# Stores hit for alcohol sales

If you're going to sell liquor to a minor you'd better be ready to face the consequences.

That's the message the Michigan State Police Northville Post is sending to store clerks and owners.

The lesson was a lot tougher May 21 for six clerks who were arrested and issued an appearance ticket.

An 18-year-old was sent in by State Police to buy liquor.

"Every year, about this time, we seem to lose one or two kids in a drinking and driving accident," said Charles Schumacher, state trooper, Northville Post.

"They're getting the alcohol from area stores. Wouldn't it be nice to get through a year without any fatalities?"

THE HIGH SCHOOL student was sent by State Police to 23 stores in Plymouth, Canton and Northville townships. He was able to buy alcohol at six sites, Schumacher said.

The stores where the clerks sold liquor were: 7-Eleven, Canton Center and Warren roads in Canton; Canton Center Party Shop, Canton; Great Scott, Plymouth Township; Jarohs in Plymouth Township; Hamlets, Northville; and Northville Party Shop, Northville.

The clerks were charged with furnishing alcohol to a minor and were given a ticket to appear in court. The charge is a misdemeanor and carries a maximum \$50 fine for first offenders.

The Liquor Control Commission was notified of the six stores that sold the liquor. Owners must appear at an LCC hearing where they can be fined up to \$1,000 and could lose their liquor license, according to Howard Patterson, LCC district supervisor.

One store had its license removed for three days following a similar decoy operation last year, Schumacher said.

"The owner is responsible no matter who sells it," Patterson said.

# Driver gets prison in '86 traffic death

For Charlie Triplett, Thursday was just another work day at Jack Smith's Beverage Company in Adri-

Friday, sitting in the courtroom of Washtenaw Circuit Judge Ross Campbell, the 19-year-old was sentenced to 1½ to 15 years in prison for involuntary manslaughter.

Triplett was convicted in connection with the 1986 traffic death of his girlfriend, Georgenna C. Nix of Canton Township.

Triplett's attorney, Eugene Hoiby, is appealing the decision, according to Washtenaw County assistant prosecutor Kirk Tabbey.

If an appeal is not filed within 56 days, Triplett is to report to Riverside Correctional Facility in Ionia.

TRIPLETT WAS living with friends in Plymouth last June when he and Nix decided to celebrate her graduation from Plymouth Salem High School at a party at Silver Lake State Park in the Pinckney Recreation Area.

When the weather turned cool, the two left in the Nix family's 1981 Chevette.

Sgt. Joseph Yekulis, who investigated the accident, said the car was traveling 70-80 mph on a park road where the speed limit was 20.

"He passed two cars in front of park headquarters on a hill with a double vellow line.

"He went back into the southbound lane and started to lose control as he crested a hill," said Yekulis. "He went left of the center line and crossed into the opposite lane and drove off the left shoulder. steered back onto the roadway, crossing both lanes and started heading for the opposite edge of the road.

"He tried to over-correct to the left and skidded off the right edge of the road. He hit a cherry tree, climbed up the tree and vaulted 17 feet into the air. He struck a large oak tree 7 feet above the ground. The car rolled from the passenger side toward the driver's side and landed on its top," said Yekulis.

Nix was pronounced dead on arrival at the University of Michigan Hospital. Triplett, who recalls nothing about the accident, sustained closed head injuries.

Triplett's Nix's blood alcohol level was 0.11. A 0.10 level is considered legally drunk in Michigan. Neither teen was wearing a seat belt. Triplett had attended Plymouth Salem High School and was unemployed at the time of the accident.

Her teachers said Nix showed promise in photography and art and was pondering a career in the field.

YEKULIS DESCRIBED Triplett's

March trial as tough and grueling.

"It was an emotionally charged trial because a lot of sympathies were involved on all sides," said Yekulis.

"Her parents are two of the finest

meet. And his parents are pretty nice people."

The defense argued that Triplett was not driving the car at the time of the accident because Triplett couldn't remember anything beyond leaving the beach, Yekulis said.

A seven-woman, five-man jury deliberated six hours before finding Triplett guilty.

"We were incredulous about the defense's argument. We found both bodies pinned into their respective seats," said Yekulis.

"Their contention was ludicrous," agreed Tabbey.

Triplett "was just really, badly negligent and it's a criminal act. I told the jury he had to held responsible and accountable for his actions."

"This is what happens when you drive around drunk. It happens every year, and it will happen again," Tabbey added.

Washtenaw County prosecutors recommended a four-year minimum sentence.

"A 1½-year sentence was not out of bounds but this was a particularly tragic case that involved a lot of people. We were concerned with the loss of life and in sending a message to the community," said Tabbey.

Yekulis says sheriffs' "No. 1 goal this time of year is to prevent this

Maybe, just maybe, young people will begin to find better things to do on weekends than drive up and down Main Street in Plymouth looking for action.

Fewer cruisers seemed to converge downtown last Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Monday than on previous weekends, according to Police Chief Richard Myers.

He wouldn't say that the cruising phenomenon has peaked even though many residents and business people here would herald that prospect. "It was a holiday, cooler weather. There are too many variables," Myers said, accounting for fewer cruisers.

Police issued 100 tickets Friday through Monday, Myers said. Most were handed out Friday and Saturday nights. The number doesn't include parking infractions.

The chief offered a partial breakdown by offense:

- 20 for trespassing.
- 14 for pronioted turn.
  13 for seat belt violation.
  nine for unnecessary noise.
- 14 for speeding.14 for prohibited turn.
- four for transporting open intoxicants.
   four for consuming alcohol in public.

There were no major incidents, he added. City police also issued 100 tickets the weekend of May 15-17, Myers said. The past week-

end of May 15-17, Myers said. The past weekend, however, had an additional 24 hours due to the holiday.

City adminisistrators continue to interview candidates for up to eight temporary, full-time police positions to supplement the department through the summmer, Myers said.

The plan is to have the new officers on duty by the time school lets out for the summer the middle of June.

# Conductor keeps musical heritage alive

Janita Hauk was the 12-year-old daughter of an Ohio grain elevator owner when she first heard the rich, full-bodied sound of a violin.

"My sixth grade teacher played it for us in class. I went home and begged my dad to go to town and buy me one," said Hauk, now a respected area violinist and music educator.

"He brought home a trombone, trumpet and a violin and I got my

Having heard Mrs. Slotterbeck play Beethoven's Ninth Symphony on the strings, the young woman's mind was made up.

Just a month after she began lessons, Hauk was promoted to the Old Fort School Orchestra. Within a year, she'd won an award at an Ohio solo and ensemble festival.

"I got a medal, and thought,
'Boy, I must be pretty good,' " recalled Hauk.

No doubt the thought mirrors

those of the folks who've attended Hauk's numerous concerts.

Hauk teaches strings for Plymouth-Canton Community Schools and is conductor of the Livonia Youth String Orchestra. For 17 seasons, she has performed as a

first violinist with the Plymouth

Symphony and is a member of the

Plymouth String Trio.

DUE TO HER husband's health, Hauk is stepping down from her musical posts. The couple plans to live summers in Kingsville, Ontario, and winters in Port Charlotte,

While looking forward to life in sunny climes, Hauk looks back on both gratifying experiences and disappointments.

An instructor at Livonia's Madonna College and Ladywood High School, Hauk has coached orchestras to Division I ratings at district and state festivals.

"If I've accomplished anything in my life, I would like to think I would have brought (Plymouth-Canton's) strings program from next to nothing to the beginning of something," she said. "The program just barely exists, and it's such a shame."

At present, 45 students are enrolled in Plymouth-Canton's string/orchestral program.

"People concerned about culture should cry out about the fact that a strings program doesn't exist in the middle and elementary levels dur-

# Escapee is back in jail 5 hours later

A man who escaped custody of Plymouth Township police last Sat-urday following arraignment on a burglary charge was recaptured in Dearborn about five hours after he

The escapee, identified by police as Michael Todd Jones, 21, of Detroit, was taken to the Wayne County Jail after Dearborn Police and Detroit Police tracking dogs found him in a field at Ford and Evergreen roads.

A handcuffed Jones ran away from two township police officers at about 12:10 p.m. as he was led from out-county circuit court at Henry Ruff and Michigan Avenue in Westland.

"We tried to catch him, but there was no doing it," said Officer Erik Mayernik. "He escaped in a field."

JONES STOLE a bicycle and got

as far as Dearborn before he was spotted, Mayernik said. He still was wearing the handcuffs on one wrist when apprehended at about

Jones had been formally charged with burglary prior to his escape. He pleaded not guilty to the charge and was ordered to the county jail when he couldn't post a \$5,000 cash

Jones was arrested by officers James Jarvis, Robert Smith and James Hirschfeld Friday afternoon after a neighbor observed him break into a house on Sheldon Road, Mayernik said.

A resident there later identified jewelry found in Jones's possession as stolen, Mayernik said.

A window had been kicked out. Jones originally gave his name as William Clarence Davis when arrested, Mayernik said. A warrant

alleging escape from lawful custo-dy will be sought, he added.

Two other warrants are outstanding against Jones, one for breaking and entering, the other for probation violation, Mayernik

An internal investigation of Jones's escape from custody will be made, said Police Chief Carl

WARRANTS PROBABLY will be sought against two Canton men, one 20, the other 18, in connection with the break-in last Wednesday of a condominium unit on Lynn,

Mayernik said. Again, neighbors who observed suspicious activity called police, he said. Smith arrested the pair. A

doorwall had been jimmied. Nothing apparently was taken, Mayernik said.

"PEOPLE SHOULDN'T think the Rouge is now clean," Friends of the Rouge director Bonnie Anderson said. "There's still a lot of work that needs to be done."

Work sites stretch from Birming-

ham to Canton Township.
In upstream areas, volunteers will take to the water to clear logs and other debris. Volunteers will clear debris from river banks in heavily polluted downstream areas. Municipal public service workers have already cleared log jams and debris from the river at those sites. Gloves will be provided.

Other Wayne County participants include Livonia, Plymouth, Plymouth Township and Westland. Oakland County participants also in-clude Farmington, Farmington Hills and Southfield. The Oakland County Drain Commissioner's is sponsoring a West Bloomfield cleanup site. For fully documented. Friends of the

A heavy turnout for this year's cleanup, they say, is essential to keep Rouge restoration a top legislative priority. Priends members are optimistic about meeting their goal.

"WE SHOULD be able to get 4,000-5,000 volunteers," Friends of the Rouge President James Murray said. "We have all 14 commy that participated last year, plus eight new communities. I don't think enthusiasm has slackened, if anything it's increased."

Log jams, a prime contributor to Rouge pollution, are worse at some

sites than they were one year ago.
"You should see the log jam in the city of Wayne," Anderson said. "It's a lot bigger than the one we had last year. And there's other places we didn't even touch last year."

Clearing log jams is important to letting the river "heal itself," Anderson said. A smoothly flowing Rouge will clear itself of many waste mate-

But Friends members admit the Rouge's problems are too great to be solved by volunteers alone.

Large scale industrial pollution long ago subsided — a victory for early 1970s environmentalists. But small business pollution hasn't been

of Governments (SISMCOG), members are expanding the Rouge cleanup into a year-round activity...

"We've made tremendous strides in getting high schools and colleges involved," Murray said.

Students from 16 metropolitan high schools analyzed Rouge River samples taken from river sections near their schools. Material is now on file with the University of Michigan computer system. # Child witness bills readied

House and Senate conferees reached agreeement on four bills designed to protect Michigan children

testifying against abusive adults. The House bills, sponsored by Rep. Mary Brown, D-Kalamazoo, had set the age for protective treatment at

17 and under. The Senate Judiciary Committee, chaired by Rudy Nichols, R-Waterford, had split between 13 and 15.

A CONFERENCE committee headed by Brown and Nichols agreed to set the age at 15 and reported the bills back to the Legislature for final

"I said I would consider 17 if data were produced later to support it,"

s said last week.

Four bills are necessary, Nichols said, in order to cover proceedings in criminal courts, juvenile courts, teacher tenure and administrative

The bills, if enacted and signed by the governor, would allow use of anatomically correct dolls, allow the presence of a "support person" such as a protective caseworker when the child is testifying and in some instances permit the use of videotapes.

USE OF videotapes would make it unnecessary for children to repeat their horror stories of sexual abuse seven or eight times — to a principal, police officer, detective, caseworker, prosecutor, district court and circuit court juries.



It's another to make the courts and social agencies use them.

"What does it mean? Not very much," George Ward, the chief assistant Wayne County prosecutor, told a state Senate panel considering two bills extending to-23 the age at which probate courts and state agencies could retain jurisdiction over ju-

venile offenders. Ward said the four-year extension of authority doesn't force the probate court or the state Department of Social Services to use that control

whenever they want."

Then Ward and Sen. John Kelly, D-Detroit, proceeded to blister officials for early releases.

WARD, A PROBATE judge and a DSS official last week testified before Sen. Rudy Nichols' Senate Judiciary Committee on juvenile bills.

State law defines a juvenile as anyone 17 or under, but a 17-year-old lawbreaker can't automatically walk out the door as soon as he

walk out the door as soon as he reaches 18. The law allows probate court and DSS to retain jurisdiction until age 19.

But a panel of officials appointed by Chief Justice Dorothy Comstock

tended four more years, to 22.

Nichols, B-Waterford, whose northern Oukland district stretches to Rochester, has infruduced two bills — SB 275 and 282 — to do so. Co-sponsor is Kelly. The hills may be reported out of committee as early as this was!

Ward cited the case of Walter Mutter, 76, who was beaten to death by a 16-year-old in a laundromat on Detroit's northeast side. The teen was placed under the jurisdiction of DSS, which "kept him 666 days and let him go before his 19th birthday, on the theory he had received 'maxion the theory he had received 'maximum benefit' of DSS services," Ward

"He was known as a ringleader in the local gang. He was totally unremoractul and vangeful," Kelly said.





# Pick school board MXNA to serve full term

N MONDAY, June 8, Canton and Plymouth voters will select two members to the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education for four-year terms.

That's four years.

The length of the term is important. We must remember that after one issue is resolved, the life of a school board 4member continues. Over four years, hundreds of decisions are made many very important.

To elect a school board member to make one or two decisions, or deal with just one issue, is short-sighted. A oneissue trustee has nothing to contribute once that problem is solved.

So let's elect candidates who can function well for four years.

OF NINE candidates who filed for the school board, only five have indicated they are serious. Others have failed to submit candidate questionnaires or failed to appear at candidate forums, signs they lack wind for four years.

Of the five serious candidates, two have demonstrated records of commitment to the school district by voting in at least three-fourths of the elections they were eligible to vote in.

Those two are incumbents Roland J. Thomas Jr. and Dean Swartzwelter.

Commitment is important because school trustees must attend a minimum of 52 meetings a year or at least 100 hours. Anyone who cannot spend one or two hours a year in the ballot box, or with an absentee ballot, lacks commit-

BOTH INCUMBENTS have demonstrated they can handle criticism without being overly defensive. Both are equipped to listen to angry, frustrated residents and respond objectively. This trait especially helps advance communication between decision-makers and - those impacted by decisions.

Thomas and Swartzwelter, as might be expected of incumbents, are both

knowledgeable about issues facing the district. Both also are well-informed about the staffs and needs of buildings throughout the district. They are wellinformed because they have taken the time to get involved, not because they are incumbents.

**Both Thomas and Swartzwelter were** knowledgeable and informed before they were candidates because they were involved at the building level and by serving on school district committees. Of the other seven candidates, only one has served on school committees.

The other candidates are uninformed because they have been uninvolved. They have not earned the right to serve.

EACH YEAR the Observer Newspapers endorses candidates because we believe education is important enough to elect the best qualified board mem-

As a newspaper we cover regular meetings of the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education as the eyes and ears of the community. We watch the board in action and come to recognize its strengths and faults. # Memory is a reason for tears

SHE WAS CRYING.

It was the Memorial Day holiday. "Taps" was playing. And she was

Quiet tears at first, but then loud, steady sobs. The kind that make people look in astonishment and then turn away. The kind that make small children stare, wondering why someone would cry on a day when the sun was shining and the band was playing.

Still she cried.

I do not know why she cries so much. No family members or close friends have been killed in battle.

I do know this. She cried when she looked upon the rows and rows of neat white gravestones at Arlington. And again when she read the inscription of how many died fighting various Ameri-

"Those poor families," she said. "So many broken hearts."

PERHAPS IT was the thought of all the broken hearts, all the crushed dreams, all the devastated families that flowed down her teary cheeks on Monday. Perhaps it is because she has an infant son and she prays against all fear

that the broken heart will never be hers. The question, though, isn't why she was crying. The question is, Why wasn't I? Why weren't you?

Perhaps the second-greatest insult to those who die in war is the fact that survivors won't even give up a midweek day in their remembrance. It has to be a Monday; it has to be a three-day

There were complaints this last weekend that uncertain weather reduced the tourist trade in sunny Michigan. The weather, however, didn't stop the travel plans of 37 families whose sons and husbands were killed aboard the USS Stark. They have sacrificed far more than a weekend.

RATHER THAN feel shame for turning a memorial into a holiday, some seem to flaunt it. A caller to this newspaper was justifiably outraged at five businesses on Orchard Lake Road in Farmington Hills and West Bloomfield. The stores were flying the American flag but failed to fly it at half-staff.

If you fly the flag you have a responsibility to fly it correctly, said the caller. Otherwise, it is better not to fly

it all. He told two businesses of their mistake. They said they couldn't do anything about it. Imagine that.

So what's the greatest insult to those who die in war? It's the fact that it doesn't take much of a memory to remember why we have Memorial Day.

You don't have to be a graybeard spinning yarns about World War I. You don't have to recall the pre-baby boom days of World War II. You don't need to recall the "police action" in Korea or the "conflict" in Vietnam.

"FINALLY, AS a further safety measure, media requests for electronic coverage must be submitted in writing to the court not less than five days in advance of such proceeding," saith the

Why five days? It doesn't take a reasonable person five days to decide on such a request, and it shouldn't take a judge that long, either.

Indeed, trial schedules in the Oakland

Circuit Court, for example, are available no earlier than Friday of the prior week. It would be a physical impossibility for a broadcaster to obtain court permission to videotape a trial starting

on a Monday. Or a Tuesday. Or a Wednesday. Or a Thursday.
In sum, the Michigan Supreme Court is playing God, badly, with the right of the public to see its judges, prosecutors, cops and lawyers at work.

# Rich folks value work, family

Are the rich really different from the rest of us?

The most remarkable thing about those who have more money than others is just how unremarkable they really are," said Lawrence P. English, president of CIGNA's Individual Financial Services Division.

English commented on a Louis Harris and Associates poll of wealthy Americans to better understand what drives them.

They are traditional, middleaged Americans with a highly developed work ethic and sense of family values. Unencumbered by the baggage of what's often called the 'me generation,' they seem to embody the best of traditional America, English said.

Success in America: The CIGNA Study of the Upper-Affluent" marks the first time America's wealthy were randomly polled on their hopes and dreams, said pollster Harris.

The 500 adult Americans polled had a minimum annual household income of \$100,000 or a net worth of \$500,000 excluding primary residence — about 2 percent of American households, Harris said. The study was conducted from Feb. 2 through 23.

HOW THEY became successful:

• They earned their own money 82 percent acquired most of their financial assets primarily through work; only 6 percent primarily inherited their assets.

• 45 percent work for an organization, while 42 percent are self-employed, but the self-employed are wealthier

• They work - 87 percent of main income producers are active workers; 12 percent are retired; 1 percent describe themselves as not working, but not retired.

· Spouses work, too. In 56 percent of the households with married couples, spouses also work.

#### THEIR PRIORITIES:

• Highest priority is providing for their families.

• Self-fulfillment - 84 percent say it's vitally important that they be able to apply their tal ... creativity and energy.

• Educating their children - 75 percent say it's absolutely essential or very important.

· Contributing to charity is a major goal - 50 percent attach high importance to contributing to charities, institutions or causes.

• Material goals and status are on the bottom of their lists. Fewer

than one in five attach much importance to owning a vacation home. Only one in 10 think of owning art or prestigious cars as important.

#### THEIR FINANCES:

• They control their own finances 71 percent say they manage finances themselves; 19 percent say their finances are managed largely by a professional.

• They carefully weigh investment options - 72 percent say they carefully weigh resources and options, only 9 percent say they rely on intuition as much as hard informa-

• They buy real estate - 79 percent report that they have held real estate investments in the past year. The wealthier they are, the more likely they are to increase investment in real estate during the next year - surprising in light of the dured under tax reform.

· Closely following real estate on the list of investments are stocks (75 percent) and money market funds (71 percent). Commodities at 12 percent and junk bonds at 8 percent are the least favored investments.

• They don't expect benefits from the new tax law. Only 15 percent think the new tax law will result in their paying less taxes.

#### **DEMOGRAPHICS:**

• They're middle-aged - median is 48, nearly a decade older than the U.S. median of 39.

• They're married - 83 percent; only 7 percent have never married. (In the adult population as a whole, 61 percent are married or living with a partner, and 20 percent have never married.)





# Club offers savings for shoppers

Staff photos by Bill Bresier HEN IT comes to saving money at the grocery store or drug store, some shoppers

Some lackadaisical types may clip a coupon every now and then; others have more elaborate systems of clipping and filing coupons and refund forms. For some shoppers, the savings that result from their clipping-and-filing efforts are considerable.

The Refunders Club attracts a variety of shoppers looking for savings. The club meets at 9:30 a.m. the third Wednesday of each month at the Plymouth Grange, 273 Union St.

An average of 10 to 15 people

show up at each meeting.

"Sometimes we get busy," said Plymouth Township's Jeanne Climie, who's been a member since 1980 or so. Some of the shoppers also go to meetings of other refunders' organizations.

"I don't myself. This is the only one I come to."

THE CLUB isn't as formally organized as some clubs are; there's no president, but the work that needs to be done gets done.

"Everybody started getting together," Climie said. "Nobody's really boss-boss."

Climie recalls seeing a newspaper item about the club; that's what got her started going to meetings. The Refunders Club used to meet at the fire station at Canton Center and Cherry Hill roads in Canton, she said.

At the club meetings, some people work on organizing the centsoff coupons; others work on the refund forms. Shoppers look through to see what's available at each meeting.

Club meetings are similar to garage sales, Climie said, in that they allow participants to sell or trade things they can't use.

At each meeting she attends, Climie brings two or three garbage bags full of labels and product wrappers. The items are priced at

# He gives the arts a boost

State Sen. Jack Faxon can still remember clearly his junior high school performances in Gilbert and Sullivan's "H.M.S. Pinafore." He'd like today's Michigan students to graduate from high school with equally fond memories.

The arts are an important part of a curriculum, according to Faxon, D-Farmington Hills.

"I would like to defy anyone to teach kindergarten without art," he said. "They all love it, and they all are stars."

As students progress through school, however, something happens. There's less expression of creativity and spontaneity in the arts.

Participating in the arts is good for children and teenagers, Faxon said, in that it allows everyone to be good at something.

"Children who have the arts in their life's program are better adults."

Faxon spoke to a group of approximately 25 people at last Thursday's meeting of the Plymouth branch, American Association of University Women. The evening meeting was held at the Plymouth Cultural Center.

FAXON WAS first elected to the Michigan House of Representatives in 1964 and to the Michigan Senate in 1970. He's a graduate of Wayne State University and of the University of Michigan and is a former Detroit Public Schools teacher.

Faxon's a longtime supporter of the arts.

"We have a real problem in the defense of the arts," he told those attending the Plymouth AAUW meeting. The emphasis on jobs and commerce tends to push the arts aside.

As a result, we've lost something of the human dimension of living in a civilized society, he said. The quality of life, "the sheer enjoyment of life itself is not something that has been improved upon these last few years"

"Quality is a very important issue to sanity in a society."

Participating in the arts provides a safety valve for emotional energy, he said, and helps maintain stability.

Faxon questioned the current emphasis on computer skills. "I can't even use an electric typewriter, they're so technical."

The senator also questioned the reasons for emphasis on math and science instruction in schools.

"The most important skills are communication skills."

It's not necessary for every student in Michigan's schools to study chemistry, Faxon said.

THE SENATOR does, however, favor a high school graduation requirement of one year of arts study. Such a requirement would be used as a financial incentive to encourage school districts to provide arts programs.

"It is a socializing experience for a society, and it's a vitalizing one,"

Even students who don't appear to be interested in the arts will benefit from taking arts classes, he said.

"If there's ever a situation where they need it, it's the ones that don't want it."

The arts have historically provid-

ed an outlet for creative expression, he said. In the 19th century, for example, women worked on quilting, needlework and other textile arts.

In the 20th century, the arts have become so successful that nearly all artists want to come to the U.S., Faxon said.

"Why is New York the cultural capital of the world?" The diversity of U.S. society gives the arts a boost.

spot for parades, Smith said. Other homes on the Plymouth call Judy Lore, 453-5181.



# We need to pause in remembrance

MEMORIAL DAY was more than a holiday in the days of my youth. It marked more than the beginning of the summer season. Memorial Day was special time of recall and remembrance. We spent a good portion of the day in the village come-

Our time in the cemetery began with a Service of Remembrance and Prayers. The names of the war dead were read. A. Depression is the most prevalent mental disorder in older persons. There are many causes and a variety of treatments.


The best way to start to help a depressed person recover is to encourage him or her to seek professional help. A complete medical and psychological evaluation should reveal the cause of the depression and treatment should begin at once.



"The changes are subtle, but they get the communication across," said Inatome.

They weren't cheap. The approach — the cost of studying the change, of rearranging the showroom, of promoting it - may run as high as \$200,000. If it is successful, it will expand to other stores in the 74-store chain. Success will be determined by how close the Troy store comes to

expectations of a 20 percent increase in sales.

'If we're satisfying the customer 20 percent more, then we should see 20 percent more sales," said Inatome. "But we're not just doing this to sell 20 percent more. It's not just a move to sell more computers. We want a more satisfied customer."

THE CHANGE in store atmospherics is part of a long-range plan by Inacomp, headquartered in Troy, to boost consulting and support services to 20 percent of gross business Solid walls in the showroom have in the next 41/2 years. CAD (computer-aided design) classes, for example, are \$3,000. It can cost as much for training as it does for the computer.

Inacomp was founded by Inatome in 1976 with \$35,000 borrowed from family members and grew out of his success selling kits by day that he'd

built in the basement by night. That was in the beginning of the PC boom. Companies have come and gone but Inacomp has survived the shakeout that has been marked by other companies' bankruptcies and

mergers. The new emphasis on satisfying the customers' psychological and educational needs as well as the needs of his pocketbook will, hopes Inatome, help keep the company profitable and avoid the problems faced by other merchandisers. (Sears recently closed 42 business computer centers and IBM has sold 80 of its computer stores.)

Inatome, 33, is a graduate of Warren Cousino High School and a 1976

graduate of Michigan State with a degree in economics.

He has been called "one of the few superdealers who help shape the industry" by Newsweek Magazine and was named as one of the more influential executives in 1983, 1984, 1985 and 1986 by Computer Retail News, a trade publication.

Inatome has been named Entrepreneur of the Year by the Harvard University Business Club, the outstanding young man of the year by the Michigan Jaycees, and he received the Michigan State University Business School's Financial Leadership Award.

Inacomp's sales were \$158 million in 1986, up 22 percent from 1985, and Inatome predicts sales of \$320 million for fiscal 1987. Not bad for a guy who did just \$400 in sales his first month in business. Not bad for a guy who was told after an aptitude test in college that his greatest chance of success would be in mortuary science.

THOUGH INACOMP is publicly traded, Inatome is as connected to Inacomp as if it were still a family

In fact, in 1984 rumors of his illness sent the stock down two points in two days, a total paper loss of \$10 million.

A Wall Street insider called to ask him about his health and when Inatome said he was fine, the insider told him the word on the street was that he had cancer. As it turned out, it was the chief executive of another firm who was sick; Inacomp's price quickly rebounded.

He's fine, and Inatome hopes the expensive foray into remodeling his flagship store will help keep Inacomp fine for years to come.

# Small business advocate makes her mark locally and nationally

"It's been a long road from Livonia housewife to Zim-Jeanne Paluzzi. owner of JGP Marketing Group International of Livo-

Jeanne Paluzzi left Sunday for Zimbabwe to explore business opportunities for her clients in that African country. It has, indeed, been a long road, and an interesting one. For a while, it seemed as if

nothing but frustration and failure would come her way. Now, it seems to be success after success.

Paluzzi has owned her own public relations and marketing firm since 1979.

She was appointed in March to the Advisory Council on Small Business of the Federal Reserve Bank in Chicago. She is vice president of the Small Business Association of Michigan and finishing her second year chairing its Political Action Committee; in 1986 she was an elected delegate to the White House Conference on Small Business; she has been a member of the board of directors of the Livonia Chamber of Commerce, president of the Michigan chapter of the National Association of Women Business Owners, on the Industrial Development Commission in Livonia and on the city's cable TV advisory committee.

On and on reads her resume appointments, elected positions, commissions and memberships to a wide range of professional asso-


THE RESUME wasn't always so full. The long road had a potholed, twisting start; it seemed Paluzzi would never get where she wanted to go.

In the early '70s, Paluzzi had been a longtime volunteer for civic and religious groups in Livonia. She found herself in need of money and a job.

"I thought it would be awfully nice to get paid for something I enjoyed doing," she said of her decision to get into public rela-

She landed her first job in the PR department of the Detroit engineering firm, Smith, Hinchman and Grylls Associates, but was laid off within a year. She went to work for Albert Kahn Associates and again was laid off within a year. She was hired at Young & Rubicam and was fired a few weeks before Christmas when a new department head came in with a stiff broom.

"I got a lot of leads and refer-

rals from friends, and I saw the potential of starting my own firm," said Paluzzi. "In mid-January (of 1979) I sat up all night playing solitaire, drinking Scotch and thinking about starting my own firm."

Start it she did, operating it out of her house. Her first year was boom, her second bust after she lost a major client. But more booms followed and by 1984 she was able to move into her spacious, stylish offices on School-

And she's successful enough now as a small business person to be appointed to give advice to the Federal Reserve Bank on the needs of small business.

PRESIDENT REAGAN at one time planned on dismantling the Small Business Administration. He has cut back enormously on its lending policies. Yet, Paluzzi remains hopeful that the creation of an advisory council to the Federal Reserve isn't window dressing, that it will lead to substantive change and a meaningful dia-

"I didn't agree with Reagan on the demise of the SBA," she said. "The SBA should be responsive to the job-creating sector of our society. Now, for the first time . . . communication barriers can overcome (because of the Federal Reserve advisory council).

"You have to take small bites at a time to change things. I don't think this is just cosmetic. You need to maintain a pressure on them to make an impact, but you don't want to make a nuisance of yourself. You have to learn how to take advantage of an opportunity to effect change.

"Small businessmen are getting more credibility, people are more aware of us. We have created more jobs in the economy than big business has lost."

A couple of years ago, Paluzzi nearly rejoined the ranks of big business. "I got some calls from headhunters, and I thought about moving on. But I decided to stay in business," she said. "I enjoy all the freedom and frustrations of small business."

# Let the jobseeker beware

Recent graduates or people interested in employment as traveling (or door-to-door) sales representatives should proceed with caution, warns the Better Business

Ads offering good pay, glamor, travel, training and advancement are often used to recruit the young and unemployed. These ads usually don't indicate the company's name - only the name and local phone number of the recruiter.

Those who answer the ads are usually interviewed at a local hotel or motel. Those interviewed generally must quickly decide whether to accept the job. What they find out — often once they're on the road and away from home — is that the job involves door-to-door sales for magazines, books, chemical cleaners or other products, and conditions are not at all as expected.

Crew members work long hours under close supervision. There is a pressure to meet sales quotas, and pay is by commission only. Some salespeople have been left stranded far from home when they haven't made enough sales or have challenged the rules of the compa-

Some state laws require door-to-door salespeople to immediately show customers identification indicating who they are, the name of the company they represent, and the purpose of the visit. In many cities and counties the sales crews must register with local authorities. Often sales supervisors ignore such regulations and do not tell their salespersons they are violating the law.

Those considering this type of job should check out the company with the BBB office nearest its headquarters. Get all details in writing about the job, such as food and lodging programs, who is to pay for or provide transportation, etc. If possible, try to speak to several

# practically speaking people who have worked in sales for the company you

are considering.

Never be pressured into taking a job before checking out the company to your satisfaction.

While laws protect consumers from misrepresented or defective goods, there are no laws that require merchants to offer refunds, exchanges or credits on merchandise they sell, the BBB warns.

These voluntary practices have become widespread among retailers wishing to make shopping in their stores as attractive as possible to customers. But consumers should never assume that merchandise can be returned unless this policy is specifically stated by the store. Return and exchange practices vary from store to store, so customers should understand the store's policy

when making a purchase. Virtually all stores with exchange or refund policies require that the product be returned within a specified time period, in new condition, with all packaging in place, and with the original sales slip.

Because of health laws, these return policies seldom apply to underwear, bathing suits or hats.

The BBB emphasizes that customers should not confuse return and exchange policies with product warranties. Products often come with stated or implied warranties from their manufacturers. Read the warranty before returning a defective product to the retailer.

#### The Negative Changes

1. One of the areas adversely affected is early retirement. If you choose to plan for retirement at \$6, the maximum annual benefit you will be able to finance will be just \$40,000, sharply lower than the early limit of \$75,000.

This implies that if your defined benefit plan contributions are based on the \$75,000 figure, your actuary would have to do some fast refigurmg, if he determines that your plan yould have more than you need, the like will slap a 10-percent tax on the

The will stap a 10-percent tax on the excess when you retire.

Your tax attorney may be able to solve this potential problem by rolling over the money into a defined contribution plan or an IRA, but the rules are complex, and it pays to be constituted.

2. The Tax Reform Act also has tightened the coverage rules. Until now, participation by 56 percent of all full-time employees was neces-sary to make a profit-sharing plan legal. That level has been increased to 70 percent.

Translated into real numbers, it

means that seven out of a full-time staff of nine would have to participate in the plan, a sizable increase

over the previous requirement.

One possible solution to this problem is to switch to a 401 (k) plan. If

you combine a 401 (k) with a money purchase plan, you can contribute \$7,000 in the 401 (k) plan and get the maximum defined contribution of \$40,000 a year in the money pur-chase plan, provided such a contribu-tion does not exceed 25 percent of

3. The Tax Reform Act has completely wiped out the advantages of voluntary contributions. Previously, interest on your voluntary contributions to a qualified plan was taxeddeferred until you withdrew the accumulated interest. The law changed in a way that makes the interest tax-

 Borrowing from your qualified plan, still permitted up to \$50,000, has lost most of its advantages. For one thing, you still have to pay interest on the loan, but it is no longer tax est on the loan, but it is no longer tax deductible. For another, the \$50,000 loan limit has to be reduced by the highest balance on any loans you took from the plan in the previous 12

The Tax Reform Act does offer a break to the early retires. Under the old law, except for death and disabil-ity, you could not withdraw from a Koough Plan before ago 89% with-out incurring a 10-percent penalty. Now if wen receive women in Now, if you receive your money in equal monthly payments over your lifetime, you can withdraw your retirement benefits at any age without

The law even allows variations of this general rule. For instance, you are okay if you start taking out small installments in the beginning and increase your draw after you reach 59%. Of course, some restric-tions (such as a maximum withdrawal of \$112,500 in any one year) apply to this otherwise generous rule.

# Good management sees stock through trying times

Two years or more ago when the first Tylenol scare occurred, it seemed to me that it would be wise to sell my Johnson & Johnson stock, and I did so. I only got \$29.50 for my shares when I sold.

In recent times the stock has sold as high as three times what I sold it

It seemed like my reasoning was good when I sold the stock, but the way it has worked out, it looks like I

When you are looking at a stock and deciding whether to hold or sell

it, there are always several points of view. When Johnson & Johnson's Tylenol product was hit with the tampering scare, there is no question that the reaction of a lot of investors was negative.

Here was a company with a major product that suddenly the entire world was being told — by radio, newspaper and TV — might poison you if you used it. Certainly the normal reaction of an investor would be to recognize that the company was likely to have a period of trial and was likely to experiece some loss.

price than you did. And that is lesson number one for you to learn. If you are going to act on current

Some investors choose the companies they invest in because they have looked at them carefully and have come to the conclusion that they have superior management, a team that is more aggressive and more profitable than its competitors.

WHEN A company demonstrates to such investors that its management is growth-minded and has produced a superior record, the investors often decide to hold that kind of company as long as the management that produced that record is at the

When you own a company under that premise, you recognize that the management has done a pretty good job of solving problems in the past, and consequently it is likely to continue to do so in the future.

You would have reasoned in Johnson & Johnon's case that its manage-

# Big business, big labor set Michigan's economic agenda

AP - Michigan, more than many states, is a place where big business

is king. Elsewhere in the nation, the voice that states the public agenda and expresses public aspirations may belong to a politician, or to a citizens group, or even a newspaper.

Michigan, though, marches to other voices, such as the soft, grand-fatherly discourse of Roger Smith, chairman of General Motors Corp., or the smooth, imperial statements of Lee Iacocca, Chrysler Corp. chair-

Dow Chemical Co. of Midland, Upjohn Co. of Kalamazoo, Kellogg Co. of Battle Creek, and Whirlpool Corp. of Benton Harbor lack the overwhelming clout of the automakers, but they dominate their regions and have made an indelible imprint

on life in their headquarters cities. Big labor, through the voice of the Combative president of the United Auto Workers union, Owen Bieber, acts as a center of power unrivaled by many governments within this nation as a result of its ties to big business.

THE GIANTS of Michigan business and labor, in a tangible sense, have it within their capability to decree boom or bust for large sections of the American economy.

Their power is fundamental, dealing as it does with the economic fabric of our lives. Other issues pale to relative insignificance in comparison with that of which Michigan's business-labor establishment is an arbiter: Do we prosper or does the wolf come snuffling around the

Given the scope and nature of that power, the marbled edifices of Washington seem like a lackluster side show compared with the assembly lines in the main tent.

Washington's issues are big - war in Nicaragua, trade sanctions against the Japanese chip-makers, Star Wars and the anti-ballistic-missile pact with the Soviets - but they seem curiously remote from our lives in Michigan.

Of what importance are they, really, to Traverse City and Escanaba?

Riegle and the 18 men representing Michigan in the House of Represent-atives, although undoubtedly powerful officials, are part of a group. The chairmen of Michigan's big business-es can rule their establishment with an iron fist. CONGRESS' GRASP on the na-CONGRESS' GRASP on the nation's purse-strings gives each member influence over the amount of outside money pumped into his or her district. Each, through his or her participation in the lawmaking process, can help swing the nation from open markets to protectionism, from low taxes to high taxes, and from a budget deficit to a budget surplus, with far-reaching effects in Michigan.

Even when Rep. William Broomfield, a suburban Detroit Republican, tosses gentle questions at witnesses in Congress' Iran-Contra probe, he has a measure of power through the controversy's likely effect on the 1968 presidential election.

If the Democrats win, we'll have one set of policies that will mold the environment within which Michigan's big businesses and big unions operate. If the Republicans win, we'll have another set, and our lives will be different as a result.

# **Defeat of Midland** puts Salem in final

Plymouth Salem coach Ken Johnson was spared the Gatorade dunking, a la Bill Parcells and the New York Giants, during his soccer team's post-game celebration Wednesday.

But Johnson might have welcomed the ice-water treatment after the Rocks endured high temperatures and a burning sun to defeat Midland 3-0 in a Class A girls semifinal game at Brighton High School.

The victory gives Salem its first appearance in the state championship game.

The Rocks, who boast a 16-2-2 record, will meet Western Lakes rival Livonia Churchill at 1 p.m. Saturday at Northville. In the other semifinal, Churchill defeated No. 1ranked Troy Athens 2-1 in a shootout Wednesday.

To compensate for the hot, humid conditions, Johnson broke from the tradition of playing a standard lineup and substituted more frequently. As a result, Salem's bench played an important role in maintaining the Rocks' game-long initiative on offense and wearing down the Chem-

"WE KNOW WE can go about five players deep, and we had every line covered with at least one starter," Johnson said.

'We have quite a few players who could start on any other team. Some teams get to the 12th man and they're a little weak."

Salem controlled the tempo of play for all but a few instances and clearly outplayed Midland. Midland had trouble getting the ball past the Rocks' defense, led by Jennifer Marshall, Maria Wordhouse, Jennifer



# Local favorite settles for 2nd in bike race

You could hear the disappointment in his voice and see it in his face.

Sitting in the interview area a few moments after Saturday's first ever Nabisco Mayor's Cup criterium world-class bike race in downtown Birmingham, Tom

chuler talked slowly and softly about his near triumph. Schuler captured a second-place silver medal although he was pedalling strictly for gold. It was a tough outcome for the 1974 Birmingham Seaholm graduate who wanted badly to score a triumph in front of his family and friends, not to mention the estimated 5,000

ometown spectators fencing the half-mile course.

"If I had won today I would have thrown my arms 20 feet in the air as I crossed the (finish) line," said Schuler, who graduated from Birmingham Seaholm High School in 1974. "This was my homecoming. There was a little extra pressure here and added incentive.

"I knew the course well and I had a lot of friends out there cheering me on . . . I could hear them on every lap," he said. "It's good to be on the podium (receiving a medal), but it would have been nicer to win."

Schuler, a 30-year-old standout biker for the 7-Eleven team racing in his native city for the first time as a professional, didn't disappoint anyone with his effort.

CALIFORNIA'S DAN Franger, Washington's Tom Broznowski and Schuler broke from the pack of 40 riders about midway through the 76-lap men's race. The three bikers engaged in a strategic "chess match" for approximately 32 laps before Franger finally broke Schuler and Broznowski waged a war for second but neither could catch Franger, who crossed the finish line in a time of 1 hour, six minutes and 31 seconds. Schuler barely rode home in front of Broznowski in 1:06.32 m

Franger gon \$1,725 while Schuler took home \$1,075.
"Dan went for a prime (racers make money for winning designated laps, called primes) then just kept going," explained Schuler. "What happens a lot of times in a situation where there are three riders like that is you start watching one person and the other breaks away. That's what Dan did and we just let the gap get

too big.
"This race was more of a cat-and-mouse game than-I like, but that's sometimes what these races come down to." he said. "It could have turned out better for me, but I'll take second place on most days. At least it was an exciting race."

Schuler, a former Olympian, spends most of his time these days as a racer/manager of the 7-Eleven team. While he didn't take first place in the individual race, Schuler, Livonia's Jeff Pierce, Leonard Nitz and Alex Stieda combined for enough points to keep 7-Eleven atop the team standings. Pierce finished 15th overall in

THE WOMEN'S race was even more exciting, consider ering the hometown angle.

Two racers with Michigan roots - Connie Paraskey in-Young and Mindee Mayfield — finished with the gold and silver, respectively.

Paraskevin-Young won the 40-lap women's race in a time of 46:02 and took home \$650. Mayfield finished right behind and won \$425.

# B&B: It's like visiting an old friend

OR RAY Gage, publisher of Innsider Magazine, it means recapturing the deeper living values of an-

For readers who have visited the bed and breakfast establishmenta and historic inns of Michigan, it means many small but important things: fresh flowers or hand-made quilts in the guest room, breakfast with a family, tea in the garden, most of all the personal touch you get when you visit a friend.

That's what an inn was 150 years ago, not only a place to sleep but also a place to catch up on the news and meet new people. You wouldn't like the cornstalk

beds offered to travelers in the 19th century, or the fact that you shared a room with many other travelers, but you'll like them of a series

The great thing about visiting a historic inn or B&B in 1987 is that you are riding a time capsule back to an earlier American lifestyle and you are taking your modern bed and other 20th century conveniences with you. It is a good way to get in touch with our 150th birthday.

Innsider is a national magazine, but Gage's first issue had the Garfield Inn of Port Austin on the cover, and his June 1986 issue focused on Michigan. The Port Austin scene is a good example of B&B in Michigan.

ON ONE SIDE OF Lake Street, the three-story Garfield Inn rises above a green lawn, its red clap-board and white trim leading to a turreted roof line. James Garfield, who later became president of the United States, made an impassioned plea for the presidential bid of Ulysses S. Grand from the balcony of this home in 1869.

When I wandered in to take a look. I found guests gathered around a mahogany bar while the owners, Gary and Gayle Regnier, set the tables for dinner and organized a nighttime activity in the lounge. Upstairs, four-poster beds graced the guest rooms; a room with bath costs \$65 including breakfast.

ACROSS THE STREET is the Lake Street Manor, a beautiful twostory brick home built by a lumber baron in 1884 and now run as a bed a mason really knew how to lay and breakfast by Carolyn Greenwood. Room with bath ranges upward from \$55. You can stay upstairs in a nicely furnished bedroom, have breakfast in bed or downstairs, enjoy the Victorian garden or sit in the hot tub in the Bay Room.

The historic hotels are at least 50 years old, and have more than 21 rooms; this list includes one of the three sesquicentennial hotels that go back to 1837 or beyond: Botsford Inn, Farmington Hills. The other two are the Old Tavern Inn, Niles and National Inn, Marshall.

IT ALSO NAMES places like the Dearborn Inn, St. Clair Inn, Stafford's Bay View Inn in Petoskey, the Mayflower in Plymouth, the Grand Hotel and five others on Mackinac Island, and the Terrace Inn, Bay-

I'm looking forward to visiting the Terrace Inn, which has been bought and restored by Frank Shumway, who also owns the Birchwood Inn, Harbor Springs. Frank is a lawyer who got tired of the city. That's how many of the inns and B&B's are cre-

The state lists historic inns, eight to 20 guest rooms, separately. That includes the Garfield Inn and one of my favorites, the Hotel Frankfort in

This hotel and the Brookside Inn, Beulah, both owned by Kirk Lorenz, have large individualized rooms with 7-by-7-by-3-foot Polynesian spa tubs and lots of other funky extras. Lorenz incidentally is formerly of Plymouth.

The term "historic inn" also includes several places I have heard good things about: i.e. the Wickwood Inn in Saugatuck, the Last Resort in South Haven, the Victorian Villa in

thy's Bear Creek Inn in Marshall. "At Bear Creek, we usually stay in the Library Room which has a bay window that overlooks the creek at Bear Creek." She also visited and thinks highly of the Winchester Inn.

Mary Monroe of Livonia is especially fond of the Leelanau Count Inn in Maple City near Leland, which is in the state's inn section and the Jolli Inn, on nearby Lake Leelanau. The Jolli has six rooms and two apartments in the main lodge, and others in cottages.

"Each cottage is furnished, clean, stocked with dishes and cooking utensils. All you bring are sheets and towels," she said.

Jolli Lodge was also mentioned by Miriam Luttermoser of Livonia, whose brother Keith Jolliffe is the owner. Thee Jolliffs also are former Plymouth residents.

Jolli may not be what some people think of as a B&B. It is not listed among the 24 pages of bed and breakfast lodgings in the state book. but B&B operators like Andrea Casteel of the Stuart Avenue Inn, Kalamazoo, doesn't want travelers to focus too much on that book anyway.

Andrea, and Pam O'Connor of the Hall House, Kalamazoo, have organized the Lake to Lake Bed & Breakfast Association, which has members all over the state. Among their members, I found many bed and breakfast places that were recommended to me by other people, but were not listed elsewhere.

Bev Sharrette, formerly of Farmington Hills, had nice things to say, for example, about the Boulevard Inn in Tecumseh. I have also heard great things about the Riverside Inn, which serves a fish boil and other interesting outdoor meals to guests and the public in Leland.

# Copper Country: Michigan's El Dorado

O THOSE who squint at maps, the outline of Michigan's Upper Peninsula resembles a rabbit bounding westward. Its nose reaches for Wisconsin, forelegs are down in Menominee, ears bend together into Lake Superior to form the Keweenaw Peninsula.

Maybe the ears will look like a horn to you, but that's Copper Country, a scenic Michigan region totally unlike the soft glens of the Irish Hills

or orchardlands of Traverse, and and ridges, eroded remnants of what looking a bit different to everyone they once were. who goes there.

lake may crash moodily against rough rock formations nicknamed "Devil's Bathtub," etc., or it may gently lap a beach of singing sand. Hilltops and forested vistas remind visitors of the Smokey Mountains, with the wide blue horizons of Superior as a bonus

SOME OF THE oldest stone surfaces on earth are part of the cliffs

There are two state parks, a state university, a restored fort, lighthouses, Maine-like harbors, Along this curving coast a great ghost towns, waterfalls, a dozen inland lakes, an airport with scheduled flights, friendly people and a city that came close to being chosen the state capital.

And there is history. One-hundredfifty years ago this northern treasure became part of our state, just as Michigan was ushered into the Union. In settling a land squabble with Ohio, Congress favored the Buckeyes over the Wolverines, then tried to soothe ruffled feathers by granting Michigan additional land along the coast of Lake Superior. Only geologists and a few others were pleased. The rest sneered at Washington treachery.

Houghton didn't wait long to be proven correct. Six years before the discovery of gold at Sutter's Mill in California, our "useless" wilderness addition was being invaded with the same fervor that sent the '49ers west. Lodes of the purest copper ever found were once sandwiched in the rock strata, and their discovery brought speculators, mushroom boom towns, wild times and a rush of hopeful immigrants from the mines of Europe.

IN TIME, THE income produced outdid the El Dorados of the west. Central, Phoenix, Ameek, Mohawk. Almost all the names on the Keweenaw map began with a mine shaft. In spite of porch additions and a variety of color trims, you know by identically pitched roofs which communities started off as company

Stumbling into the bits and pieces of Keweenaw's history via ghost towns and logging trails is part of the visitor's fun.

The peninsula's Main Street is U.S. 41, an artery extending from Miami, Fla., to a mile past Copper Harbor, Michigan's northernmost village. Forty-one curves around the end of Keweenaw Bay, up through Chassell (site of a July Strawberry Festival) then along Portage Lake where strange gray sand is a reminder of the 10 copper stamping mills once operating here. Not awfully nice to

Houghton and Hancock, metro center for the region, perch across from each on hillsides steep enough to compete with San Francisco. Between them Portage Lake, very narrow and looking more like a river, once saved freighters the time and dangers of going around the peninsula's tip. Browse through the magnificent Seaman Mineral Museum at Michigan Technological University or watch the good ship Ranger II head through the lift bridge on its way to Isle Royale.

NEAR HANCOCK, home of historic Suomi College and hard-to-find courses in Finnish, the Arcadian Mine gives guided tours from mid-June to October. You are taken down to see how they operated and given enough data to emerge grateful for a desk job near a window.

U.S. 41 zigzags through Hancock's steep streets, curves out for a scenic MI 49801. 906-774-5480.

overlook and passes close to a Copper Country monument atop the hill. A hulk, a wreck, an unintended logo of the region is the giant rusting shaft house of Quincy Number Two

It is one of the most-photographed relics of the north. Do NOT enter. Just how deep those old mines were is best told right next door, the steam hoist mechanism, open for summer viewers, was capable of lowering and raising men and ore a distance greater than 10 stacked Renaissance Centers.

In Calumet a must-see is the restored Opera House, where Sarah Bernhardt, Jenny Lind, Caruso, et al. performed back when the city bubbled with 45,000 residents. Calumet once had a higher tax base than Detroit, and many thought it should be the state capital. Ask about Calumet's walking tour, "A Step in Time," brochure/map available from the Chamber of Commerce.

Past towns and old mine sites, the road burrows and winds through a 10-mile tunnel of trees on its way to Copper Harbor. Lake Medora, site of bass conventions, will be on the left. A little farther the Keweenaw Mountain Lodge, a county-operated hostelry and one of this writer's favorite get-away spots, will be nearly hidden in the pines on the right.

THE INVITING log Lodge, built by unemployed miners, has one of the largest stone fireplaces, warmest dining room in the state and offers a rare nine-hole golf course plus private duplex cabins close to Copper Harbor and the start of Brockway Mountain Drive. You might think the road was the product of a roller coaster design shop, but hang in there. The top of Brockway offers a view that will rearrange your ideas of Michigan.

In Copper Harbor: motels, restaurants, rock shops, a boat across the inlet to the lighthouse museum, sunset cruises on the "Island Queen," day trips to Isle Royale. Go beyond town to Fort Wilkins State Park, where a restored military post has tours and talks all summer. Campers should approach early in the day, as the popular park fills up quickly.

The road to Bete Gris ends on beaches so dry the sand squeaks. On the other side of the peninsula, M-26 twists like a corkscrew next to the rocky shore, offering scenic lookouts and places to hunt agates as it goes to Eagle Harbor and Eagle River. E.H. has a splendid little bay and beach for swimming, if you can tolerate the abysmal cold of Lake Supe-

ANY NATIVE WILL provide a longer list of roads to explore, trails to hike, where to find thimbleber-

Considering the iron ranges, copper mines and today's vacation pleasures, when Congress gave us the front end of the rabbit, they made Michigan richer than anyone's wildest dreams.



OUIS REDSTONE remembers the first office. It was a second floor walkup on Woodward Avenue. Rent was \$25 a month. Riva, his sister, was bookkeeper and brother Solomon handled contracting.

"It was a family business," said Louis Redstone.

Redstone is celebrating 50 years as an architect. He is a man

worth celebrating. Six hundred people will do just that tomorrow at Louis G. Redstone's Associates handsome and modern Livonia office.

The new office is larger and more modern than the Woodward walkup but his is still a family business. Son Daniel Redstone is president, and nephew Samuel Redstone is secretary. Another son, Eliel, is an architect in San Francisco.

Louis, 84, says he works now more as a consultant for his firm. "I still think we are on the threshold of new things," Louis

said of the firm. He is a painter and sculptor and has always mixed art and architecture. He is supporter and organizer of the arts. He has written five books, some with his wife Ruth.

Their comprehensive book called "Public Art" describes works from across the world. Redstone has traveled to nearly every country in the world.

His building designs are many

National Bank building on Fort Street and Cass Avenue with its extensive exterior stone carvings; the Berry International Terminal at Detroit Metropolitan Airport; and Somerset and Westland malls.

He has designed dozens of schools and about 100 bank branches. The first bank was a drive up on Vernor. His latest bank building, also for Manufac-turers, is at Six Mile and Haggerty in Livonia.

"We are very proud that our customers stayed with us."

REDSTONE WAS BORN in Grodno, Poland. He came to America in 1923 and graduated from the University of Michigan architecture school in 1929, the year the stock market crashed. He worked for a year for architect Albert Kahn's firm in Detroit.

In 1934 he went to Palestine and opened an office in Tel Aviv. He knew many American architects who were forced to leave their profession during the depression. Redstone says he was lucky to keep working.

"I felt if you interrupt your career, you really lose it," he said.

In Palestine he built settlements, doing everything from designing to cutting stone and digging ditches. He helped build the Palestine Pavilion for the 1937 World's Fair in Paris.

### **Close friends**

Samuel Cashwan and Louis Redstone have been friends for 60 years.

Cashwan was an instructor at the Detroit School for Arts and Crafts in 1927 when the two first met. They discussed art and architecture. Cashwan offered Redstone space in his studio and encouraged Redstone in his sculpting.

Redstone commissioned Cashwan sculptures for Redstone's buildings. The most recent example is a seven foot copper sculpture designed for the Redstone and Associates building in Livonia.

Redstone has organized a retrospective show of Cashwan's work that opened this week at the Center for Creative Studies, the modern version of the Detroit School for Arts and Crafts.

Cashwan was born in Russia. He is now in his 90s and sculpting in North Carolina. He was expected in Detroit yesterday for the show's reception, and in Livonia tomorrow for the Redstone celebration.

The Cashwan show features 14 pieces on loan from the collections of Redstone and the Detroit Institute of Arts. The show is free and open to the public Monday to Thursday through Aug. 17.

# Artist shifts gears, cuts loose

OM HALE, WHO CLOSED the door of his office at American Motors for the last time almost two years ago to become a full-time artist, said, "I love it.

"I've never felt better in my life. Virtually everything I do has a purpose to it. It's nice to devote all of your time to creating something. Freedom of choice - it's hard to put a price on that, it's the most valuable thing in my life."

He is relaxing in the living room of his Farmington Hills home where he has his studio, resting his feet, in deck shoes, comfortably on the broad wooden block coffee table.

His wife, Mickey, is making coffee. Sidonia, the long-haired gray cat, who travels with them to art shows around the country, is curled


up beside him on the couch. His paintings cover the walls of

the house. While he may be most familiar as an artist who does paintings of cars, his range of subiects covers a good portion of the American scene.

His paintings of cars are a world apart from the common catalogue variety. Hale zeroes on the romance, the beauty, the wizardry and excitment of the automobile at its zenith. In them he balances his expertise in technical and design detail with his substantial skills as an impressionist painter.

IN THE FRONT HALL, in a gold frame matted in rich yellow ultra suede, is "Chrome," the watercolor which won the Gold Metal of Honor in the American Watercolor Society's 1980 exhibit in New York City. It was reproduced on the cover of Yankee magazine that same year. This, like many others, is available as a limited edition print.

Just this spring Hale reached a goal he had been working toward

for 13 years. He was one of six artists from North America selected for membership in the prestigious American Watercolor Society, AWS, whose total membership is less that 550. His painting, "High Winds," was a medal winner in the

Society's show at the Salmagundi Club of New York City which closed earlier this month.

He maintained the combination of designer in the auto industry and freelance artist for 13 years.

"I never planned on being an artist," he said, "I always wanted to be a car designer," he paused and then continued, "but, not being used creatively made me very restless. To release that creativity, I just started painting. It became a release for me and gradually it took on a life of its own. I was never planning a second career. Automotibles always fascinated me since I was nine years old, there was nothing I wanted to be but an automobile designer."

HE SMILED AS HE considered the paradox, "Now, I find that everything I do with art, which I never planned, has been exciting and enjoyable.'

throes of creativity, exhaust ourselves quite often. But new artists may lose interest in art altogether if they struggle through even one of two works of art.

BY WORKING ON two or three pieces at the same time, you can push yourself through the "MTF" syndrome without really knowing it.

For example, I am building a prototype of a new toy for a toy compathe prototype aside and work on a full-figure soutpture that needs quite-a bit of detailing. Often I will aban-don both and work on a painting and before the night is over, I find I'm back sanding or detailing the proto-

type.

It's true that most of what I work on is commissioned work, but let me say, the thrill of a commission quickly fades in the (you guessed it) middle two feet.

So go easy on yourself. If you are painting and it is at the laborious state, then labor a little and then start a watercolor. Have a colored pencil in the works and do some pencil sketches while you relax. Remember you have to motivate yourself and you are the first to notice the subtle shift from leisure to labor.

He returned to Detroit that year to continue his career. By then he had learned all facets of the building and design business.

He tells a story: Once when checking the construction of a building he designed in Highland Park, he spotted a bricklayer doing sloppy work on an archway. The man challenged Redstone to do better. Redstone climbed the scaffold and set the bricks properly.

The worker could not believe an architect could lay bricks, Redstone said.

"He was so mad, he took off his overalls and stormed off to a bar to get drunk."

BUT ART HAS been his passion through the years. He has spread art liberally through his designs from schools to shopping malls. "As far as buildings were concerned, I was always in touch with artists," he said.

In 1927, he met sculptor Samuel Cashwan at the Detroit School for Arts and Crafts, predecessor of Center for Creative Studies. Cashwan offered Redstone space in his studio and helped him with his sculpting. The two have been friends for 60 vears now.

Cashwan sculptures were done for Redstone's buildings. Cashwan's sculpture, "Noah and the Bird" was done for Redstone's 50-year career anniversary. The piece will be dedicated in a ceremony Friday.

Redstone's design of shopping malls is especially infused with art. There is a reason. "What better place could there be to expose droves and multitudes of people to art?" Redstone asked.

Other Redstone designs include the Jewish Community Center in West Bloomfield, the new Metrovision building in Livonia, and the Buell Building on the Lawrence Institute of Technology

Redstone Associates also has designed the new Stroh's development, River Place, and Grand Traverse Village near Traverse City.

Redstone lives on Detroit's west side in one of three houses he designed, complete with studio and skylight. His brother lives in another of the
