

Gunman shoots ex-wife, so



Sandy Robinson feared her ex-husband enough to have protection orders issued against him. Tuesday morning, the fear proved valid when he walked into her office. shot her, then turned the gun on himself.

In the early morning hours Tuesday, Sandy Robinson made a frantic call to a Plymouth Township 911 operator from her office at Penske Trucking and Leasing. She told the operator that her former husband, whom she desperately

feared, was there with a gun.

Moments later the operator heard two gunshots. And then there was

Detroit resident John McGhee, 30, used a .380 caliber handgun to shoot Robinson before turning it on himself.

Plymouth Township police officers were immediately dispatched to the location at the corner of Eckles and Schoolcraft, but it was too late.

Both the man and his wife were dead, each shot once in the head.

The incident, which occurred about 5:30 a.m., was the final act of a turbulent relationship between the two. According to Officer Jamie Senkbeil of the Plymouth Township Police Department, McGhee refused to let go after their brief marriage had ended recent-

Robinson, a 34-year-old Taylor resident and mother of two, had two personal protection orders issued against McGhee, including one for stalking, according to police.

McGhee rented a room Monday night at the Motel 6 on Ford Road near I-275 in Canton Township. When police searched the room Tuesday, they found a letter he penned entitled "Last Words Note," in which he scribbled a few words to family members, apologizing for being a burden.

When McGhee walked into the Penske building and up the stairs to the second-floor office where Robinson worked as a dispatcher, there was no kind of security in place to stop him. Two other employees witnessed him come in, but fled when they saw the

Hammer time

Rain can't dampen Habitat spirit

t's rained much of the past week, but that hasn't dampened the spirits of hundreds of Plymouth community volunteers who are giving their time as part of Habitat for Humanity's Plymouth Blitz Build.

It's the first time an entire community has come forward to build a home for Habitat for Humanity, with more than 450 volunteers giving their time to construct a house from foundation to landscaping.

Work on the home, which is located in Inkster, began last weekend. And, if Mother Nature cooperates, it will be completed in just over two weeks.

"It usually takes about three-and-a-half months to complete a home, but if the weath-

er holds up we'll have this done almost on schedule," said Jim Napiorkowski, a general contractor who works in Habitat for Humanity's western Wayne County office, located on Starkweather in Plymouth. "A lot of people have never done this before, but it doesn't matter. We show them what to do, and the volunteers are eager to learn. Board OKs more money for paving

Plymouth Township officials approved spending an extra \$53,000 for the resurfacing project of the parking lot at the Department of Public Services Building.

The additional funding approved Friday at a special Board of Trustees meeting will be used to repair the parking lot's base and drainage. The building is located at 46555 Port Street.

In April, the board accepted a \$66,593 bid from Al's Asphalt Paving Inc. to resurface the lot with new asphalt. When work began two weeks ago, however, it was determined much of the base under the asphalt was deteriorated, partially as a result of faulty drainage.

"When we began tearing out some of the existing asphalt, the base was not good as we anticipated. The rain we've had has only exacerbated the

City takes a look at more Farmer signs

Armed with 75 petition signatures, Plymouth resident Derek Duerr pleaded with city commissioners Monday night to consider posting additional stop signs on Farmer Street to curb speeders "before someone's 2-year-old gets killed."

Residents have been concerned for a long time about motorists exceeding the 25mph speed limit on Farmer, particularly the seven-block stretch between Sheldon and Blunk.

"There is a heavier amount of traffic since last summer, the rates of speed are much higher, and a number of us have witnessed near-misses," said Duerr, who lives at the corner of Farmer and Arthur. "God forbid someone's child gets hit."

City Manager Paul Sincock told commissioners adding stop signs along Farmer "did not meet state requirements and could open the city to liability exposure."

Victim succumbs to injuries from high school fall

One of the two workers injured in a 25-foot fall at the Plymouth High School construction site died from his injuries Monday.

Jeff Copeland, 35, from Sterling Heights, was critically injured when he fell while working on the roof of the new building, which is being con-structed at the Plymouth-Canton Educational Park, at Canton Center and Joy roads. Reports indicate he was also

hit by a piece of structural steel as he lay on the ground.

A second worker, Paul Webb, 24, of Jackson, was released Sunday from St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Ann Arbor. He suffered a fractured wrist, as well as facial and hand lacerations, in the

The incident occurred last Thursday afternoon when a bundle of steel was being placed on the unfinished roof.

"There was a two-man crew on the roof, one on the east end and the other on the west," said Bill McCarthy, vice

president of Redford-based McS/EV, the general contractor for the \$50 million project. "A bundle of steel was being put on the roof deck when a joist failed.'

The men were employed by McGuire Steel Erection Inc. in Green Oak Township. Owner Dan McGuire has been

unavailable for comment. Meanwhile, the Consumer and Industry Services Agency, a division of the Michigan Occupational Safety and Health Administration, continues its investigation, which is expected to take several

months.

"We will complete our investigation and discuss the findings with the employer and any union representatives, said Maura Campbell, spokeswoman for the agency. We'll then take a look at the history of the company and determine any penalties or citations. The company will have a chance to appeal any decision.

According to Campbell, McGuire Steel had 13 citations issued against it for serious safety violations during the past six months.

Ken Jacobs, the executive director of support services for Plymouth-Canton Schools, said MIOSHA investigators "made two suggestions and we've accomplished both of them, including an assessment of the structural integrity of the affected area. The site was turned back over to us Monday.'

State Rep. John Stewart, R-Plymouth Township, introduced a bill to create the Michigan Guardianship Ombudsman

House Bill 4916 would provide oversight for guardians and conservators to help prevent abuse and misuse of monies from people who are under a guardianship or conser-

Stewart said the bill will provide protection for senior citizens and the elderly.

"Members of several organizations, including the AARP. have spoken to me about the need for someone to look after the needs of people depending conservators and guardians," Stewart said. "I will

continue to work with these organizations to ensure their voice is heard."

Stewart said he received bipartisan support from more than 20 members to co-sponsor the bill, which has been endorsed by members of the Michigan Supreme Court.

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

The Plymouth Township Police Department has expanded the capabilities of its Community Watch telephone notification system. Residents will now be able to call in anonymous crime tips, as well as have documents and forms sent to a fax machine

The department set up Community Watch in 1999 largely as a way to reach residents and business owners in emergency situations. For example, if a fugitive was fleeing officers somewhere within the township, the police department could record a message and use the system to instantly contact all the homes and businesses within a certain radius to be aware of the situation.

The notification system has also been used to inform people of important meetings and other

One of the new features added to the system this month is an automated hotline number for residents to call in crime tips anonymously in nonemergency situations. If a person thinks something is suspicious, they can call and leave a recorded message

According to Officer Jamie Senkbeil, the feature is meant to encourage residents who would rather not leave a name help the department keep the township a safer place.

"There are times people know about criminal activity, but they don't call because they don't want to be involved. They think we will outsmart them into providing information about themselves when they call. With this system, they don't actually speak to anyone. They just leave a message," she said.

Another new feature of Community Watch is called Fax-On-Demand, which allows callers to obtain routine forms, including freedom of information requests, press releases, and gun permit applications, by having them sent to a fax

Senkbeil said one of the more popular forms that can be obtained through Fax-On-Demand is the

The vacation check form tells us when and for what duration a resident will be away from their home, as well as certain information about the house. During that time one of our officers will drive by and check the house out," she said.

In addition to those features, the department has also expanded the system's mapping system to include homes built within the last several years. as well as added crime prevention tips and home security suggestions.

Community Watch can be contacted by calling 734) 414-7518. From there, a number of automated prompts direct callers to the feature they are searching for. For example, the crime tip feature is accessed by pressing 2.



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Two stores ticketed in tobacco sting

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The Plymouth Township Police Department cited two township stores for allegedly selling tobacco to minors during a sting operation Fri-

Using a couple of Livonia high school students as decoys, officers issued tickets to clerks at the Hines Park Party Store at 40522 Ann Arbor Trail and Amoco Service Station at 42395 Ann Arbor Road

In both incidents, officers waited outside while student operatives were sent in and used police-marked money to purchase cigarettes. According to police officials, neither clerk asked for photo identification before making the sale.

Officers waited for the students to exit the store before entering and issuing \$50 fines to each of the clerks.

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According to Officer Jamie Senkbeil, two 16-year-old male students, who are taking law enforcement classes at the Livonia Skill Center, were used in the sting.

The students go in the store without any ID and only the money we mark beforehand," she

In Michigan, the legal age for purchasing or possessing tobacco is 18. In all, the police department targeted 17

township stores during the sting.

Despite the two violations, Senkbeil said the

department was happy most of the stores complied with the law.

"We are very pleased with the results of our enforcement efforts. The majority of the stores requested photo identification prior to sale. In most of the cases, when the operative had no ID, the stores refused service," Senkbeil said.



According to Bailey, many of the original drainage pipes running beneath the old asphalt are plugged up. In addition, there is clay under the base, so the water has no place to go but to pool up on top of the asphalt.

"We need to dig up the pipes, clear them out and bury them up again with pea gravel. They really need to be repaired," Bailey

Bailey said spending \$53,000 would be "a worst case scenario." Depending on the amount of damage to the base and drainage pipes, the township could save as much as 30 percent. The money will come out of the Water and Sewer Department budget.

gun, according to police.

Hal Helterhoff, Penske's vice president of corporate security, said even if there had been security, McGhee probably would've gotten in because he was an employee at another Penske facility in Dearborn and was once a driver at the Plymouth facility.

"These are the tragedies you think about all the time, and then it happens and you feel so bad about it. We just feel so bad, and our sympathies go out to all the family members," he said.

According to Helterhoff, Robinson was very well liked by her co-workers, and was in "very good spirits" when she started her shift at 5 a.m. Tuesday. He said the company will bring in a grief counselor to speak with any of Penske's 20 employees.

Helterhoff said the incident wouldn't necessarily make the company add security.

"We will look into all aspects of our operations, from top to bottom. But we live in a free society. You don't want too many badges or barricades to get in the way. But we will definitely take a look at what can be done, he said.

Lt. Robert Smith said the police department is still investigating the incident.

"There are a number of things we are still trying to determine, including ownership of the gun. At this point, we don't believe it was issued to him (McGhee)," he said Tuesday.





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



All Saints graduates 1st class

The opening of All Saints Catholic School four years ago was marked by high expectations and excitement. Last night, in a quiet Mass celebration, the school graduated its first class of eighth-graders.

All Saints' class of 2001 is small - only eight students - but they have proven themselves excellent students, said Principal Jacci Brown.

The school currently administers to three grades the Iowa Test of basic skills, and Brown said the students score above the 70th percentile.

"We're going to start giving the test to all the grades soon,' she said. "I think it would be a wonderful test to see if we're really doing what we hope we're doing and if the skills we teach are lasting skills.'

When Brown walked in on a class of third-graders working on Power Point presentations of their favorite lakes and rivers, she suspected the students' skills might be well-ingrained.

But every bit as important as their academic skills is the other lessons they've learned, said Brown

"Building a school on some principles and values in addition to having great academic education is something of value to us,"

The school was the first built by the diocese in 35 years, Brown said. It's unique in that it belongs to no parish, though students must be members of one of the three Canton parishes - Resurrection, Saint Thomas A' Becket and Saint John Neumann - or Saint Kenneth in Plymouth. The parents pay on top of tuition a one-time fee to help fund the building's con-

struction. "The parishes are certainly supportive, but they are not obligated to give us any amount of dollars," Brown said, adding the churches each agreed to pay the diocese for part of the school during the first five years.

A challenge every bit as great as constructing the building has been forming an identity, a pro-

cess that continues to evolve. "Everybody except our youngest students was somewhere else before they came here," Brown said. Not only do the 455 students have different experiences in different schools, but the 25 teachers - most of whom have more than five years of experience - also came together with varying backgrounds.

One part of the school's identity that's already emerged is a strong force of parents who volunteer their time and expertise.

We have about 100 parents who regularly volunteer their time and are very active in the school," Brown said.

Brown explained the parents have been instrumental in the school's good start on its library, having already gathered more than 5,000 books. They've also organized pretty good volleyball, baseball, soccer and cheerleading teams.

Brown said they help partly for fun, partly for duty and partly because of tradition.

"Catholic schools have always been such a tradition in the church that people want that for their own children," she said.

That's the percentage of the 73,000 voters registered in the Plymouth-Canton school district who bothered to show up at a candidates' forum last week at Plymouth City Hall

All four candidates showed up for the forum, which was sponsored by the Observer Newspapers and the League of Women Voters. Here was a chance for voters to ask any question they wanted of the people who want to be elected to help shape the future of our community's children.

And 12 people showed up.

We'll grant that moving the forum from the Plymouth District Library to City Hall may have affected attendance. The library is more easily accessible to the public, but it's not like City Hall is in the boonies. It's a big building right next door to the library, and it has doors and everything.

And we grant that some people watched the forum on cable television, since Comcast taped it and aired it this week. But was it enough to make a difference?

History suggests not.

■ In June 1998, 2,705 ballots were cast, but 720 of those were absentee votes, meaning only 2,685 actual voters bothered to attend the polls, which are generally open 13 hours for voters' con-

■ In June 1999, a banner year around here for school board election attendance, a total of 3,812 ballots (997 of them absentee) were cast.

876 cast absentee ballots, for a grand total of 2,906 votes.

This is a district facing important issues. There are diversity issues and infrastructure concerns. It's a district whose financial situation is approaching crisis status, whose ability to educate our children may be put at risk.

Why don't people care?

It can't be a lack of information. These elections are an annual rite. Voters are bombarded with information ranging from individual mailings to the kinds of forums conducted last week. The school district peppers voters with information about precincts and schedules, both in their newsletter (mailed to every home in the district) and in newspaper adver-

Newspapers cover the candidates and the issues. Children, assuming parents are talking at any length with them, are a font of information.

■ Meeting illegal

This is based on the recent action taken by the Plymouth Township Board at a special meeting held on May 17, 2001, which was called to discuss the selection of a Police Chief.

This meeting was held without an official notice issued to me as a trustee. I personally discussed my availability with the supervisor, the treasurer, the clerk and the trustees and informed them that I would be on vacation. Sprawl issues affect the details of our lives

My home is along the M-14 corridor that links the suburbs of western Wayne County with the relatively undeveloped areas of Livingston and Washtenaw counties. Once placidly rural, signs of development are cropping up all over.

The rich guy from Oakland County has just moved into his 14,000-square-foot starter home



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udbury,

at the end of the road, complete with a gatehouse and a jet d'eau and a pair of mute swans in his pond. A new subdivision complete with an inviting picture of a country landscape at the entrance - is going in just north of two new and truly

hideous big hous-

es, complete with

gingerbread on every available surface. And a local family proposes to rezone their 360-acre farm to develop it

as a trailer park. None of this is big news to anybody who has looked around recently. Dirt is being scraped everywhere you look, whether it's for a new subdivision or mall or merely a trophy mansion.

The pressure of development has led to much hand-wringing about "sprawl" and numerous mind-numbing discussions about how to combat

On the one hand are the pro-development folks, who never saw a development proposal they didn't like. Trumpeting slogans about private property rights and sneering at tree-huggers, they reflexively support any proposed development, preferably with a rationalized public subsidy "to gain revenue for the local tax

On the other side are anti-development folks who never saw a development they didn't hate. Chanting slogans about preserving farmland and green space, they fight losing battle after losing battle as sprawl encroaches daily on diminishing rural areas.

Caught in the middle are local governments, especially zoning authorities, who have master plans and an obligation to follow them but who are terrified of being sued to the breaking point should they deny developers the rezoning or use permits they seek.

Here are three starting points for a commonsense approach to this tangled subject.

Plainly, neither the automatic pro-develop-

ment nor the reflexive anti-development position can contribute much to useful discussion of this issue. A constructive re-framing might be for everybody to recognize that in many areas growth is inevitable, so the discussion really ought to revolve around how best to manage the growth that is certain to come. For example, my friend, former state Senator Lana Pollock, who runs the Michigan Environmental Council, talks sensibly about "smart growth" - meaning managed growth.

Michigan's Constitution puts a big barrier in the way. We are a "home rule" state, which means in practice that municipalities and, especially, townships, are free to adopt whatever zoning ordinances they wish, regardless of what their immediate neighbors happen to do. That means that a 200-acre shopping mall can be plunked down next to a determinedly rural township, and there's nothing anybody can do

House Speaker Rick Johnson, by background a farmer from northern Michigan, has proposed a series of measures that would coordinate planning among neighboring government units. He deserves a lot of credit for willingness to break loose from a mind-set that places private selfinterest over community values. While the Legislature is looking at that suggestion, some attention should also be given to immunizing zoning boards against frivolous lawsuits brought by deep-pocketed developers when things don't

Lastly, there are certain areas of the state that simply should be preserved from development. The Michigan Nature Conservancy, at 31,000 members one of the largest conservation organizations in the state, is in the process of unveiling a program that prioritizes threatened eco-systems according to hard scientific analysis. The Conservancy works with landowners who wish to place a "conservation easement" on their property, thereby preventing development for all time. It also helps fund outright land purchases and find conservation buyers who are prepared to buy and protect threatened areas.

Obviously, issues of sprawl are complicated, intensely local and often very difficult to resolve. They deserve higher priority in Michigan's public policy and political circles, if only because they affect so profoundly the intimate details of how we all live our lives.

The movie Jaws used the catch line, "Just when you thought it was safe to go back into the water. It's a frame of mind that apparently applies not only in Hollywood, but in real life. Only you'd

have to rephrase it to, "Just when you thought you were safe." Period Sandy Robinson probably thought she was safe.

closed in her dispatch office at Penske Truck Rental. For three years, she'd built a professional life there, getting close to co-workers, apparently trying to work through a troubled marriage

On Tuesday, the trouble raised its ugly head in the worst way. Her ex-husband, John McGhee of Detroit, walked through the doors at Penske and made his way up the stairs. According to police, Robinson saw him coming and immediately picked up the phone to dial 9-1-1. At the same time, witnesses saw he Mad a gun and started yelling, to no avail.

The 31-year-old McGhee shot Robinson, then turned the gun on himself. According to police, the sound of the shots could be heard on the 9-1-1 tape. First the shot ending Robinson's life, then the shot that killed McGhee.

Then ... silence. A deadly silence, as it turned

As always happens in the aftermath of tragedies like these, details came out rapidly.

■ The couple had divorced. Robinson had reportedly secured two personal protection orders against McGhee, pieces of paper that told him to stay away from his ex-wife, but had no real power. They never do.

McGhee was also a Penske employee. According to Tom Racette, Penske's district manager, McGhee had in the last few months been promoted from driver to a position in the logistics division out of Dearborn.

■ According to police, McGhee had rented a room at the Motel 6 at I-275 and Ford Road, where he left a suicide note saying he was tired of being a burden.

Robinson reportedly had two children, one of whom was scheduled to graduate from a Taylor high school the same day her mother died.

■ There was no security system in place at Penske. Not that it would have mattered. According to Hal Helterhoff, vice president of corporate security for the Penske Corp., McGhee probably would have been able to get through the security system because he was also a Penske employee.

Predictably, not many people at Penske wanted to talk much in the wake of the incident. Robinson was described as a "fantastic person," wellliked and popular among co-workers. According to Racette, her personal problems never came up at work, at least not enough to send red flags about a possible attack.

But clearly, if police reports are accurate, Robinson herself felt like something could hap-

pen. According to reports, as soon as she saw McGhee coming, she started yelling for him to "go away," while simultaneously dialing 9-1-1

In the wake of Robinson's death, security issues will be re-examined, according to Helterhoff. But it didn't sound like too many changes would be

"Any time you have a tragedy like this you look at everything, top to bottom," Helterhoff said. "We live in a free society, so you don't want to see too many badges and barricades.

Unfortunately, in society today, badges and barricades are apparently needed more than ever Or maybe a case like this proves they're not necessary. If McGhee was bound and determined to kill his ex-wife, depriving her children of their mother in the process, no barricade would have stopped him. He could just as easily have waited outside and shot her getting into her car, or going into her house, or stopped at a red light.

Murderous intent can't be stopped, not by a barricade and certainly not by a piece of paper foolishly - and deceitfully - labeled as a personal protection order.

It's a sad commentary on the times, but perhaps Robinson's death proves one thing, metaphorically speaking:

It's not safe to go back in the water.

We all saw that. This country, in all of its anguish, came together. We united in a common ground, a bond of love and sympathy and compassion. We wept tears as a nation that we have never wept before, united in the futility of such a

devastating loss of life.

For what? Revenge? We wept communal tears at the thought of the anguish, at the loss of such innocence in Waco. A comedy of errors, resulting in the ultimate horror. Babies condemned to an undeserved hell fire, brought about by the stubborn resolve of a man who fancied himself God, and the stubborn

resolve of a posse of cowboys. We watched in horror, and we prayed as we

saw those fires burning. "Please God, please God, please help them.

I never expected to feel this way. When they found the man who drove the truck to that horrific end in Oklahoma City, I felt rage, anger, confusion. Why? Why? Why?

Timothy McVeigh, a man who felt a higher mission. His was a mission of rage, anger and confusion. He had seen Waco, and he had asked, "Why? Why? Why?"

He didn't look like the evil incarnate as I watched his image on the television. He looked like a man/boy, lost, scared and without hope. How could such a person commit such an act?

He sits in solitary now awaiting his execution. Around him, in the outside world, our country unites in a collective blood thirst, anxious for this lynching. McVeigh, the unsanctified martyr, sits, awaiting his unholy redemption, carrying with him secrets, upon secrets, upon secrets. I never thought I would feel this way. Maybe it

was the emotion of that day in Oklahoma City. I don't know what justice is, as I embrace the loss of so very many, the heartache, the grief.

I just know that in those flashes of media of Timothy McVeigh, I see a brother, a son. This person so black of heart, seems to have one thing surviving, something that had long escaped Jeffrey Dahmer, John Wayne Gacy, and Richard



"This year, we're enhancing the creek," said Kelly Kelly, event organizer and Canton assistant township engineer. "It's very important for the whole health of the watershed. Enhanced vegetation helps promote stream quality, stream bank stabilization and enhanced habitat."

Several volunteers were students from Plymouth-Canton High School, who earned community service credits or extra credit for earth science classes. The students said they had more fun than they expected.

Becoming educated is what the Rouge Rescue events are all about, according to Joyce Murphy, from Canton's planning services department.

"This year, we're not so much cleaning up the river, but beautifying it and helping the stream beds while educating people about water quality issues," she

Coldplay ready for warm welcome

pretty much been interested in music since as long as I can remember," said Guy Barryman, speaking in a leisurely tone from his home in England. The bassist for the latest, greatest

Britpop export - Coldplay - has been playing music since he was a teenager.

The difference is, now the whole world can hear him.

Raised on radio

Barryman was born in Scot-

land, but raised in Kent, England, where he discovered a penchant for record collecting early on. "I guess I started collecting records when I was 14, probably very bad records. I can just remember (that feeling) when you found the (perfect) record. You put a lot into it. It's different when you're a grown up. As (kids), you go out and find it like

Now Barryman and his bandmates Jon Buckland (guitar), Chris Martin (vocals) and Will Champion (drums) are making the records for young collectors to treasure. Coldplay's debut Parachutes entered the record charts at number one in their native England - a dream most musicians will never realize. It

also spawned the mega-hit radio single, Yellow, which has since boosted the band to the top of Britpop royalty and made Coldplay a household name on either side of the pond. Coldplay shares its throne with the likes of Radiohead and Travis - offering an emotive soundtrack that leaves its mark on anyone willing to listen.

Push play

Coldplay began in 1996, just four college friends. "We were living in the same halls, little rooms with 600 people ... in Central London," said Barryman. "There were a lot of musicians. We would jam with guitars in the room. Me, Chris and John

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got together and started writing songs. We needed to find a drummer. We talked Will into playing drums. He picked them up really quickly."

An accomplished musician who proved talented at guitar, bass and piano. Champion had never played drums before joining the band. He got behind the kit before the first gig - an unsigned band festival in Manchester called In the City in 1998 and never left. Soon after, Coldplay released its first 6-song EP, Safety on the English label Fierce Panda. Another label, Parlophone snatched up the promising foursome and released a second EP, 1999's The Blue Room, which revealed Coldplay's first single, Shiver. A drifting song of devotion with lyrics like "I'll always be waiting for you," the song made it onto Parachutes as well.

On tour

Though it seems things came together quickly for the young band, it didn't feel that way, said Barryman. "We've worked so hard for 4 years now." He remembers crowds growing from 50 to 700. "It just began escalating, up and up." It hasn't slowed

Coldplay has embarked on its first headlining U.S. tour which stops at Detroit's State Theatre today, June 7. The band will be accompanied by Grandaddy, the hand-picked choice to open these shows. "If they had phoned us, we'd be out there in a flash," said Barryman, a fan of their music.

So far, audiences in the United States have been good to Coldplay. "In America people are more up for it, there's a bit more energy," he said. "We always get a warm response from the crowd. Europe is more laid back, like their judging you.'

The judgment on Parachutes is in, and it's an undeniable hit. Mixing melancholy with hope are songs with the gentle rush of Spies, the moping piano that trails Martin's apologetic voice on Trouble and the sentimental reassurance of Everything's Not

Lost. The record was completed in nine weeks over a period of six months. The band went into the studio assuming it would only take a couple weeks, but Barryman said, "We didn't want to put something out until we were 100 percent happy with it.

Coldplay

"We were really quite hard on ourselves. When I look back, we worked really hard. We were in the studio until 1-2 o clock in the morning.

Along for the ride was producer Ken Nelson. "He became a fifth member of the band," said Barryman. "He was mixing stuff up. He's such an easy-going, helpful lad. We're going to continue to work with him.

It wasn't easy to find a producer in the beginning. "We met so many people and they all wanted to put their stamp on it," said Barryman. "A lot of producers are doing it for themselves. We knew what we wanted and what we didn't."

Look how they shine

On Parachutes the band had but one objective. "We just wanted to create atmosphere really," he said. That melancholy essence spills from the record's second single, Yellow. "It was an obvious single. There was no real reason for debate. It was very sort of poppy, catchy."

Barryman remembers the creation of this song clearly: "We were in the studio in Wales, an old converted farm. We went outside and looked up at the sky. I've never seen so many stars in the sky, as far as I could see. Chris went inside with a little idea. We bashed it out really quickly."

Though he plays the songs each night on tour, Parachutes seems like a distant memory to Barryman. He's focused now on new songs. "It's always nice when you have new songs to play. They're a lot more up tempo. It's just getting a lot stronger. It's much more coherent. I'm really excited about it."

Coldplay will return to the studio with Nelson in August to record the foll -up to Parachutes. New songs like Murder, God Put A Smile on Your Face, A Rush of Blood to the Head and Warning Sign are expected to make the cut. 'They're really more powerfulsounding songs," said Barryman.

Coldplay fans are waiting patiently.

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'Pearl Harbor' is bloated, soulless account of attack

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The makers of Pearl Harbor have good reason to expect praccally every American to turn out for their movie. After all, they took the trouble of listing most of us in the credits.

Hunting for your name in the 10-plus minutes of end credits would be far more productive than watching the nearly three hours of dreck that precedes

Pearl Harbor may well be the ultimate modern example of Hollywood bloat and bilge. Producer Jerry Bruckheimer and director Michael Bay flung \$135 million -\$135 million! - at their subject and produced a dumb, soulless behemoth that delivers the cinematic equivalent of shell shock.

For all the 118 actors listed, the movie offers almost no sense of authentic humanity. The faces the filmmakers plaster on their characters are as flat and stereotyped as those on war-recruitment posters

The Bay-Bruckheimer formula of treating people as secondary to explosions worked just fine in The Rock and Armageddon. Those movies bordered on liveaction cartoons.

But Bay and Bruckheimer are now dealing in something bigger than a terrorist siege on Alcatraz or even a planet-killing asteroid. Their subject is real, fresh in the collective memory and vital in recent world history.

You can't tell the story of Pearl

Harbor without blowing a lot of things up, but with so much money to burn, the filmmakers could have channeled a little more to script and character development.

Ben Affleck is at his most boring as Rafe McCawley, who trains as a fighter pilot with childhood buddy Danny Walker (Josh Hartnett, going toe-to-toe with Affleck for dullness).

Rafe falls for Navy nurse Evelyn Johnson (Kate Beckinsale, who gives an uncharacteristically numb performance). Their romance is shattered after Rafe is presumed dead in the Battle of Britain, where he'd joined a U.S. squadron.

Both now stationed at Pearl Harbor, Danny and Evelyn commiserate. Next thing you know, Evelyn's friends are telling her to move on with her life, that it's been all of three months and she needs to get back into circula-

Guess whose arms she circulates into? And guess who turns up alive in Pearl Harbor barely a day before the Japanese attack?

The script by Randall Wallace is forced and foolish, an epic

The first half of Pearl Harbor is spent on Rafe and Danny's tedious friendship and their monotonous relationships with Evelyn. There's no spark between Beckinsale and either leading man, while Affleck and Hartnett never muster any kinship, as friends or rivals.

Supporting players include Jon Voight as Franklin Roosevelt, Alec Baldwin as Col. Jimmy Doolittle, and Cuba Gooding Jr., Dan Aykroyd, Mako and Tom Sizemore, all pretty much phoning in roles that have

little dimension. The star of Pearl Harbor is the 40-minute attack sequence, a

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combination of live explosions and digital effects. There's a handful of gripping images of sailors on sinking ships, but the battle isn't terribly artful or original in capturing the horrors of

The violence is sanitized for sake of a PG-13 rating. Bay and Bruckheimer also had

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an eye on political correctness To avoid offending Japanese audiences. Japan's rulers are treated superficially and sympathetically as leaders who feel compelled to attack to preserve their way of life

For all its feebleness, Pearl Harbor will have audiences lined up around the block.

Disney has marketed the stuffing out of the movie, making it seem like a patriotic duty to see it. That's the real offense.



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Gabriel Shear (Travolta), a charismatic and dangerous CIA operative fed up with American bureaucracy, uses a sexy associate, Ginger (Berry), to coerce a computer hacker (Jackman), just released from prison, to steal \$9 billion from a DEA slush fund. 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




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



Their home is one of eight on display in the garden walk, sponsored by the Redford Township Beautification Committee.

Livonia's beauty

In Livonia, a hedge of fairy pink rose bushes gives passers-by a hint of the majesty that lies ahead at a home on Myrna, north of Five Mile Road, east of Hubbard.

The front yard presents a rainbow of flower beds carefully planted for more than three decades by Zenobius and Oksana Stelmach. A row of lively pink honeysuckle and white hydrangea welcomes visitors.

When a breeze rustles branches, the aroma from lily-of-the-valley and a multitude of flowering trees is overwhelming. Along the front of the

property, Stelmach points to the mounds of perennials he so carefully tends.

A special botanical project is hidden among the white cress, pink and white bleeding heart, snow on the mountain, irises, silver dollars, peonies and an assortment of ferns and hostas.

Stelmach grafted rose branches from the fairy bushes and carefully covered each to protect their roots. Some will take, others won't.

His conversation is fertile with the attributes of what nature does to the garden caretaker.

"After a day's work, a relaxation for me was to transplant something. I just enjoyed it," said Stelmach, who is retired from his job as a professor at Highland Park Community College where he taught chemistry and biology.
On 1.25 acres of land, Stel-

mach has planted hundreds of trees including a multitude of spruces and pines. White and varying shades of purple lilac bushes decorate the back yard among forsythia,

aster, lamb's ear and berries. Oksana makes jellies from the berries and Stelmach uses them on his bread every morn-

When the Stelmachs bought the house in 1962, there were just eight apple trees on the lot. Four of the eight are still thriving. A pigeon coop, with mostly rollers and one "homer" bird,

Planted in Plymouth

In Plymouth, it's only fitting that Ann Warren should have an English garden, as she was born and raised in England.

Living in the United States for 32 years, Warren has managed to make room for hundreds of old perennial favorites, such as large flowering peonies, wisteria, iris, regular and miniature roses and scores of day lilies showing their blooms among wavy borders.

She has lived in her Plymouth home for 22 years, but she started her garden just 12 years ago. The tall delphiniums are her favorite.

"Some years they're really good, and some years they're not, and we just wait to see what comes up.

If Mother Nature cooperates - and she usually does - Warren has something flowering from late winter into late

"I tend to overgrow," Warren said. But when the bulbs die down, there's something that comes right

A large deck loaded with pots planted with petunias, pansies and assortment of other annuals is a focal point. But it's the decorating nuances, such as a tiny stone patio with a garden swing and the tastefully placed arbors, that make the biggest impression on visitors.

Her advice to new gardeners is to get plants from friends and family who are dividing their overgrown perennials.

"That's a cheap way to get started. I'm always giving stuff away."

Plant flowers that you know are successful, she added.

"Some things just don't do well here," Warren said. "We've got shade along the back, and it's very hard to get things to grow back there. Some things just don't make it and you have to try something else until it will."



All proceeds from the Livonia garden walk will go to the historic village, explained Janet Bennett, chairwoman of the Friends of the Development of Greenmead. The money will be earmarked for renovations to the Judge Blue home so that it can be used as a conference center and reception room.

The homes on the Livonia walk range in style from pristine and manicured to free-flowing and packed with flowers.

Taking pains not to reveal the locations of the homes before the walk, Bennett said: "One is on a ravine lot. She has a nice mix of perennials and annuals with interesting features, such as a patio with a long swing.

You look down the ravine and creek and she has a little vegetable patch. It's very charming. The woman has a real knack."

Another garden is at a recently built home on a cul-de-sac south of Six Mile Road and east of Middlebelt.

"The lady in the home is a master gardener and she loves to talk about her plants," Bennett said. "She's bubbling over with enthusiasm, and I'm sure everyone will love talking to her and getting their garden questions answered. Another couple was recommended by their

neighbors to be on the walk. "The lady of the home has pots hanging from the fence all over the yard. The interesting thing here is that interspersed in the beds she has figurines and carousel characters many of which

she painted herself." In Redford, some the yards will take more time than others to walk through, said garden walk

chairwoman Janet Watson. Watson's garden will be on the walk and features a waterfall pond with fantail fish that has earned her the nickname "Grandma Fishy."

The pond is home to frogs, tadpoles, water lilies and other plants to keep the water oxygenated.

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

"If you get nervous and have high blood pressure, get yourself a garden. But if you're a quarreling person and get mad at the weeds, the garden is probably not for you.

"You've got to like plants. If you don't like plants, nothing will come out of it."

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

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


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

life! Whether it's the familiarity of your own town or the unexplored streets

in a strange place, street life provides tremendous opportunity for you and your camera

If you look through a photography book or at a collection of old photographs, you'll find some of the most interesting pictures are invariably of street life. This is largely because it is this aspect of our lives that most readily reflects the fashions, trends and lifestyles of a particular period.

Store fronts have an identity

of their own. Advertising signs, lampposts, even mailboxes are important features of the street and can be effective elements of a photographic composition.

A street is dynamic. Cars, buses and bicycles are all subjects with strong pictorial poten-

And, of course, there are the people. People walking down the street, people engaging in animated conversation, people standing on the corner - all wonderful opportunities for street life photography.

There is an almost irresistible appeal in people pictures and a subject preoccupied is easy prey to a photographer with a keen eye and a quick response.

A street market can be a treasure house of street life pictures. Market people are extroverts by nature and often have faces and mannerisms that can make great photos

One of the problems that often occurs in street life photography is confusing and busy backgrounds. Try to avoid this by choosing a camera position that isolates your subject from the surroundings. Use a telephoto lens to frame your picture tightly and by using a wide aperture, distractions in the background will be kept out of focus.

To minimize problems with contrast, photograph subjects that are out of direct sunlight. Better still, an overcast day provides the best lighting for street life people pictures. Bright colors are more saturated and lighting on faces is more flattering.

Use a fast film in the 400ASA range, either color or black and white, depending on your preference. The faster films will enable you to hand hold exposures under most circumstances.

So there you have it! Become streetwise with street life.



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

Art form

That leads me to telling you about bonsai. In Japanese, the word bonsai means "tree in a pot." Bonsai is an art form that uses both design and horticul-Bonsai are created to look like

stylized versions of natural trees in their various forms and environments. Pine trees on a rocky shoreline and the lone tree in a farmer's field have a representation in the long accepted bonsai

The modern art form of bonsai has roots that reach back to China in the third century B.C. Naturally dwarfed and twisted trees were collected from mountain tops and transplanted to pots for display. Gradually, techniques evolved to create and maintain the same effect on other trees.

During the cultural exchange between China and Japan of the 12th century, the art came to the Japanese. It was in Japan that bonsai was refined and elevated to its greatest potential. Most of the techniques in use today are the result of generations of Japanese refinement.

The greatest myth about bonsai is that they are a specific kind of tree with a shape that they simply grow into. The distinctive bonsai "look" is actually

the result of many years of work. Bonsai aren't simply grown; the bonsai artist has designed. pruned and trained the entire tree to achieve a work of art.

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Now to the show. 

Ashley, a precocious 11-year-old and native of Texas, decided one day that she wanted to write a fan letter to one of the Survivor contestants - Rodger Bingham.

Survivor, a CBS television show, aired this last winter for 12 weeks and had over 28 million weekly viewers rooting for their favorite participant.

Checking the phone directory, Ashley discovered that Rodger had an unlisted address, but she knew that the contestant hailed from Crittenden, Kentucky. The only listing for a Bingham in Crittenden was for a Wilbur Bingham. Armed with Wilbur Bingham's address, she unabashedly drafted a letter to Wilbur with hopes that somehow he would be related to the universally-liked Rodger Bingham, and further, that the letter would be passed onto her hero-Rodger

This begs the question, why was the show Survivor so popular and what made Rodger Bingham, the 53-yearold farmer from Kentucky so likable with 11-year-olds like Ashley?

Reality television

For those who haven't followed the show, 16 people were picked from a possible 49,000 hopefuls to participate in a "reality-based" program that pits them against one another in grueling athletic and brain-teasing challenges in order to see who can outwit. outlast and outplay the others

All of the contestants' actions and reactions in the "primitive" outback of Australia were videotaped 24/7. We learned from the show about character vs. ruthlessness; integrity vs. backstabbing. I found the show quite engaging because of the quality of people who participated ... like Rodger. I understand that more scoundrels surfaced in the original Survivor series aired last summer.

Wouldn't it be nice to theorize that this group is a microcosm of American

Survivors? Reality? What about those who are diagnosed with cancer? They too, are survivors. Suzanne Sommers, a celebrity with cancer, for cowards. Isn't she right.

Lately, I have been shaken by the number of people I know who live in Livonia, Westland, Plymouth and other suburban areas who have been diagnosed with cancer. You may know these people. They could be your neighbors, relatives or family. Some are younger, some older, but I've noticed an overriding survivor trait of character and integrity in these friends. This debilitating, life-threatening disease seems to strike good and decent people. It is not the Rodger Binghams or these cancer victims of the world who necessarily win the game, but they are just good people, period.

But let us return to Ashley, the young lady who wanted to express her admiration for Rodger Bingham via Wilbur Bingham of Crittenden, Ky. She, like me, saw these stellar qualities in her favorite Survivor contestant, the senior member of the Kucha Tribe. Not one negative thing was ever said about Rodger because he never bad-mouthed or criticized other players. From talk show hosts to Monday morning pundits, everyone

said what a good guy Rodger was.

And what did Wilbur Bingham do with the letter from the Rodger admirer? Well, Ashley made a good guess that her letter would end up in her favorite contestant's hands. Crittenden, Ky., is filled with Binghams who, as you might guess, are related to one another. Ashley would be pleased to know that Wilbur made sure Rodger got the letter.

Surviving a television show is not even comparable to surviving cancer but I've admired the personal qualities exhibited in many of the people from both groups. I am also proud to be married to a person with an equal amount of goodness, character and integrity - and coincidentally, Rodger's cousin.

Vella. "The idea behind planting a tree is that it's a living thing that goes on living and becomes part of the land-



"It's very disappointing," said Dickey. "For three years in a row, I thought we were the better team in the district, and we came away with nothing.







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Seller can't hide behind bad report



After we signed a purchase agreement, we had the house we were interested in buying inspected. The inspector did not find a roof leak. The seller's disclosure statement indicated that there was no problem with the roof not true. Do we have any recourse?

Possibly. The Michigan Seller Disclosure Act provides that even though a buyer is relying on the opinion of a professional inspector, the seller must disclose known conditions if they contradict the inspector's report. Every disclosure must be made in good faith. If the representation made to you was false or misleading, you may have a claim for silent fraud or negligence against the seller.

We are interested in buying a home from a family member. Do we have to have a real estate broker?

There is nothing in the law that requires you to have a broker or, for that matter, an attorney to assist you. However, you are well advised to have an attorney review your closing papers to ensure that the legal requirements necessary for the sale are met. It may be that you may need a separate attorney representing each party, as one attorney may be in conflict of interest in representing both parties. The attorney can also prepare a closing statement and other documents necessary. A real estate broker would be typically used if you are looking to find a home to sell or buy.

Who do you call?

Look for these in a Realtor when it comes time to buy or sell your home

It can be done - selling your home by yourself.

But unless you have the expertise and time to set a fair price after doing comparable sales studies, advertise, screen prospective buyers to make sure they're financially qualified, show at all hours and at a moment's notice, and expedite a lot of paperwork, you may want to use a Realtor to help.

While commissions are negotiable figure on paying 6-7 percent of the sales price here) and considered distasteful by some, it could be money well spent.

So how do you find a good Realtor? "I'm kind of amazed, myself, at how many people will literally open a phone book and look for the nearest office," said Janice Grupido, broker/ owner of Countryside GMAC offices in

Troy and Sterling Heights. Her suggestion: Get recommendations from friends, neighbors, family and co-workers, then interview several candidates.

"You're going to want to know their affiliations, experience level, what services they do and don't supply," Grupido said.

Office support to handle lots of details also is important to know, she added.

Start on the Internet, then do a little legwork locally, advises Judy Walker, broker/ owner of Riverpoint Realty in Southfield.

"They should go to crs.com (Certified Residential Specialist). That will show the people ... who have attended workshops and classes beyond just getting licensing. They're absorbing information to keep on top of the

"Be aware of neighborhood Realtors who have a sense of what's going on and will do a bang-up job keeping you informed," Walker added.

A personal reference is the best reference, said Glenn Bianchini, broker/ owner of Century 21-217 in Oxford. "Probably 99 percent of the time it's word-of-mouth."

"The first thing is look at friends

"Who's doing the most business in the subdivision as far as selling homes? "Look at the signs. If you see signs, stop and talk to people. Ask what they think of their Realtor."

It makes sense to interview several prospective Realtors before signing a listing agreement or a buyer's representative contract, the pros agree. Interview even if you happen to have a friend or acquaintance in the busi-

Interview several Realtors

"It doesn't take a whole lot to get a real estate license," said Pamela Ford, broker/ owner with Morgan, Moreno & Milzow in Clarkston. "Interview to see which one closest matches your standards. It (a home) typically is your most valuable asset.

"If you look for a presence in the marketplace - advertising, signs that with a personal recommendation leads you to at least a number of agents who do it professionally and not recreationally.'

"Definitely make sure they have a

marketing plan - what's on the market, what the competition is and what they've sold," Bianchini said. "Ask specifically what they're going to do to make the house available on the mar-

Realtors at the top of their game will dazzle during a listing interview if they're prepared, Walker said.
"I make myself knowledgeable

about the community, and it helps me put together an excellent program," she said. "When you can walk into an interview and bring out pertinent information including a beautiful pic-

Things that a Realtor should be prepared to answer during an interview, Walker said: "How well educated and versed you are, how long you've been practicing your craft, are you adept to a particular area?"

Brokers name names

While brokers will give out the names of their most profific associ ates, top-producers may or may not be the best representative for a particu-Some top-producers have assistants

who deal with various parts of the transaction, so clients may not have as much direct contact with their Realtor throughout, Bianchini said.

Walker said she's a big believer in the "intuitive gut-feeling" that often arises when a would-be client and Realtor click during the interview

Temperament does play a part, Grupido agrees.

"It has to be someone you can work with. It's an ongoing relationship, not just putting a sign in the ground ... someone who will keep in touch," she

"It doesn't have to be a brotherly relationship, but I would like it to be strongly professional," Grupido said. "We're actually the orchestra. You should be holding the baton."

Cheap isn't always best where commissions are concerned, Hromek added. "Pay a marketable commission," he said. "Pay it and be happy. You only get what you pay for. That's what you have to look at."

Jumbo loan: Do math carefully



Late last year, the upper loan limit for conforming loans increased to \$275,000 - excellent news for borrowers just over the previous limit but below the new limit. Affected borrowers would now be saving roughly \$100 on their monthly mortgage

Saving \$100 is like making an extra \$130-

160 per month, depending on your tax bracket. Earning the same \$160 residual income monthly requires a return on investment of 6 percent on \$32,000. In short, when it comes to large investments like your mortgage, a seemingly trivial change can make a huge difference in a borrower's lifestyle and cashflow.

Again, I must emphasize the importance of making your mortgage decisions within the confines of a larger financial plan. In the case above, it may have been very appropriate for the borrowers to apply a limited amount of personal funds from other sources towards their home purchase to keep their mortgage loan amount below the "jumbo" limit of \$275,000.


Very large home loans, especially jumbo mortgages, can be unduly expen-. sive to unaware borrowers. Just as reducing the mortgage amount slightly can save hundreds of dollars, there are many other strategies that will help such borrowers save money in the long

One tactic is for jumbo borrowers to stay in the fixed stage of an adjustable rate mortgage. For example, if a borrower needs a \$300,000 mortgage, he sees the opportunity to reduce his initial interest rate by one-half of 1 percent by using a 5-year ARM instead of a standard 30-year fixed-rate mortgage. By doing so, he saves over \$6,000 in interest charges over the five years which more than covers the cost of his next refinance. He applies the remainder towards principle or invests it.

The downside of this gambit comes if the interest rates are very high when it is time to refinance. The counter-gambit, however, is to continue with a shorter-term ARM, say of the 3-year variety, to get the deepest discount on interest rates long enough for interest rates to recover.

That monthly savings can be very enticing even for the risk-averse bor-

Mortgage rates still 1 percent below last year rates

(AP) - Mortgage rates around the country rose this week but are still more than one percentage point lower than they were last year.

The average interest rate on 30-year fixed-rate mortgages climbed to 7.24 percent, up from 7.20 percent last week. according to a nationwide survey released Thursday by Freddie Mac, the mortgage company.

Fifteen-year mortgages, a popular option for refinancing, went up to 6.78 percent this week, comthe previous week.

At the same time last year, rates for 30-year mortgages averaged 8.54 percent and rates for 15year mortgage averaged 8.24 percent.

On adjustable-rate mortgages, lenders were asking an average initial rate of 5.89 percent, up from 5.82 percent the week before. Last year, one-year ARMs remained at a nine-year high of 7.25 percent.

These rates do not

pared with 6.76 percent include add-on fees known as points, which averaged around 1 percent of the loan amount for all three types of mortgages.

"The economy grew slower than expected in the first three months of the year, which seems to have carried over into the housing market in April,' said Freddie Mac's chief economist Robert Van Order.

"Both new home sales and existing home sales fell in April from near

KEEP YOUR DREAM HOME FROM BECOMING A NIGHTMARE by GARY S. MEYERS



So, you're building a house — the home of your dreams. Here's how to keep that dream from becoming a

nightmare.
Start early. Tom Tylutki, division Kimball-Hill president of Construction, one of the Midwest's largest and oldest building compa-nies, suggests you follow a few stm-

ple rules.

1) Check with your local home builder's association to find a builder with a good reputation.
2) Carefully look at model homes,

then drive around to inspect homes under construction to make sure that the builder is delivering the promise of the models.

 3) If you are buying in a development, drive or walk around the neighborhood. Stop homeowners and ask them how they like their houses. Dig a little deeper. Was everything done on time? If something went wrong, how did the builder respond? How well did the builder communi-

4) Look at the amenities promised. If they are not yet in place, ask the local building inspector about the company's reputation. You might even check out other developments that this builder has done.

5) Call the building department of the municipality. Ask about its inspection process. How often and how thoroughly is construction inspected? Usually municipalities look at the site before the foundation is back filled to make sure that the basement was put in correctly and that drain tiles are in place. Then someone checks the frame, plumbing and electrical. Many require a drain

survey before allowing any sod.

6) Once your house is under con struction, most of the larger builders will invite you to a pre-dry wall walk-through. Bring your purchase agreement, with options and any changes. At this point the frame and all the mechanicals, such as plumb-ing and electrical, will be in place. Compare this to your records. If you opted for an island in the kitchen with a cook top, are electrical or gas lines in place to handle that? How about the whirlpool tub? Look for ceiling light cans, outlets for fans special cable or phone locations. Ask lots of questions. If you have some concerns, you can ask to come back for a second look after the changes

7) Your next official visit is the pre-conveyance walk through. This s done two to five days before your closing. The builder already will have inspected the house and may have a list of last minute items that need to be done. In any case, bring your paper work with you again, check it against the finished product. Make sure any changes are complet-

ed. This week, The Meyers Report went to some experts to answer read-

ers questions.

Q. I have been paying private mortgage insurance for 15 years on my 30-year fixed-rate mortgage. I have been told that this monthly charge can be removed. How do I go about having this charged removed?

A. It sounds like you will have no problem removing the private mortgage insurance (PMI) charge, in part because after 15 years you should have paid down the principal to the point where you owe 75 percent or less of the original loan. However, you did not say whether you have a you did not say whether you have a conventional or FHA loan. The PMI charge cannot be removed from an

FHA loan.
After 15 years, there is little doubt that the value of your home has risen enough so that you have more than 20 percent equity in your home. Home appreciation alone can get removal of the need for private mortgage insurance coverage. Check with your lender.

Jim Lukas, vice president of Amcore Mortgage suggests you fol-low this simple process. First check your current mortgage balance, and get the appraised value and sales price of the house when you bought t. Next divide the loan amount into the original price or appraised value. This will give you your loan to value

If you had been in the home for 10 years or less, your lender may have required you to get a new appraisal and use that to determine the loan to value ratio, Lukas said.

If the loan to value ratio is 80 per cent or less of the original loan amount, your next step is to write a letter to your mortgage holder. In the letter state the loan to value ratio, your original loan amount, the origi nal appraised value and sales price of

the house, and the date you took out the mortgage. Request the mortgage holder cancel the insurance and refund any balance held in the escrow account for purposes of pay-

ing the PMI.

Q. My husband and I are currently renting and would like to buy. Our problem is a shaky credit history. We have never filed for bankruptcy, nor do we intend to. We are slowly paying down and, in some cases, paying off our debt. Although my husband is an immigrant, I am a US citizen and have been employed by the same company for 15 years. I have access to a down-payment through my 401k, if necessary. My husband is employed by the Chicago Public School system as a teacher. Our combined income is approximately \$70,000. Please advise if there is any hope for us to obtain a mort-

gage.

A. Yes, there is hope.

"But qualifying is dependent on how shaky your credit is," said Todd E. Grayson, executive vice president of South Central Bank and homeloanrate.com.

Grayson suggests looking at two programs for first time home buyers with low down payments: FHA and IHDA (Illinois Housing Development Authority). FHA has more flexibility in the underwriting, requiring a low down payment and using credit scoring in a different way from conventional or sub-prime

The IHDA program for first time home buyers requires a 5 percent down payment, but the interest rates are lower than FHA or conventional

Grayson believes that borrowing from your 401k for the down payment, will not be a problem, but there are concerns about your husband's residency. He suggests that you contact your local HUD office for a list of qualified pre-purchase counselors in your area.
