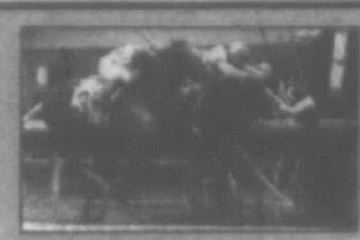

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Principal fearful of Detroit

Fights trip to testify in Nalepa lawsuit

Nearly 16 months after the hanging death of 8-year-old Stephen Nalepa of Canton, discovery continues in a lawsuit filed by his parents, Deborah and Lawrence Nalepa.

A trial date is not yet set, however a motion to produce documents from the defendants is scheduled for 9 a.m. tomorrow before Wayne County Circuit Judge Samuel Turner.

The Nalepas charge that Plymouth-Canton Community Schools were negligent in showing "Nobody's Useless" to Stephen's second grade class. The film, which depicts several attempted suicides including a hanging scene, was shown at Gallimore Elementary School the day before his body was found hanging from his bunk bed in March 1990.

Plymouth-Canton Superintendent John Hoben said he doesn't know how good a chance there is the case can be settled out of court.

"I don't have anything, other than the fact that our depositions were taken a month ago. I have no idea whether they'll be able to settle," said Hoben.

Sixteen defendants are named in the suit, and the depositions of several school officials remain to be taken.

Joyce Reefer Deren, principal of Gallimore Elementary, is objecting to traveling to Detroit to give a deposition in connection with the case.

ATTORNEYS FOR Deren argue that the principal and "many of the individual parties who didn't ask to be made defendants in this lawsuit have fears and misgivings about the city of Detroit."

In addition to Deren, defendants include the Board of Education, Hoben, executive director of elementary education Shirley Spaniel, school psychologist Jacqueline Hisey, social worker William O'Connor, librarian and media specialist Ann Wood-Alatolo, and teachers Jane Armstrong, Norma Foster and Alice Brown. Also named are Encyclopedia Britannica Educational Corporation, Osmond Productions

Storm pounds area, lights out all over town

Plymouth-Canton got its share of damage from the thunderstorm Sunday that swept through metro Detroit.

Hundreds of local residents suffered through power outages, firefighters stood watch over spots where wires lay, and department of public works crews removed trees lying over roadways.

In Plymouth Township, one house was destroyed by fire caused by a downed power line. The family living there was on vacation in northern Michigan.

And in the city, a downed tree damaged a parked car and the porch roof of a nearby house. No injuries were reported in any of the storm related incidents.

In Detroit Edison's Wayne-Monroe division, which includes Plymouth, Canton, western Wayne County and part of Monroe County, 65,000 customers lost power due to storm damage, said Edison spokesman Scott Simons.

"The Plymouth-Northville area was one of the most extensively hit areas," Simons said.

By Tuesday afternoon, 20,000 were still without power, he said, adding all power was expected to be restored by Friday.

Power outages came "as a result of high winds knocking trees and limbs into power lines, and lightning strikes," Simons said.

In Plymouth, DPW crews were called at 10 p.m. Sunday to unblock Hardenberg Street, blocked by a fallen tree. "That took us about 20-25 minutes," said Mark Hammar, assistant DPW director.

"There were three or four locations in Old Village where trees were blocking the road or traffic had to go around," he said.

trees, our guys knocked off around midnight," Hammar said, adding that other suburbs were hit harder than Plymouth.

Plymouth Fire Chief Al Matthews said wires were reported down at 11 locations in the city, and firefighters were dispatched to keep people away from each location.

In one incident, a power line dangled over a chain-link fence. "There were no reported fires, no reported injuries," Matthews said.

Downed wires cut power to traffic signals at Main and Mill and Ann Arbor Trail and Mill, and police set up stop signs at those intersections.

Matthews said the storm damage was "the worst we've experienced in the city for a long time."

The storm — which area utility officials are calling the worst in their history — toppled part of a tree that crushed Robert Fitzgerald's white 1989 Ford, causing damage estimated at \$1,500. The car was parked in his driveway in the 1100 block of Penniman in Plymouth.

As described by a Plymouth police officer, "the limb scored a direct hit to the center of the vehicle roof, causing great damage."

A power outage prompted the cancellation Monday of all activities at Centennial Educational Park.

"We were without power from

Whyman campaign worker threatens businesses

Two candidates for the state House seat vacated by Gerald Law are trading charges, after a July 4 incident sparked by a campaign worker.

Candidate Jerry Vorva is criticizing candidate Deborah Whyman, after one of her campaign workers on July 4 threatened to picket two city businesses for displaying "Vote Vorva" signs.

"TO BE INTIMIDATED because of your choices is totally un-American," Vorva said.

"I have an overzealous 16-year-old campaign worker," said Whyman.

"It's obscene to think that this occurred on the Fourth of July, the day of our independence when we threw off the yoke of oppression," Vorva continued.

"These are the kinds of intimidations the Nazis used," he said, adding Whyman is responsible for the actions of her campaign workers.

"It was a stupid thing," Whyman said, but added that her workers "didn't tear up any signs."

"He's (Vorva) trying to sling mud at my campaign," she continued.

Also running for the 36th District state House seat is Georgina Goss. All three candidates are Republicans. The winner of the Aug. 6 primary will run unopposed in the Aug. 27 general election.

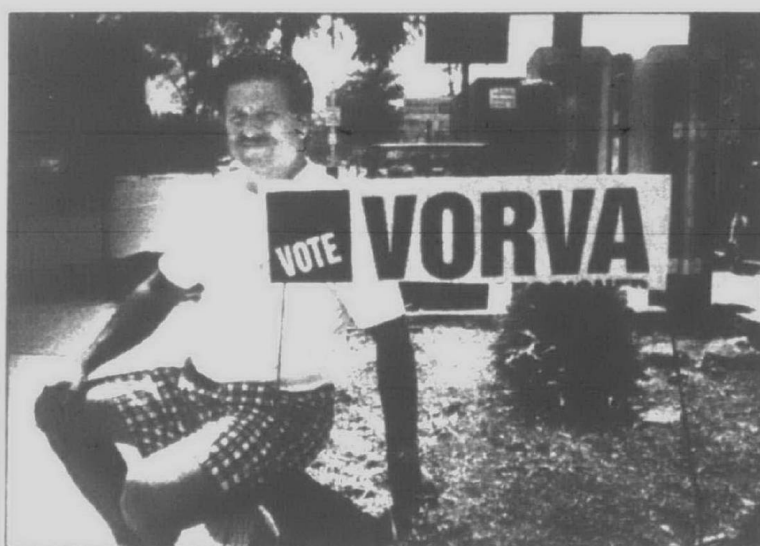
"I didn't know what the hell they

were talking about," said Dimitri's Party Pantry owner Dimitri Ayoub, when a group of Whyman campaign workers told him he should take down his Vorva sign.

"I didn't like their attitude," he said, adding he told the group of six teens to leave his store.

Carol Laing, co-owner of Dairy King on South Main was also told by a group of Whyman campaign workers to take down the "Vote Vorva" sign outside her business — on display only during the July 4 parade.

"They just seemed a lot on the pushy side," Laing said.

Letters and plans reveal that state and federal officials have some interest in airport expansion, even though they say expansion is not necessary.

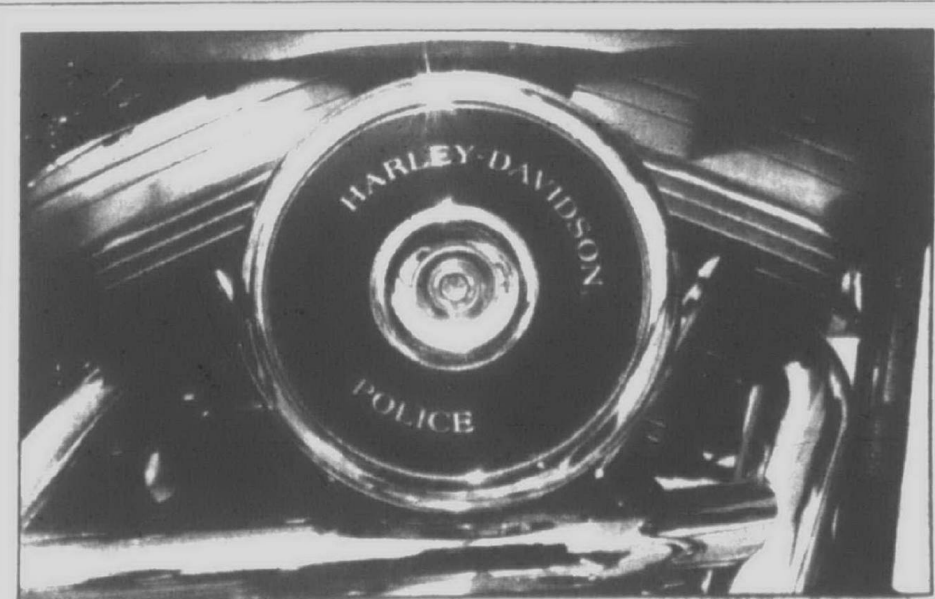

Principal fears trip to Detroit

Inc., Wayne Oakland Library Federation and Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

"Detroit is not a place (the defendants) travel to on social occasions, nor for recreation," said school district attorney John Crimando in a motion filed June 25.

"To have to travel in the streets of Detroit causes some of them, including Deren, anxiety in addition to that which has been experienced by being named in this suit. The plaintiffs have named 16 individual defendants, and it's anticipated other individual employees will be asked for their depositions," he said.

THE SCHOOL district has argued unsuccessfully that school officials enjoy governmental immunity, and that a protective order should be issued barring parties in the suit from speaking to the media.

The latter motion was filed after Deborah Nalepa appeared on a nationally-syndicated Phil Donahue show entitled "Classroom

Brainwashing" last November.

Turner ruled in April that Hoben, school board members and the Gallimore teachers and school psychologist "are not the types of individuals to be afforded the protection intended for high executive officials as contemplated by the statute."

Turner also ruled that "there exists a genuine issue of material fact for the jury to determine whether the defendants' malfeasance constituted a gross negligence."

Crimando is fighting the ruling in the Michigan Court of Appeals. Crimando also contends that school officials were not negligent.

"THERE IS NO question that the actions and decisions of the defendants were not grossly negligent. The ruling of the trial court is reversible and will cause material injustice if not corrected at this juncture," he said.

Crimando sought an order barring parties in the suit from discussing the case with the media and prohibiting "any media from obtaining in-

formation contained in the court-house records."

Crimando argued that "accounts that have thus far been contained in the media are wildly divergent and contain misrepresentations, unqualified opinions and misstatements."

"The public in general and the media in particular are not entitled to information generated during pre-trial discovery process," he said. "If the media is allowed access to pre-trial information, the defendants may be unable to have a fair trial. Further, defendants fear they will be unable to seat a fair and impartial jury."

The Nalepas' attorney, Mary Katherine Norton, countered that "the defense appears to be advocating an obstruction of the free flow of information, which is abhorrent to the freedom of speech principles espoused in the First Amendment."

A GAG rule would constitute "prior direct restraint upon the plaintiffs' freedom of expression, which has been called the most serious and

least tolerable infringement on First Amendment rights," she said.

Turner ruled against the schools Jan 29.

Film distributor Encyclopedia Britannica Educational Corporation is denying liability in the case, as is the Wayne Oakland Library Federation, supplier of the film.

Attorneys for Encyclopedia Britannica argue that "the film does not advocate lawless conduct, nor does it incite violence. Stephen Nalepa's own culpable conduct, misconduct, negligence and assumption of risk led to his death. The death may have been caused or contributed to by individuals or entities over whom this defendant exercised no control."

about 9:45 p.m. Sunday until a little before noon Monday," said Roy Anderson, chief security officer for Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

"You never know when electricity is going to come back on," so we had to close down, he said.

The storm meant no summer school for about 800 students, no driver's education for between 400 and 500 and the cancellation of day care, sports clinics and Safety Town, a traffic safety program for youngsters Monday.

The school board early in the day switched its meeting to Hoben Elementary, but was able to meet as originally planned Monday evening in the Listening and Viewing Room at Canton High School.

Plymouth-Canton residents were notified via radio and the district's 24-hour newswire (453-0271).

Everything was back in operation Tuesday and there was no storm damage to any school facility, said Canton Principal Tom MacKenzie.

WHO ATE THE EVIDENCE?: A Domino's employee delivered a pizza to a York Street residence about 2 a.m. July 6 and was headed to her next stop when she realized a large pizza worth \$6.23 was missing from her back seat.

She said there was a party at the house on York Street, and several people were outside. The employee, a 21-year-old Canton woman, said she saw no one near her vehicle or anyone in the vicinity. Upon returning to the house, the York Street homeowner claimed no knowledge of the theft. There were no leads or suspects.

FELONIOUS ASSAULT: Two Plymouth police officers were on routine patrol shortly before 11 p.m. July 6 when they were flagged down by a group of teenagers. The teens said two men in a new white Laser or Probe pointed a gun at them,

yelled obscenities and racial slurs.

Shortly afterward, the officers saw the described car driving onto southbound Main from eastbound Simpson. The officers ordered both the driver, a 21-year-old Canton man, and passenger out of the car.

After four officers arrived at the scene to assist, police found a chrome .77 caliber pellet/dart gun on the backseat of the car. The driver was arrested. The passenger was wanted on two Plymouth Township warrants; one for obstructing a police officer and the other for larceny and malicious destruction of property.

OBSCENE MESSAGE: Sometime July 7 or 8, someone damaged a 1983 Dodge Aries belonging to a 19-year-old Plymouth woman. She told police someone wrote with marker on her car. Obscenities were on the driver's side windows, which the owner was able to wash off. Other obscenities that could not be removed were written across the back of the trunk. 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
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Cops rev up for lessons in Harley style

Harley-Davidsons weigh 600 pounds and can go 120 mph, but if you know what you're doing you can ride it with the ease of a 10-speed bicycle.

"I've been riding since 1972 and I never knew what a (Harley) could do. As long as you learn how to ride it and control it," said Canton police Sgt. Eddie Tanner, who heads Canton's motorcycle unit including two Harleys and six officers trained to ride them.

LAST MONDAY OFFICERS from

Canton, Plymouth Township and Farmington Hills swerved in and around bright orange cones in the Plymouth-Canton high school parking lot. It was the first day of a week-long course to teach officers how to get the best performance out of their motorcycles.

Sometimes it was smooth riding. Other times the motorcycles, donated for practice by Harley Davidson, were tipped over in failed maneuvers.

"The whole reason this course is set up is for safety," said Canton officer Brian Darow, who heads the course.

"It puts pressure on them," Darow

said. "But if they can't do it here, they won't be able to do it on the road as a police officer. We try to teach them to learn their own capabilities."

Officers on motorcycles have an advantage over being in a car, Darow said, just by its relatively small size. It can get into tighter places and on terrain, like fields and wooded areas better than a car.

Traffic patrol in subdivisions is easier on motorcycles, too, Darow said.

"I sat in a lot of subdivisions in a police car. You don't have neighborhood kids and people coming talking to you. They see you on a bike and

they come up to you. A lot of people will approach an officer on a motorcycle than in a car."

And if you're trying to catch speeders, motorcycles are definitely easier to hide, he said. The two wheelers are better working festivals where there's a lot of traffic, Tanner added.

"We can get bikes in every corner, nook and cranny to the high schools," he said. In fact, the motorcycles were used at Centennial Education Park on the last day of school this year.

"Police officers have to learn how to ride and train just like everyone else does," Darow said.

tinguish employees and their dependents who are college students or entering college and have high scholastic standards and have exhibited leadership qualities.

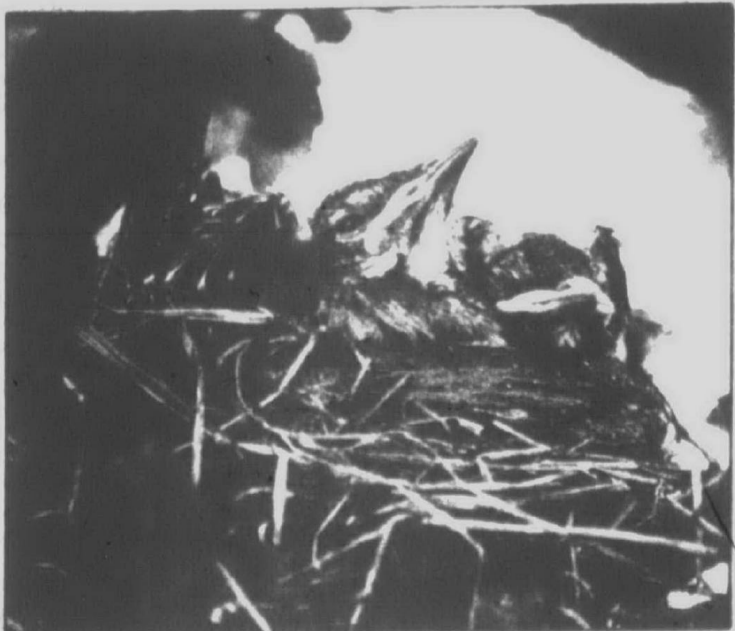
Matthew is the son of Hardee's

Scholarship requirements specify that the award be used to further the education of the recipient.



Hazardous incident team covers 23 communities

They've responded to leaking chlorine in Novi and a fire in a laboratory in Ypsilanti Township. During Memorial Day weekend, out they went to Dearborn, where a railroad car was leaking.

When someone calls for help from the Western Wayne County Hazardous Incident Response Team, 40 members from 23 communities covering 450 square miles show up.

"I think people are more aware when something spills. Sometimes it's a matter of not doing anything. Maybe it's just putting a bucket under a drip or it could be an extensive operation," said Wally Kurzeja, an inspector with the Farmington Hills Fire Department.

HIRT is a part of the Western Wayne County Fire Mutual Aid Association, of which communities such as Canton, Farmington Hills, Westland, Garden City, Livonia, Plymouth and Redford, to name a few, are members.

Firefighters from these communities are the ones who show up when there's any kind of an emergency with hazardous materials. They do more than just show up. There's re-

search, study, learning and of course, training, for the type of situations they will encounter.

"We have full response responsibilities. We have the ability to mitigate and investigate a wide variety of situations," said Kurzeja, HIRT's training coordinator.

IN 1990 ALONE, HIRT responded to five incidents. In August, for example, the team went to Canton Township, where hazardous materials were disposed of in a stream. Two days later they went to Northville Township, where a toxic and corrosive material was found in an abandoned building. In December, they responded to the runway crash of two passenger jets at Detroit Metropolitan Airport.

But these firefighters aren't walking blindly and uninformed into a situation. There's plenty of training and studying behind them. By December, the whole team is expected to be trained at the technician level, which is the minimum level of training the state now requires for those who respond to hazardous materials emergencies. The state is consider-

ing combining the technician level with the next step, which is specialist.

The topics covered in the team's training includes decontamination and proper use of equipment. The team in 1990 also had the opportunity to practice on simulated hazardous spills.

"It's hard to keep up," said Kurzeja, who is fire department circles is considered knowledgeable about hazardous materials.

Even since HIRT formed in 1988-89, laws have changed. Training is a constant, as is studying and keeping abreast of the laws and regulations governing hazardous and toxic materials.

In June, Farmington Hills hosted the monthly training. Beginning this month, the group will train twice a month through December, Kurzeja said.

AT THE LATEST training session, HIRT members practiced the use of chlorine kits. Chlorine, Kurzeja said, comes in a variety of containers, from cylinders to tank trucks. The kits contain the tools necessary to stop a chlorine leak.

"We need to do this on a frequent basis," Kurzeja said.

Training is absolutely necessary. Consider that for at least an hour before the HIRT team enters a facility with a spill, for example, there's research to be done, special suits and clothing to be set up and plans for decontamination to be made.

"You can't find an encapsulated suit that's good for all materials you encounter," he said. "There are specific suits for specific things. It has to be compatible with that class of chemical."

Before HIRT members enter a facility or situation involving hazardous or toxic materials, they are given the rundown on the immediate signs of exposure to the material, as


well as the signs of late exposure.

Wherever the team goes, they report to the fire chief in that particular jurisdiction. "We try to give the fire chief options. This is what can be done. Or this is what we would like to do."

"If we can't have a positive impact, sometimes the best thing to do is to do nothing," Kurzeja said.

He does, however, want the public to know that these hazardous and toxic problems are not going unnoticed or unaddressed.

"We want to make citizens aware that this is one of the things their city has the capability of this team. There are people who are taking care of their concerns, their lives and their property," Kurzeja added.

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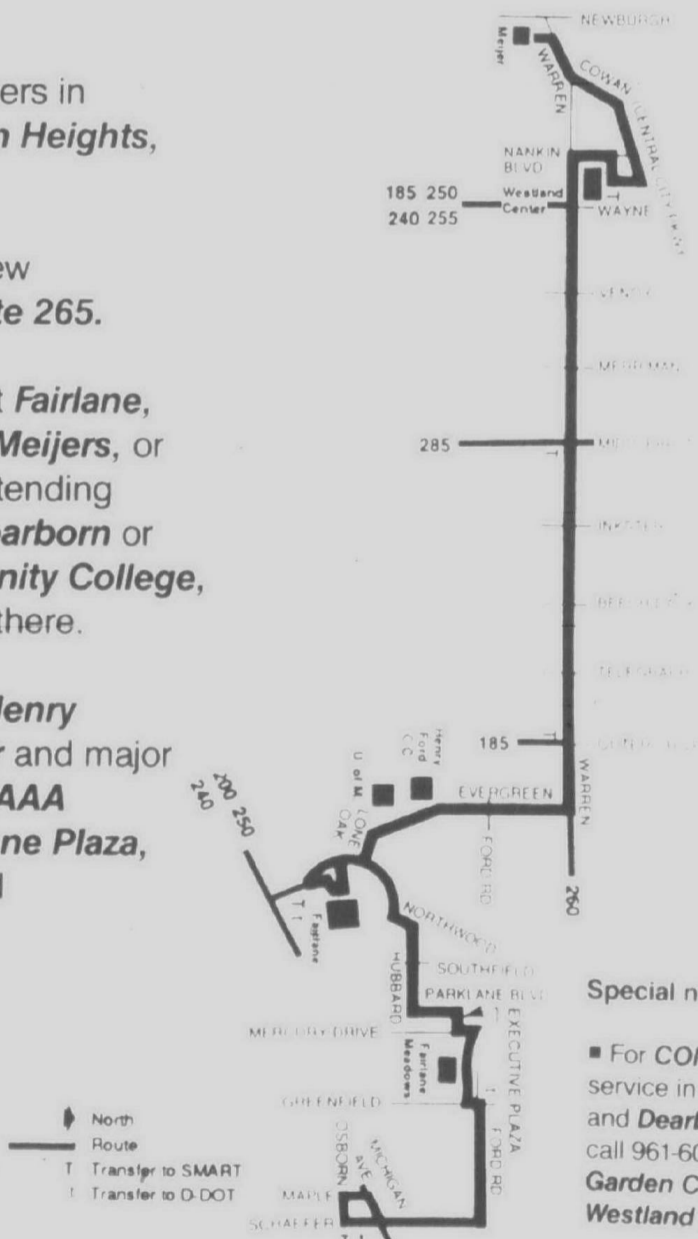

Madonna to host Taiwanese students

Twenty-five Taiwanese students will be touring area schools this month as part of their master program studies at Madonna University, Livonia.

Students will begin a three-week U.S. program July 14. They will tour area public schools, as well as vocational and trade schools.

Many of the students are teachers or school administrators in their native land.

During their U.S. tour, students will participate in panel discussions, drawing comparisons between education in both nations.

Outside of the Madonna program, master's studies generally are not available for working Taiwanese adults. Programs are usually limited to those who plan to teach college.

Before entering high school, Taiwanese youngsters must take a national test to determine their future education. Based upon the test, students either attend college pre-

paratory or vocational high schools. Madonna began its Taiwanese program in March 1989 when university President Sister Francilene and academic vice president Sister Rose Marie traveled to Taipei to meet with Taiwanese officials.

Joint programs for business and education professionals were subsequently developed in conjunction with the New Schoolmates Foundation for Culture and Education and Chen L. Chang, principal of Pankow Vocational-Technical School, Mount Clemens. Chang is a New Schoolmates representative.

Coruses are taught by Madonna faculty members stationed in Taiwan, although students must complete their studies on the university's main Livonia campus.

The Madonna program includes such topics as computer information systems, management theory and organizational behavior.

Stempien tapped to lead SC board

Jeanne Stempien, a Schoolcraft College trustee since 1986, has been named chairwoman of the seven-member board.

Stempien, a Northville Township resident, was appointed during the annual board organizational meeting July 1.

As chairwoman, Stempien will direct and help shape the agenda at board meetings.

Stempien said she'd like to see the board developing a new satellite campus, among other long term goals.

"I think there's a strong feeling on the board that we should be looking for something to the south and west," she said. "Schoolcraft College-Radcliff Garden City has been such a success that there's a feeling we should now be looking to do something for these other students, too."

Schoolcraft currently operates classes out of Plymouth-Canton school buildings, as well as on the Livonia and Garden City campuses.

Finding alternative financing sources is also a key priority.

Stempien said, especially as state money becomes less certain.

"We already know not to expect one of our quarterly payments (from the state) on time," she said.

The move forces the college to tap into its reserves.

Trustees are also expected to approve a contract with the Schoolcraft Faculty forum, the

college teacher's union, sometime this year.

FORMERLY BOARD vice chairwoman, Stempien swapped jobs with ex-chairwoman Mary Breen of Plymouth Township. Breen, chairwoman since 1987, is now the board vice chairwoman. Stempien's appointment was unanimous.

Charges against news exec dropped

Federal authorities have dismissed a criminal complaint of bank fraud against newspaper executive David Willett, but the U.S. Attorney's Office plans to review the matter for possible indictment by a federal grand jury.

As expected, federal officials Tuesday filed documents in federal court seeking to have the bank fraud complaint dismissed. The motion was approved late last week in Detroit federal court, FBI spokesman John Anthony said.

Federal authorities earlier had indicated that the complaint would be dismissed against Willett, president

of a company that publishes the Westland Eagle and the Canton Eagle.

However, authorities described the move as standard procedure, and Anthony said a grand jury indictment may be sought after the U.S. Attorney's Office completes its review.

Anthony said he could not speculate on when an indictment might be sought.

But Willett's attorney, Allen Early, said he plans to meet with federal prosecutors "to enlighten them" about what he described as Willett's innocence. Early hopes the effort will convince federal officials that a grand jury indictment should not be

sought against Willett.

WILLETT HAS denied the bank fraud charge in which federal authorities accused him of shifting millions of dollars among checking accounts in attempts to cover bad checks.

Authorities charged Willett with a check-kiting scheme in which they said he schemed to defraud the Wayne-Westland Federal Credit Union and First of America in Wayne during a three-month period last year, from Jan. 1 to March 31.

FBI officials said Willett shifted \$5.8 million of the more than \$6.3 million that he deposited to his accounts, in a scheme that authorities

said resulted in First of America losing \$30,000.

The FBI accused Willett of shifting the money among his accounts "at such intervals that it would appear to the victim banks that there were sufficient funds on deposit to honor (the) checks." In fact, FBI officials said, Willett did not have sufficient funds.

Willett appeared in federal court June 13, after he surrendered to authorities on the criminal complaint. Federal officials also searched the offices of Associated Newspapers Inc., which publishes six suburban newspapers, and seized documents that they said implicated Willett in the check-kiting scheme.

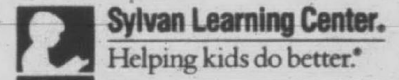

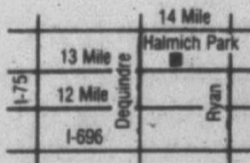

Ford tops state delegation in mailings to constituents

U.S. Rep. William Ford, D-Taylor, was once chairman of the House committee on Post Office and Civil Service so it might not be a surprise he's among Michigan's leaders in sending mailings to his constituents. Ford spent \$27,294 on mailings in the first quarter of this year, more than any other Michigan Congressman except Bob Traxler. Traxler, a Bay City Democrat, spent more than \$45,000 in mailings. Ford's district includes southern Livonia, Westland, Garden City and Canton.

All but about \$3,000 of Ford's spending went for a questionnaire that solicited constituents' views on issues such as free trade with Mexico and taxing Medicare benefits for the wealthy, spokesman Mike Russell said. Ford has sent out questionnaires in each of his 27 years in Congress. "He honestly believes that the survey results give him a true indication of the mainstream public thought in the 15th District," Russell said. "We generally get 10,000 to

12,000 responses, which is about three times as many as the Neilsen surveys that determine what we're going to watch on TV." Spending varied widely among other area Congressmen. Rep. Sander Levin, D-Southfield, spent \$17,947 to rank fourth among the state's 18-member Congressional delegation. Levin's district includes Redford. But William Broomfield, R-Birmingham, and Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth, ranked near the bottom. Broomfield, whose district includes

much of Oakland County, spent \$2,653. Pursell, who represents northern Livonia, Plymouth and Plymouth Township, spent \$1,705, less than any Congressman other than Detroit Democrat John Conyers. Conyers only spent \$472. Critics of government spending accuse lawmakers of abusing the so-called "franking privilege," which enables them to send mass mailings to their districts at taxpayer expense. Such communications, say the critics, are political propaganda that gives incumbents an unfair advantage over challengers.

Even some in Congress agree. "A public relations menu for some members of the House," Rep. Jerry Lewis, R-Calif., said last year. The complaints grew so loud that the House, aware of polls showing its popularity dropping out of sight, approved reforms shortly before the 1990 election. Now, members get an allowance sufficient to send three first-class mailings a year to each residential address in their districts. The average allowance: \$178,000. Broomfield's allowance is \$215,660, most of any Michigan Con-

gressman. Allowances for other area representatives are: Pursell, \$182,945; Levin, \$172,761 and Ford, \$170,057. Previously, some members were spending more than \$400,000 a year on mass postage. The reforms appear to be paying off, said the National Taxpayers Union, a watchdog group that howled over the old system. The House spent about \$7 million on franked mail in the first three months of this year, down from \$12.5 million during the same period in 1989, the previous non-election year. But "even with reforms, the average incumbent still spends far more on the frank than the average challenger spends on his entire election campaign," said James Davidson, the group's chairman. Between Jan. 1 and March 31, Rep. Bob Traxler, D-Bay City, was the Michigan delegation's biggest mass mailer, according to the House clerk's quarterly report. He spent \$45,297.65, or 27.3 percent of his allowance for the year.

Jobless rates fall for communities

A shrinking work force led to lower unemployment rates in Plymouth and Canton in May, according to the Michigan Employment Security Commission.

But while unemployment rates fell in May compared to April, they were still up from levels reported one year ago.

Canton's unemployment rate in May was at 4.9 percent, compared to 5.4 percent in April and 3.9 percent in May 1990.

In the city of Plymouth, the May unemployment rate was 3.6 percent, compared to 4 percent in April and 2.9 percent in May 1990.

In Plymouth Township, the May unemployment rate was 4.1 percent, compared to 4.6 in April and 3.3 percent in May 1990.

MESC Director F. Robert Edwards attributed the work force declines to unemployed workers leaving the job market after unsuccessful efforts to find employment and to fewer teens entering the summer work force.

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A quiet friend

Office helps crime victims without fanfare

She's often the first person crime victims see — after the police — but, until they become victims, few people even know her office exists.

"Unfortunately people usually find out about us only after they've been victimized," said Charlene Batchelor, out-county victims rights advocate for the Wayne County Prosecutors office.

Based in Westland, Batchelor assists crime victims in that city, as well as Livonia, Garden City, Redford, Plymouth, Canton and a host of other suburban communities.

The Westland office, opened less than one year ago, provides emotional support to crime victims and directs them toward other social service agencies.

"Often, after a crime, people don't

know where to go," Batchelor said.

Batchelor's duties have ranged from sitting alongside crime victims in court to finding housing for battered spouses.

Domestic violence accounts for a large portion of Batchelor's case load, though she also assists victims of child abuse and rape, as well as senior citizen crime victims. Her case load includes victims as young as 13.

"IT'S OUR job to assist society's most vulnerable members," she said.

By her own estimation, Batchelor meets with about 10 people a week. Frequently on the road, Batchelor attends hearings at 27 district courts from the Grosse Pointe to downriver.

Roughly 25 members of the county prosecutor's staff are involved with victims rights, and many handle sub-

urban cases, though Batchelor is the only victim rights advocate assigned to a suburban office.

Cases are referred from local police departments. "Every police report has to come here," Batchelor said.

Among those impressed with the process is Judge Gail McKnight of the 18th District Court, Westland.

Victim of a breaking and entry, McKnight said she was impressed by how quickly the victim advocate office contacted her.

"They really do their job," McKnight said. "Plus, the booklet they give crime victims is full of good information."

Victim advocates also provide a form for victims who wish to add their comments to the court record.

"Court can be a very stressful place," McKnight said. "I know people might not always be comfortable

about standing up in court and speaking."

The Westland office is at 3000 Henry Ruff, off Michigan Avenue, in the former Eloise complex. The county's new homeless shelter is less than one block to the west.

A trained social worker with a degree from University of Detroit-Mercy, Batchelor makes it a point to educate her contacts — not only about the legal process but about the nature of the crime.

"People become locked into abusive patterns of behavior," she said. "Often the men responsible don't see what they're doing wrong."

If more people aren't aware of the office, it could be because victim rights is a relatively new portion of the judicial process.

"Defendants have always had rights but, too often, victims don't know that they too can have a say in

the legal process," Batchelor said.

State lawmakers approved a victim rights act in 1985. Three years later, voters amended that state constitution to add a section on crime victims rights. Michigan is one of only six states — and the only one in the Midwest — to incorporate victims rights into its constitution.

The amendment allows victims access to any court hearing involv-

ing the accused, gives victims permission to confer with prosecutors and allows victims to make a statement during sentencing.

But Batchelor said the concept of victims rights is also designed to prevent crimes. It's a way to show victims how the system works, she said, and prevent them from taking the law into their own hands.

"We don't want another 'Burning Bed'" she said.

Livonia pair offers trips in a high-flying biplane

Ride into yesteryear aboard an antique, open-air biplane and enjoy a flight over one of Michigan's more quaint tourist attractions, the authentic Bavarian German village of Frankenmuth some 80 miles north of Wayne County.

Vintage Air Tours, owned and operated by Russ and Kathleen Newhouse of Livonia, offers 20-minute flights each weekend in a genuine 1929 Travelair plane. The flights originate at the Frankenmuth Airport, located one mile east of town. Cost is \$39.50 for adults and \$27.50 for children.

Russ Newhouse, a Northwest pilot who hails from a family of pilots, maneuvers the plane. Kathleen, who married Russ a year ago, attends to all arrangements.

"This is so different from aviation now days. It's open cockpit

flying. You're right out there in the open," enthuses Kathleen.

Indeed, customers don helmets and goggles, climb into the forward cockpit and, with Russ at controls in the rear cockpit, ascend a thousand feet for an aerial view of the Cass River, historic structures like the Lutheran Church in Frankenmuth and a sea of fields rich with soy beans and wheat.

THE FORWARD OR passenger cockpit is outfitted with bench seating accommodating up to two passengers. The plane, which has a 220 Continental engine, travels at speeds of 100 knots.

Russ arranges flight schedules with Northwest to free up weekends for Vintage Tours. He has been flying biplanes, aircraft outfitted with two wings, for 30 years, according to Kathleen.

Frankenmuth was selected as

the site of the new business both because it is a popular tourist area and because of its German heritage. Early aviators were of primarily German descent, including Clyde Cessna, Lloyd Stearman and Walter Beech who designed and manufactured the Travelair. The plane is very similar in design to the Fokker, a World War I fighter.

Russ's grandfather started Princeton Airport in New Jersey and his father is a retired commercial pilot for American Airlines. Three uncles also were commercial pilots.

Kathleen, mother of sons Joseph, 7, and Joshua, 5, is retired as a supervisor from Northwest Airlines.

Flights are available 7 to 10 p.m. Fridays, 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Saturdays and 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Sundays. For advance tickets, call 462-6227.

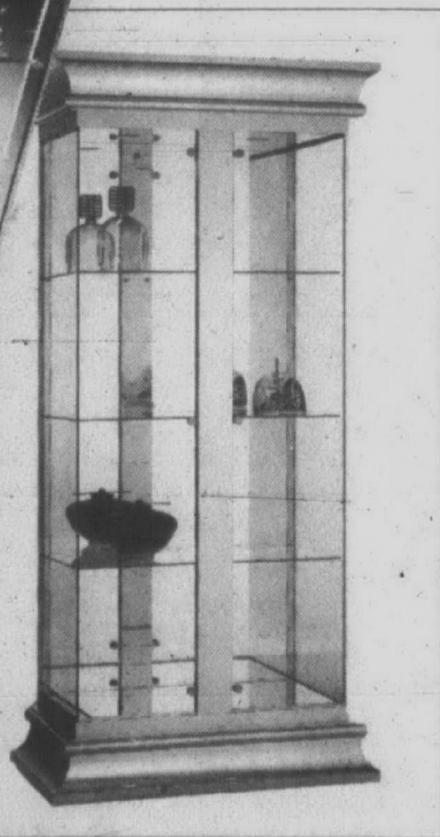
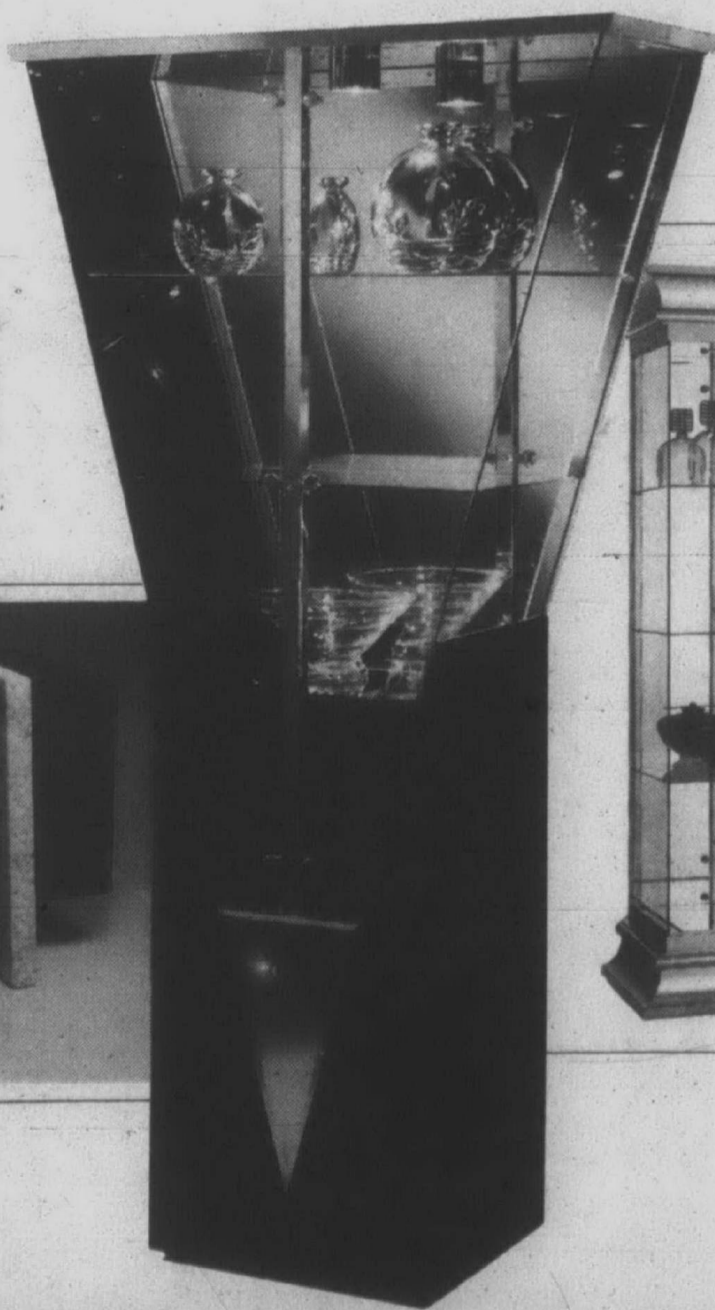
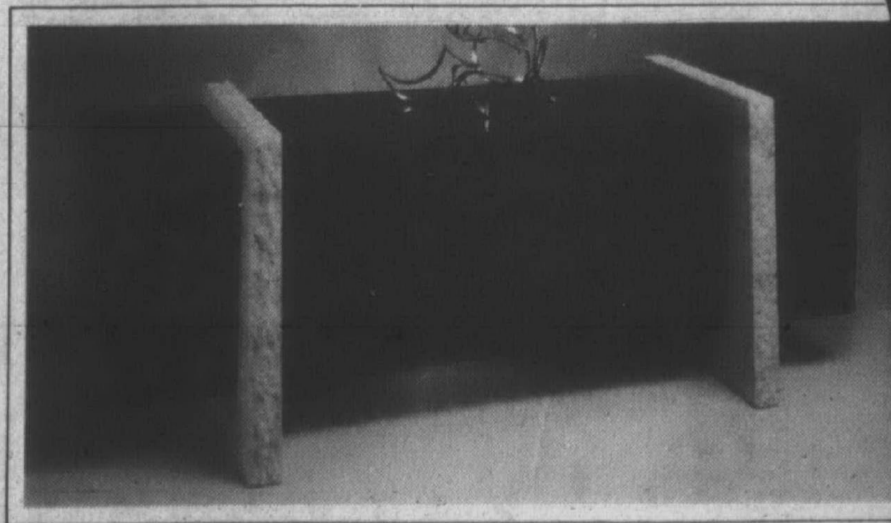
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Discovering nature is life-long challenge

An interest in nature and its various aspects can be a life long pursuit. No single person can know everything there is to know about the natural world, and thus it provides a challenge to expand on one's present knowledge, or expand into new areas of interest.

While in the field pursuing an interest in birds, for instance, it is hard not to notice the flowers, trees, and insects that are found in the area. Though an interest in birds may be the initial reason for getting into the field, to fully understand birds it is necessary to become familiar with many aspects of nature.

If you find a bird nest it is interesting to note what kind of a tree it is in, or what the nest material consists of. Watching bluebirds bringing food to their young may stimulate you to try and identify what kind of insects the adults are finding.

Once you begin to explore one of

these side interests, it may result in a life long interest too. Then investigating the new subject provides all the excitement of discovery that the initial subject provided.

PURSuing an interest in nature can start at any age and continue until death. I can see the challenge in my children when they chase after an insect and the satisfaction when they catch it. After examining it and trying to find it in our books, we let it go. People in their 70s and 80s can still enjoy the thrill of nature discovery, but find it hard to run down the

football field.

Butterflies have provided me with a new challenge and I enjoy the opportunity to explore and learn about them as often as I can. I was very surprised when we found a butterfly garden on Mackinac Island with butterflies flying only inches from our face. We watched them feed on the many different nectar sources available in the green house. There were also caterpillars to be seen and the chrysalids they formed afterwards.

Though primitive compared to Callaway Gardens in Georgia, it provided a new learning experience for the family in an area flooded with fudge shops. It also helped us become more aware of these beautiful creatures as we bicycled around the island.

Be careful with reverse mortgages

Q. My husband and I own our own home. I have heard about a new way to get cash from our home with some type of special mortgage. Can you tell us if this is true and how it is done?

A. Up until now, the only way you could get any cash from your house was to either borrow against it, which means you would have to move. There is a new way to realize cash from your house known as "reverse mortgages" or "home equity conversion." These programs allow you to take the value of your house without monthly loan repayments or without having to move out of your house.

The American Association of Retired Persons recommends investigating several aspects of the plans before you decide to use them. You should determine what your monthly payment or line of credit will be and weigh that against your needs today and in the future.

YOUR ATTORNEY or financial planner should be consulted as to whether the receipt of the cash will affect your eligibility for benefits such as Medicaid and pharmaceuti-

cal or energy assistance.

Cash from a reverse mortgage, however, does not affect your eligibility for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) if the money is spent within the month it is received.

You should decide if you want to retain some equity, should you prepay the reverse mortgage, for yourself or your estate. As with any legal document, you should review the papers, prior to signing, with your attorney, accountant and your family.

ADDITIONAL USEFUL information is that reverse mortgages are considered a loan and therefore not calculated as income for tax purposes. It is also possible that you will be required to share, with the lender, a percentage of your house's appreciation in value during the term of the loan.

Homeowners should also be aware

that the monthly payments of reverse mortgages or home equity conversions are figured, in part, on the basis of age. The younger the applicant the less is received.

Depending on your age and the amount of equity you have in the house, these programs may not be worth having. Home equity conversion plans are relatively new. They are not available, as yet, in Michigan and seem to function where houses have appreciated the most, which is in states such as California.

The transaction cost of obtaining a reverse mortgage is high.

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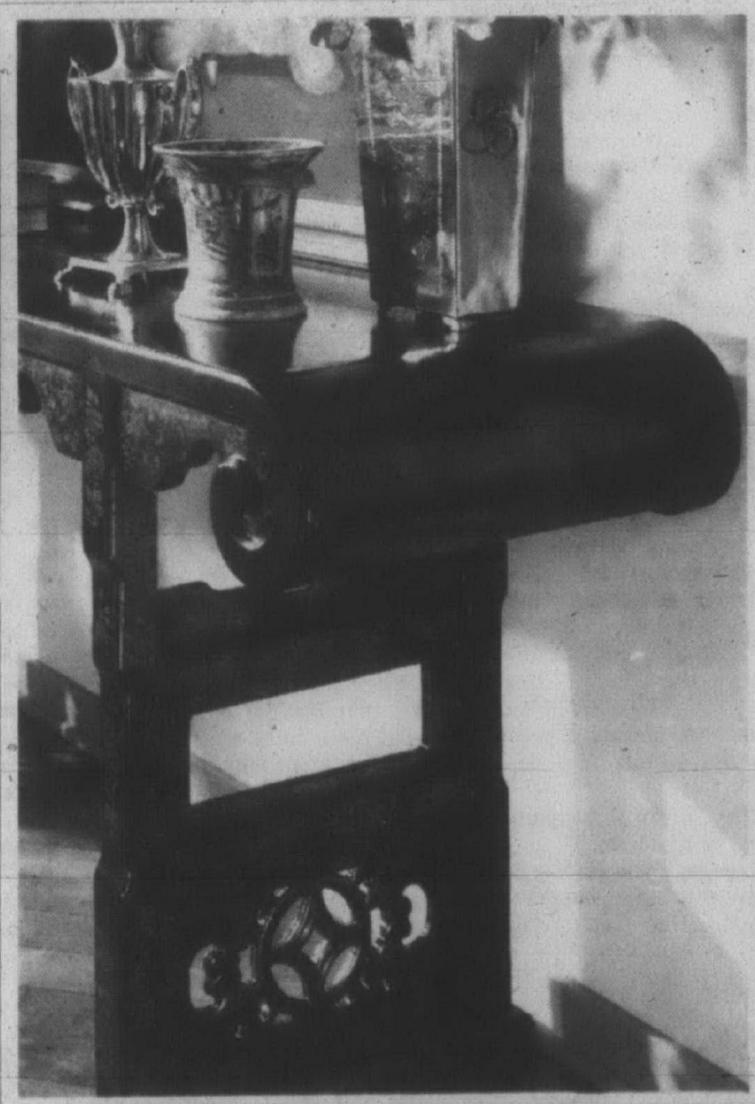

Napier Road It's our area's 'Blood Alley'

THERE'S AN OLD song and dance we hear when township officials are asked about roads. It goes: "The road is under Wayne County's control. We can't do anything about it."

As they used to say on Dick Clark's American Bandstand, "I'd give it a 65, the lyrics are catchy, but it's the same old beat."

And we're tired of it.

In the case of Napier Road, the tune sounds like a death march. Nine people have died on the road since 1970, five of them in the last four years.

The Napier Road case was pleaded recently by Ray Carlson who described how his 18-year-old daughter, Tamara, was killed in a March accident along with her boyfriend, Michael Fullerton, 18. Both were seniors at Plymouth-Salem High School. Carlson's son, Raymond, 16, was injured in the crash.

Carlson contends the crash happened because the road is dangerous. He said the speed should be lowered to 25 miles an hour and hills that make visibility tough should be graded. He also suggested adding stop signs.

We agree with all of Carlson's suggestions. They should be carried out now. But when Carlson made his pitch to the Canton Township board, he was met with: "The road is under Wayne County's control."

Although Carlson's pitch was made to Canton, it well could have been made to Plymouth Township. Napier, which is a dirt road, also runs through that township.

It's time for Canton and Plymouth township officials to bury the hatchet over the airport and get on to the real issue of forcing Wayne County to do something about the road.

If they don't, there will be more blood on their hands.

Petty politics New vision needed for budget

THE PEOPLE entrusted to solve Michigan's education crisis have spent the first-half of 1991 haggling over whether Detroit or Grand Rapids should give up state funding for its symphony orchestra and art museum.

Even more troubling is that neither Gov. John Engler nor the Michigan Legislature has a satisfactory solution to cutting a \$900 million budget deficit. The best they have managed was some bookkeeping that shifts most of the problems into fiscal 1992.

We're not disparaging cultural institutions, the need for social services or other programs on the chopping block. But if our elected leaders can't hack these, they won't come to grips with the big one — funding for kindergarten through 12th grade public education. That constitutes one-third of the state's \$7.1 billion budget.

3. The governor makes minor changes and submits his idea to the Senate, which passes it by a wide margin and sends it to the House.

4. The proposal either dies in the House or is reworked to the point that Engler will veto it.

This kind of partisan strategy has given us a property tax freeze instead of the promised cut and, more importantly, a lukewarm tax-sharing plan to solve the education funding dilemma.

The tax-sharing plan under consideration would divide the state into three regions and pool the property tax revenues from districts in each segment. It is flawed both in concept and execution.

What is needed is a radical departure from the past practices of funding public education in Michigan.

That means ending reliance on property taxes for education.

Equality among Michigan's public school districts can never be attained in a system that uses residential and commercial property values to apportion revenue.

DROP PROPERTY taxes from the equation and residents might be willing to take another look at a graduated income tax or increasing the state sales tax to pay for schools. Yes, these ideas have been rejected by voters in recent years. But offer them some true property tax relief and see what happens.

This kind of proposal demands that politicians be willing to put partisan pettiness aside and concentrate on larger solutions to serious problems.

From what we've seen and heard in budget deliberations, we're not sure the current crop of leaders can handle it.

MUCH OF THE Constitution's eloquence comes from its statement of basic human rights.

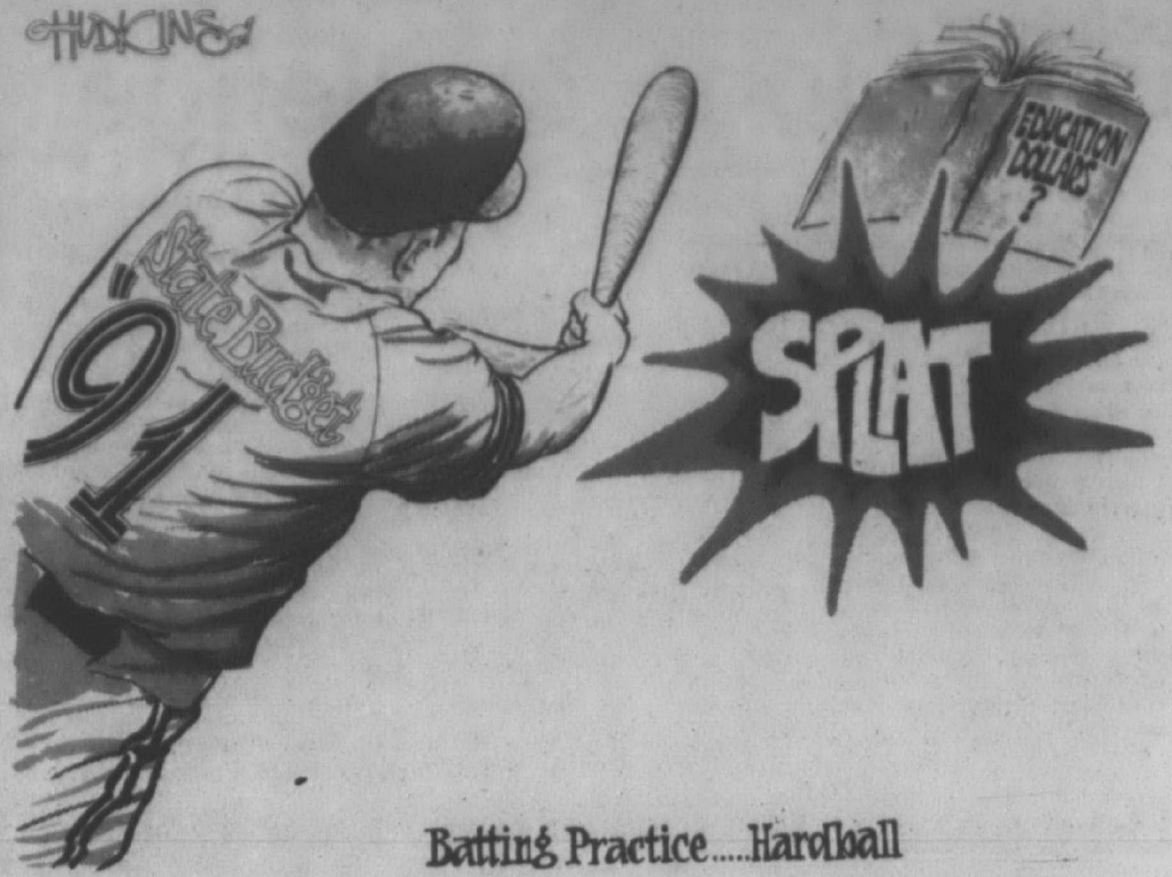
Interpreting those rights hasn't been easy. Sometimes portions of the same amendment conflict.

When a Livonia school principal says a second grader can't show a videotape to her classmates because it contains religious material, it raises the potential conflict between her right to free expression — or everyone's right to freedom of religion. The First Amendment guarantees both. It calls strongly for "free exercise of religion"

(even for those who choose no faith) and against government showing favoritism or discrimination against any particular religion.

Recent Supreme Court rulings have furthered Thomas Jefferson's view that the clause's intention was to build "a wall of separation between church and state." The court has set guidelines for display of a creche or menorah on public property.

This is another in a continuing series of articles marking the anniversary of the Bill of Rights.

Racist images require affirmative action step

IT'S WORRISOME TO think twice about going downtown — again.

Yes, again. When we moved back to metro Detroit from Houston 18 years ago, suburbanites rarely went downtown although it had been six years since the race riots.

But in recent years, despite Mayor Coleman Young's offensive behavior toward whites and the suburbs, much of that fear has dissipated.

On a recent trip to Pewabic Pottery on Jefferson, I had to detour onto an unfamiliar expressway. Once I was able to get off the expressway, I stopped at a fast food restaurant and got out to ask for directions back to Jefferson. On the way to my car, a black man called to me, "Hey there, white girl."

Clearly I was in his territory, and I was being made to feel uncomfortable about it only on the basis of color.

COINCIDENTALLY WEST BLOOMFIELD Eccentric reporter Jim Radebaugh also had a racially charged experience that day. He was in Northwood Jewelers on Woodward in Royal Oak getting a new battery for his watch.

As at a number of jewelry stores, the door was locked. Radebaugh, a white male, rang the doorbell and was promptly let inside. While he was there, two black men came to the door. They rang, but were not let in. Instead, they were told over a speaker that the store only sold "to the trade."

These were two isolated scenarios — scenarios which, with minor variations, are probably repeated dozens of times each day all over Detroit and its suburbs.

At a recent meeting with Birmingham representatives, following two well-publicized racial incidents in that city, the NAACP said they have had numerous complaints from blacks who said they were poorly treated in Birmingham shops and restaurants.

That's when Birmingham city commissioner Rex Martin made the extraordinary statement about living all his life in Birmingham and never hearing of one problem related to blacks shopping in Birmingham.

THE DAY AFTER that meeting, I had an interesting telephone call. It

was from someone involved in the Birmingham business community, who said he couldn't give his name for fear of losing his clientele.

But he wanted to report that when some longtime members of the Birmingham business community meet for breakfast or lunch — as they do on a regular basis — racist remarks aren't the exception, but the rule.

Birmingham is on the line here. And with one of the smallest percentages of minority residents of any of the suburbs we cover, it is a handy target. But countering this group of bigoted businessmen, Birmingham also has a core of residents out to change its racist image to one of affirmative action.

Detroit, too, is on the line. Just as Birmingham is a lesser community without minorities, Detroit sorely needs a more sizable white presence.

Neither can endure the current polarization.

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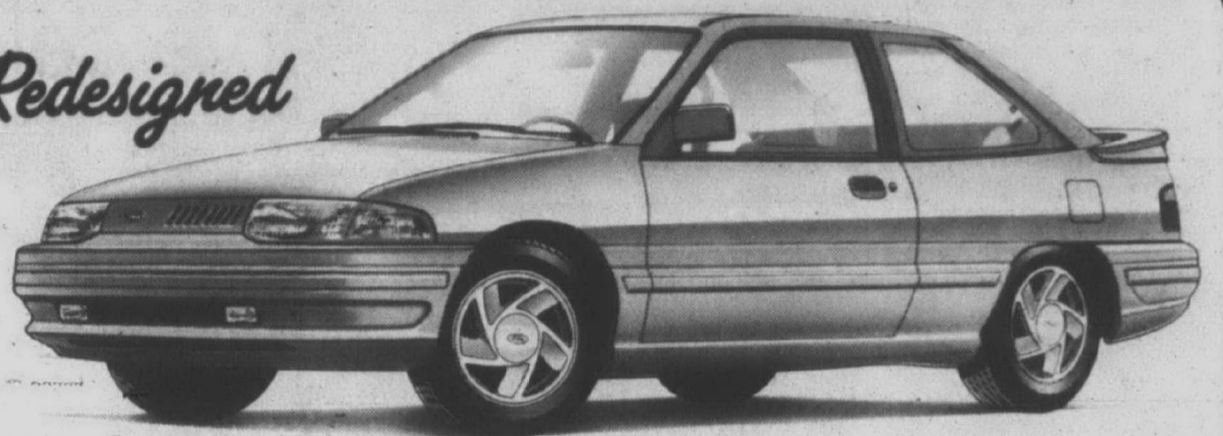

Downs. Black Tie Affair has won more than \$1.1 million in his racing career.

More racing fans than ever before will have a chance to watch, as 73 simulcast outlets are lined up across the nation for the Mile, up from 44 last year.

At last year's Mile, 11,493 fans showed up at DRC, despite rainy and muddy conditions. Attendance and the handle at DRC have each dropped about 3 percent this season, publicity director Bob Raymond said, but he expects at least as large a turnout as last year's Mile.

ATTENDANCE IS down throughout the country, according to Raymond, and officials at Hazel Park said their course is suffering a 5.8 percent drop in attendance. Raymond has a couple theories for the drop in daily attendance and handle.

"It's mainly the recession; people don't have discretionary income," Raymond said. "But also the unusually hot weather. People don't come out to the race track as much during the hot weather."

Following is a profile of each horse entered in the Mile, beginning with the favorites:

Black Tie Affair: The 5-year-old will be ridden by Pat Day, a winner of more than 5,000 races who will be inducted in August into the National Museum of Racing Hall of Fame. Day has won every major race, according to Tanner, except the Kentucky Derby.

Black Tie Affair has 13 wins in 40 career mounts and this year has won two of his five starts. A sprinter, Black Tie Affair outlasted last year's sprint champion, House Buster, in seven furlongs in April at the Commonwealth Breeder's Cup in Keeneland, Ky.

He also has a second and third place finish in 1991.

"I expect him to run right in front and say 'Catch me if you can,'" Tanner said. "He'll try to carry speed as far as it will take him."

Silver Ending: The 4-year-old took fifth place in the 1990 Kentucky Derby. Silver Ending, who has started five races this season, has won the Arkansas Derby and the Pegasus Handicap in the Meadowlands.

Hall of Fame jockey Jorge Velasquez, who rode Pleasant Colony to the Kentucky Derby championship in 1981, will ride Silver Ending. The horse has been a fine investment for owners Angelo and Beth Constanzo, who bought Silver Ending for a mere \$2,500. The dividends have been impressive, as Silver Ending has won more than \$920,000 in his racing career.

"It's been a hell of an investment," Tanner said. "He likes long distance of ground and likes to come off the pace. He's one of those horses who makes the long, big run."

Silver Ending earned his nickname because of the gray tail, which is easy to spot on his mostly dark brown body.

Private School: Based out of Churchill Downs, Private School took second in the Foster Handicap to Black Tie Affair and has won six of 19 career starts. Private School proved he can be successful on a 1 1/4 mile course last year in winning the Ohio Derby.

He has made more than \$384,000.

Yonder: Three of Yonder's four races this year have come on grass, but don't think it'll be a major adjustment racing on DRC's dirt field. Yonder, a 4-year-old, has won four of 19 career mounts — and all four wins came on dirt.

The son of 1977 Triple Crown winner Seattle Slew, Yonder has won \$83,000.

He finished fifth in the 1990 Belmont Stakes as a 3-year-old and also won the Jersey Derby that year.

Angel Cordeiro, the Hall of Fame jockey who rode Opening Verse to a second place finish in the Michigan Mile last year, is expected to say today whether he will ride Yonder or not, Tanner said.

Sangria Time: His sire, Timeless Native, won the Michigan Mile in 1984 as a 4-year-old. Sangria Time is enjoying a fine 1991, winning three of six starts and finishing second and third one time each. He has won nine of 37 lifetime starts and has more than \$278,000 in career earnings. One of his wins came at the Ark-La-Tex Handicap at the Louisiana Downs, a 1 1/4 mile course.

His jockey will be David Guillery, a leading rider in both Arkansas and Louisiana.

Solo Matt: The 5-year-old comes home to DRC, where he was based until last fall. Now based at Woodbine Race Course in Toronto, Solo Matt has won 11 of 36 races. Riding Solo Matt is Eucledes Vergara, Ladbroke DRC's leading jockey. The last time Vergara rode Solo Matt they won the Frontier Handicap last Labor Day at DRC.

Solo Matt showed his distance ability in finishing second by a nose at a 1 1/4 mile race at the Greenwood Race Course in Toronto. Despite being based most of his career at DRC, this is Solo Matt's first Michigan Mile.

Regal Affair: Tanner calls this a "mystery horse" because of his great success in a thus far injury-riddled career. After winning his first career race in May, 1989, by 10 lengths at Churchill Downs, Regal Affair broke a bone in his stifle (equivalent to a human's shoulder) and it took two years to heal. Since his comeback in April, Regal Affair has won three of his four starts and now has \$86,000 in career earnings.

Lotus Pool: Lotus Pool is the son of Spectacular Bid, who won the Kentucky Derby and Preakness in 1979. Lotus Pool, a 4-year-old has won four of 13 starts and up until last fall never raced outside of Ireland. Of his 13 starts, only two have come on dirt. He has won one of the two races on dirt.

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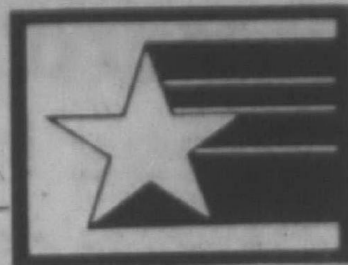
Map showing location at intersection of Woodward and 14 Mile Road, near Michigan Ave and Merriman Rd.

Kingswood alumna makes movie for doctoral thesis

GRADUATE dissertations summon up visions of dedicated students scuffling through dusty volumes, scanning endless rolls of microfilm or, these days, hacking away endlessly on computer keyboards.

Not so for former Detroit, Birminghamite and Kingswood School alumna, Marcy Hedy Lynn, whose graduate thesis for a doctorate in film at New York University is the feature film production "Murder Too Sweet" under the banner of Whim Wham Productions.

The line producer, Detroit Producer's Association member Patricia Wedhorn, describes the film, set in 1936, as "a darkly comic thriller centered around a gangster family and their misdeeds while trying to fulfill a contract."

Wedhorn continued, "This is a student thesis film, which means that there are no investors. All the money for the film is coming right out of her pocket. Many costumes, location permits and creative time was donated."

PRINCIPAL PHOTOGRAPHY took place in the metropolitan area from June 19 through July 3 with 80 industry professionals and 70 extras including Michigan State Senator Jack Faxon who, Wedhorn noted, "got the shortest haircut he ever had so he could be an extra."

All these dedicated individuals spent countless hours in rehearsal, being fitted for costumes and, during principal photography, many 14-16 hour days on the set. "It's not the typical student film that I'm used to here in Michigan," Wedhorn commented. "It's an actual feature with numerous locations, many extras, special effects, everything associated with a feature."

"Murder Too Sweet" is a period piece, so donations included a wide range of vintage costumes as well as the usual materials required for film production. Cast and crew worked at such unique locations as the Thornley Mansion at Cranbrook in Bloomfield Hills; the Evergreen Cemetery on Woodward Avenue in Detroit; the Soup Kitchen in Detroit; the Franklin Cider Mill, and one of Ann Arbor's well-known landmarks, Drake's Sandwich Shop, for the scene in which Sen. Faxon appears as an extra.

Director Marcy Hedy Lynn is an enthusiastic, committed filmmaker who speaks with a quiet, burning intensity about her work. Her academic career reads like a Cook's tour of the Western world, with several years in Chicago where she received a bachelor of science in theater and a master of arts in film theory and production at Northwestern University.

From there she headed to the Sorbonne, where she earned the equivalent of another bachelor's degree, this one in cinema. After Paris she studied at London's Royal Academy and the Goethe Institute in Berlin before returning to New York and New York University. Lynn's practical experience as a filmmaker is awesome for someone not yet 30, with every aspect of filmmaking represented by her particularly long list of skills, awards and productions.

LIKE HER education, Lynn's honors and screenings read like an American road map, with stops here in Detroit on the way west to Santa Barbara and San Francisco film festivals. Houston, Chicago, New York and New England are also locales where she has screened her films

and won certificates of merit, excellence and commendation.

Her "Shortnin' Bread Rock" and "Whether Willed" were screened last year on Boston's Channel 5, WCVB-TV. Another one of her films will be screened there later this month.

"Murder Too Sweet" was shot on 16mm film with a \$25,000 budget, miniscule in these days of Hollywood's megabudget mania.

Even at the low end, feature film production is expensive. Lynn's talent and experience have stood her in good stead as she worked profession-

ally to raise money for the production of "Murder Too Sweet." She also obtained grants and, as she said, "I rely heavily on my credit cards."

Lynn fits right into the Detroit area's long, rich and internationally renowned tradition of producing fine film talent.

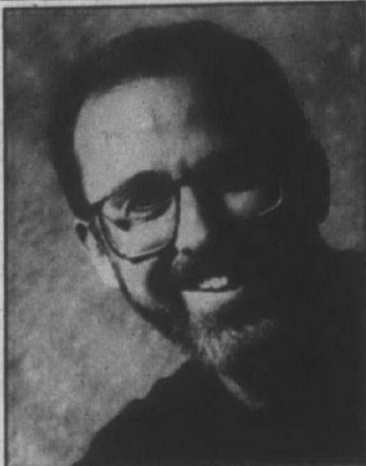

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Stratford's 'Our Town' flawless in presentation

"Our Town," the American classic by Thornton Wilder, is a jewel of a production in the hands of the Stratford Festival in Canada.

Combining gentle humor and dramatic punches, the play stars Douglas Rain as the Stage Manager, or narrator, of the story of life in small-town Grover's Corners, N.H., in the early 1900s. A seasoned pro, Rain manages to extract every bit of meaning from subtle lines that could just slip past you with a less able actor.

"Touching" and "warm" are words that describe the low-key action, directed by Vivian Matalon, which builds to a stunning climax in Act 3. One of the most powerful, and incredibly sad scenes, I've ever seen

on stage is this funeral sequence, where mourners and the dead are present after the death of the young heroine, Emily, in childbirth.

Staging and lighting throughout the play are magnificent, especially in the funeral scene where the dead, dressed in iridescent grey, are stark contrast to the mourners, all in black with umbrellas.

THE MESSAGE of "Our Town," as pointed out to the audience, is that the living are all blind, and don't appreciate death. "It (life) goes so fast," the deceased Emily says.

Ann Baggey gives a strong performance as a vibrant Emily Webb, and Andrew Dolha is appropriately pleasant and confused as George Gibbs, the next-door neighbor who becomes her boyfriend when they are teenagers.

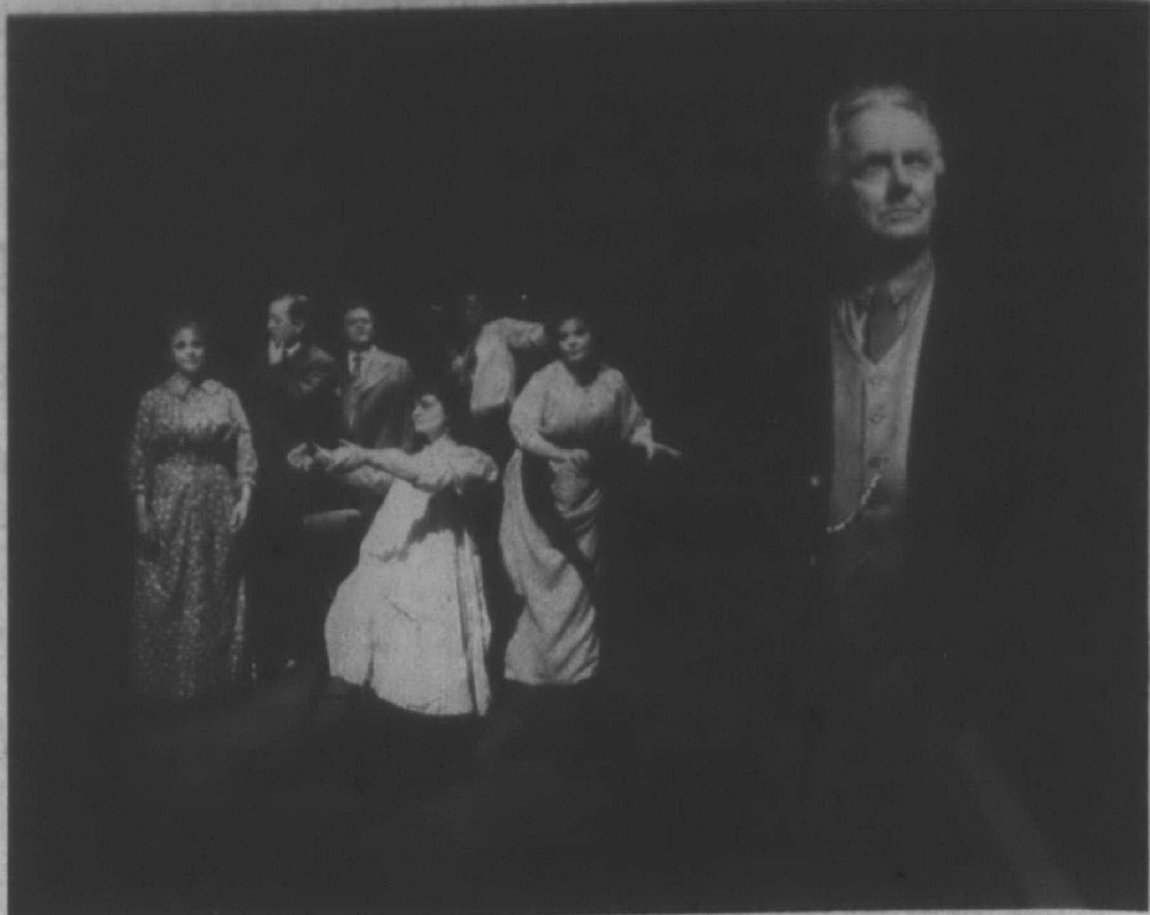
One of the play's most amusing scenes is where actor Rain, taking

the role of the drugstore owner, pantomimes making ice cream sodas for the young couple.

The first act concerns the couple's growing up in Grover's Corners. Good performances all are those by William Dunlop and Roberta Maxwell as George's parents, Dr. and Mrs. Gibbs; Claire Rankin as George's younger sister, Rebecca; Peter Donaldson and Susan Wright as Mr. and Mrs. Webb, and Sam Dinicol as Emily's brother, little Wally Webb.

In Act 2, George and Emily are married, and then the action jumps back to their teenage "romance" where he buys her an expensive, ice cream soda.

The stage for "Our Town" is bare, except for tables and chairs, which are changed about and used imaginatively to create the mood called for by each scene. At times, some

A funny thing happened after baseball career



Comedian Ron Robertson went from the baseball diamond to knocking out one-liners on the comedy club circuit.

Comedian Ron Robertson likens his job to "going to college without taking classes."

"I get excited about going to work — it's just too good to be true. I can't work enough," he recently said from the comfort of his Santa Monica home, which just happens to overlook the beach.

Robertson retains his enthusiasm, even when comedy appearances require him to travel. Why?

"Because I'm getting free peanuts and getting paid to make people laugh," he said. "What could be better?"

Robertson didn't always feel that way about his career. After graduating from high school he played major league baseball with the Oakland A's and the Atlanta Braves.

That was a long time ago, the 42-year-old comic admits.

"I was good at it when I was a kid and it helped pay my way through school," he said.

WHEN HE signed a contract to play baseball he included a clause that required the Oakland A's to pay for his college education, whatever it might be. Robertson chose Harvard University. And after he finished school, he hung up his baseball cap.

Business degree in hand, Robertson then entered the world of big business, where he became a marketing executive, first for Duracell Batteries in New York, then for a company in Houston, Texas.

Life in a pin stripe suit bogged him, though, and for entertainment Rob-

ertson started hanging out in a Houston comedy club after a hectic day at the office. That's when things began to change.

"I started going there in 1978 when it first opened and just watched," he recalled. "And some of the stuff just wasn't funny. I said to myself 'I could do that.'"

And he gave it a shot. The date is etched in his memory: March 3, 1980, the day Robertson calls his "comedy anniversary."

"I signed up and was supposed to do five minutes. I had an idea of what I was going to do but not that much of an idea. Luckily it was a good crowd," Robertson said.

From that night on, Robertson lead a double identity. By day he was a button-down marketing mogul . . . by night, an up-and-coming stand-up comedian.

BEFORE LONG — 2 1/4 years later, to be exact — he decided to abandon the business world and pursue comedy full-time. Robertson said he's never regretted his decision.

"It always starts out of ignorance," Robertson said. "But I was lucky — I never went through a peri-

od where I thought I was going to starve. It's amazing how it began."

So what does a Harvard graduate with a master of business administration degree in marketing find humor in?

"Things that have happened to me," Robertson said. "My comedy style is conversational and reality-based. I have a rather caustic sense of humor."

In his routines, Robertson jokes about relationships, about the quirks that surface between married couples and about the confusion among genders.

"If people come to see me, they'll see themselves," Robertson said. "The mirror may be different, but they'll see the same things inside."

Robertson's favorite comedians are George Carlin, Robert Klein and Richard Pryor, "although I like a lot of other people, too."

Asked what his career goals are, Robertson said "eating and paying rent works well for me right now."

ASIDE FROM stand-up comedy, Robertson has done a few commercials and occasionally auditions for

acting work. But he said he's not really very worried about where his career will take him.

"As long as I'm true to this and true to myself, things will come along," Robertson said.

In his spare time Robertson, who's single, often heads to the golf course.

"I golf with a lot of other comics — it helps us loose that nightclub tan," he said.

Robertson was last in Michigan in February 1989 and said he's looking forward to his next visit.

"I pick the cities I enjoy going to now," Robertson said.

By the way, he invites "every married couple" to see his act, not excluding the single crowd, of course.

"There's something for everyone," he said.

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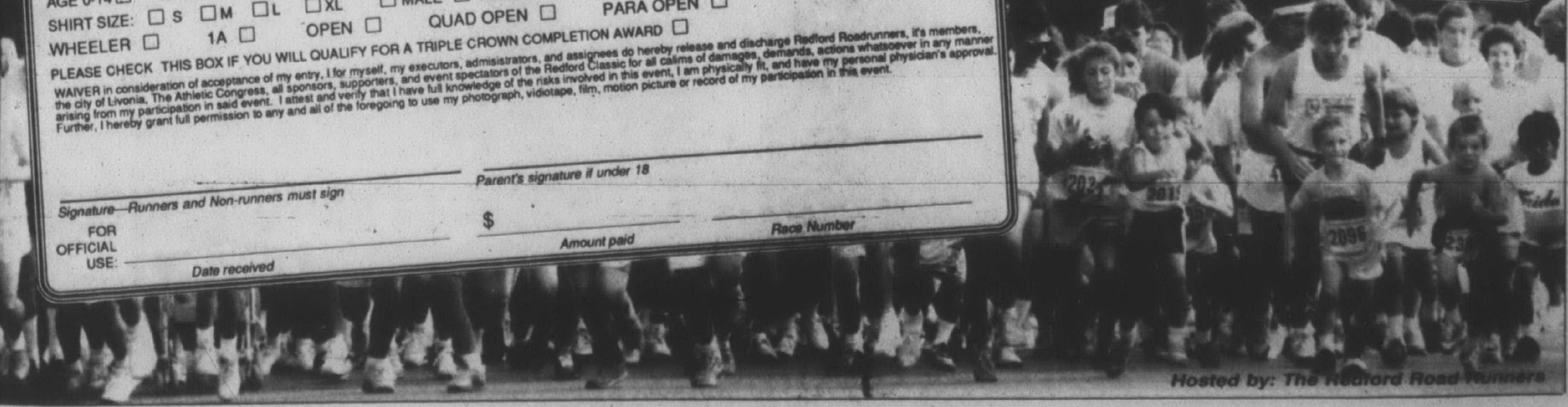

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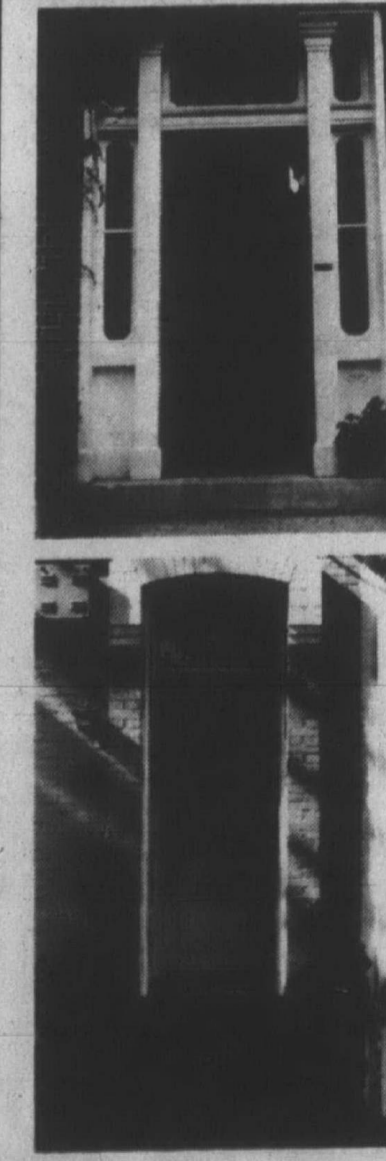
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Car magazines can be as blind as manufacturers

"Grosse Pointe myopia" was the title of a column by Brock Yates published in Car and Driver magazine in the late 1960s in which Mr. Yates squared off against the domestic auto industry as hopelessly self-involved, rarely able to see beyond their collective Big Three navels, as it were.

The column established Yates as a Detroit critic. Yates also established himself as hopelessly lost, having wandered over to the east side, rather than heading toward Bloomfield Hills, where the top auto execs mainly live. But I digress.

The point to the essay was that Detroit automakers were unable to see beyond their own cultural norms, and continued to churn out huge gas guzzlers when the rest of the country

(i.e. California) was heading toward small, light imports.

Since then, Car and Driver along with Road and Track and Motor Trend have grown from being back-pocket stuffers for hard-core gearheads to the status of self-proclaimed Opinion Makers in the arcane science of why people buy cars.

The so-called "buff books" by now also have managed to close the same loop previously criticized by the likes of Mr. Yates. They have, in fact, created a substantial cult of auto executives that see the greater world out there through the eyes of magazines that are mainly the stuff of automotive adolescent fantasy.

JUST HOW far this has gone was impressed on me the other day when

the president of one of the Big Three — himself a regular reader of enthusiast magazines — confessed he had not read a thoughtful cover story in Atlantic Magazine that used his company as an example of how U.S. corporations are bumbling international trade. I wouldn't have expected him to personally pick up the magazine, but I did assume his staff culled this kind of thing and brought it to his attention — as they do for

magazine new-car reviews.

Without getting into the journalistic merits of the auto enthusiast magazines (some of my best friends write for them), the incident started me wondering how much of the greater world of automobiles screened out, rather than illuminated, in their pages.

For one thing, the heavy emphasis on high-performance cars in enthusiast magazines has precluded virtual-

ly any mention of the major marketing trends that have shaped the U.S. industry in the past twenty years or so — including the mom-and-pop minivan, the huge growth in four-wheel drive utilities, and the abrupt emergence of the light truck as a family vehicle.

Also notable is that Honda eschewed magazine publicity until it was well-established as a dominant presence in the United States. Yugo, on the other hand, courted the magazines and it backfired. A former Olds division general manager ducked any kind of press and managed to lead the entire country in sales of a single model.

There seems to be no particular pattern to whether slavish buff book praise guarantees success or not.

The Camry didn't have much support, and it is dynamite in the showroom; Nissan has been lauded, but is hurting for sales.

All this may seem blasphemous coming from someone who has made a living as an auto magazine writer for nearly two decades. In fact I tend to share the car nut's enthusiasms for high-performance cars. On the other hand, I don't doubt that there are lots of other reasons why people buy cars and trucks, ranging from child-proof seats, to a nice color, to a dull old thing that starts in the morning.

Maybe buff book myopia has gone too far.

Management of computer access urged

Computer virus — the words send shivers up the collective spines of everyone who has ever tinkled the keys of a desktop PC.

But as dramatic sounding as computer viruses may seem — and even though computer viruses gets all the attention — other areas of computer security are more important. People who depend on computers in their day-to-day affairs and businesses should be more concerned about unauthorized access than isolated computer virus attacks.

In today's modern office, with computer terminals at every desk, the potential for abuse is great. Unauthorized access can lead not only to the obvious — stolen information that may help a competitor take your business — to the less obvious — inadvertent destruction from a well-meaning employee.

Robert Fiolek, senior manager of consulting services for BDO Seidman with offices in Troy, said small- and medium-sized businesses don't rank computer security very highly on their list of priorities.

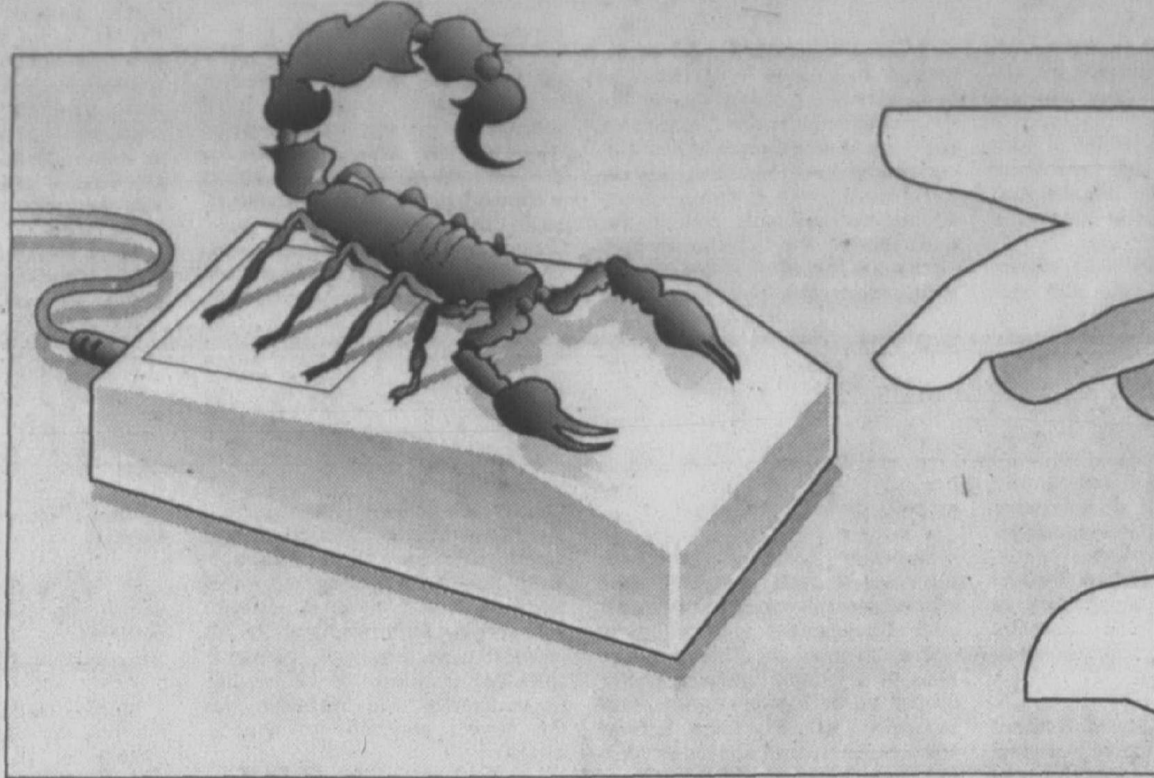
"People should definitely be more concerned than they are," he said. "Something about micro-computers has made people more comfortable."

The proliferation of micro-computers and knowledge about how they are used should make businesses uncomfortable, not comfortable, Fiolek said.

Computer security is not difficult, he said. Simple password and authorization levels would eliminate most of the problems of unauthorized access.

MENU-DRIVEN applications that permit users access to only certain areas of data will eliminate many of the rest.

Computer security can be broken up into three basic

areas, the first is hardware and software controls, he said.

"The real irony is that most computer systems have (security measures), but it's surprising how few people turn them on," he said. If companies would just turn on the basic password and access controls included with their software packages, they would eliminate most of their problems.

The second area, Fiolek said, is who is in charge of the system. Because sensitive information is kept on computers, the person in charge of computers should be someone the company can trust with the information first, and someone who knows about computers second.

"It shouldn't be some guy who moved up from the mail room because he has a computer at home," he said.

The third area, Fiolek said, is the importance of backing up information. Again, sensitive files are kept on

computer and duplicates should be made of them in a timely manner.

Access to data is important not only because data can be lost, but also because data can be altered. "We want to make sure people know where their data comes from."

Fiolek said most information kept on computers is probably important, but his clients are most concerned about pricing strategies and cost margins — information that would give opponents a competitive edge.

Other information his clients have stressed an interest in keeping from prying eyes include customer lists; inside information like payroll and inventory; and new technology or product development planning.

FRED SHUBACK, manager of Coopers & Lybrand's Information Technology Computer Security Services,

said although computer viruses have received much of the attention, accidental data erasures and unauthorized access to data are far more common areas for breaches in computer security.

"Viruses are more glamorous, but the bigger issue is the ease in which you can retrieve things from a computer," he said.

Computers are often compared to file cabinets in the way they store information. "Today, the issue is the ease with which you can retrieve things from a computer as opposed to a file cabinet."

Twenty years ago, when businesses kept their files under lock and key in file cabinets, searching for information — be it for innocent or nefarious reasons — was a lot of work.

Today, the same information, much more in fact, is available by punching several keys. Access, Shuback said, is key.

Authorized access is a problem, he said, but not because of corporate espionage. The real problem is not stealing data, but altering data by accident.

"People are curious and may destroy data by accident when poking about the computer," he said. "The way to resolve this is to have a system that allows people to do exactly what they're asked to do, but in an efficient way."

FOR EXAMPLE, if a person's job requires only inputting sales information, there is no reason they should have to call up sales reports.

"So the system would be designed with a menu that has several options — those tasks that the person is not responsible for (doing) wouldn't even be listed."

Shuback said computer security is also not limited to preventing damage.

"We also want to make sure errors are detected," he said. "It's not unheard of for a company to go months without discovering an error."

Since information in computers is used — not just stored — incorrect data can affect decision making. Decisions based on faulty premises can seriously affect the health of a business.

"The cost of reconstructing lost data can be enormous," he said.

Computer security also encompasses tracing mistakes, Shuback said. "When changes are made to files, it is important that the changes can be traced to an individual so any questions can be cleared up later."

Fantasy flights hurt business, prof says

Five years after the Challenger tragedy, NASA fumbles projects like the Hubble space telescope.

General Motors spent more than \$70 billion on new plants and products in the 1980s but continues to lose market share.

The CEO of a small firm confronted with foreign competition wistfully maintains that "maybe something will happen."

The cause: a narcissistic flight from reality that has consumed our nation's organizations. The result: unhappy workers and an ever-declining ability to compete on the world stage.

"It's more of a characteristic of the current state of American culture than the institutions," says Howard Schwartz, Oakland University business professor and author of the recently published book, "Narcissistic Process and Corporate Decay."

Schwartz maintains that society gives organizations the impossible task of recreating the narcissistic state of the child, who is the center of a safe and loving world to relieve the anxieties and uncertainties of adulthood.

SUCH GROUPS comfort us but also trap us.

Symptoms of organizational decay include: commitment to bad decisions, a hostile response to other companies and markets, ritual in place of work, and advancement based on ideology and politics rather than achievement and competence.

The individual unhappiness and lack of fulfillment in many organizations is bad enough, Schwartz said. But companies beset by organizational decay have also contributed to the decline in American global competitiveness.

IT WASN'T always so.

"A hundred years ago, you didn't find these kinds of narcissistic organizations," Schwartz said. "The organizations existed pretty much aware that the outside world was a trial for them."

Schwartz dates our narcissistic culture from 1945 when Americans were buoyed by their World War II successes and new found power and prosperity. It collapsed with the Viet Nam war.

"We were living off of capital and our way of organizing that had served well," Schwartz said. "The whole Viet Nam war was built around the maintenance of an illusion."

And organizations like NASA were pressured into sustaining the national fantasies of grandeur, he said.

"In effect, upon NASA had fallen the burden of maintaining the narcissism of a strikingly and perhaps

increasingly narcissistic American culture," he wrote in his book.

In the process of a flight from reality, NASA changed from the embodiment of individual "right stuff" to a kind of Disneyland in space. He believes all the needed feedback systems were in place to prevent the Challenger tragedy, but upper management didn't listen and didn't believe that NASA's efforts could be flawed.

ONE ANTIDOTE to such narcissism is fear, said Schwartz, using the Japanese as an example.

"One of the essential elements of Japanese culture is the feeling of danger, the feeling of risk. It's due to geography; they live in a country that's on an earthquake fault," Schwartz said.

"And paradoxically, it's the organizations that feel a sense of vulnerability, that better understand their limitations, where this stuff is less likely to take place."

He maintains that flawed organizations only reflect flawed individuals.

"This understanding of reality is deeply repressed. If you bring it up, it's denied; people will get anxious and avoid you," Schwartz said.

He is not optimistic that the lessons of American corporate failure are being learned by today's young people, including his students.

"What I see is a worsening of the situation because these kids are really cynical. They've grown up in an era where the vision of business was all rapaciousness," Schwartz said.

"As far as they're concerned, business knows nothing but exploitation. It comes as no surprise to them. It's really what they expect."

The solution to these organizational problems is as difficult as adulthood, according to Schwartz. People must have the courage to think and act individually, to accept individual fallibility and mortality.

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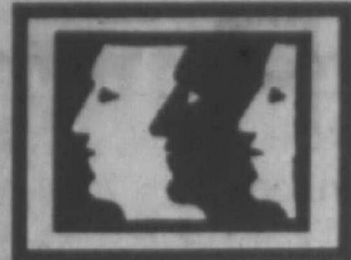

It has been nearly 30 years since the Beatles arrived on U.S. shores, and a good 20 years since the group broke up. Even so, their influence on music remains strong to this day.

Many baby boomers grew up

with the music of the Beatles and learned to play the guitar in part from listening to the Fab Four's songs. Those boomers are among members of the Over 30 Guitar Club.

Club meetings are 7 p.m. the first Monday of each month at the Evola Music Center, 215 W. Ann Arbor Road in Plymouth. The club is designed with adults in mind, although age isn't a major consideration.

"We're not so stringent that we're checking ID at the door," said Russ Tkac, store manager.

The club is for those who are interested in playing the guitar. They could weigh 30 pounds or more or be at least 30 inches tall, he said.

"It's just been doing really well," said Tkac, a Waterford resident. "We've been averaging 25 to 30 a night."

CLUB MEMBERS met last week to listen to the music of guitarist Joe Summers. He specializes in jazz guitar, but also plays a wide range of music.

"I bought a guitar here a while back," Summers said.

He was asked if he'd be interested in playing for the Over 30 Guitar Club.

The club began meeting at the Plymouth store in April. A different musician is featured each month. Club meetings are also at the Evola stores in Utica and

Waterford, with artists appearing on different nights at each location.

"I'M JUST going to play, basically an improvisational thing," Summers said prior to last week's session.

He began playing the guitar at age 12.

"I've been playing for a long time."

Summers, from Ypsilanti, now spends much of his time in Florida.

"I've been trying to relocate down to Florida, but Michigan summers keep drawing me back."

He has played at restaurants and bars in Michigan, Florida and elsewhere.

HE PLAYED for an appreciative audience at Evola Music Center. Club members then asked Summers a variety of questions.

"You've got to be around other musicians and you've got to listen a lot," Summers told members.

He often plays on his own at restaurants, and diners don't necessarily listen to the music.

"Sometimes, people do come in to listen. Then it's a real treat to play for people."

Summers enjoyed playing at the guitar club meeting.

"We have such a diverse range of adults, male and female."

Beginners and more advanced players come to each meeting, Tkac said. There's no charge for participating, although hosting club meetings does help Tkac's business in the long run.

"If you can get somebody in and they find it's enjoyable, they're going to tell their friends," he said.

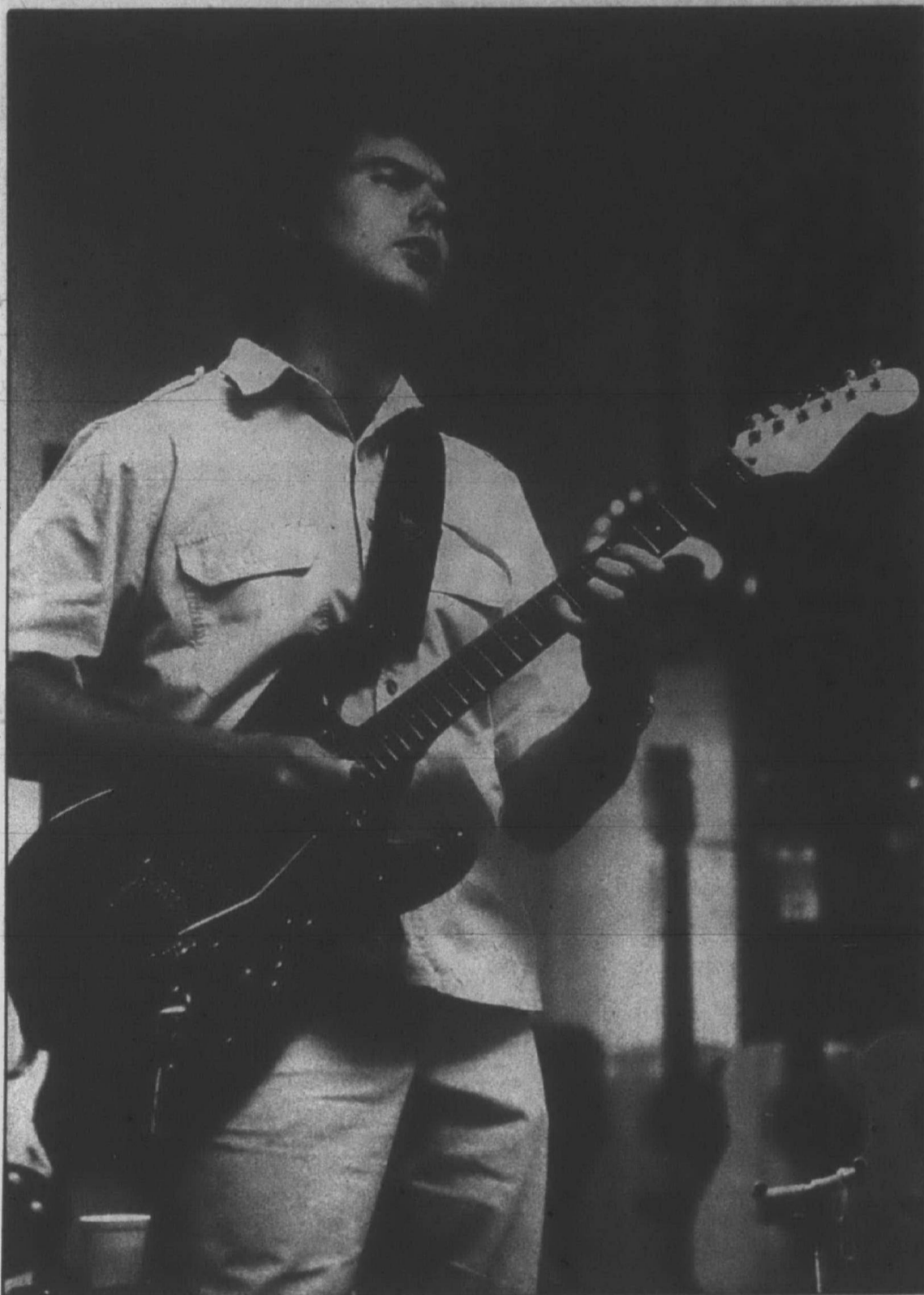
RICHARD CLARK of Livonia and his son, Rich, came to last week's session. They've been to earlier meetings at the Plymouth store.

"No, low-key is not in my vocabulary," she said. "Sometimes, it does need to be a little more toned down." That's true if she's performing for a

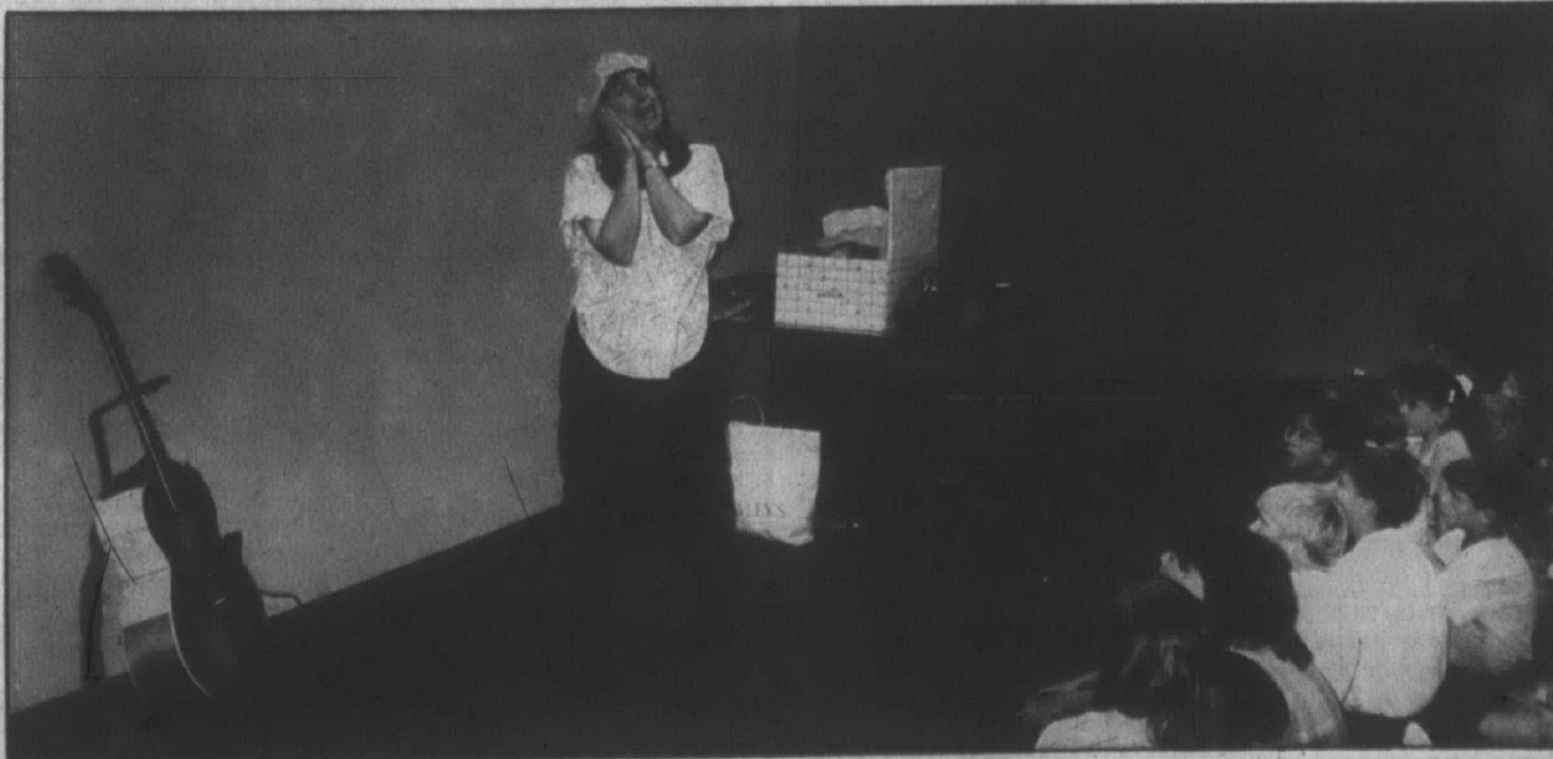
larger audience.

Beacon

Signs send messages of hope

"Broken hearts mended here" proclaimed the sign in front of the Parkway Heights Free Methodist Church in Redford.

The Rev. Donald Stanton, pastor of the church, always has his eye out for a thought-provoking message to put on the church's outdoor sign.

"I think this is one of my favorites," said Stanton, 57, of Redford. "Hopefully, it will catch somebody's eye."

Many churches have signs advertising the pastor's name and times of worship services. The signs announce important events, such as vacation Bible school or a picnic for the congregation.

Some offer congratulations for weddings, anniversaries or births.

BUT A MESSAGE saying "Count your blessings" or "A happy marriage is an earlier heaven" is a low-key outreach.

"I hope it's a ministry," said the Rev. Mark McGilvrey, pastor of Memorial Church of Christ in Livonia.

"I think the key to getting (the messages) read is to change them often," said McGilvrey, 41.

The themes generally are inspira-

tional, rather than doctrinal. They emphasize hope and God's abiding love.

Most messages are short and punchy. Often, humor and plays-on-words are employed.

The Rev. Dr. DuWayne Lee, pastor of Faith Bible Church in Livonia, recalls one of his favorites: "Don't count sheep — talk to the shepherd."

"It's an encouragement to pray," said Lee, 59.

Where do the ideas come from?

Companies which sell the outdoor signs sometimes provide publications containing inspirational messages.

The "Reader's Digest" is a favorite source. Church members make suggestions. Even a blurb on somebody's bulletin board or little messages on tea bag dunkers can provide clever nuggets.

And there is no shortage of books with clever quotations.

Lee especially enjoys a book called "Our Daily Bread." It is chock-full of upbeat one-liners.

The Praise Chapel Church of God in Plymouth sets a weekly theme, tied to the sermon and reflected throughout the worship service.

THE MESSAGES are geared to "meaningful worship," said the Rev.

Brian Tucker, 23, associate pastor.

One of Tucker's recent favorite themes was "Beware of the barrenness of a busy life." It comes from a book called "Ordering Your Private World."

"I think everyone can associate with that (theme)," said Tucker, a Redford resident.

Some churches recruit members of the congregation to come up with message ideas and to maintain the outdoor signs.

At the Church of Christ in Plymouth, all proposed sign messages are screened by a committee for appropriateness and good taste, David Thomas, the pastor, said. Church members maintain and change the sign board.

The church, which has an elevated and highly visible sign, is known to its neighbors as "the church with the sign," Thomas said.

"The main idea is to cause people to think about their life, hopefully in a spiritual sense," Thomas, 42, said of the sign messages.

"When you're in the wrong place, your right place is empty" recently appeared on the Plymouth Church of Christ sign.

CANTON RESIDENT Robert St. John is currently responsible for brainstorming the sign messages at the Lake Pointe Bible Chapel of Plymouth.

St. John, a 20-year member of the church, takes his job seriously.

"What we're trying to achieve is to give encouragement to people who pass by," said St. John, 47, an engineer. "They may be hurting or struggling. Perhaps it will whet somebody's appetite to come and visit."

St. John's favorite message is "The best 4-letter word is love." He likes it because it is short. More to the point, St. John said, is that "love is a very important Christian concept."

Feedback is sporadic. Occasionally, someone will call a church to comment on a message. Thomas has received letters of appreciation.

None of the pastors interviewed have any evidence that the messages have attracted new members. But they expressed satisfaction at providing inspiration or comfort.

Stereotypes based on gender can also hurt men

Men are in trouble. I counseled with a man recently who is facing a divorce. He has isolated himself and he has begun to drink. These are symptoms of more trouble in his life. They may be the cause of even greater problems.

This man is said to be the cause of his family's separation. This is not the whole story. The children blame him. The wife blames him. He is losing his home and his family. He is going to the outermost darkness where he will be pointed to as the cause of this tragedy.

Yes, he caused some of the pain. Others caused some of it as well. Yet he is not going to be forgiven, nor included back into the affection of the family members. Healing seems a long way off, if ever.

I have seen this pattern over and over again. The man leaves and

loses most everything but his job. Yet why should anyone have compassion for a big, grown-up man? We men are tough and should be able to take care of ourselves. Who cares about the hurt that men feel? What is most significant in the eyes of society is the hurt that men do.

A RECENT article suggests that there are other factors at work. It is a kind of prejudice against men. The evidence comes from a study of homeless people in America. Between 64 and 78 percent of all homeless adults are men.

Among single homeless adults, 78 percent are men. This means that with the higher death rate of men compared with women, particularly in this category of persons of poverty and often advanced age, a lot of men are in trouble.

The author of the article on homeless men believes that there is a prejudice against the homeless, helpless man. He is considered worthless. Male losers are "unworthy of help." We can easily identify a woman as a victim. She deserves protection and help. Men in such circumstances do not.

What can be worse in our society than an unemployed man? The answer is an unemployed man who drinks and has left his family. Even

worse than this, cites the author, men in this condition are scary. We imagine that they are not simply worthless, but dangerous to our society.

Such prejudice against men in trouble is multiplied when the person is a minority race. Most if not all have experienced rejection, betrayal and even violence because of their racial heritage.

Will society change? Those who consider themselves religious must

address this problem. Do we believe in a God who has equal forgiveness for men and women? Do we support a means to provide work for men at the bottom of our society?

WOMEN AND children have welfare. Men are supposed to get a job. Over and over again, I have men come to our church and ask for a job. There are no jobs available.

I call upon you to look and see. I call upon you to have compassion for the man who is divorced and alone. We must talk to the man who is without a job and find out what this person experiences.

Religious persons must begin by identifying our prejudices, forgiving ourselves and changing our ways. These things are very diffi-

cult, yet they are at the heart of a faith and commitment to a God that renews and transforms life.

Let's face it. If men are in trouble, we all are in trouble.

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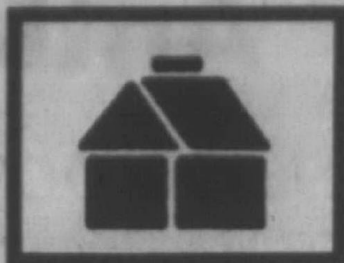

Village road dubbed Joshua Simmons Drive

The family of Joshua Simmons, a Livonia Township pioneer and the area's most prosperous farmer in 1850, applauded the naming of the road winding through Greenmead Historical Village as Joshua Simmons Drive.

The road was christened June 30. About 40 descendants of Simmons came from Northville, Novi, Plymouth, Grand Rapids, Florida, Ohio,

Texas and California for the celebration.

The event marked the 150th anniversary of the Simmons/Hill House, the stately Greek Revival-style house that stands in the northwest section of the village, Eight Mile and Newburgh.

Simmons, a farmer and native of New York, had the house (called Meadow Brooke) built in 1841, his third and most lavish home on the site. Sherwin Hall, a Detroit lawyer, and his wife, Jean, bought the farm-site in 1920, renaming it Greenmead

after her childhood home in Baltimore.

Welcoming the crowd, John Colley, Livonia Historical Commission secretary, said: "This is the 15th year Livonia has owned the Greenmead property, just one-tenth of the time it was owned by the Simmons family."

COLLEY PRAISED the city, historic groups and Friends for the Development of Greenmead for taking on a project as ambitious as Greenmead Historical Village,

which boasts 25 historic buildings in the village and farmsite.

Fourteen have been moved to the village from their original sites in Livonia; seven are restored and open to the public.

"Greenmead's wonderful for the heritage of Livonia and for the children of the community who have a chance to see our history," he said.

Standing near the new street sign, between the old carriage house and the caretaker's house, Marian Lynch, Livonia Historical Society president, said Simmons was just 23 when he

came here from New York to buy 160 acres of wilderness that later became Livonia Township.

In 1877, his home, the centerpiece of the farmsite, was called "the grandest farmhouse in the county."

Fourth and fifth generations of Simmons family members joined Greenmead officials and volunteers, the Livonia Historical Society, the Livonia Historical Commission, city officials and the Friends for the Development of Greenmead as council president Joan McCotter clipped the ribbon opening the village road,

which runs about one-third of a mile from Newburgh Road to Victor Parkway. Many of the same relatives were on hand in 1977 when the Simmons/Hill House museum opened.

WITH THE family of Joshua and Hannah Simmons gathered around, McCotter said, "Greenmead is a treasure to preserve. We thank the Simmons family for sharing their heritage with us. You must feel warmth in your hearts knowing that

Her handmade baskets provide organizing tool

DONNA SQUIRE'S basketry organizes her home, "providing a place for everything, and everything in its place."

Baskets holding kitchen tools, towels and tea bags neatly organize and display needed items on kitchen counters, walls and shelves.

This weekend, you can see Squire's handiwork as well as watch it being made during the 11th annual Art in the Park in Plymouth.

"It's a great way to keep organized," said Squire in an interview at her Livonia home.

Squire began weaving baskets five years ago after taking Livonia

Community Education classes.

"I just always have to be busy," she said. "Making baskets, I have something to show for my 'busyness.'"

From Egypt to China, basket making is an ancient art, thousands of years old. The history of basketry is difficult, if not impossible, to determine because the roots, vines, grasses and fiber materials disintegrate over time.

It is known that basketry preceded pottery as a craft in North and South America.

FOR 9,000 years at least, North American Indians have used their skills to make baskets. American Indians gathered grasses and reeds to construct baskets for storing food, sleeping mats and pitch-coated boats.

Squire's basketry is made of

rattan from Malaysia, China, Thailand and parts of Africa. Rattan comes from various species of palms, which are extremely tough and pliable.

Squire's basket handles are made from hickory and oak.

She uses oil-based stains in different shades of walnut on the majority of handwoven baskets. The rest of the country baskets, she leaves natural.

Squire decorates the baskets with folk art images, ranging from apples to Amish girls. Using

acrylic tole paint, she creates country themes on ash from one-half to three inches wide, interwoven with the rattan.

Interwoven curls, American Indian style, as well as rattan roses decorate other baskets by Squire.

Squire works 40 hours weaving baskets the week before a show, 30 hours weekly otherwise.

"It's a great way to pass time while waiting for the kids at cheer-leading practice or T-ball," she said.

BEFORE SHE begins making a

basket, Squire soaks the rattan until it becomes supple and workable.

"First I get the reed wet, then lay them out," she said.

Squire begins weaving the basket base, then proceeds up the sides.

"I have to keep rewetting the reed constantly," she said.

Once completed, the baskets air dry in about one hour.

Baskets can be used to hold magazines, bread or bills. There are large ribbed baskets for eggs or melons, and miniature

peg baskets to display on a shelf or hang on a peg. And there are covered sewing baskets, pie baskets, garden baskets to hold cut-flowers or tools, and custom baskets to fit any need organize a home or office, keeping it neat.

"For whatever you have to carry out to the patio, baskets are great," Squire said.

Donna Squire's baskets are priced from \$5 to \$80, with an average range from \$10 to \$35.

Plymouth artist Thomas LeGault in booth 155 will demonstrate acrylic painting techniques at faster-than-lightning speed.

LeGault, after practicing painting for 21 years, has been known to complete a traditional landscape bathed in a pink mist in 90 minutes.

"I'm really going to be showing off because this is the first time I'll be doing a home show at Plymouth's Art in the Park," LeGault said. "I actually create

some of my best pieces at the shows."

Families, art, food and entertainment paints a perfect picture of Art in the Park. "I thought, we (Plymouth) had a beautiful setting here in the park for art," Quinn said. "We started out with 30 artists and now there are 280."

Hours for Art in the Park have been extended this year: 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., Saturday and Sunday.

Pioneer a Livonia legend; studio open houses work

ARTSCAPE ANECDOTES:

• Fitting salute — His adventurous spirit was undaunting.

Livonia pioneer Joshua Simmons, whose 19th-century farmstead is now Greenmead Historical Village, was just 25 when he brought his wife, Hannah Macomber, here from Bristol, N.Y.

In search of a better life in 1824, he saved \$225 to buy 160 acres in the wilderness of what became Bucklin and later Livonia Township. He then returned to New York.

He and his new bride made their way to Detroit in 1826 via the steamboat Superior on Lake Erie. By wagon, they arrived at their new homestead 30 miles away on a rainy night — Joshua \$5 short on the amount he owed the teamsters.

Joshua unloaded their belongings and stayed with them. Hannah stayed at a neighbor's home a mile away. In the morning, Joshua fired a gun to let Hannah know he was fine.

That day, Joshua built a three-sided log shanty, thanks to help from neighbors. A small house eventually followed.

In 1841, Joshua commissioned his landmark farmhouse, a Greek Revival-style house that's now a national historic site.

By 1850, his farm, Meadow Brooke, was the most prosperous in Livonia. It stayed in the Simmons family for 91 years. Sherwin and Jean Hill acquired it in 1920 and renamed it Greenmead. The house became a city museum in 1977.

"There's a lot of pride associated with knowing your great-great-

grandfather left a significant mark on an area," says Dick Simmons.

He was one of more than 40 descendants attending the June 30 dedication of the road through Greenmead as Joshua Simmons Drive.

Unwittingly, the living history that his 150-year-old house and surrounding farmstead now provide is Joshua Simmons' richest legacy to the people of Livonia.

• Homestyle art — It's a reveal-

ing sign of the times.

To save time and money and to ease stress, artist Alice Nichols has, for the past six months, hosted monthly open houses in her home studio to show her work.

A traditional watercolorist, Nichols still exhibits in local, state and national shows.

But the 35-year Farmington resident finds her home shows a practical alternative to art gallery commissions averaging 30 percent as well as other costs: crating and shipping, show entry fees, preparing slides for jurying.

The art gallery route is especially tough. "It's hard to even get in the door," she said.

"Artists love to do their creative activity on paper or canvas rather than building shipping crates and

shuffling paintings to and from a show," she told the Observer.

"Having people visit me in my studio allows them to see the whole creative process."

A watercolorist, lecturer and instructor with 30 years of experience, Nichols says marketing her art at home doesn't mean she's all business.

"I want people to come in and browse, and browsing does not mean commitment to buying," said the Farmington Artists Club charter member, who was instrumental in starting the Picture Lady and senior adult painting programs in the mid-'70s.

"I like to talk to people about my work and, of course, I always have the coffee pot on."

Nichols has been part of two coop-

erative galleries. In a co-op, the artists share cost and staff requirements to keep the place humming. Commissions also are much lower. But both galleries closed because of lease problems.

For Alice Nichols, home marketing seems a productive marketing tool.

As she told me: "I've sold a couple paintings. The only real cost is postage. I've had a lot of calls and a lot of lookers who said they'll stop by again. I'm making contacts and updating my mailing list. So I've probably come out ahead in terms of profit."

She'll take the summer off but resume her open houses in the fall.

Gilles Didier, a Paris collector and dealer of antique, original stone lithograph posters, will visit the Linda Hayman Gallery in Farmington Hills Friday-Saturday, July 19-20, with a collection of 500 posters.

The posters, dating from 1880 to 1935, were used to advertise theater, cars, trains, boats, bicycles, food and beverage, toys, clothing and hats.

Didier, who has specialized in antique posters for 15 years, has helped American and Japanese museums as well as private collectors build poster collections.

Current chairman of the Poster Society, Didier participates yearly in "Art Expo" in New York and Los Angeles, the "Poster Show" and "Works on Paper" in New York, and the "Tokyo International Art Show" in Japan.

Toulouse-Lautrec, Jules Cheret, Steinlen, Much, Cassandre, Pal, and Paul Colin are some of the well-known artists who designed the posters.

Cheret, who designed an opening night poster in 1889 for the Moulin Rouge dance hall in Paris, was the first to master the techniques of large-scale color, stone lithograph posters. Two years later, Toulouse-Lautrec designed a poster for a new attraction at the Moulin Rouge, which was to make the dance hall known worldwide.

The posters are available in different sizes, styles such as Art Nouveau or Art Deco period, and themes. The average poster format is 24 inches by 39 inches.

Prices for the posters begin at \$500.

Didier will display and sell the antique, original stone lithograph posters during regular gallery hours. Hours are 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Friday, July 19, and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday, July 20.

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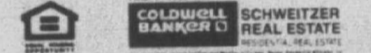

you're sharing something of your past with us."

Dr. Richmond Simmons, of Minneola, Fla., is a great-great-grandson of Simmons and the family historian. Formerly of Novi, Simmons has 300 living relatives of Joshua and Hannah Simmons and is responsible for rounding up family members for the dedication.

"I always visit Greenmead when I return to Michigan," he said. "It's an impressive place to see and it's great that the city and local groups continue to find money to keep it up. Families don't stay in regions for generations anymore, so I feel some permanence to visit Greenmead."

Another great-great-grandson, Robert Kirk Simmons, of Mentor, Ohio, came to the dedication with two grown sons. Originally from

Novi, Simmons said naming the road after Joshua Simmons is a deserving testimonial.

"It's hard to find a place like Greenmead anywhere in the country. There's a warm feeling knowing that something physical from the past is here, not a plaque, but something functional," he said.

Simmons' great-great-granddaughter, Evelyn Weinburger of Houston, remembers visiting Greenmead seven years ago after

the village was closed.

"When a volunteer heard we were from the Simmons family, she stayed just to give us the complete tour," she said. "This is a beautiful place. I look around the village now and wonder how genteel life must have been years ago."

SUE DANIEL, president of the Livonia Historical Commission, Greenmead's overseer, is pleased with the dedication, just one of the projects the commission has on its 1991 agenda to honor the Simmons/

Hill House sesquicentennial.

"Something in the park needed to have the Simmons name," she said.

With the street sign now in place, Daniel said the commission is working on a historic marker for the house, which will be paid for by the Friends for the Development of Greenmead.

Other plans include buying a frame for an oil painting of Hannah Simmons, planting a maple or walnut tree near the house, printing a brochure about the house or the farm complex and repainting the 1841 date on the peak of the house.

"Greenmead is a major accomplishment," Daniel said. "I look at it as a place to show children what our community was like. When children visit Greenmead, they understand and see that what they have now hasn't always been here."

Novi Township native Dick Simmons is a great-great-grandson of Livonia pioneer Joshua Simmons, whose farmstead has become Greenmead Historical Village. The road through Greenmead is now Joshua Simmons Drive.

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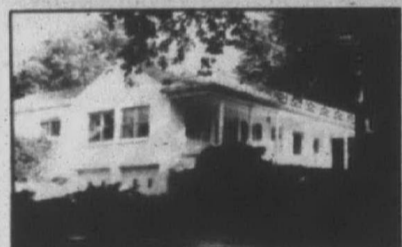
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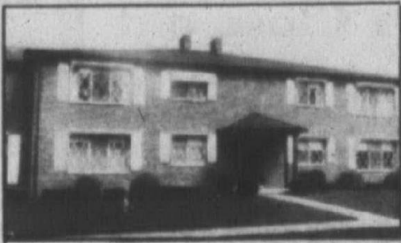
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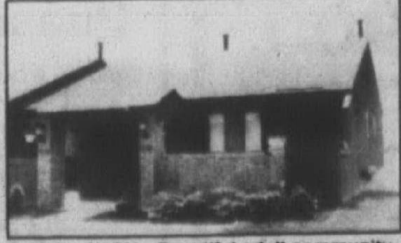

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New festival gardens fulfill 12-year dream

Thank goodness, Mary Bonnell persevered. More than 12 years ago, Bonnell, costume designer and later artist relations manager for Oakland University's Meadow Brook Theatre, began to talk about gardens on the festival grounds.

"So many artists would come and say, 'What a beautiful place you have here.' Pat Boone loved to jog along the trails with a limousine following him, and Kris Kristofferson liked to walk in the woods. . . . When the big sculptures were put up, that was a dandy idea, but what about natural art, I said."

Well, she kept refining her idea, then inspired by the way florists donate displays for Christmas at Meadow Brook Hall, she drew up a new plan. And this time it worked.

With the approval of Stuart Hyke, director of cultural affairs, and the folks at the university, she pounded the pavement and made calls earlier this spring.

And the result? She found 34 firms willing to give time, talent and materials to turn the east side of the festival grounds into one of the loveliest garden spots in the metropolitan area.

A DOZEN firms have built or are in the midst of building individual gardens along 1,500 feet of walkway (donated). A new gazebo with a shake roof in a circular brick courtyard makes a dramatic focal point for the gardens, which randomly follow the pathway from the front entrance at the top of the hill down and around the back of the hill to the south parking lot.

Bonnell, who's been on the site ever since the activity started in early May, said, "I'm just thrilled. It has exceeded my expectations. . . . I thought they might be using leftover or excess material, but they sure didn't skimp on the plant material."

She strolled along the newly paved walkway pointing out specimen trees and shrubs and noting items of special interest — the attractive design of the Weigand's Nursery (Utica) annual and perennial gardens just inside the front gate; and the pergola about to receive its second coat of paint just across the walk in the garden by Goldner Walsh of Pontiac already looking settled in, with roses, annuals and a tall beech tree.

As she started down the walkway toward the gazebo, she spoke of the size and maturity of the three blue

spruce at the back of the triangle garden by Harding Landscape of Oxford, the graceful line of the weeping beech in the quiet serenity of the garden by Eaton Nursery of West Bloomfield; the lovely walk of Michigan grindstones in the garden created by Rogers Garden Center of Keego Harbor, and the bubbling fountain pool, which follows the curve of the hill by Juett Associates of Farmington Hills.

BORDINE'S BETTER Blooms of Rochester Hills had a surprise in store. Instead of one garden, they

elected to put in a group of circular gardens by the gazebo, each with a different kind of topiary in the center.

Other gardens are by Superior Scape of Washington, English Gardens of West Bloomfield, Alexander Nursery of Mt. Clemens, Gree Gardens Nursery of Oakland Township, Kmart and the Meadow Brook Festival staff; a recycling waterfall, a garden pool and the intricately paved walkways in several of the gardens, she said.

All of the firms putting in gardens have agreed to come back each year

and replant, she said, "as long as they keep their name on the plot."

Bonnell said she also hopes that some list of the plantings can be available at each garden.

THE HANDSOME garden benches around the gazebo and in the gardens were made by the Meadow Brook Theatre scene shop when the cost of commercial ones was prohibitive. Twelve are completed, 10 more and under way. They are sturdy, stylish and each seats at least four people.

Miraculously, all of this work — trees, shrubs, flowers planted, fountains and garden pools, electrical wiring, outdoor lights and irrigation system installed, rocks, boulders and Michigan grindstones moved into place, garden structures built — all this and more is being done and donated during the busiest few weeks of the year by all of these companies.

All who promised have come through in fine style. The gardens

(and there's plenty of space for more) add several more dimensions to the summer activity. An art show is on the slate, so are parties and pre-concert entertainment.

The possibilities are endless. Nobody knows that better than Mary Bonnell, she's been working on the idea for more than a decade.

Next? A Meadow Brook Gardens Auxiliary and people willing to help love 'em and weed 'em.

Hometown slides wanted for show

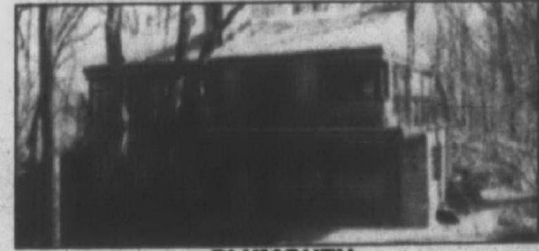
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Awash with color

Belle Isle gardens are a bloomin'

The gardens are blooming on Belle Isle — that special, unusual island in Detroit. The conservatory, with its spectacular displays, is visited by many people through the year, but I wonder how many are aware of the beautiful gardens on the east side of that dome?

Many of the gardens are planted and maintained by city employees. The resulting avenues of floral displays are a treat for weary eyes. A well-kept hedge outlines the areas with large expanses of grass for leisurely strolling separating the gardens.

The north section of this area is devoted to roses. One side boasts heritage roses (all species before 1867), which are planted in honor or in memory of a special person. A record is kept to assure that all is in order and that only heritage roses are used.

Across the expanse of grass, a modern rose bed of hybrid teas, floribundas and others (no minis) is carefully tended. These rose gardens, begun in 1989, are under the direction of rosarian Victoria Zamojska-Lang of Warren. She is a member of the Belle Isle Botanical Society, a dedicated group of several hundred volunteers who work diligently to keep this garden and the perennial and annual beds in good shape.

The Belle Isle Botanical Society was begun in 1988 with the encouragement of Joe Stanton of Indian Village.

THE LATEST project, a huge undertaking, is to restore the large lily pond between the conservatory and the aquarium. Much overgrown foliage and plants have been removed and pruned. Care has been taken to save as many original plants as possible, while new ones, as well as annuals have been planted. Azaleas, rhododendrons, hostas,

snake bush, four Sargent crabs and a tri-color maple can be seen, as well as many begonias, which add color and interest.

The cement used in the pond cracked, so repairs need to be done before water is put in and fish and water plants are introduced.

The society's goal is to keep the beauty of Belle Isle alive, serve as docents in the conservatory and work in the gardens.

It was my pleasure to speak to this group in February. The meeting was held in the nature center on the island, a wonderful place to learn and observe. I highly recommend a jaunt to this spot. Take a stroll along the river, enjoy the fountain, the zoo, the conservatory and the gardens. A picnic would be in order. You may want to try a bit of fishing off the piers or from the river bank.

One other observation: notice the lovely iron fence around the gardens. It was erected in memory of the famous architect Leonard B. Wilke by his wife, Leona.

You can join the Belle Isle Botanical Society, a non-profit group. Write to P.O. Box 14693, Detroit, 48214 for information. There are several classes of membership.

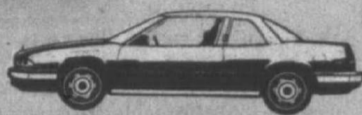

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Mayfair market still strong after all these years

Mayfair Realty, opened in Detroit's Rosedale Park in 1955 by nine employees of an existing firm unhappy with the way things were going, has prospered in the suburbs for nearly three decades.

One of those young moneymen, Bill Willis, a Farmington Hills resident, remains active in the business today.

"We saw a chance to take a more aggressive position in marketing," recalled Willis, 59, now vice president. "Five of us at that time pooled our money. It wasn't very profitable for the first two years. We had to put

money back in the business to make it work."

They took the name of the adjacent subdivision — Mayfair Park — as the name of the firm and endured. "People with us were the top producers in the business," Willis said.

The firm followed the Detroit migration west with subsequent moves to Redford in the early 1960s and to Livonia a decade later.

Those two communities still are targeted by the firm due to their affordability and reputation of schools.

MAYFAIR CONTINUES to sell in Detroit and has branched out into new houses priced at several hundred thousand dollars in Oakland

County.

But the affordable suburban resale market — with houses available in a variety of price ranges including starter homes — is the firm's bread and butter.

Last year, the office team of 28 sold more than 400 houses for an aggregate of \$33.3 million, Willis said.

"We've been following the market out," he said. "The biggest thing that started the exodus (from Detroit) was busing, and I was here with the houses. We deal in more affordable housing for the average person."

Willis, whose father, Bill, was in the business, and whose son, Jim, also is associated with the firm, has

no plans to slow down.

The attractions? "IT'S A BETTER income you can make working for someone else and being your own boss," he said.

Willis ticked off several changes he's seen in the business over the years. Buyers and sellers are more consumer-oriented. Closing costs are much higher now due to soaring taxes and the concept of points attached to mortgages. More women are working as sales agents.

"I think what's changed the most is training programs through the Multi-List Service that weren't available when I got started," he

said. "I learned by hard knocks. Now, they learn through books."

"With the computer," said son, Jim, "if you have a buyer who knows what he wants, you can put the parameters in and pull them right out."

But Bill Willis laughingly admitted to avoiding computers. "Everything's photographic memory," he said.

WILLIS OFFERED his thoughts on a couple of other topics:

● On the secret to his success: "You have to be very honest and be very aggressive. Today, you have to do what the competition isn't doing, go the extra mile. In service, there's

a big difference in saying and doing."

He told the story about telling a telephone inquirer that he would mail some information, then surprising by hand-delivering later that day.

● On home buyers today: "People buying a house used to work their way up to the (dream) house. Kids today tend to want to start where their parents left off. Kids stretch themselves to the limit today."

But if young buyers seem to be greedy, they do have an advantage their parents didn't. "Financing is much more flexible now," Willis said.

No deal better than a bad deal

I have an offer to purchase, but it doesn't provide a date for the purchaser to get a mortgage. It indicates the offer will stay open as long as he has made reasonable efforts to obtain a mortgage. I am desperate to sell but am wondering about the propriety of such a provision. What do you suggest?

Sometimes no deal is better than a bad deal. I have seen situations where such one-sided provisions give the purchaser an unlimited amount of time to obtain financing and many times the purchaser does not even make a good faith effort to obtain financing. But if such a provision is in the purchase agreement, the agreement can be open for months' short of the seller going to court to get a declaratory pronouncement on the terms and conditions of the



agreement. Do not sign such an agreement that does not allow you a clear escape clause in the event that the purchaser does not obtain financing at a stipulated rate for a stipulated sum within a certain period of time. In this case, let the seller beware.

I am the secretary of our association and we are in the middle of a major battle with the developer including litigation. The developer is attempting to divide the members of

the association through what we consider to be dirty tricks. Letters have been sent to members the association by so-called "interested citizens" of the condominium attacking members of the board and their legal counsel. What can we do to stem the tide of the developer under these circumstances?

First you must try to confirm to the extent possible that the developer or its agents are responsible for the "dirty tricks." Depending on the nature of them, have your attorney determine whether they are in violation of any ethical or legal rules regarding the incidents of litigation. Also, keep your members apprised of the fact that this is a common tactic on the part of some developers who are engaged in litigation.

To the extent that any slanderous

or defamatory statements have been made against any members of the board or its legal counsel, you should examine remedies available to the association, including additional claims against the developer or persons in concert with the developer.

May sales rise again

May marked the fourth straight month of increases in area house and condo sales over 1990, according to Metro MLS, the multiple listing service.

MLS members sold 1,566 units, 1,446 single-family homes and 120 condominiums, representing a 13.8 percent jump over last May.

Year-to-date totals are up 6.6 percent over last year. Metro MLS covers a 1,600-square-mile area in northwest Detroit, western Wayne and Oakland counties.

"The home market here began to tail off rather sharply in the last quarter of 1990 but started a significant turnaround in February," said Allen C. King, Metro MLS

president. "We knew that a lot of potential buyers were being delayed during that period as consumers waited to gauge the effects of the business downturn."

House listings are 13 percent ahead of a year ago. The median price of houses and condos sold in May was \$86,950, 6.5 percent higher than a year ago. The year-to-date median is \$84,000, up 5.1 percent.

"Homes priced above \$100,000 now account for nearly 40 percent of our sales," King said. "But one in four homes still go for under \$60,000, so that we can generally find affordable properties to match most income levels."

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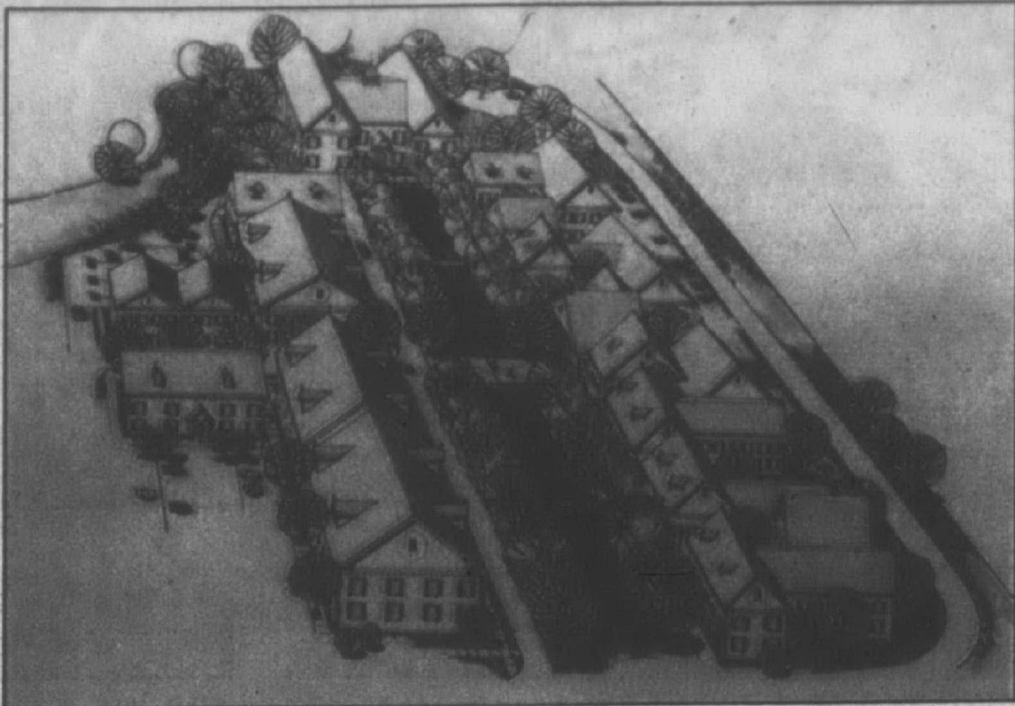

Traditional values resurface in town planning schemes

If you're driving along a major mile road and someone has removed the "Welcome to — City" signs, how would you know when you're leaving one community and entering another?

Modern planning has accomplished positive things, but it has not been a total success. Many of the communities that have been built since the end of World War II — and in some cases in the last two decades — lack a focal point.

Ironically, many towns with a focal point — areas like downtown Birmingham, Rochester, Plymouth, Farmington and those further out like Clarkston and Milford — could not be built today.

Planners have forgotten the fundamentals that formed them, according to Robert Gibbs, president of Gibbs Planning Group of Bloomfield Hills. Curiously, those very same things that make small towns and villages so charming are also shunned in conventional planning wisdom, Gibbs said.

Small lots, street trees, sidewalks, walking to the corner store, knowing your neighbors, sitting on the front porch, kids playing on the front lawn, commons, town squares, and parks don't translate well to "sidewalkless" suburbs with homes on half-acre lots.

"That may be changing," he said.

NEO-TRADITIONAL planning — some call it village or town building — takes lessons learned from old villages and the principles learned in retail development and combines them into projects that take mixed-use developments to their next evolution.

"What makes a neo-traditional project work is the relationship between the various aspects of the project," Gibbs said. "You have to understand the dynamics — you have to make it work."

In a neo-traditional development, people living in the project are more likely to walk to the store, he said. Why? Because the project is designed in such a way as to make walking comfortable and driving seem absurd.

That means there has to be a community identity and continuity — similar materials and architectural themes run throughout the project's commercial, residential and special uses, Gibbs said.

Site lines are established with street trees and roads to draw the eye to focal points like parks; pedestrian links — remember sidewalks? — bind homes and retail areas.

But how the elements are used is less important than how they relate, Gibbs said. "People get hung up on the details — they think if they have cute benches and light poles that it's neo-traditional — it's not."

Builders scale back for fall Homearama

Homearama Fall 1991, less elitist, but no less stunning.

Homearama — the term coined by builders 10 those many years ago, still conjures images of area builders strutting their stuff and building fantastic mansions.

But not this fall. This fall, we'll see a kinder, moderate Homearama.

With between 15 and 20 builders this year, the Homearama planned for southeast Novi will have more than twice the homes of last year, but the real emphasis is on price.

While the term "affordable" may be too loose, for the first time Homearama homes will start below \$200,000 and climb to around the \$250,000 range — a price builders believe will take the annual showcase of homes out of the realm of the wealthy and put them back within the reach of move-up buyers.

The last Homearama to feature homes under \$200,000 was in Livonia more than five years ago.

Herb Lawson, the developer of the Homearama site and president of Herb Lawson Inc. of West Bloomfield, said he did considerable marketing to determine what type, size, and price range homes would sell in Novi.

IN SOME HOMEARAMAS, the idea was to build showcase homes, he said. The problem was those homes have a limited market.

Homes in this year's Homearama will fit the market that already exists. "And we apparently did our job, because several are already pre-sold," he said.

Homes will range from \$190,000 to \$250,000 in price and 1,800 to 2,500 square feet in size. "I'm sure people will add to the homes — and we as developers want to be flexible."

"It's going to be exciting this year because it is more in line with reality," Lawson said. "We didn't want to get into a situation where we had a bunch of \$400,000-and-up homes and no one to buy them."

James Bonadeo, president of Builders Association of Southeastern Michigan, said the theory behind Homearamas has always been to dazzle people with spectacular homes, but that created a problem — most people who came to the Homearamas would be hard pressed to ever afford such a home.

People would use them to generate decoration and remodeling ideas, but few Homearama visitors were house hunting, Bonadeo said.

"I was even getting calls from people asking why we don't build houses more people could afford."

The same comments were often registered by visitors at the annual home show.

BUILDERS ASSOCIATION members have been toying with the idea of a more moderate showcase for several years, Bonadeo said, and the overwhelming support from visitors finally convinced them.

Visitors to Homearamas in recent years have numbered as high as 100,000.

Homearamas with less expensive homes pose a number of challenges for builders, Bonadeo said. First, since they have come to represent grandeur, builders must work to get more out of less.

"It's like small autos — you can have small cars but still get all the goodies," he said. Special architectural flourishes like high ceilings and round windows normally found in more expensive homes will be moved into the lower priced range.

Interiors will also be different from what people would expect in a \$200,000 home. Kitchens, bathrooms and bedrooms will include many of the extras — albeit on a smaller scale — of previous Homearama homes.

"It's sure to be more of a challenge to builders," Bonadeo said.

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Density problems foil 'traditional' planning

A true neo-traditional project would even have flats or apartments above the commercial shops, re-integrate schools into the community, and have public gathering spaces at parks or intersections, he said.

PERHAPS THE most important aspect is scale, he said. The typical retail strip wouldn't fit in the middle of a residential development.

Russell Lewis, associate planner in the Oakland County planning department, said to his knowledge, there are no neo-traditional developments in southeastern Michigan, but he believes that will change in the next decade.

Developers have already scored big with these "neo-traditional town" developments in New England and Florida, but neo-traditional projects are slow in coming to the Midwest, he said.

The evolution of modern municipal zoning has made neo-traditional planning unworkable, Lewis said.

Larger lots because of setbacks, wider roads, wetlands and woodlands preservation and other restrictions preclude neo-traditional development, he said.

Planning must be re-evaluated, if not reinvented, he said. "Current planners are not familiar with what goes into the traditional planning process."

Traditional planning creates communities and projects with a focal point; modern planning creates buffer zones, Lewis said.

BY EXAMPLE, Lewis said an acquaintance told him a story about a visitor to this country who upon being asked what they thought of the United States responded, "There's no there, here."

When municipal planners are planning for development, they are looking at things that can be controlled by ordinance, but they are

forgetting a very important aspect of planning — design, he said.

Planning is not master plans, ordinances and zone — it's design, function and scale, Lewis said.

"We're not building places, we're building projects," he said.

The main objection to neo-traditional planning seems to be the higher density of the projects, Lewis said. "It doesn't have to be that way."

Marketing says neo-traditional planning will work, planners think it will work and developers think it will work, but municipal planners — once they see high density — are opposed to it, he said.

Planners aren't the only ones who have to change; if neo-traditional planning is to take off, developers must rethink the way they do things, Gibbs said.

INSTEAD OF taking a parcel of land and building a tract of homes, a section of residential, and a group of office buildings — as is commonly done in mixed-use projects and planned unit developments — neo-traditional projects build communities, he said.

Current mixed use developments use different aspects for separate functions, Lewis said. A commercial strip center, for example, will act as a buffer between a residential development and a major road.

"If someone (in the residential section) wants to go to the store, he'll hop in his car and drive there," he said.

Chuck Leman, president of the community planning consulting firm Vilican-Leman Associates in Southfield, said cities and projects have adapted some aspects for use in southeast Michigan. But in its purest form, there haven't been any neo-traditional projects.

"I like a lot of what they're doing," he said, "but what's going to be the impact?"

"We need this type of thing to jar

us loose," Leman said. New ideas and new planning strategies are always good, but whether they can be used without modification is another matter.

"ALL OF THESE (neo-traditional planned) communities are small," he stressed. "It may be, the principles can't work on a larger scale."

"If you had 36 square miles, it wouldn't work," Leman said although there is a growing interest in neo-traditional planning throughout the country, he isn't certain it will be a great factor in planning, Leman said.

"It may be this is just another Twigg," he said, referring to the ultra-thin 1960's model whose meteoric rise to stardom was coupled with an equally meteoric fall.

Neo-traditional planning, with its emphasis on pedestrian scale, may not sell well in southeastern Michigan where the automobile is such an intrinsic part of life, he said.

Nevertheless, some neo-traditional planning ideas have been incorporated into current thought, Leman said. "I think we'll see more of that in the future."

"Look at Farmington Hills," he said. "Every residential development abuts open space."

Funneling traffic to secondary roads, establishing pedestrian walkways, and other things that make a community feel more comfortable may be all that can be done, he said.

"Somewhere along the way, someone is going to run with the idea and I'll be glad to see it happen," Leman said. "It will be a battle (to get a project through), but I think we can learn from it."

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Construction hampered by concrete hauler strike

A new building for service operations at Livonia Chrysler Plymouth remains partially finished and idle for want of a concrete floor.

Holtzman & Silverman, a building company based in Farmington Hills, is ready to start 14 houses in one of its developments. But the inability to get curbs poured has stalled the project.

And if you're waiting for a new driveway or concrete work around your house, well, you know the frustration.

A monthlong strike of concrete transit drivers in Wayne and parts of Oakland County has had an impact on the local construction scene.

"It's having a great effect," said James Bonadeo, president of the Builders Association of Southeastern Michigan. "They (drivers) deliver the concrete. We can't get any concrete, so we can't put in any basements. Without a basement, you can't build a house."

TEAMSTERS LOCAL 247, representing some 600 drivers in negotiations with an association of 27 concrete suppliers, is asking for a raise of \$1.60 per hour over three years plus pension and health improvements.

Drivers now make nearly \$16 per hour, said Ben Mosqueda, business agent for the Teamsters.

Different Teamsters locals represent different areas. Local 247 generally covers all of Wayne and Washtenaw counties and pockets of Oakland County.

Builders working in some areas of Oakland where agreement has been reached with other Teamster locals or builders supplied by the handful of concrete independents with which Local 247 has settled are less affected.

It's all a function of where builders happen to be building.

Builders can get their concrete from any supplier. But concrete won't set properly if trucked longer distances. And with demand exceeding supply now, some builders get stuck.

Builders like Stephen Taglione, president of the B.B.C. Group of Farmington Hills.

"We have nine locations around town, and it's hurting two or three badly," Taglione said. "If you don't get foundations started, you're stopped before you start."

Some two dozen potential houses currently are on hold, he said.

"Every site under construction has been touched by it (strike), some more adversely than others," said Gary Cooper,

executive vice president for Holtzman & Silverman.

Some subcontractors in Oakland are paying premiums to get concrete in a timely fashion even when it is available, Cooper added.

THAT COULD result in pass-ons and higher prices for buyers.

Cooper also touched on another concern — buyers canceling orders — should the strike become lengthy.

"I would hate to see a labor problem affecting houses already sold," he said.

Holtzman & Silverman projects now on hold due to the strike include 14 houses in a subdivision in Ypsilanti stalled by curbs and another half dozen houses awaiting foundations and basements scattered throughout Oakland County.

Bonadeo, a Plymouth builder, said the strike has stalled about three of his houses.

Abe Ran, a vice president for Biltmore Properties in Troy and Byrnie Benson, president of a building company in Waterford, both said that they haven't been impacted by the strike yet.

Benson, who specializes in houses priced at less than \$100,000, added that he will be affected if concrete still isn't available by mid-August.

SOME BUILDERS like Bonadeo said they've noticed a trickle-down effect to other building trades.

"We get all kinds of calls from carpenters we've never heard of looking for work," he said.

Residential builders aren't the only ones affected by the strike.

Livonia Chrysler Plymouth was in the middle of replacing two older service buildings with one modern structure.

"It stopped everything," said Gary Marl, general manager of the dealership. "The shell is all done and half the floor is in."

To compensate, the dealership has moved service operations to the body shop and extended hours. Marl figures that the strike will cost the dealership \$10,000 per month in overtime, temporary phone lines, extra security and other internal adjustments.

"It's very disorganized," Marl stated. "I said thank goodness it isn't winter."

Mosqueda said just before the July 4th holiday that he expected the strike could last a couple more weeks.

"Summer's getting shorter," he said. "I think this is the time to be doing this when the weather is in your favor."

Concrete can be poured year-round, but a premium is charged when additives are included during winter months.

Carpenter ants: more harmful than termites

Mention termites and most homeowners hit the panic button. But another wood-destroying insect may have an even greater economic impact — the carpenter ant.

Carpenter ants are the largest house-infesting ants in the United States. Contrary to popular belief, carpenter ants do not eat wood. But they do have a habit of building nests in wood, particularly in structural wood, which can cause problems for homeowners.

Their size, as long as ¼ of an inch, is the most obvious physical feature of carpenter ants. Carpenter ants are usually black with heart-shaped heads.

Ant control can be difficult. But with a little knowledge of the ants' lifestyle and habits, serious problems can often be prevented.

Locating the carpenter ant nest is the first step. Often, you can do this as well as, or better than, a professional pest control operator.

You are most familiar with your house and its construction and are likely to know if there are areas where there may be plumbing leaks or other wet spots. Damp or wet wood is a likely site for carpenter ant nests.

Inside a hollow-core door is yet another common nest site for this pest.

LOOK FOR sawdust-like bits of wood, which the ant workers push out while building the nest. Another telltale sign — dead ants caught in spiders' webs.

Carpenter ants are most active between 8 p.m. and 4 a.m. Occasionally, a faint, rustling noise can be heard behind a wall as workers move around.

Timing search efforts during these hours may make your task easier.

Once the ant nest is found, it can be treated with an insecticide labeled for carpenter ant control. A dust formulation is preferred, especially in areas where a liquid spray could damage electrical wiring.

If ants are found a week or so after treatment, there is probably more than one nest. A pest control expert may be needed if ants persist.

Certain high-risk areas such as wooded suburbs and heavily forested lots where few trees have been removed may require additional precautions. Since carpenter ants are often already in these areas, they can readily invade houses being built there.

Before building a house in a wooded area, get an inspection by an entomologist or other qualified personnel. The inspector can evaluate possible problem areas. He or she likely will recommend removal of tree stumps, as well as any trees that contain large carpenter ant colonies.

REMOVE OR TREAT trees containing holes or ones that are beginning to show signs of decay.

Avoid house designs with flat roofs because they are prone to drainage problems. Walls and roofs should be free of vines, tree branches and other vegetation.

When designing a new house, stay away from decorative bark mulch, as it is a prime source of carpenter ant colonies. Instead, choose a non-organic mulch, such as stone or marble chips.

Examine firewood logs before purchasing and discard any infested ones. Store firewood off the ground and well away from the house.

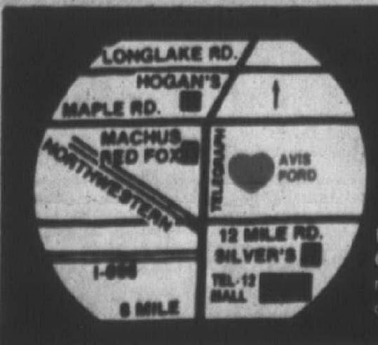
