Papal organizer

Priest guides visit of U.S. deacons

George Charnley left his engineering job to become a priest and 11 years later he's engineering the pope's visit Saturday with deacons from across the U.S. But then the massive undertaking couldn't be too much for a man who lightheartedly discusses leaving his 10-year job at Ford Motor Co. for the priesthood because, "Ford always says they have a better idea. Well, I had a better idea."

The pastor of St. John Neumann Catholic Church in Canton started planning for the papal visit last

February. He attended weekly meetings to guarantee every minute is accounted for from 10:05 to 11:20 a.m. when the pope is at Ford Auditorium.

HIS WORRIES as the Ford Auditorium site coordinator went further to consider the deacons' stay. They are scheduled to arrive at 7 a.m. and leave at 1 p.m. after watching the pope deliver his speech at Hart Plaza via television. There were an infinite number of small details that consumed time, like contacting the catering company for the doughnuts and coffee, meeting with other site coordina-

tors to make sure everything pieces together and understanding the interaction with security people, to name a few.

All this added responsibility comes in the midst of an already hectic time.

Charnley, 46, was named pastor of St. John Neumann in March after serving 4½ years as pastor at St. Dunstan in Garden City. He was given the papal coordinating job because he serves as director of the deacon program for the Archdiocese of Detroit.

Stahl plans no layoffs after recent sale

No layoffs are planned at Stahl Manufacturing Co. in Plymouth and Redford after plants there were acquired earlier this month by Columbus (Ohio) Auto Parts Inc., a company spokesman said.

"We're not planning on reducing the size of the operation," said John Salvette, recently named vice president and chief financial officer for Stahl Manufacturing.

"I think it was getting too big for him (B.J. Stahl) to manage and this was a good opportunity in time to bring in Columbus Auto Parts with management expertise to bring further growth in business."

About 250 work at both the Redford plant on Woodbine and the Plymouth plant on Junction and less than 50 at Better Built Box Co. on

Farmer in Plymouth, said Al Snyder, administrative assistant for Stahl Manufacturing.

"We're going to try to put more sales in existing facilities," Salvette said. "We have no intentions at this time of shutting any plants down. Our intent is to get more sales and we're confident we can do that with existing facilities and equipment."

STAHL AND Better Built plus Patterson Lake Products of Pinckney, Junction Manufacturing of Rives Junction, and Moeke Brothers Logging of Mancelonia had been owned by members of the Stahl family.

Purchase price of the five companies to Columbus Auto Parts wasn't disclosed.

Stahl Manufacturing was founded 46 years ago by its current presi-

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Residents seek tax for parkland

Some Lakepointe Subdivision residents want Plymouth Township to buy 32 acres of vacant land at Haggerty and Schoolcraft roads and develop another township park.

About 30 people are circulating petitions calling for a property tax increase of 3½ mills (\$3.50 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation) for two years to accomplish that goal, according to organizer Loraine Potochick.

They hope to submit 507 valid signatures to Esther Hulsing, township clerk, in time to qualify for the Nov. 3 ballot.

MEIJER INC. has an option to buy that property on which it proposes to build a 207,000-square-foot retail store. The parcel is owned by a construction company.

The township planning commission was expected to give a recom-

mendation yesterday (Wednesday) on a rezoning request that would allow Meljer to proceed.

Zoning regulations, designed to promote orderly growth, determine how land may be used. The township board rules on rezoning requests.

"We thought we have a desirable alternative," Potochick said. "With a township park there, it may lead to other rezonings for residential, apartments or houses, and not commercial or industrial."

"I know it's an unrealistic thought to know everything will always remain the same. We want the community as a whole to decide, not just a handful of people," she added.

The 32-acre parcel at Haggerty and Schoolcraft has been appraised at \$2.5 million, Potochick said.

A tax increase of 3.5 mills for two years would raise enough money to buy the land and leave about \$94,000

Fund-raisers seek \$425,000 for charity

The board of directors for the Plymouth Community Fund/United Way has set a fund-raising goal this fall of \$425,000 — \$25,000 more than was targeted during the 1986 campaign.

The annual drive began yesterday and continues through the end of November.

Marcia Buhl, chairwoman of this year's campaign, and Clarence DuCharme, the fund's executive director, both are confident that people will respond generously.

"I've found . . . there are a lot of people concerned and committed to the United Way drive," Buhl said.

"We probably have the first or second per capita contribution for any United Way community our size in Michigan," DuCharme added.

ORGANIZATIONS supported by locally generated money and their allocations from this year's campaign include:

- Plymouth Family Service, a counseling agency, \$83,850.
- Growth Works, an agency that deals with problems of youth including drug dependency and delinquency, \$83,600.

- Plymouth Salvation Army, \$45,000.

- Huron Valley Girl Scout Council and Detroit Area Council Boy Scouts of America, \$42,900.

- Plymouth Community Family YMCA, \$21,500.

The Plymouth Community Fund also has allocated \$36,000 to the United Way of Michigan, an umbrella agency of 26 other non-profits.

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Winter school levy OK'd

Even though all communities in Plymouth-Canton Community Schools pay the same tax rate, Canton Township property owners will contribute the most to the school district.

Each community will pay 39.02 mills but Canton will pay more collectively because property value within its limits is higher. In total the district will collect \$45.2 million in property taxes for 1987.

Taxes are levied on half the property's market value, or on its assessed value. For instance, an owner of property with market value of \$100,000 has an assessed value of \$50,000 that is multiplied by the 39.02-mill tax rate on a per thousand basis. (A mill is equal to \$1 of tax for each \$1,000 of assessed value.) That property owner will pay \$1,951 in school taxes annually.

THIS IS THE breakdown of how much each community will kick into the school district's budget:

- Canton Township, with a state

equalized valuation of \$519 million, will contribute \$20 million.

- Plymouth Township, with an SEV of \$443 million, will contribute \$17 million.

- City of Plymouth, with an SEV of \$153 million, will contribute \$6 million.

- Other communities with portions of their limits in the district will contribute \$2.1 million, from totaled SEVs of \$43 million.

The Plymouth-Canton Board of Education unanimously approved the 1987 winter tax levy at Monday's meeting.

The district missed out on \$1.2 million that would have been generated from state aid and property taxes if a waiver of the Headlee Amendment had been approved by voters during two elections earlier this year.

The 39.02-mill tax rate for this year is 0.98 mills lower than the 1986 levy because of the Headlee waiver defeat.

The Headlee Amendment requires a vote of the people before a unit of government can collect more money from an SEV that increases more than the rate of inflation. If voters

disapprove, the tax rate has to be lowered.

THE HEADLEE WAIVER defeat resulted in a \$1 million cutback in proposed budgets "throughout the entire district," said Diane Barnes, Plymouth-Canton district director of finance.

Some of the areas affected included administration, educational aids, text books, capital outlay, maintenance and operation, transportation, security, block grants, athletics and community education.

The preliminary 1987-88 school year budget is earmarked for \$55 million, Barnes said. Last year the budget was \$53 million.

Even though the Headlee waiver failed, the amount of money the district expects to receive will be higher than last year due to higher property values. The exact amount of the increase is not yet tabulated, Barnes said.

"But our costs have gone up," Barnes said. Supplies, fringe benefits, utilities and labor are major areas that will cost the district more this year, she said.

School board buys 2 lots for possible expansion

School officials say they're keeping their options open on what to do with two lots the schools are buying near the administration building.

The school board unanimously agreed Monday to buy two lots adjacent to the administration building on Harvey south of Ann Arbor Trail.

The \$225,000 purchase — including two houses — comes in the midst of discussions on how and where to house the central offices.

THREE PLANS still exist for housing the central administration: Either expand the present location,

construct a building site elsewhere or buy an existing building elsewhere.

The purchase will make staying at the present location a more viable alternative, said Ray Hoedel, associate superintendent for business.

Because insufficient parking is a common complaint, the additional 17,825-square-foot lots could be used for adding spaces as well as expanding the building for office area, he said.

School board members debated the effect it would have on the central offices options.

Board president David Artley said even if the district doesn't use the land to expand the administration building, the purchase is a good investment.

"The price is extremely reasonable in terms of the current market value. This does not preclude the building of a new building. No, absolutely not. The options are all still open."

Dean Swartzweiler, board member, said the alternatives are still in the running. He added, however, the "present location has serviced the district well."

EVEN THOUGH HE admitted the added responsibilities were great, Charnley wouldn't have passed on the opportunity.

"It's a once-in-a-lifetime chance — the pope will never come to Detroit again," he said and paused. "At least not in our lifetime. It's exciting to be a part of something unique to the country and to the Archdiocese of Detroit."

The pope's willingness to meet with the deacons has "enhanced the deaconate community's effort to come together."

Many people mistakenly think deacons are "mini priests," Charnley said.

"It's a separate order. They're

ordained ministers of God. And they're a vital sign to people in the work place because people can approach them."

Deacons usually work a full-time job and volunteer between five and 20 hours weekly to the ministry. Their duties include serving as "ministers of the service," like working in hospitals and visiting the sick; "ministers of the word," proclaiming the gospel; and "ministers of prayer," Charnley said.

MANY DEACONS are married and have studied about six years part time to become a deacon, Charnley said.

He emphasizes the volunteer help that went into preparations

for the pope's visit, especially the work of Leo Bistak, a deacon at St. Rene Goupil in Sterling Heights and assistant Ford Auditorium site coordinator.

"There's been a lot of long hours and a lot of hard work by volunteers in the deaconate community of Detroit. The preparation is amazing and all the volunteers are amazing."

What would Charnley, who has seen the pope twice during general audiences in Rome, say if he had an unexpected moment to chat with Pope John Paul during this week-end's visit?

He paused a moment, and said: "Thank you for recognizing the permanent deaconate and the role they play in the church of the U.S."

"Stahl Manufacturing has long been a respected name in the automotive industry," Smith said. "This company is a big part in our strategy to become the leading supplier of forged components to the auto industry."

COLUMBUS AUTO PARTS, founded in 1912, is a minority-owned company, according to Salvette's press release.

Smith acquired majority interest earlier this year, Salvette said.

Michigan Cancer Foundation, the American Red Cross, Visiting Nurses Association, First Step, and Big Brothers/Big Sisters.

THE PLYMOUTH Community Fund, established in 1944, pre-dates the United Way of Michigan.

"A group of community leaders felt all human needs of the community weren't being met," Buhl said. The Plymouth Community Fund/

United Way and the United Foundation of metropolitan Detroit don't fight with each other over money, Buhl and DuCharme said.

Individuals who live in Plymouth but work in a United Foundation-serviced community can designate that their contribution go to the Plymouth Community Fund or even designate a specific agency serviced by either fund.

The same holds true for people who work here and live elsewhere.

for park development, she said.

The money would be collected in 1989 and 1990.

The owner of a house with a market value of \$100,000 could expect to pay an additional \$175 in property taxes for two years if the increase were to pass.

"Maybe it isn't too much to preserve a corner and do something beneficial to the neighborhood," Pototichick said. "We know it's a long

shot. Our time is limited. We're going to give it our best shot."

THE TOWNSHIP owns a large park and golf course at Ann Arbor Trail and McClumpha Road.

By law, ballots must be available 20 days before a special election, Hulsing said.


She said she'd like to have this and all other petitions submitted by the end of the month to allow time to check signatures, enable the township's attorney to review ballot lan-

guage, and make printing arrangements.

Pototichick said Monday she hoped to submit the petitions Wednesday.

Township voters already will face one proposal in November — a tax increase from 80 cents to \$1.20 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation for extended hours and more books at the Dunning-Hough Library.

It's also likely, Hulsing said, that a separate proposal asking for a tax hike of \$2 per \$1,000 of SEV for two years to build and operate a township pool will make the ballot.



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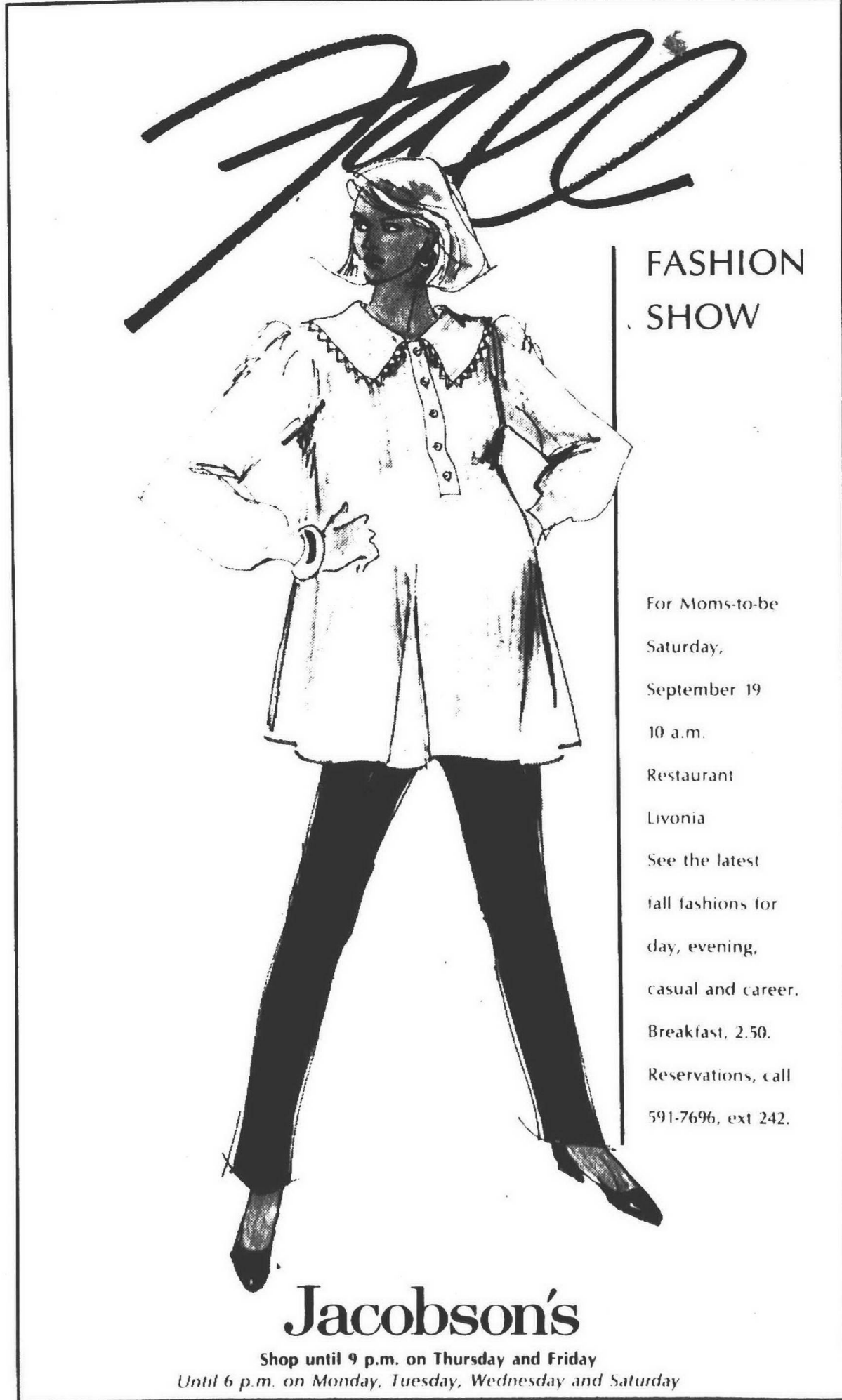
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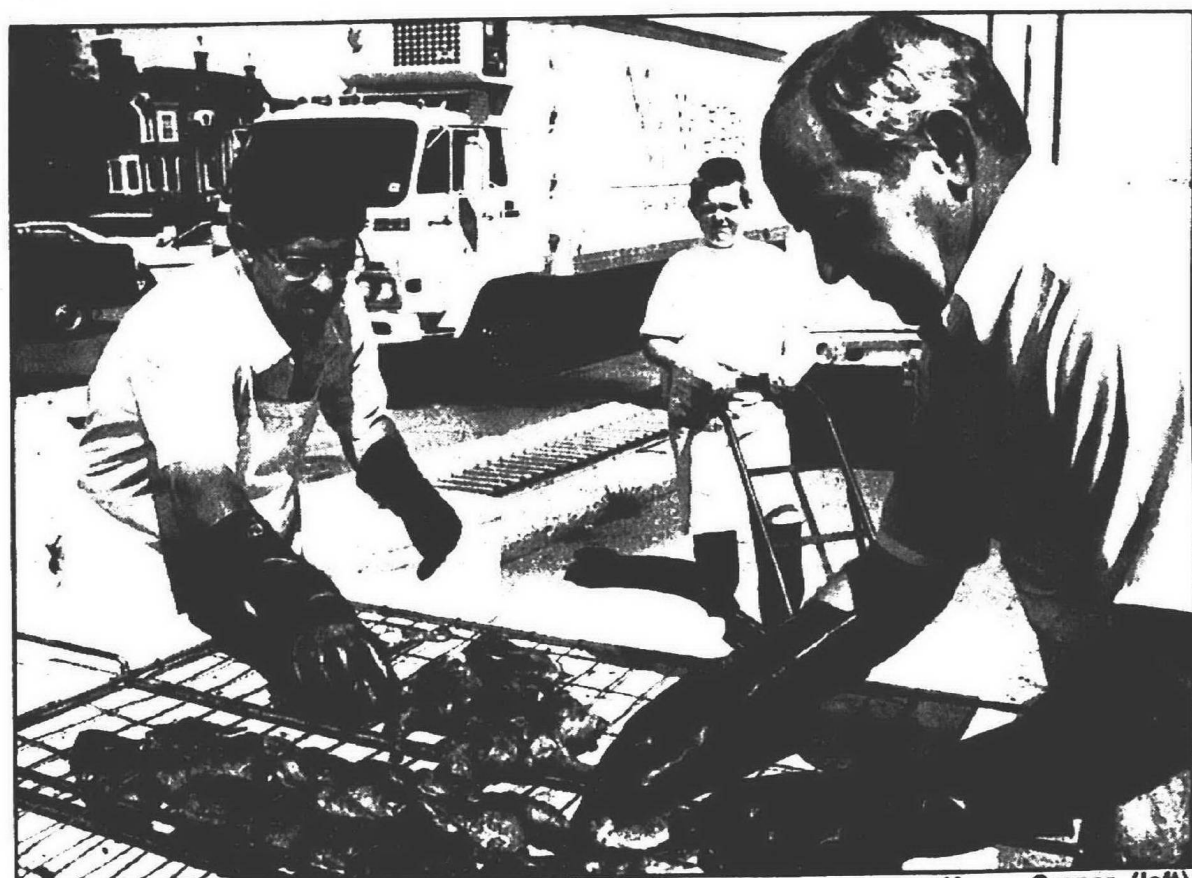

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National Merit semifinalists

Six seniors attending Plymouth-Canton Community Schools are among 15,000 students nationwide who have been named semifinalists in the 33rd annual Merit Program of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation. The semifinalists will continue in the 1988 competition for about 6,000 Merit Scholarships worth more than \$23 million. More than 1 million students from some 19,000 high schools entered the current Merit program by taking a qualifying test in 1986 when they were juniors. Semifinalists represent about half of 1 percent of each state's graduating class. Plymouth Canton High seniors named semifinalists are Roshani B. Cowmeadow, Minal Hajratwala, Daniel J. Ream and Evan K. Young. Plymouth Salem High semifinalists are Lisa M. Brining and Laura J. Porterfield. About 90 percent of the semifinalists are expected to advance to finalist standing of which 44 percent will receive a scholarship. Announced this spring will be some 1,800 finalists who will earn \$2,000 Merit Scholarships, about 1,400 who will earn corporate scholarships from \$500 to \$8,000, and some 2,800 who will receive grants from colleges and universities ranging from \$250 to \$2,000. Since the program started in 1956 some 102,500 students have received merit scholarships totalling \$310 million.

Friends of the Rouge president James Murray is apparently under consideration for the soon-to-be-vacant post of Wayne County public works director.

"I've heard the rumors," he said. "I'll have something to say (this coming) Monday."



Sources close to the situation, however, said Murray will most likely be the one to replace division of public works chief James Hamilton, who will retire in November.

Michael Duggan, assistant county executive, confirmed that Murray has been interviewed by Wayne County Executive Edward McNamara and is being considered for the job. Duggan said a press conference to announce the new DPW director will be held sometime next week.

Murray has been drain commissioner since 1984. His term of office expires Dec. 31, 1988.

Though an elected official in Washtenaw County, Murray has been active in Wayne County through his work during Rouge River cleanup activities in 1986 and again last June.

Murray has been a central figure in Friends of the Rouge, the volunteer agency that coordinated cleanup activities.

He is also chairman of the Area-wide Water Quality Board and the Michigan Water Resources Commission.

Murray is an Ypsilanti Township resident.

The DPW oversees treatment and transmission of sewage from 34 Wayne County communities and five communities in adjacent counties. It operates the downriver, metro, northeast and Rouge Valley sewer systems.

It monitors compliance with federal Environmental Protection Agency standards, and industrial waste levels, administers construction grants and bond issues and reviews sewer rates.

The DPW maintains over 160 miles of sewers. It also operates the Wyandotte Wastewater Treatment Plant.

The DPW post is involved in planning the long-awaited "super sewer" that will serve much of western Wayne.

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Applicants already vying for park post

At least 20 applicants already are vying for the director's post of the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority, even though the director isn't retiring until early next year.

Director James Pompo said he has submitted a letter to the board of directors indicating he'll retire next March. Pompo accepted the post two years ago, at age 63, succeeding David Laidlaw.

John Hertel, chairman of the board and Wayne County representative, said he wouldn't be surprised if more than 100 people apply for the job. He said he's not

among the applicants.

"I'm new at Channel 7. I'm a producer here and I'm enjoying it very much. I'm not planning on anything like that."

Pompo confirmed that as of Monday, 20 candidates, including six insiders, had filed for his position. He said some outside candidates will be informally interviewed this Saturday in New Orleans during the National Parks and Recreation conference.

GREG ALMAS, the authority's personnel director, said he couldn't reveal the names of outside candidates without their prior consent because that might endanger their current positions. He also said he couldn't reveal the names of internal candidates because the position isn't posted yet.

"We only have these applications

because people know I'm in personnel and they get them to me. Revealing a partial list might cause more harm than good."

The position was advertised in the Job Mart Publication of the National Parks and Recreation Association, Pompo said. "What they're doing in New Orleans is going through to consider who will be final candidates," he added.

IF A MAJORITY of Huron-Clinton's seven-member board participates in the New Orleans interviews it would violate Michigan's Open Meetings Act, which says "meetings of a public body shall be available to the general public."

However, Almas said only two of the commissioners were attending the conference and would participate in the preliminary interviews.

Hertel, a co-sponsor of the act while he was a state senator, said the interviewing process is not a violation of the act.

"This is a good opportunity to do some exploratory type recruitment," Almas said of the New Orleans interviews. The board has not set up a formal interviewing process, he added.

The Huron Clinton Metropolitan Authority is named after the two longest rivers within its boundaries, which span Wayne, Washtenaw, Oakland, Macomb and Livingston counties. It operates 13 Metroparks within its boundaries. A 14th park, Wolcott in Macomb County, still is under construction and is open for group use only.

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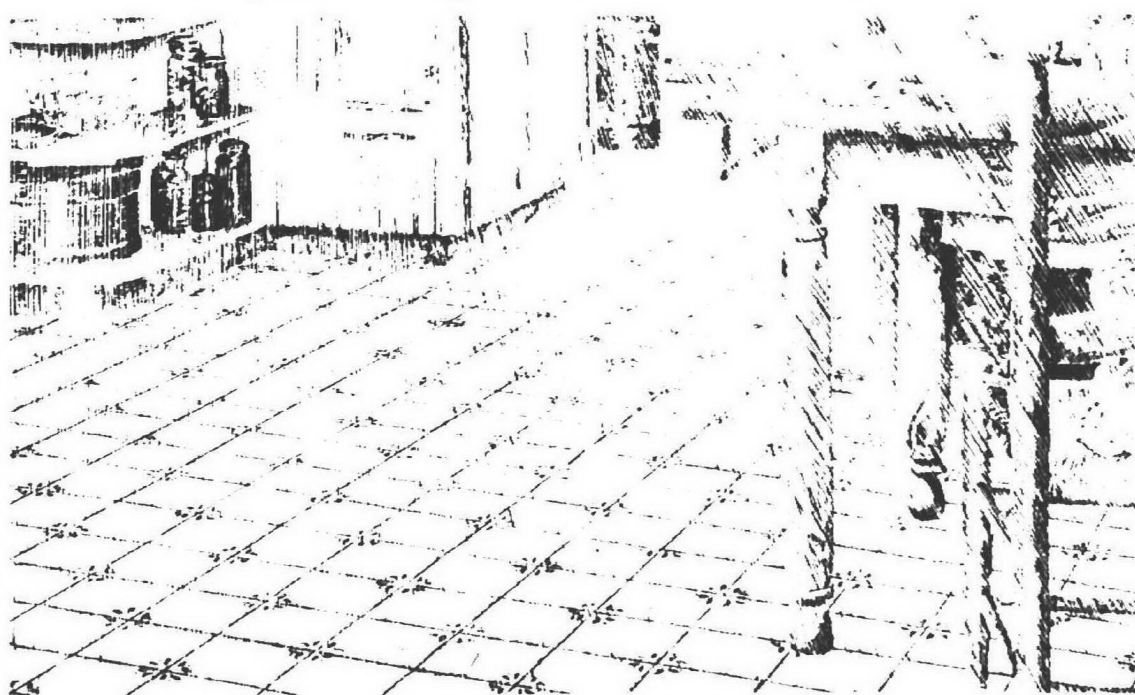

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Fall in Congress: stormy

AP — Michigan's congressional delegation is predicting the start of a stormy legislative session as Congress gets back from its summer vacation.

Congress started its recess last month with some weighty questions left hanging, including the authority of the government to borrow money to operate.

"By and large," said Rep. Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth, "it is going to be a debate and confrontational gridlock that we've got in trying to work out . . . the budget and how we're going to get the budget under control." Pursell is a deputy whip in the House Republican leadership.

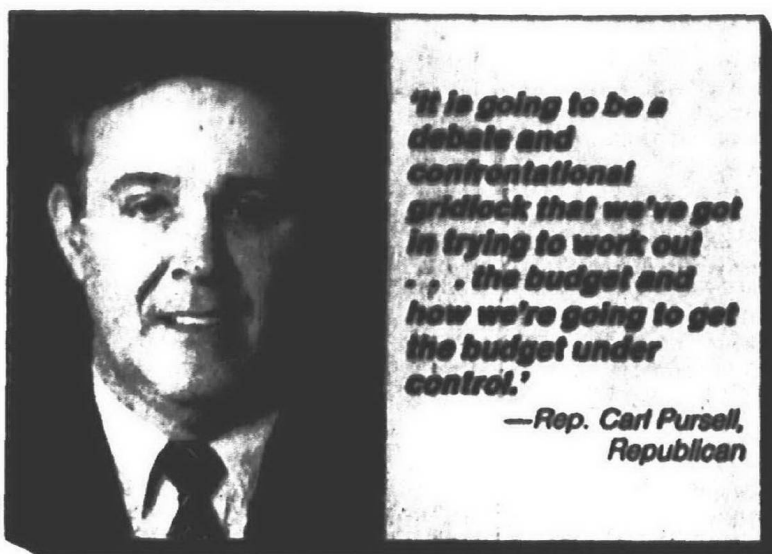
The House and Senate, mired in a dispute over how to revise ceilings on the federal deficit, at the last minute passed a resolution continuing borrowing authority through early October.

EACH HOUSE will be faced with the need to solve the budget question so permanent borrowing authority can be sent to the president for his signature.

Legislation to reduce the nation's trade deficit passed in widely different forms by the House and Senate must be reconciled through behind-the-scenes compromises in a committee composed of members from each body.

The trade bills have caused a split between hardliners, who want tough sanctions against countries that unfairly undercut American products in U.S. markets, and lawmakers favoring a more moderate approach.

Congress also will face the problem of reaching a compromise between House and Senate versions of

next year's budget, a process that historically has turned into a battleground between lawmakers seeking to protect programs affecting their districts from cuts designed to bring federal spending in line with its resources.

THE BILLS, for example, contain spending on defense projects affecting northern Michigan, including \$500,000 for research into Defense Department uses of wood, said Rep. Robert Davis, R-Gaylord.

To cover proposed spending next year, the House leadership before the recess was discussing the need to seek more revenue through a tax increase in one form or another, the

type of legislation difficult for the Congress to pass, particularly with a presidential election year looming.

"Each and every one of them are massive undertakings," said Rep. John Dingell, D-Trenton. He is chairman of the powerful House Energy and Commerce Committee.

"They will be done and, hopefully, with cooperation from the administration, although unlikely so," Dingell said.

Pursell, a moderate whose district includes part of Livonia, sees the polarization of left and right over budget issues as presenting an opportunity for "those of us in the middle trying to achieve some policy goals."

BUT DEMOCRATS in the Michigan delegation took a more pessimistic view, pointing to the White House as playing a spoiler role.

"The next few weeks are decision time," said Sen. Carl Levin, D-Mich. "Do the president and the Congress work together to fix (the budget ceilings) and then to agree on a package which seriously reduces the deficit? Or do they point fingers, assign blame and then only agree to muddle through until after the next presidential election?"

"I hope and will work for the former, but fear the latter," Levin said.

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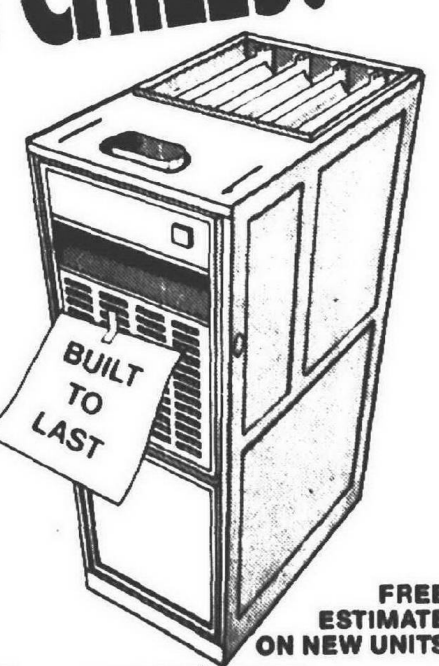

Hamtramck on Saturday and celebrate Mass for more than 90,000 people later that day at the Pontiac Silverdome. The visit also includes a welcome at Blessed Sacrament Cathedral and

an address on social justice at Hart Plaza. At 8:30 a.m. Saturday the pope is scheduled to travel by motorcade through the 2.1 square mile city of Hamtramck and give a short speech

in Polish at an open field near Joseph Campau and Hewitt. Behind him will hang Polish flags and banners and a reproduction of the painting of Our Lady of Czestochowa, an image of the Virgin Mary

At 10 a.m. the pope will address some 2,000 deacons and their wives at Ford Auditorium. At 11:35 a.m. Pope John Paul II will give an outdoor address on social justice, expected to be the highlight of his trip, at Hart Plaza.

Sabbath curbs area Jews visit with pope

Despite differences with papal policies, the Detroit Jewish community will not stage protests when Pope John Paul II comes to town. "American Jewish leaders met with the pope in Rome and agreed to future free and open discussions with the Vatican before our concerns become issues," said Alvin L. Kushner, executive director of the Jewish Community Council. The Jewish people were upset over the pope's audience in June with Austrian president Kurt Waldheim, who was accused of Nazi war crimes, Kushner said.

DIFFERENCES ALSO exist between Jews and the Vatican because of the latter's refusal to recognize the state of Israel and its apparent insensitivity to the Holocaust, he said.

"Because the pope's visit Sept. 18 and 19 falls on our Sabbath, the Archdiocese of Detroit did not invite Jewish dignitaries to the Hart Plaza or Pontiac Silverdome," Kushner said. "But Saturday night after the Sabbath, Jewish community leaders have been invited to the state department's gathering at the airport when the pope departs."

JEWISH GROUPS refused to participate in ceremonies during the pope's visit to Miami, Kushner said. The Southfield-based Detroit Zionist Federation, an umbrella organization of 19 Zionist groups and affiliates in the metropolitan area, acknowledges the mutual understanding that has existed for many years with the local Catholic community, said president Norman Naimark. "However, we find ourselves disappointed and pained at the pope's

recent meetings with Kurt Waldheim, at the Vatican's refusal to recognize the state of Israel and at the apparent lack of sensitivity to the Holocaust that killed a third of our people," Naimark said. "We hope that the pope will assert his moral leadership to isolate those associated with crimes against humanity and to give support to the survival of beleaguered Israel."

The Jewish Community Council's position is that there should be no link between troublesome world Jewish-Vatican relations and local Jewish-Catholic relations. That disagreement with papal policies shouldn't stand in the way of local dialogue, he said. The pope's short visit on the Sabbath precludes dialogue during that time, Kushner noted.

Administration spokespeople say its policy has steadily eroded Mozambique's alliance with Moscow.

Wells supporter Daniel Moynihan, D-N.Y., said closer American-Mozambican ties "have dealt the Soviet

CAMPAIGN FINANCE BILL — By a vote of 53 for and 42 against, the Senate failed to achieve the three-fifths majority needed to silence a GOP-led filibuster against legislation (S. 2) restructuring the financing of Senate campaigns.

This marked the sixth time this year the Senate has failed to end the talkathon and begin direct debate on the bill, which Democratic sponsors have gradually softened to win over opponents.

The bill provides discounts on campaign mailing and broadcast rates to Senate candidates who agree to limit spending and the amount of political action committee (PAC) money they receive. A candidate would receive public funding only if his or her opponent exceeded voluntary spending limits.

Supporter David Boren, D-Okla., said "we must not allow the highest positions of public trust in this land to be placed on the auction block for sale to the highest bidder."

Opponent Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., said the bill would "limit the freedom of expression and popular participation in government," and is "an entitlement program for politicians" in its public funding section.

Senators voting yes wanted to debate the campaign finance legislation.

Jackson: Drugs worse threat than Klan

Touching on campaign issues ranging from drugs to U.S. automotive jobs, the Rev. Jesse Jackson solidified support among 450 guests at a recent fund-raiser in the Bloomfield Hills home of singer Aretha Franklin.

"There has never been a greater threat to our nation since slavery," Jackson said of the nation's drug problem. "Even when blacks and Jews were being lynched by the Ku Klux Klan, we at least knew who the enemies were because of their hooded costumes."

Jackson is one of several Democratic candidates for next year's

presidential election. He lost his primary run-off in the 1984 campaign to Walter Mondale. "In the last primary election Mondale won with 6.7 million votes. Blacks gave him 4 million more than he got from the rest of the nation in November," Jackson said.

ONE OF Jackson's acknowledged 1984 campaign problems was appealing directly to voters instead of working with local elected officials. This time, Jackson said his popularity has increased with liberal white voters, farmers and union members.

"You know, when the plant shuts down and you are out of work, poverty has no color. When you can't af-

ford health insurance, the hospital will turn you away whether you are brown, black, white or yellow," he said.

Highland Park Mayor Robert Blackwell, who did not support Jackson four years ago, is endorsing Jackson this time around.

Detroit Mayor Coleman Young, however, is still withholding his support and did not attend the fund-raiser.

During his remarks Friday, Jackson also addressed the loss of automotive jobs to foreign nations.

"DON'T GET mad at the South Koreans — they aren't taking our jobs. Detroit and GM gave them the

jobs," Jackson said of continued layoffs in the auto industry. The UAW has made job security its most important bargaining issue, surpassing such as wages, cost of living and health benefits.

The political gathering was unusual for Franklin who was making her first public political endorsement.

"I've known Jesse since my father (the Rev. C. L. Franklin) was preaching here in Detroit and this was just something I wanted to do to help him out," she said.

"But I never knew campaigning was such hard work. I support him, but I'm going to stick with show business from now on."

Good neighbor's a crimefighter

IT SHOULD surprise no one that thieves probably drool at the mention of some of the nicer subdivisions in Canton and Plymouth.

Houses are filled with such easily fenced goods as guns, TVs, stereos, microwaves, VCRs and jewelry.

So unless you relish higher insurance premiums, take the advice of Neighborhood Watch: "Never give a burglar a break. Beware."

Sanctioned by the International Association of Chiefs of Police, Neighborhood Watch is a proven success in teaching residents how to reduce the threat of burglary in their neighborhood.

WHEN A criminal offense is suspected, Neighborhood Watch participants are asked to jot down all pertinent details, then call the police. They don't do any investigating or try to make any arrests.

Resident patrols may seem more glamorous. But they're foolhardy. Nobody wants unwitting victims or the focus of prosecution themselves. Such patrols are only effective when special training is provided, such as in the case with the now merged REACT and PACT groups.

Under Neighborhood Watch, volunteers act only as supplemental "eyes and ears" for regular patrol officers. For example, watchpeople can routinely keep watch for potential neighborhood trouble — like strangers — while walking in their living room, through their yard or to their mailbox.

Neighborhood Watch can only be as effective as the people on any given block let it. They have to be nosy. They have to be suspicious. And they have to report suspicions at once. Burglars don't dawdle. The chance of capture drops once they flee.

Criminals get very nervous when they know neighbors are keeping an eye on each other. It pays to be our brother's keeper.

Watchers are told what they can or cannot do and what they can or cannot expect from the police. They also receive a home security survey, a Neighborhood Watch sign and periodic feedback.

THE KEY to the program lies in watchers not trying to be vigilantes but instead trying to look out for their neighbors through familiarity of habits.

The program alone won't rid your neighborhood of thefts. There's plenty you can — and should — do to bolster your home's security. Contact crime prevention specialists at the Canton, Plymouth or Plymouth Township police department for free advice. Precautions don't have to be expensive or elaborate. Simply engraving personal property under the Operation Identification program can be effective.

But police reports bear out that Neighborhood Watch helps limit the volume and helps lessen your family's fear of burglaries.

The program also might help spark new friendships in your neighborhood. It gets neighbors talking — and that can't help but have a positive effect.

U.S. Constitution

It withstood the test of time

WHEN THE U.S. Constitution was signed 200 years ago today, framers could not in their wildest imagination have realized the nation they were creating.

As the United States fully casts aside its innocence and youth, only a learned, responsible and involved public can ensure that the Constitution remains a lifeline against tyranny and oppression.

Despite our ever-changing history — the Civil War, Prohibition, the Industrial Age, two world wars, the Vietnam conflict, Watergate and now the Iran-Contra Scandal — the U.S. Constitution has stood the test of time.

As we look to the next 200 years, the four-page document with all its successes and failings must continue to provide us with a high standard of

freedom, equality, fairness and the right to individuality.

But the document is only as strong as those who support and embrace and adhere to it. Without those qualities, the Constitution will falter with our ignorance, intolerance, greed and hatred.

We are armed with a living constitution that is both far-reaching in intent, yet devoid of those specific answers for which we now struggle the most — abortion, genetic engineering, pollution, nuclear war, multinational corporations, crime.

To meet the challenge tomorrow promises, we must enter the future with the same vision and dreams that drew the framers to the Constitutional Convention of 1787.

Papal visit

Ignore hype, listen thoughtfully

WEEKS BEFORE John Paul II was due to arrive in metropolitan Detroit, people already were tiring of the "hype" over the arrival of the pope.

Hype about the cost of security . . . hype about tickets for the papal Mass in that latter-day coliseum called the Silverdome . . . hype about dissidents protesting his positions (which were consistent with Catholic tradition) . . . hype about souvenirs and the effect on business.

We suspect the spiritual leader of one of the world's oldest surviving (1,950 years) and largest (840 million members) institutions would be a little put off by it himself, if he were to speak candidly.

WE WELCOME his visit Sept. 19 nevertheless because:

- Unlike many popes in this century, John Paul II was not a Vatican bureaucrat, diplomat or lawyer before his 1978 election. He was a pastor, a man from the people who worked among the people, a man conversant in many languages. Politically he broke the four-century Italian monopoly on the chair of St. Peter.

- He will recognize the importance of the traditional city, with his appearance in Detroit; ethnic diversity, with his appearance in Hamtramck; and the suburbs, with his Mass in the Silverdome. His choice of symbols is excellent.

- He knows the area, through pre-papal visits to a seminary at Orchard Lake and our neighborhoods and even restaurants. He comes to see us, his old friends, not just to be seen like a glitzy movie star.

- Church authorities hope his visit will bring converts, not so much from other denominations as from the "unchurched," and stimulate Catholics to consider vocations as priests and nuns.

IN OTHER respects, however, Pope John Paul II's visit will be a jarring one:

First, while he is one of the world's most respected moral and political leaders, giant percentages of Catholics don't follow his teachings on birth control, disagree with his view on the role of women — even dissent on abortion.

Second, the pope's own economics — to the extent he grasps "the dismal science" — are pretty socialistic for the taste of this citadel of free enterprise. John Paul reportedly plans to talk here about our economic ills. His theme tends to be unfair distribution of wealth — the shopworn rescinding of the pie rather than the creative increasing of the total pie.

This isn't Europe. In his native Poland, Catholic seminaries are full. In America and metropolitan Detroit, seminaries are emptying and being mothballed or sold off.

Whatever he says is likely to ruffle feathers and rattle cages. Good. We in metropolitan Detroit can take it as well as dish it out.

We welcome Pope John Paul II, controversy and all. He's not here to preach hate, like an ayatollah or a fuhrer, or to ransack the wallets of the young, like an avaricious rock star. He's here to try to do us some good.

Let us ignore the hype and listen to him thoughtfully.

Growth Works facts offered

To the editor:

On Aug. 24, the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education approved an additional \$55,000 of the requested \$70,000 for this year's funding of the Alternative Education Program at Growth Works. This is in addition to the \$70,000 which was already budgeted.

This money was taken from the board contingency fund (\$40,000) and the food services capital outlay (\$15,000). It is anticipated that another \$15,000 may be forthcoming from next year's budget. Last year we spent a total of \$153,000 on the program.

There were 70 students referred to the program last year. However, these students were there for various lengths of time so financial comparisons to a regular full year for other students are not easily possible.

Last year, the budgeting for Learning Options was determined by using the district's anticipated per pupil cost and multiplying it by 40 program slots. So the \$2,000 per pupil per year is inaccurate.

The students at Learning Options are primarily from the middle schools, not the Centennial Educational Park, so "survival" at C.E.P. is not as big an issue as "survival" in our society.

A study committee is being formed to objectively study and evaluate the entire alternative education program and to make recommendations to the board for future actions.

While the tone of the editorial was

supportive and appreciated, the errors of fact are significant. Because your editorials are normally so well researched, logical and on target, I felt it necessary to provide you with accurate information.

U.S. Constitution sails as freedom's convoy

AS YOU READ this, reflect on the word convoy. It has been in frequent use lately in regard to America's armed escort of oil tankers in the Persian Gulf. If you are old enough (and there are many American men and women who are), you may have been aboard just such a vessel.

For instance, it was about 1:30 on a cold morning in February 1943 when a 23-year-old Army nurse from West Boylston, Mass., Cynthia Holt by name, knew that the troop ship USA Uruguay, which she shared with 21 other nurses and 5,500 men, had been struck, 5 1/2 days outbound from New York in the North Atlantic.

In her married life, she is a highly respected Michigan author. Perhaps you know her as friend, neighbor or reader. Her name is now Cynthia Holt Cummings and quite likely you will buy one of her newest collection of verses, an autographed copy of "Christmas Wishes," as a gift for someone special as the Yuletide approaches.

"There were ships of all kinds in our convoy as far as you could see," I was told recently when I interrupted this delightful lady as she was one-by-one signing a stack of her books for distribution to outlets in more than 30 states. Before she's done, the number of copies will run into the thousands.

"We had been rammed by one of our own tankers and quite a number of men were lost," she recalled, adding that later on her own brother had lost his life in the Pacific Theatre during World War II.

After the Uruguay had limped to St. George's Island off Bermuda and while waiting for transfer to the old Santa Rosa, Cynthia felt moved to write her first poem. It reflects her feeling that "no one realizes the danger they are in." She called it simply, "Convoy."

On this particular day, the 200th anniversary of the signing of the United States Constitution, I hope you join me in considering it appropriate as one of the memorials to those who have regarded our constitution as a synonym for freedom. These are Cynthia's words, reprinted with her permission.

"Have you ever stood on the deck

at night/With the thoughts of death very near? You lift your head to the sky above/That your prayers may be easier to hear.

"Around you the water is thrashing/And the wind is blowing cold/And you reach out your hand for something./Just something for it to hold.

"There are many around you standing there/With their heads turned toward the sky/And they do not seem to realize/That the other ships have passed us by.

"Before you, chained closely to the edge,/A lifeboat you faintly see./Will it be necessary to use On that rough and raging sea?

"A feeling of emptiness arises./As you wait in the black of night./And you know that the others around you/Are filled with the same thoughts of fright.

"You know that your knees are knocking/But you cannot keep them still./And you know that what is to happen/Will have to be God's will.

"You feel an arm upon your shoul-

der. It adds some courage now./As you look on that turbulent water./Not knowing what next to do

"The sound of a voice at last you hear./Above the troubled waters/It is hard to believe the words it speaks./You will all return to your quarters."

"God has been good — our ship may we keep./And we return to our cabins below/How little we realize the things that had happened/In the areas ever so low.

"The boys with injuries untold/Are brought up from below./And doctors work to ease their pain./In the many ways they know.

"As nurses we know that each minute counts./That there are also things we can do/To help these boys in pain./Who form the unfortunate crew.

"And so with the many others./Working silently there together./We lend the little bit we can/To help those boys get better.

"The boys we have lost/May never know the plight our ship had met./But we know the courage they must have had./It is in our memory yet.

"And now that our fright is over./We are ready to start again/For some foreign shore, some distant land./To help, and give, and win."

How to spend \$170 million

THE STATE treasury has \$170 million burning a hole in the politicians' pockets.

It's there because of federal tax reform. You see, Michigan's state income tax rides piggyback on the federal income tax. When the feds removed a bunch of exemptions, Michigan's tax base increased — hence the "windfall."

Our heroes agree they've got to get rid of it but can't agree on how. Gov. James J. Blanchard and many legislators want to reduce the tax rate from 4.6 to 4.4 percent. Educators want to get their mitts on it. Ditto for the rapacious social services lobby.

Here's a modest proposal to use the "windfall" to correct an injustice and still give the money back to taxpayers.

OUR COUNTY and local courts have been funded in part by the state and in part by counties and local units.

Though logical, the system led to many budget wars between judges and local budgeting boards, with the judges threatening to jail the boards.

In 1979 the state began a program of paying 100 percent of the cost of lower courts. The program began — and stopped — with the Wayne Circuit Court, Detroit Records Court and the 36th District Court in Detroit.

Along came the recession. Budgets were cut. For the '80s we have had two systems of court funding — one

for Wayne County Detroit, the other for the Wayne suburbs and the other 82 counties.

Lots of folks outstate want equal treatment with Wayne County Detroit. "There is a great deal of restlessness outstate," said Milton Zaagman, executive director of the Michigan Judges Association. Zaagman, a former state senator from Grand Rapids, spoke to the Senate Judiciary Committee chaired by Rudy Nichols, R-Waterford.

Well, we could stop state funding of Wayne County Detroit courts — over the dead bodies of Executive Ed McNamara and Mayor Coleman Young.

Or the state could do justice by the Wayne suburbs and the other 82 counties by paying for their courts, too.

THE COST? Zaagman put it at an additional \$150 million to \$225 million.

Where to get the money?

I say use the \$170 million state income tax windfall — a continuing revenue source.

The fiscal logic is perfect, so far

as I can tell but the politicians need one question answered: What about the voting taxpayer?

Since the state would be relieving 82 counties and a couple of thousand cities and townships of the burdens of paying for circuit, probate and district courts, those units could be told to cut their property tax rates to the tune of \$170 million.

Polsters say that while the income tax is unpopular, the property tax is considered even more unpopular, burdensome and regressive.

In short, keep the income tax windfall use it to pay for local courts and reduce the local property tax burden.

ONE FURTHER twist to my modest proposal.

What if the good voters of Communityville want to use their cut of the \$170 million for something besides a tax cut? What if they want a library? Or in the case of Oakland County improved roads?

Let 'em use it the way the voters want, I say, and God bless local control.

Only once in a generation do we get a \$170 million windfall in the state treasury. Only once in two generations do we get to make a massive reform like full state funding of courts.

In education, choice is best

Complete — not token — freedom of choice is what is going to turn education around. Let individual citizens choose whether or not to pay for government education! Then educators would become accountable directly to parents, and a variety of educational methods would become affordable to more people.

Money is the lifeblood of the system. When it comes by choice — when value is voluntarily exchanged for value — then we will see the best in education.

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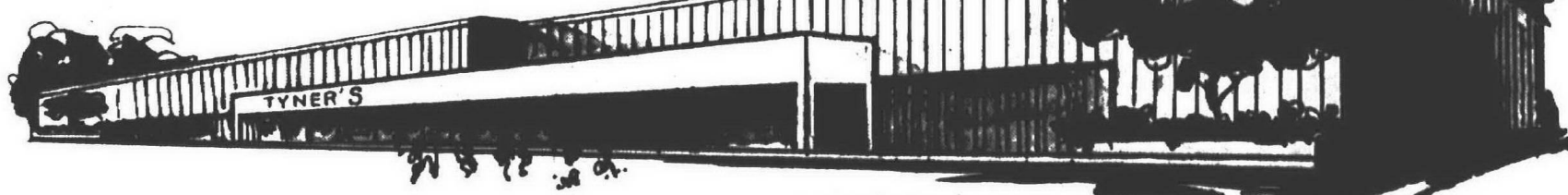
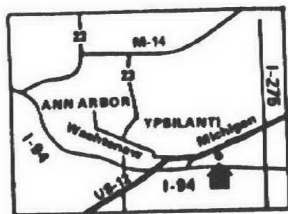
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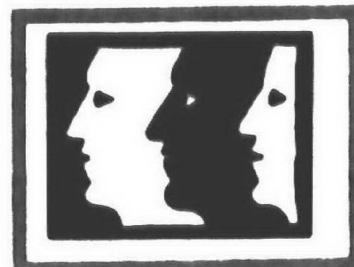

Fun's found at fest

Food wasn't the only thing to be found at the Plymouth Fall Festival.

Antiques, arts and crafts items and books were also offered for sale, along with a number of other non-edibles.

Information was among the commodities found at the festival. On Saturday afternoon, Sandra Florek and Mary O'Connell were the women with the answers at the Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce information booth.

Florek, the chamber's president, and O'Connell, the executive director, had plenty of questions to answer.

"Where are the ponies, and there are none," O'Connell said in describing frequently-asked questions.

Those attending the festival Saturday also wanted to know where the Plymouth Community Arts Council's Artists and Craftsman Show was being held (Central Middle School). Questions about the location of the Plymouth Symphony League's Antique Mart — the Plymouth Cultural Center — were also common.

QUESTIONS ON how to buy tickets for the Jaycees steak dinner were common.

"That is the most popular question," said Florek, who is director of institutional advancement at Schoolcraft College. Festival-goers also

wanted to know where the nearest pay telephones and the restrooms were.

Some of the requests for information were unrelated to the festival. Questions about the locations of various businesses, for example, weren't unheard of.

"We know those answers, so we're OK," Florek said. She and O'Connell were enjoying their time in the information booth — among other things, they had a roof over their heads when Saturday afternoon's rain started.

"We're a good team," the chamber president said. The amount of traffic at the information booth was just right.

"We're not bored and we're not overwhelmed," said Florek.

Down the street at the book sale booth of the Plymouth branch, American Association of University Women, plans had been made in case of rain. Heavy plastic covered the paperback books, protecting them from Saturday's rainfall.

The AAUW's Barbara Greanya and Elaine Bain were hard at work Saturday afternoon. The AAUW book sale was held all four days of the festival.

"They were pretty good before the rain," Greanya said in describing the Saturday crowds.

SOME OF the festival-goers were seeking specific books, such as a biography of Thomas Edison.

"But that's normal," said Greanya, president of the Plymouth branch, AAUW. Some of the festival-goers didn't realize the AAUW can't keep track of each book offered for sale.

The AAUW collects books each week from a drop box at the Dunning-Hough Library in Plymouth, not all of the books available for sale were on display Saturday afternoon.

"People are storing them in their garages, just waiting for us to call them," the AAUW president said with a smile.

Greanya also saw some of her students during the festival. She's a first grade teacher at Eriksson Elementary School in Canton.

"They say, Oh look, there's Mrs. Greanya." Some of the youngsters were a bit startled to see their teacher outside of the classroom.

Proceeds from the AAUW book sale are used for scholarships.

"Just like the other book sale," Greanya said, referring to the larger book sale held each spring. "It's a smaller profit."

Down the street, the Plymouth Historical Museum was also open for

Museums Their role is a vital one

Dr. John L. Wright doesn't believe in the inoculation model for museums — if you visit a museum one time as a child you don't ever have to go back.

Wright, director of the public programs division at Henry Ford Museum & Greenfield Village, believes museums should be comfortable, inviting places to visit. Among other things, museums need plenty of places for people to sit down.

"That's something that museums have not ever been very good at, making people comfortable."

Wright spoke at a Thursday, Sept. 10, meeting of the Plymouth Historical Society, held at the Plymouth Historical Museum. Wright is responsible for all aspects of programming at the facility in Dearborn, including the daily schedule of activities. The Dearborn resident is also responsible for the publications program and special events presentations.

IT'S POSSIBLE for museum staffers and active volunteers to lose perspective on a museum's role, Wright told those attending the first Plymouth Historical Society meeting of the season. Answers to the question of "Why do people visit museums?" are varied.

"Because they're there, I suppose," said Wright, who received a doctorate in popular culture and

literature from Bowling Green State University in Ohio. "It's a little like climbing the mountain."

Visitors to museums may be there simply to kill time or to get in out of the rain, he said. Focus interview research done at Henry Ford Museum & Greenfield Village revealed many reasons for museum visits.

In addition to "passing time," the other typical pat answer to that question is "to learn about this or that." Wright's somewhat skeptical of that claim, like others, he doesn't spend much time studying the exhibits in great detail during visits to museums.

Wright believes it's important to look at museums from an outsider's perspective. One researcher who did so found three categories of museum visitors.

SOME PEOPLE visit museums for the personal experience and enjoyment. A museum can provide solitude, serving almost as a kind of retreat and allowing visitors to connect with the past or with nature.

"People do indeed look at museums as special kinds of places they can go to," said Wright, who serves as chairman of the Michigan Council for the Humanities.

The second group visits museums for a social experience. Among other things, museums are popular spots to take visitors from out of town.

"It's a place to socialize. It pro-

vides another kind of social interaction."

The third variety of visitor is the one seeking an educational experience.

"The immediate assumption people make is that museums are educational." Although museums have a contribution to make to education, that's not their primary role.

The kind of learning that takes place in a museum is different from that found in a classroom, Wright told the Plymouth Historical Society members and guests.

"And I say thank goodness for it."

Museums need to allow visitors plenty of freedom and opportunities for social interaction, Wright said. Having a chance to talk with craftspeople, for example, can make a museum visit more enjoyable.

"If you don't want that, you can stay home and watch TV."

Museums, including local ones, have a vital role to play in preserving items that represent a shared culture, the speaker said. Doing so is especially important in an era of rapid change.

"Museums like this one can be a place of continuity."

MUSEUMS ALSO need to deal with change, Wright said. Doing so isn't always an easy task, changes made in recent years at Henry Ford Museum & Greenfield Village have caused some friction.

It's important for museums to save items representative of the more recent past, Wright said. That's been done recently at Henry Ford Museum & Greenfield Village.

Locally, the Daly Drive-in restaurant on Ann Arbor Road in Plymouth represents a cultural landmark, he said.

"The old style drive-in is just about gone. Will anybody remember it once it's gone?"

Those at the meeting enjoyed hearing Wright's comments. Elizabeth Donnelly of Plymouth, a retired schoolteacher and Plymouth Historical Society member, liked the idea of saving things representative of more recent times.

"We tend to go back as far as we can go," Museums are limited, however in what they can add to their collections.

"Storage space is always a problem," Donnelly said. "This museum started out just as a house." The current museum building at 155 S. Main St. was donated by Margaret Dunning.

Bruce Richard, president of the Plymouth Historical Society,

agreed that storage space is a perennial problem for museums. The problems of a local museum are a bit different from those of a larger one.

"We're a different kind of museum, of course, than Greenfield Village," Richard said. Among other things, visitors to the Plymouth Historical Museum come in to do research on their family backgrounds.

Richard agreed it's important to save items representative of life in a community.

"These things are passing from the scene faster than we think they are."

Although smaller local museums have storage space problems, larger museums don't always have the necessary storage space either. At least one person at last week's meeting knows that from personal experience.

"The same problem, but on a huge scale," said Beth Stewart, program and exhibits chairwoman for the Plymouth Historical Society. Stewart, a Plymouth Township resident, is a former staff member at Henry Ford Museum & Greenfield Village.

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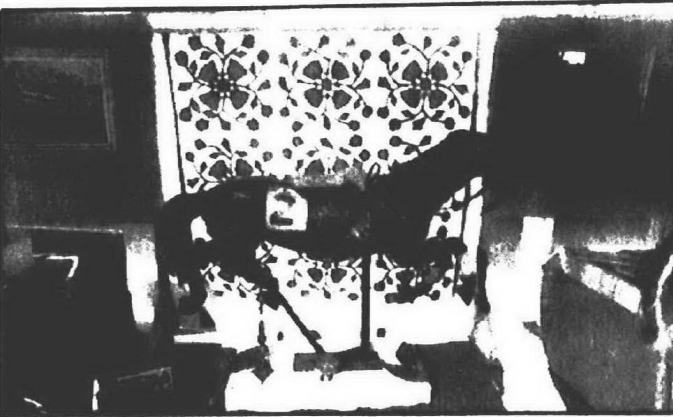
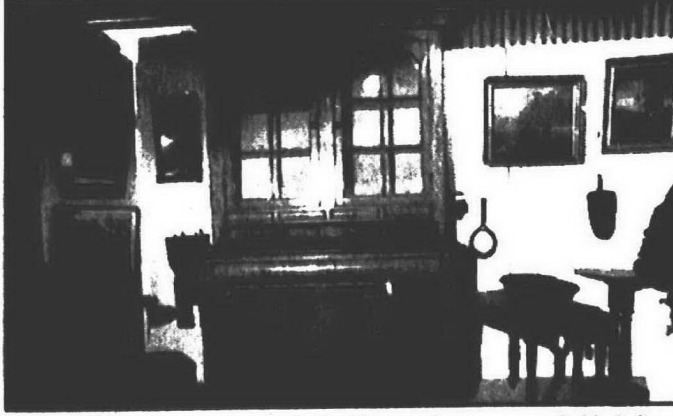
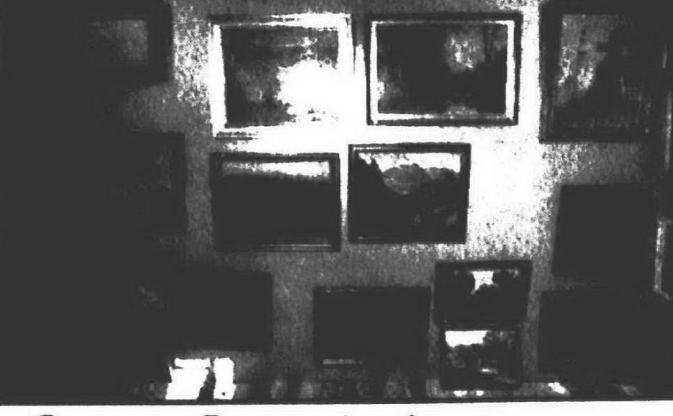

Handbell group to ring in pope

POPE JOHN PAUL II will have ringing in his ears when he visits the area this weekend.

And he'll have the Classical Bells to thank for that. The ecumenical handbell choir has been selected to play for the pope Friday at a reception at the Cathedral of the Blessed Sacrament in Detroit.

The Classical Bells has members from all around the area, including Livonia, Plymouth and Farmington Hills. The group, however, doesn't have any Catholics.

Nonetheless they are pleased as punch to be playing for the pope.

"I THINK most of us here have a great deal of respect for the pope as a world leader," said Donna Gleason of Plymouth, who attends Redford Baptist Church. "We're honored to be playing for him. It's a once-in-a-lifetime thing."

Susan Berry, director of the group, also thought it would be a great thing. So when she heard about John Paul's planned visit to Detroit, she called the Detroit Archdiocese and offered any help they might need in possibly using handbells during the service.

The Archdiocese then asked if the Classical Bells would perform during the pontiff's visit.

Berry, who is a full-time instructor of handbell music, had previously done workshops at Sacred Heart Seminary in Detroit. She noted that handbell music mainly has been used in Protestant services.

"Many Catholics have never heard handbells as part of a service," said Berry, who is from Detroit. "Catholic priests used them centuries ago."

BERRY CURRENTLY is helping some Catholic parishes establish handbell choirs.

The Classical Bells have been together five years. Each member plays anywhere from four to six bronze bells. The group uses 60 bells altogether to produce the very soothing brand of music.

Many members are also directors or members of handbell choirs at their respective churches.

The Classical Bells not only play in churches, but also at shopping malls, schools and social functions as well. The 12-woman contingent has also performed in the Detroit Thanksgiving Parade.

Performing for the pope, though, is the biggest event on the group's agenda thus far.

ORIGINALLY, the handbell group was scheduled for Saturday's Mass at the Pontiac Silverdome. But there was concern that their chime

wouldn't be worth a dime in the cavernous stadium.

Instead, the Classical Bells were moved to the reception on Friday. The group, supported by a choir ensemble and an organist, will perform during the processional, recessional and following the reception.

Some of the musical numbers the group will perform include "Exaltations," with organ, brass and bells, prior to the pontiff's arrival. The pope will be walking down the aisle to "Procession."

During the service, the group will play "Canticle of Hope." "Glorious of Thee are Spoken" will be performed during the recessional along with "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing."

The group has been practicing an hour-and-a-half once a week at St. Matthew United Methodist Church in Livonia in preparation for the event.

Prepapal visit jitters are not evident.

"Oh no," said Doris Edwards of Livonia, who is also handbell choir

director at Mount Hope Congregational Church in Livonia. "After you play a few concerts together, you're never nervous. It's just a lot of fun to play as a group."

Marcia Harmon of Farmington Hills expects playing for the pope will be a heavy chore. But that's only because she has to shake the 17-pound C-3 bell as a member of the bass section.

"By the end of the day, you feel it," Harmon said.

OUR DAUGHTER was married last week. By their promises before God and in the presence of family and friends, our daughter and her fiancé bound themselves together as husband and wife until death do them part.

Thirty-one years ago, her parents did the same thing. Like our daughter, we were married in church, and by our promises before God and in the presence of family and friends, we bound ourselves together as husband and wife until death do us part.

I really can't remember what I was thinking when we were married. It's highly probable, though, that I was not thinking about the same things that ran through my mind when our daughter was married. Thirty-one years ago, I did not consider myself or my wife as being particularly courageous and bold in taking on a commitment until "death do us part."

Thirty-one years ago, the statistics for divorce were not as grim as today. Staying married until death was the rule, and not the exception. Making lifelong promises was not unusual, nor was it taken lightly. What God had joined together in providence and care was not to be torn asunder.

Promises, covenants, vows, pledges, et al don't mean much today. We have developed a technique for resolving cases of conscience, duty and conduct, and we use it with reckless abandon. Truth has become

IT SHOULD NOT surprise us that people chose to live together, instead of promising faithfulness and commitment until death do them part. "Shacking up" requires no commitment, and it certainly does not attest to any courage. "Shacking up" describes many of our relationships in public life. "Shacking up" only destroys that which is worth the human effort.

Our daughter and son-in-law have started out on a journey that lifts up all that is noble and courageous in humanity. Rejecting a mutual opportunism that would feed only themselves, they have grasped the opportunity to be a part of all that is trusting and faithful, committed and honest. The center they have created in their covenant will serve as an axis for life that is worth the human effort.

Our daughter was engaged for more than a year. Yet when she and her fiancé made their promise and commitment to each other in the church of her childhood and youth, they had only a partial understanding of each other. They are daring to risk everything they know about themselves for the sake of sharing all that is to come with the other. It is a risk, her parents would insist, that is worth the effort.

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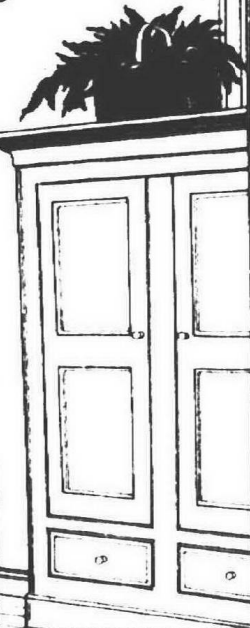
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Savings, disability insurance lacking

Local financial planning experts reviewed the data of the family profiled here and made general recommendations based on the participant's resources and goals. "Build a solid financial base" is a commonly heard recommendation of financial planners. But how do you do it? The steps toward building this financial foundation are the focus of this month's Family Finances profile.

Rob Parker, 33, and Barb Parker, 31, live in a comfortable house in Lathrup Village with their 1-year-old son. Rob works as a middle manager for a \$30,000 annual income, and Barb is a clerical worker earning \$20,000 per year. Rob also has a daughter, 13, from a previous marriage. She plans to attend college, and Rob wants to help her as much as possible.

"THE COLLEGE costs for my daughter are coming up quickly," Rob said. "And I know I should plan now. What should I be doing?" Currently, no money has been put aside for these anticipated expenses.

Another major goal is to provide for the family's financial security — both long- and short-term. "How should we proceed?" they ask.

They have saved some money recently and are attempting to add \$250 each month to their savings account and \$50 monthly to their stock holdings. They are willing to accept some risk in their investments if it will help their money grow faster.

THEIR LARGEST investment assets are in their company retirement plans. Rob has accumulated a balance of \$15,000, and Barb's vested account is valued at \$10,000. For a couple in their early 30s, these assets should substantially increase by retirement.

Rob wrote a will four years ago prior to their marriage but isn't sure whether it is still valid. Barb has no will.

Both have personal and group life insurance. Their medical insurance is sound, and their homeowners insurance is in excellent shape. They have maximum liability coverages, replacement cost coverage on their house contents and property floaters on their jewelry — all of which are recommended by the advisory panel.

ROB REMAINS concerned about liability claims, though he wonders if an umbrella liability policy providing \$1 million in protection is needed.

Our panel believes their disability coverage needs attention. Both Parkers have employer coverage that stops after six months.

Estelle Wade of Estelle Wade Advisors in Birmingham suggests tracking their expenditures for the next six months and increasing their emergency reserve to \$5,000. This should give them a picture of their spending patterns and provide them with a cushion should an emergency occur.

Dan Boyce of the Center for Financial Planning agrees.

"THEIR DEBT situation is under control and in good shape. But with only \$3,750 in total liquid assets (see Financial Chart), they have little to fall back upon in the case of a major financial setback."

Their disability insurance is also a concern for our advisers. "With coverage that lasts only six months, a long-term disability could be a devastating blow to their financial planning," Boyce said. Wade suggests

buying a personal disability income policy that starts paying benefits after six months. By dovetailing the coverage on their personal long-term disability policies with short-term coverage at work, they reduce costs and eliminate unneeded duplicate coverage.

THE LAST PIECE of the financial foundation recommended by our advisers is the writing of new wills. "They should not leave to chance the transfer of property upon either or both of their deaths," said attorney Alan Ferrara, of Couzens, Lansky & Roeder. Rob's old will is still valid, and it could cause problems in the case of his death, leaving his new family without enough assets to maintain their standard of living.

Boyce adds that he should check the beneficiary designations on his life insurance and his retirement plans at work to make sure they reflect his current wishes.

The panel next recommends tackling the goal of saving money for the children's educations. Wade suggests investing \$150 per month in a conservative growth and income mutual

fund as soon as they have enough in their emergency reserve.

SHE PROJECTS THAT by the time Rob's 13-year-old daughter starts college, this fund will be worth more than \$10,000. "By investing this money in a custodial account, the taxable profits will be taxed to Rob's daughter at her lower tax bracket." Also, if they could put an additional \$50-\$75 per month into an account for their young son, this would go a long way toward meeting his needs in the future.

Additional savings can be used for intermediate or long-term goals. The panel recommends an ultimate goal of saving or investing 10 percent of the family's total income for future financial security. It may take several years to reach this goal, but consistent progress toward it is the key to financial success.

The Parkers have made a good start in their financial lives. They are not heavily in debt, and they save a portion of their incomes each month. By shoring up the cracks in their financial foundation, they should be in excellent shape toward building a sound financial future.

Arena scores with skyboxes

Building personal relationships with clients has moved up in the priority lists of some area businesses — at least 16 rows up.

One hundred businesses have shrugged at declining entertainment tax deductions and invested \$75,000 to \$125,000 to lease a skybox for one year in the Auburn Hills Arena, home to the Detroit Pistons come July, according to Tom Wilson, chief executive officer of the basketball team.

That leaves 80 skyboxes still available in the 20,000-seat arena. Due to innovative design, 52 of the skyboxes ring the 16th row without obstructing pay-as-you-go seats; 48 boxes are available above row 25; and 80 suites crown the arena.

And due to changes in the Tax reform Act of 1986, not a penny of the lease price is tax deductible.

"It is a significant price, but they entertain the folks important to them in a different style," Wilson said. "It's like having people over to

your own house for dinner and then walking out into the arena for a job or sporting event. It doesn't mean they'll get the order, but it cements their ability to bid and give them a fair opportunity to put their product out there against somebody else's."

"They," those who have signed minimum three-year leases for skyboxes, run from "Fortune 500 companies to tool and die shops. It's a strange mix, but the common denominator seems to be they put a premium on entertaining," Wilson added, noting that boxholders wish to remain anonymous.

BUSINESSES, under the old tax structure, used to write off most, if not all, client entertainment costs such as food, even tickets, boat rentals — whatever it took to get the job done. Today, 80 percent is the maximum allowable write-off, and the IRS also is starting to squint at "lavish or extravagant" meals, on which it will soon offer a ruling.

Wilson said the new tax law "hasn't seemed to affect this," and added boxholders still have a clean shot at the entertainment deduction. Auburn Hills, according to Wilson, operates on the same skybox system

as the Joe Louis Arena.

That means anyone who leases a skybox receives tickets to every event and can deduct 80 percent "of the highest real price for any ticket to any show."

There are 12-14 seats per box. Using Wilson's example of about \$20 per ticket for a Billy Joel concert, that comes to \$240-\$280 per event, or a deduction of \$192-\$224. Two events per week means boxholders could realize at least \$20,000 annual-

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Children need to learn financial facts of life

Dear Dad,
Ever since I can remember, you have been a financial planner and educator. That's why it's so ironic I have learned so little about money management in my 21 years.

Next year when I enter medical school, I'll have to handle my own finances, despite my limited knowledge in this area. And if I have little knowledge, how about the young people who have had even less exposure to the financial facts of life?

You should urge all parents to do some of the things listed below so their children will do a better job of money management than I probably will.

During my entire school and college career, I never had the opportunity to take courses on money management. I wish parents would emphasize to teachers and

administrators that learning about managing money is as important as learning about history, science or math.

IF LEARNING about money is made fun, youngsters will want to learn more about it. Using paper money, children can "buy" and "sell" stocks and bonds as well as invest in real estate.

Parents can show their kids how they are doing and why their investments are doing well (or not so well). This will prepare kids for decisions they will make as they get older.

Growing up by watching those around us, my friends and I learned that "the future is now." Everything we wanted, we wanted right away. And many of us got it right away.

Whether it was a toy, a bike, a car or a stereo, we wanted it right away.

We figured it was our parent's responsibility to pay for everything we wanted.

THE REASON is simple: If we had to wait for something, we felt we were missing out. Looking back, I realize this is a bad lesson. No matter how parents handled buying things for their children, it is never too late to correct the situation.

Once we learn that by postponing

buying things today we invest in our own future, we can then learn how to use the power of compounding. I know about compound interest, but I never really understood it until recently.

Of all principles parents can teach kids, nothing is more important than the power of compound interest. If you save money instead of spending it, your savings will earn interest —

and the interest will also earn interest.

The results can be phenomenal. For example, if I had invested \$1,000 at 10 percent when I was 11, today my savings would have grown by 260 percent.

IF SOMEONE just out of college puts \$2,000 a year for 30 years in an IRA account earning 8 percent, he ought to have more than a quarter of a million dollars. A quarter of a million dollars ought to get anybody's attention.

Parents should offer incentives to teach youngsters about money. If children are taught the work ethic, they will learn the value of money and saving.

If a kid wants a bike, he could buy it only if he worked for half the price of the bike. Parents can get even a slightly better bike to demonstrate

that saving first always means that we get a better value.

I hope you will accept this letter in the spirit in which it is written. Parents should teach their children about money management early in life. Kids are ready. Will the grown-ups in their life lead the way?

Tape library helps Zehnder's employees succeed

Bill Zehnder, general manager of Frankenmuth's Bavarian Inn Restaurant, is one person who knows how to treat people. Name one other Michigan-based restaurant that has served the equivalent of five guests per minute, every minute, all year long.

some different outlooks on life, help build more self-esteem, and let them know how important they are to us, everyone wins."

ZEHNDER'S LEARNING Library is one employee support program, established in 1984.

"The program began when our su-

pervisors and managers were receiving tape cassette learning series from Nightingale-Conant Corp.," Zehnder said. "It wasn't long before we decided to expand distribution to include all of our employees since the tapes were being swapped at a rate faster than we could keep track of."

ly in entertainment deductions on tickets alone.

TICKETS AREN'T the only things that come with the private suites, "with an emphasis on privacy," Wilson said. "We have three basic design plans with 15 different colors, couches, chairs, wall coverings, ice-makers, televisions, a bathroom and other comforts. If someone decides they don't care for our furnishings, we'll give them a cash allowance and the opportunity to work with our designers."

Besides the Pistons, Wilson said the World Wrestling Federation has

committed to using the arena, and negotiations are under way for "every major family show" such as circuses.

The new arena cost \$65 million, which Wilson said is the "most expensive privately funded arena in the nation." It will house restaurants, a four-sided TV replay scoreboard, a video studio to film and rebroadcast concerts, and an oversize screen for the rebroadcasts.

On Piston business, Wilson said, "we're real excited we'll be here. One thing we've missed is that crowd involvement, and we'll get it in this stadium because it was specifically built for basketball."

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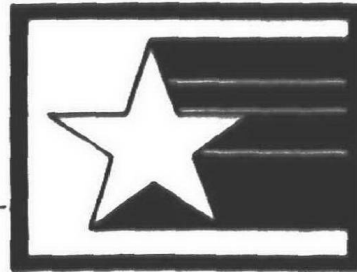

'42nd Street' Taking care of costumes

THE MUSICAL "42nd Street" is the biggest show touring right now, and the biggest show the Birmingham Theatre has every had. For Cheryl Wagner, the theater's wardrobe supervisor, that means an especially busy time.

The production has its own wardrobe supervisor, Roberta (Bobbie) Souder of Los Angeles, who travels with the show. On "42nd Street," Wagner is working as house wardrobe supervisor.

In a big room downstairs in the theater, where they clean and repair costumes, Wagner and Souder described how their jobs mesh. Souder said that before she comes to town, she explains, "I need this many people. I need them there. I need a shoe-maker and a dry cleaner."

For David Merrick's musical extravaganza, "42nd Street," which has lavish costumes and wigs and many costumes changes, "I needed 10 dressers, three who had worked quick changes. I needed three principal dressers, for the fast changes, who had worked this theater before and know the intricacies of the theater."

WAGNER FILLED all these needs, coming up with a dry cleaner who can do things in one day and a shoe repair that has worked with dance shoes before. "There are a lot of tap shoes," she said. "42nd Street" is a show where the stage is filled with a dancing chorus and stars who tap madly in production numbers.

Costume designer Theoni Aldredge won a Tony award for her designs for this hit, still playing on Broadway and in London. Most elaborate of all the costumes in "42nd Street" are the gowns worn for the "Dames" musical number and at the finale.

"One dress was replaced for \$4,000," said Souder. It was one without beading. Most of the other "Dames" dresses have beading, and some have hand-dyed fabrics. It would cost from \$7,000-\$10,000 to replace one of these.

The dresses get nicknames. A yellow one with feathers is called, appropriately enough, "Big Bird." Each dress in the show has a hat, and Souder pointed out, "All costumes are identical" in the New York, London and road companies.

Wagner works as a dresser on

each of the shows that comes to the Birmingham. On this show, there are 11 dressers in all. "We get a work call every day for four hours," she said. Souder, Souder's assistant who also travels with the show, Wagner and another helper all maintain the wardrobe.

REBEADING, repainting shoes, replacing horsehair on the hats — these are some of the jobs outlined by Wagner that must be done. "There are 86 shirts in the show that get washed on schedule," she said, indicating the monumental task of doing the laundry.

The fabrics in this particular show are "not necessarily designed for touring," which makes them require more care, Souder pointed out.

A little, lively blonde, Souder contrasts with the taller, tranquil Wagner, but both give evidence of being well-organized individuals. Organization is a must in taking care of the costumes and doing the changes.

On stairs leading to the stage are chairs alternating with laundry baskets. When performers change, the costume they remove is dropped into the basket and the next one, from the chair, is donned.

Racks of costumes behind the stage display garments needed for quick changes. A quick-change room is nearby. Three women stars share a dressing room for quick changes, and one of the men in the cast — the

young tenor, who changes his clothes 11 times — has another dressing room.

THE "DAMES" change is the most difficult, with hairdressers, cast, dressers and set changes all happening at once, for about 30 seconds.

Two hair people travel with the show and a third person, usually a hairdresser, is added in each town. In Birmingham, the conductor's wife, an actress-singer who worked as a dresser on the show in Chicago, is doing wigs for the first time.

The women in the cast all wear wigs, 52 wigs in all. The wig worn by Gina Trano, who plays Peggy Sawyer, the chorus girl who becomes a star, has to be completely redone at intermission, after her strenuous efforts in the first act.

There are so many costumes for the show some are stored on 13 gondolas on a trailer behind the theater. Traveling, it takes a 40-foot semi to carry the wardrobe.

For other productions at the Birmingham, Wagner works with a team of helpers, their number depending upon how many the show requires. For "Master Harold... and the Boys" and "Split Second," she worked alone.

After Florence Lacey played the Birmingham in "Evita" last season, Wagner was invited to join the company on its European summer tour. "It was an experience to speak to foreign-speaking people, trying to do changes. In Geneva, they only spoke French. It was difficult."

Pals teams up on horror film

From the moment they walk into the Big Boy, you know this interview will be different. Scott Spiegel of West Bloomfield and Josh Becker of Franklin are in town to oversee their newly released movie, "Thou Shalt Not Kill... Except."

Directed by Becker and produced by Spiegel, the film has a screenplay written by both. A fast-talking team, the fair-haired Spiegel wears a white sport shirt while Becker, the brunet, favors dark. They order coffee, light up cigarettes and spin off the story of two guys who make movies.

"We both went to West Maple Junior High," Becker starts the ball rolling while Spiegel chomps a sandwich. "I met Scott in the seventh grade. We both graduated from Groves High School in 1976." Meanwhile, they'd formed a gang of pals, but this gang wanted to make movies.

"We were making feature-length Super-8 movies in high school," Spiegel, finished with dinner, picks up the thread while Becker lights up. "Three guys from our group went off and did 'Evil Dead' (the Ferndale-based horror-comedy). We founded Action Pictures."

"WE WANTED TO do the ultimate revenge movie," Becker chimes in. "So we think of the coolest way to do something. In 'Thou Shalt Not,' it's just different enough from other action movies to work."

It's different all right. "Thou Shalt Not-Kill... Except" had an original working title of "Bloodbath," which was pretty accurate. It's the tale of four Marine Vietnam buddies, one of who is wounded and returns home to Upper Michigan.

A crazed Manson-like cult goes on a rampage, kidnaps the vet's girlfriend, just as his buddies show up to visit. Together, they give the cult members a variety of quite unpleasant deaths. There is a lot of blood, mostly spurring from people's mouths.

"We had the screenplay by 1979," says Becker, "and we've been raising money. It's very difficult to make movies independently. We made 'Thou Shalt Not' on \$225,000, which is about the food budget on a big film."

"It's a big cast," Spiegel adds. "All local cast. Sam Raimi from 'Evil Dead' is in it. We filmed all around the Detroit area. In fact we had to move our Vietnamese village three times — when the owner of the land showed up." Not high budget.

"WITH THIS FILM done, now we have the credits to get some better financing. That's good, because it takes a lot of \$5,000 shares to make up \$225,000, and that's low budget," says Spiegel.

Their next projects include a string of proposed ideas whose titles are somewhat unsuitable for a family newspaper. They involve much blood, violence and sudden death. "What can I say," jokes Spiegel. "We like action films, you know?"

In the best tradition of the Broadway musical, "42nd Street" at the Birmingham Theatre is a razzle-dazzle toe-tapper that sends the audience home humming its memorable tunes for days on end.

Now beginning its eighth year on Broadway, "42nd Street" is greater than the sum of its individual parts. The show hangs on the flimsiest of plots, filled with every show-biz cliché. The Birmingham cast, always competent, is seldom outstanding. The wonderful songs and dances make one forget all about such missing elements as message, logic or credibility.

Based on the classic 1932 film, "42nd Street" boasts such well-known Harry Warren-Al Dubin songs as "Lullaby of Broadway," "Shuffle Off to Buffalo," "We're in the Money," "You're Getting to Be a Habit With Me," "About a Quarter to Nine" and the title number.

"Do it for Broadway!" and "Kid, you're going out there a youngster, but you're coming back a star!"

Trano looks and acts appropriately ingenious. Though her singing and dancing never disappoint, neither do they quite ever ignite into star power. Thiergaard has a lovely voice but most of the time seems too nice for a prima donna.

The real stand-out among the chorus girls is Linda Griffin as Anytime Annie. Like Ado Annie in "Oklahoma!," she is known to never say "no." Griffin, who looks and sounds like a young Ethel Merman, has loads of spunk as she belts out her lines or leads several ensemble numbers.

BLAIR IS WELL-CAST as tenor Billy Lawlor, Elizabeth French is likeable as saucy Maggie Jones, whose actual role in the show-within-a-show is a bit elusive, and Richard Blair pleases as Bert Berry, the on-stage composer who mysteriously

Gold and Reynolds just missed getting additional goals as both hit the post with other attempts.

Senior Michelle McKenzie is Stevenson's top returnee after capturing league titles in the 200- and 500-yard freestyles. She also was second and third in the state, respectively, in those events.

Seniors Amy Harrison (back), Lisa Campos (fly), Nan-

cy Detmer (free), Lisa Dotzenroth (free and back) and sophomore Gina Bennetts (fly) are other swimmers who will play key roles if Stevenson is to repeat.

From the standpoint of opposing coaches, the Spartans have another good squad and are again seen as the favorite.

The WLAA's other top swimmers will put their talents on display Saturday, also, and the league has many good ones. Thirty-five percent of the participants in last year's state meet were from WLAA schools, according to Salem coach Chuck Olson.

LIVONIA Churchill's Audra Martin and Westland John Glenn's Julie Jensen are back after placing in the state meet. Martin was second in Class A in the butterfly and third in the individual medley, and Jensen was seventh in the IM.

North Farmington has excellent breaststrokers led by Cindy Cramer, who was third in the state and fourth in the IM. Marcy Mulbarger (ninth in the state) and Kerry Doran will complement her abilities in that event.

Farmington's Lauren Weary placed ninth among the state's butterfly swimmers as a freshman. Plymouth Canton sophomores Nicole Drake and Cassie Cummins are young swimmers to watch.

REGULATIONS ON TIGER MUSKELLUNGE

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on October 7, 1983, under the authority of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, renewed the order of July 14, 1978, that hybrid muskellunge, commonly known as the "tiger muskellunge," shall be deemed a muskellunge, and it shall be unlawful to take or possess tiger muskellunge except in accordance with laws, rules, and regulations governing muskellunge for a period of five years effective January 1, 1984, through March 31, 1989.

For coach Rob Neu and his Plymouth Canton girls basketball team, the Mercy Hoops Classic ended on a much happier note than that on which it began.

The Chiefs, who lost to eventual winner Traverse City in the first round after having the Trojans on the ropes early, rebounded with a 58-42 victory over Waterford Kettering and won the consolation game Saturday night.

Beating the Captains was a feather in Canton's cap. Kettering is no slouch, having gone 21-4 a year ago and nearly beaten runner-up Farmington Mercy in the tournament's other first-round game.

Just as Traverse City, which rallied in the second half behind 6-foot-1½ junior center Wendy Merriman to beat Mercy 43-34, overcame a poor start to beat Canton, the Chiefs also turned the tables on the Captains.

CANTON faced a 30-24 halftime deficit, and it was due to the efforts of 5-11 sophomore Susan Ferko the Chiefs were that close. She scored 10 of her game-high 14 points in the first two quarters to keep Canton within range.

"Susan did a great job scoring at the basket in the first half," Neu said. "She's a good, young player who will only get better."

Other players came to the forefront in the second half and took the load off Ferko's shoulders, and the Chiefs took the game completely away from Kettering.

Canton moved into the lead 42-38 after posting an 18-8 advantage in the third quarter, and they outscored the Captains by 12 in the final period to maintain control.

KAREN Boluch and Heather Miller, both of whom were named to the all-tournament team, scored eight points apiece in the second half and Amanda Bell six. Boluch finished with 13 points — 22 for the tournament. Miller 11 and Bell eight.

"I thought our mental focus was much better than it was to start the game," Neu said. "Our seniors did a nice job taking care of the game in the second half."

"We made some minor adjustments, which was really reinforcing what we needed to do against a scrappy team. We had to get people in the right spots against their pressure and come to meet the ball."

Kettering's Mikki Bryce scored all 10 of her points in the first half, and Megan Armstrong got just three of her nine points after halftime.

Mercy's Jan Herberholz, Merriman and Traverse City teammate Nikki Kulik also were selected for the all-tournament team.

Blazers, Salem take tourney trophies

Start the state girls basketball tournament now because it's evident that Livonia Ladywood has already past mid-season form.

The Blazers passed an early-season test, capturing their third Great Lakes Invitational title in four years Saturday night with a convincing 72-50 victory over Dearborn Divine Child in the championship final. (Plymouth Salem topped Detroit DePorres in the consolation final, 60-44).

It was Ladywood's fourth straight win without a loss and its third against a state-ranked team this year.

"This is kind of a different group," said Ladywood coach Ed Kavanaugh, who guided the Blazers to state Class B titles in 1983 and 1985. "They're really together and the intensity level is there — and they're workers."

Divine Child, which knocked Ladywood out last year in the regional finals, succumbed to the Blazers' fierce assault.

"THE TWO TEAMS, flying up and down the floor, traded baskets in the first quarter with Ladywood holding a 20-17 advantage.

The Blazers then turned their game up a notch in the second quarter, shredding the Falcons' zone defense to gain a 15-point lead at the half, 41-26. In the third quarter Ladywood put the game out of reach with an 18-10 scoring margin. Highly instrumental in the surge was 6-foot-1-inch center Katie McNulty, who converted a trio of three-point plays.

McNulty finished with a game-high 22 points and helped shut down DC's high-scoring center Gabrielle Senatore, who finished with 12, most of them coming after the game had already been decided.

"We feel defensively that our players are good enough that we can go head-up with people," Kavanaugh said. "We didn't plan anything special."

McNulty was named to the all-tournament team along with speedy guard Yvonne Barnett, who finished with 13.

THE BLAZERS ALSO got 15 points from senior forward Nancy Wagner, who enjoyed a fine tournament, and nine from Karen Finnegan.

"We were on the floor for the ball and it seemed we always rebounded with two or three people around the ball," Kavanaugh said. "They're very team-oriented and they're not selfish. They know all the players can score when they move the ball around."

Salem's Dena Head was named the tournament MVP — and deservedly so. The 5-foot-10 forward scored 65 points, grabbed 34 rebounds, made 12 steals and dished off 14 assists in the two-game series.

Forward Dawn Douglas of DePorres was also named to all-tournament team along with Divine Child guard Andrea McAllister, who finished with 18 points against Ladywood.

IN THE CONSOLATION game, Salem broke a 13-13 first quarter deadlock by outscoring the Eagles 18-4 in the second quarter.

Head, who finished with 30 points, and junior point-guard Jill Estey, who contributed 12 points and eight assists on the night, sparked the second quarter outburst.

"Our pressure in the second quarter was excellent," said Salem coach Fred Thomann, whose team is 2-1. "We did a pretty good job on Douglas, who is a fine scorer, and on Dana Joubert (eight points). And we really did a good job of running the court. We got excellent scoring off our defense."

Nothing gained, nothing lost.

That was the bottom line Monday night after Livonia boys soccer rivals Churchill and host Stevenson, two of the state's top-ranked teams, battled to a 1-1 draw before 800 fans.

Two-time defending state Class A champion Spartans, who have not lost in three years, went into the game as a slight favorite, ranked No. 1.

But Churchill, ranked No. 6, held tough despite being outshot 18-8. The Chargers also proved they could be a team to be reckoned with at the end of the season.

"It's fun to play the best and you can't take anything away from a team like Stevenson," said Churchill coach John Neff. "Being able to hang with them is encouraging."

"These things happen in soccer," said Stevenson coach Pete Scerri. "I told them they played a good game. I'm glad it happened now. I'm very satisfied. How many good chances did we throw out?"

BOTH GOALS were scored early in the first half.

Churchill drew first blood at the 11-minute mark when sophomore forward Phil Todino, taking an assist from John Gentile, put the ball into the net make it 1-0.

But Stevenson answered only five minutes later when junior Bob Dimitriou came up from his mid-field post and sent one through. Kurt Will on the goal to knot the count at 1-1.

Stevenson then had a goal disallowed on an off-side call, but the Spartans continued to threaten, particularly near the end of the first half.

Churchill's Chris Speen then came up with what proved to play of the night, heading a ball out of the net when goalie Ted Lukiewski was pulled out of position on a Mel Karfis corner kick.

"We've got some work to do on corner kicks," Neff said. "They were jumping all over us on those."

But Lukiewski, a senior who is starting for the first time, made very few mistakes. He also had

good help from sweeper back Jim Chendes, who patrols the goal area like a middle linebacker.

"TED HAS BEEN around and he's paid his dues," Neff said. "He did a very nice job."

In the second half, Stevenson would mount an offensive rush, come up empty and then find Churchill's quick forward line of Khaled Zeidan, Gentile, Bodin and Todino responding with a rush of their own.

But the pattern throughout the second half proved fruitless as both teams failed to score.

"Churchill was juiced up," said Scerri. "But every team is juiced up when they play us. I think our team felt a little pressure."

"I think what we have to do is have the mid-fielders come up more from behind."

Neff also kicked around some strategic ideas for the future.

"We played a little too much kickball," he said. "We didn't get the ball on the ground enough. And we had a hard time at midfield."

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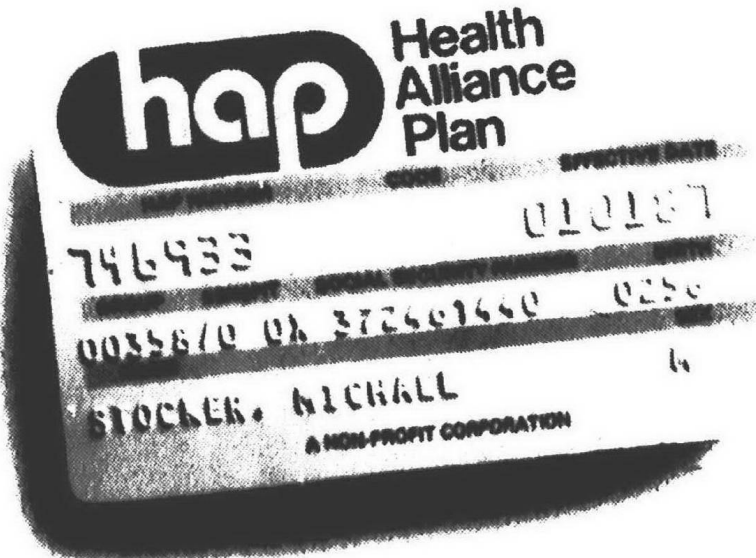

HURDLE WASN'T as pleased. "I thought we went through a stretch where we passed very poorly, from the middle of game three to the end of game four," he said. "We have not been able to sustain our play. When you have the lead on someone, you shouldn't let them get back into it."

"We haven't established that killer instinct yet."

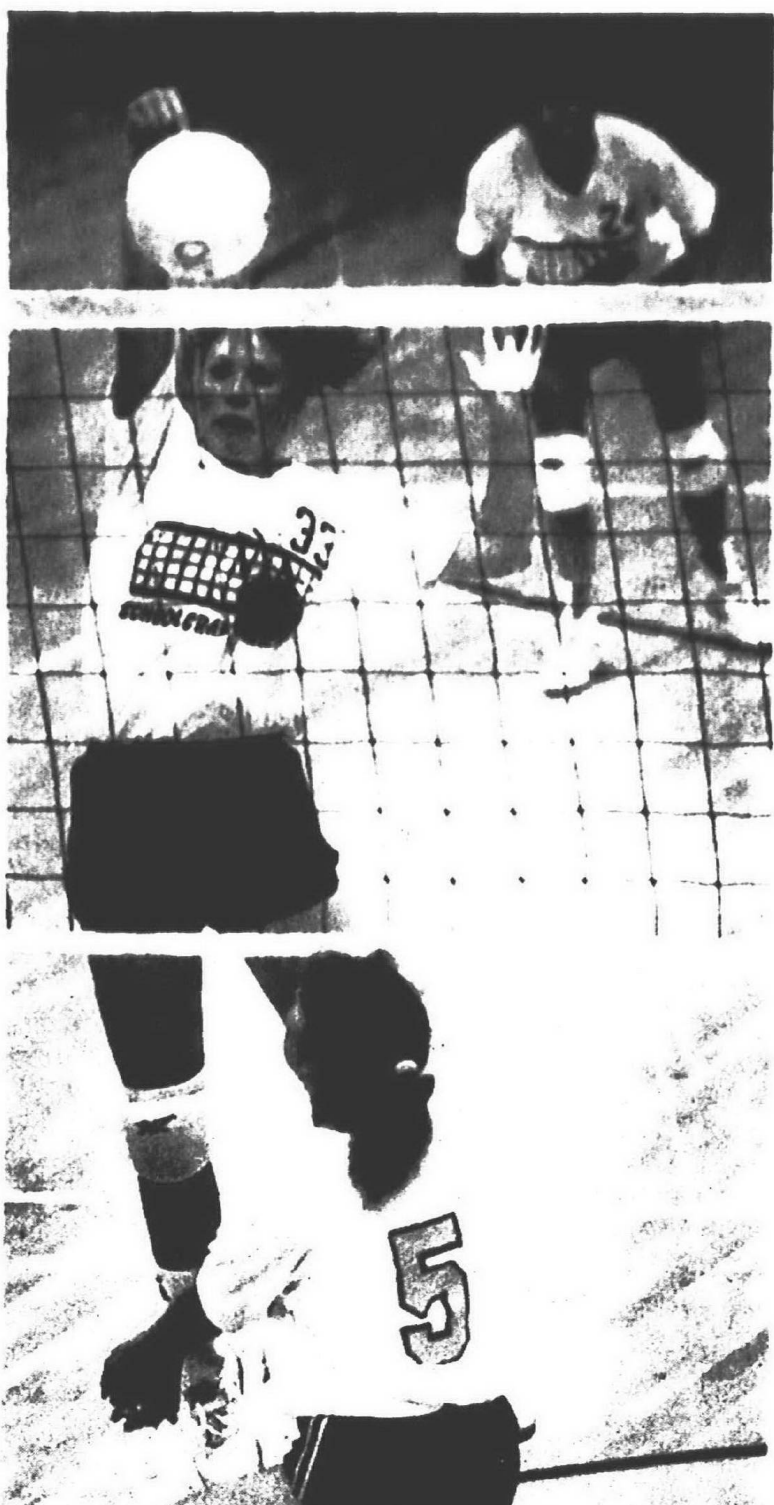
What OU did establish Tuesday was its superior strength. The Lady Pioneers maintained a two-to-three point edge throughout the first game; in the second, they overcame a 5-4 SC lead with five consecutive points and never again trailed. The closest the Lady Ocelots got after that was two.

But the momentum OU built through the first two games quickly dissipated in the third. SC scored the first five points and — behind some outstanding outside hitting by 5-foot-4 Chris Paciero — blasted the Lady Pioneers.

In one stretch of six-straight SC points, Paciero, a freshman from Livonia Churchill, collected four kills. She finished the match with eight, second highest among Lady Ocelots.

THE FOURTH game was the best of the match, with each team surging and neither surrendering. A four-point rally by SC gave it a 10-6 lead, but OU answered by scoring three straight to make it a one-point game. The Lady Ocelots went ahead 11-9 before the Lady Pioneers got the final six points, the last four in a row.

Sue Lormin, the 5-8 senior out-

side hitter from Troy (Athens), sparked OU. She served the three points that got her team back into it in game four, including one ace, then later drilled a kill shot from deep in her own court that tied the game at 11-11.

"If she gets her confidence at the beginning of a match, she's great," Hurdle said of Lormin. "We've been working with her on not getting discouraged if she doesn't get off to a quick start."

"I didn't think she started particularly well tonight, but she stuck with it and got better as the match progressed."

Lormin finished with a team-high 17 kills in 37 attacks. Her attack percentage was .324.

The premier hitters for each team turned in their normal fine performances. SC's Jill Ehler collected 16 kills, tops for the Lady Ocelots, although nine errors lowered her attack percentage to .156.

OU's Tracey Jones fared better, getting 14 kills in 33 attacks with four errors for a .303 average.

Ehler's attack percentage was hurt by OU's superior size and blocking ability. The most telling statistic from the match was blocks. OU, considered small by NCAA Division II standards, had 29 blocks to just 13 for SC.

"We need to play a little more consistently, and we need to pass the ball better," said Hurdle. Teeters' concern: "We've got to get some more blocking."

OU improved to 8-1; SC is 7-3.

SC NOTES: The Lady Ocelots had few problems at the Lake Michigan CC Invitational last weekend, winning 11 of 12 games. SC ripped Flint Mott 15-3, 15-5 to reach the semifinals, where it beat Kellogg CC 15-11, 15-5. In the finals, it was a 15-13, 15-5 triumph over Lake Michigan. Ehler paced the Lady Ocelots with 45 kills.

Neumann scores 4 in win over Delta

Gemstone artistry

TAPED TO A paneled wall in gemologist Ken Rose's Southfield office is a simple one-line sentence cut out of a magazine. It reads, "We show you what you haven't seen."

This unofficial motto is the cornerstone of Rose's career, as multifaceted as a carefully cut gemstone.

An art teacher at Stevenson High School in Livonia until his retirement in June 1986, he runs a thriving business he started almost 20 years, selling unusual gemstones to craftspeople, commercial jewelers and schools across the U.S.

For 10 years, he was associated with the Detroit Institute of Arts, first as an instructor, then as coordinator of workshops and of all the children's art classes conducted by the DIA.

A trim, dapper man whose only concession to the more traditional Bohemian appearance associated with male artists is a well-groomed beard, Rose reminisced about his teaching career and discussed his flourishing business behind a desk that glittered with un-set, rainbow-hued gemstones.

"I STARTED AS a jeweler's apprentice, then I decided to make my living with my hobby, so I went into teaching," recalled Rose. Then with a grin he said, "Except back then, if you'd told me I'd be teaching, I'd have told you you were out of your mind. But I stayed with it for 30 years."

Rose, an alumnus of Cass Technical High School in Detroit, obtained his bachelor's degree from Wayne State University in 1958 and began his teaching career at this time. He also has a master's degree in metals from Eastern Michigan University and also has a certificate in gemology from the Gemological Institute of America, the accepted school of the trade.

At the same time that he launched his teaching career full time in Livonia, Rose joined the staff at the Detroit Institute of Arts.

Those years saw the beginning of the Family Workshop Program, an idea that Rose and a colleague borrowed from the Museum of Modern Art in New York City. Held on Sundays in centers throughout the metropolitan Detroit area, the program had an unusual requisite.

"Parents couldn't show up without kids, and kids couldn't show up without parents," Rose said firmly.

"A lot of professional artists were involved and it worked out very well," he recalled.

Rose's teaching career embraced all types of media, including drawing, print-making, sculpture and painting.

He also found the time to exhibit his art work in crafts and art shows, building a reputation as an innovative craftsman, an asset that would prove invaluable when the time came to switch careers.

EXCEPT THAT ROSE hasn't completely abandoned his former profession.

He serves on the board for the Scholastic Art Awards for metropolitan Detroit, a national organization that honors the achievements of high school art students. The Detroit chapter has enjoyed much success in competition with schools across the U.S. and next year may bring increased recognition for the retired teacher.

"I've been told — although there's nothing official as yet — that I've been recommended to be a national judge in New York (on the jewelry competition) in 1988," Rose said.

"It would really be a kick because I've had a lot of national winners in New York over the years, and it would be nice to culminate this by being a judge."

The things that Rose puts into his jewelry designs are the same

things he looks for when evaluating a piece of jewelry.

Basically, his three criteria are originality, good craftsmanship and how wearable the piece is for its owner. The last guideline can be a little tricky, warned Rose.

"Sometimes jewelry artists tend to forget these things are going to be worn, and sometimes they're not very comfortable."

Before Rose begins creating a piece of jewelry, he first considers the stone and what he is designing — a ring or necklace, for example.

He may sketch some preliminary designs, but usually he prefers to begin working with wax molds. He always uses metal-working tools with the molds because when the piece is cast in metal, he can finish it with the same tools.

ROSE WORKS WITH the customer throughout the designing process, showing them two or three waxes before the metal is cast for the setting.

"They want to see it and hold it," he explained. "Jewelry is a tactile thing. It's the closest thing that you're wearing — closer than your clothes — and it has to have a good feel to it."

Trust is an all-important factor when a designer is commissioned to create an original piece of jewelry.

"Sometimes, someone will come in with a picture and say, 'I want something like that' when they really don't," he commented.

Often the customer confuses what they may want with how they feel other people will react to it, forcing the designer to become an amateur psychologist in order to satisfy the customer. But that's usually not the case with Rose.

"The people who come to me don't want the round stone in the round setting," he laughed.

That's also true of one of Rose's most successful former students, Matthew C. Hoffmann of Ann Arbor.

The two met while Hoffmann was still a student at Livonia's Bentley High School 13 years ago. With Rose's encouragement and resources, Hoffmann's creative talents blossomed.

From his first store in Ann Arbor, Hoffmann has gone on to open a showroom in Chicago and is planning for the opening this fall of his New York showroom on Madison Avenue.

The 30-year-old avant-garde designer has built up a sizable reputation around his individually sculpted gold designs.

Last year, Rose accompanied Hoffmann to New York to scout locations for his newest showroom.

After Rose retired last year, Hoffmann asked him to join his

staff, and for five months, the two collaborated on jewelry designs and laid the groundwork for Hoffmann's New York store.

BUT ROSE'S OWN business demanded his full-time attention, and the arrangement ended. They remain close friends, however, and enjoy a mutual admiration of each other's accomplishments.

"I'm very proud of Matthew, and he always gives me a pat on the back," beamed Rose.

Hoffmann isn't the only other former Rose protege to achieve success in the art world.

One young woman is a successful fashion designer in California and another is an accomplished photographer and sculptor living in New York.

The father of three, Rose tried

to instill an early awareness of art by assigning each child a jewelry project as they were growing up. It didn't work, he said.

"They'd rather have me make it for them," he said.

However, his oldest daughter Aryn is an architect with the firm of Catello and Associates of Birmingham, designing buildings instead of jewelry.

A psychologist friend of Rose's once offered his opinion of how Rose achieved success as a designer. He told Rose that many people are afraid that once they create something, they will never be able to do it again.

"But I know I can," he said, smiling.

'Prisoners of art' share a gallery show

"We don't know what it is to be bored," said Louis Gothelf as his wife, Reva Shwayder Gothelf, smiled in agreement.

These two octogenarian artists, whose love affair and wedding were documented in the locally made film, "Young at Heart," will have a combined show of their paintings at Rubner Gallery of West Bloomfield starting Friday.

Each will have more than 20 new works in the show, which continues through Oct. 1. Hers are acrylic on canvas and his are watercolor on paper.

"We painted like all winter long," she said, describing their apartment in Florida that faces the Gulf of Mexico. "Mine are mostly scenes of the water, beaches, trees, but not palm trees. The only artist who could do palm trees well was Winslow Homer, and my name isn't Winslow Homer. I'll have a lot of flowers, too. And I used quite a bit of silver leaf."

"Mine are mostly local scenes," her husband said.

"We get in the car and drive," Rose Gothelf said, "and we've found a favorite spot where we paint."

"I am painting in the tradition of Edward Hopper and Winslow Homer," said Louis, who has achieved success as a portrait painter.

He recently completed a commissioned portrait of a Filipino ophthalmologist. That, along with one he did of his wife will be in the exhibit as well as a self portrait. His portrait of

President Jimmy Carter is in the Archives of the Carter Library.

In the course of their lives, each has achieved wide recognition as an artist. His work has been exhibited in the art museums in Toledo, Milwaukee, Indianapolis, Rockford, Ill., and in many private galleries. He did stage settings for the Chicago Civic Opera Company for many years.

Watercolor is a relatively new medium for Gothelf, but a natural one, since he loves to draw.

"He draws constantly," said his wife, "when we go out he's always got a pencil."

He picked up the conversation at that point. "In the doctor's office, for instance. The doctor tells you to come in at 2:30 p.m. and he doesn't see you until 4 o'clock," he said.

"He can get a lot done there. People are always interesting in the doctor's office," she said.

SHE, TOO, LIKES to paint from life. "I like to go to Eastern Market, there's plenty of material there."

Her art career formally began in 1948 when she enrolled at Society of Arts, which later became Center for Creative Studies, and studied with the great Sarkis Sarkisian. She has since exhibited and taught extensively. Her work has been in shows at the Philadelphia Academy of Art, Detroit Institute of Arts, Wayne State University and Lincoln Center. Her work is also in many corporate and private collections.

He worked in a herring factory. . . . Chagall was a great painter. Talk about a creative genius."

"His nephew taught me Hebrew. My father paid him 25 kopecks . . ."

"Reva and I both have a basket of energy to keep on going. I'm a pris-

oner for life in the art world."

BOTH WERE a bit surprised, but not awed, by the attention they have received as a result of being the stars of the movie, "Young at Heart."

"They stop us on the street," she said. "They stop us in the grocery. I have never yet seen anybody who didn't react to the film. I didn't know at the time they were doing a movie, I thought they were just for us. We probably wouldn't have been any good if we had known."

Reva Shwayder Gothelf and Louis Gothelf are up early in the morning to work in their shared studio.

Their show opens with a 6-9 p.m. reception for the artists. Regular gallery hours are 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

Textured board makes difference

OCCASIONALLY people come into my store for the first time and say, "Hi, is David Messing in?" Now that is my favorite straight line. I always say, "Well, does he owe you any money?" and when they say, "No," I add, "Well, then, I'm Dave Messing."

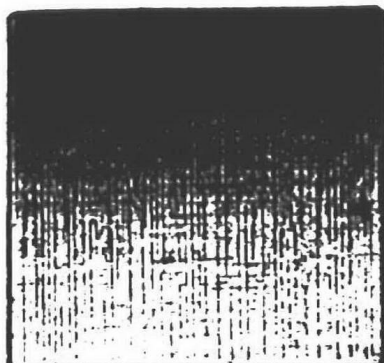
Here's another favorite. The customer says "You must be Dave Messing but you're much taller than you appear in your picture in the paper." Now, I never ask this because I don't want to sound like a smart alec, but how tall can just your head look?

No one recognizes me from my picture unless it's at the worst time possible. For example, I just came out of the steam room and shower at the health spa. That morning I had to borrow Adam's giant beach towel with Mickey Mouse on it. So there I am — half-asleep with just smiling Mickey around my middle. I also have my head tipped way over to one side and am blasting my hair with a hair blower. In walks this guy, tips his head to the side and says, "Hey, you're Dave Messing. My wife reads your column all the time."

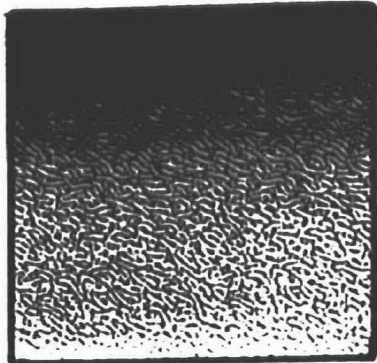
Instantly I suck in my gut and almost lose my towel. So with towel in hand, blower in the other and a smattering of cream on my face, I say, "Er... um... yes, I am he and tell her thank you — and..." Fortunately the whirl of my blow dryer cut the conversation short. One noticeable difference from my picture, however, is that my beard now has more blonde in it. WELL, A PICTURE usually makes things pretty clear and pictures of textured drawing boards help define their versatility. Some of what I discussed last week bears repeating as you look at the boards. Remember, the fine shell pattern is probably the most common. Coarse shell is better for large pictures. If you are doing artwork which will be greatly reduced, I also recommend the larger textured boards like the coarse shell, stipple and linen.

We have over 400 students and most of them love working on tex-

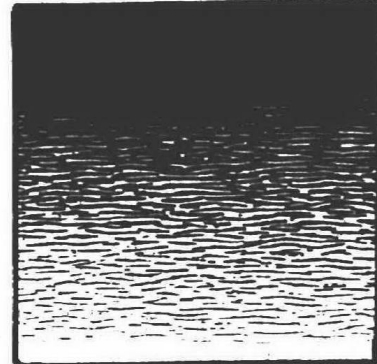

ured boards or papers. Likewise, most customers are fascinated with the idea of textured surfaces. So take a look at these wonderful textured surfaces and imagine your next project done on one of them.

Scratch board is also available in several textures. However, I prefer the "fine" textured pre-coated scratchboard. This product comes from England; is a very thick board is technically called Esdee scraper board. Unfortunately, it only comes in a small 9-by-12-inch sheet and costs \$4.40. You must see the work you can produce on this marvelous paper/board. It is a special treat to use transparent watercolors over your finished scratchboard. The transparent colors sink into the white scratches and textures and seem to disappear on the black background. When you are done, you then spray the work to fix the colors and enrich the black background.

Robert M. Melsner

Q The developer in our condominium has chosen a management company to manage the condominium and is still in control. Several homeowners are concerned about the quality of management as well as certain construction problems. What should we do?

A The condominium documents provide for the establishment of an advisory committee appointed by the developer. Sometimes the developer hand picks people who he thinks will not cause him problems. See if there is an advisory committee that has been formed. If not, form one, either formally or informally, and organize your members so that you can prepare for the taking over of control of the association. Such preparation should include the retention of legal counsel, a management consultant, and a CPA.

Q We are looking for an objective answer to the following question: What is the difference between a lawyer who charges a lower hourly rate and a lawyer who charges a higher hourly rate for purpose of handling my closing? Can you elaborate?

A It is difficult to respond to your question with particularity because you are dealing with the subjective aspects of hiring a professional to provide personal services to you. The criteria which go into the hourly rates charged by an attorney often include his years of practice and experience in the particular specialty involved, his recognition as an expert or specialist in the community, his rating among the lawyers, his academic

and professional background including articles and seminars at which he has spoken, and the quality of the support staff which he has.

You should also look into minimum charges for services such as phone calls and letters and how fast the work can get finished. Price alone should not be the determination in selecting any professional service.

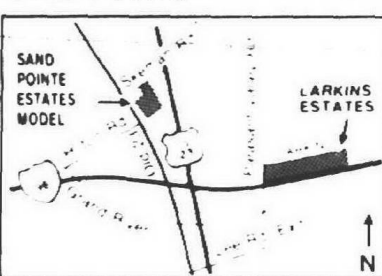
TAX UPDATE FOR HOMEOWNERS

Homeowners age 55 or over may exclude from their taxable income a capital gain up to \$125,000 from the sale of their principal residence. They must have lived in the home at least three of the five years before they sell, and the exemption may be claimed only once in a lifetime. This tax break has not been changed.

Deductions for mortgage interest and real estate taxes remain at \$1,000. If you are forced to purchase a home due to a disaster, over 35 miles away, one-half of the total \$1,000 may be deducted for pre-movng househunting expenses and temporary living expenses up to 30 days at your new location. If you have the deduction, you have to use it within 90 days. There has been a change in the new tax law. With the new law, you can now deduct the mortgage interest on a second home. If you have a second home, you can deduct the mortgage interest on that home as well.
