Township candidates

With all of the elected offices in Plymouth Township up before voters in November, candidates have started to take out petitions.

By noon Friday, 10 candidates had taken out petitions.

They are Dennis Campbell, Charles Curmi, K.C. Mueller, Abe Munfakh, Ron Griffith, John Stewart and Greg Williams, all for trustee; Kathleen McCarthy, office unspecified; and Mary Brooks, treasurer.

Brooks is the only candidate so far to collect and file petition signatures.

Munfakh, Griffith, Stewart and Brooks are incumbents.

Smith Horton, a current trustee, has taken out petitions to seek the township clerk job.

Esther Hulsing, longtime township clerk, said she's not seeking another term.

"I'll be glad to do some volunteer work in the community," she said.

Candidates must get a minimum of 35 petition signatures to get on the ballot. The deadline for turning in petition signatures is 4 p.m. May 12.

Vacancies help city diversify

Take the hanky away from your face, downtown Plymouth. While several downtown businesses have recently failed, some business owners and city officials say this could be a time for opportunity, not sadness.

That's partly because the creation of more available business space downtown makes it possible for the downtown retail mix to diversify — something city officials have wanted for a long time.

"When things shake out, the downtown is stronger because of it," suggested City Manager Steve Walters.

"TRADITIONALLY, THE result is an improvement in the overall mix," he said.

Once one business leaves, "The odds are a stronger business will come into town than the one that left," Walters said.

"One positive aspect for the remaining downtown businesses that are doing well is they can strengthen their position by relocating," Walters said, to a bigger and more prominent and possibly better space.

Some business owners also see a positive side to some businesses leaving.

"The town is changing — the old has got to go," said Cathie Kessel of Brass and Iron Beds on Ann Arbor Trail downtown.

Hilda Bokos of Unique Accessories said that with some businesses leaving, space is created for businesses that Plymouth lacks.

Still kicking Business owners say they're 'alive, vital'

No, we're not closing our business!

That's what several downtown Plymouth business owners have been telling folks who come in their shops, after several businesses have closed.

And frankly, some of them are tired of dealing with the question, "Are you going to close?"

"You hear this over and over again," said Suzanne Bogden, owner of Aventura at Main and Ann Arbor Trail. "The negative has got to be erased."

Bogden said she's doing well, and so is Hilda Bokos of Unique Accessories. "Those of us who are strong will be fine. We're alive, we're vital," she said.

Still, when people come in lately, "The No. 1 thing they say is, 'What's happening to Plymouth, are you going to make it, or are you going to go out of business?'" she said.

"Because Fred Hill left town doesn't mean the shades are being drawn," she said.

Dale Knab, owner of Wiltse's Pharmacy, said people aren't asking if he'll close, but they are

interested in what's happening downtown.

"It's troubling because you don't want to see an empty store front, especially three or four of them," he said.

"We're doing quite well," Knab said.

"People come in and say, 'How's business?' and I say I'm doing as well as I've ever been," said Sharon Burton, owner of Burton Gallery antiques.

"It's a sad thing, a lot of businesses are closing, but you think, 'Why?'"

Former justice rallies support

Former state Supreme Court Justice Dennis Archer, the man who ran Detroit Mayor Coleman Young's 1977 re-election campaign, told members of the Kiwanis Club of Colonial Plymouth and the Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce Thursday that "I am not a candidate for mayor, contrary to popular belief. I am, of course, interested."

A Mayflower Meeting House capacity crowd heard Archer — who in late 1990 stepped down from the high court to enter private law practice and prepare for a mayoral run — present his "Thoughts for a Greater Detroit."

The 66-page document is a look at a stable, revitalized Detroit and the steps necessary to bring it about. His remarks, which emphasized the need for cooperation between the city and suburbs, were laced with levity and laughter.

TO DIG DETROIT out of the serious trouble it's in, "we must restore Detroit's confidence in itself," said Archer. "We need to insist upon a return to decency; we need a reaffirmation of respect for each other and for the law; we should demand a zero tolerance to crime; we need to reintroduce discipline, which begins in our

Archer gives suburbia his thoughts on Detroit

home; we need a renewed commitment to educational excellence; and we need to preserve and strengthen our family units."

With input from a cross-section of "knowledgeable Detroiters and several individuals from other states," Archer proposed solutions to problems involving crime, economic development, transportation, jobs, education, health care, housing, human resources and municipal finance.

Copies of his "Draft for Community Input" are available through his office at the Dickinson, Wright, Moon, Van Dusen & Freeman law firm in downtown Detroit.

The Observer also has copies available. Archer said he'd like to incorporate into the blueprint feedback from anyone wishing to suggest additional ideas.

In Archer's view:

- Alleviating crime must be the number one priority.

- "No aspect of our civic responsibility is more fundamental or important than the education of our children."
- "The city must acknowledge that effective use of human resources requires leadership, honesty, integrity and a willingness to share information."
- "The experiences of Pittsburgh, Atlanta, Baltimore and Cleveland have proven that economic development is possible even for cities

facing severe economic, racial and political problems. Drawing on those experiences, the dream of economic development can likewise be made a reality in Detroit."

- More Detroiters must enter the skilled trades. The inability to read and write, coupled with a lack of practical experience, prevents many from being job candidates."
- "We need to promote, both state-wide and regionally, Detroit's world-class hospitals and their proven ability to provide the most up-to-date quality health care."
- "A process is needed to build a housing partnership in Detroit around a comprehensive, city-wide affordable housing strategy."
- "Detroit, in its effort to become revitalized, must understand and optimize its greatest asset — its people."
- Because "Detroit's expenditures for most functions are relatively high, the city must evaluate carefully how effectively we are using the resources we now have."

Archer's position paper was distributed to agencies and individuals, including "anyone whose name has been mentioned as possible mayoral candidate. Why? Because I wanted to raise the price of admission, to assure that anyone presenting themselves to the citizens of Detroit would put the city of Detroit first," Archer said. "This way, there's a program people can buy into or not buy into."

ARCHER, who grew up in a poor family in Cassopolis, a small town 187 miles southwest of Detroit, said the only way Detroit can come back is through cooperative effort. He says suburbanites can run, but they cannot hide from the city.

Wanna-be mayor wows local crowd with speech

Reaction to former State Supreme Court justice Dennis Archer's speech to members of the Kiwanis Club of Colonial Plymouth and the Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce was overwhelmingly positive.

Plymouth City Commissioner Dennis Shrewsbury has known Archer for four or five years.

"I've always liked him," said Shrewsbury. "I told Justice Archer the week after he resigned last year that I would pledge my support to him. I think he would be a great asset to the city of Detroit."

Canton chiropractor Tom Gerou said people at his table were impressed by Detroit's would-be mayor. "He would make a great mayor. He's very organized and well-prepared," said Gerou. "He really has his heart into taking charge of the city and making it great again."

Gerou's brother, Plymouth attorney Mike Gerou, likes Archer's "creative new ideas," particularly as they pertain to cooperation between the city and the suburbs.

Pat Pulkownik, president-elect of the chamber of commerce, said, "I'm a property owner in Detroit and I'm giving him my card, telling him to call me if I can be of some help. I'm paying too much in taxes."

Plymouth city engineer Ken West said, "I'm impressed by Dennis Archer. It's easy for someone to criticize someone else. He didn't do that. Instead, he's proposed solutions, which is a subtle way of saying what's wrong."

Homemaker Julie Hoglen of Plymouth Township said she thought Archer related well to his audience.

"I think he has strong convictions, and I think he was sincere in making his points," Hoglen said. "He got us out of our little shell."

Archer has another supporter in Plymouth Police Commander Michael Gardner. Gardner, Kiwanis president, has gotten to know Archer at U of M football games, where they happen to have season's tickets near each other.

"Archer feels the need to work with people in the city and the suburbs," said Gardner. "He believes regional cooperation is a must if the region is to thrive."

Bill McMullen of Beyer Friendly Drugs on Ann Arbor Road was less enthused. "He sounded like a politician. But I respect the man," said McMullen. "He would be a welcome change, but I'm a little skeptical."

Justice resigned post

Detroit-born Justice Dennis Archer was appointed in 1985 to the Michigan Supreme Court by Gov. James Blanchard, becoming the first black justice to sit on the high court in nearly 30 years. In 1988, Archer was elected to an eight-year term on the Supreme Court.

Former president of the state Bar of Michigan, the National Bar Association and the Wolverine Bar Association, Archer has earned a national reputation as a highly successful trial lawyer. At the firm of Dickinson, Wright, Moon, Van Dusen & Freeman, Archer specializes in complex civil litigation, product liability and medical malpractice. Archer resigned the Supreme Court in 1990 to return to private practice as an equity partner at the downtown Detroit firm.

In 1984, Archer was named one of the 100 Most Influential Black

Americans by Ebony Magazine. He was listed among the 100 Most Powerful Attorneys in the United States by The National Law Journal in 1985.

Archer was named the Most Respected Judge in Michigan by Michigan Lawyers Weekly while on the Supreme Court.

In March, 1991, he was chosen as one of the 100 Most Influential Lawyers in America by The National Law Journal.

An avid runner and weight lifter, Archer is a graduate of Western Michigan University and the Detroit College of Law.

He has taught at the Detroit College of Law, Wayne State University School of Law, and has worked with civic organizations including the Michigan Cancer Foundation.

He is married to 36th District Court Judge Trudy Duncombe.

ARCHER WAS ASKED BY an audience member if he needed Coleman Young's permission to run. "I stopped asking permission a long time ago, except from my wife," he laughed. "I don't mean to be glib, but the answer is no. I am not worried about machines. If I'm running, I'm winning."

Aspiring judges? Attorneys express interest if new spot is created

The likely creation of a new local judgeship — a job that pays nearly \$100,000 annually — is sparking interest among several local lawyers eligible to run for the job.

The third 35th district court judgeship has not officially been approved by the state Legislature, so some local attorneys are reluctant to declare their candidacy.

But some are declaring strong interest in the situation.

"If they (legislators) do it, I will look at it then," said attorney Dennis Shrewsbury, a Plymouth city commissioner.

City Attorney Ron Lowe said, "I would have an interest in pursuing the office if it's created."

"Although I believe myself to be uniquely qualified, I believe it is premature to list those qualifications," Lowe said. "It is unethical to campaign for a judgeship that has not yet been created."

ASKED IF she's interested in running, Jeanne Stempfen, who heads the Schoolcraft College board of trustees, said, "Yes I am, assuming it goes through."

"I have been thinking about it for quite a while. I was interested in running two years ago when the Legislature authorized a seat, but it wasn't pursued by local communities," she said.

Local attorney Carol Levitte, administrative law judge for utility hearings and former racing commis-

sioner, said, "If the position were funded, I certainly would be interested," adding she's brought a lot of cases before the 35th District Court.

"No decision has been made yet," said Plymouth attorney Liz Johnson.

Some prominent local attorneys who said they're not interested in running include John Vos, Plymouth city commissioner; Bruce Patterson, director of planned giving for Eastern Michigan University; and John Stewart, who is seeking re-election as a Plymouth Township trustee.

She suggested a record store or clothes store for young people, adding, "There's no place for them (youth) to go."

"You take a lemon and make lemonade," said downtown development authority member and former mayor David Pugh.

He suggested that the economic downturn could cause city officials to consider easing regulations on businesses that don't encourage them to come to town.

Still on the books is a system by which businesses, depending on their on-site parking and size — must pay the city \$4,000 for each parking space they aren't able to provide on site.

Farmhouse retains rural heritage

Norma Baker Cassady likes to remember back to 1945, when she and her husband, Roderick, bought a then 70-year-old, New England style farmhouse along with two barns, two silos, a pig house, a chicken coop, a smokehouse and a three-person "necessary" (furnished with the Sears Roebuck catalogue), all on 265 acres of land on Territorial Road.

Today, the Cassady home sits on three acres, flanked by century-old trees and the only remaining outbuilding, the cow barn, which has a coat of green paint, a new roof and the original lightning rods.

The house still retains much of its original character, thanks to Cassady who has a love of preservation and antiques.

"WHEN WE BOUGHT the place, most of the outbuildings were so dilapidated that they had to be torn down," she said. "The horse barn was 2½ stories tall with hay stored on the second floor. Of the two silos, one wood, and the other tile, the tile one seemed sturdy enough to me," she said.

However, the village fathers thought it should go, too.

"I begged those fellows to save it. I wanted to be able to go up to the top and look around the county, but they wouldn't listen to me," she said.


In 1955 the Cassadys sold thirty acres of railroad frontage to Western Electric, and the remainder of the farm acreage is now the New England Subdivision.

The house was built in 1875 by Marcus Miller on a farm that he had inherited from his father, John Miller. There was a log cabin before that, she said.

Cassady knows her Plymouth history, having lived here for all of her 98 years. She was born Norma Maria Baker, on her grandparents farm that was located on the corner of Beck and Territorial.

Her grandparents were neighbors of the Marcus Millers, and the families would get together at husking bees, barn raisings, and during threshing time. When Cassady was two, she, along with her parents moved into the village.

WHEN SHE WAS in her teens, the Millers retired from their farm and moved into the village on Oak Street (now called Starkweather) where the



two families again became neighbors. She never dreamed that later on she would live in the Miller farmhouse.

By the time the Cassady's bought the house in 1948, the Miller farm had had a succession of owners. At one time it was known as Maple Lawn Dairy Farm. According to Plymouth Historical Society records, one of the four log school houses at which Plymouth children were educated through the eighth grade a century ago stood on the Miller farm at the corner of Sutton (Territorial) and Moreland (Sheldon) roads.

The Cassadys made several changes to the old Miller house.

"The house had no piped-in water except for a small rainwater pump in the kitchen sink," she said.

The old cistern is still in evidence on the west side of the house. A bird-bath, visible from the present-day sun room sits perched on the cement cover.

"The low, one-story wing at the back of the house was in such poor condition that in 1975 we restored it, replaced all the windows, window frames and inside doors throughout the house. We had the new walls of the back wing, and the old walls on the front wing insulated for warmth. We also attached a garage in the rear," she said.

THE HOUSE IS T-shaped. The two-story front wing with gable has a narrow porch with wooden grillwork. On one wall of the porch, and facing east, is a large, five-pointed wooden star. Mrs. Miller was a member of the Eastern Star. To the right of the front doors is a plaque dated 1977, the year that the American Association of University Women designated the house as a historic landmark.

When refurbishing the inside, the Cassadys took great care to maintain the historic character of the home.

The wooden staircase that sits in the main hall between the two parlors was built from walnut trees that grew on the property. Cassady said the staircase was "painted white when we moved in, and I had it restored to its original walnut finish, so it looks just like it did when the house was first built."

The old dining room has been enlarged into a family room, and paneled with Ohio maple. Some of the massive beams from the horse barn have been installed as part of the plastered ceiling. The beams are in perfect condition and you can see the hand-hewn ax marks.

On one dining room wall, a long sideboard showcases a collection of antique glass and on the opposite wall, a large hearth displays such items as an iron pot, tin candle molds and sleigh bells. Pulled close to the hearth is a small, caned chair that belonged to Cassady when she was a little girl.

Above a sofa is a painting of a blacksmith shop that used to stand in Plymouth on Kellogg park. Of the caned double bench by the hutch, Cassady said, "That is a parlor bench from Pennsylvania, and on Sundays, the bench was put on the back of the wagon, and the women sat there for the ride to church."

The three upstairs bedrooms also contain interesting items. One room has a rope bed made by a Plymouth man. You can still see the holes in the bottom frame where the ropes were tied to support a feather mattress.

THE CHEST AT the foot of the bed came from the Henry Baker house in Plymouth.

He wears wire rim glasses with clear lenses, and a dirty, brown, long tweed overcoat and brown slacks. He has no facial hair. The suspect carried a handgun with a square grip covered with dirty white adhesive tape.

It's believed the suspect may be responsible for other area robberies, because the composite — produced by police with help from eye witnesses — resembles an FBI photograph of a suspect in another recent bank robbery, Plymouth Commander Michael Gardner said.

Police have no leads so far, but "the FBI is confident law enforcement ultimately will get him. We don't have anything yet, and would appreciate calls from anyone who may have some information," Gardner said. "He is distinctive looking. I've got to believe someone is going to recognize him."

Canton woman fends off attacker

A Canton woman in her late 60s reported she was recently attacked by a man in Holiday Park in Westland.

But police said she retaliated and could have prevented a possible rape.

She described him as a white male, 18-24 years old, 5-foot-4-inches tall, with a medium build and neck length brown curly hair. He was wearing oil stained blue jeans and boots.

The attack took place about 4:45 p.m. on Jan. 7 as she was walking in the park near the Koppernick entrance, said Westland police Sgt. Laura Moore.

The victim told police the man made remarks that were sexual and punched her in the face. As she was falling to the ground, the woman told police, she retaliated and apparently hurt her attacker. He didn't have a weapon.

He became angry and kicked her in the face, Moore said.

"HE WORKED her over pretty well," she added.

The man fled in a reddish color, box-type car.

Moore said she believes the man lives in the Wayne County area, or he likely wouldn't be familiar with the remote park.

"He has to be someone familiar with that particular area," she said.

Moore said she believes the attack was an isolated incident, adding there have been no other similar incidents reported prior or since.

Police advise that fighting and screaming are good ideas if the attacker doesn't have a weapon. Moore said the woman's resistance may have prevented a rape.

"I think that's why he fled," Moore said. "She must have hurt him. If there's no weapon involved, scream and try to get away. If there's a weapon I wouldn't suggest resisting."

GOP expected to back 'open' primary

Voters in the March 17 Republican presidential primary won't have to declare a party preference if the party changes its rules tonight, as scheduled.

State GOP chair Dave Doyle called a special meeting of the Republican State Committee (RSC) at 6:30 p.m. in the Lansing Civic Center to try to make a rules change allowing an "open" primary.

Under it, voters would be asked at the polls, "In which primary do you wish to vote?" said party spokesman Bryan Flood.

Those who answer "Republican" will either be given a party ballot or directed to a Republican voting machine, he said.

The fact that they vote would be recorded, as usual, but not the fact that they chose the Republican ballot.

The RSC is the governing body of the party between conventions. It is

composed of members from each congressional district and 13 at-large officers.

DEMOCRATS still must declare a Democratic affiliation at the polls before being given a ballot. National Democratic rules require a "closed" system in which only declared Democrats may take part in picking the presidential nominee.

"We had hoped they would join us in an open primary," said the GOP's Flood.

With both parties changing their rules, a state law requiring voters to declare a party affiliation by Feb. 18 is superceded.

Attorney General Frank Kelley ruled that a U.S. Supreme Court decision allows party rules to take precedence over state law because a political party is a "voluntary association."

IT'S STILL possible to figure out who voted in the Republican primary. One could compile a list of those who vote March 17, delete the de-

clared Democrats and conclude everyone else voted Republican.

Republican candidates are incumbent George Bush, columnist Pat Buchanan and state Rep. David Duke of Louisiana.

Democratic candidates are former Gov. Edmund (Jerry) Brown of California, Gov. Bill Clinton of Arkansas, Sen. Tom Harkin of Iowa, Sen. Bob Kerry of Nebraska, former Sen. Paul Tsongas of Massachusetts and the imprisoned Lyndon LaRouche.

Voters will not see the names of potential national convention dele-

gates. The parties will apportion delegates on the basis of the candidate's voting strength.

Bench strength Report cites need for judges

One local district court has too many judges and another too few, according to a recent state report.

But officials at the 17th District Court, Redford, aren't worried about losing a judge and officials at the 35th District Court, Plymouth, say a third judge appears headed their way.

Court administrator Marilyn K. Hall told legislators Michigan needs a increase at nearly all levels, state Court of Appeals, county circuit courts and local district courts.

A new judge for the Plymouth-Canton-Northville area district court, would be one of six district judges added statewide.

"Some of the lawyers in our community are already getting their bumper stickers ready," Judge John Garber said.

Hall's report, based on case load, showed the two-judge 35th District Court actually needs 2.75, and should add one soon.

"Four years ago, the Legislature approved the third judge but our communities didn't approve," Garber said. "Now, our communities have approved so it's up to the Legislature."

Four communities with declining case loads — Pontiac, Lansing, Muskegon and Flint — would "sun-

set" district judges. The posts wouldn't be abolished until a vacancy occurs by either retirement or resignation, she said.

Despite a case load recommendation for 1.42 judges, Redford wasn't included in that list.

"Our case load really varies from year to year," Judge John Dillon said. "Next year, they could estimate we need slightly better than two judges."

The 16th district Court, Livonia, fell just short of the qualifications for an additional judge.

Livonia, with two judges, needs 2.56. A new judge won't be recommended until the need reaches 2.68.

Court official aren't holding their breath awaiting a new judge.

"We have a magistrate who comes in for some cases, so things are really going pretty well," Judge Robert Brzezinski said.

Staffing at other area court should remain as it is, the report showed.

Westland, with two judges, needs 2.17, according to the report. Garden City, with one judge, needs 1.26.

Wayne County Circuit and Detroit Records Court were not analyzed statistically because of their unusual structure, with circuit court handling civil cases and records court handling criminal cases.

Wayne Probate Court, with nine judges, needs 8.75.

To add a judge next Jan. 1, the Legislature must act "immediately,"

Hall told lawmakers. "The deadline for filing for the primary is May 12."

Outside of Detroit and Wayne County courts, local units pay part of the cost of each judge and must agree to create a judgeship.

Despite recommendations, Gov. John Engler said his 1993 budget would contain no increase for the judiciary.

Courts are expanding nationwide. THE CULPRIT appears to be what President Bush calls "America's love affair with the lawsuit."

"The decade of the '80s," said Hall's report, "was a period of accelerated case load growth for Michigan trial courts with reported new filings increasing by over 70 percent. Between 1984 and 1990, new filings increased by 43 percent, or over one million additional filings per year."

Biggest case explosion occurred in the Court of Appeals, which Michigan didn't have until 1964. Founded with nine judges, it has tripled in size.

Hall argues that the Michigan Court of Appeals has a far bigger case load than the average of other states — 547 filings per judge predicted for this year versus 154 for the national median.

"Michigan would need 80 Court of Appeals judges for 1991 in order to match the national median," her report said.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. AMENDMENTS TO SECTION 24.020 OF CHAPTER 24, FIRE PREVENTION CODE

Chapter 24, Fire Prevention Code Enforcement Ordinance, Section 24.020 changes in the Code. This section makes changes to the BOCA National Fire Prevention Code of 1990 (the "Code") which was adopted, by reference and incorporated into the Code of Ordinance of the Charter Township of Plymouth by Ordinance No. C-91-08. The changes to said Code are as follows:

F-100.1 is amended to provide for the Title of the Ordinance.
F-101.1.1 is added to provide that this Ordinance shall apply to air-supported, air-inflated, membrane-covered frame structures.
F-101.3.2 is added to ensure that approved automatic sprinkler systems shall be installed in all buildings.
F-105.4 is amended to allow the Fire Chief to survey all buildings to ensure that all fire safety equipment and devices that are necessary are available.
F-200.1.1 is added to provide that no tent or air-supported structure is used for gathering ten or more persons without first obtaining a permit from the Building Official and the Fire Official.
F-301.1 is amended to prohibit all open burning.
F-404.4 is amended to require that all buildings shall be equipit with a minimum of one 110 volt UL approved smoke detector and a heat protection system.
F-500.7 is added to ensure that all buildings, except dwellings, shall be situated within 300 feet of a public fire hydrant.
F-500.8 is added to provide that all single unit buildings over 100 feet in length and over 100 feet from a public road shall have supplemental fire protection.
F-500.9 is added to provide exceptions to the applicability of Sections F-500.7 and F-500.8.
F-500.10 is added to prohibit tampering with fire hydrants or fire extinguishers.
F-2700.4 is added to provide a definition of the word "fireworks."
F-2803.1.2 is added to restrict the location of Class 1 liquids in above ground tanks within the Township.
F-2804.0 is amended to ensure that self-service gasoline dispensing stations and garages comply with all applicable ordinances and codes and provide fire extinguishing systems.
F-2810.1 is added to prohibit new bulk processing or industrial plants and distilleries with the Township.
F-3500.0 is added to provide the Fire Official with authority at fires and other emergencies.

SECTION 2. VIOLATION AND PENALTY.

This section provides for penalties for violation of this Ordinance.

SECTION 3. SAVINGS CLAUSE.

This section provides that adoption of this Ordinance does not affect proceedings, prosecutions, for violations of law, penalties, and matured rights and duties in effect before the effective date of this Ordinance.

SECTION 4. SEVERABILITY.

This section provides that any unenforceable section can be severed from the rest of the Ordinance.

SECTION 5. REPEAL OF INCONSISTENT ORDINANCES.

This section provides that all Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are repealed to the extent of such conflict.

SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This section provides that this Ordinance shall become effective upon its publication.

Operation Lifesaver

Engineer teaches respect for train's power

Every time someone dies in a train-car collision, Albert Gampp of Livonia thinks of a small town near Benton Harbor and of the truck driver he almost killed.

Gampp was the engineer on a train going 55 mph near Benton Harbor that hit the back end of a semi-trailer truck crossing the tracks.

The train's engine pushed the rear end of the truck one mile down the tracks before Gampp finally was able to stop it.

The collision severed the cab of the truck from its back end, and as

Gampp walked the mile back to the intersection he had no way of knowing if the driver had survived or had died.

"The truck was carrying a load of lumber and as I walked back I saw lumber on the tracks that was shredded like toothpicks," said Gampp, an engineer for 30 years for the CSX Railroad. "I found parts of the truck all along the tracks."

The driver of that truck was among the very lucky who have survived a collision between a train and a vehicle.

EVERY YEAR, according to railroad statistics, hundreds of people are killed and thousands of people

seriously hurt in close to 6,000 train-vehicle collisions nationwide.

In 1990, almost 700 people were killed in crashes at rail-highway crossings across the nation.

This month, two off-duty Michigan State Police troopers were killed after apparently gambling that they could beat a train at the Grand Trunk tracks in Waterford Township. The officers drove around the gates; their car was hit broadside by the train and burst into flames.

The number of fatalities and injuries are so alarming to railroad officials that in 1972 all railroad companies banded together to form "Operation Lifesaver."

The purpose of the program is to educate people on the rules of railroad safety.

Many of the railroad workers nationwide who take part in the program are engineers who, like Gampp, have come close to killing someone.

GAMPP WILLINGLY talks about the Benton Harbor truck driver because the driver escaped death. But he won't talk about the crash he had in which someone died.

"Every engineer can tell you a hair-raising story about trains, cars and crashes," Gampp said. "Some engineers see it happen many times. They always have to live with these deaths. They never forget."

Gampp, who runs a train out of Plymouth, also works part time as a spokesman for "Operation Lifesaver." He takes his message to lo-

cal elementary schools (Don't walk along railroad tracks), to high schools (Don't try to beat a train at a crossing) and to school bus drivers (Don't go around the crossing gate).

In today's fast-paced, space-age world, many forget the power behind trains, which often seem like relics from a different time.

Compounding the false illusion is the fact that, viewed from afar at a crossing, trains look small, harmless and slow.

In reality, trains pack a weight up to 250,000 pounds and, at 55 mph, travel another mile after the engineer slams on the brakes.

POWER, WEIGHT, speed and having the right of way, it's a deadly combination for careless drivers.

"The train looks so far away, but it's deceiving," Gampp said. "At 50 mph, a train travels 70 feet per second. Drivers think they have time to get across the crossing), but they're only allowed one fatal mistake. When it's a tie at a railroad crossing, the driver loses."

Trying to beat a moving train and going around a downed gate are two of the deadliest mistakes a driver can make, Gampp said.

However, it can be equally as deadly to walk on railroad tracks, climb into box cars, or move forward too fast once a train has passed. A second train could be coming on a second track.

"On double tracks, you can miss one train only to be hit by another one," Gampp said.

Parents, kids learn together

Middle school students and parents from the Plymouth Canton Community School District will participate in a Parents' Geography Project on Tuesday, Feb. 11, at West Middle School.

Sixth-, seventh- and eighth-grade students from Central, East, Lowell, Pioneer and West middle schools will join parents in this hour-long session which begins at 7:30 p.m. in West Middle School cafeteria.

The workshop will be led by Marjane Baker, a fifth-grade teacher at Allen Elementary School, who is a consultant for the Michigan Geographic Alliance. The program, offered at elementary schools across the state, is funded

by the Michigan Geographic Alliance and the Michigan Council for the Humanities.

According to Sheila Alles, Plymouth Canton curriculum coordinator for reading and social studies, the workshop is designed to increase global awareness among families and to encourage parents to take an active part in their child's geography instruction.

Discussion for the evening will focus on a current event, with a study of the area in which the event is taking place. To help study the area, each family participating will receive a free world map.







Airport noise debate revving up once again

Most days, William Brackett has to strain his ears to hear the sound of a jet engine.

That is a big change from one year ago, when jet noise was driving Brackett and thousands of other western Wayne residents batty.

"It's better now," said Brackett, whose eastern Garden City neighborhood is squarely in Metro Airport flight patterns. "There are still days when it's not so good, but it's nothing like it was."

That means Brackett and others in Livonia, Westland and Redford neighborhoods won't want to hear this message: This summer, airport noise will probably increase.

ONE YEAR ago, residents voiced their noise concerns — loud and clear — at a series of public hearings throughout the county. Airport noise loomed as one of Wayne County's biggest controversies in early 1991.

Action was taken. Flights re-routed over suburban neighborhoods in a Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) safety move a few years earlier — prompting complaints — were re-routed again last summer in a 180-day test.

In most neighborhoods, noise complaints tailed off quickly and sharp-

ly. But the test is long over and the old routes are back.

"Complaints may be down, but that's because it's winter," deputy county executive Michael Duggan said. "People are inside more and they're keeping their windows shut. When summer comes, we expect complaints to go up again."

Permanent relief is on the way, Duggan said.

It's arrival, however, is the focus of a new county controversy.

Members of an anti-noise citizens coalition and an county commission airport study group both say the county executive's office is dragging its feet in bringing about a permanent solution.

"THIS IS a major undertaking and they're under economic pressure from Northwest," said David Esper of Citizens Against Airport Noise.

Northwest is the airport's chief passenger airline, with more flights than almost all others combined. Task force recommendations urged Northwest to upgrade its fleet, replacing older, noisier jets with newer models.

At the same time, commissioner Susan Hubbard, D-Dearborn, had pressed for a cost benefit study for all items on the 34-item list drawn up by her anti-noise commission task force.

County officials said Thursday the

information was available and would be forthcoming.

Duggan, however, said any delay in finding a permanent cure was caused by the lengthy, deliberate procedure used by the FAA in assessing or altering flight patterns.

The executive's office continues to lobby FAA officials to revise routes, Duggan said.

Despite task force suggestions ranging from "noise budgets" for permissible volume levels, nighttime flight restrictions and limits on ground "run ups" — engine acceleration prior to take off — Duggan said noise won't be fully abated until routes are permanently changed.

The summer test fanned out jet takeoffs over a larger number of Wayne County communities, reducing flights over the Middlebelt Road corridor and Dearborn.

While it made many residents happy, it displeased others.

The goal was to put more flights over less populated southern cities and townships.

"I'd say the people in Livonia, Garden City and parts of Dearborn Heights and Inkster were pretty pleased, those in Dearborn a little more lukewarm and those south of the airport were unhappy," Esper said.

That means western Wayne homeowners will continue to hear noise. So will their elected officials.

Ex-rep's appointment blocked

Former state representative Teola Hunter wasn't appointed Wayne County health and community services director Thursday, the latest in a series of personnel disputes between the county executive and county commission.

"It's gotten to the point where if the county executive says the sky is blue, they'll say it's gray," deputy county executive Michael Duggan said.

Hunter, an 11-year state House

veteran, resigned last month to join Wayne County Executive Edward McNamara's staff.

Commissioners rejected Hunter's appointment Thursday, arguing McNamara should have filed a second-term reorganization plan with them first.

"He's 13 months into his second term and there's still no (reorganization) plan," said Kay Beard, D-Westland.

Commissioners also complained the executive declined to specify


how Hunter's post would be financed.

The move is more than symbolic. Rejection blocks her from making policy and from advancing to the deputy director pay level, said commission Chairman Arthur Blackwell, D-Detroit.

STILL, HUNTER remains on the county payroll and will serve in the same capacity she has since January.

Several appointments have been delayed or rejected in McNamara's five years as executive, though many commissioners said they had a tough time voting against Hunter — formerly one of Lansing's most powerful legislators.



If you see folks on Valentine's Day wearing gold hearts on their sleeves, ask if they know the Rosie Rags story. Chances are they do, thanks to a local fund-raising effort for children's charities.

Rosie, the doll with a heart of gold, is ambassador for Variety Club International, which, along with F&M Distributors, has brought the successful Gold Heart Day campaign to metro Detroit. The effort originated last year in Great Britain and raised more than \$2 million.

Rocks take double-OT win from Glenn

If the Western Lakes Activities Association produces a "Greatest Games of the WLAA" videotape, Friday's thrilling Plymouth Salem-Westland John Glenn game should be included.

Thanks to James Head's dramatic steal and layup, the visiting Rocks prevailed with a 65-64, double-overtime victory.

With :24 remaining in the second overtime, Head stole a Glenn pass, drove the length of the floor and was fouled as he laid the ball in. The 6-foot-6 sophomore's free throw gave Salem a 63-58 lead.

After senior Micah Orr nailed a three-pointer, Eric Stemmer calmly sank two free throws, to put the Rocks ahead 65-61. John Miller canned a triple at the buzzer for the game's final points.

Salem improved to 8-4 overall and 5-2 in

the WLAA. The Rockets evened their records at 6-6 and 4-4.

BOTH COACHES said it was the type of game they hated to see someone lose and agreed the game was one they will not soon forget.

"I've never been in a game this fun, to this extent in boys basketball," Glenn coach Pat Bennett said. "I told the team this was one of the greatest games I've ever seen or been a part of. Add to that the rivalry between Glenn and Salem, and that made it more of a great game."

"I've been in a few fun games in this gym," Salem coach Bob Brodie said. "In the 1985-86 season, we played for the conference championship here and won at the buzzer."

"I have faith in the team's poise. We've been in an overtime game against Farming-

ton Hills Harrison, and I never thought we were going to lose tonight."

Trailing 50-48 with :10 remaining in regulation, Glenn's Ken Taylor converted two free throws to knot the game at 50-50. Mike Slone's 10-foot baseline jumper rimmed out as time expired.

The Rockets looked as if they had the game won in the first overtime after two free throws each by Kevin Tomaszewski and Taylor gave Glenn a 54-51 lead with 1:14 left.

SLONE MISSED a triple, but the ball was rebounded by Salem's Mike Abraham. He missed the putback, but Taylor was called

for going over Bob Schneider's back. Schneider made both ends of the one-and-one opportunity and closed the margin to one point with :51 left.

Glenn's Kevin Champion missed a jumper and Taylor committed his fifth foul by going over Abraham's back. Abraham sank the first free throw to tie the game at 54-54.

The Rockets had a chance to win the game with :09 left, but Chris Smith missed the front end of his one-and-one attempt. The game went to the second overtime after Abraham's running one hander at the buzzer was a little too strong.

"I told Pat this was a great high school basketball game. It means more when you win a game like this on the road. The philosophy is, if you go into overtime on the road, you'd better be ready to play. You're going against a tough crowd and a tough team, and you'd better buckle up your chinstraps."

Head and Champion exchanged buckets to open the second overtime. Head and


Schneider both made two free throws to give the Rocks a 60-56 lead. Smith scored on a layup to bring the Rockets within two. Salem had a chance to tie the game 12 seconds later, but Head came up with the heroic steal and driving layup.

"I felt the steal but I wasn't sure if he was going to pass it," Head said, noting he never gave up on the Rocks' chances for victory. "I never thought we had lost the game. Like the coach says, until the buzzer sounds, the game isn't over."

AS SALEM players swarmed on the floor after the game, a dejected Glenn team headed back to its locker room.

"It hurts," Orr said. "Everybody in the locker room is still down. But we knew we played a whale of a game. We knew Salem was good and would give us a run for our money."

Falcons dethrone Salem as Lakes dual champion

The site was the Plymouth Salem gymnasium and not Buckingham Palace, but a changing of the guard took place nonetheless Thursday night.

In a showdown for the Lakes Division dual-meet wrestling title, Farmington dethroned Plymouth Salem 42-26 and ended Salem's nine-year reign.

"It's the first time since I've been coach (five years) that we've beaten Salem," Farmington coach Al Beyar said, sharing credit with assistants Barry Walsh and Dave Denny. "It's a big shot in the arm, a big boost."

The Falcons finished with a 5-0 record in Lakes duals and improved to 12-1-1 overall. Salem, the three-time defending Western Lakes Activities Association champ, is 4-1 and 6-7.

Beyar couldn't yet commit Farmington to the kind of long-term success the Rocks have enjoyed, but the Falcons clearly are having a great season, which includes winning the first Observerland tournament.

"THIS IS just an exceptional group of kids we have at Farmington," Beyar said, adding nine of the

wrestling

13 wrestlers in the lineup Thursday were seniors.

"We've got some good people coming back next year, but we won't have the senior depth we have this year. Some of them have been together since the sixth grade and it's their year."

Salem took an 18-6 lead after four matches on consecutive pins by Brian Harreld, Scott Martin and Dan Bonnett; however, the Falcons won seven of the last nine bouts to run away with the victory.

The Rocks led 24-20 after Jeff Shumate pinned (3:57) Jason Holliday in the 145-pound contest, but Farmington had two superior decisions, two pins and a draw in the remaining five weights.

"We don't have enough firepower," Salem coach Ron Krueger said. "We got to 152 and we knew there was not another win left. We were kinda hoping but it didn't happen."

"The only bright spot of the evening was at 112. Harreld is a freshman and that was his first varsity match. He did a nice job."

FARMINGTON'S Dave Monge (152) defeated Pete TenBroeck 9-0 to tie the score at 24. Pins by Mike Pallo (160) over Doug Wind (4:28) and Ryan Adams (171) over Tally Sny (3:56) all but clinched the win as the Falcons led 36-24.

Farmington's Rob Cavagnol, the Observerland champion at 189, and Phil Haynes battled to a 3-3 tie after the Salem wrestler rallied for three points in the last period, the third coming on an escape with 18 seconds left.

That assured the Falcons of the win, and heavyweight Matt Siskosky finished with an 11-0 decision over Jamie Breithaupt.

"(The upper weights are) one of our strong points," Beyar said. "It was just a question of whether we could get some pins up there."

"The Salem kids always do a good job. They fight the entire match. They can come back at any time and score points or get a stick. They're known for that."

Farmington's John Economy (103) started by pinning Scott Hughes (1:30) before the Rocks surged behind pins by Harreld, 4:31 over Chris Darnell; Martin, 2:41 over John Lane; and Bonnett, 5:56 over Jon Duff, at the next three weights.

Rolling Rocks Salem swimmers sample success

For the first two months of the swim season, Plymouth Salem struggled without success to win a dual meet.

Now the Rocks are on a roll, having won their last two.

Salem is 2-0 in the Lakes Division of the Western Lakes Activities Association after defeating Farmington 98-97 Thursday and Westland John Glenn 135-50 the previous week.

The Rocks, 2-5-1 overall, face more tough competition in the weeks ahead, however. They visit defending WLAA champ and state-ranked Livonia Stevenson later this week and will be host to once-beaten North Farmington on Thursday, Feb. 27.

"We're swimming a little better, and that will be our main objective" in the Stevenson meet, Salem coach Chuck Olson said. "We'll go over there with that as our goal — to do as well as we can."

"We'll see how much of a lineup change we can force (Stevenson coach Doug Buckler) into making."

Salem's Aaron Berlin won two events and anchored the winning 400-yard freestyle relay team against Farmington.

Berlin swam the 200 freestyle in 1:55.81 and the 500 freestyle in 5:11.05. The relay unit consisted of Joe Ervin, Brett Petroskey, Matt Erickson and Berlin. The Rocks finished in 3:33.03.

Salem's Steve Salhaney won the diving with a career-best 271.35 points, and Erickson also had an individual victory in the butterfly with a time of 1:00.01.

David Bracht was first in the 50 freestyle (24.07) and combined with Petroskey, Ervin and Fred Locke to win the 200 freestyle relay in 1:37.15.

Farmington winners were Mark Scanio, individual medley (2:13.39); Don Boyer, 100 freestyle (53.01); Scott Frump, backstroke (57.91); and Kevin Yoder, breaststroke (1:05.51).

The Falcons also won the medley relay with Frump, Yoder, Scanio and Scott Brown turning in a time of 1:45.72.

Salem's Ervin was second in the IM (2:15.04) and the 100 freestyle (53.26), and Justin Richardson went over 200 points for the first time in diving with a third-place total of 207.85.

Scott Helmstader, Phil Hoffmeyer, Erickson

and Bracht comprised the runner-up team in the medley relay (1:46.04).

PLYMOUTH CANTON improved to 3-1 in the WLAA, 2-0 in the Western Division and 5-2 overall by clobbering Livonia Franklin in a dual meet Thursday at Livonia Churchill, 123-63.


Jeff Clark, Pat Lancaster, Mike Orris and Craig Steshetz won the 200 and 400 freestyle relays with respective times of 1:32.5 and 3:30.3, and each one also had an individual victory.

Clark was first in the 200 freestyle (2:01), Lancaster the 50 freestyle (23.4), Orris the butterfly (57.2) and Steshetz the 100 freestyle (52.6).

Matt Tertel won the 500 freestyle (5:28.3) and anchored Canton's winning medley relay team, which included Bryan Lang, Ryan Henkel and Joe Foster. The Chiefs posted a 1:32.1 time.

Canton's Nick Atwell had 223.9 points to win the diving, and John Mincher captured first in the backstroke with a 1:05.3 time.

Zavagnin, a Redford Catholic Central senior, was expected to sign a national letter of intent Wednesday with UNC to play soccer and possibly football as a freshman next fall. 
the Irish don't have as strong a soccer program as the other schools he was considering and not as prestigious a physical therapy program.







"Turn your head . . ."
"Move to the right . . ."
"Chin up . . . That's good!"
"More light underneath, guys."
"OK, freeze!"
Click . . . Flash . . . Flash . . .

With more than three dozen pieces of portable photographic equipment, including expensive Arri lights, reflectors, two 35mm cameras and a variety of lenses, stands and tripods, a Bloomfield Hills car dealer's showroom was temporarily transformed into a setting for an elaborate photographic session.

At center stage was two of metro Detroit's most notable of their respective crafts — fashion photographer Lisa Spindler and hair stylist Hoffer Shanouni. Each had their own idea on how the shoot should be orchestrated, and, egos aside, each allowed the other space for artistic creativity.

"These photos are going to be great," boasted Spindler as she perched her trim frame atop a chair to get a better view of her subjects.

Instructing her two assistants on how to set up for one of hundreds of shots she took that day, Spindler continued to move about in an almost frenzy-like manner while Hoffer watched in awe.

THE FIVE models, actually clients of Hoffer's, were "gorgeous." Well-known television makeup artist Robin Manogian had created identical looks for each woman. Smooth powdered skin with just a hint of blush. Cleopatra style eyeliner, very long lashes and very lush red matte lipstick.

All wearing black attire, they posed atop a vintage 1956 Rolls Royce Bentley with a rare charcoal-colored Afghan, named Paris.

It seemed every phase of the production had class. Even the dog followed instructions to a tee.

With music blasting from a portable cassette player, the atmosphere was reminiscent of an overly sensational Hollywood photo session.

Hey, if everything looks important, then it must be important, right? If the theory holds, then Hoffer is on his way to widespread recognition.

his personal advertising and marketing plan will earn him national recognition as one of the country's most talented hair stylists.

"I'VE ALWAYS been very good at styling all kinds of hair," he said. "I can usually please every client who comes to me by creating a new look that suits them. I'm thankful for my talent . . . It's a gift."

Hoffer is currently employed as artistic director and chief stylist at Centofanti's Salon in Southfield. His client list includes some of the area's most well-heeled professional women, socialites and media stars.

"The one woman I really want to makeover is Lynn Thomas (wife of Pistons' star Isaiah Thomas)," he said. "She has gorgeous hair and, with her face, I could really create a dynamic look for her."

But since he's friends with her stylist, he concedes he would "never" try to woo another colleague's clients.

"I never knock anybody; it just isn't courteous," he said.

Granted stylists are known to be among the biggest gossips and to go to great lengths to attract clients, especially those with big names, but Hoffer prefers to have his name become a household word.

"When you know you are really good, it's important to get the word out. That's why I'm doing this."

AS SPINDLER continued her relentless pursuit of the perfect pose, the crew spent another 30 minutes re-setting the lights and makeup artists powdered shiny spots that were beginning to show on the models' foreheads because of the hotlights.

"I know I'm pretty hard," said Spindler matter of factly, sensing that the models are beginning to tire.

In a flash, Hoffer enters the final scene for this portfolio, dressed in black shirt and trousers and a cobalt blue cashmere blazer. With his beauties perched around him on the back bumper of the Rolls, he was in his world, one he hopes will continue to expand as he pursues a career in the spotlight.

With a five-figure promotional budget, Spindler's creativity and guidance from a public relations expert, Hoffer seems destined for the big time.

"But don't get me wrong, I have no desire to move to New York or Chicago," he said. "My work is here."

The Jamersons keep on jamming

Their demo tape held little promise and they stumbled through a sound check with a set of out-of-tune guitars. But bands like the Jamersons persevere.

Always have, always will. The four-man contingent whose name is taken in tribute to Motown bass player James Jamerson rips into a 12-song, power-chord-driven set unrestrained and totally immersed in the specter of rock'n'roll.

They are seemingly free of the posturing, devoid of the clichés of snarled lips and fists in the air. Their opening set at the Hamtramck Pub is a joy to witness.

Oh sure, there are the unnecessary calisthenics and the open betrayal of influences (Replacements being the most obvious). The Jamersons intentions are pure.

"If I had it my way, I'd play every night," said bassist and vocalist Scott Greenberg, 26, a 1984 graduate of Southfield High. "There's like a hierarchy in Detroit. We've only been around seven months. We have to work our way up."

In that sense, the Jamersons are no different than a handful of insurgent bands locally. But they acknowledge their upstart status. In fact, they revel in the fun of their infancy.

REFRESHINGLY, there's no talk of pending record deals or showcases. Just enthusiasm.

In the meantime, the Jamersons would be content to get something recorded and play some outstate gigs.

Their history may yet be charted, but three of four members have considerable records of participation on the local music scene.

Guitarist Steve Kaminski is formerly of the Gear; drummer Bob Brunsten (1983 graduate of Rochester High) tooled around with alternative outfits Before or After and Allison's Ghost, and Greenberg was a

member of the Freemasons.

Mutual friendships brought them together during the summer. Things clicked.

This drive is visible on stage. The Jamersons, though, appear to have more going for them than youthful energy. For one, the band has three songwriters, each with a distinctive style and realm of influences.

Kaminski stabs away and screams his compact pop musings; Greenberg's numbers are no less volatile but a bit more reflective.

Guitarist and vocalist Dave Goulette's songs, such as "Virtue," seem almost pristine by comparison. There are harmonies and melodies, with which other band members

grapple with a bit of amusement.

"I SEE IT more as a writer's workshop type of thing," said Greenberg, who lives in Farmington. "I like the stuff Dave writes. I like the stuff Steve writes. I hope they like the stuff I write. . . . We play to make the songs sound good."

Added Kaminski: "The idea might be from in the songwriter's mind, but the band takes liberty with the arrangements."

Surprisingly, the clash in songwriting styles hasn't produced any exchanges of artistic gunfire between members. Greenberg said the intention of the Jamersons is to first and foremost have fun.

And it's the erudite-looking bassist who appears to be in charge of the outfit. Nearly half the numbers in the set list are Greenberg's, including a throbbing pop thrash song "Harvest."

It was one of the first numbers written as a member of the Jamersons, which initially relied on Greenberg's songs. Then others brought their wares to the group.

"It started off that way," Greenberg said. "I wanted to play and have a vehicle for my songs. . . . Being one of the guys offered a better opportunity to have fun and for everyone to contribute, instead of trying to be a Svengali and everyone hates your guts."

'Life Is Sweet' provides unforgettable slice of life

Andy has a penchant for beginning projects that he never finishes. Wendy, his wife, possesses a perpetually sunny disposition. One of their daughters looks like a boy and works as a plumber. The other leaves the house only when her cigarettes run out.

Like Wendy's infectious laugh, the quirky characters in "Life Is Sweet" have a way of being both annoying and irresistible at the same time. Mike Leigh's new film, which opens at the Detroit Film Theatre this weekend, looks with humor and insight into their everyday lives.

The film opens colorfully with Wendy (Alison Steadman), teaching a roomful of preschoolers simple dance steps. The normal children contrast sharply with her own twin

daughters (played by Claire Skinner and Jane Horrocks), nightmare versions of characters on the old "Patty Duke Show."

Meanwhile, Andy (Jim Broadbent) leaves the house for 20 minutes and returns with a ramshackle food-vending trailer which he parks right in front of the house. You just know it's going to sit there rusting until the end of eternity — or the police make him haul it away.

What makes "Life Is Sweet" so successful is the way director Leigh and his talented cast keep the characters so real and intimate. Part of this has to do with the physical boundaries of the film. Even the scenes outdoors are claustrophobic, keeping its audience perpetually on edge.

YOU BEGIN by laughing at the incredibly caustic daughter Nicola, until you realize the emotional problems she suffers from. She refuses to share a meal with the family, instead inhaling candy bars late at night until she's forced to throw up.

Leigh, in classic British style, goes off the comic deep end once or twice with family friend Aubrey. He's

played by jowly character actor Timothy Spall of "Gothic" and "The Sheltering Sky."

When the opening of Aubrey's new restaurant Regret Rien is jeopardized by the lack of a wait staff, good-natured Wendy volunteers to help. She conscientiously memorizes the menu, which includes such house specialties as chilled brains, pork cyst and liver in lager.

Although Aubrey serves as a bizarre diversion, "Life Is Sweet" works best when focusing on the main family unit.

As Wendy, Alison Steadman paints an unforgettable portrait of a woman, once an aspiring dancer, who carries on despite considerable hardships. She is irritated by her husband's follies, but also recognizes him as someone who still carries on dreams — no matter how misguided — and doesn't give up.

"Life Is Sweet" ultimately delivers a life-affirming message, especially in its appropriately opened conclusion. Obviously not your usual comedy, it offers the most insightful slice of life you'll see on screen this year.

This time of year Seattle weather forecasters could take a long vacation and few people would miss them.

Save the freak snowstorm, Seattle's winter is predictable gray and drizzly, with clouds obscuring the Olympic and Cascade Mountains that rim the city.

In this land of mist and moss built on Puget Sound, true-blue Seattlites are easily recognizable. They don't bother with umbrellas.

But the weather does little to dampen the city's vibrancy. With bright neon signs shimmering off wet pavement and the aromatic scent of locally roasted coffee wafting from cozy cafes, Seattle is full of life in January and February.

The newly opened Seattle Art Museum, at 100 University St. and First Avenue, is the latest cultural addition to the skyline. The limestone building, designed by Robert Venturi, is decorated with vertical fluting and a playful band of colorful tiles and stands out against the featureless office buildings nearby.

Its displays of Northwest Native American and African art are among the nation's best and next month the museum will open galleries of Western and Asian art. The Japanese gallery will feature a tea-house commissioned by the Urusink Foundation of Osaka, Japan.

Recommended admission to the museum is \$5; free on the first Tuesday of every month. It is open Tuesday to Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. (to 9 p.m. Thursday); Sunday, noon to 5 p.m. For more information

WHERE TO STAY

The Inn at the Market, at 86 Pine St., is one of the city's most popular hotels. In the market area the compact hotel has 65 spacious rooms — some with a view of Elliott Bay — and the hallways smell of sweet herbs in window boxes. The rooftop balcony has a spectacular view of the bay and the Olympic Mountains.

The hotel has room service but no restaurant, but it's hardly an issue considering you're in the heart of the market. Doubles start at \$95 and will go up to \$100 in March; prices increase with the view. For more information call (800) 446-4484 or (206) 443-3600.

The elegant Sorrento Hotel, at 900 Madison St., about six blocks from downtown, was built in 1909 and was modeled after a castle in Sorrento, Italy. The 76-room hotel (42 are suites) is participating in the Supersaver program through March. The regular rate of \$140 for a double room will be \$95. For more information call (800) 426-1265 or (206) 622-6400.

At the Alexis Hotel, at 1007 First Ave., with 54 rooms decorated with antiques, guests can luxuriate in whirlpool jets in their bathroom tubs or in a steam room. Some suites have wood-burning fireplaces. Under the Supersaver package a standard double room will drop from \$165 to \$115. For more information call (800) 426-7033 or (206) 624-4844.

Budget Choice: The Westcoast Vance Hotel, at 620 Stewart St., is a remodeled modest 165-room hotel that is convenient to downtown. A double room, normally starting at \$85, is \$65 under the Supersaver plan. For more information call (206) 441-4200.

To boost tourism in the slow rainy months a "Supersaver" program gives discounts of up to 50 percent on 18 hotels in the city to March 31. With the hotel discount comes a coupon book for cultural events, retail outlets and restaurants. For more information call (800) 448-6540.

SIGHTSEEING

Visitors may find it hard to leave the maze with 8-foot-high walls at the Pacific Science Center, at 200 Second Avenue, North, at the Seattle Center, home of the Space Needle. In fact, it takes from 20 minutes to an hour to get through the 3,000-square-foot puzzle.

Another recently opened exhibit features robotic life-size dinosaurs. An Imax film, "Ring of Fire," documents the earthquake-and-volcano-prone Pacific Rim.

Admission to the center is \$5; \$4 for seniors and children ages 6 through 13; \$3 for children ages 2 to 5. Laser shows and Imax films cost \$1 more. For more information call (206) 443-2001.

Unlike many Western cities,

Seattle's center is best explored on foot. First Avenue, lined with eclectic shops and restaurants, is a good starting point.

The city also provides free bus service up and down the avenue. Shopping at major retail stores is just up the hill at Westlake Mall, at Fourth and Pike Streets.

At the north end of First Avenue is Pike Place Market, possibly the grandest open-air market in the country. Its colorful swirl of vegetable stalls, fish markets and views of Puget Sound, plus the spicy aromas of ethnic food emanating from restaurants and cafes, is a celebration of life on the Pacific Rim.

At Pioneer Square, one of the city's oldest sections, where pioneers rolled giant logs down the original "skid road," a giant totem pole stands guard near an ornate iron pergola. The square is lined with art galleries, shops, Oriental-rug outlets and nightclubs that regularly host blues and rock bands.

FOR SKIERS

Excellent skiing can be found just a few hours from the city, but the

snow can quickly go from powder to paste if temperatures rise and it rains.

The best area within two hours of the city is 7,000-foot Crystal Mountain, on the border of Mount Rainier National Park. From its 43 runs and 10 chair lifts — including a high-speed chair lift to the top of Crystal Peak — the views of the Cascades are breathtaking.

Lift tickets at Crystal Mountain are \$16 weekdays; \$28 on weekends and holidays. For more information call (206) 663-2265.

Another local favorite is Stevens Pass, about 70 miles northeast of Seattle. It has great views and its terrain is challenging though not as diverse as Crystal. Still, it's close and affordable and has night skiing.

Tickets at Stevens Pass for an eight-hour session, starting at 9 a.m., 11 a.m. or 2 p.m., are \$10 Monday and Tuesday, \$15 Wednesday to Friday (\$2 more for longer skiing) and \$26 on weekends. For more information call (206) 973-2441.

The Mount Baker Ski Area, three hours north of Seattle, gets an amazing 750 inches of snowfall a year. Tickets are \$15 weekdays and

WW II veterans can take nostalgia tours of England

the stolid residents of East Anglia formed the kinds of friendships that can only be forged in war.

In the years since the war, English groups such as Friends of the Eighth (FOTE) and Buddies of the Ninth (BOTNA) have restored some airfields, set up World War II museums and acted as liaisons for tour groups.



Did you know that...

• Growing evidence now indicated that many of the same therapies that help non-diabetic heart patients will benefit their diabetic counterparts equally or to an even greater extent. These treatments include beta blockers, medications that decrease the heart rate and blood pressure, and clot-busting drugs for patients who are acutely stricken with heart attacks.

• Most cereals provide a low-calorie, low-fat, zero cholesterol snack. The key, however, is to use skim milk.

• Many malls now offer early-morning walking programs, where

you can walk with a group before the stores open, unimpeded by shoppers.

• Excessive alcohol consumption can result in palpitations and rapid heart rates. This condition, commonly known as "holiday heart syndrome" may be attributed to a surge of adrenaline, which can trigger disturbances of the heart rhythm. Prevention of this problem is quite simple, namely, moderation in alcohol intake.

• A new medical procedure, known as cardiomyoplasty, may help some of the more than two million Americans whose weakened hearts can't adequately circulate blood. During the operation, sur-

geons remove a muscle flap from the back and stitch it to the heart to beef up its pumping power. A pulse generator under the skin stimulates the muscle. Since 1985, about 120 patients have undergone the procedure in trials around the world.

• Several years ago, the National Institutes of Health initiated a large study involving nearly 5,000 individuals, 60 years and older, with systolic blood pressure higher than 160. One half of the participants were given high blood pressure medications, whereas the other half received tablets with no active ingredients (sugar pills). Patients were observed during a five-year follow-up period. The group that received drug therapy demonstrated a marked reduction in fatal strokes

and heart attacks. The practical implication of the study? Treatment for high blood pressure should definitely be considered, regardless of your age.

Feast on special desserts

OK folks, this is your conscience talking . . . It's getting close to Valentine's Day. Love. Amore. Don't you think its time you indulged just once? Wouldn't it be fun again to lick the icing off the beaters?

Remember the days your fingers were turned into bulldozers as you made sure every last scrape was removed from the bottom of the frosting bowl?

EVERY NOW and then, it's necessary to just "get crazy" and make something totally decadent and sinful. No worrying about calories, cholesterol or fat. And what better time of the year to blame it on than Valentine's Day? What better way to say "I Love You" than something from the oven.

Cards, flowers and perfumes are all alternative and approved gifts, but something homemade always shows you care just a little bit more. Probably because you took all the time and effort to do it yourself. Anyone can drive to the florist and buy a dozen roses. Ditto for a trip to the mall for some trendy perfume.

But an afternoon or evening in the kitchen, just you and your bowls — and maybe some romantic music in the background to set the mood. Something homemade. Something delectable. Something your love can really sink their teeth into.

So just what is it that makes Valentine desserts so special? If cupid's day evokes visions of roses and perfume, calorie laden and succulent desserts are the exclamation point. This is surely the day that calls for heavy cream, sugar, real vanilla and chocolate. Worry about calories tomorrow, for on Valentine's Day, you feast.

A SUGGESTION, for starters, could possibly be a homemade box of truffles delivered right after lunch in a satiny box. Just a few, select, handmade truffles, not a four pound box that gets passed around the office like that door-to-door fund-raiser box you bought in October.

Intimacy must prevail. The classic Valentine dessert, Coneur A La Creme is a simple treat to prepare that consumes far more time than talent. Speciality heart shaped molds can be had around town starting at \$15, but yours truly bought a heart-shaped cake pan for \$4, drilled a few holes in the bottom, and viola! You can line the pan with cheesecloth and follow the recipe, which will yield a triple cream cheese dessert that literally melts in your mouth, especially when surrounded by fresh fruit and purees.

Chocolate has been known for ages as the "edible affection confection." Pastry and dessert chefs are concocting wild creations with tempered chocolate — everything from pianos to obscene X-rated edible treats. Metropolitan Detroit has many speciality food shops and dessert emporiums that if ordered in advance, will melt your lover's heart faster than a chocolate bar in hot little hands.

DO-IT-YOURSELFERS CAN find homemade chocolate molds, pans, supplies and instructions at cake decorating stores and gourmet shops like Kitchen Glamour.

But believe it or not, one of my best sources for sweet Valentine desserts comes from paging through my favorite cookbooks. Many dessert cookbooks available at your local library have detailed instructions and pictures to many dazzling Valentine desserts with minimal skill.

So come on, no one ever believed the old wife's tale — "A moment on the lips, forever on the hips" — not on Valentine's Day anyway.

Recipes

BLACK BEANS AND RICE

Hearty and low in fat, this meatless dish tastes great and is easy to make.

This recipe serves four.

2 cans Progresso ready to serve black beans
¼-½ cup chicken broth
1 cup onion, chopped
½ green pepper, chopped
½ cup red pepper, chopped
3 cloves garlic, minced
½ teaspoon ground cumin
½ teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon pepper
2 teaspoons (or to taste) hot sauce (Durkee hot cayenne pepper sauce)
1½ cups canned diced tomatoes
2½ cups hot, cooked rice (prepared without salt or fat)

Coat a 4-quart sauce pan with cooking spray. Add the chopped onion and next three ingredients and saute until tender, using chicken broth as needed.

Add the beans, slightly drained, and the diced tomatoes to the onion mixture and stir well.

Add the remaining spices and the hot sauce and bring to a boil.

Cover and reduce the heat, stirring occasionally so that the mixture doesn't burn on the bottom, and simmer for 30 minutes.

Cook converted rice according to directions on the box. Add to the bean mixture and mix well.

LEMON BROCCOLI

1 bunch fresh broccoli
¼-1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
salt and pepper to taste

Trim off the large leaves of broccoli. Discard the tough ends of the lower stalks and wash the broccoli thoroughly.

Cover and cook in a vegetable steamer or in a small amount of boiling water for 12 minutes or until the broccoli is tender. Drain and place on a serving platter.

Sprinkle with grated lemon rind, salt and pepper.

SPICY PEACHES

2 tablespoons brown sugar
1 tablespoon rum
1 teaspoon margarine
1 teaspoon lemon juice
¼ teaspoon cinnamon or allspice
2 cups sliced peaches, fresh or frozen
¼ cup plain low-fat yogurt

Combine brown sugar, rum, margarine or butter, lemon juice and all spice or cinnamon in a saucepan.

Cook and stir these ingredients over medium heat until the mixture is bubbly. Add the peach slices.

Cook uncovered and stirring occasionally for 3-4 minutes (2 minutes for frozen peach slices) or until the peaches are just tender.

To serve, spoon the warm fruit into four dessert dishes and dollop with yogurt. Serves four.

When we contacted Heidi at her Rochester home, as the perfect hostess for a '50s retro seducer's meal for Valentine's Day, it was becoming clearly evident why cookbooks like "The American Gourmet" by Jane and Michael Stern, (Harper Collins, \$25) are garnering kudos by offering classic recipes, deluxe delights, flamboyant favorites and swanky company food from the '50s and '60s. Needless to say, Heidi loved the book.

THE COOKBOOK, done up in pink and turquoise of course, says "Eating rich was once equated with eating well."

The recipes are not for the heart-healthy set, but as James Beard once said "A gourmet who counts calories is like a lady (sic) of the night who looks at her watch."

Filled with such delicacies as Miss Leslie's Checkerboard Sandwiches, Julia Child's Poulet Roti and Beard's Famous Onion Rings, Graham Kerr's (also known as The Galloping Gourmet) Fillet of Fish Macadamia, the book explores '50s and '60s cuisine and brings back vintage memories of Chop-o-matics, Juicerators and chafing dishes.

Ah, those were the days. But would the recipes make it on a table set with Frank Wright china and Howdy Doodie Spoons? Are pink and black Lazy Susans and palm tree napkin holders considered seductive?

PROCLAIMING TO be "more goofy than romantic" Heidi promised to choose a few of her faves from the book, and from "Cooking in the Nude, 'Quickies'" by Debbie and Stephen Cornwell, (Well-

ton Books). She promised the selections would reek of "Eleganza."

More on what she did and how she did it will follow, like the roving jeweled cat clock eyes and rhinestone studded swinging tail that I remember from life in Wyandotte.

On a slightly more restrained note, John and MaryBeth Hobson who both claim to be cruising near 50 years of age remember the '50s and '60s and how entertaining meant a Harris Tweed suit for the guys, a shirt-waist dress, real nylons, heels and pearls for the lady, and always at least one or two other couples.

The table would be set with a floral or lace cloth, the earlier part of the day spent polishing silver and making sure the neighborhood butcher removed most of the fat for the Beef Stroganoff.

BOTH JOHN and MaryBeth were

raised in Detroit, but now live in Redford. They vividly remember the days of visiting Trader Vic's and flaming shish-kebobs, the Top of the Ponch and the Niagara Falls Treadway Inns' famed Duck à l'orange.

Being avid diners, the Hobson's really enjoyed "The American Gourmet's" chapter on Gourmet Restaurants: Suave, Snob and Slob. While they frequently entertained at home, many a seducer's meal was had from the likes of Larco's, Little Harry's and The Old Place, all of which have gone the route of the Baked Alaska, Steak Tartar and 007's Potent Martini, all of which are highlighted in the book.

BUT BACK to our featured guest, Heidi Lichtenstein. Anyone who's ever been in Cinderella's Attic and met Heidi must know that there's almost something Victorian about this

lady. My visit to the shop found clothes that were very elegant and well made.

Heidi herself says that the quality of life in the '50s was better, and it was an ebullient and ambitious era that saw a grand transformation in American gastronomy.

Yes, the table was replete with Boris and Natasha napkins and the water glasses were vintage Hopalong Cassidy collectibles, but the food was prepared with love.

The Presto electric skillet performed like it did 40 years ago with a rendition of Seducer's Potatoes that the seductress prepared for her main squeeze, Mike "Boss Hoss" Miller of the nationally renowned

"Goober and the Peas" band.

The monkeywood bowls brimmed with Aphrodisiacal Artichokes, while the Roper range simmered Naked Chef's Carrots. The main course, Love at First Bite, a recipe that would make any modern-day chef cringe, featured chicken, Karo Syrup and bananas.

HEIDI SAYS Mike went back for seconds on the chicken while she nibbled through the night on the Seducer's Potatoes. Yes, it was a pre-Valentines meal Heidi will never forget; but then again, emulating someone like June Cleaver was easy, but like the Lady of Charm at WXYZ used to say, "A lady never tells." Happy Valentine's Day.

Microwave takes fuss out of making truffles

AP — Let your microwave oven take the fuss out of candy-making. For these buttery rich truffles, you start by melting chocolate with butter and milk. Remember, in microwave cooking, chocolate pieces hold their shape even when melted.

So, instead of just looking through the oven door, reach in and stir every few seconds to see if they've softened.

To flavor the truffles, you can use orange juice, liquor, or liqueur. For the liquor or liqueur, choose from rum, Irish whiskey, brandy, kirsch, amaretto, hazelnut liqueur, coffee liqueur, praline liqueur, or orange liqueur.

CHOCOLATE TRUFFLES
One 6-ounce package (1 cup) semi-sweet chocolate pieces
½ cup butter or margarine
3 tablespoons milk
1 beaten egg yolk

3 tablespoons orange juice or desired liquor or liqueur

Unsweetened cocoa powder, powdered sugar, chocolate-flavored sprinkles, coconut, or chopped or ground nuts

In a 4-cup glass measure combine chocolate, butter or margarine, and milk. Cook, uncovered, on 100 percent power (high), for 1½ to 2½ minutes or until soft enough to stir smooth, stirring once during cooking.

Gradually stir about half of the hot mixture into the beaten egg yolk. Return all of the mixture to the 4-cup measure. Cook, uncovered, about 1 minute or until bubbly, stirring every 30 seconds.

Stir in orange juice, liquor, or liqueur. Cover and chill about 1 hour or until mixture is cool, evenly thickened, and smooth, stirring occasionally.

Beat the cooled mixture with an electric mixer on medium speed about 2 minutes or until slightly fluffy. Cover and chill about 15 minutes or until the mixture holds its shape.

Line a baking sheet with waxed paper. Drop the mixture from a level teaspoon onto the sheet. Cover and chill about 30 minutes or until

firm. Roll into balls, then roll in cocoa powder, powdered sugar, chocolate sprinkles, coconut, or nuts. Cover and store in the refrigerator. Makes ¾ pound (about 48 pieces).

SEDUCER'S POTATOES DAUPHINOISE

"Rich, yes," wrote Helen Gurley Brown, "but just this once, could you forget how fat you're getting?"

- 4 medium size thick skinned potatoes
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon fresh ground pepper
- 1/2 cup scalded cream
- 1 garlic clove, cut in half
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 1/2 cup shredded Gruyere cheese

Peel the potatoes and slice them in rounds 1/4 inch thick. Place them in a bowl. Sprinkle on salt and pepper and pour in cream. Toss lightly, taking care not to break the potatoes.

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Rub an 8-inch baking dish about 2 inches deep with the cut sides of the garlic clove. Use 1 tablespoon of the butter to generously grease the baking dish. With a slotted spoon, transfer half the potatoes to the prepared dish. Dot with 1 tablespoon of butter. Sprinkle with half the cheese. Add remaining potatoes. Dot them with remaining butter and sprinkle with remaining cheese. Pour the seasoned cream over the potatoes and if necessary, add just enough milk to barely cover. Bake 40-45 minutes or until potatoes have

absorbed the milk and are tender. (From "The American Gourmet" by Jane and Michael Stern, Harper Collins Publishers, copyright 1991, \$25)

NAKED CHEF'S CARROTS

The prelude to the recipe was rather erotic and mainly unprintable from a young Catholic boys upbringing, so if you want the prelude, you'll have to buy "The American Gourmet."

- 1 pound carrots, scrubbed clean and sliced into 1/4 inch discs
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 2 teaspoons brown sugar
- 1/4 cup brandy

Boil carrots until barely tender, about 10 minutes. Drain. Stir in butter and brown sugar, mixing to coat the carrots. Place in a flameproof serving dish. Heat the brandy and pour over the carrots, and ignite. Saute 15-20 seconds, tossing to extinguish the flames.

CLASSIC FLAMING BAKED ALASKA

- 1/2 cup orange curacao or Grand Marnier

- 1/2 cup soft bread crumbs

Melt butter. Add remaining ingredients and toss to blend. Stuff chicken breasts with mixture and place in au gratin dishes. Pour half of banana mixture over chicken and bake at 350 degrees for 25-30 minutes, basting once. Step Four:

- 1/2 banana, sliced
- Top breasts with sliced bananas and spoon sauce over. Return to oven for 2-3 minutes and serve.

COEUR A LA CREME

- Serves 6-8
- 1/2 pound large curd premium cottage cheese
- 1 cup ricotta cheese 1 cup whipping cream
- 1/4 pound cream cheese, room temperature
- 4 tablespoons powdered sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- pinch salt
- 1 pint fresh strawberries
- 1 tablespoon Kirsch (cherry flavored liqueur) optional or strawberry jelly
- 16 small strawberries (as a garnish)

Dip a large piece of cheesecloth in water. Wring dry and line a 1 quart coeur a la creme mold, allowing a 2-inch overhang on all sides.

Rub the cottage cheese and ricotta cheese through a strainer or food mill. Whip cream until stiff. Beat cream cheese until

fluffy. Add cottage cheese, sugar, vanilla and salt and beat until light and fluffy. Stir in whipped cream. Pour into prepared mold, smoothing over the top. Cover with overhanging cheesecloth.

Place mold on a wire rack set over a pie plate. Refrigerate at least 6 hours. (Whey will drain leaving the triple cheese).

To make sauce, puree the pint of strawberries with the kirsch or jelly. To serve, invert mold onto flat plate. Remove cheesecloth. Arrange strawberries around the mold and top with puree around the edge.

AMARETTI TORTE

- 1 teaspoon butter, softened
- 1 tablespoon flour
- 1 cup (2 sticks) butter, room temperature
- 1 cup sugar
- 5 egg yolks
- 1/2 cup Amaretti crumbs (available at Italian markets)

- 1/2 cup flour, sifted
- 4 ounces semi-sweet chocolate chips
- 6 egg whites

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Coat a 10x2 inch round cake pan with the butter. Dust with flour, shaking out the excess. Cream butter with sugar until very fluffy and almost white in color.

Beat in yolks, one at a time, blending well after each addition. Using a mixer set at lowest speed, gradually add Amaretti crumbs and flour.

Fold in chocolate chips. Beat egg whites in a separate bowl until stiff peaks form. Stir 1/4 of the whites into the batter to loosen. Gently fold in remaining whites.

Pour into prepared pan and bake at 350 degrees for 35-45 minutes or until cake tests done. Cool on a rack for 30 minutes. To serve, invert onto a flat platter and dust generously with powdered sugar.







Who speaks in the children's 'Best Interest'?

True story of family in crisis

The foster care programs of America and elsewhere are intended to provide suitable temporary homes for children in need, yet sometimes even the best of intentions can be thwarted. NBC has dramatized an actual case in point with the story of good people at odds who all claim to be thinking "In the Best Interest" of the Children." The movie airs on Sunday, Feb. 16.

Sarah Jessica Parker ("Equal Justice," "Square Pegs") stars as Callie Cain, an acute manic-depressive whose string of romantic trysts has left her with four young daughters and an infant son. She returns to her Iowa hometown with her brood hoping to start life afresh, but instead her family slips into squalor, living on food stamps. The role of adult is performed by her oldest girl, Jessica (Lexi Randall). It is Jessica who feeds the baby in the middle of the night, Jessica who reminds her mother to take her birth control pills, and Jessica who comforts her siblings in times of distress. She is clearly the backbone of the family, but, as she reminds her sisters, she is also just a little girl.

When Callie's illness flares up, her brother John (Gray Graham of "Alien Nation") suggests she needs more treatment and assures her he will care for her children while she is away. The paranoid Callie accuses him of wanting to steal them. Crowded by a social services investigation, Callie finally agrees to commit herself, but only on the condition that her brother isn't granted custody of her family.

The children enter the foster care program and are placed in the farm home of Patty Pepper (Sally Struthers) and her husband, a salt-of-the-earth, childless couple whose unconditional and stable love gives the children a family life they never dreamed possible. With the state-ordered visits to Callie proving more and more disturbing to them, the children want to keep their new home with the adoption-minded Peppers. If it had been left to the

children to decide what was in their best interest, the story might have ended here.

But Callie is feeling better and wants her kids back. Brother John thinks they would be better off with him and his family, but there are other forces at play in the situation. The social services department must adhere to a strict case plan, the children's court-appointed attorney (Elizabeth Ashley) seeks to protect them from all parties, and Patty Pepper has initiated a media campaign to help her hold on to what she's got.

For Parker, the role of a character afflicted with poverty and mental illness was quite different from

her previous acting endeavors, but there were elements of her own past that she could draw upon.

"My grandmother was raised in Appalachia, and my mother always said we were white trash wannabes," she explains. "So I guess there is a bit of blood in me that understood that sort of upbringing and experience. And I was a product of the welfare system myself."

Parker's performance is one of understated brilliance, and Struthers' perky monument to maternal instincts warms the soul. But Randall's guardian big sister, who longs for someone to take care of her, is the heart of this very emotional film.

Soap writer creates 'Bold' characters

Will Nikki and Victor marry again? Will Jill ever convince John to give her another chance? Is Faith going to cause big problems for Ridge? There's one man who knows the answers to these questions and much, much more. He's William J. Bell, executive producer and head writer of the highly rated CBS series *The Young and the Restless* and *The Bold and the Beautiful*.

Bell, one of the most respected men in daytime television, isn't afraid of controversy. He's tackled tough and sometimes taboo subjects such as AIDS, date rape, incest and crack-addicted babies. While he listens to his audience, he has his own ideas about what's going to happen on his shows.

"Very often the people who write in will tend to react negatively to what you are doing," Bell says. "What you ultimately have to do is follow your own judgment. That is what I've done since I first started writing. I'm not going to do what someone else suggests, I'm going to do what I believe in. If I'm wrong, then I won't stay in the business. If I'm right, I'll save myself a lot of money in psychiatric bills."

The formula seems to have worked for Bell, as he has written over 10,000 episodes of daytime drama since 1957. He began his career writing for *The Guiding Light*, with the great Irna Phillips. (The pair also co-created *Another World*.) Bell has served up stories for *As the World Turns* and *Days of Our Lives*, pulling both soaps up from the bottom of the Nielsen. Not one to rest on his laurels, Bell went on to co-create *The Young and the Restless* and *The Bold and the Beautiful* with his wife, Lee Phillip Bell.

The strength of his stories, as Bell explains, comes from well-developed characters. "You want characters that the audience can relate to, in some cases be furious with and at the very least be interested in. But in most every case, you want some strong emotional involvement between the audience and your character. Then you need good stories to support them," says Bell. He must be right, for *Y&R* and *B&B* stay in the No. 1 and No. 5 five spots on a consistent basis.






