

# Public broadcaster envisions a bright future

Some Republicans in Congress want to end federal support of public TV and radio, but that won't mean the death of public broadcasting.

That's what WUOM-FM station manager Joel Seguine told nearly 100 Plymouth Rotarians on Friday. The station, on 91.7 FM, is owned by the University of Michigan and programs mainly classical music and news.

But if federal money is cut off rather than phased out, Seguine said, "Some of these rural and small stations could fail. There's not enough to draw from in their communities to make up the money."

While Seguine said more popular public radio programs should survive — such as news programs "Morning Edition" and "All Things Considered" — more-specialized public radio programs could die.

Each person in the United States contributes \$1.09 in federal taxes to support public radio and TV. Of that amount, 30

cents supports public radio stations, according to WUOM.

Some Rotarians, in a question-and-answer session after Seguine's comments, said they agreed with Republicans in Congress that taxes shouldn't support public TV and radio.

"I'm against my dollar going to public broadcasting," said Jerry Trumpka. "I see a lot of documentaries catering to a left agenda, especially a recent one on Johnson's Great Society. They need to do something to make it a little fairer."

Seguine said that National Public Radio's news programs are sensitive to being balanced. "Part of it is, we cover stories that other media don't cover," he said.

For example, he said, NPR re-

cently did a news feature on alternative rock coming out of the gay community. He said doing such a story shows NPR's desire to report on what's happening throughout society.

WUOM, Seguine said, has a staff of 25, an annual budget of \$1.5 million, and 120,000 regular listeners. He said radio listeners in this area are among the luckiest in the country, as the area is served by five public radio stations.

Of WUOM's budget, \$630,000 in fiscal year 1994 was raised from listener and corporate contributions, he said. The station gets \$220,000 annually from the federal government, and the rest comes from the University of Michigan.

Seguine said radio in general "has never been stronger."

"It will always be portable, it will always be immediate, it will always be local," he said.

"AM was dying; it's coming back because of Rush Limbaugh and his colleagues," Seguine said.

## Students explore geography

Students across the Plymouth-Canton school district have won the school-level competition of the National Geography Bee and a chance at a \$25,000 college scholarship.

The school-level bee, at which students answered several questions on geography, was the first round in the Seventh Annual National Geography Bee, which is sponsored by National Geographic World and Chrysler Corp.

The kickoff for this year's event was the week of Dec. 5, with thousands of schools across the U.S., the District of Columbia and five U.S. territories participating.

In Plymouth-Canton, three elementary schools and two middle schools participated in the Geography Bee. The top winner from each school was chosen to continue on with the competition. Those representing Plymouth-Canton Community Schools are: Andrew

(Spike) Wagner, Bird Elementary fifth-grader; Michelle Leach, Hoben Elementary fifth-grader; Ben Brockschmidt, Tonda Elementary fifth-grader; Adrienne Muney, East Middle School seventh-grader; and Jeremy Murray, Central Middle School eighth-grader.

The school winners will now take a written test; up to 100 of the top scorers in each state and territory will be eligible to compete in their state Bee on April 7.

The National Geographic Society, with 9.2 million members, has as its mission the "increase and diffusion of geographic knowledge." In addition to the National Geography Bee, the Society sponsors a number of geography education institutions for teachers, the National Geographic Society Education Foundation, and the Geographic Alliance Network, which is currently working in every state, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and Canada.

## Building owner claims he's been harassed by officials

State aeronautics officials don't want to buy the nearby blue-and-yellow buildings for the Canton-Plymouth Mettetal Airport.

But building owner Ed Tate says he believes he has been harassed by Canton Township with tough building and site renovation requirements and difficulties getting a building permit. Tate believes those difficulties were designed to allow the state to step in and snatch up the building for next to nothing.

"It's just continuous harassment," Tate told the airport advisory board Thursday. "They (state officials) don't want to buy it, they want to run us off it and steal it."

Board member Elaine Kirchgatter, Canton treasurer, asked Tate to explain himself. "The word harassment is a pretty strong word. As a township official, I would like that documented."

### State won't buy

John Wagner, state airport inspector, announced the state's decision Thursday not to buy Tate's buildings at 8508 and 8520 Lilley Road. "Based upon informal investigations of various pricings of this property, it is our conclusion that the asking price of the property is more than the informal pricing."

Randy Collier, state Bureau of Aeronautics licensing and enforcement manager, said the state would be obligated to pay the appraised value. An appraisal would cost \$15,000-\$18,000. Checking on prices of property in the area shows too big of a spread between those parcels and Tate's property, Wagner added.

Airport board member Tom Carmody, a local businessman, abstained from voting on the state's decision because he previously expressed an interest in Tate's buildings.

Tate bought the two buildings — one a smaller office-type building, the other a larger warehouse-style building — a year ago with the intent of opening an auto electric repair and service business.

### Improvements required

"They wouldn't give me a permit to do absolutely nothing," Tate said. In October 1994, he was given a list of improvements required to receive a certificate of occupancy to open his business.

Tate, who believes the township has been in cahoots with the state, said township staff and officials have been giving him the run-around.

"Their strategy is that they wear you down. All they are doing is giving me the fast shuffle. They know this building is on the master plan for the airport. They were denying us permits to use the building so we'll go broke so the state can take it."

But township officials and staff say that's not true.

"Not a chance," said Supervisor Tom Yack, about Tate's belief that the township is in league with the state. "When Mr. Tate bought that building his eyes should have been fully open as to what was required."

Tate has complained not only about having difficulty getting a building permit to complete improvements, but believes some of the improvements are absurd for the use he intends for the buildings.

Some of the things that bother him include a sidewalk and berm along the front of his property. Tate said it has cost him \$2,000 a day to stay closed, waiting for the paperwork, improvements to be done and eventually a certificate of occupancy.

"There has been one nitpicking thing after another. They wanted a berm and sidewalk. There's none anywhere else on the road," Tate added.

### Township requirements

Township staff say there was good reason why Tate's site plans were rejected. His site plans were later approved and he was issued a building permit Nov. 30, 1994. He completed a final improvement last week and is hoping to get a certificate of occupancy.

"When you get a new business in an existing building, we require that it is brought up to current standards," said Judy Bocklage, township associate planner.

Tate said the building was not vacant and therefore he should not be required to comply with newer standards. But Jeff Goulet, community planner, said that the previous business occupied the building illegally.

"Someone was in there, but illegally. They didn't have an occupancy permit. They were shut down," Goulet said.


That means Tate, the new owner, is required to comply with the new standards, including site work, such as a landscaping berm and paved parking lot. The building — not the use Tate plans — is considered non-conforming because of the site and required building setbacks.

"He wouldn't authorize his engineer to make the changes on the site plan," Goulet said.

### Tate questions

Tate questioned the airport board how Mettetal can be open for business when it clearly is in need of improvements, particularly in fire safety. Board member Mike Stankov joined in, questioning why code improvements are scheduled for Mettetal through 1999.

"I suspect by 1998 we'll get the code violations done," Collier responded, adding the major deficiencies may be fixed by summer's end.

## Last year a busy one in Canton

According to Canton Supervisor Tom Yack, 1994 was a very good year and 1995 promises to bring a variety of issues to the forefront.

"We want so much activity going on at the Summit (on the Park community center) and Pheasant Run (Golf Course) that no one will ask why we did this. They will ask why didn't we do it sooner," Yack told the Canton Chamber of Commerce and guests at the annual State of the Township address Feb. 1.

Yack reviewed the progress of 1994, a year that put Canton at the top of the list as the busiest new-housing market in Michigan. "We're a little nervous about that," he said, adding the workload has been tough on township staff.

But Yack reviewed how the township board came to put projects together and put township government on a different track.

"We shared a vision. But we didn't know we had the same vision until we came together," Yack said, referring to his elected colleagues.

In 1988, he said, the newly elected officials got together to share their ideas. Among the ideas were: diversity in housing, efforts to raise housing standards, cultural activities, parks and recreation improvements, intergovernmental cooperation, community identity, and responsive and innovative government that has spirit and pride.

"We really haven't departed from those values," Yack said.

In the past year, the Downtown Development Authority streetscape project began and is now close to completion; a volunteer coordinator was hired to

bring together volunteers and organizations in need of help; and the Pheasant Run Golf Course and Summit on the Park community center were under way in earnest.

In fact, Yack said, the Summit and Pheasant Run will be named as one of the top 10 developments by Detroit Monthly. "The idea of the Summit is on everyone's lips. With the advent of the Summit I think we will present an array of activities," he said.

In other 1994 news, the Planning Department and Planning Commission revised the master land-use plan and created the village shopping district. "Hopefully, over time we will blunt the negative impact of commercial development," he said, referring to the new commercial district.

Yack also credited the township staff, which has been faced with a myriad of projects. "Everyone put

in one heck of a year."

Another event in 1994 that moved Canton forward was completion of the Ford Road Task Force report, which offers suggestions and strategies for improving Canton's main street.

"The first impression of this community is gained by that main road," Yack said.

Also completed was a fire/emergency medical services report that shows the current system — which includes the fire department providing ambulance service — is the most cost-effective for the community. "The people of Canton Township want a high level of service," Yack said.

Canton officials also came to realize in 1994 that consolidating records, dispatch and lockup with other nearby police departments wasn't for the township. "It didn't make sense for Canton. We're already as efficient as you can get

when it comes to delivering police services. I think there was some feeling that the big guy on the block was going to gobble up the little guy," Yack said.

New projects are in store for 1995. Yack expects local officials in Wayne County to join forces on transportation issues and sewer and water issues with the city of Detroit and Wayne County. "We want to be a player in that. When we represent one million (population), we are not going to be left out in the cold," Yack said. "We are creating an alliance."

Other projects on tap include a quality of life study, as well as cooperation with the Plymouth-Canton School District, improved communications for the public safety department and a study of staffing in the fire department.

Also to be considered in 1995 is videotaped arraignments, which would eliminate the need for police officers to run back-and-forth to the court. "It could reduce overtime by \$30,000," Yack said.

The new year also will bring a public art program designed as a competition for new artists to create a work of art for the Summit outdoors. "We are going to focus on emerging artists," Yack said.

In 1990, "I decided to own my own business. I had some customers out here," Laginess said.

On changes in the insurance business, he said, "There seems to be a lot of competition, more than in past decades."

"There's a lot more open pricing. Fifteen years ago for worker's compensation, all companies charged the same price. Not now. You have to distinguish yourself with price and with service," he said.

A small agency can do that, Laginess said. "In a small operation like this you're dealing directly with the agent and the owner of the business, the person who's taking care of their account. That makes a big difference because no

one else will care more than the person whose livelihood depends on it."

The chamber board of directors elected Laginess to a one-year term for 1995.

# County officials try to avert suit over youth home

Trying to head off a federal law suit over conditions at the Wayne County Juvenile Detention Facility, county commissioners voted 10-5 Thursday to approve a blueprint for change.

Unless problems of the youth home are addressed satisfactorily by Feb. 9, the U.S. Department of Justice has threatened to sue the county and appoint a federal overseer to bring the facility into compliance.

A Department of Justice investigation of the youth home, located in Detroit, was conducted in

1994. Federal authorities released a report in December with accounts of physical abuse, overcrowding and food containing worms, roaches and rocks.

The youth home's 101,000-square-foot detention facility, built in 1960, currently houses about 220 boys and girls, age 12-17, in 200 bedrooms.

Commissioners voting against accepting the blueprint included Thaddeus McCotter, R-Livonia, who also represents Plymouth and Plymouth Township; Michelle Plawiecki, D-Dearborn Heights, who also represents Redford Township and Livonia east of Middlebelt; and Bruce Patter-

son, R-Canton Township.

McCotter, Plawiecki and Patterson said they voted no because part of the plan said the population of the youth home should be reduced by moving violent offenders "to another Wayne County facility."

Said McCotter: "They don't know where they're going to put those kids."

Wayne County deputy executive Michael Duggan said he hasn't seen the commission's blueprint, but he is "very confident" that enough changes have been made to satisfy federal officials by the deadline.

"Warren Evans (director of the youth home) has made tremendous progress in the last 90 days," Duggan said.

A request has been made to relieve overcrowding by releasing the least violent offenders, Duggan said.

County Executive Edward McNamara hopes to ultimately solve the problem by building a new youth home at or near the current site. A design contract will be sent to the commission later this month, Duggan said, and the design should be complete about 10 months after the contract is approved.

Duggan does not have an estimated cost of a new youth home yet.

The commission has estimated that one would cost about \$14 million.

The new youth home will be paid for, in part, with revenue from a 0.1-mill property tax approved by voters in 1988 to "build and operate a juvenile offender work/training institution," according to the ballot language.

Until now, much of that money has been earmarked for juvenile programs that emphasized keeping offenders in their homes. Commissioners and others have criticized McNamara for spending

on programs instead of a youth home, but Duggan points out that the commission approved McNamara's request to spend the 0.1-mill money that way.

The 0.1-mill tax raises about \$2.7 million a year.

Commission vice chair Kay Beard, D-Westland, who also represents Garden City, lamented the whole scenario at the Feb. 2 commission meeting.

"I have never been as frustrated in my public career as I have over this 0.1-mill issue," she said. "We had better get down to the business of what we were elected to do."

## Blood donors get pizza

One thousand individuals who attempt to donate blood to the Red Cross Wednesday, Feb. 8, and Thursday, Feb. 9, will receive a heart-shaped pizza from Papa Romano's.

Blood donors must be age 17 or older, weigh at least 110 pounds and be in general good health. Donors age 72 or older may need a note from their doctor.

To collect enough blood to meet the needs of patients at area hospitals, the Red Cross must collect 5,500 pints of blood a week.

The Red Cross provides blood to 55 hospitals throughout Wayne, Oakland, Macomb, St. Clair and Washtenaw counties.





# Commission rejects exec's nominees for waste board

The Wayne County Commission voted 14-1 Thursday to reject six reappointments and seven new appointments by Executive Edward McNamara for two-year terms on the Solid Waste Plan Implementation Committee.

But the commission also approved the appointment of commissioner Michelle Piatecki, D-Dearborn Heights, who also represents Redford Township, to the same committee.

The 14-member committee is responsible for overseeing the management of the county's solid-waste disposal program. Terms of all former committee members expired Dec. 31, 1993.

Commissioners said the blanket rejection of all but Piatecki was done because there wasn't enough time to think about the qualifications of the candidates.

"Until such time that we question these people we shouldn't be appointing them," said Commissioner Bruce Patterson, R-Canton Township.

Had the commission waited any longer, a 30-day requirement for confirmation of appointments would have expired and the appointments would have been automatic.

"It's not the people; it's the positions these people are allotted," said Commissioner Thaddeus McCotter, R-Livonia, who also represents Plymouth and Plymouth Township. McCotter objects to the appointment of assistant county executive Wilbourne Kelley to a "general public" slot on the commission.

"It's not representative of the general public," McCotter said. "I've got nothing against Kelley. I just don't think he should be representing the general public."

Commissioner Susan Hubbard, D-Dearborn, said, "No way is this rejection a reflection of those individuals who are on the list. Many of those who are on the list will remain so."



# Religious groups push for less secular schools

Business leaders will have to battle religious evangelicals if they want to hang onto school accreditation and the science curriculum in Michigan public schools.

Senate Republican leaders announced last week they "will" repeal the School Code, effective July 1, 1996. The Senate Education Committee, chaired by newcomer Leon Steil, R-Spring Lake, will hold hearings on what to put in its place.

"The real work lies ahead of us, collecting information from the schools," Steil said. "We'll start a series of hearings this spring and have the new code in place by July of '96." The schedule is yet to be announced.

Almost immediately, the Michigan Family Forum, which has fought most state curriculum laws, bore down on its favorite target: the science part of the core curriculum with its emphasis on evolution and genetics.

"A candidate's views on evolution or creationism will now become a legitimate concern for voters since one or the other may be mandated," wrote MFF's Dan Jarvis in a letter to lawmakers.

"Creationism," a view espoused

mainly by Protestant fundamentalists, holds to the literal accuracy of the Bible's account that the world was created by God in six days.

In contrast, business groups since the mid-1980s have called for state-endorsed high school diplomas, state core curriculum standards, state accreditation of schools, annual reports from schools and state testing.

Steil, 55, is newly-elected to the Senate after one term in the House and service on the Ferryburg City Council. He worked in marketing and management for IBM from 1966-92.

Committee vice chair is Doug Carl, R-Utica. A fundamentalist Baptist, Carl, 43, has been in the Legislature 10 years. He was part of a special panel in 1993 that blistered the Michigan model health curriculum after hearings packed by fundamentalists.

Senate majority leader Dick Posthumus, R-Alto, cast the issue in terms of "paperwork" done by local school officials to feed a Lansing bureaucracy. He said targets would be a mandated state core curriculum and outcomes-based education.

"We're not out to eliminate local school boards. It (the new

code) may have a minimum number of days. It will have schools of choice."

Asked whether the Senate GOP would favor vouchers, Posthumus said, "It's not possible under the present Constitution." He did not comment on plans by Teach Michigan and other groups for a petition drive to amend the Constitution, which bans any state aid to non-public schools.

Posthumus called for abandoning state work on new high school proficiency tests, which emphasize problem-solving over rote learning.

"We could allow schools to pick from a menu of six or 10 tests that are already out there," he said. "We may end up keeping a state test, but there are a lot of others out there."

Bob Harris, press spokesman and secretary of the State Board of Education, said Senate Republicans were "approaching the issue logically and rationally. In Colorado, the state board rescinded the school code, and the legislature went bonkers."

Asked if he foresaw an effort to replace evolution in the science curriculum with creationism, Harris said, "I don't think we know that."



### Slow simmering stew comforts, satisfies

**Stew:** To simmer slowly, combining meat, vegetables and potatoes in a hearty, one dish combination. Also, to fuss.

Mention stew for dinner and the first sentence tells all. But to some do-it-yourself cooks, preparing a pot of stew turns into more of a fuss rather than the slow, effortless combination that a stew should truly evolve from.

Some folks confuse stewing with pot roasting and braising claiming that a stew is more of a serving "style" than a cooking method.

Any good cook knows that stew should be a compelling combination of meat, potatoes and vegetables that melts in one's mouth!

#### Momma's stew

Whenever momma made stew, her first job was to retrieve the old cast iron Dutch oven from the fruit cellar. While she scrubbed the pot, we were ordered to ride our bikes over to the local grocery store for \$2 worth of stewing beef. After trimming the meat herself, momma would scoop up a handful of flour and toss it over the beef like an angel scattering moon dust.

The cast iron pan was heated while "just a scoop" of bacon drippings was melted in. The meat was tossed in, quickly browned and gently prodded with her long handled cooking fork that was sometimes used as a disciplinary tool. A half bottle of cheap dry red wine was added, and a hand-crushed bay leaf or two. Another hand held a melange of herbs and spices that were intertwined with some rapid shakes of the pepper can. The heavy top to the Dutch oven was then put in place, the flame lowered to nary a simmer while we waited. Only when a beef chunk was tasted and deemed tender enough for momma's demanding tastes were the potatoes, onions, carrots and celery added.

To this day, the magical ritual has yet to change. In addition to momma, the French are noted for their excellence in stew making. Their process utilizes two French ingredients that have fallen to the wayside in this day of microwaves and fast food, namely, wine and time.

While interesting herbs and spices, fresh vegetables, and the discreet use of wine, make a fabulous stew, the true success of stew lies solely in the method of cooking.

#### Cooking tips

A stew that has boiled under a high heat with as much agitation as a washing machine will not be more tender than one gently urged on the simmer setting. It's a fact that "boiled" meat will prove to be tough and stringy, and the gravy will be muddy with most of the flavors boiled out.

It's the summer, whether it be in wine, broth, juice, water or beer that makes the best stew. Whereas, nothing quite cooks like a 30-pound chunk of cast iron, other small appliances will suffice. Crock pots, deep glass casseroles or anything with a good cover can handle a stew. Le Creuset makes an enameled cast iron saucepot/Dutch oven that looks as good as it cooks. Regular cast iron needs a certain amount of care, namely a good wash and a wipe with oil to prevent rusting before storing, especially in a dark, damp fruit cellar.

A deep casserole dish with a lid, when stuffed with the necessary spices, wine and a good recipe, makes an affordable, appreciative shower/host/hostess gift.

I can't think of anything bad that happens when I make stew. The entire house fills with the aroma of something delicate yet hearty. Stew is comfort food and coupled with a crusty loaf of bread, it's all that's necessary to make a meal.

If there was something to complain about, I would have to admit that removing the "skin" that forms on the top of the pot while cooking is somewhat annoying. Usually by the time this happens, I have consumed the remainder of the wine and it's hardly a bother.

Allowing a large pot of stew to simmer for hours will not only produce this "skin" but probably a small oil or fat slick. A gravy ladle or bent serving spoon works best to remove this without the over-mixing that could easily turn a tender pot of stew into barbecue help. Thickening the stew should be a matter of preference, one that I can live without.

## Now is a good time to discover Classic Malts

Grain whisky is a less intense spirit than malt whisky and was originally blended with malt to give a lighter flavored dram that would have broad appeal and extend the Scotch market worldwide. Scotland's most famous product is now sold in over 190 countries, an amazing success considering its small geographic origin.

Six individual distilleries which produce Classic Malts have earned recognition for using traditional methods to produce a full spectrum of whisky styles characteristic of their region. The uniqueness of each malt is due to the ingredients, production method, climate and maturation.

A tasting of these six malts in this order: Glenkinchie, Dalwhinnie,

Cragganmore, Oban, Talisker and Lagavulin allows one to discover a range of tastes that extends from light and delicate to full and robust.

A little preparation will enhance tasting enjoyment. Taste against a white tablecloth to best notice the spirit's color. Use a glass that curves in slightly at the top. A six to eight ounce wine glass is perfect. Aromas are an important part of appreciating a malt. Addition of a small splash of cool (not chilled) spring water and a gentle swirl will aid in releasing the aromatics. Sip the malt and swirl it around in your mouth. Use only cool spring water to refresh your palate between whiskies.

Glenkinchie (\$38.98) is produced in southeast Scotland in the distilling region known as the Lowlands. It is made by steeping barley in pure spring water, then drying to halt germination forming malt. The malt is mashed with warm water which creates a sugary solution known as "wort." Yeast is added for fermentation and the alcoholic mixture produced, known as wash, is

## ASPARAGUS WITH CHAMPAGNE MUSTARD VINAIGRETTE

1 pound asparagus, (12 pieces)  
1 yellow pepper, sliced into 8 thin circles  
2 plum tomatoes  
1 cucumber, sliced thin  
1 head leaf lettuce  
Dressing  
1/4 cup Champagne or white wine vinegar  
1/2 teaspoon fresh basil  
1/2 teaspoon fresh tarragon and oregano  
1/2 clove garlic  
1/2 teaspoon Dijon mustard  
pinch salt  
1/2 cup salad or olive oil  
1/2 teaspoon fresh parsley, minced  
pinch fresh ground pepper

Remove woody ends of asparagus, peel stem, blanch in boiling salted water until half-cooked. Shock in ice water; drain. Place tomatoes in boiling water for 30 seconds. Shock in ice water to stop cooking, remove skin, slice into circles. Place 2 lettuce leaves on four plates to form base. Top each plate with small mounds of leaves torn into bite-size pieces. Top with tomato slices, set asparagus on tomato with cu' cucumber, pepper rings. Serve with dressing.

To make dressing, combine herbs and vinegar, heat to a simmer and simmer 3 minutes. Cool. Place garlic in food processor. Process until pureed. Add vinegar, herb mixture, mustard and salt. With the machine running, pour oil in a steady, slow stream. Add parsley and pepper. Serves 4.

## SHRIMP AND LEEK STRUDEL

8 shrimp shells on  
1/4 cup white wine  
2 teaspoons shallots  
1/2 cup chicken stock  
1/2 tablespoon margarine

1/2 tablespoon flour  
1/2 cup heavy cream  
2 leeks, chopped  
1/2 teaspoon fresh dill, minced  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
pinch white pepper  
2 teaspoons margarine, divided  
Dough  
1/2 cup margarine, melted  
1 box phyllo dough  
1/4 cups fine bread crumbs  
1/2 tablespoon sesame seeds

Remove shrimp shells — reserve shells, devein shrimp, wash well. Melt 1 tablespoon margarine, add flour, cook 1 to 2 minutes to form a roux. Combine shells, white wine, shallots and chicken stock. Bring to simmer, add roux. Simmer 30 minutes, strain, add cream. Simmer to a medium sauce, season to taste with salt, white pepper and lemon juice.

Remove dark leaves from leeks, split leeks in half, wash well under running water, cut thinly on the diagonal until you have 4 teaspoons. Serves 4.

Saute with dill, salt and white pepper in 1/2 teaspoon margarine. Saute shrimp in 1/2 teaspoon margarine until externally cooked — remove shrimp from skillet — add any juices that remain in pan to sauce.

To assemble strudel: Place a sheet of parchment paper on the table. Place 1 sheet of phyllo dough on top. Lightly spread dough with melted margarine, sprinkle with bread crumbs. Top with another sheet of dough. Do not top last layer with bread crumbs or margarine. Divide dough into thirds to form three equal rectangles.

Place 2 shrimp, 1 teaspoon leeks, and 1/2 teaspoon shrimp sauce on edge of each dough third. Roll up dough half way. Press sides up toward the center. Dot the end with margarine, roll up into a cylinder. Brush top with melted margarine. Sprinkle with sesame seeds (optional) or bread crumbs. Bake uncovered on greased pan at 375 for 20 minutes until crunchy and golden. Serve with any remaining sauce. Serves 4.

doubly distilled in copper pot stills. The spirit is then allowed to age and mellow in oak barrels for 10 years.

The warm, dry Lowlands climate enables Glenkinchie to mature more rapidly than most malts producing a light-to-medium body and smooth malty taste.

■ Dalwhinnie (\$46.96) is produced in the northern Highlands at 1,073 feet above sea level. Here, the malt is dried with a peat fire and the water source is pure snow-melt which perks through peat formed from heather. Dalwhinnie has a gentle heather-honey aroma with a smoky dryness in the finish — a good appetizing malt.

■ Cragganmore (\$38.98) is a 12-year-old Speyside malt whose

smoothness and clarity is due to the local spring water that feeds into the River Spey. It is a fragrant with notes of grass and smoke with a lingering, malty finish — a complex sipping whisky.

■ Oban (\$38.98) is a 14-year-old western Highland malt with a note of sea breeze in the aroma and the taste of fruit in a very warming dram that finishes with delicate peaty undertones — an after dinner malt.

■ Talisker (\$46.96) is a 10-year-old single malt from the Isle of Skye. The water, drawn from a spring beside the distillery, is dark and peaty imparting a seaweed-like pungency. Talisker develops a full body and smoky flavor with a long, peppery finish — an expressive spirit.

■ Lagavulin (\$46.96) is a 16-year-

old Islay malt distilled in the southernmost point of the Hebridean islands. It is the epitome of a powerfully peaty whisky. This character develops when the germinated barley is dried over peat fires cut from local moss. The onion shape of the stills is so critical to the taste that distillers have refused to change its shape over the years.

## Lover's CASHEW DRIED CHERRY CHICKEN

1/4 cup fresh bread crumbs  
1/2 cup heavy cream  
1 egg  
1/4 cup butter  
6 ounces ground turkey or chicken  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
pinch black pepper  
1 tablespoon Maderia  
1/4 teaspoon fresh thyme, minced  
1/4 teaspoon parsley, minced  
1/4 cup dried cherries  
1/4 cup cashews, chopped  
4 chicken breasts with rib bones  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon thyme, minced  
pinch black pepper

pinch garlic powder  
1/4 cup canola oil

Combine bread crumbs, egg and cream, let set 10 minutes. Cut butter into small pieces. In a food processor combine ground turkey, bread crumb mixture, butter, salt, pepper, Maderia and thyme. Mix until just combined. Remove from processor, fold in cashews, cherries, parley.

Loosen skin from breast meat, put about 1/4 cup meat-cherry mixture between skin and breast meat. Smooth out. Combine remaining seasonings. Place breasts in roasting pan, brush with oil, sprinkle with seasonings. Bake at 375 degrees for 30 minutes or until internal temperature is 160 degrees. Let rest 10 minutes before slicing.

To serve, remove bones from breast, slice breast on a diagonal into 4 slices. Serves 4.

## RASPBERRY JUS LIÉ

1 cup chicken stock  
1/2 cup apple juice  
1/2 cup cranberry juice  
1/2 cup raspberry vinegar  
1 teaspoon shallots, minced  
1/4 teaspoon fresh thyme, minced  
1/4 cup Maderia  
pinch black pepper  
2 tablespoons corn starch  
3 tablespoons cold water  
1/4 cup dried cherries, finely chopped

1 cup wild rice

1 teaspoon parsley, minced

## YELLOW SQUASH, GREEN BEANS AND ROASTED SHALLOTS

4 whole shallots, unpeeled  
1 yellow squash  
1/2 pounds green beans  
1 quart water  
1/2 sprig thyme  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 tablespoon olive oil  
1/2 teaspoon thyme leaves, minced  
1/4 teaspoon salt

## pinch black pepper

Place shallots on a sheet tray — spray with salad oil — roast in 400 degree F. oven for 10 to 15 minutes or until just tender — remove — cool. When cool, remove skins from shallots. Split squash in half, scoop out seeds. Cut thinly on a diagonal.

Remove tips from both ends of green beans. Bring water, thyme and salt to a boil — add beans. Cook 4 minutes — remove — shock in ice water to cool, drain.

In a large skillet heat olive oil, add shallots, yellow squash, blanched green beans, minced thyme, salt and black pepper. Toss until vegetables are heated through. Serves 4.

## MOMMA'S BEST BEEF STEW

2 1/2 pounds stewing beef, cut into large cubes  
1/4 cup flour  
4 tablespoons bacon drippings or oil  
2 cups water  
2 cups dry red wine  
1-2 bay leaves  
1 tablespoon pepper  
1 teaspoon parsley  
1 teaspoon thyme  
1 teaspoon marjoram  
2 medium potatoes, cubed  
4 carrots, cut into chunks  
4 stalks celery, cut into chunks  
1 large onion, cut into chunks

Cook stewing beef with flour. Heat bacon drippings or oil in the bottom of a heavy Dutch oven. Add beef and brown on all sides, turning frequently to avoid burning.

Add water, wine and herbs. Simmer, covered, on lowest heat for 2 to 2 1/2 hours. Add vegetables and potatoes. If sauce is too thick, add more wine or water. Cover and continue cooking on lowest heat for 1 hour or until vegetables are tender.

Remove bay leaf. Season with salt and pepper, if desired. Serves 6-8.

## LUXEMBOURG STEW

3 pounds veal shoulder, cubed  
1/4 cup flour  
1/4 cup unsalted butter  
1 onion, sliced  
1 pound tomatoes, skinned and seeded  
5 whole cloves  
1 bay leaf  
pinch thyme, rosemary and marjoram  
2 1/2 cups beer  
6 gingersnaps  
Juice of 1 fresh lemon (3 tablespoons juice)

Roll veal cubes in flour. Melt butter and brown veal lightly. Remove veal from pan and saute onions, adding a little more butter if needed.

Return veal to the pan. Stir in tomatoes, seasonings and beer. Cover and cook for 2 hours over low heat in a medium low (300 degree F.) oven.

## CREAM PUFF HEARTS

1/2 cup water  
1/2 cup milk  
1/2 cup margarine  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon vanilla

3 ounces white chocolate, finely chopped

Gotts gets back

**W**ho could have blamed Leslie Gotts for staring into the mirror and saying: "What next?" The sophomore from Plymouth Salem hasn't enjoyed much since taking her basketball talents to Wayne State. Her ankles are the main reason: She suffered an ankle sprain prior to her freshman season that kept her sidelined until midseason, limiting her to 14 games.

Then before the start of the current season, Gotts underwent surgery after injuring her other ankle. That forced her to miss all of the preseason, setting her back even further.

"She's been behind from the get-go," said WSU coach Diane Wisnewski.

With senior Wendy Winter enjoying a solid season at point guard (12.8 points, 4.2 assists per game), the 5-foot-4 Gotts was limited to 15 minutes a game, playing both guard spots. Her shooting suffered: She had made just 5-of-33 floor shots (15.2 percent) going into Thursday's game against Grand Valley State.

But perhaps the tide turned, finally.

Winter was forced out of the lineup due to illness. Gotts replaced her; for Gotts, it was her second start of the season. And after a shaky first half — 0-for-4 shooting, with two turnovers — Gotts got it together to record her best collegiate game in the Lady Tartars' 87-75 victory.

She scored 10 points in the second half, converting all three of her shots from the field. Two of them were 3-pointers; the other was a slicing drive to the basket. Gotts was also 2-for-3 from the free-throw line and had five assists, three in the second half.

"It was good for her because she needed the confidence," said Wisnewski. "I thought she handled their press well."

For Gotts, the game was basically a big relief. She knew she could still score: The question was, when would she?

"Even though my percentage isn't that good, I really don't take that many shots," she rationalized. Her biggest concern was her ankles — she couldn't help but worry.

"I try not to think about them," she said.

Perhaps now the problems will disappear. There's no doubt Wisnewski wants to count on her, and she will if Gotts turns in the cool-under-pressure kind of performance she did against Grand Valley.

Another Rock emerges

**G**otts wasn't the only former Salem standout to turn in an outstanding game Thursday. Jake Baker, a 6-foot-4 senior starter at Grand Valley State, tied his season-high for points by scoring 10 in the Lakers' 81-76 triumph over Wayne State.

Baker made 3 of 5 shots, including 2-of-4 3-pointers. He also had four rebounds and two steals.

Coming into the game, Baker was averaging 4.8 points and 2.6 rebounds per game for Grand Valley, which improved to 9-9 overall, 5-6 in the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference.

**P**lymouth Salem collected seven wins in 13 weight classes — four by pins — and it was just enough to edge Westland John Glenn 34-27 Thursday in a Western Lakes Activities Association dual meet at Salem.

"I didn't know four champions would do it, but the kids came

The best performances, according to the coaches, came from Salem's Scott Hughes (119) and Phil Mitchell (134), who were voted co-most outstanding wrestlers.

Hughes, who was third last year, pinned defending champ Josh Banks of Livonia Churchill. Banks was ahead 6-5 when Hughes got a reversal, followed by the pin.

It was the first time Hughes beat Banks after two losses, and he also

avenged a loss to Garden City's Jason Milne, the 112 winner last year.

"(Banks) has been at 126 all season and was cutting to 119 for this tournament," Hughes said. "I figured I would be stronger because I've been at 119 all season."

## Chiefs tumble to Chargers

This figured to be a match with the potential for massive consequences, which usually means it will be close, down-to-the-wire.

It turned out differently.

she's strong enough and physical enough to go up against bigger opponents.

"She's one of those flexible players you love to have."

Anderson has succeeded by accenting her greatest strengths: the mental part of the game and her physical strength. She's accomplished this by simply outworking everybody.

"I have different responsibilities here," Anderson said. "I know I'm not going to be a scorer, with Denise (Kirby) and Delonda (Little). I have to rebound and play defense."

In WSU's 87-75 win over Grand Valley State Thursday, Anderson did both. She played 15 minutes (two more than her season average) and scored nine points, her second highest total (her best: 10 vs. University of Michigan-Dearborn Nov. 26); she also grabbed a career-best seven rebounds.

"I actually hit my shots for a change," Anderson said with a smile, noting her 4-of-5 shooting from the floor (including a 3-pointer). Scoring has been a bit of a problem: For the season, she's

averaging 4.4 points and 3.1 rebounds a game, converting 36.6 percent of her shots.

But there's no doubt about her contributions. WSU's record is proof enough: 15-4 overall, with an 8-3 GLIAC mark.

She does have her weaknesses. "She probably makes mistakes because she tries too hard," said Wisniewski. "She thinks she has to prove she belongs at this level. So she ends up putting a lot of pressure on herself."

Of course, Anderson is already adjusting to that problem. "I know I have to learn to keep my composure, to stay in the game mentally," she said. "The game is so much faster here, that's been an adjustment."

And it's one more thing she's worked at, successfully — which has caught the attention of more than her coach.

"She's got the respect of her teammates," said Wisniewski, "because she works so hard."
