No tax renewal

Schools don't expect to seek millage renewal

There's good news for taxpayers in Plymouth-Canton Community Schools' proposed 1990-91 budget.

If all goes according to plan and the method of state school funding doesn't change, voters won't be asked to renew the two-year, 4-mill tax increase approved last June.

"If we had to make a decision right now, we would not renew the 4 mills," said Ray Hoedel, the district's associate superintendent for business

This year, about \$4.1 million is

being generated by the increase.
"It looks well as far as not renewing the 4 mills at this time," Hoedel said. "It also looks well because the property tax operating levy would be going down, which is good news for taxpayers."

"This is contingent upon the status quo as far as state funding," said Superintendent John Hoben. "If any of these property tax revisions go through, it would paint a different picture. If things remain the same, it looks very much like we could" go without a renewal with a bond issue and no tax increase

Agreed Hoedel: "If the SEV continues in our district and if we went for a fairly sizeable bond issue, then it looks like we could maintain our current debt levy pretty much with very little if any debt levy increase."

How much school officials would seek in a bond issue will be determined at an upcoming workshop. Projections peg the amount at \$30 to \$50 million, because the district has to accommodate growth being the

Enhancing the financial forecast is the district's state equalized valuation. Locally, SEV is projected to increase 15 percent in 1991, 12 percent in 1991-92 and 10 percent in

EXPENDITURES ARE projected to increase to \$67.8 million from \$61.6 million this year. Revenues, \$64 million this year, are projected at \$69.2 million in 1990-91.

The fund balance, \$1.9 million on July 1, 1989, is expected to be \$4.4 million July 1, 1990 and \$5.7 million by July 1, 1991.

It's anticipated that enrollment -14,943 this year - will be 14,947 next year. The number of elementary students in 1990-91 is projected at 7,154; middle school students at 3,347 and high school students at 4.446.

Certified staffing is targeted at 662 for next year, up from 655 this year, representing increased expenditures of \$2.4 million.

Under the initial budget, operational funds for the high schools' athletic department would be restored to the 1986-87 level of funding with an allocation of \$55,000.

Some say a statue in the Kellogg Park fountain could serve as a point of pride for Plymouth and help draw

attention to downtown. But even if the general public agreed on a need for a statue, a weighty question arises:

Who would pay for it?

Of the equity program grant, Froelich said, "You never know from one year to the next whether it will be made available."

While these grants are traditionally for buildings, Froelich said a statue could qualify under grant provisions that a project should benefit people using that community.

"Probably a case could be made for it," she said. "I think it's a great idea to have a sculpture somewhere in that area."

Other possible sources for grants are the National Endowment for the Arts and the state commission on public art, Froelich said.

Private businesses or service groups are another potential source for money to pay for a statue.

Death shocks friends of 'quiet' student

Students at Plymouth-Salem High School described 16-year-old Douglas Briggs as an enthusiastic and respectful member of the football team who had no reason to commit

Briggs was found in his Canton home hanging from a basement rafter by a scarf around his neck at about 12:30 a.m. Sunday. Less than three hours earlier police found 8year-old Stephen Nalepa hanging from the top of his bunkbed by a

The Wayne County Medical Examiner's office said both died of asphyxiation by hanging.

Canton police Lt. Alex Wilson said homicide has been ruled out in both cases, but police continue to investigate the possibility of suicide or accidental death.

Cops probe death of 'artistic' child

Larry and Debbie Nalepa struggled Tuesday to understand the death of their 8-year-old son, Steen, who was found by his older brother Saturday night hanging from a bunkbed.

They described him as a beautiful, artistic child who had no reason to take his own life.

Canton police Lt. Alex Wilson said an investigation is still pending on the boy's death as well as the death of 16-year-old Douglas Briggs who also died of asphyxiation by hanging later that night.

Wilson said police have not determined if either incident was a sui-

Plymouth-Canton teachers voted 591-143 to ratify a three-year contract granting increases of 5 percent, 4 percent and 5 percent and an additional cost of living adjustment of a maximum 2 percent

Voting on the expedited agreement took place Monday and Tuesday. The Board of Education is scheduled to ratify the contract April 9.





'On a bus trip we saw rowhouse with bars on the windows and no yards that cost \$100,000 and \$200,000. It's easy to understand how there can be so many homeless," said LaBelle.

Canton sophomore Ben Hendricks said Close Up workshops on interna-tional issues "extended our minds. They tricked us into learning.

Some students described the minuses as strict rules, jam-packed schedules that left little time to socialize, 11 p.m. bed checks and "500lb. security guards."

"When you finally got to meet evervone, you were leaving," said La-

Canton students Carey Couturier and Lisa Cloffi were greeted by Sen. Ted Kennedy when they took seats near him on the underground train linking the Capitol to the Senate buildings.

Neither realized it was Kennedy until a friend told them.

"He asked us where we were from and what we were doing in Washing-ton," said Couturier. "He seemed like a nice, cheery guy."

Crime in Washington hit a little too close to home for Howell and some friends who were walking behind the Smithsonian museum their first day in the capital when they nearly witnessed a shooting.

"We heard gun shots. We ran down and saw someone who'd just been shot," said Howell.

Other students had a little trouble navigating Washington's subway, called the Metro.

Capitol sights impress, surprise young visitors

For the Salem students who visited Washington, D.C., on last week's Close Up trip, the highlights included seeing the Supreme Court in session; viewing monuments and architecture; meeting diplomats and observing senators and representatives on the job.

There were lowlights, too.

"I liked seeing the Supreme Court," said Kellie Szurek, a Salem junior. "It's amazing to see exactly where everything takes place and who decides things."

Szurek said she was surprised to see one justice, while hearing a case involving General Motors and the U.S. government, "lean back and put his feet up. I thought, 'You're supposed to pay attention; this is important,' "said Szurek.

Teacher/chaperone Bill Gretzinger said he heard testimony during the Poindexter trial from a ranking member of the House, a U.S. representative from Illinois who served on the Intelligence Select Commit-

"It was intriguing how vaguely he answered questions," said Gretz-inger. "He was asked if he recalled being in attendance at a meeting in 1985 or 1986. He answered, 'If the minutes indicate I was there. I was

'He couldn't remember. He ran on with his answers until the prosecutor objected. You began to wonder if you were seeing deceit or what."

SALEM SOPHOMORE Chris Couch said, "it depressed me seeing people living outside. It's amazing they can stay out there that long and nothing gets done."

It surprised Szurek to see the Senate "so empty" during a hearing on the Clean Air Act. "And the president of the Senate wasn't paying attention. He was writing."

Brian Kirby, a Salem sophomore,

enjoyed the free day. But, he said, "We ended up in the wrong part of town. We were harassed by a burn in McDonald's. It was kind of scary.

Autumn Bunch, a Salem sophomore, said she learned "not to tell people where you're staying. At 3 a.m. one night we had some drunks trying to get in our room. I didn't like the fact you couldn't trust any-

Salem sophomores Ray Alvarado and Melissa Gay were impressed with the Vietnam Memorial. "It's kind of hidden from view. It goes from the ground level, from small, to big, to show the importance of the event," said Alvarado.

"It's cut into the ground to symbolize a scar," said Gay.

"I saw more homeless people than I've ever seen in my life," Alvarado said. "They've spent their lives that way. It's really bad. And they have signs: 'I need help,' 'I need spare change.' It's kind of sad. You wonder why they are all in Washington. It's the toughest place to get a job."

After seeing Capitol Hill, which she found "huge and awesome," Salem sophomore Stephanie Fowler said the White House was a disappointment. "I thought it should be bigger, but it wasn't," she said

For Salem sophomore Theresa Sunderman, the Lincoln Memorial was the highlight.

"His hands are in positions symbolizing peace and power. They also repesent the initials 'A' and 'L," she said. "If you look at him from both sides, you see he has two different facial expressions to show the was confused about the war."

College grant helps protect ground water

Professors teaching urban planning at seven Michigan colleges will have more material to instruct students about ground water because of grant being handled by the League Women Voters of Northville-Plymouth-Canton-Novi and Livonia.

The \$298,442 grant from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation is being used to develop lecture materials on ground water protection for use by urban planning professors.

The project is part of the Ground-water Education in Michigan program of the Kellogg Foundation.

Ground water is an important to our area's quality of life, said Diane Rockall, project director.

She said it's important to under-stand the impact that human activities have on the quality of ground The project will prepare three to five hours of college-level lecture material to distribute to professors

of urban planning at the seven Michigan colleges that offer urban planning degrees. The material, Groundwater Con-


tamination: A Michigan Perspective, will stress the importance of ground water quality considerations in professional planning. The material will also be made available to local plan-

The transfer of ninth graders to Centennial Educational Park next year will present advantages for the transportation department. Bus service will be available to

more students. It will be possible for all middle school students to be transported on the same time schedule, allowing for a longer instructional day for gifted students, better coordination of inter-school athletics and more timely arrivals for non-public school students.

Plans call for a \$250,000 restoration to the transportation budget. The department, however, is requesting an additional \$250,000 for

vehicle replacement.

The budget includes \$74,618 for instructional computers for all grade levels and \$280,387 for text-

No special education staffing changes are being planned, and it's expected that special education expenditures will be offset by \$650,000 in state aid.

Plymouth residents sentenced for part in pro-life demonstration

Three Plymouth residents were among 15 pro-life activists sen-tenced for their participation in an anti-abortion demonstration in April 1989 at the women's health care clinic in Livonia.

Those sentenced Friday in 16th district court are among a group of more than 40 people arrested and charged with disorderly conduct and/or interfering with a police offi-cer during the April 29 demonstration at the clinic on Five Mile.

The last of the demonstrators will be sentenced April 5.

SENTENCES HANDED down by Judge Robert Brzezinski against the defendants ranged from jail sentences plus fines to one person having his guilty plea taken under advisement, which means the charge will be dropped if he has no further contact with the judicial system over the

Among those sentenced was the Rev. Michael Panich, who received a four-day jail term, six months probation, a \$100 fine and \$255 in costs. He was found guilty of disorderly conduct after a jury trial.

Panich, the nastor of The Lord's House church in Livonia, also was found guilty of interfering with a police officer and received a \$50 fine

and \$55 in costs on the second charged.

Panich could remain jailed until April 21 if he refuses to pay a fine

Senator hears from homeless

Homeless Vietnam veteran Charles Winter tried for three years to get Supplementary Security Income (SSI) benefits.

Because he is illiterate Winter, 43, does not have the skills to pursue or follow up on his own application. And because he lives near a Lansing highway in a small tent bought with money he collected from cans and scrap metal, Winter never received low the federal poverty level, may

any paperwork. "The only time that I've ever been employed was back when I was 17 years old," said Winter. "At that time, I dropped out of school without knowing how to read or write. I took on some odd jobs at the grocery store and some factory work, but nothing ever lasted too long. After jumping from job to job, I enlisted in the Army and was sent to Vietnam. This is where my troubles began. When I was honorably discharged from the service, I was a full-blown

alcoholic." Winter's plight finally reached the attention of Sen. Donald Riegle, D-Flint, who is promoting introduction of the Homeless Outreach Bill of

IF ENACTED, the bill would require the Social Security Adminstration (SSA) to reach out to the blind, disabled and elderly in soup kitchens, shelters and day centers and teach them about benefits to which they are entitled, but may not know

"Under the Supplemental Security Income program (SSI), these people whose incomes are substantially bereceive benefits - up to \$386 per month for individuals," Riegle said. It is estimated that among the homeless in this country about 25 percent suffer from mental disability, 10 percent are physically disabled and 20 percent are elderly.

Homelessness has been an issue in Wayne County, where officials recently authorized a county-sponsored shelter. It has also been an issue in Oakland County where church groups have held vigils for the home-

Winter was joined at the hearing by Sherry Brantley, a former home-less and physically abused wife with three daughters under age 7, and Thomas Rybinski of Detroit, a laidoff General Motors Detroit Hamtramck auto plant worker who got caught up in a bureaucratic mase of GM recall rights.

The three headed the agenda at a banking, housing and urban affairs committee hearing on homelessness





This movie, from the clips I saw, seemed to be detailed," said Bill Steele, community services director of Community Mental Health Services in Détroit.

STEELE HAS presented several seminars on suicide for Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

"That's why the films that are really helpful don't get graphically into the actual attempts but instead talk about feelings and issues and give solutions for them."

Over and over, kids see violence in films, cartoons and television," added Steele. "If there's no problem solving going on in a movie and it actually shows in detail the method, kids certainly can pick that up. So many factors can influence young

Experts disagree on whether someone as young as 8 years old is capable of planning and committing suicide with a realization of the finality of the act.

Cleanup must begin at home

ARTH DAY is coming. That means we will be reading and hearing plenty about such environmental issues as preservation of the Brazilian rain forest, elimination of chloro-flurocarbons (CFCs) and prevention of environment-ravaging oil spills. All of these are issues of global impor-

What must be remembered, however, is that cleaning the world also means cleaning our own back yard.

We, in southeast Michigan, are no different from other Americans - or from other citizens from other nations. For too long, we've paid too little attention to the world around us. That must change.

IN MANY ways, change is already evident. But nagging environmental problems persist:

• It's encouraging that individuals from many southeastern Michigan communities contribute their time each year to cleaning the heavily polluted Rouge River.

But it's discouraging many of the communities themselves are involved in a lawsuit to protect their outmoded sewers — the primary source of Rouge pollution.

• It's encouraging that many communities

have begun recycling programs.

But it's discouraging that so few markets have been found, to this point, for recycled goods — especially recycled newsprint.

lt's encouraging that many area stores have begun marketing "environmentally conscious" products, often on specially marked shelves.

But it's discouraging that, in many stores, shoppers can take their goods home in non-recyclable plastic bags.

Likewise, it's discouraging many stores continue to stamp the label "biodegradable" on products, even though environmentalists say that even bidgeradable products will deterior to egradable products will deteriorate too lowly to play any role in easing our landfill cri-

The original Earth Day, 20 years ago, represented a grass-roots approach, bringing individual citizens together to make their opinion known to government and industry.

Earth Day 20, Sunday, April 22, should provide position forms. If there's a difference it's that wave have the understanding that individual acceptability is also important.

As consumers, we should pledge our allegiance to goods in environmentally safe packaging - as well as to products that have already been recy-

Returning to cloth diapers and building a back yard compost pile, for yard waste, are other steps each of us could take to help the environ-

Producers won't move toward recycling until they believe a market exists among consumers.

AT THE same time, we should let our local government know that we are willing to pay the cost necessary to eliminate outmoded sewers, as well as to begin local or regional recycling programs - including ones for tires and car batteries, a pair of particular environmental problems.

These suggestions are neither easy nor cheap, but all are necessary.

Landfill space is decreasing. We urge the state Department of Natural Resources to hold off on licensing any new landfills until the communities they would serve have recycling plans up and

Landfills, with their potential for air and water pollution, are yesterday's waste disposal so-lution. While some additional landfills might well be necessary, every landfill licensed under the present setup is a setback to recycling and other

more responsible approaches.

There were these Right-to-Lifers, parading up and down the sidewalks, carrying their usual baggage — signs that said "Stop Abortion," "No More Baby Killing" and, their favorite, a fully formed fetus splattered on an American Flag with the words "America's Holocaust — Abortion" prominently displayed.

The article, "Autism expert praises Burger program," prompted me to write another point of view. My daughter, Jennifer, attended the Burger program for almost seven years. When she started the program at 3, she spoke in simple sentences and phrases. Many thought that she had much potential. By 9 years of age, she lost most of her limited language except for an occasional "ga" and "cookie" to indicate her needs. She scored low on intelligence tests, failing skills that she performed at younger ages.

Although Jennifer gained in some areas at the program, this was pri-marily due to her teachers and certainly not the Burger environment. Burger represented no Shangri-La for Jennifer. She was escluded from square dancing, chorus and other

"special activities." She was placed in classrooms with all non-verbal children. Jennifer's contact with peers who talked consisted of one 20minute speech session a week.

Not only does the program lack role models, but also it is not conducive to living in a non-handicapped world. How can we expect acceptance when society receives a strong message that the best place for people with disabilities is to be separated? Granted, integration is not easy. It takes courage and fortitude to make change.

My daughter now attends a class-room for the autistic in a junior high school in Plymouth. Her performance on tests improved. Just recently, I heard her say, "mom." She still has a long way to go, but the wonderful part of all of this is 140 students signed up to work with my daughter's class. Parents, teachers, administrators and students showed caring and understanding toward people with disabilities. I believe Plymouth gave Jenniter a chance

POLICE HAVE enormous powers. Police can low away semesne's car. Police can arrest a person. Police can even kill a human.

Werse, pelice can effectively hide the name of the officer who did the hilling for months. They can't do it legally, but they can do it effectively. (Evening News Assn. v. Troy, 417 Mich. 481.)

Even when police investigate their own mistakes, a police review beard can black out three-quarters of the report and hide it for many months. (Post-Newsweek Stations v. Detroit Police Department, Michigan

World history texts need changes

Q: My son's social studies world history textbook looks about the same as the one I had 20 years ago. There has been some updating to the '80s, but most of the chapters are basically the same. I enjoyed world history, but it seems more is going on in the world today than is being pre-sented in my son's world history textbook. Do you know what I mean?

A: Yes, I know what you mean. More is going on in the world today than is presented in the present world history textbooks. Remember, however, that change has occured so rapidly in the last few years it will take time to catch up. Nevertheless, world history textbooks have always tended to fucus on the ancient Middle East (the Egyptian) and the European contributions to our own culture. For years, I've watched book companies make token jesters to include some "non-Western" cultures beyond Europe and America in their world history textbooks but nothing of any real substance.

Don Johnson, a professor at N.Y.U., says world history, as presently taught in high schools, centers around European history and its impact on the United States. He sees the major focus as the march for human freedom from the ancient



Middle East, the Egyptian times, to Europe and then on to America.

China, India, Africa do appear briefly in some world history textbooks. However, they are primarily viewed as countries which became colonies under the control of the Europeans, as opposed to having any impact upon world civilization. Indeed, textbooks tend to view European history as the important world history and China, Africa, India, the modern Middle Eastern countries and even native American Indians simply as cultures to be discussed. This frame of mind borders on being an American western elitist mentali-

THEREFORE, I agree with you that what appears in today's world history textbooks does not entirely reflect what has occurred in the "larger" world since man's exis-tence. There is an urgent need for

world history textbooks — or at least local school districts' social studies curriculums — to include Hispanics, Asians, blacks, and the modern Middle East whose people will make up the majority of United States citizens in the next century.

It has been well researched that Hispanics, blacks and Asians are having more children than whites: whites will be the minority race in the 21st Centurj. This factor, alone, for better understanding of each other, should be sufficent encouragement to change our world history textbook format.

But change takes time, especially in education. Many of today's world history teachers are teaching what they were taught in college 15 to 25 years ago. The new breed coming out of the universities have had much more exposure to the multicultural world history approach. I'm sure today's social studies teachers would address this issue more thoroughly given an opportunity for curriculum input, in-service training years.

a more expansive and integrated world history textbook. A world his-tory textbook which treats all civilizations and their beliefs with dignity, not just some isolated cultures for some cursory attention. NVESTING IN the stock market isn't something most high school students do too often. Economics students at Centennial Educational Park are doing just that. They're participating in a statewide stock market simulation.

"It's great," said Jeff Coleman, a junior at Plymouth Salem High School. "It gives you the idea of what



The project helps students understand how the stock market worke, said Ken Kaneko, a business education teacher at Com Educational Park.

start with an account of \$100,000. The money's not real, so students don't have to worry about losing their shirts.

"Most of the teams, they end up in the negative," said Ken Kaneko, a business education teacher at CEP. That hasn't been true of local teams.

The game is run by the Michigan Economic Education Council and cosponsored by Roney & Co., the Detroit Free Press and the Securities Traders Association of Detroit and Michigan. Regional competition is coordinated through the Michigan Economic Education Council offices at Eastern Michigan University in Ypsilanti.

STUDENTS TRADE in stocks on the New York Stock Exchange and American Exchange. They're responsible for researching the performance of different stocks.

"It gives the students experience with the stock market, understanding the stock market and how it works," Kaneko said. "It's fun because most of the classes treat it as

if it's their own money."

The program's been used for several years at CEP in ectnomics and introduction to business. Teams of middle school and high school students from throughous Michigan compete in the 15-week

Students start with \$100,000 and with an additional \$100,000 in credit. Kaneko said. They read newspapers and do other research to help them decide where to invest the money.

"We try to relate this to economics and the business world," he said. Students have been known to seek

advice from their parents and from stockbrokers. One girl last semester got help from an uncle who works on the stock exchange in New York. "Some of them just get kind of lucky," Kaneko said. It's not unheard

of for students to take a chance on a stock simply because they like its

STUDENTS GET a weekly printout indicating how they're doing. Kaneko's economics students managed to accumulate \$122,407 in the fourth week of the program, putting them in sixth place statewide.

"It's pretty interesting, seeing what you can do," said Dewey Wheeler, a junior at Ptymouth Canton High School and a team captain for the game. "It just depends on the company. You do a lot of research and find out what's going to happen."

Wheeler enjoys the competition involved in the game. He's planning to

put what he's learned to good un this summer by buying a computer program that'il make it possible for

"With \$100,000 in this game, we can buy more expensive stocks," he said.

Jennifer Boice, a Salem senior, and Jennifer Conroy, a Canton senior, are working together on a team. Boice is captain of that team, which also includes Jeff Coleman and Jason Crabb.

"In the future, it could help you if that's what you wanted to do," Boice said. She'd consider investing some of her own money in the stock mar-

ket a few years from now.

"Possibly, but not as much as we did," she said. "This isn't real money, so we don't have to worry about

Conroy's also enthusiastic about

participating.

Churches spread the word on census

U.S. Consus Bureau officials, working to get the word out on the 1990 consus, have enlisted the help of relig-

This Sunday, April 1, has been declared Census Day,

and some area pastors plan to remind worshipers of the importance of filling out ceasus forms.

"Our divisional beadquarters actually has inundated us with all kinds of information," said Lt. Jeffrey Beachum, commanding officer of the Plymouth Salvation Army. That office in Southfield has forwarded booklets builds in section 2. booklets, bulletin inserts, posters and sample letters to the Plymouth Salvation Army, which serves residents of Plymouth, Canton and Northville.

Beachum doesn't have any problem with helping to get the word out about the census. He hasn't found there's much of a need to convince people to fill out the

'It's Scripturally accounted where there were censuses taken. There's nothing non-biblical about it. I m sure the government needs to know for tax purposes and for management services," he said.

AT SUNDAY services at the Plymouth Salvation Army, a bulletin notice and verbal announcement will

remind werehipers about the census.

Bulletin announcements about the census are also being used at Ward Evangelical Presbyterian Church in

"We do plan to work on it, encourage our people to take part," said Kelly Sharkey, communications coordi-nator for the church. Consus reminders will also be giv-en through publications used for individual classes at

Ward Presbyterian Church staffers got lots of of material from the U.S. Census Bureau.

"So it makes it pretty easy to pick it up and use it,"

Sharkey said. "They know what they're doing."

She agreed it's helpful for church officials to work with the U.S. Census Bureau to make people aware of

"We are in a position where we are working with the community in a lot of ways," Sharkey said. Worshipers come to Ward not just from Livonia and the surrounding area but also from Rochester, Ann Arbor and other more distant communities.

A SERMON based on the 1990 census isn't planned at

"There's more of an Easter emphasis this time of year." The census could be mentioned in church classes, Sharkey said, and talked about as part of the lesson.

Archdisease of Detroit officials are encouraging people to complete consus forms. The archdisease newsport, The Michigan Catholic, has been used to spread the word, as has a newslotter cent to parishes from the archdisease's Catholic Community Services Office.

"Semetimes, it's not looked at as a very important thing," and Brends Marshall, assistant director of communications for the archdisease. Parishisases are being encouraged to complete their same consus forms and in

munications for the architecese. Parishioners are being encouraged to complete their own comms forms and, in some cases, to volunteer or work for the Cansus Bureau. Archdiocese officials have emphasized that consus data will affect the quality of human services provided for low-income people and others. Filling out the form isn't time-consuming, Marshall said.

"For most people, it will only be a short amount of time." Decisions about promoting the census are left up to individual parishes.

NO CENSUS material arrived at Risen Christ Lutheran Church in Plymouth Township, according to the Rev. K.M. Mehrl, the pastor. He doesn't plan to make any announcements about the census.

"I've been too busy really with other things to pay too much attention to it." He agreed it's fine for churches to spread the word about the census.

"I think certainly the church could be used as a resource for doing something like that," Mehrl said. "Cer-

"They sent us a booklet. I assume most of the church-es get a booklet," Grusbal said. "We're not going to do

anything major."

Roll Call Report

RUBAL DEVELOPMENT By a vote of 360 for and 45 against, the House sent to the Senate a bill (HR 3561) delivering federal aid to depressed rural areas. At an estimated cost of more than \$2 billion over five years, the bill starts new programs, realigns current ones and gives states more voice in funding decisions. It shifts certain programs from the Farmers Home Administration to a new Rural Development dministration.

Members voting yes in support of the bill were: Hertel, Ford, Levin and Broomfield Pursell voted no.

FLAG ISSUE The House voted 309 for and 101 against to withdraw from the U.S. Supreme Court its betief for the 1900 law making it a crime to desecrate the American flag. This vote on (H Res 362) was a victory for Republicans who would rather protect the flag by constitutional amendment. They objected that the Democratic-approved brief asked the court to rule on the flag last in the term beginning in October. They saw this as a delaying tactic by Democrats who want to pretic by Democrats who want to preserve the statute.

Section 16.2 notes to Schedule of Regulations presently reads as follows: Footnote (x) is the last footnote to the Schedule of Regulations.

Section 16.2 Notes to Schedule of Regulations is hereby proposed to be amended by adding a footnote (y) which reads as follows:

(y) The number of stories may be increased to three (3) stories provided the three story portion does not exceed 1/4 of the length of the building and the roof line and building elevations are not flat or one dimensional. Ode to a travel agent

Today, Iris Jones begins a new travel column, Crossroads, as an addition to the travel section. The column will appear weekly offering tips and tales about adventures around the world.

Have you ever wondered if a travel agent can save you money?

You should have been sitting on my shoulder when I sat across from Janet Kerns in the Lathrup Village Office of the American Automobile Association(AAA). I gave her an impossible

task: find two lowpriced airline tickets from Detroit to Los Angeles on a week's notice. She performed a miracle and saved me several hundred dollars.

Like many of you, I buy my airline tickets as inexpensively as possible. I could have bought Detroit-LA tickets for under \$200 during any of the Great Ticket Spectaculars of the last six months.

They seem to give tickets away in August, in October, even in January. One airline would slash prices and the rest would follow.

Unfortunately, there were no spectaculars in sight when I needed tickets to LA. It was too late to purchase 14 day, 21 day or 30 day advance tickets - the prices go down as the number of days goes up. I had one week and would have to pay for the tickets that day.

I signed in at the AAA office at 4:40 p.m.; they close at 5:30 p.m.

I'm a member of the Automobile Club of Michigan and have always been a fan, but you don't need to be a member to buy airline tickets or book other travel from them. AAA is the biggest travel agent in the state.

I SIGNED in, waited my turn, and was led to a desk by a cheerful blonde in a navy blue suit. I didn't know her, she didn't know me, but the sign on the wall at the back of her cubicle read

"Janet Kerns, Travel Counselor." 'Can you find me any low-priced tickets to

Los Angeles next Wednesday," I said. 'Seven day advance tickets," she said as she put on her telephone earphones and started tapping on the computer. "They are going for about \$435. How many tickets?"

"Two. That's nearly \$900 for two tickets. Any chance of getting them for less than that?"

Janet clicked away, talking to me as the numbers came up. American, United, Continental. "Continental's just under \$400, that's the best so

"I didn't want to give you all the bad news at once," I said, "but we need to be in L.A. before

"Too bad we can't get you on Southwest, they have good fares, but they extended their coupon offer and everything's booked going west. You never know, let's look.'

She called Southwest but the only flight that got in before noon was fully booked in Q-class. That's what they call the low-cost fare, Q- fare. Most travel agents would have stopped there but Janet is a determined soul. "Is your travel

companion a child by any chance?" 'No. he's over 60.

"AHA!" and she started typing furiously again. "American gives 10 percent off to anyone who is a member of AARP." That's the American Association of Retired Persons. Other airlines have retiree rates too, but none of them could get us into Los Angeles before noon Wednesday.

"Can you go a day ahead and stay overnight?" "Not in L.A., but I wouldn't mind an overnight in Phoenix, does that work?"

Danish adventure

When touring Europe this summer, be sure to fit Copenhagen into

This charming, yet often over-looked city is sure to surprise you with its ancient cobblestone streets and free-spirited Danish culture.

Copenhagen, Denmark's capital, lies on the Danish island of Zealand and is the biggest and liveliest of the Scandinavian cities.

The streets in town are filled with young and "young at heart" folks, out and about, eating and drinking in outdoor cafes and listening to music in the center square. You'll get the same European charm other large cities offer, without the intense cul-

The pedestrian drag, Stroget, is a wide-open cobblestone street filled with wonderful Scandinavian clothing stores and shops. The walk seems endless with each store bringing on a new European style in shoes, scarves and hats. The end of the drag opens up to the city center with peddlers offering great bargains on jewelery, trinkets and food.

DURING MY TRAVELS, my friends and I became regular explorers of the beautiful canals near the harbor, our favorite area in the city. Nyhavn, a canal lined with boats and seaside cafes, was once a strip filled with sailors and rowdy bar room brawlers.

The place is pretty mellow now and offers a peaceful stroll down by the docks between pubs. Most of these places are pretty cheap, and the friendly people who run these small joints enjoy practicing their English.

There is so much to do for nightlife in Copenhagen, the days seem endless. We were surprised that many of the bars and restaurants don't close until 5 a.m. and by that time the early-morning cafes are opening to serve a hearty breakfast. So try not to run yourself down during the day; you'll regret missing some of the best jazz in the world.

The Jazzhaus was a hard club to find, hidden away down the pedestrian street Norregade, but that place was well worth the adventure. If you go, search it out. Jazzhaus brings in internationally known artists along with excellent local bands.

If you want to dance to some traditional jazz music, go to the Foyer Scenen on Magstraede.

TIVOLI GARDENS is a central place lined with bars such as Slukefter and Faergekroen with contemporary folk music to traditional jazz. We found ourselves joining in the sing-a-longs even though our Danish was pretty weak.

We agreed that the best music in



town was played at the Irish Pub. There is really nothing Irish about the place which is filled with longhaired, blond Danish men singing the blues. These guys would give some of the greatest New Orleans bands a run for their money.

I missed the world famous Copenhagen Jazz Festival which is celebrated in July—if you plan to go make reservations, the town will be bursting with tourists.

Like other Scandinavian countries, Denmark enjoys a very high standard of living. High quality porcelain and silverware have become popular products imported to the U.S.

DON'T BE MISLED by Danish currency, the kroner. Although you may receive approximately 6kr to the dollar, kroners go fast when you pay 150kr, or \$25, for a reasonable

Copenhagen has a great bus and train system but the city is best seen on foot, so wear your walking shoes; there's a lot to do. If you're out late and miss the last train back to your hotel, flag down a taxi. Most drivers will pull up in a Mercedes Benz and

are very polite, unlike most of our New York City cab drivers.

When you arrive in Copenhagen, orient yourself in the Radhusplads or Town Hall Square. You'll receive much help from the tour guides and you'll actually be sitting in the center of Copenhagen.

THE DANES are some of the friendliest people you'll ever meet, and most of them speak English very well. So don't hesitate to ask for

For a good view of the city, try the endless spiral stairs of Freslers Kirkes Tarn which leads to a twisted tower in Town Hall Square. The tour guides to the tower make the exhausting trip up the stairs at least five times a day, so don't try to keep up with them.

LIVING UP TO its free-spirited reputation, Denmark is the only country where you will find a place like Christiania, a tax-exempt experimental living project. This "free society" with limited or no laws, is a 10-minute bus ride from Central Station, on an island isolated from the

city. The society was founded in 1971 by youthful squatters and continues to be a controversial issue in Europe.

During World War II, the island of Christiannia was used as a concentration camp while Denmark was occupied by Nazi Germany.

Today, a trip to Christiania will give you flashbacks filled with with '60s counter culture and hippie regalia. The place is mainly occupied by harmless junkies and freaky freelove folks who run shack-like workshops and houses.

College comes to workplace

Faced with the prospect of fighting — and losing — the traffic bat-tle, overcoming fatigue and meeting family obligations, daytime workers who take nighttime classes have never had it easy.

But without a college education, getting ahead at the office can be tough, if not impossible.

IN RESPONSE to the growing corporate need for managementlevel employees, especially those trained to see the world in black and red, a handful of area business schools are beginning to teach management courses at the office.

The latest is a business administration degree program offered to Michigan Bell employees at the phone company's technical and office center in Southfield. Classes are taught by professors from Madonna College in Livonia.

With more than 300 students signing on for the first term in November, hitting the books in company conference rooms by night has become de rigueur, as Ma Bell picks up most of the bill to enhance its employees' decision-making abilities, boost morale and strengthen its competitiveness

"I was starting out fresh and at first I thought what does psychology have to do with business administration?" said Carol Ventimiglia, a methods analyst at the Southfield center and a Livonia resident.

"But it really helped me to understand different personalities and work better with people."

For Ventimiglia, who is married with two children, trying to find extra time in the past for college was next to impossible but she said attending a three-hour class one night a week in her building couldn't be

"IF I take one course every term, it will take me eight years to earn a degree," she said. "But I know Madonna offers some courses on Saturdays at their main campus, so I can go over there and hopefully graduate

"The classes also are compressed into 10-week terms, which makes it difficult but I really enjoy the opportunity to advance my career, especially wit the cutback the company has gone thorugh in years past."

So successful is the Madonna program that an additional 120 Michigan Bell employess have signed on for the second term which began the

last week in February. "The response has been extraordinary and we really feel very strongly that the more knowledge employees have, the better able they are to perform in the work environment," said Eileen Dixon, a company spokeswoman.

"OUR INDUSTRY is growing more competitive every day and one way we feel we can stay a step ahead is through education. Not only are our employees learning new skills but they're also keeping the old ones fresh."

While some employees attended Madonna in the past and have since switched to office classrooms, Dixon said the program has encouraged more workers to take on course

Sales pitches for cellular phones fixed

Seven cellular telephone re-

tailers — including Fretter Inc. of Livonia and Cellular One of Farmington Hills - have agreed to stop sales practices that allegedly violate antitrust laws, state Attorney General Frank Kelley said Tuesday. All have agreed to change their

ads and to inform people that they may buy telephones without having to buy six months of service from a particular supplier of cellular air time, Kelley said.

In addition, Ameritech, which had tripled air rates on some of the mandated six-month contracts after cellular telephones were bought, has agreed to honor original contract terms, the attorney general said.

"I AM PLEASED that these merchants came forward in response to my request and agreed to change their advertising and practices," Kelley said.

Customers now will have the option to pay more for the cellular telephone and not be bound to a particular service provider for six months.

"Those who signed up with Ameritech only because it was a requirement of purchase should not be made to pay higher and higher

rates," Kelley said.
"Now, with the cooperation of Ameritech, those customers will receive the benefit of what they thought and were told was a good deal at the time," Kelley said.

A state investigation confirmed complaints that some cellular telephones for sale required linkage with a particular service provider, an illegal tie-in, said Chris DeWitt, spokesman for Kelley.

The attorney general ordered the retailers and service providers to change their practices earlier this month.

"ALL OF THESE retailers and the service providers responded promptly when they realised there was a problem," Kelley said. "They have shown a willingness to admit and resolve the problems, and I commend them for that attitude."

The attorney general's office also is investigating whether cellular telephone retailers owe the state treasury sales tax on money received from service providers to promote tie-ins, DeWitt said.

Katherine A. Cappelli, vice president of marketing and sales for Cellular One, issued a statement Tuesday after Kelley's announcment.

"Cellular One is pleased to have been able to address the attorney general's concerns regarding the advertising of retail pricing on cellular telephone equip-

"We are also very pleased that our practices as a service provider have not required any corrective action as a result of the attorney general's investigation," Cappelli said.

Ameritech had been reviewing customer inquiries on case-bycase basis prior to the attorney general's involvement in the situation, said Sue Marceau, manager of public relations.

Customers under contract to an Ameritech distributer were allowed to extend the old rate, she





Not all heroes drive fast cars

The Navy recruiters in the lobby of movies showing "The Hunt for Red October" — sent there to sign up teenagers still enthralled by this latest techno-thriller — bring to mind whether the auto business could use a similar dose of Hollywood adrenaline.

Maybe a plot where a Russian engineer steals a top-secret Lada from a plant near Moscow, making a break for the border. . . Then again, maybe not. Still, the question remains: Is there the stuff of a good

thriller in the auto business?

For the most part, the role of the car in Hollywood has been to crash, chase or be chased — preferably all three at the same time. Once in a while some memorable image emerges, such as Steve McQueen bounding down the hills of San Francisco in a dark green Mustang, or the crushing of the brand-new Lincoln with the body in the trunk in Goldfinger, when the automobile emerges in the role of some kind of metaphor about the basic transiency of life in these United States.

BUT THE business itself has inspired just a few feeble efforts, such as Harold Robbins' "The Betsy." There has been nothing with the efforts at drama inspired by the oil business, the airplane business or the nuclear reactor business — all of which have had their day in the sun.

Save big: Cut mortgage interest

Say you have a \$80,000, 30-year mortgage with a fixed mortgage rate of 10 percent. Your payments are \$703 per month. You just learned that only \$23 of your monthly payment goes toward the repayment of the principal. The rest (\$600) is all interest payment. You are also shocked to learn that over the life of this mortgage, you will pay \$172,150 in interest — more than twice the original mortgage.

You wish there was a way to re-

You wish there was a way to reduce the interest payment. But since it is a fixed mortgage there is no way out. Right? Wrong

In a two-part article we will explore three ways of significantly reducing your interest payments

STRATEGY 1: Accelerate payments — In order to appreciate the value of this strategy, it is important

If you make additional payments, specifically to reduce the principal, then you will not be charged interest on the amount. Here is an example to illustrate this point.

Suppose you decide to make 13 instead of 12 — payments a year lightat case, the life of the mortgage would be reduced from 30 to 22 years. Put differently, by paying an additional \$703 each year, you will save \$61,506 in interest charges not an insignificant amount of \$84.





Index shows economy is improving in Detroit

Detroit's economy advanced in the weakness in retail sales to contribute to the increase in the Grand point in five years, according to an economic measure issued teley by fourth quarter, and Russell P. Agreet Thornton, a notional accounts of Grant Thornton's Detroit offnent consulting firm

The index, a quarterly composite of seven equally weighted economic indicators collected for 24 major U.S. metropolitan areas for the past five years, climbed 0.98 points in Detroit, to 110.6 in the fourth quarter, from a revised value of 109.7 in the third quarter.

This is the second consecutive quarter in which the index for Detroit has increased. On average, the index of all two dozen cities rose 0.87 points in the fourth quarter, to 109.5. For the year, the index increased 1.05 points in Detroit and an average of 0.75 points among all cit-

Detroit's improvement in factory hours — a measure of future eco-nomic activity — was greater in the fourth quarter than that of all mot-ropolitan areas studied except Chicago, Miami and Atlanta. In addition, only Los Angeles, Minneapolis and Chicago registered more of a quarterly improvement in business failures than did Detroit.

AT THE same time, Detroit's quarterly retail sales were weaker than those of more than two-thirds of the metropolitan areas tracked. Around the country, the index increased in all metropolitan areas studied in the fourth quarter, except IMPROVEMENT IN factory in all cities except Boston, Phoenix, hours and business failures offset Ariz., and Cleveland.

Coaches approve expanded playoffs

The decision to expand the high school football playoffs is being applauded by Observerland coaches who say it will create added incentive and interest in the tournament.

"I think it's great," North Farmington's Jim O'Leary said. "It gets more teams involved, and it separates the teams that are closer in terms of enrollment and competi-

North, being a smaller Class A school, is one of the area schools that should benefit from the new system, which creates four new classes and doubles the number of teams making the playoffs from 64 to 128.

The last of several proposals to change the playoff format effectively splits each of the four existing classes in two, dividing Class A into AA and A. The same applies to Classes B, C and D, too.

The four championship games in the single-letter classes will be played the Friday of Thanksgiving weekend and the other four on Saturday, all at the Pontiac Silverdome.

"IT DOES water down the playoffs some," Farmington Hills Harrison coach John Herrington said, "but we'll get used to it, I guess. If you want to expand, it's the best way to do it."

The original proposal, by Macomb County athletic directors, called for dividing the state into six classes, which would have required creating a new point system to determine who qualifies.

Jack Roberts, executive director of the Michigan High School Athletic Association, proposed a seven-class plan, splitting all but Class D in half based on enrollment figures. Class D schools objected, and the proposal that was accepted calls for eight classes, in football only.

Salem's challenge to blend vets, youth

The challenge for Plymouth Salem soccer coach Ken Johnson early in the 1990 girls season is to blend the proven talents of veteran players with the budding skills of new-

The Rocks, who were 12-2-2 and runners-up in the Western Lakes Activities Association, return 12 players from that team, including allstaters Michelle Minton and Jenny Emmett.

Johnson will add to that number six first-year varsity players. Four of them, as well as four of the returnees - all of the team's eight freshmen and sophomores - were members of the Plymouth Lightning, a state finalist in the under-16 tourna-

At this stage, Johnson thinks Salem is a year away from being a true power once again. At best, the Rocks, who won the Class A title three years ago, could arrive by mid-

"A lot of people think we're going to be good this year," Johnson said, "but it takes a while to get going. You have to be patient. We'll be rebuilding for a few weeks."

THERE'S NO doubt Salem will field a quality team, according to Johnson. The question is whether or not the Rocks can play with the other WLAA powers and teams on their schedule like defending state champion Troy Athens.

"We won't be any slouches," Johnson said. "We could click in a month's time. We could be steady opposition for the favorites."

Salem's returning players include forwards Minton (senior), Kim Goff (senior), Erin Harvey (junior) and Mandy Drummond (sophomore), midfielders Sara Hayes (senior) and Jenny Oleksiak (junior), defenders Jenny Marshall (senior), Amy Krajewski (junior), Tracy Bough (senior), Lina Reservano (senior) and



all-state forward

The new additions are forward Kris Goff (freshman), halfbacks Julie Thomas (sophomore), Erin Bagozzi (sophomore) and Shelby Cary (freshman), defender Ann Tomas (junior) and goaltender Sara Egloff (junior). Thomas, Bagozzi, Tomas and Egloff played on the JV team

Salem has the fortunate circumstance of having a seasoned player at each position, and Minton fills that role among the forwards. Minton, who scored 16 goals and had eight assists, Hayes and Marshall started on the state championship team as freshmen.

"(Minton) has played for the state's Olympic Development team," Johnson said. "So she's been playing at a high level, and we expect good things from her.'

DRUMMOND, WHO had 12 goals and eight assists, will start at right forward, and Eris Goff on the left side, with Minton at middle striker. Harvey (11 goals, 4 assists) will substitute in and rotate positions. "She's dangerous with her runs on goal," said Johnson of Harvey. "The corner off the bench and plays a vale.



"We've got four bonafide forwards, and Sara can play forward,

Hayes is the veteran in the midfield with Cary and Ferguson, who joined the varsity for post-season play last spring along with Gibbish, starting in Salem's 4-3-3 alignment.

The Rocks must find a way to get along without All-American Jill Estev - as well as five other starters who graduated - in the midfield. Estey was a four-year starter and two-time, all-state selection who plays basketball for the University of Illinois.

Other starters who must be replaced are Teri King (forward), Melissa Uhl (defender), Kim Larner (halfback), Maria Wordhouse (defender) and Missy Smith (halfback).

'We'll have to rely on Minton giving us leadership in the middle and coming back to help out," Johnson said. "Jill did the same thing. She was really a forward who came back to help in certain situations."

WITH THOMAS and Bagozzi relieving the starters, Johnson expects Salem to be strong in the midfield throughout the game.

"That's the way Canton_won (the state title) in '88," he said. "They had five good midfielders who rotated in and out. Your midfielders get tired, and the subs have to step in for 10-15 minutes a game to take the pressure

Pianist shares her philosophy

Pavlina Dokovska, the highly acplaimed Bulgarian planist who recently made her Birmingham debut for the Cranbrook Music Guild, lists Sofia, Bulgaria, as her address but considers the world her home.

"Wherever there is music, musicians and music lovers, I am at home," said the petite, raven-haired artist, who performs up to 80 concerts a year throughout Europe, North America and Asia (even Mon-

Birmingham-Bloomfield, "home" is the abode of her good friend and fellow Bulgarian, Ginka Gerova-Ortega, who is also an internationally recognized concert artist. Other friends with whom she feels at home throughout the world include Met stars Mirella Freni and Nicolai Ghiarov, cellist Nathaneal Rosen and composer Gian-Carlo Mennotti. Because Freni's birthday fell on the date of Dokovska's Birmingham performance, the pianist dedicated the concert to her. "If I had thought harder, I would have had the concert taped and sent to her (Freni)," Dokovska mused, "but I got so busy practicing, that I forgot. I am sending her an inscribed program, though. That will be her birthday card."

A believer in the uniqueness of each person, Dokovska thinks that our modern, high-tech era is "robotizing" humanity and said the arts (and artists) are a vital ingredient in retaining "the individuality and creative uniqueness both of persons and

"Real education - the education of values, morality and culture, as opposed to facts or technical formu-- begins at home and from birth. It is individuals," she said, "which imparts values, the aesthetic, cultural and spiritual knowledge of humankind. Machines can do wonders, but not this. The role of the arttst (as of the parent and teacher) is to pass on the accumulated cultural knowledge of each era to the next generation. It is an awesome, but wonderful responsibility.

One of her fondest and most recent memories is of a concert she gave in Ulan Bator, Mongolia. "Everyone was so eager to hear good music . . . they were so full of warmth and love, it was a 'special' experience. I especially liked the fact that I played to mixed-age groups — children, teenagers, adults, the elderly." She has already been asked to return, she said, "and I can hardly wait. I felt at home there. Music really is a language that transcends all barriers - even in places as little known to most of us as Mongolia. I think that I am particularly lucky to live and work in the world

As for concert careers, Dokovska said, "Successful music careers today are very strange - it is often now (too often) more a matter of publicity and promotion than of artistry." She acknowledged that winning the Debussy Competition and a Fulbright to Juilliard (to study with Beveridge Webster) in 1980 gave her a great advantage. "There are so many truly fine planists who never really have a chance (for a career)," Dokovska mused.

A believer in fitness (she walks and is careful about her diet), Dokovska feels that "dedication, stamina and a sense of humor" are the necessary adjuncts to talent and the good fortune she has in sustaining her career.

SHE ALSO WORKS on new music constantly, even as she continues to polish her current repertoire, to expand her repertoire and to keep it from getting stale.

Before she puts together a program though, Dokovska studies the music and researches the composers and eras.



THE WORD "REVELATION" same to become aware of the previously unknown, so artists not only happen upon revelations, they look for them. Even people as close to you as your own family members, offer fantastic revelation as you attempt to draw them. The subtle little bump that a three-year-old has for a nose, the strength in your father's furrowed brow or maybe you never noticed the beauty and look of conto as you look and study the lines, sh and colors of all you attempt to draw."

corn in your mether's oyes. How blue is your paraheet? What shade of green is your unbrolls plant?" How faccinating it is to be an artist.

Some need to fly to far away places to find beauty. But the watchful eye of an artist finds beauty in the common place. Such as, the folded and cracked leather of a high top work boot — the free flowing lines of the untied laces and the shiny brass of the worn eyelets.

Some need to "get away from it all" and the artist seeks to understand what was always there. To do so is to look at your surroundings wherever you are. Revelation will come to you as you look and study the lines, shapes and colors of all you attempt to draw.

So instead of getting "away from" it all, try getting "into" it all. Find revelation in the common place. Along with exotic animals and faraway scenes, look for the beauty of those things available and often overlooked.



In her quest to bring quality children's enter-tainment to the area, theater owner Inga Zayti often gets help from unexpected sources. Take, for instance, her current production of "Aladdin," a live stage production now going on at her quaint and charming — not to mention historie.— Marquis Theater in downtown bloth. historic - Marquis Theater in downtown North-

For this show, Zayti accidentally acquired the volunteer services of an area businessweman who just happens to be a talented seamstress who "signed on" to do the costumes for the

presented at the Marquis and was impressed with what Inga was trying to do," Sharron said.

Because the bridal business is traditionally slow in the beginning of a new year, Sharron said she decided to contact Zayti to see if she could get involved in costuming future shows. The timing was right, Sharron said.

"Aladdin" was in the casting stage so she was included in the planning at its earliest stages by other technicians who were going about the business of set design, music and lighting.

Born in Detroit, Sharron learned to sew at her

mother's knee, so to speak.

'My mother and dad owned the Allure Bridal Shop for many years, first in Detroit and then moving to Livonia. My three sisters and I learned the business from them."

THREE OF THE four sisters are still somewhat involved in the bridal business, which now includes a shop on Meadowbrook Road in Novi as well as the store on Plymouth Road in Livo-


However, only two of them are seamstresses - and even that has changed over the years, Sharron said. Because the shop does a lot of custom work, she is involved in designing, particularly in the prom dress line. Another sister works mainly with bridal headpieces. A third sister is involved in a cake decorating business.

Their mother, Sid, retired from the business several years ago, but was pressed back into service when Sharron "became a little nervous about meeting the dress rehearsal deadline."

"It was a wonderful experience," said Sharron. As her mentor, "Inga was a wonderful teacher, pointing out many things like how lighting affects color and how it changes on stage. I learned so much from her."

What has resulted is a set of stunning costumes for the "Aladdin" cast. But more than that, Zayti has a new disciple in her efforts to bring good children's entertainment to the area at affordable prices in an authentic theater set-

The topography in the Midwest generally conjures up in one's mind flat terrain — the prairie.

flat terrain — the prairie.

However, about 10,000 years ago the retreating glaciers left in their path not only flat land but sculptured pockets — hilly terrain and inland lakes.

Southeastern Michigan is a product of that glacial wake, particularly in Oakland County.

Having a variety of both flat and hilly alluvial landscapes provided an ideal setting for agriculture in the 19th century. One hundred years later the country's burgeoning population has supplanted agriculture with architecture — the built environment satisfying humanity's basic need for shelter.

The variety of building sites in the county provides a challenge for the enterprising individual who seeks to

build on an in-town lot or lake lct. Topography plays a tantamount role in determining the type of architectural structure that will be compatible with its surroundings.

With a sensitive architect and understanding client cognizant of their needs, a sense of place can be sought which ultimately will make for good architecture that will last a very, very long time.

"In-town" provides the greatest challenge. Vacant lots fast are becoming extinct in more densely populated, desirable areas but they can be found.


ONE EXAMPLE is a lot on South Washington in Roy Oak, now site of a two-unit townhouse designed by the architectural firm of Stucky & Vitale. Located in an older neighborhood, the style of architecture seemed to warrant something contextual, in this case a Victorial style which is eclectic in nature.

Put together an efficient workshop

If you dream of an efficient, functional place to work on projects and store tools, here are some hints to help you get started on your ideal

shop. A sturdy 2 by 4 frame topped by a double layer of %-inch plywood will serve as an excellent, easy-tomake workbench.

If a full-sized bench takes up more space than you have, you can build a fold-down unit. Use a solid core door for the benchtop; fasten it to a wall, using a piano hinge. Support the front edge with 2 by 4 legs attached with hinges and folding leg brackets that lock open.

For most people, the correct height for a workbench is 34 to 36

Because concrete is hard on the feet and damages tools that are dropped accidentally, cushion the workshop floor with plywood or an old carpet.

Storing Tools Here are some tips for expanding

storage space:

• A back of the door tool rack is great for storing small tools and sup-

· You can store tools on wall hooks or on a peg board. Paint the outline of each tool on the surface to remind you and others where to replace it.

To make a handy rack for screwdrivers and other small tools, drill a series of 1/2 to 2 inch holes through a 1 by 3. Mount the rack on the wall with L brackets.

Jars with screw tops are ideal for storing small items such as nails, screws, nuts and bolts. You can double your shelf capacity by screwing some of the jar lids to the undersides of the shelves. If you need a rack to store abrasive sanding discs, cut off 1/5 to 1/5 of an aluminum pie plate and fasten it to the wall, bottom side out. .

Safety Precautions

When working with any power tool use only a heavy-duty, grounded (three-prong) extension cord that is 14-gauge or larger.

To keep power tool cords out of the way as you work, hook the slack on a long spring screwed into the ceiling above your workbench.






