"Ripley's Believe It or Not" would

This school district has no schools. It has no administrators, no teachers

and no students for that matter. It's the Plymouth-Northville School District, and it exists only on

Say what?

This is a true story, honest. The district lies along a crook in Napier Road south of Five Mile and the Brae-Burn Golf Club. It encompasses about six houses.

Its reason for being is bond indebt-

FOR YEARS, the district's residents sent their children, illegally, to Plymouth-Canton Community Schools. Iilegally because these folks actually lived in the Northville Public School District, says John Hoben, superintendent of Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

Boundaries are such that Napier Road curves outside the Plymouth-Canton district and then back in close to Brae-Burn

The families, residing on the west side of Napier, were found out in about 1972, Hoben said.

"I'm surprised it was never uncovered before. Obviously, those people

"What brought it to light was someone sold a home, and when the new resident went to vote at Farrand School, there were no voting records. It took a good citizen moving in to vote for us to discover it."

The district confessed to the state Department of Education and was told "the onus was on the district that had enrolled the illegal students," Hoben said. The state socked Plymouth-Canton schools with a \$177,000 penalty for not charging tu-

### 'Typical' teen dies

Paul Bradford, 14, died of an apparent cardiac arrest after a scuffle with another student at Central Middle School in Plymouth Tuesday.

"There was a shoving match but nothing unusual," said Richard Myers, Plymouth police chief. "It was the way schoolboy arguments are. It was quickly broken up by one of the teachers. There was nothing to make us believe there were any unusual

Paul, an eighth grader, collapsed shortly after the incident, which took place in a classroom at about 10:45 a.m. Paul was taken to St. Mary Hospital in Livonia about 11:20 a.m. and was pronounced dead "shortly after," a hospital spokeswoman said.

The Canton resident was born with a heart problem and had open heart surgery when he was 8 years old. He had an artificial heart valve and last visited the doctor Jan. 29. Paul seemed to be doing well at that time, said his father, Gordon Bradford.

### Sweeper makes sure city streets stay clean

Operating a street cleaner isn't as carefree as it may

So says John Burger, a public works employee in the city of Plymouth for nearly 30 years.

Burger, 48, is the department's eldest statesman in terms of service

The Westland resident is one of four who takes turns cleaning major roadways in the city three times a week and all subdivision streets monthly spring The sweeper also comes out during thaws in winter.

"You have to pay attention," Burger said. "If you don't, you have the gutter broom up on the curb or sidewalk. You don't have much time to do much gawk-

THE SWEEPER sucks paper, leaves and twigs into

a hopper, then scrubs along the curb to allow for good drainage to storm sewers

A 50-gallon water tank on the sweeper is refilled at designated fire hydrants about every hour. The hopper is emptied at Riverside Cemetery every 21/2 to 3 hours. Later, the debris is hauled to a landfill.

Street cleaners start at 11 p.m. the one week per month they sweep subdivisions, at 3 a.m. when sweep-

The street cleaner logs about 1,500 miles annually, at a speed of about five miles per hour

"You really don't have much chance to look around," Burger said. "It's something you more or less have to be alert on."



### Family site to house condominium project

Ralph Lorenz, one of the bestknown entrepreneurs in the community, plans to build 19 condominiums in Plymouth Township on land where he raised his family.

He also has broken ground for a 2.600-square-foot office annex off Deer Street behind the Mayflower Motor Inn in the city of Plymouth.

Lorenz, 76, who's spent a lifetime here, shows no signs of resting on his

"What are you going to do?" he said. "I have to have something to do. How do you slow down? You can't. I feel like 36."

Lorenz and his son, Rick, who recently arrived from Colorado with his family, are partners in the condominium venture.

Individual units of up to 2,275 square feet are expected to sell for about \$250,000.

"THESE WOULD probably be the most luxurious in the area so far," said David Schaff, architect for the project. The 10-acre site is on the south

side of Ann Arbor Trail between McClumpha and Canton Center The Lorenzs cleared one big hur-

dle last week when the township board approved their request for a cluster housing option.


That option allows a developer more leeway in preparing a site plan to take advantage of unique land situations. It doesn't allow for more dense construction than is already permitted.

The parcel has a flood plain of just over 21/2 acres at the southern end through which passes a branch of Tonquish Creek.

Without the cluster option, Schaff said, only about 14 lots could be developed due to the topography and the project would become economically infeasible.

Construction is expected to start in late April, Schaff said. Some units could be ready for occupancy this

### Group eyes teen loitering

A report on how to improve relations this summer among youth, business people, residents and police in the city of Plymouth is expected next month from a committee formed to examine the issue.

The committee, strictly advisory, consists of people from all sides of a controversy centering on young people loitering and trespassing in the downtown area.

'The overall goal is to basically look at the overall situation and recommend possible courses of action in 1987." said Paul Sincock, assistant to the city manager.

"We felt it was important we get all concerned groups together, take a look at the situation, and make some kind of report."

"THIS ISN'T a real formalized kind of thing. It's not an officially appointed board from the city commission level. It's an informal meeting of concerned persons," he

Sincock said he initiated the committee and invited input from

young people who he believed might want to participate.

The response has been somewhat discouraging but not disheartening, he said. Only a handful have followed these lowed through.

"It's encouraging that there are students and young people want to get involved," he said.

"We can say we looked at the sit-uation. Whether the city takes ac-tion or not, that's another whole is-

sue. This is an advisory thing.
"It's kind of the old theory two heads are better than one," Sincock said.


Students, according to written summaries of those sessions provided by Sincock, cited a lack of things to do and a place to "hang out." Some cited a lack of consistency in law enforcement.

The committee has met twice. It is expected to meet at least one more time. A report may be issued in 30 to 45 days, Sincock said.

### Adult education comes under attack

Local educators have labeled charges that school districts are profiting from inflated attendance figures in adult education programs as misleading and irresponsible.

School officials from western Wayne County say they are concerned that recent publicity may result in wrong perceptions by the public and lead to cuts in state aid to school districts.

Budget cuts, they agree, would be disastrous.

Superintendent Dennis O'Neill of Wayne-Westland schools, one local district accused in recent years with profiting said, "We have a tough time making ends meet with current funding."

Kenneth Erickson, superintendent of Redford Union Public Schools, another district singled out for criticism of its adult ed program by state officials, said the district "hustles" now to balance annual budgets.

'We come very close to the breakeven point each year, and we have yet to fully reinstate programs cut during the lean years in the 1970s."

These include such programs as music, art appreciation and physical education at the elementary level, and offering five rather than six classes each semester to junior high school students.

ROBERT BOLS, supervisor of the auditors for the state Department of 1960s, according to Education, and Robert McKerr, former associate state school superin--tendent for finance, were quoted recently in a Detroit Free Press article, that charged many school districts with inflating attendance figures in adult ed programs to collect state money.

They also charged that districts then use these profits to finance other educational programs.

In an interview with the Observer, McKerr, now a senior researcher for Citizens Research Council of Michigan, stood by his comments. But, he said, they are based on audits from 1983-84, before new state regulations that are in place now had been ·implemented.

### Schools deny charge of inflated figures

Bols, however, said he was misquoted. While he said 80 to 85 percent of all district audits result in altered figures, changes are usually minor and sometimes are in favor of the district.

The differences are usually caused by a difference in interpretation of regulations, he said.

THE PRACTICE of moving state funds from one budget item to another by district administrators is legal. There are no state regulations limiting the practice.

Districts receive state aid based upon FTE's, or the number of fulltime equivalent students taking accredited courses. Adults are included in the FTE count, but on a different formula than that used for regular K-12 students.

State aid is paid to individual districts in six annual payments. A portion of the money is earmarked for specific use but that which is not enters the general budget. This money is budgeted according to need.

It costs less to provide courses for adults than it normally does to provide specialized classes for advanced students or other special education programs, and budgets reflect the difference, according to school officials

The practice of moving funds in the general budget stems from the

Larry Masteller, director of community education for Plymouth-Canton schools.

At that time, he said, the state Department of Education adopted a policy entitling adults to a free education.

Masteller maintains school districts are much more accountable than Bols or McKerr implied. He also said adult ed mandatory.

ERICKSON RESENTS other implications by Bols and McKerr as

According to him, Bols and McKerr imply that school districts with large adult education enrollments are cheaters and dishonest.

Erickson said Redford Union has one of the largest programs in the state for several reasons; it is a partnership program that also services South Redford and Livonia students,

the district has devoted an empty school to the program and offers both day and night classes, and there is a large local population particu-larly suited to classes that increase employment skills.

A similar situation exists in Garden City, according to Superintendent Michael Wilmot. The district cooperates with Dearborn, Dearborn Heights and Northville. Garden City provides courses for adults in all four districts.

The arrangement is called a consortium. A district that receives state aid provides adult ed for districts that are out-of-formula and receive no state aid.

The arrangement also guards against duplication of adult ed programs in any one area.

MASTELLER SAID when he prepares an annual budget for the Plymouth-Canton adult education program, he sits down with the district's budget director. Together they define the program for the next school year.

"As long as my program is being treated fairly, I am receiving my budget and am properly staffed and supplied, it is no concern of mine if I get more money than the next pro-

"To take one program and say it is

profiting is entirely overlooking the total picture of financing education. Schools are not in a profit-making posture," Masteller said.

Wilmot concurred. "It is distorted to islolate a portion of a school budget. Excess funds in one area simply offset costs in mandated programs.'

The Clarenceville School District,

which includes parts of Livonia, Farmington Hills and Redford Township, has 623 students in its adult ed program, including those from Farmington with whom Clarenceville has formed a consorti-

Clarenceville Superintendent Michael Shibler labeled Bols and McKerr's remarks 'irresponsible. While some programs can be criticized, there are more that

Those that are run efficiently, might be hurt (by the criticism),"

Shibler said any extra money left over in the Clarenceville adult ed budget is put back into the program to upgrade it or used elsewhere.

"We unashamedly use the funds where they are needed," he said.

ONE PROGRAM that has been troubled in the past is Wayne-Westland, often enough to prompt O'Neill to ask, "Will this ever go away?"

O'Neill was not superintendent when the district was accused of inflating adult ed enrollment figures in 1983-84.

The district is currently repaying the state \$665,000 in overcharges, including that for 150 registrations that district officials agreed were invalid, O'Neill said.

Of an additional 300 registrations challenged in court, O'Neill said, Wayne-Westland was ordered to repay on 150. The remaining 150 were deemed valid

O'Neill said the overcharging occured because of "sloppy bookkeeping" that has since been corrected, and auditors who arbitrarily imposed state regulations that were not in place at the time of the incident.

At the time, the district offered courses to nursing homes residents, O'Neill said three or four of them died after classes began but records did not reflect the deaths.

As a result of the problems then, O'Neill said the district no longer offers classes in nursing homes without prior approval from the state.

A current investigation of the incident by the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office has been, according to other Wayne-Westland educators who asked not to be named, prompted by certain local citizens who 'want a pound of flesh. They want criminal charges filed against former directors of the program."



to Gerald Dunn, executive director for the Metropolitan Association for Improved School Legislation.

"Jerry got a one-line change in the state aid act that pardoned us for that fine," recalled Hoben.

But that was just the first reel of befuddling red tape. The families didn't want to switch to Northville schools.

"They wanted to stay in Plymouth, so we had to go through the process of having the boundaries changed. That meant having to get approval from Oakland, Wayne and Washtenaw counties because "Northville is in Oakland and Washtenaw, and we're in Wayne and Washtenaw," said Hoben.

"It was a confusing mess at the time.'

John Street, director of business and finance for Northville Public

Schools, wouldn't disagree. When the district was part of Northville, bonds were sold based on the property within the school district. When we transferred to another school district, those taxpayers still remained responsible for the debt incurred up through that point."

To satisfy the bond indebtedness, the Plymouth-Northville paper school district was created in the early 1970s.







### State of the State Blanchard emphasizes youth and winning

Vague. More detail.

That's how area state senators greeted early versions of Gov. James J. Blanchard's first State of the State message of his second

"Competitiveness" and "families" - two favorite Republican terms stood out in the Democratic governor's outline message.

"WIN" WAS another favorite word of Blanchard, who won 61 percent of the vote last Nov. 6.

Categories in his message were labeled "Winning the Jobs of Tomorrow" (economics), "Preparing Our People to Win" (job training), "Winning the Fight for Safety"(crime) and "Winning by Caring" (welfare proposals) and so on.

to be youth. Major initiatives covered job training, tougher sentencing, a pre-school program, camps for problem juveniles, more school aid and a 20th state department to deal with child and family problems.

And he saw Michigan's top challenge as "rapid global economic change."

The speech to a joint session of the Legislature Wednesday evening was more a list of promised benefits than a blueprint of how to achieve them. Lawmakers applauded, but their desire for more detail cut across party

"THE WHOLE message has the flavor of what Republicans have been saying for years," said R. Robert Geake, R-Northville, beginning his 12th year in the state Senate.

"It sounds scarcely distinguishable from a moderate Republican Blanchard's top interest appeared philosophy," Geake said, stressing though, we may not see changes like eliminating the waiting week for unemployment compensation."

Geake, who chairs the Senate Appropriation subcommittee on social services, likes:

• Blancard's emphasis on such favorite Republican words as "family" and "competitiveness."

• The governor's willingness to "deal with product liability" and reducing costs of workers comp and unemployment comp.

The governor is anticipating a drop of 12,000 general assistance caseloads from 105,000. "I don't think that's realistic." Thus, Geake sees little chance the state can increase welfare benefits by 3 percent due to a declining caseload as Blanchard pro-

 Creation of a 20th state department to responsible for policies dealing with children and families. The departments of Mental Health, Social Services, Public Health, Education and Corrections already have such responsibiltiies, and Geake said a new department would be "disruptive" because "in our society there's no clear line between childhood and adulthood, no clear lines of responsi-



"Now, raises are given to non-union employees on a calendar-year basis because they took an 18-month freeze a few years back," said Carol Stone, purchasing/personnel director for the city.

The city commission has indicated it would consider making another adjustment during coming budget sions to put all employees - including department heads who also took a freeze - back on a fiscal year basis, she said.

Firefighters, police officers and DPW workers represented by unions will receive negotiated pay increases July 1 at the start of the city's fiscal year.

City manager Henry Graper's yearly base salary rose to \$49,500 from \$48,960 with the recent raise Although seemingly less than 3 percent, part of his pay increase was di-verted to a deferred compensation plan, Stone said.

Non-union employees and department heads are paid off for unused sick time up to six days a year.

**DEPARTMENT** heads, who must live within the city limits, also are assigned city cars.

The 13 police officers and seven firefighters represented by unions will receive 4 percent pay raises effective July 1.

At that time, police officers at the top of the scale will reap an annual base salary exclusive of overtime of \$31,171. The base salary now is \$29,972.

The four fire captains will receive \$32,886 in July compared to \$31,621 now, while the three firefighters will get \$29,774 compared to \$28,629. Again, overtime is extra.

Police officers and firefighters receive longevity pay up to \$800 yearly.

The city is in the process of paying off police officers and firefighters for accumulated sick time. Once accomplished, they won't receive extra pay for unused sick time.

The 16 DPW workers are represented by the Teamsters. Their contract expires June 30.

Most are classified as either Maintenance Worker I or II.

After three years of service, they are paid at hourly rates of \$11.49 and \$11.18, respectively.



### Rec leaders see trouble

### Federal cuts fought; DNR shakeup worrisome

Professionals say public recreation is in deep trouble with the federal and state governments.

Not only are Oakland County parks and other suburhan projects about to lose federal aid, but the sitution in Lansing is deteriorating.

"I was surprised at how tense, how

'down,' this conference is," said Kelly Kendall, attending her first Michigan Recreation and Parks Association conference in Dearborn this week. The Michigan State University student is also part-time recreation director for rural Bath Township, north of the East Lansing campus.

"We as professionals are afraid to speak up," said R. Eric Reickel, Wayne County's parks chief and former Oakland parks director. "Well, I'm not afraid," he said, listing the specific problems.

THE EXCHANGE occurred during a daylong meeting of the Gover-nor's Recreation Advisory Committee, a 17-member panel headed by outspoken Harriet Saperstein of Detroit. It held its quarterly meeting in the MRPA convention hotel to meet with the professionals.

A chief worry, said Saperstein, is that the Reagan Administration wants to rescind federal aid, collected from offshore oil drilling revenues, for recreation projects.

Michigan counties, cities and townships had lined up for \$2.4 million of that money this year, planning to match it with local funds.

Examples: Oakland County sought Engineering. \$130,000 for 46 modern campsites at Groveland Oaks Park; Farmington Hills wanted \$60,000 for Heritage Park picnic facilities and a basketball court; Pontiac wanted \$125,000

for Galloway Lake Park access road, parking aras and child play site; the suburban Wayne cities of Inkster, Taylor and Wyandotte sought money for everything from tot lots to a bandshell.

• Recreation services chief Joseph Seavey is retiring this month after 37 years.

"Nobody in the history of the state has had more impact on local recreation," said Wayne County's Reickel, adding he hoped DNR would look outside its own ranks for a successor because no one on the internal horizon is up to it.

 Recreation was excluded from the Governor's Conference on Travel and Tourism, Reickel said.

• Kerry Kammer and Thomas J. Anderson, two former legislators serving on the Natural Resources Commission, upset recreation people by saying money from the land trust approved by voters in 1984 would go increasingly for land acquisition and less for development.

'That really bothers cities which don't have any more land," Greenslit

Reickel was alluding to a speech MRPA heard the previous evening by commerce director Doug Ross. A key economic strategist in the Blanchard Administration, Ross delighted MRPA by saying that a superior quality of life, enhanced by recreational opportunities, helps business attract brainpower.

SAPERSTEIN prodded the governor's advisory committee to take

stands on several issues.

One is to seek a bigger portion of the estimated \$40-50 million that Blanchard wants to recover from pop and beer wholesalers under the deposit law.

When consumers pay retailers 5-20 cents for a deposit, the money goes to wholesalers. If the container is broken or discarded, the consumer never redeems it and wholesalers

keep the money.

"The guys who opposed the 'bottle bill' got that money," DNR staff member Mike Moore told the panel.

Moore reported that Blanchard is seeking \$12 million in program initiatives for DNR, the rest of whose \$294 million proposed budget is continuation. All initiatives would be supported by the unredeemed deposit money.

Of the new money, he said, \$1.7 million is earmarked for recreation and the rest for research on hazardous substances, acid rain studies and



### Coach helps disabled post personal victories

When Rikki Gans was a child. other youngsters made fun of her formal name, "Erika." They called her "Eureka.

They may have been teasing but, in a way, they were prophetic. Webster's New World Dictionary defines "eureka" as "an exclamation of triumphant achievement.'

Gans, whose smile is as vigorous as the rest of her, could tell you about triumph and achievement. As a teacher at the Northwest Wayne Trainable Center in the Webster School building in Livonia, she has coached many mentally impaired young people to personal victories some on the order of bouncing a ball and catching it, others winning an event in the Special Olympics.

"I have seen kids' self concept grow tremendously through Special Olympics because they really feel that they can do something," said Gans, who recently was named 1986-87 Wayne County Special Olympics Coach of the Year.

"I've even seen parents think more of their youngsters, that they can do something. They are so proud. "There's a lot of paybacks."

AT THE center, Gans works with 100 young people a day from the Livonia, Plymouth-Canton, South Redford, Redford Union, Garden City, and Northville districts.

The students are between 3 and 18 years old. They are trainably mentally impaired, with IQs of 30-50. Some may have physical handicaps.

Gans runs year-round training in her gym classes. The year starts with soccer in the fall, and goes on to floor hockey, basketball, gymnastics, track and field and softball. There's also swimming throughout the year at Livonia Stevenson High School.

And tournaments in Warren, in

versity, Grand Rapids and in Mt. Pleasant at Central Michigan Uni-

versity, among other sites.
"They look forward from one tour nament to the other," Gans said of her athletes. "They know if they get good enough they'll be included. It's like other children who like to be on the varsity team at school.

GANS HELPS train physical education, special education and early childhood development student teachers from Eastern Michigan University and Schoolcraft College.

She developed the Outdoor Education Program at Webster in which she coordinates a week of winter camping for 120-150 students. During this time she gives instructions in cross-country skiing and snowshoe-

In addition to all this, Gans is active with the Association for Retarded Citizens. She received the ARC Teacher of the Year Award in 1977 and the ARC Volunteer of the Year Award in 1984.

"Your commitment and dedication to your athletes has never di-minished," Susie Pidsosny, area director of the Wayne County Special Olympics, wrote to Gans when she was chosen as coach of the year.

"Your comments at our recent State Poly-Hockey Tournament, 'So they didn't win, they played well together and had a good time,' only exemplifies the spirit of Special Olympics coaching, a spirit which you demonstrate in everything you do."

WHAT DOES Gans like best about her work? The children.

"The kids are all happy kids," she said. "They're fun to work with. They're lovable kids. There's a need for them to get involved in physical activities. They enjoy it as much as any normal kid."

Another "payback" comes from families and volunteers.

Families help in many ways. They

may give moral support to their youngster. Others may drive chil-dren to a certain event or serve as



This is an informational message about your phone service from Marcia Buhl, your Michigan Bell Corporate Affairs Manager.

"These telephone service changes concern only operator-handled long distance calls outside your Michigan Bell long distance calling area. They apply to collect, credit card, person-to-person calls, calls billed to a third number, and requests for assistance. Some customers will need to contact their long distance companies for new instructions on how to place such calls. To find out if and how the service changes may affect your service, we ask you to read the following explanation."

An explanation of the changes in your operator-assistance service for calls outside your Michigan Bell long distance calling area (interLATA calls).

How operator-assisted calls were placed before. If you wanted operator assistance to place a long distance call, you dialed "O," or "O" plus the area code (if required), and the phone number you wanted and an operator put the call through for you.

How these calls are placed now. If the long distance service on the phone you are using is provided by a company that offers operator services and you want operator assistance to place a call, you dial "O," plus the area code (if required), and the phone number and an operator will assist you. To reach the long distance operator for additional assistance, you must dial "OO." (Important: If you dial "O" without the phone number, you will get a Michigan Bell operator who can place calls within your Michigan Bell area only.)

If the long distance service on the phone you're using is provided by a long distance company that does not offer operator services, you must contact that long distance company to get instructions on how to place operatorassisted long distance calls.

**HOMELESS** AID - By a vote of 296 for and 76 against, the House passed and sent to the Senate legislation (HJ Res 102) to provide an additional \$50 million this winter in emergency aid for the homeless.

The money was taken from a disaster relief account within the Federal Emergency Management Agency. It will fund food and shelter programs run by private organizations

such as the United Way and American Red Cross.

Supporter Bruce Vento, D-Minn. said, "Literally within blocks of this Capitol building, the homeless are huddled for warmth on heating grates and in doorways. Across the nation emergency shelters are filled

beyond capacity Opponent Robert Michel, R-Ill., said. "No one can quarrel with the need to assist the homeless," but that state treasuries, which have surpluses, are in a better position to help

SENATE

COMMITTEE FUNDING - By a vote of 58 for and 36 against, the Senate tabled (killed) an amendment to cut its committee spending by 5 percent during the first session of the 100th Congress.

The Senate then approved a budget (S Res 80) of slightly more than \$45 million this year for staff payroll, travel, consultants and virtually all other expenses of the 19 Senate

The outlay is about 3 percent higher than last year's \$43.6 million figure, with most of the increase allocated to raising staff salaries.

Wendell Ford, D-Ky., said approval of the cut would be "a declaration that the Senate does not believe it should make a 100 percent effort to deal with the serious problems faced by our farmers, miners, small businessmen, war veterans, aging citizens and others."

Steven Symms, R-Idaho, who sponsored the amendment, said that with the Potomac River in danger of being turned red by Washington's red ink, "the Senate is a good place

Senators voting yes were opposed to cutting Senate committee budgets by five percent.

Voting yes were Michigan Demo-crats Carl Levin and Donald Riegle.

PAY RAISE - The Senate approved, 88 for and 6 against, a resolution (SJ Res 34) to block hefty pay raises scheduled for early February for members of Congress, Cabinet secretaries, federal judges and top executive branch officials.

Salaries of House members of senators would rise 16 percent from \$77,400 to \$89,500; the pay of district court judges would rise from \$81,100 to \$89,500; and Cabinet officers' pay would be increased from \$88,800 to \$99,500.

The Senate sent the resolution to the House, where it must be passed and sent to President Reagan for his signature by midnight Feb. 3 if the increase is to be blocked.

Because the House had adjourned for the week without addressing the issue, and would not meet again until Feb. 3, it appeared the resolution would fail and the raises would take effect.

### Will state or local solution be used?

OW OFTEN do you call the fire department each year? When was the last time you called the police department to come to your residence?

How many times a year do you call for an ambulance to come to your

SOME SERVICES, although critical when you need them, are not required every week.

You don't need a plumber until the pipes burst, a mechanic until the car breaks down, a technician unless something needs fixing. How often you need it doesn't diminish the importance of those services.

But some services are required regularly and must be available when needed. When a toilet needs flushing, there must be a sanitary sewer available to handle the discharge. We cannot wait a week and don't want to seek alterna-

The same is true of garbage. When you take trash out to the curb, it needs to be picked up. Nobody wants to leave it there for two or three weeks. Neither does anybody want trash bags piling up two or three weeks in the garage, basement or utility room.

THE PROBLEM facing local government is that residents are producing the same volume of garbage - if not more - at a time when the cost of disposal is rising out of sight.

Individuals haven't become excited in the past decade about solid waste disposal. It's not an exciting issue. Yet getting rid of our garbage is one of the most critical services we use. If you recall, the garbage strike in New York was as serious as a blackout or blizzard.

When trash is picked up weekly, we take waste disposal for granted. But as landfills fill up, our choices narrow quickly. We might as well have a massive garbage strike if there's no place for trucks to carry our trash. You can't store trash in garbage trucks - it has to be dumped somewhere.

Within five years, there will be no

landfills in Wayne County. At that point, costs which now are doubling will skyrocket even more. As a consumer of trash removal services, you can count on paying the bill.

ONE OPTION is to find new landfill sites. Nobody wants one near his house, but we all need one. Eventually, the state could exercise its power of eminent domain and dictate where landfills will be located because public health, safety and welfare demand it.

Another option is to burn our garbage. An incinerator is expensive, however - far too costly for a single community. The five local units in the Plymouth-Canton-Northville community could form an incinerator authority and share the burden. But consumers still would have to pay to build the incinerator plant.

Because local governments have not accepted landfills, the state will make this decision. The best remaining local decision seems to be an incinerator. Plymouth-Canton leaders should look at that choice.

And we do have local expertise to tap. Plymouth City Manager Henry Graper assisted a financial consultant in the construction of an incinerator plant by an authority formed by Garden City, Westland, Inkster and Dearborn Heights. Canton Supervisor James Poole has served for four years on the Wayne County Solid Waste Disposal Committee.

Additional property tax millage very likely will be involved. Homeowners must give serious thought to how important trash removal is to their daily lives. Not an exciting topic but very

# No overspending with taxes, JOA

WHEN YOU SPEND more money than you make, what do you do?

If you are Jim Blanchard or David Lawrence, you do a couple of innovative things. The two - one a governor, the other the publisher of the state's largest failing newspaper — were speakers last week at separate lunches as part of the Michigan Press Association's 118th annual winter convention at the Grand Amway hotel in Grand Rapids.


The convention has met in Grand Rapids for only three years. It used to meet at Kellogg Center on the Michigan State University campus in East Lans-

Moving from Kellogg to the Amway Is not unlike an Associated Press writer being transferred from the livestock desk at Des Moines to the business beat on Wall Street. Both serve essential purposes, but one is more interesting.

IT IS NOT that the Kellogg was inadequate - any hotel can have elevators and ice machines that don't work - it's just that as far as plushness goes, it would have made a great warehouse.

It always seemed that the state's publishers and editors met there so they wouldn't taint their halos when scolding politicians for taking junkets to sunsplashed and exotic locales. But that theory had holes in it. Kellogg couldn't sell booze on the premises so the press association let Blue Cross, Michigan Bell, AAA and others set up hospitality puites, which is what editors call beer gardens when someone else is picking up the tab.

That's mostly history since the move to the Grand where hospitality suites are dwindling because of the fear that lipsy editors will collide in the lobby




But I digress. How is it, you may ask, that Blanchard and Lawrence balance their budgets?

BLANCHARD DID it by making the courageous decision to raise taxes four years before he would have to seek reelection. But he also said that the state, despite hiring 3,000 additional prison guards, now employs 14,000 fewer people than it did in the pre-recession days of 1979. He also said the state now pays nothing for interest payments while the feds pay \$562 per person just for interest on the national debt.

Lawrence, publisher of the Detroit Free Press, said he was tired of people tossing around the word "monopoly" when talking about the proposed Joint Operating Agreement between his paper and the News. 
Regular Observer & Eccentric readers will recall that months ago we did several stories on the dangers of AIDS and its potential to reach epidemic proportions.

Since that time other newspapers have tuned in to the dangers of this always-fatal disease.

Unfortunately, the word just isn't getting out fast enough. Every day thousands more become infected. That's right, I said thousands - every day.

AND BECAUSE the public believed it was only a disease which haunted the homosexual community, it turned its back on the disease. But now, the het-

erosexual community is being struck. And every scientific authority agrees



that a cure, a magic serum, doesn't exist and won't exist for the next five to 10 years. By that time, hundreds of thousands will have died in this country. No telling how many will die around the world.

And although the disease can be transmitted by intravenous blood transfusions or through use of infected needles used primarily by drug addicts, the primary mode of transmission is through sexual contact.

ONE OF THE most interesting personages on the international stage these past two decades has been Gen. Alexander Meigs Haig Jr., with whom some in our area will rub elbows Saturday.

The general turned 62 on Dec. 2 and among those close to the Washington scene there seems little doubt but that he hopes to be the Republican candidate for the office of president of the United States in 1988.

Astute columnist and commentator George Will, writing in the Washington Post last week, reported that Haig's political-action committee already "has disbursed \$600,000 since July" on behalf of his unannounced candidacy.

Although his most recent governmental role was as secretary of state under President Reagan, Haig cannot



Several local women legislators in their assessments remain interested in maternity leave legislation, despite withdrawal of a bill calling for adult "care giver" leaves.

But their male counterparts remain cool to the idea

State Rep Judith Miller. R-Birmingham, said Monday she was withdrawing her "care-giver" bill which would have given state employees time off to care for elderly or disabled relatives - but would submit a resolution urging the Michigan Civil Serivce Commission to

enact a similar policy. The Civil Service Commission would be asked to do what she proposed," Rep. Lyn Bankes, R-Livonia said. "It was something more properly handed that way.

While not dealing directly with maternity leave issues, Miller's bill was seen as a step toward state-legislated leaves of absence.

A bill calling for maternal and paternal leaves was filed by Rep. Mary Brown, D-Kalamazoo, though it hasn't been debated during the new legilative session.

While that bill might represent the best hope for maternity leave supporters, Bankes envisions maternity leaves as part of a larger program that would also involve on-the-job day care sites.





HERE ARE any number of ways to make a living. That reality is easy to see by leafing through a U.S. Department of Labor/Bureau of Labor Statistics publication, the "Occupational Outlook Handbook." The handbook's index to occupations lists hundreds of job titles, ranging from A for academic librarians to Z for zoologists.

Job duties, level and places of employment, education and training requirements, advancement possibilities, earnings and job outlook are detailed, along with descriptions of other occupations requiring similar aptitudes, interests or training.

Working conditions for those jobs are also described. The publication notes that not all jobs consist of work done in the relative comfort of an indoor setting.

Jobs done outdoors require "a major portion of time to be spent outdoors, frequently without regard to weather conditions," the handbook states. "Roofers, who ap-

ply roofing materials to the tops of buildings, work outdoors."

In Michigan, the work must go on during the winter months, generally without — as the U.S. Department of Labor handbook notes


"regard to weather conditions."
 Those weather conditions can be harsh ones, even for the hardiest of souls.

According to the National Weather Service, a total of 24 inches of snow fell in January of this year, compared to a normal snowfall of 10 inches for that month. This January thus qualifies as the second snowlest on record in the Detroit area.

Bitter cold and biting winds can also make the day's work difficult. Nevertheless, the work must be completed, whether it's clearing the roadways, delivering the mail, seeing that children get to school safely or doing construction work. These are some of the people who see that the job gets done — no matter what the weather forecast may be.

NE PRIEST remembers meeting him on a sidewalk at Orchard Lake St. Mary when he was an unassuming cardinal from Poland.

Another fondly reminisces about how the cardinal opted for the "real thing" to drink at a personal meeting in London, Ontario.

Others recall seeing him at St. Peter's Square in Vatican City. Some

have only seen him on television.

Nonetheless, leaders in the local Roman Catholic church community are excited, and somewhat surprised, by Pope John Paul II's an-

nounced visit to Detroit Sept. 18-19. It was well-known in the Detroit Archdiocese that Archbishop Edmund Szoka had been trying to get the pontiff to visit for some time.

"I guess the ducks were finally all lined up," said the Rev. William erzer of St. Valentine Church in

SHERZER, AS with many pastors in the area, believes the visit by the pope will strengthen the bond amo the 1.5 million Catholics in the ar-

Some think his two-day stop will take togetherness a step further.

"It will enhance unity of Christians in general," said the Rev. Jerry Cupple of St. Colette Church, who met Pope John Paul II at St. Mary College in Orchard Lake some 10 years ago when the pope was a Polish cardinal.

"(The visit) will thrust the Catholic church into the headlines," said the Rev. Robert Byrne of St. John Provincial Seminary in Plymouth who's seen the pontiff speak in St. Peter's Square in Rome on two occasions.

"It causes attention to be focused on the church, which is good.'

ONE REASON it's good, as the Rev. George Charnley of St. Dunstan Church in Garden City points out, is the visit might cause discussion among Catholics about their involve-ment with the church. Or, perhaps,

why they have fallen away from it.

And if one person has the personality and charm to pull the masses together, they feel, it's Pope John Paul II. Those who have seen him in

person know why.

### Truth can be used in the wrong way

"IF IT doesn't work right, tell us. If it does, tell others." A once familiar promotional. Not well-written, perhaps, but unmistakably clear. Could anyone doubt what was

meant? Students of religion might find this dictum remarkably similar to the commandment of the Ten that reads "You shall not bear false witness". Evangelical explanations to this commandment emphasize not the restraint of false witness, but rather the necessity to speak well of others and put the best interpretation on all they do.

That was always the most disconcerting part. It wasn't the bearing of false witness that was so troublesome. It was trying to speak well of others and putting the best interpre-tation on all they had done that was extremely difficult.

"Not bearing false witness" or 'telling us if it doesn't work right" is not concerned with telling lies. It is concerned with telling the truth in such a manner that the esteem of all will be enriched. This is not an issue of deliberate lying, but rather intentional truth that will build communi-

TRUTH CAN be used to destroy just as truth can be used to build and to enrich. A truthful statement can destroy a person as easily as a mali-

And even more demonically, a truthful statement can be used not only to destroy the other person, but also to build up one's esteem in the minds of others.

The fabric of our society has been so distorted in recent years by delib-erate deception and vested self-interest that the building of community through truth will be difficult. We are more inclined to use truth as a sword to maim and to kill than as an experience of shared hope that builds community.

Seeking out the best in others putting the best interpretation on everything others do - explaining their actions in the kindest way are gifts of trust and hope and kindness we offer to others. They are the building blocks of community that dares to move beyond self-defense. The spirit of acceptance and affirmation builds acceptance and affirmation.

WE ARE, of course, free to choose either one. And that is the ultimate issue . . . what we choose to do. What is at stake is the quality of life we would choose. The process of seeking the best in each person can only create a life together that builds on the best each has to share and give.

Choosing only not to bear false witness against those who do otherwise would not offer much life together, because there would be so very little with which to begin.







# VIDEO I HE

OVIE INDUSTRY officials are hopping mad over a little black box resting in a gray area of federal law. Although it's illegal to copy videotapes, it's legal to own or sell a

The box enables home video fans to copy rented movies even though those cassettes have been encoded with Macrovision, a process aimed at stymieing duplication. Without the aid of that little black box, copies of tapes with Macrovision technology feature pictures which vary drastically in brightness or are scrambled.

So far the method has been applied exclusively to prerecorded videotapes. CBS/Fox, HBO/Cannon, Warner, Disney and Media Home Entertainment are among the firms using Macrovision to block copying, according to Gary Gwizdala, chief operations officer of Macrovision in Torrence, Calif. More than 15 million titles, 50 percent of the industry's output, has been encoded with the process, he said.

It's an industry offensive against what insiders view as copyright violations and patent infringement. "It's a very serious problem. It costs the industry billions of dollars," said Fred Fehlauer, senior vice president of CBS/Fox Video, Livonia.

"We do know that illegal copying costs the industry an estimated \$1 billion, 5 million," Gwizdala said. "More than 20 percent of homes make at least one copy of a prerecorded cassette a year. I'd say the average is more like six or seven copies.

THE ENTERTAINMENT industry is pushing to use a form of Macrovision to prevent consumers from taping cable television programs, copying movies recorded on laser disks and making audio cassette recordings of records and compact

"They have a right to protect their copyright," said Myron Singer of Movieland in Southfield. "People who are real serious about copying seldom watch the movie again, any-

"Video retailers lose rentals," said Jim Bouras, vice president of home video for the Motion Picture Association of America (MPAA.) "They pay \$40-\$50 per tape and depend on the rentals to earn it back. People who rent and copy the tapes and loan them to their friends decrease the number of rentals.

"Some customers maintain there is a problem, that it interferes with simple playback on television," said Gerry Dervish, owner of Troy Video. "They're tending to be people with

"Most people don't even know

there's a difference in the tape (with Macrovision)," said Myron Singer of Movieland of Southfield.

On some television screens, tapes with Macrovision showed pictures with a rainbow effect around them, Gwizdala said. "That was the reflection of the Macrovision on the phospherous caused by the curvature of the tube." On televisions with extremely sensitive vertical holds, Macrovision has been known to aggravate the set's tendency to allow the

picture to roll, he said.

Tve talked to 100 different consumers and less than 10 of them had Macrovision-related problems. There's so many things that can go wrong with VCRs. Macrovision has no impact on audio-related problems at all," Gwizdala said. "We've taken great care not to upset the consumer's pleasure in watching the programming.

MEANWHILE, THE MPAA is urging federal legislation to force VCR manufacturers to incorporate a computer chip or other device in their products which would be activated by the Macrovision signal encoded on the cassette. This would prevent overriding of the anti-copy device. The law would ban the manufacture and sale of the override de-

For the MPAA, copying equals theft. "If I want a Ferrari does that give me the right to go ahead and take it?" asked Jim Bouras, MPAA vice president in charge of home video. The price of prerecorded videocassettes is decreasing; many are available for \$19.95. That makes copying less of a bargain, he said.

For many who copy tapes, the results can prove disappointing. "The VHS format was never designed for duplication. The quality's pretty poor," said Bill Lackner, store manager for New York Video World, Royal Oak.

Owners of Beta format VCRs can obtain a good second generation tape, according to Syerson. He adds that taping television programs falls into a different category of discus-

"The Supreme Court has pretty much established that you can tape off of cable television for your personal use. They did that in Sony vs. Universal Studios," Syerson said. "This (Macrovision) is a way for Hollywood to get around that."

"As a policy matter we won't get involved in free broadcasting," Gwizdala said. "The Supreme Court has upheld the consumer's right to time shift. However, premium programs in the pay-per-view category is another matter.

MANY CABLE companies and premium channels tout the convenience of taping movies from cable. interest to subscribe. Their growth has gone away," Gwizdala said. "It would be a better business policy for them to try to attract new customers by offering better programming."

Macrovision is working with laser disk manufacturers such as Philips of the Netherlands and Pioneer and Laser Disk, both of Japan, to apply the blocking device to their products. "Between 30-60 days we should have the engineering evaluation complete. Assuming the bugs can be worked out, in another 60 days after that we should begin to manufacture. It should prove advantageous to the consumer because new programming would be released on tapes and laser disks at the same time," Gwiz-

### Port of Detroit snubbed by local importing firms

The port of Detroit is the third busiest in the nation with goods from all over the world flowing through it. But in total revenue generated from duty, the port slips to 10th position. Local businesses importing goods for sale frequently bypass Detroit in favor of trucking goods from either

"Few people realize the port of Detroit is a major port," said U.S. Customs Import Specialist Nick Devine, assistant director in the Service's Class and Value Division.

While annual port revenues have steadily increased here, he added, they have done so at a slower rate than in other parts of the country, notably on the west coast where imported goods from the Orient are increasing in number.

JIM HACHT, owner of Hacht Sales and Marketing in Farmington Hills, has imported exclusively from the Orient since he started his business six years ago — but not through Detroit

Hacht, who does all his own buying, imports such items as Easter baskets and Halloween costumes, rawhide pet supplies and inexpensive KC (disassembled) furniture

Hacht never uses Michigan ports. He ships his merchandise from the Orient to the nearest U.S. port on the west coast. His goods enter Michigan by way of rail or truck.

This is a common practice. William Seidel, owner of Delta Import Export in Livonia, imports machinery like coils and grinders from Europe and Japan to American customers located throughout the country.

He ships his merchandise to the port nearest the customer and that, he said, might be Texas or New York. Only occasionally is it Michi-

PIER QNE Imports, a home furnishings chain based in Texas, has 19 outlets in Michigan. The company obtains merchandise by buying directly from such places as India or Africa, or indirectly from American vendors who do their own importing.

The merchandise is stored in one of eight warehouses in various parts of the country. Outlet managers buy from the warehouse nearest them. For Livonia manager Mary Ellen Ellis, that means Chicago. She buys merchandise there that has been processed through customs in the Chicago port, for resale in her Livo-


the gourmet stock he sells in his Merchant of Vino shops in Birmingham, Troy and Southfield from vendors. He stocks thousands of varieties of imported cheeses, candies, nuts, wines, oils and numerous other

But Jonna directly imports one item himself, Evian water straight from France to the Detroit port. Jonna takes pride that he is the largest importer of Evian water into Michigan and possibly the entire country.

**REVENUES COLLECTED** in duty at the Detroit port in fiscal year 1986 totaled \$424 million. Six other Michifan ports, Sault Ste. Marie, Saginaw-Bay City, Grand Rapids, Port Huron, Battle Creek and Muskegon, generated an additional \$52 million.

In the first three months of this fiscal year, \$133 million has already been collected in Michigan, \$118 million coming from the Detroit port

"Fully 99 percent of it," said Devine, is legitimate duty payment. An estimated 22 of the total amount is "users" fee, levied in January 1986, Devine said, to make the collections unit of U.S. Customs self sufficient, paid for by those who use it.

### Businessman must heed changes in market

"Another print shop has moved into town, how am I supposed to compete when one's on every cor-


"I can't control the economy, and it certainly affects sales at my jewelry shop!

"I just opened a tanning salon and then find out everyone's afraid of skin cancer"

As a consultant, I have heard these comments and others like them from small business owners and managers. All readily agree that "control" of a business is limited to what goes on within the firm's own environment, anything external to that environment becomes very difficult, if not impossible to manage

These "external environments" that potentially affect both the short- and long-term success of any small business venture include the following (1) the economy, (2) the competition, (3) the political/legal environment, (4) technology, and (5) the cultural/social environment under which the business operates.

WHAT BUSINESS owners must realize is that although they can't "control" or change external environmental activities, the effects of these activities on the business may



be controlled through proper market planning

Let's take the example of the retail florist industry, which has been significantly affected by changes occurring within the competitive environment over the last 15 years.

Mass marketers (such as supermarkets) began offering green plants to consumers in the early '70s.

Over time, supermarkets expanded their floricultural products to include standard varieties of cut flo-

Given the general problem supermarkets were experiencing with product quality, florists (by majority) chose not to respond to this competitive activity. As time passed, not only did supermarkets resolve their product quality problems but also began offering more exotic varieties of cut flowers to consumers.

ALONG WITH the fact that buying flowers at supermarkets was convenient for the consumer, sales growth skyrocketed.

At present, many supermarkets have set up "mini-flower shops" on the premises offering fresh and silk floral arrangements to customers, taking special orders and wiring flo-ral products to and from different geographic locations.

As such, the retail florist is no longer the retail florist's major competitor anymore. Unfortunately, not all of the traditional florists in business today recognize this trend and are losing valuable market share as a result. Enough said?



Have you fallen into the debt trap? If so, you're not alone. Many families suffer from out-of-control credit card charges and loans.

Credit counselors say that getting out of debt is one of the toughest money problems and may take two or three years. Extension specialists at Michigan State University offer these tips for cutting debts:

 Go cold turkey. Cut up your credit cards or put them away in your safe deposit box. This may be the only way you can pay off your old debts without adding new ones.

· Channel any "found money" directly to your creditors. Any money you get in addition to your regular income - such as a tax refund, a pay raise, overtime pay or a gift - should go directly to the lenders.

• Cut other expenses ruthlessly and use the excess to pay off old debts or avoid new charges. Redirect cash from the non-essential to the essentials that you would otherwise charge. Deciding just exactly where to cut is an individual or family matter, but some common targets include excessive entertainment, long distance phone calls, eating out and cable television.

To figure out how much you can afford to charge is easy. Total up your monthly payments for creditors include all but your rent or mortgage. If that total payment figure is more than 20 percent of your monthly take-home pay, don't charge any

### Old movies on cassette are filled with romance

spired classic films, as well as pictures that simply are awful. The old plot - boy meets girl, they fall in love, are separated, then reunited in a big finish which leaves them marriage-bound - held its appeal for a long time. Like the Western, it's a genre which has declined in the last several decades.

It's hard to find an unabashed love story which wouldn't be painfully bad to watch or equally as embar-

rassing for us to admit seeing.
On the brink of Valentine's Day, an occasion largely for school children and greeting card companies, let's go back to a simpler time when people took these things seriously. All of the following old movies are

available on cassette:
When "Ninotchka" was first released in 1939, the advertisements proclaimed "Garbo laughs." The beautiful stone face does indeed laugh heartily after Melvyn Douglas determinedly pulls out every joke he's heard in an attempt to get Garbo's very dour Russian commissar to smile. His jokes fail. It's the sight of Douglas' dapper character falling off a chair in a Parisian workingclass restaurant that breaks Garbo's

SOME OF THE dialogue is dated

Lubitsch, retains its charm. Douglas as the man about town convinces Garbo that life is more than workers' committee meetings and no

Bela Lugosi, Sig Ruman and Felix Bressart play the three Russian dignitiaries seduced by the pleasures of wine, women and song in capital-ism's hedonistic capital. Their portions of the picture, as they trot around Paris in top hat and tails, is a funny but naive portrait of the Russians as hicks. Ina Claire plays a wonderfully snooty Russian countess yearning to resume her Tsarist glory

Ît remains Garbo's movie - romance without nausea.

It was remade as a musical in 1957 and retitled "Silk Stockings." Fred Astaire plays the man about town who now has a perfectly 1950sstyle glamour job, movie director. Cyd Charisse assumes the role of the dowdy Russian commissar sent to discover what has befallen her country's wayward diplomats to France. There's great Cole Porter music. Fred and Cyd show off on the dance

The romance between Astaire and Charisse lacks the spark of the Gar-

with overtones of the correct Western doctrine winning over the misguided one, the original carries it off with style while the remake settles on being more strident.

It isn't surprising. In the late 1930s, Russia was on the verge of being our ally in another war against Germany. Twenty years later, Russia was our foe in the cold war.

IN 1952. John Ford received an Oscar for directing John Wayne in "The Quiet Man." Wayne plays an American boxer who killed a man in the ring. This is a period piece. In the finale, Wayne, fed up with O'Hara's scheming to regain her furniture from her equally stubborn family, literally drags her across the Irish landscape. It isn't a scene that's likely to be placed in the forefront of feminism. O'Hara's Colleen manages to be strong and womanly at the same time — not an easy accom-plishment in a decade during which woman were usually portrayed as bo-Douglas pairing. If you're looking for some laughs and some thrills and a good deal of fun, you'll get a bang out of the Plymouth Theatre Guild's latest production, "Murder Takes the Stage."

Don't look for anything new and different in the play itself. Written by James Reach, it's just another formula whodunit, with a cast of formula characters (the ingenue, the ladies' man, the blonde, the joker), in a formula setting (New England-barnreconverted-to-summer-stock-theater), and a formula plot (everybody loathes one of the characters, wishes that character were dead and, pretty soon, one of them sees to it that she is dead).

Ultimately, the triteness of Reach's play doesn't really matter a lot. With an able cast and some commendable behind-the-scenes support, director Bob Weibel has put together a smartly paced, close-to-the-audience production that keeps playgoers entertained and involved in the old whodunit guessing-game from start to finish.

Stand-outs in the 13-member cast include Hollis Denham, who seems in his element playing the tall, dark, handsome charmer with the roving eye; Alvin LaCroix, a real scenemaker, in the role of the plodding New England lawman misnamed

Other players are awaiting ACT and SAT test results, which may qualify them to play at the Division I level.

Those All-Area players expected to sign by Wednesday, but who have not verbally committed (as of Tuesday) include Livonia Franklin linebacker Chris Parenti, Borgess defensive back/wide receiver Sean Darkins, Borgess defensive back Zip Holliday and Wayne running back Darren Tatum.

### Jouppi gets passed over

Joe Jouppi, the All-Area linebacker from Plymouth Salem, may be a victim of the NCAA's ruling to reduce the number of Division I football scholarships from 95 to 85 per school.

At one point, Miami of Ohio, Eastern Michigan and Central Michigan were eager to sign Jouppi - an aggressive, hard-hitting player much in the mold of former Salem star Scott Jurek, currently a starter at Eastern

But all three Mid-American Conference schools have given Jouppi the cold shoulder.

"I've been at this a long time," said Salem coach Tom Moshimer. "If he's not at least a MAC-level player then I don't know who is."

With 10 fewer scholarships, major Division I schools like the University of Michigan and Michigan State are being extra selective in their recruiting process. Before, U-M or MSU could afford to gamble on a borderline player. Now many borderline players will end up in a MAC-level program. The effect of the NCAA ruling trickles down to Division II and Division III levels as well.

Jouppi visited Hillsdale last week and is likely to end up at a Division II school.

"What it means is, somebody is going to get a steal. This kid is a player," Moshimer said.

He hit a free throw with 10 seconds left to put his team up by two, then stole the ball from Concordia leading scorer Scott Goodpaster (24 points) as Goodpaster was about to attempt the game-tying shot.

St. Mary's plays at University of Michigan-Dearborn Wednesday, then hosts Flint Jordan Saturday.

### Pioneer men upended

Oakland University's mens basketball team needed to do was win at Lake Superior State Saturday. Combined with Wayne State's loss at Michigan Tech, the Pioneers would have been within a game of first place in the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference.

The incentive was considerable. LSS's first-half shooting (20-of-33, 61 percent) allowed it to take a 47-39 lead at intermission. The Lakers added to that bulge early in the second half and kept it in double figures most of the way. The closest OU got was 86-82 with 28 seconds left.

FOR OU, SCOTT Bittinger turned in another excellent shooting performance, netting 29 points (including five-for-five three-pointers). Johnny Johnson scored 19, Wallace Davis had 13 and 11 rebounds and John Henderson scored 10.

Tony Avant paced LSS with 28 points on 12-of-15 floor shooting. Mike West had 21, Chris Wooley 16 and John Gilbert 14 and 10 rebounds.

In Thursday's win, OU opened up a nine-point lead at halftime (34-25) by scoring the final nine points of the half, but it didn't last. Tech (10-10 overall, 5-4 in the GLIAC) got the first 13 points of the second half, and the battle was on.

With 9:27 to play the game was tied at 48-all. OU scored the next six points, and the Huskies never got closer than five the rest of the way.

North Farmington, ranked No. 3 in the state and No. 1 in Observerland, had to pull out of the meet because of a scheduling conflict.







## **B.J.'s a Hawkeye**

## Ex-Warrior goes down fighting against U-M

HE BUZZER sounded. The game ended. The celebration began.

B.J. Armstrong stood dead still near midcourt, seemingly oblivious to the jubliant fans spilling on to floor in a wild frenzy all around him. Then he slumped over, bending and grabbing both knees in a combination of exhaustion and disappointment.

This could have been one happy homecoming for Armstrong. But if it had been, no one would have cheered. Or almost no one, anyway.

That's because Armstrong took his considerable basketball talents from Birmingham Brother Rice to Iowa. Not the University of Michigan. Not Michigan State.

"I looked very hard at both Michigan and Michigan State," Armstrong would say later. But he opted to accept George Raveling's bid to play at Iowa. That was 1985. By the end of Armstrong's first season as a Hawkeye, Raveling had split for the west coast and the University of Southern California. Armstrong decided to stick at Iowa

GOOD MOVE. At least until Saturday it was. Iowa had lost just once, a home game against Indiana, and had spent a week or so at the top of the national rankings. Entering Saturday's game at Crisler Arena, the Hawkeyes were No. 2 in the country.

And B.J. Armstrong was their starting point guard. He was averaging better than 12 points a game. He was in charge of running new coach Tom Davis' fast-paced, full-court attack. Big responsibility for a sophomore, but so far Armstrong appeared to be up to the challenge.

A win over Michigan Saturday

would have made him happier than at any time this season. He tried to downplay his feelings after the 100-92 upset, but his performance down the stretch betrayed him.

As Armstrong accurately assessed, "We just weren't sharp today. (Michigan) just outplayed us, outhustled us. They beat us to loose

When asked if it was a tough loss to swallow, Armstrong said, "Sure it is, sure it is. You always like to win on the road. It's always frustrating

HE WOULD repeat those same thoughts a dozen times in the next hour to a variety of local media, all wondering what it was like to be bombarded with deafening cheers in his hometown - after losing the

"Every loss hurts," he said at one point. "I try to approach each game the same. It would have been nice to win one here."

For Armstrong, a win would have been sublime. But from the opening minutes it was apparent an upset was in motion. U-M would open up a lead, Iowa would battle back, then the Wolverines would answer with another charge.

Frustration is an integral part of sport, and Saturday's game was frustrating for Armstrong. He could see his team was operating at threequarter capacity, a normally lusty V-8 plugging along on six cylinders. And he could not inspire any more out of his teammates.

Finally, Armstrong took matters into his own hands. He had scored just five points, but with six minutes left and Iowa down 80-71 he started to force the action. Two free throws dropped, then two more. A driving layup for two. A beauty of a baseline jumper, 12 feet out, arched and ripped through the net. Another



Even now, the three-story Victorian 'cottages,' with their gingerbread roofs, dominate the surrounding streets.

> The name HOWARD is in the stained glass window over the entrance door. The inn started out as the Woodland Avenue House, became the Howard House and then the New Howard House until the bank foreclosed in 1918 and it reopened as Hotel Roselawn in 1923.

> Joseph Graham, founder of the Graham Paige automobile, sold it to Arthur W. Twarz, who named it Bay View Inn. He sold it to Dr. Roy Heath, and when Heath was looking for just the right person to inherit his love for innkeeping, he sold the white clapboard hostelry to a young 22-year-old Stafford Smith for \$30,000 in June, 1961.

> The place had 50 tiny bedrooms with common baths down the hall. Guests came by train, had their own reserved table in the dining room and stayed for the summer. When the trains stopped running the next year, the Smiths had to redesign their inn for modern, mobile trav-

Travelers come to an inn like this because the owners know the definition of the word host, "to greet or entertain in your own home, or elsewhere." Duff and Janice Smith not only own Stafford's Bay View Inn, they have over the years been the plumbers, builders, decorators, cooks.

ing and renovating ever since. Stafford's Bay View Inn now has 20 guest rooms, each with its own bath. Everything is slowly being converted to the style of the 1880's.

Duff refuses to even consider putting telephones and television sets in the rooms. There is one in the lounge but Duff likes to put out a platter of complimentary hors d'ouevres in the evening and watch former televsion junkies get to know each other, maybe even wander together into the dining room for dinner.

The small white clapboard hotel with the Victorian wallpaper and the antique beds was open summers only until 1968. During that first decade, the Smiths ran the inn during the summer and did other things in the winter. Janice taught English at Petoskey High School, and still does.

Duff started a catering business, and took over the dining rooms at Boyne Highland and Nubs Nob in Harbor Springs and at the Weathervane Inn, Charlevoix. In 1971 he started the Pier Restaurant in Harbor Springs. That is where I first

THEY HAVE been building, add- met him; I think he was painting the front door at the time.

The Smiths celebrated their 25th anniversary and the centennial of the inn by opening a restaurant called Stafford's One Water Street in Boyne City, their chance at last to build a place frm the ground up. By 1990, they hope to have a 45-room inn next door.

OVER THE YEARS, Stafford has relinquished more and more of the innkeeping to others, to Dudley Marvin, general manager of the restaurants, and to Judy Honor, GM of the Bay View for six years and hospitality/catering expert for the whole organization.

Stafford accepted the centennial business award from the Historical Society of Michigan in 1986, and will become the first president of Country Inns and Back Roads Association Feb. 1. If you are an inn lover you probably own the guide book Country Inns and Back Roads, revised for the 21st year by author Norman T.

inns described in that book, but my fles at the end of the table, I knew experience is that their success or failure depends on exactly that attribute of 'being a host' that typifies the Bay View Inn.

The beautifully renovated rooms, with their antique furniture and quilts, are an important part of that at-home feeling, of course. It is also very down-home to linger over pink tablecloths, with antiques and turnof-the-century wallpaper around you, enjoying a view out the window of summer lake or winter snow.

GOOD FOOD makes you feel at home, even if the setting is more elegant than your own home. Stafford's Bay View Inn was one of three midwest inns featured in the April issue of Gourmet magazine in 1985; the article included Stafford's recipes for chicken Dijon, seafood fettucine and shrimp chinois.

As I stood in line on that recent Sunday morning, however, sneaking a final blintz and watching Stafford Smith carving ham and serving wafthat rooms, food and even service were important, but not enough.

What it takes to be an innkeeper is the same thing it takes to be a great host in your own house. You make everything as fine as it can be and then you are a very personal host. Stafford's Bay View Inn is fully

open from May 15 to Oct. 3. You can rent a room and have breakfast year round, but the popular dining room is only open weekends in the winter.

There used to be three buffets a week in the old days: two on Sundays and one on Thursday, which was maid's night out. Now there is just the Sunday brunch buffet: adults \$11; children 7-11 \$6.50; children 3-6

Room rates this time of year start at \$67 for one person, \$84 for two people in a room, including a full breakfast.

# 150th to be big tourist year for state

The year-long sesquicentennial revenue into the state economy and propel Michigan to its fifth consecutive record tourism year, AAA Michigan is predicting.

With 150th anniversary celebrations and special events planned in nearly every section of the state, tourism should grow about 5 percent this year, said Peter Erickson, AAA Michigan member services director.

That would equal the increase registered last year when nearly 50 million travelers helped boost tourism revenue to \$13.3 billion. From 1983-1986, tourism revenues rose by \$2.8 billion, or 27 percent. Erickson attributed the record growth of 1986 to low inflation and the lowester average gas prices in eight years.

Erickson said the cost of an averwill help pump \$14 billion in tourism age 41/2-day trip, including camping and more expensive hotel stays, also equaled the figure of the year be-

fore, \$151 per person. Erickson said self-serve, no-lead gas averaged 94 cents a gallon in 1986, compared to \$1.24 cents the year before. He said the average cost along state routes was the lowest since AAA began keeping records for self-serve no lead in 1979.

Figures from the state Department of Transportation for 1986 show a record 70.6 billion miles were traveled in the state, including a 4 percent increase at 22 major tourist attractions last summer, a 4.4 percent jump in state tax collections for hotel and motel room rentals for the first nine months and a 7 percent rise in Mackinac Bridge





## **Remnants:**

# Couple uncover the survivors of Poland's past

By Corinne Abatt staff writer

It's almost like looking at a lost civilization, this exhibition of color photographs from a book about Jews left in Poland after the Holocaust, at Birmingham's Pierce Street Gallery. These are gentle, thought-provoking glimpses of a way of life that seems to disappear as you watch it.

The first chapter of the book, "Remnants: The Last Jews of Poland" has a one word title, 'Why?"

Why would a young, married, Polish couple from Warsaw, Tomasz Tomaszewski, free-lance photographer and Malgorzata Niezabitowska, journalist, want to write about Jews? Like 90 percent of the Poles, they are Roman Catholic. The Jewish population of Poland has all but disappeared. Why did they want to interview old people, living by themselves in small towns and villages?

And in turn from the Jews they could find, came another why. Why

But, the couple persisted from 1980 to 1985, working on their project quietly while they did other assignments, driven by a curiosity

that wouldn't go away.

She said, "My grandmother, who brought me up, told me about Polish Jews. It was a normal part of Polish history. My grandmother was a very clever person. She wanted to educate me in a particular way, and Jews were part of my heritage.

With that said, this slim, blond, blue-eyed journalist spoke of the atmosphere when she was going to school in the '50s and '60s, "The Jewish subject was taboo in Poland. The Jewish subject was untouched - in are lonely. No one visits them. When the press, on TV, in books - there was just nothing."

SHE WONDERED WHAT, if anything, was left of the once second largest Diasapora in the world that numbered more than 3 million before World War II. Their influence on the culture and economy of Poland had been significant for a thou-

Her curiosity was fueled by a well-remembered pain, "In 1968, 25,000 Jews left Poland. They were very assimilated. It was very painful. They considered themselves Poles, not Jews. They were invited to emigrate. I had some very good friends who were Jews in high school and my first year of college. I was very shocked. It was the first serious experience of my life. They came to my apartment. We discussed it all night. It stayed with me - the pain. But I was too young to deal with the

Niezabitowska, with degrees in law and journalism, from the University of Warsaw, and Tomaszewski, a free-lance photographer, trained in physics and optics, at the University of Warsaw, met in 1977 and were married in 1978. Both were active in the Solidarity Union and she went to work for its paper, Solidarity Weekly, from the first issue on. When that was closed down, she worked for other papers and many of her articles appeared in Western publications including Paris Match, les Tempes Modernes and Moment/USA.

THEY USED THEIR OWN funds on the project to find, talk with and photograph the Jews of Poland. In all, she did 1,000 interviews and he took 7,000 pictures. Film was often difficult to find and so were the Jews they wanted to photograph and inter-

"We could write the next book on how to find the people," Niezabitowska said. "They are not hidden, but they are not publicized at all. It's very important to win the trust of we came they asked why."

Tomaszewski said he printed some of his pictures to show them what he had done. "They liked the pictures very much. They saw they were not manipulated."

She added, "After the first barrier was crossed, they were friendly. They called us children. They wanted us to stay with them and they told us many stories.

He said,"They had the feeling they are the forgotten people."

She said many live in small, remote villages, "They don't need money or clothes. What they need is human beings. They were very nice to us. We became friends. We stayed in contact with them."

Tomaszewski is vice president of the Union of Polish Art Photographers, the only one of its kind in the country. Membership brings an I.D. card that is the essential credential for free-lance photographers.

When he had an exhibition of 120 of the photographs of the Jews at this organization's gallery in Warsaw in 1985, the response was heartwarming.

CAPTAIN CORCORAN also has an admirer in the peddlerwoman called Little Buttercup, who possesses a dark secret. The captain, wishing to make his daughter Josephine a suitable match, selects stately Sir Joseph Porter (George Bloomfield), an admiral.

Sir Joseph is rebuffed by his intended, since she plans to elope with her beloved Ralph. The plot is revealed by the sinister Dick Deadeye, played by Mark Byars of Garden City and Ralph is put in irons. Byar's real-life role, incidentally, is that of a "good guy": Garden City police officer.

Finally, Buttercup reveals her secret: that Ralph and Captain Corcoran were switched in infancy. Ralph's now elevated social status frees him to marry Josephine, while the captain, now a commoner, becomes Buttercup's first mate.


Meanwhile, Sir Joseph resigns himself to wed Hebe (Dorothy Duensing), a cousin who is constantly tagging along, and all ends happi-

The "switched baby" plot is powerful and dramatic in grand opera, but becomes a ridiculous scenario at the hands of librettist William S. Gilbert. The very hummable melodies of Arthur Sullivan tradtionally have the audience doing just that as they leave the theater.

This "encore season" of the Lyric company follows a very successful first season that played to good crowds at all three offerings: "The Golden Age of Operetta," "The Mikado" and "Die Fledermaus."

This year's efforts will be marked by improvements in the technical quality and appearance of the shows, according to a MLO spokesperson.

The season will close with a June presentation of Mozart's "The Marriage of Figaro" (in English).

# Fun side of caricatures is challenging


HIS YEAR I plan to take a course in sign language so that we can have special art classes for the hearing impaired. I plan to attend a small business seminar to better understand the "ins and outs" of business. I also hope to take a few classes in glass etchings and other specific art

All pretty noble and self-improving topics wouldn't you say? So how did I start out this year? Juggling. Yes, juggling. I don't believe that juggling will enrich my art or lead me closer to any life goal, however, I thought it would be fun.

One of my art students, David Britchford, asked me if I would like to attend his class in juggling. I laughed, then thought, then laughed again and said, "Sure."

The first night I juggled three bean bags. But I invented a new people If I juggle for 10 seconds, I cover about 30 feet running after bean bags, which are, for some reason, constantly falling out of my reach. I guess "fun" is not always

IF YOU LIKE to have some fun in art, try doing a caricature. First I would like to say that caricatures are fun! They are 180 degrees from portraiture. In a portrait you try to play down unattractive or uncommon features. In caricatures you emphasize or poke fun at certain characteristic features. I feel a caricature should never be cruel or disrespectful. Any feature of face or body can be overdone to the point of injury and this should never be the goal of the caricaturist. So with that warning out of the way, let's talk about how to do caricatures



A caricature is truly an art form. Art is selection and selection is caricaturing. It is studying the model or photo and extracting only those lines and shapes that are characteristic of the person. How you place those lines and shapes on paper sets the mood of the caricature. If your lines, shapes and colors are bold and greatly exaggerated, then your caricature will be wacky or silly. If your lines, shapes and colors are more carefully drawn and more subtly

placed, then your caricature is more realistic yet still humorous. Both styles are appreciated and will be accepted.

A caricature is a visually brief description and that is a good tip for finding what to draw and what to leave out. Mentally describe the features to yourself before you begin to draw. Remember, it is your mind that tells the hand what to draw. Clarity in the mind produces clarity and accuracy of line on the paper.

out or select, and the caricaturist must first master abstraction if he or she is to improve in this field. Caricatures of many artists are weighted down with too many lines and details, causing the artwork to hover somewhere between realism and cartoon. Probably the greatest compliment to a caricaturist is when someone says something like "that's his face exactly. In just a few lines you got his features perfect."

The hardest people to caricature are pretty girls and women because everything is pretty and there is little to be humorous with. Men are a caricaturist's playground because their features are usually bolder than those of women.

Always be sure to ask what are the hobbies of the subject and also the occasion for the request. Proba-

as a caricaturist is style. "Style" is your personal touch or the look that is characteristic of your ability. The quality that causes people to say "Oh I've seen his work before." Style is not taught and it is particularly distasteful if it is copied. Style is developed by practice and is appreciated if only for its originality.

So try some caricatures. But you may have the same revelation I had this week - fun is not always easy.



# Think of yourself as a poet

Did you know there is a very powerful universal language spoken by everyone, young and old, rich or poor, from all parts of the world? What I'm referring to is the language of the photographic image.

And just as a knowledge of basics is essential to communication and understanding in any language, so is it in photography.

For example, we all know about grammar and punctuation in the English language. We know where the periods and commas belong. Similarly, in photography we need to know the basics, such as how to set the shutter speed, how to determine the correct aperture and how to read the depth-of-field scale.

But as creative photographers, we go a step beyond this. In short, we must learn to become poets with our cameras. You see, a poet makes grammar a secondary thing. The words flowing from the creative self are primary. The poet is tuned into his innermost feelings and these are expressed in words. Poems are written expressions of the inner self.

Photographers must strive to do this, too. We must make the mechanics of photography secondary in order to concentrate on the poetry. It's easy to get correct exposure with our cameras. Now let's work toward getting proper exposure with our photographic feelings.

Remember that as photographers,



we have the ability to make visible what others can only sense. This is an exciting concept. Begin to think of your feelings as the true lens of the camera.

Realize that a photograph, and you as the photographer, can reach out and stir human emotions that often go beyond what the spoken or written word can do.

Remember, the lens that truly sees the beauty of a flower, the innocent smile of a child, or a dramatic sunset isn't attached to the front of

the camera. Rather, it's the lens in-

Learn never to underexpose your feelings. Remember that it's not the artist's brush that produces the painting, the violinist's bow that makes the melody, nor the poet's pen that writes the sonnet.


Similarly, it's not the camera that produces the photograph — it's you. Put your inside lens to work and become a poet of photographic lan-
