## City tax hike has scant impact

The average tax bill for services other than trash removal in the city of Plymouth will increase by about \$25 a year, a 3.6-percent increase. But because of a drop in charges for trash, the total city tax rate will go down.

At a meeting of the city's Finance Commission, the city's tax rate was approved Monday, the 1994 rate will be 2.05 percent, or a decrease of 0.01 percent from 2.06 percent last year.

The increase was the lowest since 1987. "You've done a tremendous job with it," said longtime commission member Paul Nastoff, the long-

resident to address the commission during the public hearing Monday on the budget.

Commissioners also approved a 1.5-percent decrease in the millage charged for garbage and recyclables, falling from 2.2 to 2.1 mills.

The total city millage was reduced from 2.05 to 2.04 mills.

By law, the commission could have chosen to raise the total city millage by another 0.05 mills to 2.14 mills.

The net 0.01-percent average increase for homeowners was necessary to balance the budget, commissioners

said as officials discussed a budget that trimmed by 20 the number of city employees and gave just about 100 new places to cut the budget without cutting services, residents want.

The commissioners worked very hard on their budget, he said, working with the goal of reducing costs, said City Manager Steve Walters.

The increase in the tax on garbage residents was also a part of the budget, but it was offset by the city's new property tax increase. That portion of the budget increased from

## Credit union founder believed in helping others

George Lawton, whose foundation for helping Plymouth Canton's Federal credit union from its infancy, died Saturday as a statewide institution with 100,000 members throughout Michigan. But his leg heart is what people admired most about Lawton.

Lawton, 71, of Northville, died at home May 27. He suffered from emphysema.

Lawton, who helped found the Plymouth S.M.A. served as president of the Plymouth Chamber of Commerce and the Plymouth Canton Board of Education. He served numerous organizations, including the Plymouth Industrial Development Corporation, Plymouth Symphony Society and Plymouth City Commission. He also was chairman of the Canton Township Planning Commission and served on the Canton Economic Development Board.

It was three days after D-Day, the year-ago today, when former Plymouth mayor Edouard "Bud" Martin landed at Omaha Beach.

It was a punky, rainy day, and the water was so muddy and thick that it was terrible, Martin said.

It was a sad experience, seeing young people going there in all kinds of places. I've never really talked about it with anyone.

Martin was a machine gunner in private first class, serving in the 1st Infantry Division in England. "We were assigned to Patton's 1st Army. He told us at that time we would be part of the invasion," Martin recalled.

The first week in Europe, the soldiers were told to waterproof their equipment. But when it was announced that the invasion would begin, Martin and his division were in England.

"We were looking forward to going overseas," Martin recalled.

Then at 4 a.m. on June 6, the soldiers came to move out. The soldiers were ordered to Plymouth. They were loaded onto landing craft.

Through it all, Martin said, he was from Plymouth, Michigan, and he was leaving from Plymouth, England, to his probable death.

# Developer pushes for senior housing

Mr. Lindquist, who in 1987 signed a purchase agreement with the church to develop a senior housing center at the site, said he still has no idea what is happening.

He still feels he has a binding agreement, said H. Rollin, a Plymouth attorney representing Lindquist.

But Ned McGrath, director of communications for the Archdiocese of Detroit, said the final discussion of Lindquist's proposal has come and gone.

McGrath said that since the family life youth center plan was announced on St. Patrick's Day, "There has been great interest and great excitement among people in parishes that work with youth; it's a very exciting and well-received plan."

Since the plan was announced, church architects and staff have been out there several times, McGrath said, and construction should be started.

The church in November reached a purchase agreement with Lindquist and his firm St. Anthony Interests Inc., saying the developer failed to provide information about project financing by a specified deadline.

Lindquist responded that this was a misunderstanding and that financing was in place.

everything that's needed to put a project of this magnitude together.

Lindquist suggested that the family life center and his retirement community could exist on the same site.

McGrath responded, "It would be a shame for people because their idea didn't work out, to stand in the way. A lot of people are making plans to use this facility, then, so our family is needed."

The seminary, closed in 1988, is on a 170-acre site at the southeast corner of Sheldon and Five Mile roads.

Should Lindquist choose to file suit, he would be the second developer to sign an agreement to develop a senior housing center at the seminary, only to have the archdiocese scrap the plan, and to end up in court.

A Maryland firm took the archdiocese to court over a similar voiding of a signed purchase agreement, but the archdiocese prevailed in 1990.

# Rouge Rescue

## Volunteers flock to river for cleanup

Redford Township resident Joyce Caudill has a compulsion to thrash around in the Rouge River this time of year, battling the tree limbs, bicycles, batteries, and floating balls for primacy of the waterway.

"She's always in the river," said Caudill's sister, Karen Hicks. "Every year she gets in the river, pulling stuff out."

Caudill has exhibited this behavior annually since 1989, when she and Hicks got involved with the Rouge Rescue cleanup. "I started out being good this year and said, 'I'm not going to get grubby,'" she said, "but I have to. I've gone under a few times, but not by choice."

Caudill, Hicks and a crew of 200 or so labored at three sites in Redford Township Saturday, pulling debris from the Rouge. "We got a lot more volunteers here than I thought we were going to have," said Hicks, the Redford site coordinator for the past six years.

At the Farmington site near Middlebelt and Eight Mile, city officials, city employees and more than 100 volunteers broke up a tremendous logjam. "This is a perfect example of how a community pulls together for the common good," said Farmington Hills resident Aldo Vagnozzi, who has attended eight of the nine Rouge Rescues and has the T-shirts to prove it. "It's just a very respon-

sive community. I hope we're making a dent."

Vagnozzi reports that a bowling ball was found, but alas, "It wasn't my size."

Farmington Hills resident Helen Hamecky attended her first Rouge Rescue Saturday. "We loaded the trucks," she said. "We saw them coming through the woods, so we walked over." When she says "we," Hamecky means herself and her dachshund Schnauzer, who doesn't like to be picked up.

In Westland, the volunteers roiled alongside and in the Tonquish Creek, a tributary of the Rouge, clearing three logjams, 30 tires, car parts and a barrel. Perhaps the most youthful of all Rouge Rescue crews, this group was primarily comprised of teenagers from Livonia's Churchill High School earning an extra 15 points toward their grades in science, sociology and physics.

These students included Tonya Martin. "I'm kind of excited. I want to be in the river," Scott O'Connor, Dave Quinn, Rob Lore and James Hakim, all of Livonia.

Hakim said extra credit in physics class is the carrot that drew him to the worthy effort. "It's a little early on Saturday morning if I'm not getting something else for it," he said.

## CEO says Kmart fine despite losses

A controversial plan to raise capital and a poor 1993 financial performance brought criticism from several shareholders upon Joseph E. Antonini, Kmart chairman and chief executive officer during the retail giant's annual meeting Friday in Troy.

compliments last year and 1994 customer compliments to date this year.  
"Is that outstanding? Yes. Is it surprising? No. But when you have 5,000 stores and a couple million customers, you're not going to please everyone all the time," said Antonini, a Bloomfield Hills resident.  
"And of the shareholders or corporate owners?"  
"It's like being the coach of a basketball team. When you have a good year, they cheer you, a bad year, they're down on you," he said.  
Antonini's comments came during the meeting and a press conference at corporate headquarters.  
An unscientific survey of cus-

tomers outside of a Kmart store in Plymouth the day before the annual meeting would seem to reflect some of those observations.  
"It's my primary place I shop," said Ron Bowling of Plymouth. "They're clean neat. They finally did make them big enough but not oversized like some of their competitors."  
Bowling, however, offered a piece of advice. "Put more brand names in. Give people more choice."  
Jean Varian of Dearborn Heights said she often shops at Kmart.  
"It's clean, kept up. I'm impressed with cleanliness. Quality is fine," she said.  
"It's good to me, the only store I come to," said Dennis Simonds

of Plymouth. "It has everything I need. I get good service every time. If something doesn't work I bring it back and there's no hassle."  
"It's generally well stocked unlike some hardware stores I can think of," said Ewalt Schultz of New Hudson. "As long as a store provides good service, is clean in appearance and prices have adequate value, people will go."  
Schultz's only complaint, and he admitted it's minuscule, "interior lighting is too harsh."  
Billy Seiber of Belleville said he sometimes has problems getting in and out of Kmart in a timely manner.



"They're slow," he said. "I like the prices. I try to come here on my lunch hour. I can get my shopping done faster than I can go through the line. I like the prices. My advice is hire faster people."

Two employees, who both requested anonymity, said there's plenty of room for improvement.

An employee at Sports Authority, a Kmart subsidiary, said she believes the service is better there and at other umbrella operations, Borders/Waldenbooks, Builders Square and OfficeMax, than in Kmart stores.

"If I rated (the company) on a scale of one to 10, it probably would be somewhere in the middle," she said. "They have a lot to work on. Customer service, for one. Employee morale is very

low. The other employee, a Kmart worker, said competition seems to have paralyzed management.

"Now they don't know what to do. They're stymied. I feel sorry for the guy (Antonini)," she said.

The first Kmart opened March 1, 1962, in Garden City. That store is still operating. Other local Kmart stores are in Livonia, Canton, Westland, Farmington and Farmington Hills.

Antonini outlined a four-point plan to shareholders during the annual meeting to turn things around.

"Number one is restore our earnings power by boosting sales in the core U.S. Kmart store divisions," Antonini said.

Specific steps include new

stocking methods so sales people can concentrate on customer service, quicker distribution of merchandise, more control for managers at the store level and consolidations at headquarters.

"Number two is complete the modernization of our Kmart store base," he said. "Third, we strengthen our commitment to give customers the merchandise they want at the right time and right price. Fourth, is to build a culture within Kmart that fosters and thrives on positive change."

"We are not just completing a project," Antonini said. "At

Kmart, we are building a whole new way of doing business."

Fifteen people spoke during the shareholder question portion of the agenda.

Their comments included criticism of the stock spinoff capitalization plan involving the subsidiaries and criticism of management and directors' salaries and bonuses.

Kmart drew compliments for looking into its firearms sale policy and charitable work.

An employee also urged more training for store staff.







## Budget picture

### School district has \$6.5 million to spend



The Plymouth-Canton schools have \$6.5 million more to spend this coming school year than last year. Two new schools mothballed will be open, but other cuts will be made.

Plymouth-Canton Community Schools' 1994-95 revenue picture is cloudy but brightening.

School officials expect to know more about state funding by June 27, when the Board of Education holds a public hearing on the budget. But the latest figures show an 8.2 percent increase in revenues.

Overall revenues of \$85.8 million represent a \$6.5 million increase over the current year, said Ray Hoedel, associate superintendent for business. Federal project revenues are up. Ameritech has made a grant to the district of \$5.25 million, he added.

Also projected is an extra \$400,000 in the school's rainy day fund, up from \$1 million to \$1.4 million. This is due to the district's latest state and status report of May 29, which showed our recapture amount going down, almost \$200,000, said Hoedel. "Also, just received on May 19 was the latest billing from Blue Cross, which is also down, and we are projecting additional savings of \$100,000."

The district will open the two new elementary schools, boarded up after shortly they were built and the millage tabled last year.

The per-student state foundation grant is about \$21 more than we expected, said Hoedel. "The initial state foundation grant is \$5,597 per student and the district's estimate is \$5,486. We believe they are a little better than."

"We are using enrollment of 14,850 for next year. The state is using 14,888. We are perhaps a little bit conservative. We have a great

deal of tax refunds not reflected in their figures," Hoedel said. State equalized valuation rates are still uncertain, he added. "All districts can expect adjustments to funding as they get more precise data," Hoedel said.

It's likely students will see a decrease to between \$50 and \$100 in pay to play, co-curricular fees. Board members discussed charging a one-time annual fee, regardless of how many activities students participate in. A decision is expected June 27.

Board members also discussed added spending to reduce class size, assess early elementary students, accommodate an added number of gifted students, institute a reading intervention program for first-graders, and hire a development grant writer.

"The idea would be to have someone who would do nothing but write grants. That position could more than pay for itself," said Dick Egl, community relations director.

If the district spent money to reduce class size, it likely would be done in early elementary. "It's pre-

dicted that if you don't have the money for reducing class size across board, your first shot is best shot, so you go with the early grades," said Egl.

Expenditures are pegged at \$85.3 million. "This represents an \$8 million increase, of which \$4.4 million is new state retirement match expenses over the 1993-94 budget, or a 10.3 percent increase," said Hoedel. "Included in our expenditure are budget reductions of \$386,000."

The following are some of the cost-cutting moves planned: moving the Talented and Gifted Program from Allen to Miller Elementary to save \$10,900 in transportation costs, improving bus route efficiency, \$16,000, opening Tonda and Bentley elementaries, and saving \$42,000 in transportation costs, custodial maintenance cuts, \$45,000, special education adjustments, \$26,000, not replacing a retiring employee, \$50,000, cutting the capital outlay budget, \$56,000, cutting the Hepatitis B budget, \$70,000, and cutting summer tax collection fees, \$70,000.

## House bill focuses on racetrack revenues

Northville could receive up to \$900,000 in racetrack revenue under House Bill 5495, approved by the House last week, according to State Rep. Jerry Vorya, co-sponsor of the measure.

Vorya said local governments are being paid about half the amount required by law. Michigan law allows cities and townships to collect 27.5 percent of wagering revenue from racetracks within their boundaries to offset pressure on public services, including fire and police.



# Cub Scouts participate in Pinewood Derby race

St. Robert Bellarmine School in Redford was the scene in May of the 17th annual Gemini District Pinewood Derby race for 142 Cub Scouts representing 46 packs from seven communities.

The boys were winners from their local packs. Pinewood Derby races and had qualified to compete in one of the three age classes (Wolf, Bear, Webelo) for the top honors in the districtwide competition.

A total of 19 awards were presented to the top six finishers and runner-up in each class.

winner represented 15 packs and earned a total of 19 trophies. Each winner was rewarded with a plaque with a photograph of themselves with a new Dodge Viper sports car.

The awards went to seven boys from Livonia, seven from Redford and three from Canton, and three from Plymouth.

Brandon Lambert, Pack 781 of Plymouth, kept his string of wins alive by repeating as the fastest Webelo car. He previously won in the Wolf, Bear and Webelo categories in 1991, 1992 and 1993.

Elect Feiten, Kilijanczyk, Horvath

Voters in the Plymouth-Canton School District on Monday go to the polls to cast their ballots for school board members in what is one of the most important elections in recent years.

The new school board composed of two or three new members will face the challenges of putting a new school superintendent in place, new educational mandates, and a new financing system.

Voting is complicated. There are three races. Two candidates are vying for election to a one-year term; six are seeking two four-year terms in the June 13 election.

In the race for the one-year term we recommend Susan Feiten of Plymouth Township. In

the race for the two four-year terms, Steve Kilijanczyk of Canton Township and Mark Horvath of Canton Township are solid choices.

Feiten was appointed to the school board and has gone on to be a solid performer with the ability to balance cost with quality.

Kilijanczyk is a bit strident when it comes to school finances, but such a voice is needed to restore the board's role as a watchdog of public finances. Horvath is an engineer with the Ford Motor Co. and has a good grasp of what knowledge and skills students will need to become part of the work force.

But whatever the choice on Monday, don't forget to vote. It's the only way residents can have an impact on local government.

Tough justice works for kids

Tough action, but with alternatives, is our communities' best strategy in dealing with youth gangs and youth violence.

We must mete out punishment and discipline offenders. But we must also do what we can to make young people welcome in our communities.

The issue isn't one community leaders like to talk about.

Schools are especially closed-mouthed and defensive when the subject of youth violence is broached, but school officials aren't alone.

Local police have also been slow to acknowledge the problem.

But the problem exists, even in the safest suburbs.

From a crime-related drive-by shooting in Wayne County from Southfield and Farmington Hills to a tragic fight at West Bloomfield High School, to a shooting death at a Rochester Hills convenience store, youth violence has recently been front-page news in many local communities.

When it's time to be tough, punishment must be the way, but it must be meted out.

Saturday night in the schools, for instance, are rarely a peaceful three middle school students to the rest of the school year for playing an exploding device in a school restroom.

Learning to live according to the 10th of the commandments is not the best preparation for the real world.

The kind of real world we're talking about is not the kind of real world that is more as destructive as the actual violence. But unless responses indicated that folks applauded the local school for taking such action and making kids responsible for their actions.

It wasn't a scientific poll, but we believe responses wouldn't have varied much in any of our other communities.

Government is responding.

Oakland County's still-new boot camp for young offenders is perhaps the best local example of a get-tough approach to youth crime and violence.

There youngsters are taught discipline in military style, and it's hoped strongly persuaded against committing another crime.

But if we are to mete out discipline and punishment, we must also offer alternatives.

How many of our local communities feature teen centers, financed by either public or private sources?

How many offer comprehensive sports and social programs for area youngsters?

How many local communities and businesses offer summer and after-school job programs?

Now contrast that to the programming local communities provide for seniors.

The point here isn't to pit one generation against another, merely to underscore that our young people are a special constituency with special needs.


Opening youth centers, adding youth programs, and providing youth jobs, alone won't prevent youth violence and youth gangs.

But solutions such as turning over a Troy city park to young people on summer Friday nights will lead them to believe they are welcome, even wanted, members of their communities.

And people welcomed by their society are rarely the ones who commit violent acts.

Put another way, youth violence is a form of rebellion. But how can you be a rebel when there's nothing to rebel against?

# Proposal A plus triplets spells out a good year

When we have something to announce, Tim, you'll be the first to know," Gov. John Engler told me a couple of years ago.

I didn't expect he would keep the promise, and he didn't. Mark Hornbeck of The Detroit News was first to stumble across the rumor last week that Michelle was pregnant with triplets.

My conversation with Engler occurred during an interview in which we concentrated mainly on school finance, the biggest single news topic in our circulation area.

I recalled that Engler announced his engagement to Michelle only after the 1990 election and that some of my brothers and sisters in the media were miffed because they didn't even know Engler had a steady girlfriend. "You

never asked me," Engler told the news conference.

That's when Engler promised I would be the first to know.

I asked the governor once a year after that but gave up, out of consideration for his feelings. I figured that if I

missed the big story — tough.

Well, Hornbeck got a tip last week and called Agnes Engler, the governor's mother, who blurted out enough to verify the tip. Engler reportedly was upset with Hornbeck. Michelle had miscarried a couple of times, so the governor

was touchy, and I could see why.

But Hornbeck had been forthright and fair, identifying himself and his paper to Grandma Engler. Hornbeck's conscience should be clear.

The point today, however, is not who got the big, big, big news first but what are we going to name the offspring?

Getting Proposal A passed and begetting triplets are two of the biggest things any Michigan governor has done in 157 years. Moreover, John Engler did both in the same year. Moreover yet, they both occurred about the same time, March 15.

My humble suggestion is that all three Englerites be given names with the initial A — as in Proposal A.

Suppose they're girls. The Englers are big on family names, so they might want to name one after his mother,

though Agnes isn't a popular name anymore. There could be Alice, Amy, Abigail (for the outspoken wife of President John Adams), Ann, Annette, Angeline or Amelia. Don't forget the Sleeping Beauty — Aurore. And so on.

For boys there is a glut of Celtic names beginning with A — There's the fisherman saint, Andrew. And dozens more.

Bearing triplets would be tough for any healthy woman, and Michelle Engler is going on 37. At this point, I will drop the intrusion and offer her a non-partisan, non-denominational, heavy-duty prayer.

# MEA must replace scare tactics with solutions

You don't have to be a rocket scientist to figure out that Michigan's system of public education is facing a crisis.

Most parents, teachers, employers, administrators — even the kids in school! — share a strong desire to have world-class schools able to prepare all students to compete successfully in a global economy. And most also agree that our schools, by most measures, are failing to reach this standard.

This contradiction between hope and reality has opened the door to a wholesale assault on our public schools at just the time when public education needs all the help it can get.

Item: Most of the heat in the debate over Proposal A was generated by a bitter conflict between Gov. John Engler and the Michigan Education Association, the teachers union. The governor in effect accused the union of causing the deterioration of our schools, while the MEA charged Engler with scapegoating, not to mention being anti-union. The conflict is now the main driving force in Michigan politics.

Item: At the heart of this animosity is a law passed last December authorizing new charter schools outside the regular public school system and without MEA represented teachers. Financed by the same per pupil support provided to other schools, charter schools are supposed to allow experimentation free of the clumsy rules and ossified bureaucracies of the public school system. The MEA calls charter schools union-busting, plain and simple.

Item: Organizers of the Noah Webster Academy — a charter school — propose to link home schools across the state to a core of supporting teachers in Ionia County. Supported by \$5,500 per-pupil state funding, the academy will offer back-to-basics lessons stressing traditional values. "This is a school that will be using public tax dollars to sanction a certain type of morality," says Kim Brennan Root of the MEA.

Item: The Pinckney school board is virtually certain to turn over management of its schools to Education Alternatives Inc., a for-profit firm that asserts privatized schools can improve educational performance at reduced per-pupil cost. A lot of people are pretty skeptical of EAI's track record, but even more are so frustrated that they're willing to take a chance on privatization.

To top it off, last week saw release of an as-

tonishing letter from David Sabedra, MEA regional director, to Eric Gilbertson, president of Saginaw Valley State University, which:

- Threatened to refuse student teachers from SVSU if the university authorizes charter schools that don't meet MEA standards
- Urged local school superintendents and boards of education to end their involvement with Saginaw Valley programs
- Suggested MEA members who are Saginaw Valley graduates quit donating money to the university.

Now I know and admire a lot of teachers who are MEA members, including those who teach my son, now in sixth grade in the public schools. And I know and admire a lot of leadership people in the MEA.

But the stonewall tactics the union is now using expose it to the terrible risk of being considered largely irrelevant in resolving the overall public policy issue of what happens to K-12 education in this state.

There's an old slogan that goes: "If you're not part of the solution, you're part of the problem."

It's axiomatic that teachers in this state — the majority of whom are currently MEA members — must become part of any solution to the problem of how our kids can learn at a world-class level. For that to happen, the MEA needs to do more thinking about educational solutions and less writing of inflammatory and threatening letters.

The Y will also sponsor a two-hour sport skills camp to cover soccer, street hockey, basketball,


fitness and volleyball. Youngsters will learn a sport's basic skills, teamwork and conclude the program with one hour of swimming at the Y's indoor pool.





State's best



State meet a struggle for Chiefs



The surprise surrounding the performance of Plymouth Canton's girls track team at the Class A state meet Saturday was how high expectations were, not the final results.

After having recorded impressive victories in the Western Lakes Activities Association league meet and the Class A regional, a lot was expected from Plymouth Canton's girls track team at Saturday's state finals at Midland HS.

Except from coach George Przygodski. The Chiefs scored in just one event: the 800-meter run, in which Tracey Cavin finished seventh in 2:19.9.

The question: What happened to distance standout Lana Boroditsch,

would have been in four), the high jump, in which she didn't score. "You have to have the big horses when you get into a meet like that," said Przygodski. "We rode them all year." Indeed, the Canton coach refused to acknowledge any disappointment regarding his team's performance this season. "We probably ran our best meet of the year at the regional," he said, quickly adding, "Not that we fell off at all, we just did not perform at that level."

# Paluk packs up after signing with Dodgers

Jeff Paluk made a quick decision after his graduation from Saginaw Valley State University. He had just finished a course in geography for his first job out of school.

Paluk, a 1990 Plymouth State graduate, was drafted in the 20th round of last week's Major League Baseball draft by the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Paluk signed a contract and left Wednesday for the Dodgers' spring training complex in Vero Beach, Fla. His final destination next week is either Yakima, Wash., or Great Falls, Mont., where he'll play rookie ball.

"I don't think I've ever been further west than Chicago," said Paluk, who is a year shy of a college degree. "It's a new experience. I'm just anxious to see what the weather will be like. I don't know what to pack."

Paluk originally a walk-on at SVSU. Finished his college career on the top 30 list for career wins. He was 4-1 this season but most

Director Nancy Brassert has wonderfully coordinated the cast and crew of this large undertaking. Assisting her are musical director Marlene Loucks, choreographer Dee Dee Johns Charleton and assistant director Paul Gillin.

Richards is perfect as Stine, whether struggling to keep his frustrations in check or venting his sardonic humor, and vocally he's magnificent, belting out his solos and duets.

Likewise, Andres is marvelous as Stone, giving a wonderfully droll delivery to absurdly corny lines and adding strong vocal ability. The Stine-Stone duet "You're Nothing Without Me" is a real tour de force.

Kappy Pennington is convincing as the movie's seductive Alaura Kingsley and looks stunning in all white as she vamps around Stone's office. Kendall White is well cast as Mallory Kingsley, the sexpot starlet off-screen.

Janie Castagna so thoroughly individualizes her roles as Gabby, Stine's long suffering wife, and Bobbi, the lost love of Stone's life, that is hard to remember whether they are played by the same actress. Vocally she shines in her sexy torchsong "With Every Breath I Take," and the duet "What You Don't Know About Women."

Ed Guest is very believable as Buddy Fidler, the unscrupulous real-life

womanizing producer-director, and Irwin S. Irving, his exact movie counterpart.

Amy Lynn Smith is excellent as Dolie, Stone's wise-cracking, long-suffering secretary, and as Gabby, Buddy's real-life secretary. She belts out a rousing "You Can Always Count On Me," first as Dolie, then as Gabby, with a split-second change of set and costume.

As Munoz, the Latino cop with a giant chip on his shoulder who hounds Stone with a vengeance, John Marshall is so terrific it is hard to remember that his accent is assumed. His song-and-dance routine with three other cops is hilarious.

Playing pop singing star Jimmy Powers, Andrew McMechan croons beautifully, backed up by the "Angel City 4" of Krystyn Loucks, Linda Fisher, Laurie Jerrell and Kim Brown.

In smaller roles, Mark Nathanson and Ara Basherian are delightfully silly as mobsters, as are David Rau as guru Dr. Mandril and Roz Basherian as a flamboyant masseuse.

Set designer Michael Gordon and art director Ann DeMan accomplish wonders given the limitations of the



Cop faces greatest challenge on runaway bus in 'Speed'



Jack Traven (Keanu Reeves), a Los Angeles Police Department cop on SWAT detail, has a fearless nature and a keen understanding of the criminal mind. That and some luck have kept him alive.

But Jack's luck is being put to the ultimate test. He's trapped on a runaway city bus that's set to explode if it falls under 50 mph.

Get ready for rush hour. "Speed" also starring Jeff Daniels, Dennis Hopper, Sandra Bullock and Joe Morton opens Friday at metro Detroit movie theaters. The Twentieth Century Fox release marks the directorial debut of Jan De Bont. The screenplay is by Graham Yost.

The moment producer Mark Gordon finished reading Yost's screenplay he knew that "Speed" would be his first action project. "The story feels real," said De Bont. "Most action films are so elaborate with so much fantasy, you can't go along with them. 'Speed' is about these normal everyday people on their regular bus ride downtown who are suddenly faced with their worst nightmare."

The bomb-laden city bus was actually 10 identical vehicles each outfitted with different driving, camera and lighting rigs. For in-

stance, one bus, affectionately known as the "Pope-mobile," contained an enclosed Plexiglas platform fitted on its front which held three cameras, operators and sound equipment.

For the elaborate action set pieces Gordon turned to stunt coordinator Gary Hymes, a noted race-car driver and veteran of several Steven Spielberg films.

The other vital element to the success of "Speed" was the cast, particularly Keanu Reeves and Sandra Bullock who plays Annie,

a passenger who unwittingly becomes the driver of the runaway bus.

De Bont was meticulous about his casting choices, selecting actors who would bring just the right tone to the film.

"Keanu and Sandra bring a contemporary look and attitude," said De Bont. "Because Keanu wanted to do most of his own driving and stunt work, it made his performance all the more compelling."

Bullock brings an edge of much-needed humor to the tense film. "The audience needs to laugh within the context of this story," said Gordon. "And Sandy provided that. Her performances is incredibly honest and funny."

What is a heroic film without a great villain?

"Action films live and die by their villains," said Gordon. "And we have a terrific one in Dennis Hopper."

Hopper, as the sociopathic Howard Payne brings the same air of menace and touches of evil to his performance that characterize his chilling work in "Blue Velvet" and "True Romance."

In battling Payne, Reeves is assisted by two noted stage and screen actors, Obie Award win-

ning Jeff Daniels as Harry Temple, his partner, and Emmy Award nominated Joe Morton, as Captain McMahon.

Daniels first came to the attention of film audiences in the Oscar winning "Terms of Endearment." Since then he has starred in a wide variety of roles, most

memorably "Gettysburg," "Ragtime," and Woody Allen's "The Purple Rose of Cairo" and "Radio Days." He is currently filming the comedy "Dumb and Dumber" with co-star Jim Carrey.

'Midnight Cowboy' rides again at select theaters

In honor of the 25th Anniversary of the original release of "Midnight Cowboy," MGM Pictures will be presenting this film June 10 to 14 at the Michigan Theatre in Ann Arbor and July 15 to 21 at the Main Art Theatre in Royal Oak.

Originally released May 25, 1969 at the Coronet Theatre in New York City, "Midnight Cowboy," stars Joe Buck, (Jon Voight) a good-looking, uneducated Texas youth, who is convinced that he is the answer to the prayers of many lonely, love-

starved New York women.

Joe quits his dish-washing job, outfits himself in synthetic cowboy regalia and heads East. In New York, he meets Ratso (Dustin Hoffman), a sickly, undersized Bronx-born con man, who first victimizes then teams up with him.

This unlikely pair of loners join forces to bilk a hostile world which rebuffs them at every turn.

In the movie history books, the Jerome Hellman/John Schlesinger production of "Midnight Cowboy" rates landmark status not

only as a multi-Oscar winner, but the first major studio production to be branded with an X by the MPAA's then brand new Code and Rating Administration in 1969. In 1971, the rating was commuted to an R, according to "Variety," "In light of evolving rating

standards and the film's acclaim."

When the rating was changed to an R, rumors persisted — and still do — that the film had been edited, but, in fact, the movie has never been cut from the time of its original release.

## Survivors revisit 'nightmare'



**Bernard Offen has spent a lifetime trying to deal with the nightmare that has contorted his life. This spring he returned to its origin in a documentary that records the atrocities of the Nazi death camps for the Holocaust Memorial Center.**

Spring came early to Auschwitz this year.

By the first week of March, faint blades of grass started to show themselves across the vast barbed-wire Birkenau complex near the Auschwitz camp headquarters in southwest Poland.

"There was no grass here then, even in summer," said Bernard Offen, staring at the wet ground. "Nothing green, just sand. Anything green was eaten."

Offen was brought to Birkenau as a 15-year-old prisoner in 1944. He is one of the few inmates to survive the Nazi murder machine that claimed the lives of 5.9 million.

Now a 64-year-old retiree, Offen has spent a lifetime trying to deal with the nightmare that contorted his life. He went back to the scene of his agony and loss as part of a Detroit-based documentary, commissioned by the Holocaust Memorial Center of West Bloomfield.

September Moon Production Network of Southfield is producing a video, "When Restraints Are Removed," a historical and moral examination of the Jewish persecution in Nazi Germany, scheduled for showing this fall.

HMC director Rabbi Charles Rosenzweig of Oak Park and September Moon president and executive producer Rosalind Lulloye Cooperman of Farmington Hills headed an 8-person crew that included cameraman Kevin Hewitt of

Livonia and lighting director Ron Jaszczak of Detroit.

Cooperman, producer Will Lawson Sr. of Royal Oak and Rosenzweig have accompanied Holocaust survivors back to the ghettos of Warsaw and Krakow and the desolation of such places as Treblinka, Plaszow, Majdanek and Auschwitz-Birkenau.

**Provides a lesson**

They have conducted extensive oral history interviews with the survivors, four of whom live or have lived in the Detroit area, and have videotaped international witnesses.

The documentary will ask viewers: "What would you have done?" The film is intended, said Rosenzweig, "to provide a lesson to individuals to ensure that all societies will be protected from the evils and hatred that are unleashed when moral restraints are removed."

At Birkenau, known as Auschwitz II, the major killing field of all the death camps with possibly a million fatalities, the video crew set up its equipment by the fearsome arch, or "Death's Gate," through which trains passed into Birkenau. Offen, a former Ferndale resident, slowly shuffles along the rails, his head down. He walks along a rail line that abruptly stops about a half-mile ahead.

This short track, literally the end of the line, completed a network of tens of thousands of miles of railroads that spanned Eurasia and the Mediterranean, ultimately

connecting them to an earthly hell. It stretched from Norway in the north to Athens in the south, Caen in the west to the ravaged villages of the Soviet front.

These are the same rails that brought Offen and his 50-year-old father in a cattle car awash in human waste and jammed with other terrified Jewish "prisoners" in August 1944. Indeed, their nightmare 3-day journey in that suffocatingly hot car was itself a death sentence for some.

Auschwitz-Birkenau spreads across some 430 acres of former Polish farmland. Its crude barracks once held more than 100,000 prisoners stacked, in its commandant's words, "in swarming ant-hills."

**Painful story**

Now, the quiet serves to mock the sounds of terror that had filled the air of Auschwitz-Birkenau 24 hours a day from March 1942 to November 1944. Today, Offen tells his simple and infinitely painful story.

Jacob Offen, a simple shoemaker, had lied about his son's age to pass him off as older, and more likely to be selected as a camp laborer. SS men quickly made a cursory decision about the new arrivals' physical capacity for back-breaking work. Those who qualified were pointed to the right and were doomed to crushing labor and eventual death. The old, the young, most women, the weak, were waved to the left and were doomed to immediate death by gas, then burning in crematoria or an outdoor pit.

Jacob Offen instructed his youngest son, "Get behind me, and stand on your toes." The SS man pointed past Jacob at Bernard and signaled "right" to join the laborers. Offen looked back to see his father motioned to the left to death. Their

eyes met in a last moment of desperation, love and goodbye, and it was over.

When Offen was having his identification number, B-7185, painfully tattooed on his forearm later that day, he asked of another inmate, "Do you know what happened to my father?" "He went up the chimney," was the man's reply.

At least, if it can be of any solace, Offen knows where and how his father died. His mother, sister, grandmother and grandfather were abducted by Nazi troopers in separate raids of the Krakow ghetto and never seen or heard from again.

Rosenzweig was a teenager in one of the many thriving Jewish communities of Poland when war struck in September 1939. He fled to Russia and escaped.

This trip is his fourth trip to the death camps. Poland was once the home of an estimated 3.3 million closely knit Jews; today the estimated is between 4,000 and 20,000. Nearly 90 percent of Polish Jews died in the Holocaust, and hundreds of their survivors were murdered in Poland when they returned to reclaim their property after the war.

**Very difficult**

As Offen told his story at Birkenau, the camera crew taped the gas chamber and crematorium at the main Auschwitz grounds. As the team stares in silent shock at the mountains of shoes, suitcases and Jewish prayer shawls accumulated at the prison camp called

Majdanek, the rabbi paces, his head down, in constant aimless motion. "It is very difficult," said Rosenzweig. "Very difficult."





able, even submissive, ever wishing to keep harmony and avoid being rebuffed.





Questions concerning the total number of those put to death and imprisoned, the work of both collaborators who helped Nazi persecution and the "righteous" in various countries who aided the hunted; the relative numbers of Poles, Russians, Germans and Gypsies who disappeared in the killing apparatus; the position of the Vatican regarding Jewish oppression; and allegations of inadequate response by the Allied powers to the emergency have served to make the Holocaust a highly sensitive subject.

That the Soviet Union liberated and subsequently controlled Poland and most of the key concentration camp sites, often juggling historical facts to fit political ends, aggravated the problem.

Then there was the revision and heartache the civilized world felt on viewing the gruesome images of the camps when they were liberated in 1944 and 1945. Winston Churchill said it was "probably the greatest and most horrible crime ever committed in the whole history of the world."

While the lessons of the Holocaust seem etched in the stone of Majdanek, where a granite memorial that covers a sea of ashes and human bone fragments intones, "Let Our Fate Be Your Warning," controversy continues about the actual numbers of the terrible toll.

The traditional number of estimated Jewish dead in what is called the "Shoah," or catastrophic destruction, has long been 6 million. More recent figures, based on delayed Soviet information, indicate the number could be closer to 5.2 million dead. However, some believe that a new counting process currently under way will reveal that up to 7 million Jews perished, out of an estimated 8.9 million who lived in Europe in the 1930s.

Rosenzweig, his historian colleagues and Holocaust survivors stress that in considering the enormity of those numbers, it is important not to ascribe the crime merely to Adolf Hitler or to a lunatic aberration of the human soul. The Holocaust existed as a public function of a sitting government, with tens of thousands of bureaucrats employed in the daily eradication of a race of people.

At Auschwitz, functionaries as diverse as doctors, train engineers, poison gas manufacturers and victim-tabulating accountants helped to make up the far-flung killing machine.

Other nationalities, particularly the Poles, suffered terribly under the Nazis. Patriots, the intelligentsia and priests were crushed in the conquered countries. But the Jews alone were targeted as a race.

## No exit

Many heard the official welcome offered to inmates of Auschwitz by SS commandant Karl Fritzsch: "You have just arrived not to a sanatorium, but to a German concentration camp, from which there is no exit but through the crematorium chimney. If there are among you Jews, they don't have the right to live longer than two weeks; if priests, not longer than four weeks; the rest — three months."

In the words of liberated prisoner Dr. Zalman Grinberg: "We unlearned to laugh. We cannot cry anymore. We do not understand our freedom yet, all this because we are still with our dead comrades. We are not alive. We are dead."

The eloquence of the survivors videotaped for the project is overwhelming. West Bloomfield resident George Vine recounted how his father kept assuring his son

that the real Germans, the good Germans, would soon come along to renounce the actions of the SS few. His father admired the Germans beyond any nationality in Europe. Only Vine survived of his family.

Eva Kor, who with her twin sister, was used for medical experiments by infamous SS doctor Josef Mengele, spoke to her late mother at the very site at Auschwitz where she last saw her alive.

Abe Bomba, who lost his family at Treblinka, said: "I was ashamed to tell that I was in a concentration camp. (People thought) you must have done something wrong. The German people were intelligent people, doctors, professors; they wouldn't do something like that."

"Very, very fine people perished here; people believing in God with all their hearts, and they come to a place like this, and they know that five minutes after they will all be dead, that is the thing that a man has in his mind and in his heart. You live with it, even if you go to a concert or a wedding."

Bomba, a survivor of Treblinka, was used as a barber by the Nazis. He was made to cut the hair of Jewish women about to enter the gas chamber. He knew what their fate was, but he could not let on. He could not save the wives, mothers and sisters of some of his closest friends, not even relatives. He had to hand over babies hidden by their mothers outside the chamber. They were immediately murdered.

He sadly surveyed the grounds of Treblinka and said, "I will never come back here again."

## Unthinkable scenes

Rosenzweig takes his own small solace from the horrors he has devoted a lifetime to chronicling. The Nazis, by their own testimony, humiliated their victims to dehumanize them. They stripped the Jews, whipped them, spat on them, tortured them, mocked them.

"The Nazis desperately tried to dehumanize the Jews," Rosenzweig said. "The amazing thing is that they never succeeded. And they couldn't understand it. In that sense, the Germans were defeated. Even after the war, many victims had the opportunity to kill their guards, but they couldn't do it. They remained human, which they (the Nazis) never were."

The day after his testimony, at the director's office of the Auschwitz main barracks, Offen found his name entered on the Nazi list of prisoners: Offen, B., student. Born 4-17-24. His actual birthday is April 17, 1929. The lie that saved his life was concocted by the next name on the list — Offen, J., shoe repairman.

Later that afternoon, Offen is asked to pose with a friend outside the gas chamber.

"Get in here," he said. "Have your picture taken with the one who got away."

## Do's and don'ts when growing an herb garden

Last February, I designed an herb garden for a semi-shady location and have had several questions about caring for the plants. Here are some tips about horticultural practices, culinary and crafts, for those specific herbs:

Herbs don't require much fertilization. If they are strong and healthy, they won't need the boost. But, if you want, it's time to fertilize the garden now with a 5-10-5 solution. Miracle-Gro in a hose-end sprayer works well. If the ground is dry, water it before fertilizing to prevent burning the roots.

Keep the garden weeded and the plants trimmed to avoid possible pests and diseases, although herbs generally aren't bothered too much. Crop rotation of some such as tarragon, thymes and sages benefit from this practice. Use a mulch to deter weeds. Clean the garden in the fall and work a layer of compost into the soil.

If you see white-fly, place a yellow board coated with oil to attract the flies. Slugs can be hand-picked or repelled with diatomaceous earth, stale beer or traps. An insecticidal soap or a cold water spray will keep spider bites at bay.

### Drying directions

When harvesting, remove only one-third of the plant so that it continues to grow. Use the fresh herbs, as soon as they look big enough, in culinary dishes. If they are clipped often, they will reward you with more growth. As the supply increases, they can be prepared for winter use.

Herbs can be dried by laying them on a screen or basket, or securing the ends with a rubber band and hanging them until dry in a dark area that has good circulation. A paper bag with holes punched in it over the herbs will keep the dust away.

Place the herbs on a paper towel and microwave them at 50-percent power. Always put a cup of water in the unit. An oven temperature at 180 degrees Fahrenheit works - if you smell them, it's too hot! A few can be placed in the refrigerator on a towel on a plate and left uncovered to dry. Before storing, be sure they're cornflake crisp.

One-half cup herb used singly or in combination in an eight-ounce tub of soft margarine with one-half teaspoon lemon juice can be frozen for use on veges or for French bread. Freeze a single layer and then bag. LABEL EVERYTHING!

Now for the specific herbs from the February design:

■ **Lavender** - Prune plants back as new growth is starting. This fall, don't prune the spikes off so they can protect the plants during winter. In mid-spring, trim off the old spikes and one to two inches of last year's growth. Lavender is pretty in floral arrangements and is used for moist and dry potpourris. Lavender cookies are unusual.

■ **Thymes** - Don't let them get woody. In spring, cut back dead growth. Cut the sprigs for drying, then run your hand backward up the stem to remove the leaves. Remove the leaves the same way when they are fresh. Thyme is good with green beans and a sprinkle of lemon juice.

■ **Sage** - Prune in mid-season so it doesn't sprawl. Hard pruning will result in a bushy plant with lots of bloom. Fresh sage is used in wreaths and cooking. After drying, rub it between your hands, then store - great for stuffing! Harvest any time. Lavender, thyme and sage can be propagated by layering.

## Livonia photographer captures Ireland

A touch of Ireland descends on Greenmead Historical Village Saturday-Sunday, June 11-12, as Livonian Cathy Hankey brings the landscape and architecture of the Emerald Isle to life in a series of color photographs exhibited at the 18th annual Livonia Arts and Crafts Festival.

The juried show, featuring more than 200 exhibitors, runs 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. both days. Greenmead is at Newburgh and Eight Mile in Livonia. Visitors can walk through the historical village during the show, but the buildings won't be open for tours due to a lack of volunteers.

A sneak preview of Hankey's work is on display through June 30 in the Livonia Arts Commission's circular showcases on the second floor of the Livonia Civic Center Library. The arts commission also sponsors the festival.

Hankey's images are primarily of Ireland, but she also captures the beauty and charm of Scotland, England and Wales on film. From a small lighthouse near Waterford to the sheep of Magillacuddy Reeks in County Kerry, Hankey spotlights these places and more, including Windsor Castle, home of

the royal family; Blarney Castle, and the magnificent stone structure that is Kylemore Abbey, which is on one of lakes of Connemara, County Galway.


"When you do scenic photography, you're out there where it's beautiful. You get to go to a lot of neat places," Hankey said.

"Kylemore Abbey is one of the prettiest castles in Ireland. It's now a girls' school."

Hankey took up photography 10 years ago as a way to relax after long, sometimes grueling days as an accountant for Montgomery Ward, a position she has held for the past 29 years.

She acquired the basics of photography, including how to develop black-and-white film and retouch photos, in adult education classes at Stevenson High School in Livonia.

"It helps me unwind, doing something different. In accounting, you always have to be right. You better balance, or you're in trouble," Hankey said.

For the last 10 years, Hankey has shared her love of landscape with art show visitors. She will display work in the Farmington/Farmington Hills Founders Festival as well as in a show at Frankentmouth this summer.

But what is it that draws her back to Ireland again and again?

"The people are unique. You can get pretty scenery anywhere. It's the people. They're very friendly. They won't infringe on you unless you want to talk, then they'll tell you anything and everything you care to know about their country."

Hankey's first husband died six years ago after 24 years of marriage. Photography kept her going during the grieving period after her husband's death. "It helped me through the down times."

A year ago, Hankey met Kenneth Gwanger of Shelby Township through a singles club and something clicked. Their love of photography (he collects antique cameras) created a bond between them.

The couple, who married May 21 in a small, quiet ceremony, make their home in Livonia. From this base, they plan to travel in search of the perfect photograph.

"We'll pick a new place every summer. For our honeymoon, we're going to Connecticut to photograph lighthouses," Hankey said. For next year, "We're thinking about going to Alaska."

Hankey uses three cameras but does most of her shooting with a trusty old manual Minolta. Gwanger recently gave her a 1950s manual Voigtlander, which she plans to use on the honeymoon.

■ **French tarragon** — Two or three harvests per year are possible. Cut when it's 18 inches tall. Use it fresh on fish dishes, or make a flavored vinegar.

■ **Basil** — Keep the flower stalks pinched off the plant for more foliage. When making vinegar, use white for the opal, regular cider for the green. Make a pesto base, then freeze for winter use.

■ **Parsley** — When harvesting, cut the foliage from the outside completely to ground level. It's full of vitamin C.

■ **Summer savory** — Harvest when it's about six inches tall. Frequent snipping will extend the harvest. When it insists on flowering, cut the whole plant down, dry it, strip the leaves and store.

■ **Coriander** — All parts are edible. Leaves are called cilantro, used in culinary dishes. Leaves, roots and seeds are used in marinades. One half teaspoon ground coriander seed added to the batter of a loaf of ginger, carrot or banana bread is a treat.

tion is again sponsoring the third annual Meadow Brook Landscape & Garden Show," said Larry Wright, CEO/president of the Metropolitan Detroit Landscape Association.

"Each year more members participate, as well as other organizations. This show is unique in that it's the only outdoor landscape and garden show. It's rewarding to see our attendance increase every year."

Ball, the garden expert on NBC-TV's "Today" program, will be available to meet and answer questions from visitors on all aspects of yard care during the show both Friday and Saturday. Look for him at the gazebo adjacent to Meadow Brook Hall.

Representatives of Allied Floral and the Michigan Arborist Associations, the Southeastern Oakland County Resource Recovery Authority and master gardeners will also be on hand to share information. They will be in the other ornate gazebos, provided by Gazebos Ltd. of Walled Lake.

### New gardens

In addition to the large display, set-ups for beginning garden railroaders will demonstrate that you can start small.

Three hundred fifty 5-foot evergreens will form a Circular Maze Garden that will challenge attendees through a network of paths and passages. Designed by Ron Krueger of Northwind Farms/Landscaping of Utica, it will be constructed by Alexander Nursery of Mount Clemens.


Knoll Cottage, the playhouse of

## Aim to make the ordinary different

### FOCUS ON PHOTOGRAPHY

Want some ideas for different kinds of photographs — pictures that will grab the viewer's attention and make him or her say, "What is this and how did you do it?"

All it takes is to make the ordinary different.

For example, everyone likes to photograph flowers, especially at this time of year. But let's make the ordinary different. A trip to your local glass shop is all it takes.

A piece of textured shower door glass placed between the flowers and your camera will produce stunning effects similar to an impressionistic painting. Textured glass is available in many styles (even colors) so the possibilities are endless. Use your imagination to shoot other subjects through textured glass.

Another way to make the ordinary different is to use a super wide angle lens 20mm or less. The distortion you'll get by moving in close to your subjects will amaze you. Move in close to a friend or to your family pet. Try sighting through a tree. The resulting distortion will produce dramatic and unusual results.

We're all so accustomed to photographing people so that we can see their faces. How about shooting them from their backs or doing a photo theme of hands or feet? This would certainly make the ordinary different.

While we're talking about people pictures, consider placing someone in an unlikely setting. For example, shoot an elegantly dressed model in a junkyard or a friend in a tuxedo on a farm. These photographs will definitely get attention.

Try taking a common prop such as a red rose and place it somewhere in the composition of a series of pictures. This "common denominator" will tie a set of photos together and will earn you accolades from family and friends.

I decided to make a photograph, shown here, of the recent eclipse of the sun differing from the ordinary. By stacking three neutral density filters on my 400mm lens and adding a "star" filter, I anticipated light scattering that produced the concentric rings of the sun's corona along with the large bands of light. This extraordinary photograph of a rare stellar event rewarded me with a truly unusual shot.





Lilley Pointe boasts amenities, value



A condominium community in Canton four years into construction still seems to be a good buy. The buildings look sharp, the grounds are well maintained and plenty of amenities are offered for the money.

A brand new two-bedroom, two-bath condominium in Canton with all major appliances included, plus air conditioning, balcony or patio and a carport - all for \$80,400 or less.

Where? Lilley Pointe, on Lilley between Ford and Cherry Hill.

Some 80 units remain to be constructed by Thomas Burdt on land developed by his father, Richard. Nearly 150 have been completed since the two started work at the 22-acre site four years ago.

"I think basically it's a good quality product built soundly for the money in a good area," Thomas said.

"Price is always the first draw for first-time buyers," Richard said. "Location is always the second factor."

"There's nothing in Canton that compares to this in price," said Virginia R. Walsh, a sales representative at Lilley Pointe.

"There's very little (distance) they have to drive for conveniences," said David Castelli, whose Century 21 firm is managing sales.

Lilley Pointe offers three basic models ranging from 970 square feet, the Ashley, to 1,050 square feet, Cloverdale and Bedford.

All models offer range, refrigerator, microwave, garbage disposal and washer and dryer as standard amenities. There are heat detec-

tors in every room and smoke detectors outside of each bedroom.

The rooms are fairly small but functional. The master bedroom in all three models is about 11-by-14 feet. The largest living room is 214 square feet.

But a balcony on second-floor units and a patio on ground floor units extend the living space. The two bedrooms are also at either end of each unit for more privacy. All upper-level models have cathedral ceilings and private entrances with an electric heater at the door to provide warmth on cold days.

The Cloverdale has more cabinets in the kitchen, but the Bedford more room there for a table and chairs. The Cloverdale has a walk-in closet in the master and a wall separating the dining area from the master.

Lilley Pointe is serviced by the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools. The property tax rate for municipal, school and county services is expected to approach \$31 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation.

Global challenge

Fortune 500 setting lures new campus chief

Theory and Practice. That's the approach Lawrence Technological University takes at its Southfield campus.

Some 5,000 students from virtually every corner of the metro area study there. About half are in the day program, half at night.

Charles M. Chambers, who was installed as LTU's fifth president last weekend, actually has been on the job for about a year.

"One of the major reasons I came here is within 10 miles of where we're sitting, 40 percent of the For-

Chambers: I envy young people today. The opportunities for creativity and exciting careers are out there in ways never seen before. It will be very challenging.





That means the owner of an \$80,000 condominium at Lilley Point would pay about \$1,240 annually in property taxes.

The association fee to maintain the common areas is \$72 per month.

"We're shooting for young people just getting out of college and we're shooting for retirees looking for a place with reasonable dues and a presentable place they can live summers," Richard Burdt said.

"We see a lot of blue-collar retirees who want to keep a place in the northern U.S. and go south for the winter," he added.

Prospects like the Canton area, the eating space in some of the kitchen models and the view from the upper level, Walsh said.

"You have a good atmosphere out here," Thomas Burdt said. "It's quiet, relaxing. People are always walking around with their kids."

The development has a gazebo and quite a bit of grass, but no pool or clubhouse.

"We did away with those amenities due to costs for upkeep," Richard said. "We wanted to keep it as reasonable as we can."

Other factors contributed to keeping the price down, Thomas said.

"Materials and labor have to be bought right. Something like this, volume helps. You can get a good price for the dollar for construction. We have it designed so it's not complicated."

Pam Haggerty, a nurse, moved into Lilley Point about seven months ago.

"It looked well kept," she said. "I knew it had been started three or four years ago. Everything was still well maintained. It looked like everyone cared about their home and would be good neighbors."

Haggerty purchased an Ashley model.

"It's very open," she said. "The living area is all one room —



kitchen, living room, dining room. When I have people over, I don't like being shut away in the kitchen."

Haggerty moved to a condo from a house.

"I noticed one down side is people aren't used to living in a community setting real close. You give up some quiet and privacy. It's not a real negative but an adjustment."

Glenn and Jeannie Fixler, retirees, plan to live at Lilley Pointe for part of the year and in Florida during the cold weather months. "We felt it was an answer to what we needed," Glenn said. "We wanted something a little smaller... and I didn't want work around the place."

The Fixlers, who liked all the models, settled on the Bedford for better access in and out of the kitchen. They added cabinets to the kitchen and utility room and upgraded the carpeting.

"It's close to shopping, very close to expressways, nice restaurants out there. The price was right, too," Glenn said.

The sales office at Lilley Pointe (981-6550) is open 1-5 p.m. daily and by appointment. It's closed Thursdays.

what he was doing when he started. Your parents may change careers two or three times. A young person today is going to be changing five to seven times in his lifetime.

The role of high school and college is not to crunch out carbon copy architects and engineers, but prepare them for lifelong learning — graduate degrees, short courses, seminars. We want young people comfortable with adapting to new things.

**What has caused the change?** Chambers: The basic reason is international competition. You have to be out front with what's happening now. You need more training, more education, more skill.

You hear business make a distinction between service and product. That's a false discussion in many ways. Manufacturing isn't a mechanical thing that sits in factories and hums along. It's a very agile enterprise.

To keep a competitive edge in manufacturing depends on a very careful extension of service. You need a feedback system of monitoring, controlling quality with people involved. That's service. There's a strong convergence. The best manufacturing system today builds on people skills.

**It seems that a lot of educated, experienced people have lost their jobs in recent years with corporate cutbacks. What's their future and shouldn't loyalty be a two-way street?**

Chambers: A company can support a workforce only to the extent it can be competitive in the marketplace. A company has to be able to be economically strong.

That's the only real security. We're going through a readjustment that's a real painful one. Highly trained people in my view aren't nearly in as bad a situation as faced their parents who were semi-skilled.

People can move into education, helping with young people. And entrepreneurship. Big companies don't want to be everything. They're willing to contract out.

**But what about the quality of life for displaced and unskilled workers?**

Chambers: I've been in India, the Middle East, all through the Orient. I can tell you the standard of living we have, even if it were to flatten out, is extraordinary.

Our children may not have the four bedroom home, three baths and a two-car garage, but when you see how life is in Europe, apartments with two bedrooms, shared baths... I think our standard of living is much superior.

I would like to compare more with quality of life, the idea that if you're not better than before or your parents, you're a failure. Our quality of life is unmatched.

They (untrained and unskilled) may have to share an apartment. They may not have a fancy car. But they will have recreation, health care, nutritious food, clothes, quality of life.

**What kind of training is needed for a technology or business career in the future?**

Chambers: Quite honestly, a four-year college program is still the basic entry level for professional work whether it's journalism, accounting or business.


