

Project a township milestone



Land available for development in Plymouth Township is no longer readily available. The last major subdivision project in the township is now under way.

The last major subdivision construction project in Plymouth Township is under way.

While there are still a few sizeable land parcels available for home building, available space is just

about gone.

That's why the clearing of land northeast of Ann Arbor Road and the township's west border, Napier Road, is a symbol of sorts.

That startup of work on the Country Acres of Plymouth project is a sign that after extensive home building in Plymouth over the past

10 years, the township is nearly fully developed.

The project developers, headed by managing partner Silvio Scapatichi, have begun work to clear land in the phase one section of the proposed six-phase project.

The project, on 415 acres, calls for 302 plotted lots and 138 cluster housing units. The plotted lots have a lot size of 30,000 square feet.

Shirley Barney, township community development director, said phase one of the project has won final preliminary plat approval from the township planning commission.

"That means they can start work on utilities and putting roads in," she said.

"I think this is the last large development we'll see," Barney said, adding this is the largest subdivision proposal to go before township officials in years.

The project is split into six phases. Phases two through five have won tentative plat approval from the planning commission, while phase six has won tentative site plan approval.

Dog is killed

A dog that's been running with a pack of five or six dogs suspected of killing a pet cat and two deer in recent weeks was shot and killed by two Plymouth Township police officers March 18.

Sgt. Steve Rapson said officers were called to the Five Mile-Beck Road area at about 2 p.m. after a homeowner spotted the dog.

"We tried pepper spray and that didn't work, the officers had to shoot it," Rapson said.

The police report on the incident did not detail the dog's breed.

Voting machines earn praise

There were a few glitches, but the new Plymouth Township touch-screen voting machines generally lived up to expectations last week.

In a report to township trustees on Tuesday, Township Clerk Marilyn Massengill said, "I am happy with the equipment's performance. With additional knowledge and experience, I believe future elections will go smoothly and election night more quickly."

After the primary election March 19, election results were

tabulated at 9:10 p.m. — just 70 minutes after the polls closed. While this was the fastest tabulation of election results in years, Massengill said the tally should go even faster in the future.

"The most impressive thing for us is with the new voting equipment a person can see the whole screen, there's no paper, there's no ballots to work with, and precinct workers don't have to spend time numbering punch cards in privacy envelopes," she said.

"It worked well, precinct workers loved it," Massengill

said.

While most voters told precinct workers they liked the system, some complained that lights shining over voting booths caused glare, making the screens hard to read.

Township officials opted not to buy voting booths to go with the screens that eliminate glare problems. Massengill said a solution would be to cover the top of the old punch card booths with black material to eliminate glare. She said these covers should be ready by the next election.

At one precinct, election

workers did not notice that machines were running on a battery power pack, instead of electrical power. "The problem was not discovered until early afternoon, when the unit screens went out," Massengill said.

"The units had been operating on the internal battery, and much like leaving lights on in a car; eventually, the battery wore down," she said.

For the next election, 64 of the Unilect Patriot voting machines will be used, four per precinct.

Hanford extension plan sparks controversy

Jimmy Durante believed you ought to "Make Someone Happy." Plymouth-Canton Community Schools will do just that for Canton property owners George and Anne Bradley if they agree to a plan proposed by Canton Township and developer Jack Cook.

It looks as though the school district, which owns 18 acres in the same area, will go for the proposal. If it doesn't, the Bradleys plan to sue the township.

For decades, the Bradleys have owned a five-acre parcel

off Canton Center Road between Warren and Ford Roads, near the end of Hanford Road. Their frontage on Canton Center is zoned commercial; with residential land behind it. The school district owns a nearby parcel, with a small piece of it on Canton Center.

The Bradleys' problem began when developer Jack Cook put together a site plan that would result in single-family homes being built in an area surrounding the Bradley property.

"The Bradleys filed a lawsuit against the township when it approved the development, because it left them hanging

with undevelopable property," said Gene Daley, a former Canton planning commissioner, trustee and zoning board of appeals member.

Under an agreement hammered out by Cook and the township, the Bradleys' land could be developed if the schools agree to give up part of its northern frontage. That would allow room for Hanford Road to be extended through to Canton Center Road.

The Bradleys' suit has been dismissed without prejudice, pending the school district's decision.

"We hope the road comes through. But que sera, sera. I

think O.J. is guilty, but he is still a free man," said George Bradley, whose wife Anne was Canton treasurer in the 1970's.

John Birchler, Plymouth-Canton executive director of finance, said that while a deal has not yet been negotiated, it's an attractive idea.

"We think the concept is beneficial to us. It would be good for us, whether we build a school there or sell. It would add value to the property."


The acreage, large enough for an elementary or middle school, is the southernmost parcel of land owned by the district. Purchased in 1968, the site extends west from the end of

Hanford Road halfway between Sheldon and Canton Center roads. It includes 200 feet of frontage on Canton Center.

As proposed, "We would give up a piece on the northern boundary of our property, which would be used to complete Hanford Road," said Birchler.

"Hanford Road wouldn't go straight across to Canton Center. It would dip a little to the south. That would allow developer some additional room to develop additional lots."

The district stands to gain frontage on the Hanford Road extension, as well as a possible traffic light at Hanford and Canton Center.

Official up for new position

Clarenceville residents will have the chance next week to meet the three finalists for the job now held by David Kamish, superintendent of the Clarenceville School District.

Starting Monday, April 1, each finalist will spend one day in Clarenceville, meeting administrators, staff and students.

Each day-long visit ends with a 7 p.m. open house in which residents can meet and talk to the educator, and a 7:30 p.m. second, one-hour interview before the school board. Both will take place at board offices in Clarenceville Middle School, 20210 Middlebelt.

E. Jake Hudson, a retired educator from Ohio, will be the first finalist to visit on Monday, April 1.

The second visit on Tuesday, April 2 will be by Thomas J. Tattin, executive-director for Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

The third finalist, Alan K.

McLean, superintendent of the Maple Valley School District, will visit Clarenceville on Wednesday, April 3.

Clarenceville trustees picked the three finalists Sunday after interviews with seven semi-finalists.

"We had a lot of very fine candidates," said Vernice Dunklee, board president. "We had seven very strong candidates. It will be very difficult to make a choice. They all have a lot of experience. We're seeking a good mesh. We need to see them, and they need to come here and see us."

Also in April, the trustees plan to visit each educator in his own district.

The trustees have set May 1 as the target date for picking Clarenceville's new superintendent.

Fifty-seven educators initially applied for Kamish's job. The trustees winnowed the field to seven, then three.

Kamish retires from his post June 30, after spending five years in Clarenceville's top job.

Students offer praise for alternative program

For the ninth-graders and their parents who bravely spoke about how the new Journey program has changed their lives, Monday night's packed Plymouth-Canton school board meeting was a little like the TV show "This Is Your Life."

Ellie Plass told the board that while she attended Central Middle school, "I had anger problems. When I got mad, I got violent. I didn't know how to control it. Mrs. (Principal Pat) Moore got so sick of me. I was suspended eight times a year or more."

"When you're a kid and you give up, you find so many ways around things. People, when they give up, they don't even care. I was dreading going to the high school this year. I thought I'd get trampled."

Ellie heard about Journey, the alternative ninth-grade program at Starkweather Center, and enrolled — with reservations.

"I thought it would be full of a bunch of dorks, but it wasn't anything like that. Everyone was cool. The teachers were cool. At the park, (Plymouth-

Canton Educational Park) it's like you are in a stream. Here, you are actually a person. Everyone gets to know each other. It's a lot better."

Stephani Hootman said, "When we all started, we were 50 kids with big problems and big dreams." Lots has happened since then, she said.

"We are proud of our good grades. So many of us have learned to deal with our problems and solve them in a more mature and responsible way. I never felt I could talk to someone til I came here. I know I can't do it all, but when I can't, these teachers are here to catch me. This program does a lot of good."

Journey teachers Rick McCoy, Deb Trapp, Marie Schlosser and Heidi Mick described Journey for the board.

The 50 students, who signed "contracts" when they voluntarily enrolled in the Journey pilot raised their grade point by an average of 1.75 points this year, said McCoy. "Journey students have significantly fewer referrals for discipline." Attendance has greatly improved as well, he said. "If someone doesn't climb off the bus, someone is calling in five minutes, because

we're concerned."

Mick said students take a shuttle at 7 a.m. from PCEP to Starkweather, where they study math, humanities, English, history, writing, and earth science in classes ranging in size from 16-25.

They take a bus back to PCEP for sixth hour. "It's really convenient for them to be there, so they can take a sixth-hour elective and participate in after-school activities," said Mick.

An hour a day is dedicated to the "Student Service Center," said Trapp. "Sixteen or 17 kids meet in a group for one hour every day. We deal with communication skills, conflict resolution, and talk about and resolve issues. We take a look at relationships and overall self-esteem building and confidence building. Students receive one credit. That really is the single component that makes us uniquely different from the ninth-grade program at the park." Students also volunteer for 20 hours of community service, mentoring at elementary schools.

Journey also offers parenting programs. Parents agree to provide 20 hours of school-related community service as well.

Hospice care advocates honor representative from Plymouth

Earlier this month about 200 hospice advocates filled a Lansing conference room to honor State Rep. Gerald Law, R-Plymouth, with the Michigan Hospice Organization's Legislator of the Year Award.

The MHO represents 110 independent hospice programs statewide. Law represents the east and north portions of Livonia, Plymouth and Northville.

Tracy Muscat, co-chair of the MHO Legislative Committee, said Law has been a champion of hospice both in his district and in his work with legislators in Lansing.

More specifically, Muscat made reference to Law's efforts and sponsorship of proposed legislation to set up a separate licensing process for hospice residents.

Lawmakers and hospice advocates want home-like settings where they dying who live alone can go to spend their final weeks.

Law said: "Not all hospice patients are able to remain in their home. Many people who suffer from incurable illnesses are dying with no one able to care for them or nowhere to go, this legislation would help to

change that."

Sister Mary Giovanni, president of Angela Hospice which opened Michigan's first hospice residential facility of its kind in Livonia, feels the legislation is crucial to the future of hospice care.

"We hear almost every day from dying individuals who are alone and asking us for help... we are reaching out to take care of as many of them as we can in alternative settings such as our Care Center or unit at Plymouth Court, but there has to be more and Rep. Law has been a leader in helping to find the solution."

Steve Guile said Brandle has told him the project is still going ahead.

"I encouraged him that if he's not going to develop the property right away do something with the exterior of the building. I

would say it's in need of repair," Guile said.

"It really needs to have some painting done, some upgrading of the brick and the window awnings. In the window area you could see things that would be more eye appealing," he said.

Pulkownik said she's had six potential downtown restaurant owners approach her about coming to Plymouth. "The lack of an available liquor license keeps them from being here," she said.

"One was ready to sign a lease for 4,000 square feet to come into town," Pulkownik said, but didn't for lack of a liquor license. The Animation Station was

founded by former policemen Chuck Eveleth and Vern Mitchell. The store was started in a 700 square-foot space at the Westchester Mall on Forest Avenue, then added 900 more square feet.

"Then they expanded in other malls, this is all over a period of two and a half years," Pulkownik said. The other stores are in the Livonia Mall and Macomb Mall.

Of the Main Street space, "They would like to make that their corporate headquarters, their flagship store," she said.

The space being vacated will be leased to Days Gone By and a retail business, Pulkownik said.

Scappatichi's attorney Al Tabaka said it's too early to say if home building will actually begin at the site this year.

"It's unpredictable," he said. "It's possible, but that depends on a lot of factors."

"It's speculative, we're in the process of doing some preliminary work," he said.


Asked if major home construction would happen at the site in the next two years, Tabaka said, "That would be a surprise to me. These things don't happen that

quick." "But it's partially started, I think it's a beautiful project," he said.

Trees are to be retained throughout the project and about 30 acres of open space are to be created.

There are 118 homes to be built in the first phase of the project. Also in the first phase, a new road bisecting the subdivision is to be built south from Powell Road, on the project's northern border.





seen at the Too-Chez restaurant in Novi, Gail's Chocolate's in Royal Oak and at the Metro Music Cafe in Wyandotte - just to name a few. They also are responsible for the backdrops of a new exhibit at the Detroit Historical Museum, which shows Detroit at the turn of the century.

The two newest murals are mirror-image and follow an art deco style that depicts an overflowing cornucopia crowned by simplified peacock feathers. The murals of muted colors will be surrounded by a gold leaf frame.

"We came up with a few sketches and they picked one," Judge said, referring to JPRA Architects & Planners/Peter

HansRea Design, who designed the new food court.

The murals will serve as a backdrop for the cafe's sign, which will be a handcrafted wrought iron peacock. "It will anchor and announce the food court," said architect Jim Ryan.

Judge and Dytyniak worked on the murals in their studio on Ronda Drive, where there is plenty of space for their work. When the time comes, the artists will take the oil-painted canvas murals to the new shopping mall and put them up.

"We will prep it as if we were wallpapering a wall," said Judge, a Plymouth resident. "The canvas is durable. It has an artful feel to it. You will think mural

when you see it."

There is the chance of ripping the murals as they are put on the walls. "But you can fix them. Once the canvas is glued down, you can come in and score it," Dytyniak said.

Judge and Dytyniak, a Wayne resident, consider themselves artists but not "artists." They recognize ego and temperament. But their goal is to work at what they love and to earn a living.

"Artists are notorious for their pride and ego," Dytyniak said. But the partners work well together. Adds Judge: "We've got a good respect for each other. The big thing is that it comes out right."

After the architects picked out

a design for the murals, Judge and Dytyniak took an overhead transparency and projected it the canvas tacked to the walls of their studio. "It's very practical. You can make all the mistakes on an eight-inch piece of paper," Judge said.

One of the reasons the artists work so well together, Judge said, is that they both can be nit-picky, but the other helps curb the tendency. "You need someone to cut your arm off when you are done," Judge said.

The artists, both who studied at the Center for Creative Studies, merge their talents from two different avenues. Judge started out as an illustrator and cartoonist. Dytyniak got into televi-

sion scenery and set design.

"We can duplicate each other's styles," said Dytyniak, who started business as a sign and graphics shop. "Although we are not officially partners we always consider ourselves partners because we work on the same jobs."

Though the food court murals have taken some time to do, Judge and Dytyniak work on several projects at one time. "It always takes more time than you think," Judge said. "It's labor, labor and more labor."

But both artists agree. It's coming up with an idea that's the hard part. Of course there are those lucky, lucky times when the idea just jumps out at

them. "But in our position, because we work with architects, they come up with the concepts and we both put our heads together for the design. Architects give us the parameters and the artists fill it in," Dytyniak said.

The partners and friends consider themselves quite lucky. They both do what they love and get paid for it. "It's like sitting down and listening to music. But you get to play it," Dytyniak said.

Judge agrees. "I always knew I wanted to be in art. But I also consider myself just like a plumber or a carpenter. I do believe when you're doing a job, you have to show up on time."

HOUSE TO TRY AGAIN ON COURT REFORM

Two suburban district judges are hailing the revival of legislative efforts at "court reform" — the simplifying of Michigan's multi-tiered justice system.

The plan, scheduled to be unveiled in the House today, won't require a voter-approved constitutional amendment to eliminate county probate courts. But it could result in two years in elimination of Detroit Recorder's Court.

"District judges across our state already act as circuit and probate judges," said Southfield District Judge Stephen C. Cooper.

"The arguments against court reform appear to come from those who are afraid of any change," said Wayne District Judge Carolyn A. Archbold. Circuit judges have argued against such change.

In its simplest form, "court reform" means a single trial court instead of the current system of circuit, probate, district and Detroit Recorder's Court, with all having the same pay and same jurisdiction. Because probate courts are established by the constitution, it would take a constitutional amendment to consolidate circuit and probate courts.

In Lansing, Rep. Michael Nye, R-Litchfield, will introduce

on Thursday a new substitute for his House bill 5158. Rather than eliminate courts, it will expand the powers of probate and district judges. Key elements:

- Probate judges would have concurrent jurisdiction, with circuit judges, over domestic relations cases. Probate courts could be called "family courts."

- All trial courts could handle equity cases.

- All matters involving the same family could be heard by the first judge to be assigned to the case. Reformers argue that under the current system, a family could find itself in probate court for a delinquency case, district court for the first step of a domestic violence case, and circuit court for divorce proceedings.

- Detroit Recorder's Court, which handles criminal cases in both Detroit and out- Wayne County, could be abolished by Jan. 1, 1998, unless the city agrees by Oct. 1, 1997, to be responsible for funding it. Recorder's judges would be "grandfathered" as Wayne County circuit judges. Detroit is the only city in Michigan where countywide circuit judges don't try major criminal cases.

The latter step is similar to a separate bill sponsored by Rep. Deborah Whyman, R-Canton. The Whyman bill would

abolish Recorder's Court and grandfather its judges as circuit judges, but without the option of staying in business if Detroit pays for it.

Whyman's bill is vehemently opposed by Detroit politicians, who say her motives are racial, as well as by Supreme Court Chief Justice James Brickley.

State government pays for a portion of all courts, but it pays the entire cost of Detroit Recorder's and Detroit District courts.

Plymouth District Judge Ronald Lowe insists reform is fair because district judges already are doing the work of circuit and probate judges. "Under emergency or special orders or as experimental 'pilot projects,' the Supreme Court and the state court administrator have already authorized full or partial trial court unifications," Lowe wrote in a February Michigan Bar Journal article.

One major change sought by Gov. John Engler and former Sen. David Honigman, R-West Bloomfield, wouldn't be made. Under Nye's revised bill, Ingham Circuit Court would remain as the Court of Claims, handling prisoners' suits and claims against the state. Engler insists the Ingham judges are too liberal and pro-plaintiff. He wants such suits filed in the local jurisdiction.

"This week is a wonderful way to remind people of the importance public health plays in protecting our health every single day," McNamara said. "For example, public health ensures our water is clean, our food supply is safe and diseases are kept under control."

The Wayne County Health Department will be showcasing its accomplishments and new initiatives.

The department has launched several new programs to promote health and well-being including a smoking reduction program, efforts to increase immunization rates and decrease adolescent violence, a campaign to promote rabies prevention and the recently implemented Community Health Assessment Program.

Also, the department's Envi-

ronmental Health division is providing certification training courses for all food-service managers as mandated by law.

"Public Health Week was established to recognize the contributions of public health and prevention services to America's well-being," said Dr. Donald W. Lawrenchuk, health department medical director. "A clean bill of health is one of life's most precious gifts and public health helps make that a reality."

During the week, the Wayne

County Health Connector, a van, will be parked outside county health department centers. Visitors will be able to hear prerecorded health awareness messages, receive informative pamphlets and have related questions answered by health department staff.

The van will be at the Westland Health Center from 9-11:30 a.m. Monday, April 1. The center is at 2501 S. Merriman in Westland.



AUTO THEFTS ON THE RISE

Some recent data from the Michigan State Police indicates that while overall crimes decreased motor vehicle theft has increased.

H.E.A.T. (Help Eliminate Auto Thefts), a statewide auto theft prevention program, has issued a "heads-up" on auto theft prevention, based on the results of the 1994 Uniform Crime Report, recently released by the Michigan Department of State Police. Statistics in the report, the most recent available from the Michigan State Police, indicate that while overall crimes from manslaughter to embezzlement decreased by 0.5 percent from 1993, motor vehicle theft was the only crime showing an increase — up 6.3 percent from 1993.

"This statistic shows that auto theft prevention tactics need to be reemphasized," William Liddane, director of H.E.A.T., said.

"This is the first increase in motor vehicle theft in the past 10 years. H.E.A.T. has played a major role in that milestone — offering auto theft prevention programs that educate the public and provide solutions on what they can do to help," Col. Michael Robinson, of the Michigan State Police, said.

"The key is keeping a steady flow of information out there so the public keeps thinking about protecting themselves," Liddane said. He said he believes citizens must play a larger role in combating auto theft. "We've had 10

good years and now we can't get complacent about this. People need to be aware of everything about auto theft — from carjacking to lesser known crimes, such as auto insurance scams, re-tagging operations and chop shops," Liddane said.

"People should keep their eye out for re-tagged vehicles," Lt. Paula Whitty of the commercial auto theft section of the Detroit Police Department, said. "That's when the original VIN (vehicle identification number) has been removed and replaced with another number, usually indicating a stolen vehicle. Anything that looks tampered with, probably has been," Whitty said.

When buying a used car, even from a dealership, consumers should make sure they have proper titles, the VIN intact and the federal sticker is on the inside of the driver's door, Whitty said. "That federal stickers should also match the VIN. All

the paperwork and vehicle ID should be in place and have matching information," Whitty said. If not, the car is probably stolen and the original owner is legally entitled to that car, she said.

Insurance fraud is trickier, Liddane said. "That's basically a paper crime — usually where a vehicle owner hides or disassembles a vehicle, reports it stolen to the police, and in 30 days, (if insured) receive reimbursement from the insurance company," he said. Liddane advises citizens to be aware if they see a vehicle being stored for an extended period of time — that is could be part of an auto insurance scam. Any citizen who has information about stolen vehicles or wants to report a tip should call the police and the H.E.A.T. tip line at (800) 242-HEAT and report what they know.

The tip line is monitored by the Michigan State Police Crimi-

nal Investigation Section in Livonia. The section directs tip information to the appropriate law enforcement agency in the state.

Tip callers are rewarded up to \$1,000 if their tip leads to the arrest and binding over for trial of a suspected car thief, up to \$10,000 is rewarded if the tip results in the arrest and binding over for trial of suspected theft ring members and or chop shop operators. H.E.A.T. also awards \$2,000 for information leading to the issuance of a warrant for a carjacking suspect.

As of March 15, 35 tips have been paid a total of \$61,150 with 57 vehicles recovered with a total value of \$624,500. Also, 89 tip calls have been made and 55 suspects have been arrested, as of March 15.

In 1995, 87 tips were paid a total of \$165,450, 154 vehicles were recovered for a total value of more than \$1.8 million.

Teen smoking Solve problem in classrooms

The Plymouth City Commission did the right thing by backing off an ordinance aimed at cracking down on teen-age smoking.

Smoking is a serious health problem and should be discouraged at every point possible. However, imposing a \$50 local fine is not the answer Education is.

The ordinance would have allowed the city to prosecute teen smokers in the 35th District Court instead of sending the offenses downtown to Wayne County courts where the offense isn't treated seriously.

On paper it sounded good. However, to force a teenager to pay \$50 does nothing more than fill the court's coffers. It doesn't address smoking as a health issue.

Also, the issue has become bogged down in politics. At its March 18 meeting, the city commission was presented a letter from

Wayne Probate Court Register Alexander Luvall. He challenged criticism of the county courts.

"It is important that you understand that the court has conducted hearings and assessed costs in a very high percentage of the cases heard," he wrote. "The hearings were established to assist the Plymouth-Canton community with its student smoking problem."

Let's face it. All the letters in the world sent between a prosecutor's office and local officials aren't going to stop a teenager from smoking. That will have to come from parents and schools.

The best places to address the smoking issue are the classroom and the living room.

New voting machines deliver

Technology can work. Just as it did for Plymouth Township officials who used touch-screen voting machines in the Republican primary election last week.

It went off without a hitch. Our favorite anecdote is about an 80-year-old-plus gentleman who was nervous about the new machinery at first, but after voting was happy with it.

When a senior citizen can easily use a new voting system, then it is a success.

Also, the new system which allows voters to simply touch the name of a candidate on a screen to register their vote, was able to quickly produce voting results. The totals were available 70 minutes after the polls closed. Estimates are that it will be quicker

in the future.

In a report to township trustees, Township Clerk Marilyn Massengill said, "I am happy with the equipment's performance. With additional knowledge and experience, I believe future elections will go smoothly."

There were, however, a few complaints about lighting. Voters said that lights caused a glare on some of the screens, making it hard to read. Township officials opted not to buy voting booths to go with the screens that eliminate any problems with glare.

Overall, there were no serious problems. That's a good track record for the new system, which cost \$160,000.

Older pets need homes too

An estimated 200,000 pets are euthanized in Michigan annually, according to the Michigan Humane Society.

That's a travesty when you consider that many of these dogs and cats were loved but for some reason discarded with the garbage.

This trend can be reversed — not only by people refusing to discard their animals — but also by adoption. A great number of the animals euthanized are adults, often as young as 2-3 years of age.

There are plenty of pet adoption agencies out there, including the humane society and the Michigan Animal Adoption Network, which has weekend adoption fairs.

True, there's nothing quite as heartwarm-

ing as a cuddly puppy or kitten. But there's also nothing as heartwarming as a pet who needs a home. By adopting older pets you already know what size the animal will be, what its habits are and what its needs are.

The dogs and cats that people have tossed onto the street are good pets. They just don't have anywhere to go — except the incinerator.

Adoption agencies also ensure the pet is spayed or neutered, has its shots and has been checked by a veterinarian before it comes to your home.

Also consider that older pets are perfect for working families who are gone all day. Older pets know the score. They trust you will return.

Spring delays arrival here

If spring had an official sound, it would be the crack of a baseball bat, a smell, lilacs and a sight, green buds.

And while the calendar says spring is here, folks in Michigan know that those sights and sounds are still a few weeks away.

The Tigers usually have an opening day where the weather is more likely to produce snow than sunshine. And even though the hardy crocus has been popping out from under snow covered patches, other spring flowers don't dare come out until April or May.

That means we will have to wait patiently for at least a couple weeks watching the weather maps and waiting for the real spring and not just the occasional warm day or two to finally arrive. While that sounds like grim

work, we can take pride in that it makes us more resourceful.

Here are a few tips to speed the wait:

- Visit a nursery or garden center to get in the "spirit of spring."
 - Pick up a garden catalog and plan out a new landscaping scheme.
 - Get a copy of the Tigers' schedule. Check out which home games you'd like to see in May or June. April can be a cruel month in Tiger Stadium.
 - Get out the state map and remember the warm lakes of July and August.
- All those activities can take place inside, which is a good place to be until at least April.

Many reaping benefits of Proposal A

Hard to believe, but it was a full two years ago that the state of Michigan dramatically changed the way it pays for public education. Some people lately have been criticizing the lingering effects of 1994's Proposal A, and maybe with some justification. On the whole, though, here's one taxpayer who's mighty glad he voted for it.

What brings this to mind is the arrival of our property tax assessment earlier this month. That day of dread has lost its sting now, thanks to the combined efforts of our elected officials and the Michigan voters.

Of course, part of the whole reform package involved some tax increases, the most wide-ranging being the rise in the state sales tax from 4 to 6 percent. This part of the plan drew a lot of fire when it was proposed, some

people arguing that it would discourage the purchase of goods and thus prove a drag on the state economy, and others worrying that it would be an unfair burden on lower-income people. I don't think either of these worries has really played out. As uncomfortable as I am defending any tax increase, this one still strikes me as reasonable, given the benefits of the package of the whole.

Which brings me to the aspect we most often think about: The changes in the property tax structure. Instead of a patchwork of local taxes, we have a statewide tax with some, much smaller, local taxes laid on top of it. The system of allocating the state money to the various local districts is confusing and cumbersome, and may indeed be unfair (though in my mind, certainly not as unfair as the previous system). But the impact on the homeowner — that's the key.

Most people got a cut in their property tax rate. A lot of people got a big cut. Some got a relatively small one, maybe not even enough to offset the increase in the sales tax. But that, of course, depends on how much money the individual spends.

As nice as the property tax cut was, however, in my mind it pales in comparison to the single most important reason I voted for the proposal: The cap on assessment increases.

This was probably the single best change in tax policy this state has seen in many years; I rate it more important than the Headlee Amendment. In case you've forgotten, the change is simple: For as long as you hang onto your home, the "taxable value" — from which the tax bill is calculated — can only increase by 5 percent annually or the rate of inflation, whichever is lower. That means,

aside from changes in the tax rate, your — mine, everyone's — property taxes can only rise that much.

This change is critical. In this state's housing market, particularly in this area, the old assessments could shoot up 20 percent, 30 percent, or even more, in a single year. Talk about unfair impact. This situation was literally driving people out of their homes, and we've found a way to stop it.

Some people arguing against the change say that this system is unfair because the old-style assessment becomes the taxable value for the new owner of a home. They say this will lead to dramatically different taxes on similar properties in a given area. Yes, it will; this has already started to happen and will continue to do so.

So what? This isn't unfair to the new people; it's simply a break for the

longtime residents. The new owner's taxes are based on the exact same figure they would have been before Proposal A came along. And the longer the new owners remain, the more benefit they themselves will realize from the system.

Some say this punishes people who move. It doesn't; their taxes are just the same as before. What it does is reward people who don't move, those who stay in one place, helping to create a stable community with a better sense of its own history.

Michigan showed a lot of wisdom when the school finance reform package passed, I thought as I looked at our assessment notice. We're starting to see the benefits, and they'll get better as time goes on. The new system may not be perfect, but it's a big step in that direction.

College assessment truly a multifaceted task

As high school seniors think about college they are probably wondering what they are going to get out of it. With the increasingly chancing job markets, more non-traditional students (the parents, homemakers,

assembly-line workers) are also going to college. Most college students are very aware that a college degree increases (but does not guarantee) their earning power. They sometimes forget that to increase their earning power they must increase their learning power, that's the real bottom line in today's world. As our society begins to rapidly change, students who can learn quickly and adapt will be most successful. An emphasis on understanding what and how students have learned and is more important than ever.

People have the right to ask what they are getting for their money. From research, we know that quality management methods improve the

quality of programs and help lower costs. Most colleges such as Madonna University are committed to improving quality, keeping tuition costs down.

Colleges offer more sophisticated levels of learning and therefore require a more sophisticated approach to assessing the outcomes of college graduates. Madonna University's College of Continuing and Professional Studies recently hosted its fifth annual conference on assessment with more than 100 participants from public and private universities from as far as Chicago. Two major initiatives were discussed, quality management programs for continuous improvement and a new innovative assessment requirement by the North Central Association of Schools and Colleges (NCA) which accredits all colleges and universities in the Midwest. NCA now requires all colleges to measure and report on achievement

of educational goals a part of accreditation.

Universities in the United States are among the best in the world. People from all over the world come to study here. Its international reputation is beyond reproach. Our strength is in our diversity of programs.

The NCA has been recommending a sophisticated approach that lets colleges identify what they think are the most important programs, assess and create reports.

Madonna University has taken this one step further by adding a continuous improvement process. For example, between 97-100 percent of the Madonna's nursing graduates pass the national licensing exam on their first try. We continue to work towards a consistent 100 percent passing, but we will not stop there. We set our standards higher than the test.

The reputation of our graduates on job performance aids more in their success than passing the exam. Both measures are necessary.

The purpose of a college degree is not only to provide a highly skilled work force but to educate people to understand the history, the powerful ideas, and the culture of people in the United States and throughout the world.

We know from the lessons of history that a well-rounded education prepares students for a dramatically changing world.

The fundamental question universities must anticipate and address is: "Are we preparing students to meet the challenges of the 21st century?" These challenges will be both technical and ethical.

Universities will still maintain traditions of knowledge in history, religion, social understanding, sciences and arts, while they must also link

more closely to the immediate needs of employers. This will be a difficult and intricate task.

Universities cannot rest on their laurels, they cannot escape the quality assessment movement and they will have a much harder task defining and measuring progress. Just like the assessment movement that has been ongoing in our K-12 programs, there seems to be no turning back.

College and universities will be taking a more in depth look at themselves which will help keep higher education on top by offering increasingly better environments in which to learn. This renewed emphasis on assessment should also help our students become more flexibility and adaptable learners that are prepared to enter the 21st Century.

Corporate greed costs a great deal to country

An old friend told this story during intermission at last weekend's Plymouth Symphony concert in Novi High's auditorium.

In a rowing competition, the Japanese team had eight men at the oars and one coxswain to steer. The American team had one man at the oars and eight managers. The Americans lost by a mile. The managers fired the man at the oars and were duly accorded bonuses for analyzing the problem correctly.

Businessmen like Robert Eaton, chairman of Chrysler Corp., don't like such stories. Eaton spoke to the Economic Club of Detroit last week about the bashing in the media that managers get. "People like me and others who run companies like to think of ourselves as builders," he said. "And in spite of what the public hears and reads, we do care about protecting jobs..."

One gets a different impression from the 1995 annual report of Black & Decker, the international maker of home and commercial tools.

Business has been good. Revenues were \$4.77 billion, up 50 percent from 1989. Earnings were \$216.5 million, up 620 percent from 1989. But jobs? If you check pages 46-47 of the fine print, you find jobs had dropped more or less steadily since 1989 from 38,600 to 29,300 last year — a 24 percent loss. That's 9,300 people out of work.

Alonzo G. Decker Jr., former chairman of the board, is staying active. At age 88, he "is employed as a part-time employee/consultant at an annual rate of \$150,000," says the fine type in the proxy statement. That sum could pay several workers with families to support.

The directors each get a retainer of \$30,000 a year. They also get \$1,000 for each board and committee meeting. There were five board meetings, and most committees met four or five times, so they can take home \$39,000 to \$40,000 apiece — not bad for 10 meetings. Oh, and committee chairs get another \$3,000 on top of that.

But there's more. B&D provides each director \$100,000 of term life insurance and \$200,000 of accident insurance. A non-employee director who serves five years gets half the retainer amount, \$15,000, as a retirement benefit. How long do you have to work to get retirement benefits like that?

The chairman, president and CEO of this deal is Nolan D. Archibald, a man who is so good, apparently, that the free market eyes

tem awarded him a salary of \$839,000 and a bonus of \$810,000. That's just the money payout. Archibald has perks and other personal benefits of \$57,000, including \$31,000 for personal use of the company plane. Some workers in the U.S. economy are supporting a family on his aircraft perk alone.

There are nifty stock options, too, but space is running out.

Is this just one horrible example, sensationalized by the media, of how American corporations are run? Two Associated Press stories of March 5 put some numbers on the anecdotes:

- Personal incomes in 1995 grew 6.1 percent.

- The average compensation for chief executives of large companies jumped 23 percent in 1995.


Black & Decker shareholders were asked to approve a new Executive Annual Incentive Plan to be administered by a committee of the board. Says the proxy statement: "The committee does not anticipate that it will disclose the specific goal or goals for any fiscal year, because the committee believes that this information is confidential business information."

Upon confronting such arrogance, at least one stockholder voted a resounding "No." Tim Richard reports on the local implications of state and regional events.

COUNTY FUND TARGETS BLIGHT

An economic development fund to aid distressed communities and neighborhoods in Wayne County was announced Monday.

Wayne County Executive Edward H. McNamara and Wayne County Commission Chair Ricardo Solomon announced the creation of the 21st Century Fund.

"Wayne County faces significant economic and community development challenges as we approach the next century," McNamara said. "We have aging infrastructure, a shrinking population base and many blighted neighborhoods and commercial areas. The 21st Century Fund is designed to revitalize distressed areas while also creating jobs and enhancing the county's tax base."

Money from the sale of county surplus properties is being used to set up the fund, McNamara said. The fund has assets of about \$3 million and is projected to grow to at least \$25 million within the next five years as property sales are finalized.

The fund will take the county's economic development efforts to new levels, according to Solomon. "The county has created many innovative programs that have generated economic

opportunities and neighborhood revitalization," Solomon said. "However, these activities have been hampered somewhat by a lack of dedicated funding. The 21st Century Fund will enable us to maximize our efforts."

The fund will be used primarily for loans as opposed to grants. To create greater overall return, the fund will target projects that bring in other public and private funds.

The fund will support a range of projects, including land acquisition and preparation for housing; infrastructure; industrial site reclamation and cleanup; minority business development and downtown redevelopment.

The Economic Development Corp. of Wayne County will propose project plans for use of the fund with staff support from the county's Department of Jobs and Economic Development. The EDC, established under Public Act 338 of 1974, is empowered to undertake projects which promote industrial, commercial and

residential projects within the county. McNamara said he envisions the 21st Century Fund being a partner in projects initiated by Detroit Renaissance, the city of Detroit and other municipalities, the new Greater Downtown Partnership and other public sector and private sector development ventures.

"We look forward to supporting Mayor (Dennis) Archer's vision of making Detroit a great city again," McNamara said.




"Health care needs to be made more affordable," Janda said in a 1994 interview. "The way to do that is by preventing need."

Hardaway basketball, and tickets to see the University of Michigan football team, the Detroit Tigers and Toledo Mud Hens.

Tickets to see Gladys Knight, John Tesh and Tanya Tucker, along with an antique matching couch and chair, 19-inch color TV and a chance to sit in on a WJR radio show also will be up for grabs.

"We have quite a collection," said Janda, a Plymouth resident. "We're trying to attract a wide spectrum of folks. We want to have the fund raiser as a fund raiser, but we also want to have it as a bit of an event."

"We're going to have literature available that way folks can save and prevent injuries. Hopefully, the public will latch on and take that information and bring it

home and read it and maybe make some of these changes in the community."

The auction is part of the institute's fourth annual Mid-American Sports Medicine Symposium, during which Janda will talk about the headway his organization has made.

The Institute for Preventative Sports Medicine is a non-profit, charitable organization that focuses on the prevention of children's sports injuries with a reduction in health care expenditures. According to the institute's literature, one of the studies performed by the board of directors led to the proposed prevention of approximately 1.7 million injuries with a savings in health care of \$2 billion a year nationally.

The institute has studied improper soccer "heading" techniques, which have been shown to result in an irreversible loss of memory and information processes in youth and young adult soccer players, and how to prevent fatal arrhythmia as a result of being struck in the chest by pitched balls.

The project for which Janda is best known is his study of "break-away bases," created by Roger Hall of Pennsylvania. The bases pop off when players slide into them with a certain amount of force. The Centers for Disease Control analyzed Janda's data and concluded that if break-away bases were used throughout the United States, it would

prevent more than 1.7 million injuries, he said.

According to Janda, injuries caused by sports, motor vehicle accidents and the unintentional discharge of firearms are claiming the lives of more individuals younger than age 44 than any other cause. More than \$133 billion is spent on short-term care of those injuries -- excluding an employer's cost of replacing an injured employee.

"Until folks deem the prevention of injuries worthy of their attention, they're not going to give it support," Janda said. "If we can't get the support, we can't get the studies done to benefit them. That's where the fund raiser comes in."





Churches ready for Easter

If you thought carols were only sung at Christmas, you would be mistaken. Palm Sunday, March 31, marks the beginning of Holy Week as area churches celebrate the passion of Christ with special music, including carols.

The word "carol" originally meant a ring dance. It is believed that at one time people used to dance as well as sing to carol tunes. When they were most popular — the 1400s to the mid-1600s — they were sung at all times of the year. Many of the older carols, especially those from continental Europe countries, were written to be sung at Easter or in the spring.

Because people in the 1800s thought about carols only at Christmas, some of the best spring carols had Christmas lyrics put to their tunes. The song "Good King Wenceslas" originally was printed in 1582 as "Spring Has Now Brought Forth the Flowers."

With this in mind, local churches are putting the finishing touches to their music that will bring special meaning to the Holy Week observance and Easter celebration.





Women needed for study

Providence Hospital's Cancer Center is recruiting patients with advanced breast cancer to take part in a large, nationwide clinical trials program for a new medication recently approved for the treatment of postmenopausal women with advanced breast cancer.

Providence is the only community-based teaching hospital in Michigan participating in the study.

The new drug, Arimidex (anastrozole) is a potent, selective, aromatase inhibitor approved recently by the Food and Drug Administration as a new treatment option for advanced breast cancer in women who have already been through menopause and whose disease has progressed following therapy with tamoxifen, an established hormonal breast cancer therapy.

The objective of the clinical study is to test Arimidex opposite tamoxifen as first-line therapy for advanced breast cancer for this patient group.

"It is critical that we keep searching for new ways to treat advanced breast cancer," said Dr. Judie Goodman, coordinator of the Breast Cancer Work Group at Providence. "Clinical trials in this important disease area are of special interest to us since they have the potential to offer treatment to patients of all backgrounds who do not benefit from, or cannot tolerate, current therapy or have difficulty with multiple dosing regimens."

Approximately one woman in eight will develop breast cancer in her lifetime. According to the American Cancer Society, an estimated 184,300 women will be diagnosed with breast cancer in 1996.

It is estimated that about 6 percent of patients with breast cancer in the United States have advanced breast cancer. Further, the Breast and Cervical Cancer Project, sponsored by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, reports that a disproportionate number of deaths from breast cancer will occur among minorities and women of low income.

To be eligible for the Arimidex study, women must have already been through menopause, have been diagnosed with advanced breast cancer, not currently be taking tamoxifen as part of their breast cancer treatment, have an interval of at least 12 months between stopping tamoxifen and relapse of their disease before entering the trial, have an interval of at least 12 months between the start of chemotherapy and entry into this trial and not have any life-threatening disease, such as an extensive liver disease.

Participants in the clinical trial will receive free study medication and frequent monitoring at no charge.





Global glass goes to the edge

Two years ago, Ferdinand Hampson began visiting artists' studios in Asia, Europe and North America to research the latest in contemporary glass. He showcases the findings in Habatat Galleries' 24th annual International Glass Invitational. One-third of the more than 90 exhibiting artists are new, selected on the merit of their images not their credentials or years of experience spent working with glass.

"The theme this year is a celebration of creativity. These new artists were juried on what they created, not on their resume. In years past, the International centered around geographical location and historical tradition. I think the theme will challenge the noted artists as well," said Ferdinand Hampson president of Habatat Galleries. "Most of this year's International is storytelling art or personal images, not always relying on the beauty of the material."

Traveling to museums, galleries and artists' studios from Czechoslovakia to North Carolina, Hampson learned of artists mixing materials and using traditional techniques in innovative ways. Mundy Hepburn combines glass and gas. A trip to his Connecticut studio led to an exhibit of Mundy's work in a separate building behind the gallery leased especially for the International. The only other artist shown there is legendary glass master Dale Chihuly with his new 10-foot long wall piece.


Hepburn's luminous glass sculptures use high frequency static electricity to light up carefully balanced mixtures of harmless gasses such as neon, argon, krypton, helium and xenon. Colors arise from the blend of gasses inside as well as from phosphorus painted on the glass. Looking like sea life or strange creatures from outside our solar system, the glass sculptures literally move, reds flowing into blues.

"Mundy Hepburn's work is technology beyond. It's glass you have to plug in so we're going to display it in a darkened area where his 9-foot sculptures will rise out of the ground," Hampson said. In July, Hampson traveled to Taiwan to discover Heinrich Wang whose work

deals with cultural values of virtue, nature and the circle of life. Unlike America where the majority of glass artists mix materials Asian artists like Wang, who studied at Center for Creative Studies College of Art and Design in Detroit, concentrate exclusively on glass.

According to CCS' crafts department chairman Herb Babcock, Wang's "glass sculpture imparts a visual vitality to the classical." "I wanted to familiarize myself with Chinese arts of all types so I visited museums relying on historical tradition. Part of selecting works from other cultures is finding out about that country," said Hampson.

Although Troy artist Glen Michaels began exhibiting glass assemblages 30 years ago in New York, this year's theme challenged him to create pieces confined to a single concept. "Copper River" is a tall rectangular relief incorporating copper fused in

glass. Using copper fragments as fine as human hair, Michaels surrounds them with unglazed gray tile reminiscent of the facade of a building or mountain. "I hope it suggests that it's a

man made work being exposed. As if the side of a mountain has fallen away, or an echo of an archaeological site," said Michaels, best known for his 90-foot long mural in the Bricktown Station of downtown Detroit's People Mover. Michaels, whose primary work is private and commercial commissions, is currently creating a 100-square foot fused glass wall mural which flows into a pool in front of Beaumont Hospital.

Bigger and Better Hampson expands the International to include four levels of glass this year. Spaces, designed for showing Asian art and a retrospective of glass works from the 70s and 80s, will transport visitors into different worlds. Outside the gallery in the park will be a sculpture garden of glass.

Two weeks before the International, staff members unpacking the glass were in sheer delight as if it were Christmas morning. Catching their fancy were sleek and sophisticated raspberry and burnt amber geometrical works by Czechoslovakian husband and wife artists Stanislav Libensky and Jaroslava Brychtova. As always, Emily Brock's found objects like old waffle irons turned into miniature diner scenes produced amazement. Large jars pierced by dozens of straight pins and looking as if they came from a mad doctor's laboratory by another artist drew mixed responses. Once assembled, said Hampson, the artist's intent will become apparent. He preferred to reserve his comments until then.

Begun one year after Habatat Galleries was established in Dearborn, the International Glass Invitational is the oldest and largest annual exhibit of contemporary studio glass in the United States. Held in conjunction with Michigan Glass Month, the International continues to show the progressive growth of glass as a respected art material. Once considered a craft, the contemporary studio glass movement born 34 years ago, is now a contender in the world of fine art.

What excitement is contained within the cool surface of glass?
Esthetic beauty, scientific wonder, historical fascination...

Featured pieces are both delicate and durable. The colors and intricate work have lingered through the centuries.

A cobalt blue bottle from the first century A.D., a Byzantine flask with trailing on its neck from the fifth or sixth century A.D., a jug from the fourth century...

The gallery's wonders are on view all year, not just during Michigan Glass Month, and they

are in a variety of media, not just glass.

A textile from Peru, dating A.D. 900 to 1500, shows detailed work in a pattern of birds.

A cuneiform tablet is shown with its own envelope. The clay tablet, sealed with the seal of the scribe, tells of payment of barley and features a presentation scene.

Drinking vessels called Kantharoi date from 330-310 B.C. Their deep bowls are brightly and joyously adorned with

women's faces. Smaller faces are found inside the vertical handles that extend above the lip of the cup.

On a larger scale is a vessel called a krater from the early fourth century B.C. The item bears a depiction of a gorgon, a creature whose stare could turn a human into stone.



Sweet Lorraine's exercises perfection

Having a meal at Sweet Lorraine's is much more than an evening or afternoon out. It's an exercise in perfection.

Lorraine Platman, owner of the restaurants in Southfield, Madison Heights and Ann Arbor, is an admitted perfectionist. Some might consider that a bad trait, but for Platman it has helped her restaurants maintain their reputation for having quality service and food.

"Everything we do here, we try to do against the negative things that you might experience with other restaurants," Platman said.

The presentation of the food at Sweet Lorraine's is like a play

on a stage, she explained. Visitors to her restaurants are greeted with "hello" instead of the curt "smoking or non smoking?" or "how many?" There are no bussers screaming across the floor. The servers welcome guests like they're the only ones who matter.

Platman makes sure that none of her dishes goes out with garnish. If it does, it isn't finished. She wants to make the show look finished.

Even the decor at Platman's restaurants is meticulous. The stores, like the 11 1/2-year-old Southfield location, are filled with conversation pieces - funky brightly colored salt and pepper shakers, lights that are held by little trapeze artists, heat-sensi-

tive straws served with lemonade, and mannequins dressed with clothing from trendy Royal Oak stores.

When she was preparing to open her Ann Arbor location 2 1/2 years ago, she saw the new building as a palate on which to create yet another conversation piece.

Located in the lower level of a building near Farmers Market, the Ann Arbor store fills with light from the ceiling to floor windows. Artworks from Matisse and Monet adorn the walls. Some of the guests call ahead of time to make sure that they're not seated next to the classically painted nudes. Platman obliges. "These are our guests. We want to make them comfortable." Even her cafeteria-style loca-

tion in Madison Heights, opened 13 1/2 years ago, has funky touches of its own.

"People don't have to notice everything. They notice this thing and that thing. Like in my Madison Heights store, I have gray napkins and people come in and say, 'they have grey napkins.'"

Platman, who moved to Michigan from Essex County, England, in 1965, is a self-taught chef. Having studied fine art and environmental science in college, she calls herself an "environmentally aware art chef."

"Actually I think about food all the time. My beginnings are in art so I visualize food (as an art form). I'm very influenced by cuisine around the world," said

Platman who runs the restaurants with her husband.

Her vivid imagination helps her create the dishes that has made her restaurant popular. Smoked Salmon Quesadillas (\$6.95) - made with Norwegian smoked salmon combined with cream cheese, capers and spices then grilled in a large whole wheat flour tortilla - is a top choice as an appetizer.

Her Jamaican "jerk" steak marinated in hot Caribbean spices then broiled to order (\$16.95), and her Hot Yellowfin Tuna Nicoise salad tossed with green beans, diced tomatoes, fresh herbs and Yukon gold potatoes (\$12.95) are among the favorites of her clients.

She created her burgers

(\$5.95-\$8.95) with flair as well. The Portobello Mushroom Burger is served with no-fat balsamic, roasted garlic dressing and grilled served with caramelized onions, spicy aioli, tomatoes and baby organic greens.

A vegetarian-friendly restaurant, she offers a different vegetarian entree every night. On the menu, Platman goes out of her way to make sure that vegetarians know that her Caesar salads are made without egg yolks.

"We make things easier on guests. We don't do stuff that's easier for us."

What if guests still aren't happy?

"If they don't like it, we'll change it. I try not to be a trendy restaurant. I tend to appeal to people on a comfort level."

Singer's tape campaign wins rock star's notice

Jonny Polonsky didn't want to play the game of chance and hope that a record company would one day notice him. So he cut to the chase.

and get his record deal with American Recordings. The label mates are now touring together; they come to St. Andrew's Hall in Detroit on Thursday, March 28.

Polonsky played all the instruments and sang all the vocals on his appropriately named debut "Hi My Name is Jonny." But he hired a band to bring his Replacements-style pop rock on the road.

"It changes the songs for sure. There's no harmonies just a guitar, bass and drums. It makes it a little more rock pop than pop rock. At first I was a little Nazi-esque in wanting to make the songs sound like the record. I think they still do have the basic feel and everything."

On the 10 song, 24-minute CD "Hi My Name is Jonny" Polonsky sings about relationships ("Love Lovely Love," "Evil Scurvy Love," "Gone Away" and "In My Mind"), "post mortem astral projection"

("Uh-Oh"), a boating excursion turned fatal ("I Don't Know What To Dream At Night"), and "an ode to the joys of avoiding painful confrontation through napping" ("It's Good To Sleep").

His most recent relationship, which ended last fall, was "definitely an inspiration" for "Hi My Name is Jonny," the Chicago native explained.

"A lot of the songs are definitely written from a certain period of time for me. They're about a specific person, but not always all the way through. The core of the song might be inspired by something," Polonsky said.

"Hopefully they're just good songs. I like songs that everyone can relate to."

Band won't explain 'Just' video

When the British rock band Radiohead comes to the Sanctum in Pontiac Friday, April 5, don't plan on any of the members revealing why a man lays down and refuses to get up in the video for "Just."

I asked guitarist Ed O'Brien during a recent phone conversation if he ever plans on explaining the plot and he answered bluntly.

"No. Never," O'Brien said with a slightly annoyed tone in his voice. "You wouldn't believe how many times we get asked that. We're thinking about wearing pins that say 'No Just Answers.'"

The follow-up video, for "High and Dry," a crime mystery plot that takes place in a San Francisco diner with real patrons as extras, is just as intriguing. The secrets behind Radiohead's videos for its latest album "The Bends" are shoeing budgets and young art students who

have no experience in making videos, O'Brien explained.

"Our trade is to perform live. We wised up on videos on (the debut album) "Pablo Honey. We were quite involved in them and we were deeply horrified," O'Brien said with a laugh.

"We've been lucky with the videos that we've had (for "The Bends"). Although this album hasn't been huge, we've gotten quite a bit of MTV play. MTV told us, 'The videos have been good. We now so look forward to getting a Radiohead video.' When you watch MTV and stuff like that, you see the same directors. It has become a very boring format. It doesn't have to be like that. You don't need to spend hundreds of thousands of pounds to make a video."

The creative videos have helped push "The Bends" out of record store shelves nearly a year after its release. Like the Sanctum show, most of the gigs on Radiohead's tour are sold out. O'Brien chalked the slow climb

up to the album's eclectic nature.

"There are no stand-out tracks on the album. There are different songs for different moods hence we haven't really had that one big track. That's exactly what we wanted. 'Creep' (from "Pablo Honey") was a stand-out track. We wanted to get away from that stand-out track (theory) and make a more cohesive album."

'Girl 6' rates a 4 for Lee

On one level "Girl 6" returns Spike Lee to his roots as a low-budget filmmaker. Released last week with little of the director's usual hype, it serves up another slice of black urban life with an engaging cast and a hip-hop sense of humor.

You can also see it as a vanity project of sorts, garnering wide release with seemingly little effort. Where the cleverness and edge of "She's Gotta Have It" forced viewers to take notice, "Girl 6" works on the slimmest of ideas.

Lee leaves himself open for comparison. Here Theresa Randle plays a struggling actress whose opening-scene audition requires her to read lines from that previous film. Humiliated after disrobing for a pushy director, she hooks up with a phone-sex job where she finds not only money but an appreciation of her talents.

She recreates herself daily, not only on the job but on the streets, donning a series of often outrageous outfits and wigs. She dreams about the black actresses that have gone before her, mimicking everyone from Dorothy Dandridge in "Carmen Jones" to Pam Grier's Foxy Brown.

As Girl 6, she soon becomes

the most-requested operator, servicing a steady stable of clients. We see them, filmed mostly on video, calling from lonely bars, seaside villas, and corporate offices. The funniest likes to talk dirty while he stands in his underwear, but in hand, before an elaborate baseball stadium backdrop.

The phone-sex idea is hardly novel. Robert Altman's "Short Cuts" had as one of its many characters a housewife who fulfilled callers' sexual fantasies while doing mundane chores like changing a diaper or nursing a child. Fine as a subplot it has yet to carry an entire film.

"Girl 6" is also a cautionary tale in which the fantasy encroaches on the actress' real life. A psychopath phones with plans to rape and kill her, even giving her address, a harrowing idea that Lee introduces then drops.

As aimless as the whole project ultimately becomes, you actually look forward to Lee's ubiquitous cameo, this time as a baseball memorabilia-collecting neighbor who serves as shoulder for her to cry on.

John Turturro shows up as a slimy theatrical agent along with Quentin Tarantino as a hot director known only as QT. Madonna, who has found her niche in the movies as a charac-

ter actress, plays the boss who encourages the woman to work from home.

If nothing else, "Girl 6" serves as a showcase for the chameleon-like Randle. You're reminded how good she is when Halle Berry shows up (in yet another cameo), barely able to make a convincing job of playing herself. Super model Naomi Campbell also appears as a fellow operator, dressed in a tee-shirt reading "Models Suck," a good indication of the movie's often self-conscious humor.

The twenty-plus vintage Prince songs (and a few new ones) give the movie a welcome sense of nostalgia. It's a fitting combination, since the movie, in concept at least, recalls the days a decade ago when Lee, like Prince, was more than just a symbol.

Following a recent foray into his childhood ("Crooklyn"), it's not surprising that Lee would again look back to his own past. Unfortunately, on a scale of one to 10, his work on "Girl 6" only rates about a four.





Is it time for the Plymouth Salem boys track team to go the distance?

This may have to be the year the Rocks win the Western Lakes Activities Association, according to fifth-year coach Geoff Baker.

Salem returns two of the area's best long distance runners in seniors Jared Binecki and Scott Pengelly. With an improved supporting cast, Baker believes the Rocks will improve on last year's third place finish in the league standings.

"We have about 12 juniors and seniors and the rest are underclassmen," Baker said. "But we have quality in those juniors and seniors and if they can pass it on to the younger ones, we'll be good for several years to come."

"This may have to be the year for us, however, because Binecki and Pengelly will be very hard to replace."

Salem didn't lose a lot from last year's team. Besides middle distance runners Andrew McDonald and Steve Karmann, the Rocks lost Rocky Johnson, a state-qualifier in the discus and shot put.

There's no question that the strength of the team will be in the distance. Binecki was the WLAA champion in the mile run and second in the two-mile last season. He also qualified for the state meet in both with season-best times of 4:26 (mile) and 9:50 (two-mile).

Pengelly, who is coming off a strong cross country season, qualified for the state meet last season in the two-mile, but a late-season ankle injury kept him sidelined.

Joining the two seniors in distance will be sophomores Teono Wilson and Japbir Gill, junior Greg Mitchell and freshman John Little.

"We're going to have to make sure we don't run our distance runners to death," Baker said. "We did that last year and it took its toll."

A pair of sophomores - Dave Hester and Karl Brandenburg - will make up for the loss of Johnson in the throwing events. The two will also be important because Salem doesn't have any pole vaulters.

Hester broke Salem freshman records last season in the discus

(139 feet) and in the shot put (43-foot-9). About seven other throwers will help the duo.

"There are some big shoes to fill, but I'm sure that Dave can do it," Baker said.

The Rocks were weak in the long- and high-jump last season, but Baker sees improvement. Junior Andres Lopez will hope to use some of his basketball ability to help him be the top jumper.

Joining Lopez will be fellow hoopster Bahvin Patel, a sophomore. Hester and sophomore Jeff McKian will also jump both events.

Junior Mike Rodriguez, senior Dirk Schmiedel and senior Kyle Dylsizen will specialize in the long-jump. Dylsizen has fully recuperated from a serious injury last season, when his head banged off a concrete landing.

"Our jumpers are young, but we're going to need points out of them to make a run for the championship," Baker said. "We have to have them jump as much as possible so they'll be ready for the conference meet."

Schmiedel and Hester are the leading 110-meter high hurdle returnees. Junior Rob Hawley and sophomore Mike Discher will compete in both the 110 and 300 hurdles, as will senior Dan Johnson - the WLAA's second fastest 300 hurdler last season.

A young but experienced group of sprinters will help the Rocks improve on last season's performances. The group includes junior Lawrence Nunn, sophomores Kevin Conte and Scott Kingslien, and freshman Chris Mason.

Perhaps the most versatile runner will again be senior Jason Barylski, who may see action in each event from the 100-meter dash all the way to the one-mile run.

Junior Scott Loewe and sophomores Ian Searcy and Charlie Schmidt will run with Barylski in the middle distances.

"We're definitely a better team than we were last season," Baker said. "My goal is the conference championship. Westland John Glenn, Farmington Hills Harrison and Northville will all be tough challengers."

Canton looking for better things in '96

The key to success for this season's Plymouth Canton boys track team may be health.

Even though it sounds simple enough, the injury bug was something that plagued the Chiefs last season. And it may be back.

What promises to be a promising year for Canton has already started off with an injury. Senior Chris Benskey, who was to be Canton's leading thrower, broke one of his legs a month ago. His status to compete at all this spring is questionable.

But coach Bob Richardson, now in his eighth season at the helm of the Chiefs, is still optimistic that his team will improve on last season's 2-5 record and eighth place finish at the Western Lakes Activities Association meet.

"We have the talent this season, so staying healthy will be a key," Richardson said. "Some teams that were strong last season lost some key people to graduation. I believe this league will be very competitive and we could finish in the top five - perhaps even the top three."

The reason for Richardson's optimism is a strong balance of upperclassmen and lower classmen on the 40-plus member squad.

In addition, graduation didn't significantly hurt the Chiefs. Only three seniors left, the most vital being the team's leading thrower, Jon Gallinger.

Still, the throwing events looked to be strong before the loss of Benskey. Sophomore Kevin Kiel is now the team's top thrower. Junior Keith Balcon and senior Mark Wolf - both first-year members of the team - will add some much-needed support.

"We thought we had two good returning throwers, but now we only have one," Richardson said. "We are fortunate, however, to have two guys

come out for the team, and they are both big, strong kids."

The top long jumpers are back, led by senior Jim Chefan, who recorded a leap of 19-feet, 6-inches last season. Junior Dave Koshizawa, senior Curt Davidson and sophomore Jason Falardeau also return.

Chefan is the top returning high jumper (6-feet), too. Junior Mike Zdziebko and sophomore Eric Larsen also return.

Zdziebko, and juniors B.J. Page and Jeff Soash, will run the 110- and 300-meter hurdles. Senior Ben Nelson will focus his attention on the 300 hurdles.

"This is a good group of hurdlers," Richardson said. "It's the third year for all of them and fourth for Nelson. We definitely are looking forward to when we could run the shuttle hurdle relays."


Nelson, Chefan, Davidson, Falardeau and Koshizawa lead a deep group of sprinters. Junior Bill Iler, sophomore Rob Lynn and senior Steve Putala will also compete in the short distances.

A newcomer to the team, sophomore Kwaku Dankwa, may be the fastest member of the Canton team and may make some noise in the sprints, according to Richardson.

Sophomore Jon Page will show how versatile a runner he is by running the 400 and 800 runs. Others who will run middle distances and possible the 1,600 are Iler, seniors Craig Brunskole, Evan Crockett and Andy Hoisington and junior Adam DeGiorgio.

Senior Ian Bedford, who was Canton's leading scorer last season, is the team's top distance runner. Bedford, who qualified for the state meet in the 3,200 last season, recently finished fifth in the state in the 3,200 at an indoor meet held in Ann Arbor.

Senior Ryan Portrey, juniors Jason

Vergari and Bobby Mayer, sophomore Shaun Moore and freshman Jason Rutter will try to help Bedford score points in the distance events.

"Last year, we did our best in the distance, but I think we'll see improvements in the sprints and the hurdle events," Richardson said.

"The throwing events, which we're

usually strong in, are still a question. And it doesn't help that we don't have a pole vaulter. We're forced to start a lot of meets down 9-0."

Richardson also believes the addition of assistant coaches Paul Bedford, Jeremy Rheault and Terry Barnhart are paying immediate dividends in practice.

One Kramer gone, one left; Jed ends wrestling career

Michigan State University senior wrestler Jed Kramer interrupted a telephone conversation late Monday night to pay for some pizza at the front door. Pizzas? Up late? On a Monday night?

Is this really Jed Kramer, the guy who prides himself on being disciplined in the wrestling room, classroom and at home?

Kramer happened to be entertaining his brother, freshman Ezra Kramer, a member of the MSU wrestling team who lives in a dormitory across campus. Since he just finished a successful career and Ezra has at least three years left in his, Jed wasn't feeling guilty about eating his share.

"Now that the season is over, I guess I can eat all I want," said Kramer, a 1991 Redford Thurston graduate.

Kramer finished his career with successive berths in the

NCAA Tournament following grueling competition in the Big Ten, long known as the best wrestling conference in the country.

Kramer, who wrestled at 134 pounds, placed fifth in the Big Ten meet this year after taking sixth place last year.

He was 27-21 as a senior with seven pins to finish his career with a 71-81 overall record. He had a 1-2 record in the NCAA Tournament, just missing his chance to place among the top six.

Kramer opened with a 10-4 loss to Steven Schmidt, the third seed from Oklahoma State University.

"I wrestled well, not well enough to beat him," Kramer said. "I was getting desperate toward the end and ended up giving up a few points."

Kramer won a 10-1 major decision in the second round against Missouri's Emory, giving the Spartans 1.5 points toward their

seventh-place finish in the team standings. He bowed out of the tournament with a 5-3 loss to his regular nemesis from the Big Ten, Northwestern's, who ended up taking fifth place.

Ironically, Kramer defeated 6-4 the last time the two met at the Big Ten meet, earning Kramer fifth place there.

Still, Kramer is satisfied how his career turned. He was one of four MSU co-captains during the 1995-96 season.

"To go in and wrestle varsity at a Division I school, that's even an accomplishment," said Kramer, who finished third in Class B as a senior at Thurston at 119 pounds. "Now that my career has ended, I realize I accomplished a lot."

Kramer carries a 2.8 grade point average majoring in education, which is impressive considering his busy schedule. Along with being a member of the wrestling team, Kramer is president of Champions For Christ, a

Christian group that meets regularly on campus.

"It helps me grow to be a stronger Christian and better person overall," Kramer said.

His schedule took on a new dimension this semester as a student teacher for seventh and eighth grade math at nearby Haslett Middle School.

Some of the students, used to seeing Kramer in a suit and tie, also got to see his other side when they attended some of his matches at MSU. Some even prepared banners, which in this case is the equivalent to leaving an apple on the teacher's desk.

"At school, I'd dress up real professionally and they'd call me, 'Mr. Kramer,'" Kramer said. "It was funny to hear them at the meets saying, 'Go, Mr. Kramer.'"

Tom Minkel took over as MSU coach the same year Kramer arrived on campus in 1991-92. One of Minkel's trademarks is having a well-conditioned team,

which suited Kramer well.

Kramer was a cross country runner in high school and regularly won preseason distance competitions with the MSU wrestling team.

An MSU wrestling practice might be overwhelming for someone who is out of shape.

"It's a very intense practice," Kramer said. "We practice only in a T-shirt and shorts, not a sweat shirt, and I can remember losing six pounds once in practice. You sweat a lot."

Kramer wrestled as a freshman at 118 pounds with the MSU varsity before being red-shirted as a sophomore, mostly to catch up to some of the more experienced wrestlers in the Big Ten.

He was able to recover in about five weeks from a partial medial collateral ligament tear in his knee in the summer of '94. He also can laugh about a tough stretch a couple years ago when he competed despite sustaining

stitches in his head in two straight matches sandwiched around an ankle sprain in practice.

Kramer, who attended eight different schools because of family moves before settling in at Thurston in the ninth grade, is keeping his teaching options open. The Kramer family once lived in South Carolina and Jed had a fondness for warm weather.

He feels he can help make a difference as both a teacher and coach.

"I hear of gangs starting up and what they're thinking, I'm not sure. Some parents, I don't think some care what their kids do. Some don't want to be overbearing and have no rules," said Kramer, who carried a 3.45 GPA in high school. "Unless you see successful people having fun being disciplined and motivated, you don't have the motivation to lead an upward life."

Work ethic propels swimmers

Individually speaking, the 1996 boys swim season was a remarkable mirror of past seasons.

Once again, Plymouth Salem dominated the Western Lakes Activities Association. But once again, the Rocks did it with depth rather than individuals.

That's evident when examining the '96 all-Observer team. A year ago, Salem put three relays on the first team but just two individuals. This season, the Rocks have one relay and three individuals.

And yet, they still rank as the top team in the WLAA, the league that dominates all-Observer selections (Redford Catholic Central had two second-team selections; they were the only non-WLAA swimmers chosen).

There are only two individual repeats from '95: Livonia Churchill's Mark Campbell and CC's Kevin Reinke.

Best team effort of the season? Although Salem again won the WLAA title, the most impressive team at season's end was Livonia Stevenson, which edged North Farmington by a point at the WLAA championships.

This with a team of 13. Seven of them are mentioned somewhere on the all-Observer's top teams, which are listed below.

First team

200-yard medley relay: North Farmington sophomore Dan Gabriel, senior Jason Speer, junior Patrick Duthie and senior Phil Zald qualified for state meet in the final dual meet of the season, then finished second at the WLAA's to Stevenson. They gained some measure of vengeance with a ninth place at the state finals in 1:39.31, the fastest time posted by an all-Observer team this season. They also set a North pool record.

"We always had strong aspirations for our medley relay," said North coach Pat Duthie. "The four young men that swam on this relay each qualified for the state meet in the individual events of their strokes."

Mark Dettling, Plymouth Salem, 200-yard freestyle: A junior, Dettling was second in the 200 free at the WLAA meet to double-winner Mark Campbell of Livonia Churchill and was first in the 100 butterfly. He qualified for state meet in the latter.

"Mark has been a valuable swimmer the past three years with his versatility to swim whatever was needed for the team," said Salem coach Chuck Olson.

Dan Belanger, Farmington, 200-yard individual medley: A senior, Belanger qualified for state and finished second in the 200 IM at the WLAA finals (2:01.94). His best time was 2:00.8 in the IM; he also had a 59.38 in the 100 breaststroke.

"Dan's performance this year was outstanding," said Farmington coach Ross Bandy. "This season was a cap to four excellent years at Farmington High School."

Jason Speer, North Farmington, 50-yard freestyle: Speer finished second at the WLAA finals in both the 50 (22.58) and 100 (49.00) freestyle. His best clocking in the 50 (22.49) was a state qualifier. He also placed sixth in the 50 and fourth in the 100 at the Oakland County meet.

"Jason was an outstanding leader in and out of the pool for the Raiders," said Duthie. "He was our 'go-to' guy when we needed a big swim, such as anchoring our winning 400 freestyle relay in the WLAA championship meet." For his efforts, Speer was named North's most valuable swimmer for the '95-96 season.

Jeff Thomas, Farmington, diving: After a mediocre performance at the WLAA finals at which he finished fourth (428.40 points), Thomas, a junior, busted loose to place third at the state regional meet and ninth at state. His top six-div performance was an Observerland-best 285.10 points.

"Jeff has had an outstanding season."

said Farmington assistant coach Kurt Campbell. "Both his diving and leadership skills have grown by leaps and bounds. He continues to be a solid addition to the Farmington team."

Tim Buchanan, Plymouth Salem, 100-yard butterfly: Only a sophomore, Buchanan placed second to teammate Mark Dettling in the 100 fly at the WLAA meet (55.91). He saved his best for last, however, finishing eighth at the state finals with a career-best 53.27. That and his performance in the 500 free (5:00.96, sixth in WLAA) earned Buchanan co-MVP award at Salem.

"Tim had a fine sophomore season following a great freshman year, but he really stepped up his performance at state meet with six outstanding swims," said Olson.

Mark Campbell, Livonia Churchill, 100-yard freestyle: A self-described big meet swimmer, Campbell - a senior - proved it by winning both the 100 and 200 free at the WLAA finals. At the state meet, he further improved his stature by placing eighth in the 100 free (47.76) and ninth in the 200 free (1:44.04).

"Mark has been one of the most talented swimmers Churchill HS has ever had," said Chargers' coach Ken Stark. "Mark is an excellent big-meet swimmer and has left his mark on the league and at state meet."

Kyle Petroskey, Plymouth Salem, 500-yard freestyle: A versatile swimmer, Petroskey was at his best in the 500 free, an event in which he scored in at state meet, placing 10th (4:54.65). Nobody in Observerland had a faster time, but the junior also contributed to Salem's success in the 200 IM (seventh at WLAA meet) and in the 100 breaststroke. He was third in the 500 at the WLAA finals.

"Kyle had a great dual-meet season, in which he proved why he had been chosen most improved swimmer in 1995 by showing his versatility," said Olson. "Kyle was chosen Most Valuable Swimmer for 1996."

300-yard freestyle relay: What may concern opponents most about this Salem quartet is that just one of them - John McLenaghan - is a senior. Nick Corden and Buchanan are sophomores and Dettling is a junior. They took second at the WLAA finals (1:31.73) and finished 15th at state (1:30.31).

"It's an outstanding foursome with three of four returning to finish in 1997 what they started in 1996," said Olson.

Dan Gabriel, North Farmington, 100-yard backstroke: Gabriel set team pool records in the 100 backstroke (55.64) and in the 200 medley relay. The sophomore accomplished far more than that, however, winning the 100 back at the WLAA meet (55.52) and placing ninth at the state meet (54.15).

"Dan Gabriel knows what it takes to get the job done," said Duthie. "He is a highly-motivated hard worker." Those qualities earned him North's outstanding swimmer award for the past season.

Phil Zald, North Farmington, 100-yard breaststroke: A senior, Zald qualified for the state finals early in the season, then finished it by placing 11th at the state meet. His WLAA performance wasn't his best - he was sixth (1:02.87) - but everything else was.

"Phil has been an outstanding sprint freestyler and breaststroker for North Farmington," said Duthie. "He has been a major player in the success of North's swimming teams for four years. He has been a hard and very focused worker," one who holds the school record in his specialty.

400-yard freestyle relay: More good news for the Rocks and bad news for their opponents. The Salem foursome that took third at the WLAA meet (3:21.01) and qualified for state, where it took 10th (3:18.12), will be back in '97.

Nick Corden and Buchanan are sophomores; Dettling and Petroskey are juniors. "This foursome will be returning in 1997 and should be a force to be dealt with at the state level," said Olson.

seniors (Brian Butrico, Ted Burmeister and Chad Crosby) to anchor the relay (with sophomore Mark Sgriccia), Livonia Stevenson excelled. The Spartans only lost once all season in a dual meet and peaked at the WLAA finals, winning the league championship (1:40.60).

"I was real happy when this relay won at the league meet," said Stevenson coach Doug Buckler. "They did a great job all year."

Brian Rajdl, North Farmington, 200-yard freestyle: The Raiders' team captain, Rajdl took third at the WLAA finals in the 200 free (1:50.08). A senior, he qualified for the state meet on two North relays.

"Brian is a consistent hard worker," said Duthie. "He has always had exceptionally good swims at the end of the season, such as he had in this season's WLAA championship meet."

Alex Rottgers, Plymouth Canton, 200-yard individual medley: The one thing Rottgers has over most of his fellow all-Observer mates is age. He's just a freshman, and he already has taken a trip to the state championship meet. Rottgers qualified for state in both the 200 IM and the 100 breast, finishing third in the IM (2:02.04) and fifth in the 100 breast (1:01.98) at the WLAA finals. He posted a career-best 1:01.39 in the 100 breast at state.

"As a freshman, he was our high-point scorer in the dual-meet season and at the conference meet," said coach Kyle Lott.

John McLenaghan, Plymouth Salem, 50-yard freestyle: A senior, McLenaghan qualified for state in the 50 free and both the 200 free and 200 medley relays. His 22.56 clocking in the 50 was second-best in Observerland; he placed third at the WLAA meet in that event and sixth in the 100 back.

"John was chosen as one of our captains for the 1996 season, in which John and the other seniors won their four-straight WLAA Conference championship," said Olson.

Otto Geiseman, Plymouth Salem, diving: A state qualifier, Geiseman - a junior - battled Farmington's Thomas for top honors within the Observerland area all season. His season-high 285.00-point total was second only to Thomas. He finished fifth at the WLAA finals (414.65 points in 11 dives).

"Otto has improved every year and has continued the great tradition of outstanding divers from Plymouth Salem," said Olson.

Patrick Duthie, North Farmington, 100-yard butterfly: Duthie enjoyed a fine junior season by finishing third in

the 100 fly and sixth in the 200 free at the WLAA meet, qualifying for state in the former. His 54.35 at state was 14th best.

"Patrick is a very conscientious and diligent worker," said his coach, and father. "He made outstanding progress during the 1995-96 season, having dropped five seconds off of his 100-yard butterfly and qualifying for state."

Kevin Reinke, Redford Catholic Central, 100-yard freestyle: Reinke's junior season for the Shamrocks was capped by a double win at the Catholic League meet. He won both the 100 freestyle (49.72) and the 100 backstroke (56.84), qualifying for state in both.

Reinke was a first team selection on last season's all-Observer team in the 100 back.

Keith Falk, Livonia Stevenson, 500-yard freestyle: Falk is another of the promising freshmen in Observerland. He finished first in the 500 free at the WLAA finals (4:55.72) and qualified for state meet in that and the 200 IM. He was fourth in the 200 IM at the WLAA meet (2:03.42).

"Keith had a great first year at Stevenson," said Buckler. "He works real hard, and I think he'll be one of the greatest swimmers that I will have coached by the time he's a 12th grader."

200-yard freestyle relay: Chad Crosby (a senior), Steve Domin (a sophomore), Kevin Fordell (a senior) and Falk (a freshman) provided some big surprises down the stretch for Livonia Stevenson. The Spartan foursome qualified for state with a third-place finish at the WLAA finals (1:31.99).

"I was very proud of this relay team," said Buckler. "To take third place at league and then go to state and drop more time was just great."

Nick Sosnowski, Redford Catholic Central, 100-yard backstroke: Only a sophomore, Sosnowski paints a pretty picture for the Shamrocks' swimming future. He placed first in the 200 IM (2:03.75) at the Catholic League meet, at which CC finished second.

In the 100 back, Sosnowski posted the third-best time in Observerland (55.87) and qualified for state meet in both the 200 IM and 100 back.

Ted Burmeister, Livonia Stevenson, 100-yard breaststroke: Burmeister, a senior, excelled at the end of the season for the Spartans. He finished second in the 100 breast at the WLAA meet (1:01.86), qualifying for state, then finished 12th at the Class A final.

"Ted has been a pleasure to coach for four years," said Buckler. "He's the sec-





terested in a little pre-season action take a sick day Monday (blame it on spring fever) and head out to the Huron River at the Proud Lake Recreation Area because trout season officially opens at 12:01 a.m. on April 1. Well, in this neck of the woods anyway.

Thanks to the dedicated efforts of the Michigan Fly Fishing Club and the Michigan Department of Natural Resources a 23-year tradition continues beginning Monday as a two-mile section of the Huron River in the Proud Lake Recreation Area will be open to

catch-and-release, fly fishing only for trout April 1-26.

Back in the early 1970's, when gas prices were rising faster than the federal deficit, the cost of taking a trip north to fly fish was getting out of hand. A group of anglers from the Livonia-based Michigan Fly Fishing Club decided they wanted to institute a program to bring fly fishing a little closer to home.

In cooperation with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, the Michigan Fly Fishing Club came up with this special season. Approximately 3,000 brown and rainbow trout are planted each spring in a two-mile stretch of the Huron from posted signs just below Moss Lake to posted signs 100 yards below Wixom Road. This is the only section of the river open for the special season. General trout fishing rules apply to the area when the regular season opens on April 27 (Check the DNR Fishing Guide for specific guidelines).

"Our club spearheaded the project," said Dale Ross, a board

member of the Michigan Fly Fishing Club. "It has become a great training ground for people interested in fishing for trout in a stream."

A 1987 DNR study showed that each fish was caught an average of 3.8 times and most of the stocked fish are caught in May during the regular trout season. Some evidently do survive through the summer as ice anglers have reported catching trout through the ice on Proud Lake. 



Judge advocates unifying courts

Judge Ronald Lowe of the 35th District Court told Canton Chamber of Commerce members Thursday, March 21, that trial court unification would simplify a complex system and cost less to run.

Although a state House effort to combine the district, circuit and probate courts in Michigan has so far failed, and a tamer state Senate court-reform effort

has emerged, Lowe believes unification is still possible.

"We find ourselves with an unprecedented opportunity to reorganize," Lowe told chamber members at their "Third Thursday" breakfast gathering in the Old Country Buffet. "The governor's office wants to do it. The Supreme Court wants to do it. The state Legislature wants to do it. It's not often you get all those powers wanting to do something. Now what we have to

do is come up with the best plan.

"The best thing that could happen to you would be total trial court unification," he said. "If a proposal is out there to allow for trial court unification, that's something you should get behind because I think you'll find that the benefits will come down to your pocketbooks, too."

Under a unified system, any judge could hear any case. The way it's set up now, the cases are categorized and divided between

district, circuit and probate courts.

"There are ways you could find yourself in all three courts," Lowe said. For example, an adult and a juvenile could break into a house, then injure themselves falling into a hole for a pool in attempting to flee.

As a witness, the homeowner could be in district court for the adult's preliminary exam, in circuit court for the adult's trial, in probate court for the juvenile's

trial and in circuit court again to fight the lawsuit filed by the adult thief because the hole for the pool wasn't adequately marked with warning signs.

The current system, Lowe said, runs up attorney bills, causes police officers to work overtime and crowds jails with people waiting for trial.



One of my first stops was to an unofficial Boy Scouts page which included links to Boy Scouts of America Councils, BSA national phone numbers, national committees, Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Explorers, Sea Scout Ships, Order of the Arrow, Camps & High Adventure Bases, Jamborees, Camporees & Other Encampments, Wood Badge Courses, and links to other U.S. and international scouting resources. The Universal Resource Locator was <http://www.scouting.org/>.

I also was interested in the Slovene Catholic Girl Guides and Boy Scouts Association, also an unofficial page, which can be visited at <http://www.uni-nb.si/~uelulv28b/scoutse.html>. Their scouting groups are Cub Scouts (ages 8-10), Scouts (ages 11-15), Rover Scouts (ages 15-21), leaders and spiritual assistants (21 and older).

"1997 National Scout Jamboree" is a highly-developed Website that can be visited at <http://w3.trib.com/~dont/scouting/jambo97.html>. I learned that the 1997 Jamboree will be in Bowling Green, Va., July 28 through Aug. 5, and will be attended by some 34,000 Scouts ages 12-18. Activities will include aquatics, scuba diving, action centers, conservation, merit badge midway, arena shows, fishing, field sports including archery, shot gun and pioneering. The site gives the cost and criteria to attend.

This site also tells you how to subscribe to a Listserv discussion group on the 1997 jamboree by sending an E-mail message to majordomo@hoplite.org and in the message area type "subscribe jambo97" (without the quotes). The site also has a long list of jamboree Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs) as well as a who's who list of adult leaders attending. By the way, the Webmaster who maintains the jamboree home page also maintains home pages for the Masonic order including one for Job's Daughters.

A Cub Scout leader seeking information on Awards and Advancement will want to visit <http://www.hiwaay.net/usecscouts/csawards.html>. There are links relating to Tiger Cub Scouts, Cub Scout Advancement, Webelos Advancement, BSA Knot Awards for Cubs and leaders, and other Cub awards.

The best laid-out and most complete site I found was The Scout Hut which can be visited at <http://www.skypoint.com/members/srtobin/scouting.html>. A lot of the information comes from both Listserv E-mail discussion groups and Usenet news groups postings on Scouting.

"The Scouter's Reference Shelf" is a very complete reference that's very nicely and graphically laid out with colorful yellow file folder tab-like indexing graphical devices. The "Creative Campfires" folder label, for instance, is loaded with such items as Creative Campfires Handbook, Skit Planning, Campfire Cheers, etc.

"Stories & Storytelling" includes "The Bear's Tail - an Indian Legend," how-to tips on effective story telling, how to use stories, and a Shaggy Dog Story. "Scoutmaster's Minute" folder includes the Scout Oath, Meaning of Honor, Know Your Camp, a

Scout Worship Services handbook, and messages and biography of Lord Baden-Powell, founder of boy scouting.

The official home page of the Girl Scouts of America can be visited at <http://www.gsusa.org/>. Upon arriving, the user finds a greeting from the national executive director and a "current news" link. Other pages offer information on How We Serve Girls, Funding the Organization, Volunteer Opportunities, Publications, National Facilities, Cookie Sales, Adult Education, Technology, and Special Dates among other links. 



SHOW CELEBRATES THE ART OF GARDENING

Artists have taken inspiration from nature since the beginning of time. It's only fair that nature take some inspiration from art — at least nature as artfully arranged by gardeners and landscape designers at the Ann Arbor Flower and Garden Show, sponsored by the University of Michigan Matthaei Botanical Gardens, March 28-31.

The seventh annual show opens today at the Washtenaw Farm Council Grounds in Ann Arbor, see map and schedule.

This year's theme is "Art in Bloom," paying homage to numerous artists with appropriate garden settings prepared by area garden clubs, professional nurseries and individual gardeners. The artists spotlighted in the exhibits include Vincent Van Gogh, Salvador Dali, Pablo Picasso, William Morris, Piet Mondrian and many more.

Seven buildings will be connected by blossoming "greenhouse" tunnels.

The show features over 500 displays and exhibits including landscape garden displays, floral creations, a Master Gardener booth, a Marketplace with over 45 commercial booths, educational and plant society exhibits, live music at a gazebo and an Antique Garden area featuring ornaments, accessories, furniture and more.

The show's 2,400-square-foot feature garden, "In an Artist's Garden," has been inspired by Claude Monet's garden in Giverny, France.

The garden will include a series of arches with climbing roses, a walkway of nasturtiums, the facade of Monet's Pink House, a pond with a section of Japanese bridge and a 60-foot mural painted in the style of Monet depicting the Seine and the landscaping of Giverny. The feature garden will be designed by Lodi Farms Nursery of Ann Arbor and the UM Matthaei Botanical Gardens.

Adrienne O'Brien, horticulturalist at Matthaei, has been busy trying to force bloom nearly 8,000 pots of plants for the main exhibit and the linking tunnels. She has had to alternately warm and cool plants to get them blooming at peak times for the show.

"As I get more experienced, it gets easier. I can tell what will bloom," she said. "I take records without fail."

The Ann Arbor show includes a Standard Flower Show presented in cooperation with the Federated Garden Clubs of Michigan Inc. with judging in three categories — design, horticulture and special exhibits. Judging will be completed the day before the show opens. The show features 30 professional exhibitors, 35 gardening groups and 350 amateur exhibitors. The Cranbrook Garden Auxiliary will present a special exhibit featuring another artist recently in the news.

"Since the major exhibit is Monet's garden, we thought we'd do Vermeer's garden because of the big Vermeer show in Washington. No one has ever seen Vermeer's garden, so that's

an advantage," said Phyllis McLean of Bloomfield Hills.

The exhibit will feature a townhouse near a market square with a walled garden. Over the wall will be scenes of Vermeer's Delft.

"You can see it from a window in all his paintings," said McLean. "We've tailored it to a Dutch garden. Vermeer was interested in perspective, line, linearity and we try to capture that."

This is the fifth year that Cranbrook has participated in the Ann Arbor show. McLean said this was an important outreach project for Cranbrook. A hostess is always present at the exhibit to invite visitors to come to Cranbrook.

"It gets quite exciting. Everybody is playing out their fantasies. I always learn a lot from other exhibitors," McLean said.

Each exhibit offers a different challenge for the gardeners.

Winifred Boni of the Livonia Garden Club is working with Nancy Sannar on an entry called "Spacious Spaces."

"Our category is masters of form and we have to design a garden to include a sculpture," Boni said.

This is Boni's second year at the show. Last year the garden club did a lakeside cottage room with a fishing theme and took a second prize. This year her exhibit will be eligible for the Matthaei Botanical Garden Group Award. "We'll have a mixture of plants, different

foliage and flowers. The walls are a dusty pink and we'll work with those colors," Boni said.

Last year Keller and Stein Florist and Greenhouse of Canton won the People's choice award with its "Maytag Rag" exhibit, centering on an antique washing machine. This year the focus is on artist Georgia O'Keeffe.

"We're doing a small porch and patio exhibit with the theme 'Georgia on My Mind' in reference to Georgia O'Keeffe," said Bob Simmons of Keller and Stein. "We'll have shades of purple based on her purple petunias."

The O'Keeffe style flowers will be draped about "an old-fashioned Southern porch on a lazy afternoon."

Florence Smith of Farmington Hills, director of the Federated Garden Clubs of Michigan District 1, will be focusing on a very different modern artist.

"I'm entering a class called 'Hello Dali' as in Salvador Dali," said Smith. "I'm planning that I will try to get a feeling that will represent his work in color and form. I'll be using fresh plant as well as dried."

The area for the exhibit is tiny, not to exceed 8 inches in any dimension and viewed through an 11 inch opening.

"It's tedious to do. I have to keep the scale as well. I'm also involved in making miniatures and it helps."

Complimentary shuttle buses will run every 15 minutes from Briarwood Mall.

FOCUS ON PHOTOGRAPHY
Study photos critically



MONTE NAGLER

Did you know that one of the best ways to improve your photography is by closely looking at the photographs of others? Whether it's browsing through a gallery or leisurely thumbing through a good photography book, many benefits can be yours by a good, hard, critical look and analysis of the photographs. It doesn't matter if you prefer landscapes, street scenes, abstracts, people pictures, color or black and white. The important thing is to start looking at pictures and to begin to understand not only what the photographer is trying to communicate but, more importantly, how he or she is doing it and what the picture is doing to you.

By tuning into your own emotions and asking yourself some important questions as you "read" a photograph, you'll gain insight and technical skills that will certainly help you in making your own photographs.

Begin by asking what the subject or main theme of the photograph is. Does it move you and how do you respond to it? How do you suppose the photographer felt about it?

Study the lighting. Is it harsh or soft? What direction is it coming from and what time of day do you think it was? Ask yourself what might happen to the picture if the lighting were different. What camera position was used — near or far, low angle or high? Why do





you think the photographer used a particular camera position and what does it do for the picture? How might another camera location affect the photograph?

What lens do you think was used and why? Was it a wide angle, normal or perhaps a telephoto?

As you know, a lens' focal length and aperture greatly affect depth-of-field. Is there a lot of depth-of-field or little in the picture? How would a change in depth-of-field alter the final image?

What about shutter speed - slow or fast? Is the subject blurred in motion or caught at the peak of the action? Look for use of filters or any other special ef-

fects, too.

Of course, you should study the composition carefully. How are the elements of the picture arranged and does it all make sense to you?

Is the photograph telling a story? If so, tune into your feelings of it. Try to interpret what the photographer is trying to say and what your responses are.

LINGO

Real estate has a language all its own. Earnest money, closing costs, escrow accounts. It's hard to play the game if you don't know the rules or the lingo.

"One reason being a good Realtor is when you explain to people what it means — and what it means to them — and help them make a qualified decision on total understanding," said Linda Rea, an annual multi-million dollar seller with Real Estate One in Troy.

"The one who really needs protection is purchasers," said Tom Nemes, a Farmington Hills lawyer who does a substantial amount of real estate work. "They're always enthused, caught up in emotion. Detail is often overlooked."

Here's some basic terminology buyers and sellers should know before they jump into the market.

PURCHASE AGREEMENT

A document submitted by prospective buyers detailing the terms and conditions of a purchase offer.

Because the document is legally binding if accepted, it should be examined by a lawyer before submission to the seller.

HOMEOWNER'S INSURANCE

Usually required by mortgage lenders and a must at all times whether required by others or not unless you're very wealthy. It protects the owner against losses from fire, weather and criminal activity and damages from personal injury claims. Cost is several hundred dollars.

POINTS

A fee charged by a lender for a more favorable interest rate, payable at closing or rolled into the monthly payment. A point is one percent of the money borrowed. Two points on a \$100,000 mortgage would be \$2,000. Generally, the more points paid, the lower the rate.

INSPECTION

Usually included as a condition of sale in purchase agreement by buyer, an inspection gives purchaser a third-party's overview of property's condition. An inspection can cost a couple hundred dollars.

EARNEST MONEY

A cash deposit, usually 3 percent of the proposed purchase price, included with a purchase agreement to indicate a buyer's sincerity in making the offer. Earnest money is applied to the down payment at closing.

HOME WARRANTY INSURANCE

Becoming more popular, usually offered as an inducement by sellers. It pays to fix major mechanical, electrical and plumbing problems for a year or two after purchase. Cost can be a couple of hundred dollars. Buyer should consider including this in purchase agreement designating the seller as the premium payer.

SELLER DISCLOSURE STATEMENT

Required by state law, a form in which sellers describe their knowledge of the condition of the property.

DOWN PAYMENT

Up-front money paid by a buyer to acquire a mortgage. Traditionally, it's 20 percent of the purchase price.

TITLE INSURANCE

A policy to protect buyers and mortgage companies from challenges to legal ownership. Sellers usually buy a policy for a buyer's protection as part of a standard purchase agreement, and the buyer purchases a policy that protects the lender for the amount borrowed. Real estate agents handling a transaction usually arrange for title insurance. Cost can be several hundred dollars each way.

FSBO

For sale by owner.

MORTGAGE

Money borrowed from a financial institution to purchase a house.

MLS

Multi-listing service is a current list in computer or book form of houses available for sale compiled by realty boards. Descriptions usually includes basic information such as location, how many rooms in the house, special features and asking price.

CLOSING COSTS

Fees charged by lender when a mortgage is needed to buy a house. Costs can include appraisal fee, credit report, survey, title insurance, recording fees and mortgage application/document preparation fees.

COMMISSION

A fee paid to agents by the seller for selling a house. Exact amount is negotiable, but the going rate here is about 6 percent. Commissions usually are split between agents representing buyers and sellers if both are involved.

BUYER'S (SELLER'S) REMORSE

The psychological feeling of regret about making a big change in life. It almost always passes.

PRIVATE MORTGAGE INSURANCE

Insurance required of a buyer by a lender to protect the outstanding mortgage in case of foreclosure. Usually required if a downpayment is less than 20 percent, PMI can be costly — \$43 per month with only 10 percent down on a \$100,000 mortgage.

TRANSFER TAXES

Usually paid by the seller, the state/county transfer tax rate is \$8.60 per \$1,000 of a house's selling price everywhere in Michigan except Wayne County, where it's \$9 per \$1,000.

ESCROW ACCOUNT

Usually required by a mortgage lender, it allows homeowners to pay property taxes and, sometimes, homeowners insurance on an installment basis. Lender pays property taxes and insurance from individual accounts when due.

Board should have control over funds

REAL ESTATE QUERIES

Q: Our board has placed our reserve funds in an account where the management company has signatory power. In fact, I am not sure that the directors themselves have any power to sign checks on the account. Is that a good idea?

A: No. The board of directors should maintain tight controls over the expenditure of association monies at all times. Unfortunately, there have been a number of instances of embezzlement by management companies in certain locations around the country, particularly in Manhattan and California. I would not allow any third party to have any direct control over your funds without getting the requisite signatures from the association board members, i.e., at least two, particularly with respect to reserve funds. I recognize, of course, the difficulty in facili-

tating the remittance of day to day checks by management firms of the association funds if they need the association board's signature. The board must consider the pros and cons of giving the management company that flexibility with respect to the expenditure of association operating funds. However, as to reserve funds, I believe that the association should have exclusive reign over the expenditure and remittance of any checks from these accounts.

Q: I am attorney representing the buyer of a resale unit within a community association which is still under construction. Do you have any tips which I could consider beyond the normal aspects of reviewing the contract in any real estate purchase.

A: In the limited space available, may I suggest that you consider the following: (1) has the developer completed the recreational amenities, if any, and other common facilities and, if not, is it committed to do so by a certain date; (2) has the developer made the necessary financial contributions required by the

governing documents and/or the disclosure statement. If not, what is the likelihood that the unit owners will be required to fund a deficit in the association's working capital reserve accounts after the developer is departed; (3) has control over the homeowner association governing body been transferred to the unit owners; (4) if control has been transferred to the unit owners, has "transition" been completed. If not, is there an expectation of significant litigation with the developer for defects in the common areas or for the developer's failure to make the necessary financial contributions.

Use different lenders for different needs

THIS WEEK'S HOME MORTGAGE SHOPPING TIP:

Using a lender or loan officer who specializes in the type of financing required for your home purpose can make all the difference.

The days of going to the corner bank for all your home financing needs are over. The home buying process has changed, along with everything else. Income, assets and credit are three of the four major components lenders look at when considering a mortgage for approval. The evaluation of the property to be financed is the other major component. Buyer's

salary and commission plans have become more confusing for lenders to analyze. The way people manage their assets is not as simple as when they simply deposited their extra money into savings accounts, making it much easier for underwriters to track. Finally, the depth of people's accumulated credit history makes the mortgage approval process much more involved for the lender.

Due to the changes mentioned above, mortgage lenders increasingly need to become more flexible in how they determine a borrower's credit worth and more flexible in the types of mortgage programs they offer.

This brings me to my mortgage shopping tip of the week. With so many lenders and so many mortgage programs available today, I believe it is very important to narrow down the specific mortgage program you will need before you select the lender. There are several reasons for this. First, I have found that most lenders and loan officers have developed specialties in certain mortgage programs and have mastered how to handle them better than others. Along with this, the interest rates and closing costs are usually lower than the competitors. I've often seen someone spend more money or have problems with a certain

lender/loan officer who simply was not the best choice for their mortgage needs. And, subtle differences between lenders can translate into major problems or big losses.

Again, try to figure out what type and what size mortgage you're going to need. You may need a conventional loan, new construction loan, first time buyer loan, low down payment loan, fixed or adjustable rate loan, shorter term loan, a loan that allows for bad credit, a no-income verification loan, bridge loan, balloon loan, no-point/no-cost loan. . . . The list goes on and on. With so many programs to choose from, it would be

extremely difficult, if not impossible, for any one lender to offer every one of these loans efficiently and competitively. Just remember, like most products and services in today's world, if you use a lender or loan officer who specializes in your specific mortgage needs, you'll be getting help in making one of your biggest lifetime investments a better experience, while probably saving additional money in the meantime.

THIS WEEK'S QUESTION:

Q. We are planning to purchase a home this spring. We think that we will only be staying in the home approximately four to five years. What type of mortgage would you recommend? Should we buy the points to lower the interest rate?

A. I would first advise against buying points when you're not planning to have the mortgage more than five years. It normally

takes five years to make up for the up front cost of paying the points. You would be better to pay the slightly higher rate over the five years instead of one lump sum up front. In my opinion, a 3-, 5- or 7-year adjustable rate would be ideal for you. The rate would not change for the loan period but could then adjust upward or downward, normally at a maximum of 2 percent per year with a lifetime cap of 5 to 6 percent. These programs can have rates 3/4 percent to 1/2 percent lower than the 30 year fixed rate and end up saving you plenty of the five years.

Resumes: Do You Have What It Takes?

of different avenues of study and interest. You have to realize where you want to go in your career and put together resumes that reflect your interests and knowledge. On the other hand, if you have been in the work force for a number of years, you probably have had several diverse employment situations or opportunities. These should automatically generate resumes of different types, with distinctive points. A person who has been employed for 15 to 20 years may have as many as five or six unique resumes. As an exercise, write multiple resumes that target particular areas of your current career and interests. A key item to remember: A resume should not read like a personal biography. Resumes are a reverse chronological listing of your major career accomplishments. A resume should never say that you were assigned, or you were only involved in, a particular element. Future employers don't care how much you were assigned. If you didn't accomplish measurable, meaningful tasks, they don't count them as true experience. Most companies are interested in only the last eight to ten years. With today's rapid changes in technology, many of your accomplishments before then provide little merit today. If you feel that you have significant accomplishments prior to that, you may want to list them as a one- or two-line-item entry. When designing your resumes, there are a wide variety of different styles and appearances. Your public library is an excellent source of style guides and industry practices. Pick and choose ideas that you are comfortable with and fit your career field. What I have commonly seen in industry are resumes using bulleted items to focus on accomplishments. This is an example of ones which state positive accomplishments: • Created a new, weekly payroll system, which eliminated the need for three people • Authored a freight-tracking program, saving the company \$2,000,000 per year • Designed a new steering component, saving one man-hour of assembly per vehicle Be proud, list achievements as indisputable accomplishments. You are selling your skills and abilities to your future employer. In the sales game, the two major factors are "Facts and Benefits." Present your future employer with "Facts" of your unique career and demonstrate the "Benefits" that you have provided and could develop for them. Take a moment to think about your work life. What have you accomplished? What did you plan to do and never got to? Did you help the company to succeed or did you just work there? Does the management recognize that you generated profits and provided benefits to the company? Did you cut expenses? Did you reduce personnel? Did you save them time, or perform any number of other tasks that could be seen as a benefit to the company. If this sounds like your career, congratulations! You will do well with this company or any others where you seek employment. On the other hand, if you can not see how you have become an integral and necessary part of the corporate goal, maybe you need to redirect your energies. If you are going to succeed in this highly competitive business world, you have to be a participant, an active player and a leader, not just a spectator on the sidelines of life. Under the heading of Education,

if you have completed college, list your major and highest-level degree first. If you are presently attending college, list the program and expected date of graduation. If you are in college or have completed college, there is no valid reason to list high school or elementary-level institutions. With today's electronic resources available, verification of education and employment history have become routine. Under no circumstances should you ever risk the embarrassment and loss of career opportunity by having your credibility questioned. If you are a student, just starting out, your accomplishments may include being the chairperson of a student-based committee or doing research and advanced work for various professors. You could also include scholarships that you have won as an accomplishment point. List awards you have won for a particular project that you completed. If possible, try to show how these attainments can benefit your future employer. Don't forget your summer-internship programs. If you happen to be involved in one that paid no real compensation, be sure to state that, because it clearly shows that you were after the experience, not the money. There should be a wide variety of other things that you can list as accomplishments, if you just take the time to think about them. A common mistake an totally unnecessary statement on your resume is "References available upon request." Everyone should have references available, if requested. Where do your goals and objectives belong? Goals and objectives should not be in your resume. In most cases, they are better off being part of the closing paragraph of your cover letter. The cover letter states exactly how your talents will benefit the organization to which you are applying. This is not the time to list what you want in your life, in general. Oakbrook Village avoids sticker shock

It probably shouldn't be too surprising that 108 of the 166 condominium sites in Oakbrook Village North, built in Commerce Township by MJC, have sold within a year.

Price certainly is a big factor. A 1,380-square-foot unit with two bedrooms and two baths sells for \$133,900. A unit of 1,630 square feet with three bedrooms and three baths goes for \$147,900.

The base price includes two-car garage, first floor laundry, dishwasher and range.

"The thing that makes it interesting to buyers is they're all end units, two to a building, as opposed to an attached complex that may have interior units," said Frank Munaco, MJC sales manager.


"Here, we put some niceties you might find in larger homes," said Michael A. Circo, the builder/developer. "We give 'em volume ceilings, nice big windows, doorwalls."

"When people want to buy today, it's sticker shock," Munaco said. "When people find something affordable, they get excited. They see this as very affordable. It's affordable for working people and retirees."

Just two floor plans are available.

The Easton situates everything on the main floor. A two-story sloped ceiling sits like a canopy over the great room and dining room. A half-wall separates the kitchen/nook from the dining room.

The model decorates one




bedroom as a den. The main bath has a combination tub/shower. The master, with cathedral ceiling, has two wall closets and bath with shower only.

The Franklin is a split-level.

The main floor features great room with sloped ceiling, dining room, kitchen/nook, master with cathedral ceiling, two closets and shower, second full bath with combination tub/shower and a second bedroom or optional den.

A loft upstairs has a bedroom and bath. From the outside, the units are virtually indistinguishable. Vinyl siding is the primary exterior material with some brick and wood accents.

"We started thinking that because the ranch was more affordable, more people would want it," Munaco said. "But they've been selling about one for one. People coming out of bigger houses, if they could afford it, it's something they don't want to give up."

Most of the buyers are empty-nesters, but Oakbrook North isn't designed to be a senior citizens haven.

"There are children in here. We aren't a retirement community by any means," said Mary Mintzer, sales rep.

Popular options available at premium price include fireplace (\$1,795), air conditioning (\$2,300), skylights (\$1,250 a pair) and bay window (\$1,500).

The average ranch sold in the sub is upgraded to the tune of six to eight thousand dollars, Mintzer said.

"The floor plan, openness, layout — they love it," she said. "They can't believe how nice these are for the dollar. They do a lot of shopping. They educate themselves on what's available."

Oakbrook North is serviced by city water and city sewers. It's in the Walled Lake school district. There are no sidewalks.

The property tax rate is \$24.62 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation, half of market value. That means the owners of a \$148,000 condo would pay just over \$1,800 in taxes the first year.

A trash removal fee of \$111 also is charged by the township. The monthly association fee is \$65.

Wesley and Karen Clark bought a ranch.

"What we like most is it has a spacious living area," Wesley said. "It feels big, and I also like that it has a two-car garage and full basement."

"We've had a couple of service issues, but they were taken care of as soon as I'd written the warranty request," he said.

Dick and Irene Stojak also selected a ranch.

"As soon as we walked into the models and saw how open and bright they were ... it's just what we were looking for," Dick said.

"My wife is handicapped ... and when we saw how easy it was to get around and how easy it was to get in and out of, it was just what we needed."

"The condo is well built," he added. "You don't hear your next door neighbor at all."

The sales office at Oakbrook North, (810) 624-0520, is open noon to 6 p.m. daily, closed Thursdays.

Strong surge in employment spurred housing construction

Jobs drive construction. And a strong surge in employment last year in southeastern Michigan spurred residential construction to a six-year high.

For 1995, builders here acquired permits for nearly 24,000 units — 19,500 houses and condominiums, the rest apartments — according to a tracking service based in Livonia.

The 10-county area surveyed included Wayne and Oakland, according to U.S. Housing Markets, published by Lomas Mortgage USA.

"Metro (Detroit) area recorded the greatest employment expansion in the country as the auto industry continued robust output in '95, feeding community of suppliers, R&D, design and high-tech firms," U.S. Housing Markets reported.

"Employers made about 115,000 net additions to payrolls

last year — annual growth rate of 4.8 percent, highest since 1985 record. Hiring surge brought three-year total to 225,000 net new jobs."

Builders of single-family product, houses and condominiums, were especially busy in the western and northwest Detroit suburbs: Canton, Novi, Farmington Hills and Waterford, the publication reported.

Apartment activity was especially strong in north Oakland, Lapeer and Genesee counties, following the employment boom along the I-75 corridor. The Auburn Hills-Lake Orion corridor was especially productive, U.S. Housing Markets reported.

While the number of multi-family permits here remained about the same last year as in 1994, volume in the more northern locales more than

doubled. Concessions disappeared on apartment rents, the publication said. Occupancy rates were in the mid-90 percent range in most modern projects.


The thriving employment picture here also resulted in good news for owners of existing product, U.S. Housing Markets indicated.

"Strong economy leads to housing price inflation," the publication stated.

"Median (half above/half below) existing home sales price in fourth quarter just short of \$100,000 — nearly 15 percent higher than a year earlier, astonishing for a metro market of this size.

"Even used condos, typically weakest market niche, are selling well," U.S. Housing Markets reported.

Nothing dispels kitchen blahs faster than fresh paint

Paint is the easy, affordable answer if you want to give the kitchen a new look but hesitate to delve into a costly, time-consuming remodeling project.

So says Shari Hiller, the well-known color maven and home-tuition consultant of Dutch Boy Paints.

A fresh coat of paint can do wonders for a tired kitchen," explains Hill. "It can brighten a dark room, and make a great big space appear cozy. It can lend richness, drama, and depth. It can make simple pieces important, and can add great personal style."

"Unless you've repainted before, it's hard to believe just what a change a few hours with a gallon of paint and a brush can bring to a room. You may find that painting walls is enough, but if you want more of a change, take a paint brush to the cabinets as well. With some today's fancy finishes, such as sponging, rag rolling or combing, even battered old cabinet doors can look so good that you won't want to replace them."

Painting Is easy

But can you really do it yourself?

Nancy Craig, a color expert for Martin-Senour Paints, says yes.

"It's hard to imagine somebody who can't use a brush or roller," she says. "And, actually, some of the new painting techniques that create such dazzling effects are even easier. Take sponging, for example. The cloudlike effects it creates on walls, cabinets or pieces of furniture are fabulous, and yet it's hard to make a mistake. You apply a solid-color base coat, dab a sponge dipped in paint of another color onto the surface, allowing some of the background to show through. Then, if you don't think you've got enough color, let the first layer dry and sponge on some more. Waiting for the various layers to dry is almost the hardest part of the process, I think."

"Combing, which involves the removal of wet paint from a freshly painted surface, to create stripes is a bit more difficult than sponging," she adds.

"But I feel that with relatively little practice, the average person can achieve highly professional results."

She feels that sponging and combing are great finishes for tired cabinetry.

"They produce a very luxurious look," comments Craig. "Squint a little bit, and I think it's easy to see an heirloom where you just had a tired cabinet before."

Neutrals work wonders

If yours is one of the white laminate kitchens that dominated the housing market back in the '80s, paint can be a fantastic pick-me-upper. Hiller mentions she recently saw such a kitchen, which had been given a dramatic new lease on life with a coat of deep raspberry on ceiling and soffits. "Before, this kitchen was white everywhere," she tells. "White cabinets, countertops, floor, walls and ceiling. It's no wonder the owners found it cold and clinical. The infusion of raspberry gave it great warmth and personal style. It didn't even look like the same kitchen."

However, if you have kitchen cabinets made of wood, she recommends sticking to neutral tones such as taupes, beiges, peach, soft gold, pale orange, and, of course, the entire spectrum of whites, which ranges from snowy tones to creamy hues.

Creating texture if you're working with neutrals is one of the tricks Hill has taught viewers on the new decorating show, Room-By-Room, where she is a co-host.

"Start with a flat base coat," she explains. "Then sponge on a satin coat in the same color."

Or you can mask off stripes, and paint every other stripe in a satin finish. Color-on-color finishes are easy to live with, yet very interesting."

She warns against using snow whites in kitchens with almond-

color appliances. "Use creamy off-whites instead to avoid giving the appliances a dingy look," she advises.

Accessories count

Make-overs become even more effective with the right accessories.

For a country look, Hiller suggests framed cross-stitch samplers, old-fashioned mason jars and cooking utensils, and all sorts of folk art. For what Hiller terms a "salsa mood," go with cactus plants in terracotta pots, colorful platters, ropes of red peppers, jars of beans. The contemporary kitchen can benefit from brightly colored canisters and serving pieces in simple shapes, modern art in sleek frames, and dramatic designer cookware.

"Such accessories needn't cost

a lot and finding them can be fun," she says. Go to garage sales and flea markets, the five-and-ten, crafts fairs and museum shops. "And the fact that today's paints are vastly improved is more good news for those craving a kitchen make-over with minimal expense and fuss. 



A ladder is a ladder, right? Wrong, it depends on job

You're in the process of getting all the tools and materials you need to complete the job. Then you discover that in addition to everything else, you need a ladder.

So off you go to your favorite hardware or building supply store to buy one. When you get to the store, you're amazed at how many sizes and styles are on display in the ladder aisle. Which one do you buy? A ladder is a ladder, right? WRONG!

Having the right ladder for the job is the key to safely completing your task. Using the wrong ladder is extremely hazardous. When you choose the wrong ladder or use it improperly the result may be serious injury or death.

So while you're standing in the aisle looking at all the choices you have, ask yourself these questions:

- Will the ladder be used indoors, outdoors, or both?
- What's the highest level you'll need to reach?
- What tasks will you be doing on the ladder?
- Including your tools and material, how much weight will be on the ladder?
- Is there even a remote chance that the ladder will come into contact with electricity or electrical wires?

wall or roof line. For a one-story house, a 20' or a 24' extension ladder is normally best. This will allow enough length for proper set-up, overlap of ladder sections, height restrictions of the highest standing level, and where appropriate, the extension of the ladder above the roof line. The highest standing level is four rungs down from the top. Never stand on the ladder above the support points or roof line. For two-story houses, 28' or 32' models are usually required, depending on whether you need to reach windows, gutters, or the peak.

For stepladders, the highest standing level is two steps from the top.

A person standing higher could lose his or her balance and fall. The maximum safe reaching height is approximately 4' above the height of the ladder. Technically, an 8' ceiling can be safely reached on a 4' ladder. Most people prefer taller ladders, however, because the pail shelf and molded top that hold the paint, tools or cleaning supplies are closer to the highest work area.

Material

Once you've selected the appropriate size and duty rating for your project, the last step is choosing the material. Werner ladders are made of fiberglass, aluminum, or wood. Each of these materials has characteristics that make it best for certain applications.

How you'll be using the ladder determines what material will be best for you. For example, if you'll be working primarily outside, or around corrosive chemicals, you might select one material over the others. And if you might be working around electricity, an aluminum ladder should never be used.

Fiberglass ladders are a great value and the top choice of both consumers and professionals, as they are suitable for a wide variety of applications. Fiberglass is strong, lightweight, and electrically non-conductive.

The aluminum ladder's advantage is its high strength and light weight. Typically a low-maintenance ladder, it performs well in rough working environments, it's rust resistant and corrosion resistant, and it's available in all four duty ratings. A very important warning about aluminum ladders: Aluminum ladders conduct electricity and should never be used when doing electrical work or in a situation when you may come into contact with live electrical wires.

The "traditional" material for ladders is wood because it's from wood that ladders have been designed and built for thousands of years. When kept clean and dry, they offer a margin of safety around electricity, and they're available in a variety of sizes and duty ratings.

Once you've answered the important questions about the ladder size, material and application, you can take an informed, confident stroll down the ladder aisle and select the right ladder for your projects.

Style

If you'll be using the ladder indoors only, a step stool, a stepladder, a platform or a multi-purpose ladder (one which folds into several positions) is usually recommended.

If the ladder will be used outside only, a taller stepladder, a multi-purpose ladder, or an extension ladder will be more appropriate.

Size

Selecting the correct size ladder is based on the highest level you'll need to reach. One of the more common (and more dangerous) mistakes is using a ladder that is either too long or too short for the task at hand. For example, many homeowners purchase extension ladders that are too short to safely use for cleaning the gutters or painting the outside of the house. They end up reaching up or leaning out too far, both potentially very dangerous.

Extension ladders should be 7 to 10 feet longer than the highest support or contact point, which may be the

Duty Rating

Ladders are designed and constructed with specific uses and weight loads in mind. These uses and weight loads are indicated by "duty ratings." The duty rating is the maximum safe load capacity of the ladder. A person's weight, plus the weight of any tools and materials he or she is carrying, must be less than the ladder's duty rating. 


