

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Ballot snafu clouds city primary



A mistake in the instructions that accompanied absentee ballots sent to Plymouth voters has thrown the upcoming primary election into potential chaos, affecting the votes of nearly 800 absentee voters.

Questions concerning the legality of ballots, especially absentee ballots, for the City of Plymouth's Aug. 7 primary election are "under legal review" by

Doubts surfaced when former commissioner and current commission candidate Dennis Shrewsbury contacted the Wayne County Elections Commission, questioning ballot language which instructs residents to vote for eight of the 10 candidates on the pri-

A Wayne County Elections Commission representative tells the Plymouth Observer the ballot should tell residents to vote for only four candidates, because there are four open seats to be filled in the November general election.

Day-long discussions Wednesday between the Michigan Secretary of State's office and attorneys representing the city failed to reach an agreement on the ballot directions.

However, Chris Thomas, director of elections for the state of Michigan, said

Michigan election law 576-A says in all partisan and non-partisan elections, voters can vote a number equal to the number of persons to be elected for that office." Thomas said in this case that number is four.

City attorneys claimed a provision in the city charter allows for the election of double the number of people as there are open seats in the primary. In the



Cuts would hurt P-C students

If Gov. John Engler goes through with his threat to cut school aid funding by 5 percent because of a decline in state revenues, it could cost Plymouth-Canton Schools nearly \$900,000 in foundation grant money.

However, Rep. John Stewart, R-Pl mouth Township, said he's working on compromise legislation to avoid the scenario, to be presented to Englar his Oct. 1 deadline.

"I'll fight like hell to make cottain the foundation grant doesn't get touched," said Stewart.

On July 12, legislators failed to reach an agreement on an \$11.3 billion school aid appropriations bill, then recessed for the summer. Engler then warned lawmakers that if they don't come up with a solution, he'll make his own cuts.

"The legislature didn't make significant cuts and threw the ball back in Engler's court," admitted Stewart. "We didn't think he would threaten a

"I'm negotiating with my colleagues to get them to support the basic foundation grant," he said. "I would rather see other programs get cut."

Stewart said a conference committee will be discussing alternative solutions, and he's hopeful they'll be near a decision by the time the legislature returns Sept. 20.

"There will be a lot of late sessions between Sept. 20 and Oct. 1," predicted Stewart. "Engler has put the proverbial hammer over our heads."

With minor exceptions, auditor OKs records

An independent audit of Plymouth Township's finances found the township's books to be in order, with the exception of a few minor problems with

some accounting practices. The audit, conducted by the accounting firm Plante & Moran, was presented to the Board of Trustees Tuesday. The annual audit was completed a month later than normal because of a letter written by former township accountant Carolyn Cox alleging Treasurer Ron Edwards was stealing money from township checking accounts.

In her letter of resignation dated Jan. 28, Cox implied to Clerk Marilyn Massengill that Edwards may have been stealing money from township checking accounts. She alleged Edwards didn't provide her with bank statements or reconciliations for checking accounts for the year 2000.

"We didn't find anything that substantiated her allegations," he said.

However, Heffernan said there were some accounting practices that needed to be cleaned up. First of all, he said there needs to be better communication between the treasurer's office and the accountants, particularly when it comes to check reconciliations, which deal with outstanding and voided

According to Heffernan, Edwards provided bank reconciliations to Cox for the first four months of 2000, but then discontinued the procedure, which led to growing rancor and dis-

The fire started when her youngest son was playing with a lighter, which ignited a bed in a back bedroom.

According to Plymouth Community Fire Department reports, the 5-year-old son was playing with the lighter in his bedroom, when his mother heard him scream. Flames quickly spread from the bed to the rest of the bedroom, but she was able to get

him and his two brothers, 6 and 8, out of the

Someone called the fire department about the fire shortly after 11 a.m. However, by the time fire fighters could respond, it was too late for the mobile home, located at 49515 Maple.

"When we got there, the fire was well under way. The inside was already engulied in flames," said Fire Chief Larry Groth.

According to Groth, the older mobile home was destroyed by the fire. He estimated the property damage to be somewhere in the megh-borhood of \$52,000.

Groth said there will be no investigation because the bey admitted to starting the fire

and the mother confirmed it.

The incident is the classic example of why parents need to make sure children don't play with lighters or matches, according to Groth.

"People must keep lighters and matches away from children, because children are curious. I'm sure this boy didn't mean to burn down his home, but his curiosity got the better of him and he made a

mistake," he said.

Firm axes Wilcox tree moving

on the Wilcox property in downtown Plymouth has been put off a week. The 100-foot-high tree, the second highest in

Michigan, is being moved to make way for a fivestory condominium project to be constructed on the 2.5-acre site. "This kind of a project can run into all kinds of difficulties," said Bryan Williams of Worldwide

Tree Moving, who had hoped to move the tree last Monday. "We ran into tough sand because it's dry and hard, so it's difficult to slide. We'll have to make some adjustments to drag it like we want."

The tree is about 80 feet wide, has a root ball that's nearly 30 feet in diameter, and weighs nearly 500,000 pounds.

There are many who believe the copper beech will die because its root system is too sensitive for

the move. However, Williams said two years ago he moved a copper beech at Michigan State University and it's growing well in its new location.

They're sensitive when you don't treat the tree with the respect it needs," said Williams. "We've moved trees in all temperatures, including 100 degree heat in Texas. Our success rate is well above 95 percent."

Williams said his company will try again next Monday to move the tree about 100 feet on the

"My personal thought is that it won't happen, that the legislature will come up with other ways to cut the budget," she said. "If they do cut the foundation grant, it will put a lot of school districts into budget deficits. Many districts are

already battling for survival. "Our lobbyists tell us the con-

ference committee is not far from an agreement," she said.

The Plymouth-Canton Board of Education, in adopting the 2001-02 budget, added \$1 million to the district's fund equity for the operating expenses of Plymouth High School. If Engler's plan goes into effect, the high school will still open, but the board would need to consider program cuts.

Two school board members, Mark Slavens and Judy Mardigian, have been at the forefront in pressing local legislators for help in increasing the foundation grant for Plymouth-Canton.

"I'm very disappointed Engler would take this position," said Slavens, a member of Michigan Citizens for Fairness in Public School Funding. "I'm not sure he's been a friend to public education. It's incumbent upon our legislators to ensure the cuts don't take place.

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"Our budget is stretched pretty thin right now. The cuts would slice into our core business, which is educating kids," he said.

Mardigian said the cuts couldn't come at a worse time for Plymouth-Canton Schools.

"We're opening Dodson Elementary this year, and the new high school next year. We can't afford to lose that kind of money," she said. "Our kids will be directly affected."



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

trust between the two parties.

As a remedy, Heffernan recommended the treasurer's office institute a monthly procedure of preparing bank reconciliations for the general and payroll checking account, and send a copy to the clerk's office. The accountant works for the clerk. Heffernan said Edwards has done this every month this year.

Heffernan said the audit also turned up a number of outstanding checks that were written over the course of the last several years.

"During the audit, we noticed a number of outstanding checks. Although there were not a high amount, there were a number of them. It is a practice that needs to be cleaned up," he said.

Edwards flatly denied stealing any money. He admitted his relationship with Cox was less than amiable, which led to the problems between the two.

"It is no secret that there was a conflict between the former accountant and myself," he said.

Cox worked for Rosemary Harvey, the former finance director whose job was eliminated last November during an administrative restructuring. In February Harvey filed a lawsuit against the township for wrongful discharge. Edwards was named in the lawsuit.

In her letter, Cox also recommended the board re-establish Canton Township.

Edwards said Cox's allegations were politically motivated.

"She knew there was no

money missing when she left. My reputation means everything to me, and she was clearly trying to tarnish it. Since the day I walked into this office, I have made every effort to clean up the books. In the meantime I've stepped on some toes. This is all about politics," he said.

According to Edwards, he and new accountant Ron Berry have spent many hours over the course of the last three months cleaning up the books, which he said have been mismanaged by the township's accountants for at least the last 13 years.

"We have been working day and night trying to change the system, which has been in place for many years. As of now we are up to date and the books are balanced," he said.

Heffernan agreed with the statement.

Some trustees were unset the audit was completed almost a month later than it usually is. Plante & Moran submitted the audit to the state just before the June 30 deadline. Board members did not see the report until last week.

"I have a problem with this audit being submitted to the state without the board being able to discuss it first," said Trustee Abe Munfakh.

Heffernan said Cox's letter was the main reason this year's audit took so long to complete.

"Because of the letter, we took an extremely close look at the treasurer's office, which I think the main reason for the delay."

Emergency plan helps rescue fallen artist

Bob Lovelace of Plymouth Township was getting ready Saturday morning for Art in the Park. His job that day: a bike paramedic for Huron Valley Ambulance to patrol among the tens of thousands expected visitors in case of medical emergen-

Lovelace just finished packing the portable defibrillator on his bike when he received a radio call that someone had fallen and appeared to be having trouble

"We were at City Hall talking with (City Manager) Paul Sincock when the call came in," remembers Lovelace. "I knew exactly where to go, and we got there in less than 45 seconds."

Lovelace and his partner, Tom Canning, listened to their radios while biking to the scene with lights and sirens on, getting additional information on the victim. They approached the area on Main Street, across from Compari's Restaurant, and found an event volunteer performing CPR on an artist who fell and hit his head.

"On that day I happened to have the defibrillator on my bike," said Lovelace. "When we arrived I saw CPR being performed, and determined he was in cardiac arrest. I took out the defibrillator and shocked him. The Plymouth Community Fire Department arrived and assisted, and he was conscious and talking as we transported him to St. Mary's in Livonia.'

Plymouth Municipal Services employee Joe Fulkerson was one of the first on the scene.

"He was dead," remembers Fulkerson, who cleared the victim's air passage, using the training from his days in the Navy. "They shocked him four or five times before they got him back to life."

Lovelace said because of the art fair, medical assistance wasn't far away.

"Because of the emergency plan for the event, there were nearly a dozen paramedics close by," said Lovelace. "It felt very gratifying. That's why we're in this business, to make a difference. It was a good team effort."

Michael Strailey of Columbia, S.C., was reportedly recovering well after the incident, and eventually transferred to St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Ann Arbor for further tests.

"We have a medical plan that went off without a hitch," said

Art in the Park organizer Dianne Quinn said it's hard to practice for such an emergency, but all the planning worked.

Sales were so good that even the youngsters got into the act.

"There was a young boy who sold bow and arrow sets he made for \$5 apiece," said Quinn. "He earned nearly \$3,000 during the three-day event.

"And, there were some kids on Penniman who sold lemonade for 25 cents a cup in front of their home. They made \$50,"

Quinn said preparations for next year's Art in the Park are already under way.

"It's just like planning a wedding," she said. "There's something to do all year long before the actual event takes place."

"Every year we have a meeting with the volunteers to discuss emergency situations. This year we happened to need it," she said. "I think next year we'll have special emphasis on the emergency plan."



As the candidates for city commission began hearing about a possible irregularity in the Aug. 7 Plymouth primary ballot, there

were mixed reactions. "My strategy included sending out materials to the absentee voters," said Peter Bunting. "If new absentee ballots are sent out, I will have to send more election materials. That would cost me more money.

City Manager Paul Sincock, in a press release, said "The review of the city's ballot is on-going with the Secretary of State to insure that it is consistent with the city charter and current state law. The city attorneys have not made a determination as to the status of any ballots currently on file. The city attorney has indicated that it may be necessary to hold a meeting of the city Election Commission as soon as this Friday.'

If an error has been determined, new ballots can be printed in time for the primary next

month. The real problem has to do with 750 absentee ballots that have already been sent to city residents, approximately 300 of which have been returned.

Both Wayne County and state officials suggest printing new ballots and sending them to the 750 people who received incorrect ballots. When the new ballots come back to City Hall, they can be tracked and the corresponding incorrect ballot dis-

Of the incorrect ballots that remain, those that have votes for four or fewer candidates can be counted. Ballots with more than four candidates selected would be disposed of.

Newburgh Lake posted off-limits to swimmers

At Newburgh Lake, neither canoe nor body can traverse the shimmering waterway.

Wayne County Environmental officials report elevated levels of bacteria in the lake. Weekly water samples are taken at the lake, which was dredged three years ago to remove chemical and other con-

As a result, the lake is not approved for "full body contact at this time, so no swimming," said Kimberly Beanum-Coleman, Wayne County chief of Technical Services.

Although some people bring their own canoes, the county's canoe rental operation hasn't opened this year. Paddle and row boats have not been available for rent, either.

County officials cite a lack of workers and, most recently, water quality as main reasons.

The rental operation employs four part-time workers, who earn \$7 an hour.

"There is money in the budget, but there's not enough bodies to run it," said Larry Fitch, Wayne County parks director.

With any vessel, there is a risk someone could fall into the water or come in contact with it.

That doesn't wash with Ed Moros of Livonia, who is frustrated he and others cannot use the lake to its full potential. "Something doesn't seem right," Moros said.

He and wife Carol regularly walk and bike in Hines Park. She also cross country skis there during the winter. Last summer, the couple took their grandchildren on a paddle boat ride on the lake. The Moros wanted to do that again this

His wife phoned the county and was told they couldn't find workers to run the boat rentals.

When Wayne County officials sought voter-approval for a park tax renewal a year ago, they painted a picture of a soon-to-be pristine lake where people would be able to swim, canoe

Improvements have been made, noticeably to the dock and shelter areas. The end result, though, is still short of expectations, the Livonia man

"They had a big pie-in-the-sky dream," Moros said. "Now it's fizzled to nothing."

Officials believe storm runoff and animal waste are causing bacteria levels to swell. "It could be the geese," Beanum-Coleman said. "We don't have any scientific evidence to say, yes, this is the cause. It could be natural."



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Democrats challenge plan for congressional districts

A court battle looms over a GOP-endorsed plan that would see two U.S. Congressional districts in Wayne County merge into a new entity.

On Wednesday, July 11, the Democratic Party filed a lawsuit in U.S. Federal District Court in Detroit. According to 9th District state Sen. Thaddeus McCotter, R-Livonia, the lawsuit puts on hold the new map.

"Now we wait for results of the judicial (process)," McCotter said last Thursday. "Hopefully, there will be a decision in a reasonable period of time, because we know people will be running (for legislative seats) in 2002."

As part of the contested plan, spearheaded by state Republican legislators, a portion of the 13th and all of the 16th U.S. Congressional districts – represented by Democrats Lynn Rivers and

John Dingell, respectively – would merge into the proposed 15th. If the new map sees the light of day, Rivers and Dingell would have to square off against each other in the 2002 election.

"Democrats have to sue," added McCotter. "They'd be remiss if they didn't."

Essentially, the map makeover followed results of the 2000 census in which population shifts continued moving away from the city of Detroit. There will be 15 U.S. Congressional districts instead of 16 under the new plan.

Rivers' current district encompasses Ann Arbor, Ypsilanti and western Wayne communities such as Canton, Garden City, Plymouth, Westland and part of Livonia. Those suburban municipalities would be tacked on to the proposed 11th, which extends north into Oakland County. Both Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti would be included in

Dingell's district includes all of Monroe County as well as downriver Wayne communities including Dearborn Heights and

Just the beginning

But Rivers' and Dingell strongly oppose the plan, labeled it partisan gerrymandering and indicated it would need to pass muster with various state and federal courts to be implemented.

"These are the first few steps in what I expect will be a very long dance," said Rivers, expecting the plan – if passed – to be challenged up to the Michigan Supreme Court and "if need be, to the Federal District Court."

About the proposal, which would merge six Democratic districts into three, Rivers said it is an unfair way to grab majority status, that Republicans "want

GOP squabbles over plans

Before the redistricting plans for Congress and state House and Senate won final approval Thursday, July 12, and were sent to the governor for his signature, they set off a series of intramural squabbles in the GOP.

Raczkowski, R-Farmington, contends the Senate drew plans for a new non-incumbent 11th congressional district for McCotter.

Although Raczkowski is also interested in running for that open seat himself, his current power base, in Farmington and Farmington Hills was specifically drawn out of the district. She'll study nursing at Madonna University in the fall.

"I chose nursing because my daughter had five major brain surgeries since she was 6 years old, and I've been a player on her medical team," Binder said.

Binder's daughter, Brandi, developed a serious seizure disorder shortly after her 5th birthday.

"It progressed very rapidly and she was having up to 200 seizures a day," Binder said. "It was a nightmare. We thought we were going to lose her several times." Brandi's only hope to get the seizures under control was a hemi-

spherectomy, or removal of half her brain. Today, Brandi is preparing to enter her senior year and is an A

and B student. "Working with my daughter and her recovery was a full-time,

24-hour, seven-day a week job," Binder said. Although Brandi has not recovered the use of her left arm, and

has struggled with right-brain functions like math, sequential and abstract processes, she has far surpassed expectations from 12

"We were at the cutting edge. No one knew then how to deal with a child with half of a brain," Binder said. "I knew there were other families out there who needed to know what we've learned. so I thought if I could combine the knowledge I have with professional training in nursing, I could help other people."

Teacher's pet

Sandra Koelzer, another mother returning to school, chose her career because of her children.

Koelzer will pursue a teaching degree, with a little help from the Canton Business and Professional Women \$300 scholarship. When my kids were born, I started working evenings, so they

wouldn't have to go to daycare. Then when they started school, I began working as a volunteer at the schools," Koelzer said. "Eventually, I got a job for (Wayne-Westland) school district, working as a secretary. And I started thinking, I think I could teach. I think I could make a career out of this.'

The scholarship will make a huge dent in Koelzer's tuition costs. "It will help a lot," she said, adding she will continue to work full-time while she attends school in the evenings.

The \$300 will pay most of her first semester tuition, and every little bit helps, she explained.







I have also witnessed residents walking through the alley behind our homes, shouting out non-sensical statements at the top of their lungs, scaring the children who are playing outside. This is not an altruistic attempt of Dr. Broe's to help these folks lead "normal" lives.

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State business halts while pols take care of their future

I have long suspected that the best way to figure out what's really important in life is to look carefully at the behavior of our legislative masters in Lansing. Last week's news comes as confirmation of the principle.

Lawmakers adjourned for their two-month summer vacation. (Two months! Yup. Our lawmakers don't go back to work until mid-Septem-

ber.) Before they left Lansing, the legislature:

Passed right on time! redistricting plans for districts for the U.S. House of Representatives and both the state House and Sen-

Ambitious lawmakers can now start making timely plans for their 2002 campaigns.

Failed to pass a budget for higher education. The fiscal year for Michigan schools and most colleges starts on July 1, the normal target date to decide how much money they will receive. But this year administrators will just have to twiddle their thumbs until the Legislature takes its own sweet time to work out a spending plan later this

■ Failed to pass a budget for K-12 schools. This is serious, too, because kids will be back in the classroom before the legislature reconvenes. Moreover, with tax revenues weak from a down economy, the state's promised foundation grant of \$6,500 per pupil is at risk if the governor is the one who has to do the cutting. Lawmakers can save it, if only they pass a budget. So, for the first part of their fiscal year, school districts will be flying blind about how much they can spend.

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Failed to pass legislation defining what constitutes a "failing school" and establishing appropriate responses. Mike Malott, director of the statewide news service that serves this newspaper, thinks this is the most important initiative now before the legislature. The senate passed the package earlier this year, but the house has yet to start work on it. Another school year will have started before lawmakers deal with the question of what to do about our worst-performing schools.

Failed to pass legislation on improving water quality by providing more money to fix up leaky sewer systems. Lawmakers started the year

trumpeting about this critical issue requiring fast action. Not now.

A couple of other big issues fell off the table in the rush to adjourn, but I'm sure you get the basic idea.

Certainly, we've all learned to admire the basic axiom of political life in the legislature: What's mine is mine and what's yours (or the public's) is

When it comes to serious matters like the boundaries of legislative and congressional districts that directly affect the political future of the political class, you can absolutely count on detailed and timely work by the legislature. But when it comes to relatively trivial matters like spending plans for schools and colleges for our kids and pure water for our state, there's plenty of time to wait. After all, the state's fiscal year doesn't begin until Oct. 1, so it's just their tough luck that the folks running schools and colleges have to begin their year without a firm budget from the state.

Of course, there's a lot of finger-pointing going on. Senators are harrumphing that inexperienced members of the newly term-limited House have no idea how to construct a budget when times are tough. And house members are grumbling that certain senior members of the senate - Dan DeGrow, who has a lot to say about school financing, is the main target - loaded up the budget bill with pork.

That's mostly spin. The fact is that lawmakers got distracted for much of this year by redistricting, a close competitor to money in the hierarchy of things that define political success. Republicans got tangled up in intramural fights between house members wanting to run for the senate, while Democrats have already sued in U.S. District Court about Gerrymandered districts.

As things stand now, the legislature is the body that makes decisions about redistricting. And when confronted with that issue, lawmakers seem to have trouble concentrating on anything

Mike Malott thinks that for the legislature to make redistricting decisions is an intrinsic conflict of interest. He's got a point. Certainly the business of the state ought not come to a grinding halt while the pols take care of their political

Rules are rules and they should apply to lawmakers

Michigan's Supreme Court is apparently feeling the heat of the criticism being heaped on its recent ruling to block a referendum on the state's new concealed weapons law.

Justice Stephen Markman appeared Monday on the Mitch Albom Show on WJR to defend that 4-3 decision.

Frankly, he didn't do very well. And when a justice of the court has trouble justifying an opinion he helped write under the probing questioning of a sport-columnist-turned-talk-show-host, it might be taken as a sign the opinion isn't all it should be.

His appearance, along with dissenting Justice Marilyn Kelly, was a rarity because the court usually doesn't respond to criticisms, preferring instead to "let the opinion speak for the court."

Markman insisted the state Constitution has to be read in a strictly literal fashion, as the court ruled, and that you have to go by "the plain language" of its text.

Of course, previous courts and three justices on this one concluded that it doesn't make sense for the people of Michigan to "reserve to themselves the power to ... reject laws enacted by the legislature" and then leave a loophole in which the legislature can effectively block a referendum just by tacking on a few dollars. That, dissenting justices argued, would essentially eliminate the right of referendum.

But Markman points to Article II, Section 9, of the constitution, which states that "the power of referendum does not extend to acts making appropriations."

"How else are you going to read that?" Markman asked Albom.

A fair question. For myself, I might even be convinced by it if the court's "the-rules-are-the-rules" attitude was applied to the legislature as well as the people who took the trouble to pass petitions to challenge lawmakers.

But they weren't. I'm not a lawyer, but it appears to me there were a string of violations by lawmakers as they were getting this bill passed.

If the rules applied to lawmakers the way the court chose to apply them to voters, the CCW law would never have been approved with the referendum-proofing appropriation in it in the first place. For example:

■ The \$1 million was not in the bill when it passed the house. It wasn't in there when it passed the senate. The spending item was tacked on in conference committee. But Rule 8 of the Joint Rules of Senate and

House clearly states that "the conference committee shall not consider any matters other than the matters of difference between the two Houses.' Now, how else are you going to read that?

To be fair, such rules are routinely ignored by the Legislature, but then why are those rules there?

■ There are rules in the constitution intended to keep lawmakers from changing bills around too much, so that the public can keep track of what is going on there. Article IV, Section 24 states that "no law shall embrace more than one object."

The law started out as a bill "to regulate and license the selling, purchasing, possessing, and carrying of certain firearms. ..." When the \$1 million was added for the distribution of trigger locks, wasn't the bill given a second purpose? Several lawmakers pointed that out at the time but were ignored by the sponsors and the court.

How are you going to read that one? ■ If the bill were an appropriation, protected from referendum, but it started as a regulation and licensing bill, then didn't the purpose of the bill change? Article IV, Section 24 of the constitution states that "no bill shall be altered or amended on its passage through either house so as to change its original purpose."

How bout that? To be fair, such rules are routinely ignored by the legislature, but then why are those rules there? To use the logic of the court, lawmakers could take action to change those rules if it doesn't

like them, otherwise it should follow the plain language of those rules.

The court chose interesting timing to get picky about rules. It knew about the legislative history of the bill, but the justices of the majority decided to ignore it when lawmakers played fast and loose with the rules. They only applied the plain language of the rules when they were being applied to

Make Tiger Stadium the new home of Baseball Hall of Fame

I am suggesting a concept that could revitalize downtown Detroit, attract millions of tourists a year, boost the local economy, and retain Tiger Stadium as a baseball shrine. I have been thinking sporadically of this concept for nearly three years - shortly after the Detroit Tigers owner said he would build a new stadium instead of renovating Tiger Stadium - but more intensely because of a July 8 New York Times story that destroys a myth about how and where baseball was originated.



That story contains specific information from New York newspaper clippings in 1823 and several years later that a game of baseball was played in that city - not Cooperstown, in upstate New York, which Major League Baseball insists is the true birthplace of the game

and 1839 as its birth year. Now that we know that the site and date are not historically accurate, let's discuss a great opportunity for Detroit, baseball and its millions

of baseball fans across the country. That opportunity is for the empty Tiger Stadium, which sits on property where professional baseball has been played since the late 1890s, to be converted into Major League Baseball's Hall of Fame, now located in Cooperstown, accessible mainly to fans in the northeast region of the country - and even then not all that convenient.

Tiger Stadium should be the site of the relocated Hall of Fame for numerous valid reasons. 1: The stadium and property has a century-old

tradition and history behind it. 2. It presents a chance for larger a Hall of Fame for exhibits, displays and related activities, which could be located where some of the existing seating sections are now. What a thrill it would be for people of all ages to walk the bases and stroil through the outfield where Ty Cobb, Henry Greenberg, Al Raline and other greats played in a Detroit uniform. The stadium would be a great location for the NGAA baseball world series, Little Loague World Series as well as local and regional championships or special all-star games. Bost of all, it would be ALL baseball — no condos, boutiques, or rental lofts.

3. The stadium's playing field can be covered with a transparent roof to allow games to be played in the daylight — summer or winter, by high school, ameteur league, college and/or pre-

fessional teams - even in winter months.

4. The location is perfect. In the Midwest, it is accessible within one day's drive for more than half of the country's population, including the East Coast. Access is convenient with several major freeways nearby.

The existing road and water/sewer infrastructure are all in place.

5. While not important to out-of-towners, it would give the city of Detroit and its downtown section a major boost for tourists and local visitors - particularly for families whose children would not be legally allowed into nearby casinos because they are underage. The Hall of Fame in Detroit would be a logical destination for all categories of tourists and visitors who could tie it in with a game at Comerica Park (which I would prefer to be called the new Tiger Stadium), Greenfield Village and Henry Ford Museum, the Automobile Hall of Fame, to name a few. For true history buffs, visitors can also stroll through the nearby Corktown neighborhood and enjoy a meal at some of its new restaurants.

For downtown Detroit itself, moving the Hall of Fame to the stadium would give a major boost to the west side of that section, which certainly needs a catalyst for improvement.

Will Cooperstown and its chamber of commerce complain about such a proposed move? Of course! Detroit city and business leaders complained in 1973 when the Detroit Lions announced the team would move its games to the planned Pontiac Sil-


But let's face it. The local economy in Cooperstown was built on a myth.

The recent New York Times story wasn't the first published questioning of Cooperstown being the birthplace of baseball. There have been serious questions about the true birthplace of baseball for many decades. Let's not be afraid to take a serious look at the hall's origins and consider a new location that would be vastly more convenient and closer to most of the Midwest and East Coast tourists coming by car or air.

The concept represents an excellent chance for the Tiger Stadium Fan Club, city officials and true baseball fans to talk about the possible Hall of Fame relocation and prove to Major League Baseball officials that this is an idea whose time

So now it is time to call Cooperstown's historical bluff and have baseball officials seriously consider moving the Hall of Fame to Tiger Stadium. Let's not have the beautiful structure ignored

Knollenberg's district also is going to take on a new look and be known as the 9th. Longtime constituents in Livonia and Redford Township would drop out of Knollenberg's territory and join the new 11th.



Like so many DJ's-in-demand, Paul Oakenfold finds himself constantly in motion. Just weeks before the start of the Area:One Festival - a convergence of rap, rock, pop and techno and the brainchild of Superstar Moby -London-born Oakenfold has but a moment to spare. You see, he's jetting off to Ibiza, Spain.

And it couldn't be a more appropriate pre-cursor to the major tour. Oakenfold first visited the island more than a decade ago and discovered his "Balearic beat," the sound that revolutionized dance music in the U.K. and essentially made Oakenfold a

household name in the States.

"I never wanted to be involved in a so-called band," admits the soft-spoken music guru. "I never wanted to play guitar. But I liked the thought of playing music.

When he encountered DJs mixing records and making beats in clubs, he saw the turntable as an instrument for the first time.

Oakenfold was a natural choice to join Area: One. "Moby asked me, so I said yes," he explains. "He sent me a nice little e-mail and I was like 'Yeah.' I like what Moby does.

The line-up, which also includes OzzFest veterans Incubus, rootsy-crooner Nelly

May, Kevin Saunderson and Juan Atkins, offers the most diversity on a single concert bill this summer. "The concept works nicely in England," says Oakenfold. He hopes it succeeds Stateside as well.

"I'm happy to be able to play to a completely different audience, he says. "It will be good for me."

Oakenfold should know well what's good for him. He's built his career from the ground up. Once a courier shuffling along the subways in New York City, he was drawn into nightclub culture, tempted by the birth of hip hop, and landed work at record labels like Champion and Def Jam where he'd get credit for

Miles is an oversized cat belonging to Bret Tobias, singer of Philadelphia's best kept pop secret, The Bigger Lovers. He appears on the inside cover of the band's debut, How I Learned to Stop Worrying, sitting upright on a couch. Being the largest of Tobias' pets, Miles is often referred to as "the bigger lover." Are you catching on yet?

"People seem to like the cat," admitted drummer Patrick Berkery. "He has people now." It all started with a feline.

But it only takes one good listen to How I Learned to Stop Worrying, to get you hooked. The instant those Beach Boys harmonies and The Who-style gui-

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t's no real tar riffs hit your ear drums you won't be able to resist it. I could-

> So I wasn't about to pass up a talk with the band's newest member, Berkery, who was busy in Philadelphia, anticipating a first visit to the Motor City.

A music fan since age 4, he remembers when his relatives would buy him toy drums and guitars. By Christmastime, age 8, little Patrick unwrapped his first real drum kit and a musician emerged. "I really wasn't so good at baseball," is his only explanation.

His aunt exposed him to the sweet sounds of The Beatles. His sister loved Prince and The Police. Music was unavoidable. "I was coming of age when MTV just started to happen."

When he's not playing music, Berkery is writing about other people who play music - as a journalist frequently gracing the pages of Magnet and Philadelphia Weekly. "It's the only other thing I can do."

When fellow Bigger Lovers Bret Tobias, Scott Jefferson and Ed Hogarty roped Berkery in to play drums, around the fall of 1999, it looked as though they were on a road to rock stardom. Just about to make a first record, The Bigger Lovers got picked up by a major label. When I came to be in the band

merger went down with Universal, we got the heave-ho.'

But the band, and Berkery, stuck it out. "They are probably the best songwriters I've ever worked with," he says of Tobias and Jefferson. "It was always important to me to be able to pull it off live."

It took some time to work out the kinks on stage, but the band discovered they had more to worry about. How I Learned To Stop Worrying almost never saw the light of day.

The Bigger Lovers recorded it nearly two years ago for Mood Food Records (home to bands like Whiskeytown). Completed with producer Daniel Presley (The Breeders, Imperial Teens) by February 2000, the record had an initial release date of March 2000. March turned to April and April to August. The label then lost its distribution, but still owned the rights to this record.

The band was forced to buy back their own record and shopped it around until they found a label willing and able to release it. Enter Black Dog Records (Marah, Continental Drifters), a small outfit based in Mississippi. In March 2001 the long wait

was over. "It was just a matter of being patient," said Berkery.

But The Bigger Lovers music speaks for itself. Songs like the addictive clap-along quality of I'm Here, the candycoated chorus found on Threadbare and Beatlesque build of Casual Friday are met by a pleasantly unexpected twang of a lap steel in the record's farewell, Out of Sight. It's a pop delight delivered by able, eager musicians.

Next on the set list...

The band's new material could be described as more "Kinksish." "It's a lot more immediatesounding," said Berkery. "It won't be as over-the-top produced." He's hoping this time around a bigger label will latch onto The Bigger Lovers.

'We don't have any delusions of grandeur that we're going to become The Rolling Stones," he added. They've come this far alone. No booking agent. No manager.

And The Bigger Lovers survived it all without a hint of scandal fit for VH-1's Behind The Music.

"I'm past the point where I'm in my late 20s and I think 'I gotta be a rock star," he said. We can do this. If we have to have day jobs, so be it. People seem to really like what we do

What should you look for in a ceiling fan? "Longevity, style, you want one that's quiet," said Mike Kotecki of the electrical department of Lowe's in Westland. "After that it becomes a personal preference." Warranties range from 15 years, to 30 years to lifetime, he said.

The most frequently asked question from ceiling fan customers is what size to get, Kotecki said.

If the room measures 8 by 10 feet, the fan diameter should be 30 inches; if the room is 10 by 12 feet, the fan diameter should be 42 inches; if the room is more than 12 by 12 feet, up to 20 by 20 feet, the fan diameter should be 52 inches.

"It should always be hung on a fan box," McClain said.

"The old ceiling light boxes will have a tendency to break. It's very important to inspect your boxes before hanging (the fan)."

The fan can be hung on a downrod, or close to or flush against the ceiling. Vaulted or angled ceilings could require longer downrods.

All fans have a pull chain to provide three speeds and "off," and a slide switch to reverse the direction of the air flow, Kotecki said.

"You want to have fan control," McClain said. "A dimmer switch would burn out the motor."



(NUE) - It's not that hard or expensive to install a ceiling fan. It just takes time

To install, the first step is to turn off power to the existing light fixture at the main service panel, test for power, and then remove the fixture and electrical box. Use a metal brace attached to framing members for ceiling fans. Attach a 14 1/2-inch-deep metal light fixture box to the brace bar using a U-bolt and two nuts.

Next, attach the stove bolts to the adapter plate with locknuts. Insert the adapter plate into the box so the ends of the U-bolt fit through the holes on the adapter plate. Secure the adapter by screwing two locknuts onto the U-bolt. Open one knockout for each cable that will enter the electrical box and attach a cable clamp to each knockout.

Now go to the attic and position the brace bar between the joists—the parallel beams that support the ceiling. The bottom legs of the brace bar should be flush with the bottom of the joists. Rotate the bar by hand to force the end spikes into the joists. The face of the electrical box should be flush with the finished ceiling

While it may seem complicated, installing a ceiling fan is relatively easy: Even if you've never hung a ceiling fan before, it shouldn't take you more than a few hours to install.

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

History and beauty showcase magnolia plantation, gardens

tion in June 2000 was memorable because I had chance visit the historic and lovely Magnolia Plantation and its Gardens

S.C. The gardens, which opened to the public in the late 1860s, are regarded as America's oldest manmade tourist attraction.

The plantation has, for more than three centuries, been the original ancestral home of the Drayton family. It is believed that no other plantation in South Carolina is still under original family ownership from that time; 13 generations of the present owning family have lived here.

There are acres of gardens, formal and informal, mazes and statues, peacocks and guinea hens, miniature horses that graze in a field surrounded by a split-rail fence, and so much more to see and experience.

The plantings offer beauty all through the year, so a visit can be planned at any time. Each path leads to more beauty and the question, "What could be more beautiful than what I am now seeing?"

Visitors can observe plantation life as it was in the 1840s, with the vegetable garden near the domestic workers' cabins and guinea hens in the yard. The domestic workers were taught to read and their schoolroom is on the grounds.

Canoeing, bike and walking nature trails, picnic areas, a 125acre rice field waterfowl refuge and a petting zoo of plantation animals will keep every member of the family busy and enter-

A leisurely stroll through the many gardens is a highlight. The lovely Crepe Myrtle was in full bloom when I was there. The present director, Taylor Drayton Nelson, says the Camellia collection-more than 100 years oldis magnificent toward the end of March and Rhododendron blooms aren't to be missed, nor are the Magnolia Grandiflora, the flower for which the plantation was named.

There are several theme gardens such as an enclosed Barbados Tropical Garden, a Topiary Garden and a Biblical Garden. There is also a large Indian burial mound and a plantation worker graveyard.

A neat experience is a 45minute ride on the nature train around the rice fields and wildlife refuge that borders the Ashley River.

All kinds of water creatures such as turtles, alligators, osprey, bald eagles and the like reside in this area. A nature boat plies the water of the ancient 150-acre flooded rice field, now a wildlife refuge for many waterloving birds and swamp inhabitants.

Gardens

Boardwalks and dikes lead through The Audubon Swamp Garden, 60 acres of blackwater cypress and tupelo swamp.

This is a most unusual major garden and wildlife preserve, and should be a must on the list of things to do. Try to spend at least 45 minutes to see alliga-

tors, anhinga (water turkey) and other wildlife as well as beautiful water lilies.

The Audubon Swamp Garden is independently operated by that Society and is reached through Magnolia Plantation. It is open to coincide with the plantation hours.

The Biblical Garden was most peaceful and bordered by boxwood with a religious statue; standing in the center. Along one path in the woods, red and white impatiens had been planted under the Magnolias; quite a

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Another beautiful area is the formal Herb Garden, just inside a long hedge of Crepe Myrtle. Just behind this garden is the magnificent ancestral home with a collection of outstanding Early American antiques. Tours are available.

Live oaks are festooned with Spanish moss and are quite picturesque; the mist over the river in early morning evokes a feeling of tranquility that radiates from this centuries-old plantation and

Putting Magnolia Plantation on your itinerary when you're traveling South is suggested.

Refreshments are available. A gift shop is filled with lovely things. Open 365 days a year, 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Call for November to February hours.

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

Inspect equipment

Take a moment to visually inspect the equipment before each use. The vibrations of small engines can easily loosen the most secure fastener. Debris in the cooling fins reduces the unit's efficiency and can contribute to overheating of the engine, which can shorten its

often don't bother to check the oil. Small engines can be notorious oil burners, especially with age. Add oil as necessary, but don't over fill. If you haven't changed the oil lately, do it now. Spray cables occasionally with penetrating lubricants, such as

Just as a sharp knife is easier to use than a dull one, a sharp mower blade reduces the amount of work needed from the engine to turn it. This in turn reduces fuel consumption and places less wear on the engine.

Grass clippings that compress on the underside of the mower (especially true of mulchers) also create drag on the engine and hasten deterioration of the deck.

As energy rates soar, everyone needs affordable ways to beat the heat.

With hot weather already upon us, now is the time to give your home a "check-up." Here are six tips from the Comfort Institute to make sure your summer electric bills don't blow your

Don't run your clothes dryer when it's hot out. Your dryer blows air out of your house when it's drying clothes. And for every cubic foot of air it blows out, a cubic foot of hot outside air gets sucked in that your air conditioner has to cool down. Run your dryer late at night or early morning and you'll have lower electric bills. Even better, use a "solar powered" clothes dryer: a clothes line in the back yard.

Have your duct system tested for air leaks. Many think that windows and doors are the major cause of a home's energy wasting air leaks. But according to recent research by the Department of Energy, gaps, joints and disconnections in the typical home's duct system are much more significant. The DOE states that the typical duct system loses 25 percent to 40 percent of the energy put out by the central heat pump or air condi-

Leaks are usually the biggest problem. Authorities recommend having a contractor seal them with bushed on "mastic." Duct tape often dries out and fails. (It turns out duct tape is great for many things, but sealing ducts isn't one of them!)

Ask your air conditioning contractor to perform an Infiltrometer "blower door" test. The blower door is a computerized instrument originally invented by the Department of Energy. It pinpoints where your home's worst air leaks are, such as duct leaks, and also measures how leaky the overall house is. While most homes are still far too leaky, some are now quite tight, and need mechanical ventilation to ensure the air inside is fresh. Many contractors offer an Infiltrometer test as part of a "Whole House Comfort Checkup" that also checks insulation levels and overall duct performance.

Replace your air conditioning or heat pump air filter. Most systems need this done every month to ensure safe and efficient operation. Some such as electronic air cleaners need to be thorough-

Have your air conditioner cleaned and tuned. A pre-season tune up is a great investment. It reduces the chances of breakdowns in the middle of the summer and more than pays for itself through more energy efficient operation. Make sure the contractor cleans both the indoor and outdoor heat transfer coils, and checks refrigerant gas charge by measuring "superheat" and "subcooling."

Taking good care of your camera will assure that it will perform satisfactorily for you for many years. Here are some basic tips to help you out.

> Never leave your camera in a very hot or

cold spot. Temperature extremes can warp delicate casings and fit-

tings and distort mechanisms. ■ Keep the body free of dust

and dirt. A soft cloth works fine. I've found that Q-Tips dipped in film cleaner solution are an ideal way to reach those hard-to-getat places on your camera. It's easier than you think to

accidentally have a camera knocked from your hands or bumped into a solid object. Accidents or rough handling can cause severe damage. So always use a camera strap. Having your camera securely around your neck prevents accidents.

Most cameras aren't waterproof and can be damaged significantly if water gets inside. Take

lens from water (especially salt water). If your camera should get wet from rain, dry it off immediately with a soft, clean cloth.

Don't touch the glass on the front or back of your lens. Fingerprints, if not removed right away, may eventually become permanent. Keep your lenses clean with lens cleaning tissue and lens cleaning solution.

Store your camera in a dry, ventilated place. The original box with its moisture-absorbing silica gel bag is an ideal means of safe storage.

■ If you're not going to shoot

care to protect both body and for a while, remove all batteries from your camera. This will prolong their life and eliminate any chance of battery corrosion that can damage your camera.

Try thinking of your camera as a best friend and treat it accordingly. If so, you'll enjoy a mutually rewarding and satisfying relationship that will last for many years.

"Stop it." my dad said with absolute concern and love. "It's OK to say, 'another month's passed' since David

died, but you've got to stop counting the days, hours, minutes."

He's right, but I can't help

David died from complications of acute mylogenous leukemia at 3:56 a.m. Sun-2000, 6 months,

9 days, 8 hours, 4 minutes before our 19th wedding anniversary.

I threw the first handful of dirt into his grave after the funeral luncheon Thursday, Dec. 21, and wondered how I'd live without him.

All by myself

I'm learning, but it's not easy. I've never lived alone, and have difficulty remembering when there wasn't a man in my life to love and take care of.

I lived with girlfriends in college, and got married 14 days after graduating from Michigan State University. In high school I met a guy, just before my 16th birthday, and didn't date anyone else. We broke up when I met David at Henry Ford Community College in

After David died I got help from professionals and have spent a lot of time thinking and looking at photo albums trying to figure out who I am and want to be. About two months ago I began including "Kaleski" in my byline.

Before I became David's wife, I was Keely Kaleski. Some people will say you can't change your name and change your life. But I'm not sure they're right. Thinking of myself as Keely Kaleski is empowering. It reminds me that I have roots that extend beyond marriage.

Making do

Women have this tendency to want to please others, and in doing this they lose themselves. It's the difference between being a "make time" woman - someone who makes time to do what they need to do to be good to themselves, and a "make do" woman - someone who puts the needs of others ahead of her own. I've always been a "make do" woman.

David and I led a pretty sedentary lifestyle. I gained weight, and was shocked in January 2000 to discover that I weighed 200 pounds.

I've lost over 60 pounds and dropped from a size 16 to a size 8. Instead of vacationing at a resort, I begged my dad and brother Mike to let me join them on a bicycle adventure along the Wisconsin River. I rode over 370 miles in six days, learned how to put up a tent, carried my own gear and made new friends.

When I came home I felt like taking care of things I'd put off like selling David's car and finding out what classes to take this fall at Walsh College where I'm an MBA student.

Friends have started to introduce me to their single, male friends. I celebrated my 19th wedding anniversary with girlfriends who made me laugh and told me about dating in the '90s.

I've read "Mars and Venus Starting Over" and "Mars and Venus on a Date" by John Gray, "What Smart Women Know" by Steven Carter and Julia Sokol, and Anthony Storr's "Solitude: A Return to the Self."

I'm learning a lot, embracing this new single life, and laugh thinking about all the things I did wrong on my first two dates in 20 years - poor

Golden rule

Age is only a number to Canton senior

'm a business woman. I've been working all my life and I've got to keep on working," said 89-year-old Susan Golden.

The Canton resident works three days a week as a senior aide with Help-Source of Ypsilanti. The Senior AIDES Program is funded by the National Senior Citizen Education and Resource Center and places income-eligible individuals (55 and older) in paid employment internships at local non-profit and governmental agencies.

Golden's involvement with Help-Source first started in 1988 when she worked as a job bank employee counseling senior citizens to find employment. According to Sally Kruger, Help-Source Senior AIDES program and Adult Day Services program supervisor, Golden has been a valuable asset to HelpSource since the very begin-

'I think it's great she's still working," said Kruger. For the past six vears Golden has worked at the Plymouth Adult Day Services Program on the campus of Our Lady of Providence in Northville. "She keeps that program going as much as that program keeps her going. It has really given her a purpose to stay active.'

Three days a week from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Golden is transported to the Northville facility from her Canton home where adults with memory loss (dementia) and other special needs spend the day in a socially stimulating environment supported by recreational/cognitive activities. The 89-year-old says she helps serve coffee and a light breakfast, makes the guests comfortable, gets them anything they need and one of her favorite activities - sings

"I'm a ham at heart," admits Golden. "I love to sing and dance for our

Special touch

Greg Perkins, site manager of Plymouth Adult Day Services in Northville, is Golden's direct supervi-

"Some of our members have more needs than others. Some have a hard time eating," said Perkins. "Sally sits with them and guides and prompts them to eat which can be critically important for patients with dementia. She has a sensitivity for that and shows empathy toward these special human beings.

Golden attributes her ease in working with people to the lifetime she's spent involved with the public. After her family immigrated from Bialystok, Poland to the United States when she was an infant, they started a retail shoe business, J. Swed Shoe Company in Milwaukee. Eventually she and her husband were involved with the readyto-wear industry in both Wisconsin and eventually Miami in the early 1940s



where she worked at a dress shop at the prominent Saxony Hotel.

"I was there during the big 1945 boom," remembers Golden. "Desi Arnaz's troop was there and a lot of other very well known people." In 1953 Golden moved to Michigan with her two children, Alan and Sharon, where she joined her second husband.

Life long goal

Having dreamt about being a nurse one day, Golden said she wanted to be a caregiver after her mother fell ill

when she was a teenager. She finished two years of her high school education but then dropped out. "It was always on my mind to get my GED. It was important to me because I couldn't finish school when my mother was sick."

In her late 70s Golden went back to school and completed the classes to proud of that."

In addition to working in retail, Golden said she helped open Mead-

Adversity motivated architect

Vera Angélico knew she wanted to be an architect when she was just 6 years old. She might not have known what the word meant, but she was left with such a lasting impression after seeing the Catedral Metropolitana in Brazil's capital, that it would shape her entire educational and profession-

My dad drove the whole family to Brazilia in 1962," remembers Angélico. "Architect Oscar Niemeyer was charged with designing a new capital for the city. I remember we went to the cathedral and entered it from a tunnel and it just exploded in front of us with all this color. I was so impressed. I saw people walking around so mesmerized. I knew I wanted to bring to people that kind of wonderment and joy.

For Angélico the trip to the South American city was all she needed to start her on a path to becoming an architect. The road, however, wasn't a smooth one and it would be nearly 40 years before

she was able to fully realize her dream. "I'm an avid reader and that started when I was very young," said Angélico. "My dad was very supportive and really fed my hunger for learning by buying me all different kinds of books about architecture and art.

After graduating from high school and receiving her degree in architecture from the University of Sao Paulo in Brazil, she began work as an architect. Her fiancé, however, was from the United States and he eventually moved his bride to Hous-

The first of many disappointments came when Angélico learned her degree wasn't comparable to American standards. She was told she wouldn't be able to work here as an architect and would have to start her education over from scratch.

"It was tough. The language was very hard. I didn't have anybody to give me the ropes and being a woman ... a Latina woman ... was a big struggle,"

said Angélico.

Angélico then moved to New Jersey and in 1985

relocated to Michigan.

The Northville resident said she combined her love of art and architecture and began working as a design consultant. Being a licensed architect was still out of reach.

In 1989, Vera quit working at a Jackson architecture firm to help her husband start his own business. Then a call from a friend in San Francisco in 1996 forced her to do some soul searching. "He and I went to school together in Brazil. He

told me he was living in California and said he was

registered as an architect. When will you be?', he asked. I told him forget about it.'

Angélico couldn't get his question out of her mind. "It took me one year to wrap everything up with my clients again," said Angélico. "I wanted a clean cut."

After a potential architect finishes approximately six years of school they must complete a three-year internship and then pass nine exams - Angélico referred to as "grueling" - that range in duration from five to seven hours long.

"I had no social life and my family never saw me but I knew I had to do this for myself."

Angélico graduated from Lawrence Technological University and in 1997 began the daunting task of looking for an internship as a woman in her 40s, entering a field that was very much dominated by people half her age.

She eventually found a good fit for her situation and her interest in medical office facilities projects by working at MAS Associates of Farmington Hills under the leadership of President Charlie Johnston.

According to Johnston, architecture interns are part of the internship development program, a requirement of the American Institute of Architects (AIA). The program sets standards for interns, including monitoring the hours an intern accumulates as well making sure they are exposed to an array of projects so that they may become licensed.

"When we were looking for an intern to fill the position, Vera was simply the best possible choice for the job," said John-

MAS has a director of operations who is responsible for making sure interns fulfill their requirements, and reviews their work. Johnston said Vera got great reviews on the projects she was involved in and was known as a hard worker.

"Charlie was very supportive of my journey," said Angélico.

In 2000, Angélico began the licensing process and finished all nine tests in six months. "It was a major event when the envelope came in the mail. I started

yelling that I passed. It was such a celebration. Everytime I see my name on a piece of mail with AlA after my name I just can't believe that's me."

Through a mutual acquaintance, Angélico met Danny Hancock, owner of a small Fowlerville carry-out pizza business. He was in the market for an architect to design a restaurant where a car dealership showroom once stood.

"She's the greatest," said Hancock. "She went above and beyond the call of duty."

In the end Angélico designed Danny's Pizza Shack, a 1,650 square-foot restaurant that seats 50 in Fowlerville. Hancock said the project had its up and downs

"When you design something you have take into consideration the impact it's going to have on the quality of the environment and remember that a building is

not a sculpture. We have to live with this everyday of our lives. You can't put it in the closet if you don't like it.

The Plymouth businesswoman's father passed away before she became licensed in the United States. She knew he was

proud of her. "After I called my husband and told him I passed the test, I called my mom in Brazil. She's so proud of me ... everyone in my family is. It took me a very long time and it was a very painful journey with many adversities. But I held onto my dreams and my passions and I've learned how to become a fighter.'



If you heard someone talking about packing, grinding, tailing or "riding the rail," you might look at them like they were from a different world.

In a way they are.

Their world is on the water, not on the land. And for sailors like these, there is no finer place to be than the mouth of the Black River in Port Huron on Saturday morning, joining about 3,000 of their fellow competitors in the 77th-annual Bacardi Bayview Mackinac race.

As the largest fresh-water sailing sailor that he was, Clayson had always

race in the United States, the event takes participants anywhere from two to three days to complete their trek across Lake Huron to Mackinac Island for the finish.

And it's much harder than it seems. In last year's race, weeks of preparation, strategic planning and hard work were about to pay off for Tim Clayson, a Farmington Hills resident and skipper of a 30-foot Catalina, named Unplugged.

Clayson's crew, participating in their first Bayview Mackinac Race came in not knowing quite what to expect. Avid sailor that he was. Clayson had always

been intrigued by the big race, but had never had the time, nor the permission to enter.

"I had wanted to do it for a while," said Clayson. "It seemed like a good thing to try, but my wife had always said to wait until I could take the kids."

Clayson's seven-man crew, including sons Chris and Brian, were nearly through with the 235 statute-mile Shoreline course, one of two courses racers can opt to take en route to the finish, when the weather finally got the best of their boat.

Just 30 miles away from the finish and the festivities on the grounds of

Mission Pointe Resort on Mackinac Island, severe winds, rain and waves caused one of the boat's main sails to blow out. The turn of events left Clayson and crew with no other choice but to pull out of the race.

"The worst is definitely having to retire. There is a lot of disappointment in that," said Clayson. "Everyone handled it pretty well actually. I was probably the most nervous and the most affected by it, having the responsibility not only for results, but also for the safety of everyone."

While urge to race is a passion for some people, others try it on a lark and wind up

Mark Revers, a Plymouth resident and regional director for race-sponsor Bacardi, was sitting in a meeting two years ago when he first contemplated the idea of entering the race. He was familiar with the event but not with all that it entailed.

"I was actually just sitting in a meeting when I casually mentioned how neat being on a boat would be, as nonchalantly as if you were reading a National Geographic and you saw a picture of the Great Wall of China and you said 'how cool would it be to go there,' " said Revers. "The next day I get told that I've been put on a boat.'

Unlike Clayson, who had grown up around water and sailed most of his life, Revers had never set foot on a boat before. The idea of sailing intrigued him but at the same time made him apprehensive.

"As excited as I was, I was a little concerned about being seen as a greenhorn by the rest of the crew," Revers said.

Any reservations Revers had were quickly put to rest. In his first race of any kind, Revers contributed to the success of his crew, headed by skipper Norman Silverman. They finished first in their class as well as taking top honors overall for their division.

Revers had so much fun and got along with the crew so well, he maintained involvement and stayed with the team through the summer and fall. Last year, the sailors duplicated the feat by taking top honors in the Cruising Division once again at

Newcomers like Clayson and Revers have been fortunate enough to be part of the extremes Port Huron-to-Mackinac has to offer in their first races, but for someone like Farmington's Keith Turner, the stories have been long in the making.

Turner took part in his first Mackinac race 35 years ago and has sailed it ever since. Sailors of the Mackinac have fondly given

the nickname of "Old Goat" to any participant who has been involved in the race for 25 years or more. Turner's one of the oldest "Old Goats."

Turner's crew covers three generations. There's a member of the crew who has been part of 49 races, two members with 18 races under their belt and the youngest, a 14 year old, participating for the first time.

"We just told him to stay out of trouble and keep his fingers out of the way," said Turner. We've finished everywhere from first to last. One year I do remember, we didn't finish because we lost a rudder.'

All of the sailors hold their own reasons for doing the race and have their favorite parts. Revers, after going through for two years has his own favorites on just what makes the adventure worthwhile.

"The beginning and the end are great," said Revers. "There's all of the fanfare and pageantry surrounding the start. Then at the end, you're pretty beat up and you're ready to see land.

"But when you're riding the rail, you're just sitting there with your legs hanging over the edge. It's a very timeless, unique experience. You're sitting there and you can see the water, maybe some land and the sky.

You're just sort of lost, in a good way, out there. It's a way to get away from the pressures of life. There are the most fabulous sunsets. The stars at night are just unbelievable.

Most sailors agree that the night portion is where the race is either won or lost. If you can maintain your work ethic, wits and motivation while the sun is down, you're a step ahead of the rest of the field.

At the start, everyone is very awake and ready to go," said Turner. "You've got to imagine there are 20 boats all maneuvering for the same position. "I took my father out for a race and he watched the maneuvering at the beginning for five minutes and then he finally just told me to tell him when it was time to start. It's that intense."

There are over 260 yachts ranging from 26 to 72 feet in length. The largest boat may have a crew numbering over 20 sailors. Many of the people in the Bayview event will be coming off a race that sends them from Chicago to Mackinac. After the two days of that race participants will drive to Port Huron to compete in the Mackinac event.

Some, like Turner, are regulars, back for another go around. Others like Revers hope to have a good safe race while enjoying the success of past years.

Then there's teams like Clayson's who, after two grueling days last year were left with a bitter taste in their mouths from not finishing and questioned whether or not to return.

"We were tired and hungry," said Clayson. We didn't know if we wanted to eat first or sleep first. We hadn't had much opportunity to sleep and we'd been living on cold sandwiches for two days. We ended up going to a local restaurant and about cleaned the place out. Immediately after (the race) there was some hesitation about coming back, but within a couple of days the disappointment was gone. It only lasted for a short time and we were ready to go.'

"It's been a fantastic program and our numbers have improved quite a bit," said Redford Union swimming coach Doug Schade. who runs the program. "Last year, we had about 60 kids per session and the first session this year (which ends today) had about 110 kids. So our numbers are up."

While most of the kids who take part in the lessons come from Redford, the program is open to any child older than six regardless of residency. Parents can register their children at the Parks and Recreation office at 12400 Beech Daly or call (313) 387-2650 for more informa-

Classes run from 10 a.m. to noon Monday and Wednesday or Tuesday and Thursday from this Monday to August 16. The cost of the program is \$30. There's also an open swim at the pool from noon to 1:30 p.m. and 3-5 p.m. from Monday through Friday until August 17 for \$2 each

"The classes basically are our learn-to-swim program," said Schade. "They learn water safety, how to float, how to rescue people and how to improve their swimming. It's a gradual program."

Gradual comes from learning how to swim, but also from getting enough swimmers to make the next step in the swimming scheme - participating in the township's "Tidal Wave" swim club each summer. This summer's season is almost done ending with a meet on July 30 against the Taylor Pool Sharks and the Redford YWCA's team. "But we'd like to get the kids

into these programs each summer," said Schade. "A lot of swim clubs will charge \$200-400 for 10 weeks of lessons and competition. We're offering the same program the swim clubs do, but we charge just \$50.

"We're trying to run a competitive swim club for the kids."

The Tidal Wave is split into two groups - those entering the sixth through eighth grades and those going into high school. This year, the junior high group has about 22 swimmers - up from six last year - and the high school age group is at 24, compared to 15 a year ago.

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
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"The whole idea is to get these kids swimming now," said Schade, "and when they're done with the swimming lessons, maybe they'll move on to the summer swim club, get to a certain level and graduate to their high school teams.

The kids are getting better, no doubt about it. They're improving dramtically - especially the junior high kids. With the beginners, you can see it happen more. With the high school kids, you can see it not so much in their times, but in their technique. The bottom line to to get these kids swimming, have them improve and have fun doing it."

Deals can fall in the cracks

All kinds of circumstances - big and small - break deals.

Messy showing conditions and overpricing on the part of sellers limit prospects right out of the gate.

Buyers not qualifying financially or having unrealistic expectations sabotage their own efforts.

And when a truculent buyer meets up with an intransigent seller, watch out. Lots of smoke, but no fire.

More typically, problems surface during inspections. Appraisals don't pan out. A deadline passes unmet. Personal economics change. Pseudoexperts inject themselves into the process

Poor communication and an inability or unwillingness to compromise might also bring the Good Ship Transaction to a dead stop in the water.

Mortgage troubles

"Normally in this day and age, we get an approval letter before we even start," Dottie LeSeur, an associate broker with Coldwell Banker Legacy in Westland, said of buyers qualifying for a mortgage.

"But if one loses a job (or quits), and if approval is based on two incomes, it can kill a deal after both have qualified," she said.

"Most people understand right up front that you don't make any changes in your life when you start looking for a home. You don't buy a new car or get a new job until after closing."

Other roadblocks loom. "If you have a contingency on the

sale of your present home in order to purchase a new home and your present home doesn't sell, you don't have a deal," LeSeur added.

Sellers should know that just because they need a certain amount of money on the sale of the current house to move up doesn't necessarily mean

pany may indicate that a home is worth less than the agreed price.

In that case, the seller can reduce the price, the buyer can come up with a larger down payment or the people involved can prove with comparable sales studies that the appraisal is wrong, LeSeur said.

Otherwise, no mortgage and, likely, no sale.

Inspection fallout

Betsy Lanman, associate broker with Century 21-217 in Oxford, identified two primary deal breakers.

"An inept inspector - they tend to scare a buyer out of it. They don't go into any detail about what can be remedied with a quick fix.

"Most inspectors are upright and honest. They will work with the buyer and seller, won't try to scare."

In cases where inspection issues arise, the parties will successfully renegotiate nine times out of 10, Lanman said. The others times, compromise doesn't happen because the buyers feel overwhelmed or the sellers insist on their price.

Mortgage approval is the other big sticking point, Lanman added.

"Ninety-nine percent of mortgage people will be really straight and say, This buyer is a little shaky. We'll do our best to get it through.'

"Credit has a lot to do with it, late pays - not being straight with mortgage people. They (buyers) say they make this amount and they don't.'

Like Yogi Berra, Lanman realizes that it ain't over 'til it's over. In cases where the sale is real shaky, she'll keep the home listed until everything is signed, sealed and delivered.

I don't take it off the market. I keep it going, let other agents know we'll look at back-up offers.

Ah, relatives

Inspections and relatives are the big deal killers experienced by Jacqueline Erlandson, associate broker with Max Broock in West Bloomfield.

"There's no such thing as a perfect house," she said, and that applies to inspections and family members prospective buyers sometimes bring in as advisers.

An inspector can pan a nouse without comparing it to other houses in the same price range. Ninety-nine percent are very reasonable. I sometimes think

they're too hard on a house." Then, there's the relatives.

They get very protective. If they don't think it's right, you just find something else. You can't argue with a buyer. Their thing is to please.'

James Baker, associate broker with Real Estate One in Novi, said everyone must focus on the ultimate goal at all times - get the transaction done. Keep the end in sight."

Buyers probably won't get everything on their wish list; sellers shouldn't expect to squeeze out every dime.

First-time buyers scared off by a lessthan-perfect inspection report and urged on by well-meaning parents or other "family experts" often will take flight quicker than a more seasoned purchaser, Baker said.

"The buyer has to give the seller an option to respond. My advice would be 'Be open minded, don't draw conclusions, be flexible and be willing to compromise a little bit.' And that goes for sellers, too.

"If a buyer and seller want it to work out, it will work out. If they have that mindset, they won't scare the other one

Ask seller to pay costs for buyer



Like most financial deals, there is a transaction price to pay for acquiring a home, especially if there is a mortgage involved.

While mortgage costs may vary significantly with different lenders and loan types, they generally fall into three categories: closing costs, escrow expenses, and down payment.

Closing costs normally include things like appraisals, surveys, closing and filing fees, title insurance, and required reports but may also include lender-imposed fees, discount points, and origination points. Some of these costs are negotiable; many are not.

A simple way to minimize these costs is to ask the sellers to pay for them. You will save a dollar for every dollar the sellers agree to cover. If they are not willing, you may ask them if they would cover some costs if you both agreed to increase the purchase price by the amount of these costs.

By "rolling in" the costs in this manner, you would be amortizing your costs over the life of the loan and preserving today's cash for other things. A thousand dollars in costs amortized over 30 years costs seven or eight dollars per month.

Lenders can sometimes cover some of your closing costs but will normally only do so by assessing a higher interest rate. This method may be a good strategy for larger loans, but the rate required to offset costs could be substantial.

Some lenders require borrowers to establish escrow accounts from which they will pay your next year's taxes and insurance. To pay your own taxes, you may incur an escrow waiver fee of up to 1/4-percent. Waiving escrows can be beneficial if you have high property taxes or if you plan to stay in your new loan for a long time.

Your down payment is your minimum investment in your property. A small down payment sets you up for a better overall rate-of-return on your investment. However, many borrowers still like the security of owning a larger portion of their home.

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

Up your insurance to protect renovation

(NAPSA) - According to the Independent Insurance Agents of America, one in four home remodeling projects increases the value of a home by as much as 25 percent. In addition, three of four homeowners don't update their policies when making structural changes to their homes.

Whether it's architecturally designed floor plans for an expanded family room with an inset entertainment center or the cocktail napkin sketch for the do-it-yourself swimming pool and deck, it's a good idea to meet with your insurance agent before the construction begins.

"Unfortunately, if your homeowner's policy has not been updated to reflect new construction, more than likely you will be underinsured in the event of a loss," says Daniel H. Olmsted, senior vice president, Personal Insurance Division, Atlantic Mutual Cos. "Simple preventative measures, such as meeting with an agent on a regular basis, can help ensure that homeowners are properly insured."

When negotiating with a home remodeling/ renovation firm or independent contractor, ask for a valid contractor's license and proof of liability and workers' compensation insurance.

"Any reputable contractor or firm will readily provide a license and certificate of insurance. Securing these documents will save time and money in the event of an unforeseen disaster," adds Olmsted.



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Homeowners planning renovations can consult this checklist:

Speak with your insurance agent both prior to and following any remodeling in order to evaluate your coverage needs.

Before construction begins, check with your local municipality for specific building codes and, if applicable, obtain a builder's permit.

If using a contractor, require that he/she have at least five years experience, provide proof of insurance and are

■ If you will be exposing your home to the elements during construction, include a place for theft and weather damage liability in your homeowner's policy.

■ Be wary of signing for any deliveries unless you have personally paid for them or are willing to accept responsibility for their payment.







MEYERS ON MORTGAGES

FORECLOSURE SCAMS CAN MAKE A **BAD SITUATION WORSE**

by GARY S. MEYERS



The scam artists are out there. preying on homeowners facing foreclosure and making the problems worse.

Imagine you are in financial trouble. A "mortgage consultant" or "foreclosure service" contacts you with an offer of help. You bite, and you end up losing your home. There's also bankruptcy proceedings you didn't even know you filed, because you did-

n't.
This week The Meyers Report first week the Meyers Report looks into the growing problem of foreclosure scams — the fly-by-night hustles and the get-rich-quick schemes that play on consumer greed, fear and ignorance.
"People facing foreclosure are

in a stressful situation," said Sandra Rasnak, Assistant United States Trustee and National Bankruptcy Fraud Coordinator. They want to believe they're not going to lose their homes. This is what the perpetrators play on.

Rasnak works for a little known branch of the US Justice

Department — the Executive Office of Trustees - which monitors the bankruptcy system to watch for fraud and other abuses.

In the world of mortgages, where the dollar amounts are high and the paperwork usually understood only by specialized lawyers, frauds and scams abound. People who want to buy or keep their dream homes will do just about anything, and believe just about anyone, espe-cially if their judgment is clouded by emotion and they don't have the information they need.
"Many people get into trouble because they're afraid to contact

their lenders when they get into financial trouble," says Dan Kaatz, Citibank's Illinois Mortgage Director. "Generally your lender is going to want to work with you, and they're a lot safer than someone you discover in a mailer A typical scam plays out this

A homeowner who has not been able to make payments learns he's facing foreclosure. He receives a letter or a flyer telling him that he does not have to lose

his house, and he does not have to hire an expensive lawyer, if he simply follows the advice of the 'counselor" who sent the letter.

The letter will tell you to call the people and set up a meeting with them," said Rasnak, "or it may all be done through the mail The general concept is that if you pay them some money, they'll be able to help you save the house by getting a new mortgage or a debt consolidation loan. In anoth er variation, they say that if you deed or sell them the property for a low price, they'll rent it back to you while you get on your feet They may also tell you to send your mortgage payments to them while they look for a new loan

for you."
No matter what the scenario, it always comes down to the perpetrator saying, "give me some money, and I'll fix your prob-

lem.

The problem doesn't get fixed, it just gets put off, Rasnak said. In an article written for the American Bankruptcy Institute Journal, Trustee Office spokesperson Jane Limprecht described the vicious twist used by the perpetrators of these

"Typically, a partial interest perhaps 5 percent or 10 percent — in property held by a home-owner facing foreclosure is transferred to a real or fictional entity already in bankruptcy. Because the property interest is then held by a bankruptcy debtor, the original owner's creditor cannot fore close until the bankruptcy court lifts the automatic stay when you

don't show up for the hearing. The calls and notices stop coming, and the homeowner thinks the problem has been solved. He does not realize that this is only a delay while the courts untangle the fraudulent bankruptcy filing.

These schemes are intended to buy time for the perpetrator."
Rasnak said. "They want to keep that rent, mortgage payment, or fee coming in as long as possi-

'Sometimes they'll put ten-

ants' houses under foreclosure. and the tenants don't have any idea they are involved in the scam, she said. Their rent goes into the pocket of the perpetrator, and the tenants will eventually be evicted when the house is

finally foreclosed."

How can you recognize the signs of a foreclosure fraud?

There are some clues," Limprecht said, "But usually people facing foreclosure are in such a high emotional state that they're not thinking about looking for them. All they want is to have their problems fixed." Some of the signs of a scam

may include

• Letters sent to people on a foreclosure list.

roreclosure list.

"These lists are available in many cases from court clerks' offices, or public notices," said Rasnak, "Notices may also be published telling when the sale will take place and what property will be sold."

* Letters from people calling.

• Letters from people calling themselves "mortgage consul-tants" or "foreclosure services." or similar names.
"If you can't pay your mort

gage, call your mortgage lender or contact a lawyer for help," said Limprecht. "Your state or local bar association may be able to help you find low-cost legal

• Requests for payment before services are provided.
"Instead of contacting your lender or refinancing your loan the scam operator pockets all the money you paid, and then files a

bankruptcy case in your name-sometimes without your knowl edge, said Limprecht,
The rule of thumb in this, and
any case involving finances, is

that if it seems too good to be true, it probably is, Kaatz said.

The Music and Motor Fest (formerly the Michigan '50s Festival) is back for its 14th annual celebration, July 25-29 at the Novi Expo Center.

Over the past 13 years, this event has grown to become the third largest festival in the state (behind the National Cherry Festival and the State Fair).

In our first year, the festival was a virtual "wash out" due to some untimely thunderstorms. We had a pretty good run for the next 11 years and then last year, the rains came again. 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Mitch Ryder rolls into town on July 26

When the Carnival wheels were spinning and Saturday dances at the Walled Lake Casino jumping, local Rock n' Rollers would make the trek to the lakes area and kick-out-the jams.

It was there that many local rockers began their legendary careers. Mitch Ryder was one of those musicians.

A blues singer by profession, Ryder would travel from gig-to-gig, sitting in with whomever he could and soon was staring down fame as the self described "high octane, turbo, high performance" rocker, the first in a line of rockers such as Iggy & The Stooges, MC5, Nugent and Bob Seger.

"I played out there (Walled Lake) with Ten Nugent," Ryder said, from his Wayne County home. "I was the first to really break out."

Ryder, who attended Warren High School, said he would often head off to what is now the Wayne State University area of Detroit, where he would find other musicians plying their trade.

"I'd go down to Woodward and Alexandrine where the transients (musicians) would go," Ryder said. "There was always a new house band and you'd have to learn material quickly."

Ryder said he also was influenced by southern gospel music and the black music scene in Detroit.

"My mother was from the south," Ryder said, talking of his education in music. "So I learned a lot from her and chorus singing. I've have been classically trained. I do read and write music."

Ryder, who was born William Levies, Jr., has been performing since high school when he played under the stage name 'Billy Lee' and cut his first single in 1962 for a gospel label.

And Ryder paid his dues; 'jamming' with some of the most famous band in rock history. From The Dave Clark Five to Booker T. & MGs, Ryder was on the scene of rock's beginnings. And he quickly learned to 'work' a crowd.

Ryder said getting the crowd into the music, from a musicians point of view, has more to do with the "psychology" of the crowd than the rhythms of the music.

"A musician does what works well for them," he said. "There are things you can do like the chant, when you call back to the

audience. But, in most cases, people are already there because they are interested in you."

And interest in Ryder's music isn't just limited to the North American market. European audiences, especially in Germany, have taken to the bluesy sound that makes up Ryder's repertoire.

"The Europeans have a real sense of history," Ryder said. "They really understand how things (Rock n' Roll) evolve."

In the 1980s, Ryder's popularity in

Europe surged and he was doing a lot of shows across the ocean where audiences, like fellow blues player Buddy Guy, can eclipse even his legendary status in the United States.

"The best experiences have been in the small clubs," Ryder said. "You can see every stubbed toe and cut finger. The audience is right there. The interaction is tremendous."

And Ryder really wants his audiences to 'take a ride' with him. He's much more interested in an active crowd.

"I can't understand the performer who is satisfied with polite applause," he said. "The greatest thing in the world is to have the audience right there every step of the way."

Ryder, along with his band - The Detroit Wheels, are best known for their songs "Jenny Take a Ride," "Devil with a Blue Dress On," "Sock It To Me Baby" and "C.C. Rider." Ryder had a major hit with his version of Little Richard's "Jenny, Jenny."

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

Every musical group usually has one song that people remember them by and "Joy to the World" is that song for them, he said.

"I'm glad that people associate us with that song," Wells said. "It lives on and has

The group is also finding new life with new music.

"We have been doing a lot of shows with symphony orchestras," Wells said. "We went to Abbey Road, where the Beetles played and recorded with the London Symphony Orchestra.

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

The Sun Messengers, who pride themselves on being people-oriented and noted for their "workman" like attitude, are a "down to earth group."

"Musicians have a reputation of not showing up on time," Steiger said. "That is not us. We take care of business when we are up there. Hey, we're a party band. We like to see people having a good time."

The Sun Messengers take their 'hard working' persona seriously. Weddings, outdoor-indoor concerts and clubs, the band is always working.

"We did about 250 jobs last year. We'll do about 300 this year," Steiger said. "(Our) guys have played with everybody from Otis Redding to Martha Reeves (and the Vandellas). We've got one guy who did the entire southern circuit. There is a lot of experience in this group."

And with the opening of the casinos in Detroit, the Sun Messengers are doing a lot of work off Beaubien Street.

"When the Greektown Casino opened up, we started doing dates there and next thing you know we're playing there all the time," Steiger said. "We're, like, the house band for them right now."

While some designs of window walls still resemble their forerunners, it doesn't mean the trapezoid window has been abandoned altogether. Scott Davis, regional sales manager for Permanent Sash and Door in Wixon, says the current trend presents a wide collection of styles.

They are still doing the A-frame where the glass goes all the way up into the gable, but they are dropping in the radius, or circle-top, windows in there as well."

The ceiling's the limit

Depending on the brand and size, there are certain limitations as to what kind of window will work within a wall application. Tessman says that manutacturers will only go so tall and wide with operating windows.

"With an easement window, the tallest you can go is six feet," he says "With some brands you may be able to go a little taller, but that's the industry standard in an operating crank window."

When it comes to non-operating and fixed units, such as picture windows, the ceiling is the limit. But there is always a window that can be too large.

"In one configuration, we'll go 12-feet wide and six-feet tall," Davis says. But eight feet tall will be pushing it with the length





A normal wall has an R-value of 18, a measure of an object's resistance to heat flow, whereas windows are rated with an R-3.
