Railroad crossings could close



A proposal has been made to close two railroad crossings in Plymouth's Old Village. The crossings at Holbrook and York streets would be affected.

The closing of railroad crossings at Holbrook and York streets in Old Village has been proposed by CSX Transportation to city officials, who are reviewing the potential benefits.

The city is going to be looking at the feasibility of closing those crossings," said City Manager Steve Walters. "We'll obviously have some discussions with adjacent property owners, and try to determine how traffic would turn around at the end of the street."

The state has ordered that CSX improve signal crossings at each crossing, and Walters said CSX officials have told the city they'd prefer to spend the money on rubberized crossings at Starkweather and Mill Streets.

The CSX proposal to pick up the entire tab for rubberized crossings is attractive to city officials, because without the offer the city's contribution to two rubberized crossings would total about \$40,000, Walters said.

Walters said the state has set an October deadline for an answer on what's planned for crossings at Holbrook and York. With nearby residents' input, city officials plan to determine whether or not to close the crossings by then.

Walters said the Starkweather and Mill crossings are scheduled for routine maintenance this summer.

"The city and the railroad are interested in rebuilding them with rubberized crossings like Main Street and Ann Arbor Trail have," Walters said. "We've tentatively discussed with the railroad getting into those crossings and the sharing of costs."

Fond memories of Plymouth will last minister a lifetime

As most would agree, learning to say goodbye is never easy. For Lee Seese and his family, it will be particularly hard. Not only are they saying goodbye to friends and members of his church congregation, they are also saying goodbye to Plymouth. And that may prove to be the hardest thing of all for the family.

"Saying farewell is always a hard thing to do. The sounds of the train whistles in the middle of the day, the Fourth of July parade, the Penn Theatre, band concerts in the park — these are some of the things that mean Plymouth," said Seese, who has served as associate minister at the First Presbyterian Church of Plymouth since 1990.

"But more than that, it is the graciousness that we have experienced in this city; the way we were welcomed by the church and the community," Seese said. "People always thought of us, whether it was Thanksgiving dinner, extra tickets to a Tiger game or a trip up north. People always went out of their way and this is the way that we will remember Plymouth. It is noticeable, and it is something that sets Plymouth apart from other parts of the country."

On July 19, Seese will leave his post at the church and move to Seattle where he has accepted a position as minister of the Mount Baker Park Presbyterian Church.

The move offers a mixed blessing. Although the family is leaving a town that they love, they are

also headed for home. Both he and his wife, Lisa Konick, were born and raised in Seattle, and their families still live there. The couple is looking forward to introducing their sons, Jeremy, 8, and Devin, 4, to the place where they themselves grew up.

"The move offers a good opportunity for our boys to grow up near our family. Both Lisa and I are adventurers and there are parts of the world where we would like to do a mission. But for the next stretches of our sons' lives, we thought it would be nice for them to share in the benefit of living near their grandparents and cousins," Seese said.

He said the move also offers a unique professional opportunity. His new church in Seattle, while set in an affluent neighborhood, is surrounded by a lower income area populated by southeast Asian refugees from the post-Vietnam era. Seese said that he is eager to work with the church in creating a "oneness in Christ that transcends racial barriers. The congregation is working toward this."

Seese graduated from Princeton Theological Seminary in New Jersey in 1980 and temporarily returned to Seattle for six months, staying at home with his son, Jeremy, while Lisa worked as a reporter for the Seattle Times. He was notified of the position in Plymouth by friend and mentor Brewster "Budgie" Gere, now minister of the First Presbyterian Church of Farmington.

Seese said that although the church leaders may have had doubts about his age and lack of experi-

Storm knocks out power

Thursday brought a triple whammy to Plymouth and Canton.

Mother Nature unleashed two of the miseries — a sultry heat wave with temperatures close to 100 and an early evening storm that blackened the sky and led to downed trees and power outages throughout the area. A funnel cloud even was reported by spotted near Livonia.

On Friday, Detroit Edison spokeswoman Mary Kay Bean said, "We had 4,800 customers affected by outages as a result of the storm."

As of 2 p.m. we still had 3,900 customers without service," she said. "We've been concentrating on wire down calls right now, because it's very important to protect the public safety."

She said Edison expected the majority of affected Plymouth customers to have power restored by Saturday. "We'll be working through the weekend," she said, adding 100 additional line workers were coming from Pennsylvania to work with the usual Edison crews and private contractors to restore power.

Outages were caused by storms Thursday with 50-60 mph winds and lightning strikes. "They have the ability to have a tremendous impact on trees, lines and equipment," Bean said.

In Canton, trees and branches were down, but there were no major problems reported, according to officials.

The third calamity struck at 6:30 a.m. and came not from Mother Nature but from high-tech society. Thousands of local residents spent the day without telephone service when a switch failed at an Ameritech building at 11770 Merriman, Livonia. Some 65,000 telephone lines in Livonia, Westland and Garden City were out for most of the day, said Jonathan James, Ameritech spokesman.

The summer storm hit about 6 p.m., bringing a bit of relief from the steam of the day. The sky darkened, fingers of lightning spread across the sky, trees rocked and swayed and torrents of water fell.

With the storm came a loss of power, to homes, businesses and street lights.

Teen mission trip an eye-opener

Are you crazy? asked four young bystanders in Jackson, Tenn. The boys were watching teen-agers about their own age build a house and grade a yard that didn't even belong to them. The bystanders were incredulous when they learned the workers had traveled more than 700 miles to work in the 100-degree temperatures and weren't even getting paid.

The workers, 15 area teens from the youth group at Geneva Presbyterian Church in Canton, had been involved in fund-raising the previous year about \$4,000 to make the trip and work with Habitat for Humanity. Those nine boys and six girls ages 15-18 were under the guidance of youth director David Willerup.

The bystanders, with nothing to do except shout insults, were approached by James, a large man in charge of the Habitat project in Jackson.

James taught me a thing or two about charity, Willerup admitted. Instead of reprimanding them, James said, "Hey, you got nothing to do, why don't you work with us?"

That's just what they did and

they did get paid, in chocolate chip cookies.

"That was fine for them," said Willerup. "They got their cookies, they pulled some weeds and they learned something about helping people in need."

Helping people in need is nothing new for the folks at Geneva. Involved in many community outreach projects, this was the fourth annual pilgrimage for the youth group to assist Habitat for Humanity in various locations throughout the country.

It was the first for Willerup who came to Geneva a year ago as an intern.

Volunteers help homeowner families building their own homes as well as those of neighbors.

Said Willerup, "Habitat is not just building homes but they're building communities because they are bringing people from the community in to work together. They're building everybody's sense of giving."

The homes are one-story dwellings built on slabs to keep the cost at about \$15,000. The resident is expected to pay for the building materials but interest-free loans are available through Habitat.

The youth group worked with

Willerup said, "Her mother could outwork anybody. Her mother was working real hard because she wanted Rosalind out of her house."

Willerup was impressed with the efforts of his teen crew. Chaperones were Dave and Carol Bunch, Mike Gaubatz and Jim Fedorko.

"It's a lot of hard work," said Adam Wolski, 16, a student at Plymouth Salem High School. "I like working as a group, working on houses. It just feels great, especially when you're doing it and you know you're actually doing something right and good."

This was Wolski's second Habitat sojourn. Last year, he traveled with the group to Apollo, Pa., and he has plans to go on next year's trip.

Nancy Kindraka, 16, a student at Plymouth Canton, has made plans to go on the next trip. This was her first time working for Habitat.

"I found it to be really exciting," she said. "It was exciting to be out helping the people. Building the house and working with the group and working with the homeowners themselves was really fun. You didn't even mind the hard work so much because you knew this was good for these people."

"The whole church was behind us in this mission," said Willerup. "They were very supportive throughout the whole year in all of our fund-raising activities to help us out so that we would have the budget to do it."

Next year's trip to work on Habitat homes is already in the planning stages. The adults at Geneva have also committed to assisting the Habitat building blitz to be held in Detroit from Aug. 6-11, by packing 100 lunches for the volunteers working on site.

Bricks from streets selling like hotcakes

The sale of downtown street bricks to benefit the Plymouth Historical Society is a big success, said Jack Kenyon of the society.

The Main Street bricks excavated during street construction went on sale at the city Department of Public Works yard July 8 and have continued to sell on successive Saturdays. "We're well over 3,000 bricks sold," Kenyon said Thursday.

"What's left are mostly broken and chipped; people who want bricks have to dig around and can't really get into the bottom of the pile," he said, adding about 5,000 bricks remain.

The sale continues on Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

"A lot of people show up to buy less than five bricks, but some have bought from 100 to 350," Kenyon said.

HISTORY

Some of the bricks offered for sale are sandblasted and etched with the words "Main Street Plymouth, Mich. 1908," the year the bricks were made and laid on Main Street for its first paving.

"The big users are for patios; the intermediate users get them for walkways and edging planters; small users buy them for souvenirs; some of them are even going to people out of state," Kenyon said.

The historical society so far has raised more than \$2,000 from the brick sale, Kenyon said.

The bricks sell for 50 cents each for the first 100, 45 cents for the next hundred, and 40 cents each for even more bricks.

The money "will go either in the operating budget or into the capital funds, the interest of

which supplements the operating budget," Kenyon said.

Theresa Gall of Plymouth said she bought a brick for her patio as a memento of Main Street. "I'm going to put it in a strategic spot," she said.

Former state representative Jerry Vorva of Plymouth said, "I picked up about 125 so far," adding he would have taken more on that trip but was afraid of breaking the axle on his van.

"I'm going back to reclaim some more. I'm going to replace the bricks on my porch; it's nice to have some Plymouth history on my porch. It makes a great value and it's a great thing to have."

"I'm also purchasing some sandblasted bricks, one to put in my porch and some extra ones for my real estate customers," Vorva said. "It's a nice conversation piece and it helps the historical society."

Precinct changes get school board's approval

School precincts in Plymouth-Canton are being realigned, but don't look for school and government precincts to have the same configurations now — or any time soon.

As convenient as it would be for voters to go to the same polling place for both school and government elections, it wouldn't be practical or cost-effective, say school officials.

The Board of Education changed the boundaries of school district Precincts 3 and 5 in Plymouth Township at its meeting Monday night. Trustees also eliminated from school district Precinct 8 the portion in Plymouth Township. Affected voters will be notified of the changes by mail.

"It's a convenient time for the township of Plymouth to give us the needed help in this project, since they are realigning many of their own precinct boundaries," said Ellen Schroeder, Plymouth-Canton elections clerk.

Changes in Canton precincts to accommodate the township's growth are expected next.

"Canton Township has indicated to us that some changes will be coming in the near future that will dictate our realigning school precinct boundaries in Canton. We will also be creating a new school precinct in Canton," said Schroeder. "At this point, all precincts that include the city of Plymouth, township of Plymouth, and township of Canton will not overlap one another."

Superintendent Charles Little

said, "Periodically, the townships and city realign their precincts in an effort to economize. When Plymouth realigned this winter, we joined them. This allows us to use the same notification postcard system. Canton will realign in the fall, and we can use the same mailing with them to inform voters so things are clear and economical."

Apparently, despite receiving cards in the mail, some voters were unsure where to vote in the school district's election last month.

Newly elected Trustee Michael Maloney said, "One of the things that really frustrates voters is when their voting place changes. We should be able to explain, because it's going to cause the same frustration."

Maloney said he came across a voter election day who was so exasperated that she said to him, "They are trying to discourage me from voting."

Speaking of election day, Plymouth City Commissioner Robert Jones told the board that he encountered a woman who'd come to the wrong precinct, and was unable to find out where she was supposed to vote. "This went on to the point where she didn't vote. She wasn't going to vote for the 2.3 mill anyway," he said. "I think we should be able to tell people where they vote. If this is a particular problem, I hope it's looked at before the next election."

Little said each polling place posts a map. In addition, said Schroeder, all election workers

have to do is call her office, open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. every election day.

"Questions can be answered quickly and accurately that way," said Little.

"How difficult would it be to make the master list available at every precinct?" asked Trustee Jack Farrow. "That's possible, but not right now," said Dave Rodwell, research and technology director.

Schroeder said the last three elections have gone smoothly.

There's been talk of matching school and government precincts, she said. "There may be a push for it, but frankly, I don't see how it would happen. The cost would be tremendous, and practically, it's just not conceivable. Government has 43

precincts. We have 17. We'd be looking at almost 200 precinct workers. We have less than 100 now." Equipment would be a huge added expense, Schroeder said.

The district spent \$18,000 on the June 12 election.

Realigning government precincts with school precincts wouldn't work either, "because they have more voters than we do, and a greater voter turnout," Schroeder said.

"Where people get confused is in some small school districts, they can do it real easily. We have six governmental units to serve."

The process will be further streamlined when the district switches to a computerized system, Schroeder said.

Hiring of 11 new teachers gets the nod from trustees

The hiring of 11 more teachers was approved by the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education last week. Board members approved the hiring of 17 teachers and learning specialists at a previous meeting.

The new hires are replacing 64 teachers who accepted an early retirement package offered by the district.

Among the new teachers to start at Iebister in the fall is an Eastern Michigan University graduate who has two relatives the district, one of whom teaches at Iebister. Laura Riegall's aunt, Linda Guenzel, teaches at Iebister. Her brother, James Riegall, teaches at Bentley Elementary.

According to board policy, relatives of district employees can be hired, as long as the board is informed of it and relatives don't supervise one another.

Errol Goldman, assistant superintendent for employee relations and personnel, notified the board of the situation last week.

A couple of trustees questioned whether relatives teaching in the same elementary school might present a problem.

"I spoke with (Iebister principal) Lee Harrison, and the individual (Laura Riegall) has been a

long-term sub there. They were very impressed with her," said Goldman. "I don't have a problem with it."

Trustee Barbara Graham said, "I'm uncomfortable with them being in the same building. It will be very difficult if we continue the same trend."

An administrator evaluating an employee with a relative in the same building is presented with a difficulty, she said. "I'm not particularly fond of the idea if we go too far. I wonder if there is some way to remedy this in the future."

Goldman said, "The difficulty is you want a committee at each school doing its own hiring. They want the best available. I don't believe our administrators will have any difficulty with evaluation."

Parent Lucy French told the board her daughter was fortunate to have Laura Riegall as a teacher last year. "It worries me that nepotism might override competency," she said. "She really is an outstanding young lady."

Reporting to Allen this August will be Elaina Plakas of Michigan State University, and Dayna Rugh, a Central Michigan University graduate who taught for a year in the Oak Park school district.

Beth Schimmelman, a University of Rhode Island graduate, will teach at Fiegel Elementary. Lori Love of the University of Michigan and Nicol Shamey of Eastern Michigan University will teach art at schools to be determined.

once when they first received his resume, all doubts were erased during his first visit to Plymouth for an interview.

"We fell in love with one another instantly. In the beginning, they were concerned that I did not have enough experience. Most people come out of the seminary and work in other areas before becoming an associate minister. This position included overseeing pastoral care. It was a tall order. Just coming out of seminary, but Budge encouraged them to give me a chance and they did," he said.

Soon after Seese started, long-time minister the Rev. Phillip Magee retired, and Seese stayed on as the church began a two-year search for a minister that ended in August 1994, when the Rev. James Skimins was hired to head the church.

Church law prohibited him from applying for Magee's position and Seese stayed on until the church was stabilized. "I could

have stayed on here as associate minister. Looking back, I realize that my real calling was to stick around and be the known quantity for the congregation while the church found a new minister," Seese said.

Seese and his family made a strong impact on both the church and the community and will be greatly missed, members said.

"Lee has brought a certain grace and stability to the people. We are sorry to see him go, but we recognize his need to head a new church," Skimins said.

Seese said that while he and his family will miss Plymouth, they are already planning return trips.

"This is the place where I saw my first white Christmas and I'll never forget it. When we first moved here people said, 'You're moving to Detroit?' But what we found was a perfect middle-American town, the kind of place that most people wish they could live. It is a great place to have started a career," Seese said.

but the railroad has raised the question that the Holbrook and York crossings might be closed to vehicle traffic and potentially the railroad would be willing to be involved financially in other crossings to a greater extent."

For the York and Holbrook crossings to remain open, Walters said automated signaling would have to be installed, and the railroad and city would split equally a cost of \$10,000 to \$50,000, plus annual maintenance costs.

Walters said the state is encouraging the closing of railroad

crossings, and offers money to communities to help pay costs to close them.

He said city engineers will try to determine how to create a turn-around where streets would be closed at the railroad tracks, "then go to property owners and show them where we were."

"If we get to the point of officially considering the closing, a public hearing would be held," Walters said, adding nearby property owners would be notified first.

Death penalty amendment is 'narrowest' yet

One thing is different about the latest in a 37-year series of efforts to bring the death penalty to Michigan.

"Mine is the narrowest proposal yet," said Rep. Chuck Ferricone, R-Kalamazoo, as the House Judiciary Committee opened hearings July 13 on his HJR N, a proposed constitutional amendment.

The freshman lawmaker's plan would allow prosecutors to seek the death penalty in first-degree murder cases under these circumstances: (1) two or more murders, (2) murder committed in a terrorist act "intended to intimidate or coerce a civilian population," or (3) an attempt to influence gov-

ernmental policy "by assassination or kidnapping."

The panel's meeting was held up for 40 minutes for lack of a quorum. Absentees included Reps. Gerald Law, R-Plymouth, and James Ryan, R-Redford.

Ferricone has 13 Republican and one Democratic co-sponsors. Committee Democrats revealed their hostility to the proposal.

Ferricone said he rejected efforts by many fellow Republicans to include killing of a police or corrections officer. Nor does he want to include "crimes of passion and gas station holdups where it (killing) wasn't intended."

He said arguments over whether execution deters crime and is racist aren't pertinent be-

cause "we have an unusually high murder rate" for which execution in some cases is appropriate.

Rep. Alan Croppsey, R-DeWitt, advised Democrats to work on Ferricone's compromise because if lawmakers fail to put it on the 1996 ballot, "this could go to the petition process, and if it does, it's not going to be as narrow."

A two-thirds vote of each chamber is needed to put the constitutional amendment on the ballot for voters in 1996. Although Gov. John Engler opposes the death penalty, he has no power to veto the resolution.

Democrats such as Rep. Ted Wallace of Detroit denounced the plan as racist, with blacks being executed in greater proportions than whites.

"I find it revolting," said freshman Rep. Laura Baird, D-Oakman. "It's an immature social impulse to seek revenge."

Said Rep. Mary Schroer, D-Ann Arbor: "It's odd that you (Republicans) trust a jury (in death penalty cases), but for weeks I've heard you don't trust a jury in product liability and malpractice cases." She referred to GOP efforts to limit jury awards in civil suits for non-economic "pain and suffering" damages.

Michigan was the first jurisdiction in the English-speaking world to ban the death penalty after the wrong man was hanged in

the 19th century. Voters rejected a death-penalty amendment in 1991. Talk and petition drives revived after the 1967 Detroit riot. Despite poll support of 75-80 percent, however, petition drives have always failed.

House Judiciary Chair Michael Nye, R-Litchfield, used the hot week and the Appropriations Committee room to give conservatives in his caucus public hearings on controversial proposals. A day earlier the panel had an overflow crowd on proposals to end affirmative action programs in the state.




Governor's veto cuts court funding

Capitol capsules: Gov. John Engler heated up the debate over trial court reorganization by vetoing \$25 million in aid to outstate courts, much to the disappointment of western Michigan politicians.

"The governor's veto is unfortunate . . . We want immediate action on restructuring," said Tim McGuire, executive director of the Michigan Association of Counties. MAC has a suit before the state Supreme Court that would force the state to pay core costs of trial courts in the 82 outstate counties.

In 1980 the Legislature took the first step by picking up the costs of Wayne County and Detroit courts but never took the second step until this year when lawmakers voted an extra \$25 million for courts.

But Engler vetoed that line item, saying he wants "major near-term decisions" on trial court reorganization as well as on "the appropriate number, location and jurisdiction of trial judges. Until these decisions are made, I cannot support additional funds for local courts."

While Engler has yet to be specific on what kind of court reorganization he favors, leaders of the State Bar are proposing a single "trial court" to replace circuit, Detroit Recorder's, probate and district courts. A joint legislative committee is studying restructuring.

But Engler praised the Legislature for voting a separate lump-sum budget for the judiciary instead of a series of line items.

Indian aid saved

Engler didn't veto the Indian tuition waiver program, as he had threatened, but announced he doesn't want it in next year's budget.

"A veto would merely deprive public colleges and universities of reimbursements for waivers granted in prior years," he said. "I will not support further appropriations to reimburse (universities and colleges) for tuition waived for Native American students (in the future)."

A fee of special line items and complex budgets, the governor wants all aid programs lumped into a single account. For example, Engler vetoed a \$250,000 line item for the Nursing Opportunity Program "because it is a new program that focuses financial aid on a subset of students and a single occupation rather than providing funds for all students that are in need."

Jeff Parker, head of the Bay Mills Indian Community and chair of the Michigan Inter-Tribal Council, asked Engler to reconsider because "we have a unique historical relationship with the state as a result of treaties. The tuition waiver is the result of a 1934 agreement giving Native American land to form the state of Michigan in exchange for certain rights . . . including tuition."

The higher education budget provides a 3 percent cost-of-living hike for all 15 universities and a handful of special adjustments.

Double-bunking

Prison double-bunking will continue at a state prison in Plymouth Township under the Corrections Department budget bill, which Engler signed.

It provides full-year funding for 471 new double-bunked beds, including 276 at the Western Wayne Correctional Facility.

The \$1.3 billion corrections bill also provides \$4 million for minimum security facilities and increases the county jail reimbursement program by \$5.8 million to \$14 million.



"Speaking of kids, some of our teachers have been high school students themselves. Jody Florkowski, also a senior at DSA, has been teaching improvisation for two years now.

"Evette Griffore, a senior at Thurston High, helped her sister, Janette, a couple years ago and is now teaching scenery and prop painting for our production of 'The Phantom Tollbooth.' Steve Vedder, 1995 graduate of Thurston, also taught scene study in our spring workshop this year."

Redford Youth Theatre was started in February 1990 when Florkowski, drama teacher at Pierce Middle School in South Redford School District, decided to make it her master's project for her degree in drama/theater for

the young at Eastern Michigan University.

The program started with about 20 students and grew continuously the past five years. The youth theater has more than 300 members on its mailing list today. In fact, at one time, students had to be turned away after a program filled up.

The classes are at various places, depending on where space can be found. "We usually need a few classrooms as well as a large room such as a gymnasium for dance classes. We like Thurston's auditorium for performance because it is just the right size for a small audience. Unfortunately, it isn't always available because of school activities, so we try to schedule around other people," said Florkowski.

"Many parents like the program because it keeps their children busy in a positive way. They meet new friends and gain self-confidence while having a lot of fun. Teamwork is also an important factor in Redford Youth Theatre productions. The show can't go on unless everyone cooperates."

Service dogs bill signed

Rep. Penny Crissman won Gov. John Engler's signature on a bill to allow guide and service dogs to enter both private and public buildings during their training.

"Introducing guide and service dogs to a variety of situations during their training is crucial to proper socialization," said Crissman, R-Rochester.

Her House Bill 4052 will take effect Jan. 1.

"Its passage gives us legitimate reason backed by lawful support to bring these animals into public facilities during their training," said Bill Hanson, president of Rochester Leader Dogs for the Blind. The bill was also supported by Paws with a Cause, the Michigan Humane Society and the Michigan Association of Doctors of Veterinary Medicine.

The new law will require that training dogs must be at least a year old and wear a harness with a blaze orange leash and collar, along with a hearing-ear cape or backpack. Instructors must carry picture identification.

Persons refusing to admit dogs and trainers may be charged with a misdemeanor that could cost them \$100 and 90 days in jail.

Heir bill advances

An Oakland County missing heir problem will be taken up by the state House when it returns to Lansing in September.

The House Judiciary Committee on July 13 unanimously approved a bill by Sen. Mat Dunaskiss to shorten from 10 years to five the waiting time for distributing an estate when one heir is a "disappeared person."

Dunaskiss, R-Lake Orion, won Senate passage on behalf of Laura Walker, an Independence Township homemaker and mother of four. Her father died in 1982, leaving an estate to her and two brothers, but one brother dropped out of sight in 1988.

"My parents gave up on him. We have not seen Clifford since 1981," Walker told the House panel. The family learned he had spent six months in jail for being AWOL from the military. The Social Security Administration has no record of him since 1988, the year he got a Texas driver's license.

Walker said the family suspects Clifford was involved in drugs or importing illegal aliens. Meanwhile, attorneys' fees have mounted, she said.

Subpoena bill OK'd

Gov. John Engler has signed Senate Bill 85, giving county prosecutors the power to issue investigative subpoenas.

The controversial bill had been opposed by both liberals and conservatives, who feared it granted grand jury powers too loosely.



Ed McNamara turns 'bulldog' loose on Rouge

Wayne County Executive Edward McNamara likes to reminisce about how he and his childhood buddies swam in the Rouge River during the 1930s and kept an eye out for the cops whose job it was to keep small boys out of the river.

The Rouge wasn't entirely safe for swimming then, and it's less so now, but McNamara hopes to change that.

"Someday soon the Rouge will be ready for swimming again, and I plan on doing the first cannonball off the dock," he said two years ago in his State of the County speech.

The annual Friends of the Rouge volunteer cleanup, going on its 11th year, has raised awareness and pulled tons of debris from the river and its tributaries.

And the federal government's Rouge River National Wet Weather Demonstration Project, a \$1 billion-plus, 20-year endeavor begun two years ago, could make the annual cleanup look small-time if Congress doesn't cut funding.

"Most people have never known the Rouge as a place for recreation," McNamara said in 1993. "They have only known it as a sewer. But with the help of the federal government the Rouge will once again be a place for boating, swimming and fishing."

Now McNamara has added his 16-inch gun to the campaign in the form of Deputy Executive Michael Duggan, who will take on the Rouge as his next big project. Duggan is chiefly responsible

for getting voters in Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties to approve a property tax for the SMART bus system earlier this year. He has a reputation for finishing what he starts, often against the odds.

"He's such a bulldog," said Jim Graham, director of Friends of the Rouge. "When he concentrates his efforts, things happen."

Duggan said the particulars of his Rouge project haven't been set yet, but he has gotten a feel for the river environment by canoeing the Rouge with deputy parks director Dan Navarre.

"You feel like you could be in the jungle somewhere," Duggan said of his trip. "It looked like (a scene from) 'The African Queen.' Our biggest problem was climbing over the poison ivy."

Said Graham: "It's really very pretty there, and I think most people don't think about that. It

doesn't make sense that we have to go 100 miles north to put a canoe in the water."

Although Duggan and Navarre put their canoe in the Rouge, the practice is not recommended for the general public. With more than 100 sewage overflow pipes still dumping waste into the river with every hard rain, the Rouge is still plenty polluted. In 759 tests on the Rouge from April to October 1994, the water met state standards for full body contact just 20 times.

Construction of 11 basins to catch the overflow from combined sewer systems is expected to be completed by the end of 1998, reducing sewage in the river by 33 percent. But that's the Wet Weather Demonstration Project.

Duggan's efforts are less ambitious. "I don't see taxes or new fees (to pay for it). We're going on the assumption that we're going to be creative within existing resources. We might take prisoners from the Hamtramck jail and have them clean the river."

Cleanup efforts will likely be restricted to portions of the river west of Merriman Road, Duggan said, adding that there are 50 logjams to be cleared.

Graham agreed. The Friends of the Rouge, he said, "can only get to a fraction of them. There are so many that are not easily accessible for volunteers."

Wayne County Public Works Director Vyto Kaunelis said that the separation of combined storm and sanitary sewers in Livonia,

Westland and Plymouth Township makes a significant cleanup possible between Newburgh Lake and Merriman Road.

Try grilled vegetables; they're sweet as candy

Americans are beginning to discover that vegetables, like beef, chicken and fish, take on a completely different character when cooked over wood or coals. The natural sugars in some vegetables, such as onions, garlic and bell peppers, caramelize when grilled, imparting a depth and richness that no amount of sauteeing could ever achieve.

Other vegetables, such as eggplant, acquire the same woodsy smokiness as a great grilled steak. And Portabellos, those giant mushrooms, taste like the finest filet when grilled and doused with a little Italian vinaigrette.

Methods vary, but almost any vegetable can be cooked on the grill. There are a few guidelines.

Cooking guidelines

Vegetables have no natural fat. They must be either marinated in an oil based mixture or brushed with oil, not butter which has a tendency to burn, so they won't stick to the grill.

To ensure even, thorough cooking, the grill chef must frequently turn the vegetables and carefully regulate the heat of the coals.

Finally, vegetables have a tendency to absorb off flavors, so the grill rack should be as clean as possible, and the coals free of chemical starters before beginning.

Several basic grilling techniques are all that is needed to bring out the full flavor of vegetables. Larger vegetables can be sliced or cut into chunks. These chunks are easily handled when threaded onto a wooden skewer that has been soaked in water for at least one hour to prevent burning. Some vegetables, like broccoli, cauliflower, and potatoes require some form of pre-cooking or they will dry out and burn on the outside before softening within. Of course, anytime you cook any vegetable in foil, it will cook perfectly on the grill, barring of course, any over-cooking. Broccoli and cauliflower florets, will cook perfectly when brushed with herb infused oil if you blanch them first in boiling water for 2 minutes.

Vegetable wrappers

Natural vegetable wrappers such as corn husks help keep vegetables moist and tender. Purists might wish to remove as much of the silk from cobs as possible, but yours truly simply fills a bucket of water and soaks the corn for at least an hour. Onto a covered grill it goes, only to be turned about every 10-15 minutes until the kernels are tender.

Smaller loose vegetables such as green beans, pea pods and green onions can also be grilled. You can wrap them in foil, but personal experience suggests wrapping them in corn husks purchased from a Mexican grocery store, and then soaking for an hour before cooking. I'm not a big fan of wrapping my vegetables in foil because it has a tendency to steam the vegetables rather than grill them. A good grill rack with small holes allows me to "stir grill" smaller vegetables.

When it comes to grilling vegetables, I rely a lot on my handy dandy grill baking sheet. This large square of heavy metal has smaller holes drilled throughout the surface. It can be placed on any grill, and is especially helpful in keeping smaller vegetables from falling through the grates. They're available all over town wherever good cookware is sold. A word of advice: you get what you pay for. Cheaper grill racks will warp when heated and not lie flat on the racks. Expect to pay about \$15 for a good grilling rack, but with minimal care and careful storage, it should last for years to come.

For dousing vegetables or brushing on great taste, you can't beat a basic Italian vinaigrette or salad dressing. Bottled is acceptable, but home-made is even better. Herbed infused oils offer a richness that can't be duplicated. Being on a healthy eating regimen, my grilled vegetables are basted with a good balsamic vinegar. Sometimes I'll add a few chopped fresh herbs from the garden, but for the most part, I rely on the flavor and taste of a great vinegar.

There are many vinegars out there, in addition to balsamic, that would be outstanding on grilled vegetables. Invest in a cheap spray bottle for uniform coverage; however, they have been known to plug when using vinaigrettes with herbs and spices. A natural hair small paint brush (not plastic) also works well as a baster.

Pastry chef sweet on old-fashioned recipe

Greenfield Village pastry chef Tom Preniczky of Westland, hopes to satisfy a lot of sweet tooth as well as a bit of curiosity at the Village's "A Taste of History" weekend July 22-23. He and his staff are preparing over 15,000 sample-size servings of sweets once baked in wood-fired stoves and hearth ovens a century or two ago.

All of the foods offered at the event were selected for their historical significance and practicality.

"We don't alter the recipes a whole lot. We want to give people the historical experience, but we must make sure we give them good quality."

Given Preniczky's credentials, quality is assured. He's a graduate of Schoolcraft College's culinary arts program, and has piled his sweet trade at such notable establishments as the former Chez Raphael in Novi, Les Auteurs in Royal Oak, and the Hyatt Regency in Chicago. At Greenfield Village in Dearborn, where he's worked for the last three years, he oversees both the Henry Ford Museum and Village kitchens.

"It's been a nice place to work. Never a dull day," he said adding that "A Taste of History" draws in quite a few visitors. "It's really getting to be a popular weekend, especially if we have nice days."

During "A Taste of History," culinary demonstrations representing America's cultural and ethnic heritage will take place throughout the Village.

"I guess the old saying, 'you are what you eat,' is appropriate," said Diane Thomas, Greenfield Village spokeswoman. "You can discover how people used the resources available to put food on the table. You can see how people brought their ethnic traditions to the table."

Preniczky will be making "Poor Man's Lemon Pie" in the George Matthew Adams House, once a Baptist parsonage in the mid-1800s. Back then, when lemons were in short supply, inventive cooks substituted vinegar. But Preniczky said there's no need to pucker your lips.

"We use apple cider vinegar, sugar, and a little lemon. You really can't taste a strong vinegar flavor," he said.

"It's mostly the cider and lemon. Just a small hint of vinegar."

Besides the pie, which is part of an old-fashioned church picnic menu at the Adams House, Preniczky and his sweet-loving crew will prepare huge amounts of Indian pudding, rice corn bread, Irish apple cake, and German pepper nuts.

When asked if he ever overdoses on sweets, Preniczky chuckled before answering.

"No," he finally said. "But that's a fun question. I just do a little taste test to test the quality of things. Really, my job involves checking the quality and overseeing the production."

Besides the fabulous sweets produced in Preniczky's kitchens, sample-size portions of soups, stews, meat pies and vegetable dishes will be served in a tasting tent on the Village Green. Food samples cost 25 to 75 cents. Tickets are sold at the tent.

In addition to food sampling, "A Taste of History" offers lots of family activities including potato sack races, pie eating contests and an edible auction.

Beaulieu Vineyard is back on the fast track



According to recent statistics reported by Gombert, Fredrikson and Associates, wine industry analysts, table wine sales reached a record \$2.6 billion last year. Fueled by strong consumer demand for premium varietal wines, California table wine sales grew five per-

cent, turning in the strongest performance in more than a decade.

The growing popularity of red wines and robust chardonnays were the key trends contributing to strong growth and revitalization for some California producers - Napa Valley's Beaulieu Vineyard is one of them. New releases from this legendary winery are turning heads. They turned ours too.

In late winter, the 1990 Georges de Latour Private Reserve Cabernet Sauvignon was released. As a fabled 100 percent Cabernet Sauvignon wine, it has always carried a hefty price tag. This bottling was no exception at \$40, however the wine underwent substantial refinements. The addition of merlot as a blending varietal and aging in 50 percent French oak made this a stunning wine.

Beaulieu winemaker Joel Aiken related some history about the Georges de Latour Private Reserve, a wine we had presumed was always 100 percent Cabernet and always aged in 100 percent American oak.

"When we did some research, we found out that

GRILLED VEGETABLES WITH OREGANO OIL

- 1/2 cup olive oil
 - 1 medium clove garlic, minced fine
 - 1 tablespoon minced oregano or 1 teaspoon dried and crushed
 - 1 medium eggplant, sliced 1/2 inch thick
 - 1 large zucchini, sliced diagonally 1/2 inch thick
 - 1 large red or green pepper cut into strips 1/2 inch wide
 - 1 large red onion, cut into 1/4 inch thick slices
 - 2 teaspoons balsamic vinegar
- Combine olive oil, garlic and oregano in a bowl and mix well

Preheat the grill. Brush the vegetables lightly with some of the oil mixture. Place on the grill and sprinkle with little salt and pepper. Cover grill and cook vegetables, turning frequently and brushing with the oil mixture until tender, about 10-12 minutes. Transfer vegetables to a platter and sprinkle with balsamic vinegar. Serves 4.

GRILLED LEMON BROCCOLI WITH GARLIC OIL

- 2 medium cloves garlic, minced fine
 - 1/2 cup olive oil
 - 1 bunch broccoli, cut into spears
 - 1 large lemon, cut into 8 thin slices
 - 1 teaspoon juice from the lemon
- Salt and fresh ground pepper

to taste. Mix the garlic and the oil in a small bowl, set aside. Bring 4 quarts of water to a boil with 2 tea spoons salt. Add broccoli and blanch for about 2 minutes. Drain and refresh under cold water.

Heat grill. Brush broccoli with some of the garlic oil. Place broccoli on a grill rack and cook, turning occasionally while brushing with the oil for 10 minutes. Brush lemon slices with the oil and cook over the grill for about 1 minute on each side. Transfer broccoli and lemon slices to a serving platter. Drizzle with lemon juice and remaining garlic oil. Season with a pinch of salt and good crackling of fresh ground pepper. Serves 4.

VEGETABLES IN FOIL

- 8 ounces green beans,

- trimmed (about 1 cup)
 - 1 yellow pepper, sliced thin, lengthwise
 - 1 small red pepper, sliced thin, lengthwise
 - 1 large leek, rinsed and sliced crosswise (or 1 bunch green onions)
 - 8 teaspoons olive oil
 - 8 teaspoons red or white wine
 - 2 teaspoons minced marjoram or 1/4 teaspoon dried
- Salt and pepper to taste

Cut four 24 by 12-inch pieces of foil. Fold each piece in half to make four 12 by 12-inch sheets. Center a portion of each vegetable on each sheet. Drizzle each sheet with 2 teaspoons oil and 2 teaspoons wine. Season each sheet with a pinch of marjoram, salt and pepper. Bring the four corners of each piece of foil together and crimp to make a sealed packet. Preheat grill. Cook vegetables until tender, about 15-20 minutes. Serve immediately. Serves 4.

the very first Private Reserves made by legendary Andre Tchelistcheff did have some merlot and were aged in French oak," he said.

"In 1938, when Tchelistcheff first came to Beaulieu, the 1936 vintage was still in barrel. Those 60 barrels were all French oak. Beaulieu didn't switch to American oak until 1939, when the onset of World War II made it impossible to obtain French oak."

"Back then, American oak was basically whiskey barrels, bent over steam and not charred. American oak became an established tradition over a period of years. Merlot has been added for a touch of softness, not to impose any of its own character on the wine."

Aiken also pointed out that using tightly grained French oak mellows cabernet's natural tannin

structure. A medium-heavy toast level specified for coopering helps reduce tannin levels and offers flavor subtleties.

Also sporting refinements in label design, this wine indeed honors an ages-old tradition and brings the wine to fast-track competition in the ultra-premium cabernet sauvignon market segment.

Fast on the heels of the refined Private Reserve, came Beaulieu's introduction of a Signet Collection and its inaugural release, the 1990 Tapestry, a red Bordeaux varietal blend and a new competitor in the Meritage category.

Aiken said the Signet Collection wines give Beaulieu's winemaking team freedom to experiment with different varietals. In her song, Carole King defined the Tapestry of life as "... an ever-lasting vision of an everchanging

view," Aiken said. "This describes our directional plan."

The 1990 Beaulieu Tapestry, \$20, is 40 percent cabernet sauvignon, 32 percent merlot and 28 percent cabernet franc with blackberry, currant, black cherry, black raspberry and fine tobacco aromas. With 20 months, French oak aging, it's rich and finesseful, structured for cellaring.

Other wines, not yet released, but planned for the Signet Collection are Maestro Pinot Noir, a tribute to Andre Tchelistcheff; a Napa Valley Zinfandel; and Rhone varietal blends. Watch for them. Beaulieu is a winery back on the fast track of premium wine production in California's Napa Valley.

Poon Mays Lemon Pie

1 cup sugar
1 1/2 cups water
3 tablespoons cornstarch, dissolved in 1/2 cup water
2 tablespoons butter
3 eggs, separated, yolks slightly beaten
3 tablespoons cider vinegar
1/2 teaspoon salt (less than 1/4 teaspoon)
1 teaspoon lemon juice
9 tablespoons sugar
Unbaked 8 or 9 inch pastry shell

Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. Mix one cup sugar and water and bring to a boil. Stir in dissolved cornstarch/water mixture. Boil until clear and thick. Remove from heat.

Add butter, beaten yolks, vinegar, lemon juice and salt. Stir well and pour into unbaked pie shell. Bake 1/2 hour.

The recipe for Smothered Pork Chops represents a recipe Grace Matton of Georgia may have prepared for her family during the Great Depression. Her home, the Mattox House, has been moved to Greenfield Village.

Beat egg whites until foamy, then slowly add 9 tablespoons of sugar, one tablespoon at a time. Beat until stiff. Spread meringue over pie. Bake an additional 15 minutes until top is golden brown. Cool. Store in refrigerator.

Recipe from Chef Tom Prenczky, Henry Ford Museum, Greenfield Village.

SMOTHERED PORK CHOPS

6 (1-inch thick) center-cut pork chops
2 tablespoons bacon drippings (or substitute your choice of oil)
1 lemon, thinly sliced
2 medium-sized onions, thinly sliced
1 small green and/or red bell pepper, cored and sliced into rings
4 large ripe tomatoes, peeled, seeded, and coarsely chopped
1 cup water
2 tablespoons distilled white vinegar
Pinch of ground cloves, allspice, cinnamon, celery seed, cayenne pepper
2 tablespoons sugar
Salt and freshly ground pepper, to taste

Brown the pork chops in bacon drippings in a heavy skillet. Add lemon and onion and bell pepper slices, and continue to saute. Mix tomatoes, water, vinegar, spices, sugar, salt and pepper in a small bowl until they are a thick sauce. Pour over pork chops. Cover skillet and simmer the pork chops over medium heat for 45 minutes, or until they are tender and the tomato mixture has turned into a gravylike sauce.

Smothered pork chops are usually served with rice, so that the sauce from the chops can become the gravy for the rice.

Adapted from a Grace Matton recipe. The Mattox house from Georgia was lived in from the late 1870s to early 1940s by three generations of one African American family. Smothered Pork Chops represents a

recipe Grace may have prepared for her family during the Great Depression. The Mattox House was moved to Greenfield Village.

BEATEN BISCUITS ON MARYLAND BISCUITS

1/4 teaspoon sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 cups sifted flour
1/4 cup butter or other shortening
1/2 cup milk

Sift sugar and salt with flour, blend in shortening and just enough milk to make a very stiff dough. Knead on floured board until dough becomes soft and pliable.

Run dough through a meat grinder or a biscuit machine using a coarse knife or beat steadily with a wooden potato masher for 30 minutes, or until dough blisters, keeping edges turned in.

Roll to 1/4-inch thickness, cut with a biscuit cutter for round cookies (cutters), prick with a fork and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 30 minutes. The biscuits should be a very delicate ivory color, make about 150 dozen biscuits.

Adapted from "Mrs. Owens' Cook Book," 1884 and "U.S. Regional Cookbook," 1947. This recipe is typical of foods prepared in the western Maryland in the 1800s.



Looks a little like an updated tuxedo with pinnae. Add Oscar de la Renta's black straw hat adorned with cotton pique bows (\$39.90). Finally, the short

satin and Lycra dress for dancing under the stars. Though it may look a little prom-like, the satin/Lycra combination is a hot new trend for summer. A halter neckline or spaghetti straps accent the form-fitting bodice, while the mini-skirt is full and swingy. Shown in electric blue, this easy special-occasion dress is available at Hudson's. Look for similar styles at Saks and Neiman's.

And to wrap up your summer party frock? Toss a large square silk chiffon scarf over your shoulders (\$100 at Saks). You'll be the belle of the backyard ball.

Shop caters to folks fighting addictions



Ever need words of encouragement? The proprietors of a new shop insist that sooner or later everyone does for one reason or another. They hope to be able to help.

Jon Lightfoot and Annette Lewis opened The One Stop Serenity Shop in Plymouth with two thoughts in mind.

First, they wanted to help customers celebrate their triumphs over addictive behaviors; and second, they hoped to renew the strength needed on a daily basis to maintain recovery.

Lightfoot, 22, knows that battling an addiction is never easy. The Plymouth native is a recovering alcoholic. He and Lewis started the shop to educate and service the local community.

The store is patterned after similar stores in California that cater to the needs of people in recovery. To launch the store, the pair invested half of the profits from their year-old Wellington Fragrance Company, marketing incense at the Countryside Craft Mall as well as the Gibraltar Trade Center.

Most of The One Stop Serenity Shop's merchandise is aimed at people taking part in the 12 Step Programs of groups that include Alcoholics Anonymous, Narcotics Anonymous, and Al-Anon. The shop also carries items for those trying to quit

smoking. Customers will find motivational materials like books, tapes, literature, t-shirts, posters, coffee mugs, and greeting cards lining the shelves.

And the store tries to help those affected by addictions. Family and friends of people in recovery, as well as those still drowning in their addiction, can find a friendly ear here.

"When my drinking was out of control, my mom and dad had nowhere to go when they needed help," Lightfoot said. "The One Stop Serenity Shop is not behind closed doors. We're here to help the community. If people have a family member or friend with a problem they can come in, talk, get literature. We'll steer them in the right direction."

Lightfoot said he began drinking at age 15. In the years that followed, he lost two close friends in drinking and driving accidents. While living in California, he faced the decision about the road his own life would take. He sought treatment. Afterward, Lightfoot decided to dedicate part of his life toward helping others recovering from addictions.

"If even one life is saved by the efforts of The One Stop Serenity Shop,

then the store will be a success," he insisted. "We're a way for people to celebrate their recovery. We have all kinds of merchandise here. You can apply the 12 Step Program to anything — overeating, controlling emotions like grief, or anyone working on self-esteem. Everyone can benefit from a 12 Step Program."

Lightfoot attends AA meetings weekly despite the fact he's been in recovery nearly five years. He designed a line of inspirational T-shirts for the shop. Ten different

image ranging from angels to a guy hanging from a rope above an alligator pit sport sayings like "Sometimes, all we can do is hang on!"

Lightfoot met customer and friend, Michael Miller, 21, while both were students at Plymouth Salem High School. Both took the road to alcoholism and drug addiction. A drinker from the age of 11, Miller said he "drank because of peer pressure and to get away from my problems." Today he's into the martial arts instead, hav-

ing left behind the bottle 8 1/2 years ago. He recently visited the shop.

"This really is a specialty shop," Miller said. "It's a positive way to reinforce recovery," he said.

Co-owner Annette Lewis graduated from John Glenn High School in Westland. She talked about the need to send works of encouragement to loved ones fighting addictive behaviors.

"Our books, tapes, posters and T-shirts send a positive kind of note. A card or coin (marking the anniversary of time spent in recovery) is a perfect way to let someone know you're proud of them," she said.

Customer Michael March, 20, of Canton Township especially liked the coins. A member of Alcoholics Anonymous for the last 2 1/2 years, she deals daily with her father's and brother's alcoholism.

"It's taking it one day at a time," she said. "When it gets to where I can't take it anymore, I just get out and come some place like here. It's nice to be able to come to a store like this in the middle of the community. The coins are a nice way of seeing your growth."

The One Stop Serenity Shop is at 470 Forest Ave. Downtown Plymouth. It's open daily from 10 a.m. For more information call (313) 450-9030.

Ancient Rome and Renaissance England better understood the need for urban recreation than does modern Michigan, say Joey Spano and her friends.

"One of our highest environmental risks has turned out to be the degradation of our urban environment — lack of open space, diminishing recreational opportunities, decaying parks and community centers," said Spano, a member of the state Natural Resources Commission and chair of the urban recreation task force.

"It's been a battle. People tend to vote in parks and recreation money last, but recreation programs are the first to go (in a budget crunch). I'm talking about kids in suburbia as well as De-

troit. We've got kids here drinking in third grade."

Appointed by Gov. John Engler in 1991, Spano is the first parks and rec professional ever to serve on the Natural Resources Commission, a body generally populated by old-time hunters and anglers and a few environmentalists.

Since 1992 Spano has directed the West Bloomfield Township parks and recreation program and soon will shift jobs to work in community education for her local school district. That will give her a chance to practice what her task force preached: cooperation between general government, school districts and the state in providing urban recreation. Key tools: taking inventories of what's available, making joint use of facilities, promoting their use.

Many natural resources fans knock Engler for his Caesar-like emphasis on business growth. Not Joey Spano, though she's apolitical. "Obviously, there's an interest in the governor's office," she said.

She recalled the aggressive way Engler interviewed her for the NRC post four years ago. "He asked me tough questions. He was right in my face." She counts him a fan of revitalized urban recreation.

"One of our highest environmental risks has turned out to be the degradation of our urban environment — lack of open space, diminishing recreational opportunities, decaying parks and community centers."

Her task force had support from Eric Reichel, former county parks chief in Oakland and Wayne, now in Lansing; as well as mayors and city managers in Kalamazoo and Grand Rapids; and many professionals.

"I want to get (Department of Natural Resources) staff and resources assigned (to urban recreation)," Spano said, noting the DNR already has appointed long-time employee Ron Spitzer as urban fisheries biologist. And there is renewed talk of connecting existing open space on the Detroit River front in a single, long path.

Spano praised Detroit Mayor Dennis Archer and his parks director, Ernest Burkes, for reopening recreation centers, particularly in the Seven Mile-Dequindre area of northeast Detroit, where she grew up and learned sports.

She has her own accomplishments. "When I came here in 1982, we had 57 acres of parks. Today, we have more than 400 acres, with a millage, state and federal grants," she said. "But it's been a battle."

Spano's urban task force isn't looking for vast sums of new mon-

ey or land. "We're not trying to reinvent the wheel and acquire great acreages. We have to make the best use of very limited dollars. We (the state) own two-thirds of the Upper Peninsula now. How much more land do we need?"

After 18 months of work and public hearings, her task force on June 19 recommended:

• A state DNR inventory of park facilities and needs in urban areas, with an eye out for "regional" parks that serve multiple communities.

• DNR cooperation with urban governments, police and parks professionals to assure safety in parks.

• Environmental programs for urban and suburban kids. "We need to teach youth respect for natural resources — give them positive experiences in camping, fishing, walking through woods. Our natural resources are second to none in the world. Can they (kids) experience it instead of seeing it on video?"

• State help to cities, townships and schools in recycling tax-reverted land, abandoned sites, empty school buildings and other surplus properties for parks and recreation.

• Aggressive promotion of the benefits of parks and recreation. "That sounds self-serving," she said, "but if we don't get out and beat the drums, nobody's going to do it for us. We need quality recreation for families."

She paused.

"If I could do anything in my four years (on NRC), it would be this and the Rails-to-Trails plan. I've been the most vocal proponent of Rails-to-Trails. But we now have a group called TART — Taxpayers Against Rails-to-Trails. Their attitude seems 'NIMBY: not in my back yard. I don't want to see people.'"

"We feel we have to justify the importance of parks and recreation in our society. Many times public officials forget that parks enhance the quality of life and relieve social programs."





from Ron Mason and he says he's interested. Brusseau said. All you hear around here is Michigan and I've always disliked Michigan and I'd like State I will love it (wearing MSU green). It's the best feeling in the whole world.

Brusseau led CU to the 1994 Class A state championship, the school's first ever hockey state title. He was first team all state and an All-Observer goalie as a senior, recording a 1.45 goals against average with five shut outs.

But it's hard for high school players to get college hockey scholarships. Just ask current Dallas Stars forward Mike Donnelly, who was not offered a scholarship after scoring more than 50 goals in his senior year at Livonia Franklin during the 1990-91 season.

Donnelly ended up playing a year of junior hockey after high school, then went on to star at MSU.

It sounds like a script Brusseau could like.

My first goal is to just play the second is to play well, said Brusseau. He's 6'7, 175 pounds.

Neither Mason or Barons coach Tim Alexander were available for comments.

Brusseau is expected to battle sophomore to be Chad Alban for the starting job. Alban, who played for the Kalamazoo Jr Wings in high school, played 13 games last year.

MSU finished 25-12-3 overall and lost to the University of Wisconsin in the first round of the NCAA tournament last year. The Spartans were third in the Central Collegiate Hockey Association with a 17-7-3 record.

MSU last won a national championship in 1986 and was runner up in '87. The Spartans were third in both '89 and '92.

The Spartans lost seven players to graduation, including three on the power play. Their top player, All-American Anson Carter, is expected back for his senior year.

Brusseau had a 3.5 goals against average and 91.1 save percentage for the Barons, who finished fourth in the regular season but lost in the final round of the NAJHL playoffs.

Brusseau said the area he improved in mostly was protecting

and deflecting rebounds.

"I got better either trying to absorb them or deflect them where I wanted them to go," Brusseau said. "It is a step up from high school, I definitely improved a little on everything."

The Barons played about 60 games, compared to a high school schedule of about 25. Another thing junior hockey taught Brusseau was how to endure long road trips.

"I got pretty good at card games (on the bus)," said Brusseau, who also had a job on an assembly line that paid \$5.35 an hour.

Brusseau said his style is a lot like that of Chicago Blackhawks' star Ed Belfour, who likes to use his stick along the ice. It's not the preferred style in the Brusseau home.

"My dad (Norm) and I sit and watch hockey on TV, and he always says me and Belfour are identical, putting the paddle of the stick on the ice opens up too many other areas," Mike said. "But hey, it's working for him."

Heights feel guilty about attending last week's Rich Heinz Goalie School at Redford Ice Arena.

Because at age 28, Klemann is only a kid at heart.

"My wife (Kim) and all my friends think I'm crazy, they're all concerned whether I can stay alive, and me, too," Klemann said, sitting in a dressing room following a Monday workout with about 20 kids half his age. "But I want to learn more skills. I have a 1 1/2 year old son who someday I'd like to pass along knowledge to."

The camp came at a good time for Klemann, who was off from his job at Ford Motor Co. due to a two-week shut-down at the Michigan Truck Plant in Wayne. The first week off, he and his wife vacationed in Petoskey.

"She'd rather have me at home, but fair is fair - one week for her, one for me," said Klemann, who plays Senior Tier A hockey.

Heinz, who played five years in the National Hockey League, mostly as a backup goaltender with the St. Louis Blues and Vancouver Canucks, welcomes anyone over the age of 7.

It's still growing

Heinz started his goalie schools seven years ago with two camps in his hometown of Toronto, Ont. The number grew

to 30 last year and this summer his camps are at 84 sites, five in Michigan.

Heinz has schools in Los Angeles, Las Vegas and as far south as Dallas. He will be back in the Detroit area Aug. 21-28, when his school will be held at the City Sports Center in downtown Detroit.

Heinz said when he was learning to play as a kid, there were no camps specifically for goalies.

Heinz sets up several different stations, including one that specializes in stick handling, a skill which has become increasingly important over the years to goaltenders.

"Camps were dedicated to shooters; all the goalies were targets," Heinz said. "They'd put the goalies in the net, bring in shooters and say, 'Stand there and take a blast.' The parents got ripped off."

"Goalie play has improved overall. Look at the NHL, you see guys with 2-point-something goals-against averages."

This is the fifth year Heinz has been in Redford. The regional coordinator is Cheryl Rivard, whose son John is a veteran camper.

Heinz's camp is held 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. daily. He brings a full-time staff to all the sites and also gets help from local high school standouts. At last week's camp, Redford Catholic Central players

former and present Neil Brechen, Matt Giordano, Nick Kalanicki, Dan Hunt, Tony Spasia, Jeff Helmer, Bob Bushman and Brad Prysiocki were shooters.

"For the little kids, I try to cheat at their pads to give them more confidence," said Prysiocki, of Livonia. "Against the big kids, I'm going all out to score."

One of the goalie instructors was Canton resident Steacy Chuhman, 18, one of the top-flight female goalies in the state. "I know she's good because she uses to play for the team my brother Aaron played on," said Ryan Zielinski, 18, a camper from Canton.

Good company

Heinz said three former campers and instructors, Mike Torchia, Rob Dopek and Derek Wilkinson, are now playing in the NHL. Torchia is with the Dallas Stars, Dopek with the Pittsburgh Penguins and Wilkinson with the Tampa Bay Lightning.

Heinz might not ever see or hear again from Klemann, but the two share a special bond that Heinz doesn't have with most campers.





WRITE IT AND REAP!

Writing a classified ad that gets results—whether it be for real estate, employment, the personals, transportation, or merchandise—is easy if you follow the guidelines below.




1. Give the reader specific information. Pretend you are someone reading the classifieds. What would you like to know about the item, service or job you are advertising? Be sure to add details such as color, size, condition, brand name, age, features and benefits. Be accurate! Don't embellish your ad with misleading information. Stick to the facts and reap the rewards!



2. Include the price. Don't waste your time or a potential buyer's time. If you advertise the price of the item or service you offer, the people who respond to your ad will be those who are genuinely interested. Surveys show that readers are more interested in those items and services they know are within their price range.



3. Avoid abbreviations. Don't make a potential customer work too hard! Although you may be tempted to cut down on the cost of your ad by using abbreviations, surveys indicate that many people don't understand such abbreviations as EIK (eat-in kitchen) or WSW (white side wall tires) and won't take the time to figure them out. A confused reader is a disinterested reader. Get the most for your money and use complete words.



4. Include phone number and specify hours. Be sure to let potential customers know when and where to call. Surveys show that even if a person is very interested in your item or service, he or she will not call back after the first attempt. Stay near the phone during the hours you indicate you will be available. Don't risk missing a sale!



5. Run on consecutive days. Your ad will not get results if people don't see it! Therefore, it is important to set up a consistent and consecutive ad schedule with your telephone salesperson or outside sales representative.
