



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

Arbitrator rules township must rehire fireman

When Plymouth Township Supervisor Steve Mann fired firefighter Rick Tefend in May, the 10-year veteran said he didn't deserve to be fired and vowed he'd get his job back

Last month, an arbitrator agreed with him

Tefend was reinstated by arbitrator Donald F Sugerman, who in a 19-page ruling wrote the township did not have just cause for firing him, and said the department must reinstate Tefend "without prejudice to his seniority" and "make (Tefend) whole for any loss of earnings and benefits he may have sustained " Tefend started back to work Jan 27

"I'm pleased with the decision," Tefend said "I didn't do anything wrong I was nothing less than upfront and honest with (the township) and the doctor I did everything the township's doctor told me to do

Fire chief Larry Groth said he disagreed with the arbitrator's decision

The arbitrator ruled, and we have to accept that ruling," Groth said "I don't necessarily agree but we're going to abide by the ruling "

The dispute erupted when township officials were shown videotape of Tefend working a second job while collecting worker's compensation for injuries suffered fighting a fire late in 2000 The video was collected by the company that provides the township's insurance, and shows Tefend doing various tasks, including moving equipment, at Tefend's Lake & Trail Powersports, a store he owns in Erie, Michigan

Armed with the videotape, Mann said the decision to fire Tefend was easy

"A lot of the firefighters have second jobs The problem here is he was working a second job and said he was hurt and couldn't work for us," Mann said in Mav

But Tefend contends, and the arbitrator ultimately agreed, that he was doing things doctors told him he could do The doctors, both representing the township's interests, cleared Tefend to return to the fire department without restrictions The videotape was taken



high school diploma

Two years ago, Charles Phillips of Garden City was celebrating his granddaughter's high school graduation when he put on her cap and tassel

"This is the closest I'll get to wearing these," he commented to family members

Phillips, 77, quit Plymouth High School in 1943, during his junior year, to join the Marine Corps

"Two of my friends and I went to see The Shores of Tripoli at the Penn Theatre and decided we would join

the next day," remembers Phillips "It was the thing to do at the time '

Phillips spent the next three years in the Marine Air Corps, transporting wounded soldiers and supplies throughout the South Pacific, flying to places like Iwo Jima and Okinawa

After his military stint, Phillips took a job at Ford Motor Company, before eventually spending 38 years at the old Burroughs company in Plymouth Township (now Unisys) as a quality engineering analyst

"I didn't really worry about not having a high school diploma when I got to Burroughs," said Phillips "It

Three decades later, worker hits the road

It's not like Deanna Vogras was counting down the time But Tuesday, after 30 years, 6 months and 3 days, Vogras retired from her job with the city of Plymouth

Vogras, 62, Building Department secretary, said she "never thought I would be working 30 years in one place Time goes by so fast "

However, after her husband Ken, former Plymouth director of public works who retired after 35 years, had a scare with cancer, Vogras decided it was time to do some traveling And, she's not going to let the grass grow under her feet First it will be five weeks in Florida, then on to Arizona, before a golf trip in the middle of the summer

"It's kind of scary to retire, knowing that I won't be working again," she said "I'll miss not being with the people I enjoy'

Vogras began her stint with the city working in the Department of Public Works (currently Municipal Services Department), before transferring to the recreation department, and then the

treasurer's office before finishing the last nine years in the building department

"We get compliments on our building department for being so friendly," she said "We help people get inspections done, and can accommodate them better than some bigger departments

Rosemary Harvey may know by March 8 whether they're going to trial in Harvey's lawsuit against the township and treasurer Ron Edwards Then again, they may not

The two sides are scheduled to be before Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Susan Borman, who has indicated she will rule on a series of motions made by both sides regarding the scope of the evidence that could be presented if the case makes it to trial

However, Borman 1s reportedly still insisting the sides reach a settlement At last count, the parties were still far apart on what they think such a settlement should be worth

"I can't comment on negotiations," said Marvin Stempien, the lawyer representing Harvey "I don't think negotiations should be discussed in the press Hopefully, we'll reach a resolution If we don't, we'll start a trial '

Harvey has dropped her demands from an original asking price of \$16 million down to \$165,000, plus lifetime health care for her and her children The township last week upped their original \$65,000 offer to \$140,000, which is the amount a mediator suggested the case was worth to settle

Borman 15 scheduled to rule March 8

"There are a lot of things (the township) wants to bring in that are irrelevant," Stempien said "Trials are about evidence that is relevant '

The township, on the other hand. wants to widen the time frame in order to introduce evidence they say shows problems in the township administration caused by Harvey

"The evidence we're trying to introduce is relevant," Plymouth Township Supervisor Steve Mann said "If it's not relevant the court is not going to allow it The sole reason (Stempien) is trying to limit this evidence is it shows things about his client he does not want to be seen It's that simple "

Meanwhile, the township on Tuesday filed an emergency appeal on Borman's decision to let Harvey's Whistleblower claim stand They'd also like Borman to delay further proceedings until the appeal is either denied or heard, but they aren't hopeful

On the appeal, though, Mann 1s holding onto his optimism

"Obviously we're hopeful," he said "If we didn't think there was a chance it may be heard and granted, we wouldn't have filed it However, chances of emergency appeals being heard before trial are somewhat slim, so we'll just

Grant could help DDA get started in 2003

While the newly chosen Plymouth Township Downtown Development Authority Board of Directors is concentrating on producing the crucial development and tax-increment financing plans, decisions are being made about the first project the DDA will tackle

The township has applied for a grant through the Michigan Department of Transportation that could bring nearly \$1 million to help the DDA get started The Transportation Enhancement Activity grant could be worth \$572,000, plus matching funds from both the township and MDOT, if approved

The township would use that money to do streetscapes, brick columns and

decorative fencing along Ann Arbor Road from Eckles to just west of Haggerty

"If it is approved, we may see some work next year." said Plymouth Township Supervisor Steve Mann, who also chairs the DDA board "That would be great, because we could piggy-back on improvements MDOT is planning for Ann Arbor Road "

If the grant doesn't come through, Mann said, it might be awhile before township residents see any evidence of the DDA along the Ann Arbor Road corridor The DDA board must get its development and TIF plans approved before tax equalization day in May

Assuming that happens on time, the township would collect its first money





was steady work, and the pay was pretty good I gained a lot of experience from the college of hard knocks "

However, as time went on, Phillips thought more and more about that high school diploma

"In the latter years, the people I was working with all had college degrees," he said "Here, I didn't even have a high school education and I was telling them what to do You feel like a second class citizen "

One day, while listening to the radio, his son, Ron, of Livonia, heard about a program called Operation Recognition, in which veterans who left high school to serve their country could get a diploma "My dad tried to take some

classes at Wayne State to get his diploma, but with working and a family it just didn't work out," he said "This was something I really wanted for him '

Ron did secure a diploma from the program, out of Placer County, Calif He went a step further

He found out about a bill in the Michigan legislature that would honor veterans the same way Ron talked to several lawmakers, followed the bill as it worked its way through the House and Senate, and got his wish as it was finally signed by Gov John Engler in December

The next step was to get the diploma in time for his fathers 77th birthday celebration sched uled for Feb 24

Ron Phillips convinced the Plvmouth-Canton Board of Education to take up the issue at its Feb 12 meeting Trustees approved the policy to award diplomas to veterans, waived the second reading and adopted the resolution The district along with giving Phillips his diploma, tossed in the mortarboard and tassel

The diploma was presented to the elder Phillips at his birthday celebration with his wife, three children, several of his 10 grand children, and his newborn greatgrandchild on hand to watch

"It took me a while to get it, 59 years," said Phillips 'I never thought I'd ever get one It really was a surprise

"Now that I have one it gives me a little more pride and satis faction," he said

Norma, his wife of 53 years, couldn't believe what she had just witnessed

"It brought tears to my eyes," she said "It was really touching It's never too late to get a diploma "

His daughter, Lori McGuire of Garden City, believes veterans deserve to get their diplomas for serving their country

"Even though he didn't talk about it much I knew how important it was to him,' she said "He has more knowledge and wisdom than many people with college degrees Hesavery intelligent man He just lacked the diploma to say so

Phillips, despite not having his diploma, has always known the importance of getting an educa tion

Building Official Jim Penn said Vogras won't be easily replaced


'You don't find someone who has the background Deanna has when a question or call comes in she has the answers," said Penn 'There's going to be a big void "

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Foundation scholarship is tribute to Sept. 11 victim

The Canton Community Foundation has added five new scholarship opportunities for local residents this year. including one set up by the family of Canton native Meredith Whalen, who was killed when the World Trade Center collapsed in the Sept 11 terrorist attacks

The Meredith L Whalen Memorial Scholarship of \$500 will be awarded to a female student from Canton or Plymouth majoring in business at any college or university

"She was such an ambitious, success oriented person We're hoping to attract someone similar" for the scholarship, said Joan Noricks, foundation president

Whalen, 23, worked as a financial analyst for Fred Alger Management Co, on the 93rd Floor of Tower One in the trade center She was believed to be at her desk when the first hnacked plane hit the building

Noricks said the scholarship came about from a personal connection and the family's wish to make a positive statement in the



wake of the tragedy

In addition to the family's donation, one of Whalen's former employers contributed and Can ton Township added money col lected locally following the attacks Enough was raised so that the scholarship is now an endowment

"This scholarship will be here forever That's the legacy to Meredith," Noricks said

The four other new scholarships are from the Canton Historical Society, Boyer's Meat Processing, Regal Construction and Wade-Trim Associates

All four highlight the scholarship program's philosophy of awarding grants to non-traditional students or those in specific fields of study

For example, a \$500 scholarship from Regal Construction in Canton is designed for students studying construction management, in a skilled trade apprenticeship or other trade-related fields It is open to students enrolled at vocational/trade schools or other appropriate institutions

The Canton Historical Societv/Robert Boyer Scholarship is for students majoring in history related programs at Michigan

colleges and universities Noricks said someone studying art history or planning to be a history teacher would qualify

"The goal is to be true to the desire of the donor but make it wide enough to attract a good field of applicants," Noricks said

All told, 17 different scholarships and grants totaling \$22,600 will be awarded this spring The majority are available to students living in either Plymouth or Canton Yazakı North America is continuing its \$3,000, four-year renewable grant for students attending a Michigan school Grants are awarded each year to one male and one female high school

The deadline to apply for the scholarships is April 12

Applications are available from the foundation office, the Plymouth and Canton libraries. the Canton Chamber of Commerce office, guidance counselors' offices at Salem and Canton High Schools and from local parochial schools

Noricks said plans were underway to make the application form available on Canton's Web site. www.canton-mi.us

Feb 5 and Feb 8, and Tefend returned to work Feb 14, 2001

The arbitrator reviewed the videotapes and noted 16 separate incidents, most of them very brief and showing Tefend using both hands Although calling the incidents "suspect," Sugerman ruled the incidents "neither individually nor as a whole are incompatible with his objective medical findings and improving condition "

According to Sugerman, Tefend dıdn't claım he couldn't work or resist working, but "reported on pain he experienced "

"The videotapes were taken at a time after a steroid injection and only days before (Tefend) returned to work,' Sugerman wrote "The brief episodes of physical exertion did not establish (Tefend) had misrepresented his condition to (the doctor) "

That was Tefend's point all along

"There was nothing on the tape contrary to what the doctor said I should or should not do," Tefend said

Mann disagreed then, and he still disagrees

"We're disappointed," the supervisor said "If the situation came up again, we'd take the same action We're not going to pay salary and benefits for someone working a second job when they should be here serving the township'

Groth said "We're still hashing that over '



ROBERT JAMES BRADEN

Services for Robert Braden, 78, of Plymouth will be held March 1 at Plymouth First United Methodist Church with the Rev

Mr Braden was born June 17, 1923 in Bellefontaine, Ohio and died Feb 25 in Plymouth He lived in Michigan since the age of 12, with the exception of 12 years spent in Long Beach, Calif Mr Braden retired as a master barber in 1970 and embarked on 'a full-time career as a starting judge for harness races at several Michigan pari-mutual tracks, including Northville Downs, Hazel Park, Wolverine Raceways, Jackson and Saginaw and at county fairs in Ohio, Kentucky, and Indiana He retired in 1988 and was highly respected by drivers, stewards and management

Mr Braden served in the Navy for four years during WWII in the Pacific Theater as a Pharmacist's Mate, Second Class He was assigned largely to the island of Okinawa as part of a team attached to the Second Marine Division, special augmented Hospital Unit No 8 He later attended The University of Notre Dame on the GI Bill where he earned a business degree

Mr Braden was a member of the Plymouth First United Methodist Church, Plymouth Elks Lodge No 1780 and the Backus Masonic Lodge 55 He was a member of the United States Trotting Association and a Life Member of the Michigan Harness Horsemen's Association He and Nancy were married for 22 years

Survivors include wife, Nancy J of Plymouth, sons, Michael (Ellen) Braden of White Lake. 

Incoming political figures generally get a grace period, a honeymoon of sorts that allows them to get settled before they accomplish anything

For Plymouth Mayor Bill Graham, that period should be over

Even though his vote counts for no more than those of the other six city commissioners, it's time for Graham to leader the Plymouth City Commission on the road toward accomplishing the goals they set forth last month

At the Jan 7 goal-setting session, commissioners, city workers and residents decided on six priorities for the newly elected city commission

Infrastructure improvements in the city's streets, water and sewer program A complete review of the city char-

ter A public relations and image-build-

ing plan designed to communicate with citizens to improve interest in boards and committees, as well as improving the city's image locally and statewide

Ordinance "fixes," including enforcement of city ordinances and a review of fees and late fees

Building improvements

Improving public spaces, including a review of the recreation master plan, improving public areas such as Kellogg Park and Veterans Park, new welcome signs on the outskirts of the city and improvements in the lighting along north and south Main Street

Some of these seem like they'd be fairly easy to start, but so far not much has been done to advance them This commission has a huge leg up on the last one They didn't wait 18 months to have a goal session Still residents deserve to see more progress

We recommend beginning with the easlest one, in terms of what needs to be put those ideas into motion

done to get started A complete review of the city charter

This has been a hot-button topic since former Commissioner Sean FitzGerald brought it up more than two years ago Former Mayor Dave McDonald barely paid lip service to it, agreeing to form a special committee to get it done, then doing nothing

At the very least, Graham should restart the process of soliciting members to conduct the review, top to bottom, of the city's charter Set solid deadlines and stick to them, and finish the charter review before the year is out

The others will be a little tougher to flesh out City officials are already going ahead with the task of evaluating the city's infrastructure, and perhaps details about that could be made more public during city meetings

We don't necessarily think the city has a problem with its image, it certainly seems to attract visitors by the boatloads, and new businesses are coming to town all the time But the lack of residents attending city commission meetings is an indication they haven't connected with the government they've elected

That is, at least in part, the fault of the residents themselves, for not taking more of an interest On the other hand, that's why they put these seven people up on the dais Still, the city must do more to make its meetings more resident-friendly

City officials did the right thing in getting more people involved in the goal-setting process Department heads, city workers and residents were encouraged to attend and more importantly, to pitch in with ideas

Airport authority deal is the right direction

steamed A deal has been worked out between Gov John Engler and Wayne County Executive Ed McNamara to turn over control of the county's two airports -Detroit Metro and Willow Run - to an independent authority, pending legislative approval

The state Senate Wednesday approved a bill to implement the authority Now it goes to the House

The commission wasn't consulted They wouldn't have been happy if they were Under the proposal the county executive will appoint four of the seven members of the authority, the governor two and the commission just one

On Thursday, the commission voted 11 0 to oppose the new commission and some of their allies in the state Legislature have vowed to work on getting more board appointments for the commission

In other words, it's politics as usual for the county airports But in this case, politics has really made strange bedfellows The state's top Republican and the state's most powerful Democrat have agreed on a package A state Republican senator who has been leading the attack on McNamara for poor airport management is on board supporting the plan Meanwhile, the predominantly Democrat commission has been left out in the cold

We always have questions about government policies that develop behind closed doors We understand the intended imbalance in county government that weighs power in the county executive's favor, but we worry when there is so little communication between an executive and the commission, especially when they belong to the same party

The commissioners' complaints about the process are well taken They also have strong arguments about the accountability of elected officials as opposed to appointed officials And, they have a right to be angry at the county executive

Still, the proposal has much to recommend it As Sen Glenn Steil (R-Grand Rapids), the official GOP airport hound, said last week, "This is exactly what I have been asking for "

The proposal answers many of the complaints about no bid contracts, cronyism and lack of appropriate oversight The seven-member board would have a three-

Wayne County commissioners are member audit committee to review airport financial activities The authority would be required to use competitive bidding and adopt policies on conflicts of interest The authority would operate under the state's open meetings and sunshine laws And, most importantly, the authority keeps power in the county and short circuits a state takeover of the airports

In the face of criticism that they hadn't provided proper oversight on airport contracts, the county commission last year implemented new procedures on approving contracts McNamara said this was his major motivation for agreeing to an authority He said the commission's procedures are too restrictive and cumbersome He said if they had been in effect when bids were let on the new midfield terminal, the terminal wouldn't be completed and construction would have been over budget

From McNamara's view, the authority provides more flexibility than the county commission Gov Engler and Sen Steil see the authority providing more reliable oversight while also giving the state some stake in the airports' operations The airports will remain under Wayne County ownership

If the proposal wins two-thirds approval in the Legislature it will go into effect immediately, giving lameducks Engler and McNamara an opportunity to leave their mark on the new authority Some argue that perhaps it would be better for the bill to pass by a simple majority, in which case the authority would be appointed next year, after they leave office This is what the county commission is lobbying the legislature to do

While we have reservations about some aspects of the plan, such as giving the executive a majority of appointees, the problems at the airports need to be addressed now We believe the public scrutiny that the airports have been under recently will be a strong incentive for Engler and McNamara to make qualified choices

We regret the manner in which the authority plan was developed But we believe that this effort by two strongwilled politicians to work out an honest compromise is the right direction to go

We support an authority, the sooner the better

To help make the budget projections appear less negative, the most recent projections presented by the district removed any plans for employee raises during the next three years It seems unlikely that we can "retain the best staff," as our long-range plan intends, if we cannot make any plans for employee raises

When questioned about this at a recent board meeting, Superintendent Kathleen Booher indicated that this lack of planning for employee raises would give them "more reason to get the RESA millage passed this August "

This brings in to focus yet another reason for concern, the RESA millage increase being voted on this August

This 15 mil increase is being voted on, countywide, to provide our county school district with increased funding If this increase is passed, it will result in approximately \$6 million being raised in our district, with only about \$1 5 million being applied to our school district's budget

Pay out \$6 million to get \$1 5 milhon This seems to be a bad investment

Why is Dr Booher encouraging our community to vote for such a blatantly bad deal?

She may need this money to offset the 40 percent increase in central office administrative spending in the school district or she may just feel that the county needs to increase its educational revenues by nearly 80 percent!

Whatever the reason, not very good investment advice from our educational leadership

Another way that Dr Booher seems to be focused on raising revenue for our district is through schools of choice Under this model, Plymouth-Canton opens its schools to students from outside of our district

When students come to the district they bring per-pupil revenue with them, thereby increasing the revenue for the district

One would expect that this would also result in some incremental additions to teaching staff This is not the case under Dr Booher's model

When asked about this, the administration indicated that there are many classrooms in the district that do not have 25 students and that these students from other districts could just be squeezed in with no increase in teaching staff

Right of petition slowly being eroded away in state

Thank goodness lawmakers amended a bill to tighten down on recalls before reporting it out of committee and sending it off to the full House for a vote

Under the original wording, recalls would have been impossible

The new standards proposed in House Bill 5185, sponsored by Rep Charles LaSata, will already raise the

bar for recalls and

make it more difficult for petitioners to achieve their goals But the original version would have effectively ended any chance of mounting a successful recall against an elected

official here in Michigan LaSata does want to make it

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more difficult to recall local elected

officials He says recalls are being abused in some communities and school districts in the state He argues that they can have a disruptive, even "paralytic" effect on local government if they are used too frequently or for frivolous purposes

What he is proposing is a new standard for recall votes It would not apply to state lawmakers, he said, only local officials But when a recall vote is taken, recall would not only have to win a majority of votes at the polls to be successful, more people would have to vote for the official's removal than voted for that official in the election that put him or her into office in the first place

"Voters should not have a handful of people overruling their decisions, the decision they made in the last election about who their officials are going to be," LaSata said "And voters should not have to keep going back to the polls "

Now, that is a much better bill than the version originally proposed Initially, it also included new standards about what would be acceptable reasons to launch a recall It would have also said recalls could only be used if the action at issue could not be overturned by board decision or if there was no other political resource available

Currently, the reasons for recall must be stated

clearly on the petition form LaSata's bill would have required that the reasons be stated clearly "and truthfully"

Now that sounds like a reasonable enough standard, but there is nothing in law that requires candidates to be truthful when they are running for office in the first place We expect voters to sort out truth versus falsehood during the campaign

Getting petition wording approved under the clarity standard to start petition circulation is already difficult enough Adding truthfulness to the standard would have meant anyone who wanted to launch a recall would essentially have to prove the charges in court before petition circulation could begin That would make recalls more of a judicial process than a political process

What's left in the bill may also sound innocuous, that to be recalled there should be at least as many votes to oust the official as were initially cast to put him or her into office But keep in mind that single issue elections, which recalls typically are, tend to draw a smaller turn out than general elections with a lot of seats on the ballot, which is where most of these officials get elected to office

Last year, the state Supreme Court ruled against the right of referendum When state lawmakers passed the concealed weapons bill and tacked on money to make it an appropriation, they argued is was therefore immune from referendum

Justices accepted that In essence, they opened a huge loophole in the Constitution that will allow the legislature to keep any bill they pass from a referendum drive simply by tacking on a few dollars

And now lawmakers are seeking to restrict recalls

The right of Michigan residents to petition for the redress of grievances seems to be getting slowly eroded away, one small piece at a time

Apparently, the right to petition doesn't have an advocacy group in Lansing or any lobbyists in the Capitol to speak up on its behalf

But these are important rights That's why they were written into the Constitution in the first place Michigan residents will be at a serious disadvantage in controlling their government if the erosion continues

On Nov 25, 1999 AIDS was declared a national disaster in Kenya with over 2.5 million people infected with the disease, and six hundred Kenyans dying of AIDS-related complications every day

In the projectory of fighting HIV/AIDS, this day was an enormous turning point in bringing public awareness to a killer literally wiping out entire families, a generation at a time

Rolands Lenya, director of Nairobi's TAPWAK (The Association of People living With AIDS in Kenya), is standing on a slightly raised platform in the front of a lecture hall in Nairobi's National Library Association

Today he is addressing a room of predominantly 20-something Kenyan males, students who stumbled into his presentation while taking a break from studying Lenya, a tall, potbellied man of about 55, gently slides his fingers down the wide red satin ribbon around his neck and grasps the red metal ribbon hanging at the end of his belly

Squeezing the ribbon, Lenya tells the crowd that he was diagnosed as HIV positive in 1989 At the time of diagnosis, he admits he was in complete denial of his status He wasn't gay, didn't use drugs, and thought that every man strayed from his marriage at one time or anoth-

His message for the people gathered to hear him today is clear You should not be like me, but if you listen to what I say, you will escape a life shortened by AIDS

After finishing most of his speech, he called on two employees of his NGO TAPWAK to speak about their experiences as people living with HIV

First, Mary, a quiet, 30-year-old single mother addressed the people by explaining that her husband died of AIDS approximately three years ago, but not before he infected her, leaving her unsure of how long she has left to be with her young daughter

Mary explained to the people that with AIDS, all dreams for herself and a future have van-

Questions come more easily in **AIDS-ravaged Kenya**

ished She focuses on making it from day to day, savoring each moment with her child

Lawrence, a counselor at TAPWAK and a HIV positive male, was next to address the crowd When he was transferring jobs five years ago, an HIV test was required for the transition He was tested, however, without his knowledge and when the test came back positive, he was abruptly told the results without counseling or followup care

His message for the people gathered to hear him today is clear: You should not be like me, but if you listen to what I have to say, you will escape a life shortened by AIDS.

He chokes back tears as he explains to the people how important it is to have pre- and post-test counseling, and for everyone, no matter how "at risk" they think they are, to be tested He urges the people to realize that HIV/AIDS affects people of all ages and backgrounds

TAPWAK and other HIV/AIDS-service related organizations in Kenya have exploded with visitors, information seekers and most sadly, clients, since Kenya's President Moi declared AIDS a national disaster in 1999

The leading factors contributing to the spread of HIV in Kenya are the ignorance in rural areas of the methods of spreading HIV, wife inheritance still practiced by a handful of Kenyan tribes, a proliferating commercial sex business, unsterile instruments used in traditional circumcision activities, and many other activities

But today, as Lenya and I walk out of the meeting, I express how surprised, although happy, I was to see the eagerness and openness with which the crowd asked questions Lenya looks at me, squeezes my arm and smiles

"It's getting better, Sara," he said "We can talk about it now Even just five years ago it wasnt like this '

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

Senate OKs airport authority; commissioners angry

Kay Beard says she's as angry as a wet hen

Beard (D-Westland), vice chair of the Wayne County Commission, said she and the rest of the county commission were "blindsided" by the deal brokered by Gov John Engler and County Executive Ed McNamara to turn control of the county's airports over to an independent authority

"It was a cozy deal between McNamara and Engler, two lameducks doing something like that with the hopes of having great influence when they're gone," Beard said Monday

On Tuesday, Beard and her fellow commissioners, went as a - united group to lobby state legislators On Feb 21, the commission voted 11-0 against the plan

Despite the vociferous commission objections, the Michigan Senate approved 26-10 Senate Bill 690 to implement the airport authority Today McNamara was expected to meet in caucus with Michigan House members The House plans to hold hearings today and Tuesday and may vote as soon as March 7 A two-thirds vote in the House would make the authority effective immediately

Senators voted Tuesday to advance the proposal, , after making a series of amendments offered by Sen Loren Bennett (R-Canton) to tighten up operating rules for the airport An amendment to give a board appointment to the mayor of Detroit was defeated

Key vote

According to Aaron Keesler, aide to Senate Majority Leader Dan DeGrow (R-Port Huron), the key vote on immediate effect will likely have to wait until the bill comes back from the House

State lawmakers have been reviewing contracts and bidding procedures at the airport for the past 2-1/2 years A series of reviews by the state Auditor General's office failed to find "a smoking gun" indicating wrongdoing in the letting of contracts, but senators say a number of questionable practices were

Commissioner Lyn Bankes (R-Livonia) said she had heard that McNamara and Engler met at the World Club at Northwest Airlines new McNamara Terminal on Feb 15, "working out this deal that screws taxpayers "

"I was supportive of the idea, but I'm not supportive of the way this is being rammed through, Bankes said "I was supportive of an airport authority, but I thought we'd have time to study

The deal would create a sevenmember authority Four members would be appointed by the county executive, two by the governor and one by the county commission The airport would remain under Wayne County ownership, but all decisions on airport operations would be made by the authority An audit committee within the authority would oversee contracts

In statements made after the deal was announced Feb 20, McNamara said he was frustrated by the commission's new procedures on contracts which he said were restrictive New rules on contracts were implemented following a county audit and a state investigation into contracts made by McNamara and his appointees operating the airport McNamara said the new rules

don't allow enough flexibility in

awarding a contract to a higher bidder who can provide a better service

Local control

Commissioner John Sullivan (D-Canton) said he disagreed with McNamara's assessment Sullivan has been on the county's airport committee for three years

"We don't always go with the low bidder," he said "But the new board doesn't have to answer to anyone They could go with a higher bidder and not have to explain Is this really the best deal for the people?"

Sullivan said his main objection to the new authority is that it takes away local control, especially from the people who live near the airport Sullivan's district includes the airport and its surrounding communities

"I can't say whether an authority would run it better on not," he said "But who would the people be able to go through to complain when there's more noise or more truck traffic, when they have no jurisdiction over it?"

Beard called McNamara's complaints about contracts 'garbage" and said the procedures were implemented because "of things done by the administration with him at the top

"We're charged with oversight I've wanted auditors at the airport for years," she said

optimistic about stopping legislation creating the authority They said they will be primarily lobbying to prevent a two-thirds majority which would make the legislation effective immediately

If the authority is approved by less than two-thirds, it wouldn't take effect until next April, which would keep Engler and McNamara from making the appointments.

Keesler said the main reason The commissioners weren't for giving the majority of appointees to the executive is that that's how the deal was set up Significant changes could derail it, he said

"Besides, the Wayne County commissioners have not shown much of an interest in the airport up until now," Keesler said "One of the most questionable contracts was one let recently and the board went right ahead and approved it "


For most Democrats, the key is to retain control in Wayne County, regardless of whether it is with the county board or the executive


"We bonded for it We built it We added the new terminal We nurtured it, and now the state wants to take it over No way," said Ken Brock, aide to Sen Burton Leland (D-Detroit)







Thomas Wilkins applauds the Detroit Symphony Orchestra for having the foresight to recognize contributions of African Americans to classical music long before he came on board as resident conductor He believes that for more than 20 years the Classical Roots concerts have not only introduced audiences to composers and musicians of African American descent, but also revered them as role models for the next generation

On Saturday-Sunday, March 2-3, the tradition continues with a program featuring compositions ranging from Undine Smith Moore's Scenes in the Life of a Martyr to George Walker's Lyric for Strings Guest soloist is 16-year-old violinist Melissa White, winner of the Junior Division of the 2001 Texaco-Sphinx Competition for young black and Latino string players The finals take place at Orchestra Hall each February

Wilkins didn't hear a lot of music by African American composers while growing up Life will be different for his twin

daughters Nicole and Erica Wilkins plays all styles of music for the 9 year-olds because he wants them "to understand the merits and characteristics of music in any genre, to know what makes good music '

"The Classical Roots concerts demonstrate to young African Americans that this is some thing we participate in as profes sionals," said Wilkins who is buying a home in West Bloom field in March Wilkins currently is in his eighth season as resident conductor of The Florida Orchestra where he now lives

"It's not only an entertainment choice but a career option There's something about people doing things who look like you It goes a long way in the hearts and minds of young kids Adults, it reminds them that what was deemed a Western European tradition belongs to all of us '

I use as an example the code designed by the National Electronic Service Dealers Association


1 I will conduct my individual business in a manner to ensure the goodwill and confidence of the public whom I serve

Writers share practical, personal wisdom

he selection of books this month will teach us much about nature and gardening Timber Press publishes the first two Variegated Plants The Ency clopedia of Patterned Foliage and Japanese Maples Third Edition

Variegated Plants, Susan Conder, photographs by Andrew Lawson (\$24 95, soft), covers the gamut of plants that have more than one color in the leaves whether they are small or large

Conder introduces us to the various forms and colorings and points out the "painterly variegations" She also suggests ways to use the plants to take advantage of the remarkable foliage She tells how variegations work, how to site these plants, how to buy and to grow the great variety that nature offers Photos show ideal placement

Japanese Maples, JD Vertrees, revised and expanded by Peter Gregory (\$49 95), is the only book in English solely devoted to these plants

Vertrees was an entomologist, nurseryman and educator who collected rare and unusual cultivars of Acer palmatum At one time he had the largest collection of Japanese maples in the United States at his nursery in Oregon

We learn how plants are named, their history (long and interesting), the various forms and colors that are available and the special characteristics of Japanese maples







A It is important to teach your children how to organize their room You need order now and they need these skills for later on life so they will be able to function efficiently in their own home and place of employ-

DIANA KOENIG ment Maintaining clutter control in your child's room does not have to be an impossible task if you create a workable system Whether your children are preschool, school age, or teenagers, you can help them obtain and

maintain order Implement the following ideas and systems to achieve clutter control Containerize clothing, accessories, and toys by putting like

items together Use plastic or more decorative containers such as wicker, canvas, or wood If every item has a specific place it

Q My children's rooms are is more likely to return to its place Use lidded containers so you can stack them on top of each other

Store a few keepsakes in the bedroom and put the overflow in a container in a basement storage area This would include items such as trophies, artwork, and knickknacks

For younger children, rotate toys from the bedroom to another location or use the top of the closet Children can be overwhelmed and bored if they have too many toys to choose from As you periodically change the toys, it will feel like Christmas

Exchange off season clothing to another location so closets and drawers close easily

Limit the amount of 'little pieces' from toys and games Use zip-lock bags and small lidded containers to store small items such as Lego's, Barbie accessories, building blocks, etc

Make sure your child is able to make his bed by himself Use a comforter because it is easy to make and you do not have to worry about wrinkles from the sheet or blanket The bed should be away from the wall so the comforter can slide down the side with ease

Use under-bed storage con-

tainers for toys, stuffed animals, clothing items, shoes, and craft items Containers with rollers make it easier to access the contents

Use a hanging sweater or shoe shelf in the closet to store shoes, clothing, games and toys Younger children do not usually need as much hanging space

A bookshelf is a good storage place for books, however, it will also hold games, puzzles, and toys Use a small square basket on the shelf to hold small books, which tend to fall over on the shelf You can also use a bookshelf as a back-up dresser Place wicker or plastic baskets on the shelf to hold socks, pajamas, Tshirts, etc

Use laundry baskets, large plastic containers, or a wooden toy box for stuffed toys, trucks and larger items

Use another area other than the bedroom as a play area When our children were young, we bought a small area rug for our unfinished basement so they had another play area other than the bedroom This was a good place to roll cars and build with blocks

Donate or sell outgrown clothing and toys to avoid crammed closets, shelves, and drawers

Designate a basket or shelf in the closet for shoes An alternative for shoe storage is to store shoes in a hall closet, laundry room, or garage We use a shoe storage system in our garage to keep dirty shoes out of our bedrooms

Some children need to share a room because of limited bedroom space It is important that each child has his own space in the bedroom Our boys shared a room for many years and we divided areas in half Each son had one side of the closet and their own dresser drawers They were each responsible for their own area

It is important once you have helped your child organize his room, that you help him maintain order You need to check the room daily to make sure everything has returned to it's home

Publication helps manage fertilizer runoff to protect water quality

The late spring and early summer ushers in flowers, gar dens, manicured lawns and, all too often, over-fertilization

Nutrients from excess fertilizers run into storm drains that empty directly into the region's streams, rivers and lakes and degrade water quality

SEMCOG, the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments, offers Managing Fertiliz er to Protect our Water Resources, a publication to help local leaders wade through the regulatory confusion that often accompanies the topic and gives suggestions for solutions through education and regulation

"Every stream in southeast Michigan empties to a major waterway," said Chuck Hersey, SEMCOG environmental pro grams manager

my lawn in Northville, it can end up in the Rouge River and, ultimately, Lake Erie In that way, every home in southeast Michigan is on waterfront prop ertv

Upon reaching rivers and lakes nutrients from fertilizer cause excess weed growth, which depletes the oxygen sup ply for fish and aquatic insects and makes the water unusable for boating and swimming

The publication is an out growth of the revised Water Quality Management Plan for Southeast Michigan, which places greater emphasis on reducing pollution from storm water runoff from streets, yards, farmlands, driveways and parking lots

Water that was once absorbed into the ground — replenishing standards," Hersey said

"If I put too much fertilizer on groundwater and controlling flooding - now flows directly into rivers and streams, picking up dirt, oils and other contaminants along the way

Water meter can help in detecting a leak

Q Colleen asks How can I find a leak in my house? My water bill keeps going up Sometimes I can hear water dripping in the bathroom after the sink has been used, but then it stops

A If you are on a public water system, chances are you have a water meter somewhere on or near your property Besides telling you how much water you are using, it can help you detect leaks

Water meters look a little like a speedometer Subtract the first reading from the second to find out how many cubic feet of water you have used A cubic foot contains 7 5 gallons of water For example If the first reading is 006300 and the second – a week later - 1s 006400, your use for one week was 100 cubic feet or 750 gallons (100 cubic feet x 75 gallons per cubic foot = 750 gallons) That's an average of slightly more than 107 gallons per day In some communities all you need to do is read your water bill to discover this information

To use your water meter to

detect a hidden leak, turn off every plumbing fixture in your house for a couple of hours Don't forget the built-in ice-maker or the reverse-osmosis water filtration system They turn themselves on automatically Once everything is off, take a meter reading If the reading changes, a leak exists

If the leak is a plumbing pipe or fitting located in the attic or walls, chances are great that you would have seen water dripping from the ceiling or noticed damp spots on the walls or floor If, on the other hand, the pipes are in the crawlspace or basement, it might require a bit of investigative work to find the leak

It also is possible to have a leak between the water meter and the main shut-off valve where water enters your home To determine if the pipe between these two points is leaking, shut off the main-water supply valve at the house, and check to see if the meter continues to show water is being used If such is the case, it's time to call in a leak-detection company

ogy, they will be able to pinpoint the leak for repair They can also find an evasive leak in your home

Q Tim asks We have a 3-inch schedule 40 PVC drain from a bathroom that runs about 8 feet down through the basement When hot water is draining from the bath, there is a loud cracking sound generated in the drainpipe What can I do to the drainpipe to reduce the noise?

A The cracking noise is the result of expansion and contraction of the PVC pipe as it heats up and cools down - when hot water is run through it While there are many means to deal with this problem, we believe that the best solution is to replace the PVC with a section of no-hub cast iron Use no-hub couplings to connect the cast iron to the PVC You not only will be rid of your cracking noise, you also will hardly be able to hear water running through the new pipe

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


Readers say the darndest things

cases that inspire books complete with infrared imaging and other high technology gadgets Currently he is working with Lt Commander Brian P Hall of the US Coast Guard's Detroit Marine Safety Office in the ongoing protection of the Detroit riverfront and the Ambassador Bridge Such efforts are part of the Homeland Security River Watch of FBI All of our people are hand picked and we have counterparts all over the world with whom we net work who are the best that I know after spending more than 30 years in investigative fields " he said Kıdnappıngs around the world also are investigated

Center helps grieving families find new life, hope

When Sandy Prebenda's world came crashing down around her two years ago, there were times she wasn't sure how she'd cope

Her husband, David, lost his two-year battle with cancer in March 2000 At 35, he left behind a young family – Sandy, 3-year-old daughter Morgan and 19month-old son Ryan – with a lifetime to live and sud denly no husband or father with whom to live it

"I was challenged in ways I never dreamed about," Sandy remembers now "What really makes it overwhelming is you have two grieving children"

With her life crumbling and her children wondering what was happening, Prebenda, a Plymouth resident, looked for a shoulder to cry on — and found about 800 of them at the New Hope Center for Grief Support in Northville

New Hope, founded in January 2000 by executive director Cathy Clough, is a Christian based outreach center designed to help those grieving after the death of loved ones Unlike other support centers which focus on a variety of problems, New Hope is dedicated to helping people emotionally through the loss of a loved one

"We recognize there are all kinds of losses," said Clough, who conducted meetings in her Plymouth home for the first five months or so "We focus on loss by death It's quite different from other kinds of loss, not necessarily worse, just different We want to focus on those differences"

It's a subject near and dear to Clough's heart She lost her first husband 18 years ago and, two years later, began working closely with the terminally ill at a local hospice, developing the organization's first bereavement program

Fifteen years of experience have taught Clough a thing or two about suffering and how to ease it She makes sure to point out she's not a doctor, not a licensed therapist She's just someone who knows something about loss and wants to help — straight through to the end

"We realize you don't get through your grief in six to eight weeks," Clough said "We try to get people through the whole period "






felons, 'Timmons said "If you have them in there they tend to repeat "

Somebody has to do it

While Timmons' work history is in law enforcement, Paul Harris, chief investigator of field operations at Shadow Investigation, Inc in Livonia, had 13 years in the military before becoming a private investigator Most of his work involves fraudulent work man's compensation cases

His day often begins early in the morning waiting for the person he's investigating to leave home He hopes to catch him or her going to work or doing physical activity that disproves a disability About 20 percent of Harris' workload is looking into domestic cases

'We follow around a possible cheating husband or a wife and about 90 percent of the time we catch them." he said 'If the person thinks their husband or wife is cheating on them, most likely they're correct We let our clients base their opinions from the video tapes afterwards You have to have patience We basically handle anything that comes across our way "

Harris said he avoids confrontations at all costs, but that doesn t mean the people he's investigating feel the same way

"We've had people bust out our vehicle windows and try to steal the car tires while we were in there." he added

Roger Kehrier, owner of Pathfinder in Plymouth since 1994, was a Special Agent for the Department of Justice, Drug Enforcement Agency before he started his own business The average rate for private investigators is about \$40 an hour, plus mileage, he said

Most of Kehrier's clients are insurance companies wanting him to check claims, attorneys needing background information that involves interviewing neighbors, locating witnesses and serving subpoenas, and private citizens asking for a wide range of services, like investigating a spouse suspected of having an affair Some of his most satisfying cases involved identifying bars that had pirated closed-circuit boxing fights

A few times a year Kehrier pro vides a service called check mate which involves doing an investigation on someone who is

interested in getting involved with a man or woman, but wants to know about the person's lifestyle first

"It's not the most exciting work," Kehrier said "It's not Magnum, PI Most of it is kind of stick-to it-iveness, boring work waiting for something to happen Ninety percent of the time, what you're waiting to have happen doesn't occur Sometimes it's just better to be plain lucky

As far as danger goes, Kehrier relies on his instincts

"I'd like to think I'm street wise enough to recognize danger and not place myself in a position that I would get hurt," he said "It hasn't happened yet, knock wood

Richard Cray, owner of Cray Investigative Agency in Farmington Hills, handles a lot of fire investigations and corporate embezzlements Fire investiga tions involve getting calls all hours of the day and night, and his satisfaction comes from giving victims peace of mind about the cause

"I really don't have an average day, or a normal day," Cray said "It drives my wife crazy '

Some of his most exciting moments have been proving that people were stealing from their employers

Cray said he believes the average person has a glorified image of what a private investigator does that s filled with cloak-and dagger intrigue The truth is, much of his work is mundane

"They envision someone peek ing in windows That's not the case " he said "Most of the investigators I know conduct them selves very professionally and abide by all the laws of the state and if they don't the Michigan State Police will take their licens es, and once it's gone you don t get it back Private investigators are professional people and they try to do the best they can for the client "

Many people have a skewed idea of private investigators, because they think television shows where someone gets a case and solves it in 60 minutes is portraying the real thing, Kehrier said

The Western Lakes Activities Association basketball race was an ideal model of it this season How else can one explain a conference with two sixteam divisions that have five teams share one division title and three have a portion of the other?

If equality defines the WLAA in 2002, then the tournament championship game between Westland John Glenn and regular-season champ Plymouth Salem provided the perfect summary

Just when it seemed the Rocks would take control, the pivotal force in the game — for both sides — surged once again defense And Glenn had the best of it, forcing Salem into a 0-for-6 finish over the final 5 20 as the Rockets collected the conference tournament crown with a 50-43 victory at Northville HS

Salem heads into state district play with a 13-7 mark Glenn is 14-6 "We pride ourselves on defense," said Glenn coach Joel Lloyd "We gave up

only 43 points to a good ballclub "If we play good defense and block out, we've got a good chance"


So how big a factor was each team's defense? The biggest lead either side had was the final score, and that came on a Darnel Wilson layup at the buzzer

The Rockets' defensive objectives were evident from the start stop David Hoskins The 6-foot-4 Salem junior tried to work inside early, but when a pass did reach him, three defenders collapsed on him Hoskins still managed to score 16 points, 10 of those in the second quarter after going scoreless in the first

"The bulk of their points are from (Pat) Abraham and Hoskins," said Lloyd "(Hoskins) is so good on putbacks You can't shut him down, but if we contain him our chances are better"


He met with both his athletic director, Marc Hage, and principal, Rod Hosman, on Tuesday to report the infraction



Those Plymouth Canton Chiefs came out ready, willing, but not quite able to break Salem's stranglehold on the Western Lakes Activities Association's swim championship With seven of the meet's 12 events over with, Canton was still clinging to the top position

But by that time, coach Ed Weber had just about used up all of his top talents And if there was one element separating the two cross-campus rivals, it wasn't quality of talent, but depth

After Thursday's preliminaries, Weber knew that — barring some sort of catastrophe — the Chiefs' lead wouldn't be enough down the stretch "If we're within 50 points of them, that'd be great," he said prior to the 100-yard butterfly



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It's over: Spring Arbor upsets Madonna, 81-76

One step at a time Easy to recite, not always easy to do

Last Saturday, Madonna University's women's basketball team — the top seed in the Wolverine-Hoosier Athletic Conference — might have done just that Couple that with a Spring Arbor team that was determined not to lose, and one has a deadly combination

At least for Madonna University it was The Lady Crusaders started their WHAC semifinal, played at Madonna, shooting poorly while the Cougars were on fire The result was a 45-34 halftime deficit, something Madonna could never overcome in the second half in losing 81-76

The Crusaders conclude their best season in school history with a 21-9 record and as WHAC regular-season champs Spring Arbor took a 16-13 record into Tuesday's WHAC title game at Cornerstone

After converting just 9-of-32 first-half floor shots (28 1 percent), compared to Spring Arbor's 20-of-34 (58 8 percent), Madonna managed to close the gap (which reached 15 points midway through the second half) to three twice in the last 94 seconds

Each time, however, the Cougars' Portia Reilly had an answer After Nıkkı Blaszak's layup with 134 left made it 76-73, Reilly knocked down a three-

pointer 19 seconds later to make it a six-point game

With 48 remaining, Blaszak - who led all scorers with 26 points — hit 1-of 2 free throws, with Hayley Myers rebounding the miss and scoring to narrow the gap to 79-76 with 41 to go

They never got any closer, however Reilly's two free throws in the closing seconds sealed Madonna's fate

Reilly finished with 21 points as Spring Arbor hit 35-of-61 shots (57 4 percent), she also had four assists Shanna DuBose added 17 points, Michelle Robson had 14 and Megan Vore scored 12

Joining Blaszak (who also had a team-high eight rebounds, six of them offensive) in double figures in scoring were Mahogany Fletcher with 18 points, four assists and four steals and

Kathy Panganis with 14 points However, Panganis and Fletcher combined to make just 9-of-34 floor shots (26 5 percent), the rest of the Crusaders weren't much better, converting 25-of-76 (329 percent)

Madonna managed to make a game of it by outrebounding Spring Arbor, 47-36, and making 19-of-25 free throws to the Cougars' 7-of-11 But it wasn't enough to overcome that poor first half



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Crusaders seek strong start to season

It has a team, a schedule and a temporary place to play Now all Madonna University's baseball team needs is a field to practice on and a permanent home field

Coach Greg Haeger starts his sixth season at the helm of the Crusaders' baseball team with plenty of hope that the two-year ball of red tape that has been wrapped around his planned new home baseball diamond will get untangled before it starts choking his program

"We've met with the architects," Haeger said, "and the plans have been drawn up Right now it's in the hands of the Felician Sisters, (Livonia) Ladywood and Madonna We're fighting through the red tape "

Madonna will play its home games this season at Ford Field in Lavonia, a suitable collegiatelevel diamond and site of the summer Livonia Collegiate Baseball League But the Crusaders can't practice at Ford Field and last fall were forced to use a softball diamond at Rotary Park

'We still don't even have a field to practice on," Haeger said "There are still a lot of questions to be answered

"It's been difficult at times to keep the focus of the kids on playing ball Not having a playing field and other things can't detract from what you're trying to do. That goes for the coaching staff, too

"I know they're searching and trying But they haven't come up with any solutions — and the season starts in just a few days "

Madonna's home field for the last few years, Madonna Park, was located at the Bentley Center in Livonia The city would not renew the lease and the field was torn down to make room for a new community center

Plans are to build the new diamond on property where Madonna University and Ladywood HS are sited Construction must begin soon, however, for the field to be available for next season ---and to show recruits

The Crusaders traveled to Miami Wednesday for the spring portion of their schedule and conditioning, with the first game scheduled for Friday Madonna doesn't begin home play until mid-April

Haeger has 25 players on his roster He had about that num-

week, a key reason his team struggled to a 19-28 record overall, 11-13 in the Wolverine-Hoosier Athletic Conference

"We lost more man-years to injury last year than my previous four combined," he said "My shortstop (Neil Wildfong, from Canton) broke his thumb We lost four starters down south And no one really came back

"Then we came back from Florida and lost another player with a hamstring injury We were forced to play players out of position, asking them to do things some of them had never high school So it was pretty difficult

"It was almost like spring training again after all those injuries It was very frustrating to everybody involved

"Through all that, we still made it to our conference championship That was the fifth year in row, I think, we had at least been to the conference championship game "

The Crusaders have just four seniors this season, two position players and two pitchers, and Haeger looks to them for leadership

Joe Pruchnik (from Lutheran Westland, 380 batting average, three home runs, 15 runs batted in) will anchor the batting order and play first base while Wildfong (Plymouth Canton) returns to stabilize the infield at shortstop Wildfong was a key player for the Crusaders as a junior

At second base Haeger 1s looking to Redford Catholic Central product Mario D'Herin (Livonia, 279, one homer, 15 RBI), a junior whom he feels is a solid defensive player

Third base is a contest between incumbent Roy Rabe (Livonia Stevenson, 271, two homers, 20 RBI), a junior, and 6foot-6, 245-pound junior Sterling Mintzer, a transfer from Indiana University where he played football

"Whichever one hits best, plays," Haeger said





Under these circumstances, there need not MEISNER have been a dispute as to the location of the true boundary line


On the other hand, if there was an actual dispute concerning the true boundary line, and you can establish that you had actual, hostile, visible, open, exclusive and uninterrupted use of the disputed property for more than the 15-year statutory period, you may have a claim to ownership of the property under the doctrine of adverse possession

A recent decision of the Michigan Court of Appeals, although unpublished, upheld the right to adverse possession on similar facts

You should consult with a knowledgeable real estate lawyer regarding your position, assuming that you can not settle it with your neighbor

Even if you do settle, make sure that the proper legal documentation is prepared to confirm that there are no further problems in the future should either one of you wish to sell your property

If you sell houses you may think of yourself as the circus performer walk ing the tightrope If you don't take a carefully planned next step, you could fall

So says 16 year sales veteran Judy Addıs She believes that getting 'your time management under control" is the secret to staying out of the dark days that can come from a salesperson's periodic lanses in motivation

You need to get into the habit where every dav you're calling at least five past customers That's how you build business — working on referrals she said

But, meanwhile, government officials and economists might be telling you that current conditions aren't favorable How do you close out the rest of the world and stay focused on your time management plan? "I have a saying," Addis said "I refuse to participate in a recession I think the economy is as much a point of view as anything else There always are people who need or want to sell and there are always people looking to buy "Every day you have to do something that will assure you of new business," she said "That could be talking with past customers or even following up on any lead no matter how remote it seems "It could be someone who's thinking of putting a home on the market in time to come It could be someone who called on another hsting "Your business is about gathering information and using it," said Addis, adding that she continually builds a database in her laptop computer and urges others to build their own Stop sitting there moping," Addis said "Get yourself in motion and give yourself a pattern of behavior that will get you a positive result " Lloyd E Edwards probably couldn't agree more with Addis He's an associate broker with Countryside GMAC, Troy, and during his 30 years in real estate has been a consultant, trainer and company owner To someone whose motivation has ebbed, he'd say, "Get back to the basics Get back to what you did first when you came into the business

tion is in line - Insurance policies, the warm contacts in your sphere of influence, a list of 100 people you know and who should know you're in the real estate business

"If someone isn't motivated, it's because they don't have any business or haven't had any in a while They must go back and get their listings out and start contacting those customers again

"There are national association figures that 87 percent of home sellers don't list with the person who sold the house to them because they never heard from that person again," he said

Keith Becker, sales associate, Century 21 Row, Livonia, would agree that while "everything has peaks and valleys, you have to keep a positive attitude Do not think that if things are bad, they always will be'

But to keep a positive attitude, you obviously have to have one Or get one How do you do that?

Addıs, associate broker, Coldwell Banker Schweitzer, Clarkston, could do a seminar on the subject

"In this profession, if you get into a slump, you can really spiral down," she said

Her heading of time management means "you're spending a certain portion of your day working on current business, a certain portion working on getting new business and a certain portion keeping in touch with past clients and customers

"First thing in the morning, check to see where your transactions are," she said "Do you have mortgage approval? Has the title work been ordered?

"I'm a checklist freak and an alphabetical color-code freak," Addis said "I created a form to stay focused, a form for each transaction in the pipeline Monday morning, I set up everything for the week "

If Addis' work form appeals to you, forget about getting it from her She won't share it "No, I got it from a course that cost \$3,500 and I modified it for my needs" But she urges others to develop their own

"Be sure everything in the transac-

'Understand that prospecting is the key to success," Edwards said "Work

Edwards believes that some agents keep in touch for the first and possibly second year after the sale "But the average move 1s seven years, so by the time the seventh year rolls around, they've lost contact

Edwards also thinks that what might appear to be a lack of motivation actually could be that the person has chosen an inappropriate career that just ısn't working

"If they don't seem to have the right spirit, if it's that bad, I might counsel them out of the business You hope to get to them before they reach that point

"You have to go through the economic cycles," Edwards said "Eventually they turn around If mortgages are 18 percent instead of 6 percent, you just get more creative The activities are always the same, and successful people manage their activities, not so much their production

"Some people focus more on how much they make in dollars rather than how they got there," he said

"It would be like a hockey player focusing on how many goals he made rather than focusing on staying in shape so he can make the shots The more shots you can take, the better chance you have of scoring goals'


