### Recycling record

In June, a record 55 percent of the city's trash was recycled or composted, said Joseph Russell, city solid waste coordinator.

"This significant diversion from the landfill resulted in a savings of \$7,257," Russell said.

Recycling and composting is encouraged by the bag-tag system, in which residents pay \$1 for each bag of trash set out for collection.

# Church, neighbors reach uneasy truce

A truce has been called by Our Lady of Good Counsel, the city of Plymouth, and area residents who oppose the church's proposed expansion. The parish's church, rectory, gym, school and office building are on or just off Penniman in a residen-

Neighbors and OLGC have been at odds since January, when the city planning commission granted siteplan approval for the two-story, 23,000-square foot addition.

Residents of the William A. Blunk

homeowners' association hired an attorney and took the church to court, claiming the expansion would violate parking, lot coverage and building height ordinances.

Wayne County Circuit Judge Richard Kaufman granted the association a preliminary injunction barring construction of the addition, which church officials say is badly needed to house banquet facilities, offices

pected to be signed by all three parties, the church's site plan would be voided. The parties would also meet twice within 60 days of the entry of the consent agreement to review rough sketches of the addition.

The first meeting would be sched-uled 21 days after the availability of

the site plan, said the residents' attorney, Carol Levitte.

"AS HOMEOWNERS, we wanted to be certain that OLGC gave some indication of what they were going to do," said Levitte. "No one has veto power, this is an informal get together where neighborhood con-cerns will be provided to OLGC and perhaps implemented. Hopefully, it will narrow the issues that need to be presented to the planning com-

missioners when they get a site plan "The homeowners are correct; legally, site plan approval was not proper," she added. "It does not comply with several zoning ordinances. The homeowners shouldn't have had to go to court."

Levitte is optimistic a compro mise can be reached. "I think this whole thing will settle out and will be done in a real nice way so that the whole community will benefit."

## 'Mourning' painting source of art dispute

Artist Judy Gibbs has participated in Plymouth's annual Art in the Park for 10 years. This year, she decided to include a painting she had done that shows Kuwaiti women in mourning.


"It was a painting I was very proud of, because it really brought out something from within," said Gibbs, a Livonia resident and self-

"When you look at it, you're going to see death and a lot of emotion. It just brought out the misery and the anguish that is involved with war. I wanted to show the agony of war and who suffers."

GIBBS IS upset about an incident at this year's Art in the Park, which took place July 13-14 in Plymouth's Kellogg Park. That weekend, she was approached by two show officials who were concerned about her placement of the "Mourning Moslems" painting.

The two politely suggested that Gibbs remove the painting or at least put it in a less prominent spot in her booth, she said.

NEIGHBORS SAY they're not solvinced the church won't attempt an end-run to get an expansion approved. The initial plan would have connected the existing rectory and church fronting Penniman to the school and gym. A narrow parking lot separates the school and gym from the rectory and church.

At a homeowners association meeting Aug. 5, residents said they're prepared to spend whatever legal fees are necessary to ensure city ordinances are followed.

Residents say the parish already is overbuilt and has inadequate parking. Masses and parish activities generate heavy traffic, creating a safety hazard as well as a headache for motorists trying to drive and park in their neighborhood. The 2,400-family parish has parking for 350. On Sundays, roughly 75 chur-chgoers park on surrounding streets.

Expanding the facility would serve only to worsen the problems,

Jim Burnstein lives on Church Street next door to the convent, a facility now used for parish offices, classes and parking. Burnstein says his problems with OLGC began the day he and his family moved in in 1977, when the moving van couldn't pull into the driveway because it was blocked by the car of a church main-

"I don't think any of us thinks this will be the end of it. We don't know what's going to happen, but we anticipate they're going to go forward with something," said Burnstein. "We want them to have more classrooms and a hot-lunch cafeteria. We just don't see how they can do it

To expand, OLGC either will need variances from the city or be forced to demolish part of the existing structure, because parish buildings already occupy more than the allotted 30 percent of the land area, said Paul Tantalo, an architect who lives

unless I took the painting down."

That wasn't the case, Miller said. "It was the placement at that par-ticular time" of the painting.

ABOUT 285 artists from throughout the United States and Canada participated in this year's show. Quinn, who has been involved with the show as its founder since the beginning, wasn't directly involved in the situation with Gibbs.

"I saw the painting. I wasn't dealing with it," said Quinn, a Plymouth resident and calligrapher. "I was too busy. I've never really talked to her, but I did remember the painting.

"I heard about it later. So many people talked to me about so many things, it's kind of hard to remem-

She has received a number of positive letters and calls about the show from visitors and artists, Quinn said. Artists who offer their work for sale have to expect some comments,

she said. "That happens in any show. People will comment while the artist is sitting there."

"Yet my painting was causing too much stress evidently for people coming to the show. Their idea was to come to the fair to be happy."






### School farmhouse set for demolition

Sometime in the next few weeks, Plymouth-Canton Community Schools' farmhouse, silo and milkhouse will go the way of the

\$9,265 bid Aug. 5 to Sterling Image Construction for demolition of the sildings at Centennial Educational Park. The work is expected to be ne in the next few weeks.

The structures have deteriorated "to the point that they've become safety hazards," said Dennis Thompson, the schools' supervisor of main-

tenance and operations.

"Security at CEP has caught on a number of occasions students in the farmhouse, vandalizing it, destroy-ing equipment that has been stored there, and starting open fires," said

Removing the structures will eliminate any liability to the school district, he added.

The barn at the school farm is in good shape and is being used for

Superintendent John Hoben agreed with Thompson's recommen-

"It's my understanding the farm-ouse was about ready to fall down internally. It was of no utilitarian use to us," he said. "The feeling is that it's an unattractive nuise Same way with the milk shed, and the silo is beginning to crumble." Word of the farm's imminent

demise came as sad news to retired Plymouth Salem High School principal Bill Brown, who oversaw the K-12 agricultural program in operation

at CEP up until several years ago.
"Our superintendent at that time,
James Rossman, had a strong feeling about the school farm. He believed very strongly in the fact that schools need to — for better or worse - focus, or at least maintain interest, in a school farm," said Brown, who became principal in 1969 and retired in 1986.

"He felt many of the suburban kids were deprived of that experience and exposure."

MODULAR SCHEDULING, formerly in place at CEP, enabled students interested in agrarian careers to work at the school farm, which had both crops and livestock, Brown

"We had more flexibility in terms of scheduling that allowed us to do a few things. Similar to a co-op assignment, students with agrarian interests could go to the farm and work. The same was true with the old greenhouse," he said.

The school farm was used a lot by children involved with the 4-H program, added Brown. "There were many families who got a lot out of it. It was an opportunity for them to exhibit some of their animals. The the-

ory was we had kind of a Noah's ark out there," said Brown.
"The elementary kids I think de-

rived a great deal more out of it than kids at the secondary level. We had a farm manager who talked to the kids as a park ranger would, explaining about the growing of crops and ani-

"A couple of times we had an old-fashioned thrashing machine for them to see. We pressed cider and sheared sheep; things like that. We had an old bus we painted called The Farm Express.' They went around and picked up kids and because them to the farm brought them out there to the farm. times the farm manager took animals out to the elementary

At "work bees," Brown, his wife and "those of us who had kids and were interested in that kind of thin, would clean up that old hosue. We scrubbed the tub; you name it. It was kind of a connecting thing for us."

Brown sensed waning interest in the farm before his retirement. And financing the farm was never easy.

"Things change with the curricu-lum, administration and with what the hard-core buck will buy," he said. "It's not a cheap venture to maintain that farm. It was a wonderful and unique idea, but ideas and theories sometimes don't always jive. Different things happen in school systems. Things go and

## Superintendent spends his vacation in summer 'school'

After a tough school year, you might expect Plymouth-Canton School Superintendent John Hoben to hop into his motor home and enjoy a vacation traveling around the United

Instead, Hoben went to "school" for a week with The Superintendency Institute in Traverse City, came home, packed, repacked and headed off to Poland, Hungary and Czechoslovakia and Germany for two weeks to study education with the Eisenhower People-to-People Pro-

"It was three good weeks of educational experiences," said Hoben, one of 51 superintendents chosen from a field of 8,000 from across the country to take part in the program.

The conference agenda began at 7 a.m. and ended at 10 p.m. Superintendents listened to prominent educators, worked in small groups and made presentations with the goal of 'leading the effort to transform "America's schools in this decade."

"The idea was to come up with plans for restructuring for school improvement," said Hoben, who met superintendents from Washington state to Vermont. "What came out of it was the establishment of a network with 51 American and Canadian school districts."

THE PURPOSE of the Eastern European trip was to exchange information with educational leaders in four countries, Hoben said.

Headed by a Michigan State University professor, the group included an 82-year-old college professor from Massachusetts, a representative from the State Department, a retired elementary teacher from the Thumb area, a kindergarten teacher from Saginaw, and a high school librarian and board member from Pi-

School structure in Eastern Europe differs considerably from that in the U.S., said Hoben, who picked up his own \$4,500 airfare.

Beginning at age 6 or 7, there is 10-year compulsory education. At 17 or 18, students are tested and attend a vocational program or a university depending on the results, he said.

The major difference Hoben found was the curriculum.

Their curriculum reflects "high expectations - not only for teachers, but for students and parents, for that matter. The biggest single difference I noticed is that students are workers, and teachers are facilita'I think we have to raise our standards. Also, one of the things we need to do is to let teachers decide what their best method of teaching is and hold them accountable to achieving those standards. That's a German principle.'

"They demand more and they get more. They have homework and things that are different than we experience in this country," said

Most of the problems are economic, he added.

Typically, teachers make \$100 a month, and university presidents \$300 a month. Gas costs \$4 a gallon, "so you see a lot of pedestrian traffic and a lot of bicycles.

The first stop was Poland. "Our first night in Warsaw, I finally got into my hotel room, dead tired, and turned on the English TV station, CNN International," said Hoben. "The first thing I saw was a meeting at Salem High School on the Michigan Model. I told my roommate, "That's my school!" "

"You're going to hear more about problems in Poland," predicted Hoben, noting that inflation is rampant in Poland, and that there's a perception that Solidarity is contrived and controlled.

"I didn't see any smiling faces," he added. "You can sense the tension."

HOBEN VISITED a Polish elementary school and high school and met with educators who are interested in setting up an exchange pro-

Hoben was surprised to learn "two foreign languages are required at the fourth level," which is equivalent to fourth grade in the U.S. While food was plentiful in the ho-

tels, "the grocery stores were quite bleak with limited choices," he said. Hoben said the Hungarians can't remove Russian monuments and

symbols fast enough.

He found Budapest and its baroque and Gothic architecture "very beautiful," despite the massive de-struction it suffered in World War II.

"The Hungarians are a happier lot of people" than the Polish, said Hoben, who stayed in a hotel on the

As in Poland, "the schools are in

transition, going from a Communist

to a Democratic system," added Hoben, who met with the Hungarian minister of education and the president of the University of Budapest. The group took a motor coach to Prague, Czechoslovakia, which ap-

pears be "a little bit better off than Hoben was struck by the Czechoslovakian facilities for the severely mentally impaired.

"I was very impressed with the cleanliness, and the love and care given them. It exceeded the care I see in our institutions."

The ratio of residents to staff is about two to one, he added.

The schools have a "rigorous curriculum; the same way in Hungary. They demand more of the children than what's expected here," he said. After a stop in war-scarred Dres-

den, Germany, it was on to Berlin. There are still remnants of the wall and World War II damage,"


Hoben learned that teachers in East Berlin are earning \$100 a month, while "those on the other side make \$2,000 a month. All the people in the east want to work in the west, so they have some huge problems. We don't know how lucky we are."

HOBEN HAD LUNCH with the first elected mayor of East Berlin, and met the minister of education, who was in the process of firing 400 principals, 400 vice principals and 400 social studies teachers in an attempt to "get rid of the Russian influence," said Hoben.

"He was keeping the math and sci-ence teachers, because they aren't indoctrinated. But they'll be monitored to make sure they aren't full of

that pedagogy.

"The biggest thing I got out of the trip was that the major difference between American education and their education is that the curriculum is much more rigid, and stu-


Treat patients with respect, he moralizes. All doctors become patients sooner or later.

As "We're No Angels" begins, the prison warden attempts to put the fear of God into the inmates by graphically describing how a con-victed killer will meet his end in the electric chair.

The condemned man sneers and lowers but prisoners Ned and Jim, (Robert DeNiro and Sean Penn), are suitably impressed. Because the pair talked during the warden's exhortations, they are summoned for punishment in the room where the execution is going to take place.

When the killer stages a violent escape from the prison, Ned and Jim are faced with a dilemma. They are really scared of the gun wielding killer, who clearly expects them to escape with him, but when they try falling behind during the chase through the prison, the guards lay down a line of fire.

Trapped like rats, Ned and Jim conclude the killer is the less imminent danger and are soon nervously enjoying their freedom.

Exactly, what Ned and Jim did to end up in prison is not made clear.

One amusing bit occurs with the explanation he offers a young monk who notices Penn has a clothes pin attached to the collar of his shirt. swiped earlier from a clothes line. For a comedy, this film from

'Mona Lisa" director Neil Jordan is surprisingly short on laughs. The script by David Mamet is often angry and loud, the violence too much for what should be a light comedy.

SET IN 1935, the film doesn't capitalize on the humor that could evolve out of the situations in which DeNiro and Penn find themselves.

The best performance comes from Penn, who through his simple openness starts feeling drawn to the contemplative life of the monastery. The more peaceful Penn gets, the more desperate DeNiro becomes.

The agitated DeNiro keeps working on schemes to get over the bridge into Canada, a journey foiled several times by police checks. So near, yet so far.

The film moves rather fitfully to the expected conclusion, bringing in a subplot with Demi Moore as a bitter single mother to a deaf mute

In the end, "We're No Angels" seems like a lot of talent and potential without a lot to show for it.







# Co-workers share journey toward independent lives

Just like everyone else, Betty Grantz and Linda Mardirosian share in the easy banter of co-workers. Day is done at the Westland TJ Maxx store where they work and they're on the way home.

It's a short trip in terms of miles, but a long journey in many other

Betty, 63, and Linda, 44, have spent a combined 52 years in mental health care facilities before their new jobs gave them perhaps their est-ever chance for independence.

Linda, a small, energetic woman, will return in a few days to clean windows, tidy up and stock shelves at the Warren Road store.

Betty, a grandmotherly type for whom legal blindness is no barrier, ilso stocks clothing at the store.

"THEY GET treated just like anybody cise here," said their boss, assistant merchandise manager Marshall Falconer.

Popular with co-workers, the two recently shared the store's "Associate of the Month" award, voted by the store's 65 workers. "I think the award shows how their co-workers feel about them," Falconer said.

They're good workers," added job coach, Gertrude Potts. "They want to do their own work, they don't want anyone to do it for them.

Potts, employed by Saints Inc., a private, Romulus-based social service agency, works with both women, helping accommodate them to the workforce.

The process is called supported employment, but the day is coming when the support will no longer be

What we like to see is a situation where they can work on their own," said Denise Mogos of Wayne Community Living Services, a state agency that recommended both women for their jobs. "The purpose is for them to become as independent as possible.

Neither Linda nor Betty had ever worked before, according to state records, but their success in the workforce has been accompanied by an upgrade in living conditions.

Linda, a former group home resident, now lives in an apartment in nearby Inkster.

"It's what we call supported inde-pendent living," Mogos said. "There are people who look in on her, but she has a degree of independence.'

velopmentally disabled, but Mogos said the classification shouldn't lead people to limit them as capable workers or citizens.

"The message we want to get across is they they are people, just like everybody else," she said. In addition to working two days a week at TJ Maxx, Linda works an-

other two days at a nearby McDonald's and an additional day per week at Saints, Inc. offices.

Betty, a two-year TJ Maxx employee who works five days a week, recently moved into a smaller, less restrictive Redford group home. At the new home, Betty is respon-

sible for her own cooking, shopping and cleanup, as well as taking care of her two beloved cats.

She also attends night school in the Redford Union Schools.

"She goes everywhere," said home manager Kim Prophet, "out for ice cream, to the movies, to the beach. She really seems to enjoy her auton-

Betty states her reaction to her ob and new home more simply: "I like it a lot."





CASE IN point: A while back I wrote a column chastising members of that same Operation Rescue after they paraded in front of a Livonia abortion clinic with signs bearing the names of two patients who were, they said, in the clinic to have abor-

The column infuriated the pro lifers, who bombarded me and the paper with letters and phone calls. Other people, however, sought me out and said things like "Right on," "Great column" or "It's about time somebody took these people on."
Two phone calls to my desk led to rather lengthy conversations with the callers, both of whom said they just wanted to tell me that I was ab solutely right and it's about time somebody spoke out against activities like that.

callers that they put their thoughts in writing and send a letter to the editor, they quickly backed off. One caller said he was a minister who was rather visible in his community and didn't think he should get involved in this issue. The other was a woman who said she was a candidate for political office and she didn't think it would be wise to put her views in a letter.

So there they sit - quietly. It doesn't really matter whether they are members of a silent majority or a silent minority. As long as they remain silent, it doesn't matter at all.

SECOND CASE: The 36th state House district - which includes all or parts of Plymouth, Plymouth Township, Northville, Northville Township and Canton Township recently held a special primary elec-tion to replace Gerald Law, who had resigned the seat.

On most issues there was little difference in the views of the three candidates. All were Republicans with similar ideas on education, govern-ment spending, local control of local issues, etc. The only area on which they disagreed sharply was the abor-

oner, was adamantly prochoice. Deborah Whyman, a political newcomer, was staunchly pro-life. Georgina Goss, Northville Township supervisor and a political veteran, refused to be labeled on the issue. Both sides accused her of waffling.

Whether the abortion question was a central issue among voters is anybody's guess, but the pro-lifers were out in force backing Whyman and the pro-choicers were out stumping for Vorva. Goss ended up the winner with a strong showing in Northville, but Whyman, who came in third, was only 544 votes behind Goss.

Abortion questions aside, this was a chance for voters to select the person who would represent their district in the Legislature. The turnout was dismal. About 20 percent of reg-istered voters cast ballots in Plymouth, in Plymouth Township fewer than 17 percent turned out and in Canton only 81/2 percent of the registered voters actually voted.

Whyman, who won in Canton where she lives, did so with 805 votes - 3.4 percent of the registered vot-

"I hated math," she replied.

Which didn't answer my question. Or perhaps she revealed even more than I was asking.

At the Lansing meeting, Dorothy Beardmore, the state board president, handed me a Seattle Times article headlined "Math: A nation of nces." The headline was wrong. The first paragraph said American parents and students hate math.

**OUR NATION'S problem is worse** than most educators fear. It's greater than too few students studying too little math and being unable to rea-

Most Americans hate math. That's different from being less than

I field ground balls dismally but still enjoy watching an infield double play. You may play the piano sloppily but still appreciate Andre Watts performing Franz Liszt.

Math is the language of science, commerce, industry, governmental budgets. Without math, you're half

(Did you notice last week's poor reporting in the Detroit papers about the state "arts summit"? They played the story as the big elite organizations versus the little ethnic

(The truth is that state arts funding soared 40 percent per year dur-ing the 1980s. They failed to report it because they couldn't calculate a percentage increase or didn't want

I CAN'T BOAST because I was an indifferent math student through 12th grade. Like everyone but the future engineering majors, I hated

Maybe it was because math teachers assumed their course was the only one you were taking. They were conversant in no topic but math. They never related what they were teaching to anything else in the world. They were devoid of humor.

English and history teachers would give you an occasional light

homework. Not math teachers. They were as merciless as they were nar-

Apparently schools haven't

THE ONLY math course I ever aced was in college. Can you imagine? After grinding through math at the grade and high school levels, 1 .5 broke the bank at the toughest university in the state.

The young math professor had wit. He explained binomial functions with the reproduction of bunnies. For reasons I can't explain, I began to grasp trig and five to the power of

Sadly, it didn't last. Near the end of the semester, he was hauled before the House Un-American Activities Committee, quizzed about extensive Communist connections, sus pended, fired and sent to a federal slammer for contempt of Congress.

H. Chandler Davis was the only math teacher who ever got me to like the subject.

DAVIS WOUND up teaching in Canada and contributing to Encyclopedia Americana. His articles are models of lucidity and clarity. Unlike liberal Democrats, Davis

never inflicted his political views on a class, so I can't personally tell you he was (not) a Commie. U-M didn't go in for that open meetings stuff, so I don't know whether they had evidence he was (a) Communist, or (b) dangerous off campus.

### Hotelier raps Duggan plan

As a local hotelier, I am gravely ncerned that a hotel tax is being lewed as the best source upon hich to build the financing of a new seball stadium. I am writing to outline several issues which are the basis of my concern.

• Current Depressed Operating Conditions: Due to dramatic increases in hotel rooms supply, occupan-cies in metropolitan Detroit are se-

verely depressed — a low 49 percent occupancy rate. In an effort to increase occupancies, local hotel rates are significantly lower than comparable metropolitan centers around the nation. The result of a new hotel tax for Wayne County could be the closing of many Wayne County hotels and the loss of many jobs.

 Decreased Competitive Ability:
 Increased taxes will decrease Wayne County hotels' ability to compete with surrounding counties that do not suffer from this tax. Nationally, this tax will offset any price advantage that Detroit now poss could be the death knell for Detroit's troubled convention and trade show

• National Hotel Tax Rates: The addition of a five percent tax on top of existing taxes would place Detroit hotels among the highest taxed hotel rooms in the nation. As an example, the total tax currently collected at the Westin Hotel is 12 percent and at the Hyatt Regency it is 11 percent. An increase to 17 percent and 16 percent respectively would place them second only to hotels in New York (19.25 percent plus \$2).

· Hotels are not major benefactors of increased Tiger attendance: Local hotels receive little, if any, revenue from the 80 days of professional baseball played in Detroit.

Therefore, an improved stadium would not increase hotel revenues to serve as a direct tax base. Hotels could only expect that demand for hotel rooms would decline due to rate sensitivity as a result of a hotel/motel tax financed stadium.

In review of the Duggan Plan, which was prepared for Wayne County Executive, Edward H. McNamara, the biggest benefactor in this issue would be the privately owned Tiger Baseball Club. This Duggan Plan is based on taxing one group of private entrepreneurs for the benefit of another private en-**Barry Toms**







"It's important the community supports itself," said Scott Morgan, whose Rationals was another Detroit act making a name for itself in the late '60s. "This is something definitely worthwhile doing.

Plans include having the show digitally recorded for a live album to be released at a later date along with material Kubert recorded with the Detroit Blues Band.

"He provided that nice little said Mitch Ryder, whose friendship with Kubert dated back to junior high school.

Kubert performed with the De-troit Wheels until 1967 when the Vietnam draft decimated the band,

### Fanzines are few and far between

music papers put out by regular people instead of some huge publishing corporation. They're usually cheaply printed on mimeograph paper with crude graphics, a bunch of misspelled words and a casual writing style.

But that's what makes them

Instead of beginning a record review with phrases like "the thematic elements and poignant tonal quality . . . " Fanzine writers tend to use sentences like "These boys have plenty of neat-o effects

Back in the 1960s, alternative magazines were in their heyday and anyone who had something to say would write it down and voila, they were in the publishing biz.

Lately, however, fanzine production - at least in this area - has gone the way of bell bottoms, lava lights and altruistic behavior. A survey of local record stores (the major distribution point for fanzines) revealed that most had zero or at most three copies of local magazines.

Most fanzine producers today have to be well-versed in ad rates and distribution techniques. But there's still a few people, armed with only a copier and something to say, who manage to make their little place in the literary world.

Of the few that are out there, these are some of the best:

New Direction - This is a junior-sized fanzine put out by a guy who calls himself Nick Name and his "proofreader, lover and best friend" Spirulina. Although the mag is tiny, it does get around. The mail section in the front of the book has letters from readers as far away as England.

Anyway, New Direction focuses only on music. Mr. Name's taste in tunes runs toward the alternative/ college sort. One issue featured interviews with That Petrol Emotion, Snuff and Lovers and Other Monsters as well as live reviews of bands like the Chills and Social Dis-

But the real body of the maga-

Nick's reviews are like listening to that friend of yours who frequents the indie bin at the record store they're smart and full of obscure music info. Scattered throughout the text

are a bunch of funny/philosophical quotes like Hans Selye's "If you do what you like, you never really work. Your work is your play." or George Carlin's "I am not a complete vegetarian; I eat only animalsthat have died in their sleep."

New Direction only comes out twice a year - in June and De-cember - and can be had by sending \$1.50 to New Direction, 520 N. Ashley, No. 1, Ann Arbor 48103.

Brassneck - It's a music rag with a wicked sense of humor put out by Chip Porter (lead-off hitter, token chump) and Tim Sendra (field general, token grump).

# Mol Triffid goes 'western'

Someone better tell Don McLean that Mol Triffid has gone to catch the last train for the coast. Don't worry, the music hasn't died.

It's just moving. A farewell dose of vocalist Kurt Serbus' apocalyptic screeches and Kimo Ball's double-barreled guitar will be given Saturday, Aug. 17, at Club Heidelberg in Ann Arbor. Oh, but to see Serbus don the dinner jacket and designer eyeglasses for the last area rendition of "The Devil and Sammy Davis."

Then in one fell swoop, Mol Triffid will be off to San Francisco. They're even taking Bloomfield Hills Lahser graduate/drummer Scott Mast, who replaced John Westerman last September.

Simply put, Mol Triffid has grown tired of the scene here.

"There's not a hell of a lot of places to play," said Kimo Ball, sitting in the living room (we think) of their Ann Arbor apartment with a For Rent" sign on the door. "Detroit is sad. It's either people loyal to their favorite punk band or apathetic to a Martian band from Ann Arbor."

There's no bitterness in Ball's voice, just resignation. Mol Triffid

accomplished more in three years here than the average bunch of longhaired, power-chord metal churning quartet.

THE BAND'S first single last rear, "I Want to See Pretty People Doing Ugly Things," revealed Serbus' penchant for exploring the bleakest realms of the human spirit.

Instead of wariness, the lead singer's trembling screams seemed to revel in the madness as he vividly describes a pathetic creature alone watching pornographic films. Ball's incendiary guitar pieces only made the package more hypnotic. More importantly, the 7-inch single was instrumental in garnering the band an instant following

Since then, Mol Triffid toured the East Coast and the Midwest region extensively and set up a home base in Ann Arbor. While on the coast, the band recorded a majority of their upcoming release, "Touch the Monkey," in Boston.

The six-song project is 50 minutes long and will be released on (fast becoming extinct) vinyl in the fall.

Among the selections will be a umber, "Satin Rules," in which number, Serbus pokes fun at the hysteria revolving around alleged devil worship. Another song is titled, "William Shatner Sleeps on the Eve of the Harmonic Convergence: He Dreams.

MANY OF the Serbus-penned numbers come from his own twisted perspective of every day events. 'The Devil and Sammy Davis," for example, was the result of the late singer's biography, which divulged Davis' alleged involvement with the Church of Satan.

Whether a move to the Golden Gate City will lighten up Serbus' songwriting remains to be seen. He wasn't present at the interview.

"He's into it (the move)," said bassist Dave Sahijdak.

As, too, are the rest of the band members. For Mast, the relocation is of particular excitement. The drummer always wanted to be a member of Mol Triffid ever since his former band, Pontiac, opened for them at a show in Ann Arbor.

"Kurt has a lot to do with it," Mast said. "So does the music. He has such a presence. He's so intense."

### Oakland County artists received most arts grants

The Michigan Council for the lation, said Kaza, vice president for Arts has redistributed money from policy research at the Mackinson the poorest parts of the state to the richest, a conservative think-tank study says.

In 1981-86, artists in Oakland County, with Michigan's highest per-capita income, received 46 arts council grants, the largest total of any county in the state, according to a study released today by the Mackinac Center, a Midland-based public policy think tank.

MCA distributed 83 grants to

artists in Oakland and Washtenaw counties, which has the state's sec-

ond-highest per capita income.

Artists in 24 of Michigan's 25 poorest counties received no grants from The Michigan Council for the

Arts during a five-year period.
"BY REDISTRIBUTING tax dollars from poor and middle class to rich areas, the Michigan Council for the Arts has failed to serve the public interest," said Greg Kaza, the study's author. The group rec-ommended abolishing the MCA. Gov. John Engler last week re-

versed his decision to abolish the MCA, instead establishing a new group that will phase out grants over three years.

The MCA gave more than one-third of its total number of arts council grants to counties with less than one-seventh of the state popu-

The Mackinac Center study recommended phasing out all state funding to the Detroit Institute of Arts, Detroit Symphony Orchestra, Michigan Opera Theatre and other cultural groups over a three-year period so that they are able to se-cure alternative funding from private and non-profit sources.

"REFORM IS necessary because there is no empirical evidence documenting that these state-funded organizations are serving the poor," Kaza said.

"The State of Michigan can ill afford the arts council given the prevailing economic recession, budget crisis and the needs of middle-class taxpayers for property tax relief,"

The 1981-1986 period was analyzed because it is the most recent time span for which figures are available, he said.

The 24 poorest counties which received no grants are: Lake, Keewenaw, Ogemaw, Baraga, Oscoda, Houghton, Presque Isle, Montmorency, Clare, Schoolcraft, Chippewa, Missaukee, Gogebic, Iron, Kalkaska, Osceola, Alcona, Iosco, Luce, Cheboygan, Arenac, Roscommon, Gladwin and Macki-

Her days at the all-girls Catholic school in Farmington Hills put Mallon on the path to becoming a suc-cessful professional golfer.

"I thought of it watching Meg play
at Indianwood last year," he said. When she won a tournament (the Oldsmobile Classic in February) I struck. I didn't even think about it."

While introducing Mallon to a gathering of family, friends and Mercy supporters Thursday evening at Too Chez restaurant in Novi, Teevens said "Meg cooperated beautifully" in promoting the fund-raiser by winning the LPGA Championship and U.S. Women's Open earlier this

"This is easy for me," Mallon said. "Giving back by playing golf is ter-

(Mallon would be so successful), but she could hit the ball a long ways and she worked hard, so you always knew the potential was there.

"I worked a lot with her on the basics like I would with any kid. She polished her skills with some other pros, but I think I got her started on the right track."

Vanloozen said he was impressed by the way Mallon finished the U.S. Open, holding on to defeat Pat Brad-

ley at the end.
"To come in there with the veteran players she was with and outlast them was a real sign of control and class," he said. "The normal tendency is to gas it a bit when you're not used to that, but she played like a

"I asked her if she ever thought she would be on the tour," Schulkins said. "She said she had no idea and look where she is now.

"She's an inspiration to me, because I'm working so hard to get a scholarship. I know it's within reach, getting a scholarship and becoming something of what she is someday."

It wasn't until Mallon was a junior at Mercy that she wanted to pursue competitive golf. She didn't get a college scholarship out of high school but walked on at Ohio State and became an All-American. In her junior year, "I saw teammates going out and becoming pros, and I figured I might as well try it," Mallon said.

She also had some advice for Schulkins - and all golfers.

"(Schulkins) asked me how I felt when I saw my name on the leader board and how I handled it," Mallon said. "The first few times I got caught up in it and didn't play well. In the meantime, I watched 20 others go past. I learned you have to finish the round of golf first."

#### **MALLON'S CAREER**

Mallon, who has been on the pro tour for five seasons, earned \$1,500 her first year but probably learned the most in terms of what it required to handle the rigors of the tour and be successful.

"I also found I fell in love with the game and wanted to stay out there," she said.

Each succeeding year has been more financially rewarding for Mallon. She earned approximately \$25,000, \$49,000 and \$128,000 the past three years and this year with big paydays in the LPGA and Open has won \$446,000.

"There's been a nice progression," she said, "and it's been in the right direction.

"It's strange because the money is so public. Everything is there in the paper. It took a couple years of not making a dime and having to pay people back to get there.

"I'll have to make some investments and secure it. I'm still in the midst of the season and haven't thought about it. They're nice dilemmas I have now."

MALLON, WHO is admired as much for her pleasant personality, has the natural skills to deal with the media, but that has been a learning experience, too.

"It seems everyone has a schedule and a deadline," she said, "and I'm trying to learn the balance of it. I try to cooperate as much as I can, but there comes a time when you need to have time for yourself.

"I have to make sure it doesn't interfere with the reason I'm out there, and that is my practice time."

## Gilmore makes Olympic hockey

Mike Gilmore has done it again - bucked the odds and made a hockey team few thought he could.

In this case, the hockey team is the United States Olympic squad. The Farmington Hills resident was one of three goalkeepers among the 30 players who survived the cut last week at the training center in St.

Fifty-three players were invited to the Olympic Trials, including five goalies. Players reported to camp July 31, and the roster was trimmed less than a week later.

Gilmore and his U.S. teammates were to leave Sunday for France and later Finland for a pair of European tournaments. They will return Friday, Aug. 30, and begin a domestic tour. The team will play about 60 pre-Olympic games.

JUST PRIOR to the 1992 Games next winter, four more players will have to be cut from the U.S. team, but none will be goalies since the U.S. will keep three netminders.

Gilmore is joined on the team by Scott Gordon, a goalie in the Quebec Nordiques farm system, and Wes Kuntar, who played last season for St. Lawrence University

"They're good but I'm not outclassed," said Gilmore, who made the Michigan State team as a walk-on player and eventually became its top goalie. "We'll see what happens when we go over to Europe. I think that will be the telling card."

"(The coaches) haven't said much. I think they're waiting to see what

happens in Europe, too."

Rob Stauber, who won the Hobey Baker Award while playing for the University of Minnesota a few years ago and belongs to the Los Angeles Kings, was invited to the trials but is injured and won't be available until November.

If he comes back, there is the possibility he could bump one of the other three from the team. But Gilmore is part of the team for now; plus, he and the others have a three-month jump on Stauber.

"THERE ARE many variables I can't control," Gilmore said. "I'll just do my thing and let the cards fall where they may."

Gilmore has a fifth year of eligibility remaining at MSU and will return to play for the Spartans if it appears he will be just a back-up goalie with the Olympic team.
"Twe got the jersey," he said. "What it all comes down to now is how

much playing time am I going to get?"

In the meantime, Gilmore is enjoying the lavish treatment he and the other players are receiving.

In addition to their uniforms with "USA" on the jersey, the Olympians were fitted for sport coats, dress pants, white shirts and "fancy sweatsuits" for travel purposes, Gilmore said. They also receive \$30 a day in

The team is staying at the Econolodge but plans to stay in more expensive hotels once the playing tour starts, he added.

"WE GET new things every day — warmups, uniforms, luggage," Gilmore said. "Everything is first class. So far it's been an unbelievable experience for me. I never thought I would be in this situation."

The Olympic team even had a photographer from a bubblegum card company come to the National Hockey Arena in St. Cloud last week to take action shots of the players.

## Albion grid talent includes Brannan

It was really no surprise, what college topped the list when the results in the coaches' vote for the preseason favorite in the 1991 Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association football race were announced.

Albion College first, followed by Hope, Olivet, Adrian, Kalamazoo and Alma

It would be difficult to argue with Albion's pre-eminence. After all, the Britons were 7-1-1 a year ago (4-0-1 in the MIAA), winning their secondstraight title.



### Savor the rewards of gardening

I'm feeling a little "deja vu" here as I sit and once again, ponder the abundance of zucchini and tomatoes overpowering my

This year, because of composting all of last year's leaves, clippings and food waste, the garden has sprouted forth like never before, while the jar of Miracle Gro sits lonely and untouched on the garage she'f.

I really thought I had planned it a little differently this time. In addition to my over-sized plot of fresh herbs, a single tomato plant coupled with a single zucchini

What I didn't plan for were the sprouting of virtually hundreds of pumpkin and spaghetti squash plants inadvertently tossed in the compost pile and tilled into the rich soil from last fall. On returning from a two-week vacation, I found my entire rear yard enmassed in diabolical looking fronds and blossoms. I pulled at least 60 or so plants and

As of this writing, I already have pumpkins the size of three gallon stock pots, enough spaghetti squash to half fill a Michigan basement and yes, 5foot tall tomato plants and zucchini that seems to grow virtually overnight.

As the pumpkins begin to turn a hazy orange and the spaghetti squash fatten with every morning nower, I focus most of my attention on the zucchini, tomatoes and fresh herbs.

This year I have discovered pesto. Having always been a fan of the basil, pine nut, garlic and oil concoction, this year's abundant basil crop has spurred me on to making pesto pasta sauces, not to mention canning herbaceous tomato sauces.

One of the best finds of the summer, however, was locating Alcamo's Market. This old time south of Michigan Avenue in Dearborn stocks everything Italian. I could easily drop a paycheck picking up their outstanding imported Mozzarella (that tastes so good layered between thin slices of ripe tomatoes) and Prosciutto de Parma.

Next week, I get out the old Foley Food Mill and begin the annual Janes "puttin' up the salsa" week. About 5 pounds of onions, equal amounts of tomatoes and peppers, not to mention a basket of garlic gets simmered and jarred for those snowy winters eves when you need a little warming up.

# SPICE the SLICE

Herbs and spices lend flavor and scent to bread recipes

READ! JUST the word suggests a picture of bread baking in the oven and the aroma wafting throughout the house! With herbs, fresh or dry in the mixture there is a provocative aroma, and the flavor is exquisite.

Bread has been a staple food for centuries; grains used for this purpose have been found dating back 25,000 years. Most every country has a bread suitable for their cuisine, culture and climate.

Wheat, rye, bran, buckwheat, rice, amaranth and others, or a combination of these grains, are used for bread-making. Whole-grain breads are gaining in popularity because they are healthy and give such e texture and taste.

Of all the grains commonly used, wheat contains the highest amount of gluten (a protein) which, when mixed with water, forms an elastic network to help the dough rise. Many bakers prefer unbleached flour to bleached.


YEAST IS a key ingredient in bread-making and is activated when it is mixed with a sweetener such as sugar, honey or molasses. When it is then mixed with the flour a fermentation process begins.
It isn't clear whether the Chinese

or the Egyptians first used yeast, but it is the most common leavening agent for bread. Others are eggs baking powder, baking soda and . . mixes that were kept for years by the homemaker for this

On the other hand, salt slows down this action. It also brings out the flavor of the bread. Fat, whether butter, lard, oil or margarine, or a combination, lubricates the gluten in the dough and facilitates rising. It also adds flavor, richness and tenderness. When milk (butter or sweet) is used, the loaf is softer than bread made without it.

Kneading develops the gluten and incorporates air into the dough, causing carbon dioxide to form. This makes the dough rise. After the first rising, it is sometimes necessary to punch the dough down to redistribute the yeast and let it work again be-

fore baking. One grain, amaranth, is new to me. It is very high in protein and is available as an un-hulled wholegrain, a finely-ground flour and and in pasta. Substitute ¼ cup of this



and unusual flavor. Look for it in health food stores.

Just about anything can be added to bread dough. Fruits, nuts, meats, cheeses, vegetables and wine enhance the flavor, as do many herbs.

TRY ONE or more of the followflour for all-purpose flour for a fresh ing: basil, chives, dill, garlic, mar-



joram, parsley, rosemary, saffron, sage, savory, tarragon or thyme. Herb seeds also add their special pizzaz. Anise, caraway, cumin, dill, fennel, poppy and sesame are possibili-ties. Ground spices such as cinnamon, nutmeg, and coriander also change the taste and are fun to try.

There is no set way to incorporate

herbs into breads. Dried herbs can be mixed with the dry ingredients; fresh or dried herbs can be mixed with the liquid or infused in the oil before they are mixed with the

Kneading herbs into the dough will also work. A pinwheel effect can be achieved by sprinkling them over the dough when it is flattened and rolled, before it is put into the pan.

As a general rule, use a tablespoon of dried herbs or ¼ cup of fresh for each loaf. Used alone or in combina-tion with others, herbs can help you make a bread to suit your own pal-

Here are some combinations to get you started: equal parts sage (or garlic chips, oregano) and parmesan; equal parts basil and chives; onefourth teaspoon nutmeg with a half tablespoon of thyme; or plain pars-ley added to the dough. . . all are good. A quarter cup of rosemary is

BECKY, OF Becky's Oven in Royal Oak serves the wholesale and retail trade. She told me that when onions are put in bread a bit of garlic will sweeten the flavor. For two loaves, use less than % teaspoon garlic and % cup of dehydrated onion flakes, or ¼ cup fresh onion.

Dave Auer, of Baking by the Auers in Southfield (also wholesale and retail), uses only fresh herbs and ingredients. He makes bread using rosemary, basil and red and yellow

peppers.

Jim Maier, Executive Chef, Henry
Ford Museum, Greenfield Village,
suggests sprinkling the herbs used in the bread on top of the loaf before baking. If the top is lightly brushed with water or egg and water, the herbs or seeds will adhere better. To add crunch to some breads, corn-meal is sprinkled on the bottom of

Breads can be made quickly using one bowl, or at a more leisurely pace especially when yeast is use Whether you begin with frozen do or a box mix or start from scratch, experiment and enjoy. Bread making has been around for a long, long time, and many wonderful meals can be planned around this simple

# Chill out with pasta

What could be more "summer" than a refreshing plateful of chilled pasta salad? "It's good, healthy food and fairly inexpensive," said Frank Blair, 30, who sings the praises of the versatile pasta

Blair and his partner, 31-year-old Janet Bondar, operate a Farmington Hills restaurant called Francois' Gourmet To Go. The pair have made pasta salads the centerpiece of their summer lineup.

A PASTA salad can be made with any kind of noodle, cooked al dente - until it offers slight resistance to the bite. Once cooled, it can be garnished with carrot slivers or broccoli, olives, sweet onions or any desired vegetable. Toss in some diced meat, cheese or seafood, if you wish.

The crowning touch is a coat of glistening, zesty vinaigrette dressing. The result: an easy, tasty summer meal or tempting side dish.

Blair likes to combine fresh herbs andspecial ingredients such as pea pods and shiitake mushrooms, along with the pasta and dressing.

"People want something fresh and something different," Blair said. Francois' Gourmet To Go, which opened almost 1½ years ago, is in Muirwood Square, at Grand River and Drake. Although there is seating for around 20 people, the bulk of the business is in

BLAIR TAGGED his restaurant with the name Francois to reflect his upscale goals. Francois is the French equivalent for Frank.

Bondar, 31, of Farmington Hills, is a former banquet sales manager for a local

Blair is a former maitre 'd for several hotel dining rooms. He also worked as

manager for a catering firm and prepared sauces at a local restaurant, now closed. Blair's style is "fusion cooking," which

he defines as blending regional spices and ingredients to create exciting new combinations.

"If something looks good and smells good, chances are it tastes good," Blair

The restaurant's popular shrimp salad Oriental combines linguini or angel hair pasta with cooked shrimp, pea pods, red onions, chunk pineapple, shiitake mushrooms, toasted almonds and baby corn ears.

The dressing is a spicy mixture of fresh ginger, garlic, teriyaki sauce, pepper, curry powder, lemon juice and oil. Blair uses fresh pasta. He often mixes

two kinds of oil for a richer blend. Potato salads are made with redskins. His Caesar pasta has sun-dried tomatoes, capers, red onions and parmesan cheese

A NEW, chilled bean salad, which provides protein and fiber, is a nutritional

"If you are taking the meat out, you have to put in some protein," Blair said.
"That comes from the beans."

The salads range in price from around \$3 to \$3.75 for a half-order and from \$5.50 to around \$7 for a full order. The restaurant features a number of

other specialties, including several hot pasta dishes, grilled chicken, and spicy blackened meat. Catering also is available, and the

restaurant has served a variety of functions, especially office parties and business meetings.

This light-textured bread is great to serve with a hearty soup. The "secret" ingredient is cottage cheese.

1 pkg. active dry yeast ¼ cup warm water

1 cup creamed cottage cheese 2 tablespoons sugar 1 tablespoon instant minced onion 1 tablespoon softened butter or mar-

ons dried dill weed

1 teaspoon salt ¼ teaspoon baking soda 1 egg beaten

2 ¼ to 2 % cups all-purpose

Soften yeast in warm water. Heat cottage cheese to lukewarm and combine with yeast mixture. Add remaining ingredients, except flour, and blend together.

Add enough flour, in several addi-

tions, beating well after each, to form a stiff dough. Cover with buttered wax paper and a linen towel. Let rise in warm place (80-90 degrees) until light and double in size, about 50-60 minutes.

Stir down dough and turn into a well-buttered round ceramic or glass casserole (1 1/2 - 2 qt. size). Cover and let rise again in a warm place until

Bake in preheated 350 degree oven for 40-50 minutes until golden brown. Brush with melted butter and sprinkle lightly with salt. Remove from casserole and cool on rack. Serve warm. Makes one round loaf.

HERBED BREAD FROM A BOX

The herbs can be changed to suit vour taste.

1 pkg. (13 % oz.) hot roll mix 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg

% teaspoon sage (or rosemary)

16 teaspoon thyme % teaspoon oregano (or marjoram)

Mix hot roll mix as directed on label, add seasonings with flour mix-ture. Cover with cloth and let rise in a warm place about 40 minutes or until doubled in size. Punch down and roll or pat into a 9 x 5 inch rectangle; place in a greased loaf pan 9x5x3 inches. Cover and let rise 30 minutes. Bake in 375 degree oven 35-40 minutes or until done. Remove from pan and cool on rack. Makes

#### GARDEN-FRESH HERB BREAD

The combination of herbs inn this recipe can be changed to use herbs growing in your garden.

2 pkgs. active dry yeast

l teaspoon sugar i tablespoon instant chicken bouillon 1/4 cup brown sugar ¼ cup oil

3 cups unbleached all-purpose flour 2 tablespoons finely chopped fresh chives 2 tablespoons finely chopped fresh

Cover and let rise until almost doubled 30-45 minutes. Bake 350 degrees for 40-45 minutes. Cool on wire racks. Makes





## Planets less visible this month

This month is going to be a slow month, astronomically speaking. Of the five naked-eye planets, only Saturn will be easy to see in the morning sky. Mercury, Venus, Mars and iter can be seen only with difficulty; they all appear close to the sun this month. The highlight will be annual Perseid (PER se id)

The amount of sunlight we receive in August decreases by one hour and 16 minutes. On Aug. 1, the sun rose at 6:29 a.m. and set at 8:57 p.m. for a possible 14 hours and 28 minutes of sunlight. On Aug. 31 these times are 7:01 a.m. and 8:13 p.m., which permits 13 hours and 12 minutes of sun.

New Moon was at 10:28 p.m. on Aug. 9. The moon is located between the earth and the sun and is not visi-

One of the year's best meteor showers, the Perseids (PER see ids), reaches its peak on the mornings of Aug. 12 and 13. Meteor showers are named for the constellation from which they appear to radiate, in this case Perseus. The Perseid shower will be especially nice this year be-cause there will be no moon in the sky scattering light. The darker the sky, the more meteors you can see.

Meteors are more commonly known as 'falling stars' because they look like little stars falling from the sky. Some American Indians thought they were stars running from danger. But they have nothing to do with stars; meteors are rocks falling out

But in space there are rocks, stones, grains of dust, and other rubbish tumbling around. If one of these objects falls into our atmosphere it heats up because of friction,

burns, and gives off light. A patient skywatcher can expect to see a few sporadic (occasional) meteors any clear night.

Many of these meteors are orbiting around the sun in well-defined orbits. They may be trailing along as the debris of a comet, or they may be the remains of a comet that disintegrated long ago. When the earth passes through the orbit of a meteor swarm, many more meteors than usual can be seen, and we can predict precisely when that will hap-

THE PERSEID swarm is one of the richest. A patient observer can expect to see an average of 50 meteors every hour, which is about one every minute. The best meteor display occurs between 2 a.m. and sunrise. Although Perseus is nearly overhead, the meteors can appear in any part of the sky. Their trails can be traced back to Perseus.

Meteors burn up about 20 miles above the surface of the earth, but if an exceptionally large meteor fails to burn completely, it could strike the earth and produce a crater. Most of Earth is covered with water, so any meteor impact is more likely to produce a big splash than a big crater. Is it possible to be hit by a meteor? The chances of that happen-

left of the moon on the evening of the 13th is Spica (SPY ka). This is the brightest star in the constellation of Virgo. Spica is about 275 light years

Notice the moon's position on the evening of the 14th. It is now below and to the left of Spica. The motion of the moon in just one day is very apparent when it passes a bright star

or planet.

The moon is approaching the star Antares (an TAR ees) on the evening of the 17th. Antares is the bright orange-red star to the left of the moon. One night later the moon has passed Antares

Jupiter is officially in conjunction with the sun on the 17th. It is located behind the sun, as seen from the earth, and is not visible. Late in the month it emerges into the morning

MERCURY is at inferior conjunc tion with the sun on Aug. 21. It is located between the earth and the sun. On the next day, Venus is at inferior conjunction. Don't worry about collisions occurring during all these conjunctions; the planets are millions of kilometers apart.

You can use the moon on the evening of the 22nd to locate Saturn. Saturn is two degrees to the south (right) of the moon. Saturn's beautiful ring system is easily visible through a small telescope.

Full Moon occurs at 5:07 a.m. on Aug. 25. The moon is fully lighted by the sun and will set in the southwest as the sun rises in the northeast. On the evening of the 25th the moon will rise in the southeast as the sun sets in the southwest. It will rise in the early twilight during the next three nights as well, resulting in the "Harvest Moon" effect that occurs next

Mercury, Venus and Jupiter are officially morning objects by the end of the month, but they are very close to the horizon and will be difficult to see. You might want to use binoculars and give it a try. Look toward the east northeast, about 30 minutes before sunrise on the 29th. Venus will be six degrees to the left of due east, just barely clearing the horizon. Mercury will be four degrees to the left of Venus and four degrees above the horizon. Jupiter will be four degrees to the left of Mercury, but only two degrees above the horizon. You have to have a clear, unobstructed horizon to have any hope of seeing these three planets. (A spectacular grouping will occur on September 10.)

The moon is back in Taurus on the evening of the 31st.

Look toward the east northeast around 11:45 p.m. and you'll see the Pleiades rising above the nearly last quarter moon

An excellent aid for learning constellations and keeping up to date with the sky is the monthly Sky Calendar. A one year subscription is \$6 and is available from the Abrams Planetarium, Michigan State University, East Lansing, 48824.

#### The Perseid shower will be especially nice this year because there will be no moon in the sky scattering light. The darker the sky, the more meteors you can

# Giddyap, city slickers, dude the ranch thing

### Area residents saddle up in Wyoming

Julie Candler of Birmingham and the Sundance Kid if you visit the joined other local travelers re- Wyoming dude ranch known as the cently in Laramie, Wyoming.

You may be met by Butch Cassidy Laramie.

Wyoming dude ranch known as the Vee Bar. The sturdy pair of Belgian horses will provide an old-fashioned Western-style welcome by hauling a hay wagon to meet the train from

Colorado, built in 1887 to run to the tiny gold-mining town of Centennial just a couple of miles beyond the Vec

As our group leaves the train and climbs aboard the wagon where baled hay perfumes the air, we are greeted by a handsome man in a cowboy hat. He is Duane Harm, formerly seen in Michigan doing commentaries on WJRT-TV in Flint, which he managed in the mid-'60s.

After Harm signals a giddyap to Butch and Sundance, the two horses bounce us through tall yellow prairie grass. We clomp across lands where the Sioux and Cheyenne once rode, near a marker that says, "Overland Trail, 1862-1868."

A CAREFUL observer sees ruts left by pioneer wagon wheels. Everywhere we look, the horizon is lined with mountain ranges. If we watch closely, we can see antelope, deer and elk on nearby hills.

Butch and Sundance slow to cross a narrow wooden bridge. The rip-pling, rock-bottomed river below us is the Little Laramie, well-known to local trout fishermen. Just beyond, a huge log structure is the barn where horses were stabled when the Vee Bar was a stage coach stop. Along-side is a corral filled with beautiful

After a turn, we see the lodge, built 114 years ago and once a guest house for weary overland travelers. Inside, the walls seem to emit the ghostly figures of hardy homesteaders and settlers who once stayed

Harm retired last year from a career in TV management and bought the 870-acre Vee Bar. He and his pardner, wife Susan, turned it into a dude ranch because "we wanted to be with people, as well as horses."

Now people come to ride horse-back over 26,000 acres of plains and mountain trails. They also fish, hike, eat good food, shoot trap, go tubing on the river, play horseshoes and volleyball.

THE HARMS have renovated the lodge and added a roomy area where people can relax, around a big stone fireplace. Susan used her talent as a professional decorator to add color and coziness to the three cabins and 10 guest rooms, each with a bath.

Among recent guests in these rooms were sportscaster Curt Gowdy, his wife and daughter. Wyo-Governor Michael Sullivan stopped by the Vee Bar recently for a quiet getaway. Vicki Lange of Birmingham and Dutton Morehouse of igham Farms are here for a tour and outdoor barbecue with our

In winter, skiers using the nearby Snowy Range's 23 runs stay at the Vee Bar. Corporations and groups move in for secluded seminars and

Duane and Susan Harm turned the Vee Bar in Laramie, Wyo., into a dude ranch.


But the Vee Bar's biggest attraction is 30 beautiful riding horses. "We work hard to pick the right horses," says Harm. "We look for gentle, well-trained horses that know how to be ridden."

Horseback riding and all other ranch activities, plus three meals a day, are included in the Vee Bar's daily rates ranging from \$95 a day for one person to \$432 for five peo-

IF YOU come to the Vee Bar for a week, your riding skills will be assessed and a horse that suits you (with Western saddle) will be yours for your entire stay. You and your horse can go on breakfast, lunch or dinner rides, where guides stop along the trail and prepare food flavored by delicious mountain air. Or you can choose to ride to a picturesque spot in the hills for tenting over-

Guests say they prefer the downto-earth atmosphere at the Vee Bar to what they call "yuppie ranches" with condos and golf courses. Other dude ranches in the area are also serious about horseback riding and outdoor living.







### Out of the backfield, 'Coach' scores

### Success can't spoil Craig T. Nelson

By Suzanne Gill

Success is about to find both coach Hayden Fox and his fiancee, anchorwoman Christine Armstrong. This fall on ABC's "Coach," the fictional Minnesota State Screaming Eagles football team has an unheard of 10-1 season, while Christine is offered a network job that keeps her commuting to New York. The couple, played by Craig T. Nelson and Shelley Fabares, will live together, but their win-win professional situation puts an unexpected strain on their happiness.

As the series enters its fourth season, Nelson is worried success will somehow spoil "Coach," too.

The half-hour comedy started as a mid-season replacement in the spring of 1989, but was put on the bench behind "Chicken Soup." a star vehicle for Jackie Mason. When "Soup" sank early in the 1989-90 season, ABC called Nelson and Fabares, with co-star Jerry Van Dyke, to hold the line against declining ratings in the half-hour after 'Roseanne" on Tuesday nights.

Though it began as the story of a middle-age jock at the helm of a struggling college football team, the show has developed a subtext of emotional growth spurred by the angst of its central character and his relationship with the smart, sophisticated lady in his life. Diamond-in-the-rough Hayden is nothing like the other men Christine has known, while she offers him the warmth and encouragement he's missed along the way.

"She's extraordinarily drawn to him." says Fabares, "and her good sense tells her that this is it, this guy is great." The fact that Hayden faces his own shortcomings without urging from Christine is attractive to her character, Fabares feels.

Nelson is excited by Hayden's journey of self-discovery after a lifetime of emotional blustering.

"For a man who's never examined that and is quite afraid to do so, it can be a tremendous revela-

"We've been trying to get to that and put it in some sort of form that's funny. These are the things I want to explore in this guy.'

More than most stars, Nelson is involved in the development of his

show, which will take several plot turns in the coming season: Daughter Kelly (Clare Carey) gets a divorce; the team's success turns Luther's (Van Dyke) head; and the university hires a new budget-slashing

Asked if he considers the show a success, Nelson shifts uneasily in his chair. "Thee's so much more polish to give this show, and so many more attitudes to explore."

Even Emmy nominations (Nelson has been nominated twice) for the show, which consistently ranks in Nielsen's top 20, don't satisfy him. "That's great, but we can't rest on

"I'm scared to death that I love this thing. I loved "Call to Glory," and they took it away. And it broke my heart.

"I'm not grown up enough to say, 'Just love it while it's here.'






