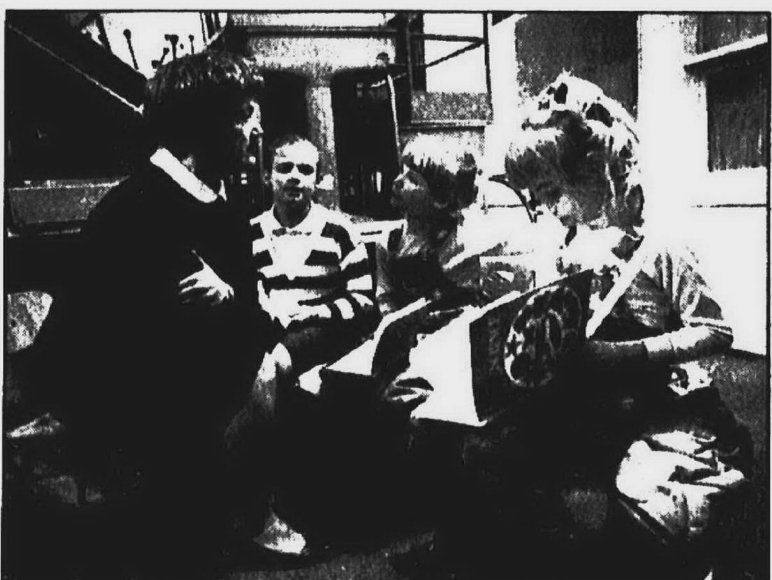
The cloakroom at Geer no longer holds boots, hats, mittens and brown bags.

# Non-union employees receive 4% pay raise

All non-union municipal employees in Plymouth Township will receive a pay increase this year of at least 4 percent.

The three elected officials will get salary increases ranging from 15 to 19 percent.

Police officers required to sign personal service contracts as a condition of employment will get no additional pay — at least for now. And firefighters and employees in

the department of public works represented by unions will continue to be paid at current rates while negotiations continue.

The township board last week accepted the recommendation of a personnel consultant and approved new pay scales for all non-union employees.

**THE RECOMMENDATIONS** were based upon an external survey of pay scales in 15 other townships in southeast Michigan.

Beginning clerks will now be paid \$12,613 to \$15,752 annually, adminis-

trative clerks \$14,221 to \$17,761, and deputy department heads and department secretaries, \$14,941 to \$20,095.

Three pay ranges include yearly merit increases, if granted.

The board also boosted the salaries of Supervisor Maurice Breen to \$44,000 from \$36,838, and Esther Hulsing, clerk, and Mary Brooks, treasurer, to \$33,000 from \$28,632.

The salaries of department heads also were hiked by the township board.

Police Chief Carl Berry was

raised to \$39,520 from \$36,292; Fire Chief Larry Groth to \$39,370 from \$34,194; and planning director James Anulewicz to \$38,221 from \$34,700.

Virgil Mooney, chief building official, received a pay raise to \$32,466 from \$31,306 and Thomas Hollis, superintendent of the department of public works, to \$31,966 from \$30,845.

**POLICE OFFICERS** in the township sign three-year personal service contracts which call for a salary of

\$16,264 to \$19,516 exclusive of overtime.

The administration and the Police Officers Association of Michigan currently are at odds over collective bargaining.

The police department currently has 13 full-time officers and five part-timers eligible for union membership.

All but one firefighter last year was paid at a base rate of \$28,604 and all but one earned at least \$5,000 more in overtime.

Their contract expired last March. Thirteen full-time firefighters are represented by the union.

The four public works employees represented by the Teamsters are paid at an hourly rate of \$8.49 to start with increases to \$9.99 after three years. The crew leader now makes \$10.91 per hour.

Their contract expired last December.

The salary study by the consulting firm of Grant Thornton didn't address union pay scales.

A 3 1/4 percent assessment increase, assuming no change in tax rates, would generate \$2,347.

**PROPERTY** owners who believe their assessments are inaccurate or claim financial hardship may appeal to local boards of review, which can adjust assessments.

The city's will convene March 3 and 4, the township's March 3, 9, 10 and 19.

McLenaghan, maintaining that taxpayers are becoming more sophisticated, doesn't anticipate a stampede.

"If information is properly presented, we feel most people will accept the facts of life," he said.

Owners of commercial property in the city can expect a 2.3 percent increase on those assessments. Way said, while industrial properties will remain the same.

Assessments on commercial properties in the township — especially apartment buildings — will increase, McLenaghan said. Assessments on rental units could go up as much as 15 percent.

Further data is expected from the county before a determination can be made on industrial property.

"That's the figure we're using in building budgets, and it's the increase state employees got this year."

The state's tax amnesty program, which has pumped millions into Michigan coffers, is no more, and the state income tax rate has been lowered.

**OTHER** not-so-good signs for education:

- About \$800 million is targeted toward prison construction.

- The federal government has cut \$190 million from educational programs.

State treasurer Robert Bowman says the 17,000-22,000 General Motors' layoffs will translate into 100,000 layoffs industrywide, Hoben said. Automakers are seeking to reduce the size of their staffs by 25 percent over the next three years, he added.

"We need to be prudent in spending and budgeting. I see rough seas ahead for education," Hoben said. "Coupled with a limit on funding, two, three and four years out we're in for some harder times."

**TAXPAYERS** IN Wayne County could be asked to approve a millage

hike in the not-so-distant future, Hoben said.

The Wayne County Intermediate School District is getting ready to ask for additional millage to support special education, Hoben told trustees.

"They're preparing a lot of literature and sending it out to their constituents."

Current revenues don't cover costs incurred by center-based programs for autistic children, the severely mentally impaired, physically handicapped and others.

Wayne Intermediate presently levies just 1 mill — less than both Macomb and Oakland counties.

A 1-mill increase would translate to \$25 a year for the owner of a \$50,000 home, \$50 for the owner of \$100,000 home.

Hoben anticipates that although the county superintendents' association probably will approve the request, the intermediate district will have a tough sales job when it comes "to the Livonias and the Grosse Pointes."

"The haves are paying for the have-nots. It all goes into one pot and is being distributed evenly. Where you have a larger tax base, people pay a proportionately larger share."

## Cash stolen in theft

About \$4,000 cash and some rings were stolen from a house on North Holbrook last week, ostensibly by a man posing as a roof repairman, according to a report filed with Plymouth city police.

The money had been withdrawn from a bank and left in a bedroom drawer for a couple of weeks before it "disappeared," the victim reported.

A man showed up at the house dur-

ing the early morning hours Tuesday and offered to repair the roof, the police report said.

He was described as white, in his 30s, 6-foot, 180 pounds, clean-shaven, wearing a red ski jacket and driving a maroon station wagon.

An elderly resident home alone at the time expressed reservations, according to the police report, but the man talked his way onto the property.

He was later confronted inside the house, the report said, where he continued talking about repairs — promising to return at a later date — before leaving.

An engagement/wedding ring set also was reported stolen.

"You get nervous and there's a certain element of fear. You're concerned everything will go right but generally the informant can tell you what to expect."

**IT USUALLY** takes a "couple of months" before a raid occurs, Mark says.

Most cases usually start with a lead from an informant, followed by buying drugs from the suspect at least a couple of times and ideally getting to know the top people in the chain of command. In rare cases investigations take the officer out of state or even out of the country.

"But the job doesn't always offer 'Miami Vice'-type excitement. During an average month 15-20 hours are spent undercover. A lot of time

is spent investigating complaints, doing surveillance and going to court to follow through with the arrest charges.

There are good and bad feelings that go with making an arrest. Mark says there are some "potentially good people" who "go down the tubes" for one of two motives — the money or to use drugs. He talked about the tragedy of seeing young college students — with potentially bright futures — end up facing jail sentences.

"When you arrest someone you've developed a rapport with and in some ways is like a friend, then you've obviously developed a trust. If you're a morally strong person there's a let down because it goes against your social principles."

"There are certain personalities

that click and there are people who, if we were in different walks of life, that I could be friends with, but you want to stay away from that.

"As much as I say this is a shame,

I also say they did it to themselves."

On rare occasions, he said, there are happy endings. After an arrest a person may get involved in a drug rehabilitation program and actually learn from the experience.

# No volunteers for nuclear storage site

The price sounds good — \$40 million in incentives and 20 jobs. But so far no Michigan community has volunteered to be a storage site for low-level radioactive wastes.

"Some have asked for more information, but they made it clear they were not volunteering," said Beverly McAninch, the gubernatorial appointee who chairs a state advisory group called the Radioactive Waste Control Committee. She is a former mayor of Plymouth and state president of the League of Women Voters.

Five panel members spent their entire Wednesday evening listening to public questions, comments and impassioned arguments against nuclear energy in a hearing on the Orchard Ridge Campus of Oakland Community College in Farmington Hills.

It was the fifth of six hearings the Public Health Department panel has held to find a voluntary recipient of radioactive wastes.

"WE ARE STUCK with this problem. We can't turn our back on it," said panel member William C. Taylor. He is a Michigan State University professor of civil engineering and former science advisor to ex-Gov. William G. Milliken.

"It's not our waste. It's Walter J. McCarthy's waste," replied Mary Johnston, a Farmington Hills resident and member of the Safe Energy Coalition of Michigan. McCarthy, of Birmingham, is board chairman of Detroit Edison Co., whose nuclear plants are a source of radioactive wastes.

And that was how it went all evening — the panel insisting there is a problem which federal law requires states to solve; Johnston and Jennifer Puntenney of Farmington Hills arguing against any use of nuclear power, calling the panel "apologists for the nuclear power industry" and interrupting panelists' answers 33 times.

THE PROBLEM was born when three states — Washington, Nevada and South Carolina — announced they would accept low-level radioactive wastes only until 1993.

Here is the history as outlined in a standard script and slide show from the regional commission: The U.S. Congress in 1980 labeled



it a state problem, giving states the options of joining regional compacts or solving it alone.

Michigan opted to join a Midwest compact with Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri, Indiana and Ohio. (Illinois joined with Kentucky.)

THE REGIONAL commission, with one member from each state, is

to decide in March which state will serve as the regional collecting point ("host") for 20 years and which as the "successor" for 20 years.

McAninch said Michigan stands a good chance because it generates 33 percent by volume, and 41 percent by radioactivity, of all LLRW in the region. Ohio ranks second at 19 and 25 percent respectively.

Added Taylor: "There is little doubt in my mind Michigan will be one of the four finalists."

GENERATORS OF the wastes are 2,300 companies and institutions licensed by the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission.

They will pay for disposal of their wastes, McAninch said. Electric power plants produce 75 percent of the LLRW in the form of resins, clothing, tools and reactor components. (Spent fuel and other high-level wastes are a federal responsibility.)

The remaining 25 percent is generated by manufacturing firms (for example, smoke detectors), research laboratories and hospitals using radiation for diagnosis and treatment.

"Even if we stopped future use of radioactive materials, we would still need a disposal site in the region, because of the need to dispose of waste from decommissioned nuclear power plants and other facilities that used radioactive materials," said Fred Fear, staff member from MSU's department of resource development.

THE REGIONAL commission will

levy a 25-percent surcharge on disposal fees to provide \$40 million in incentives over 20 years to the community which agrees to be a storage site. Target date is Jan. 1, 1993.

The storage facility, probably operated by a private contractor after competitive bidding, will provide 20 jobs with an annual payroll of \$400,000.

Two trucks a day will bring in wastes, to be stored in vaults or concrete canisters, Fear said.

The NRC says radiation exposure to a person living at the edge of the 200-acre site should be limited to 0.25 rems (a measure of radioactivity) a year.

The Michigan panel said its goal is a limit of 0.01 rems.

In contrast, a typical American is exposed to 0.20 rems a year from the environment. A dental X-ray is 0.40 rems; a chest X-ray, 0.025 rems.

The ideal site will be an inland tract of state land with road access. It will have to be tested for ground water, earthquake risk and other factors.

"It don't think any of us is convinced it has to be a new site," said Taylor, suggesting it could be on an existing power plant site.

# Wayne, U-M await Blanchard's state aid formula

Two state university leaders praised Gov. James J. Blanchard's 1988 budget proposal for boosting aid to higher education by 5.3 percent.

But they also asked for more details on the second-term governor's plan for "formula" funding for the 15 state four-year colleges and universities. Blanchard wants to allocate \$15 billion through the formula.

"A formula offers higher education administrators a very good planning tool," said Wayne State University President David Adamany, hoping for "a formula which contains the necessary quantitative measures while also appropriately recognizing the unique situations of our 15 campuses."

"WE ARE anxious to learn the details," added Richard L. Kennedy,

vice president for government relations at the University of Michigan.

"Over the long run, we believe formula funding can be the key to both the strength and diversity of Michigan's system of higher education. It is also the key to sustaining the University of Michigan as the flagship of public education in this nation."

He added a warning about the state aid increase:

"One has to remember that a 5.3 percent increase shrinks to something just over 2.5 percent, since state funds comprise roughly half of the U-M's total general fund."

Under the governor's budget recommendations, total state general fund spending for 1987-88 would increase by 2.8 percent, or \$174.5 million, nearly one-third of which (\$51.5 million) would be earmarked for

higher education.

"I CONTINUE to be impressed," said Adamany. "The governor once again has given the current needs of education at all levels a very high priority within his spending plan."

Adamany praised the proposed increase in the Research Excellence Fund. Kennedy agreed, saying the \$1.25 million increase would add to

Michigan's "intellectual capital."

Adamany also noted Blanchard "increased special maintenance funding for colleges tenfold over the last several years. While these expenditures may not be as exciting as constructing a shiny, attractive new building, what they do is to preserve the state's existing investment in college teaching and research buildings and save us money in the long run."

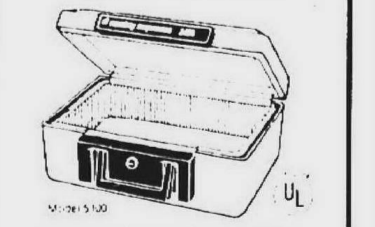

# Resident continues fight against school materials

Young people in Plymouth-Canton Community Schools are being taught with materials that expose them to foul language, illicit sex, drug and alcohol use, devil worship and the occult — and that upsets Diane Daskalakis of Plymouth.

The former school board candidate has filed complaints regarding the showing of R-rated films, and the teaching of witchcraft and fortune-telling by district teachers.

More than 750 residents have signed petitions she drafted protesting the use of "offensive material" in the schools.

The group plans to deliver a newsletter to every family in the district detailing its objections. It also is inviting the entire community to a meeting at 7 p.m. Mon-

day, Feb. 23, at Canton Calvary Assembly of God Church.

"We will give a complete, detailed presentation of the witchcraft and R-rated films being taught," said Daskalakis.

The Plymouth-Canton Board of Education plans to hear out Daskalakis at its Feb. 16 meeting.

SO FAR, school officials have reviewed more than half a dozen of her complaints, upholding her in only one instance.

A committee ruled "The Sword and the Sorcerer," which according to Daskalakis portrays "brutal murders, rape and the powers from hell," should be excluded from use.

The "Sword and Sorcerer" decision "gave me great hope, at least, that they share my point of view on something," said Daskalakis.

Last fall, Supt. John M. Hoben upheld Daskalakis on the movie "The Breakfast Club." Subsequently a review committee ruled the film can be shown under certain conditions.

Michael Homes, assistant superintendent for instruction, says specially appointed committees, one per complaint, spent an estimated four-15 hours apiece dealing with the protests.

Administrators have spent untold hours organizing the committees and setting up meetings, added Homes.

DASKALAKIS, a Plymouth Township jeweler, has complained about movies including "The Breakfast Club," "The Lottery," "Teen Wolf," "Excalibur," "The Thing," "Ghostbusters," and "Tales of Winnie the Witch."

She also objects to elementary school pupils being taught palmistry, crystal-ball gazing and card reading.

"They yell separation of church and state to stop the teaching of Christianity. Yet there doesn't seem to be any concern when it comes to witchcraft."

Daskalakis says that every film and book she's objected to was brought to her attention by parents.

"Moms come into my store and complain. I have never gone to the schools (looking for objectionable material)."

Eriksson Elementary first graders and kindergartners for "at least 11 years" have been shown "Tales of Winnie the Witch," which is the "blatant teaching of witchcraft geared toward children's minds," says Daskalakis. "I've protested at the school and have been told it's part of the curriculum. I was told they'd teach whatever they want whenever they want."

Daskalakis' group feels "it's imperative to inform people. These parents just don't know."

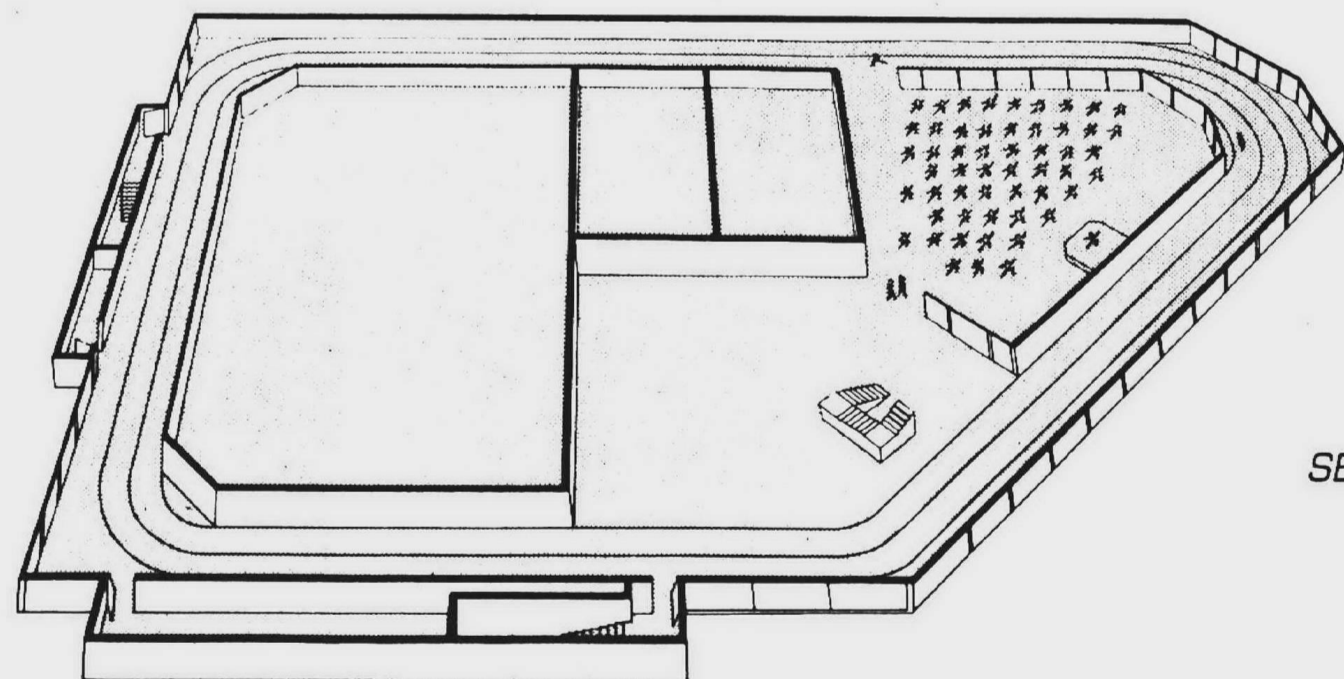

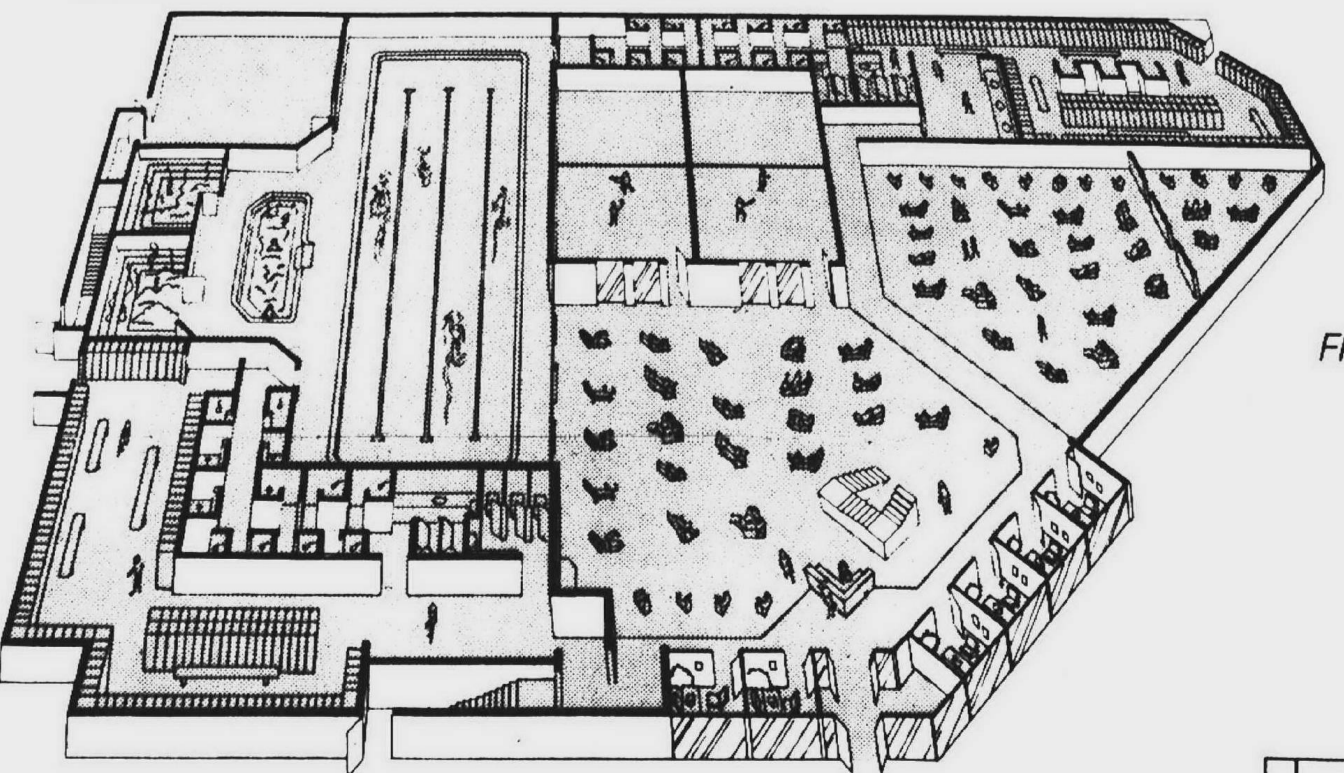

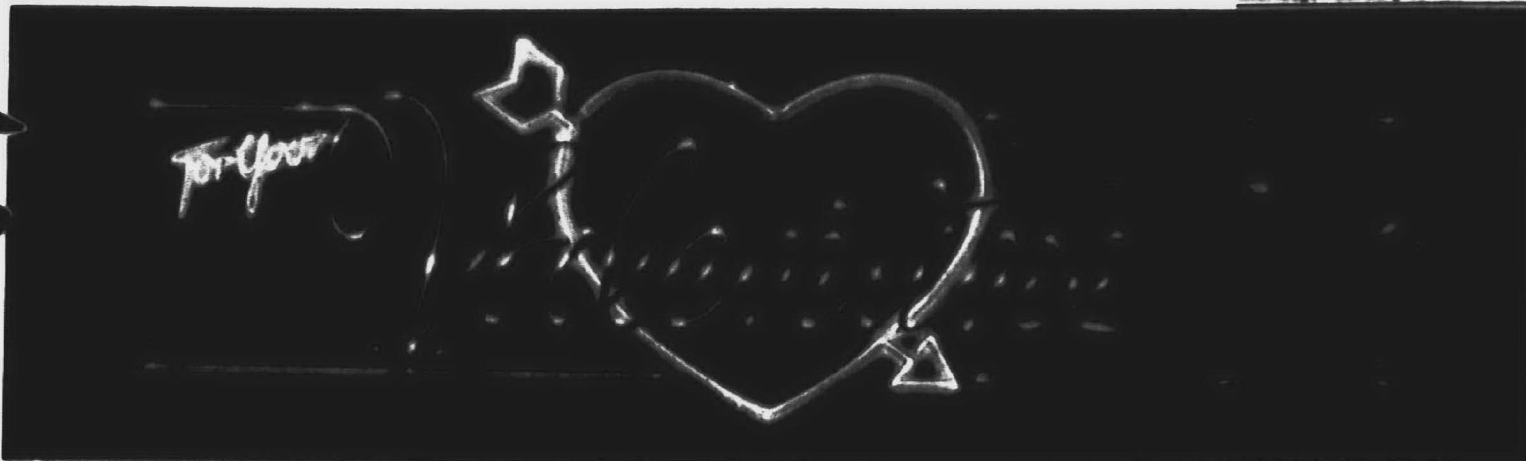

# Legislators split on property tax-cut plan

State legislators from western Wayne County are split in their support of a recommendation by a Senate citizens panel on education to raise sales taxes so property taxes can be cut.

Two Democrats, Reps. James Kosteva and William Keith, and one Republican, Rep. Gerald Law, support the recommendation. Kosteva and Keith are introducing legislation on the issue.

Two Republicans, Sen. Robert Geake and Rep. Lyn Bankes, and a Democrat, Rep. Justine Barns, either oppose the recommendation or say they need more information before they could support such a measure.

Rep. John Bennett, D-Redford, said he does not support the proposal because "I've got a better idea."

The Senate Citizens Property Tax Commission, appointed by Senate majority leader John Engler, R-Mount Pleasant, urged setting up a statewide property tax to help finance public schools.

The commission said the statewide tax should be lower than millages currently paid by property owners but that increasing other

state taxes, such as the 4 percent sales tax, could make up the difference in school revenues.

The panel suggested no specific amount for a statewide property tax, but said 17 or 18 mills was reasonable. The average local operating tax is 32 mills.

**KOSTEVA, WHO** represents Canton, said he is "encouraged by the direction" such a proposal suggests.

He said it equalizes education spending statewide, provides greater equity in present taxing structures and reduces dependency upon property taxes as a source of school revenue.

Kosteva intends to reintroduce Tri-Star, a proposal he first introduced in April 1985.

Tri-Star calls for school financing reform by cutting property taxes by half and increasing sales tax to a ceiling of 5.5 percent. Utility services would be excluded from taxation.

Keith, who represents Garden City, said he is also co-sponsoring legislation that would reform school financing.

Keith proposes establishing education regions, each comprising several counties. Regional collection and redistribution of tax money would be

based on student count, each assessed at the same rate within a region.

Keith, who served on the Garden City Board of Education for eight years before being elected to the state House, said regional collection and distribution would provide "more equity in school financing," including "a fairer share" to Garden City.

But Keith is doubtful such legislation will receive citizen endorsement and survive a vote by the electorate.

"Our sales tax is in the bottom 10 percent across the nation, but people are not interested in increasing it, no matter what."

Law, who represents Plymouth, concurs. Law said he has long endorsed a tax transfer, using a larger portion of sales tax to finance education.

But when the issue was put before voters six years ago, Law said it was soundly defeated in spite of endorsements by community leaders, state officials and educators.

"People are very mistrustful of government," Law concluded.

**SEN. GEAKE**, who represents Plymouth, Livonia, Redford and Canton, said the proposal "is a common one and I have always opposed it."

He said his primary objection is

that raising the sales tax ceiling above 4 percent requires an amendment to the Michigan Constitution.

"Michigan is a high-tourist state. We are already non-competitive in a number of other tax measures. (To increase the sales tax) could be a mistake," Geake said.

Bennett, who said he intends to introduce legislation this week, will propose that 60 percent of increased revenues from economic growth in Michigan — estimated to be 9.2 percent annually — be targeted for K-12 education.

Bennett's proposal will also mandate school districts reduce millage each year to offset increased state incomes, thereby providing property tax relief.

Barns, who represents Westland, said the citizens panel recommendation "needs much study. There are a lot of variables, and I have great reservations."

She believes property owners should have tax relief but she is uncertain that transferring the burden of taxation for education to sales tax is the answer.

Bankes, who represents Livonia, also believes property owners need relief but said relief can be achieved through other means such as qualifying more people for homestead tax rebates and raising the ceiling of rebates.



Bankes also said she does not welcome the collection of local taxes by the state because money is always lost in redistribution.

"We are doing so well in Livonia, that if we shift (taxes for education) to the state, I want a guarantee that our quality of life here will be maintained."

Sen. George Hart, D-Dearborn, whose district includes Garden City, said only that he "welcomed and respected" citizen committee findings.

Gov. James Blanchard is expected to include property tax reform in his state of the state address on Wednesday.

A Michigan School Finance Commission is expected to present a report on school financing alternatives to the state Board of Education in early October, according to Douglas Roberts, deputy state school superintendent.

Sen. William Faust, D-Westland, was unavailable for comment last week.

# Merchants in Plymouth's Old Village 70 years ago

(Part 5)

Businessmen from the north end of town were well represented in the Plymouth Mail's Booster Edition published on March 3, 1916.

In addition to cigar-maker George Springer, real estate developer Louis Hillmer, real estate agent E.N. Passage and photographer David Hillmer, all discussed in previous columns, there were advertisements in the paper from the Gayde Brothers, Beyer's Pharmacy, E.R. Daggett, R.W. Shingleton, Heide's Greenhouse, Henry Fisher, F.J. Pierce and Jacob Streng.

ALL OF THESE were located in what is today being called Old Village but which went by a variety of other names in times past.

Early maps show the north end of town and the section surrounding Kellogg Park as two separate entities. The north end was called Plymouthville, the Kellogg Park area was called Plymouth Corners. In addition to Plymouthville, the north end was known for many years as Lower Town. In recent years, merchants in

the north end have taken to calling it Old Village.

There was no business area of any size in the north end until after the railroads came in 1871. When it was clear that a railroad station was to be located at that end of town, George A. Starkweather decided that the depot area was the coming hub of activity in the community.

In 1870, in an attempt to capitalize on his hunch, he built the brick building that still stands at the corner of Starkweather and Liberty Street and moved his store from the Kellogg Park area to the new location.

Other merchants, including Peter Gayde, followed suit, but the area never achieved the prominence they envisioned. Starkweather died in 1907, but Peter Gayde's store on Liberty Street was a landmark in Old Village for many years to come.

Gayde HAD arrived in Plymouth from Germany in 1854. He opened his store on Liberty in Starkweather's building in 1870. Starkweather's dry goods store was at the corner of Starkweather and Liberty next to Gayde.

Later, Gayde built a two-story brick building at the corner of Main and Penniman where First Federal is now located. Gayde, a trustee of the village in 1871 and 1883, had three sons, all of whom became merchants on Liberty Street. William, who opened a butcher shop on Liberty, served on the village commission in 1908. Albert and Edward succeeded their father in the grocery business, calling the store Gayde Brothers. In addition to groceries, the Gayde Brothers ad in the special edition in 1916 promoted American and English dinnerware, Fancy China and Lamps.

In the same block with Gayde's was Otto Beyer's Pharmacy. Beyer, a son-in-law of Peter Gayde, and father of Bob Beyer who succeeded

Otto in the business, ran his drug store on Liberty Street from 1907 to 1941. He spoke German fluently, played a trumpet in the Frank Millard band and became a director of the Plymouth United Savings Bank. At one time, the soda fountain in the Beyer Drug Store was the most popular spot in that part of town.

In addition to drugs, perfumes, stationery, candies and cigars, Beyer carried the New Edison Disc and Victor Victrolas. His ad in the Booster Edition said: "If you have not heard the Diamond Disc, do not fail to come in, and we will play several of the latest records for you. The wonderful diamond stylus, the secret of Mr. Edison's musical triumph, brings out all the fine shades and delicate overtones preserved in the

Edison records."

TWO OTHER occupants of the business block on the south side of Liberty Street were E.R. Daggett and R.W. Shingleton.

Daggett operated a dry goods, grocery and notions store. Shingleton was a tailor and men's furnisher. He opened a merchant tailoring business in the store at the corner of Liberty and Starkweather in 1912 but sold it two years later to Daggett. He then bought the shoe stock of H.B. Jolliffe in the same block. An expert tailor, he added men's clothing and tailoring and also offered dry cleaning and pressing.

Carl Heide's greenhouse was located at the corner of Liberty and North Mill Streets. Heide, who arrived in Plymouth from Germany in

1882, worked for George Starkweather. He learned the greenhouse business from Starkweather, then built his own in 1889. He started with a single greenhouse and by 1916, when his ad in the Mail offered cut flowers and floral designs, was operating seven greenhouses. He sold the business to Reinhold Ruehr in 1939.

The Plymouth United Savings Bank, whose main office was located on Main Street, had a branch at the corner of Liberty Street and Starkweather Avenue. The branch manager in 1916 was R.A. Cassidy.

Cassidy's successor as manager of the branch had experienced an exciting day when two bandits robbed the bank and kidnapped him, as will be recounted in my next column.

## District, home-schoolers disagree

A "particularly interesting" Clonlara fee sheet was forwarded by the district to the Observer after it published an article entitled "Educators Debate Financing." It says families, regardless of the number of children enrolled, are charged \$300 tuition.

A \$150 daily honorarium is assessed to families who request that Clonlara staffers "meet with officials who challenge a family's right to home school.

"Cost of this travel is paid, in advance, by the family. Overnight accommodations, if necessary, can be with the family or friends. Families who wish personal consultation with Dr. Pat Montgomery prior to enrollment in HBEP will be charged a \$50 fee for up to one hour of consultation.

"The fee is applied to enrollment... and is due at the time of consultation." HBEP supplies tests for \$12.

A truancy trial may be over for Plymouth-Canton Community Schools and some area home-schoolers but that doesn't mean they see eye-to-eye.

School administrators and the director of Clonlara School's Home-Based Education Program disagree when it comes to the profitability of home schooling.

Clonlara's program — used by Canton's John and Sandra Bennett

who recently were found guilty in 35th District Court in a truancy lawsuit, isn't a money-maker, director Pat Montgomery has contended.

Home-schooling families are charged \$300 a year and are free to barter with the teachers they hire. Low-income families are given discounts and may exchange services or merchandise for tuition. One family pays in maple syrup, Montgomery says.

# New SEMCOG staff can't smoke

Don't light tobacco if you expect to work at SEMCOG, the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments.

"We've made it a condition of employment that there be no smoking (by new employees, in SEMCOG offices) during work hours," Executive Director John Amberger told the seven-county planning group's executive committee.

"We want to go beyond the law," he said, referring to the new state law confining smoking in govern-

ment buildings and offices to designated areas.

THAT PORTION of SEMCOG's office policy was questioned by Merrill Murray of the Washtenaw County Board of Commissioners.

"It may not be legally sustainable," Amberger admitted. "We are consulting legal counsel."

He said the smoking policy was developed after consultation with the staff. "It's a young staff," he

said, "and very environmentally conscious."

SEMCOG's offices are on the eighth and ninth floors of the Book Building in downtown Detroit. Amberger said smoking will be entirely prohibited on the ninth floor — "that's where our computer is."

On the eighth floor, smoking will be confined to private offices and a designated smoking area — except for staffers hired after the new rule took effect.

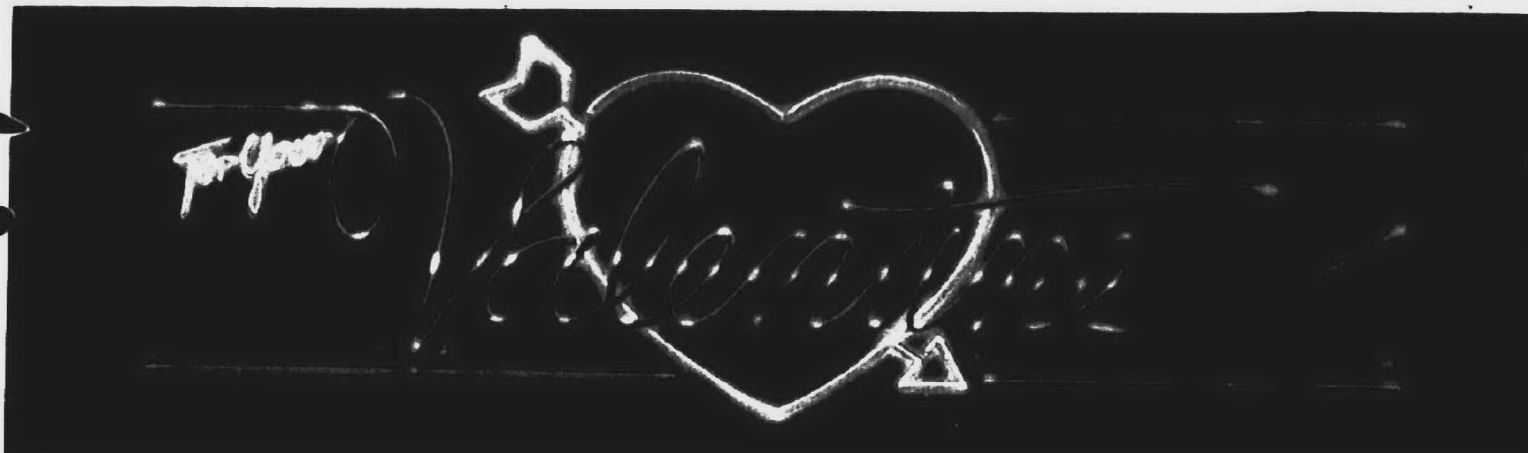
FOR GENERAL assembly and executive committee meetings, the room will be divided down the middle for both delegates and the audience — smoking allowed on one side, prohibited on the other.

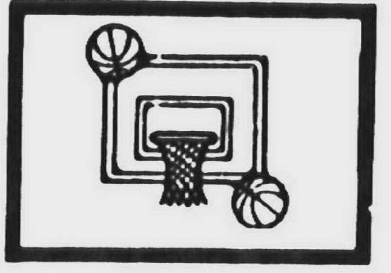

Morasky (50.8) and Butrico (52.5) went 1-2 in the 100 freestyle. Mike Goeke (1:54.0) and Jeff Albert (1:54.1) went 1-2 in the 200 free. Joe Saunders (54.4) and Greg Jubenville (1:00.6) went 1-2 in the 100 butterfly. Steve Taormina (1:07.5) and Brian Cantoni (1:08.4) went 1-2 in the 100 breaststroke.

As if that weren't enough, Saunders also won the 100 backstroke (58.3) and the Spartans won both relays. Saunders, Taormina, Jubenville and Coderre won the 200 medley relay (1:46.0) while Morasky, Butrico, Coderre and Goeke won the 400 free relay (3:28.3).

Salem (5-2) got a double win from freshman Ron Orris. He won both the 200 individual medley (2:05.0) and the 500 free (4:55.8). Don Harwood was second in

Kelly Coulson, a sophomore, gave the Raiders a big lift. She came off the bench to provide 11 successful serves good for 10 points.

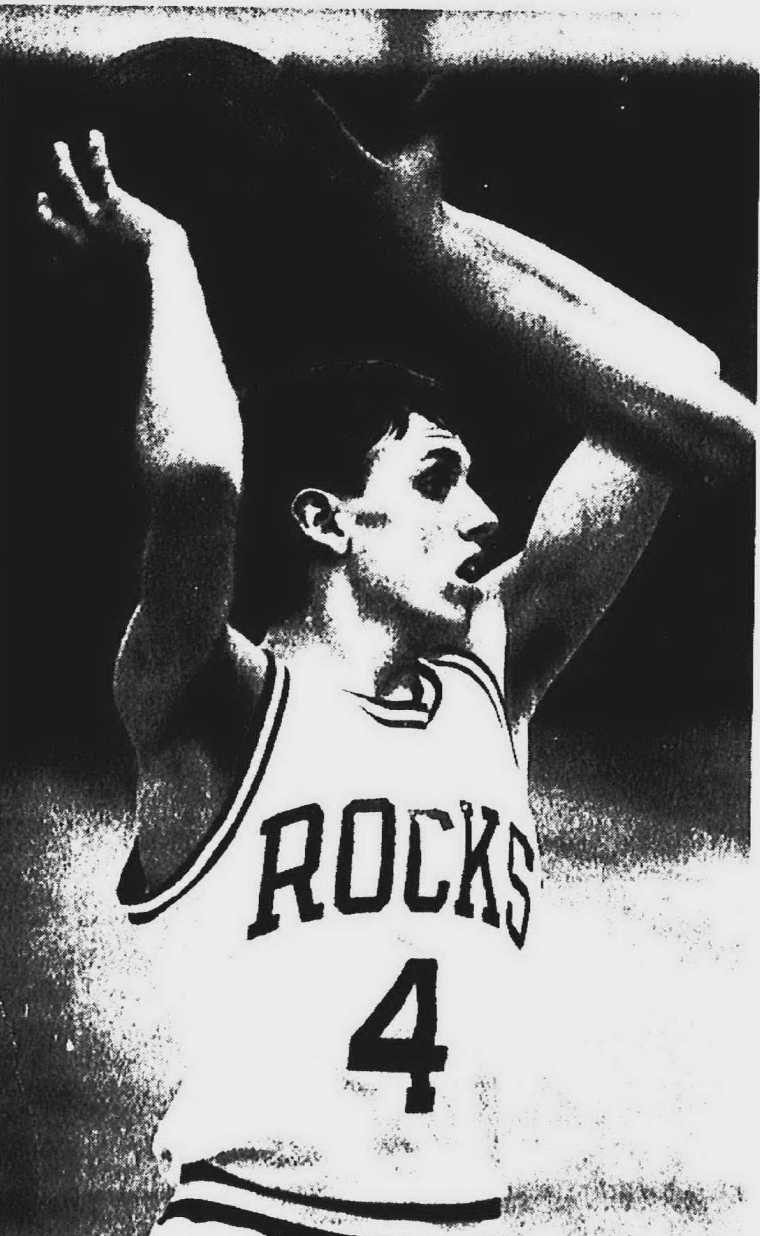
The win puts North at 4-2 in the Western Lakes, 15-6 overall. Salem is 2-4 in the league, 4-7 overall.

# North star Scott Selzer verbally commits to MSU

If Scott Selzer had his way, the only person who would know he was going to Michigan State University next fall would be George Perles.

"He's pretty shy when it comes to talking about himself," said Jim O'Leary, Selzer's football coach the past three seasons at North Farmington. "He just works hard and lets things happen. He doesn't brag. He thinks that if he talks too much people will think he's arrogant. And he's definitely not arrogant."

No. In fact, he might be described as low-key to a fault. He made a verbal commitment to accept a full-ride football scholarship from MSU two weeks ago. And kept the news virtually to himself.

His mother, Marsha Selzer, called the Observer with the news last Thursday.

"Now don't tell Scott I called," Marsha said. "He'd really be upset with me."

SCOTT SELZER may be quiet off the field, but there was nothing shy about his performance on the football field. Last fall he gained 1,311 yards rushing for North and scored 16 touchdowns. His efforts earned

him some 40 scholarship offers.

"What impressed them, especially Michigan State, was Scott's strength and speed," O'Leary said. "People just don't realize how incredibly strong he is. He bench pressed 365 pounds last year."

In addition to his strength, Selzer is one of the premier sprinters in Oberverland. He ran the 100-meter dash in 10.9 last spring.

He pared the 40 offers down to three: MSU, Indiana and Minnesota. But there was only one school Selzer seriously considered.

"I visited Michigan State and Indiana. Right before I was supposed to take my visit to Minnesota, I decided to get this thing over with," Selzer said. "I guess I always wanted to go to MSU."

SAID O'LEARY: "I'm real excited about this. And I know Scott is excited about it. They (MSU) spent a lot of time with Scott, and they were first

class throughout the whole process. They flat-out told Scott that they wanted him to be a running back. That excited him."

Plus "When I took my official visit at State, I went out with John Miller and Brian Smolinski (two former All-Area standouts from Farmington Harrison) I know those guys pretty good. And Todd Krumm, too. They are all from this area. That was nice," Selzer said.

Selzer said other than the fact that he'll be playing tailback, the MSU coaches didn't make any promises.

"They don't really tell you anything about playing time or anything like that," he said. "I'll just have to see what happens."

O'Leary said that the MSU coaches indicated to him that they weren't planning on red-shirting him, even though they were offering a five-year scholarship.

"My attitude is, he can play college football," O'Leary said. "How long it will take him to get in, I don't know. I'm no judge of that. He'll be in the same boat as every other freshman."

Selzer, who will play in the annual Michigan High School Football Coaches Association All-Star Classic in August, will sign his letter-of-intent Feb. 11.

# Pucci helps Olivet roll

Talk about reversals.

Julie Pucci has discovered just how quickly life can change in college. She's learned it firsthand as a key member of Olivet College's women's basketball team.

Just two years ago, Pucci was patrolling the back court for Westland John Glenn as point guard. She helped guide the Rockets to an 18-3 record her senior season.

She was hoping for similar success when she enrolled at Olivet, even though the Comets had a dismal past. Like any freshman, Pucci was optimistic. She figured she could help get the program on a winning course.

Her freshman season taught her an important lesson: It wasn't going to be easy.

"WE DIDN'T win a league game," Pucci, now a sophomore, recalled. "We had a good team but a bad attitude. The coach didn't really know what she was doing."

Olivet went 4-16 overall and was 0-for-12 in Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association games. Making matters worse, Pucci broke her thumb five games into the season and was sidelined for the year.

Such dejection leads to doubt, and Pucci had her share. "Every once in a while, I thought 'This isn't for me,' and I'd want to transfer," she said. "I wasn't used to (the losing) at all."

What Pucci did like was the school. When she heard new coaches were being hired — Lori and Mike Post share the position — she decided to stick it out.

Now she's glad she did. The Comets are playing better basketball than they have in a decade, sporting a 9-3 overall mark and a 4-2 MIAA record. One of those league wins was of major proportions: a 68-65 upset of Alma, the Scots' first MIAA loss since 1984.

PUCCI HAS contributed heavily to the turnaround. She's switched positions, from high school point guard to forward, and she's made the move work by averaging

13.6 points, six rebounds and 5.3 assists per game. In the win over Alma and a 66-56 triumph against Calvin, Pucci totaled 34 points, 14 assists and 10 rebounds.

Those two performances earned Pucci her second MIAA player of the week award. She's the only woman to win the award twice this season.

Pucci ranks among MIAA leaders in scoring (sixth), assists (fourth) and free-throw accuracy (fourth), despite playing a new position and filling a new role.

"I had to learn to rebound," said the 5-foot-8 Pucci. "I never had to do that in high school. And I'm shooting more. I was hesitant in the beginning, but I've been going outside more because (opponents) double and triple team our big girl (Lynda Rademacher) inside."

Instead of setting up plays like she did at John Glenn, Pucci often finds plays being set for her. "We all have roles on this team, and (scoring) is one of mine," she said.

NATURALLY, PUCCI and her teammates are all excited about the turnaround. Everything's changed, including the intensity.

"Last year, we'd show up for practice and joke around," she said. "It's very much more serious this year. We practice seven days a week sometimes."

Pucci has developed into "a better all-around player," she figures, but thinks both she and her teammates have room for improvement. "We're just starting to get used to playing together," she said of the young (three sophomore starters) team. "We can definitely get better."

To help her own development, Pucci establishes goals for herself before each game, from how many points she should score to assists and turnovers. But tops on her list is winning.

"One of my goals, of course, was to at least reach .500 in the league," she said. "We've already gone past that, so now I just want us to keep winning."

An MIAA title is within Olivet's grasp. The Comets trail MIAA-leader Alma by a game. And winning a championship would put Pucci back in more familiar surroundings.

# 'Radio Days' doesn't crystalize

"Radio Days" (PG) is Woody Allen's latest, a pleasant trip down memory lane that leaves travelers slightly unsatisfied. While the scenery is pleasant, the road is bumpy and the way stations seem unrelated. Set in Rockaway, N.Y., prior to and during World War II, "Radio Days" traces the impact of radio on an extended, middle-class Jewish family in this small community just east of Coney Island.

The family includes quite a crowd, all well-acted, with Mother (Julie Kavner) and Father (Michael Tucker) trying to keep things running for unmarried Aunt Bea (Dianne Wiest), Uncle Abe (Josh Mostel), Aunt Ceil (Renee Lippin) and Cousin Ruthie (Joy Newman), plus Grandma (Leah Carrey) and Grandpa (William Magerman).

Allen fans will recognize many of these faces as Woody's regulars. Diane Keaton is a pleasant, soft-singing nightclub chanteuse while Mia Farrow is an offbeat nightclub cigarette girl who becomes a radio gossip columnist.

TWELVE-YEAR-OLD newcomer (to Allen movies) Seth Green is Joe, the young son whose memories populate this film. His voice-over narration is read by Allen. All told, the supporting cast and extras provide the film with a Fellini-like array of faces.

The film's very valid concept, which reflects a lot of Allen's personal memories and autobiographical experiences, is that radio had a major impact on American culture.

There's no quarrel with that premise, and "Radio Days" has a number of evocative sequences in which the decor, the cinematography and the action are guaranteed to

stimulate intense longing for the good old days.

But the film's structure is far too episodic for smooth flow and sustained interest. It lacks coherence and unity and tends to be too personal. If Allen were your uncle just back from a trip, it would be swell to spend time with his stories and slides, but there are limits to such an evening's appeal.

The episodes shift from family events (real and imagined) to their favorite radio programs and then to the lives of the broadcast performers. While that is a marvelous idea, for life is truly a jumble of reality and illusion, pretense and practicality, the bare, 90 minutes of "Radio Days" fails to deal fully with its basic concept and falters when it should flow smoothly from mundane life to high illusion.

"OUTRAGEOUS Fortune" (R), on the other hand, has no such identity problems and is, flat out from start to finish, a very wacky comedy leavened with just the right amounts of excitement.

Satire and burlesque at their very best are fast-paced, with a continual progression of characters and situations. "Outrageous Fortune" takes off with just a barely noticeable delay to set up would-be actress Lauren (Shelley Long) as a prissy, theatrical artist.

A lot of the film's comedy turns on Lauren's character as it contrasts with that of another young actress, Sandy (Bette Midler), who is just as loose as Lauren is tight. Sandy is a very comic, "typical" New Yorker who lives by her wits and promises of her body.

Lauren and Sandy meet in acting classes run by the great Russian master, Stanislav Korzenowski (Rob-

ert Prosky). They also meet in the morgue while attempting to identify their lovers' bodies. It turns out that their lovers are one and the same, Michael (Peter Coyote), whose two-timing leads Lauren and Sandy on a madcap chase in the very best comic tradition.

THE FILM HAS everything except rockets, as Lauren and Sandy run across CIA, KGB, drug dealers and modern Indians, including George Carlin as a '60s burn-out running a trading post on the reservation.

Bette Midler's Sandy is vintage Midler at its best, a raucous New York "broad" chasing a two-timer across the Arizona desert in high heels. The contrast of her character with Shelley Long's polite, Eastern finishing-school demeanor is very funny. Long's unexpected behavioral changes, as the transcontinental chase escalates, provide further comic contrast.

For this, her first completed film, screenwriter Leslie Dixon has produced a polished scenario with clever dialogue and good elaboration on a basic storyline.

However ridiculous "Outrageous Fortune" gets, it's never a problem.



Seth Green is the young son in Woody Allen's charming but disjointed "Radio Days."

The quick sequence of events continually amuses and never allows the audience time to complain about how improbable these events really are.

Perhaps the best thing about the film is its good spirit and open acknowledgement of the joke. No pretenses here, just a lot of rapid-fire comedy that will delight every audience.

But they have some help—like freezers, well stocked with top quality frozen vegetables, ready to be quickly thawed for salads, stir-fried to tender crisp goodness or used in soups, casseroles or even desserts. Their freezers also contain casseroles and other make-ahead dishes stored in cookware that can go directly from freezer to microwave.

Millions of smart Americans have discovered the speed and ease of microwave cooking. And with many families eating at different times, it's made meal preparation less of a hassle. Refrigerated meals can be warmed in just minutes in the microwave. And, the "keep warm" setting on some microwave ovens holds a meal at a ready-to-eat temperature.

Whether it's a regular weeknight family dinner or a special "company is coming," here is a menu that is loaded with flavor and color and nutrition. Best of all, it is easy to prepare with the aid of a microwave oven.

Green Salad (recipe not given)  
Chicken And Vegetables With Pasta  
Carrot Cake

Fresh grated ginger and cashews add flavor and crunch to this meal-in-a-dish that starts with Oriental-style frozen vegetables. Add a green salad that takes just minutes to assemble.

For a dessert, a packaged yellow cake mix is transformed with the addition of frozen carrots, cinnamon, raisins and nuts into a delicious carrot cake.

For those evenings when there is just no time to cook, rely on the casseroles and easy to assemble main dishes stocked in the freezer. This menu is based on a make-ahead frozen casserole that can be on the table in less than 30 minutes.

Marinated Bean And Cauliflower Salad  
Italian-Style Spinach And Sausage Casserole  
Microwave Streusel Apples

The casserole (not pictured) goes together quickly and with the microwave can be piping hot on the table just 15 minutes after it comes out of the freezer. A quick pass under the broiler—you can do this with glass-ceramic cookware—melts the mozzarella topping, giving a golden brown finish to the dish. While the casserole is cooking, toss the thawed vegetables with a favorite Italian dressing. Round out the meal with a dessert that tastes like it took a great deal of time. Microwave Streusel Apples (not pictured) takes just 7 minutes in the microwave.

### Chicken And Vegetables With Pasta

(Microwave Method\*)

- 6 teaspoons soy sauce, divided
- 1 tablespoon rice vinegar
- 3 teaspoons cornstarch, divided
- 8 ounces chicken breast, boned, skinned and thinly sliced
- 1 package (16 oz.) mixed oriental-style frozen vegetables\*\*
- 1/4 cup chicken broth
- 1 tablespoon dry sherry
- 1/4 teaspoon each sugar and grated ginger root
- 8 ounces fettuccine noodles, cooked and drained
- 1/4 cup halved cashews

In a microwave-safe 2-quart dish, combine 2 teaspoons soy sauce, vinegar and 2 teaspoons cornstarch. Toss with chicken to coat, let stand 5 minutes; add vegetables and microcook at HIGH (100%) 7 minutes. Combine chicken broth, sherry, remaining soy sauce and cornstarch, ginger and sugar. Microcook in 2-cup microwave-safe measure at HIGH 1 minute or until thickened. Pour sauce over chicken and vegetables; microcook at HIGH 3 minutes. Spoon chicken and vegetables over noodles on a 12-inch round microwave-safe tray; toss lightly and sprinkle with cashews. Makes 4 servings.

*Tip:* To reheat, microcook at HIGH 2 to 3 minutes.

\*Recipe developed for 600 to 700 watt microwave oven.

\*\*Other 16-ounce package of mixed vegetables can be substituted.

### Carrot Cake

(Microwave Method\*)

- 2 cups frozen carrot slices
- 2 to 3 teaspoons ground cinnamon, divided
- 2 teaspoons granulated sugar
- 1 package (18.25 oz.) yellow cake mix
- 3 eggs
- 1/2 cup water
- 1/3 cup vegetable oil
- 1/3 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1/2 cup each raisins and chopped nuts

Microcook frozen carrots at HIGH (100%) 3 minutes. Shred in food processor or blender or finely chop; set aside. Combine 1 teaspoon cinnamon and granulated sugar; mix well. Lightly grease microwave-safe tube dish; sprinkle with cinnamon mixture. In large bowl, combine cake mix, eggs, water, oil, brown sugar and 1 to 2 teaspoons cinnamon using a wire whisk\*\* to mix ingredients. Fold in carrots, raisins and nuts. Spoon into prepared tube dish. Microcook at MEDIUM (50%) 15 minutes turning pan 1/4 turn every 5 minutes. Microcook at HIGH 5 to 6 minutes or until wooden pick inserted near center comes out clean. Cool 10 minutes in tube dish. Turn cake out on plate. Drizzle icing over cake. Makes about 12 servings.

*Icing:* Combine 1 cup powdered sugar, 1-1/2 ounces softened cream cheese, 1 tablespoon milk and 1 teaspoon vanilla; mix well. Makes 1/2 cup.

*Tip:* Cake platter may be decorated with small fern leaves and daisies.

\*\*Wire whisk beats in less air than electric mixer and produces better results when microcooking.

### Marinated Bean And Cauliflower Salad

(Not Pictured)

- 1 package (10 oz.) or 2-1/2 cups frozen cauliflower, thawed, drained and cut into bite-sized pieces\*
- 1 package (9 oz.) or 2-1/4 cups frozen green beans, thawed and drained
- 1 medium tomato, seeded and chopped
- 1 green onion, diagonally sliced
- 1/2 cup bottled Italian dressing

Sauté cauliflower, stirring constantly, over high heat in non-stick pan about 5 minutes or until vegetables are crisp-tender. Cool slightly. Combine all ingredients in mixing bowl; mix well. Marinate, refrigerated, 1 to 2 hours to allow flavors to blend. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

\*About 2 cups when cut into bite-size pieces.

### Italian-Style Spinach And Sausage Casserole

(Microwave Method\*)  
(Not Pictured)

- 1 package (10 oz.) frozen chopped spinach
- 8 ounces Italian-style sausage
- 2 cups cooked rice
- 1-3/4 cups prepared Marinara sauce
- 1/2 to 1 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1 cup shredded mozzarella cheese
- 1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 2 teaspoons melted butter or margarine

Microcook spinach in 2-quart covered glass-ceramic microwave-proof dish at HIGH (100%) 3 to 5 minutes; break apart and drain well. Crumble sausage and microcook in 1-quart microwave-safe dish at HIGH 3 to 4 minutes; drain drippings and discard. Layer rice, spinach and sausage in 1-1/2-quart microwave-safe dish. Pour sauce over sausage. Cover tightly and freeze. To serve, sprinkle with black pepper and microcook, uncovered, at HIGH 15 minutes. Sprinkle with mozzarella and microcook at HIGH 1 to 2 minutes. Top with Parmesan cheese and butter. Heat under broiler until golden and bubbly. Makes 4 servings.

### Microwave\* Streusel Apples

(Not Pictured)

- 1/2 cup uncooked quick oats
- 1/4 cup each packed brown sugar and chopped walnuts
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 4 cups sliced Golden Delicious apples or Western Winter pears

Combine oats, brown sugar, walnuts, flour and cinnamon for streusel topping. Cut in butter. Place apples in microwave-safe 1-quart dish. Sprinkle streusel over apples. Microcook at HIGH (100%) 7 minutes. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

### Microwave Tips

**Melt Unsweetened Chocolate:** Place a 1-ounce square in a small custard cup at MEDIUM (50%) 2 to 4 minutes, stirring as needed.

**Toast Coconut:** Spread 1/2 cup flaked coconut in a shallow microwave-safe dish. Microcook at HIGH (100%) 2-1/2 to 5 minutes, until golden, stirring every 30 seconds.

**Freshen Stale Snack Chips:** Place about 2 cups snack chips in a shallow microwave safe baking dish. Microcook, uncovered, at HIGH 1 to 2 minutes.

**Cook Frozen Vegetables:** Place one package (8 to 10 oz.) in a microwave-safe dish. Add 1 to 2 tablespoons water (optional) and microcook at HIGH 4 minutes; stir vegetables, cover and microcook 1 to 4 minutes longer or until crisp.



# Nutrition on a shoe string budget

Every time you buy a convenience food in the grocery store you are paying the food manufacturer to provide you with a maid service. When you buy total convenience foods such as a TV dinner, you are hiring a cook. Are these luxuries you want?

The average family spends over one-third of each food dollar for protein foods — meat, poultry, fish and eggs. Another one-fourth is spent on non-food items such as paper products, pet foods, and hair care products.

Despite the high cost of food, there are a number of ways the grocery bill can be cut down without giving up the quality of foods you like.

If you spend \$80 a week on groceries, in a year the total dollar amount would be \$4,160. Food shopping should be treated more businesslike. Appoint someone else or yourself to be the food purchasing agent for the family.

A savings of \$10 a week would be \$520 in a year — a nice, tidy little savings. To figure the food bill, subtract all the non-edibles, such as beauty care products, magazines, and pet food.

To take this a step further, subtract everything that has little or no nutritional value. Soda, snack foods, coffee and tea would all come under this heading. These totals will probably astound you!

Perhaps consideration should be made to shop for non-edibles and non-nutritional foods somewhere other than the grocery store. Let's start with a game plan for super-market savings.

Step One: Take inventory. Look through cupboards, refrigerator and freezer and see what's on hand. Foods stored in a freezer for more than one year lose quality. Since you have paid for the food make sure you consume it at its peak to get all the nutritional value.

If you haven't seen the back or bottom of your freezer for a year, check it out. You may have more food on hand than you realize. Incorporate last week's dairy products and other perishables in food prepared this week.

Step Two: Check coupons and newspaper ads for specials. Watch out for a coupon come on! Coupled food is only a bargain if you use the product. When shopping don't buy more than you have planned to use or can store properly.

Step Three: Plan your meals at home, not in the grocery store. You have an idea of what's on hand, available coupons and weekly specials, so now is the time to plan meals. Meal planning may sound tedious, but it doesn't have to be.

Consider what your family likes to eat, do you have enough time to prepare it, the nutritional balance of the meals and of course, how much it will cost. Meats and/or protein alternatives, fruits and vegetables, breads and cereals, milk and cheese are the basic four food groups to follow when planning meals. Plan a variety of interesting and appealing meals and snacks that your family will enjoy.

Step Four: A shopping list! This is a check off list so when you get home from the store you have all the ingredients you need. Every time you run back to the store for one or two items it costs.

Put unplanned purchases in the baby seat portion of the cart and have them rung up separately. Impulse shopping accounts for 20-30

percent in additional spending. Don't buy cute little containers, little cans or packages. Generally they cost more than the larger quantity. Check the cost per serving to determine the best buy. Never buy food cut up that you can buy whole. Learn to cut up a chicken, make stew meat and slice a watermelon and save money.

Step Five: Prepare the food — not merely heat it! If you enjoy cooking, you can save money on baked goods, soups, and entrees by making your own. Consider making your own homemade mixes. Go on a one-day shopping and cooking spree, grocery shop and cook all the same day. Cookies, muffins, soup, stews and casseroles can all be prepared at the same time. Freeze them for your very own convenience foods.

Step Six: Think before you shop and when you shop! Don't be like some shoppers that realize the food is running low and jump into the car and head for the nearest grocery store.

The following are some food budget stretchers to get your money's worth:

- Day-old bread makes better toast than fresh.
- Use a clean frozen juice can to store dough for refrigerator cookies. Run hot water over the sides of the can when ready to bake, then push out the dough and slice. They will certainly taste better than the convenience box or tube.
- Leftover cooked cereal can be stored in the small cans, fry it the next time.

- Try oatmeal in soup instead of rice and lettuce leaves that you are going to discard instead of cabbage in the soup.
- Vinegar is a natural meat tenderizer.

Wasting food is really poor economics — so make sure you eat what you purchase at its peak quality.

Buy nutrient dense foods to get more for your food dollars. This means they are exceptionally high in vital nutrients. A few of these are spinach, tomatoes, tuna packed in water, non-fat or low-fat milk, tofu, fresh carrots, ground turkey, dry kidney beans, whole wheat bread, potatoes and brown rice.

The cost of food is a major concern for consumers who must cope with a limited budget. Making intelligent selections from the thousands of available food products is essential in obtaining optimum nutrient value for the price paid.

To save money and have more nutritious meals is to take time at home planning, time in the store shopping, and time at home preparing.

# Coffee cake is a tempting treat

- Nut Crust**

 2 tsp. finely grated fresh orange peel  
 1/4 cup fresh orange juice  
 3 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
 3 tsp. baking powder  
 1 tsp. salt  
 3/4 cup shortening (half butter)  
 1 1/4 cups sugar  
 3 large eggs  
 2 tbsp. coffee liqueur for baked cake  
 Coffee liqueur glaze  
 Whole nuts (optional)

Prepare nut crust and press in.

even layer over bottom and sides of a 9- to 10-inch kugelhupf or other tube pan. Combine 1/4 cup coffee liqueur and cream. Grate orange peel and combine with juice. Resift flour with baking powder and salt. Cream shortening and sugar until fluffy. Beat in eggs, one at a time, until blended. Stir in dry ingredients alternately with coffee liqueur-cream and orange juice mixtures, beating only until smooth. Carefully turn into prepared pan. Bake on first rack below oven center, in 350°F oven, 50-55 minutes, until cake tests done. Remove from oven and cool in pan 10 minutes. Invert cake on wire rack and remove pan. Brush 2 tbsp. coffee liqueur over top of cake and cool. Drizzle coffee liqueur glaze over top and let stand until set. Garnish with whole nuts, if desired.

Nut crust: Mix together well, 1 cup finely chopped walnuts, cashews or pecans, 1/2 cup fine dry bread crumbs, 1/2 cup granulated or light brown sugar, 1/2 cup butter, melted.

Coffee liqueur glaze: Mix 1/2 cup powdered sugar (free of lumps) with 1 tsp. coffee liqueur and 1 tsp. each cream and melted butter until smooth.

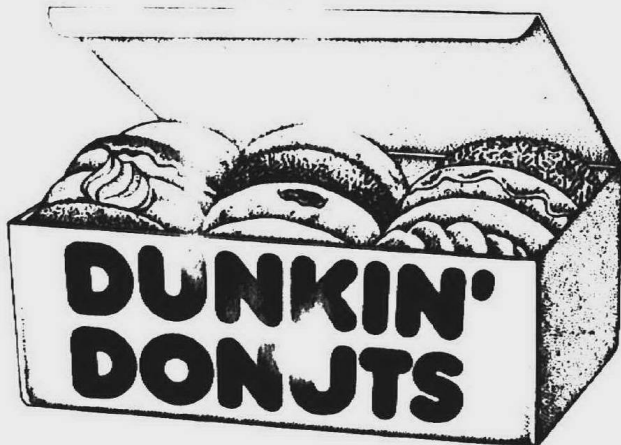

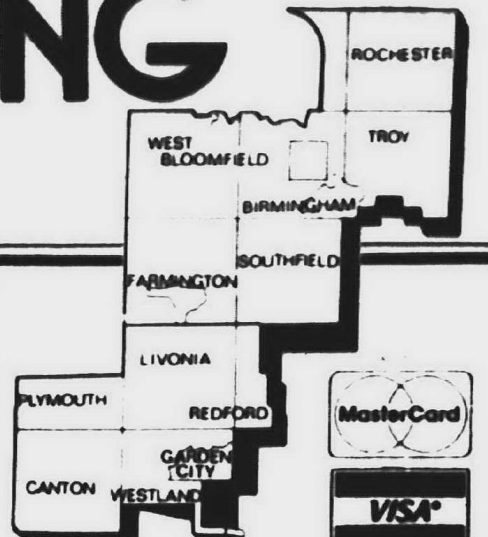

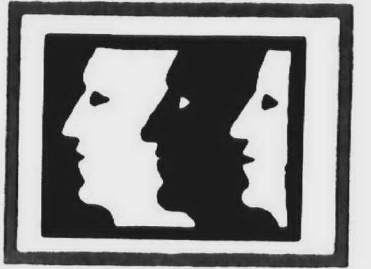

## Handling life's ups and downs

There are good ways and bad ways of coping with stress.

Healthy ways of coping with stress include exercising, participating in recreational activities and talking things out. Even crying can help.

"Crying is really important," said Carolyn Stark, director of the Catherine McAuley Health Center Employee Assistance Program.

"Sometimes it's hard for people to give themselves permission to cry." Men in particular have a difficult time recognizing that it's OK to cry, she said.

Unhealthy ways of coping include overeating, ignoring the problem or taking it out on others. Abusing drugs and drinking too much alcohol are also unhealthy ways of coping.

"Alcohol is so readily available and so promoted as a way to cope when you're having pressure," Stark said during a Wednesday afternoon program at the Canton Recreation Center.

Stark's presentation, "Depression: How to Keep From Staying Down," was part of a Wednesday open house at the Canton Recreation Center.

**IN ADDITION** to her presentation, Canton Seniors ate lunch and enjoyed a performance by the Canton Seniors Kitchen Band. Hypertension screening, courtesy of the Oakwood Hospital Volunteer Guild, was also part of the day's activities.

Stark talked about the difference between ongoing depression and the normal ups and downs of daily life. Depression involves long-term feelings of hopelessness, helplessness and despair.

"I'm not talking about feelings of sadness, which come and go for everyone."

Depression may involve a grief reaction, such as that following the loss of a loved one. A person dealing with such a loss will go through several stages.

Feelings of denial will be followed by those of anger. Hopelessness and despair will then appear, followed by feelings of guilt and eventual relative acceptance of the loss.

Although some people are devastated by such a loss and can't function, others will appear to be much more in control of things, Stark said. Each person's method of coping with such a loss is different.

Those who are dealing with a short-term crisis may wish to get professional help, she said. Friends, family and church can also help people cope with such crises.

"It passes, and the person recovers. They go on with their life."

**ONGOING DEPRESSION** involves a number of symptoms, Stark said. Those include reduced productivity, loss of appetite, isolation and withdrawal from people and a number of other symptoms.

In some cases, depression is treated with anti-depressant medications, Stark said, but for most situations, such medications aren't needed. A tranquilizer, such as Valium, may be given for a short time.

"Those kinds of drugs can lead to dependency." The use of such drugs should be closely monitored to avoid dependency, she said.

For more severe mood swings associated with manic-depressive disorders, lithium carbonate may be used.

"That has to be closely monitored by a physician because it's a very strong drug with side effects."

Depression associated with drug use can involve prescription drugs. Some blood pressure medications can contribute to depression. It's important to report such reactions to a doctor, Stark said.

"There's always a reason for it." Learning to cope with stress is a lifelong process, according to Stark. Building up coping skills is essential.

**SOME RESEARCH** has shown that depression can weaken the body's immune system.

"It's just another way of keeping healthy."

The stress cycle begins with a stressful event. Such events aren't always negative, according to Stark. A promotion on the job or a vacation, for example, can be a source of stress.

People's thoughts, beliefs and perceptions about such stressful events have a lot to do with their reactions, she said. Response to stress can include physical signs — such as a driver's increased heartbeat following a near-miss on the expressway.

In such short-term stressful situations, the stress passes and the person recovers. Long-term stress, however, means that the stress response is constantly being activated. Headaches, fatigue, nervousness and depression are likely results.

It's important to be aware of the early symptoms of depression, according to Stark.

"That's when you really need to take some action steps to find out what the problem is."

**COPING WITH** such stressful events can include changing your thoughts, beliefs and perceptions. Changing your attitudes has a lot to do with changing reactions, she said.

It's also possible to change your physiology, Stark said. Relaxation techniques, a well-balanced diet, meditation and exercise can help people cope more effectively with stress.

Changing your environment is also a way to cope. A trip south to a warmer location, for example, can help lift your spirits this time of year.

"Changing your environment may also mean improving the relationships with others," Stark said. Changing relationships with other people — by learning to be assertive, for example — can help.

It's easy to feel all alone in the world, Stark said. It's important to remember, however, that others may feel the same way.

"Maybe you really need to pick up the phone and make the first move."

Stark's presentation on depression was followed by a performance by the Canton Seniors Kitchen Band, one of several activities held throughout the day during the Wednesday open house.

The open house was held to recognize the renovations made at the Canton Recreation Center, said Diane Neihengen, senior citizens coordinator for Canton Township.

A back room was added to the center, and its kitchen and bathrooms were renovated with funds received from the Michigan Office of Services to the Aging and community development block grants.

The renovation work began in the late spring of 1986 and was completed in the fall, Neihengen said. There had been talk about holding the open house before Christmas, but a decision was made to wait until after the holidays.

Approximately 125 people came to the open house at the Canton Recreation Center.

"It's been very busy, but it's been very satisfying," she said of the day's celebration.

## ORDINANCE NO. 83 CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH AMENDMENT TO ZONING ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE ENACTED PURSUANT TO ACT NO. 184, PUBLIC ACTS OF 1943, AS AMENDED, TO AMEND ARTICLE XXI OF ORDINANCE NO. 83 OF THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH REGULATING THE PERMITTED LOCATIONS, SIZES, HEIGHTS, AND AREA REGULATIONS OF OUTDOOR ADVERTISING SIGNS AND FLAGPOLES.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

### SECTION 1: TITLE

This Ordinance shall be known and cited as Ordinance No. 83.27 amendment to Article XXI of Ordinance No. 83 of the Charter Township of Plymouth.

### SECTION 2: PURPOSE

The purpose of this Ordinance is to amend those portions of Article XXI of the Zoning Ordinance of the Charter Township of Plymouth which relate to the location, height, size, area, and other aspects of outdoor advertising signs and the location, height, and other aspects of flagpoles. The authority to amend the Zoning Ordinance is provided by the Township Rural Zoning Act, Act No. 184, Public Acts of 1943, as amended.

### SECTION 3: AMENDMENTS

The following Sections of Article XXI of the Charter Township of Plymouth Zoning Ordinance are amended as indicated:

#### SUBSECTION 3.1

The "Purpose" clause of Article XXI shall be deleted in its entirety and replaced by the following:

#### Findings and Purpose:

It is hereby determined that proliferation of signs in the Township unduly distracts motorists and pedestrians, creates a traffic hazard, reduces the effectiveness of signs needed to direct and warn the public, mars the appearance of the Township, restricts light and air, negatively affects property values, and results in an inappropriate use of land. The purpose of this Ordinance is to control the number, location and size of signs to reduce their negative effects. It is determined that the signs of least value to people within the Township are those which carry commercial messages other than the advertisement of products, services, events, persons, institutions or businesses located on the premises of the sign or the announcement of the sale or rental of the premises. It is determined that the regulations contained in this Ordinance are the minimum regulation necessary to achieve its purposes. It is also determined that restrictions in this Ordinance on the size of signs and their height, number and placement on real estate are the minimum necessary to achieve the purposes of those regulations.

#### SUBSECTION 3.2

Section 21.3.1(d) shall be amended by the addition of a Subparagraph (4) stating as follows: "The height of flagpoles shall conform to the height restrictions set forth in Article XVI for buildings and structures. A flagpole shall be deemed to be a structure under all of the provisions of this Ordinance."

#### SUBSECTION 3.3

The chart comprising Section 21.5 shall be amended by adding a column pertaining to outdoor advertising signs and indicating that outdoor advertising signs shall not be permitted under any of the zoning classifications except for Industrial. The Section shall be further amended by adding a subparagraph labeled (d) stating as follows: "Limited to areas adjacent to Interstate 275 or Michigan Route 14, a Federal Aid Primary Highway." The limitations stated in Subsection (d) will apply to outdoor advertising signs permitted under zoning classification Industrial.

#### SUBSECTION 3.4

Section 21.6 shall be amended by deleting item 12 regarding Outdoor Advertising signs and renumbering the remaining two items.

#### SUBSECTION 3.5

Section 21.7 shall be amended by adding a Subsection 6 stating as follows: "6. Outdoor advertising.

The following provisions apply to outdoor advertising signs:

(a) Size/Area. No individual sign face shall exceed ten and one-half feet in vertical measurement nor thirty-six feet in total length excluding temporary extensions, cut-outs, or embellishments. No individual sign face shall exceed 378 square feet in area, exclusive of temporary extensions, cut-outs or embellishments. Temporary extensions, cut-outs or embellishments shall not exceed twenty percent of the total sign face area. Temporary extensions, cut-outs or embellishments shall mean attachments to an outdoor advertising sign that extend beyond the sign perimeter as part of the artistic development or enhancement of the sign message, and, if utilized at all, are likely to change in dimensional form in varying degrees, to compliment changes in sign message. Such temporary extension, cut-outs or embellishments are intended to be of a duration limited to a particular advertising message and are to be considered an occasional nature, and are not to be considered the norm.

(b) Height. No sign may exceed thirty-five feet in height measured from the surface of the adjoining Interstate or Federal Air Primary Highway, except where the surface of the roadway is lower than the adjacent grade, then the sign may project 35 feet from the top of the grade to the top of the sign face.

(c) Lighting. No sign may be erected which contains, includes or is illuminated by any flashing, intermittent or moving light or lights. No sign may be erected or maintained which is not effectively shielded so as to prevent beams or rays of light from being directed at any portion of a right-of-way or residential area or which is of such intensity or brilliance as to cause glare or to impair the vision of the driver or any motor vehicle. Outdoor advertising signs may be illuminated at all hours, notwithstanding the provisions of Section 21.2.4.

(d) Spacing. No two outdoor advertising sign structures on the same side of an Interstate or highway shall be erected less than one thousand feet apart.

(e) Gating. No sign alongside a roadway shall be closer than 200 feet to a line drawn perpendicular to and across the roadway from any sign on the opposite side of the roadway.

(f) Setback. Outdoor advertising signs shall be required to set back from the property lines of an established lot a distance of not less than fifteen (15) feet.

(g) Location. The information contents of outdoor advertising signs shall not be visible from a public park, a public recreational facility, a residential area or any roadway which is not an Interstate highway or a Federal Aid Primary Highway. All outdoor advertising signs shall be set back a minimum of 250 feet from the right-of-way of any adjacent roadways.

### SECTION 4: EFFECTIVE DATE

The provisions of this ordinance shall be, and the same hereby are, declared to be an emergency ordinance and immediately necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety and general welfare and this ordinance shall be and the same hereby is, declared effective immediately upon the publication thereof.

### SECTION 5: ADOPTION

This ordinance is adopted by the Township Board of the Charter Township of Plymouth pursuant to the authority of Act No. 184 of the Public Acts of 1943, as amended, at a meeting duly called and held on the 27 day of January A.D., 1987, and ordered to be given publication in the manner prescribed by law.
