Home school preferred by board hopeful

Plymouth-Canton school board candidate Bobbie Cleary says she decided not to send her daughter, who recently turned 6, to Plymouth-Canton schools after researching the educational programs in place in the

Cleary's daughter Christine, who's been taught at home, can "understand multiplication, knows how to add and carry," and reads at a fourth grade level.

"I can't put her in a Plymouth-Canton school in a developmental class; she'll just goof around," said Cleary, a chemical engineer and a graduate of the University of Nevada, Reno. "Teachers won't be worried about it because she's so far ahead; at least that's my feeling."

THE DEVELOPMENTAL program emphasizes unstructured, learn-at-your-own-pace education and is in place in elementary grades throughout the district.

"I noticed Dr. Hoben has his formula for student-teacher ratios. In elementary schools it's 23-to-1; in middle schools 22-1; and in high schools 21-1," said Cleary.

"That is way too high for a developmental program, and it will not work. The thing behind developmental education is individualized education. It's a more expensive way to go, and I don't see how they're going

to do it right if they're cutting the budget."

Cleary says she knows of parents who think developmental education is wonderful, "but what they're talking about is all theoretical. They've been taught that it's wonderful. But they haven't used it or seen the re-

sults," she said. Plymouth-Canton's "whole language approach" to reading also concerns Cleary. "The whole language approach is based on memorizing words, not sounding them out," she said.

Hoben testifies before Congress

☐ Excerpts from Superintendent John Hoben's testimony, 3A

Had you visited Capitol Hill Thursday, you would have seen not only the Queen of England addressing Congress, but Plymouth-Canton Supt. John Hoben as well.

Testifying before the House Labor, Health and Human Services, Education subcommittee, Hoben spoke of the need to introduce high technology into the classroom, and explained why Plymouth-Canton would make an excellent national demonstration site. He requested \$20 million to \$24 million of the subcommittee's \$57 billion in discretionary funding to convert Plymouth-Canton's K-12 facilities to "classrooms of the future."

"An era of unsurpassed hands-on education is within our grasp if we will but reach for it," said Hoben, explaining how teleconferencing, com-

puters, satellites, fiber optics, video and other innovations can give teachers and students instantaneous access to information all over the

Hoben addressed U.S. Rep. Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth - now the ranking minority member of the Labor, Health and Human Services, Education subcommittee - as well as Appropriations Committee members from Kentucky, Ohio and Minnesota. Hoben also met with chief assistants from the U.S. Secretary of Education's office to review his proposal and federal grant programs.

"There's no way to judge how it went," said Hoben by phone from Washington. "I think we got our message through to them. Hopefully, that will be helpful in some way. Congressman Pursell did an outstanding job of helping us get the door open.

"The members were very courteous and receptive. They have a massive job listening to many people from all over the country," added Hoben, who was preceded in the hearing by former First Lady Rosa-

lyn Carter. Carter testified on the need for funding for mental health research.

Pursell's subcommittee will allocate \$26 billion to the Department of Education. Whether and when the department might fund Plymouth-Canton's request is difficult to predict. Frequently, grants go to districts with large numbers of disadvantaged students, Pursell said.

A plus for Plymouth-Canton is the fact that the high-technology educational package outlined by Hoben is the most comprehensive ever pre-sented to Congress, said Pursell. "I'd say Plymouth-Canton can probably get some demonstration funding. We're certainly going to work toward that goal.

The decision will be based on "the merits of the programs proposed.

Prison won't be airing 'freak show'

There'll be no "freak show" in Plymouth Township, say state corrections officials.

Officials reject a guard's comment that women prisoners being moved to Scott Correctional Facility at Beck and Five Mile roads will draw spectators, because "They like to flash the cars going by."

The guard, who declined to be named, said this would pose a problem because a large prison exercise yard is just yards away from Five Mile Road - Plymouth Township's northern border.

And once the word got out that

hundreds of females were flashing passing cars, motorists would flock to the site, he said. But prison officials suggest that

view is not worth airing. "We don't anticipate that being a problem, said Lance Shuhmacher.

administrative assistant to the warden at Scott. GEORGE CALVERT, assistant

deputy warden at the Huron Valley women's prison in Ypsilanti, said the guard's comment was "off the wall."

"I don't expect there to be a prob-lem with them exposing them-selves," Calvert said. "They are the same as they are on the street."

To meet a federal judge's order, state officials are considering turning the Huron Valley women's prison into a psychiatric facility, and some female inmates were transferred to Scott beginning Thursday.


Shuhmacher said 336 female prisoners would soon be housed at Scott. Gov. John Engler is seeking legislation to allow double bunking and a maximum 982 prisoners at the former men's prison.

Meanwhile, Phoenix Prison, just west of Scott and closed earlier this year, will be offered for sale, said Georgina Goss, Northville Township

Should the Huron Valley women's prison be closed, Scott would be just one of two women's prisons in Michigan. The other is the Crane Correctional Facility in Coldwater.

"It took them years to figure out their kids really didn't know how to read," she said. "Some do fine, but I know friends who've wondered why their kids are staring at words. They learned it at school."

The Charter Township of Plymouth ordains:

SECTION I — Adoption of Codes

Pursuant to the Michigan State Construction Code Act of 1972, as amended, being Section 125.1501 et seq of the Michigan Compiled Laws, the following Code is adopted by reference and all of their provisions are incorporated in this

"The BOCA Electrical Code, of 1990, and the technical amendments to the 1990 Edition of the BOCA Electrical Code", as promulgated and published by the Building Officials and Code Administrators International, Inc.

Section II — Title of the Ordinance
This Ordinance shall be known as the Electrical Code Enforcement Ordinance of the Charter Township of Plymouth.

District praises departing staffers

September will bring a brain drain to the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools, as three staffers begin retirement and a fourth accepts a new position.

Shirley Spaniel, executive director of elementary education, is retiring after a career in education that spans 32 years.

Beverly Marshall, principal of Bird Elementary, is retiring after 23 years, and Dallas Goss, a science teacher at Plymouth Canton High School, is stepping down after 32 years.

William Pearson, principal at Hoben Elementary, is leaving to become assistant superintendent for curriculum and instruction in the South Lyon school district.

SUPERINTENDENT John Hoben and board of education members lamented the losses at Monday's board meeting. "This is going to be quite a drain on talent for us," said Hoben. "All have outstanding talent and will be sorely

Hoben said Spaniel's retirement will be especially tough on the dis-

'She is well thought of in terms of state associations, particularly the Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development, and has held numerous offices in that organization.

"She's made a significant contribution in her tenure in the district, as director of language arts, reading and writing, principal of Miller School, and in her current position. The contributions Mrs. Spaniel has made are invaluable and she will be greatly missed. We wish her well in her retirement.'

SPANIEL SAID the decision to retire was "a hard one to make. I kind of vacillated." Spaniel said she plans to visit family, travel and possibly do some consulting.

Marshall was Isbister Elementary's first principal, and also worked as Tanger Elmentary School principal. She spent several years on special assignment directing the district's instructional supervision program.

"Dr. Marshall has done an outstanding job in the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools, and also has been actively involved in ASCD and other statewide organizations," Hoben said. "Her contribution to the district has been outstanding, and she will also be greatly

Marshall said she is "very, very sad to leave the district. I have very mixed emotions." Marshall plans to travel abroad for the first time, spend time with friends and on the golf course, "and eventually get involved in volunteer work and probably consulting."

TRUSTEE Carl Battishill, who taught in the Plymouth-Canton schools, said he worked with Goss and found his "enthusiasm for science was contagious; it was very much recognized around the building. Stressing a need

Hoben pushes for technology in classrooms

Here are excerpts from Superintendent John Hoben's testimony, presented Thursday to the U.S. House of Representatives Commiton Labor, Health and Human Services. Education:

"Plymouth-Canton, the ninth-largest school district in Michigan, has been on the cutting edge of innovation for years. We have the only school district to have a secondary educational park with two high schools housing nearly 5,000 students on the same site. This was planned to keep from de facto segregations and to share expensive facilities with the consequent saving from economies of scale.

'We are an outcome-based school system. We believe and demonstrate that all students can learn and succeed." One Plymouth-Canton program provides a "contract between student and teacher which proposes that each student will master at least 75 percent of the course content, or will keep working until that minimum or better is achieved. This provides sutdents with a second or third chance to achieve mastery of the subject matter. The results have been phenomenal. Not only have most students achieved well above what they thought possible, they have also developed enhanced self-esteem as a result of their success."

Plymouth-Canton Community Schools "warrant our diploma, guaranteeing that our graduates will have skills in reading, writing, lan-guage arts, computational skills and computer literacy. If an employer finds these skills lacking, we will provide additional training for the student at our expense.

"WE ARE LIVING in a time when mankind's body of knowledge is said to be doubling every 30 months. We have now passed the point when a teacher knows everything there is to know about a given subject. We have arrived at the point where teachers must be coaches, but no longer the fountain of all information which stands in front of a class and pours forth that information on the assembled students."

In addition to a strong basic education, "we need to provide our students with the tools to access and use information by making certain they have reference skills, critical thinking skills and problem solving abili-

"Large parts of this education can best be accomplished through the

use of integrated technology. Moving form the agrarian age to the information age in education is an innovation of monumental proportions. To do this, I believe there are five imperatives we need to consider.'

· Vision: "Without vision, education will neither flourish nor perform at an acceptable level. My personal vision is to have the current body of world knowledge electronically and instantaneously available to students everywhere in our nation. This means not only students in Plymouth-Canton, but also students in Paducah, Ky. and Presque Isle,

"The vision for technology must integrate educational goals, human resources and technology." Technology can work to solve such problems as teacher shortages in specific subjects, customized instruction, improved curriculum quality and increased productivity for both teacher and student.

• Technology recognition: "We need to recognize that there is now technology on the shelf which is capable of providing the services toward which our vision points.

'We have technology to, in essence, move the media center directly to the classroom. This technology will permit the teacher at the point of instruction to coordinate and control material from a videocassette recorder, floppy discs, films, slides, filmstrips, teleconferencing and technologies yet to be developed.

"Terminals in every classroom can give instructors control of a wealth of video, audio and data resources available at the touch of buttons. This can be done with the ease of operating a standard remote control key pad device. Schools and their students can interact with each other, with universities, state government departments, and business and industry. There are also a number of networks already in place and presently delivering programs and materials

Examples of such networks include the GMI Network which is available by satellite, the TI-IN Network which uses scrambled satellite signals for subscribers, and a regional network in Michigan called Community Television Network, which use microwaves as its transportation vehicle. Michigan's M-Star Network is another example of a source which currently provides program-ming to schools throughout the state.

While these networks are nor-

mally in one direction, with the addition of a phone or video feedback link they can become bi-directional and thereby provide total interactive

"Such distance learning may be one of the most valuable resources which integrated technology can provide.

"Current technology, in the form of fiber optics, permits us to overcome some of the bandwidth limitations of wire and to send far larger quantities of material over a cable the same size as a wire cable used in the past."

• Teacher education: "When a teacher closes the door of a classroom, the teacher determines the level of technology use. In addition to simplifying the technology as much as possible, teacher training must accompany the introduction of integrated technology in order for the technology to have maximum utilization."

• Demonstration. "Given the state of finance in school districts throughout the nation, few districts can fund the integrated technology proposed. Local districts willing to invest in the future should be aided by grants to enable them to establish such demonstration centers.

"Projected costs to produce a fully integrated technology system run from \$6,000 to \$8,000 per classroom. In Plymouth-Canton, a citizens' study committee has proposed a bond issue with \$12 million specifically set aside for integrated technology. It's estimated that this would provide about one-half the funding it would take to make a totally functional system for the entire district."

• Replication. "Ultimately, students everywhere should have the opportunity to use this technology. The electronic pathway to acquiring knowledge is proven every day as we use computers, listen to the radio and watch television.

"Once in place, such technology has the flexibility to be operational regardless of changes in curriculum, school day or any other educational options which may come about in the

"Properly using integrated tech-nology in our educational process can help us to maintain educational excellence in districts where it currently exists and to have the tools to work toward educational excellence where it is currently lacking. We owe this opportunity to this generation, the next generation and generations which follow."







Federal grant will benefit area cities

The key numbers for Friends of the Rouge are 3,000 and \$46 million. The volunteer agency is shooting for 3,000 participants at the sixth annual rouge Rescue on Saturday, June

Long range efforts to clean the heavily-polluted river were given a boost with announcement of an additional \$46 million in federal money to continue Rouge cleanup efforts.

The new federal allocation is ex-

pected to go into effect Oct. 1. It is expected to substantially improve Rouge water quality in Livonia, Westland, Plymouth, Canton, Redford and other communities in the Rouge River basin.

The federal money was approved by a U.S. House Appropriations sub-committee. Though full committee and House votes are pending, Con-gresssional staff members said ap-

proval was almost certain. The money will go toward new sewers, improving waste water treatment plants and eliminating outmoded combined sewers. Combined sewers - a chief source of Rouge pollution - dump human waste into the river when heavy storms force other sewers to over-

It will also be used to finance investigations into commerical and industrial river pollution, as well as illegal sewer connections.

"ESSENTIALLY, this makes us a test project," James Murray, Wayne County Public Works Division director, said. "We hope to be a role model for other communities throughout

The overall Rouge cleanup in-volves coordinated efforts of local communities and federal agencies, including the Environmental Protection Agency and U.S. Army Corps of

"What's nice is how everyone's all come together on this," Murray said. An estimated \$156 million in federal money has already gone toward

Rouge projects.

The \$46 million in additional federal money is tied in with money for cleanup of Boston Harbor and the Rio Grande in southern Texas, broadening its appeal in Congress. Area Congressmen William Ford, D-Taylor, Sander Levin, D-South-field and Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth, have all announced support for Rouge projects.

Announcement of the new federal money was a highlight of the Rouge Rescue kickoff event held Friday at the Henry Ford Estate, Dearborn.

"It's definitely good news," Larry Coogan, Friends of the Rouge director, said. "It's going to go a long way toward helping with the CSOs (combined sewer overflows)."

At the same time, Friends of the Rouge members are promoting the annual June cleanup throughout many area communities.

"THINGS ARE hopping right along," Canton site coordinator Kim Scherschilgt said.

With a goal of 3,000 volunteers, Friends of the Rouge seeks to make the 1991 Rouge Rescue its biggest

Volunteers clear log jams and carry other debris from river banks to trash bins placed near the site. Items commonly pulled from the river include bicycles, large appliances and even an automobile or two.

Volunteers are encouraged to avoid direct contact with the river and to wear long sleeve shirts, long pants and boots for additional pro-

were \$100 million less than expected," Roberts said.

Although the state borrowed \$500 million in March, the projected cash deficit in the general and school aid funds would peak in early June with-out implementing the payment de-lays. "There is simply not enough money in the other usable funds to manage without delaying payments," Roberts said.

it you have arthritis, you may be unable to use a tub for bathing because of the difficulty of stepping in and out of the tub.

In using a shower, keep in mind the following features.

Even if your grip is impaired, you should have a shower head you can hold by hand. Then you can direct the water between the thighs and to the posterior thigh despite limits in your body movements.

If possible, have a walk-in shower; this type is easier to enter and exit than the tub-shower combination. Place a rubber that on the shower floor and a bathchair in the shower itself to permit bathing in a seated position.

You should position 3 or more grip bars in the shower-bathroom area. The bars should be installed with you present so their placement will match the way you enter and exit the shower.


Use liquid soap. A bar is difficult to hold, and if it slips from your hand, the soap is a hazard for your step. Bending to retrieve the soap may bring on additional risks. In contrast, liquid soap comes in a plastic bottle that is easy to grasp or pick up and not a danger if on the shower floor.

If possible have someone nearby when you shower. Then you can call for assistance if despite the above precautions, you slip or fall.

No way to avoid crying

It was once said, "The only way to chop an onion is to give it to someone else."

Even with today's food processors, chopping an onion is still a teary-eyed job, especially when removing the lid of the processor after the chop. Short of having a chef-in-residence to do your cooking, one sure way to beat the tears of an onion chop is to always use the sharpest knife you can find.

Seems that when an onion is chopped by a dull knife, the onion juice is squished out of the onion more abundantly than through normal slicing. When the onion juice hits the air, it turns into obnoxious fumes that surely begin the old watering of the

I have heard rumors about being able to chop onions without tears. That's just what they are, rumors. The old adage about peeling the onion and leaving the skin intact with the roots, to prevent tears, isn't true.

Then there's the one about putting a toothpick in your mouth sideways so that the only pain you feel is in your cheeks. This is supposed to help you forget about the onion odor. It doesn't work. (As I write this, sucking ice cubes trying to stop the bleeding from using too long a toothpick.)

UNFORTUNATELY, for the weak of eye, this indispensable vegetable and flavoring agent is plentiful throughout the year. Generally speaking, the warmer the climate, the milder the onion. I can vouch for that because on a past trip to Georgia, the Vidalia capitol of North America, I peeled an onion and ate it like an apple. Grant you, it wasn't the tastiest morsel I've ever eaten, but for an onion it was surprisingly sweet and full

Onions come in two varieties. mainly dry (with the green tops removed) and green (with the tops still on and perishable).

When shopping for onions in the grocery store, you will notice various dry varieties. Seldom do fresh Vidalia onions appear in this area, but during harvesting, about the late spring and early summer months, they occasionally make their way to our local produce shelves.

They can be served raw on sandwiches and tossed into salads. They are outstanding baked and stuffed. Ditto for Bermuda onions, again found only during the spring and early summer months. Both varieties have a delicate flavor that is not overpowering and can accompany just about anything it

is served with. Frequently spotted on our grocery shelves are Spanish or Valencia Onions. Theirs is a long season, from August through April. They are noted for their full flavor, especially in soups, stews and casseroles and when served with roasts. The "justabout-do-anything onion" - this

RED ITALIAN or Creole onions are stronger yet than the Bermuda or Spanish with a flavorful pungent flavor that invigorates many sandwiches and gutsy salad bowls. Also known as purple onions, these lend themselves to baking or just served thinly sliced on a sandwich or salad.

White or pearl onions are oval with pointed ends and flaky white to silver skin. The smallest pearls, so delectable in stews, are usually reserved for pickling and being served in martinis. The large variety, called voiling onions, are great in juicy

casseroles, ragouts and fricasses. Did you ever stop to realize that something so basic crosses paths in our kitchens so often and vet offers so many different flavors? Onions are great sliced, chopped, minced, fried, stewed, baked, broiled and even served on White Castles!

TOW THAT warm days are here, like many of you I enjoy being outside as much as possible

However, during the work week that can be a little difficult. With assignments to finish and piles of files on desks to sort through, it just seems like there is never any time to enjoy the weather. A solution to this problem is to brown bag it to work.

Lunchtime is the perfect opportunity to head out for a quiet shady spot to relax and clear your mind. Just grab your lunch and head outdoors. Some office buildings provide picnic tables for workers and now is the time to take advantage of them.

Relax with your lunch in the park at the end of the street or wile away your lunch hour at a nearby pond and take extra bread to feed your feathered friends. No matter what the location, a bag lunch is an enjoyable way to take in what pleasures a warm-weather weekday

The recipes in this article are versatile and easy to make. If you have the grill fired up for a backyard barbecue, try the Grilled Vegetable Salad the next day. Or if you have roast chicken one night, try the Chicken salad or Chicken Tortilla for lunch the next day. Many of the ingredients can be purchased at specialty shops. For instance, the chutney and pate. You also can use your favorite recipe for these items.

Here are 10 brown bag alternatives to add to your lunchtime enjoyment. All the recipes serve one unless otherwise stated.

A different kind of Salami Sandwich: Partly split open pita and line bread with 2 romaine lettuce leaves. Add thinly sliced salami, sliced tomato and red onion. Sprinkle one teaspoon of chopped black olives and crumbled feta into pita. Mix in a separate bowl 1/4 cup olive oil, 1 tablespoon white wine vinegar, 1 medium garlic clove minced and 1 tablespoon minced basil. Add a desired amount of this vinegrette to your sandwich when you are about to eat.

Lavosh Club: Place 1 lavosh (a large flour tortilla can replace this Armenian flat bread) on a surface. Spread softened cream cheese over bread. Arrange shredded lettuce over cream cheese at one end of bread. Top lettuce with desired amount of turkey, ham, sliced tomato and 1 slice of peeled cucumber cut lengthwise. Roll bread up tightly jelly roll fashion, starting

at end with the filling. Cut roll in half diagonally and wrap tightly in plastic wrap.

Peanut butter with a twist: On a slice of zucchini bread spread a desired amount of peanut butter and top with another slice of the bread. (Any type of quick bread such as carrot or pumpkin may be used to add a unique flavor.)

Country Pate Sandwich: Slice a crusty whole grain roll lengthwise. Spread Dijon mustard or 1 tablespoon of chutney on one half of roll. Layer roll with a slice of your favorite country pate, thinly sliced red onion and a romaine leaf. Top sandwich with the other half of roll. Sweet midget gherkins are a great accompaniment for this sandwich.

Smoked Salmon Sandwich: Lightly toast a croissant that has been cut in half lengthwise. Spread each half with a garlic herbed cream cheese, such as Alouette cheese, and wrap tightly. Carry separately 2 slices of smoked salmon, 1 slice of red onion and a sliced hard-boiled egg and assemble sandwich just before eating. Olives and sweet midget gherkins go well with this sandwich.

Ham and Biscuit Sandwich: Slice a large biscuit lengthwise and layer a desired amount of thin sliced ham atop one half of biseuit. Top with thinly sliced cheddar cheese. Spread on top of the other half of biscuit a desired amount of fruited chutney and place on top of chees

Chicken Tortilla Sandwich: Process 1 cup cilantro, 2 cloves garlic, 1/2 cup walnuts in a food processor. Add to running machine ½ cup olive oil in a thin stream. Blend 1/2 cup Parmesan cheese and salt to taste in mixture. Take 1 1/2 tablespoons of pesto mixture and spread on top of 1 flour tortilla. Top with shredded lettuce, carrot, shredded cooked chicken, chopped scallion and chopped tomato. Roll in burrito fashion. Wrap in plastic wrap until ready to eat.

Grilled Vegetable Salad: Whisk in a small bowl 1/2 cup olive oil, 1/2 cup plus 2 teaspoons white wine vinegar, 2 teaspoons dried basil and salt and pepper to taste. Set aside. Slice 1/2 red pepper, 2 small yellow squash, 3 zucchini and 2 baby elephant lengthwise. Brush with olive oil and grill until tender. Julienne cooked vegetables and place in bowl. Chop 1/2 small red onion and toss with vegetables. Drizzle vinaigrette over top. Marinate overnight. Serves 2.

Everybody loves pita bread, not just Middle Easterners

Ten years ago, the Beirut Bakery served mostly Middle Eastern customers who

grew up savoring the versatile pita bread. "It wasn't as popular as it is now," said Iskandar "Alex" Wakim, one of the owners of the family-run bakery based in Redford.

Nowadays, people of all backgrounds enjoy the round, slightly chewy pita,

which sometimes is called "pocket bread." Pita may be eaten plain, used as a food scooper or sliced open to form a pouch or pocket, then stuffed with meat or salad.

'As people became educated, the business expanded," said Wakim, who was born in Lebanon

A visit to the bakery on Schoolcraft Road just east of Beech-Daly can mean a crash course in Middle Eastern and Mediterranean specialties.

There are stacks of the popular pita, so prevalent in Lebanese and Syrian cuisines. There are stuffed grape leaves and tangy tabbouleh, a salad which mixes bulgur cracked wheat, parsley, tomatoes and onions in a dressing of olive oil and lemon

ALSO SOLD is the so-called Lebanese pizza, dough topped with ground lamb, onions, tomatoes and spices. And trays of the sweet, honey-and-nuts confection known as baklava.

The specialties are prepared fresh by members of the Wakim family, who emigrated from Beirut during the 1970s and came to Redford. Although they were trained for other jobs, they decided to open a bakery, "to keep everybody busy," said Iskandar's wife Hala.

When we started the business nobody knew about bread," Hala Wakim said. "It took a lot of experimenting. This is a

family business. It keeps us together." The bakery opened in 1979 at Schoolcraft and Inkster roads. It moved to its present, larger facility around 1983.

Although Beirut Bakery's breads are available in many supermarkets, "Many people prefer to come heré to buy it," Hala Wakim said. One new customer came in just days

"I was on a flight," he said, picking up several packages of bread. "The airline served us a sandwich on pita. It was

after tasting pita for the first time.

Pita is made with flour, water, yeast, salt and sugar. It contains no fats or preservatives.

The pocket is formed by steam which is generated during the baking. The dough is shaped and rounded by

machine. It is baked quickly, at very high heat, in a conveyor oven. The dough puffs into a ball. When it cools, the dough collapses, leaving a hollow center. "IT COMES OUT puffed like a

football," said Iskandar Wakim, formerly of Redford, now living in Northville. "The dough weakens in the middle. You cut it along the middle and it will open into a pocket."

Each pita is called a loaf. A large loaf, at 2 1/2 ounces, contains 185 calories. Party pita is somewhat smaller.

Pita is sold in packages of 10 loaves. A 1-pound, 9-ounce package sells for 85 cents in the bakery. Supermarket prices range from around \$1 to \$1.50 per package. Pita freezes well for six months.

2 tablespoons soy sauce 1/2 pound fresh snow peas, stems removed, or 1 package frozen snow peas, thawed, 8-ounce size. Regular frozen green peas. thawed, can be used if snow

1989 Vin du Mistral Grenach Rose produced by Joseph Phelps Vineyards (\$12) is a blend containing five percent mourvedre, anoth Rhone varietal. The wine is pleas antly peppery and spicy and what we refer to as a "think light and drink right" wine. Serve it well chilled with summertime lentil or bean sal-

1987 Vin du Mistral Syrah pro-duced by Joseph Phelps Vineyards (\$16) has distinguished toasted-bar-rel aromas with lively blackberry fruit character. Intense flavors mir ror the aromas in a generous wine with good body, structure and finish It will stand up nicely to barbecued red meat.

HOWEVER, WHEN you refer to most exciting at Phelps, the Rhone-styled wines are in the fore. Winemaker Craig Williams has a personal passion for these wines. He has been producing syrah under the Phelps label since 1974. Since 1986, the Vin du Mistral (a reference to the

windy conditions of the Rhone Valley) has been used as the special brand for Phelps' Rhone-styled

"Our work with syrah has been a journey of discovery," Williams maintains. "We've learned that if we employ production techniques similar to those for cabernet sauvignon or zinfandel, the wine is excessively tannic. We now imitate several Rhone vinification techniques including whole-berry fermentation, stem retention and gentle pressing to reduce tannin extracts."

Today, the wine is recognized as soft and approachable with heightened spicy flavors.

Tavel, a small Southern Rhone appellation, is famed worldwide for its grenache rose. With its recognizable is best consumed young and well chilled. The 1989 Vin du Mistral Grenache Rose produced from grapes grown in Monterey is a close rival of Tavel (see Wine Selections of the

Condrieu, a small Northern Rhone appellation is the home of the celebrated white varietal viognier. In 1983, Joseph Phelps Vineyards ob-tained 10 viognier buds from the Ex-perimental Fruit Testing Station in Geneva, N.Y. From those buds, they developed a "mother" block of twodozen vines that has expanded into a 10-acre vineyard at the Spring Valley ranch. Currently, three acres are bearing and are the fruit source for a scant 200 cases of 1989 Vin du Mistral Viognier.
Production of Rhone-styled wines

is miniscule compared to the wines bottled under the Joseph Phelps label, but it should be recognized as a milestone in California wine production. If Phelps and winemaker Williams are able to consistently pull off the exotic wildflower bou and delicate flavors of French viognier, we're in for a special treat in years to come.

The Chiefs were led by senior Kerri Kittleson, who was second overall with a score of 100 behind medalist Megan Johnson of

Stevenson, who shot 88.

CANTON SENIOR Sarah Beckman was fifth (106), sophomore Audrey Meissner seventh (107) and junior Katie Konovaliv eighth (109). The top 12 girls received medals. Canton's six scores included 114 by senior Melissa Vernon and 120 by junior Ann Vernon

"Some of the coa hes commented about the balance, and that's really what it was that won it," Riggs said. "It's super to have someone score 88, but it's the second, third and fourth scores that you count on. It takes four girls out of six to stay together and

The Chiefs had to rally on the second nine holes to win the tournament. They trailed Stevenson by 10 strokes and Northville by five at the turn.

"When the scores started coming in after 18 holes, the seniors began to turn it around," Riggs said. Then the underclassmen came in with outstanding scores and clinched it for us."

The four girls who eventually counted in the team scoring total lowered their scores on the back nine.

Beckman made the biggest improvement with an eight-stroke drop (57-49). Konovaliv dropped five strokes (57-52), Kittleson four (52-48) and Meissner three (55-52).

"THE GIRLS looked at the leader board when they came in (at the turn), saw what Riggs said. "They worked hard all year and deserved it. When we beat Northville by three strokes in the dual meet, we knew we could do it.

Having coached the girls for so long the seniors have played four years for Riggs and the others have been on the team since they were freshmen - Riggs said he could tell the girls had the resolve to win the tour-

"I could see it in their eyes," he said. "You can't really coach them (during the meet) or say much to them, but you make eye contact. They looked up at the scoreboard and said 'OK, let's go play another nine. Let's do

The Chiefs and Salem previously played in the Great Lakes 8 League with Ann Arbor Pioneer, Ann Arbor Huron, Brighton, Saline, Howell and Pinckney. Facing some of the state's top teams on a regular basis helped prepare Canton for its success this year, Riggs said.

Plymouth Canton has extended its dual-meet reign in girls track and field for another year.



Boxer Brett Lally is a landscaper by trade, so it's only natural that the Westland native is returning to his home turf.

The North American Boxing Federation's newly crowned junior middleweight champion will be part of a seven-bout professional card on Tuesday, June 11, at the Laurel Manor Conference Center in Livonia.

Lally, sporting a 28-5 record and 18 knockouts, will take on Chicagoan Anthony "Hard Puncher" Ivory (9-2) in a scheduled 10-round non-title

The 1981 John Glenn High graduate, now residing in Plymouth, has literally fought all over the world -London, Johannesburg, Honolulu, Atlantic City and Las Vegas.

Lake Tahoe, Nev., was the site of his last conquest, a sixth-round KO against Willie "Montana" Hotchletter that gave him the NABF

Lally last appeared on an area card back in November of 1983 (in Southfield) when he knocked out Charles Triplett in the third round of a junior welterweight bout.

"We wanted to bring boxing to the local fans of southwest Wayne County," said brother Bradd Lally, Brett's manager and trainer. "This is a nice set-up (the Laurel Manor). We'd like to attract a suburban crowd once or twice a month."

BRADD LALLY'S Golden Boys Productions, in cooperation with West Coast Productions of Pasadena, Calif., are promoting the fight.

East Detroit matchmaker Lindy Lindell has lined up several boxers with area ties for the seven-bout card, including welterweight Jeff Styers (8-0), a 1984 Wayne Memorial grad, who will return to action after nearly a 21/2-year layoff.

Styers, now residing in Northville and a sales representative for a computer firm, dropped out of sight because of contract difficulties after the death of his manager Johnny "Ace" Smith, who was shot and killed in an apparent hit in Detroit.

"I have not signed a contract with anyone," Styers said. "I learned the boxing business is cut-throat and rough, but Bradd gave me an oppor-tunity and there's a good matchmaker who I can trust."

Also scheduled to appear on the card is light-heavyweight Vince "Blue Thunder" Hopper (14-4), a Livonia Franklin grad; and heavyweight Kermit Fitzpatrick, a state trooper who trains out of the Livonia

Boxing Club. Lally, however, will be the main

attraction. "I've been landscaping eight to 10 hours per day and that keeps me in shape when I'm not training," Lally said. "Plus it gives me a good suntan. I'm looking forward to it. I've been training hard."

IVORY, Lally's next opponent, is coming off a loss at the Palace of Auburn Hills against undefeated Tim

"Ivory is basically a boxer, he'll use the ring and wait for the other guy to come in so he cancounter punch," Bradd Lally said. "He's an up-and-coming fighter. He has the opportunity to fight a ranked boxer. Usually you need 15 to 20 fights be-fore you get to a real contender, but because Brett wanted to fight here, we're giving him (Ivory) a chance."

Lally is currently ranked No. 3 by the World Boxing Council, No. 7 by the International Boxing Federation and No. 10 by the World Boxing Association.

He is 11-1 as a junior middleweight since returning to the ring after laying off all of 1985 and

"Brett deserves his shot, he's paid his dues," Bradd said. "We cried in the ring after nobody thought we could be Hotchletter. It was a long

time coming.' Lally, who has posted four consecutive KOs since losing to Donald Curry on a second-round TKO in Dec. of 1989, has a contract in hand (waiting to be signed) for his next mandatory title defense, set for Aug. 8 in San Francisco against hometown favorite Pat Lawler. (The bout will be televised on USA Cable.)

"AFTER THE LAWLER fight we're going to be sitting by the phone," Bradd said. "Say what you want, but Brett has beaten good guys and paid his dues.

If Lally wins his next two fights, brother Bradd is hoping to set up a possible title shot against either WBA champ Gilbert DeLe of France or IBF champ Gianfranco Rossi of

"We'd like to Brett to stay as a junior middleweight," Bradd said. "He carries his 154 pounds well. I don't have to bug him about running. He's always in good condition and that goes all the way back to when he started out at the Livonia Boxing Club with Paul Soucy (the LBC director). And with the landscaping, it keeps his mind busy, and that's good for a fighter."

Rocks, Canton collide in district

Plymouth Salem and Plymouth Canton will meet for a third time — the second in five days — in girls soccer, but tonight's game will be the

most important.

The Centennial Educational Park rivals square off in the first round of the district tournament at CEP. The Rocks take a 12-1-1 record into the 7 p.m. game, Canton 11-4-1.

Salem has beaten the Chiefs twice this year, each time by a 1-0 score. The second win occurred Thursday in the Western Lakes Activities Associa-

The Rocks also won the WLAA crossover game last year, but the Chiefs have a good record in

Canton has eliminated Salem in post-season play the last three years. Since winning the state championship in 1987, the Rocks have not sur-vived the district tournament.

THE TEAMS played in the district final four years ago and the second round of the district the last two years. Canton won last year when nowsophomore Colleen Connell broke a 3-3 tie in the 29th minute of overtime. Salem was rated No. 2 in the state, the Chiefs No. 3.

'We can definitely beat them, but we have to

put it in the net," Canton coach Don Smith said.
"We haven't scored on them yet. If we want it,
we'll have to come out and play like it. It has to come from within."

While one state-ranked team will be finished, the winner will go far in the tournament based on recent history, which says the Salem-Canton winner ends up being the district champ.

"Not to overlook anybody, but the other teams would have to have an awful good game to beat us," Smith said. "But it can be done."

The Salem-Canton winner plays the Ann Arbor Huron-Belleville winner on Wednesday. The final will be played Friday or Saturday in Ann Arbor. Canton won the Class A title the year after Salem. The Chiefs won the second of three straight district championships in 1989 and got to the regional final last year.

"EVERY GAME is equal when you start," Sa-lem coach Ken Johnson said. "The boys won four in a row (over Canton) last year, so it can be done. It'll be tough but it's a new year. You can't start looking back. (If the Rocks should lose) it won't be for a lack of trying."



On a video screen, that is.

All Nippon Airways is betting that the allure of video games, noted for mesmerizing youngsters for hours, will help first- and business-class travelers kill time as they cross the

The Japanese carrier claims to be the pioneer in offering the in-flight games, which are displayed on a television monitor connected to the

"We realize that the trip either way is very long, and it's just trying to give them something to do, make them more comfortable, take their mind off the fact that they're in the air for this protracted time," said ANA spokeswoman Jan Still-Linde

"It sounds pretty neat," said Tim Neale of the Air Transport Associa-tion, a trade group in Washington. "I know airlines are starting to order video screens in the seatbacks and the armrests. It's the coming thing."

The video Golf is one of six games offered by ANA and developed by

All aboard

Colorado railroad bounces back after inferno

DURANGO, Colo. (AP) - On a chill, dark morning two years ago, grown men near tears stood in the snowy yard of the Durango & Silverton Narrow Gauge Rail-road and watched fire destroy the historic roundhouse

where all six engines were stored.

Since then, the railroad has literally risen from the ashes and aims for 250,000 riders this year.

There is a new \$2 million roundhouse and machine shop where the acrid, charred smell of the fire has final-

"It seemed hopeless when you looked in that burned-out skeleton," operations supervisor Dan McCall said. "We're just happy to be back in the shop."

The shop crew not only takes care of the Durango & Silverton maintenance, it does contract work for other

Engines from the Cumbres & Tolec, the Grand Canyon and the Georgetown Loop railroads have been worked on in the Durango backshop this winter. When the fire destroyed the roundhouse on Feb. 10, 1989, owner Charles Bradshaw was sleeping next door

in the General Palmer Hotel.

"By the time I had my pants on, I was thinking, if we have to run tracks in the parking lot under a circus tent, we'll get the trains going by May," Bradshaw said.

He was right. Eleven weeks later, three engines were repaired. The train season began right on schedule May

5, and by mid-summer all six engines were on track.

The plucky little engines carried a record 201,004

assengers by season's end.

Mechanics were still working six and seven days a week. But a year later, they moved into the new 35,000-

square-foot roundhouse.

The roundhouse's design incorporates historic fea-

"The shop's come a long way. It's never been better," said Larry Beam, the roundhouse foreman.

The railroad's ambitious goal of 250,000 passengers this year springs from a 17 percent increase in early reservations, Bradshaw said.

THE COTTAGES are built on square foundations under squared shingled roofs, but what happens between roof and foundation is truly innovative architecture. Two corners have been cut away to create an open deck and a screened deck. Another small porch lies off the main

We followed a long private drive to our parking area and walked across a small bridge to the door of our two-bedroom cottage. As you enter, you can go directly upstairs to a loft containing two single beds separated by a partial wall under skylights that open at your touch.

Or you can circle the stairs on the main floor, past a full bathroom, a bedroom with an upper and lower bunk, a second bedroom with a double bed, and a living-dining area

with large table, living-room furniture and a gas fireplace.

The cottages are a good buy, especially for families or small groups. Lodge rooms cost \$69 for one person, \$79 for two, \$109 for a loft room or a suite. The two-bedroom cottages are \$89 a night, \$425 a week. Four-bedroom cottages are \$120 a night or \$465 a week. Don't forget to add 12 percent state and local tax to those

The management staff at the resort are trained, but the service staff is mostly new to the hospitality industry, so things were a bit slow dur-ing that first week. Untrained or not, we found the staff cheerful and helpful, ready to open any door or run any dining-room errand.

Bettie Cannon of West Bloomfield, who visited the resort just after it opened, gave it high marks. "It's very accessible to people in the Detroit area. Families can get together

there and enjoy the facilities without spending too much money. The po-tential is greater than what's there now, because not everything is open

"What I liked best about it was staying in a cottage, lighting the fireplace at night and falling asleep upstairs under the skylight with a sky full of stars overhead."

By midsummer, these greening fields will be busy with bicycles, Tshirts, ball caps, cars, golf carts and the other trappings of a summer re-sort. For this brief off-season month it is quiet, with hawks and seagulls spreading their wings wide against the sky as they fly over the resort and the lake.

Some cruise ship lines will refund your money if you have the bad luck to sail during a storm. I talk to a lot of travelers, but only one or two have ever complained about bad weather in the Caribbean.

Where should you go?
My favorite island discovery of the last
year is St. Lucia, a mountainous isle in the
eastern Caribbean where you can stay at a
variety of resorts and enjoy sand, sea, sun and
too much good food. Definitely not for those
who like casinos and evening entertainment.

My favorite place in Mexico is San Miguel de Allende, northwest of Mexico City. This was once the heart of Spanish colonial Mexico. You can stay in an old Spanish mansion converted into a small luxury hotel. You can shop, eat and tour the surrounding area. You cannot stretch out on the beach; no beach.

Your destination will depend a lot on what you enjoy, what you mean by "somewhere different." If you go early in October, and want to go that far, you will find something different on the Balearic islands of Majorca and Ibiza off the coast of Spain. That is where Europeans go in the fall.

I suggest you spend some time in your library and at a travel agency. Check out Margaret Zeller's guide book on the Caribbean. Her observations are very personal and reliable. Use the Reader's Guide to Periodicals or just browse through past magazines like Conde Nast Traveler and Travel & Leisure. Pick up handfuls of brochures at a travel

AUMEE BAY Lodge, Ohio's 10th state park resort, opened May 1 on the shore of Lake Erie 15 miles east of Toledo in Oregon. It has been getting rave reviews.

The lodge is a great close-to-home getaway for Michigan travelers, with fine resort facilities available at moderate prices. But you will have to book early to get what you want.

The 120 lodge rooms are available all year, but 20 cottages that rent only by the week during summer are already fully booked from Memorial Day to Labor Day, although cancellations are always possible.

The cottages were rented within three hours after

reservations became available in January. The park will begin taking cottage reservations for 1992 on June

YOU REACH Maumee Bay by the Highway 2 exit of I-280. Drive through the town of Oregon and turn left between farmhouses on Maumee Bay Park Road. Campers have used the adjacent campsites at Maumee Bay State Park for several years.

Maumee Bay Lodge appears ahead of you, a contemporary sprawl of sawed planks, stained fawn grey, rising in the center to weathered cedar-shingled roofs. The lodge, low on the ends and high in the middle, is set against the shore of Lake Erie, but you need not limit yourself to the sand beach (to be completed by July 4),

or to the 1,500 feet of inland beach on the 57-acre sail-

The lodge includes a large outdoor swimming pool; a heated indoor swimming pool with saunas; courts for racquetball, basketball and tennis; and a fitness center. All are available free to guests.

If you look to the right as you approach the lodge, you see contemporary cottages in the same grey planks, scattered in singles and doubles across the slightly rolling prairie landscape, tucked into groves of trees.

Most cottages are set on widely-separated knolls beside the golf course, which looks ready for play but is still digging its grass roots into the ground for a fall opening.



Madonna and Dice not nice

In "Truth or Dare" (F, R, 118 min-sies) and "Dice Rules" (F, NC-17, 87 minutes) Madonna and Andrew Dice Clay pretend that they are artists discussing sexual power, the hostili-ty of passion and the primacy of their own sex.

Not true, friends, for in reality they're both sadists out to torment their fans with 3% boring hours of obscenity, adolescent posturing and some of the worst film footage to be screened in years.

Both of these productions are sup-posed to be innovative, something "new and different" in concert films but they wind up as two of the least entertaining films imaginable. "Dice Rules," all in color, opens with a half-hour drama in which

Dice is the ultimate nerd who becomes super cool by purchasing a \$15 leather jacket. The remaining hour is wasted screening footage from his Madison Square Garden concerts. For those who are blessed with ignorance of Clay's routine, it's non-stop four-letter words celebrating naked masculine sexual power in the hands of someone who doesn't understand sexuality or human rela-

'Impromptu:' A triumph

In the mid-19th century, George Sand created a panic, even for Paris. The popular female writer not only carried on indescrete affairs, but in-

sisted on dressing in men's clothing.

Frederic Chopin, while enjoying his own popularity as a pianist and composer, was plagued by a lung disorder that kept him from setting foot outdoors or even cracking a foot outdoors or even cracking window. Composer Franz Liszt called him "The Polish Corpse."

Historically, the meeting of Sand and Chopin was little more than a ng acquaintance through mutual friend Liszt. The new film, "Impromptu," however, takes Sand's admitted infatuation with the composer and creates an irreverent and beautiful romantic comedy.

Playing exclusively at the Maple Theatre, "Impromptu" finds Sand, now divorced, desperately trying to avoid the mad and jealous lovers she's taken since. She finds Chopin's music, introduced to her at a party recital, "heavenly" and "the answer

SAND'S RELENTLESS pursuit of Chopin completely bends the proto-col of male-female courtship. Sand, dressed in trousers and ascot, frightens the frail, well-coiffed Cho-pin. He finds her revolting, but also

is strangely compelled by her.

Judy Davis' flesh-and-blood po trait of Sand, meanwhile, redefines the depiction of famous personages. It's partly her well-documented bitterness that has Sand wearing men's

clothing, but, as she confesses to her mother, they're also "easier to move about in."

In one of the film's most moving moments, Chopin is overtaken by her intensity and fears he will die if he succumbs to it.

"Take some of my strength," she implores. "I've got too much of it."
What sounds overly melodramatic

on paper comes off with amazing sincerity on film. This is clearly Davis' picture,

though Hugh Grant's Chopin is also fine. Julian Sands, a veteran of "A Room with a View" and "Gothic," looks properly rumpled and badgered as the long-haired, thick-




While such simple rhymes would seem more at home in a Cliff Richard song, "Timeless Melody" bears a sneer and a swagger that might put the La's into company with early Rolling Stones' offerings. In fact, the bluesy riddled "Doledrum" features

the same wayward poetry reminiscent of when Brian Jones was alive. Each song here is remarkably different, distinctively rootsy, but a prominent guitar buzz provided by Lee Mavers and Cammy throughout is a common thread.

This is where producer Steve Lillywhite (U2, Rolling Stones, Kirsty MacColl) deserves to take part of the credit. Lillywhite can bring a sense of immediacy to a song like none other. At the same time, though, numbers that don't lend themselves to anthemic renderings are banners left to lie limp without a wind.

Fortunately, those are few in the La's case mainly because of the La's

After doing that for a few million or billion years (ask Carl Sagan if you're interested in exact numbers), the sun will contract and become a dense, tiny star called a "white

Now, if you'll stay with me for a moment, you'll discover why you're reading about astronomy in a record

The reason is Simple Minds' latest album "Real Life." Metaphorically speaking, of course, Simple Minds' 11-year career seems to be following the same course as our own sun.

They began slowly gathering up fans in the early 1980s with critically acclaimed albums like "New Gold Dream" and "Sparkle in the Rain." Their heyday or "red giant" stage hit in the mid-1980s when their song 'Don't You (Forget About Me)" went to number one after being highlighted in the flick "The Breakfast Club." (The song, by the way, was not written by Simple Minds — undoubtedly



a blow to the ego.)

This phase also included the hits "Alive and Kicking" and "Sanctify Yourself" off of "Once Upon A Time." They played at Live Aid and their career was huge and bright. Then they released "Live in the

City of Light" and "Street Fighting Man." As you probably don't remember, these albums didn't exactly burn up the charts. Now, with "Real Life," Simple

Minds will most likely continue their contraction into the white dwarf Leader Jim Kerr said the band

tried to recapture the mood of their earlier days on this album. I think he actually means they wanted to capture the success of their early days.

Unfortunately, "Real Life" is miles away from their early days. Musically, it's very '90s - overproduced, somewhat passionless and with the obligatory black, female back-up singers.





Van Morrison's music plays in the background while Rich Hall talks on the phone from his Montana home. ere in the conversation, the comedian is asked what Morrison record is playing.
"No, he's (Morrison) here," says

Hall earnestly.

No doubt in the tilted imaginative mind of Rich Hall, "Van the Man" is robably there strumming "Brown-lyed Girl" in his living room. After all, Hall has a knack for making up

This is the fellow who gave us the Sniglet, words that somehow es-caped Webster's book like "prem-blememblemation," which is the term for double checking to make sure a letter went down into the mailbox. He can also take a piece of Plexiglas and turn the object into a visual comedic bit about driving.

Hall's an Emmy-winning writer. He has three books to his credit and was recently honored by the Muse-um of Broadcasting in New York.

His sometimes frumpy-looking face is certainly recognizable to

Yet obscurity is still the main mailing address for Rich Hall, whose string of television credits include ABC-TV's "Fridays," HBO's "Not Necessarily the News," NBC-TV's "Saturday Night Live" and, currently, Comedy Channel's "Onion

come to prime-time exposure were those Pizza Hut commercials, where he trekked around in a pepperoni-inspired odyssey around the country. He's been in several TV pilots, but a majority of them remained dormant.

"In a way, I've sort have followed that natural pattern where you do enough late night stuff they try to fit you into prime time," Hall says. "I've sort have been resisting that and still trying to find a way to still

Also, Hall will be in a soon-to-be aired CBS-TV show "Say What?" The show focuses on how wordy the world has become, no doubt destined to find a place with a prime-time au-

of tourists," Hall says, "and they hated it." "CBS tested it in front of a busioad

STAND-UP COMEDY provides solace. Hall worked his way up the circuit, opening in front of rock'n'roll audiences.

And sometimes things could get ugly. He relates opening for a band that featured former members of The Band at some converted bowling alley on Long Island on St. Patrick's Day. After 17 minutes, Hall was left to slink off stage as the drunken crowd howled.

Hall's wry observational humor still managed to find a receptive au-

"I was kind of different because at that time I worked with a lot of props," Hall says, "which worked out well because I had a lot of bright and shiny objects to keep the drunks' at-tention a little bit longer."

His keen eye for the peculiar stems to a childhood of growing up in Charlotte, N.C., in the shadow of a K mart. He would often write short stories. He later went on to major in creative writing at the University of Washington, After graduating, Hall worked as a street performer for awhile before turning to stand-up

David Letterman recognized Hall's talents, catching his act at the Improvisation in New York. Letterman hired him as a writer for his illfated morning show. Though the program was canceled, Hall earned an Emmy for his writing

FROM THERE, Hall's sojourn into network television began. ABC-TV's "Fridays," an anemic attempt to compete with "Saturday Night Live," provided his introduction. Hall contends he doesn't remember.

"I went to a Blackstone show and I was hypnotized for three years," Hall says. "During that time people said I did 'Fridays.'

"HBO's Not Necessarily the News" later allowed a better showcase for Hall's off-beat observation-

The show also produced the first Sniglet, "flen" — the crusty residue on top of a ketchup bottle. (For the record, Hall's favorite Sniglet is "pielibrium" — a term for when the crust of a pie slice outweighs the fill-

ing and it tips upward.)
"Saturday Night Live" was another short lived late-night forum for

"There was a lot of frustration there because nobody liked our producer Dick Ebersol, who was about as funny as a stick," Hall says. "After a year, we said 'that's it' and ev-

eryone quit."





When someone celebrates his or her 101st birthday at the restaurant, not only is the person's meal free, but the patron is also reimbursed a calculated percentage of the guest check, based on how many years passed 100 the person is

SO IF YOU'RE 100 or older, there is such a thing as a free lunch or dinner. The company has had about 250 people who, in the last 20 years, have pasted the 100-year milestone and who have received checks from Bill Knapp's. None of them have yet to cash their refund checks.

"They seem to keep the check as a souvenir or momento," Pearl said.

"They are very accommodating about how they prepare the food," said Marjorie Naftaly who has

been coming to Bill Knapp's for 20 years to enjoy family birthdays. That night she and husband Roland were quietly toasting his birthday. "I save money and the food is very good," the Oak Park CPA said while waiting for the waitress to pack his free cake. "I pick out what I want."

During the month of their special date, a personal letter and a \$10 gift certificate (good any time during the month) is mailed out.'

ABOUT 3,000 customers are enrolled in the club "and it's growing," Downey said. About 20-40 cards are filled out daily and the establishment is experiencing a 20 percent return. Downey hopes to build the registry to 1,500 customers a month

ABC to present 75th running of Indianapolis 500

Speeds set at trials already topping records

May 20 May 26

By Steve Paschal If the speeds posted during the time trials are any indication of things to come, this year's Indianapolis 500 promises to be one of the fastest and most competitive in the race's 75-year history

Records began falling on the first day of practice for the biggest single-day event in racing, which will be televised live on ABC Sunday, May 26, when three-time champion Ricky Mears shattered Emerson Fittapaldi's qualifying record with a sizzling four-lap average of 227 mph. In fact, five other drivers were clocked at speeds in excess of the 223.8 mph record, including defending champion Arie Luvendyk, 1989 winner Fittapaldi, Gary Bettenhausen, Mario Andretti and son Michael Andretti.

Those showings are a far cry from the inaugural race in 1911 when Ray Harron piloted his Marmon Wasp the 200 laps around the fabled Brickyard with an average speed of 74.6 mph. It wasn't until 1930 that Billy Arnold crashed the 100 mph barrier, and it was another 35 years before Jim Clark exceeded 150 mph in his Lotus Ford. Last year Luyendyk smashed the old record set by Bobby Rahal in 1986 by over 15 mph with an average clocking of 185.9 mph.

The sentimental flavor created by the presence of such longtime veterans as Fittapaldi and Darrell Waltrip intensified earlier this month with living-legend A.J. Foyt passed his mandatory physical exam and was cleared by doctors to drive in his 34th Indy, which he has indicated will be his last. The 56year-old Foyt, sidelined since he suffered extensive injuries to his arms and legs in a crash last September, is racing's all-time winningest driver with 67 victories on the CART circuit. His four Memorial weekend victories tie him

for first place with Al Unser atop the list of Indy champions.

Mears, a three-time winner who finished first in 1979, 1984 and 1988. will be looking to join that elite group of two after almost accomplishing that feat in 1989. That year a clutch problem sent him to the pits as he battled Fittapaldi and Al Unser Jr. for the lead. Fittapaldi, one of this year's favorites along with Mears, Unser and Luyendyk, survived a tirebumping incident less than two laps from the finish line that sent the iunior Unser into the wall and out of the race as Fittapaldi took the checkered flag.

More than 300,000 racing fans are expected to converge on Indianapolis to watch the field of 33 drivers burn rubber for more than

\$4.5 million in prize money. Millions more will be tuning in to ABC for live race coverage complete with commentary by three-time Indy winner Bobby Unser and racing experts Paul Page, Sam Posey and Jack Whitaker.

This will be the sixth consecutive year that ABC Sports, which has earned four Emmys for its Indy specials, has presented live coverage of auto racing's most prestigious event. From 1971 through 1985, ABC provided exclusive same-day network coverage, and prior to that the race was carried on a delayed basis on "ABC's Wide World of Sports." This year ABC will be in the pits, the hospital area and karage to bring up-to-the-minute reports in addition to the telecast of the race.




