





Attorney remembers G. Romney from 1960s

George Romney's death Wednesday sparked some memories for Plymouth attorney John Stewart, who met the former governor in 1963.

"I was a Boy Scout honor guard working in the fort on Mackinac Island. I went down every morning and raised the flag on the governor's mansion," said Stewart, who grew up in Wyandotte.


"There was Lenore on the porch drinking an orange juice, and George was out on the lawn swinging a golf club," he said.

The governor eventually came to the Scout barracks one Sunday night for ice cream and a softball game.

"He shook hands with every one of us," Stewart said, explaining a large framed photo he owns that captures the moment.

"He stepped on the field and was

Dispatchers' contract

Plymouth Township trustees on Tuesday approved a labor contract with police dispatch operators calling for a 3-percent raise retroactive to July 1, 1994, and a 2-percent increase from July 1 this year until the contract expires Dec. 31.

There are three full-time and seven part-time dispatchers.

Paving proposed

Plymouth Township trustees on Tuesday approved an engineering study on the paving of Oakview Avenue in the Green Meadows subdivision, as 37 of 55 property owners with frontage on the street — 67.3 percent — have signed petitions saying they want paving.

PLYMOUTH PIPELINE

The percentage of homeowners based on linear feet fronting the street is 63.5 percent, according to the Department of Public Services' review of the petition. The minimum percentage required for the board to approve a paving study is 60 percent, by board policy.

The board approved spending no more than \$6,000 in costs to take soil borings, schedule meetings with county officials to review plans, and costs to advertise public hearings related to the paving.

while part of Northville schools and assume new debt in our area. They were paying two different entities the way I understand it. They should be paying the 2.08 mills.

However, a review of Salem Township tax records by the South Lyon Herald newspaper revealed that the property owners have been paying a \$4 Northville debt retirement mill, but no Plymouth Canton debt retirement mill.

If anything is owed we have to look into it," said Ray Hoedel, Plymouth Canton associate superintendent for business. "Northville seems to be very clear. The bottom line is we have to see the actual tax statements to determine what they are charged and what district they paid."

While the schools supply the sum up front within the district with tax information, it's the municipalities that the school district which prepares and sends the tax bills, said Hoedel.

Hoedel has scheduled a meeting with Northville officials

early for Aug. 8 to investigate the matter. The Wayne County intermediate school district is also researching the situation.

Diane Barnes, director of finance for Plymouth Canton, said the \$2.08 mill debt retirement levy amounts to an annual total of \$668 in what is called "Plymouth Northville" school district. She said she gets her instruction about whom to tax from the Wayne County assessor's department because the district is primarily in Wayne County.

Gary Evansko, director of assessment and equalization for Wayne County, says his office concerns itself only with Wayne County land. My reporting ends at the county line," he said.

Salem Township treasurer Dick Rhinehart, who sends out the tax bills, said he depends on the schools for information about tax rates. He said he was not aware of a problem with the transfer. His trust.

At least one property owner in the district, Kent Stanbury, grew up in the transfer district. Stan-

bury, who attended Plymouth schools in the '50s, said some of his neighbors went to Plymouth schools and others to Northville schools. Kids up the road went to Northville, and I went to Plymouth, he said. It was my choosing. There was always a dispute about where the boundary was at the time.

Stanbury said he is unaware of anything amiss with his tax bill.

It's unclear exactly how much tax revenue is involved, or whether it can be recovered.

"The amount won't be overwhelming. I think it's just 11 parcels," said Hoedel. Pinpointing the amount of revenue involved is so complicated. I wouldn't even venture to guess until after an investigation," he added.

"I have no conclusions to draw on. When we went through bond programs in 1986 and 1991, we restructured the existing debt. Some of the old debt was at a high interest rate, so we comingle some of the old debt to get a net decrease in our interest costs. In our financial analysis, that would have to

be considered."

As for whether taxes could be levied retroactively, Hoedel said he'd have to consult the district's tax attorney.

"There may be a limitation of a number of years that we could go back," he said.

Hoben said the boundary dispute first came to light "when someone from town moved out there, went to vote, and couldn't. He found out he (and the eight or nine other families sending their children to Plymouth-Canton schools) were not in our district. That started the procedure. The onus is on the school with the illegal students," said Hoben.

The district faced the possibility of a stiff fine.

"Jerry Dunn (a lobbyist with the Michigan Association for Improved School Legislation) got a one liner change in state aid act. The amount of money he saved us paid our MAISL dues for a number of years."

They were very honest, they said. They treated the statement seriously, said a spokesman for the company. It's important to them that it didn't have to attend to operate in Michigan without the tax break.

While she said the company has enough space to build light truck frames at its Milwaukee headquarters, they wanted to be closer to their customers, she said.

A.O. Smith President Sam Licavoli said the 220,000-square-foot, \$65 million plant will begin making frames for the Chrysler Corp.'s new Dakota truck next summer, adding the plant is to hire 247 employees by 1997.

He said the company reviewed plant sites in Wisconsin, Ohio

and Ontario, but the tax breaks offered in Michigan sparked the decision to build here.

Thanks to the MEGA grant, from a total cost standpoint this facility will offer attractive opportunities for our customers and us, especially in terms of transportation and inventory carrying costs, Licavoli said.

McCarthy said a range of jobs will be created at the plant, including jobs for workers with high school diplomas.

Doug Rothwell, the MEGA board's chairman and CEO of the Michigan Jobs Commission, said that in addition to A.O. Smith's 247 jobs an additional 623 spin-off jobs will also be created.

Speed limit on Morton Taylor remains at 40

when crossing guards are gone; the amount of traffic on the road now; the lack of sidewalks between Arlington and Candlewood; and the expected increase in traffic when Morton Taylor is extended south of Warren to Ford Road.

In addition to the speed study, Wayne County conducted what is called a gap study, which involves determining how many gaps exist in traffic at a certain time of day and how much time is allowed for crossings in those gaps, according to Vicki Holland, Wayne County assistant engineer.

Holland said that the study showed that at approximately 2 p.m. on the study day, 56 gaps were available in 30 minutes allowing groups of 10 people to cross the road.

"I think the traffic light is a stronger possibility than sidewalks," said Canton Supervisor Tom Yack. "I think it would be wise to see the impact of a traffic light for safety."

A traffic light costs approximately \$50,000, while sidewalks in the area would prove more costly at about \$130,000 because of the need to cross a creek in the area.

"We will have that resolved by the night of the meeting," Santomauro said, referring to traffic lights and sidewalks.

The 40 mph speed limit and safety concerns on Morton Taylor were highlighted by concerned parents in the Mayfair and Windsor Park subdivisions earlier this spring. The speed limit used to be 35 mph.

The public safety department requested the traffic study from Wayne County after it received 10-12 letters from concerned parents who requested a lower speed on the roadway crossed by children on their way to Hulsing.

Parents had expressed concern about the ability of the two crossing guards to stop traffic traveling 40 mph; the lack of plans for a traffic signal; the difficulty to cross the road after school hours

Guitar store hopes to drum up plenty of business in Plymouth

The new Plymouth Guitar Gallery on Penniman adds more variety to the business mix downtown.

Owner Fred Sanderson worked more than 10 years ago with his brother at Dave Richards' music store in Livonia, then left to work as jazz guitarist Earl Klugh's road manager for five years.

After putting in another five in lighting and sound for concerts, he'd had enough.

"I've been to Carnegie Hall, L.A., but none of it did it for me," said Sanderson. "It wasn't like the guitar shop. I thought I'd try it again."

He found a space just west of the National Bank of Detroit building, and with the help of friends, began renovating it April 1. "I have friends in every trade, carpentry, roofing — a lot of them are guitar players," he said.

"I figured I saved \$15,000," he said. Then again, those friends could be back, looking for a deal on a new or used guitar.

Sanderson plans to be a dealer for Alvarez guitars, a mid-priced, high quality brand. But he'll also carry guitars on consignment, and other acoustics and electrics.

The store also stocks a range of guitar accessories, and microphones and public address equipment. "We'll have anything a guitar player would need to do a live performance," he explained.

There are also two studio rooms for lessons, and Sanderson can do guitar adjustments and repairs in the shop. "And I do it right in front of them," he said.

"It's going to be a little more community oriented," he said, adding many music stores focus more on sales than service.

The store also stocks a range of guitar accessories, and microphones and public address equipment. The store will have anything a guitar player would need to do a live performance.

"We're interested in kids getting off on the right foot. This isn't just a rock shop. I want parents to know there's no drugs around here. We're pretty serious about cleaning up the image of the guitar. I'm going for the students, the beginners. It's a pretty serious place, it's not just a discount house," he said.

What's special about guitars? "They travel well. Beethoven said it was like a miniature orchestra," said Sanderson, a finger-style acoustic jazz player.

On a recent Thursday afternoon, there was plenty of talk of guitars and guitarists among Sanderson, his business partner Pamela Ransford, salesman Nick Farrell, and a half-dozen patrons. Talk ranged from the merits of well-known guitarists Keith Richards and James Burton to the different woods used in Fender Telecasters and Gibson Les Pauls.

Sanderson will present the Perry Hughes Trio at the store at a grand opening Aug. 20. "I was in Baker's (Keyboard Lounge) one night. George Benson came in and said this guy's the best guy in the United States — That's a pretty good compliment."

"This is just a kind of religion for me," Sanderson said.

Store hours are 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Friday and 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday.

Amoco will not meet 1995 cleanup deadline

To the disappointment of many, it appears Amoco Oil was overly optimistic five years ago when it said contamination at its closed downtown gas station would be removed by 1995.

City and Department of Natural Resources officials say cleanup of contaminated soil and groundwater is ongoing, and that Amoco has given them no indication of a targeted completion date.

That comes as bad news at a time when the rest of the downtown area is being given a face lift as part of the streetscape project.

"We obviously would like to see something on that property in terms of improvements," said Stephen Guile, director of Plymouth's Downtown Development Authority. "We're going to try to get back with Amoco toward the end of the year, once the streetscape is completed. We'll see what the status is in terms of cleanup. I'm not sure if 1995 is realistic."

For years, waste oil and fuel oil seeped from Amoco's underground storage tanks, and the site was placed on a DNR list of contaminated sites in 1979. The service station on Ann Arbor Trail at Main Street closed in 1990 after the cleanup was ordered by the DNR.

Janet Mosher, DNR environmental quality analyst, said the DNR's last correspondence with Amoco was in March 1994. "It says they have installed a remediation system, and that as of that date, it had been operating for 439 days," she said. "The system treated 546,644 gallons of ground water, recovering toluene and benzene." Benzene is a carcinogen.

"We assume the system is still in operation. Unfortunately, with the recent changes in state law, they really don't have to send us another report until they are ready for closure," Mosher said.

"It seems like they owe Plymouth something, after what we've had to look at for a few years," she said. Toney said she wrote Amoco "a couple different times, requesting that they consider giving the property to the community. We are always in need of more restrooms during festivals, and we requested use of their restrooms for that purpose. Quite frankly, we never got any kind of reply." Chamber board members met some time ago with an Amoco representative, which also was unfruitful,

"Amoco does the absolute minimum to the outside of the building and property in general. Certainly, people aren't excited about the current condition of that corner. But there are a multitude of things happening in the background that really don't allow it to get to a point of being what people want to see at that prime location in our downtown."

she said.

Repeated attempts by the Observer to reach Amoco officials were unsuccessful.

"I do know people interested in buying the property who've contacted Amoco," added Toney. "One person indicated that if he were to buy it, he would rebuild and the chamber could lease it. I think everyone would be very happy to just have the property put into some (kind) of proper use, rather than just sitting there. The upkeep hasn't been that good, either."


"We definitely want to see something exciting happen on that corner. It's a really important location," she said.

Some have proposed that the site be used for a park. Others, including Plymouth building official Jim Penn, have suggested a retail use — other than a gas station — that would add to the tax base. "I don't want to see it used as a park, but as something that would complement the downtown area," said Penn.

Sincock says things will remain at a standstill for the time being.

"At this point, there aren't a lot of options. The land in its present condition is not sellable. They need the building on the site. Basically, it's jammed with equipment involved in the cleanup," he said.

"I understand it's going to be a long process," said Penn. "Really, nothing has changed."

Canton booms with fast track for industry

It's not just the housing boom that's drawing attention to Canton. Industry is setting its own track record.

"I think there is a big upsurge everywhere in industrial growth," said Jeff Goulet, Canton community planner.

What makes Canton attractive for locating industry is the administrative — not legislative — process that business owners go through in the township. Industrial projects are reviewed and approved by the planning staff without having to go through the Planning Commission and Township Board.

"With Canton, we are on the fast track for industrial. That's an incentive. We have cut two to four weeks out of the in-house approval," Goulet said.

So far this year, Canton is welcoming an additional 360,864 square feet of industrial uses. That's compared to a total of 560,000 square feet in 1994. Also significant is that in 1994, a lot of the square footage was devoted to warehousing and distribution. Companies that are either newly locating or expanding in Canton this year will use more equipment and will provide Canton with more personal property to tax.

"Most of the new companies are in manufacturing or testing. We are seeing smaller manufacturing companies," Goulet said. For example, Antech, south of Koppernick and east of Lilley, is a tool and die company, while International Hardcoat, south of Michigan, west of Haggerty, is an anodizing company.

"We are really increasing our employment base in the industrial sector," Goulet said.

This year is bringing new companies and companies that are expanding to Canton primarily in the Koppernick area, Ronda Drive, Haggerty and Michigan Avenue.

Canton leads region in house building

The American dream is alive in Canton Township with a combination of income, home equity and a series of housing upgrades. It's no secret that housing is booming in the township.

Canton has been recognized as the leader in new, single family housing starts in this region, according to the recently-released "Residential Construction in Southeast Michigan for 1994" report from the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments.

The report states that Canton had 773 single family housing starts in 1994, leading all communities in Wayne, Washtenaw, Oakland, Macomb, St. Clair, Livingston and Monroe counties," said Casey Hans of the Canton Municipal Services Information Office. "Macomb Township in Macomb County was just behind Canton with 692."

Canton logged 350 single family housing starts in 1993 and 559 in 1992, before jumping to 773 during the past year. "That means since 1992 these figures have increased more than 100 percent," Hans said. "Canton ranks just outside the Macomb County communities of Clinton and Clinton Township this year in total permits issued, including multi-family units. Most of Canton's new residential construction is in the area of single family homes."

The 1994 figures show 100 percent growth in new, single family building permits have been issued in the last three years. This compares with 200 during the same time period in 1993. About 75 percent of new homes in Southeast Michigan have been built since 1992, the first year home values had seen an increase in

"We have land available on the south side of Koppernick, east of I-275. There's a lot of land that's not even developed."

Recreational facilities are also coming into industrial areas, such as on Lilley, where indoor soccer wants to locate, and Dekhockey on Michigan Avenue at DeWitt. "It's good because it gets industrial off the main roads," Goulet added.

Beware of calling-card thieves-Ameritech

Ameritech is warning customers to be on the alert for telephone fraud.

Although a computer system, installed last year alerts Ameritech personnel to unusual use of accounts, fraud still occurs as thieves get customers to reveal their calling-card numbers, said Ameritech spokesman Jonathan James.

The most popular scam, James said, is when a caller who claims to be from Ameritech or "the telephone company" asks the customer for his or her calling-card number and its related personal identification number, saying the numbers are needed to

resolve a computer error or to investigate a case of calling-card fraud.

The calling-card numbers then are used to fraudulently charge calls to the customer's phone.

In many cases, James said, the calls charged to the customer's bill are made to or from overseas locations.

Another popular scam is this: Someone posing as a telephone operator calls late at night claiming to be handling a collect call regarding a medical emergency.

The caller deliberately asks for someone

who doesn't live at the house he is calling.

When told he has gotten a wrong number, the caller then asks the customer to reveal his calling card number so that his account might be credited for the call.

The caller then uses the number to fraudulently charge calls to the customer's phone.

Another way con artists obtain calling-card numbers is to look over the shoulders of telephone users in public places, James said. This is called "shoulder surfing."

Darryl Miller, Ameritech security manager, says customers should never give out their calling card number or PIN to someone who calls and asks for it.

"No telephone company, including Ameritech, would ever need to ask a customer for his or her calling card number or PIN," Miller said in a press release. "People should guard their calling card numbers just like their credit card numbers."



'Everything is under one roof' at Schoolcraft College branch

Many retail businesses like to bring they are "one-stop" convenience centers for shoppers.

Now Schoolcraft College officials feel the same way about their Radcliff Center, housed for the past 10 years in a former Garden City Junior High School near the Westland boundary on Radcliff, south of Ford and east of Woodward.

"Everything is under one roof," said Mary Morsund, coordinator of college centers and academic services, whose office is in Radcliff Center.

There are services provided by the Women's Resource Center as well as the Learning Assistance Center, which provides tutoring and computer support; career placement/placement, academic and financial aid counseling; a library and book store.

In addition to certain state-of-the-art equipment, the center's library of 14,000 books is completed with new terminals, she said.

Morsund said a recent survey showed that most residents know about Schoolcraft College but a small percentage were aware of Radcliff Center. The same is true of Garden City and Westland residents where the college is in their backyard.

Morsund says she is a good example of how Radcliff Center can help adults who have been out of high school and college for many years and want to take specific courses to improve their job skills.





SEMCOG recommends end to auto emmissions test

Stop the mandatory auto emissions tests, the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments is telling Uncle Sam.

"It's not needed, other programs are cleaning the air, and the existing test equipment is becoming outdated," Birmingham Mayor Dante Lamotta Jr. told the SEMCOG executive committee.

Since 1986, motorists in Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties have been paying \$10 per vehicle annually — \$20 million a year — to have their engines tested for emissions at their local service stations. Those failing must be repaired.

Lamotta, chair of SEMCOG's Environmental Policy Council, got unanimous voice approval of the resolution asking an end to the AET. The Michigan Legisla-

ture, provided by the Environmental Protection Agency and SEMCOG, passed the program in response to the EPA's declaring the tri-county area a "non-attainment" zone.

"The existing program in southeast Michigan is producing minimal reductions," Lamotta's group said. "There is a concern that if the program is terminated and EPA disapproves of the action, economic sanctions could be placed on southeast Michigan."

But SEMCOG's data shows hydrocarbon emissions are less than 2 percent of mobile source emissions and less than one percent of total emissions. Ending AET tests will have an "insignificant" result, its report said.

SEMCOG's data placed the cost of removing hydrocarbons at \$22,000 a ton — too high a price for the benefit.

hot summer days. "Last July our survey showed 52 percent awareness of ozone action days," Shelton said. "and this year it's 78 percent."

Last year 35 percent made some effort to reduce their contributions to the atmospheric smog, and this year 64 percent are cooperating, Shelton said.

"The most popular action continues to be not mowing the

lawn," he said to great laughter. "Second is not refueling, or delaying refueling until the cooler evening hours, on ozone action days."

John Amburger, SEMCOG executive director, said the Oakland County Road Commission cuts emissions by not mowing on ozone action days and treating them as "rain days."

The region has had only a handful of "exceedances" — days on which air quality is below federal standards. Most are days on which the temperature is above 60 degrees.

Emissions tests have been politically controversial from the beginning. Although SEMCOG in 1986 lobbied for state legislation, lawmakers in Lansing complied only reluctantly.

Two years ago, EPA threatened

to extend the non-compliance zone beyond the populous tri-county region. That might have meant more stringent and more expensive tests, along with tail-pump attachments to control fumes, and even higher quality grades of gasoline.

And EPA also threatened the Grand Rapids-Muskegon area with a non-attainment designation. West side politicos denounced the idea bitterly, blocking any bad air on the winds from Chicago, Gary and Milwaukee.

The federal hammer to punish non-attainment areas include holding up highway aid and refusing smogstack permits for new industries. Amburger said the General Motors Lake Orion plant might not have been built if the region hadn't had an emissions test program.







SEMCOG praises small bus move

SMART, the suburban bus service, won praise for plans to shift to smaller buses from members of the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments executive committee.

Otherwise, there was little "review and comment" as SEMCOG, a seven-county regional planning agency, casually scanned the \$69.3 million budget of an agency that was dying just six months ago.

"It's really a continuation budget," SMART staffer Jim O'Shea told SEMCOG delegates July 28, but with one big difference: Past budgets had used red ink; this one anticipates a \$5 million surplus.

Voters in most suburban Wayne, Oakland and Macomb County communities during May and June approved a one-third-mill property tax hike to pump \$16.4 million into the ailing SMART system.

The SMART budget for the fiscal 1996, which began July 1, will be \$8 million greater than the prior year, however, because some federal and state funds are drying up.

"We're responding to criticisms we heard during the

campaign," O'Shea said. "We're purchasing a lot of smaller buses, and we're making many east-west route changes. The changes will come by fall or January."

"Probably in two months, the SMART board will approve a revised budget," he said.

Barbara Moorhouse, a delegate-at-large representing the League of Women Voters, asked whether any communities that had opted out of the SMART millage vote had changed their minds and wanted to opt in.

SMART's \$69 million in revenue will come from: federal aid, \$4.4 million; state aid, \$24.6 million; property taxes, \$16.4 million; line-haul operating revenue, \$7.4 million; paratransit operating revenue, \$2.1 million; and restricted revenue, \$3.9 million.

Its \$63.8 million spending will go chiefly to:

- Line-haul operations, \$31.3 million.
- Paratransit, \$9.4 million.
- General administration, \$7.1 million.
- Bus purchase for coordinated service, \$68,000.

Reaction mixed to Clinton's plan

AP — President Clinton's no-apology defense of the government affirmative action programs that he once seemed ready to roll back drew a mixed reaction Wednesday in Michigan.

Clinton did order federal agencies to review their race- and sex-based preference programs and eliminate any abuses or inequities.

But the president added, "Let me be clear: Affirmative action has been good for America. We should have a simple slogan: Mend it, but don't end it."

The heads of the Michigan Civil Rights Commission and the Department of Civil Rights applauded that approach and said they would be working with Gov. John Engler's office to review affirmative action programs in Michigan.

"It is important for Michigan citizens to fully understand that racism and unlawful discrimination continue to exist in our nation, state and local communities," commission Chairwoman Sondra Berlin and department Director Nanette Reynolds said in a joint statement.

"Statistics continue to show significant disparities between whites and racial and ethnic minorities, women and handicapped. The numbers also show relatively few reverse-discrimination complaints and/or lawsuits, and even fewer substantiated cases."

But a Macomb County lawmaker, state Rep. David Jaye, said Clinton's decision would keep in place policies that give minorities preference in jobs, business and education.

Jaye is sponsoring a proposed constitutional amendment that would bar affirmative action in employment, education or business in Michigan.

Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole promised to introduce legislation next week "to get the federal government out of the group-preference business."

Clinton argued that government preference programs offer a reasonable middle ground between those who would ignore discrimination and those who would impose Draconian quotas.

Rather than scrapping preferences, Clinton issued a directive

to federal departments and a 100-page report advocating reforms to ensure the programs benefit those who need help the most.

Jaye said Clinton was "trying to sugar-coat the bitter pill of racial discrimination by calling minority quotas 'goals' and 'inclusive treatment.'"

"A new shade of lipstick and shiny dressups won't make a prostitute a religious woman, nor new clothes a respectable thief. Clinton is un-

forgivably pimping for certain minorities at the expense of all other Americans," he said.

Berlin and Reynolds defended affirmative action as a "viable program for preventing discrimination. It is also an effective way to ensure that qualified individuals will have an opportunity to fairly compete and be judged on ability, rather than race, gender or handicap."



THIN VENEERS

When the surfaces of permanent teeth become stained, pitted, or worn, the dentist may suggest that they be treated with veneers. This calls for the placement of a thin layer of composite, plastic, or porcelain over the entire tooth surface, much in the way that artificial nails are applied over fingernails. Veneers can be applied to any nonchewing surface and require very little alteration of the natural tooth. In this respect, veneers are quite different from porcelain crowns, which require that the accepting surface of the tooth be etched with acid or treated to a slight reduction in the enamel. When completed, a






So long ketchup; more of us are choosing salsa

Quick - Can you name America's favorite condiment?

Ketchup? Used to be, but not anymore. Mayonnaise? Not with all that fat. Mustard? Mucky Duck might be the local favorite, but it's far from America's favorite. Salsa is the correct answer. Americans now spend more money on the sauce from south of the border than any other dip, spread or topping.

Chilies are the main ingredient. Among those frequently used, in ascending order of fire, are ancho, poblano, Anaheim, serrano, jalapeno and habanero. Tomatoes are the next basic ingredient, followed by onions and garlic.

You're probably sitting there saying, "no way Chef Larry, tomatoes are the main ingredient in salsa." Unfortunately, that's what most of us think. Our Americanized version of salsa is something that comes out of an Old El Paso jar that we can purchase at the grocery store right next to taco shells and packaged taco seasoning.

Cookbooks

"Salsas are the Caribbean, Mexican and South American counterpart of Indian chutneys and chow chows, Eastern European pickles, North American relishes and Far Eastern ginger-mustard-soy sauce combinations," writes Irena Chalmers, author of the "Great Food Almanac," (Collins Publishers, copyright 1994, \$25). Salsas can also include fruit, fresh herbs, and spices, legumes and other vegetables.

There are at least 2,000 brands of salsa sold in the United States. Americans are spending over \$800 million a year on salsa, and industry experts expect this figure to double within the next five years. By the way, Americans still eat more ketchup than salsa, but salsa costs twice as much.

Chris Schlesinger and John Willoughby, co-authors of "Salsas, Sambals, Chutneys and Chow Chows," (Morrow Publishers, copyright 1993, \$20) write "the most important thing to remember about salsas is that, like the Latin dance that shares their name, the best ones are wild, loose and loud." They go on to say, "Now that Americans have become accustomed to the vibrant flavors and spicy, chile fueled edge of the table salsa of our southern amigos, we may be ready to move on to the many variations and permutations of the genre."

My interpretation of that heady last statement is that most of us are now putting salsa on tortilla chips and everything from steak to eggs, and even fish and seafood. Schlesinger and Willoughby also recommend adding salsa to steamed vegetables, rice, and even stirred into stews and soups to add flavor.

Flavor, not fat

Salsa is just about one of the healthiest condiments on the market. Pace Thick and Chunky salsa contains only 50 calories per four ounce (1/4 cup) serving.

I make my own low-fat dipping chips. I cut flour tortillas into triangles, spray them with a little "I Can't Believe It's Not Butter," sprinkle on some Mrs. Dash's Table Blend and cumin, then toast under the broiler until golden and crunchy. You can make a big batch and store them in airtight containers.

Fthese cooks can't stand the heat, so they get out of the kitchen and head to their family swim clubs.

Skip and Linda Scully of Southfield, and their twins Jennifer and Joey, 12, have been eating Sunday dinner, weather permitting, at Cranbrook Swim Club in Southfield for a number of years.

"It's just nicer to cook outdoors when the temperature is high. It's not only cooler eating at the swim club, but it is often very social because so many families traditionally have Sunday dinner at the club because it's a relaxing way to end the weekend," Linda said.

The Scullys are sometimes joined by the MacCallums, also of Southfield. "Anytime we have a group, we bring our own meat, but share the side dishes," said Mary Beth MacCallum, who with her husband Neil have three boys, Sean, 14, Michael, 10, and Patrick, 8. "Sharing food makes for a better meal for everyone."

According to Mary Beth, "the biggest advantage to eating at the club is that the children have many different things that keep them occupied, like the playground, pool, tennis and basketball courts. This gives the adults the chance to enjoy

No-cook cereal has summertime appeal

When the mercury climbs, it's only natural to crave cooler, lighter foods. The challenge is choosing foods that deliver maximum nutrition along with great taste.

"Many people don't realize what a nutritional powerhouse a simple bowl of cereal can be," said Anne Rejent-Scholtz, a St. Louis area dietitian. "And especially in hot weather, a cool, no-cook cereal breakfast is appealing."

"Cereal can be a smart start to the day, if you're careful about the portion size," said Gail Posner, of West Bloomfield, a registered dietitian. "Look on the back of the box to check the serving size, and measure it out. Without realizing it, some people eat two to three times more than they think they are. Cereal can be a great dinner too. Because it's cool, low in fat, and you're getting some calcium in your milk or yogurt."

Rejent-Scholtz notes that a bowl of cereal makes a smart start to a summer day for several reasons.

Cereals, especially whole grain cereals like oats, are important sources of carbohydrates, vitamins, minerals and fiber. When topped with

skim milk, most cereals are reasonably low in fat. And, a cereal breakfast offers so many options for adding variety.

When pouring a bowl of cereal, look beyond the obvious milk and sliced banana, suggests Cindy Bishop, supervisor of the Quaker Oatmeal Kitchens.

Substitute vanilla or fruit-flavored low-fat or nonfat yogurt for the milk, sprinkle the banana slices with cinnamon, combine two different berries, or pair a fresh fruit with a dried fruit.

Experimenting with muesli and granolas is another way to keep summertime breakfasts cool and interesting.

Muesli (MYOOS-lee) was developed by Dr. Bircher-Benner, a Swiss nutritionist, nearly 100 years ago. The classic muesli is made with oats and often contains dried fruits and nuts. The addition of fruit juice or yogurt, and refrigerating overnight, gives muesli its creamy texture.

Peach Muesli With Berries, developed in the Quaker Oatmeal Kitchens, uses both apple juice



Build salad with color, crunch, grain sughead: Building a better salad

Smart and satisfying summer salads aren't just thrown together using the same old tired ingredients year-round. They're creatively constructed using the nutritious building blocks that summer's bountiful harvest provides.

Color is one of the best guides for choosing nutritious salad fixings. Bright orange, yellow and green usually mean vitamin-rich produce, such as the vitamins E and K in dark green leafy vegetables. Colorful peppers, broccoli, tomatoes and oranges pack a lot of vitamin C and beta-carotene.

Crunch is a good sign of dietary fiber in vegetables like carrots, red cabbage and cauliflower, to name a few. Potatoes, zucchini and cucumbers also add fiber if the skin is left on. Crisp pears

and apples, as well as peaches and nectarines, are good fiber sources and add a sweet tang to summer salads. Even without crunch, legumes like lentils, garbanzo and kidney beans pack a healthy fiber punch.

When constructing a salad, avoid high-fat items such as avocados, bacon bits, regular-fat cheeses, seeds and nuts. Just a quarter of an avocado adds 8 grams of fat and a tablespoon of bacon bits adds 2 grams. Use a low-fat or fat-free dressing and apply dressings sparingly so they don't hide the flavor of the fresh ingredients.

Take a break from iceberg and substitute deeper greens: sweet, crunchy kale; biting radicchio; pungent mustard greens; crisp spinach, chard or sorrel; nut-flavored arugula; or peppery cress. For a change, top salads with cooked miniature vegetables, such as corn, carrots, zucchini or

pattypan squash. Or brighten a salad with berries, grapes or mandarin oranges.

Summer is also a great time to try a grain salad. Barley, bulgur, wild rice, couscous or brown rice paired with the season's freshest vegetables and herbs makes a great salad. Tabbouleh salad is made with bulgur and tomatoes, seasoned with fresh parsley, fresh mint, onion and lemon juice. A brown rice confetti salad can be made with brown rice, thin strips of yellow squash, small broccoli florets, sliced radishes and sliced green onions, seasoned with fresh dill, fresh parsley and grated lemon rind, and tossed with a dressing made from $\frac{1}{4}$ cup lemon juice, 2 tablespoons olive oil, 2 teaspoons Dijon mustard and $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon freshly ground pepper.

Southwest salad can be a delightful side salad or a colorful main dish when served with bread, rolls, rice or another grain dish.

SOUTHWEST SALAD

1 16-ounce can kidney or pinto beans, drained and rinsed
1 cup frozen corn, thawed
1 cup green or red sweet pepper, chopped
1 cup tomato, chopped
 $\frac{1}{4}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ cup red onion, chopped
4 tablespoons cider (or other) vinegar
1 tablespoon vegetable oil
 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon chili powder
 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon sugar
Dash of salt (optional)

Combine all the vegetables in a medium bowl. In a small bowl, whisk together the vinegar, oil, chili powder, sugar and salt. Pour over the vegetable mixture. Cover and chill for at least 30 minutes so flavors will blend. Can be refrigerated one or two days. Stir before serving.

Enjoy vacation eating without crimping the diet

Whether you're headed to the beach or the mountains, on a bike or a cross-country car trip, chances are good that the end of vacation will find you a few pounds heavier than when you began.

Can you beat the odds and end up with no vacation weight gain? Florida Mark of Weight Watchers says you can with some common sense tips and advance planning.

- When driving, plan your meals as carefully as you do your route. Don't have meal times to chance. Pack a cooler with fresh fruit, seltzer and juices or diet soda. Prepare sandwiches before you leave home. Low-fat yogurt is also a good choice for a cooler.
- If you decide to stop along the road, use common sense. At dinner, choose plain turkey or roast beef sandwiches, without mayon-

nine. For breakfast, select cereals with skim milk; plain yogurt with jam or jelly, or poached eggs on plain English muffins. Of course, if you stop at a place known for great pancakes, you can plan to eat them, and eat sensibly for the rest of the day.

■ At fast food restaurants, stick with plain, grilled chicken sandwiches, baked potatoes or salads with dressings on the side.

■ When you reach your vacation spot, decide each day where you will have each meal. If you can, prepare breakfast and lunch yourself. Then enjoy dinner out, but be sensible about portion sizes and high-fat choices. If you decide to enjoy a specialty of the house that's not usually part of your food plan, increase your activity the next day and make lower fat choices for your next meal.

■ Take advantage of local fresh fruits, vegetables and resort specialties like fresh fish and seafood. Try to enjoy these with a minimum of added fat.

■ Limit alcohol, particularly fruity drinks around the pool. These tend to be very high in empty calories.

■ If you are on a cruise ship, you'll soon realize that food is entertainment. Enjoy the sight of

spectacular displays, but make your choices carefully. Decide whether something is worth the calories before you indulge. Remember to compensate for these choices with extra physical activity and lower fat choices at other meals.

■ If despite your best efforts, you return home a few pounds heavier, forgive yourself and get right back on your diet plan.

Dietitian gives answers to summertime questions

Here are some answers to nutrition questions from registered dietitian Karen Collins of the American Institute for Cancer Research.

■ When going out for ice cream, is soft serve always lower in fat than hard ice cream?

Soft serve products are often frozen yogurt or ice milk, considerably lower in fat than ice cream. But you can't count on it; ice cream can be made as a soft serve product, too.

Soft serve products are made with special combinations of ingredients and amounts of incorporated air to allow them to be enjoyed at higher temperatures than hard ice cream. Frozen yogurt and ice milk are great choices to enjoy frozen treats with less fat, and are available as both soft serve and hard products.

If you want a low-fat choice, ask about the identity of soft serve

frozen desserts; don't just assume they're ice milk.

■ Is it safe to partially precook chicken in the microwave before grilling?

It is safe as long as you precook the chicken or poultry immediately before placing it on the grill. Partial cooking may not destroy all bacteria, and any surviving bacteria would find the temperature of warm food ideal for rapid growth. Since some bacteria produce toxins as they grow, a second partial cooking later on might still not make it safe to eat, and food poisoning could result.

■ Does it really matter whether summer fluid needs are met by water or by soda, juice and beer?

All drinks provide fluid, but other ingredients can change how our body handles it. Caffeine and caffeine-related substances,


found in tea, coffee and many kinds of soda pop, are diuretics (substances that increase your body's elimination of fluids). Alcohol is also a diuretic.

High concentrations of sugar in regular soda pop and juice cause more body water to enter the digestive tract, which can also lead to dehydration when these drinks are the main source of fluid. While these beverages provide liquid, the total effect is that your body is not getting to keep as much as it seems.

All of the above drinks are fine for supplying some of your body's liquids, but do drink a few glasses of water, mineral water, or unflavored seltzer each day, too. A good way to get into the water-drinking habit is to alternate water every other glass with other liquids. Or if you're often on the go where bringing water is difficult, stick to water when you're home to balance things out.



Supreme Court shuts door on repressed memory suits

The Michigan Supreme Court has shut the door on "repressed memory" suits in an Oakland County case where a woman sued her father's estate, her mother and an aunt for what happened more than 50 years ago.

Justice Patricia Boyle's opinion said the statute of limitations protects defendants "from having to defend against stale and fraudulent claims." State law, Boyle added, gives a people a one-year "grace period after the disability is removed to file suit." Any change in the law is up to the Michigan Legislature, not the court, she said.

Bruce A. Lazar, Farmington Hills attorney who defended the mother and the estate, added, "If they (lawmakers) look at it, we will be heard." Because the Supreme Court decision was 7-0, there's not much the 58-year-old plaintiff can do in court any more.

House Bill 4518 would change the limitation period for sexual abuse cases but hasn't been adopted yet. At least 20 other states are considering extending the limitation period.

Marlene Lemmerman, the plaintiff, said she was sexually and physically abused by her father, the late Benjamin Pealk, and her aunt, Rachel Levy, for 10 years beginning in 1939. Lemmerman was 3 when the alleged as-

saults began. She charged her mother, Bella Neale of Southfield, denied the allegations, took no action and even threatened her with scissars.

"As a coping mechanism, (Lemmerman) maintains that she developed a second personality who took her place during the abusive episodes" and repressed memory of the abuse, wrote Boyle.

On May 18, 1990, Lemmerman said she confirmed knowledge of sexual abuse by confronting her father, then a patient in a psychiatric hospital. She showed her father a childhood picture of herself and told him he "had done something very bad to this little girl." She said her father replied, "I'm sorry. I loved you so much. You were so beautiful — so intelligent." She said her father said he was sorry six times, according to Boyle's opinion.

Lemmerman said that after several months of therapy, she realized the sexual abuse wasn't her fault and could then seek a remedy in court. Benjamin Pealk died in May of 1990. Lemmerman filed suit May 18, 1990, a day short of one year after her father's alleged admission.

Oakland Circuit Judge Robert L. Templin dismissed the suit. Templin was reversed by the Court of Appeals, which said Lemmerman was within the one-year statute of limitations. The Supreme Court upheld Templin

July 6 and is due to send a dismissal order this week.

Lemmerman is believed to have moved out of Michigan. Her Ann Arbor attorney, Lois Rogers, was on vacation and couldn't be reached for comment.

The high court also ruled in a similar Macomb County case. Attorney Lazar noted a rash of "repressed memory" suits around the country and great interest from television talk shows.

"As a general rule," Boyle wrote, "untimely filed tort claims are barred by the statute of limitations . . . A claim accrues 'at the time the wrong upon which the claim was based was done, regardless of the time when damage results.' . . . The statute of limitations bars plaintiffs' claims in the instant cases, absent some exception, because the assaults are alleged to have occurred some 40 to 50 years ago."

In a concurring opinion, Justice Elizabeth Weaver, joined by Dorothy Comstock Riley, noted the American Medical Association and American Psychiatric Association don't agree "on the viability and reliability of repressed memory syndrome."

Weaver called the syndrome idea a "still-evolving theory" and said it would be "unwise and premature to recognize the repressed memory syndrome" as a basis for a suit.

Grant to aid elderly, disabled

AP — Eight Michigan communities have been awarded grants totalling \$840,000 for assistance for elderly and disabled public housing residents, Sen. Carl Levin said Wednesday. Benton Harbor, Flint, Inkster, Jackson, Livonia, Plymouth, Port Huron and Saginaw are among 193 housing authorities nationwide to receive money for services

coordinators this year. The Michigan housing authorities will all receive \$90,000, except Flint and Saginaw, which will receive \$150,000. "In the wake of the deadly heat wave which took so many lives in the Midwest, this assistance is welcome news," said Levin, a Democrat from Michigan. "The coordinators who will be hired with this money give

residents of public housing the security of knowing someone is on hand to help them out in an emergency." The grants were awarded by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development to hire service coordinators responsible for assuring the elderly and disabled are linked to support services.





Injury can't keep runner from victory

For most of 1983 and '84, Kerry Barnett wondered if he'd ever run a competitive race again after suffering a fractured kneecap.

"I fell on the ice ... skating," said Barnett, who won the eight-kilometer Roadrunner Classic July 22 in Northville, one of the metro area's biggest road races, in 24 minutes, 20 seconds. "I took out my neighbor's kids and said, 'I can do this,' but I found out the hard way."

"I split my kneecap in half. I came back very slowly. I didn't take a step for a year. I started jogging a mile in my rehab."

Barnett, 35, who resides in Saline, was a late entry into the event, which attracted over 1,000 runners.

"Sharon Springer (one of the race officials) knows my wife and she had heard I was doing pretty well competing," Barnett said. "I got a complimentary entry and it worked out kind of nice."

Barnett set the pace throughout the five-miler, staying ahead or even with Ann Arbor training partners John Sherer (24:37), Pat Lencioni (24:40) and Rich Stark (24:52).

"I prayed a lot the last two miles, especially when you have guys like that stalking you," Barnett said. "I always tried to be in the lead, or right with the leaders. I was trying to get away from them."

Barnett eventually pulled away and gained great satisfaction in winning. He was able to finish 17 seconds ahead of his friend Sherer.

"The competition was pretty stiff," said Barnett, who is a technical research program project manager for NCMS of Ann Arbor. "And the course, from my per-

spective, was fairly tough. A lot of turns and some long hill stretches."

"But it was a great race and the people who ran it treated me just wonderful."

Barnett, a graduate Pontiac Central High and ran collegiately for Western Michigan University.

"I went to NCAAs a couple of times, but it was not a stellar college career," Barnett said. "I missed qualifying (by provisional time) for the '84 Olympic Trials by less than a second."

"I'm not training for the Olympics or anything. I try to take things low key and have fun, and they (his training partners) do, too."

This weekend, all four runners will head to Howell for the state 5K championships.

Meanwhile, Ann Arbor's Laurel Park, who repeated as Roadrunner women's champ, is eyeing an Olympic Trials shot.

She covered the 8K course under Saturday's humid conditions in 27:38, only five seconds off her personal best.

"I thought the course was tougher," said Park, alluding to the course changes this year. "The first mile was very fast, but the second mile was uphill and it didn't give you a good chance to get into a good rhythm."

"But I'm pleased. Plus, it's such a fun race."

Park is gearing up for the Bob-Crim, a 10-miler on Saturday, Aug. 26 in Flint. She also plans to run a half-marathon the first weekend in October.

The second woman overall was former Livonia Stevenson High standout Bridget MacKinnon, who finished in 29:33.

MacKinnon, who broke a personal best by over a minute, will be a sophomore this fall at DePaul (Ill.) University.

Clinic has young outlook

It was easy for some to show their age during a free clinic given Thursday by tennis great Jimmy Connors and Prince prior to the start of the Menta dent Championships Tournament at The Fairlane Club in Dearborn.

Let's count the ways.

Some participants used a two-handed style because, frankly, that's the only way they could hold a racket as big as themselves.

When it came to granting their first-ever interviews with a reporter, two little girls proved they didn't tell a taxi driver how to find this place.

"What city are you from?" they were asked as they waited in line to return a volley over the net.

Melissa Stokoski, 5, just shrugged her shoulders.

"Michigan," said the other girl who was too busy to give her name or age.

One of the participants, tiny Sophie Judson, got tired of the heat and climbed into the arms of Prince sales representative Tom Judson, who happens to be her father.

Most of the children were between the ages of 7 and 12, but it never gets old watching spectators learn a game for grown-ups.

Instruction also came from Jessie Oberholzer, a 26-year-old graduate of Garden City High who's a professional instructor at Fairlane.



Jos. A. Bank Clothiers has decided to dump its women's fashion division and concentrate on retailing men's business attire by years end.

Customers at both metro-Detroit stores in downtown Birmingham and Laurel Park Place in Livonia, bemoan the decision and have taken

to writing protest letters to the company's headquarters in Hampstead, Md.

"Ugh! Where am I going to get my business suits from now on?" Jan Wilson of Troy demanded of ladies department manager Hilda Fischer in the Birmingham store. "I get so many compliments on these clothes and people think I've spent \$600 on a suit when I've only spent \$250."

Fischer said Wilson's reaction is typical. Women are upset.

"We offered great fashion value to the professional working women — lawyers, bankers and such," she said. "This is especially bad for downtown Birmingham. Now, when our ladies department is gone, where can a woman shop for business clothes in Birmingham except for Jacobson's or Redwood and Rosa."

Janice Hayes, a spokeswoman for Jacobson's said she was "disappointed" to hear the news.

"We hate to see anyone go out of business because a good retail mix benefits us all," she said. "But what affect if any, Jos. A. Bank's decision to close its women's division will

have on Jacobson's sales, well, it's too early to tell."

At Laurel Park Place, spokeswoman Susan Azar said the mall is sad to see the women's line of clothing go, "but the store will be expanding the men's line and adding big and tall selections."

Fischer said all fall/winter clothes for women will come in at 25-percent off, likewise merchandise from the catalog. The store in downtown Birmingham will be used as a clearance center as Jos. A. Bank's ladies departments around the country close-out.

Feedback sought on SMART service

Members of the Wayne County Transit Authority are expected to meet at 8 a.m. Friday, Aug. 4, at Wayne City Hall to finalize plans for SMART service expansion and changes.

Residents are welcome to attend the meeting and make comments or suggestions regarding SMART bus service.

Plans have been nearly finished to alter and expand bus service since voters in communities throughout Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties approved a 0.33-mill, three-year property tax for SMART in May and June.

Although the WCTA has no formal authority regarding SMART routes, SMART officials must keep WCTA members happy if they want support in getting the SMART millage renewed in 1998, said Wyandotte Mayor Jim DeSana, a WCTA and SMART board member.

Wayne County Executive Ed McNamara has agreed not to make changes in Wayne County without WCTA's blessing, said SMART General Manager Michael Duggan, who is also McNamara's chief deputy.

"We view this authority as the local communities' authority," Duggan said.

"None of us are satisfied with the way SMART has operated in past years," said WCTA member

Ruth Canfield, who is mayor of Dearborn Heights.

So far, though, SMART is doing everything it promised to do before the millage vote, said Redford Township Supervisor Jim Kelly.

Here is a list of proposed changes in SMART service in the Observer zone. All of them are expected to be in place by Dec. 1.

- Weekday and Saturday service on Telegraph Road from Southland north into Oakland County.

- Creation of major hubs at Westland, Fairlane and Southland malls and Metro Airport where multiple routes will converge on facilities to accommodate transfers between routes.

- Service on Warren, Ford and

Cherry Hill roads, currently dubbed "Westland-Detroit," will be changed to Route 240 Cherry Hill, Route 250 Ford, and Route 260 Warren. On these routes, there will no longer be direct service into Detroit, and all buses will be 20-footers, as opposed to the 40-foot buses currently in use.

- Route 260 will be reconfigured to go along Ford to Mercury, Hubbard and Fairlane.

- Route 260 Warren will discontinue service in northeast Dearborn.

- Route 265 Westland/Wyandotte will discontinue service to Dearborn, to be replaced with all-day Warren 260 Service.

- Weekday service between Westland, Redford Township

and Livonia is planned with 20-foot buses. The exact route hasn't been decided yet.

- Route 265 Middlebelt will be switched to 20-foot buses and extended north to the Farmington Hills campus of Oakland Community College.

- Route 300 on Grand River will have extended weekday service hours in Redford Township.

- New service will be added from Bishop Borgess High School at Plymouth and Telegraph in Redford Township to Laurel Park Place mall in Livonia.

- Expanded service is also planned in Oakland County and Macomb County.

- Also, the transit subsidy

has been doubled or tripled for communities that are members of the WCTA.

Livonia's municipal credit subsidy rose from \$77,000 to \$164,000.

Redford Township's subsidy rose from \$42,700 to \$83,400.

Westland's subsidy rose from \$65,000 to \$130,000.

Garden City's subsidy rose from \$24,400 to \$46,800.

Municipal credits for Cantigny Township (\$43,700), Plymouth Township (\$16,100), and Plymouth (\$7,300) are unchanged because those communities are not part of the WCTA.



Oh Say, Can You be Seen?

Is Your Car Ready for a Vacation?



How often have you had to brake suddenly with another driver right on your tail? Your eyes dart to the rearview mirror, hoping he'll see your brake lights in time.

But what if your brake lights aren't working properly? There's better than a 50/50 chance they're NOT, according to figures from a survey by American Automobile Club of Cleveland, OH. They found 55% of vehicles checked had brake lights that needed some kind of repairs. This was by far the most prevalent mechanical discrepancy found during a Car Care Clinic.

Bob Knop, manager of the Club's Approved Auto Repair Department, which conducts the clinics, says most problems were found with the third brake light, generally because of a burned out bulb.

Our Subconscious Response to Lighting

"We've grown to depend on lighting to signal our intentions," says Jack Oliver, Manager for the G.E. Automotive Lighting Division.

"We respond almost subconsciously to fellow motorists' turn signals, brake lights or emergency flashers. It's a form of communication as vital to driving as road signs and center lane marking. When they're missing we're unaware of the danger ahead."

Another common lighting problem, according to Oliver, is found on vehicles with four light systems with separate units for high and low beams. Because the high beam lamps are replaced less often the lens is subjected to years of abuse from pebbles and other road debris. Eventually hair-line cracks develop and moisture works its way inside, corroding

the reflector. The unit may appear to be working OK but it is not putting out as much light as it should.

Lights on for Safety

"Some day it may be widespread practice in the U.S., as it is in Canada and Sweden, that headlights be turned on whenever the car is driven. It's a proven safety measure and already is the law in the U.S. on two wheeled vehicles where lights automatically turn on with the ignition switch. Obviously, they are more visible to other drivers," says Oliver.

"An Avis traveler safety study showed vehicles with daytime running lights (DRL) had a better accident record than vehicles not so equipped."

But lights are worthless if they are not working, Oliver emphasizes. All exterior lights should be checked periodically, not only for burned out bulbs and flashers but also for poor illumination of headlamps due to damaged reflectors.

The best way to check your system is to have one person turn on the lights, the emergency flashers and turn signals and apply the brakes while someone else walks around the vehicle to see that everything is working.

It's also a good habit during every gas fill-up to check for dirt (and ice) on all lenses, front and rear. To help maintain cleanliness you can apply a glass treatment such as RAIN X® to help repel rain, sleet, and snow.

Proper Headlight Aim is Important

At one time or another most of us have been blinded by the glare of oncoming headlights. You flash your high beams to sig-

nal the oncoming driver to dim his lights. He responds by turning on his high beams, indicating it was his low beams that had been blinding you. They were aimed too high.

Are you sure your headlights are not blinding others? Here, from G.E., is the recommended way to check headlight aim.

- 1) Put your car on a 35-40 foot stretch of flat or evenly sloped pavement such as a driveway facing a wall or garage door.
- 2) Shine your low beams on the door from 2 to 3 feet away and outline the bright spots on the door with a pencil or tape.
- 3) Back the car to about 25 feet from the door. The top of the low beams should shine no higher than the top of the marks on the door or lower than the center of the marked circle. If your vehicle has four headlights the center of the high beam (the inner or lower two lights) should align with the top

of the low beam marks. If you have only two headlights, the high beams are automatically aimed when you aim the low beams.

For most accurate aiming take your vehicle to a professional. If, on the other hand, you're a "do-it-yourselfer", follow these instructions from G.E.:

Remove the outer trim for access to the adjustment screws. To raise the beam turn the top adjustment screw clockwise; counter clockwise to lower the beam. Turn the side adjustment screw clockwise to move the beam to the right and counterclockwise to move it to the left.

Bring each beam into its final position by turning the adjusting screws clockwise so the headlamp will be held against its tension springs when the operation is completed.

If your lights continue to be out of adjustment, consult a service technician.

The joys of spring! Doing those home and garden chores you've put off until the weather broke. Suddenly it's summer and you realize your faithful car has been deprived of attention, still running on dirty oil and aging spark plugs. It's filthy inside and out, including the cooling system.

Two reasons for maintenance neglect are the popularity of self-service gas pumps (which leaves under-hood checks to the driver) and lack of understanding of what checks and services need to be done periodically.

Systems and components usually requiring seasonal attention include:

Cooling system

Flush, drain and replace anti-freeze.

Test, inspect and replace needed parts.



Engine

Diagnostic and tune-up services as needed.

Oil and filter change (check all fluids).

Tires/wheels/brakes

Rotate and inspect tires.

Balance and check alignment.

Inspect braking system.

Vision

Replace/aim headlights.

Replace worn windshield wiper blades.

Appearance

Clean and polish/wax exterior.

Clean interior, repair/replace damaged or worn fabrics.

Pay Attention to Boat or Camper Tires

Anyone towing a boat or camper dreads the thought of having to leave it parked on the side of the road because of a flat tire or damaged wheel bearing. The abandoned trailer is highly vulnerable and precious recreational time is lost. So, if trailer towing is in your plans for this summer, heed this reminder from the Car Care Council: high speed driving puts an extra burden on small trailer tires and wheel bearings. Here's why:

A small wheel turns at about triple the speed of a standard wheel. On a 2,000 mile trip it may have traveled the equivalent of 6,000 miles or more at speeds the equivalent of 200 mph!

Also, a common cause of failure on recreational vehicle tires is "dry rot" due to exposure to the elements over a long period of time. They deteriorate from age rather than wear.

Inspect tires carefully, looking for cuts, bruises and signs of deterioration. Replace tires in marginal condition.

Check tire inflation frequently and include the spare. Despite the greater vulnerability of these tires, spare tires on boat and camper

trailers are often found to be flat or otherwise useless. In fact, these trailers often have no spare tires at all.

Boaters take note: Boat trailer tires and wheel bearings are especially vulnerable because of repeated immersion on the launching ramp; rubber is easier to cut and wheel bearings are susceptible to rust. Clean and repack them at least once a year with a good grade of marine type of bearing grease.

If boat trailer tires are wearing unevenly, check the trailer frame alignment. U-bolts pro-

jecting from the axle can become hung up on protruding rocks or other underwater obstacles, pulling the frame out of alignment.

Keep in mind that you're less likely to hear the thumping of a bad tire or the whining of a dry wheel bearing when you're cruising down the road with windows closed, stereo and air conditioner turned on.
