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Costume contest

If this Halloween is to follow last year's lead, this Tuesday downtown Plymouth will be crowded with hundreds of Ninja Turtles, walking pumpkins, chubby skeletons and 3-foot tall Supermen.

A combined costume contest and trick-or-treating will be held 5:30-6:30 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 30. When the event was held last year, it drew some 3,000 trick-or-treaters and a few hundred contestants, said Sharon Holroyde, an employee at the Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce, which sponsors the activity.

It is open to children up to 13-years old, preferably accompanied by their parents.

Contestants are to report to the bandshell at Kellogg Park in downtown Plymouth. "They will be judged right there," said Holroyde. At that time they will receive a ticket. Winners will be announced by ticket number at 7 p.m.

Downtown merchants will pass out candy to the children.

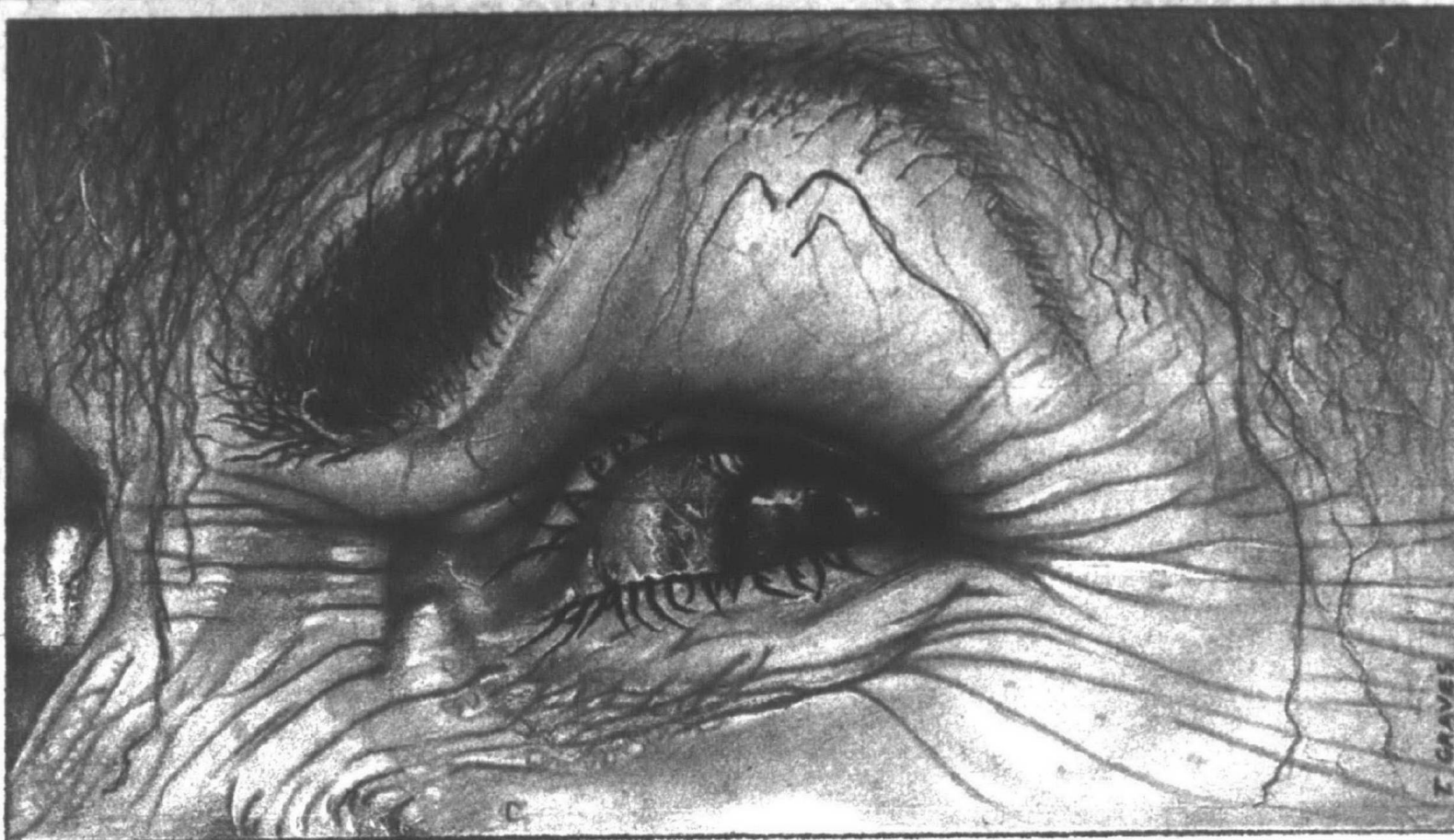
Glass talk

Although they expect to gain some support from voters fed up with the month-long stalemate over the federal budget, challengers for local congressional seats know they still face an uphill battle.

And a Bloomfield Township political analyst said incumbent Congressmen in those races are so well entrenched that it would take a "political earthquake" to unseat any of them.

"It's going to be very hard, in the metro (Detroit) area, for challengers to capitalize on discontent with Washington," said Jack Casey.

The budget Congress approved Saturday cuts \$40 billion this year and \$500 billion in five years. In that same time, the deficit is expected to rise from \$3 trillion to \$5 trillion.

THE NEW BUDGET raises tax rates for the wealthiest people from 28 percent to 31 percent. More taxes will be added to gasoline, beer, wine, liquor, cigarettes, airplane tickets,

and luxury cars and boats. Medicare deductibles are increased and Medicare taxes added to higher incomes.

Voting against the budget were Reps. William Broomfield, R-Birmingham, Dennis Hertel, D-Harper Woods, and Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth. Voting to send the budget to the President were Reps. Sander Levin, D-Southfield, and William Ford, D-Taylor.

Casey sees voters in those districts — 2nd, 14th 15th, 17th and 18th — opting for the status quo on Tuesday, Nov. 6, unless there's "a political earthquake in the eight range (on the Richter scale)."

He cited factors including well-es-

tablished incumbents with clean reputations, the way Michigan congressional districts are drawn and the lack of high-profile challengers.

NOT THAT people are satisfied with current leadership, Casey said. "It's the institution they are railing against, Congress as a whole, not 'our guys,'" Casey said.

A challenger would have to be a dynamic candidate from outside the political world to capitalize on the current situation, said the political analyst, former owner of Southfield-based Casey Communications. A "George Romney-type" who swept into the governor's office in 1964 on

a wave of disenchantment with government by voters.

Republican Blaine Lankford, a Royal Oak businessman running against Levin, said he has been calling attention to the budget deficit and what he sees as inequitable tax rates since spring. But he isn't sure how many votes it's going to win him "even though now, all of a sudden, that's become an issue."

"Ironically, it (discontent with Congress) could work for incumbents," Lankford said. "I'm afraid that people in this district (which includes Southfield, Lathrup Village

Group eyes area for mosque

A Moslem temple, school and retirement home are planned for some western Plymouth Township farm land.

Alli Fayz, planning and finance director for the Islamic Center of America, said the center plans "to build perhaps a senior citizens home, mosque, schools and other facilities down the road" — perhaps in several years.

BUT BEFORE A MOSQUE or other facilities can be built on the 89-acre parcel bordered by Napier Road on the west and Powell Road on the south, the Islamic Center must seek and win special use approval from the township planning commission, township officials say.

The land bought by the Islamic group is used as a pumpkin farm, and is zoned agricultural.

James Anulewicz, Plymouth Township municipal services director, said the planning commission had passed an earlier resolution to develop the parcel as single-family residential homes on one-acre lots.

Just east of the land owned by the Islamic Center is the Plymouth Commons subdivision, where homes are now under construction on one-acre lots.

Fayz said the Islamic Center of America, headquartered for 27 years on Joy Road in Detroit, has 5,000 members. "We're a religious organization that teaches religion and culture and the Islamic faith."

Fayz described Islamic Center members as "highly educated successful businessmen, they're hard working people."

He said a 43-acre parcel bordering Napier Road was bought in June 1988, and the remainder of the property to the east was bought in July 1989.

Keep the lights on for a safe Halloween

An extra nine cents on your monthly electric bill will help make this a safer Halloween.

Among many suggestions to help everybody enjoy the upcoming holiday, Sgt. Robert Smith of the Plymouth Township Police recommends residents leave their porch lights on all night.

And according to Lorie Kessler, spokeswoman for Detroit Edison, leaving a 100-watt light on for 10 hours costs nine cents; a 150-watt light costs 14 cents. These are the common wattages of many porch lights, she said.

Residents lights will be particular-

ly necessary in streets and roads with limited or no public lighting. "We have to rely on residents to light up the streets," Smith said.

Safety measures should start with the costumes. Smith said to use common sense and not to dress the children in outfits that may hinder their vision or movement. He also recommended wearing make-up instead of masks.

Attention should be paid to ensure that other people, especially drivers, can see the children. For example, the costumes should not be all in dark colors. But Smith is realistic about children's taste. "They'll be wearing their ninja outfits and run-

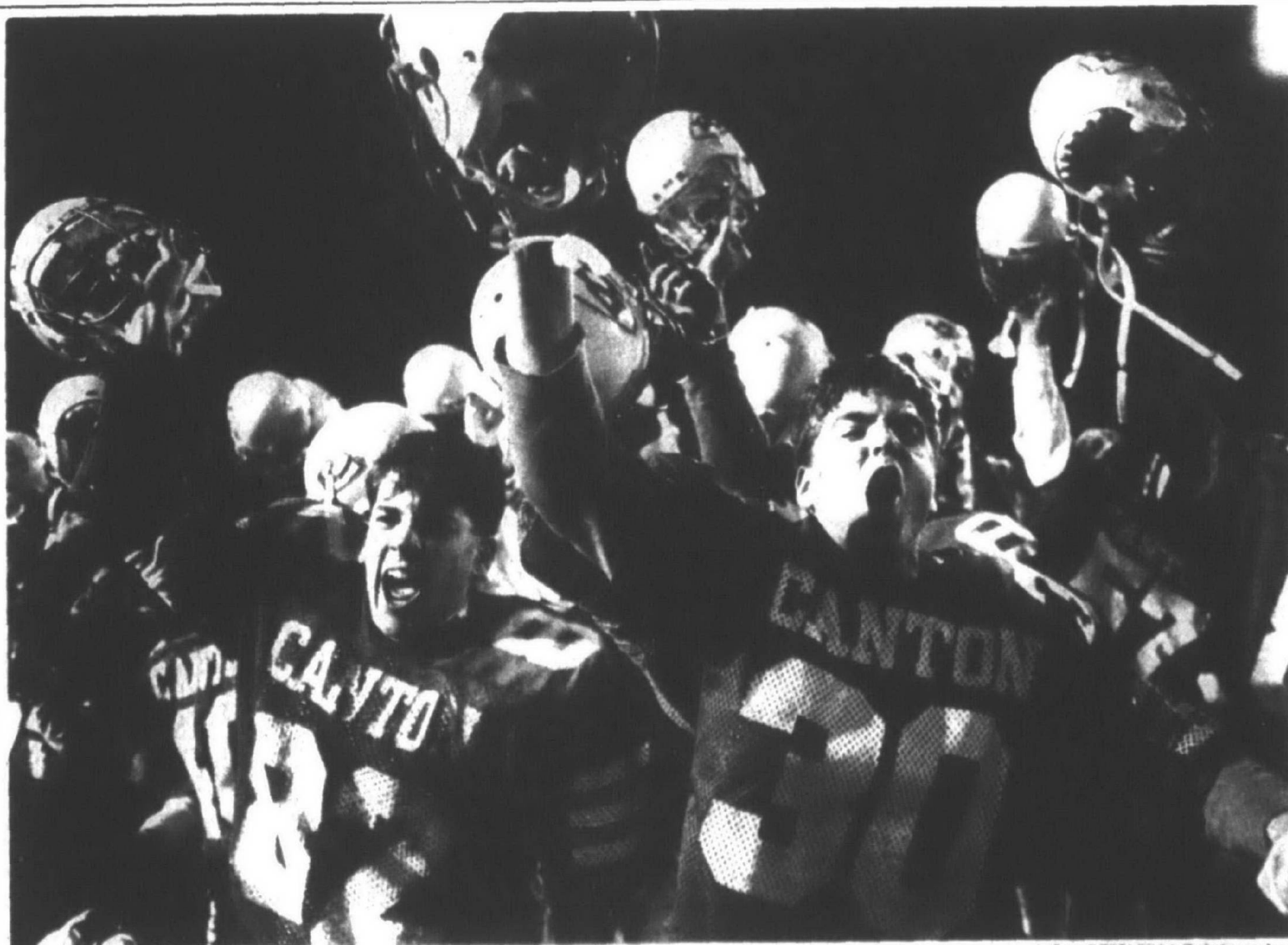

and Redford Township) are so pissed off they just won't vote."

Walter O. Briggs IV, a Democrat challenging longtime U.S. Rep. Broomfield, said people are upset with the lack of leadership in Congress. That should bolster his campaign and that of other challengers, he said.

BUT HE SAID he wasn't sure how much the highly publicized, month-long battle between Congress and President George Bush over a deficit reduction plan would affect his race.

"I do know one thing," Briggs said. "I see Bill able to get lots of air time (on radio and television news and talk shows) over this."

Briggs, like Lankford, said turning off voters — especially informed voters — was a worry.

Casey called Briggs an attractive candidate. Briggs is a descendant of the former Detroit Tigers owner and auto supplier. He is related by marriage to the late Michigan Sen. Phil Hart. Briggs also has the deepest pockets and best political ties of any challenger.

But he's young (33), running as a

Democrat from a Republican family and "has had trouble getting his message across," Casey said.

Republican Burt Adkins, challenging Ford for the second time in two years, said people in the 15th District (which includes Westland, Garden City, Canton Township and the southern half of Livonia) may be ready "now more than ever" for a change in their representation in Washington.

Adkins said free mailing privileges and other incumbent-only perks make success difficult for any challenger.

Not all legislators like budget

A federal budget package aimed at reducing the federal deficit by nearly \$5 billion over the next five years through tax increases and benefit cuts received divided support among local congressional delegates.

Both Michigan senators, Democrats Carl Levin and Donald Rie-

gle, voted against the budget reconciliation bill, which received Senate approval on a 55-45 vote.

In his comments opposing the package, Sen. Carl Levin cited what he termed a too-heavy burden on middle-income taxpayers without enough taxation on the highest income bracket.

The inclusion of a boost in the federal gasoline tax, from nine cents to 14 cents per gallon effective

Dec. 1, was a factor cited by some legislators in opposing the budget package.

"The gasoline tax included in this bill represents the wrong tax at the wrong time," said Levin. "It comes on top of the Saddam Hussein gas price hike, which has already pressed the patience and stressed the pocketbook of middle and low income Americans."

ning around in camouflage," he said. Trick-or-treating should take place preferably during daylight or dusk. Smith said the ideal hours would be 5-7 p.m.

Parents should accompany the children, but if that isn't possible, Pat Nemecek, Canton Township public safety information officer, recommends that an older brother accompany children. And if they must go at night, they should carry a flashlight and some type of reflector tape on their clothing, he said.

Children should also plan with their parents the route they will travel, Nemecek added, this way, in an emergency, parents will be able to locate them.

Nemecek also said, "Pick streets that are well lit and only cross at the corners." Children should not cross from between parked cars either. If they must trick-or-treat on streets without pavements, they should walk facing traffic.

All treats should be inspected by

parents before children eat them. "Be conscious of suspicious treats or with torn wrappers," Smith said.

Canton Township Public Safety will be working with McDonald's and Kiwanis inspecting candy, Nemecek said. Inspections will take place 6-9 p.m. at the McDonald's restaurants at 44900 Ford Road and at 40241 Michigan Ave., both in Canton. These inspections are open to all children regardless of where they live. Children and their parents will receive free orange drinks while kids will also get bags with cookies and candy.

Parents should also remember

that a safe alternative to neighborhood trick-or-treating is downtown trick-or-treating. From 5:30-8:30 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 30, the downtown Plymouth merchants will pass out candy to children accompanied by their parents.

For Devil's Night, the basic recommendation is to keep the porch lights on, Smith said. "Good lighting will go a long way to deter any of the seasonal pranks that might occur," he said, but added that this area has not had serious problems with past Devil's Nights. The most common pranks have been throwing toilet paper on trees, ringing doorbells and soaping windows, he said.

"The kids are being malicious, but they don't intend to cause excessive damage," Smith said. He noted it is important not to turn off the lights when small children go to bed. "As it gets darker and later, the bigger kids come out," he said.

The Plymouth Township Police Department will also cooperate with residents. "We'll also have more patrols directed toward the neighborhoods being a deterrent, making sure everybody has a safe and enjoyable Halloween," Smith said.

Canton's public safety will also have additional officers highly visible both days.

Area sows tree preservation law

Canton Township is just weeks away from adopting an ordinance aimed at preventing the kind of clear-cutting that devastated 30-40 acres of land at the southeast corner of Ford and Lotz roads last spring.

A forest preservation ordinance will get its second reading Nov. 13 and then will become law immediately upon publication of a legal notice, township Supervisor Tom Yack said Thursday.

The ordinance calls for developers of parcels larger than 2 acres to apply for permits before they can remove healthy trees. The ordinance calls for trees to be replaced, with a formula specifying the number of replacement trees, depending on type and size.

Trees designated as landmark or historic trees are given special protection.

"The ordinance calls for \$500 for each violation," Yack said. "We'll regard each tree that comes down as a

violation of the ordinance, which will mean \$500 for each tree."

LAST SPRING, Carlo Galuppi had the land he owned at Ford and Lotz clear-cut.

"There was a beautiful stand of trees there, but the township had no ordinance to protect its trees, then," Yack said. "Carlo heard from me immediately. He didn't make many friends."

"He was just denuding the parcel to give the impression something was happening there, to increase interest in the development community. The sad thing is, most developers, now — probably 95 percent — want to keep trees. They know that trees add value to a development."

"That land is at the doorstep to Canton. As you drive in, where you used to see a beautiful stand of trees, now it looks like there was a forest fire. There's just some scrub brush growing there," Yack said.

"We don't have this ordinance because we have an abundance of trees, but because we don't have

very much, and what we have, we want to keep."

THE ORDINANCE got its first reading Oct. 23. It was drafted after input from the planning commission, the Builder's Association of Michigan, two legal drafts from the township's law firm and similar ordinances elsewhere.

The fees for permits have not yet been set, Yack said.

"We don't want to make money on it, but a reasonable fee probably will be charged," he said.

Agricultural and farming operations are exempt, as are commercial nurseries and tree farms.

IF MORE than 20 percent of a wooded area is to be cut down, those trees with a diameter of 6 inches or more must be replaced.

If the replacement trees are 2-3 inches in diameter, they shall replace the trees on a one-for-one basis. If they are 3-4 inches in diameter, each new tree shall mean a credit for 1½ trees cut down.

Unisys plans job cuts

The Unisys corporation announced it will cut 5,000 jobs, but it is not known yet if any of those jobs will come from the Plymouth manufacturing operation.

Local representatives would not comment on the situation.

The cuts represent 6 percent of the total work force of the computer

company which had cut 10,000 jobs last year.

Reportedly, Unisys had a \$356.8 million loss for the third quarter and it expected added losses in the fourth quarter.

Unisys was the result of a merger between Burroughs and Sperry Corp. in 1986.

3 seek position as trustee on Dunning-Hough library board

At the upcoming Nov. 6 election, voters will choose a trustee to the board of the Dunning-Hough Library who could help decide whether the library should remain in downtown Plymouth or leave for a more spacious location.

DUNNING-HOUGH LIBRARY is a district library encompassing Plymouth and Plymouth Township. Currently its board has eight members, including President Carol Davis. A state law passed last year states that library boards must have only seven members, Davis said, but instead of letting someone go, the board was told it could wait until the election to bring down the number to seven.

Of the two positions coming up for re-election, only one will be filled. Trustee Judy Morgan has decided

not to run again.

The library board sets policy while its director, Pat Thomas, handles the daily operations. The director is not a member of the board.

Three people are running for the unpaid position: incumbent Janet Campbell, Mary Kleam and Virginia Tornga.

Campbell has been a member of the board for six years. The big issue the board is debating now is whether the library needs and expansion and whether it should stay downtown. Campbell said she feels strongly about this issue and this is the main reason she is running for re-election to the four-year term.

"I think we need the expansion, but I hope we can keep it downtown." Although room for the additional wing and parking spaces is very important, Campbell said, "I would like to find a way to make it work."

Tornga's association with the li-

brary is also time-tested. "I have been a volunteer for the past six years and I feel I know some of its needs and how it works," Tornga said. As a volunteer, she handles a variety of jobs, from shelving books to getting tags ready for library hours.

ABOUT THE EXPANSION she said, "We really need more room," and added that she wanted the library to remain downtown, but that available space was a very important issue. "I would investigate to see if we can stay where we are. If it's impossible, the only alternative would be to go out of the city."

Kleam was not available for comment, but Davis said she started attending the board meetings some six months ago and that made her become interested in the future of the library. The board meets the third Monday of each month. The meetings are open to the public.

Fake insurance claims rise as economy down, gas prices up

A slumping economy and surging gasoline prices are helping to fuel fake auto insurance claims.

"Since I came into auto theft four years ago, it was estimated that 10 to 15 percent of the claims were owner give ups," said state police Lt. Sandy Miller, commander of the Western Wayne Auto Theft Team, based in Canton.

"We feel it's higher — between 20 and 30 percent," she said.

COMPILING ACCURATE figures on how many people file fake claims is hard and one reason is that there's no profile of the type of person who would commit this crime, said state police Lt. Frank Deon, commander of the Eastern Auto Theft Unit.

"We've found that it's older people, younger people, businessmen, housewives — there's no set pattern," he said. "They do it because they can't keep up with a car payment, a divorce or they're in some economic bind."

Fraud is booming and an ailing economy gives drivers new incentives to make up stories and collect on insurance policies, according to a

recent Wall Street Journal article.

The type of fraud that is filed, including arsons, giving the car away and changing the car's identification, is just as varied as the person who makes the claim, Deon said. The average cost of the stolen vehicle is \$5,000 to \$6,000.

"Generally when we find a car and nothing is taken off it we know something is fishy," Deon said.

Last year in Michigan there were 65,297 cars stolen, which is down 13.1 percent from 1985 when there were 75,123 cars stolen.

"That's happening, because there's a lot of people out there like Sandy Miller," said Frank Skinner, State Farm Insurance division claims superintendent. He also is state chair of the anti-theft committee and board chairman of the Automotive Theft Prevention Authority.

"They're thinking up new scams every day," he said. "It depends on the ingenuity of the person making the claims."

ARSON INVESTIGATIONS are extremely difficult, he said, because "you have to be careful not to accuse innocent people."

More people are getting caught, too, Miller said, because officers are

identifying more fraud cases and prosecutors are more willing to take on the cases. Insurance holders pay a \$1 fee and that money goes to fight car theft through the Auto Theft Prevention Authority.

Through September 1990, the Canton-based Western Wayne team investigated 228 fraud cases. Using the assumption that 25-30 percent were fake, 55 or 60 of all the claims were bogus. Through September the team helped to prosecute eight cases.

ONE RECENT case involved more evidence than most. A Westland man last spring gave a 1986 Chevy Celebrity to an undercover state police officer, according to state police Sgt. Mike Lewis.

Six months later the Westland man filed an insurance claim saying the car was stolen. Meanwhile he had continued paying on his insurance policy.

He was charged with obtaining more than \$100 under false pretenses. The charge carries a 10 year penalty and the case is being prosecuted.

"We had a 100 percent turnout with our department. I'm very happy with the outcome of the training, and I'm real proud of this group of people. They put a lot of work into this."

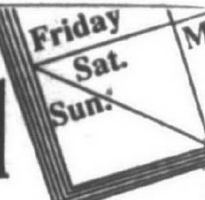
Taking part were 31 firefighters from Plymouth, Plymouth Township, Van Buren Township and Wayne. Evaluators came from Can-

ability to use fire hoses, firefighting tools and appliances and safety techniques and procedures, Matthews said.

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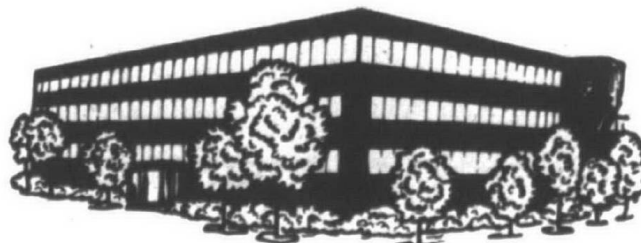

Tax talk disappoints area financial planners

Disappointment reigned among area financial experts last week even before Congress finished work on the new federal budget.

Congress reached agreement on the new budget Saturday afternoon — proposals include a new 31 percent tax bracket for high income Americans, up from 28 percent, reductions in some tax deductions, a new luxury tax on large autos, as well as boats and airplanes and

other expensive items new taxes on gasoline, alcohol and tobacco and raised the exemption level for Medicare taxes.

Even without final details, area financial planners said they were profoundly disappointed the debate had centered so heavily on new taxes.

"The U.S. Congress is only interested in additional revenue, not reducing any fat in Washington," said Norman Wiest, a certified financial planner based in Plymouth. "This new budget (if passed) is actually going to increase the deficit. Cuts of \$500 billion over five years are

nowhere near enough, the way Congress spends money. Three times that amount, \$1.5 trillion, would be meaningful."

RAISING TAXES on the wealthy may be politically popular, but won't be effective, warned Pat McWilliams of Capital Financial Planning, Livonia.

"If they (the rich) get taxed more, they always get more breaks," McWilliams said. "Everyone's going to pay more and the average guy usually pays most, percentage-wise, anyway."

But not every financial planner was unhappy with the new taxes being proposed.

"It puts taxes on people earning \$200,000 or more a year. I'm not in that category," said Stephanie Erickson of Money Concepts, Westland.

Erickson, in fact, argued against some budget cuts.

"Medicare shouldn't be cut. Too

many elderly need it," she said. "New taxes on beer and cigarettes? I really don't care, but I'd hate to see taxes on gas increased."

But Erickson agreed with President Bush's call for a cut in capital gains taxes.

"I'd like to see (capital gains) taxes dropped from 28 to 15 percent," she said. "That would benefit a lot of middle-class (people) and below."

ANOTHER TAX on the well-to-do — a 10 percent luxury tax on expensive automobiles — could keep people out of auto showrooms, one dealer warned.

"I don't think the tax itself is that bad, it's the perception of the tax that could be harmful," said Don Massey of Don Massey Cadillac, Plymouth. "I don't think most people fully understand exactly what's been passed. I don't think we fully understand. The difficult and harmful part is people could be steered away

(from new purchases) because of perception. It could cause a lot of people to subconsciously stay away."

Area Congressmen split on the budget vote, as they did on earlier, rejected, budget summit agreement.

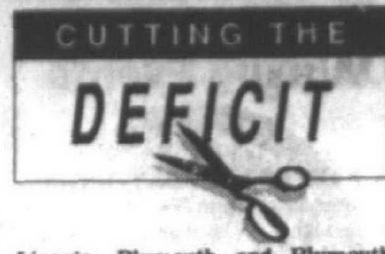
Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth, who voted against the initial package, again voted no. Sander Levin, D-Southfield, who voted in favor of the initial agreement, again voted yes. William Ford, D-Taylor, voted against the initial agreement, but voted yes this time.

Like the financial professionals, Pursell said he was disappointed the debate had shifted to taxes, instead of spending.

Spending bills would increase spending by \$32 billion, according to Pursell's estimate.

"IT'S NOT going to help the economy if we can't get a handle on spending," Pursell said.

Pursell's district includes northern



Livonia, Plymouth and Plymouth Township.

Ford who represents southern Livonia, Westland, Garden City and Canton, "believes it is about time to stop spending on a credit card and passing the bill on to his grandchildren," according to a spokesman.

Levin said the budget package, while less than perfect, was the best Congress could expect.

"There's no real alternative," Levin said. "It's not as fair a package as I would like, but we have made it more fair (than the original)".

Levin's district includes Redford.

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KNEE PAIN AND FLUID IN THE KNEE

Fluid in the knee causes pain as much from its sudden occurrence as by its amount. The normal knee holds a 1/2 cc of fluid; individuals can carry as much as 100 cc in the knee joint and experience little discomfort. Yet 5-10 cc can bring that same person to tears because of the pain that fluid creates. If fluid accumulates slowly the knee joint adapts, if the extra fluid comes in a rush, the joint capsule distends; this sudden stretch causing great pain.

Tears in knee ligaments and frays in the joint's cartilage are also reasons for pain. In these circumstances there may be no extra fluid in the knee.

When there is pain in the knee, but no fluid, your doctor puts a needle into the knee, mainly to inject steroid. The medicine does not "lubricate" the joint, but acts to soothe sites of irritation in torn ligaments or frayed cartilage. The injection will initiate healing and end disability.

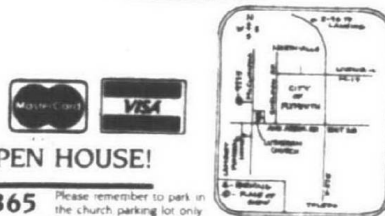

Supreme Court rivals display their solidarity during debate

The male candidates didn't show up, so the female candidates had a love-in.

State Supreme Court Justice Patricia Boyle, a Democratic nominee, said "On criminal matters, she would be similar to me."

Judy Hughes, a Republican nominee for the high court, said "I'm not running against my esteemed sister. There are not many cases in criminal law where I disagree with Justice Boyle."

They went on to prove it in a discussion of "basketball score" prison sentences.

Not showing up Wednesday for the forum on the University of Michigan-Dearborn campus were Justice Michael Cavanagh, a Democratic nominee, and W. Clark Durant, a Republican nominee. Under a quirk in Michigan law, Supreme Court candidates are nominated by political parties but run on a non-partisan ballot.

THE SENTENCING question was raised by one of just a handful of students attending the session. The state's highest court threw out a trial court's sentence of hundreds of years of a man convicted of stabbing, killing and robbing.

"I wrote the dissent," replied Boyle. "The trial court had authorized something that couldn't be done (sentences running beyond life ex-

pectancy). But the legislature had authorized any term of years. I lost 4-3."

"I would have joined in the dissent," said Hughes, adding "Some members of the court have been eroding the authority of trial judges for 20 years."

The candidates didn't discuss workers compensation or unemployment compensation cases, where Boyle and two Democrats have lined up solidly against three Republicans. Justice Charles Levin, elected as an independent, has been a swing vote.

On criminal matters, however, Boyle votes with the most conservative members of the court.

EACH BOASTED a tough-crime career in other ways.

Boyle said, "I worked on the Criminal Sexual Conduct Act (of the 1970s). It assures a woman's sexual history can't be brought out in a rape case. It's one of the most significant accomplishments of my life."

Hughes said that in Barry County she successfully prosecuted "a dirty drive-in movie west of town. The drive-in flew in lawyers from California and Georgia." When the place burned down, Hughes said she helped prevent its being rebuilt because it was a non-conforming use under the zoning ordinance.

Boyle: "I'm the only justice with significant trial court experience."

Hughes: "You don't necessarily have to be a trial judge (to be an ap-

pellate court judge). You need trial experience — and common sense."

BOTH BORE children while attending law school and had to fight for their early jobs.

"I was first in my law school class, the only woman," Boyle said. "Out of 350, I was the last person to get a job. I've never forgotten."

"I fought off five local attorneys" to win the Barry County prosecutor's election, said Hughes, admitting she was something of a carpetbagger for being new in town. The Indiana-born

lawyer also said she spent her junior year of high school in Japan, "immersed in Japanese culture."

COURTS ARE heavily burdened, they agreed.

Boyle said, "The system is extremely overburdened — too many cases, too much time, they cost too much."

Boyle called for "equitable funding" of the trial courts — circuit, probate and district. Outside of Detroit and Wayne County, local courts are financed by local units, with wide disparities in caseloads, pay and facilities.

Mettetal purchase supported

To the editor:

Let me first say I am not now nor do I have plans to be involved in aviation or local area business, real estate speculation or government. I am a homeowner and taxpayer.

Several weeks ago as I exited the Great Scott (now Kroger) at Ann Arbor and Sheldon roads in Plymouth, I was asked to sign a petition to "stop the use of my tax dollars" by Plymouth Township to purchase and operate Mettetal Airport.

Having just read a newspaper summary of the township board meeting, I knew the board specified approval of the project only if no Plymouth Township funds were involved and I so responded.

I was then asked if I "paid federal taxes," and again being aware from the article that funding would be by the Airport Trust Fund, I knew this money was not from my income taxes but from airport landing fees and taxes on airline tickets, aviation fuel, etc. My response was:

1. "The facts are being misrepresented. Why? What's going on?" and,
2. (Having been a senior manager in business for many years) "I am well aware that a valuable asset to a general aviation facility is to the Canton-Plymouth community's current and potential industry."

It has recently become clear that the Mettetal project is much more than the mere enhancement of a valuable local airport.

The probable injection of an important college facility for several hundred students in aviation engineering, electronics and mechanics, plus pilot training, offers enviable opportunities for our youth in an industry critically short of trained personnel in these fields.

It will also provide salaried jobs for college level educational staff and jobs in supporting satellite businesses attracted by the college. Some programs could be available to our high school students, also.

It is clear that this project will increase the value of our homes by attracting light industry and increasing the communities' educational base all "without" using our income tax or real estate tax dollars. In fact, it will help to hold down our real estate taxes. And these are the real facts.

So, again, I ask, "What's going on?" Whoever is behind this misrepresented petition drive certainly doesn't have the best interests of the Canton-Plymouth community in mind.

Whoever it is should come out in the open and let us hear what their real motives are in depriving us, the citizens of Canton and Plymouth, of a very valuable asset and the opportunity for a major, "no cost to us" enhancement of this valuable asset to provide salaried jobs and education for valuable careers for our youth.

In the Thursday, Oct. 18 edition of the Plymouth Observer, your paper included a very positive assessment of the teamwork displayed in a recent public safety emergency.

The emergency services employees of the City of Plymouth take pride in delivering quality services, and sincerely appreciated the public acknowledgment from your newspaper. A key element in our emergency services was unfortunately omitted in your kind remarks, however, and I would like to draw attention to the excellent job of our dispatchers.

As a long-term member of the Michigan Emergency Telephone Services Committee and immediate past chairman, I am very cognizant of the vital role that telecommunications play in delivering emergency services. We are constantly reviewing training and hiring standards, procedures and equipment needs to give our employees the tools they need to process calls for help. Our employees respond by doing their jobs in a professional, albeit quiet, manner.

In the case of the Med-evac incident, it was dispatchers who coordinated the numerous players and services involved. Every radio and

phone call was passed through a dispatcher, who had to act promptly and without error to make sure the pieces fell together.

Yet, as in most incidents in emergency services, the field workers are prominently displayed in media photos, have the satisfaction of seeing their hard work come together and exchange the pats on the back. Meanwhile, the dispatchers, isolated from the outside world, continue to answer phones and worry that "their" police and firefighters are OK out there.

I am proud of the men and women who quietly go about perhaps the most difficult job in our organization, and gain little recognition for it — the dispatchers. Please keep them in mind in your future evaluations of public safety incidents and the teamwork aspect of our organization.

- In the 1988-89 school year when the developmental program was started, it was stated that this program was geared for the smaller-size classroom (19-22). Our classrooms are larger than this, what have we done to change this program so it is now geared for the 28-30 classroom size?
- In talking with teachers and parents, we find that not only are individual schools run differently, but classes within each school are run differently. Why is this not a unified program? We understand that teachers teach in different methods, but when one teacher has reading books, reading groups, spelling lists, etc., and the other teacher does not, something is not balanced.
- What are you doing to differen-

tiate between those students who are more advanced or may need special attention within their own classroom, as the program would lead you to believe.


- You would think in any new program that is instituted it would be closely monitored, especially in light of the fact that it is already doomed for failure, based on the schools' statements that this program is designed for smaller classroom sizes than we currently have. As of this date, the school has not been able to demonstrate that there are any checks and balances in place.
- How can a student develop at their own developmental level when everyone does the same thing together in a classroom?
- What is the evaluation process for the individual student?

I guess in order to get some answers regarding our children's education is not as easy as we thought. Why?

Congress tackles civil rights, defense issues

Here's how Observer & Eccentric members of congress were recorded on major roll call votes between Oct. 12-19. HOUSE:

To Cut Defense — The House refused, 301 for and 215 against, to cut 2 percent across-the-board from the \$268.2 billion defense appropriations bill for fiscal 1991. The cut would not have affected the Desert Shield operation in the Middle East, which is funded separately.

The bill (HR 5803) was passed and sent to conference with the Senate. Counting military funding in other bills, the Pentagon's first post-Cold War budget will total \$283 billion, about 4 percent below the comparable 1990 figure.

Amendment sponsor Charles Schumer, D-N.Y., said "every dollar we spend on . . . land wars in Europe is a dollar thrown away from America's future."

Opponent Tom Lewis, R-Fla., said "across-the-board cuts are dangerous" because they affect vital programs as well as lesser ones.

A yes vote was to cut the 1991 defense budget by 2 percent.

Voting yes: Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth, Dennis Hertel, D-Harper Woods, and Sander Levin, D-Southfield.

Voting no: William Ford, D-Taylor and William Broomfield, R-Birmingham.

To Cut Interior Bill — By a vote of 167 for and 234 against, the House rejected a proposed 4.6 percent cut

in the fiscal 1991 appropriations bill (HR 5769) for the Interior Department and related agencies. As later approved by the House, the bill costs about \$11.9 billion, up six percent over the comparable 1990 bill.

Sponsor Bill Frenzel, R-Minn., said "a modest 4.6 percent cut . . . is certainly warranted in these times of fiscal despair."

Opponent Ralph Regula, R-Ohio, said that "we have worked hard to keep the totals down" in Appropriations committee crafting of the bill.

A yes vote was to cut the Interior appropriations bill by 4.6 percent.

Voting yes was Pursell and Broomfield.

Voting no was Hertel and Levin.

Not voting was Ford.

Covert Aid To Angola — By a vote of 175 for and 246 against, the House rejected an amendment to end covert aid, reportedly \$60 million this year, to the UNITA forces fighting the Soviet-backed Marxist government of Angola. The amendment stipulated that any continuation of the aid be openly requested by President Bush and publicly approved by Congress. The vote occurred as the House sent to the Senate a bill (HR 5422) funding the CIA and other government intelligence activities in fiscal 1991.

"If it makes sense to provide aid . . . why should it not be dealt with in the open?" asked sponsor Ron Delums, D-Calif.

Opponent Henry Hyde, R-Ill., said America is "committed to fighting

Communist Tyranny, whether it is in Afghanistan . . . Cambodia or . . . Angola."

A yes vote was to end covert aid to anti-Marxist rebels in Angola.

Voting yes was Hertel, Ford, and Levin.

Voting no was Pursell and Broomfield.

Civil Rights Bill — By a vote of 273 for and 154 against, the House approved the conference report on a bill (S 2104) making it easier for minorities, women and others to seek redress in the courts against job discrimination. President Bush has said he will veto the bill because it could lead employers to adopt personnel quotas.

Reversing Supreme Court decisions of recent years, the bill shifts to employers the burden of showing challenged personnel decisions were made out of business necessity rather than bias. Another key provision enables plaintiffs to collect punitive as well as compensatory damages if they win their suit.

Supporter Augustus Hawkins, D-Calif., called it "public relations, the big lie technique" to claim the bill would lead to personnel quotas.

Opponent Harris Fawell, R-Ill., said "simply stating that this bill is not a quotas bill does not mean that it is not a quotas bill."

A yes vote was to approve the bill.

Voting yes was Pursell, Ford, Hertel and Levin.

Voting no was Broomfield.

SENATE

Civil Rights Bill — By a vote of 62 for and 34 against, the Senate approved the conference report on a bill (S 2104) to combat workplace discrimination based on race, sex, religion, nationality or color. Sixty-seven votes are needed to override President Bush's promised veto of the bill if all 100 senators vote.

The civil rights measure counters Supreme Court rulings that have made it more difficult for plaintiffs to file and win job bias suits. It also adds punitive damages, of up to

\$150,000 in most cases, to the remedies available to those who win their case.

Supporters said the legislation protects civil rights without imposing affirmative action quotas, while opponents said employers would resort to hiring and promoting by the numbers to avoid costly litigation. The president's veto vow reflects business community criticism it is a quotas bill.

A yes vote supported the bill.

Voting yes were Senators Carl Levin, D and Donald Riegle, D.

Abortion — By a 48-48 tie vote, the Senate failed to table (kill) a requirement that medical authorities notify at least one parent in advance when a daughter under 18 is scheduled for an abortion in a federally funded hospital or clinic. Parental approval of the operation would not be required. The amendment was attached to a Department of Health and Human Services appropriations

bill (HR 5257) later sent to conference with a House bill containing no such provision. It would become the first such requirement in federal law.

A yes vote was against the parental notification requirement.

Voting yes was Levin and Riegle.

Stealth Bomber — By a vote of 44 for and 50 against, the Senate refused to limit production of the B-2 or Stealth bomber to six planes rather than the 75 copies the Air Force wants built. The amendment sought to signal an end to B-2 production while preserving the technological base that the taxpayers' \$27 billion investment in the Stealth program has bought. Before the Cold War ended, the ultimate mission of the radar-evading plane was to deliver nuclear warheads deep inside the Soviet Union. This vote occurred as the Senate sent to conference with the House a \$268 billion defense appropriations bill (HR 5803) for fiscal 1991.

UM-D holds dedication

The University of Michigan-Dearborn, dedicated the school's newly renovated administration building in ceremonies Friday.

The building, constructed 31 years ago and formerly called the student activities center, is the first phase of an \$11.7 million campus renovation

project started in 1989.

The renovated structure now houses executive offices and faculty offices, studios for the arts and classrooms. Future buildings slated for renovation include science and computer buildings and the student services center.



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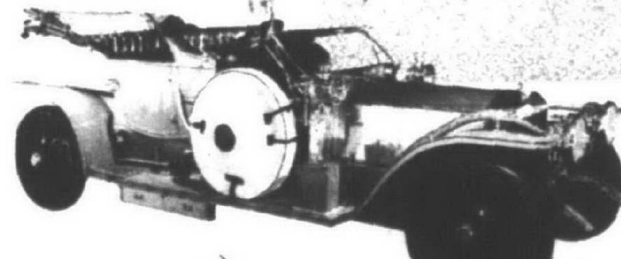

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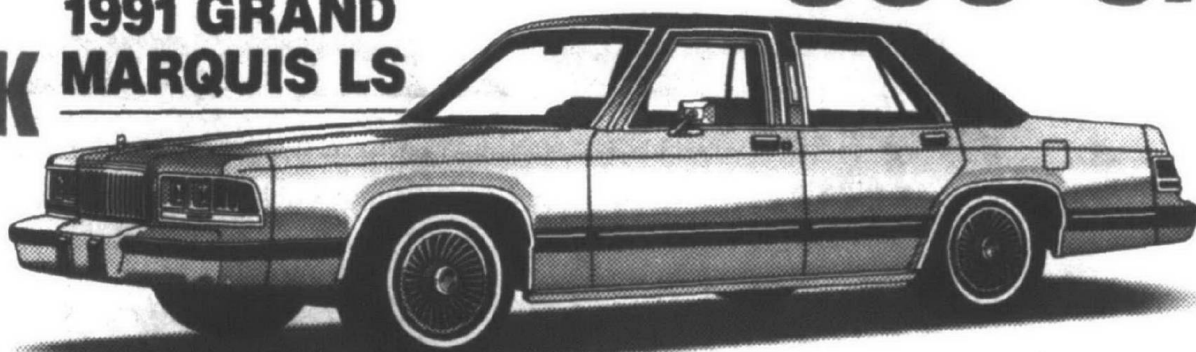

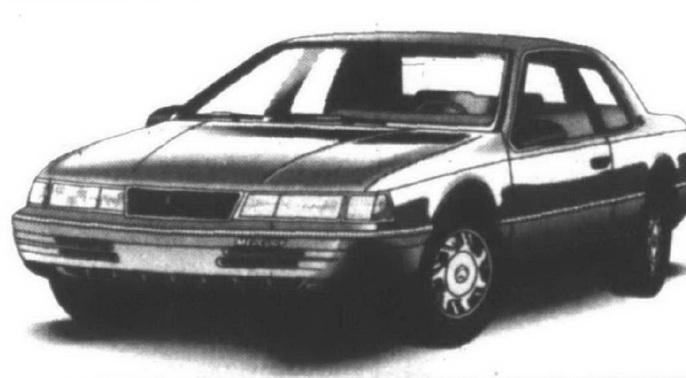

Savory secret is nutmeg

During a recent visit to the Eastern Market, I bought my first pumpkin of the season.

Small in stature and somewhere between the size of a one quart and a two-quart saucepan, this burnt-orange-and-brown speckled harvest vegetable ended up as a velvety soup that was as savory as an appetizer as it was sweet as a dessert.

Sure, the pumpkin itself was the mainstay of the soup but I just couldn't resist commenting about one tiny ingredient that made the soup so memorable. It was the chrome on an automobile, the crispness in the new sheets. It was the smell of a bakery or the sharpness of a new knife. Isn't it amazing what an iota of spice can do for a recipe?

In this case, however, an iota of nutmeg has the potential to come across more like an avalanche. This is one potent spice that has the potential to make a statement by a simple grating.

The tall and beautiful tree that bears the nutmeg has a yellowish fruit that resembles an apricot. When the fruit reaches the peak of ripeness, it splits open to reveal a nut covered with what looks like red lace. This crimson web is mace, the sister spice of the nutmeg that surrounds a tiny shell that encloses the dark nutmeg seed itself. Grated mace tastes similar to nutmeg but is more pungent.

THE NUTMEG is then dried in the sun for six to eight weeks, during which time the kernel shrinks back from its shell. The shell is then broken to reveal the oval, furrowed, grayish-brown seed. Larger seeds are sold as spice while the smaller ones are pressed for their oil, which finds its way into soaps, perfumes, ointments and medicines.

Ah, but this potent little seed carries a dark cross. Nutmeg contains a narcotic chemical known as myristicin that in large doses can be harmful. Cakes and teas containing high amounts can bring on hallucinations. But, like other such chemicals, myristicin has nasty side effects including headaches, nausea and even death.

Today's cooks need not fear these side effects since the amounts used in recipes are rarely enough to create problems. One person would have to eat the equivalent of two whole nutmegs before any symptoms appeared. Because small amounts are used, it is always preferable to keep whole nutmegs and grate only so much as is needed at one time. Once ground, the flavor deteriorates rapidly.

What is the flavor that is perceived? Personally, my mind conjures up a musky, aromatic warmth, with just a subtle hint of nuttiness. Not only was it noticeable in my pumpkin soup but the Italians use nutmeg in pastas, meat stuffings and vegetable dishes. The Indians include it in their rich curries.

My favorite bartender, Hanna, uses it to spice up her tropical hot coffee drinks, with just a dash being sprinkled on the whipped cream that inevitably gets stirred in.

You don't have to have an ethnic origin to enjoy nutmeg. Roasted chicken stuffed with a nutmeg-scented pilaf gives a new accent to the ordinary. All the fall harvest vegetables, especially the typically bland squash, can benefit from a brushing of butter and a sprinkling of nutmeg.

Even fruit like bananas, pears, pineapples and apples can have their sweetness brought to new heights with the addition of a grate of nutmeg.

In my opinion, there's no spice more adaptable to a wide range of dishes than nutmeg. You can pick up a small nutmeg grater for under \$2 at most houseware departments. A jar of nutmegs (about 10) will last a lifetime.

Scary night: Party stuff inside a shell

IT'S THAT TIME of year again when the pumpkin is king. Pumpkins are jolly and bright but a bit scary and unsettling at the same time.

Not only do they symbolize the abundance of the autumn harvest, they also signal the death of that colorful season and the onset of winter.

They offer one last glorious, rapturous burst of fiery brightness, before the bleakness of the cold days that lay ahead.

What would Halloween be without them? Black witch robes and white ghost sheets just wouldn't be the same without the orange accents of the jack-o'-lantern.

Everyone knows how good pumpkins taste. Pumpkin pies, cookies, and breads make our mouths water. And pumpkin butter spread on hot toast for breakfast helps dull the chill of the autumn winds we have to face when we go out for the day.

The taste of the pumpkin is delicious, but don't overlook the pumpkin itself as a decoration to cheer the spirits this time of year. I like to use pumpkin shells to hold all sorts of things. Remember the old nursery rhyme:

Peter, Peter, Pumpkin-eater,
Had a wife, and couldn't keep her.
He put her in a pumpkin shell,
And there, he kept her very well.

It would take a very big pumpkin to keep a wife in, but there are a lot more practical uses for pumpkin shells that are a bit smaller.

Pumpkins can be hollowed out (be sure to remove all seeds and pulp) and used as bowls or tureens to serve all sorts of soups and punches.

Others can be lined with plastic cups or containers, such as ice cream pails, butter tubs or cottage cheese cartons, to make great bowls for serving salads, desserts, nuts and caramel corn.

If you line the pumpkin, be sure to cut both the pumpkin and the carton to fit exactly, so that it doesn't spoil the appearance. Pumpkin shells lined in this way also make terrific flower vases for fall centerpieces.

If you like, you may decorate the outside of the pumpkin with waterproof markers or acrylics and make it look like a jack-o'-lantern.

These are good for elaborate adult parties, children's parties and family suppers. Or, use a smaller one to hold just enough spiced cider for you and your special someone to drink together in front of a fire.

RECIPES

CREAMY PUMPKIN SOUP

This soup is wonderful made with fresh cooked pumpkin. But don't try it with canned pumpkin, or you will be terribly disappointed.

I usually make a lot of it in October when

the pumpkins are plentiful and freeze it in plastic cartons to reheat and serve later for Thanksgiving or Sunday suppers.

2 pounds fresh pumpkin, peeled and cut into cubes
1 large or 2 small yellow onions, cut up
4 medium potatoes, peeled and cut into pieces
Salt and pepper
3-4 cups water

1 quart heavy cream (can use liquid non-dairy creamer. It's cheaper and better for you.)

Grated nutmeg
Chopped green onions for garnish

Combine pumpkin, potatoes, onions, water and a pinch of salt in a saucepan, and bring to a boil. Simmer over low heat until the vegetables are tender.

No place like Home Sweet Home

On the outside, Home Sweet Home restaurant wears the formal facade of the stately White House-style mansion it once was.

But it's not as stiff and formal as it might look. Inside, the restaurant is teeming with life. It's friendly, inviting, charming — everything you would expect from a restaurant that proclaims homestyle cooking as its specialty.

In an earlier life, the restaurant was a formal place, red velvet drapes and all. But for the past three years Steve Romanik has operated it as a casual, moderately priced restaurant — an improvement that must help old Charles Rogers, the original homeowner, rest in peace.

Rogers, a dairy farmer and the inventor of condensed milk, built the house in the late 1920s and is said to have designed the home's dramatic, gently curved center stairway with a wedding in mind. That didn't happen in his lifetime, but today many a bride has posed on that stairway. "We like to think Charlie's ghost is happy," said manager Don Mazur.

WEDDINGS AND other private parties are in the daytime. The restaurant is open for dinners only Tuesday-Sunday.

The restaurant's homey image is reflected in its menu too. Turkey and meatloaf are among the most popular items here — and no wonder. The turkey comes with homemade stuffing and the meatloaf is served with genuine mashed potatoes and gravy. The meatloaf, incidentally, packs a little kick — green and red pepper that adds a surprise zip to the entree.

The shiitake mushroom soup holds a surprise also — pepper and Tabasco sauce that will light your fire. Actually, it's not too hot, just seasoned enough to add interest to what could be an average soup. The mushrooms, by the way, are grown by Romanik himself.

Wiley's spicy chicken, on the other hand, is designed to bring a tear to the eye. "A real meltdown" is how the menu describes this item. It "will stoke the fire in your palate." Need we say more?

There are no surprises in the chicken and dumplings dish, just extremely tender chicken with vegetable and gravy and a dumpling sitting right in the middle. When was the last time you had dumplings — good dumplings? One taste of these and the memories will flood in.

FOR THOSE who don't have fond memories of home cooking, there are grilled items, hamburgers and daily specials such as the lake perch, swordfish with Dijon sauce, salmon and veal chops. The restaurant's own

Dijonnaise mustard sauce enlivens fresh fish dishes. We also recommend the mixed grill in which the shrimp, chicken, zucchini and carrots are chargrilled and brushed with a garlic-mustard glaze.

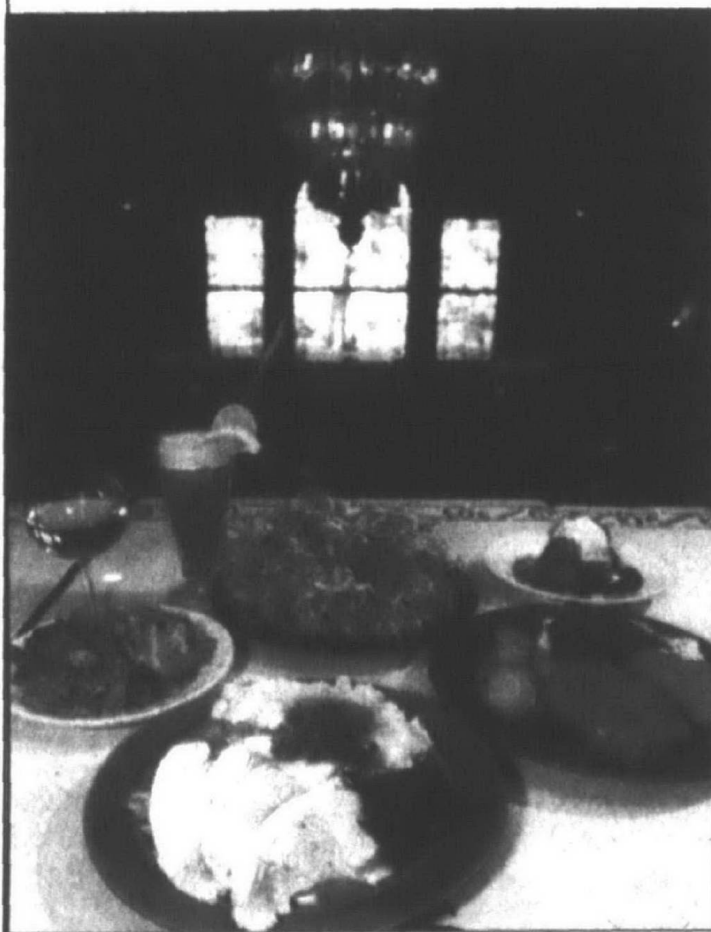
Broadening his menu, Romanik recently added "home" dishes from the corners of the world — such as pork tenderloin marinated Chinese-style and a Moroccan-style chicken with cilantro salsa. It seems there's something to suit everyone here.

One word about appetizers — plentiful. They're enough to make a meal. A half-slab of ribs is served, for instance. The onion nest — finely sliced onions that were lightly breaded and not the least bit greasy — easily fed four.

Though you may have to return a few hours later to have room for dessert, try the brownie. It's the smoothest, chocolatiest brownie around — well deserving of all the praise it has garnered. Top it with Guernsey's vanilla ice cream and Sander's hot fudge and you have a made-in-Michigan delight.

It's hard to say which is most interesting here — the menu or the house with all its neat touches, such as the bird house and doll houses in an upstairs dining room and the almost-complete border done in crayon. Quilts double as window treatments and antique lamps and furni-

CARROT ORANGE COOKIES

These cakelike cookies are a good use for leftover carrots. The kids will never know and the aroma from the nutmeg will last in your kitchen for hours.

10 carrots, sliced
¼ cup solid vegetable shortening
¼ cup sugar
1 egg, beaten to blend
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 cups all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
½ teaspoon fresh grated nutmeg
½ teaspoon salt
½ cup chopped walnuts
1 cup powdered sugar
2 tablespoons orange juice
¼ teaspoon fresh grated orange peel

Cook carrots in saucepan of boiling water until tender, about 15 minutes. Drain. Puree in blender or processor. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease baking sheets. Beat shortening with sugar, mix in egg. Stir in vanilla. Combine dry ingredients. Stir into batter alternately with carrot puree. Mix in walnuts. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto baking sheets and bake until light brown, about 20 minutes.

utes. Combine powdered sugar, orange juice and orange peel and stir until smooth. Spread atop warm cookies.

BUTTERNUT SQUASH WITH APPLES, NUTMEG AND CRANBERRIES

1 large butternut squash
4 Granny Smith apples, cored and chopped
¼ cup sugar
1 teaspoon fresh grated nutmeg
2 cups cranberries
½ cup (1 stick) melted butter

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cut squash in half. Place cut side down on baking sheet. Bake until tender, about 1 hour. Meanwhile, combine apples with ¼ cup sugar and nutmeg in saucepan over medium heat. Cook until juices evaporate, stirring frequently, about 12 minutes. Set aside. Combine cranberries with remaining ¼ cup sugar in another heavy saucepan and cook over medium heat until juices evaporate, stirring frequently, about 4 minutes. Peel the skin off the squash. Cut squash into 2-inch pieces and place in a 9-by-12-inch baking dish. Combine with apples and cranberries. Pour butter over top and toss. Bake about 15 minutes and serve hot.

tables are very tender. Using a blender, puree together with the cooking liquid. (Or drain, saving the liquid. Mash or beat the vegetables until smooth, adding a bit of the liquid at a time, until all is blended together.)

Bring to a boil again. Stir in creamer, and simmer (do not boil) for five minutes. Add salt, pepper and nutmeg to taste. Pour into an unlined pumpkin shell.

Sprinkle with chopped green onions for garnish, and serve hot.

MUSH-NACH A LA CREME

This is my son's fancy name for a quick and easy but different, homemade cream of mushroom soup with spinach. Made in minutes, it is absolutely delicious. Even people who as a rule don't like spinach eat it — and ask for more. This soup looks beautiful served in a hollowed-out (unlined) pumpkin.

Melt 1 stick of butter (½ pound) in a heavy pan. Add 2 cups sliced button mushrooms and saute. Add 2 crushed Knorr's beef bouillon cubes. (You may substitute another brand, but it won't taste as good.) Add 1 can chopped spinach, liquid and all. Add 1 quart liquid non-dairy creamer

AP — To trim the amount of fat you eat, use meat to add flavor, not as a main ingredient, recommends Martin Yan.

MOSTACCIOLI

An easy-to-make one-dish dinner, this recipe serves 6 and can be made ahead and frozen.

1 pound ground beef
1/2 cup green pepper, chopped
1/2 cup onion, chopped
2 cups tomatoes, 16-ounce size
1 can tomato paste, 6-ounce size
1/2 cup water
Grated parmesan cheese
1 bay leaf
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
4 cups cooked mostaccioli (8 ounces uncooked)
1/2 pound Velveeta cheese

Brown meat slowly. Add green pepper and onion and cook until tender. Stir in tomatoes, tomato paste, water and seasonings. Allow to simmer 15 minutes and remove bay leaf.

Layer noodles, meat sauce and Velveeta chunks in a 2-quart casserole. Repeat layers 2 or 3 times. Top with grated parmesan cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 minutes. Serves 6.

HERB SOUR CREAM BREAD

4 1/2 cups flour, divided
1/2 cup sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon marjoram leaves
1/2 teaspoon oregano leaves
1/2 teaspoon thyme leaves
2 packages fast-rising yeast
1 cup sour cream
1/2 cup water
6 tablespoons margarine
2 eggs, at room temperature

Set aside 1 cup of flour. In a large bowl, mix remaining flour, sugar,

salt, marjoram, oregano, thyme and yeast. In microwave, heat sour cream, water and margarine to 125-130 degrees. Stir into dry ingredients. Mix in eggs. Mix in only enough reserved flour to make stiff batter; cover and let rest 10 minutes. Stir batter down; turn into 2 greased 1-quart casseroles. Cover and let rise in warm, draft-free place until doubled in size, about 30-40 minutes. Bake at 375 degrees for 25 minutes. Remove from casseroles; cool on wire racks. Makes two loaves.

HOME-STYLE SALAD DRESSING

2 teaspoons fresh or instant minced onion
1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
1 tablespoon parsley flakes
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup mayonnaise
1 cup buttermilk (or use 1 tablespoon vinegar plus enough milk to make 1 cup)

Combine all ingredients and stir until well-blended. Chill before serving over mixed greens of your choice. Makes 2 cups.

COOKIE PUDDING PARFAIT

1 small package instant chocolate pudding
2 cups milk
5 Chips Ahoy cookies
1/2 cup CoolWhip, thawed

Prepare pudding as directed on package, using the 2 cups of milk. Break cookies into small pieces and mix with the CoolWhip. Divide 1 cup of the pudding between 4 dessert dishes. Place 1/4 of the CoolWhip/cookie mixture on top of the pudding in each dish. Top with the remaining pudding. Chill 30 minutes. Makes 4 servings.

Cookbook highlights foods from East Coast region

AP — There just is no thinking of the Chesapeake Bay without thinking of crabs. Unless you think of oysters.

There are plenty of other foods typical of this East Coast region — cole slaw, stewed tomatoes, baked fish, ham, rabbit, black walnuts — but it is the crabs and oysters that are so alluring to the diner and to anyone fascinated with a way of life that has become endangered.

Soft-shells and boiled crabs, crab imperial. Raw oysters and oysters roasted over an open fire, scalloped oysters, oyster stew, oyster stuffing.

These are the gems of the Chesapeake.

All of these are in "The Chesapeake Cookbook," (Clarkson N. Potter, New York, \$30), along with much more. More than 150 recipes take the cook from the first settlers of Maryland, Virginia and Delaware to today's innovative dishes.

THE LAND AND water have provided residents from pre-colonial times to the present with an abundance of provender, both cultivated and wild, say authors Susan Belinger and Carolyn Dille.

Recipes in the cookbook are divided into two sections.

First is a series of menus for Chesapeake-style feasts, a crab feast topped off with a skillet peach cake, warm goose salad and oyster chowder for a holiday dinner and Joyce's vinegared ham for a hunt breakfast.

The second is organized traditionally, by course. The authors say Chesapeake cooking is based on three tenets — Respect for local ingredients; close observation of the matter at hand, whether it be bread or goose, and a regard for the taste of things themselves.

Among the recipes in the section are pickled oysters, cornmeal waffles, soft-shell clam chowder, crab cakes, smoked bluefish and rabbit fricassee.

THE DISHES ARE influenced by immigrants from Germany, Italy, Poland, Africa and other places.

CRAB IMPERIAL

1 1/2 pounds backfin crabmeat
2 tablespoons minced sweet green pepper
2 tablespoons grated onion
2 tablespoons unsalted butter
2 tablespoons chopped parsley

1 tablespoon dry sherry
Dash of cayenne
1/2 cup heavy cream
Salt and freshly ground black pepper
1/2 cup fine dry breadcrumbs
3 tablespoons unsalted butter

Pick the crab carefully to remove the cartilage. Keep the meat in as large pieces as possible. Soften the green pepper and onion in the 2 tablespoons butter for a few minutes. Mix the crab, softened vegetables, parsley, sherry, cayenne and cream. Season lightly with salt and pepper.

Just before serving, preheat the oven to 450 degrees. Fry the breadcrumbs in the remaining 3 tablespoons butter over medium-high heat for 1 minute or so.

Butter 6 to 8 cleaned crab or scallop shells, or ceramic baking shells. You may also use a 1-quart baking dish that can withstand very high heat. Mound the crab mixture in the shells. Sprinkle the breadcrumbs over the crab. Bake for about 10 minutes, until the crab is bubbling and golden brown. Serve hot. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

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A peachy recipe for Classic Peach Melba

AP - Nationwide, peach production is a \$360 million industry, turning out an average of nearly 1.3 billion pounds per year over the last six years.

Peaches originated in China and were introduced into ancient Persia. Confucius referred to peaches, or tao, in his writings from the fifth century B.C.

In keeping with their delicacy, it's best to resist the temptation to squeeze peaches in the market. They bruise easily. Don't place great emphasis on red color, looking instead for a creamy or gold undercolor and a sweet fragrance, both more reliable signs of ripeness.

The following recipe for Classic Peach Melba is provided by the National Dairy Board:

CLASSIC PEACH MELBA
Water
4 large (about 1 1/4 pounds) fresh

peaches
1 cup granulated sugar
2 tablespoons lemon juice
4 cups water
Raspberry Sauce (recipe follows)
1 cup Vanilla Yogurt Sauce (recipe follows)
1 pint premium vanilla ice cream

Fill a large saucepan halfway with water; bring to a boil. Add peaches; simmer until the skin loosens, about 1 minute. Remove peaches with a slotted spoon; rinse with cold water. Peel peaches; cut in halves and remove pits.

In a large saucepan bring sugar, lemon juice and the 4 cups water to a boil. Add peach halves; simmer, covered, until tender, about 5 minutes. Place peaches and liquid in a covered container; refrigerate until ready to serve.

To serve: On an individual dessert plate spread one-half of the plate with raspberry sauce and the other

half with vanilla yogurt sauce; top with 1/4-cup scoop ice cream; cover with a peach half. Garnish with fresh berries, if desired. Makes 8 servings.

Raspberry Sauce
One 12-ounce package frozen unsweetened raspberries, thawed (about 2 cups)
1/4 cup granulated sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla extract

In the bowl of a food processor fitted with a metal wing blade or in the container of an electric blender, process raspberries until smooth. Place a fine sieve over a small bowl. Press raspberry puree through sieve, discarding seeds. Stir sugar and vanilla extract into raspberry puree. Makes about 1 cup.

Vanilla Yogurt Sauce

1/4 cup vanilla low-fat yogurt
1 tablespoon granulated sugar

In a small bowl combine yogurt and sugar. Makes 1/4 cup.

CILANTRO GRILLED CHICKEN WITH PEACH CORN CHUTNEY
1/4 cup oil
2 tablespoons fresh lime juice
2 tablespoons chopped fresh cilantro
2 tablespoons dried cilantro
1 clove garlic, chopped
1/4 teaspoon ground cumin
1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper
Salt
Pepper, freshly ground

4 boneless, skinless chicken breast halves
Peach Corn Chutney (recipe follows)

For marinade, in a blender or food processor combine oil, lime juice, cilantro, garlic, cumin and cayenne pepper; salt and pepper to taste. Blend until smooth. In baking dish, arrange chicken in single layer. Pour marinade over chicken. Cover and refrigerate, turning once, about 1 hour.

Prepare grill or heat broiler. Grill or broil chicken 4 inches from heat, turning once, until lightly browned on the outside and just cooked through, 3 to 4 minutes per side. Serve with Peach Corn Chutney. Makes 4 servings.

Bake, sauce, juice, freeeze or dry Michigan apples

And, of course, fresh Michigan apples are the best. Bake them, sauce them, juice them, freeze them or dry them — just eat them and enjoy them. There are apples for all meals and they can be fixed in a variety of ways.

Apples are filling, not fattening. One medium apple contains about 80 calories. An apple is about 85 percent water and low in sodium, and contains a little potassium, vitamin A and ascorbic acid. The skin is high in pectin and a good source of fiber.

Apples are a primary source of quick energy from their natural fruit sugar to satisfy your sweet tooth without adding empty calories.

Another big advantage to apples is that they help clean teeth and breath and massage the gums. Eating a raw apple for dessert will aid in removing food particles from your teeth.

BAKE THEM. Use apples for special occasions, or any time, in pie, dumplings and cobbles, and numerous more ways.

For a pie, allow about two pounds (six to eight medium-size) apples for a 9-inch pie.

A baked apple need never be plain. Core the apple, fill cavity with orange juice, cinnamon or nutmeg and raisins, and bake. Microwaving baked apples is a quick and easy dessert, or the leftovers are perfect for breakfast the next day.

Try poaching, apple wedges in cider and season with nutmeg. Perfect for dessert!

SAUCE THEM. Hot applesauce with chopped walnuts served with a warm bran muffin and hot coffee for breakfast — what could be better?

Applesauce can be added to meat loaf, breads, brownies and cakes, or made into butter.

Make applesauce a la mode by putting chilled applesauce in a sherbet glass, sprinkle with nutmeg and top with a scoop of vanilla ice cream.

TRY FRESH blender applesauce.

It's easy and quick to make.

Place about four large apples, peeled, cored and quartered; one-fourth teaspoon cinnamon; one-half cup water and about three tablespoons honey in blender. Blend until smooth. This makes about three cups ready-to-eat applesauce.

For a wonderful sweet-sour glaze, add mustard and pineapple juice to applesauce and drizzle over Chinese vegetables and noodles.

Applesauce added to tomato sauce, lemon juice and spices will give your barbecue sauce some zing.

Two pounds of apples (six to eight medium size) makes about three cups of applesauce.

JUICE THEM. Try poaching fish in apple juice or cider instead of water. Your taste buds will be happy.

Mix yogurt and apple juice with cinnamon and nutmeg or curry powder and onion for a tasty vegetable dip. Equal parts of apple juice and yogurt also makes a low-calorie, delicious fruit salad dressing.

Don't forget a glass of cold, refreshing apple juice or hot mulled cider for those really cold football days.

FREEZE THEM. Cut apples dark when exposed to the air, so coat slices with lemon juice, other citrus juice or vinegar to prevent browning. Drain well and freeze in freezer containers or bags for use later.

One of the best ways to freeze apples for pies is to line the pie tins with foil, cut the apples into the foil, add sugar, flour and spices, and wrap to freeze.

The idea is to keep the apple foil package the same shape and size as your pie tin so when you want pie, you make your crust, unwrap the apples and they can be slipped into the crust and ready to bake.

DRY THEM. For the perfect eat-them-anytime snack, try drying apples.

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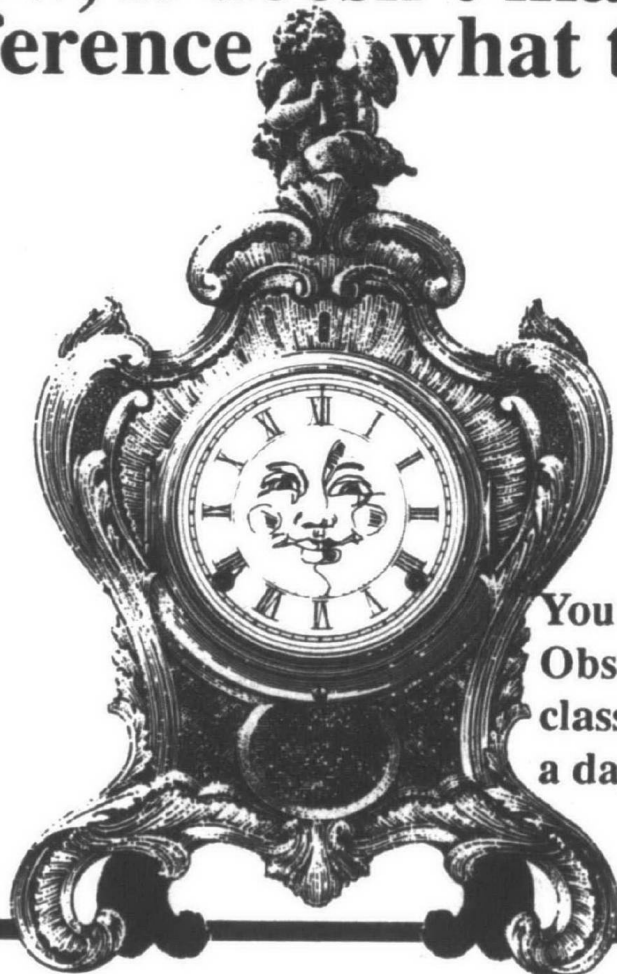

grape varieties and vinified in exactly the same manner at the Beaucastel property.

CRU DE COUDELET offers a superior buy to the knowledgeable consumer. Because of its Cotes du Rhone appellation, it does not command the same price as Beaucastel Chateaufort-du-Pape, grown a stone's throw across the road.

After graduation from the enology school at the University of Dijon, Francois' brother, Jean-Pierre Perrin, founded the negociant firm of La Vieille Ferme and set out to produce inexpensive, well-made Rhone wines to sell by direct mail to French enophiles.

This idea grew with the years and today Jean-Pierre has received acclaim for the value-priced Rhone wines shipped to the United States.

With 100,000 cases exported to the United States annually, La Vieille Ferme is the largest-selling Rhone wine brand in this country.

As a negociant, Jean-Pierre is adept at selecting proper fruit and well-made young wines for blending to make consistent quality wines regardless of the vintage characteristics. He has achieved this, and the La Vieille Ferme wines exhibit fresh fruitiness and charming appeal at a modest price.

Chiefs on warpath slam Salem, 34-0

Karl Wukie figures he and his Plymouth Canton teammates received some justice on the football field Friday night.

The senior quarterback atoned for his junior-year performance while leading the Chiefs to a surprising, 34-0 rout of Plymouth Salem in the annual clash between rivals.

Wukie threw three touchdown passes to Jason Riggs and ran for another, helping Canton to finish 8-1 and remain in the running for a possible Class AA playoff berth.

He ended the game with 224 yards in total offense, putting on a display that contrasted with last year's game when he threw four interceptions and lost a fumble in Salem's 25-6 victory.

"Last year I made the big plays for them; this year I made them for us," Wukie said. "It's a whole different feeling. After the way I played against these guys last year, I've been waiting all year for this game."

THE CHIEFS, who have beaten Salem in two of the last three games, might have qualified for the playoffs last year, but the season-ending loss gave them a 7-2 record and knocked them out of contention.

Canton prevented a repeat of that occurrence, but the team getting the fourth playoff spot was dependent upon the outcome of the Redford Catholic Central-Detroit DePue game Sunday night at the Silverdome.

The Chiefs, who were fifth in the region entering the final weekend of the regular season, were optimistic about their chances after winning Friday.

But, according to unofficial tabulations by the Observer, if CC and five of its opponents were to win, the Shamrocks would qualify ahead of Canton despite being 7-2. Playoff

pairings were not released by The Michigan High School Athletic Association until Sunday night.

"Salem got ripped off last year, and there's a chance we could this year," said Riggs, recalling the Rocks were 8-1 but stayed home while Ann Arbor Pioneer got in with two losses.

"No matter what happens in the playoffs, we can say we beat Salem in the last game," Wukie said. "I would have to go the rest of my life knowing I had lost to Salem."

"IT'S BEEN great regardless, but one of our goals was to go to the playoffs."

While the Rocks made all the big plays last year and dominated that game, Canton did likewise this year.

Riggs, who carried much of the rushing load when fullback Chris James suffered a bruised knee and left the game late in the second quarter, rushed for 108 yards on 18 carries and caught TD passes covering 3, 51 and 4 yards.

Canton's defense also held Salem tailback Leon Hister, who needed 32 yards to reach 1,000, to 13 yards on seven carries — all of it coming in the first half.

Facing a 21-0 deficit before it got the ball in the third quarter, the Rocks were forced to throw and unable to use Hister.

Canton's offense controlled the second-half clock, furthermore. Salem ran only three offensive plays and had zero yards in the third quarter and 35 yards for the half.

"WHEN THEY got us down, they took us right out of what we wanted to do," Salem coach Tom Moshimer

said. "They dominated the football game. What else can I say? They were physically stronger than us."

"I was impressed with their quickness, that more than anything. They were very, very quick and were beating us off the ball."

Wukie's first pass was intercepted by Scott Rodgers, but the Canton defense stopped the Rocks at its 8-yard line when Gordon Gibbins stepped in front of a Chris Tebben pass.

That was the springboard for a 14-play, 87-yard scoring drive by the Chiefs, ending with Riggs' first TD reception.

Canton went 62 yards in 11 plays to take a 13-0 lead with :07 left in the first half. On fourth-and-1 at the Canton 48, the Chiefs got the first down when Wukie drew Salem off-sides with a long cadence.

A 35-yard reception by Brett Howell (three catches for 57 yards) set up Wukie's 1-yard dash around end. Howell had two defenders on him but still caught the ball while tightropeing the sideline.

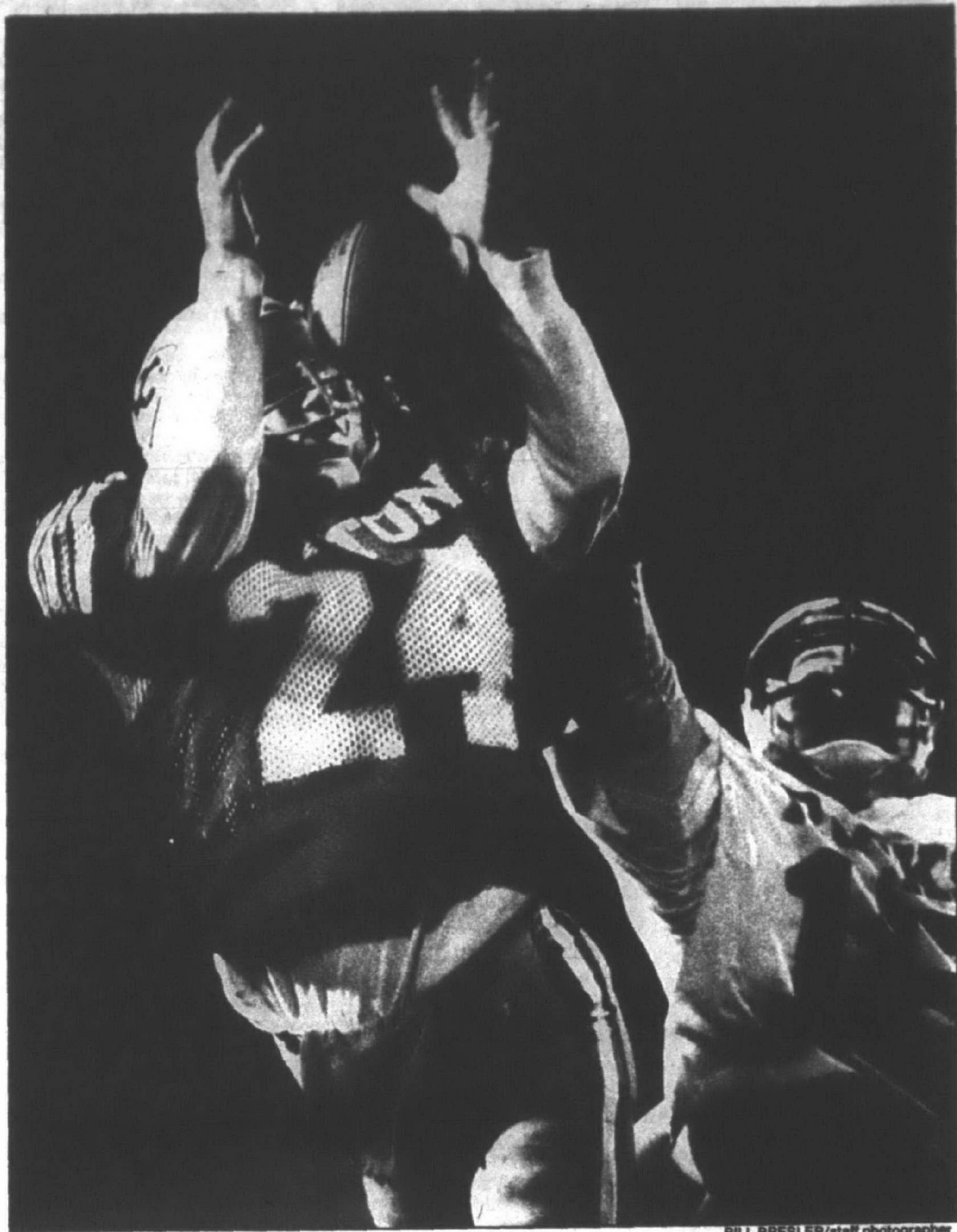
The Chiefs squashed any hopes of a Salem comeback when they scored on the opening possession of the second half.

"I REMINDED the kids in the locker room we were up 14-0 on Northville at halftime and blew it," Khoenle said. "With the nature of this game, that took care of itself."

The Chiefs, who punted on fourth-and-9 at their 46, got a break when Salem was penalized for having too many players on the field and kept possession. But the Chiefs were penalized twice for holding, and an illegal-receiver infraction nullified Mike Wougamon's 35-yard TD catch.

"This is one of the best games we've played except for the penalties," Canton guard Bill Zachary said. "Coach (Ernie) Krumm said we had better start playing our game,"

CC eliminates defending champ in district final

With eight minutes remaining in Saturday's district soccer championship game at Royal Oak Kimball, Redford Catholic Central coach John Boots was slappin' five with his starting forwards Scott Leadbetter and Dana Orsucci. The celebration had already begun.

Catholic Central exploded for six goals Saturday as the Shamrocks won their second-straight district championship with a 6-1 victory over Class A defending state champion Troy Athens. (CC won the Redford Union district title in 1989.) CC, 13-5-2 on the season, advances to the Troy

Athens regional while the Red Hawks finish the year at 14-4-3.

"These are both very good high school soccer teams," Boots said. "It came down to emotion, or a break. The last time we played Athens (earlier this year) it was a 1-1 tie. It just so happened that we were luckier today. The next time they may beat us 6-1."

CC GOT A huge emotional boots less than two minutes into the game when goalie Jeff Sawicki came up with a big save on a point-blank shot by Athens' Dan Dubek. Moments later, with the Shamrocks on the attack, Matt Kopmeyer punched in a CC goal off a scramble in front of the Red Hawk net for a quick 1-0 lead.

Catholic Central made it 2-0 with 7:49 remaining in the first half when Brendan Sullivan hit Joe Sebestyen with a pass in front of the Athens goal and Sebestyen beat Athens keeper Matt Cooper with a shot to the right corner of the net.

The Red Hawks finally got on the scoreboard with 3:28 left in the half when Jeff Eckhout redirected a corner kick from Todd Peterson past CC keeper Jeff Sawicki.

CATHOLIC CENTRAL broke any momentum the goal may have given Athens seconds before the half ended when Kerry Zagagnin lofted a free kick in front of the Athens net and Dana Orsucci banged a header into the back of the goal for a decisive 3-1 lead.

About 15 minutes after North Farmington's girls swimming meet Thursday at Plymouth Salem, the two coaches shared a conversation.

"It was a good meet," Salem coach Chuck Olson said. "Yeah," replied North coach Pat Duthie. "I was sweating a lot, and I'm not kidding."

It was warm inside the Salem pool, and that's probably why Duthie was sweating. Surely, he didn't have to sweat much about the final outcome, which showed the Raiders ahead 111-75.

North led from start to finish and won all but one event in staying undefeated in eight dual meets. The win improved the Raiders to 4-0 in the Lakes Division of the Western Lakes Activities Association.

With only Walled Lake Central remaining on the Lakes Division schedule, North has virtually clinched the division title. Salem is 7-3 overall and 3-1 in the Lakes Division.

"This was probably our best meet of the year, front to back," said Duthie, who guided North earlier this month to the Oakland County championship. "Salem has got a lot of nice swimmers and has very good depth, but our front line swimmers we kind of felt were better than theirs. Our goal is to finish as well as we can in the league meet (Friday, Nov. 9), and be a contender in the state meet."

THE RAIDERS have only five seniors on their 21-girl roster, but they played important roles. Karrie Kranz and Kerry Doran, a pair of seniors, won two events each.

Doran, keeping her unbeaten streak alive in dual meets, placed first in the 50-yard freestyle in a time of 25.85, and she later took first place in the butterfly in 1:00.02. Kranz, meanwhile, was first in the 200 freestyle (1:59.26) and the 100 freestyle (55.60).

The two also combined with fellow senior Julianne Markey and freshman Sherri Richardson in winning the last event, the 400 freestyle relay (3:50.83).

Doran, who swam with a slightly injured shoulder, didn't appear bothered by it during the meet.

"She's had quite a swimming career, and I can't remember if she's ever lost a dual meet," Duthie said. "She's good for 16 points a meet, and that's the maxi-

mum you can get. She's the best, without a doubt, female swimmer ever at North and to say the least it will be a real adjustment next year without her."

Despite North's domination of first place, Olson was pleased with the Rocks' performance. Swimming its fourth meet in the last six days, Salem managed to sweep the top three diving places and corral five second-place finishes.

ALYSSA SOFIOS won the diving with 206 points, while teammate Kim McCormick took second (190.85) and Shelly Rodgers third (157.45). Salem trailed 45-33 after the diving, but that's as close as the Rocks got.

Earning second-place finishes for the Rocks were Nicole Bosse, 200 freestyle (2:04.44); Mandi Ras, 50 freestyle (28.49); Candi Bosse, butterfly (1:03.35); and Kristin Stackpoole, backstroke (1:05.90).

"We didn't have a bad meet," Olson said. "We just didn't have a good enough meet to beat North. Under the circumstances, I'm pretty pleased. There's no reason to be discouraged. Doran, Kranz, (Anna) Palmer and Markey are pretty impressive."

"They're the team to beat in the conference. But we're really looking forward to the conference meet and our swimmers are going to have something to say about what happens there."

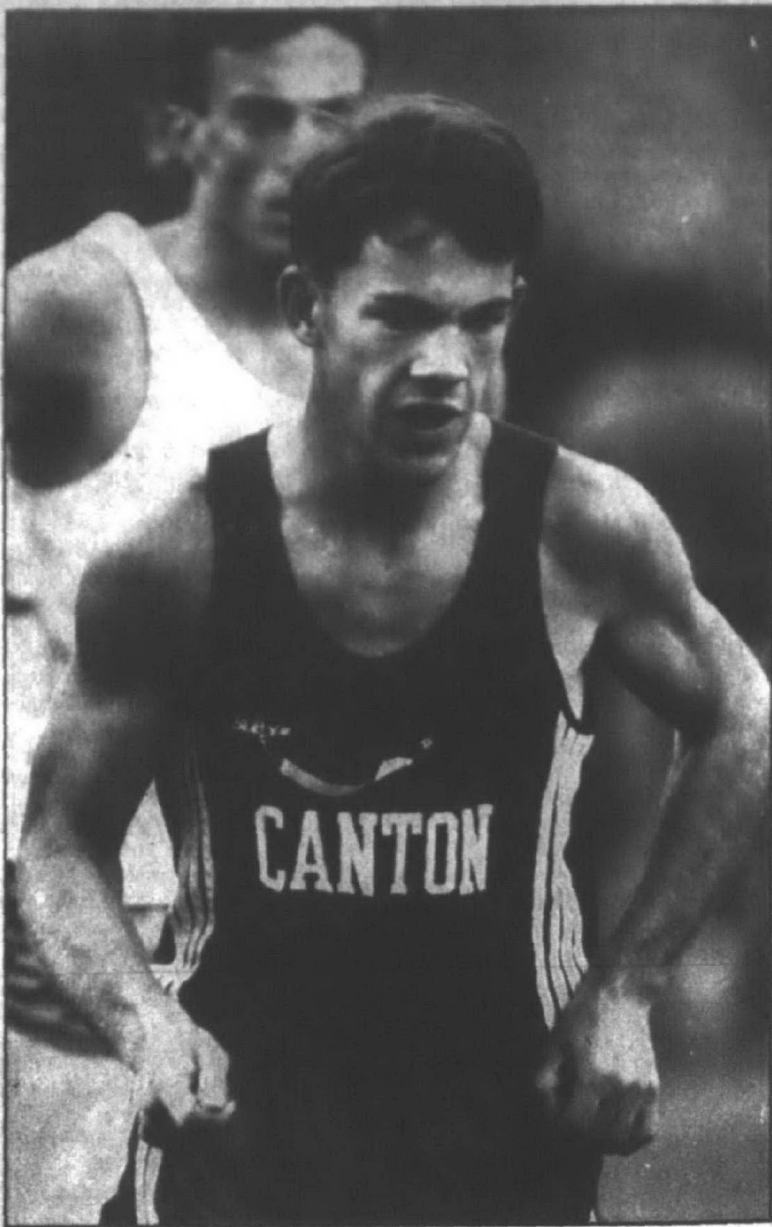
North began the meet impressively as its 200 medley relay team of Amy Duthie, Carrie Worthen, Shannon O'Brien and Colleen Harrison won in a time of 1:57.15. Jenny Wagner, Worthen, Richardson and Kranz later combined to win the 200 freestyle relay (1:47.01) to give North a commanding, 84-56 lead.

INDIVIDUALLY, PALMER, only a sophomore, helped keep up the pace for North, winning both the 200 individual medley (2:18.63) and breast stroke (1:11.22).

Winning one event each were Richardson and Markey. Richardson took the 500 freestyle (5:38.42), and Markey's win came in the 100 backstroke (1:03.40).

Markey's time in the backstroke was her best in the event this year, which Duthie was glad to see because "she's one of the hardest workers we've got going for us."

"I feel comfortable in the Salem pool," Markey said. "I've always done well in it and last year my time in the IM (1:02.8) at Salem broke my own varsity record. I'm used to the turns in this pool, the flags are about the same as the ones in the North pool."

Spartans, WLW win titles

Surprise, surprise, surprise. All three were lacking at the Western Lakes Activities Association cross country championship meets Wednesday at Cass Benton.

The closest anything came to what might be termed an upset was in the girls' race, in which favored Livonia Stevenson had a tougher-than-expected time before claiming the team title.

As the totals were being calculated, Spartan coach Paul Holmgren was visibly worried. He wasn't ready to accept a victory until all the results were in — not after his team posted 71 points, far more than he anticipated.

"We've got a chance," he said. "But we weren't supposed to have just a chance."

No, indeed. Stevenson was supposed to win handily — more like Walled Lake Western did in the boys' meet. To say the Warriors dominated wouldn't do them justice; they treated the 12-team race like a dual meet. Seven of their runners finished among the top 21, thus reaping either all-WLAA or all-Western Division honors.

WHICH MEANS two all-division runners (Brandon Keeney, who was 16th, and Art Schuetzler, who was 21st) didn't even count in Western's team point total. The five Warriors who did count all finished in the top 13.

Bill Crosby led Western, placing second (16:19). He was followed by teammate Jeff Grosso in third (16:28). The rest of the Warrior point-scorers: Jim Sweetman, fifth (16:57); Chris Crosby, 12th (17:21); and Matt Wright, 13th (17:24).

Farmington's Ben Goba was an easy winner in the boys' individual race in 16:00. The top two runners in the girls' race were no surprise: Jennifer Ray (19:15) and Wendy Proos (19:44), both from Western. They were the only two girls to crack the 20-minute barrier.

Western's overwhelming dominance left boys' coach Dennis Keeney searching for motivational tools prior to the meet. He finally hit upon something.

"We talked about having all seven (runners) up in the top 21," Keeney said. "That's what I fired them up with. But I didn't know if that was really attainable."

His runners proved it was. They scored just 35 points, easily outdistancing runner-up Plymouth Salem, which scored a very respectable 66.

PLYMOUTH CANTON was third (85), with defending champion Farmington fourth (137), Livonia Franklin fifth (144), Livonia Stevenson sixth (167), North Farm-

ington seventh (173), Northville eighth (190), Farmington Harrison ninth (233), Livonia Churchill 10th (267), Walled Lake Central 11th (276) and Westland John Glenn 12th (329).

In the girls' meet, Canton — the defending champ — challenged the Spartans but couldn't overtake them. The Chiefs finished 13 points behind, with 84.

Next was Salem, third (101); Central, fourth (126); Western, fifth (124); Farmington, sixth (129); Northville, seventh (149); North, eighth (181); Franklin, ninth (196); John Glenn, 10th (232); Harrison, 11th (320); and Churchill, 12th (321).

Stevenson's close call was in part due to Carrie Creehan's unexpectedly poor showing. "Our No. 3 girl (Creehan) was in the top 10 last year," said Holmgren. Creehan placed 24th Wednesday, with good reason. "She was sick last week, but I thought she was recovered," explained Holmgren.

As the runners crossed the finish line, Holmgren's concern grew and grew. "I was a little worried, especially where Carrie placed," he admitted. "Actually, I was quite a little bit worried."

BUT EVEN though she was under-par, Creehan's showing (21:43) was good enough. Stevenson's top runner was Stacy Prais, who finished fourth (20:31). Other Spartan scorers were A.J. Koritnik, sixth (20:46); Gail Grewe, 18th (21:29); and Becky Adamczyk, 19th (21:34).

Other top-10 finishers in the girls' race were Central's Tabatha Belcher, third (20:09); Franklin's Stacy Henett, fifth (20:46); Canton's Heather Meyer, seventh (20:51); North's Tracy Mitchell, eighth (21:00); Canton's Lana Boroditsch, ninth (21:01); and Salem's Corey Gurewicz, 10th (21:02).

Western's showing in the boys' meet carried more frustrating news to the rest of the WLAA: Only one of the Warriors' runners (Jeff Grosso) is a senior, meaning six will return and, no doubt, dominate next season's meet, too.

"This is probably the best team I've ever had," said Keeney, who coached two previous WLAA champs. "This is the first time we've ever had seven people this good."

Other top-10 runners in the boys' meet were Canton's Michael Ream, fourth (16:35); Franklin's Eric Curnow, sixth (17:05); Salem's John Thomas, seventh (17:08); Salem's Mike Patterson, eighth (17:16); Stevenson's Rodney Westlake, ninth (17:16); and Northville's Steve Coon, 10th (17:17).

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Playoff-bound CC rips DePorres

Redford Catholic Central earned a little redemption, a Catholic League title and a berth in the Class AA football playoffs Sunday night at the Silverdome.

"Could CC coach Tom Mach think of a better way to spend an evening?" "It was a great night for us, a super night," said Mach after CC overwhelmed Detroit St. Martin De Porres, 31-0. "We can call ourselves Catholic League champions, which is the best feeling and our number-one goal. And getting a berth in the playoffs is just frosting on the cake."

The win pushed CC's record to 7-2 overall and sends the Shamrocks into the first round of the Class AA playoffs. CC, the fourth-rated team in Region 2, will play No. 1-seeded Ypsilanti (8-1 overall), either Friday or Saturday at Ypsilanti. Plymouth Canton, despite an 8-1 overall record, must watch from the sidelines after finishing behind CC in the region.

De Porres beat CC, 8-0, earlier this year and that's what made this victory even sweeter for the Sham-

rocks. It was the sixth Catholic League championship for Mach, tying him for third on the all-time coaching list with Walt Bazylewicz and Mike Boyd.

The Shamrocks played without tailback Mike Thomas, out with an ankle injury, and wide receiver/defensive back Jack Davidson (broken collarbone), but one could hardly tell. Senior Arshob Stewart stepped in and gained 124 yards on 25 carries and scored one touchdown for the Shamrocks.

CC, playing with three new starters in the secondary (Brett Walter, Frank Yokum and Matt Roney) managed to outgain the Eagles, 270-130 in total yardage. The Shamrocks ran 62 plays from scrimmage to only 36 by De Porres and also held De Porres' fullback Shannon McLean to only 37 yards on eight carries. De Porres starting quarterback Melvin Sturdivant didn't complete a pass in 11 attempts and the Eagles were zero for 12 as a team.

"Our team slogan this week was 'Big payback, big payback,'" said Stewart, who had 75 yards on 18 carries by halftime. "We owed them something. I knew I had to work

hard, the team was behind me and I just went out and did it. It would have been a downer for me (not making the playoffs). This is my third year on the varsity and I felt I owed myself to make it this year."

Fullback Jon Barbara scored a rushing TD and gained 69 yards on 16 carries, while backup Brian Chaney had 28 yards on six carries, all in the second half.

The running game was so potent that quarterback Jason Carr needed to throw only three times, completing two for 26 yards. Carr scored a touchdown on a quarterback sneak and threw a TD pass of 15 yards to tight end Mike Grimes. The other Shamrock points came on a 39-yard field goal by placekicker Kerry Zivignan.

CC's dominance showed in the third quarter when it ran 19 plays from scrimmage to only two by De Porres. The Shamrocks, who led 10-0 at halftime, took the opening kickoff of the third quarter and drove 64 yards in 12 plays to lead 17-0.

Carr capped the drive by rolling out to his right and finding Grimes in the corner of the end zone for a 15-

yard TD with 4:15 left in the third quarter.

"We talked about that at halftime," Mach said. "We wanted to take the first drive and pound all the way downfield and score, because De Porres could have gotten right back into the game with a long run. We really came to play. We attacked them more this time. I don't think we realized how good they were the first time."

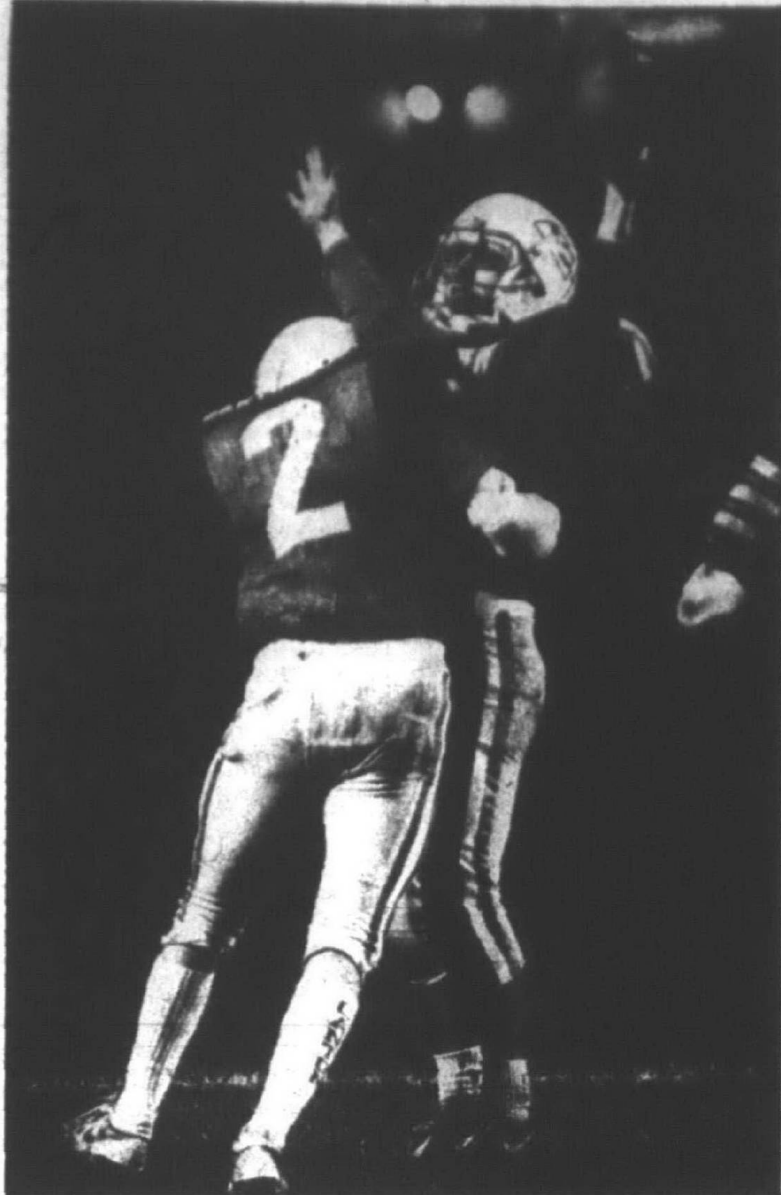
"If there's a better team out there, we haven't played them yet. We're just coming into our own."

S'craft chooses new legal counsel

In spite of strong objections by two trustees and the announced resignation of one, members of the Schoolcraft College Board appointed a Plymouth firm the college's legal representative in a 5-2 vote Wednesday.

Law, Hemming, Essad & Polczyk was approved from a field of four firms, over objections by trustees Jack Kirksey and Harry Greenleaf who supported the larger firm of Plunkett & Cooney of Detroit.

Kirksey, who serves as board treasurer, announced his resignation effective March 29, 1991. The announcement came prior to the vote because "I have little doubt how the vote will go, and I don't want it seen as, 'it didn't go my way.'"

Board vice-president Jeanne Stempien moved to approve Law, Hemming, Essad & Polczyk. "I feel strongly about a local firm and I feel the qualifications are there," she said.

Board president Mary Breen and trustees Wendell Smith, Michael Burley and Thaddeus McCotter, a law clerk for the competing firm of Brashear, Tangora and Spence of Livonia, supported Stempien's move.

In comments prior to the vote, Burley said he considered size and local ties of the Plymouth firm.

Smith said he also considered size, local ties and the firm's former experience in educational matters.

"I DON'T FEEL we have had a positive experience dealing with the second largest firm in Detroit," Kirksey said, referring to Schoolcraft's legal representative for 20 years, Canfield, Paddock and Stone of Detroit. The firm was also under consideration Wednesday.

"But to paint all large firms with one brush is not a logical conclusion," he added, because a large firm like Plunkett & Cooney has more resources and is better able to provide services at lower fees. "We should not pre-judge ourselves."

Kirksey also expressed "regret" with board procedures in securing new legal representation. "It took us

a year to get to this point. We reluctantly entered into the process." At an Oct. 17 meeting, each firm was granted a half-hour interview with trustees.

Based on the interviews, Greenleaf said that while he favored local firms, the "strength, diversity and depth of experience" displayed by Plunkett & Cooney convinced him to support the firm.

In response to Kirksey's and Greenleaf's comments, Stempien said, "The firm I nominated does municipal work extensively, work with colleges. There is a depth of experience. Based on that experience, this firm is qualified."

Kirksey asked that McCotter refrain from voting because he is em-

ployed by the one of the four competing firms.

"THERE IS NO conflict. I have nothing to gain," McCotter said, adding he intended to support the Plymouth firm over his Livonia employer.

Other trustees concurred. "If there is no personal compensation, I see no conflict," Burley said.

Representatives of each firm was present Wednesday. Breen thanked each for their earlier presentations.

Law, Hemming, Essad & Polczyk is expected to assume legal duties "as soon as feasibly possible," according to Schoolcraft spokeswoman Sandra Florek. Concern about legal representation during earlier land development negotiations led trustees to consider new representation, she added.

Unions back Metro Airport bond issue

In a joint meeting Wednesday, leaders of the AFL-CIO and the Trades Council pledged support of a request by Wayne County to sell \$100 million in bonds for improvements at Detroit Metropolitan Wayne County Airport.

The issue will appear on the Nov. 6 ballot.

The Metro Detroit AFL-CIO supports the bond sale, president Ed Scribner said, because it believes the economic future of southeast Michigan hinges on airport expansion.

"No single operation has such

enormous impact on the entire region as the airport. And in a slumping economy on the verge of recession, I think gainful employment should be at the top of everybody's wish list," Scribner said.

"A lot of people are talking about quality-of-life issues concerning the airport. But you can't approach a quality of life without a job," Scribner said.

The Metro Detroit AFL-CIO has 400 local affiliate unions with over 340,000 members in Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties.

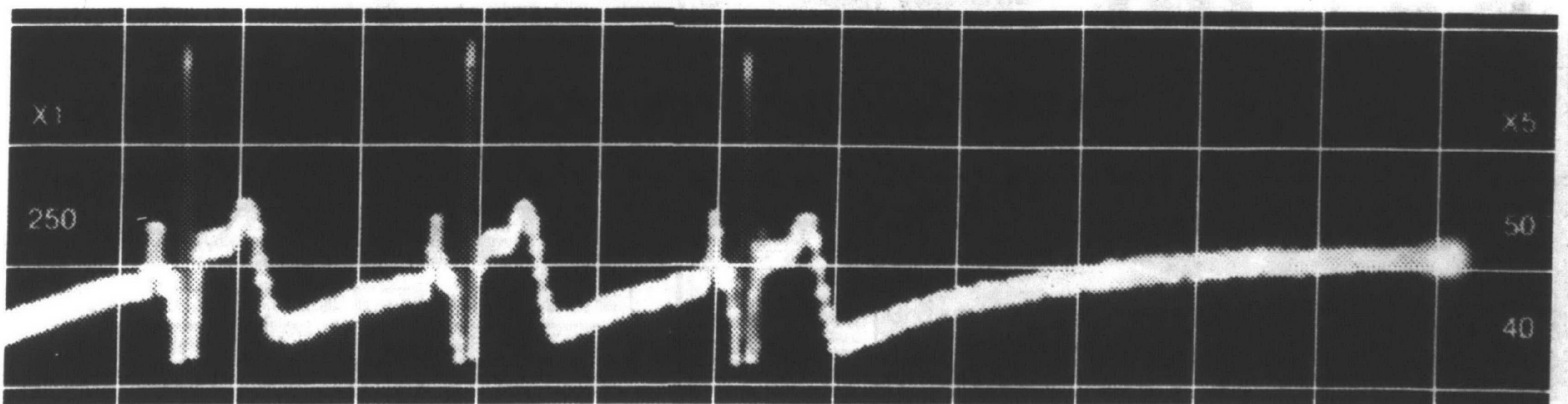

Jukeboxes bring back the sounds of the past

When the neon lights are shining and the mirrored ball is turning in Ed Blain's showroom, you may think you've stepped into jukebox heaven. A nickel or a dime is all you need to fire up Glenn Miller or The Supremes.

But walking away with a jukebox for your own home requires a bit more capital.

Blain, Detroit's king of jukeboxes, has been tracking down, restoring and selling vintage jukeboxes for 20 years. He began his career in a Pontiac flea market and now works exclusively out of several storefronts on Gratiot Avenue near Six Mile in Detroit.

Over the years, he has restored close to 2,000 jukeboxes, servicing restaurants, homes and even customers as far away as Berlin, Germany. According to Blain, more than half of his sales are to people in Oakland County suburbs like Rochester, Birmingham and the Bloomfields.

"My wife and I went to this place looking for an inexpensive newer model machine," said Gus Doerfler, a paper sales manager from Rochester. "But then we saw this and knew we had to have it."

A metallic clank echoes at the bottom of the coin box of his circa 1950 Rockola Rocket, setting into motion one of 25 record selections, visibly spinning through a window in the front.

THE CENTER piece of Doerfler's basement rec room, it is surrounded by a black-and-white tile floor, a soda counter and pictures of Elvis and James Dean.

For him, the jukebox recalls his childhood.

"We used to go to a pizza place about as big as this room and, of course, it had a jukebox," he said.

A similar sense of nostalgia got Blain into the business.

"When I was a teenager, my mother had this restaurant with a big wooden jukebox in it," he recalled. "I wanted to find one just like it. By the time I had found it about eight years ago, and just a mile away from here, I already had hundreds of machines."

With his slick black hair and gravelly, tough-guy voice, Blain, 65, is a perfect compliment to the machines he sells. He estimates that he has 800 machines in

his 18,000 square feet of storefront and warehouse space.

Pointing to one of 50 machines that line his paneled showroom, Blain conducts a brief history of jukebox styling.

"The value of a machine doesn't depend on how old it is," he said, explaining why the '30s models, similar in design to an old radio cabinet, can be obtained for considerably less than the neon and chrome gems from the 1940s and early '50s.

PERHAPS THE best known of these is the Wurlitzer 1015 of 1946. The crowning achievement of famed designer Paul Fuller, this bullet-shaped steple of wood houses glass colored by green, blue and red flashing neon. An electrically operated bubble device runs up tubes along the sides.

Jazz guitarist Earl Klugh bought one for his home in Bloomfield Township and stocked it with 78 RPM recordings of Count Basie, Duke Ellington and other jazz greats.

"There's something intangible about the sound," he said. "It's certainly more fun than playing your stereo. As a musician, I appreciate that unique, bassy sound."

Perhaps the last great jukebox design was 1961's AMI Continental, a futuristic bubble-topped model with aquamarine accents. Hotel manager Bill Kirkhuff has one in his Art Deco-style basement in Birmingham. He's got it filled with everything from Patsy Kline's "Crazy" to the Pet Shop Boys' "Opportunities."

"I originally bought it as an investment, but it's grown into something more," he said.

Unlike earlier models, the '60s and '70s machines no longer allowed the player to see the record selections spinning.

'White Palace:' Hollywood cooks up a romantic tale

Can a polite, upward mobile, successful professional fellow find love and happiness with an older woman who sells hamburgers at "The White Palace" (A, R, 100 minutes)?

You betcha, friends, anything is possible in this mad world of ours, particularly when Hollywood tells the story.

Max Baron (James Spader) is a conventional young man whose wife, Jane, was killed in an auto crash two years ago. Aside from his work, he's reclusive and still mourns her despite the efforts of his mother and friends to fix him up with all the eligible young ladies in St. Louis.

A few missing hamburgers lead to a confrontation between Max and Nora Baker (Susan Sarandon), a waitress at The White Palace, the local hamburger joint which is much more like the White Tower than the Ritz to which Max is accustomed.

Despite the argument over greasy beef, Max and Nora quickly find themselves enjoying her bed in a one night stand that is both erotic and humorous as well as extremely satisfying for both of them. Quite unex-

pectedly, however, Max returns for more and more and more.

What began as a drunken quickie evolves into a serious relationship complicated by Max's upper-middle class Jewish background and Nora's wrong-side-of-the-tracks Christianity.

This may all sound rather trite, but superb performances by the entire cast, an appropriate musical track and disciplined direction of an excellent script equal a fine production which has a lot to say about obsession, social roles and the ways in which people torment themselves and one another.

WITH THE exception of the leads and Eileen Brennan as Nora's sister, Judy, a clairvoyant, the cast is largely unknown but far from unaccomplished. Their long lists of credits reflect considerable experience — and it shows in the strongly realistic appearances they make.

Often film characters, however interesting, appear unreal. Not so in "The White Palace" where all have a

'Woman' is a Soviet treat

A good man is hard to find. For Klavdia, the 43-year-old seamstress heroine of "Lonely Woman Seeks Life Companion," the statement couldn't be more true. Tired of clattering around her apartment, she posts signs throughout Moscow, advertising for love.

Her first respondent is no Prince Charming, but an alcoholic ex-circus performer named Valentin who shows up on her doorstep. Even though she bops him on the head and throws him out, he's persistent, and a relationship slowly develops.

Made in 1987 at the dawn of

glasnost, "Lonely Woman Seeks Life Companion" is a charming, intimate comedy that proves that shortages of love know no boundaries. It plays Friday at the Detroit Film Theatre.

Even after Klavdia and Valentin get closer, society frowns upon the relationship. Friends say she can "do better" and call Valentin "a social parasite."

She starts to have doubts also. "I don't know what to save anyone," she cries. "I need to be saved."

Then she considers the alternatives. A sort of Communist scout troop called the Young Pioneers decides to take the lonely woman under its wing. In one touching and fun-

ny moment, the squeaky clean Pioneers even serenade her.

At the core of the film is Irina Kupchenko's performance. She captured the best-actress prize at last year's Montreal Film Festival for her portrayal of a prim, well-dressed woman with a good job and a large apartment in overcrowded Moscow.

"Lonely Woman" predates and also compliments "Little Vera" (1989), the equally insightful look at a restless teenager in a small Soviet industrial town. Both characters could easily exist in Western cities.

"I sensed that people had a great curiosity about the daily lives of or-

"Murderers Among Us: The Simon Wiesenthal Story" (1989, color, 157 minutes), to be released Wednesday by HBO, is a docu-drama recounting Wiesenthal's (Ben Kingsley) search for justice following his May 1945 liberation from the Mauthausen concentration camp.

The film chronicles Wiesenthal's story from that time as he began working with the U.S. Army War Crimes Investigating Division, his

founding of his now-famous Documentation Center in Vienna and his devotion to tracking down Nazi war criminals and seeing that they are tried for the atrocities they had committed.

A valid film about the Holocaust must avoid trivializing characters by giving them a commercial, Hollywood-like appeal.

What this film does quite successfully is show us people in hell, and the devils that put them there for no good reason.

Distortion outlasts its punk beginnings

A chunk of his left ear is chewed off. A scar on his left hand reminds him of a self-inflicted knife wound. He's been in jail and through treatment for drug and alcohol abuse.

The punk lives, which is quite remarkable 10 years later. Many played the part of the anarchic, venom-spewing musician, but Mike Ness of Social Distortion lived it.

Ness' career was marked by a long list of bar brawls and run-ins with the law.

Then the punk met the Godfather of fate. Ness got clean, put Social Distortion on the road again and signed a record deal with Epic.

Amid the skeletons of the punk

movement, Social Distortion is cranking out the same amplified snarl that put the L.A.-based group with the ranks of the Sex Pistols, Clash and the Ramones.

Many have disappeared, some have mellowed and some have died like Sid Vicious. Yet, one of the

punk period's most virulent outfits continues — on a major label no less.

"Yeh, it's weird for a band of our caliber to be signed to a major label," said Ness in a telephone interview. "Out of the hundreds of bands that came out of Orange County, (Calif.)... I don't know what to attribute it to. All I ever wanted to do is be in a band. I don't question it. I'm just grateful."

NESS HAS said thanks — not by turning gratuitously sentimental — but by being the truculent frontman that brought Social Distortion out of the Los Angeles punk scene and into the forefront.

The band released "Prison Bound" (Restless/Enigma) in 1988, marking a comeback of sorts.

Until then, Ness' life remained a sordid tale of drugs, alcohol and bust-ups. His most notable bar bout took place outside of a Costa Mesa club when his left ear was bitten off. Ness' wild mood swings could partly be attributed to a heroin addiction, which he kicked nearly five years ago.

In the recovery process, Ness learned a true rebel didn't need to be high on smack or stumbling drunk to be an outlaw in the eyes of others. "Prison Bound," in part, chronicled those self-discoveries. But Ness wasn't happy with the outcome, deeming the 1988 release as "too mellow."

Playing it hot with the Chili Peppers

Before he talks, Chad Smith wants to know one thing: "Did my mother call you?"

Well, errr, she did. But any mom would want to brag about her son who's a drummer with one of those long-haired, funk-punk ensembles whose last record went gold, whose collective mugs are plaster on every music magazine and whose videos radiate on MTV.

The drummer of the Red Hot Chili Peppers breaks out in laughter. The past year, well, has been a rock'n'roll odyssey for the Bloomfield Hills native.

Smith, 28, a 1980 graduate of Bloomfield Hills Lahser High School, toiled as a drummer with several local bands, most notably with Detroit rock'n'roll war horses Toby Redd from 1984-88.

But like many a local rocker, Smith grew tired of the smoke, haze and general malaise associated with the bushes of the local beat. He scrambled.

Smith loaded up the truck and moved to Beverly Hills (actually Los Angeles) to attend the Musician Institute. He found hills, swimming pools and movie stars.

But, better yet, Smith heard about some well-known outfit looking for a

drummer. He tried out and "got the gig."

A month later, the Red Hot Chili Peppers were in the studio recording what would be their most successful album to date, "Mother's Milk." Then Smith and the group were whisked off on a year-long tour, including stops in Europe and Japan.

EVERYTHING HAPPENED fast. Smith could handle the pace.

"I've played in lots of bands and stuff and I paid my dues, to use a cliché," Smith said. "I wasn't like, 'Wow.' But, in a way, it was like that. I was ready for it."

The question, though, was more like were the Red Hot Chili Peppers ready for Smith? After all, his prior experience was with straight-ahead hard rock bands. The Chili Peppers — albeit quite loud — are a funky, punky outfit appealing to more of an alternative/college crowd.

Smith was venturing into uncharted territory. He heard of the band, but wasn't particularly a big fan of theirs.

"I just went in and jammed and rocked out," Smith said. "They just started laughing hysterically. They couldn't figure out if I was good or just wild."

DREAMLAND

— Black Box

Every so often, into the life of an album reviewer there comes an album that truly pleases the senses. "Dreamland" by the Italian band Black Box is such an album.

Soulful singer Katrin Quinol has a refreshing exuberance in her voice. The first two tracks are entitled "Everybody Everybody" and "I Don't Need Anybody Else," and they kick off this album with spice and zeal. They're classic dance tunes. If you go to a dance bar, you're bound to hear them, and if you've been to one recently, then you already know what I mean.

Katrin Quinol was once a French model. But her musical influences are taken from English and American pop culture.

Yet the band's first hit single, called "Ride on Time," off the "Dreamland" album, was not sung by Katrin at all, but by Loleatta Holloway, who first surfaced during the American disco craze of the late '70s.

"Because 'Ride on Time' took off so quickly, we didn't have time to re-



do it with my voice," Katrin said. The other band members are Mirko Limoni and Valerio Semplici, and oddly enough, their musical background is rooted in classical music. Though that would be hard to determine from the effusive style generated on the "Dreamland" album.

The last member of the band, Daniele Davoli, co-writes most of the music with Semplici.

There is enough variety and innovation crammed into the powerful tracks of this album for me to give it a 9.5, on a scale from 1 to 10.

They also display an ability to slow it down. "Fantasy," the only cover tune in the package, originally performed by Earth, Wind and Fire, is slowed down a bit, but still remains danceable. Also the title track, "Dreamland" is a soothing little mood piece.

This album is just plain good time music. I enjoyed it quite a bit, I think you will too.

HEAVEN OR LAS VEGAS

— Cocteau Twins

To the first-time listener, the Cocteau Twins provide a dazzling atmospheric array of gorgeous sound. The music is accessible, but are the Cocteau Twins?

Beyond the swirling, multi-colored cover art work, little information is available about the vaunted new music outfit. This is by design, of course.

The more obscure, the more mysterious, the more from which legends are made. And, deservedly so, the Cocteau Twins have gained exalted status for their music.

At what point, though, does being coy cross into being a snob? By purposely portraying yourself as an enigma stem from trying to hide the fact you're really quite ordinary?

Better yet, how much are Cocteau Twins really Cocteau Twins or the creation of 4AD mastermind Ivo Watts-Russell? These are not criticisms, mind you, just mere questions.

Musically, Liz and Robin are flawless. "Heaven or Las Vegas" (Capitol/4AD) is swirling, orchestral and



lovely with a brooding undertone that leaves Cocteau Twins whole-somely intriguing.

"Heaven or Las Vegas," the title track, shimmers with brilliance as Liz's ethereal vocals provide an equinox of tranquility. Like many of the numbers here, the sound is both surreal and uplifting.

"Fotzopolitic" reveals somewhat of an introspective side to the Cocteaus, at least the closest thing to it on this LP. The echoed nature of the music can lend itself to interpretation as far as lyrics are concerned. And, of course, the words are not provided with the package.

In the Cocteau's mind, ours is not to ask but rather to enjoy.

THE CRIMINAL SPECIAL

— Senator Flux

Like Congress locked over a budget, Washington, D.C.-based Senator Flux appears to be in a bit of quandary.

"The Criminal Special" (Emergo) possesses those elements that made '70s psychedelia great while maintaining its "new music" sensibilities and playing such nifty instruments as the oboe and saxophone. That's a remarkable feat in itself.

While Senator Flux filibusters, though, something comes across quite clearly — these boys' vocals can be damn right annoying. Granted, a golden voice is not a prerequisite for a career in rock'n'roll. Senator Flux's David Levine and Jeff Turner tend to sing in a nasal whine, which can grate after awhile.

That coupled with some rather overblown neo-political lyrics (after all, this is band from Washington, D.C.), provide some rather monumental hurdles for Senator Flux.

All that said, this band does have some endearing qualities. Mainly, those can be heard in the uneven, quirky beat they lay down. The sax



and oboe also provide a beatnik feel to some of the numbers whereas scorching guitar licks help prop up songs like "Fallerness."

This group's talents are better utilized in straight-ahead pop stylings. "Post Script" and "Grey Eyed Athena" are as indelible as one could ever wish to hear.

Unfortunately, Senator Flux' songwriting tandem of Levine and Turner would rather concentrate on being musical revisionists instead of being just a good band.

Too bad, something tells us they could be.

The band was still in shock over the death.

Red Hot Chili Peppers are anxious to put the past behind them. The band is busy writing songs for a soon-to-be recorded new album.

Rick Rubin (Slayer, Danzig) will produce the project. Also, the band has left EMI and is negotiating with several major labels.

"With 'Mother's Milk,' we were just getting to know one another," Smith said. "It's a whole different thing now. We're a band. We're writing songs together."

With the release of this next al-

bum, Smith will have come full-circle with the Chili Peppers and his music career. He's considered one of the top drummers on the circuit.

"I'M SUPER lucky," Smith said. "People just move out here and say, 'Here I am,' standing out in the street with their guitars. There's so many musicians and so many bands. It's really competitive."

compelling and endearing realism as if they were actual folks next door or down the block.

That quality taken with the strong performances by Sarandon and Spader result in a compelling portrait of two unlikely lovers for whom audiences will root. Bridging social and cultural gaps, to say nothing of a 17-year disparity in their ages, is no mean task but doing so speaks volumes about the power of love.

That's what "The White Palace" does so well.

Kirstie Alley is developing an unfortunate knack for appearing in slow-paced, humorless comedies with unbelievable characters and exaggerated plots. The strain of accepting the Turner family of doctors in "Sibling Rivalry" (C-, PG-13, 87 minutes) is almost as much as accepting the relatives that visited Kirstie in "Madhouse."

MARJORIE TURNER (Alley) is married to Dr. Harry Turner (Scott Bakula) the youngest of a medical clan composed of a father, Dr. Charles Turner Sr. (John Randolph), mother, Dr. Rose Turner (Frances Sternhagen) and sister, Dr. Iris Turner-Hunter (Carrie Fisher).

Iris has in tow a husband, Dr. Casey Hunter (Matthew Laurance). She's a particularly obnoxious and pretentious little snit. When the family isn't demeaning Harry (the youngest), they're busy treating Marjorie worse than hired help. But

it's OK, she's not a doctor. These stereotypes — characters and situations — are so overdrawn that they're simply ridiculous and not at all humorous.

The Turner family busily prepares for the return of the favorite son, Dr. Charles Jr. (Sam Elliott) who has been off somewhere in South America doing medical research. He's the oldest and favorite.

Meanwhile, Marjorie's younger sister, Jeanine (Jami Gertz) is a free-spirit who counsels Marjorie to have an affair and loosen up. One thing and another, she does and you'll never guess who she picks, albeit unknowingly.

The complications are unbelievable and include an incompetent blinds salesman, Nick Meany (Bill Pullman), whose older brother, Wilbur (Ed O'Neill) is in line to become the town's police chief. These two are embarrassingly slow and simple in everything they do.

WITH SOME sophistication in writing and directing, "Sibling Rivalry" might have been a clever comedy, but Carl Reiner (director) seems to have lost his touch. Apparently, he believes anything he thinks is funny will get laughs.

Not so, Carl, there are the small matters of pacing, timing, humor and understanding that simple-minded TV sitcom situations don't play well on the big screen. There needs to be some excitement and tension to get laughs.

The recent deluge of Quincy Jones material is now complete with his appearance on the big screen in "Listen Up: The Lives of Quincy Jones" (B+, PG-13, 110 minutes). This enlightening documentary is also very entertaining and leaves viewers basking in the warm glow of Jones' music and personality.

"Listen Up" is the familiar story of one man rising above unpromising origins and gaining fame. However, it's not the chronicle of Jones' life that makes this movie special. The manner in which his story is told makes the difference. Throughout the film, Quincy Jones travels around his old neighborhood in Chicago and those scenes form a direct relationship with the reflections and memories that he shares with the audience.

MANY OF Jones' family and friends, including Ray Charles, Miles Davis, Ella Fitzgerald and Ice-T, contribute to the image of Jones as a musician, composer, producer and writer.

The numerous cuts to performers singing and to old footage of brass bands playing provide an upbeat tempo. The quick cuts and frenzied camera movements add to the film's kinetic energy although at times the pace is too rapid for clarity.

Overall, "Listen Up: The Lives of Quincy Jones" is full of style and substance and proves the song true, Quincy Jones is "Back on the Block," both personally and nationally.

Like country, Ness spews out some vivid lines about dancing in life's darkest corners in his distinct nasal growl.

"DRUG TRAIN" is a bitter number about the realities of substance abuse. Sings Ness with the voice of experience, "The train passes through the graveyard/May the loved ones rest in peace/For the last stop baby is a violent crash/And hard times, they may never cease."

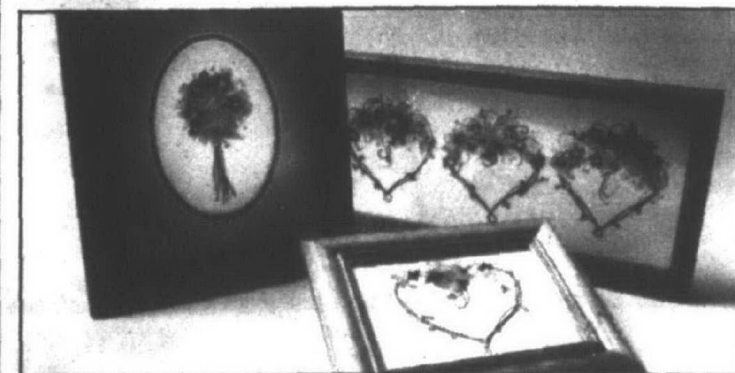
Against the cascade of Ness' crashing guitar work, the number has bite and echoes punk music's better days 10 years ago.

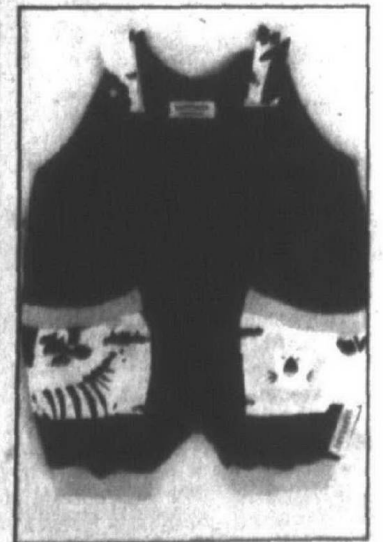


Summer memories

HER GOAL IS to star in a TV situation comedy and she's climbing up that ladder by way of the local comedy clubs.

"That's how it's done. Bill Cosby did it that way along with dozens of others," said Lisa Goich, while trying to laugh about the cold she has. "Some climbs are harder and take longer than others, but the (comedy) clubs are where the TV talent agents come to look."

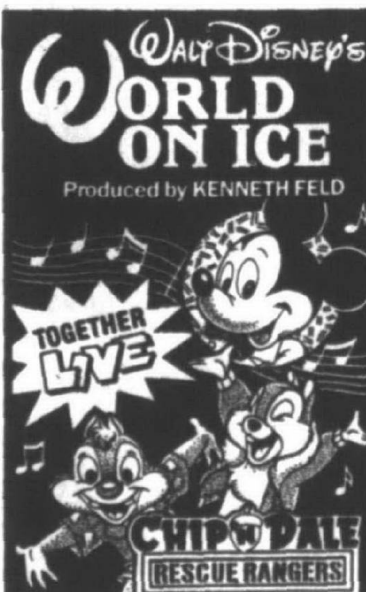

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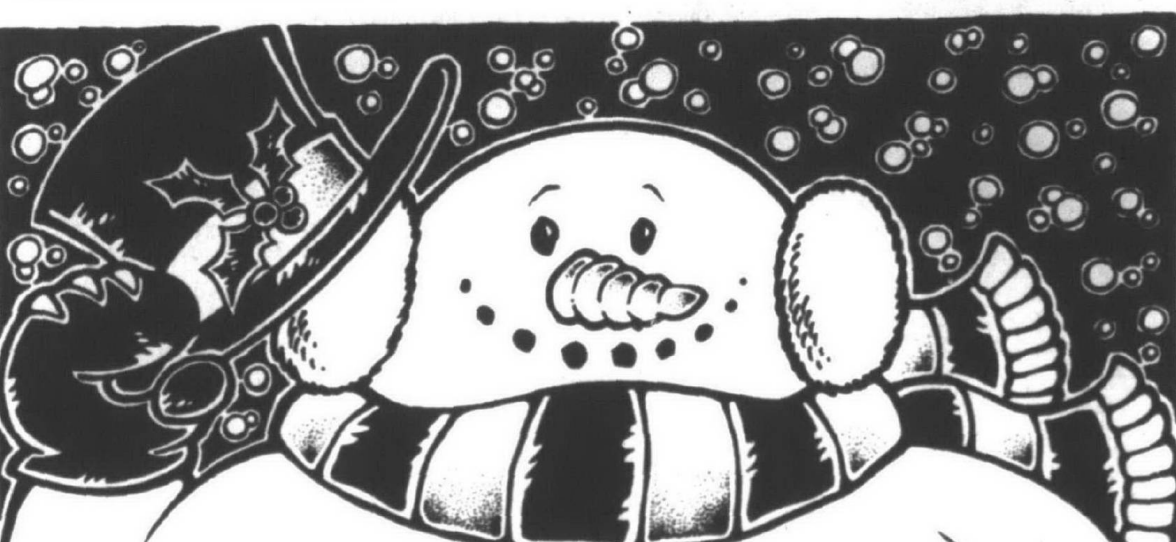

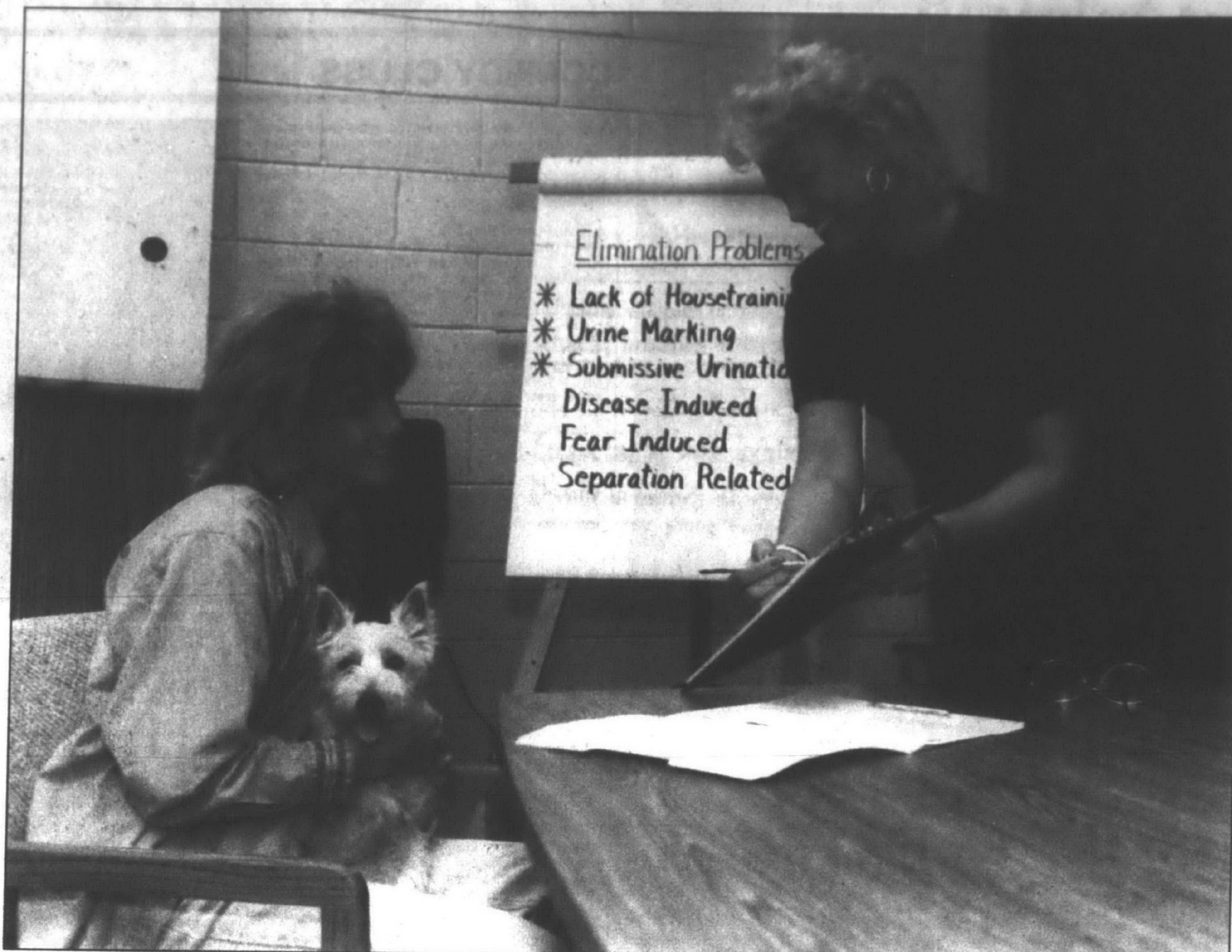

Putting problem pets in their places

"I have potty trained three kids," said Julie Graham of Royal Oak in a breath of frustration over her unsuccessful attempt to train her fourth.

Graham has three children ages 10, 8 and 4, but it is her 4-month-old white Highland terrier, Abby, that was the problem "child."

A dozen pet owners as well as

Graham sat around a table one Wednesday evening at the Trainers Academy for Obedience and Behavioral Sciences in Madison Heights to learn and discuss why their dogs just can't control the urge to urinate wherever they want.

Barbara Bocci, owner and instructor, knows exactly how it feels to be driven mad by such pet problems. She has raised many dogs, and her dedication to these animals developed her present career.

"We must learn how dogs think rather than expect them to understand how we think," said Bocci at the beginning of the bi-monthly house soiling-chewing clinic, one of several services offered by the school. "These puppies come into a foreign environment when they come into our home. It's up to us to be the teachers."

She breaks down the problem — "However, it is perceived, what is desirable to humans may not be desirable to dogs. And what is often undesirable to humans is often very desirable to dogs. To them it feels absolutely wonderful to urinate and defecate on your dining room floor."

EVERYONE, including Graham, is laughing as Bocci adds: "It is desirable to them because it is out of their way and out of your sight and probably because you are a crazy person for yelling at them."

Bocci, whose academy has eight other locations and graduates 2,500 dogs annually, instructs the anguished owners about the crate training method which usually solves the problem in most cases. It reinforces appropriate behavior while preventing the undesirable.

Graham was already familiar with crate training but was following the instructions of a pet store salesperson. It worked for their now deceased cocker spaniel but not for Abby because she was also soiling in the crate.

According to Bocci, crates are not useful correction tools if the pet was bought from a pet store (where Abby was bought) or kennel because the animals have lived in

in cages. If the pup's first weeks were initially in a cage, the crate becomes nothing more than a similar environment.

Following Bocci's suggestions, the next evening Graham attached a six-foot leash to her waist with Abby at the other end of it. Together they spend three hours every night, at half hour intervals, going outside to assure elimination occurs there and not in the home. Graham has been keeping a schedule in addition to this "umbilical cord" technique. There has been some success but the road is going to be long . . . and wet.

TRAINERS Academy not only offers clinics on house soiling, but also conducts home and show obedience classes, behavioral counseling, in-home training, instructor programs and most recently Pets in Pictures, a talent agency for "star" pooches.

Tom Maxey watched with amusement as his wife Alecia and their dog McDuff participate in an advance show class. McDuff, an 11-month-old Bichon Frise, was worrying the couple. He would generally ignore their commands even when it meant his life. McDuff passed beginner level classes and now was entering canine collegiate turf.

"McDuff is a very docile, nice dog, but we live in Franklin where there are no fences," said Maxey.

"He wasn't listening to us; he wouldn't come," his wife said. "There were situations where he would be in danger like going near the street. We wanted him to be more obedient for safety."

Maxey isn't worried about his macho image as he gives McDuff a complimentary big smooch.

"He's great now, big difference," he said. "That's why we went on to take an advance class. He was able to understand us and we were able to understand him."

TROY RESIDENT Phil Jannes was teaching McDuff and Alecia Maxey as well as 15 other dogs and masters that night. Jannes spent seven years learning the dog obedience trade after his dog chewed up the family couch. Along with two assistant trainers, Jannes demonstrated leash correction.

"Timing is crucial to all exercises you teach because when the dog makes a mistake, you have to be there to correct it," he said. "Once you correct, you have to praise the dog as soon as it is doing it right. If you miss it by half a second, it's too late."

Barbara Ellico, administrative manager at the Michigan Humane Society's control location, took advantage of a free training gift certificate she received from David Gustner, director of behavioral counseling at Trainers Academy.

Ellico was shelter manager at MHS-North when Gustner, who is also director of public relations, visited the organization to explain the center's programs.

WITH ALL HER years of experience as a humane society employee, Ellico admitted being at wits end with Ginger, a German Shepherd-Husky mix that MHS rescued from a playground in Pontiac. The wiggly female was 8 eight days old

when found under a slide. Ellico took her home and went through the exhausting hand-feeding route.

"We had her in a shoe box with a heating pad," she said. "She would cry just out of lack of companionship, so I got her a couple stuffed baby animals. I also began bringing her to work." Ginger spent its first four months in her office and then in MHS' kennels.

Ellico thought she knew everything about crate training. She certainly read plenty of brochures and books on the topic. And this wasn't the first dog she fostered. But regardless of all her knowledge and efforts, Ginger was a mess.

"She was unsocialized; she had very few manners and lacked so much confidence that when you walked up to her, she would roll on her back, put her feet up in the air and urinate," she said. "Sometimes all you had to do is come through the door and she would urinate everywhere."

Ginger's bad habits included urinating and defecating in her crate and chewing an area of Ellico's sofa and the leg off the kitchen table. Ellico was planning to put the foster pet up for adoption, she felt the dog definitely deserved the free offer.

Perhaps you are lucky. Your dog may be close to perfect and just needs some polishing to smooth out the "ruff" edges. Trainers Academy has the staff of 50-plus instructors.

But an important ingredient for Fido's success is the owner's commitment. If you are willing to work with your pet, the sky's the limit.

Jukebox: A brief history

With a swift smack, The Fonz could make the Seeburg Model C jukebox in Arnold's start to play in the television show "Happy Days." Tunes like "Blueberry Hill" and "One, Two Three O'Clock Rock" would fill the hamburger joint.

The crackling sounds of 45s playing on the jukebox have become a thing of the past. Today, jukeboxes filled with compact discs give the customer a choice up to 1,200 tunes rather than the 100 The Fonz had to select from.

But at one time, vinyls were the mainstay of smoke-filled roadhouses, sock hops and malt shops.

The first modern era jukebox was built in 1934, but the music ma-

chine's popularity didn't take off until 1950-60. In its heyday, 50,000 jukeboxes were manufactured annually and there were 500,000 in distribution.

The "granddaddy" of jukebox manufacturers is Wurlitzer, which dominated the jukebox industry through the 1940s. Wurlitzer manufactured classic jukeboxes, including its highly prized 1015.

But even though the 1015 was a classic, it had a few drawbacks. It played clumsy 78 rpm records and its selection was limited to 24.

In 1951, Seeburg introduced 45 rpm records. They were smaller than their cousins, the 78s, and cheaper to manufacture. They also spawned Seeburg's Model A jukebox, designed to play 100 selections.

The Seeburg Model A soon rendered the Wurlitzer jukebox obsolete and within a short time gave rise to the B and C models.

Jukeboxes were the mainstay of coin-operated businesses until video games came along. Between 1972 and 1982, the demand was for video games as opposed to jukeboxes.

Today, jukeboxes are becoming collector's items. It's estimated that there are 20,000 private collectors in the United States.

And for collectors, the cost depends on the jukebox being bought. When it was first made, the classic Wurlitzer 1015 cost between \$700-800. A few years ago, one in mint condition had a value of \$15,000 to \$20,000.

"The companies thought the public was too sophisticated to be enthralled by a piece of mechanism," Blain said. "Actually, it was just a cockamamie excuse for building cheaper machines."

NOW, WITH THE price of a vintage jukebox rivaling that of a new car (a clean Wurlitzer 1015 sells for about \$13,000), customers are looking to the newer, less expensive alternatives. A model from the '60s or '70s can be obtained (including delivery) for around \$500.

Christmas is an especially busy

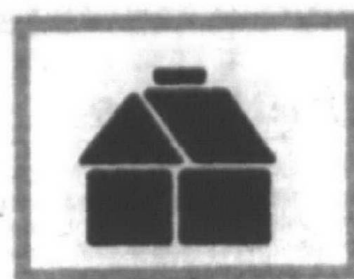
season for Blain. Last year he was making deliveries at 11 o'clock on Christmas Eve. He remembers one clever customer who hid a jukebox behind a paneled wall in his basement. When it came time to open gifts, he simply removed a bit of panelling and revealed his surprise.

The dimly lit back rooms of Blain's operation are overflowing with machines, some completely stripped for parts. Others wait for a finishing touch to make them operational again.

"They're like a fine cheese or a bottle of wine maturing with age," he said. "I'm just waiting for them to reach the point where they become collectible."

20 MOT director reminisces, looks ahead

MICHIGAN OPERA THEATRE is 20 years old and general director David DiChiera wanted to reminisce.

His eyes lighted up as he mentioned Gerald Scarfe's "Orpheus in the Underworld." He is proud of the sell-out Pavarotti concert at Joe Louis Arena. His favorite production in the last 20 years? David Alden's 1977 "Faust" or perhaps it was Rhoda Levine's "Magic Flute."

"This is going to be a year like 1976. There are so many artists on this roster on the threshold of major careers," said Dr. Di (as he is affectionately called) over tea in the breakfast room of his Bloomfield Hills home. He has a little less gray with a new short hair cut.

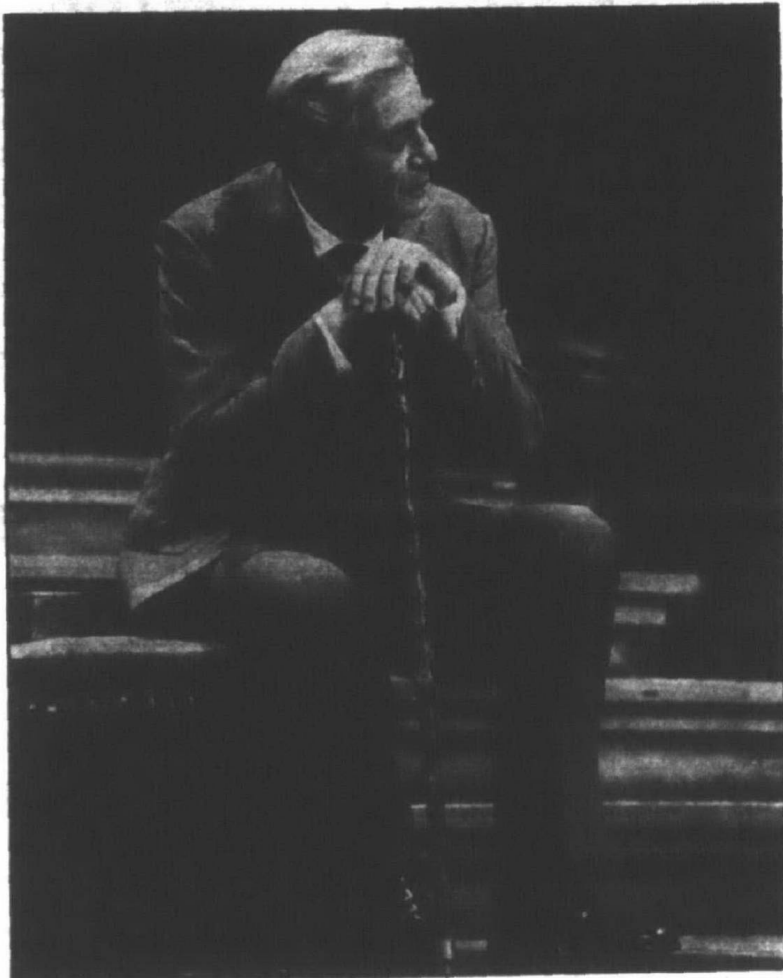
DiChiera earned his reputation for discovering talent in 1976 when Leona Mitchell, Marianna Christos, Catherine Malfitano, Neil Shicoff, Kathleen Battle and Rockwell Blake debuted in the same season.

"I have only heard one 'Butterfly' I enjoyed — that was Korean soprano Kyu Do Park who sang for us in 1978. I hope this one is of that quality."

DYNAMITE JAPANESE soprano Yoko Watanabe won a 15 minute standing ovation at the Kennedy Center recently and is singing "Madama Butterfly" in Michigan Opera Theatre's production at Masonic Temple this spring. Alessandra Marc proved sensational last summer in Santa Fe in "Ariadne auf Naxos" which she is singing for the opera theater this spring.

For the season opener "Rigoletto" Friday, Nov. 2, another new star Maureen O'Flynn will sing Gilda. DiChiera is convinced of Romanian emigre Florin Georgescu's talent and has him cast as the Duke.

"I think of all the artists I have worked with, I have enjoyed (Joan) Sutherland the most," said DiChiera who just returned with his daughter, Lisa, and 90-year old mother from a family reunion in Australia.

There he visited the legendary singer for her final stage appearance in "Les Huguenots." Last spring, he especially liked "Romeo et Juliette" and is bringing "Les Huguenots" to Detroit.

"French opera has been underrated," said DiChiera whose first language is Italian. "We have been overwhelmed by singing in the Italian style coming out of the Caruso era. We have lost appreciation for the stylistic singer, where there is real balance between words and mu-

sic, which French opera was always based on."

The Bonynges (Joan Sutherland and her husband Richard Bonyng) and the DiChieras became friends when she sang "Anna Bolena" upstaging the 1984 Metropolitan Opera Tour.

"I did it purposely," said DiChiera. "The Met tour had deteriorated very badly in terms of the artists, the quality. The week after the tour, while it was still fresh in people's minds, I brought what I thought was

an incredibly magnificent production to Masonic Temple."

MICHIGAN OPERA Theater actually began in the early '60s, when DiChiera joined the Oakland University music faculty after earning his doctorate in musicology from UCLA. His Overture to Opera series took one act operas to schools and communities. He convinced Barbara Williams (famous for her Toscanini recordings) to sing the mad scene from "Lucia Di Lammermoor" and daringly toured an anti-war Kurt Weill opera "Der Yassager" during the Vietnam War.

Against the backdrop of the Detroit riots, DiChiera and his wife, Karen, founded the opera theater. The company debuted Maria Ewing at the Detroit Institute of Arts in an English version of "Barber of Seville." A budgeted \$80,000 and 700 subscribers formed the bases for the company.

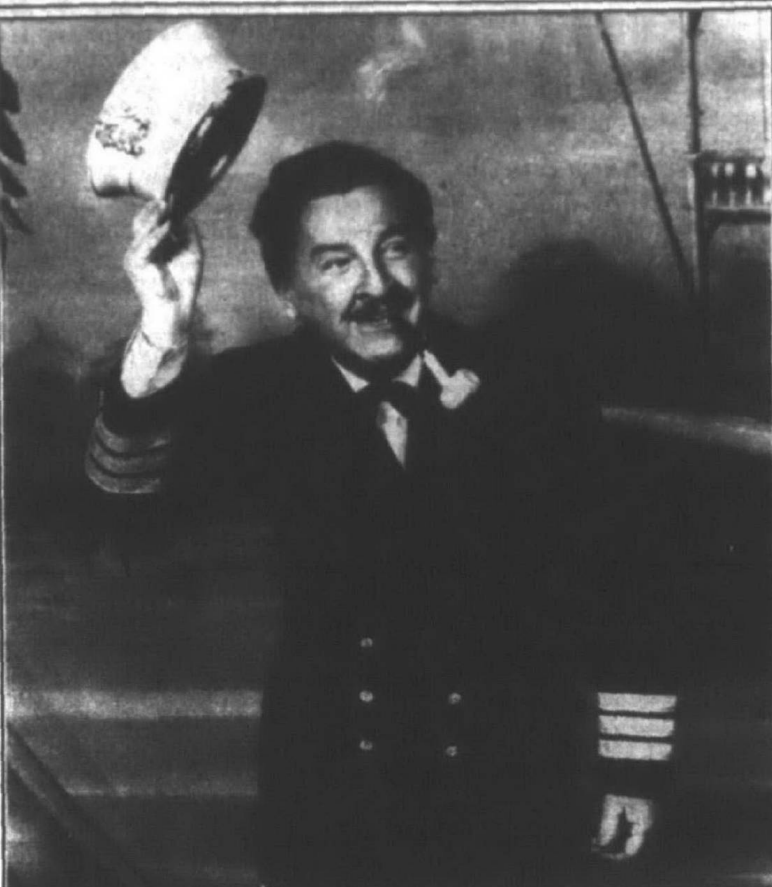
"The amazing part was that we had a second season," said DiChiera. "The DIA proved problematic for security reasons. We had the good fortune of getting Music Hall. Karen always tells the story about taking some volunteers to the second balcony to take up the rug. They found 30 years' accumulation of dirt."

There were few employees other than Bob Heuer (now general manager of the Miami Opera). Karen was a full-time volunteer.

"As I look around the country at the opera companies all I see is my former employees. I feel like the San Francisco Opera is the MOT outpost," he said referring to former Michigan Opera Theatre employees now working for the country's third-largest opera.

Sal Mineo's direction of Menotti's "The Medium" (1973) is one of DiChiera's most cherished memories.

"When he got here, the Mary Doerrs were out interviewing him," said DiChiera smiling. "I was still chairman of the music department at Oakland University. After one of those interviews Muriel Greenspon called complaining that Mineo said he was going to teach her how to act. The two tolerated each other, but the

effect on stage was so wonderful."

"Tosca" is the "Othello" of the opera stage, an opera often plagued by mishaps. This was true for the 1972 "Tosca."

"We were having dinner at the DAC when I got a phone call from the truck driver bringing the percussion instruments from Flint. The lights had gone out and he could not

continue down the expressway. Bill (Byrd) said we could re-orchestrate the percussion music into the trombone section. That's what we did an hour before curtain time. I remember thinking 'so this is how this business operates.' Little did I know."

THE CURSE OF TOSCA hit the 1987 production. Three sopranos and two tenors were hired before final casting. Opening night, Charles Long took ill. DiChiera told the audience in his front-of-the-house comments to enjoy "Tosca" because it would be a long time before he mounts it again.

"I decided to share the drama. I had a sick baritone on the stage, a baritone on a plane, and a baritone on the way to the theater. People have told me that performance was one of our most exciting."

Of the many American operas the opera theater has championed, Blitzstein's "Regina" (1977) is a favorite.

"It is a bittersweet memory. I had put so much work into making it special. The cast was for my thoughts perfect except for one person — Joan Diener ('Lolome in "Kismet"), the title role. I chased her all over Europe to sign her with us. I heard she was a nightmare, but I hired her anyway. She caused so much agitation I had to let the stage director go, whom I greatly respect. It was such an unhappy experience."

Michigan Opera Theatre will continue the celebration of its 20th birthday and the upcoming production of "Showboat" with a party, "Natchez in November," 7-10 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 8, aboard the Star of Detroit.

"Showboat" opens Nov. 16 at the Fisher Theatre and members of the cast, including Eddie Bracken and Ron Raines, will be on hand to greet guests. The Star of Detroit will remain docked throughout the evening.

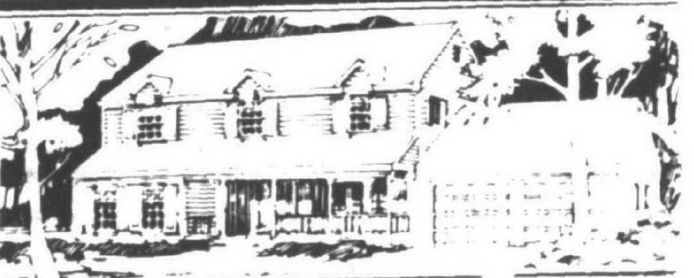

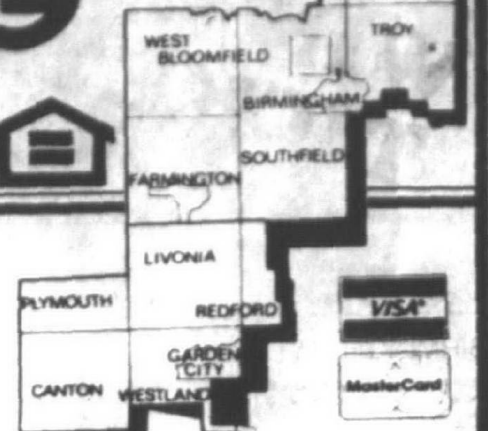

Boom or bust: Builders rely on marketing to sell houses

Homes are still selling — albeit at a modest rate — but builders are working harder at it than during the building boom of only a couple years ago.

Today's market requires new strategies.

Scott Jacobson, president of S R Jacobson Development Corp. in Birmingham, said home sales today start before the first two-by-four stud is nailed in place.

Builders rely on marketing research firms to provide information on what customers are looking for, demographic studies to indicate where the people are or where they're going. And even in today's high-tech information age, they rely on years of experience and the intuition that comes with it, Jacobson said.

The key to selling in any market — depressed or booming — is to find some way to create excitement for the product, he said. "Find something or do something — below-market interest rates, no mortgage payments for three to four months, anything — to get people to look at your product."

AND THE PRODUCT is always a good place to start, according to David Botsford, the sales and marketing director for the West Bloomfield-based Classic Construction.

"Do we need another apartment building in this area? Do we need another luxury development? Do we need another luxury condominium development?" he asked. Answering a few simple questions leads the builder to what type of product will sell.

In the past, builders let the economy dictate when they could sell, he said. "Builders go into business during good times and go out of business during bad times. Builders think, 'I'm a builder, not a marketer.' Well, I'm saying you have to be a mar-

keter if you're going to succeed," Botsford said.

Positioning, Ronald Stone, chairman of the advertising and public relations firm Stone, August and Baker in Troy, said is one of the most critical aspects when selling a home, regardless of whether its a boom or bust economy.

"If you can build up your credibility, you will get people to come out to your product," Stone said.

POSITIONING, quite simply, means placing a product in the public's mind and giving that product a good perception, he said.

Stone said positioning requires two things: knowing a product and targeting an audience desirous of that product. "Look at it this way, you're obviously not going to sell a \$60,000 car to a guy who makes \$20,000 a year."

"Once you identify your target, it's relatively easy to reach them," he said.

The tools are many. Demographic studies, focus groups, post-purchase interviews, and even direct mail to areas with people in the target income bracket, Stone said.

Radio advertising, for example, gives a product frequency and reminds people the product is out there, Stone said. Radio, also allows an advertiser to focus more and direct advertising to a very select audience.

NEWSPAPERS, on the other hand, offer more permanence and immediacy, he said. Newspapers can offer maps to the development, provide a permanent record of the product and help people draw comparisons.

Television, Stone said, is rarely used in advertising home sales because of costs and difficulty in targeting an audience, but it has a similar effect to that of radio — frequency creates familiarity.

Product advertising, Botsford of

Classic Construction said, has a place, but is not the only way to sell homes. "If I want to get someone to look at my product, I have to sell a lifestyle."

Advertising that stresses features, prices and location are frequently used, but may not be effective, he said. "Ads with floor plans and square footage — that's really builder language being sent out to non-builders."

Showing what living in a community means — golf, swimming, nature trails and location relevant to shopping, business and recreational amenities get people to take a look at a development, Botsford said. "They double my traffic flow."

ADVERTISING MAY get people out to the homes, but getting people to the door is only half the battle, John Sheehan, sales and marketing director for the Brody Group in Bloomfield Hills, said.

Sales people have come a long way in the last decade and what they've learned is being put into practice now, he said. With fewer buyers and more builders in the market, competition has changed the market over the years.

In the past, home salespeople had a price and stuck to it, Sheehan said. "Now builders are willing to take an offer on their product."

These changes have changed the sellers job from that of basically taking orders to actually having to sell, he said. "(Home) salespeople have to sell themselves, their product and their price."

To be successful, salespeople must transmit honesty and integrity, Sheehan said. "You can't come across like you're going to take their tennis shoes."

THE ABILITY TO listen to the customer and get to know him/her is probably the most important quality a salesperson can ask, Sheehan said. "You don't talk about yourself or

your product until you do that."

When the time comes for salesperson to begin talk, he or she should be well-versed in the product and able to demonstrate a home's features, he said.

In the past, it wouldn't have been uncommon for a sales person to sit at a desk as the potential home buyer wandered aimlessly about the home, Sheehan said.

Jacobson agreed. "You just can't sit in a chair and wait for a house to sell itself."

In addition to having enough salespeople on hand, homes and developments are designed to guide people through and give ample opportunities for interaction between salespeople and customer, he said. But it takes more than skilled salespeople to sell a home, Jacobson added.

THE MODEL home is still an essential selling tool, he said. "It's part of the overall presentation — people want to walk into a house that looks like someone is living there."

"My merchandise costs have gone up dramatically," he said. But it's worth it, he added, because today builders strive to not only show their homes off, but to show the homes possibilities, he said.

"People can't visualize as well as a professional decorator can," he said. "Decorating can make or break a sale."

Botsford of Classic Construction said in addition to sales people and dressing up a home, the home sellers have to be more customer friendly. "We're open every day from noon to 6 p.m. or we can set up private appointments," he said. "A lot of builders are open different hours each day, are closed some days — that not only makes it difficult for the customers to buy, but it can also be confusing."

The more inconvenient a home is to buy, the less likely people will buy it, he said, adding it's easier to go to a builder who is convenient.

Taxing situation

Maybe you can help me clear up some tax questions I have regarding our home. My wife and I sold our home about 11 months ago and bought a more expensive home, in part, to avoid having to pay a tax on the profit of our home. We have now found that we may want to buy a larger house. We are concerned that if we sell our new house now we will have to pay a tax on the deferred profit because we have owned our new house less than 24 months.

When you sold your first home, you correctly deferred the profit tax by purchasing a replacement principal residence of equal or greater cost within 24 months before or after the sale as is permitted under the Internal Revenue Code, Section 1034. But the code provides that you can only use this once every 24 months with one exception. There is a tax deferral on a sale in less than 24 months if the sale is because of a job location change that qualifies for moving expense tax deduction. That means that your new job must be more than 35 miles further away from your old home than was the old job.

Finally, to avoid having to pay the tax, you are advised to wait to sell your current home until you have owned it at least 24 months. If you cannot do so, you may lease your current home to a tenant, perhaps with an option to buy, until after your 24 months expires or you may buy or lease a larger home so you can move now.

I am advised that several tax court decisions indicate that a temporary rental of your old home, while it is available for sale, will not convert it into a rental property and you will not lose a tax deferral of Section 1034 of the tax code, the "roll-over resident rule." You are advised to contact your tax adviser concerning these transactions.

We are interviewing management companies. Four of the five bids we received were within \$1.50 per unit of the other. The fifth management company is \$3.75 cheaper per unit based on specifications for the management contract that our lawyer prepared. The board, to no one's surprise, is gravitating toward the cheapest one. I am wary because I believe you get what you pay for. How do I convince the other board members of this?

There is always the school of hard knocks that will serve to teach directors that your belief is correct. Unfortunately, too many hard knocks can ruin a condominium association. Moreover, because of the frequent

turnover of directors of the association, what one board learns is not always transferred to the succeeding board. Simply put, some management companies, like some lawyers and CPAs in the field, intentionally bid in at prices well below the market to get the account.

Then either the management agent does not deliver the services promised (because it realistically cannot afford to do so because of its low rate) or it raises the fee after it has gotten in the door of the condominium. The management company may even have many accounts (about which it boasts) that it has obtained because it appeals to the frugality of many community association boards. But can it and will it be able to deliver the services? Probably not in the long run. He who charges less knows best what his services are worth.

We have an opportunity to buy a timeshare that gives us the chance to travel to Maui in Hawaii. We have heard it is a beautiful area, but I'm wondering about the liability of having a condo there. What do you think?

A timeshare in Maui, a beautiful but expensive island, as in any other place, should be reviewed carefully by you before purchase.

Check to see whether you will be able to trade the use of your timeshare for other locales in the world.

The state of Hawaii has a condominium statute regarding condos, and there are lawyers who specialize in condominiums throughout the islands.

There is a substantial condominium boom in Honolulu with the attendant condominium association problems, including multi-million dollar construction defect litigation.

Pollution solution: Take it personally

Don't be part of the problem of pollution, global warming and the greenhouse effect: be part of the solution.

You can appraise your habits and how they affect the environment, according to an article in Country Living, and follow the conservation motto to reduce, recycle and reuse.

You can make a difference by making changes in your home, on vacation, at work, in the yard, when shopping and in your free time. Among the things you can do at home:

Recycle everything you can — newspapers, cans, glass, aluminum foil and pans, motor oil, scrap metals, used automobile tires — and investigate local recycling centers that take items your garbage hauler does not.

Use phosphate-free laundry detergent and dish soap, avoid pesticides when you can use a flyswatter and clean windows with vinegar, water and yesterday's newspaper. Use cold water in the washer until it is essential to use hot.

Opt for cotton dish towels and napkins instead of disposables and give cotton diapers a try.

Dispose of hazardous substances such as paint thinner and furniture polish on designated hazardous-waste-collection days instead of putting them down the drain.

STORE FOOD in reusable containers and return extra coat hangers to the dry cleaners.

Get an energy audit from your utility company, have your water heater insulated and set at 130 degrees. Lower your house tempera-

ture by one degree per hour for every hour you are away or asleep.

When on vacation, turn down the heat and turn off the water heater before you go. Make sure plastic trash doesn't end up in the ocean and cut the rings of all six-pack yokes. Leave animals and plants where you find them. Don't buy souvenirs made from wild animals. Stay on trails and don't litter.

At your business, start an office recycling program. Use scrap paper for jotting notes. Reuse manila envelopes and folders. Use ceramic coffee mugs instead of throwaway cups.

In your yard, cultivate plants that provide food and shelter for birds and other wildlife. Put up bird feeders and birdhouses.

Pull weeds instead of using potentially toxic herbicides. Learn about

natural insect controls as alternatives to pesticides. Use natural fertilizers such as organic manures.

If you must use pesticides, herbicides or fungicides, don't throw leftovers in the trash, down the drain or into a storm sewer. Dispose of them on hazardous-waste-collection day.

ADD LEAVES and yard debris to your compost heap or take them to a yard debris recycler. Burning refuse creates air pollution.

Plant short, dense shrubs close to your home's foundation to help insulate against cold.

When shopping, avoid one-time-use goods such as paper and plastic plates and cups. Don't buy items with excess packaging such as individually wrapped cheese slices.

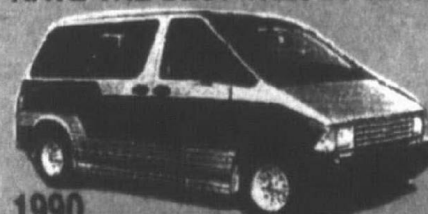



'thirtysomething' troupe used to yuppie criticisms

Show polarizes audiences

"Not again," said the stars of ABC's "thirtysomething," when producers Marshall Herskovitz and Ed Zwick asked them to appear at their last TV critics press conference.

Once again the troupe would have to face criticism that the show is "yuppie-ish;" that the characters are agonizingly self-concerned, or just plain "whiny."

"You behave like you're the first generation who ever had a baby, or ever had to do a number of other things. In Shakespeare's phrase: 'Why all this muling and puking,' you know?" blasted one critic. Another suggested that perhaps the show was "much ado about nothing."

This was no revelation to "thirtysomething's" stars, Patricia Wettig, Timothy Busfield, Mel Harris, Ken Olin, Peter Horton, Polly Draper and Melanie Mayron. "We hear this all the time," said Horton. "Over and over. We hear it over and over. It's not a surprise at all," reiterated Wettig. Mayron joked that perhaps they could have a show of hands from the critics, and the ones who didn't like the show could beat it.

It probably would have been a split vote. People either seem to like

"thirtysomething" or they don't. The show targets female viewers ages 18-49 — and does a good job of it. Ad time for the hour-long program is consistently sold out. Additionally, "thirtysomething" was the first freshman drama ever to win an Emmy for Best Drama. During its four-year run, the drama has received a fair share of the industry's honors.

The big winner among the cast is Patricia Wettig who's captured two Best Actress Emmys. Her husband on the show, Timothy Busfield, has been nominated twice for Best Actor. Busfield had this to say in defense of the show:

"I thought, 'Gee, you know. I guess I should be maybe addressing more world rights or world peace or whatever it is.' And then I thought for a second, 'I think about myself most of the time ... you know, does my wife love me, does my son, who lives half-way across the country, does he feel close to me? Am I doing a good job at work?'" Wettig has suggested that the in-depth writing makes "thirtysomething" what it is.

But some people don't care for in-depth self-examination. It's as if on the one hand you have the Lennon

fans — on the other, the McCartney crowd.

"It was never our intention to make a show that 200 million would embrace and take to their hearts," said Herskovitz candidly. I don't think that's necessary in order to do a television show."

The "thirtysomething" cast doesn't seem to think so either. The close-knit group seems to be having a lot of fun with the show, anyway. And "close-knit" is no understatement. In real-life Ken Olin is married to Patricia Wettig. (Mel Harris plays his wife.) Coincidentally, both Harris and Wettig are Pennsylvania natives. Wettig and Busfield both were one-time members of the prestigious Circle Repertory Company in New York. Additionally, Horton, Olin and Mayron each have begun directing "thirtysomething" episodes.

"We're trying to do a good show, and if people don't want to watch it, we would think that by now they'd be aware that there's two other networks, and they're both programming 24 hours a day," said Olin. Story lines for the drama's 1990-91 season include Gary's wedding, the birth of Hope and Michael's baby, and the continuation of Nancy's bout with cancer.

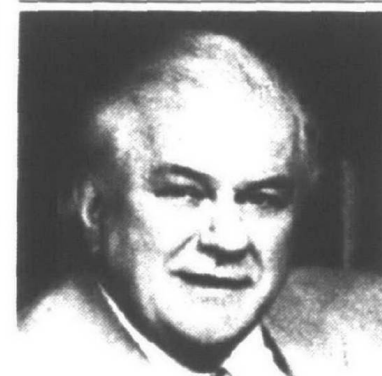

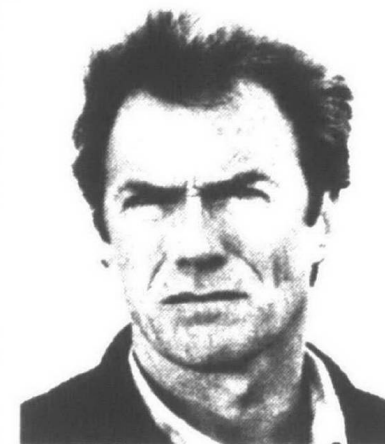

Clint Eastwood not planning anymore 'Dirty Harry' films

The bad guys couldn't kill off Dirty Harry, so now Clint Eastwood is doing the job. Eastwood doesn't plan any more sequels to his popular *Dirty Harry* movies. "I don't know where you would take him," said Eastwood at a recent press conference. "You'd have to have an awfully good script to take you away from self-imitation."

The one-hour dramatic series formerly titled *Paradise*, starring Lee Horsley and Sigrid Thornton, has been retitled to *Guns of Paradise*. The series, filmed on location in Los Angeles, has begun production for its third season. 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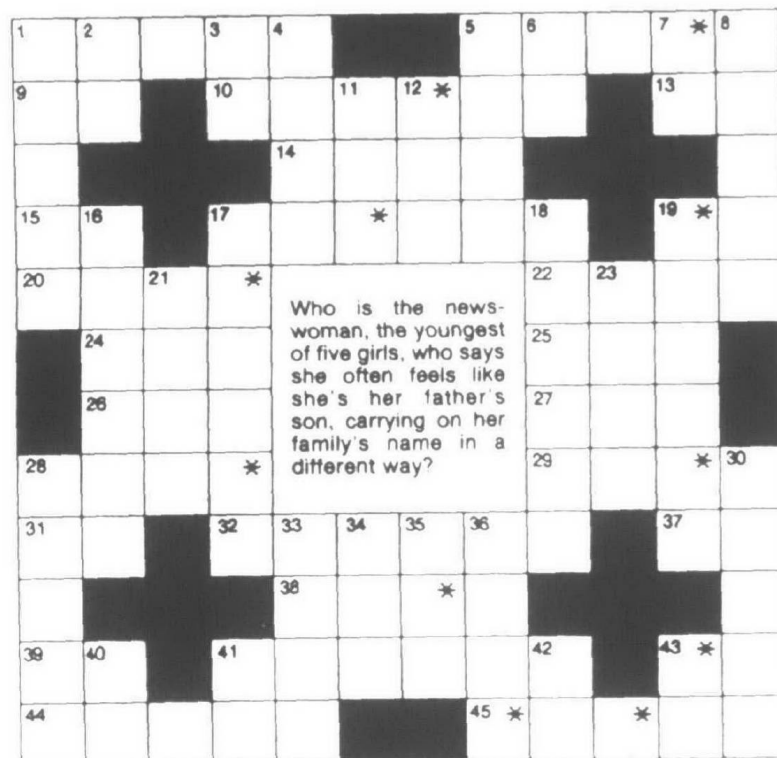
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CROSSWORD PUZZLE

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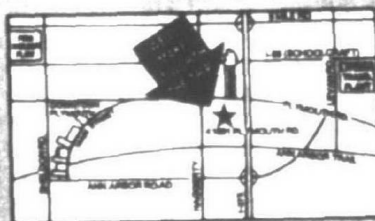
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
