### Chefs cook at culinary competition

### Plymouth-Canton wins national title

Canton High School senior Natalie Witkowski said she and her teammates were on pins and needles as the judges announced the top prizes in the national culinary competition in Orlando, Fla

The four-member Plymouth-Canton high school team won the state competition in March, earning them the chance to compete against 24 other high school culinary squads from around the country for the national title

"The judges read the third-place winner, and then the second," Witkowski said "We weren't called and we all held hands They then called our names for first, and we jumped up and down and started crying It was an awesome, awesome feeling

"Our food looked beautiful, but so did a lot of other teams," Witkowski added


"What put us ahead was our teamwork We became so close and relied on each other The judges could tell we knew it "

The Plymouth-Canton team won by preparing a seasonal garden salad, accented by seared yellow-fin tuna and pecan-crusted goat cheese quenelle, a main course of pan-seared duck breast and mushroom-sage ballotine, and followed by dessert consisting of a chocolate and strawberry-passion fruit mousse

A gourmet meal prepared with the help of only two small butane flame stoves, an ice chest and no electricity

As members of the winning team, Witkowski, Jeff Sartor, Adam Strong and Jeremy Walker each received \$20,000 in college scholarships Team alternate Sara Nickell didn't earn a scholarship, but did receive a medal for her participation



### **Township eyes** optical scanners

Local elections officials aren't too happy about it, but Plymouth Township will be among those communities getting new optical scanning devices for elections by 2006

Michigan Secretary of State Terri I ynn Land said Thursday the state has placed its initial order for voting machines to replace paper ballots, punchcards and lever-operated machines

That includes the touch-screen devices currently used in Plymouth Township The city of Plymouth already uses optical scanners

I think it's bad for our residents, because they know the touch-screen machines and they trust them," Plymouth Township Clerk Marilyn Massengill said 'But it's mandatory, so there's no sense fighting it"

Land said state and federal money would be avail-

**Plymouth and Plymouth** Township residents, a driver's license will be necessary

### District spends grant on homeland security

Plymouth-Canton Schools will spend \$50,000 m federal and state grant money to enhance the capabilities of school building administrators to respond to a terrorist incident, or one involving chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear or explosive weapons

The money will be used to hire Patriot Services Corporation of Clawson to perform a needs assessment of each school building, then develop practical applications in case of an emergency


'They will go to each building and perform an indepth needs assessment to analyze such things as our building locks, fire escapes, everything related to safety," said Bob Hayes, director of student services for Plymouth-Canton Schools

Hayes said part of the assessment will include table-top exercises to plan for emergency situations

Let's say a tanker truck rolls over on Main Street," Hayes said "That would involve Smith, Allen and Hulsing elementary schools A rollover on I-275 could involve Fiegel, Allen, Field or Eriksson


"In that perimeter, what do we do? What are the procedures for notifying parents? Evacuating kids? What are the evacuation sites?" Hayes said "We already have a Code Red drill for emergency situations But the state police, through Homeland Security, is taking it a step further with CBRNE\*

Hayes said Patriot Services was selected because of its expertise in handling CBRNE situations







### Class size, learning priorities in former principal's board run

Former Hulsing Elementary Principal Becky Moore wrote as part of her doctoral program that someday she wanted to become a school board member

After being encouraged by several people because of her 'educational background, experience and calm decisionmaking" demeanor, Moore decided to toss her hat into the ring for one of two Board of Education seats up for grabs in the June 14 election

'I know it's going to be challenging, with the tough deci-

Becky Moore 'We are in the mode of cutting, which isn't a pleasant thing to do," she said 'But, I think I can help look at all sides and keep the cuts as far away as possible from children

Moore said her first priority, if elected, would be to keep the focus on teaching and learning

I m talking about protecting the classes and the programs we have now, said Moore "The classroom is the heart of the district

Second on Moores list is salvaging co-curricular activities Research shows us children

succeed more if they participate in co-curricular activities, she said 'I think people in our community want those activities ' Moore said she'd like to see the district develop a longrange plan for class size

"When I recently asked about a long-range plan, they said they didn't have one," Moore said 'With a longrange plan we can keep class size down

While many are having a hard time seeing the light at the end of the tunnel when it comes to state funding cuts, Moore remains optimistic the ship will right itself

"It's the state's obligation to fund public schools, and I think at some point it's going to get bad enough that they'll look at restructuring, she said Moore said she favors the current board's decision to seek voter approval for a \$107 milhon bond issue to repair and renovate school buildings, construct a new elementary school in Canton, and spend \$1 milhon for emergency repairs at Central Middle School

As for the future of Central, Moore said she'd like to study the issue more

"I admire that building, it has lots of character,' she said But, I want to know that if we put money into it, will it go 10-15 years and be a quality building I don't have an answer because I don t have enough information But, I do believe we need a new middle school in Canton, because that's where the children are, she said

While Moore believes Plymouth-Canton is a solid school district, she does see at least two areas for improvement

"The reading scores are flat across the board, and I know they are trying to address that," she said

"And, we ve not found a way to make every stakeholder feel valued,' Moore said 'People feel they aren't being hstened to We need to have open, honest communication and look at all sides"



### Helen Thomas asked tough questions in search of truth | your way to fitness, clean air

elen Thomas, the most famous newswoman in America, won't be happy with something Planned Parenthood of Michigan says about her in the press release promoting a fund-raising speech she's giving Wednesday in Troy

They call her a 'former Detroit resident" That's not what she calls herself "Whenever I run into someone who asks where's your home, I say Detroit," she said over lunch in Washington last fall "Even though I came to Washington on what I said was a trip in 1943 and still haven't got around to coming home"

But to most of the nation, her home is the White House, where she has been covering presidents and presidential press conferences since



John F Kennedy For most of that time, she worked for the once-great wire service UPI In the early years, she always wore red, thinking that would make her stand out, and catch the president's eye Later, when she became the senior wire service reporter, she was always given the right to ask the first ques-

Jack Lessenberry

That changed with George W Bush, after she asked him a couple of questions he had diffi-

culty answering early in his term

tion

"They no longer call on me anymore, but that's all right," she chuckled "There are lots of good journalists who can ask the right questions What's important is that they get the chance to ask them No president has had fewer press conferences than this one, and that's a shame"

But she still shows up Four years ago, when UPI was sold to the News World Communications, a company founded by the Rev Sun Myung Moon, she decided she could no longer work for UPI She thought her career was over, but to her surprise and delight, Hearst News Service offered her the chance to write a twice-weekly column She's still at it, but why not? She won't be 84 'til August

"Writing a column has taken some getting used to," she confided in me For decades, her job was just the facts, ma'am - quizzing the presidents without fear or favor, and reporting via the wires what they had to say

Her skill at getting right down to the question they wanted to evade was legendary She wasn't supposed to give her opinion, and that was fine with her

"I still really believe that when people are given the basic facts they don't need my opinion, really," she said "I still think that journalism is best when it's giving the straight story People will never know how difficult it is to get the straight story, to get the facts There's so much secrecy

endemic in government, in business, in everything"

She should know She was there for Watergate, Iran-Contra, Whitewater and a million lesser scandals Martha Mitchell, the ditzy wife of Richard Nixon's attorney general, would confide in her in the dead of night

Now, however, she is supposed to give her opinion - and she has become more controversial than ever She has been highly critical of the war, of President Bush's fitness for the job, of this entire administration Her disdain is shared When all the living ex-presidents were asked to be honorary co-chairs of an annual Helen Thomas scholarship event, they (and Nancy Reagan) eagerly agreed President Bush declined

But she shrugs and grins "We aren't here to be loved, you know

Once, Fidel Castro told USA Today founder Al Neuharth that the difference between his government and ours was "that I don't have to be questioned by Helen Thomas" That made her proud

"All leaders should be questioned by everybody," she said stoutly She doesn't feel the US press has been adequately critical of the government since Sept 11 "We've just rolled over and played dead," she said "Who will ask the questions if we don't?"

These days, she is happy to say that yes, she is a liberal "Absolutely' In spades' Am I supposed to be ashamed for caring about people, for caring what happens to our country? For caring whether the sick and maimed are taken care of?

But she said that she has always pressed every president, regardless of party, to be more open with the American people "There is too much secrecy, always has been, though now it is worse than ever'

Whatever you think of her, nobody has seen as much of the American presidency She'll share some of her best stories and a few of her opinions over lunch at Troy's Northfield Hilton at noon Wednesday, for those able to donate \$75 to Planned Parenthood She'll also take questions, and answer all of them except the big one

"Retire? Me? I hope not! I want to die with my boots on!" she said What keeps her going? "I'm self-propelled I care about the news" Bioethics asıde, I can't help thınk that it would be darned good for journalism if somehow, Helen could be cloned

asoline prices are creeping (speeding?) toward \$2 a gallon The Environmental Protection Agency has announced that 25 Michigan counties (including Wayne and Oakland) do not meet new standards for groundlevel ozone Even small automobiles cost more than the first house I bought back in the 1970s Metro Detroit has claimed the title of America's fattest (not phattest) city from Houston.

These are just some of the reasons to celebrate May as National Bike Month

When I was a kid, bicycles were for children Adults rarely ventured out on bicycles and when they did it was only to revive a pleasant memory on junior's bike

In the 1970s, America experienced a bicycle boom Bike riding became acceptable for adults, even cool Though it has never threatened golf as an adult sport and bike sales have waxed and waned, bicycling has continued to be a popular activity for adults The introduction of the stronger mountain bikes made it possible for puncture-shy

men and women to take to highways and dirt paths alike

But National Bike Week isn't just about the recreational benefits of riding a bicycle It is also about promoting the nonpolluting, less invasive bicycle as an alternative to the automobile

That's where Bike-to-Work Week, May 17-21, and Bike-to-Work Day, May 21, come into the picture Instead of throwing the briefcase in the back of your SUV, the League of American Bicyclists wants as many Americans as possible to throw their papers into a bike pack and pedal to work or school

It's difficult in Detroit This is a metro area that has sprawled in every direction but up Most people live a considerable distance from have a good mass transit system or a single,

A few intrepid cyclists do arise early every day -winter, spring, summer, fall - and ride their bikes to work The rest of us can only envy their fitness and dedication

Still the idea is good and makes us consider how separate our work lives and home lives have become At one time, riding a bike to work would have been easy for most people In much of the world, it still is

The bicycle was not designed to be a toy, but to be a utilitarian vehicle The simple principles of balance and gearing combined to make the bicycle one of the most perfect inventions In fact, the bicycle preceded the automobile

and inspired its invention and the invention of the airplane (by two bike mechanics)

In recent years, the bicycle has become stronger, more finely geared, more comfortable for non-enthusiasts There are bicycles for every ability and need Gearing makes it easy for everyone to move a bicycle, especially on the flat roadways of Wayne County or the gently rolling hills of Oakland County

Like many young adults, I gave up bicycling in my early 20s. Over the years I kept coming back to cycling, but not as an athlete out to challenge Lance Armstrong (or even the local bicycle club) I found the time I spent on a bicycle provided the right combination of physical activity, scenic viewing and quiet contemplation

I now ride a recumbent Recumbents are pedaled horizontally with a back support I did it because of a back problem, but I keep getting kids coming up to say what a "cool" bike I have I guess it has that low-rider, 'gangsta" look.

Whatever look you adopt — sleek Tour de 🧃 France racer, classic cruiser, dirt bike grinder, suited commuter — the bicycle offers benefits for you and for the community at large

Riding a bicycle is a good cardiovascular workout without being limited to a recreation center or a short walk around the block (and less damaging to knees than running) Bicycling is a good destresser, especially when you get away from heavy traffic areas Except for a drop of lubricant, bicycles consume little of our dwindling oil supply The fuel is provided by leg power

Every summer, Wayne County closes a section of Edward Hines Drive to automobiles This is a perfect way to get into the biking habit. When I started riding again, I began with short trips along Hines Drive, until one day I had pedaled from Dearborn to Northville and back. It felt good and I've been riding ever since


Another good ride away from auto traffic is the bikeway that connects Lower Huron, Willow and Oakwoods Metroparks You might have to slalom around a walker or inline skater, but the park setting is worth it

Once you've gotten your bike legs, you can explore Michigan's wonderful Rails-to-Trails system, from the nearby Paint Creek Trail connecting Rochester to Lake Orion to the creme de la creme Pere Marquette paved trail from Midland to Clare


And, if you can, leave your car in the garage and bicycle to work If it feels good for one week, maybe you can do it another week and then another until it becomes a habit (at least until the snow falls)

The real game was being dropped into the middle of nowhere and being forced to create a micro society with other people whose profiles were chosen so they wouldn't get along "It was an amazing experience," he said

Without food or water, the participants were forced to create team unity The humorous side of his experience came when he was asked to make rice and it didn't turn out — an event that was reported in The New York Times Food section

"You go in as a person and come out as a cast member," Famie said Recognition is what Survivor

gave Famie, who came in third place He later signed with the William Morris talent agency and through his fame teamed up with the Food Network to create Keith Famie's Adventures, a 32-episode show that gave him a chance to trot the globe in search of new cultures and cuisines

"Every culture has something unique about it," said Famie, the Chef de Cuisine at Chez Raphael in the 1980s and who later opened his own restaurant, Les Auteur an American Bistro, in Royal Oak He was also named Chef of the Year a couple of times Famie showed clips of his adventure show and the various foods he encountered, such as an egg that was buried in the dirt - an apparent delicacy - in Vietnam

"It tasted like ammonia," Famie said

That chef who gave Famie the black egg to eat also talked about a particular meat, which Famie thought was duck Finally, the chef corrected him "No, not duck, quack, quack Dog, woof, woof

In China, he visited a restaurant called Snake Island filled with aquariums of snakes your choice for dinner While filming as he held a python, the snake bit him A language barrier prevented him from getting a straight answer pronto on whether the snake was poisonous It wasn't But Famie had his own style of justice -apython dinner

The Survivor notoriety has allowed Famie to draw attention to charitable causes He is a

board member for Rambow Connection, a Michigan-based nonprofit organization that raises money for children with life-threatening illnesses

In 2003, he also competed in the International Ironman Triathlon in Hawaii to raise money for Team and Training, a division of the leukemia/lymphoma society

The 16-hour day was the longest day of his hfe, but in the process Famie met youngster Adam Rose 'It was the most emotional thing to see my kids pushing him (Adam)," he said. The West Bloomfield resident is father to two children, Joshua and Alicia

#### No time like now to say 'I love you'

eing afflicted with some sort of repressive gene in my brain that shrouds most of my childhood memories in a haze, I don't remember much about my mother from my younger days

Most of the memories I have are from my teen years and later By then, Mom wasn't around a whole lot, locked into a life where she struggled with two jobs and relationships that ultimately didn't do her a whole lot of good

Still, she was my Mom. I loved her and never doubted she loved me People have their own way of showing love and you have to make allowances for that

That lesson is clearer to me now — as I struggle to make sure my children know how much I love them — than it was before Mom died in November 1986

After she and Dad divorced, Mom worked multiple jobs My grandmother lived with us, which didn't work out too well for us, because it meant eating things like brussel sprouts and liver But we had a dog, so it wasn't too bad At least the dog ate well

I remember Mom doing the laundry, going so far as ironing sheets, pillow cases and T-shirts She didn't do much of the cooking, because her lack of skill was legendary She wisely left that to Grandma and, later, to our stepfather

Our relationship improved as I grew, particularly when I joined the Air Force, a move of which she was very proud She cried when I left for Turkey, cried harder when I got back safely I was a newspaper editor then, too, so I was never quite sure what danger she thought I'd face, but she was happy when I got home just the same

She gave me a telephone credit card when I first joined the service so I could keep in touch The first month, my part of the bill was \$300, and

### Student scientists head to work at Rouge

Relying upon children to clean their rooms can sometimes be difficult for parents Even asking a 10-year old to walk the dog can be a challenge

But when Friends of the Rouge asked local schools to help monitor the quality of the Rouge River, students jumped at the opportunity

Just over 5,000 students from nearly 90 schools in metro Detroit participated in the Rouge Educational Project on Wednesday, May 5 Classes left schools and headed out to spend a few hours on the river, performing various tests to determine just how healthy the Rouge is

Students collected water samples, searched for bugs and other critters in the mud, and they measured how wide and fast the river is

They recorded all of their observations and data, and over the next few weeks will be submitting their results, or Q-Value (a numerical figure which represents the quality of a body of water), to the Friends of the Rouge, which will send the data to the state of Michigan for annual documentation

#### **FAMILY EVENT**

Cindy Molnar volunteered to help her 9-year old son, Austin, and classmates from Canton's Tonda Elementary test on Hines Drive, just west of Haggerty

"The Rouge River is an important water system in this area," she said, explaining why she was helping out

Westland's Édison Elementary School fourth-grader Holly Sutherland's mother, Julie, took a leap straight into the river, in waders, to help the students discover the types of critters that live there

"I just hope that the kids learn that they need to keep everything clean," ' Julie Sutherland said "When I was little, everyone thought it (the Rouge) was gross, but now, we're learning that there are things living in it, things we need to protect"

Power Middle School in Farmington has a bit of the Rouge in its front yard This is exactly where science teachers Eric Hammar and Michael Theisen took some of their students to point out just what exactly is in their own yards at home

"If you don't have the little creatures, you're not going to have the big ones," Hammar told his students, who according to Theisen, are "willing to expand their knowledge by using science in

ecology teacher Micki Czach told her husband that she and her colleague Shanan Wheeler were taking three classes of students to the Rouge, he walked straight up to his boss at Ford Motor Co and said that he would use a personal day if necessary, but he was going to help the community

Ford asks that their employees spend two days a year helping within the community and local charities On May 5, several environmental engineers hit the water with Czach and her students

"I wouldn t mind learning along with the students, said Mark Fishwick, an inventory manager at Ford and a firsttime helper with the Rouge project "I'm here because I care about the environment'

His colleague, Jeannette Poploskie, also was excited to help out This is a good opportunity to help the community and to get students out to learn a bit more about the environment and its importance, she said

Mom greeted me at the door with a ream of paper, a box of pens and a book of stamps

Her first three grandchildren were girls, and she lamented her sons' inability to create, well, sons Finally, she got her grandson, my eldest son Matthew, born in October 1986 We lived in Myrtle Beach, S C, then, and had plans to show him off for Christmas that year

But the call came late one November night Mom was in the hospital, and she wasn't coming out The Red Cross couldn't pull strings fast enough to get me home, so I wasn t there when she died I was 26 then, too young to lose my mother There hasn't been one night in 18 years when I haven't thought about her, haven't wished I could have her back

I drive past the cemetery where she's buried at least twice a week, silently blowing a kiss only my wife understands, emotionally cradled in the warmth of the relationship we rescued in the years before she died

You frequently hear people who are frustrated because their mothers are a bit of a nag Every time I hear that, I think, "There's nothing I wouldn't do to get one more day with my mom"

The best way to learn how good something is is to lose it It's something to think about today, the 18th straight Mother's Day without mine

I'm sure Mom reads my column on AOL for Angels, so I'll say what you should say, no matter your relationship

Besides digging around for bugs, students performed tests on the river water to see how safe and healthy it is They tested for a pH level, oxygen level, temperature, turbidity (or clarity/cloudiness), phosphates, nitrates and fecal coliform

Redford's Pierce Middle School chooses volunteers who demonstrate strong leadership to help classmates conduct the tests

Kelley Kiefer, a 12-year-old student in Jill Davison's sixth-grade science class, is working hard to understand the importance of testing the water in the Rouge

"People need to know the quality of the river so they don't drink out of it or swim in it unless they know it's safe," she said "And we need to know what's wrong with it to make it better"

#### WANTING TO HELP

Eleven-year old classmate Pamela Yaacoub agreed completely with Kiefer "Most people only care about themselves, they don't care much about the environment But when they learn a bit about the Rouge River and its problems, they want to help,' she said When Livonia Churchill High School According to Czach, If you can understand something small and at a local level, you can start to think globally"

"We service nearly 100 people with developmental disabilities in Livonia, Plymouth, Garden City, Redford, and Westland by providing them with homes, apartments, a variety of housing,' said King, executive director "We're hoping to educate and train people to be as self sufficient as they can We provide every kind of housing from 24-hour supervised to ending up in their own apartment with only a few hours of supervised staffing"

**Community Opportunity** Center opened its first residence in Plymouth in 1975 King came on board in 1980 as a volunteer at Plymouth **Opportunity House while** going to college

"We originally opened in the 1960s with work programs and then the first home," said King "Back then people were still in institutions or at home with mom and dad Then the institutions began closing

"We do feel we need to have two significant fund-raisers each year We look at this as something that s going to grow Our major golf outing (Aug 26 at Fox Hills in Plymouth) attracts a certain group Were

trying to broaden the types of fund-raisers"

Larry Rink agrees with King that the fund-raiser and play are a perfect fit He originally directed the romantic comedy back in February for Rosedale Community Players Goldie Hawn starred in the 1972 film version of the play by Leonard Gershe

"Its about a young blind man who tries to go out on his own in New York City,' said Rink, who is also president of the Players "He moved away from an overly protective

mother It's a coming of age story for him and the young girl he meets in the apartment adjacent to his It shows young people trying to spread their wings and the growth that the mother has to go through She must let her son go and trust he can function well on his own

Although we have taken shows on the road before, we don't do it as a rule, but we think it's a real worthwhile organization, helping the mentally challenged people to live a better life

led to the founding of the orchestra in fall 2000

During Ewers university days, a group of U-M medical students decided to form a group they named the Borodin Society Four times a year they played for a lunch time series put on by the university's Gifts of Art program

The LSO was a grand spinoff from that society founded around 1997, said Ewer, also a member of the Ann Arbor and Flint symphony orchestras 'Borodin was an interesting character, a well-known composer but also a chemist Thats the science and music connection we took from him '

"We took our orchestra's name from the Life Sciences Institute because we knew they were an up-and-coming organization It's a neat way for each of us to help with publicity of the other The new building opening up will help foster even more relationships They're kind of doing what we re doing with our orchestra on a smaller scale

According to Kara Gavin, science writer for the U-M Health Systems Public Relations Office, the orchestra parallels the Institutes mission to bring together all areas of the life sciences on campus Gavin was one of the founding members of the LSO

We knew of medical students who wanted to start an orchestra," said Gavin, a French horn player from Plymouth "Harvard has a doctor's orchestra just open to doctors We want everyone to join It's part of the Life Sciences Initiative (former university) President Lee Bollinger was trying to bring together Different areas of university research - some of the best researchers in medicine and dental, biochemistry - didn't know what was going on across campus The idea was to get the doctors talking to the researchers, to help accelerate the research'

Fittingly, the concert opens with "Consecration of the House, an overture written by Beethoven to maugurate a Viennese theater Gavin said its just as suited to the grand opening of the 230 000square foot scientific research

"The concert kicks off the new building, which has attracted new scientists and concentrated the researchers in all areas in one building,' said Gavin 'It is a symbol of this bringing together The orchestra has a lot of people in these disciplines who want a creative outlet at the end of their day in the operating room or lab I play because I love to play I love the music and being together with people who have similar interests Its sort of a letting go There are people who can't afford to make mistakes when they're working on a child's heart the size of a golf ball They can come and let go for a little bit'



### It's the season for sneezing and sniffling **PREGNANCY**

While seasonal allergies are on the rise heading them off early by seeking treatment before the runny nose, congestion, sneezing, coughing, wheezing, and watery eyes set in can help keep these uncomfortable symptoms at bay

"It's a lot easier to treat the allergic reactions before they start happening than to wait until you've had symptoms," said Dr Andrew Singer, an allergist at University of Michigan Health System "Typically, this means starting a couple weeks before allergy season even begins to get your body ready for the onslaught of allergens Once the allergic reaction happens it takes more medication and it's much more difficult to calm things down and make you feel better'

Starting early means being ready Depending on what part of the country you live in allergy season is likely to begin around March or April and continue right through the first frost in the fall The earliest allergens to pop up are tree pollens, followed by grass pollens and then different types of weed pollens Ragweed, one of the most common allergens, usually kicks up around late August or early September

More and more people are affected by seasonal allergies Twenty years ago about 10 percent of the population experienced seasonal allergies Today that prevalence has doubled to 20 percent to 25 percent Allergists notice this trend in perennial allergies and food allergies as well

Experts suspect the "hygiene hypothesis" is to blame for the upswing in allergies As doctors have gotten better at treating infections with antibiotics and vaccines children aren't exposed to as many infections as they were 20 to 30 years ago

ago "The immune system literally gets bored," Singer said "If one part of the immune system isn't challenged appropriately enough or with the right challenges at the right period of time then it turns into more of an allergic immune system rather than an infection fighting immune system"

Allergies are most likely to spring up around age 2 or 3 They'll get worse as children get older and collect more allergens but by the 20s or 30s symptoms tend to improve As people continue to age, then reactions to allergens tend to lessen That's little consolation to someone who spends the spring sniffling and sneezing

Many different medications are available to treat seasonal allergies Traditional over-thecounter antihistamines can treat symptoms well but tend to make you drowsy Newer antihistamines don't cause the same sort of drowsiness and tend to last 24 hours which means taking a pill once a day as opposed to every four to six hours Nasal steriod sprays are available by prescription These effectively manage allergy symptoms without making

you sleepy If medications don't work allergy injections may be an option Doctors determine exactly what's causing the allergy and create a customized injection of allergens based on the individual's sensitivities

For many people seasonal allergies are easily managed with over-the-counter medications If those don't work for you or if your symptoms are year-round, consider seeing an allergist It's also advisable to visit a specialist if this is the first year you're experiencing allergy symptoms Your doctor can determine that it is allergy and not sinusitis or an eye infection

Allergies can also be linked to asthma Among children with allergies, 50 percent to 70 percent may have underlying asthma as well For some people allergens in the environment specifically trigger asthma.

"Certainly when asthma's involved allergies become a little bit more dangerous because the asthma can get to the point where a child or adult can have difficulty breathing, may need supplemental oxygen or may need to be seen in the emergency room for further treatment," Singer said

The best tests for allergies are a skin scratch or prick test in which the doctor places tiny amounts of suspected allergens under your skin to look for a reaction These tests will help determine the specific substances causing your allergies Blood tests may also be done to look for antibodies to suspected allergens

While allergies can't be cured, there are things you can do to limit your exposure to allergens Avoid going outdoors during peak times of year for pollen exposure Use air conditioning in your house and car and keep the windows closed Wear a mask when doing lawn or garden work. Shower or bathe at night to remove pollens or other allergens from your hair and skin Vacuum your carpets, curtains and soft furniture often, and remove any mold you find in your home.

Callcut exercised regularly during her first pregnancy and currently participates in water aerobics, walking and does a set 30-minute circuit program at a fitness facility

"Exercise helps me feel stronger and better about myself," she said "In addition, it has been a great stress reliever"

Callcut added she believes it is the exercise that helped her during her first pregnancy, as it is now, to keep within the recommended guidelines of limiting weight gain to 25-35 pounds

Kime has already discovered that remaining active — she walks regularly, does yoga and some weight training — is allowing her to have the energy and stamina to continue a healthy lifestyle The young mother-to-be grew up in Spain, where being active is a way of life

"Unlike here, in my country we walk everywhere and use public transportation," she said "We walk to get fresh groceries every day All this activity keeps most of my countrymen fairly fit

"For me, health and fitness go together, so I am continuing to be active every day This will help me be more physically prepared when the baby comes"

Kime, who has a pre-existing shoulder injury from playing tennis, is also working with Mary Ann Koenig, a physical therapist at Complete Therapy in Canton Koenig, like she does for other pregnant clients, has developed an individualized program for Kime It takes into account the shoulder problem and concentrates on strengthening the abdominal muscles and pelvic floor to accommodate the added weight of the baby

#### WEIGHT TRAINING

It's also important to do some upper body training with weights to strengthen the arms, shoulders and back for good posture," Koenig said 'Pregnant women can continue to do weight training, but they should use smaller weights so problems don't develop"

The therapist added that the aim of her program is to assure less back strain, good body mechanics and provide new mothers with the ability to comfortably pick up and hold their babies

'Pregnancy is a normal pathological state for a woman's body to be in," Koenig said "Because of this, continued exercise is possible as long as precautions are taken"

She stressed, however, that no exercise program should be undertaken without a doctor's consent

Callcut got her doctor's approval before continuing with her exercise program

"I just go a httle slower than I did in my pre-pregnancy days," she said "Also, if I find that an exercise I'm doing is uncomfortable, I stop doing it I try to use good common sense'

Kime also believes that common sense is the best tool to use when it comes to exercise "I control to the sense to be about

"I will continue to do what I've been doing with the needed modifications for pregnancy," she said "This, I hope, will keep me healthy and that things will go well for the baby and me"

Taylor, who has been in practice for 29 years, said that while participating in moderate exercise is normally safe for the majority of pregnant women, there are times when activity should be terminated These include pain, vaginal bleeding, dizziness or feeling faint, headache, increased shortness of breath, muscle weakness, rapid heartbeat, calf pain or swelling, difficulty walking, uterine contractions and chest pain, decreased fetal movement, and amniotic fluid leakage

#### PREVENTING OSTEOARTHRITIS

Osteoarthritis is a joint condition that occurs because of wearing out of the cartilage that surrounds the adjoining bone. The comparison to a tire is a good one cartilage wears out like the tread on a rubber tire does. The joints most likely to experience osteoarthritis are the shoulder wrist hip and knee.

In the case of the human body it appears that use up to a point preserves joints. That is the exercising doesn't wear out the cartilage like every mile does to a rubber tire. Proper use stimulates the body to repair cartilage and to undertake re-modeling as needed.

Thus walking and logging help knee cartilage. However excess stress such as trying to run marathon type races without proper train ng can damage cartilage to the extent that will bring on osteoarthritis Doing knee bends can have the same effect. The worse stress on knees comes from being overweight and the best way to prevent osteoarthritis is to keep your weight reasonable

The next best approach is to avoid injury Whether you are protecting your knees hips or shoulders warm up before exercise and avoid joy rides on motorcycles and be very careful rollerblading

Having said what you can do to prevent osteoarthritis I must admit that to a large extent developing it is related to your heredity. That is particularly true-of osteoarthritis of the hands and wrists. Following the guideline of care of your hands to avoid injury will help delay the onset of arthritis if you bound to get it and lessen the severity of what you will need to deal with when it comes.





It's an old story illustrating positive thinking Two men are working in the excavation for a new church A passer-by asks what they're doing One man says he's digging a hole The second man says he's building a cathedral

Earl LaFave said, yes, he'd be like the second man "There was that moment, he said, when the gravel pit stopped being just a gravel pit and started being the heart of a new community where hundreds would live and play

The Beck Companies, which LaFave operates with his brother, Steven, mined stone and sand from a hill more than 300 feet high and a half-mile to a mile wide néar Kensington Road in Brighton

When they got down to ground level, the backhoes, cranes and excavation loaders pulled ton after ton of gravel from an ever-growing cavity

Before long, seeping ground water, and underground springs now cleared of ancient blockage, began to fill the cavity The backhoes were parked along what was becoming a shoreline Dredges and underwater vacuums continued the work

"Yes," LaFave said, thinking back to that day in the late 1980s when "we no longer were just digging gravel but now were shaping something else'

It may have started with the invention of the typewriter in 1867, which hastened the demise of handwritten business letters and documents Then came the telephone, no doubt a miraculous invention, albeit one that reduced the need for face-to-face meetings

Things have certainly come a long way since then, as today's technology has mundated people with telephone, cellular phone, pager and fax numbers, as well as e-mail addresses It is the nature of these mediums to be impersonal Yet that doesn't mean you can't add warmth to your digital communications Following are a few strategies for "electronic etiquette," which can help you build the lasting relationships that are the key to business success MEANINGFUL MESSAGES

The "voice mail freeze" it's happened to everyone at some point. It is characterized by difficulty or

concise voice mail message for someone "on cue" after the beep However, there are ways to conquer the problem

One way is to practice by leaving yourself a voice mail, then critique the message Is everything clear? Would you return your call? People can hear a "smile" on the phone, and they certainly can hear your attitude When you leave an upbeat message, it invites people to call you back. If you must leave a long message, indicate this up front For example "I'm going to be out of the office for a few days, so please excuse this long message " The recipient will appreciate your candor and your consideration

Finally, work towards returning every call you receive within 24 hours This is the best way to let your customers know that they are important to you FRIENDLY FAXES

A fax can be a great follow-up tool After completing a negotiation on the

get something into your customer's hands right away that confirms your agreement A handwritten note sent via fax can be just right for the task Be sure to verify that faxing is acceptable to your customer In most cases, fax machines are in common office areas, and he or she may have confidentiality concerns EASY E-MAILS

Because e-mail is one of the most immediate forms of digital communication, it's important that you learn to use it effectively

The message you send may be printed out and distributed to others, so make sure it looks professional Carefully check grammar and spelling While word processing programs usually include features to help you with grammar and spelling, this is less likely to be the case with e-mail, so you want to be on your toes

Pay attention to who is copied on your messages You may even want to

ly sensitive information in an e-mail message, in case it accidentally lands in the wrong person's hands

Lastly, include a subject line, your full name, title, address, phone and fax number in every message Many people use subject lines to help them separate and prioritize e-mail messages A message marked "No Subject" from "ABCDE@aol com" may fail to seem important or even be mistaken for spam and deleted CONFERENCE CALLS WITH CLASS



\* 2004 marks Chevrolets 93rd year in the car business

- \* Chevrolet began as a dream of two men -- Louis Chevrolet and Billy Durant -- in 1911.
- \* Louis Chevrolet was a race-car driver and designer and Billy Durant was a financier They started talking about a car company in 1909
- The very first product of the Chevrolet Motor Car Co Inc. was the Classic Six. Its debut was on Nov 3, 1911 \* The Classic Six began being produced in 1912 and cost

\$2,150 \* Durant and Chevrolet decided to incorporate into two separate companies -- the Little Motor Car Co and the Mason Motor Co Mason would produce the engines and Little would

build the bodies for Chevrolet vehicles \* In 1913, Chevrolet had already outgrown its facilities in Detroit because capacity had doubled. The company was moved to Flint

\* In 1914, the famous Chevrolet bowtie emblem was created and the company introduced its second-generation of automobiles, beginning with the Model L Light Six. \* It wasn't until Chevrolet introduced the H-Series Chevrolet

Fours, the first 4-cylinder models, that the company's reputation took off

\* Chevrolet introduced two distinct models in 1914 --- the Royal Mail Roadster (which cost \$750) and the Baby Grand Touring Car (\$875 MSRP)

\* The Royal Mail Roadster and the Baby Grand Touring Car were the first models to use the valve-m-head engine that s still popular today

\* In 1915, Chevrolet introduced its first luxury model, the Amesbury Special

\* The first Chevrolet dealers were in Oakland, Atlanta and Kansas City, Mo

\* Chevrolets price leader, the 490, was introduced in 1915 The name was taken directly from its cost -- \$490

\* The very first V-8 engine in Chevrolet vehicles debuted in the D-Series cars So popular and functional was this engine that Chevrolet used it exclusively on its cars until 1955, when the next-generation V-8 was born.

\* During the height of World War I, General Motors purchased Chevrolet, making it a division of GM \* In 1918, Chevrolet introduced its first truck. Today its truck

lineup ranges from the Colorado to the Avalanche

\* In 1919, Chevrolets were recognized as the wonder cars of the automotive industry

\* 1920 was a big year for Chevrolet because it produced more than 150,000 vehicles, which accounted for 39 percent of total General Motors sales

Fracassa \* Billy Durant, one of the creators of Chevrolet, left the company in 1920

\* Wilham S Big Bill Knudsen became Chevrolets general manager in 1923

\* Chevrolet introduced the Superior model, which replaced the 490, m 1923

\* In 1925, Chevrolet decided to reintroduce the V-6 engine and it came to be known as the Stovebolt Six.

\* The Stovebolt Six name was not complimentary But the engine proved so durable and dependable that the Stovebolt Six became synonymous with value in automobile engines

\* By 1927, Chevrolet topped the 1 million unit mark. \* Chevrolet was the top-selling nameplate for more than 55

years except for four years \*In 1930, Chevrolet produced its 7-millionth vehicle and was

second only to Ford Motor Co \* Chevrolet regained its sales leadership in 1931, thanks to

strengthened advertising efforts

\* Also in 1931, during the major time of the Depression, Chevrolet introduced the Roadster, which sold for \$475, the least-expensive car ever sold by Chevrolet.

\* Chevrolet introduced the Sports Roadster and Sports Coupe in 1932 These cars are favorites of collectors today They were the first cars with wire wheels


\* Marvin Coyle replaced Knudsen as general manager at Chevrolet in 1933

\* Chevrolet adopted a new advertising theme in 1933 -greater value, and backed it up with mechanical advances designed to make driving easier

\* In 1933, Chevrolet introduced the first built-in trunk and independent front suspension

\* Its been more than half a century since Chevrolet first became a Pace Car for the Indianapolis 500 Since that time, the honor of the Pace Car and the Chevrolet Bowtie have become synonymous

\* In 1995, the official Pace Car of the Indy 500 was a convertible Corvette. It was driven by former Chevrolet General Manager Jim Perkins That car was outfitted with a 57-hter LT1 engine capable of 300 horsepower at 5,000 rpm The engine was mated to a 4-speed electronically controlled automatic transmission Other features included ZR-1 5-spoke aluminum wheels and 4-wheel anti-lock disc brakes It was a stock model, with no factory performance enhancements The only enhancements -- which were mandated by the United States Auto Club (USAC) -- were installation of a roll bar, 360



degree strobe lights, 5-point driver and passenger safety harnesses and on-board fire control It also had a camera. \* In 1986, Chevrolet was again chosen as a Pace Car for the Indy 500 race and the honor was bestowed on a Corvette convertible, which was built at the Bowling Green, Ky plant. \* The Corvette Pace Car was powered by a 350 cubic mch 5 7liter V8 that produced 230 horsepower at 4,000 rpm. The engine was mated to a 4-speed manual transmission with computer- controlled overdrive

\* The bright yellow Corvette had heavy-duty Bosch-designed 4-wheel anti-lock brakes

\* All convertible Corvettes built that year were considered Pace Car replicas and were designated Z51 Corvettes

\* Behind the wheel that year was retired US Air Ford Brigadier General Chuck Eager, the first pilot to shatter the sound barrier as a test pilot

\* It wasn t until 1990 that Chevrolet was chosen as a Pace Car again

\* It was a bright yellow Chevrolet Beretta with a 3 4-hter V6 engine with 245 horses and an electronically controlled automatic transmission

\* It was the first 6-cylinder Chevrolet to be chosen as an Official Pace Car since the Chevrolet Stylemaster Six-Series started the tradition in 1948

\* Chevrolet produced 7,500 replicas for sale to the public. In bright yellow, 1,500 were sold, in turquoise, 6,000 were sold \* In 1993, Chevrolet was chosen again and rolled out a 1993 Chevrolet Camaro Z28

\* It was the fourth time that a Camaro was a Pace Car at the Indianapolis 500 race

\* The 1993 Camaro Z-28 Pace Car was outfitted with a 275horsepower LT1 V8 small block engine.

\* Other features included a 4-speed electronically controlled automatic transmission and 4-wheel anti-lock brakes

\* It had a removable T-Top glass panels, a two-tone black over white paint job and multi-colored strips along the body panels \* On the interior, multi-colored stripes accented the bucket seats

\*Also on the outside a Camaro decal stretched across the top of the windshield


