Observer THE POLITICS OF EDUCATION **Educators support federal** goals but question details

Educators seem to agree that the intentions behind the No Child Left Behind Act were good The devil is in the details

"The intent of No Child Left Behind is good The problem with No Child Left Behind are the number of unfunded mandates that go with it and the expectations are high," said Greg Baracy, superintendent of Wayne-Westland Schools *We're all for higher expectations, but there is zero funding for No Child Left Behind"

Local educators also argue that NCLB and Michigan Yes! fail to take into account differences in student backgrounds

"There is no consideration in No Child Left Behind for the many different elements in society," Baracy said "No consideration of poverty levels and the experience of those in poverty, no consideration of help for the mobility factors, children who move around and come into our district two grade levels behind'

Bob Greene, director of evaluation for Troy Public Schools, said the federal government expects schools to do a number of things to reach the 100 percent proficiency goal in 12 years, but provides no additional funding to achieve that goal

He said the expectation that ESL (English as a second language) students and special education students can achieve at the same rate might not be possible

"From what we know about learning language and academic skills, it's unreasonable to believe that the same proportion of ESL students will be as proficient in the same time," Greene said "Give us a threeto four-year period to work with students to develop their literacy and academic skills After that, after working with them, then they take the test'

He said some special education students have academic deficits too

Bids flow for Bathey

Three development companies have submitted proposals to develop one of the last remaining large parcels of land in the city, a 16-acre tract which is owned by the city and commonly referred to as the Bathey property

"There are some interesting possibilities here," said City Manager Paul Sincock. "We've still got to weed through the proposals, and then set up a subcommittee to look at them and make a recommendation

"We'd like to get moving on this as quickly as possible, because the sooner we get paid for the property the sooner we get paid back for all our expenses related to it," he said

Sincock is referring to the 20year court battle with former owner Wendell Flynn of A&E Holdings, which over the period failed to pay \$3 million in back taxes, interest and penalties The city gained ownership of the property in January 2003

Among the companies submitting proposals for the location at 100 S Mill Street, between Main and Ann Arbor Trail, are

21 Century Holdings of Southfield for \$4 5 million According to the proposal, Mill Street Commons will consist of 180' homes sites, including a mix of multi-story ranch, townhomes and, live/work combination units, which will allow for homeowners to open small businesses—such as an attorney, architect or accounting office-on the street level, while having a residence above

Crosswinds Communities of Novi for \$2 7 million The offer calls for 184, two-bedroom rowhomes





Hill waives exam, heads to trial

Harry Hill, Jr waived the preliminary examination in 35th District Court on one count of embezzling funds from the Canton Community Junior Baseball/Softball Association Friday

But that didn't stop prosecutor Doug Baker from presenting a lot of his evidence

Hill, the longtime president of the association, is charged with stealing money in excess of \$20,000 During a bond hearing, Baker laid out a large chunk of his case trying to convince Judge John MacDonald to hike his bond to \$300,000 and force Hill to resign





"We have money disappearing and gambling going on," Baker said "It's our position he's using the money from the league to finance his gambling"

Those are charges Dillon called 'ridiculous and false

'He lost a job four years ago, and has since made \$300,000 a year selling office equipment," Dillon said "He has no need (to take the money) (Hill) has contributed more than double what he has taken back in reimbursements'

Salon opens with new 'Attitude'

Stylists hope customer service, family atmosphere lead to success

Canton High School senior Megan Ring decided that, when she finally got her hair cut, she wanted to do something good at the same time

And the folks at Attitudes by Design were only too happy to help

Ring, 17, was on hand at Attitudes' grand opening Feb 29, after delaying her haircut long enough to let it grow enough to qualify to be donated to Locks of Love, the program which donates hair for wigs for cancer patients losing their hair to chemotherapy

Ring's aunt had done a similar thing, and Ring thought it was a good idea, though she had to wait a bit

"I wanted to get it cut (earlier), but it was pretty long already," said Ring, who talked her friend, Sarala Sarah, into joining her 'So I let it grow longer, and figured I could donate it '

Trish Carrel, who owns Attitudes by Design with her husband, Ken, and her staff were ready when the teenagers came calling Carrel had opened the studio, located where Salon Trio used to be on Starkweather, back in November, and held the grand opening last weekend

Trish Carrel, who has been involved as a stylist since 1992, had been working at a Canton salon with a great group of stylists," who urged her to open her own business

Ken, a general contractor by profession, got behind the move 100 percent, and the couple found the old Salon Trio site, which had already been sold once and had become bogged down in financial problems

are hoping their focus on a family atmosphere will make their salon distinct


"We're trying to focus on above-ordinary satisfaction, Ken Carrel said "We want to give our customers what they want, not just a haircut

board the most about him "Greg is a fantastic guy," Kleven said 'He has a long history of the Y and a great grasp on the Strong Kids campaign The Y is in the midst of its \$75,000 'Strong Kids" fundraiser

Wolcott practices the gospel of fitness that he preaches, a longdistance runner, he has run in three marathons and plays basketball for fun

The 100,000-square-foot Livonia Family Y is located on the west side of Stark just north of I-96 and has been open for 54 years

Wolcott said he wants the two recreational facilities - the Y and the recreation center - to be partners rather than competitors He said that 250,000 people live within a five-mile radius of the Y

"Thats an awful lot of people for the Y to serve" Wolcott said

Basketball, soccer and swimming continue to be immensely popular, and with both the Livonia Community Recreation Center and the Livonia Family Y offering those programs, everyone wins, according to Wolcott

The Y is and always has been a collaborative organization and has a history of success, he said 'But we're proud that (the recreation center) is there

Wolcotts reason for playing basketball at the recreation center 1s because the YMCA no longer offers adult basketball leagues Likewise, when the recreation center does not offer a particular program or a program fills up, he said, people are sent to the Y

Wolcott said that the YMCA has partnered with the city in running swim programs at the Shelden Pool for years

Livonia Family YMCA board member Alıcıa Douglas saıd fund-raising and membership are most important to the YMCA Because the Y is nonprofit, fund-raising is especially important It is currently in the midst of its \$75,000 'Strong Kids fund-raising campaign

The Y's membership numbers stayed stable between last year and this year, according to Wolcott

Douglas said that she's not surprised that people are flock-

"People want to try something new and different The recreation center and the YMCA are sometimes on equal levels - but the Y is a nonprofit and tax dol lars continue to perpetuate the recreation center"

The Y has an open-door policy and opens its memberships to anyone, regardless of their ability to pay Scholarship programs are in place to help people become Y members or get involved in recreation programming Even though many people may view Livonia as a middle- to upper-middle-class suburb, the economy has still struck its people hard This means places like the Y become especially important, according to Douglas

'We need to embrace one another for the sake of the community," she said

Board member Steve King said Wolcott has brought a renewed energy to the Y He said marketing continues to be the key to the Y's success Filling certain recreational niches helps, too "Indoor tennis is its biggest selling point, and it's the only place around to play handball," King said

The Livonia Family YMCA has been losing members since before the recreation center opened, according to King But as with any business, competition is good

The opening of the recreation center forced the Y to actually focus on what the competition does and forced us to take a look at ourselves," King said





School district is the glue for **Plymouth-Canton communities**

Canton Supervisor Tom Yack describes the Plymouth-Canton school district and its accompanying three municipalities as "like a hand and glove

Plymouth City Manager Paul Sincock calls the school district "one of the vital key elements of the community

School district activist Debra Madonna calls the area's schools "the glue between the three communities'

If these comments are true, it would, in part, explain the continued growth in Canton and Plymouth townships, and the influx of younger families into Plymouth

We've had a tremendous turn in the neighborhoods," Sincock said "We have lots of schoolage kids"

Former school board member and activist Roland Thomas believes the quality of the school system indeed influences why people move to a certain community

"I think schools play an important role but are they number 1, 2 or $5^{2^{n}}$ Thomas questioned "I also think it depends on where you are in life People tend to simplify (the importance of a school system), but I think it's a more complex question

"Education is vitally important to any community We've got to be able to educate our young people because they are our future," Thomas continued

As Madonna said, "smarter kids make a better community'

The quality of the Plymouth-Canton district is believed to have an impact on the sales - or at least the prices - of homes in the three communities

"If your public school system is successful, communities thrive and continue to grow We live here because we work here and want our kids to attend school here," said Chuck Portelli, Plymouth-Canton Education Association president

"If you move into a subdivision that you like, if your public school system is not good will that subdivision be there," Portelli said "The same house in two different communities will be two different prices That's not based just on the school system, but the school system is definitely a piece of the pie that affects the quality of life in a community'

Yack wouldn't disagree "If the quality dropped, there would be a rupple effect Over time, you would find sellers whose homes would take longer to sell"

The value residents place on education is evident for Sincock. "Housing in the Plymouth community would not be selling what it's selling for'

While each of the three communities operate

differently, based on unique philosophies, the school district is the linchpin between the local governments, Madonna said

"It forces us to get along If you look at the history of our communities, we support the schools, but we ve had a problem passing millages I think that reflects a trust in our boards People are reluctant to trust them to monies to run our schools," she continued

The communities partner often with the school district, which goes a long way in making use of existing facilities and avoids redundant building

'The schools bring significant facilities to our communities,' Yack said, including playing fields and gymnasiums, all of which are well used

The city of Plymouth partners with the school district when it buys gas and diesel fuel, and the district buys road salt from the city

Residents ask Yack to get involved in urging the school board to move forward with the building of two new schools in Canton

"I choose to be involved by writing letters and talking directly to school board members," Yack said, as opposed to attending school board meetings

"Sometimes you don't get a lot of feedback and you are left to draw your own conclusions,' he said


On the other hand, Yack encourages those residents who believe additional schools are needed to equally get involved

"There are philosophical differences in the way the three communities work The political part is how decisions are made,' Madonna said 'I don't think the three governmental groups here have been sitting at the table enough when discussions about building new schools were held'

Madonna supports the refurbishment of Central Middle School But Yack questions keeping the building going 'It's like why buy new buses when we can just fix the old ones?'

Thinking globally, school board puts children first

While Board of Education members have many functions, most agree whatever decisions are made by the governing body of the school district have to be made with the best interests of students in mind

"The role of school board members is to think globally, know the community well, and do what's best for all kids," said Elizabeth Givens, an eight-year board of education member "That's the balancing act

"There will always be special interests and special needs groups," she said, "but you have to balance the needs of one child against the needs of another in what's best for the whole'

However, that sometimes is easier said than done, because there are a lot of opinions, mainly from parents in a school district that has 17,000 students

"We are the bridge between the district and the community," said board president Judy Mardigian "We are part of the voice of the community That's why they elected us, for the oversight and to communicate We're a check and balance"

Mark Slavens, in his fifth year on the board, considers it his responsibility to improve student achievement, allowing students to be prepared for higher education, or the work force, when they graduate from high school

"I see myself as a member of a group of seven, which helps set policy, with the main objective of helping to improve student academic performance," he said "Students today have to compete globally, and we need to give them the proper skills to compete globally"

However, with school districts in Michigan facing funding cutbacks from the state, trying to compete globally 1s almost a monumental task

"If you look at our student test results and our (reduced) funding compared to other districts. you might be tempted to say money doesn't matter," said Mardigian "But, the other side is what more could be done to



The No Child Left Behind Act was passed by Congress with bipartisan support in late 2001 and signed into law Jan 8, 2002, by President George W Bush The act is an extension and expansion of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, first enacted in 1965 as part of President Lyndon Johnson's "War on Poverty" with the intention of improving education for children living in poverty

The goal of the NCLB programs is to have 100 percent of all students proficient in reading and mathematics by 2013-14 Proficiency is to be defined by each state Every school is expected to improve each year and states are required to test students to measure adequate yearly progress

While all schools are required to make AYP, only Title I schools — those schools which receive federal funding because they have a significant number of low-income students - are subject to a series of remedies over several years allowing students to leave schools that fail to meet AYP and requiring staff and administrative changes at failing schools

NCLB also includes a requirement that Title I school teachers meet the criteria for * being "highly qualified," which means that elementary schools demonstrate a knowledge of teaching math and reading and high school teachers demonstrate a knowledge of their subject NCLB has a Reading First program which applies Title I money for classroom reading instruction for grades K-

States are required to test at various grade levels to chart achievement growth The states select their own tests Michigan is using the Michigan Education Assessment Program tests, which have been. in place since 1970 Beginning in 2005, schools must test all children in grades 3-8 annually in math and reading In 2007, science testing will be required

To comply with NCLB, Michigan has an Education Yes! program which includes the* MEAP and an annual report card for all schools The first report card was released to the public last month Schools are given a letter grade A, B, C, D-Alert and NG The grades consider MEAP scores, AYP and 11 school performance standards which are self-evaluated by the schools

Critics of NCLB argue that the federal government hasn't supplied enough funding to pay for the extra testing requirements or to carry out the remedies mandated for failing schools

Mardigian suggests parity in the foundation grant with neighboring school districts could help in providing more programs for students, such as foreign languages in the elementary grades, reading recovery programs, enhanced music programs in the middle schools and additional counselors

While Givens believes Plymouth-Canton has been 'severely held back in what we can do because of the cuts in funding," she believes the lack of money has created a positive

Givens, whose parents were both school administrators, has learned a lot about how boards and administration should interact

"If I have issues, I have to make sure the top administrator (superintendent) knows those issues," she said "We have to look at finance and curriculum from a broader perspective, and if we have issues make sure the superintendent knows, and then wait for the process to take care of the

funding from the state," said Slavens "While we were financially sound at the time, I was concerned about future funding'

However, Mardigian said board members quickly find out that being a one-issue board member doesn't work

"You can champion one issue, but once you get elected you find there are a lot more issues,' she said "You soon find out you sign up for a bigger-picture view'

"In schools that have a higher proportion of special education students, that's going to be a problem," Greene said What bothers me is it presumes that we have not been doing all we can do for special education and ESL students We're willing to do as much as we can "

While some states have complained about the federal government intruding m education issues, many local educators argue that other states are not testing as ngorously as Michigan, which puts Michigan at a disadvantage

"I'm a believer in the use of MEAP to do a check on whether our curriculum is aligned to Michigan's curriculum overall," said Sam Barresi, Wayne-Westland's assistant superintendent for instruction "But the difference with our state is that other states are only giving a basic skills test MEAP is a higher level of thinking You can't compare

Barresi said it was like comparing a luxury car with a subcompact

Jay Young, director of communication for Livonia Public Schools, said the schools use multiple measures in evaluating a student's progress rather than one test

"That's a more accurate and better assessment of students," he said

Kris Gekiere, Farmington Schools administrator for school improvement, testing and accreditation, said the MEAP holds Michigan students to a higher standard

Gekiere was critical of the state's report card system

"There needs to be a rethinking of the

formula," she said "Something is wrong when you have so many failing schools Many school districts have complained that the data used for evaluation, some of

it going back to 1995, was incorrect Jeremy Hughes, chief academic officer

for the Michigan Department of Education, presented an assessment of the first report card to the State Board of Education Feb 10 and agreed that a single database was needed to replace the four databases used for the report card

What we found was sometimes a particular piece of information in one database didn't match another," Hughes said in an interview with the Observer හ Eccentric

He said schools were given an opportunity to look at their reports and make adjustments, but not everyone had made corrections by the time the grades had to be released

Hughes said the state understands the complaints about including ESL and special education students in the general student body But, he said, the federal NCLB puts a cap on special education students who can take the alternate MI-Access test at 1 percent of the district student population Hughes estimates that the special education population is about 2 5 percent

School districts have also complained that high-achieving schools are at a disadvantage The state requires that 95 percent of students take the MEAP At many high-achieving high schools, students opt out of the MEAP

"Higher-ability students, collegebound, are more interested in taking advanced placement tests than the MEAP, which they don't need," Hughes said

Several districts, including Plymouth-

Canton, Farmington, Bloomfield Hills and Birmingham, had high schools that received an NG for this reason

Hughes said there is talk at the state level of making participation in the **MEAP** mandatory

He said some districts already require that students take, though not pass, the MEAP to graduate

Another complaint from high-achieving districts is that they find it difficult to continuously improve from a high level

"It's like running a mile,' Hughes said "You get it down and it's hard to lop off the extra second It's hard to go from 90 to 91 and easy to shp to 89 High-achieving schools are asking for some recognition that they are at a higher level"

Hughes said these problems are being seriously considered in preparation of the next report cards


"We are dealing with over 100 schools that have submitted evidence that there is something wrong in the report card and we're working with them about developing a new report card,' Hughes said

Wayne-Westland's Baracy said schools can't solve all the problems that prevent students from reaching proficiency

"There are too many variables to treat everyone the same way," he said 'The problem is we have a diverse group of children and parents and resources aren't there When kids leave here they have no parental support Too many children don't know their colors, the alphabet, they've never been read to When they come to the library and are asked to pick their favorite book, they can't because they never had a book at home"

Baracy said schools are ready to stand up and do what they can with the resources they have



But there are some reasons to think both guesses could be wrong

The one thing that is certain is that each state can expect to see a lot of George W Bush and John F Kerry With this year's primary contest over, earlier than ever before, Americans will have eight months to get to know both men

And it is a cinch that both of them will spend more time in our two states than in New York, California and Texas put together That's because we live on the front lines of an America seen as closely divided between the red and the blue'

Those are the colors TV uses on election night to show how states voted -Democratic blue and Republican red Four years ago, the nation was divided so closely that had even the smallest red state switched to blue, Al Gore would have won Yet most states are not real

John F Kennedy and Richard Nixon were fighting their cliffhanger campaign in 1960 both campaigned in nearly every state of the union This year, the candidates will make a real effort in half the states maybe as few as 15 Most of the Rocky Mountain west and most or all the South are hopeless for Kerry, and he knows it Bush can forget about New York, New England and California. displayed four years ago

Which leaves the Midwest Last time, both parties fought hard for Michigan til the end but Democrats surprised even themselves by winning by a comfortable 217,000 United Auto Workers union members had election day off, a welloiled and efficient machine got black workers in Detroit to the polls, and Gov John Engler failed to deliver for George W, one reason he wasnt even considered for a cabinet post

Ohio was another story With a week to go, Gore essentially conceded defeat and pulled all his TV advertising, sending the money to other states During the campaign, he never visited Toledo Not surprisingly, Bush won

But he didn t win by very much, just 4 percent -2,351,309 to 2,186,190 Democrats later grumbled that a real effort might have turned the tide

That's doubtful — but there is reason to think that Bushs stock has fallen in the Buckeye State Manufacturing has been hard hit by the recession, recovery has been slower than expected and Ohio unions and Democrats are energized Take note Twice as many Democrats voted in last Tuesday's primary than voted the same day in New York though the Empire State has almost twice Ohios popula

Michigan's unemployment figures are even higher -- but that is not unusual, after years of the boom-and-bust auto economy But while President Bush isn't especially popular here, the Democrats are in some disarray Detroit's "boy mayor," Kwame Kılpatrıck, has nowhere near the get out the vote ability Dennis Archer and his brilliant and ruthless heutenant, Freeman Hendrix,

Worse, the party has not one but two state chairmen, an embarrassment that resulted when the governor, as is traditional, wanted to name her choice - Butch Hollowell - and the unions refused to give up their man, Mark Brewer

Brewer and Hollowell have a simple relationship They loathe each other, and each wishes the other wasn t there That led to a mess in the state's Democratic caucuses last month, and could spell trouble in November It would be a poor idea for either party to take either state for granted

The issue that comes up time and again is funding Educators complain that the education act imposes several new and expensive "mandates" without providing the promised funding

Those expenses include yearly testing of students in grades 3 through 8 beginning next year and implementation of a series of remedies to improve schools that fail to meet adequate yearly progress

The administration counters that federal funding for education is at an all-time high, but concedes that funding for NCLB is not at the level authorized Of course, at a time when the government has a record deficit and is fighting a war, funding will continue to be a problem

Educators also argue about rules they find inflexible and counterproductive

While administrators support the law's goal of promoting the progress of all children, they argue that the law creates an unfair burden on some schools that have a large population of immigrant children or students with special needs These students are included in the general school population, which makes it harder for those schools to meet adequate yearly progress They argue that those students need to be tested and helped separately

Educators also complain about Michigan's Education Yes¹ compliance program They argue that the requirement for AYP puts highachieving schools at a disadvantage because it's difficult to keep moving forward as required when they're already at the top These districts are also at a disadvantage at the high school level because so many of their students opt out

of taking the voluntary MEAP test Education Yes' requires that 95 percent of students in a school take the test to reach AYP

Education Secretary Rod Paige recently got into hot water for "joking" that the National Education Association was a "terrorist organization" He was immediately called to task and issued an apology, while reiterating his objections to NEA lobbying against various aspects of NCLB

Paige, like many conservatives, also tried to drive a wedge between teachers and the nation's largest teachers union in suggesting that the union doesn't speak for teachers

Parge's use of the inflammatory word "terrorist" at a time when we are fighting a war against terrorism seems too calculated to be an "innocent joke" But what seems clear is that criticism of NCLB is not confined to the NEA State politicians of both parties, school board members, superintendents, principals and education specialists are also concerned about the details

Some have suggested that Paige should resign

A better idea is that he should listen to the complaints and find ways to administer the law so that it can achieve the laudable goals that have been set

It would be better if he were an advocate for more funding, an advocate for having Congress reassess some aspects of the law, an advocate for working with educational professionals, unions and administrators, to make good ideas work

Friends come together to raise funds for former musician who has ALS

Heidi Hepler hasn't forgotten her musician friends back in Michigan even though she and husband Michele Ramo left Livonia for the bright lights of New York City five years ago

When the husband and wife azz duo heard about a March 11 benefit at Herman's Old Town Grill in Plymouth for longtime friend Robin Posler, they decided to put on a May concert in Queens called "A Song for Robin"

Robin Posler, a songwriter and musician, is in the final stages of ALS, Lou Gehrig's Disease Her husband, Clay, is hoping his old friends from Livonia's Franklin High School and the Wayne Westland area where he grew up will come out for the Plymouth benefit to help Robin

The concert features music by Shirley Franklin and Delta Drive, Rattlebox, Blues Owls, and Terraplanes 7 p m to midnight Thursday, March 11, at Herman's Old Town Grill on Liberty in Plymouth

Clay will be sitting in with several of the bands while a nurse cares for Robin at their Dearborn home ALS is a neurodegenerative disease that kills nerve cells and pathways in the brain and spinal cord Patients like Robin in the later stages of the disease are totally paralyzed due to loss of muscle control

"We thought if there's any way we can help we would," said Hepler "Clay has been caring for her day and night and 1sn't able to work We love them so much and wanted to help them out with their bills and to try to ease some of the stress that comes with that"

Dave Pascowski feels the same way He came up with the idea for the Plymouth concert which he and his wife Shirley are coordinating Pascowski was best man at the wedding of Clay and Robin Posler 23 years ago

"When I see my friend crying and his wife can't speak without a computer, can't close her mouth, a machine runs con-

stantly to remove saliva so she doesn't choke, I knew I had to do something," said Dave Pascowski

Musician friends like Hepler, Ramo, and Dave and Shirley Pascowski are keeping Robin and Clay Posler going through this difficult time Robin was diagnosed in July 2001 with a very progressive type of ALS Clay is her primary caregiver He says when he sits down to pay bills it's like playing cat and mouse with the calendar He had to quit work more than a year ago to care for Robin 24hours a day, 7-days a week

"Hospice is involved Every day is like a borrowed day," said Clay Posler who's better known in the music community for playing harmonica, saxophone and bottle neck slide guitar as Clay St James 'We've been married 23 years She's my friend It's been fantastic Shes my fishing buddy We were either playing music or fishing

'She has an incredible sense of humor She's mentioned to me that what she misses most is conversation and food She spoke several languages'

Robin, 43, can no longer talk or swallow but if Clay has his way her voice will never be silenced He plans to market some of her musical recordings for ALS under the title Angel Without a Voice"

'When you think you have a little bit of a rough day, just think what Robin's going through," said Hepler 'The physical suffering of this disease is horrendous It takes a lot of courage to withstand it on his and her end They've been an inspiration to many people "





A personal trainer helps some get in good shape

Do I need a personal trainer² Abbey Werder, age 53, asked herself this question when her exercise workouts seemed to have little impact on her weight-loss efforts

"I work out about five times a week and I play golf often when the weather is good,' the Birmingham wife and mother of four said 'But I still haven't been able to shed the few pounds that would make me feel more comfortable

She decided that a trainer was the way to go 'I needed a tune-up, more variety in my exercise routine and a more effective program, Werder said "And I needed help to accomplish my goals" Enter Matthew Mikkola of Beverly Hills Club in Beverly Hills

Mikkola, who is certified both as a massage therapist and through the International Fitness Professionals Association as a personal trainer, set Werder up with a new program after first assessing her health and fitness levels In addition, he learned that this client wanted to lose weight

'Werder had become comfortable with her exercise routine, which hadn't changed in years, Mikkola said 'She was stuck on a plateau because her body had become used to this routine and her metabolism had adjusted to it. This was one of the reasons why she wasn't losing weight

Under Mikkola's training, Werder's exercise intensity was increased and more variety — other exercises — was added This gave her metabolism a boost and she began to get more positive results

According to Mikkola, the assessment process and listening to the individual's personal goals — in this case, weight loss — are the necessary first steps to a successful relationship with a chent And, he added, you must be sensitive to their needs to gain their trust

"A woman in her 50s usually isn't interested in building massive muscles or running marathons, like some other clients,' Mikkola said 'This is why I wouldn't design a program for someone in this age group that is too intense with such strenuous activities as an excessive number of pushups, sit-ups or lunges

Instead, Mikkola chose "functional training' – exercises that help the client better perform everyday activities, such as climbing stairs and lifting heavy objects 'The main goal is fitness and keeping my clients motivated," he said

Joe Stachura, wellness coordinator for the Livonia Family YMCA, said that a good trainer provides clients with a positive experience so that they stay motivated

'You have to go slow and help the client build up to optimum exercise success that will help them stay fit for life, he said Stachura added that if you have the client go too fast, they can not only hurt themselves, but acquire a dislike for exercise

According to Stachura, there is no one exercise program that works for everyone 'This is why a personal trainer is so important He or she can design a personalized workout, based on such details as age and fitness level, that can help the client gradually increase performance ' And, he stressed, variety must be built into the workout "Offering a variety of exercises helps eliminate boredom and create lifelong participation in fitness activities," he said John Bonner, general manager of Peter Nielsen's Personal Training Club in West Bloomfield and Nielsen's Town Center Health Club in Southfield, said that once you decide to

work with a trainer, it's important to select one who you feel comfortable with and who makes you want to come back

'You don't want a trainer who will provide you with a cookie cutter' program," Bonner said "You want someone who will tailor a program to your needs'

Bonner, who has a bachelor of science degree in health and fitness from Central Michigan University and a master's degree in exercise science from Oakland University, as well as numerous professional fitness certificates, lists the following considerations when selecting a trainer

■ Does the trainer have a professional certification? At the very least, a personal trainer should be certified by a recognized professional organization, such as American College of Medicine, National Strength and Conditioning Association, American Council on Exercise or International Sports Sciences Association A certificate indicates that the individual has passed a test reflecting basic knowledge of personal training

■ Is the trainer CPR-certified? You want a



Does the trainer have references? Other clients are the best sources to determine a trainer's abilities

Does the trainer encourage your input? Is the trainer a good listener? You should be instrumental in the process of mapping out your training program Your needs, concerns and goals are important to success

■ Do your personalities fit? You are going to work closely with this person Make sure you have found a trainer who is best suited to work with you, and someone you can work with You should have confidence in and be comfortable with your trainer

Don't eliminate all carbs from your diet

hat s going on with the low-carb craze? Is this just another diet fad, or do carbohydrates really sabotage your efforts to maintain a healthy weight?

After decades of recommendations to eat low-fat foods, the fat content in Americas diet has declined over the past 10 years However, over that same time period the number of overweight and obese people has doubled!

How did we get so fat on a low fat approach to our diets? The answer is car bohydrates

As it turns out, the most common sources of carbohydrates are baked goods (cookies, bagels, bread, crackers, chips, pizza and sandwich buns) and common foodstuffs including potatoes and white rice These are loaded with simple carbohydrates which our bodies rapidly convert to sugar The sugar is then absorbed into

the blood stream and contributes to our fat stores

So it s no surprise that the cornerstone of the popular Atkins and South Beach diets is to limit or eliminate carbo-

However, not all carbohydrates are bad The carbohydrates in lowstarch vegetables and

fruits (cucumbers, celerv strawberries grapes, oranges, apples, etc) pack a modest amount of carbohydrates with soluble and insoluble fiber both of which are very good for you So do whole-grain breads, beans, pasta and cereal, brown rice and sweet potatoes In fact, there is no scientific evidence that

eating fresh fruits and vegetables (excluding corn and potatoes) and whole-grain products make you fat In fact, just the opposite is true! They are quite healthy for you

So, a reasonable step to self-directed weight loss is to limit or eliminate simple carbohydrates that really are just sources of sugar in disguise Replace these with fresh fruits and vegetables, beans and whole grains and you will see a gradual loss in weight

And remember, at your next visit to a restaurant, ask for extra vegetables in place of the white potatoes or rice Happy dining!

Overcoming nutritional challenges of elderly

Good nutrition is a key factor in warding off chronic illness and maintaining a high quality of life as we age As we get older, however, getting good nutrition can be difficult

'Several factors can affect a person's ability to eat the amount and variety of food the experts recommend," said Chris Warburton, president of the Right at Home in Troy The organization offers in-home supportive care to seniors and other adults to help them continue living independent-

'Difficulty with cooking tasks, such as standing for long periods, lack of transportation to the grocery store and a lack of meal planning are some of the problems we know seniors face


To overcome the special nutritional challenges of the elderly, Right at Home recommends the following tips, based on information from the U S Food and Drug Administration, to help seniors maintain a healthy diet

The act of cooking itself may present a problem for seniors who find it difficult to manage utensils, heavy pots or standing for long periods Seniors can use a microwave oven to cook pre-made and frozen meals, take part in group meal programs through a local senior center or enlist the help of a family member, friend or in-home supportive care company to prepare easy, healthful meals

Some supermarkets deliver groceries to your door, while local volunteer groups may have drivers assist you


Sometimes aging leads to difficulty in chewing or digesting food Seniors with these problems should substitute other foods in the same food group to be sure they are still getting those nutrients For example, juices and soft, canned foods can take the place of fresh fruit and raw vegetables



This diagnosis is one of exclusion That means that when your doctor has exhausted all other reasonable explanations for your fatigue he turns to chronic fatigue syndrome. This diagnosis has other characteristics such as recurrent sore throat prolonged flare of fatigue after attempted exercise, fitful sleep muscle and joint aches, problems of memory, and presence of depression Likely anyone with prolonged fatigue will have these problems, particularly depression

Treatment of chronic fatigue syndrome remains a work in progress Therapy with stimulants, anti-anxiety or antidepressant drugs has not proved effective. What works best is to encourage exercise and activity to tolerance not to the extent to bring on a flare but to a point where you gain stamina and endurance in a slow and hopefully steady manner



Here's the inside scoop on homeowner's insurance

If home is where the heart is, then you undoubtedly want that heart to be protected by insurance

That's where homeowner's insurance comes in It provides financial protection against disasters, insuring the home and what's in it A basic home policy will cover the repair or rebuilding of your home if it's damaged by fire, smoke, frozen pipes, ice and snow (Damage caused by flood requires a separate policy) To determine the cost of rebuilding your home, factor in the style of the house, number of rooms, square footage, type of roof and type of exterior wall construction

DISASTER PROTECTION

In the event of a theft, fire, hurricane or other disaster, possessions like furniture, clothing and other personal items will also be covered Expensive items like jewelry are covered, but only up to \$1,000 to \$2,000 (A special policy, called a floater, can cover their full value)


To figure out how much coverage you need, make a detailed list of everything you own and its cost Your belongings can be insured for their cash value or their replacement cost A cash value policy pays the cost to replace your belongings, minus depreciation A replacement cost policy reimburses you for the cost to replace the item (which is usually about 10 percent more than the actual cash value)

LAWSUIT COVERAGE

Homeowners' policies also cover lawsuits for bodily injury you or family members cause to other people or damage caused by pets If you are brought to court, the policy covers your legal and court fees Most policies provide a minimum of \$100,000 worth of hability insurance

Policies also pay for living expenses if you are living away from home temporarily while your home is being rebuilt after a fire, storm or other insured disaster Coverage varies from company to company

Mortgage lenders require that you purchase a minimum amount of homeowners insurance, but ask your insurance agent if your policy has enough coverage You can get insurance through your local insurance agent or insurance companies, or via the phone, mail or online Consult your state insurance department, the yellow pages, family or friends for recommendations or further information

Anne Fracassa

Auto columnist Anne Fracassa is ill So her column this week is written by Dave Menard, an Avanti NewsFeatures auto critic from Florida

If you're looking for a sport utility vehicle, ultimately the one you buy should be predicated on what you're going to need from it.

The smaller SUVs are great if you re looking for a carlike ride with some extra cargo room for groceries and kids, and decent gas mileage – a little sexier version of a minivan, perhaps On the other hand, if you need lots of space, a powerful engine for towing a boat or trailer, or you do some off-roading, the larger SUVs may be what you need And luxury SUVs are another category altogether

For the past few years, DaimlerChrysler has tried to straddle the middle with its Dodge Durango model Larger than the small SUV's like the Jeeps and the Toyota RAV4, but smaller than the mammoth Ford Expedition, Lincoln Navigator and Toyota Land Cruiser, the Durango attempted to give you the advantages of each size in one package, like cargo room and towing power Unfortunately, with its truck-like ride, and mediocre gas

mileage, some of the disadvantages of each came along for the nde, too For 2004, DaimlerChrysler has given the Durango a

ror 2004, DannerChryster has given the Durango a makeover, inching it closer to the larger classes of SUVs and using its Ram pickups as inspiration This year's model is seven inches longer, two inches wider and more than three inches taller than previous Durangos The engines are more powerful, with a new 5 7-liter HEMI Magnum V8 (345 hp) among the three offerings More power, more room, better seating options – all improvements, but the Durango is now firmly in the full-size (but not behemoth luxury) SUV camp

As noted above, the new Durango is longer, wider and taller than it was for the last few years It's now more than 16 – feet long, more than six ft wide, and more than six ft tall The optional running boards help, but with the standard 17" wheels, the vertically-challenged may

have some trouble getting in Once inside, though, you ll notice plenty of head, leg and shoulder room The optional leather-trimmed bucket seats are comfortable and provide good support There are multiple storage areas, including a new "fast food bin," to keep your lunch from spilling all over the place while you drive (you don't really eat-and-drive, do you?)

The Durango SLT comes with air conditioning (front and rear), remote keyless entry, power seats, power windows and locks, tilt steering column, and cruise control An AM/FM/CD player is standard, you can upgrade to an eight speaker, 288 watt, six-disc system that also plays MP3s as part of a package that includes an overhead console, cargo net, garage door opener, security system, and cast aluminum wheels Other options include the leather-trimmed seats, power sunroof, off-road tires and a 384 watt amplifier for the sound system

The new Durango comes with a second row 40/20/40 seat and a third row bench seat A reclining 40/20/40 second row seat is an option With the second and third row seats folded, you get 101 cu ft. of cargo room

One of the areas of improvement over previous Durangos is in the ride and handling Even though the new Durango is bigger, it's also more solid and handles better The ride still won't be confused with a luxury car, but for a vehicle of its type and size, it's not bad at all An all-new and torsionally stiff fully-hydroformed frame is linked to an independent front suspension and rack-andpinion steering The rear suspension is also new, with coil springs and a solid rear axle The Durango is rated to a towing capacity of 8900 lbs Power fold-away mirrors, a seven and four pin wiring harness and hitch receiver make up the optional light towing package The new Durango comes with a lineup of three

The new Durango comes with a lineup of three engines The standard engine is the new Magnum 3 7liter V6 rated at 210 hp Acceleration is decent, but if you want a little more jump off the line, you might want to look at the optional 4 7-liter Magnum V8 (230 hp) or the HEMI Magnum V6 (345 hp at 5600 rpm and 375 lb -ft of torque) ABS blakes are standard and stopped very well

The 2004 Dodge Durango SLT starts at about \$28,000 Add the option packages above and you're looking at about \$33,000 While the new Durango may have moved farther away from the smaller SUVs, with a better ride, more power, better seating and more cargo room, it's moved closer to being an excellent choice for the full-size SUV crowd


