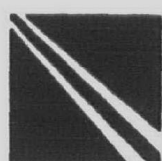

City proposes 'moving' street



A change in traffic patterns in Plymouth's Old Village is being studied. Engineering consultants propose that a portion of Holbrook be redone to curve into Wilcox.

Left turns from Holbrook Street onto Wilcox Road are scary, say some Old Village neighbors who have asked city officials to do something.

So what's being proposed, by the city engineering consultant, is moving Holbrook Street.

More exactly, engineering consultants Dietrich, Bailey and Associates have suggested that the portion of Holbrook — which now enters Wilcox Road at a sharp angle — should be redone to curve and enter Wilcox at 90 degrees.

City commissioners heard about the problem last month, and at the

Nov. 6 commission meeting, from several residents. Adding to the danger, some said, is the nearby intersection of Wilcox and Hardenberg Street. It also enters Wilcox at a sharp angle close to the Wilcox-Holbrook intersection. And drivers entering Wilcox from either side street must also watch out for traffic from the other two streets.

The city administration has proposed closing the Hardenberg-Wilcox intersection. Among some neighbors concerned with that plan was Don Hess, who told commissioners Nov. 6,

"If you close that street off, that (Wilcox-Holbrook) is a very dangerous intersection," he said.

Making Holbrook enter Wilcox at a better angle would reduce danger, the consultants suggest. To further enhance visibility, they also suggest removing brush and a dead tree to the right of drivers seeking to turn left from Holbrook onto Wilcox.

They also propose cutting back a banked mound on the right, to allow drivers to better see oncoming traffic on Wilcox.

Tradeport plan draws opposition

It's thumbs-down on a longer runway and more air traffic at Willow Run Airport, say Plymouth city commissioners.

On Nov. 6, they passed a resolution opposing the creation of a Willow Run Tradeport. The resolution was sought by County Commissioner Thaddeus McCotter, R-Livonia, who told city commissioners in October the tradeport would cause noise and draw money away from improvement projects needed in the Plymouth area.

Wayne County Executive Ed McNamara's administration had pushed for such a development, saying it could create jobs. But even before the Plymouth City Commission passed its resolution last week, McNamara stated the tradeport idea is dead for now, blocked by opponents.

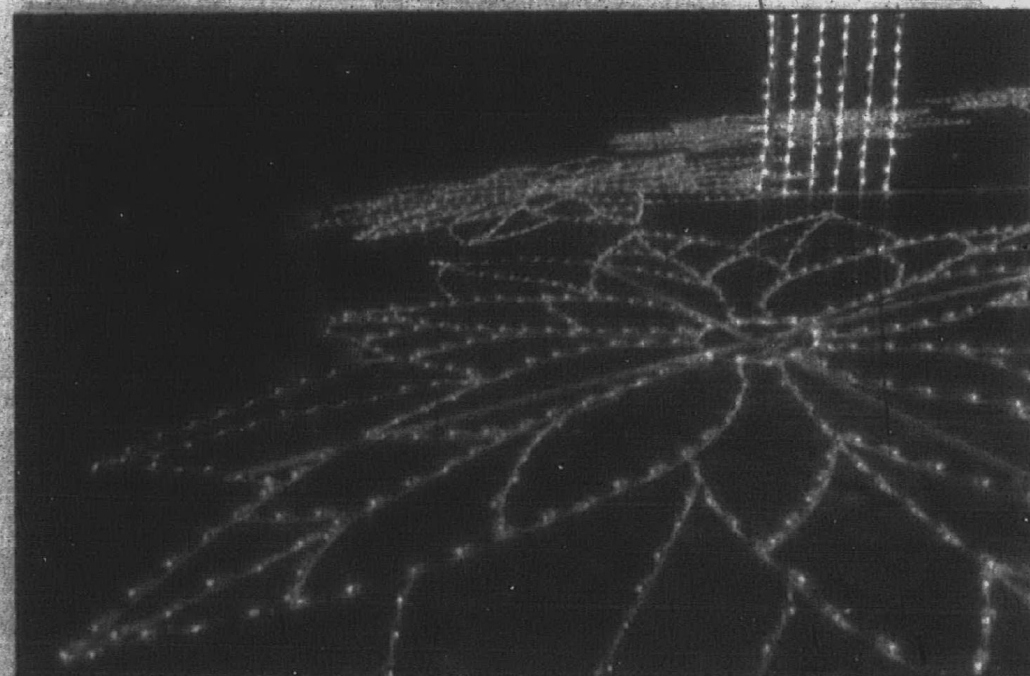
Joining McCotter in opposing the tradeport are the Canton Township Board of Trustees and County Commissioner Bruce Patterson, R-Canton.

The Canton board passed a resolution against the tradeport in October. Then McNamara said Oct. 31 that the tradeport project is dead "until someone like Mr. Patterson either becomes enlightened or is replaced."

McCotter said he was pleased with the Plymouth commission's action. "I'm glad that after they took the time to discuss the issue that they acted as usual, in the best interest of the people of the city of Plymouth."

Focus on schools

District explores long-range planning

Plymouth Canton Community Schools are seeking professional help in surveying the community and drafting a long-range plan.

With assistance, the district plans to appoint focus groups to study what provides value to education in the district.

Three bids are being considered. School board members heard a presentation last week from Cauburn Associates, Inc. in partnership with the Gordon S. Black Corporation. Both New York-based companies would handle the yearlong project for \$52,500 plus travel expenses.

Also interested are David Castlegrat and Associates of Dearborn Heights, and Bickert, Prophet, Warren, Barnes and Associates Ltd. of Glen Ellyn, Ill.

Castlegrat and Associates bid was \$21,900. Bickert, Prophet, Warren, Barnes and Associates

bid the job at \$7,600-\$14,400, depending on how long the project would take. Travel expenses would be billed at between \$3,200 and \$4,400.

School board trustee Mark Horvath has repeatedly identified long-range planning as a weakness in the district. It was included among the board's goals at retreats and workshops in 1994.

Serving on the long-range planning team will be Superintendent Charles Little, a board member, three building administrators, three parents, district residents without children in school, three teachers, support staff, business owners, a governmental representative, a central office administrator and a college representative.

The facilitator hired by the board will oversee and direct the process, offer methodology training, advice and guidance to the

long-range planning team and the board, and present the recommendations to the board, "according to information from the district. The surveys will predict and evaluate the validity of the long-range issues as identified and revealed by the focus groups."

Officials pledge that the survey will "stay away from educational jargon, and attempt to define current reality."

According to the board, "district staff, through the office of the superintendent, will provide operational activities that lead to the implementation of the long-range vision."

The board heard most recently from Cauburn Associates and the Gordon S. Black Corporation. Penny Cauburn, president of Cauburn Associates, told trustees she comes from an educational background and knows "we tend toward a flavor-of-the-month

mentality. We would put in place a strategy to ensure that one year later, we are in a different place."

Bickert, Prophet, Warren, Barnes and Associates would involve district stakeholders in providing "a coherent plan and direction to establish priorities for the use of current and future resources within the school community. The firm defines long-range planning as "clarifying the nature of the organization, making decisions about its future directions, and implementing them."

David Castlegrat and Associates would target "six-to-eight constituency groups that need to have focus groups." Information collected from them would be worked into the survey, which would be analyzed and presented to the board. Management consulting would include facilitation and coordination of the long-range planning process.

Major Mettetal improvements scheduled

The state government oversees Mettetal Airport in Canton. Several major improvements in 1996, because federal government money for such projects might not be available beyond next year.

Randy Collier, state Aeronautics Bureau licensing and enforcement manager, told the Mettetal Airport Advisory Board Thursday, Nov. 9, that federal grants for airport improvements will likely be available in 1996, but not necessarily after that.

We don't know what is going to happen in '97," Collier said. There may not be a federal project.

the federal government.

The next costliest improvement planned for next year is the paving of the main apron and tie-down area. Total project cost is estimated at \$270,825, of which \$243,743 would be paid by the federal government.

Other federally funded projects planned for 1996 are new lights for the runway, including a rotating beacon, \$100,000; and construction of a taxiway connector on the airport's east side, \$70,000.

All told, \$984,000 worth of work is planned for next year. The federal government share is expected

to be \$849,000.

In 1997 Collier hopes to rehabilitate "taxi streets" between hangars, pave hangar approaches and install a fence on Joy Road.

Still other improvements have already been installed.

A new fuel farm with 20,000-gallon underground tank is under construction, and will cost \$160,000. It is expected to be operational by Dec. 1.

John Wagner of the Michigan Department of Transportation said the fuel farm project went \$29,000 over budget because of soil conditions.

Transient pilots are expected to contribute more to Mettetal's revenue once the tank farm is operational because they will pay a higher price for gas than pilots based at Mettetal.

Currently, transient pilots contribute to the cost of running Mettetal only if they stay overnight and pay tie-down fees.

Another improvement that has been operational since late October keeps aircraft a bit higher over Joy Road when on final approach.

The Precision Approach Position Indicators, known as PAPI, employ a suite of lights to guide pilots to a touchdown point 790 feet from the north end of the runway.

When following the PAPI flight path, pilots cross Joy Road at an altitude of about 37 feet above ground level.

Before PAPI was installed, pilots touched down 262 feet from the north end of the runway and crossed Joy Road at an altitude of about 16 feet.

Wood gets lots of TLC at shop

When most kids were into sports and other activities, Patrick Gallagher was making wooden trains, hobby horses, doll houses and more out of wood.

In July, the 1983 Plymouth Canton High grad opened his own shop devoted to restoring wood furniture and unique wood items, with co-worker and Plymouth Salem High grad Mark Tchornzynski. The Restoration Station is at 140 E. Liberty in Old Village, next to the Presbyterian Thrift Shop.

Gallagher said all dressers, desks and other items brought in for refinishing are stripped by hand — not by dipping in vats as some businesses do.

"I know of other shops where you bring something in and it takes them three months to a year, I want to keep it to a two-week turnaround," Gallagher said. "I don't want to be the biggest, I want to be the best."

Gallagher has worked for nine years in wood restoration, and taught the subject in adult education classes.

Why should folks look into refinishing older furniture? "It's usually a better quality piece — no staples, they'll have dove-tail joints," Gallagher said.

Once the restoration is done, "The cost is half of a

new piece and it's a better quality piece," he said.

Restoring old furniture often includes replacing warped veneers, selecting the right finish, and even making a new table or chair leg to replace a missing one. "We do a lot of chair regluing," Gallagher added.

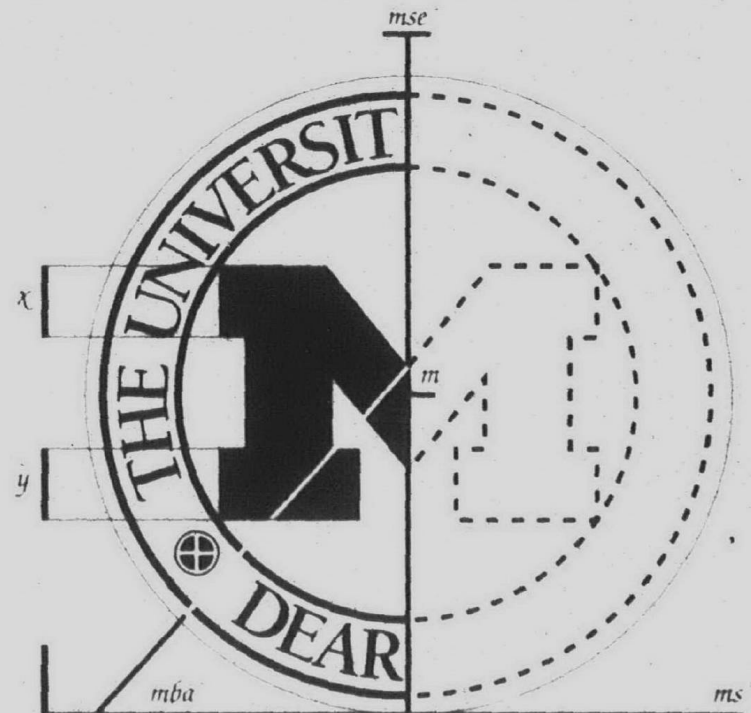
"We do colored lacquers and custom toning," he said, showing off some of this work on a restored wood cabinet to a 1930s-era floor-model radio.

Gallagher and Tchornzynski have also refinished doors to homes, some in upscale subdivisions. The wood, they've found, is often not finished properly when the door is new. "It's amazing. In two years you'll have this gorgeous door looking like garbage," Gallagher said.

Besides the typical dresser and cabinet work, some current refinishing projects they're tackling include work on a walnut-veneer Fletcher corner desk, and refinishing a 1960s Shelby steering wheel.

How's business since opening? "Sometimes you have a great week, sometimes you don't," Gallagher said.

The store is open 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays, but they're often at the shop until 7 p.m., Gallagher said. The Restoration Station is open 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturdays. The phone number is 455-8989.

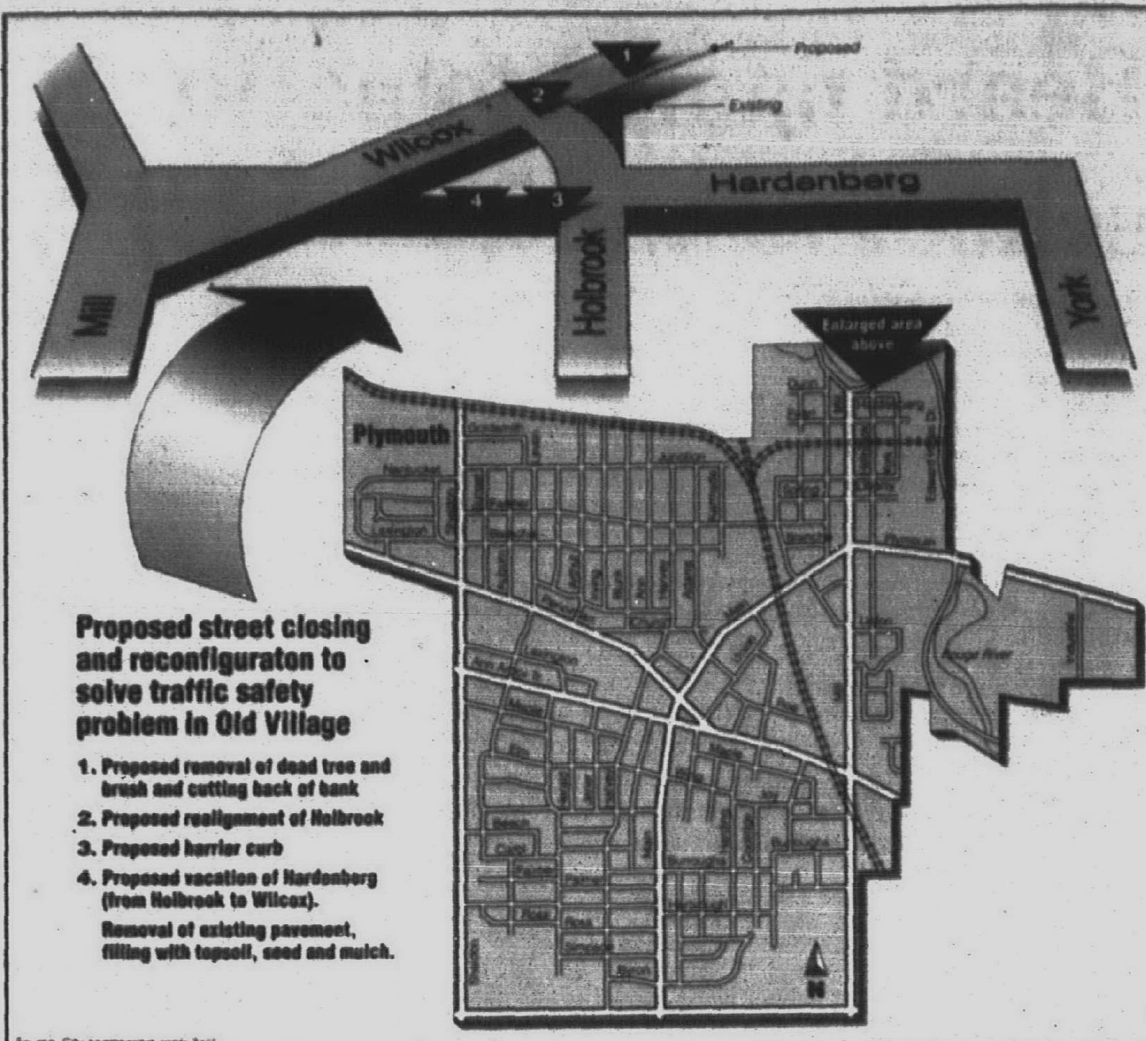

City Manager Steve Walters told residents and commissioners the city would need approval from a private property owner to make those landscaping changes, and county approval to change the angle of Holbrook entering Wilcox Road, as Wilcox is a county road.

At that city commission meeting, commissioners asked Police Chief Robert Scoggins if car acci-

dents were a problem in that area. Scoggins said he would look up statistics on traffic accidents there. "There have been accidents but not great numbers," he said.

The engineering consultants estimated the cost of realigning Holbrook at \$20,000-\$30,000. The cost of vacating the portion of Hardenberg Street from Wilcox to Holbrook would be \$12,000, and

costs to improve the sight distance east of the Holbrook-Wilcox intersection is estimated at \$7,500.

Mayor Doug Miller said the city administration would talk with Wayne County officials about approving the changes, and discuss the matter at a future commission meeting.

McCotter said McNamara's administration won't likely push for the tradeport until after the next county commission election, in November 1996. "If myself and Commissioner Patterson are not elected you will see them push for

the tradeport," McCotter said.

In rejecting the tradeport plan, McCotter said that if \$180-\$200 million in federal and state money went to the tradeport and airport improvements, money would be short for road and other projects in western Wayne County.

In their resolution rejecting the tradeport, city commissioners said the runway extension "would be expected to increase the num-

ber and frequency of aircraft flights over the west edge of Wayne County, including the city of Plymouth."

"The property owners in this area have made substantial investments in their property development, on the basis of the community plans, which will be adversely impacted by the proposed tradeport project," the resolution continued.

Murder trial adjourned again

The third murder trial of former Canton resident Dr. Charles Fisher has been adjourned yet again.

Wayne County Circuit Judge Cynthia Stephens granted a continuance to allow Fisher's new attorney, Paul Curtis of Detroit, additional time to prepare. The case originally was set to go Oct. 9.

Kenneth Mogill, Fisher's former attorney, told the judge he could no longer in good conscience represent Fisher, said Wayne County prosecutor Bob Donaldson. Mogill, however, said he had no comment when reached by the Observer.

It's expected that the case will be tried sometime after the first of

the year.

Currently imprisoned in the Saginaw Regional Correctional Facility, Fisher is charged with the 1984 asphyxiation death of his wife, Ella Maria Mercado Fisher.

Mercado, a nurse, was suffocated with duct tape in the living room of the couple's home on Thornwood in Canton.

Fisher was found guilty of first-degree murder by two juries. The first verdict was set aside after a judge ruled that a comment by a prosecutor shouldn't have been made. In late 1991, the Michigan Supreme Court reversed a second conviction, ruling that a diary kept by Mercado should not have been admitted into evidence.

A state Supreme Court ruling Aug. 9 said evidence regarding

Mercado's state of mind is admissible.

"We can bring in nine classes of information," said Donaldson. "The evidence can include portions of Mercado's diary, letters written by Fisher, as well as statements from others who spoke to Mercado before her murder."

Donaldson and Canton Detective William Keppen say they've been successful in tracking down 41 witnesses all over the U.S. and overseas. One witness will be traveling here from Riyadh, Saudi Arabia.

Fisher, a microbiologist, claimed that intruders gagged and bound both him and his wife, and that he was unable to revive her once he freed himself. He currently is doing time for solicitation of perjury.

Beard named to national school-to-work council

Kay Beard is headed to Washington, D.C., twice a year.

Beard, vice chair of the Wayne County Commission, has been appointed to the National Advisory Council for School-to-Work Opportunities.

The council is being established to advise the Departments of Labor and Education on the School-to-Work Opportunities Act of 1994.

Robert B. Reich, secretary of labor, and Richard W. Riley, secretary of education, announced the appointment.

"I'm excited about it. It dovetails so well into other things I've been doing," said Beard, D-Westland, who also represents Garden City.

Beard has served three years as chair of the National Association of Counties' Employment Steering Committee. She also serves as chair of the Job Training Subcommittee of the Employment Steering Committee.

Beard is also a board member of the recently formed Out-Wayne County School-to-Work Partnership. Last month she was appointed chair of the Labor and Manpower Committee for the Michigan Association of Counties.

As part of the appointment, Beard will go to Washington, D.C., twice a year, starting in January 1996. There will also be teleconferences, she said.

The goal of the School-to-Work Act is to create learning systems throughout the country to help all students master the academic and technical skills they need. The advisory council membership includes individuals involved in local School-to-Work initiatives. About 40 individuals representing educators, employers, community groups, students, state and local officials, labor and the public will serve on the council.

She plans to bring information about what's going on locally and statewide with her to Washington. "I want to be up to speed

about what's going on in the whole state."

"I'm hoping I can be a good conduit," she said of her plan to take Michigan's concerns to Washington and come back with information on what other states are doing.

"It's important that all the players work together," she said. "We've got to have a better trained workforce."

Times have changed from the days when a person could do well in high school and expect to get a good-paying factory job, Beard said. Now factory jobs often require computer skills.

Changes in technology occur almost daily, Beard said. "It's an exciting time," she said.

"People have to understand the need for lifelong training," she said.

"We are very excited about the opportunities to create new learning structures that provide pathways for all students to be successful in our dynamic economy," a letter to Beard from Reich and

Riley said.

"As we rapidly approach the 21st century, the School-to-Work Act will help create learning systems in every state and every community in this country to help all students master the academic and technical skills they need. These new systems bring together parents and other leaders from business, labor, communities and schools to implement the three core components of School-to-Work — school-based learning, work-based learning and connecting activities," the letter said.

"It's an exciting concept. I'm delighted I was asked to be on it," Beard said.

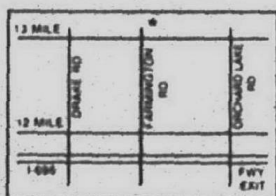

Friend of court package moves in Senate

Nearly two years ago, Sen. Robert Geake was listening to stormy public testimony from hundreds of people complaining about Friend of the Court operations in most Michigan counties.

Recently the state Senate, without a word of debate, gave unanimous approval to the first 25 of 40 reform bills that the Northville Township Republican guided through committees to crack down on deadbeat parents and make life fairer for non-custodial parents.

"Michigan joins the Uniform Interstate Family Support Act on collecting child and spousal support," Geake said in his third-floor office behind the Senate chamber in the Capitol after the session. "We took a giant step toward helping the stability of Michigan children and families."

That bill sets up tribunals to forward support proceedings to other states and to serve as a responding tribunal for proceedings started in other states. In extreme cases, a governor could extradite deadbeats who failed to provide support.

The bills go to the House, where routine approval is likely. If enacted, most of the bills would become law in mid-1996.

Sen. Michael Bouchard, R-Birmingham, was sponsor of one part

of the package — to require Friend of the Court to tell credit agencies about non-payments of two or more months that reached \$1,000.

"Sometimes a person is short at the end of the month and has three bills to pay — phone, credit card and child support. He'll pay the phone and credit card because if he doesn't it will affect his credit rating," said Bouchard. "Now, his non-payment of support also can affect his credit rating."

Geake said one bill allows a custodial parent to sue for back support for as long as 10 years after a child reached age 18. That

would allow recovery when the non-custodial parent's economic circumstances have changed.

"There is a requirement that when a judge issues a bench warrant to require a parent to pay, the parent will have to pay court costs, too," Geake said.

No less than a dozen bills had to be passed to change "visitation" to "parenting time" in support, family counseling, probate, divorce, social welfare, penal, adoption and other laws.

"They mean the same thing," Geake said, "but non-custodial parents didn't want to be stigmatized as 'visitors.'"

The most politically controversial bill in Geake's package is still in the Family Law Committee. That would shift Friend of the Court from the jurisdiction of circuit courts to general county government. Geake says the office would get better supervision and funding. Circuit judges, however, oppose any reduction of their powers. And many county officials aren't eager to take over Friend of the Court.

Two bills will make it a felony to falsely charge child sexual abuse, physical abuse, emotional abuse or neglect of a child — currently a misdemeanor. Punishments would be up to two years in prison and a fine of \$2,000.

Such abuses are often charged in nasty divorce cases, but the

Senate Fiscal Agency said there is no data on how many prison sentences might result. It guessed the cost to the Department of Corrections at \$50,000 to \$65,000 annually on the basis of five sentences of one-year duration.

Two bills were needed — one to change the penal code, the other the child protection act.

Other bills would:

- Specify that Friend of the Court has 14 days to disburse support payments, or pay interest, and to guard against gender bias. Currently FOC has 30 days to process support payments. The Senate Fiscal Agency said 10 percent of 713,000 cases aren't disbursed in a timely manner.

- Make it a felony to conceal income if judicially required in the calculation of child support payments.

- Allow a court to place deadbeat parents who had been found in contempt for non-payment on electronic tethers, confining them to home or the county jail except during working hours. The Senate Fiscal Agency said electronic tethers currently cost \$6.50 a day which is charged to the participant.

Among other sponsors of the bills were Sens. Loren Bennett, R-Canton, David Honigman, R-West Bloomfield, Mat Dunaskiss, R-Lake Orion, and George Z. Hart, D-Deerborn.

PROBING FOR DEEP POCKETS

The American Academy of Periodontists screening and recording (PSR) test in 1992 as a means of detecting periodontal (gum) disease. 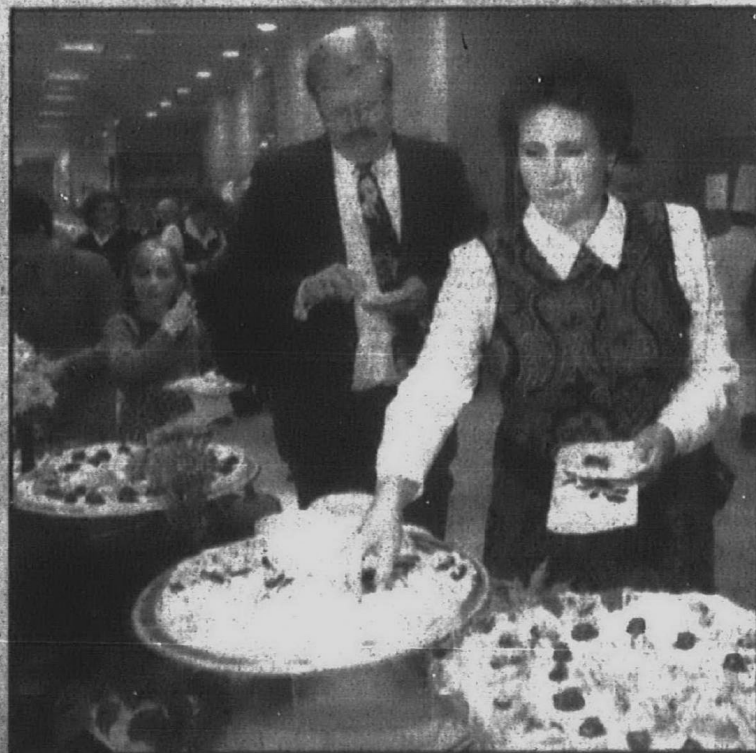

Hunt down recipes, tips
for preparing wild game

At the time of the hunt. For centuries, man hunted all the animals we now eat before he domesticated them. Our tastes for the exotic continue to increase.

With proper connections, the game hunter who ventures into the north woods and emerges with nothing more than a hangover can visit any number of butcher shops and procure anything from filets of white-tail deer to mallard breasts, alligator, scorpion, snake, ostrich, and even lion.

Unfortunately, it's usually a spouse or significant other who is left with the responsibility of preparing the wild game so that it tastes like it just came from a child's oven. More often than not, it's the camp or home cook who should be the one to do the "it's too gamey" tasting, because that's usually how a wild game dinner goes.

If you happen to place the blame for bad tasting wild game on your shoulders, be sure you hand out this advice: The flavor of any freshly hunted game is partly on how it was handled in the woods.

Some area chefs, like chef Milos Cibulka, who has a four-part video series on the proper dressing, preparing, cooking and storing of wild game, stress proper field dressing and the transport of a wild game animal.

Furthermore, "the animal needs to age and drain properly before butchering," claims Cibulka, who was lucky enough to be leaving for the north woods this time.

Fortunately, in addition to Cibulka's video series, available at all Kitchen Glamour stores for \$19.95, there is another aged, but still widely

Here's a recipe originated by the late, great James Beard, adapted from his book *James Beard's American Cookery*. **MRS. LESLIE'S VENISON PIE**

10 pounds venison steak or stew meat
4 tablespoons flour
4 tablespoons butter oil mixture
1 medium onion, chopped
1 bay leaf
1/2 teaspoon thyme
1/2 teaspoon parsley
1/2 teaspoon thyme
1/2 cup Madeira or sweet red wine
2 teaspoons flour
3 tablespoons black currant jelly
Salt and pepper

4 eggs
Dough for 2 crusts

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Roll the meat cubes twice in flour that has been lightly salted. Sauté them in the butter oil mixture until nearly browned. When meat is brown, add the onion. Place the meat, onion, bay leaf, mace, nutmeg, parsley and thyme in a casserole or Dutch oven with just enough water to barely cover. Bring to a boil on the top of the stove, then cover and simmer in the preheated oven for 1 hour.

Make a paste with the wine and the remaining flour and stir into stew. Stir in jelly and continue simmering covered in the oven until very thick, about 45 minutes. Set aside to cool.

Boil the eggs in their shells until hard. Prepare the pie crusts. Peel eggs and set yolks aside (discard whites). When ready to assemble, divide the dough in half and roll out about 1/8 inch thick. Place bottom crusts in a deep oven proof glass pie pan. Pour in cooled venison and sauce. Crumble the egg yolks over and cover with remaining crust.

Bake at 375 degrees for 45-60 minutes or until crust is golden brown. Serves 4-6

ROAST WILD TURKEY

8 ribs of celery, with leaves
7-10 pound wild turkey
1/2 cup salt pork, sliced thin
1 medium onion, with skin, quartered
1 carrot, cut into 4 sections
2 cloves
1 bay leaf
1 teaspoon thyme
1 bunch Italian parsley, chopped
The juice of 1 lemon
4 outer leaves from a head of lettuce
Salt and fresh ground pepper to taste
1/2 cup brandy, optional

Cut the leaves from the celery and reserve. Remove the neck, giblets and last two wing joints from the turkey.

Place these parts in 2 cups of cold water with the onion, carrot, 4 celery ribs, cloves, bay leaf, thyme and

parsley and bring to a boil.

Reduce heat to a simmer and cook for 1 hour, uncovered. Strain the broth. Wash turkey inside and out with lemon juice. Tie strips of the salt pork over the top and legs of the turkey.

Place remaining celery ribs inside the turkey. Place the turkey in an open roasting pan and surround it with onion skins, celery leaves and lettuce leaves. Roast for 1 1/2 hours in a preheated 400 degree F oven.

Remove salt pork and strings and any leaves and skin surrounding the bird. Reduce heat to 350 degrees F and cook for 1 hour or until the juices run clear when pierced with a fork.

Baste frequently during the last hour of cooking with pre-prepared broth. Remove the turkey to a heated platter. Skim off as much fat from broth and prepare a gravy. Season with salt, pepper and brandy. Serves 8-10.

used book on the subject. The "L.L. Bean Game and Fish Cookbook" by Angus Cameron & Judith Jones (copyright 1983 by Random House Publishers, \$25), although not as descriptive and visual as Cihelka's video, suggests various ways to age, store, process, clean, cook and serve a vast assortment of wild game.

If you have to explain to your spouse that the \$600 you spent for four days at deer camp was well spent, you can walk through the door with just about any specialty venison cut from Michigan farm-raised white tail deer.

Farm-raised game

Barb Francis, who along with husband Don owns and operates Butcher Boy Game Meats in Warren, says that they can sell you everything from a \$4.95 per pound leg of venison to a \$7.95 boneless roast of white tail deer. Butcher Boy is metro Detroit largest supplier of exotic game. It's all farm-raised and USDA certified. The Francis' told me that there are more than 300 farms that raise venison for retail sales, and hopefully, that fact helps reduce poaching. Butcher Boy Meats is at 13869 Herbert in Warren, and the Francis' can be reached at (810) 779-0600.

Another major league player in the retail wild game market is Polarica Game Inc., who mail order out of San Francisco and New York City. In addition to exotic wild game such as elk, antelope, wild boar, pheasant, kangaroo and rattle snake, Polarica also is a major handler of fresh wild and cultivated mushrooms, truffles, exotic fruit, edible blossoms and miniature vegetables. You can call them at (800) GAME 4US to request a product and price list.

Helpful books

Of course, my idea of hunting is going to a store where there are volumes of books with everything

I need to know about preparing wild game. I hunt for cookbooks that include proper cutting techniques, aging qualities and preparation details.

Gone are the days when all that was necessary was to fry up two pounds of onions in enough grease to warrant chest pains. Nowadays, savvy hunters know that tougher cuts, especially from the legs of the deer, need to be completely removed of all fat (tallow) and slow roasted, preferably with a continual brush of a marinade for optimum results. Leaner, more tender roasts and tenderloins can be baked with a little bacon or salt pork to assist in keeping the meat juicy.

Leaner game birds like pheasant, duck, partridge or wild turkey can be larded the old-fashioned way, wrapped in a little bacon or simply grilled. An all-around basic informational book entitled "The Home Book of Smoke Cooking Meat Fish and Game" by Jack Sleight and Ray Hull, (copyright 1971, Stackpole Books, \$12.95) offers suggestions on home smoking techniques that can be done anywhere from inside a household oven to the largest smokehouse. Just about all of the books I checked out include recipes for jerky, sausage, marinade and cooking techniques.

And remember, hunters, just as important as the first field dressing, if you need to take your trophy to a game processor, you get what you pay for. Inexperienced processors will give you 25 percent more burger instead of good cuts because in the processing, little care or effort is made to use the proper cutting techniques.

Ask an experienced hunter for references. The longer the meat "hangs" and is allowed to cure in cold, dry temperatures, the better the game will taste. Good luck.

Dorothy's basket hid lots of goodies

Once again, the young woman from Kansas has her trusty basket in tow. Perhaps this time, Dorothy, planning ahead, consulted award-winning cookbook author Sheila Lukins and cooked up a mouth watering medley of edibles.

Here are some of her favorites:

CRISPY BUTTERMILK FRIED CHICKEN

2 frying chickens, about 2 1/2 pounds, cut in 8 pieces
Salt and freshly ground pepper
1 cup buttermilk
1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour

2 teaspoons paprika

1/2 cups solid vegetable oil shortening or enough to accommodate chicken, depending on the size of your skillet

Rinse chicken pieces. Remove excess fat and trim wing tips. Pat dry very well. Place in a large bowl and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Toss with the buttermilk. Let rest for 30 minutes at room temperature.

Put flour in a large plastic bag and season with paprika and 1 teaspoon each salt and pepper. Heat the shortening in a 10-inch skillet over medium high heat until hot.

Remove chicken from the buttermilk and dredge in the seasoned flour, shaking off excess.

Fry the chicken, starting with the skin side up in batches, for 12-15 minutes per side, covered, until golden brown and cooked through. Drain on paper towels. Serves 6.

FRIED CHICKEN GRAVY

1/4 cups chicken frying fat
2 small onions, halved and sliced
2 cloves garlic, peeled and finely minced
2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
2 cups defatted chicken broth (canned broth or bouillon cubes is acceptable here)
Pinch of freshly ground black pepper

Place the chicken fat in a non-stick skillet over medium heat. Add the onion and garlic and cook for 3-4 minutes until lightly browned.

Add the flour and cook for 2 minutes, stirring until flour becomes golden brown. Add the broth and cook for 3 minutes at a gently simmer. Serve hot with fried chicken. Makes 1 1/2 cups.

COUNTRY CORNBREAD

1/2 cups cornmeal
1/2 cup all-purpose flour
3 tablespoons granulated sugar
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup plain non-fat yogurt
2 tablespoons melted butter
2 tablespoons vegetable oil

2 eggs, lightly beaten

1 cup creamed corn

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Butter an 8-inch by 8-inch baking pan.

Combine the cornmeal, flour, sugar, baking powder and salt in a mixing bowl.

Combine the milk, yogurt, melted butter, oil and eggs in a bowl. Add to the cornmeal mixture and stir until just combined. Stir in the creamed corn.

Scrape the batter into the prepared pan and bake for 45 minutes or until the top is golden brown and a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean.

Cool on a rack and then remove from pan and cool completely. Cut into squares to serve. Makes 6 servings.

GRANDMA'S TURKEY STUFFING

4 tablespoons margarine, divided
1 medium to large onion diced
3 stalks celery sliced
8 carrots sliced (1 pound)
1 small head of cabbage, sliced coleslaw style
1½ cups uncooked rice
Salt and pepper to taste

Cook rice. Let stand to cool. Melt 2 tablespoons of margarine in very large frying pan. Sauté onion on medium to low heat, being careful not to brown. Add celery and sauté until crisp-tender. GARLIC MASHED POTATOES

3 pounds potatoes (about 4 large), peeled and quartered
2 (3-ounce) packages cream cheese, softened
½ cup sour cream
¼ cup milk
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
¼ teaspoon salt
3 cloves garlic, minced
1 tablespoon butter or margarine, melted
½ teaspoon paprika

Cook potatoes in boiling salted water to cover — 15 minutes or until tender. Drain and mash with potato masher. Combine potatoes, cream cheese and next 5 ingredients in large mixing bowl. Beat at medium speed with electric mixer until smooth. Spoon mixture into lightly greased 13 by 9 by 2-inch baking dish. Brush top of mixture with melted butter. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake at 350 degrees F, uncovered, 25 minutes or until heated. Serves 6-8.

To prepare ahead of time, cover the dish and chill up to 24 hours. Before baking, let it sit at room temperature for 20 minutes.

CHERRY-BERRY PIE

1 (16-ounce) can pitted red cherries, undrained
1 (10-ounce) package frozen red raspberries, thawed
1 cup sugar
¼ cup cornstarch
¼ cup butter or margarine
¼ teaspoon almond extract
¼ teaspoon red liquid food coloring
1 (15-ounce) package refrigerated pie crusts
1 teaspoon all-purpose flour
Garnishes: fresh raspberries and powdered sugar

Drain cherries and raspberries, reserving 1 cup combined juices; set fruit aside. Combine sugar and cornstarch in a medium saucepan; gradually stir in 1 cup reserved juice. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture begins to boil. Cook 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat; stir in butter, almond extract, and food coloring. Gently fold in reserved fruit; cool slightly.

Unfold 1 pie crust, and press out fold lines; sprinkle with flour, spreading over surface. Place, floured side down, in a 9-inch pie plate; fold edges under, and flute. Spoon in filling. Roll remaining pie crust to press out fold lines. Cut 5 leaves with a ¾-inch leaf-shaped cutter, and mark veins using a pastry wheel or knife; set aside. Cut remaining pastry into ½-inch strips, and arrange in a lattice design over filling. Top with pastry leaves.

Bake at 375 degrees F. for 45 minutes. Cool on a wire rack. Garnish, if desired. Yield: one 9-inch pie.

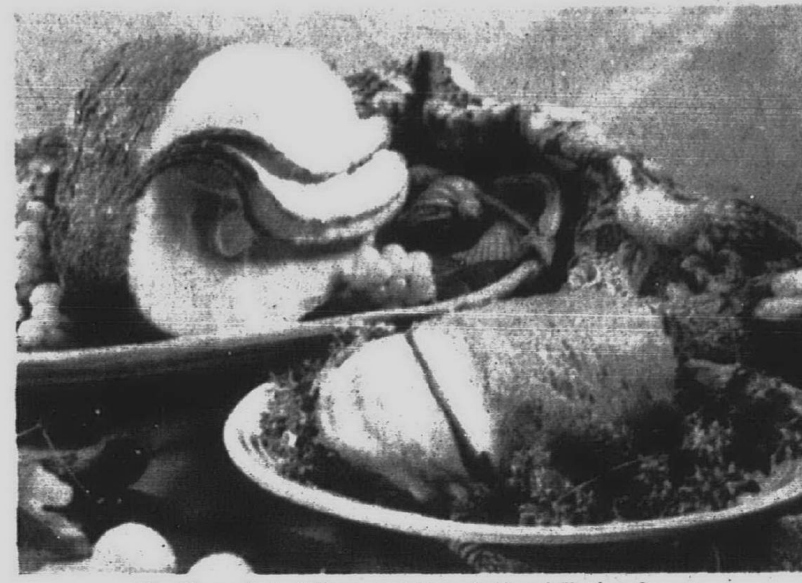

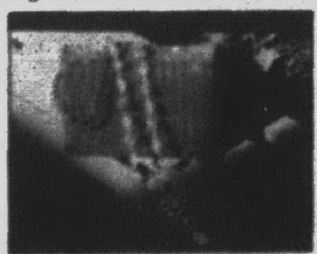
Cohen is an interior designer with expertise in residential and commercial design. She feels the boutique is the perfect avenue to redirect her creative talents.

One summer afternoon Northland Center's marketing director Linda Brown sat down with public relations agent Susan Haddad to dream up a spectacular holiday promotion for the mall's 40th winter.

When Santa arrives at Northland in Southfield on Saturday, Nov. 18, at 2 p.m. he will be greeted by four skylights situated atop the mall, five 40-foot shooting stars, white-winged horses in the Land of Pegasus, a North Star Postal Station furnished with gold star-shaped tables where visitors can compose Letters to Santa, and a 16-foot high snow globe animated by falling snow.

Kids who join the Santa Holiday Bear Club by Dec. 6 will be invited to a special breakfast with Santa and Holiday Bear.

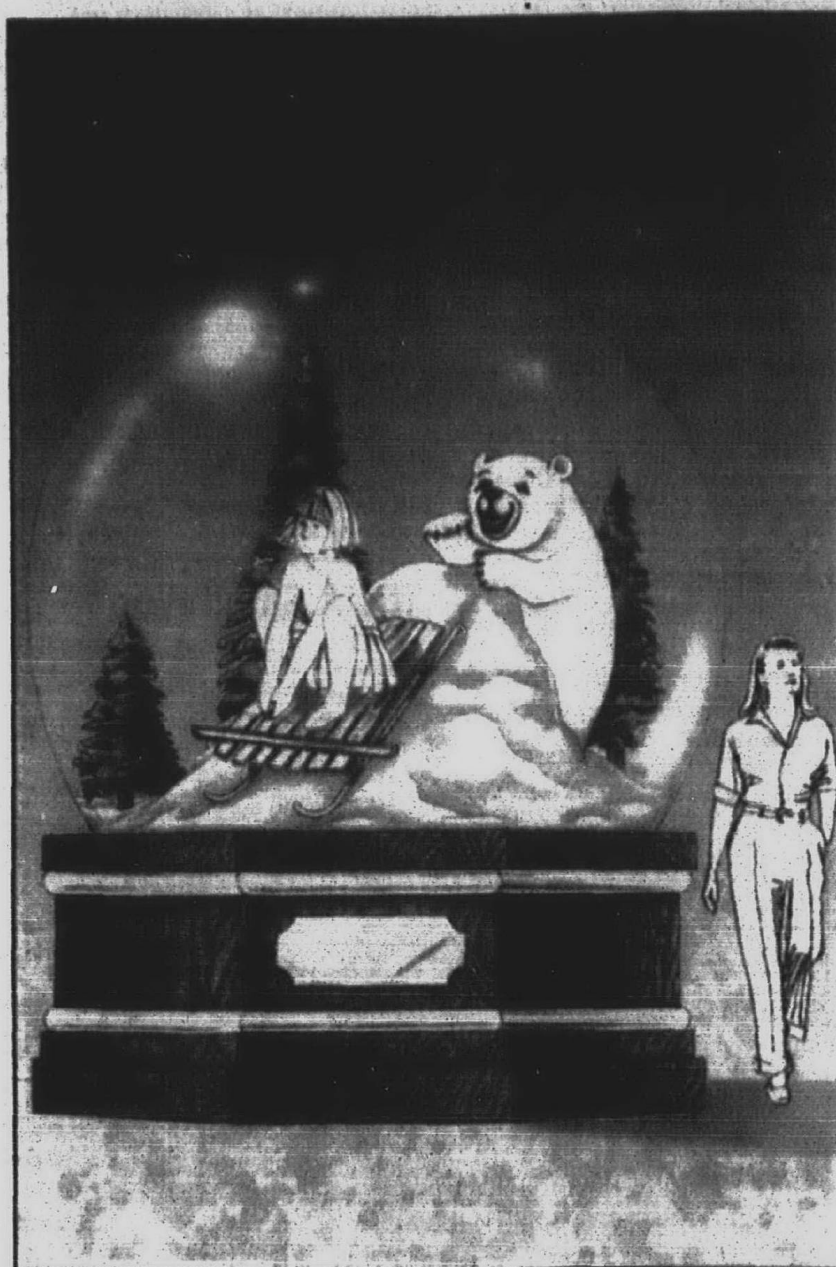

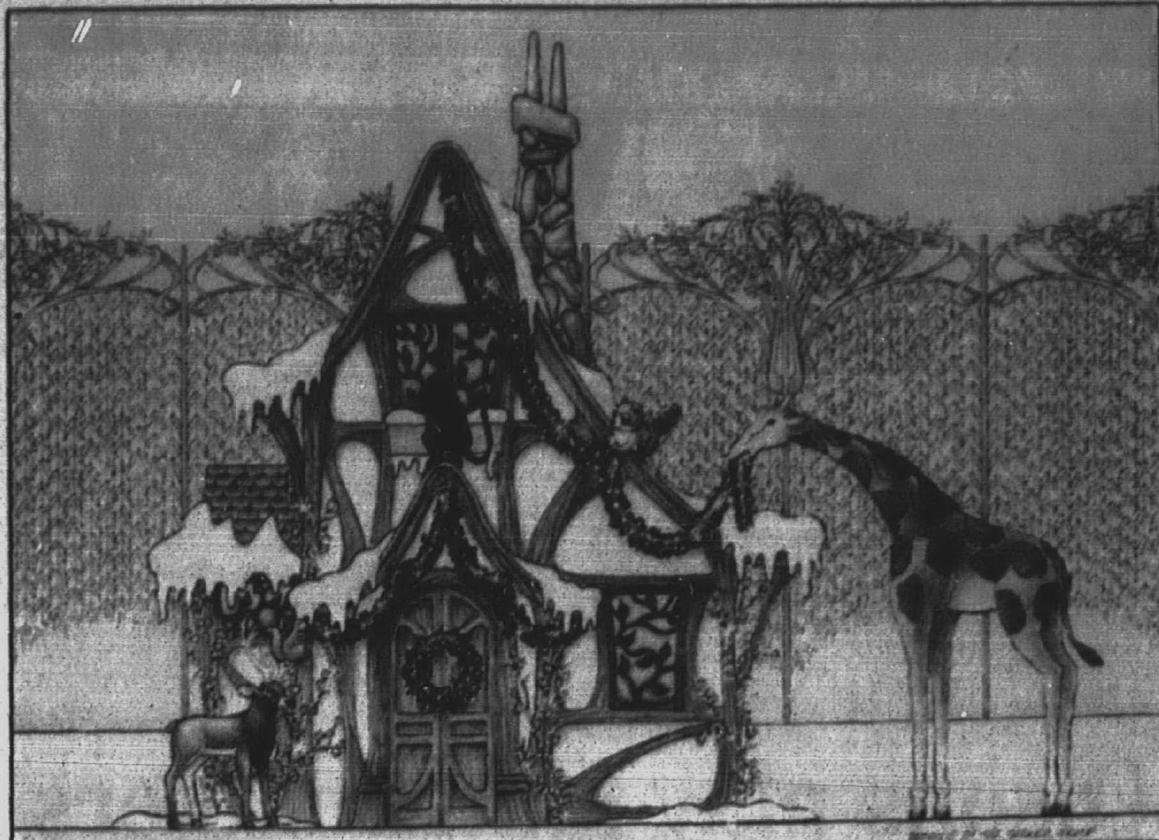

"Ace Ventura: When Nature Calls" is the eventual result of superstardom. Charmless, forced, and only occasionally funny, it succeeds at only one thing: making the original "Ace" look almost brainy in comparison.

It was only last year that Carrey went from "In Living Color" ensemble player to one of the nation's hottest box office draws. Not nearly as bad as the critics said, "Ace Ventura: Pet Detective" was an intentionally doozy device for Carrey's obvious talents at mimicry, bad taste, and crazy facial expressions.

Since then, Carrey has turned into a primary energy source, with high profile roles in "The Mask," "Batman Forever," and "Dumb and Dumber." His toothy goofball with the trademark "Allrighty then" has been the most distinct comic personality since Pee Wee Herman, and infinitely more popular.

So where does the new "Ace" movie go so wrong? Probably with Carrey's much publicized ego. Creative differences with the original director led to installment of Steve Oedekerk, the film's writer and a longtime Carrey friend.

The resulting story, such as it is, finds Ace traveling to Africa to locate a missing white bat, the sacred symbol of the Wachatis tribe. If it is not returned by a certain time and date, the Wachatis will hold their neighbors responsible and start a major tribal war.

All too predictably, Simon Cal-

low's stuffy Brit is the actual kidnapper. He will control the lucrative bat dropping industry if the tribes wipe each other out.

Since Carrey's mega-salary accounts for most of the reported \$44 million budget, the producers use him in virtually every frame. Oedekerk's direction is so flat and uninspired that even diehard fans will overdose on the actor's million-dollar "metamorpho-face."

Granted, there are funny bits in the movie, like the parody from "Cliffhanger" where the moun-

tain-climbing Ace allows a raccoon to slip from his grasp.

Leaving the ashram in Tibet where he has worked through his grief, Ace can't resist sending a Slinky down an impossibly long flight of stairs.

Most of the scenes, however, are just rereads from the first "Ace" movie, but with the gross-out level amplified. The African

locales and wide screen should hold some surprises, but they don't.

With this latest venture, Carrey's comedy goes from dumb to dumber.

'Copycat' has some interesting moments

"It's a sick world, isn't it?" the serial killer says to his victim in "Copycat." And if you see this movie, you'll probably agree.

This suspense-thriller about two women who track an ingenious murderer has some interesting moments, but ultimately is done in by its tired, overused formula.

As the movie makes clear in its opening scene, serial killers tend to be intelligent and methodical as they go about their hideous business all the while keeping up an innocent exterior. The idea that such people can and do walk among us without suspicion gets your spine tingling right there.

It's surely not Sigourney Weaver's fault that "Copycat" is not as compelling as it should be and leaves you feeling stale. She turns in her usual top-notch acting job playing Helen Hudson, a forensic psychiatrist who has specialized in the psychology of serial killers and who has made quite a bundle (judging from her sumptuous San Francisco apartment) from book royalties and lecture fees.

It's fitting she has such a great apartment, because now she can't leave it. At one of her lectures, she was stalked by crazed, slobbering psychopath Darryl Lee Cullum (Harry Connick Jr.), who, in a truly creepy scene, traps Helen in a bathroom stall, hangs her up like a piece of meat and almost kills her.

Although Cullum is caught and safely imprisoned, the near-death experience has left Helen totally agoraphobic, unable even to go outside to pick up the newspaper near her apartment door without having a panic attack.

When several young San Francisco women are murdered, however, her dormant tracking in-

instincts start to tingle. So she teams up with perky, no-nonsense police detective M.J. Monahan (Holly Hunter) and her good-looking young deputy, Ruben Goetz (Dermot Mulroney), who enlist her in the chase.

Instead of one measly murderer, the movie gets to draw on the ghoulish legacy of famous U.S. serial killers like Ted Bundy and Jeffrey Dahmer by creating a character who studies, imitates and pays homage to the "great" killers of the past.

Director Jon Amiel ("Sommersby") works with wonderful ingredients: two likable actresses in the lead roles, the dramatic vistas of San Francisco and a clever idea from scriptwriters Ann Biderman and David Madsen.

As the movie unfolds, we quickly sense that by becoming an expert on serial killing, Helen has unwittingly made herself into a perfect audience. Only someone like her — an expert, a maven — will appreciate the references, the little touches of a killer like this copycat.

The problem is that, as usual, Hollywood is trying to have it

both ways. The formulaic movie teeters on the border of exploitation with one too many a shot of a ravaged co-ed in her underwear. And there's one lingering image that's so disturbing, you know a movie called "Copycat" is going to bring it around a second time.

Putting a couple of smart, tough women in key roles doesn't fully inoculate the movie against charges of pandering.

American movies and television shows seem to be practically overflowing at the moment with images of sadistic killers and their victims. How about giving us a break for a few weeks?

Livonia Franklin (9-11): The Patriots open district play to-night against Wayne in an interesting matchup. Senior guard Tracy Rynkiewicz is a scorer, while Kelle Main is an inside force. Franklin is capable of advancing to the GC district final, but that's where it all ends.

THE GAUNTLET

Lutheran High Westland (17-3): After losing several key players to graduation off last year's Metro Conference championship team, which finished 19-3, coach Ron Gentz had his new crew contending again right until the final game this year. But it looks like a terrible rerun as the Warriors will meet Borgess in the district final.

WHERE EAGLES DARE

Salem stuns Athens in snow

The setting was better suited for the state ski finals, but that didn't stop the Plymouth Salem and Troy Athens boys' soccer teams from turning in a heated performance.

Playing on a snow-covered and icy field Thursday night at Rochester High, the Class A semifinalists battled the conditions, as well as each other, for the better part of 70 minutes before a three-goal outburst helped send the Rocks on to a 5-2 victory and a berth in the state finals.

For the Red Hawks, the result put an end to another stellar campaign as coach Tim Storch's squad tied a single-season record for wins with 22.

"I feel this game was for the state championship, and if we couldn't win it, then there is nobody I'd rather see win it than (Salem coach) Ken Johnson," said Storch after watching his Red Hawks finish the season 22-2 overall. "He's always been a class act and it would be poetic justice to see him win it in his last year."

For Johnson, the trip to the finals, in which the Rocks are to meet Portage Northern, marked the third time he has taken them to the title game. The two previous trips saw Warren DeLaSalle score a 2-1 overtime triumph in 1992 and Storch's

Final is postponed

Central clubs Canton in a defensive struggle

Actually, Bob Blohm — the Plymouth Canton girls basketball coach — got the kind of game he wanted in Friday's Western Lakes Activities Association championship.

The results, however, were not.

Canton and Walled Lake Central, the WLAA's regular-season champion and the state's third-ranked team in Class A, both put on an aggressive defensive display in the title match at Livonia Churchill. But in the end, it was Central that emerged with the crown, courtesy of its 42-26 drubbing of the Chiefs.

Central ends its regular season perfectly: 20-0. Canton goes into Monday's state district game against Northville with a 16-4 mark.

"They are so physical," said Vikings' coach Steve Emert of the Chiefs. "They play good, hard, man-to-man defense."

Sounds a bit strange coming from the guy whose girls:

■ March slowly onto court during the pregame warm-up, in line according to height — which is impressive, to say the least. Is this meant to intimi-

date or what?

■ Pick up enough fouls that Canton is in the bonus before the second quarter is two minutes old;

■ Are so tough themselves on defense, the Chiefs manage just three first-half field goals, and have just eight for the game.

If the Vikings proved something Friday, it was that they could find a number of ways to win. Their offense wasn't particularly impressive against Canton (14-of-43 from the floor, 32.6 percent), and despite their size advantage, the rebounding was nearly even.

But Central took the Chiefs' game right to them, holding them to a mere 8-of-38 from the field (21 percent) and forcing 21 turnovers.

How difficult was it for Canton? Their all-WLAA pivot player, senior center Sarah Warnke, did not score from the field all evening. She was limited to 6-of-8 free-throw shooting.

But then again, three other Canton starters managed just two free throws between them. Only Kristi Florensi hurt Central much, scoring 10 points.

At the other end of the court, Becky Cummings — Central's 6-foot-1 jun-

Alcala lifts Catholic Central Shamrocks, 21-14

Redford Catholic Central used the wind and Greg Alcala to its advantage Saturday afternoon in the Class AA football regional final at Pontiac Warner Stadium.

The Shamrocks scored two touchdowns, including one by their forgotten junior tailback Alcala, with the wind at their backs in the fourth quarter to rally for a 21-14 victory over Troy.

Alcala, who started the season as CC's No. 1 tailback, played only limited time as Kevin Quays backup the last several games.

He gave the Shamrocks a 7-0 lead with an 80-yard run for a TD with 2:07 left in the first quarter.

His 63-yard run in the fourth quarter tied the score 14-14 and the Shamrocks went ahead to stay with John Spolsky's seven-yard run with 3:40 remaining.

Rain and snow, a strong wind and cold temperatures made conditions miserable, but not for Alcala.

"I always seem to have big games in the mud," Alcala said. "I kind of had a feeling all week I'd get some action."

The 11-0 Shamrocks advance to the state semifinal to meet Sterling Heights Stevenson, a 46-0 winner over Detroit Martin Luther King. Kickoff is 1:30 p.m. Saturday at Mt. Clemens Chipewewa Valley High School.

Alcala finished with 175 yards on 15 carries, meaning he had only 32 yards on 13 carries when he didn't cross the end zone.

"We didn't know anything about 20 (Alcala)," Troy coach Gary Griffith said. "You can't allow a team to score on 80-yard runs. I don't care who that team is. Especially, you can't give a team like CC plays like that and expect to win."

Defending champion Troy trailed 7-0 at halftime and elected to kick off to start the second half with the wind at its back. The Colts stopped the Shamrocks on three plays and took over at CC's 42 following a 16-yard punt by Eron Kosmowski.

Quarterback Kyle Rance picked up a first down with a 12-yard run and three plays later hit Drew Patrick with a 26-yard TD pass to make the score 7-7 with 7:03 left in the third quarter.

CC failed to pick up a first down in its next two possessions. Following a 19-yard punt, which was pretty good considering the conditions, by Kosmowski, the Colts took over at CC's 46 late in the third quarter. On the first play, senior tailback Torrance Adams took the handoff and went in untouched to give Troy a 14-7 lead with 1:04 remaining in the third quarter.

"We decided to let it all hang out in the third quarter," Griffith

said.

CC's had the wind in the fourth quarter and the Shamrocks capitalized with Alcala's 63-yard run on first down with 8:07 remaining cut the deficit to 14-13. Kosmowski made the extra point following a good hold by Steve Mondry to tie the score.

"Greg's really been running hard in practice the last few weeks," CC coach Tom Mach said. "We got out of a tight 'T' offense a bit and Greg's a good open field runner. He ran like a champ today. That's a great team we played."

Troy failed to pick up a first down on its next possession and the Shamrocks took over at the

Colts' 35 following a short punt.

It took CC seven plays to score on Spolsky's seven-yard run around right end for the go-ahead points with 3:40 remaining. Spolsky finished with 75 yards on 24 carries, sharing the limelight with Alcala, who goes by the nickname "Chewey" after the Star Wars character.

"We all understand our roles and we take turns, if it's not 'Chewey,' then it's Kevin," Spolsky said. "That's a well-disciplined team and the game went back and forth, but I kind of feel it's our destiny to go all the way."

The Shamrocks finished with eight first downs to Troy's six.

All-league

Several members of the Michigan State women's soccer team gained all-Big Ten honors after the Spartans closed out their season with a 1-0 loss to Penn State in the opening round of the league tournament, hosted by the University of Indiana in Bloomington.

Among the four players who were named to the first and second teams was junior defender Kris Goff, from Plymouth (Salem HS). Goff has been named to the all-league scholastic team previously and has one career goal, and it was a memorable one — the only marker scored in an overtime win over Michigan in '94.

Against the Red Hawks, the Rocks wasted little time jumping on the scoreboard as senior Drew Drummond beat Athens goalkeeper Luke Spreitzer 6:32 into the opening half. The lead grew to 2-0 at the 23:46 mark when Michael Mezger rolled a shot past Spreitzer and into the corner of the Athens net.

"When it was 2-0, I thought it should have been 4-0, but still I felt we were in good shape," Johnson said. "But my hat goes off to Athens and a Tim Storch-coached team. They never give up."

The Red Hawks responded to the deficit by rallying to gain a 2-2 by halftime. Junior Krzysztof Zaryczyn found himself free inside

the box following a Kirk Hodges corner kick to beat Salem goalkeeper Brian Bacyinski and added the second six minutes later with Hodges and Jonathan Wells drawing assists.

"We had a very poor first 25 minutes," Storch said. "We didn't take advantage of the wind like they did and it cost us."

With a gusty wind to their backs, the Rocks pressured the Red Hawks in the second half, notching the game-winner with 11:43 to play when senior Ronny Mashni raced nearly half the length of the field and managed to trickle a shot past Spreitzer.

With the Red Hawks playing up the field and looking for the equalizer, Rocks Brett Konley and Matt Sarkesian were able to

slip behind the Athens defenders and register late-game goals.

"We've been a very strong team with the wind all year," Johnson said. "Also I've never had a team as fit as this and be able to play against such adversity."

The Rocks, who lost to the Red Hawks 2-0 during the regular season, held a distinct 25-11 edge in shots. Spreitzer recorded 13 saves while Bacyinski made five.

"I'm tremendously proud of this squad," Storch said of his Red Hawks. "Nine games this year we were either tied or behind at halftime and in eight of those we came back to win. That shows a lot of character from a young team that lost so many seniors the year before."

Dodge Grand Caravan changes for the better

OK, OK

I caught a lot of static from all of you out there when I said the Honda Odyssey was the very best minivan on the market.

Well, at the time I drove it, it was.

It was the only minivan that drove like a car, was as easy — or easier — to get into than a car and had the magical fourth door on the driver's side.

I now stand corrected.

The Odyssey now tries for first place with the 1996 Dodge Grand Caravan.

It's been more than a decade since Chrysler changed the way America drove when it introduced the minivan. And for 12 years, it had the ugliest, hardest to get into, uncomfortablest — as that a word? — minivans on the market.

Oh, sure, it made minor revisions and changes here and there, but other minivans had nicer options, better suspensions, more car-like ride and feel and car-like amenities

than the Voyager and Caravan.

Let's throw all that out the window.

The new Dodge and Chrysler minivans have changed — and how they have changed. They haven't leapfrogged the competition, but they sure jumped ahead of the domestic offerings, that's for sure.

I mean, they're even kinda cute. For a minivan, that is. Exterior styling is smart and efficient. It doesn't look like

there's a lot more glass (even though there's been a 30 percent increase), but there's better visibility all around than before. I don't see any blind spots.

The front fascia looks friendly. The Grand Caravan is also higher and rounder than before, which translates into better front and rear headroom.

There are a lot of Caravans to choose from, including a short-wheelbase, long-wheelbase, entry level, mid-level and sporty versions. There are four choices in engines as well: 2.4-liter 16-valve 4-cylinder, 3.0-liter V-6, 3.3-liter V-6 and 3.8-liter V-6.

The 2.4-liter engine is mated to either a 3- or 4-speed automatic transaxle; the 3.0-liter has a 3-speed automatic and the 3.3-liter and 3.8-liter engines have 4-speed automatics.

The Grand Caravan evaluated was outfitted with the

3.3-liter sequential multi-port fuel injected V-6 that put out 158 horsepower. It was adequate for around-town driving. The 3.8-liter gives you 166 horsepower, which may be a little better for any towing you may have to do.

Fuel economy isn't too shabby: 18 in the city, 23 on the highway.

What I liked best was the interior.

Instrumentation is laid out well — logically, in fact. Everything is within easy reach, including the heating and cooling and the stereo.

There are pockets galore in this thing, from map pockets to coin holders to juice box holders.

Unfortunately, most "instrumentation" is done with warning lamps. Analog instrumentation is used only for the speedometer, odometer, trip odometer, fuel level and coolant level.

The tach is standard only on

the SE and LE trim levels. (I still would like to see more automakers use oil pressure gauges once in a while.)

Handling during city and highway driving was much better with the new Grand Caravan. It's quieter, too, and now has a car-like ride. It no longer feels like a truck.

The list of standard features on the Grand Caravan LE is long: Air, dual air bag (standard on all Caravans), front and rear door side beams, 4-wheel anti-lock brakes, eight cupholders, a rear defroster, power door locks, side window demister, tinted glass, intermittent wipers, windshield wiper de-icer and rear speed-delayed wiper.

By the way, all you smokers out there have to specifically ask for a "smoker's convenience package" that includes the lighter and ash receiver inserts. More and more automakers are doing away with those things, and Chrysler's no exception.

Oh, there's one thing Chrysler could do to top the Honda Odyssey. Put automatic sliding doors on the Grand Caravan.

Now THAT would make it perfect.

The Grand Caravan is a pleasant surprise. How 'bout that — now there are two minivans worth their weight out there.

How Many Fluids?

(CCC)—How many fluids can be checked on a typical car? Four? Six? Ten? If you guessed ten, you're right. They're found in the

1. Engine
2. Transmission
3. Braking System
4. Battery
5. Windshield Washers
6. Power Steering
7. Cooling System (Antifreeze)
8. CV Joints/Rear Axle
9. Gas Tank
10. Air Conditioner

All of the above require periodic checking and "topping off," except the CV joints (which should be checked for leakage) and some batteries. Which ones require changing? The engine oil, antifreeze, transmission fluid and brake fluid.

How many require filter replacement? Generally, three: the engine oil, transmission fluid and fuel. Late-model cars are more susceptible to trouble due to contaminated fuel and brake fluid, says the Car Care Council. The tiny orifices in fuel injection and braking systems require that the fluids passing through them be absolutely clean. For the long life and dependability of your vehicle, check fluids regularly, says the Council.
