## Ex-pitcher slides into recreation director job

Tom Willette was drafted by the San Diego Padres and the Kansas City Royals, but the city of Plymouth has signed him.

Willette, 36, was named recreation director on Monday by the city commission. He had served as acting director after Chuck Skene left the post in January.

The former pitcher was Skene's assistant. Skene, who was living in Westland, left after voters upheld residency requirements for department heads.

On his longtime boss leaving, Willette said, "Basically it was unexpected. I thought maybe someday when Chuck left, I'd be given the opportunity."

From his office at the Plymouth Cultural Center, Willette oversees two full-time staff members. He's hoping to fill an open recreation supervisor position.

He also oversees several youth and adult sports programs, senior programs and operation of the ice arena.

"The ice arena is probably the biggest thing we have control over. We have figure skating classes and basic skills classes year 'round. The Plymouth Canton Hockey Association rents time," he said, as does the Eastern Michigan University club team and the South Lyon High hockey team.

As a youth, Willette was most interested in baseball. He pitched for the state-champion Plymouth Sa-

lem High team in 1975, then attended North Carolina State University on a baseball scholarship.

Out of high school, "I was drafted by the Padres," he said. "They didn't offer me enough money for me not to go to school."

He hurt his arm in his junior year in college, but was drafted again by the Royals. "I felt that with a sore arm I'd be better off to get my degree, which I did," Willette said.

In 1979, he began substitute

teaching and working part time for the recreation department. When Paul Sincock left the department to become assistant city manager, Skene hired Willette as his assistant.

A degree in running a recreation department goes only so far in preparing one for the job, Willette said. "It's on the job training. You learn how to deal with the public in certain situations. I learned quite a bit from him (Skene) on how to handle situations," he said.

One thing a recreation director has to deal with is parents angry over a referee or coach's decision. "Sometimes you can appease them, sometimes you can't," Willette said.

"The best thing to do is let them have their say and look into it and get back to them," he said. "It might not be the answer they wanted, but at least they see you tried."

The largest sports program the department oversees is youth soccer, with 700 kids participating in spring and fall seasons. "I think soccer's really exploded over the last few years. They can go out and participate in a team sport and not have those honed individual skills" demanded in baseball or other sports, he said.

On possible future changes in the recreation program, Willette said assistant Carol Donnelly "has some ideas about expanding some of our classes for kids. I'd like to try to get some more revenue."

## Tax cut to spur realty

**Some local Realtors say a property tax cut could boost home sales in the Plymouth area. But Realtors also are taking a wait-and-see attitude.**

Local Realtors say they're waiting for the next step from state legislators, but some say stopping the use of property taxes to support schools could reduce monthly house payments — and that could boost the home sales market.

Realtor Lee Bittinger recalls a young couple who moved from a \$136,000 house in Arizona to Canton.

"We were squeezing him into a \$96,000 home. He couldn't qualify because of the taxes," said Bittinger of REMAX Crossroads Realty in Canton. "We have an awful lot of transferees from out-of-town who are absolutely shocked with our taxes."

Some area Realtors are hoping that shock over property taxes will be a thing of the past with the state Legislature's \$5.6 billion property tax cut.

"We are excited from the standpoint of homeowners' and property owners' rights," said Bill Deacon, president of the Western Wayne Oakland County Association of Realtors.

Realtors say they're excited about the tax cut's potential to boost the housing and construction industries.

Some say that property tax relief will help senior citizens remain in their homes. Young couples who have been unable to buy a house because of property taxes are expected to now qualify.

## School reforms loom

While some observers are attacking state legislators for eliminating property tax funding for schools — a move they see as high-stakes poker victimizing children — others are heralding the move as an unprecedented opportunity for Michigan.

Legislators last week voted to do away with property tax as the main source of funding for public schools. The tax cut will mean a \$5.6 billion savings for taxpayers.

Beverly Walkow, executive director for the Michigan Education Association, said, "I think state Sen. Debbie Stabenow, D-Lansing, (a candidate for governor who introduced the measure) put a bluff out there. I don't think she was really serious about the issue. I think she was saying, 'If they can do it, we can do it better,' and that the rest of the Legislature called her on it and mob hysteria set in. They're truly playing Russian roulette."

# City, landowners seek common ground for parking

The City of Plymouth's plan to create more parking downtown, proposed in the spring, has so far not won over downtown property owners who must participate for the plan to succeed.

At a city commission meeting earlier this month, commissioner Bill McAninch commented that city officials were so far not win-

ning acceptance for the city plan from downtown property owners.

City manager Steve Walters on Thursday declined to say if the city parking committee had run into opposition from property owners.

"It's hard to describe, other than it being in the process of negotiation," Walters said.

Walters said he hoped to meet soon with city attorney Ron Lowe and commissioner Doug Miller,

head of the parking committee, to discuss negotiations.

Walters said three alternative plans are being discussed:

■ The city could acquire parking lots downtown now held by downtown property owners. However, the city would not pay for the lots. Instead, property owners would deed the lots to the city with a reverter clause, "like people sometimes do with city parks," Walters said. The advantage to

lot owners is they would get out of paying taxes and upkeep costs on the lots, and the city would take over liability.

■ The city could buy the lots. "That's not in the city or property owner's best interest because they really can't use it for anything but parking," Walters said.

■ Lots could be leased to the city, "and leases can be in lots of different kinds of forms," Walters said.

The city manager added that city officials hope to meet with property owners separately to discuss options, one of which would apply to all lot owners.

"I think we have to go to the city commission in September" with a plan, Walters said.

The question of available parking downtown is related to another parking-related issue — the parking credit system.

By the parking credit system, downtown businesses with little on-site parking had to pay the city so much money for "parking credits" — parking spaces somewhere else downtown.

An ordinance revision planned by the parking committee headed by Miller would eliminate parking credits. Yet, Walters said, "We can't make a change until we get some control over public parking."

# Awaiting murder trial, doctor gets prison for inciting perjury

Charles Fisher — awaiting retrial in the 1984 murder of his wife — told a Detroit Recorder's Court judge Friday that he did not bribe a fellow prison inmate to take the rap for him.

"The main thing is I'm not guilty," Fisher told Judge Vera Massey Jones at his sentencing. "I intend to appeal."

Fisher was convicted in early June on one count of inciting perjury, a five-year felony. The jury also found the former microbiologist not guilty on one count of attempted obstruction of justice, a 2½-year felony.

Massey Jones sentenced Fisher to serve 6 months to 5 years in prison for the latest conviction. Fisher already has more than 180 days credit for time served.

The sentencing was delayed for more than a month to give Fisher's attorney, Ken Mogill, time to file motions concerning the venue or jurisdiction of the case, as well as double jeopardy.

Mogill had argued that since it was claimed Fisher paid an inmate while at the State Prison of Southern Michigan at Jackson to take the fall for the murder of his wife, Maria Mercado, the case should be tried in Jackson County.

At the time, Massey Jones told

Mogill that the perjury and obstruction charges stem from the murder case pending in Wayne County.

"I believe this issue has been argued twice in the course of this trial," said Bob Donaldson, Wayne County assistant prosecutor.

On Friday, Massey Jones denied Mogill's request to dismiss the charges. Regarding any suggestions for sentencing, Mogill said: "It's difficult to make a plea at a sentencing where the jury made the wrong decision."

Donaldson suggested a sentence of 40-60 months for Fisher. "I think the focus in sentencing should be on deterrence," Don-

aldson said. "Tampering with a murder case with the intention of presenting false testimony is the most direct affront on our system."

Fisher told Massey Jones that throughout the past nine-year process of trials over his wife's death, he has always presented himself in court even when he worked outside the country. "I came back to this country to clear my name," Fisher said.

Explaining he has a full-time job waiting for him, Fisher asked Massey Jones for less than a prison sentence. "If probation could be granted, I certainly would appreciate it."

Massey Jones told Fisher that when a jury finds a defendant guilty, she's mandated to impose a jail sentence. "Inciting perjury strikes at the very heart of the judicial system," she said. "Because I have to let the community know this is a serious crime, I will have to sentence you to jail time."

Fisher was accused of paying a fellow inmate to say he and other inmates broke into the Fisher's Canton house in 1984. Attorney Mogill argued that no evidence had been presented that Fisher had access to prison tokens with which to pay the inmate.

The inmate also testified that Fisher told him he killed his wife by wrapping duct tape around her

face. Fisher had been free on bond awaiting his third trial on first-degree murder charges when he was arrested on the additional felony charges in January. He has remained in the Wayne County Jail since.

A trial date has not yet been scheduled for Fisher's retrial.

Two juries had found Fisher guilty of first-degree murder in his wife's death. The first trial was ruled in error based on a comment made by a prosecutor.

In late 1991, the Michigan Supreme Court reversed the second conviction, ruling that a diary kept by Mercado should not have been admitted into evidence.

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### WALKING ON CEMENT, GOING ON GRASS

If you have sore feet, you may have wondered if walking on cement caused your discomfort. Did the hard surface give your feet a pounding? Joggers feel that running on the street is hard on feet, while going on grass spares an otherwise inevitable ache.

Though such an association between surface and soreness is appealing, no data exists to prove it. If your feet are healthy, how they respond to a surface is a reflection of your shoes. If you work on a hard surface, then thick soled shoes are best suited for your needs. If you are a runner, then everything on you, from shirt to shoes, is as lightweight as possible. To meet this goal, running shoes include thin padding, which in turn, responds better to a grass surface than an asphalt one.

In medical practice aching feet most often represent an impairment in gait. The contours of the foot consists of bones curved in an arch and maintained that way by a host of ligaments and tendons. Inflammation or injury may fray these sinews and upset the balance among the bones. The result is a sore foot.

Before you treat sore feet by a renovation of your home or workspace, see your physician or podiatrist. They may find a flaw in your foot that represents a need to change your shoes or begin medical therapy.



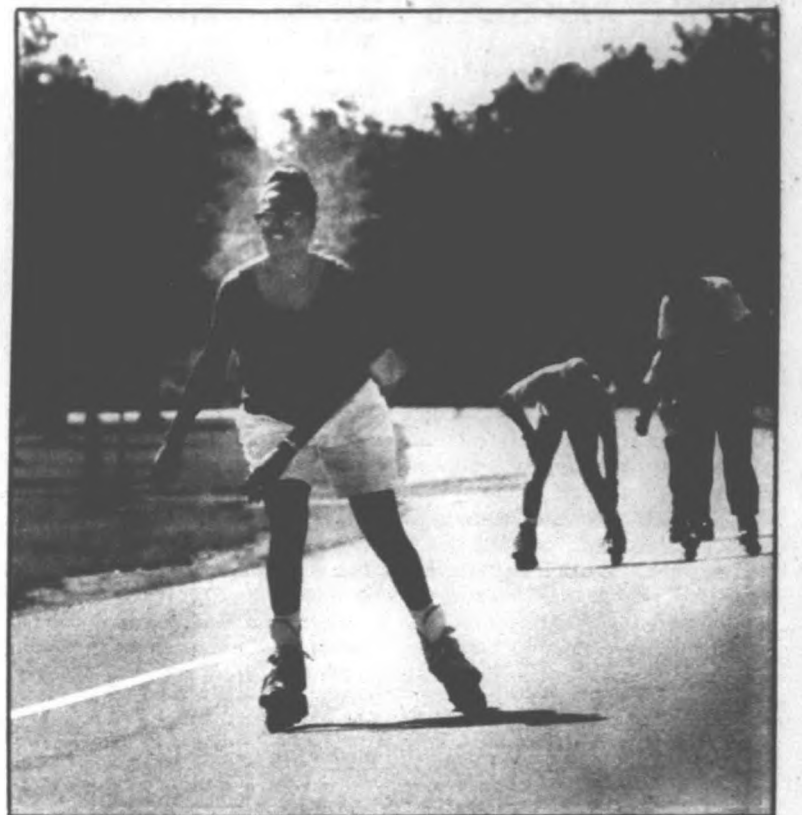

# Hines Drive coasts through summer

The joy of bicycling ends when you're looking over your shoulder and dodging 16-wheelers.

That's why cyclists, sports enthusiasts and nature lovers take to the paths in Hines Drive when the roads are closed. Vehicles are banned every Saturday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on the stretch from Outer Drive to Ann Arbor Trail.

"There's no traffic to worry about — there's all kinds of people roller skating and walking their dogs," said John Hokett, hauling his daughter, Mary, in a bicycle trailer. Daughter Anne and wife Maggie took part in the family ritual.

"What's nice is that you're safe," Maggie Hokett said. "The difference between biking and taking cars is that people will say 'hi' to you on a bike."

There are no worries about

parking the car since the Livonia family lives close enough to cycle to the park.

The "Saturday in the Park" road closure program is becoming a family event, according to Tessie Pitsea, manager of recreation for Wayne County parks.

"You see tricycles, training wheels and senior citizens out on their walks. It's interesting seeing the big, wide range group."

A car window somehow obscures the scenery, according to Janet Rose, who was out cycling on the path with her husband, Charles, on a recent hot Saturday morning.

"When you're in a car you miss half of it," she said. "You have to listen for whose coming up from behind. Here it's pretty safe. You're not going to be hit by a car."

"I'd hate it if they take this away from us," the Livonia woman said.

John Alma of Westland was out riding a bicycle on an outing with his wife, daughter, Lori Sawle, also of Westland; and his two grandchildren, Brian, 3, and Adam, 1.

Standing tall on his Rollerblades, Ken Biglane said he logs about 15 miles most Saturdays. The Livonia resident also makes the trip at least once during the week when the road is open to cars.

Allen Henry and Roxanne Peterson, both of Westland, were out in-line skating, despite the heat, with friends from Baltimore and Washington, D.C.

Balancing on the blades, Peterson said, "I'm still learning."

The road wasn't limited to wheels, skates and walkers. Gypsy, a golden retriever, was taking a walk with her owner, Cheryl Lazar of Livonia. The exercising pair

lives so close to the park that they walk down.

But plenty of people bring their cars and there's ample parking available at Nankin Mills, at Ann Arbor Trail; Merriman Hollow, east of Nankin Mills; and Warrendale, at Warren Avenue.

Flat tires and heat exhaustion are the most common problems during the road closure, according to Wayne County sheriff's deputy Ken Laskasky, who was patrolling the area one recent Saturday.

"Most of the time it's just scrapes, bruises and flat tires," Laskasky said, adding, however, that the sheriff's office fields a lot of odd reports, too.

"We were looking for a 250-pound naked man. All the witness could say is, 'He had a mustache and black hair.' We're not sure those kinds of calls really happen, because we never find anyone."

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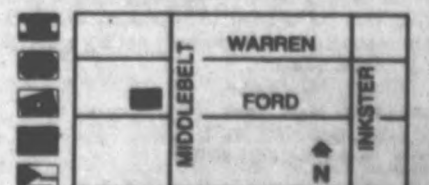
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# Farmers given tax break by House

Farmers will pay lighter property taxes under a House passed bill designed to correct an assessing flaw.

Rep. Dan Gustafson's bill exempts cherry pitting, onion washing and carrot washing machinery from the state's personal property tax.

"There was an inconsistency in the way they were being taxed," said Gustafson, a first term Republican from Haslett who represents part of Livingston County. Some counties taxed them; others didn't, he said.

Gustafson had no estimate of how big a tax break farmers might receive, but several Democrats objected to cutting school and local revenues.

"We don't know the cost," said Rep. Lyn Jondahl, D-Okemos, Democratic cochair of the House Taxation Committee and a declared gubernatorial candidate.

"They (local units) aren't carrying out their responsibility to assess."

Gustafson said lost revenue would be minimal because that farm equipment hadn't been taxed until a Tax Tribunal decision against Wm. Bolthouse Farms in Newaygo County.

In general, Michigan law exempts farm machinery and equipment from the personal property tax where it is used for farming. The legal question was whether pitting, cooling, cleaning, washing and size grading equipment is part of farming or processing.

The House decided 80 to 15 in favor of the farmer.

Voting yes: Republicans Lyn Bankes of Redford, Penny Crissman of Rochester, Barbara Dobb of Union Lake, Jan Dolan of Farmington Hills, John Jamian of Bloomfield Township, Shirley Johnson of Royal Oak, Greg Kaza of Rochester Hills, Jerry Vorva of Plymouth and Deborah Whyman of Canton.

Voting no: Democrats Maxine Berman of Southfield, William Keith of Garden City and Richard Young of Dearborn Heights.

Absent: Justine Barns, D-Westland.

"Last time I looked at the (state) budget, we were in deficit by \$200 million," objected Young, Democratic chair of the Appropriations Committee. "If we keep doing this, it's going to come home to roost."

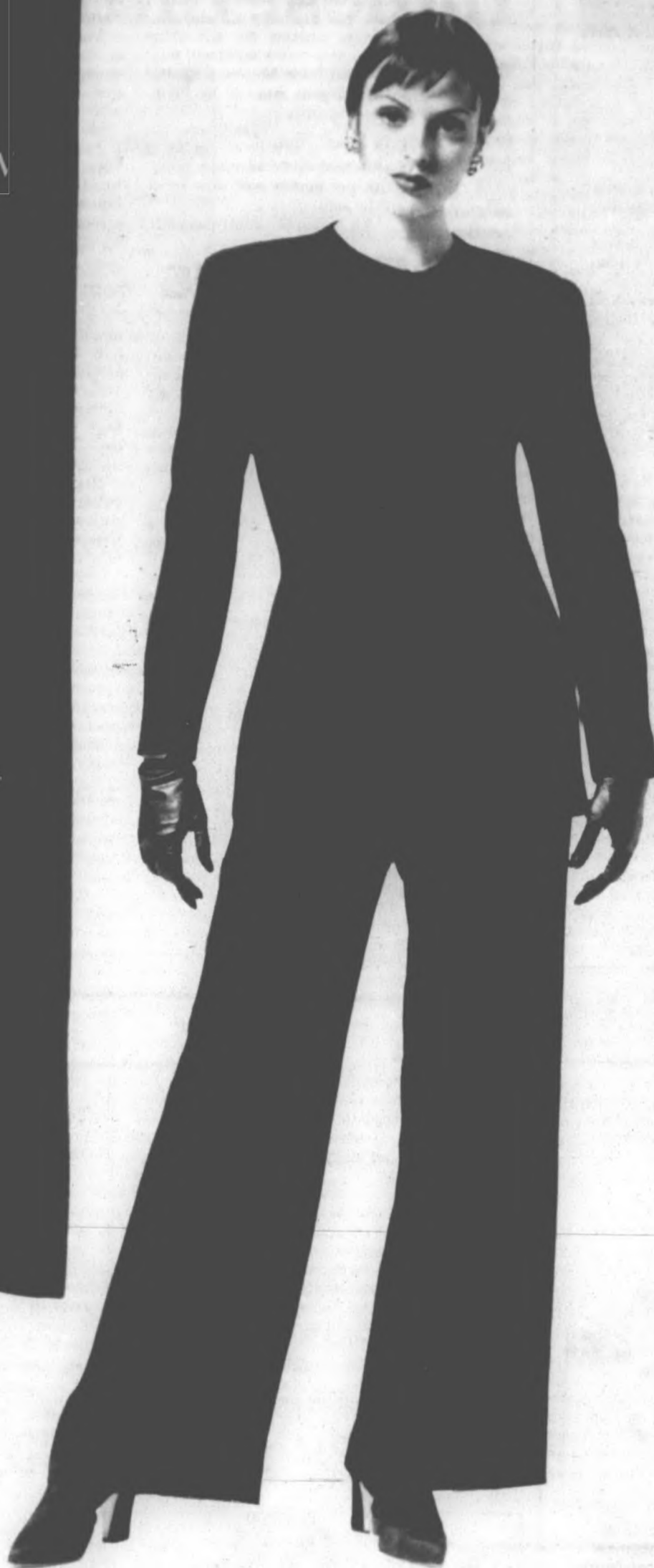
In floor debate, lawmakers amended Gustafson's bill to exempt water conditioning and cherry pitting equipment. Critics said it was being turned into a "Christmas tree bill" with many ornaments.

The bill is part of a constant Lansing debate over "tax expenditures" — eliminating taxes on politically favored groups. Some conservatives would go even further and eliminate the personal property tax entirely, although it brings in \$900 million a year.

The Michigan Farm Bureau and Chamber of Commerce supported the bill. Gov. John Engler's Treasury Department and the Michigan Association of Equalization Directors opposed it.

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## CHEAP EATS

Beware! Caution! Yikes! Chit chat, gab, gossip. And no stealing other's forks but most importantly have a good time!

These are but a few of the many rules listed on the menu at Royal Oak's La Fondue. This all-fondue establishment features everything from pickles and angel food cake to cod and tenderloin all fit for swishing into various concoctions perfect for dunking.

Aside from the chain restaurant booth seating, the scenery inside La Fondue isn't half bad. Dim lighting, assorted wine bottles and muted pink and green tones make up most of it. No need to get bored, however, because once your appetizer has arrived, you're too busy to notice your surroundings anyway.

The appetizer choice is CHEESE. You decide on swiss or cheddar. Both are prepared (along with everything else you order) in a fondue pot situated in the middle of your table. Beer and garlic is heated to "very hot" and Kirsch, some secret spices and mounds of cheese are melted to "bubble."

Sliced Granny Smith apples are good for dipping, assorted breads (french and rye) are handed out in a basket and vegetables are also available for a little extra. La Fondue makes a big oops by serving bread a little on the boring side and way too soft.

Fondue entrees are pretty much guaranteed to suit anyone's taste — chicken, beef, cod and shrimp are offered separately — and if you just have to have it, all tell your server, "I'll have the feast." Take note that back when fondue first started out, times were rough and food was scarce, so you be the judge as to whether or not the feast is really a feast by today's standards.

"Fondue" your entree can be fun but tricky business. Take for instance the time factor. In front of you is a plate of the feast, everything on it is cooked for different amounts of time and it's up to you to monitor it. You and your guest each place your matching pieces of beef into the boiling pot, you begin to talk about how great a time you had last weekend. You chat, you gossip. You forget just how long your beef has been in there, and then you forget just how long its supposed to be in there. Relax, and remember next time to check your watch.

If your still up to yet more fondue fun, order dessert. Fresh fruits, marshmallows and bits of angel food cake can be dunked in either dark or white hot chocolate. Heavy, but it's chocolate heaven.

One word to the wise for safe fondueing: leg crossers beware; the heating element underneath the table encourages the use of asbestos kneepads. And another thing share everything, or you'll burn a hole in your pocket!

Birmingham's Midtown Cafe is one of those surprising exceptions to the rule that larger restaurants are cold and impersonal. The cafe's interior has unbelievable presence, hinting at an upscale New York cafe atmosphere and wide open airiness with walls fit for an art gallery. Comfort reigns here with numerous tables for four and tongue-and-groove pine bedecking the vast wall space, giving the place a laid back feeling.

The wait staff is highly efficient, well-versed in the day's fare and interesting and funny to chat with. Not only that, they look pretty spiffy in their all-black attire and they actually look like they are enjoying their work.

Newcomer chef Rich Redmer deftly balances traditional fare with some of his own innovative touches. Rich is fresh in from New Orleans and has been at the cafe for about two months. He's gotten rave reviews from many satisfied patrons.

A hint of creole surfaces in many of Redmer's creations, subtle enough not to overpower entrees, but definitely there. Menu offerings are changed on a daily basis, but favorites find their way onto the menu in one variation or another.

In the way of appetizers, Maryland crabcakes are nicely set off with spicy cocktail sauce and Duck Gallantini with picante and fresh fruit are expertly prepared and beautifully presented. Nachos are still a big hit and tasty pizzas sport artichokes and pesto.

Whatever the Midtown does, it seems to do well. Roast beef is accompanied by spicy red pepper

## Indies: Little labels, big dreams

Bands have to start some place on the road to success and many times it's with the indies. They're small record labels where the president is everything from promoter to salesman, public relations executive and accountant.

Commercial success is what all recording companies want with its releases.

On the other hand, independent recording companies pray that someone will listen to its releases.

Nevertheless, when you are the president of a local independent recording label with a Royal Oak post office box and you receive orders from as far away as the Great Britain, France, Poland and Italy, your company has hit the big time. "The records get out to places that groups have never heard of; the bands definitely get exposure, but for me I want to build my catalog,"

### STREET BEATS

Icon Records founder Dennis Breton said. "I look at the last four years as a major time and money investment."

In today's mass produced, high powered music industry, independent recording labels, such as Icon Records, are slowly edging their way up to the top. Detroit plays host to hundreds of indies (the insiders name for independent labels) who may be in the shadows of major recording companies at first glance, but in due time could become an equal.

### Work, work

Indie owners walk a narrow line as the promoters, sales people, public relations executives, accountants, managers, company presidents, secretaries and gig organizer, while the majors with high power and expense accounts, are viewed as big brothers which George Orwell could have never conceived.

"The indie scene is more human; they are doing it for the music," said Sue Summers, founder of Detroit's Chaos Network and Records. "The majors don't listen to the music. They don't know the music." Summers recently changed her

company's name from Chaos to Static after Sony Music Entertainment Inc. notified her that it had a label named Chaos. Summers, who hadn't trademarked her 3-year-old name, filed the appropriate papers for Static. Her roster includes Mental Landscape, Brothers From Another Planet and Red September.

Even with a fresh start, her goal remains the same.

"To get out these bands I heard from the Detroit area . . . The majors are avoiding us because they want to see how the indies are doing," she said. "They seem to be avoiding us because we don't have a sound. Atlanta and Seattle have a distinct sound, where Detroit doesn't."

"I think I can help in getting the music out there and if a band places it, I'll push it."

The love for the art of music is the root to majority of independent labels. Many labels are formed specifically to allow groups which are generally overlooked a medium to express themselves. Other Detroit indies are open to all sounds.

"When I started out there were a lot of cool bands and a lot of cool stuff here that doesn't get chronological," Breton said, "and there are a lot of people who think that the local music scene sucks and I'm out to prove them wrong."

Icon's listings range from a 1960s rock'n'roll surf riff of The Golden-tones to the energetic ska sounds of The Exceptions and rock edge of The Colours.

### Basic training

Local bands are usually comprised of "people with day jobs who enjoy jamming on the weekends or starry-eyed teens who dream of the ultimate recording contract." Indies provide the basic training for these bands, according to Entertainment Promotions (EP) founder Mark Barnowski.

"Indies are the life line for new talent such as a lot of new acts in country music," said Barnowski, who performs under the name Mark Edwards. "The majors don't have the time to develop the talent."

EP is the promotions division of R&A Records which was started by Barnowski and his brother after receiving some success as members of the group the Relation in the early 1980s. After the group disbanded, Barnowski and his brother formed their label and later developed the promotions division to work with major labels. Today EP is promoting such artists as Bruce Hornsby, Rosanne Cash and Regina Bell out of its Troy office.

Once an indie likes a band's or performer's sound and is signed either to a written or verbal contract, it is typically up to the artist to bear the costs to record the material. From there, the indies may charge or even absorb the cost of publishing on cassette or compact disc.

Transmat Records was formed in 1986 by Detroit and techno wiz Derrick May to release "Strings of Life" and "Nude Photo" which has received success in Europe and only

heard in dance clubs stateside.

Indies know the only way people will hear material is with radio, DJ and retail support.

The lack of that musical infrastructure in Detroit dismays KMS Records founder Kevin Saunderson who has won several gold and silver albums from the United Kingdom as founder of the techno-dance group Inner City.

"I think as a music scene we need to network and help each other then we have in the past," said Saunderson, a Southfield resident. "We need support here in Detroit. We get a lot of support overseas, but as soon as I see the support here I think we can survive."

"That's frustrating, frustrating enough no to do it any more."

Static's Summers is doing something about that. She is one of the developers who brought about the Detroit Music Alliance, a support group for local acts which meets monthly in the metro area to learn about the music industry and find support with one another.

Indies know it takes more than just band fraternization to succeed with the majors, many times it has to be truer than life.

Icon's releases are printed on colored vinyl to attract attention, Breton said, even though he has not made a profit since he started his one-man company four years ago.

Reality for many indies is that they never see a profit and fold faster than they started, but Breton sees a future for indies.

## Posies enjoy sweet smell of success

The Posies frequently dreamt about whom they would play with when their band made it big. Big Star wasn't one of them. It seemed impossible.

"It's one of those things that I never thought I would experience; it's not like I thought, 'Someday I want to play with Big Star,'" said the soft-spoken Ken Stringfellow.

The Posies are trying to start their own tradition with their two-part Beatlesque harmonies and powerful guitars. However, sometimes they find there's a bit of confusion with the other "P" bands.

"I was in L.A. and I went into an Italian restaurant and I saw Kevin DuBrow, lead singer for Quiet Riot. When I was like 13 and in junior high, Quiet Riot was quite the item. Then there's Kevin DuBrow in the bathroom of this Italian restaurant," said Auer, lead guitarist and vocalist. The excitement continued until they spoke.

"He said, 'Yeah, I think I heard you guys. No wait, that's the Pogues,'" Auer said.

# 'Justice' suffers from sophomore jinx

"Boyz n the Hood," about day-to-day life and death in South Central L.A., was such an accomplished and emotionally charged work that no one could believe that director John Singleton was only in his early 20s.

In his second feature, "Poetic Justice," Singleton acts his age. This predictably plotted story of mismatched lovers on a long road trip is proof positive of the sophomore slump, but it does have more than a few elements that make it worth seeing.

Janet Jackson, unfortunately, isn't one of them. Though the pop singer is easy to watch, she registers only two emotions — contemplative sadness and profanity-charged anger.

Supposedly, she gained weight for the role so she would look less glamorous, but this is the only thing she has in common with real actors like Robert DeNiro or even Shelley Winters. Her talented fellow actors, especially Tupac Shakur as Lucky, run rings around her.

## MOVIES

Jackson plays Justice, who watches her boyfriend gunned down right next to her at the drive-in. Months, maybe years, later she still mopes around the South Central hair salon where she works, not dating, placing her deepest thoughts in a thick book of poetry.

That's where Lucky comes in. A postal worker who has a kid and lives with his mother, he's just the kind of guy that Justice's money-hungry boss warns her about. "The problem with you is, you always pick the wrong kind of man," she says.

And for a while Justice agrees. Then, by a coincidence that has occurred in only about 100 movies before, they are thrown together in Lucky's postal truck on a trip north to deliver mail. Love conquers all, of course, but not without a trip down some rocky roads.

There are several stops on the odyssey, when they make with friends Chicago (Joe Torry) and

Iesha (Regina King). They smell barbecue from the road and stop to crash a family picnic, with Lucky masquerading as a relative. But when Iesha gets drunk and Chicago starts a fight, they realize how they don't fit into this world at all.

"Poetic Justice" should have kicked back for a while longer at the barbecue, by far the most entertaining part of the movie. Instead, when the foursome heads down the road to a more radical African-American gathering with pounding drums and speeches, its agenda grows a bit thin — and obvious.

It grinds to a halt when the truck finally reaches its destination in Oakland, only to discover something catastrophic has just happened. Like most road movies, "Poetic Justice" doesn't know when to go with the flow instead of reaching for earth-shattering conclusions.

Justice's poetry, usually read aloud in indulgent montages, is really the work of Maya Angelou, the veteran poet who knocked everyone for a loop at the Clinton

inauguration. Her words, along with music by Stanley Clarke and Stevie Wonder, share soundtrack time with the usual rap.

Looking for a message? Singleton has a nice one about the nature of creativity, which comes out in Justice's poetry and in Lucky's sincere attempts at becoming a rapper. We see the silliness of friend Chicago, who can only express himself by "dressing fine" and constantly brushing his almost-shaved head.

Singleton isn't the first filmmaker to hurt his batting average during his second time at bat. Even Spike Lee, with "School Daze," went down a few notches but bounced back with a masterpiece a film or two later. Singleton, now 25, is equally capable of making great movies again.

Barbara, My 12-year-old daughter is overweight. She is intelligent and attractive, previously chubby, now fat. Her mother and I don't know what to do. We want

certed, lifelong commitment to do so.

Your daughter will decide for herself whether or not she wants to make this commitment. You cannot make the decision for her. You might be able, however, to help, by being as knowledgeable on the subject as possible. The problem is so prevalent that it is hotly researched, so that there is more to know now than at any time in the past.

her to see a counselor, but she refuses.

I have a weight problem myself, so I believe I know my daughter's feelings. She never expresses concern or unhappiness, but because being fat is such a torture for me, I think she is covering up her true feelings.

Since I am an adult, I have my weight under control. Despite being bigger than I wish I were, I am successful, socially and in business. I worry that with a girl, success will be much more difficult if she is fat, than if she were a boy.

I don't have a lot of hope about her weight because I can't be the weight I want to be. Even though I make this call, I wonder if there is a solution to this problem.

Dear Caller,

I understand the torture a seemingly unsolvable problem like this one can bring. You and your daughter are fat in a thin world. Your worries are valid; our culture discriminates against fat people, especially fat women.

For the past 40-50 years, fat people have been the last group we self-righteously ostracize without guilt. Our culture snubs them because it is believed that they are responsible for their problem. We are taught that others who are traditionally discriminated against, for example, those who are foreign born or those with handicaps, cannot change their condition. Therefore, we sympathize with them rather than make fun of them.

The assumption that fat people are responsible for their condition is challenged by recent research on the subject. The research suggests that weight and body shape are largely hereditary. As I write this, and as you read it, we can all think of those, who despite an inclination to be fat, successfully remain normal size. The research indicates that they are very few. Those who are successful in changing their destiny must make a con-

We know that fat people react differently to food restriction than thin people. We know that dieting, in the old restrictive sense, usually aids obesity, rather than decreasing it. We know that weight maintenance is rarely possible without exercise. We know that the kind of food that is eaten is more important than the quantity. Find out about this research, and talk to your daughter about it. Possibly, if she will not see a counselor, she will consent to seeing a dietitian.

There is another matter, one that concerns the relationship between you and your daughter. Because it is painful, it is frequently a reality that parents deny. You cannot be a role model for your daughter losing weight unless you conquer your weight problem. Often being a good example is the most effective way to teach. Too often with a hostile child, the only way. If, as you say in your call, "I can't be the weight I want," then you must accept that she can't.

Dear Readers, Some months ago this column received a letter from a father considering growth hormone for his son. That column discussed the psychological pros and cons of chemically altering a child's size. At that time none of the experts I interviewed talked about possible harmful, physical side effects.

Recently, I heard Dr. Jeremy Rifkin from the Foundation of Economic Trends say that human growth hormone has been linked to an increased chance of leukemia and other disorders. On the same program, Dr. Gutai, a physician at Detroit's Children's Hospital, strongly disagreed. So, despite a strong recommendation for the drug by many, there is debate on its safety, that some experts do not acknowledge.

# Legalizing drugs worth the risk of increased use

Wayne County Sheriff's Department Detective George Wesson sipped champagne with the recently in Detroit. I was his coach at Southeastern High, and we had met to dine and toast the 30th anniversary of his record-breaking 49-second 440-yard dash to the state title.

However, during the course of the meal, we talked more about drugs than track. Despite an out-of-control trade, which has defied all other solutions, Wesson opposes legalizing drugs. So does Walter Chapman, the Highland Park police sergeant decorated for helping solve the serial killings there. So does George Rouhib of the Sterling Heights police. So does Dennis Archer, Detroit's top mayoral candidate. In fact so do all of my knowledgeable friends in police work or other public life — except one — and he shall go unnamed to protect him from the boo-

birds who would vilify him for his unpopular opinion.

Vilification, after all, is what boo-birds do best. Witness the mob of boo-bird politicians who seek every opportunity to vilify Bill Clinton less than a year into a presidency already distinguished by his pragmatic style. Clinton's pragmatism has been particularly effective in confronting the national debt (although boo-birds will probably try to blame the Mississippi flood on him). Hopefully, he'll use his style to solve our horrendous drug problem as well.

Witness also the boo-bird professors who vilified president Sandra Packard of Oakland University for comparing college administration to cemetery administration. "In a cemetery, you have a lot of people under you," Packard joked in the June 21 issue of "Crain's Detroit Business," "but you can't get

them to do anything." She was merely trying to explain how she involves people in decision-making rather than use a coercive business-type approach.

Witness also the boo-birds who blitzed me for citing the merits of drug legalization in Rochester Schools' 1990 edition of "Telford's Telescope". As with Clinton's and Packard's boo-

birds, my boo-birds' motives were multiple and less than pristine. Their main motives for attacking were my multicultural curricular initiatives and recruitment of minority staff. Biased little boo-birds love to peck away at high-profile people who take stands on tough issues.

Mao Tse-tung obliterated drug use in China by summarily executing sellers and users, but Americans must apply remedies to the drug problem which won't compromise civil liberties. While I respect Detective Wesson and others who speak from gritty experience, I'm still convinced that those remedies are legalization (to eliminate profiteering and corruption), treatment (including supervised alternative drug dispensation), rehabilitation and education.

Several police and municipal authorities who once numbered among my

boo-birds have grudgingly come to agree with this. Even Coleman Young — seldom in agreement with me on anything — is saying it now. Prisons are overflowing with youthful dealers ready to risk violent death in order to become millionaires. And if we could somehow prevent the growth of the coca crop or close our porous borders to it, laboratory-produced drugs would simply take over the market.

The one great gamble to legalization is increased use. That's a gamble worth taking, because our inner cities' drug situation couldn't get any worse. Soon it's going to engulf the entire nation.

I assure her that she's incorrect: Professional athletes have continued to demand yearly pay hikes. Lawyers and physicians — who so far have not had to had pay hikes awarded or agreed to by monitoring boards — have been able to increase fees as they require. Engineers and other professional, college-educated persons have been awarded moderate increases in salary. Never do I see anyone call for these groups of professionals to relinquish part of their salary for the betterment of their profession, their clients, or their society. Only teachers are asked to make a sacrifice at that level.

Our society must stop paying lip service to children and to education. While not many issues are black and white, this one surely is: Either we believe that our children are worth our time, our effort, and our money or we don't believe it. Michigan's education-financing laws show that we don't really care.

While I'm on this soapbox, allow me to ex-

press two additional ideas: First, except for the absolutely worst teachers — those who have no control in their classroom, those who fail 25 percent of every class, those who don't like kids — most teachers deserve every cent they are paid. For all the talk about practitioners (businessmen, scientists, nutritionists, historians) taking the place of teachers, I sincerely and humbly doubt that many non-teachers could (would) endure the classroom experience for a significant period of time. . . .

Second, it is commonly accepted that you can't make a silk purse out of a pig's ear. While calling today's students "pig's ears" is both politically incorrect and professionally foolish, I nevertheless insist that teachers whose students have not prepared for learning under the watchful eyes of parents who are engaged with their children are not going to become scholars in America's classrooms regardless of the teacher, the teacher's salary, the textbook, the football team's record, the caliber of the band or anything else.

The reason there was no need for counselors and crisis clinics in the '50s was students weren't threatened by new information and ideas. Why confuse our children with the difficulties of learning to take advantage of these new technologies when they could be out having fun? Besides, the technology is expensive. Pencils and books did the job in the past. Let us do away with frivolous expenditures and continue, as Mr. Gladden has implied, to congratulate ourselves on our past accomplishments.

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# Observer chairman, owner honored for achievement

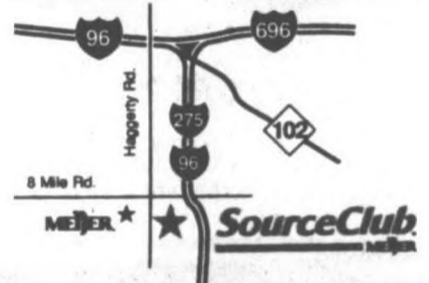
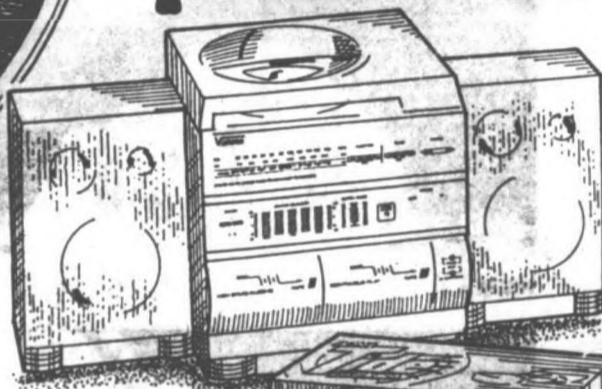

## Plan to eat well on family camping trip

I think camping is one of life's rituals that all kids should experience. I remember my first camping trip. We were shipped off on a bus one Monday morning after a frantic weekend of trying to borrow sleeping bags and flashlights. Momma cursed while she sewed our names onto what seemed like everything we owned.

### Camp memories

The camp was north of Clarkston in what was then a well-wooded area within walking distance of a lake. I caught fish, swimmer's ear, poison ivy and my first case of homesickness. As far as the food was concerned, all I remember was a Buster Brown shoe box, neatly lined with waxed paper, filled to the brim with momma's chocolate chip cookies.

Somewhere in the Janes Gang family trunk crammed into the attic in Wyandotte is the wallet I made, the belt I wove, the potholder I strung and a few pictures, one of which was a photograph of me surrounded by my fellow campers, and that shoe box full of momma's cookies.

Times have changed and although my kids are still a bit young to be sent off for a week at camp, I'd bet that shoe boxes are still crammed with goodies, and parents still stay up way past the 11 o'clock news to sew names inside underwear.

About eight years ago, the Janes Gang bought one of those good sized pop-up campers that are easily pulled behind the family mini-van. As you're reading this, we will be off, looking for that perfect campsite, setting up our camp and priming the old Coleman stove, anticipating the taste of burnt marshmallows, grilled hot dogs and with a little luck, whatever we catch for dinner.

Trying to keep up the auspices of a gourmet chef at a campground can be tricky, and needs some planning. You have to understand that my wife Diane's idea of camping and roughing it is a Holiday Inn not within walking distance of a major mall. Furthermore, the campsite should be in one of those "suburban camper havens" like a KOA or a state park with electricity and hot showers.

### Surviving camping

We have learned to survive camping by following these suggestions, all culled from years of experience.

First off, when it comes to food, we eat well. The camper is well-stocked and stuffed with handy large plastic storage boxes, one stuffed with necessary spices and condiments, one stuffed with a set of cheap non-stick cookware and utensils, one stuffed with reusable plates, bowls and cups, and the last crammed with dry food, cereals, canned goods and a coffee maker.

### Simple meals

Breakfast is usually kept as simple as possible with a late lunch serving as the main meal and hot dogs and burgers in the evening around the campfire. Contrary to popular belief, when this chef goes camping, the Cuisinart and Braun hand-mixer stay home with the cat.

Lunch is usually something that can be made in one skillet. Those storage boxes are a godsend, especially during inclement weather and damp, dew soaked mornings. Since the refrigerator in the camper is not much larger than a tackle box, perishable items are kept in a cooler marked with a big "X" so the kids know that pop and juice are somewhere else to be found.

A few bags of precooked hamburger make their way into a hearty goulash or get mixed with a can of tomato sauce and a packet of taco seasoning for lunch.

I don't want to get the feeling we're Neanderthals out in the woods. A small bag of potatoes we pack gets roasted one evening and then grated the next day for potato pancakes or hash browns.

The kids love cheese fondue and the non-stick fry pan over the old Coleman stove does a great job of heating canned chicken broth while a pound of domestic Swiss cheese is hand grated and dredged with a little flour and garlic powder and stirred into melt.

Chunks of bread, pretzels and a steamed head of broccoli make for a light evening supper. There are a few of life's little luxuries that I simply will not go camping without.

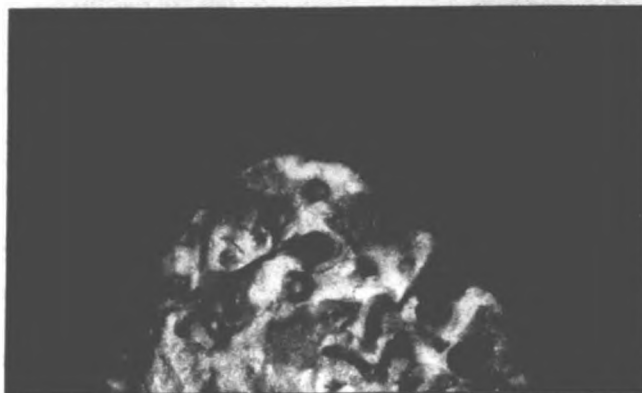
Two good sharp knives and a plastic cutting board are de rigueur along with a good can opener and a Swiss Army knife complete with a cork-screw. And if all else fails, a long extension cord, an electric fry pan and my Visa card, to use at that great Chinese restaurant the park ranger told me about while checking in, when I can't tolerate blackened hot dogs and domestic mustard.

## Scouts hit the trails with sure-fire campsite meals



When it comes to camping and outdoor cooking, it pays to be prepared. Local Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, and their leaders, who are avid campers share tips and recipes. Some of their creative meal suggestions will surprise you.

Quentin and Lynn Lloyd of Redford never settle for scorched burgers or a slapped-together meal when they're cooking outdoors.

The Lloyds and their four children ages 8 to 15 years are involved in scouting. And they've been avid campers for years.

"We cook like we do at home," said Lynn Lloyd, a preschool teacher. "We like real food. I don't like to sacrifice

nutrition."

Summer is the peak season for outdoor cooking. Millions of people are heading off to campgrounds and beaches.

"It's being out in nature," said Katharine Redcay of West Bloomfield, a Girl Scout leader, organizer and camp consultant. "It's good to be away from phones and cars."

The Lloyds, interviewed before

What do you do when someone in your family refuses to eat low-fat foods — especially when that person is the primary cook in the family? This is the situation in the Dehne household.

Ron and Anne Dehne have lived in Livonia since 1987. Everyone who knows this couple knows that Ron does most of the family cooking. But, Anne is concerned about the large amount of fat Ron uses when he cooks.

Ron sounds like your typical "meat and potatoes" kind of guy. He likes to eat steak with lots of butter on his potatoes. Fortunately, Ron is very active. He is a sergeant for the Livonia Police Department. In his spare time he shoots balls in the basketball hoop on the driveway or swims in the family's new pool.

Anne is also extremely busy. She is an IRS revenue agent. When they are not at work the Dehnes have a full schedule at home with their two children. Kristyn, who is 7½, attends Kennedy Elementary School. She told me she likes to eat healthy foods and would like to be a vegetarian as long as she doesn't have to eat beans. Kristyn said she also learned about low-fat foods in school. But her mother has been the most important influence in teaching her about healthy eating.

Alexander is 4. If you ever want to see perpetual motion just look him up. Alex told me he loves carrots. When I asked him if he likes them cooked or raw he said "neither, I like them plain."

While I was interviewing Anne both children asked if they could have a snack. Instead of the usual junk food, these kids were given fruit. I thought that was great because when I was their age a snack was a cupcake or chips.

I think Ron and Anne are doing a wonderful job teaching their children to choose healthy foods for

- 1/2 cup mini semi-sweet chocolate chips
- Extra Serving Size (9-ounce) prepared graham cracker crust
- 1 cup crushed Oreo cookies (8 cookies)

In blender, sprinkle gelatin over cold milk; let stand 2 minutes. Add hot milk and process at low speed until dissolved, about 1 minute.

Add cream cheese, sugar and vanilla and process until blended.

- 1 cup skim milk, heated to boiling
- 2 packages (8 ounces each) Philadelphia brand fat free cream cheese

- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 box (5 ounces) Nabisco SnackWell's Fat Free Cinnamon Graham Snacks

starting a round of short camping trips, like well-rounded meals when they're traveling in their pop-up camper.

Some of the Lloyds' typical campsite meals are shish-kabob, Salisbury steak with gravy and boiled potatoes, and one-pot meals featuring browned meat, rice and onion soup mix for flavor.

Quentin Lloyd, an assistant scoutmaster, likes to show his flair for improvisation. Have you ever heard of scrambled eggs prepared in a resealable plastic bag? How about hamburger patty cooked in a hollowed-out orange?

Redcay, a homemaker, enjoys teaching her Girl Scouts how to cook using tin cans as pots and griddles.

"You should see the looks on their faces when they see you can really cook on them," Redcay said.

The possibilities are endless,

whether cooking over an open fire, on a barbecue grill or on an outdoor stove, say the scout leaders. But planning and teamwork are vital.

Pam Jones and Mary Jane LeForge, both of Livonia, are co-leaders of two Girl Scout troops.

"Before we go, we know exactly what we are going to eat," said Jones. "It cuts down on waste."

Jones got into scouting with her daughter Shauna, now 13. Whenever there's a trip, the troop members plan exactly what they will need, including foodstuffs, utensils and recipes.

Camping trips with the scouts teach youngsters how to be resourceful and work together, said Quentin Lloyd, a mockup technician at Chrysler Corp.

For example, scrambling eggs in a bag is quick and easy. It requires no utensils and little cleanup.

Crack two eggs into a resealable plastic bag. Add a little milk. Salt and pepper to taste. Close bag tightly and knead with fingers until contents are mixed. Drop into a pot of boiling water. Cook about two minutes and serve.

The Lloyds also take family vacations in their camper. Their children, Sean, 15, Kyle, 11, Chad, 10, and Meghann, 8, are seasoned travelers.

The Lloyds plan meals with no leftovers. Space is limited. Eating up reduces demands on the cooler.

During the trip Lynn Lloyd makes quick trips to the grocery store to buy fresh corn or salad fixings.

One-dish meals are efficient. Hobo stew is a favorite of Sean Lloyd, who's working on his Eagle Scout ranking.

Hobo stew combines hamburger, canned mixed vegetables and

canned cream of mushroom soup. "Mix it and wrap in foil tightly," Sean said. "It takes about a half-hour to cook." Kyle, 11, enjoys hamburger cooked in a hollowed-out orange. It's quick, easy and requires no utensils or pots. "The orange peel protects (the meat) from burning, and gives it a little orange taste," Kyle said.

During scout outings, adults supervise while youngsters do most of the chores, according to Redcay. They gather firewood and dice vegetables. Troop leaders make sure safety rules are followed.

Redcay's daughter, Rachel O'Connor, 9, is a Junior Girl Scout. Rachel's sister, Margaret O'Connor, 6, is a Brownie. They attend Meadow Lake Elementary School in Birmingham.

Novelty is a big part of the camping adventure. For example, leaders teach the safe use of the

"buddy burner" and "vagabond stove."

A buddy burner is a tuna fish can filled with wood shavings and paraffin. It's used with a vagabond, or hobo, stove. The vagabond stove is an empty, institutional-size can with vented sides, top and bottom. Cooking is done on the top of the can.

"We want the girls to feel good about themselves," Redcay said. "They deal with a little bit of adversity and have fun."

Rachel O'Connor, a veteran of several camping trips, enjoys the challenge.

"You can make pretty good scrambled eggs and sausage (on a hobo stove)," Rachel said.

Mishaps can occur.

Kyle Lloyd remembered the time his dad was fixing sweet-and-sour chicken outdoors. Oil in the too-thin pan caught fire and started a small grass fire.

Jones' group once made Indian pudding, a heavy-on-the-molasses dessert. "It smelled really good, but nobody would eat it," Jones said.

More successful was the Jell-O, prepared and popped into a double-bagged resealable plastic bag and buried one foot below ground.

The Lloyds enjoy baked apples. The apple is cored, almost all the way through. Sprinkle cinnamon into the hole. Place on a skewer and cook over fire.

Rachel O'Connor's favorite dessert is the classic S'mores, a blend of graham cracker squares, chocolate and marshmallows, toasted. Presumably, they're so tasty you just have to ask for "s'more"

As the scouts advance through ranks, their skills sharpen. Creativity blossoms.

"They're developing a sense of confidence," Redcay said.

## BISCUIT MIX

- 2 cups flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 2 tablespoons dry milk
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 teaspoon butter or oil

Combine dry ingredients then thoroughly mix in shortening. Use mix to make campfire pizza and biscuits. Recipes follow.

## CAMPFIRE PIZZA

- Biscuit Pizza Dough
- 3 cups biscuit mix, divided
- 8 tablespoons water, divided
- Pizza topping
- 12 ounces (1 1/2 cups) pizza sauce, divided
- 4 ounces (24 slices) pepperoni slices, divided
- 2 ounces (8 tablespoons) olives, pitted, sliced, divided
- 2 ounces (8 tablespoons) mushrooms, cleaned, sliced, divided
- 1 green pepper, washed, seeded, cored, chopped
- 8 ounces (1 cup) mozzarella cheese, shredded, divided

Preheat coals. In large mixing bowl, combine biscuit mix and wa-

ter. Mix to thick paste. Line 4 mess kits or 9-inch foil plates with foil and divide dough into quarters.

Press dough out on mess kits or foil plates to make crust. Place 3 ounces (3/4 cup) pizza sauce on each of the 4 pizza doughs, spreading evenly. Top each pizza with preferred toppings. Top each pizza with 1/4 cup mozzarella cheese.

Seal mess kit cover or top each foil pie plate with a second unlined foil pie plate and wrap with a layer of foil to keep them together. Place in coals.

Using tongs place hot coals on top of mess kit or pie plates. Cook 5-10 minutes until crust is done and cheese is lightly browned. Remove from coals, uncover, lift foil liner with pizza out of mess kit or pie plate. Serves four.

Note: This recipe can also be baked as one pizza in a well-greased Dutch oven, using 1/2 less biscuit mix.

## BISCUITS

- 2 cups prepared biscuit mix
  - 3/4 cup milk or water
  - flour
  - shortening
- Put Dutch oven over coals with some coals on lid to heat thoroughly. Grease pan for biscuits. Put 2 cups prepared mix and 3/4 cup milk or water into the mixing bowl.

Stir with a fork until mixed. Stir as little as possible. If dough appears to be too moist or sticky, add a little more biscuit mix and stir in.

Sprinkle a little flour on a clean, dry, flat surface. Put dough on flour and sprinkle a little flour on dough. Roll dough out until 3/4 or 1/2 inch thick.

Cut dough into biscuit size pieces, knife can be used to cut into 1 1/2 inch squares or use the end of a small can. There should be at least 16 pieces.

Put the cut dough in the greased pan and put in hot (450 degree) Dutch oven. Dutch oven should be put over hot coals with some hot coals on lid.

Check in 5 minutes. There should be only slight evidence of a crust. If there is not evidence, add more coals. If there is heavier crusting, remove some coals. Check in 10 minutes. There should be slight evidence of some browning. Change the heat as needed. Check in 15 minutes, test to see if done, use the splinter test — (shove a splinter or toothpick into one biscuit that looks less done than the rest and pull it out. If it comes out with dry crumbs, it is done. If the crumbs are moist, additional cooking time is needed).

Biscuits should be done in 15-20

minutes actual cooking time. Remove Dutch oven from fire as soon as you take the biscuits out.

Alternate instructions. Spread a little oleo around the bottom and sides of a cold frying pan. Then coat the pan with flour by shaking a teaspoon of flour inside it.

In a bowl add 1/4 cup cold water to each cup of biscuit mix. Mix the dough. To make it easy to handle, rub some flour on your hands. Shape the dough into biscuits about 1/4 inch high and 2 inches wide and set these in pan. Cover.

Cook over a flame or shove the pan into some hot coals, covering it with coals. When cooking over heat, the flame must be low. If it isn't, simply move the pan around to distribute the heat and hold the pan off the heat part of the time to keep the bottoms of the biscuits from burning. Cook them 5-7 minutes on one side, then turn them over with a spatula and cook 5 minutes more. Be patient and give the baking powder time to work.

## MOCK ANGEL FOOD CAKE

- 1 loaf French bread, sliced
  - 3 (14-ounce) cans condensed milk
  - 3 cups shredded coconut
- Dip bread in condensed milk, then role in coconut. Toast over

coals with a toasting stick.

## S'MORES

- Graham crackers
- Marshmallows
- Chocolate bars

Toast marshmallows on stick. When golden brown, sandwich between chocolate and graham crackers. Evenly toasted marshmallows melt the chocolate. Be careful not to flame the marshmallows.

treats. They also encourage their children to be outside and active instead of sitting indoors watching TV.

Now, back to Ron. We needed to come up with a very convincing recipe makeover if we were ever going to persuade him to eat low-fat foods. Usually, when large amounts of fat are omitted from a recipe the texture or flavor is slightly different from the original recipe.

But this reduced-fat no-bake cheesecake tastes very close to the original box brand no-bake cheesecakes from Jell-O. Be sure to read next month's column on Aug. 23 to find out Ron's reaction to the cheesecake.

Here's a suggestion to help lower the fat at your house. Have only the low-fat versions of common products on hand. For example — low-fat cream cheese, low-fat or skim milk, pretzels instead of chips, salsa and corn chips instead of chips and dip. Try one of the new no-fat brands of tortilla chips that are now available.

Try egg substitutes in place of real eggs, frozen yogurt instead of ice cream, fruit or fruit snacks instead of candy.

# Fresh vegetables make tasty entrees

Summer is the perfect time to create delicious entrees using fresh vegetables from the garden or local farmer's market.

The Olive Garden Italian Restaurant's Rigatoni con Zucchini offers a delicious pasta dish with a summertime twist: sauteed zucchini and stewed fresh tomatoes. Rigatoni con Zucchini is a new entree featured on The Olive Garden's Summer Fantastico menu, available now through Sept. 6.

For other summertime vegetable-filled dishes, the following tips supplied by the United Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Association, will help you choose the freshest produce.

**Beans** — Pods should be firm, crisp and slender with good green color. Beans should break with a "snap." Wash before using.

**Mushrooms** — May be white, tan or cream-colored. Freshest mushrooms are closed around the stem by a thin veil. However, those having open veils caused by loss of water are just as nutritious, but have a more pungent flavor. Refrigerate in a paper bag or ventilated plastic container. Avoid storing in plastic bags.

**Onions** — Choose onions that are clean and firm. The skins should be dry, smooth and crackly. Avoid onions with wet, soggy necks or soft, spongy bulbs, which indicate decay. Keep at room temperature in a well-ventilated area. May be refrigerated; above all, keep dry. May be stored three to four weeks.

**Potatoes** — Choose firm, clean and relatively smooth potatoes free of cuts or bruises. Avoid green-colored potatoes and those with sprouts. Never refrigerate potatoes, but keep them in a cool, dark, well-ventilated area. Keep away from light (which can cause greening) and moisture.

**Summer Squash** — Should be fresh, heavy for its size and tender. Choose small to medium sizes. Refrigerate and use as soon as possible.

**Tomatoes** — Choose smooth, firm and plump-looking tomatoes with good color. Place away from sunlight. Putting tomatoes in a bag hastens ripening. Best if never refrigerated.

**Broccoli** — Look for compact bud clusters. Color varies from dark green to purplish green, depending on variety. Yellow and wilted leaves indicate aging.

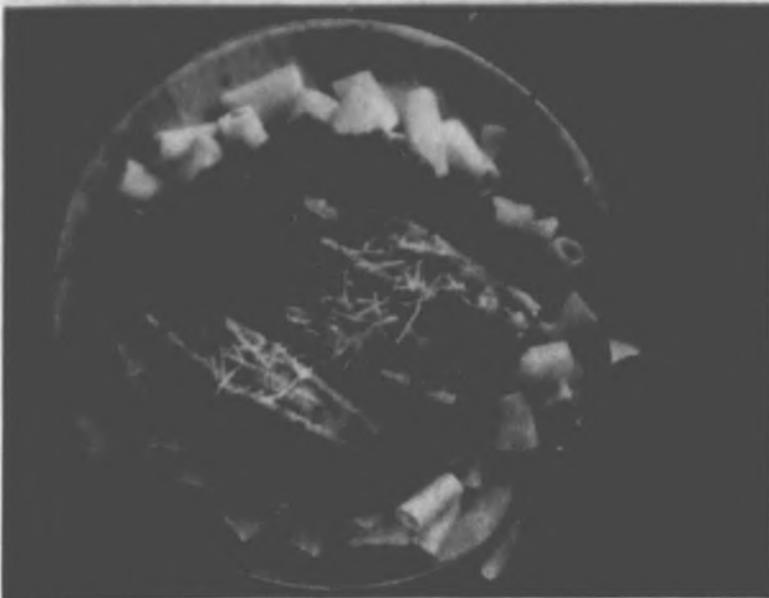

1/2 cup olive oil

- 1 cup onion, chopped
- 1 pound fresh mushrooms
- 1 1/2 teaspoon garlic, finely minced
- 3 cups crushed tomatoes
- 1 16-ounce can tomatoes, diced and drained
- 1 1/2 cups tomato puree
- 1 cup black olives, sliced and drained
- 2 teaspoons capers, drained
- 1/2 teaspoon oregano, dried
- 1/2 teaspoon basil, dried
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon crushed red pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon fennel seeds
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

**Zucchini preparation**  
4 large zucchini sliced lengthwise, 1/4 inch thick  
2 tablespoons olive oil  
basil, dried  
oregano, dried  
salt  
black pepper  
1 pound rigatoni pasta  
Parmesan cheese, freshly grated

Chop onion. Divide mushrooms

into 2 equal portions. Cut 1 portion into quarters and reserve. Finely mince remaining portion. Mince garlic. Heat olive oil in heavy Dutch oven over medium heat. Add onion

and minced mushrooms. Cook 10 minutes or until onions are very soft, stirring frequently. Add garlic and mushroom quarters and cook 5 more minutes stirring constantly. Add remaining ingredients, stir and bring to a simmer. Reduce heat and simmer 20 minutes, stirring frequently.

Bring a large pot of water to a boil. Cook rigatoni according to package directions.

To prepare zucchini — cut ends off of zucchini. Cut lengthwise into 1/4-inch thick rectangular slices. Sprinkle sliced zucchini with salt,

pepper, basil and oregano. Heat 1 tablespoon of olive oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Place zucchini slices in one layer in the pan.

Saute about 3 minutes per side just until tender. Remove to heated platter, and cover to keep warm while sauteing remaining zucchini. Add remaining olive oil as needed.

Drain cooked rigatoni and transfer to a serving platter. Ladle sauce over the pasta. Top with zucchini slices and serve. Pass extra and freshly grated Parmesan cheese. Serves 4-6.

- 1 pound Swiss cheese, grated or cut into small cubes
- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 cups chicken broth
- 1 clove garlic, chopped fine
- Dash of Tabasco or other hot sauce
- Bread and steamed vegetables for dipping.

Grate the cheese and dredge with flour. Toss to coat. Set aside.

Bring the chicken broth to a boil in a non-stick skillet or saucepan with the garlic. Add cheese mixture and stir with a long plastic spoon until smooth and thick.

Add hot sauce. Lower heat and simmer for 5 minutes. Serve with bread and vegetables.

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### Planning makes cooking outdoors easier

Remember that old motto about scouts always being prepared?

When it comes to camping and outdoor cooking, that adage really pays off.

"Planning makes it easier," said to Quentin Lloyd, an assistant scoutmaster from Redford

The following tips reflect prescribed scouting guidelines, as well as the personal experiences of Lloyd and other scouting leaders interviewed for this story.

- Plan meals in advance. Be flexible.

- Assemble basic mixes in advance. If you're planning to serve pancakes, make up mix and put it in a resealable bag. This conserves space and is economical.

- Plan meals with no leftovers. Always make sure you have proper utensils and pots before leaving home.

- Cut up vegetables in advance. For convenience, use canned or dried vegetables. Use packaged or canned soups for gravy or seasoning.

- Have everyone take part in the meal preparation. Rotate duties.

- When preparing food, observe hygiene and safety. Wash hands. Tie back hair and loose clothing before starting a fire.

- Use only the amount of wood needed for a fire. Keep a bucket of sand or water nearby. Know which direction the wind is blowing.

- Be especially careful with perishable foods such as eggs, milk, meats and poultry. To avoid spoilage, don't leave food out more than one hour.

- Keep hot food hot and cold food chilled.

- When putting out a fire with water, sprinkle, rather than pour. If re-kindling a fire, put embers of coal next to the logs. Blow or fan.

- Keep plenty of water, juice or Kool-Aid on hand. It's easy to get dehydrated on hot days or during strenuous activities.

- Store all food in containers.

- Never leave food, toothpaste, drinks or dirty clothing in your tent, to avoid attracting animals into the sleeping area.

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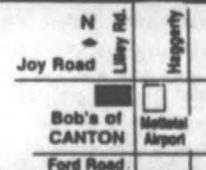
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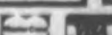

■ "All the Pretty Horses" by Cormac McCarthy is the coming-of-age story of a 16-year-old who runs away to Mexico from his Texas ranch. It's a National Book Award winner and is appropriate for college-age or adult readers. "Should have won the Pulitzer Prize," according to Bookpeople staff.

■ "Colony" by Anne Rivers Siddons. If, like me, you're a Siddons fan, Colony is populated with her usual appealing and indomitable women characters. ## Will bigger is better win in the end?

"The cycle in retail right now says bigger is better," said Sanford Weber, president of LaKritz-Weber and Co. of Southfield, a commercial real estate firm. "It's the day of the Big Box Users, or as we say, the category killers."

Weber recently chaired a panel discussion sponsored by the International Council of Shopping Centers on how the Michigan market will be affected by warehouse-style retailers "hitting the area by storm."

His panel included Sandra Ambrozik of Best Buy appliance stores, based in Minneapolis, Minn.; Wendy Frost of Michael's Stores Inc., a retailer of arts and crafts items based in Irving, Texas; Noal Solomon of Office

Max Inc. of Shaker Heights, Ohio, and Celia Wing of Home Quarters, home improvement stores based in Landover, Md.

These real estate scouts are currently seeking metro Detroit locations for stores. Some have already opened stores here and others have stores under construction.

Best Buys hopes to open 10 stores in Michigan by the end of the year, according to Ambrozik. The stores sell appliances and music software in huge buildings with prototypes of either 35,000 or 45,000 square feet. They will land with a splash to compete with Fretter and ABC Warehouse. Recall that the Highland Appliance chain filed for bankruptcy recently.

Michael's, a giant retailer of arts

and crafts items, is "the biggest in the country," according to Frost. "We have over 35,000 items in stock, with 189 stores in 28 states," she said. "We're opening soon at Lakeside, in Troy, in Dearborn and Southgate. Down the road, we'd like stores in Novi, Bloomfield and Canton townships."

Michael's will compete with Frank's Nursery and Crafts and Lee Wards for the dollars of local crafters.

Office Max, in Detroit since 1989 with the opening of the Madison Heights store, now has 20 stores in Michigan, 296 stores throughout 40 states. Office Max was recently purchased by the Kmart Corp., based in Troy. The prototype store is 23,000 square feet, (compare that to the traditional office supply store of 6,000

square feet) favoring locations in regional or power centers. Sales were \$528 million in 1992, and Solomon predicted sales of \$1.5 billion this year.

Home Quarters, a wholly-owned subsidiary of Hechinger's of the Washington, D.C., area, has 46 stores in 13 states, all east of the Mississippi River. Sales topped \$1.9 billion in 1992 so the company wants to expand.

"We have broken ground in Livonia, Madison Heights, Roseville and Southfield," Wing said. "We're looking for other locations in Pittsfield and Bloomfield townships. Eventually we want 10 stores in the metro De-

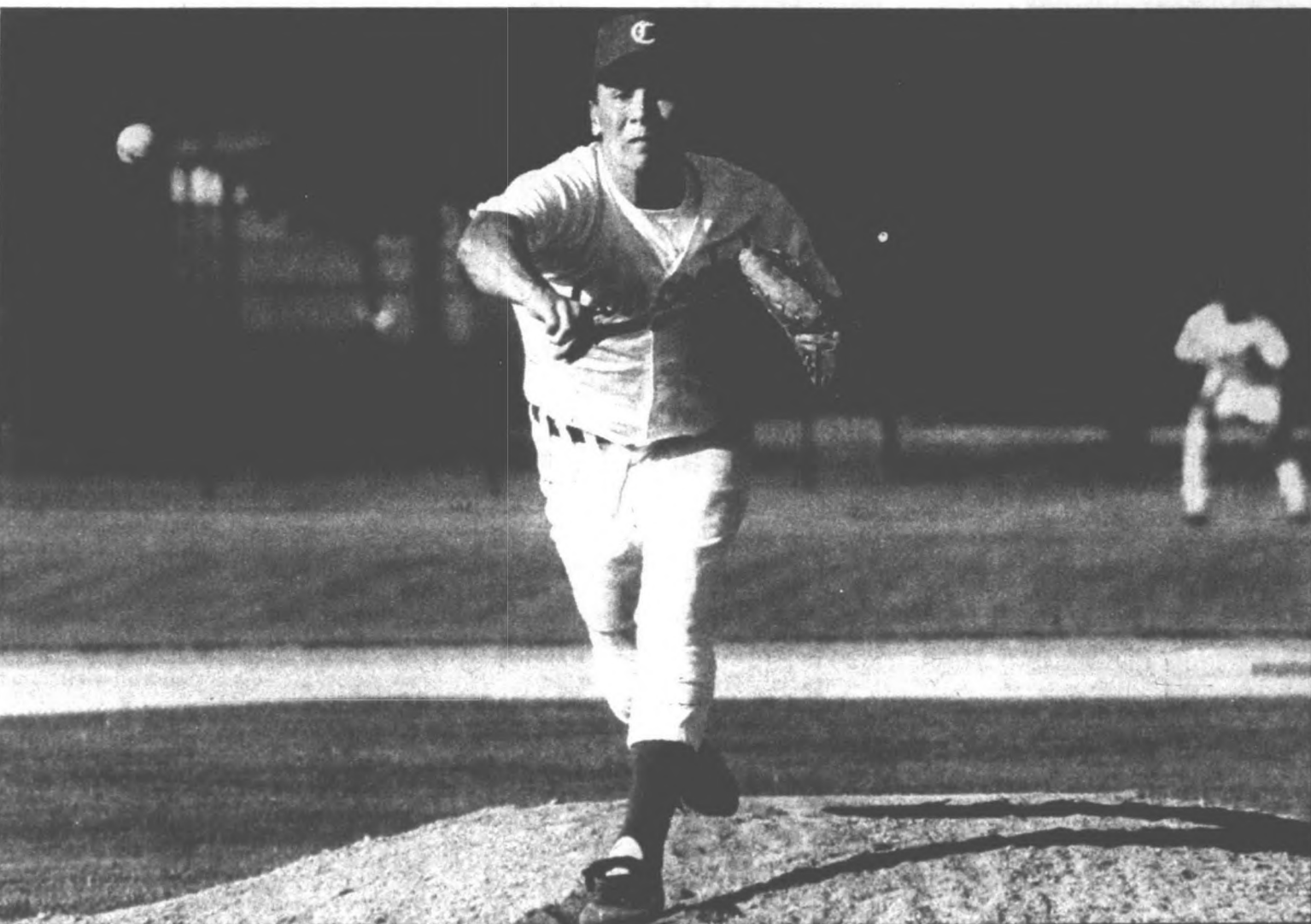
NFWB coach Jim Ferguson also gave Scheffer credit for a fine pitching performance and the VFW batters for their display.

But, according to coach Tom Teeters, they really shouldn't have gotten that far. Which is what pleased him — they overachieved. SC collected its fifth-straight Region 12 championship, posting a 37-13 record and once again winning the Eastern Conference (they've been first in the conference in each of Teeter's eight seasons as coach).

And in the '92 pre-season, he didn't think they could possibly win the conference.

Unfortunately, Teeters' '93 team won't match last year's team in terms of overachievement. The reason — there's just too much talent.

Indeed, this could be the most talent Teeters has ever had to work with.

"We have a lot of experience, and athletically we're very strong," he said, searching for possible weaknesses in his team.

Finding them, opponents are bound to discover, won't be easy.

### Solid nucleus

First, however, the losses. Outside hitters Julie Wood and Nancy Ehler have graduated and taken their talents elsewhere — Wood to Madonna University, Ehler to University of Toledo, where she follows another SC standout, her sister Jill.

Also not returning: Jennifer Damphousse, who has decided not to play and has transferred to Hen-

ry Ford CC, and Erica Edwards, who has left school.

Five players are back: 5-foot-8 1/2 Tracia Clendenen, a "do-everything" by Teeters' description; 5-11 middle blocker Danni Sheehy; 5-5 Shannon Capstick; 5-7 Janine Sproui; and 5-8 Sharia Yaklin.

Not a bad nucleus to build around, certainly. Factor in the material Teeters has coming in, and this project is first-rate.

Let's start with the transfers, both from Henry Ford CC. When Teeters examined a '92 Hawks lineup that included these two, he thought there was no way SC could reclaim the conference crown.

But things didn't work out, and now Kristen Barnes — a 6-1 1/2 Class A all-state middle blocker at West Bloomfield HS as a senior — and Danielle Pfeffer — a 5-11 all-around standout from Dear-

## Bowler cherishes tourney triumph

The 15-year Farmington Hills resident has experienced a lot of highs during his bowling career. Now as the official winner of the "Peterson," Lee Snow has hit the ultimate taste of victory. It meant

a lot more to him than the \$45,000 first place money. Snow is a nostalgia buff and this achievement means his name and picture will be on the wall at the house on 35th and Archer streets in Chicago right along with many of the legendary names.

A lot of good bowlers have tried the Peterson Classic, only to come away muttering to themselves in despair, for this is no ordinary tournament. Eight games are bowled across 16 lanes, and each lane is different.

One may have 60 feet of oil, the next one bone dry.

They have bad racks, so the pins are not properly spotted. The pins are heavier and mixed and all this is done on purpose.

It poses a real challenge to the bowlers, and only those who are properly prepared can succeed.

As Snow says, "some of the lanes hook a lot, some not at all, you have to take whatever the lane will give you."

His strategy was to be sure to hit the head pin on the first ball and not to miss any one-pin spares.

There are no arrows or dots or other spots on the lanes, it makes it much more difficult to find a line and sit on it. Snow's total score was 1,589 pins, which happened to be the second lowest winning score in all 83 Peterson tournaments.

His last two games were 230 and 248, and that made the big differ-

ence. Part of the winning strategy was to use an older ball, a black diamond, which proved to react more consistently on the varied conditions, instead of one of the newer Urethane or reactive balls which are less predictable.

Winning isn't exactly new to Lee Snow.

He was the NCAA in 1973 while at Eastern Michigan and he won the Bowlers Journal Classic Division at Tampa in 1979.

He has won two Michigan Majors titles, six city association championships and two state titles. He bowls in the Stroh's Traveling All-Stars and Ansaras Classic at Drakeshire. His highest average last season was 221.

Snow is the current president of the Stroh's Michigan Majors Bowling Association. He has competed in the Pro Bowlers Tour in the 1970s, managed several bowling centers, owned a pro shop and serves as color commentator for the MMBA on PASS TV every month.

The Wayne-Westland Bowling Association and the Tri-City Women's Bowling Association are jointly conducting league officers schools and supplies at Westland Bowl on Aug. 12.

# OCC cagers have what it takes

Rearm and rerun. That's the general idea at Oakland Community College, anyway. The men's basketball program keeps chugging along, replacing stars of the past with a new batch of 6-foot-5 quicksters.

Coach Lynn Reed's biggest problem every year seems to be finding the right combination. After hearing him list his recruits for the '93-94 campaign, the feeling once again is the talent is there to make a run at the Eastern Conference championship — and maybe go a bit further.

There are losses, to be sure. Gone are 6-6 forward Myron Banks (to NCAA Division I Buffalo), 5-10 point guard Kevin Woodmore (to Siena Heights), 6-7 forward Bill Knight (to Ferris State) and 6-2 guard Troy Coleman (still looking).

Returning, there's some fire-

power in 5-11 shooter Craig Martin, 6-3 swingman Willie Payne, 6-5 forward Mark Galbraith and 6-4 forward Randy Hicks. Then there's Will Marcoux, a 6-6 forward from Redford Catholic Central, and Curtis Long, a 5-2 super-quick guard, both of whom sat out last year.

So much for the known quantities. What's new? What has Reed added? Is there anything that could push the Raiders beyond their 15-14 record of last season? Not surprisingly, the prospects are aplenty. Among the most promising: 6-9 Perry Elliott, from Detroit, a talent who has displayed "phenomenal improvement." He must make his grades in summer school to be eligible, however.

Then there's Troy Daniels, a 5-10 point guard from California. "He's a tough kid, a good player," said Reed.

Also Troy McNeil, a 6-7, 230-

pounder who graduated from Troy HS two years ago but hasn't been playing. "I think he's a late bloomer," Reed said. McNeil is bringing someone with him: his cousin, Mike White, a 6-5 forward from Ohio.

Two others who look particularly promising are 6-5 Tony McNeal, from Walled Lake Western, whom Reed compares to former OCC star Toine Murphy; and 6-6 Chris MacFarlane, from Walled Lake Central. Both could develop and become instant contributors.

So could several others. Like 6-4 Freeman Jones from Pontiac Northern, who also must make his grades in classes this summer; 6-3 guard Scott Goddard, from Waterford Mott; 6-4 forward Damon Henry, from Oakland Christian; 5-10 P.J. Woods, from Romeo; 6-1 Harold Golsen, who played at Macomb CC several seasons ago; 6-2 Ken Clay, from

Detroit Renaissance; and 6-5 Robert Antwine, from Pontiac Central.

Goddard and Henry are shooters. Clay has been out of high school a year; he didn't play at Renaissance, but Reed likened him to another OCC great, Raabe Reviere; both Woods and Golsen have been out of school a while, but their games are sharp; and Antwine has exhibited enough ability to make a positive impression.

Or, as Reed put it, "It gives me a start, something to work with. If Elliott continues to improve, he runs well and can block shots as well as anyone I've had."

A 6-9 impact player could push OCC over the top. In '92, the Raiders lost a half-dozen games in the final minute, by a couple of points. A talented big man could reverse that.

And in so doing, convert an also-ran into a title contender.

born Edsel Ford — are playing for him.

"We originally tried to recruit both of them, but they chose Henry Ford," said Teeters. He insists he did nothing to change their mind, except possibly injecting some frustration into their '92 season by guiding SC to consecutive wins over the Hawks in conference play.

Both secured releases from the program, and now could make the Ocelots NJCAA title contenders. Barnes "has been working very hard weight-lifting." As for any possible attitude problems, Teeters assured, "There won't be. She wants to play very much."

### Impressive newcomers

Barnes should give the Ocelots the kind of power they enjoyed

two years ago with Kari Van Deusen and Renea Bonser. Pfeffer, on the other hand, provides something more.

"She's a 5-11 setter with great speed, a great jump and one of the best blocks I've ever seen," gushed Teeters. "She's one of those players who's making us be very creative. She can play the right side and set, she can middle block and set, she can play the left side and hit."

"Wherever we need her to make the team better, we'll use her."

Both Barnes and Pfeffer have one year of junior college eligibility left.

Another major addition to the lineup is Livonia Churchill grad ('92) Julie Campau, a 5-11 middle blocker/outside hitter who went to Michigan State (but did not play) last year. "She's got great

hands," said Teeters. "She'll have an immediate impact on the team. She's real aggressive, a team leader."

Another sizable newcomer is Tracia Kazayaka, 6-1 from Warren Woods Tower. Kazayaka was a standout in basketball (she may join Jack Grenan's SC team after volleyball) who could not find an appealing collegiate hoop offer. Like Barnes and Pfeffer, "she's a great blocker," said Teeters.

Last but hardly least on the list is Margaret Heddle, a 5-9 outside hitter from Ypsilanti and the sister of former SC player Sarah Heddle. Margaret's all-around ability was apparent at Ypsi, where she was the Braves' setter. Teeters expects her to back up Clendenen at setter and provide defense.

Practices have not yet officially begun for SC (although conditioning has). Still, Teeters knows where more work will be needed. "Defense is something I hope we get better at," he said. "Also outside hitting. Replacing Julie and Nancy is something we have to do."

Then there's serving and... well, given time, Teeters could think of a dozen things. But he also admits this is as talented a team he has ever had, with the possible exception of the '88 NJCAA championship squad, which had more overall speed but less size.

In the final analysis, if these Ocelots can come close to the '92 team's ability to overachieve, they'll match up with any NJCAA foe.

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# It's always fair weather with Willard Scott

A letter once passed through the busy New York City postal system addressed simply to "Portly, Sunny Weatherman, NBC, New York."

Not surprisingly, it found its way to the crowded mailbag of NBC's Willard Scott, a staple of the network's "Today Show." With all due credit to the mail handlers involved, it could scarcely have been intended for anyone else.

Since March 1980, when he made his "Today" debut, Scott has been one of television's most popular - and colorful - broadcasters, a mix of canny showmanship and unabashedly corny bonhomie. Whether engaged in a folksy rumination about rain in the Northeast, or saluting a grateful Georgian's 100th birthday, Scott provides a respite from the polished, even self-important style of most TV news staffers.

That Scott musters his genial, ebullient delivery so early in the morning is testimony to both his energy and his professionalism. "Oh, I usually lay around in bed until 3:30 or so," he laughs, describing his morning regimen. "I told somebody last week and I wasn't trying to be funny-that I loved being on vacation

'cause I could sleep 'til 6:30 or 7.

And as for the other residents of the Scott household? "It's just my wife and I now," he explains, "and she doesn't care what I do. Hell, one time she made up the bed with me it it."

One presumes Scott is in no such danger when staying in a hotel on one of his many road trips, doing his "Today" segments from various fairs, festivals, fund-raisers and parades around the nation. Despite the rigors of travel, Scott describes the remotes as "kind of my trademark...I love it."

Scott says the rewards of the road trips are multiple. "No. 1, of course, I'm a ham," he admits. "I just come alive when I'm with people. There are also practical, business spinoffs. People want to hire you a week later to make a speech, or someone in an ad agency sees you and says, 'Hey, that guy's okay, he's working with a cow, or with kids.'"

In his speaking engagements, titled "The Joy of Living," Scott opens with anecdotes from his years in broadcasting as well as other humorous topics.

"I usually take a hairpiece with me that I use as a prop," he says, "and then I look for some baldhead-

ed guy in the audience to kid around with. And hope he doesn't sue me."

The second part of Scott's speech is a bit more serious, turning to the thing he describes as "the second great love of my life, which started just as a fluke." He's referring to his trademark birthday salutes to centenarians and his feelings in general for the treatment and respect accorded the elderly.

"I've been saying for several years," says Scott, "that we need to get older people and younger people together and have a dialogue. There's a lot of ills in our society that come, I think, from people not knowing or spending time with their grandparents. It teaches you respect...and older people have a lot to offer, a great deal of wisdom."

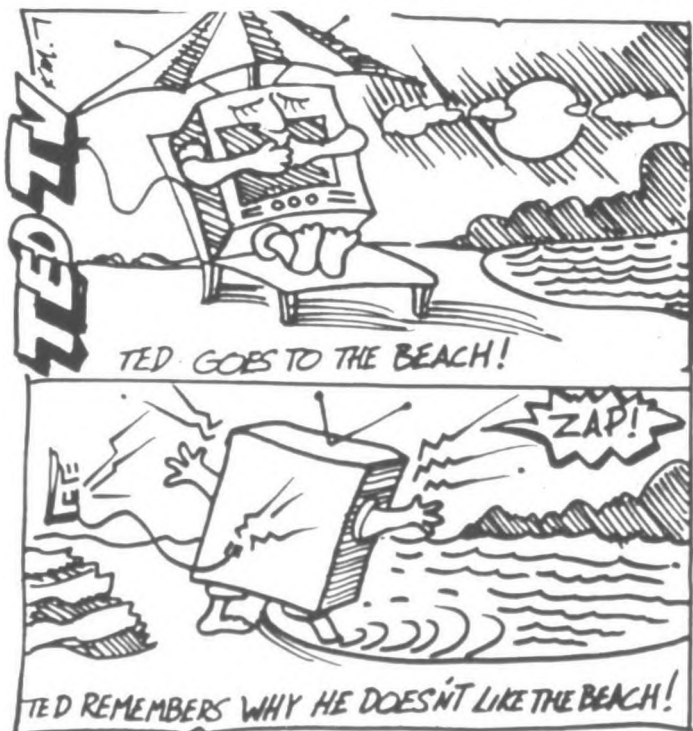
The author of four books (including a best-selling recipe collection), Scott has gained a lot of his own wisdom through a lifetime in radio and television. He became infatuated with broadcasting after wandering into a Washington radio station at age 8 and watching none other than Eric Sevareid read the news.

"I never forgot that," Scott recalls. A make-believe station in his parents' basement led to the real thing by the time he was a teenager, working with a souped-up system he ordered through the mail from St. Louis. His partner was one David Sharp, and the call letters of their fledgling enterprise were WSSD.

"We were broadcasting one Saturday morning," Scott remembers with a laugh, "and some guys from the FCC came to my house and shut us down. They said we were coming in over the Pan Am frequency as flights came in at the airport. I'm lucky I didn't go to jail."

Weekday mornings, veteran broadcaster Willard Scott serves up weather forecasts, folksy humor and his trademark 100th birthday salutations on NBC's "Today Show." Scott says he caught the broadcasting bug at the age of 8.

Raised in Montreal, Udy has directed several noted plays, including "Out in America," which earned her a Dramalogue Award.

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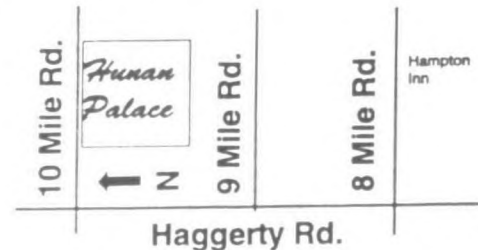

### More Elvis on the way; TNT tallies votes for favorite films

Raycom, a sports and entertainment company based in Charlotte, N.C., has announced a five-year contract with the estate of singer Elvis Presley. The arrangement calls for a series of syndicated television specials co-produced by Raycom and the estate, culminating in a 1997 spectacular commemorating

the 20th anniversary of Presley's death on Aug. 16, 1977. The first two offerings air this summer in a two-week window beginning Aug. 7. Lisa Hartman-Black and Mac Davis serve as

co-hosts and narrators for both programs. 'Article 99' entertaining,  
thought-provoking despite flaws

Imagine "M\*A\*S\*H" rewritten and co-directed by Billy Wilder, Frank Capra and a TV sitcom neophyte, and the result might be something like 1992's "Article 99," a film little seen in its brief theatrical release. A blend of icy cynicism, hearty belief in the "little guy" and sometimes threadbare plot developments, Howard Deutch's film is at once entertaining, thought-provoking and maddeningly uneven.

Perhaps the problem is that "Article 99" just never decided what it wanted to be when it grew up. The film seems to meander between "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington" and "The Hospital," with occasional forays into the territories of Rambo-style machismo and poorly staged slapstick. It just never picks a path and sticks to it.

But some films, like some people, can be forgiven a lot just because of good intentions. "Article 99" springs from a good idea, the performances are sound, and the statements it makes, however clumsily, need to be made.

Ray Liotta ("Unlawful Entry," "Dominick and Eugene") stars as a rebellious, resourceful doctor in a Veterans Administration hospital. Frustrated with the VA's dense bureaucracy and ceaseless cost-cutting, Liotta and his confederates (John C. McGinley, Forest Whitaker, Lea Thompson) have become experts at going around the proper procedures, even if it means scheduling patients for prostate surgery when they really need a triple bypass, or shifting patients from one ward to another rather than let them be returned to the street.

Into the fray comes intern Keifer Sutherland, a young man with his eyes on lucrative private practice and totally unprepared for the grim realities of real-life medicine.

Stand-out performances come from Liotta and John Mahoney as the hospital's ruthless, politically minded director. Kathy Baker ("Picket Fences") is appealing as a rule-bound psychiatrist angered, then attracted, by Liotta's maverick behavior.
