New requirements OK'd for CEP graduates in '92

Graduation requirements for students entering ninth grade next year in Plymouth-Canton Community Schools have been revised to include at least one semester of computer education and an additional semester of social studies.

The minimum number of credits necessary to graduate - 22 - remains unchanged.

The school board revised curriculum requirements to meet standards established by the state department of education for school financing incentives.

PLYMOUTH-CANTON stands to collect about \$475,000 in state aid by complying, according to Mi-

chael Homes, assistant superintendent for instruction. "I think the incentive is to bring conformity and consistency as far as the number of credits graduating senand areas in which they should iors should have

satisfy Homes doesn't expect that the new requirements will create hardships for students here, especially where computer science is concerned.

"It would have to be a highly unlikely set of circumstances to prevent a kid from meeting requirements."

The state, for example, has allowed Plymouth-Canton to consider the 10-week computer classes made available to all sixth and seventh grade students as fulfilling the computer requirement.

The computer requirement also can be met by completing such high school classes as beginning typing keyboarding, computer math and computer data processing

BOARD MEMBERS and administrators said their biggest concerns about state curriculum requirements is the conflict that sometimes arises when students want to experiment with fine arts classes

Classes like band and chorus generally are offered only at specific time periods. More required classes limit electives.

The earlier required classes are completed, the better, Homes advised

We would hope parents would play a close and sig nificant role in making these choices." Homes said.

Students graduating in the Class of '92 will have to earn two credits in science, two in math, four in English or language arts, three in social studies, one half in health, one in physical education, two in a broad category including fine arts, foreign language, vocational education and practical arts, one half in computer education and seven in electives.

Recent garage fire was set; 3rd arson blaze in 5 weeks

A fire which last week damaged a garage at a rental property on Harvey Street in the city of Plymouth was the work of an arsonist, according to Fire Chief Al Matthews.

The fire in the detached two-car garage was set in at least two places, Matthews said. Samples collected from the debris were sent to the state police crime lab.

Matthews estimated damage at \$5,500.

Firefighters were summoned at 4:07 p.m. Nov. 25. The last unit cleared the scene at 6:38 p.m. No one was injured.

The investigation into an arson fire Nov. 20 at Lillo's Pizza and Subs in Charlestown Square continues, Matthews said.

Alertness can reduce shopping season risks

Witness one harried holiday

Call her Beth.

Beth wants to do all her Christmas shopping in one trip, so she darts from store to store, until her shopping is complete.

When she leaves the mall, her arms are so filled with packages that they're dropping on the floor.

Her wallet and credit cards are visible in her purse, as she walks across a poorly lit parking lot, alone. Her mind is on other things: parties, early work deadlines, Christ-

mas commitments. There's so much to do, so little

AREA POLICE would call someone like Beth a prime candidate for

Women, in general, are more susceptible to assault in malls than men because they do much of the shopping, police say.

There's safety in numbers," said Plymouth Police Chief Richard Myers. "Females should pair up and married women should shop with their husbands in order to discourage

"Purses should be held close to the body. The year-round rule, don't drape your purse over your arm, still applies."

Myers advises shoppers to put their packages in the trunk so they won't be visible inside the car. "It's

not as easy to break into a trunk as into a car

Some malls are safer than others or are perceived to be so, he said. A confident walk will provide a positive, not vulnerable, appearance.

FOOT PATROLS are planned in downtown Plymouth, especially during afternoon and evening hours, Myers said.

Dave Boljesic, public safety information officer in Canton, provides similar advice.

"Drive around till you find a good, well-lit spot. If it takes extra time, it's OK. It's for your own good."

Boljesic also warns against credit card fraud.

"Make sure that when you give somebody your card it is your card and not somebody else's card. Stores are real busy now and it's easy to get cards mixed up. Charge receipts should be ripped up."

Never count money in front of

Use caution in using 24-hour bank machines when you're alone after dark. Boljesic said a better idea is using teller machines inside stores.

When large, expensive gifts are brought home, the worst place to put them is under the Christmas tree in front of an open window, he said. "Be aware of your environment.

Nobody will deter crime completely but you can make yourself a less likely target." Foot patrols also will be added in

Plymouth-to-Plymouth Gas Balloon Race will be televised next week on local cablevision.

Where the Wind Blows" is a program on the flight of the gas balloon Windsong on Oct. 12, 13.

The gas balloon, piloted by Gordon Boring with co-pilot Scott Lorenz, left Plymouth from Central Middle School athletic field the evening of Friday, Oct. 12, and landed Saturday south of Lexington, Ky.

The video centers on the balloon Windsong (the lone entry in a race to Plymouth, Mass.) and its flight commemorating the Michigan Sesquicentennial and the 30th anniversary of the sailing of the Mayflower II.

The event also was a fund-raiser for Straight, Inc., a drug rehabilitation program in Plymouth.

The major portion of the video was taped the day the balloon actually landed. The film includes scenes from the six-hour period of prepar-

A 60-minute documentary on the ing the balloon for flight, a lift-off made possible with the assistance of 25 volunteers from throughout Mich-


> THE FLIGHT also revived the two century old tradition of balloon mail. The Windsong carried with it 2,500 envelopes that were delivered to Plymouth, Mass., and then mailed back to the purchaser. The envelopes were sold for \$10 with proceeds going to Straight.

> The Windson's original destination was to be in or near Plymouth, Mass Due to weather, the take-off was delayed three days. By Oct. 12 it became evident to Boring and Lorenz that if they did not leave soon they would be delayed for at least a week

Knowing their destination would be nowhere near the east coast, Lorenz and Boring took off. In the program, producer Perry displays the ironic conclusion to a successful story. After returning to Michigan, Lorenz said of the flight: "It was 19 hours of pure bliss followed by 20 minutes of pure terror."

Perry, sports information director for Omnicom, is in the process of distributing the program to cable stations around the country.

He also is working on a similar type of program on the second annual Plymouth-in-the-Fall Sports Memorabilia Show held this past at the Plymouth Hilton.



People see \$2 million and think it isn't much of a cut, but it's actually much more than that," he said.

Cuts could be canceled if state legislators approve new taxes and fees for Wayne County.

The center and families it serves will be lobbying legislators for quick approval of the county budget package, Herzberg said. Approval by mid-December, as sought by the county, would allow most services to continue with limited interruption, he said. Later approval, he added, would almost be as devastating as no approval.

'It would take several months to bring our operations back to where they were and there's no guarantee we could," Herzberg said. "Every year, we face some threat of cuts. It's like we're a yo-yo. It's impossible to run a good mental health program that way."

PARKS CUTS mean cancellation of all supervised winter activities at Hines Park and other county recreation areas. Skating ponds and tobboggan hills won't be maintained this winter. Only one major activity will remain: cross-country skiing







It's a matter of deciding which house should go first." Geake said. My recommendation was that it should begin in the Senate

Passage could come quickly if leaders in both houses reached agreement Kosteva said but it's doubtful the package would be passed before mid-month

McNamara said he hoped to have the bills approved by Dec. 17 when the Legislature is to take its winter

"It's going to take time." Geake said. I don't think it's going to come by Dec 17 but then I think we'll continue meeting past that date, too."

Four cents of the cigarette tax increase would go toward criminal justice programs, as sought by the county. One cent each would go to local health departments and for statewide AIDS research. The additional two cent increase represents a compromise with out-state legisla-

In addition to the cigarette tax increase, the county seeks a tax on Metro Airport parking and an increase in circuit court filing fees

Seniors' home tax credit forms due in mail soon

- Michigan senior citizens will get their property tax credit forms soon despite the stalemate over handling of a federal tax windfall that's delaying printing of regular income tax forms

State Treasurer Robert Bowman announced the state is printing the forms and will mail them immedi-

Senior citizens need to get these forms as soon as possible so they can get their homestead property tax refund and make their winter property tax payments," Bowman said. "They (senior citizens) can send them in as fast as they can fill them out.

THE TAX CREDIT forms will go to senior citizens who received a credit last year and who don't need an income tax form to file. The impasse over the federal windfall has blocked officials from printing regular income tax forms.

Olivia Maynard, director of the

state Office of Services to the Aging. applauded Bowman's action.

For many older adults without the refund, it would mean they would not be able to make their property tax payments on time," she

The windfall to the state treasury was produced by last year's federal income tax changes, which removed many deductions.

Michigan's personal income tax uses the federal standards. Thus, Michigan would get \$170 million more in revenue without a change in the rate. Legislation to return to taxpayers part of the federal tax windfall bogged down Thursday in the

LAWMAKERS AND the Blanchard Administration have struggled for months over how to handle the

It threatens to delay the printing of income tax forms; but Bowman

said most property tax credits for the elderly can be processed without a tax form

Mailing the 750,000 tax credit forms early, and not combining them with income tax forms, will cost the state an extra \$150,000, Bowman said

The forms still will be later than usual Last year the Treasury Department mailed tax booklets in October, and many senior citizens got their refunds by Christmas

The department won't begin printing the tax forms for other taxpayers until the administration and House Democrats agree with Senate Republicans on how to handle the federal tax reform, Bowman said. The dispute could delay tax refunds and cost the state millions of dollars in interest, he said.

I still think it will be resolved, Bowman told a news conference "One of the casualties cannot and will not be senior citizens.





Gov. James J. Blanchard, who proposed the surcharge during bargaining over the speed limit, had no immediate comment

SUTTON SAID an assessment levied under 65 mph speed limit law is not a fine but a tax. This tax, called safety assessment," when combined with all other taxes, causes the total amount of taxes imposed by the legislature to exceed the constitutional revenue limit.

Headlee, still recuperating in Salt Lake City after a heart transplant operation, was the 1982 Republican candidate for governor and leader of the 1978 movement that won voter approval of the tax limitation amendment that bears his name

Part of the amendment states

Property taxes and other local taxes and state taxation and spending may not be increased above the limitations specified herein without direct voter approval.

And There is hereby established a limit on the total amount of taxes. which may be imposed by the legislature in any fiscal year on the taxpayers of this state. This limit shall not be changed without approval of the majority of the qualified electors voting thereon.

WILLIAM D. McMASTER, a Troy publicist who handles many Headlee causes and who also is a director of Taxpayers United for the Michigan Constitution, said. The governor and Legislature are using the federal speed limit law as a fund-raiser for the State Police and the state gov ernment

The first \$6 million annually taxed on tickets issued motorists will supplement operation of the State Police, while the remaining millions anticipated annually are earmarked for the State of Michigan General Fund

In-formula

Equity at issue

OTHING IS so powerful as an idea whose time has come, and it's the hope of educators around the state that the need for a new and equitable system for funding public education is an idea whose time has indeed come.

It's a simple concept, but one that has eluded us for years in Michigan. With our almost total reliance on local property taxes as a basis for public school funding, we have created a system that allows some districts to have vast sums of money for various programs, while others have a difficult time funding the most basic of programs.

The difference is, of course, the difference in property wealth, and those districts with an extensive property wealth have great financial advantages over those that do not.

The state tries to reduce the difference between property rich and property poor districts through a general state aid program. The trouble is that in spite of its best effortsover the years there has not been enough money available to achieve equality and the differences among districts are getting greater.

REDFORD Union Schools, for example, is a property poor district that had a per pupil tax base in 1986-87 of \$38,781. This compares with its school district neighbors who had per pupil tax bases of \$182,299; \$121,440; and \$107,191 in that same

Because of its low tax base Redford Union received general state aid. The combination of general state aid and local tax revenues provided \$3,011.02 per pupil for the

The neighboring districts because of property wealth, did not receive general state aid, but depended exclusively upon local property taxes for the operation of their district. Their local property taxes alone were able to provide per pupil revenues of \$5,893; \$4,025; and \$3,773 for

their districts respectively.

The irony is that the property tax rate (36.9 mills) paid by residents in Redford Union was higher than that paid by any of their neighbors in the other three districts. However, the dollars available for education programs, even when combined with state aid, were substantially less.

If Redford Union had the same dollars available per pupil as was available to its neighbors, the district's budget in 1986-87 would have increased in one instance by \$18 million, and in the other by \$6.4 million and \$4.8 million.

Such increases would have permitted the district to restore a full sixhour day at the junior high school (cut back to five hours in 1976), restore a full art, music and physical education program at the elementary level (reduced in 1981), buy needed equipment and materials, repair all roofs throughout the district, lower class sizes at all levels, and, in

It should be said here that we in Redford Union are very happy for our neighbors, although we're admittedly quite envious also. Their districts are funded the way that all districts should be funded. It is our hope that one day soon we'll all enjoy the same advantages that they have.

Actually, the present state aid formula, if sufficiently funded, could achieve equity. This was pointed out by Dr. Allan Odden of California, a school finance expert and consultant to the Michigan School Finance Commission.

However, there is a question whether there are sufficient funds available to the state to achieve equity through the present state aid system. And if equity cannot be achieved through the present system then a solution to our dilemma must be found by some other means.

This may have to include the redistribution and sharing of the wealth generated through the state by industrial and commercial properties so that all districts, and all children, receive benefits from these resources. The issue is one of equality of opportunity and basic fairness for all children.

There are many programs being offered in Lansing as legislators and others attempt to reduce property taxes and bring about fairness in school funding.

SEVERAL proposals suggest an increase in the Michigan sales tax in order to replace money lost through reduced property taxes. This, of course, requires a vote of the people and it's very questionable whether such a vote would succeed.

Several proposed plans include redistribution of industrial and commercial income through one means or another. In the absence of any new money available to fund schools, this seems almost inevitable, and, in the view of many, desir-

Suggested also has been a plan whereby an equal sum of money would be distributed to all districts throughout the state for the operation of schools. Such a plan does not take into consideration that there are vast differences in the cost of doing business from one area of the state to the other and this would it-

self be unfair.

The development of a plan to equalize funding for education will be a very difficult process. The issue, however, is too important not to be undertaken. Equal opportunity for all children is in fact an idea whose time has come, and when we do finally achieve it; all of us in Michigan will benefit.

chool funding: separate unequal

The quality of a public school student's education may be greatly enhanced by his or her address. Michigan school districts in propertyrich areas sometimes have two to three times as much to spend per student than do less

affluent school districts.

A desire to equalize spending throughout the state gets widespread approval in theory, but wealthier districts balk when proposed solutions suggest lowering their expenditures in order to spread the wealth to other districts.

Wealthier districts say the solution is to find other revenue sources, such as increasing the state sales tax, in order to raise others to their level. Less affluent districts say it is unlikely that voters, already wary of high property taxes, will approve any substantial tax increase; in that case, a redistribution of the wealth is the only other alternative.

KEY TO THIS debate is the state's formula for funding schools. The formula guarantees a set number of dollars per student, per mill of tax levied by the district. If property taxes don't generate this minimum level, then the state makes up the difference with state aid payments. If the taxable value of property in the district (divided by the number of students) exceeds the minimum guaranteed by the state, the school is an out-of-

formula district and receives no state aid but, because of high property values, is better funded than in-formula school districts.

On today's Observer & Eccentric editorial page, two superintendents look at the school funding dilemma: Roger Garvelink of Birmingham Public Schools writes from the perspective of an out-offormula school district, Kenneth Erickson of Redford Union schools represents in-formula school districts.

Pay for quality

IRMINGHAM CITIZENS have a social conscience. We do care about other students in the state. We firmly believe that the best way to ultimately strengthen our state, our economy and our quality of life is to strengthen our system of public education.

We are an out-of-formula district. Our citizens' state income taxes support other education systems, not ours. We are not complaining Many of us do not qualify for the Homestead Act. We are not complaining. We pay per capita high sales taxes. That money does not support our schools. It supports other school systems. We are not complaining.

What we are complaining about and what we are extremely concerned about is any suggestion that we cannot continue to provide the quality of education for our students as we have in the past, as we are presently and as we feel we should be able to do in the future with our own resources as we simultaneously assist others

EVERY STATE needs lighthouse districts. We have worked diligently to not only provide the very best of educational opportunities for our own students, but to share our experiences, our research, our successes with others

We are privileged to have the resources to respond to the needs of others. We accept this responsibility with great seriousness and humility. We do not expect compensation for our time. We are pleased to be able to help.

Let's look at per pupil cost. Yes, we are one of the very highest in the state. We do not apologize for that. We wish for every student in Michigan to have the same opportunities. However, our per pupil cost is not exactly as you may first think.

Last year we had 7,500 K-12 students. We also had more than 76,700 registrations in community education. In addition, we accommodated more than 10,000 college and university registrations. We actually ran a small college. We provided space and underwrote a large part of the cost for a senior citizens center. We paid the salary of the gerontologistcoordinator. We provided space for the Meals on Wheels program, and coordinated hundreds of other services: daily social activities, trips, social worker services, income tax service and on and on for more than 1,100 seniors

As a school district, we initiate training sessions and leadership forums for the community. We have an important national role in the parent involvement movement.

We are privileged to do these things, but the point is this: As a pub-

lic school system we have stepped up to meeting the needs of a community. If we did not do these things, that is, create a learning community, others would have to do them and probably at greater cost to the taxpayer. It happens that in Birmingham they show up as per pupil cost.

HAVE WE BEEN fiscally responsible? I'm sure we have been. Our salaries are not as high as many. In fact, our teacher salaries are not as high as a number of in-formula districts. Our resources are directed at students and the community as much as possible.

Let us deal with the myth that Birmingham students are all from wealthy families, are raised by nannies, have trust funds and drive Porsches to school. Absolutely not true. We have many wealthy families, it is true. We also have many families, more than generally recognized, which are poor by common definition.

So why are our test scores so consistently high? They are right at the top in the state. The socioeconomic demographics would indicate that we should not score so high, but we do. We do because we have the resources for remedial reading teachers, counselors to deal with potential dropouts, a personalized curriculum if you will.

But at least as important, we have tremendous parental and community involvement and support.

ANY LEVELING of our resources will destroy much of that involvement and commitment which we have nurtured so carefully. The school system will be less our system. Local control is important to us. We feel we should be able to continue to provide that level of services to our students. We want to help others, too, but taking it from Birmingham and other districts like Birmingham is not going to make the impact we need.

The Number One goal of the Michigan Out-of-Formula District Association is to bring more money into the educational system. Again and again we have spent our time and considerable resources working on legislation and bringing about changes that have benefited only in-formula districts and students.

We need statesmen who will fight with determination to make the Birmingham experience available to all students. Our taxpayers are willing to pay more for quality.

Graduation test bad idea

To the editor:

After reading M.B. Dillon's Nov. 16 article concerning competency testing for high school students, I must say that I disagree strongly.

Throughout their 18 years of education, students must take tests such as the IQ, MEAP, IOWA, PSAT, SAT, and NMSQT to name a few. If these students can handle everything on these tests well enough to even be in high school, why is another test needed?

As it is, I feel that in the school system, there are too many tests which are almost always identical and do very little or nothing for a student's academic growth.

However, beyond my personal feelings about an overkill on testing. I would like to pose two hypothetical examples. A student, let's call him Joe, lives in a poor area that can't afford quality education in its schools. Joe is a straight-A student throughout his education, given the information he receives from his teachers.

The competency test, however, covers a lot of material that Joe isn't familiar with. He, therefore, receives a "non-endorsed" diploma, due to the lack of quality education,

which is due to the lack of money in his school. Is this fair — to cheat an intelligent student out of an "endorsed" diploma because he lives in a poor area?

Another example worth considering would be that of two students, let's call them Bill and Bob. Bill is in gifted classes, but his average grade is a C. owing to his irresponsibility in handing in assignments. Bill takes the competency test and, being as intelligent as he is, receives an endorsed diploma.

Bob, on the other hand, is in remedial classes and is a hard worker who earns A's and B's. Bob, not being too smart, takes the competency test and is awarded only a non-endorsed diploma.

Now, a company or college will look at these diplomas, and who do you think the institution will choose? Bill, because of his wonderfully endorsed diploma. The establishment will suffer from Bill's irresponsibility in getting things done but will be too afraid to hire Bob, who would have worked much harder but didn't have "the" diploma.

Is this fair — to allow people who really don't care about excelling to get jobs over those who would really try hard and do good things for the company/college?

I see no advantage to passing S.B. 350, except that its passing might cause schools without the best education to feel compelled to heighten

their standards. However, I sincerely doubt that this would happen.

My greatest fear concerning S.B. 350 is that students will not try in school anymore because the emphasis will turn from grades to one singular test score.

Family ties

Historical footnotes recounted

LAST WEEK, as little children across our land cut out or drew figures of turkeys to adorn their blackboards, teachers no doubt told them of how the first Thanksgiving came about and that the Pilgrims' bountiful corn harvest after their first dreadful winter in Massachusetts brought such rejoicing that a threeday feast was decreed.

Chances are there even was mention of John Alden and Priscilla Mullens and perhaps a reading of Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's poem "The Courtship of Miles Standish." It is a delightful tale with a "they lived happily ever after" message for the children of our classrooms.

But I doubt whether any teacher told the little darlings the ultimate family sequel, leaving well enough alone with the story that Priscilla had two suitors in Capt. Standish and Alden, marrying the latter after her famous line, "Why don't you speak for yourself, John?"

It was a couple of years after the Mayflower had arrived with these hardy souls aboard that John and Priscilla were wed. Their marriage was blessed with 11 children, among them a daughter named Mary. As you will see, Mary became a central figure in the aforementioned sequel to the Alden romance.

HISTORY books don't mention that Priscilla had had a third suitor, but my own family's genealogy does. It traces our lineage back to 1096 when France's first Lord of Lannoy was cited. But it doesn't get interesting until 1620.

At that time, 18-year-old Philippe de Lannoy, French by ancestry, Dutch by birth and English by association, sought passage on the Mayflower to be near his adored Priscilla Mullens. For whatever reason, he missed the boat.

However, a year later he was one of the 35 passengers on the second ship to sail for America, the Fortune, which arrived in Plymouth harbor in November 1661. He had been led by young love, but lost on tution, election laws, voting regula-

that score too and later married one Hester Dewsbury of Duxbury, Mass. a town about 10 miles north of Plymouth.

Philippe was the first French Huguenot to land in America and, although succeeding generations altered the name, he was the first Delano to settle on this continent. He and Hester had at least eight children, among them a son, Thomas.

In what our genealogy calls "an appropriate footnote to the sad story of Philippe's unrequited love for Priscilla," there was an eventual union of the Delano, Mullen and Alden lines in 1667 "when Philippe's son Thomas married Priscilla's daughter Mary in one of this country's first shotgun marriages."

THEN comes a paragraph which may explain that my interest in affairs of the law and the courts, of which I write reasonably often, stems from an incident in family history which took place 320 years ago:

"Plymouth Colony court records interestingly reveal that Thomas Delano was fined 10 pounds on Oct. 30, 1667, for having carnal copulation with his now wife before marriage. The evidence, of course, was the birth of his son on his wedding day."

Meanwhile, Tom's father, Philippe, had gone off chasing Indians years before and for his gallantry was awarded 40 acres of land, which led Philippe and Hester to become neighbors of John and Priscilla. Perhaps that's where we got the adage. 'All's well that ends well.'

Just because of the coincidence in dates, when Mother Goose and I observe our own 34th wedding anniversary next Oct. 30 maybe we should drink a toast to Tom and Mary in absentia. I'll bet we would have liked those folks

A significant addition to the family tree came in 1854 with the birth of Sara Delano, who at age 28, would marry the 54-year-old James Roosevelt. They named their only son Franklin Delano Roosevelt, and he became 32nd president of the United States of America.

This was the same America an ancestor on his mother's side had helped settle three centuries earlier, brought to these shores by the unsuccessful love of a lady named Priscilla. Of such stuff is history made,

Many Founding Fathers - those chaps who wrote the Constitution had a working knowledge of French and had studied Latin and Greek in the academies. In the 60s, a handful of teachers wrote to congressmen asking federal aid for the teaching of those classical languages. They lost

But a modern Midwestern student would be justified in arching an eyebrow and asking. Which language - this year?



GOP agenda Protect assets of elderly

State Rep. W.V. (Sandy) Brotherton tells of a 90-year-old woman in his Farmington district who turned over her assets to a daughter and kept just a few dollars in her bank

"People think it's unfair to lose all to a nursing home. So they divest. They qualify themselves for Medicaid," said Brotherton in a Lansing news conference.

The 65-year-old seven-term lawmaker was a member of a House Republican task force which last week announced a package of bills on long-term care for the elderly.

You'll spend more money in the last year of your left on medical care than in the rest of your life," Brotherton said in underlining the economic issue.

THE PACKAGE got little attention, in part because it was so complicated, but it had a clear theme. Our report recommends how sen-

iors can maintain their homes and still receive adequate and affordable health care," said Rep. Walter De-Lange. R-Kentwood, task force

There also was a political theme: They've put an agenda on the table," said Rep. Victor Krause, R-Rockford, chair of the House GOP Policy Committee, for which the task force is part. The GOP agenda will force Cov. Lance Planeters will force Gov. James Blanchard and majority Democrats in the House to react to their proposals.

The GOP legislators said that improved long-term care should be a top priority to help Michigan's one million senior citizens

Most couples making retirement plans don't realize how fragile their nest egg can be if either partner must be institutionalized," said Rep. Walter DeLange, R-Kentwood.

BROTHERTON'S contribution is House Bill 5067. It would provide an additional state income tax exemption of \$1,500 for a Michigan resident who provides primary care for

a family member over age 60 who is at risk of institutionalization

As individuals live longer," the task force said. 'the likelihood of losing spouse, siblings and friends in-creases." Mix in the projected decreasing ratio of nursing home beds to needy population, and many elderly face trouble.

'A tax incentive would encourage younger family members who are already struggling to support themselves to assist in caring for their elderly relatives," the task force

It also recommended exploring di rect subsidies, as well as Brother ton's proposed tax break, to primary caregivers of elderly family mem-

A KEY MEASURE, said Brotherton, is a pair of bills allowing separation of the assets and income of married couples when one seeks application for long-term care ser-

Only the assets and income of one would be considered in determining eligibility for 'Medicaid long-term' assistance. That recommendation is covered in House Bills 5021 and

The bills would try to guard against the nursing home bills of one spouse using up all of a couple's assets, leaving the other - usually the wife - impoverished.



Reading choices for kids vary

By Julie Brown staff writer

HEN IT'S time to shop for holiday gifts for children, books are a good option

Not just any book will do, however. Children of different ages and with different interests most likely won't enjoy reading the same books.

"They really should know what the child's interests are," said Pam Rawlinson, deputy director of the Dunning-Hough Library in Plymouth. It's also important to know the child's reading level.

Judy Teachworth, head of children's services at the Canton Public Library, agreed it's important to know what children's interests

"And then I'd say, too, just trust your own instincts and judgment." The librarians agree it's a good idea for children to own some

"There are always those books that should be in everybody's home all the time," Rawlinson said

HAVING A book at home means a child doesn't have to worry about it being checked out of the library, the added.

she added.
"You're saying this is special,"
Teachworth said of giving books to
children. Giving kids books encourages them to read; there's not
a conflict between book stores and
libraries, she said.

"I think they co-exist beautifully, because you can't buy every book."

In buying books, shoppers have a number of titles for young readers to choose from Books are available both in hardcover and in paperback.

Younger children generally do better with sturdier hardcover books, Rawlinson said. Hardcover books are sturdier, although they're also more expensive.

Even a paperback is preferable over nothing

Hardcover books usually have better illustrations. Teachworth said

"I guess it depends on your budget. They both have their place, I think."

There are always some classics on recommended lists. Teachworth said. Those titles are ones that educators and librarians recommend, they're also books that children eniov

In buying books for infants and toddlers, it's important to consider durability. Teachworth said. Some books have pages that can easily be wiped clean.

SOME BOOKS for very young children come with a stuffed ani-

mal. Books for young children have big pictures and easy to follow stories

Kids can learn to turn pages using those too. Teachworth said. The thicker pages of those books make them easier for very young children to handle.

Books involving familiar objects and the ABCs are good choices for very young children, she said. Nursery rhymes, such as Mother Goose, are popular for that age group Very young children also enjoy books with fabrics they can touch or scents they can smell.

When children get to be a little older, books can become a bit more complex. Preschool children enjoy books with plenty of action; books about everyday things, funny animals and ridiculous situations are popular. Catchy rhymes are also popular.

The Dr. Seuss books are popular with younger readers, Rawlinson said Parents may want to look for

books that have won the Newbery Medal or the Caldecott Medal. Those medals for outstanding books are awarded annually by the Association for Library Service to Children, the American Library Association.

Some children's books come with a cassette or record, she said. Children can read the story and play the cassette or record as they read.

CHILDREN AGES 6 to 8 or so can handle more complex stories

"You still want illustrations, I would say, and you want them to match the text," Teachworth said. Children in the early elementary grades enjoy "how to" books on such subjects as crafts, drawing and simple cooking.

Children who are interested in dinosaurs will enjoy books on dinosaurs, she said.

These tips on choosing books for children of all ages are included in a Reading Is Fundamental pamphlet. "Choosing Good Books for Voir Children"

Your Children."

• Have your children help select books as soon as they start indicating preferences. Let them browse in a library or bookstore

and choose for themselves.

• Get to know the children's section of your local library and seek' help from the children's librarian. (Children's librarians are knowledgeable about books for children and want to help you.)

 Determine your children's interests and then help to steer them toward books on their favorite sub-

 Ask relatives and friends about books their children have taken to heart. You may want to trade books.

• If your son or daughter doesn't like a book, put it away. Forcing books on a child will defeat your purpose and turn reading into a battle of wills.

 Understand that children may want to hear (or read) favorite books again and again, even after you think they've "outgrown" them.

 Consult lists of recommended books. Several organizations make them available.

• Experiment. Offer variety but above all, trust your young

ters' reactions and your own.
 Look for books you will enjoy reading aloud. Allow your enthusi-

asm to come through.
 Remember that your role is to introduce your children to the pleasures of reading, so have fun.

Christian radio might be new to Livonia, but it's certainly not new to Charlotte Kennedy

The general manager of the newly-established WLQV-AM 1500. whose offices and studios are in Livonia, has worked in the business since she was 19. She's done everything from being an announcer to working in commercial sales.

A common bond links us with the Soviet people

thought. If we killed most of the people in the Soviet Union in a nuclear war, how many Christians would we

My wife is a teacher, so I asked her how many Christians she guessed live in the Soviet Union. She said probably a million. I read up on the number.

Christian believers alone number 100 million in the Soviet Union. Add to this Jews and Moslems and you get 130 million people. The Communist Party only amounts to 18 million people. These figures remind me of the action carried out in the Viet; nam War, "To save the village we had to obliterate it.

The period between Thanksgiving and New Year's Day is a time of peace and hope. It is a time when the contrasts of how the world should be and how it really is become sharp. It is a time when we pray for peace and we help the poor I do not believe that we should evade the differences between the American and Soviet systems. On the other hand, we must learn more about those we call our enemies

My son is studying in a university in West Germany. He lives about a two-hour drive from the Czech border. Among the subjects he is studying are Eastern Europe, Russian history and Russian language. The tensions and division of the Cold War are very real in this part of the world. We also need to study the So-

FROM EVERYTHING I read it is

Not so long ago I had a disturbing evident that the Russians know more about us than we know about them Our inclination is to believe that the two nations are very far away. All we need to know is that they are different from us and they threaten us This is not enough.

Our knowledge of Russian Christianity is pitifully small. For a thousand years the Christian faith bas been separated East from West Peace and hope can only have a chance if we make connections with those who are brothers and sisters in the faith in a vastly different situa-

I am encouraged by the interest among younger adults in visiting Christian communities in Central America. I also believe that we must make contacts between religious people in our nation and in the Soviet Union Our denomination's mission study for the year is the people and churches of the Soviet Union This is hopeful.

We need to keep this image in our

minds: There are five Christians for every one Communist in the Soviet Union We need to build new images which offer hope for greater understanding I remember a professior of history

at Wayne State University telling a group that war is always built upon the concept that we are different from them. He then said that the only way to reverse this process is to sestablish a basis for our similarity; with a potential enemy. As a people and as individuals of faith, we can work toward reversing this fatal im-





Crested?

Office occupancy depends on marketing efforts

Southeastern Michigan's office construction market may have peaked and soon could post higher vacancy rates unless builders observe basics "while the market is good," according to the speaker at Tuesday's Builders Association of

Southeastern Michigan meeting. William Smolkin, head of a New Orleans marketing and feasibility consulting group, told the meeting that while he personally is not familiar with the Detroit area's office market, he is knowledgeable about national trends. Smolkin said Oakland County, particularly Southfield, is one of the few places in the country still in good shape with high occupancy rates

In 1960, only 40,000 square feet of office space was on the market north of Eight Mile. Today, there is more office space in Southfield than in the central business district in Detroit," he said.

Citing a September report from Coldwell Banker, Smolkin said that not including Detroit, 34 major downtown areas are experiencing average vacancy rates of 16 percent. Of 42 suburban markets, 27 have vacancy rates higher than 20 percent,

"It shows signs of some slight weakening, but is still twice as good as other suburban markets," Smolkin said in reference to this area. Staying on top without pitching, however, will be difficult without

backing up to basics. "I know of one building that was offering 20 percent to 33 percent discounts, or a year's free rent, on a

five-year lease. This is the kind of thing that's happening in extremely distressed markets," he said. Some of those markets include Hartford, midtown Manhattan, Boston and Toronto, according to Smolkin.

AVOIDING DECREASING occupancy means assessing space situations now, Smolkin said. He pro-

· Adapting buildings for other uses - the warehouse-to-office-complex permutation. Smolkin said a new national trend is to build the office space fronting a landscaped office park, with light industrial space

When the going gets tough, you have to change tactics," Smolkin said. In addition to the basics, he said rent concessions are becoming increasingly popular. Other tactics are more expensive but necessary to compete in an overbuilt market.

"Lease buyouts for the right tenant are not unheard of," Smolkin said. He added that the package of incentives includes paying a tenant's moving expenses, offering monetary concessions on parking arrangements or preferential spaces.

Other considerations to draw tenants include club memberships; putting a health club on the premises or both; an executive dining room; absorbing the cost of reconnecting the tenant's phone system; offering transportation services to make less appealing sites more attractive; and bumping up improvement allowances, in some cases, doubling them, he

1988 economic forecast: so-so

The automotive industry can expect continued sales declines and even stiffer competition next year. But finance, retail and construction industries will remain healthy or show modest surges, according to panelists at the Economic Club of Detroit's "What's Ahead for 1988" luncheon held

Panelists included Kenneth A. Macke, chairman and CEO of the Dayton Hudson Corp., Thomas R. Ricketts, chairman of the board and president of Standard Federal Bank, based in Troy, Keith E. Crain, vice chairman, Crain Communications; and Fred J. Auch Jr., president of the George W. Auch Co. and the Associated General Contractors of America, Detroit chapter.

Low interest rates, the trade deficit, last month's stock market crash, the national debt and consumer confidence figured heavily into each speaker's predictions. One speaker said he moved to a more generalized forecast after the stock market plunged.

Following are more specific predictions from each sector

Retail: "cautious optimism"

"Over all, we're cautiously optimistic about the long-term economy, Macke said. Almost as proof, he cited six new Target and eight new Mervyn's stores that opened in Michigan this year. Both stores are owned by Dayton Hudson Corp.

Consumer confidence dropped after the market crashed but consumers still aren't sure how it will affect them, Macke said, quoting the October survey of consumers by the Michigan Survey Research Center.

That confusion has "softened" consumer spending throughout the latter half of this year, specifically since July, Macke said. Even though he said early November figures were also "soft," Macke added most economic indicators are solid.

While consumers are wary about the long-term prospects for the economy, they have more disposable income today than they did a few years ago," Macke added. "With few exceptions, even those one in five Americans who 'play' the stock market are no worse off now than we were a year ago.'

Another reason Macke saw for caution is middle America's perception of arbitrageurs, the Wall Street specialists who speculate on margins, takeovers and almost

anything that can be traded. 'Middle America thinks there's something very wrong in an economic system that allows people to make millions without ever creating a product, rendering a service or providing jobs. I couldn't agree more.

Value still will remain high on the consumer's list, and Macke said he sees an "ongoing consumer movement" in that direction, largely because of economic uncertainty. He added any growth in the high-fashion, high-service area certainly will benefit his main company, Hudson's.

Fast work means no recession

Quickly alleviating budget and trade deficits and recouping problem loans to developing countries are three key areas that, if addressed, will keep the United States from falling into a recession, Ricketts, chairman of Standard Federal Bank, said.

"I'm optimistic and positive but let's be honest with ourselves We have saved too little, spent too much, borrowed too much, imported too much and loaned too much. This must begin to change if we want continued economic growth," he said.

Ricketts noted the current economic expansion began in November 1982 and is the longest in the post-war era. He said the stock market plunge should be viewed as a warning signal that investors do not approve of current economic policies: Ideally. Ricketts proposed a three- to five-year plan to avoid a reces-

To approach a healthy economy, Ricketts advocated developing ties with trading partners, continuing the dollar's devalua-

ast chance to save on taxes

It's beginning to look a lot like tax time. Although April 15th is a few months off, wise tax planners are checking their lists twice for any overlooked items that might help them save money when the IRS comes calling

Here are some tips provided by the Michigan Association of CPAs, based in Farmington Hills; Plante & Moran, Southfield, and Grey & Trepeck, Birmingham. While it may be too late to take advantage of all the tax breaks, there are a few things you can do to save money on your taxes.

• Contribute to your retirement plan. Both 401(k) plans and IRAs retain their tax-deferred status with some new limitations. If a 401(k) plan is offered where you work, you can contribute up to a maximum of \$7,000 per year. That's down from \$30,000, but still represents a tidy deduction. If you're in the 28-percent bracket, you could save up to \$1,960 on your tax bill and generate tax-deferred interest income.

The IRA fared a bit worse under tax reform, but can still offer a way to shelter income from taxes. If neither you nor your spouse (if married) are covered by a company pension plan, the rules remain the same: You can contribute (and deduct from your taxable income) up to \$2,000 of your earnings if single, \$2,250 if married and your spouse doesn't work, or \$4,000 if married and both you and your spouse earned at least \$2,000. If you are covered by a retirement plan at work but your adjusted gross income (AGI) is \$25,000 or less if single or \$40,000 or less if married, you can still take advantage of the full contribution and deduc-

BUT IF ONE or both of you are covered by a retirement plan at work, and earn more than \$25,000 if single or \$40,000 if married, new rules apply. For every \$1,000 above those amounts, you lose \$200 in IRA deductions. So, if you are single, have an adjusted gross

practically speaking

income of \$30,000 and contribute \$2,000 to an IRA, you can deduct \$1,000. If your adjusted gross income is \$35,000 and you are single, or \$50,000 and you are married, you lose the IRA deduction completely.

Your best bet is to take a look at what you will probably earn for the year and base your contribution on the deductibility. Keep in mind that a married couple with an AGI of \$40,000 could shave \$1,120 off their tax bill with a \$4,000 IRA contribution.

• Accelerate deductible expenses. Certain expenses are still deductible under tax reform and it may be to your benefit to prepay some of those ex-

Interest expense is a good example. "Personal" interest deductions are being phased out over the next four years. If you have an auto loan, you may want to pay at least a part of it early. The interest on such loans is only 65-percent deductible this year, but the deduction drops to 40 percent next year. And the tax rates are lower next year so the deduction will be worth even less.

Tax reform eliminated the deduction for state and local sales tax, but if you pay your local income taxes before year end, your deductions will be worth more under 1987's higher rates. Property taxes on your home remain fully deductible. If it can help reduce your federal tax bill, you may want to pay at least a portion of next year's property taxes this year.

· Medical and miscellaneous expenses may also help lower your tax bill. Although medical expenses are only deductible to the extent that they exceed 7.5 percent of your adjusted gross income, you may want to stock up on any prescription drugs or medical supplies if your medical expenses are close to the limit. This is especially true if your medical expenses were abnormally high this year, but will be lower next year.

Some miscellaneous expenses can also be prepaid, although they are now deductible only to the extent that they exceed 2 percent of your adjusted gross income. Union or professional dues are an example.

- Charitable contributions are only deductible for those who itemize their deductions.
- Be sure you have either paid in

bility or 90 percent (up from 80 percent) of your current year liability to avoid underpayment penalties. If it appears you won't meet either of these requirements, consider increasing your withholding allowance or increase the amount of your final quarterly estimated payment.

· Defer your income. Although salary is difficult to defer, you may be able to defer interest, dividend income or year-end bonuses. Defer investment income until next year by buying Treasury bills and short-term Certificates of Deposit that mature next year.

• Give it away. You can make tax-free gifts of up to \$10,000 per recipient per year (\$20,000 where you spouse joins in the gift). Consider giving income-producing property to cut your own current tax bill.

cant inflation and urging Japan to start buying something from somebody for the good of Japan and the world's economy." Japan historically is a major exporter and reluctant importer of goods and services.

Certainly none of us would doubt that we have now reached the point of global economic interdependence. We wake up to reports from the Tokyo and London stock markets. What happens today on Wall Street is often reflected the next day overseas and vice versa;" he said.

Ricketts said Detroit and Michigan should do well in the climate he proposed, particularly in the areas of selling more locally produced goods, and housing, which in 1988 should approximate this vear's sales

His predictions for 1988 include GNP growth of about 2 percent; the federal budget deficit falling

to about \$140 billion; the national unemployment rate leveling off at 6 percent, inflation at about 5 percent but up to 512 percent by the end of next year; six-month Treasury Bills averaging 64 percent: 10-year T-bills yielding about 91/2 percent; mortgage rates for fixed, 30-year terms at 11 percent with adjustables at about 8 percent; and housing starts down about 10 percent.

Auto road paved with potholes

The auto companies should gird for competition in 1988 the likes of which they have never seen, said Keith Crain, whose primary publication. Automotive News, is

an industry bellweather. Crain said his staff expects next year's domestic car sales to drop to 6.7 million, down slightly from more than 7 million this year. Overall, he expects industry car sales to decline by about a half-million, from 10.26 this year to 9.79 in 1988.

'In the next few years we'll see competition so tough it'll make the last few years seem like child's play," he said. A large part of the competition will come from increasing numbers of countries exporting cars to the U.S. Ford is in the best position and General Motors is in the worst to weather such competition, he added, pointing to GM's poor showing for the 1988 model year. which ended eight weeks ago

Oldsmobile sold 297,000 fewer cars than the year before, Buick was down 156,000 units, Pontiac, 152,000, Chevrolet, 86,000 and Cadillac, 32,000," Crain said.

Crain gave the audience a preview of the Automotive News top stories of the year, pegging Chrysler's buyout of AMC as the Coup of the Year and the top news story. Others, in descending order, were the stock market crash, Ford topping GM's profits; Henry Ford II's death, and over-



Indexes, averages both report on stock market

Recently in my senior-level investment course, a student was critical of the way the media reported on the stock market's activities.

Not only did they overemphasize the importance of the Dow Jones Industrial Average, which is not representative of the whole market, she said, but they also confused the publie by making statements like "the market went down by \$5."

Market indexes compared

The accompanying chart presents several measures of the market. Clearly, the Dow Jones Industrial Average represents less than 2 percent of all NYSE stocks and excludes important market sectors such as electric utilities and transportation

Furthermore, it is price-weighted - the Dow-Jone Industrial Average owns an equal number of shares of each stock. So a dollar change in the price of any one stock has the same effect as a change in any other stock. That means that moves in IBM, with a market value of \$100 billion, and in Navistar with a value of \$1.5 billion, have exactly equal effects on

In a value-weighted index, however, the value is the number of common shares outstanding multiplied by the price per share. So in the S&P 500 Index, IBM makes up 4.4 percent

How could the Dow Jones Industrial Average, which is the average of prices of 30 industrial companies, be 2,700? It is the result of stock

Initially, stock prices were divided by 30. Over the years, however, the divisor has been reduced to compensate for stock splits, dividends and replacements of one company's stock by another's. Now the divisor is just 0.784.

In contrast, the S&P and NYSE Composite aren't averages but indexes They measure changes in total market value of stocks, and the index number is the percent of change compared with a base.

Tax changes can help small businesses

Second of two parts

Changes in current tax legislation can be used to help small business owners take full advantage of the methods available to shelter business income and in some instances. other income.

As discussed last week, these changes relate to business owners operating as sole proprietorships filing Schedule C or partnerships filing Form 1065.

Brenda Orlando, a CPA who operates a small business accounting firm from Clarkston, said there are several ways in which small business owners can reduce their taxable income, given changes stemming from the Tax Reform Act of 1986.

Self-employed business owners can now deduct 25 percent of the amount paid for medical insurance for themselves and their family as a business expense on Schedule C.

"LAST YEAR, self-employeds could deduct health insurance for employees as a business expense, but the owner's premium was an itemized deduction," Orlando said.

In order to take advantage of this change in medical insurance deductions, the owner must cover his or her employees under a non-discriminatory plan.

Overcoming the "hobby loss" rule is possible for business owners who are able to provide the IRS with proof that their business was entered into to make a profit, not as a hobby or to generate losses.

The "hobby loss" rule provides that if a taxpayer fails to make a taxable profit from a business in three out of five consecutive years, the business is considered to be a hobby by the IRS. As such, the taxpayer would not be able to deduct any expenses in excess of the business income.





Teens don't buckle up

Traffic accidents are the leading ause of death for teenagers, but a arge majority still aren't buckling up, according to a survey by Michigan State University

Teens cite their right to free choice and rebellion against authoriy figures as the major reasons many fail to use their safety belt, the study said

The survey, conducted by MSU's communications department, sampled 709 Michigan high school students and found that just 21 percent wear their safety belts all of the

Some 36 percent of the students wore their belts usually or sometimes, and 43 percent rarely or never wore their belts.

The national average for safetybelt use in states with safety belt laws is 51 percent, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Detroit-based Traffic Safety Now Inc. said the survey also found teenagers appeared to be less concerned about being involved in an accident than adults, according to Dr. William Donohue, principal investigator for the study and associate professor

Traffic Safety Now Inc. is a national non-profit organization encouraging safety-belt use and passing safety belt laws. Participants include auto manufacturers and the American Seat Belt Council

Deep wells used to store toxics

AP - Hazardous chemical wastes can be safely stored deep beneath the earth's surface, federal officials say. But the process faces questions about haphazard regulation and continuing criticism from environmen-

tal groups. In Michigan, about 120 million gallons of waste are pumped each year into 13 wells drilled up to one mile deep in sandstone or limestone, according to a 1986 report by the state Department of Natural Re-

Chemicals stored in the wells include pharmaceutical wastes, acids and other potential pollutants.

A REPORT released in October by the General Accounting Office said the Environmental Protection Agency's Region V office in Chicago has failed to periodically inspect deep wells in Michigan and Indiana. In both states, the federal government oversees the waste injection control programs.

Valerie Jones, chief of the EPA's Region V Underground Injection Control Unit, said the wells were inspected, but forms were not filled

"I guess we just got caught up in a bureaucracy bigger than us," she

A.J. Rarick, chief of the DNR's well design and injection evaluation section of the geological survey division, insisted the wells are safe.

"There has never been a case of a problem with a deep well in Michigan causing pollution," he said. Pressures are so intense at that depth that fissures or cracks could not form to allow the wastes to trav-

ENVIRONMENTAL groups, however, aren't convinced.

They have complained that many questions about what happens to waste after it is stored remain unanswered and have called on com-

panies to treat, recycle or reduce wastes. "We think there are better technologies, and there are too many risks associated with (deep well storage),"


The GAO, the investigative arm of Congress, said it has documented two cases in which waste from deep wells had contaminated drinking water, one each in Texas and Louisiana. Gordon said it is only a matter of time before the wastes do more

"It seems to be a disposal method based in large part on uncertainty." she said. "It's like sending your waste into outer space and hoping you never get hit by it."

one, is late night telephone calls. I am an early riser (not surprising after 40 years of teaching) and retire for the night around 10. I have a phone by my bed.


The phone calls are usually from younger people and the reasons for the calls vary from meeting reminders to "just calling to chat."

Nature lovers need binoculars

endless source of discovery. But to see things well and closely, one really should have a pair of binoculars.

They would also make an excel-Pent Christmas present for someone who enjoys the outdoors. If you consider a pair of binoculars as a gift, re are some things to look for.

Every pair will have some numers on them, like 7 x 35, or 10 x 50. The first number indicates the power, or magnification of the lenses.

At first thought, it may seem like the higher number of greater magnineation would be best. However, greater magnification also magni-Les body movements when binocuters are hand held. Many people can-

pletely still to avoid any blurring. Seven or eight power binoculars are good for most people

The second number is the size of the big lens. This number generally indicates how much light will be received by the binoculars.

BEFORE YOU buy a pair of binoculars, check the manufacturers catalog for some of these statistics · Field of view of 1,000 yards

a wide field of view allows you to get the subject in your view more readily. Birds bouncing around in the trees are difficult to see with a narrow field of view. A wide view also helps those of us with glasses, because our eye does not get as close to the eyepiece to take full advantage



of what field of view is available. • Exit pupil - the greater the

number, the more light will come through to your eye. This will allow you to use them when light is fading. A much better indicator than the second number mentioned above.



State traffic toll soaring — AAA

Michigan traffic deaths have increased annually since 1983 and could soar to 2.000 in 1990 without a statewide traffic safety campaign, says AAA Michigan president Jack Avignone.

'Michigan traffic deaths dropped to a post-World War II low in 1983 and have climbed steadily since then to 1,632 last year, a 23-percent increase," said Avignone.

Chair of the Traffic Safety Coordination and Communication Task Force, Avignone spoke last week at the 1987 Governor's Traffic Safety Conference in Lansing.

HE PROPOSED a uniform statewide attack combining the public, private and governmental sectors to reverse rising state traffic deaths.

While the state's death rate per 100 million vehicle miles traveled has dropped from 12.5 in 1941 to 2.3 last year, traffic deaths have in-creased 7.2 percent annually since 1984. And that is totally unacceptable," Avignone said.

He pinpointed driver error as the leading cause of traffic accidents, adding, "And the leading cause of driver error is impairment due to al-

Alcohol was a factor in half of the 94,000 traffic deaths since State Police began keeping records in 1933.

We could make major inroads in reducing traffic deaths if more progress could be made to change attitudes about drinking and driving,'



Plymouth Canton had a fine season in boys basketball last year, and the Chiefs would like to take another step up the ladder in 1987-88

Third-year coach Tom Niemi's ballclub is coming off a 12-8 season in which Canton won the Western Division title and was runner-up to Plymouth Salem in the Western Lakes championship game.

'You always try to do better than you did the year before, and that's going to be quite a task." Niemi said.

Trice, a 6-foot senior, was the team's most valuable player last year after averaging nearly 11 points and 51/2 rebounds to earn alldivision honors. He will serve as a tri-captain this year along with senior Jeff Anulewicz and junior Brian. Paupore.

"Roger is a tremendous athlete and probably the best weak-side rebounder as a guard I've ever coached," Niemi said. "He's a tremendous defensive player and an offensive threat, too.

The 6-5, 200-pound Anulewicz and 6-5, 175-pound Paupore are two good

reasons the Chiefs should be strong and difficult to outmuscle in the

Anulewicz has improved his inside game, both as a rebounder and scorer, Niemi said, and Paupore was the third-leading scorer as a sophomore with a 61/2-point average. Anulewicz pulled down 41/2 caroms per

CANTON ALSO has Cedric Beguin, a 6-7, 185-pound exchange student from Switzerland, to help in the

"He's thin but that's the most height we've seen around here in a long time," said Niemi, adding it will take time for Beguin to adjust to American basketball.

Furthermore, the Chiefs also return 6-3 senior Mitch Fyke and 6-4 senior David Foxworthy from last year's varsity. Both can play inside or outside. And up from the junior varsity comes 6-3 junior Fernando Johnson and 6-4 sophomore Ray Penman.

This is the most height I've had since I've been at Plymouth Canton." Niemi said. "Hopefully, our rebounding will be better due to increased strength and size.

Our players are a little taller. we're much stronger than last year and we have fair quickness," he add-

NIEMI HOPES the Chiefs will be a fast-break team, and with the above players pounding the boards Canton figures to be able to do so.

Trice leads the cast of players who will handle the ball in the open court. and guards Matt Littleton, 6-2 senior, and Brad Carey, 5-11 senior, also return after sharing much of the guard duties last season. Carey averaged more than six points a game, Littleton 41/2 to go with 21/2 rebounds

We like to fast break under control and glean everything off the defense," Niemi said. "If we play good defense, hopefully the offense will be that much better.

Other guards include three juniors 5-11 Troy Waldron, 6-0 James Young and 5-11 Gordie Risbridger off the JV team and 6-0 senior Doug Johnson. The latter didn't make the final cut a year ago, but worked hard in the off-season and won a spot on the team this year.

We have a lot of competition for positions and a lot of flexibility in where we can play our players," said Neimi, who had yet to decide on a starting five for Friday's season opener at Brighton.

She adeptly dribbled behind her back and through her legs against some pretty quick girls from Detroit Mackenzie. She rarely turned the ball over. I was thinking to myself, 'Half the teams in the area would love to have this girl running their

Foley, a tiny 5-foot-2 point-guard, relishes the sharks darting at her, trying to steal the ball.

'I like it when they do that," she smiles. "I'm just thinking, 'Come and

Maybe inspiration is a better term for Katy Foley

WE ALL MARVEL at Jim Abbott, the one-handed pitcher for Michigan. He's truly an inspiration. And when I was in high school I was amazed when I watched a scrawny guard from Livonia Stevenson, Paul Van Wagoner, the son of a coach, whip around opponents like Isiah Thomas. He had a withered right arm.

Any good athlete, limited or not, needs support. And Katy's biggest supporter is her mother, Marilyn.

She hauled Katy off to Shriners Hospital in Chicago when she was a youngster to get the proper treatment. There were times when they'd go every week.

ball at St. Mary's of Redford. As she grew up she idolized her older sister Sue, eight years older, who played for St. Mary's High.

When Katy left grade school she contemplated going to Farmington Hills Mercy, a Catholic League power in basketball, but opportunity to play at Borgess swayed her thinking.

So what's equal about a secondstring kicker on the University of Michigan football team receiving a full-ride scholarship when other athletes make major contributions in their sports and get nothing?

IT HAPPENS. Not just at U-M. which for all the accolades athletic director Don Canham will garner in the next year as he heads into retirement - has never shown much support for women's athlet-

Her 55 points was far and away the most scored by a Spartan this season. She was a major reason her team finished 14-5-1.

"Cindy was a pleasant surprise," said MSU coach Joe Baum. "It usually takes a freshman a year to get adjusted. Cougars pounce on Hawks in 'B'

Farmington Hills Harrison had faced other playoff opponents with good defenses - and carved up each one en route to the Pontiac Silverdome and the Class B football final.

Grand Rapids Catholic Central appeared no less impressive on paper. But, unlike Allen Park, Monroe St. Mary-Catholic Central and Marysville, the Cougars backed up their record with a superb defensive showing Saturday night.

The Hawks' potent offense finally met its match in GRCC. The Cougars dared Harrison to run the ball and thwarted its heralded passing game for three quarters, ultimately winning its first state title with a 19-7 victory over the Hawks, 11-2.

'Our defense has been our mainstay all year," GRCC coach Jim Galvin said. "Defense wins big ball-

games and championships. The Cougars, who completed an unbeaten 12-0 season, put a heavy rush on Harrison's All-State quarterback Millard Coleman, and linemen Brian Harrington, Mike Polakovich, Ben Lewákowski and Mike Galvin had him working under extreme pressure for much of the game.

COLEMAN ENDED up 8-of-16 passing for 143 yards, but 122 of that came in the fourth quarter after GRCC had taken a two-touchdown

lead. "Catholic Central was forcing me to throw when I wasn't ready, which resulted in overthrows and misconnections," said Coleman, who finished the year throwing for 2,093

"We felt he was a fine quartertack, and we had to pressure him and make him throw off balance," Galvin said.

The Cougars limited Harrison to a net total of just 8 yards rushing. sacked Coleman four times for a minus-30 and intercepted him twice. Coleman, whose running and scrambling had been so instrumental in the team's last two games, was contained by a GRCC defense that dropped him for a negative 20.

GRCC's pass rush was the most obvious factor in throwing the Harrison passing game out of sync, but the Cougars compounded that with effective pass coverage.

"THEY PREPARED very well for us," Harrison coach John Herrington said. "Their pass rush was good. But their change-ups in the secondary were tremendous, because we had a hard time finding the

'We've had big rushes before and been able to throw. This defense was a lot like Monroe Catholic Central against the run, but could play the

Harrison geared its defense to stop GRCC's All-State tailback Bob Foster and was, for all intents and purposes, successful at doing so.

The Cougars were able to move the ball better on the ground, but GRCC by no means overpowered Harrison's defense. In fact, nearly half of the winner's 307 total yards came on two plays - a late run by Foster that put him over 100 for the game and a long pass for the

Cougars' third touchdown. Furthermore, GRCC scored all of its TDs through the air, but the first er and later lateraled to Burgess, two resulted from a tipped ball in who hooked up with Wauldron for a the end zone and a pass thrown from 29-yard gain and a first down at the field-goal formation.



OU chorus celebrates silver anniversary

The Oakland University Community Chorus is celebrating its silver anniversary this year with 134 enthusiastic members. A quarter century ago when the chorus was started as a gesture to the community, only 12 people showed up for the first meeting.

June Jardin of Troy remembers the early years when the group met in churches and gymnasiums before Varner Hall was built. She and her daughter Mary joined together 20 years ago and have been returning faithfully each year.

Although she married and moved to Windsor last March, Mary Jardin Bennett still comes home every week to sing. She crosses the Detroit River to meet her mother and drive to Rochester for the regular Tuesday evening rehearsal of the chorus.

Like many others, June and Mary are drawn back year after year by the challenge of the music and by the 'vim and vigor" of director John Dovaras who "makes it fun." "Sometimes he dances around up there. He lets you know when he's pleased with how you've done; sometimes he'll

Twenty two years ago, Dovaras, associate professor of music at Oakland University, began directing the chorus and selecting challenging music for the group to perform.

He says, "The works we choose aren't tea and crumpet music. The chorus sings the great, large choral masterpieces of the centuries. We seldom repeat pieces. The Bach

Magnificat is the most repeated work and we've only done it three times. We've sung in Hebrew. German, French, Italian, Latin and even

To celebrate the Chorus's silver anniversary, Dovaras has gone through the roster for the past 12 years and invited alumni to return for the celebration. In addition to its traditional concerts, the mixed chorus will hold special concert recep-

tions and an anniversary dinner. ADULTS REGISTER TO SING with the chorus through the University Continuing Education Office and pay \$30 each semester plus the cost of music. Auditions are "painless," Dovaras promises. They primarily give him an opportunity to check vocal ranges. Only occasionally does he reject a singer.

We have people from all walks of life and all professions - university deans, bigwigs in the auto industry. doctors, lawyers, architects," he said. He estimates the average age to be about 46 and says most people sing with the group for three or four

At 75, Michael Kollins of Bloomfield Hills proves the rule. He joined 21 years ago when his oldest son started at Oakland University. He says, " I felt I could learn so much about music from him. When we sing in other languages, he inspires us to learn the meaning of the words so we can give the necessary feeling to

T THIS writing I've barely begun my Christmas shopping, but what? Me worry? I'm not worried. This is the way it's done every year.

I know there are people in this land who finish with everything shopping, wrapping, baking and addressing cards - by August at the very latest, but I don't want to know these people. There are seasons for everything and the season for Christmas shopping begins the day after Thanksgiving. I think it was Norman Rockwell who decreed it and I intend to live by it.

I love the malls at Christmas time. I love the twinkling, glittering lights, the endless greenery, the streams of red velvet ribbons, the Currier & Ives skaters forever following a mechanized figure eight. I'm even thrilled by Muzak's rendition of "Oh Holy Night" - until I remember why I'm there.

I'M THERE TO shop. I have a long list in my bag with nothing crossed off, but I don't want to shop. I head for the only haven in the shopping mall - the book store. I wander around gazing at titles, fingering book spines, marveling at the fact that I am in a magic room surrounded by thousands of books, each waiting to move me, to mystify me, to tell me something I didn't know.

But now I have a terrible urge to throw away my Christmas list, the



one so carefully executed by those I know and love who count on me to come through with the things they really want. I don't want to buy them what they really want. I want to buy them books.

But not just any books. No, I want to buy them the books I used to love. Or the books I still love. Or the books I know I'd love if I had a chance to read them. I decide, as I wander around this wordful wonderland, that there is something wrong with my family.

I DECIDE THAT they are incredibly disloyal and disrespectful, and besides that, they are clods. How else to explain their reading habits?

One reads historical and political non-fiction and can't for the life of him figure out why anyone would pay big bucks for a hardcover novel, a book you'll only read once. He does not even need to own the book he's reading. In fact, he feels better about it if he doesn't. Unbelievable.

One reads seemingly anything that comes from the mystical Latin

mind: Borges, Fuentes, Garcia Marques - she can be forgiven because she has at least inherited the need to have books around her, but I still don't get those guys, I'm sorry.

Another reads Stephen King. Another reads Jackie Collins. And there are still others who shy away from books altogether.

Nothing wrong with any of the above, you say? You think I'm bring a snob? Maybe, but I see it as evangelistic fervor. There is joy to be had in the books I read; there is beauty to behold: When Eudora Welty writes I want to laugh and cry and kill myself for not being Eudora Welty. The same with Pat Conroy and Larry McMurtry and Lee Smith and E. L. Doctorow and Gail Goodwin and John Steinbeck and Elmore Leonard and Ann Tyler and Alice Walker and the young Truman Capote . . . and so many other others I could be killing myself all the time.

AND AS TRUE with any evangelist. I want to spread the message: Read what I read and I'll like you. No, that's not it. But there's a mes-

age in there somewhere. And it might even come down to: I am a little silly when it comes to books. It all started. I think, with Raggedy Ann and Raggedy Andy. Theirs were the first books I remember owning. and I read them over and over, loving them for their words like "raggedy," "wrinkly" and "woebegone"

and for John Gruelle's lovable, comical, sorry-sad characters. I truly believed my dolls could come alive too. Would I have believed if I'd discovered the Raggedy world through the medium of television? I can't even imagine

But for all that, I don't feel sorry for people who don't read. Not anymore. It's a choice they've made, just as I choose not to watch football. I'll save my sympathies for the millions of people who want to read but can't. Or for those who find reading such a struggle it's never been more than a chore, if not a downright duty.

How do we open the doors for them? What magic key unlocks that part of the brain that gives words forms and substances and life?

Wouldn't it be something if all it took was the right book, the right words, the right pictures? And wouldn't it be something if all of us who love the written word found that right book and gave the gift of reading to someone who might not know what a gift it was until it arrived?

It would be something, all right but there I go, evangelizing again.





TAX TIP IF YOU SELL FOR A PROFIT

Normally, taxpayers who Normally, taxpayers who sell their home for a substantial profit face a heavy tax load but this burden can be avoided if you buy another home that costs as much or more than the sales price of the old one, within a specified time, the profit from the sale is not included in your taxable income.

The second home must be bought and occupied within a period ending 2 years after the sale. A 2-year period is also permitted when building a new home. This tax deferment applies only to the sale of a home which is the family's main readence.

may deduct for "fix-up" expenses if they were accomplished within 90 days prior to the sale and paid for no later than 30 days after the sale. Check with your secondant or the days after the sale.
