even hearng about what the Department would do It is actually a very pract
cal and potentally a hugely mpactful piece of legislation that is recevvng increasing support much attention because It was introduced into the House of Representatives by Congressman Dennis Kucminch, who is a candidate for press1-
dent But a year after its introductoon, the bill is already garnering support in Congress wth 48 co-sponsors

## Exhibit uncovers Detroit's design icons

Did you know Henry Ford invented the harcoal briquette?
Or that the Tupperware Party was conceived of in downtown Detrot?
The Detroit Historical Museum uncovers these and other moments of Detroit genuus in its latest exhibit
Amervcan Icons - Detront Desugns opened last weekend and runs through May 2005
"This is an exhibit of 'I didn't know that," said the show's organizer, Jill Grannan, curator of social history at the museum
Representing four main categories automotive styling, industrial design, architecture and advertising - the exhibit presents 16 design icons born in Detroit, from Henry Ford's conception of the assembly line process in the early 1900 s to the more recent "Timex takes a licking and keeps on tuckung" ad campaign created by Detroit's Doner agency
"All of these are designs Design can apply to many dufferent things," said Grannan
Everyday objects, like the charcoal bri-
quette, are particularly interesting because most of us don't stop to consider the mnovation behind such tems, let alone who was responsible, sard Grannan
Ford used wood shavings from an automord used to make the buetes, which were orginally marketed under the Ford name The product was renamed for a Ford relative, E G Kingsford, who selected the manufacturng site for the briquettes Today, Kingsford charcoal remans the topselling brand
"Henry Ford was very interested in agriculture and recychng,' said Grannan "He also loved to go camping, so he was kind of promoting his own interest, too"
A woman named Browne Wise came up with the idea of selling Tupperware in the home when she passed by a display of the

products in J L. Hudson's in downtown Detrot. Earl Tupper later named the sungle workng mother vice president of the company Wise also was the first woman to appear on the cover of Business Week magazne. Other icons represented in the exhibit mclude the World Trade Center, designed by then-Birmingham architect Minoru Yamasakx, the automotive tall fin credited to Harley Earl of General Motors, and the comic strip character Cathy
Ford's Model T and the assembly line serve as the 2,000 -square-foot exhibit's anchor icons, sald Grannan. "Because when you ask why people were drawn to Detroit, why were all of these things developed here, we look to these two inventhons"
Grannan chose not to segregate displays according to design category in hopes of illustrating the relationships between different fields
"There are all of these loop-arounds and interconnections," she sadd "And I really wanted people to be drawn to whatever particular object catches his or her eye."

A 1951 graduate of Cranbrook Academy of Art, Hanson's sculptures of ordmary people doing ordmary things an old couple resting on a park bench, a cleannng lady rolling a trash barrel, a man on a lawn mower - are well-known
But the process by whuch Hanson acheved his virtually real renderngs of everyday people is less widely known He used photographs as a sketching tool, helping hm make choices about gesture, posture and placement.
"Hanson was not a skilled photographer in the technical sense," said Gregory Wittkopp, director of Cranbrook Art Museum "But the photographs are fascinating for helping us understand the artistic process"

Makıng up the exhıbit are more than 100 of Hanson's photographs, along with two sculptures - Bodybulder (1989) from Cranbrook's own collection and Busmessman Reading (1983) on loan from the Collection of Gllbert and Lla Silverman
Hanson took the color photographs using etther a Polarord or Kodak Instamatic camera. Many were taken in the artist's studio
The Cranbrook exhibit marks the first time the images have been shown outside New York.

## Lots of action in 'The Day After Tomorrow'

The Day After Tomorrowis a big, loud, summer action move masquerading as a cautionary tale with social and political relevance
The film s cataclysm of clımatological chaos turns the Northern Hemisphere into tundra more frozen than Lambeau Field. Yet it also manages to bring people together - the right people, namely the film's stars and enlighten them at the right moments

High school students Sam (Jake
Gyllenhaal) and Laura (Emmy Rossum) fall in love while tryng to avoid freezng to death in the New York Public Library (though we know they can t possibly die, because they're too good-looking)

Sam s estranged parents, Professor Jack Hall (Denns Quaud) and Dr Lucy Hall (Sela Ward), seem likely to reconcle, thanks to the pouring rain and driving snow

And most important of all, the vice presi dent of the United States, who just happens to resemble Dick Cheney, realizes only in the aftermath of mass destruction that, er, maybe he should have histened to warnings about the dangers of global warmung

Director and co-writer Roland Emmench, who blew up the White House in Independence Day, seems to want it all here He wants to preach environmentalism, yet pummel his audience with dizzyng
sight and sound.
Yet for all its spectacular visual effects including tidal waves that flood Manhattan and freezng temperatures that cause British military helicopters to plummet from the sky - the movie s most thrilling, terrifyng event is one of the simplest turbulence in an aurplane as Sam and some classmates fly from Washington to New York. That s the most reahstic force to fear, and the only one lakely to make you feel truly anxious
Watchung New Yorkers scurry for their lives remains unsettling - even though its been nearly three years since Sept 11, and even though the source of terror this time is a computer-generated storm
In the midst of all this is Sam, waiting for his father to rescue him as promised If that means walking through blizzard condtions from Phladelphua to New York, Jack Hall will do it - even though hes the only scientist in world who predicted all this deadly weather, and is usually the smartest guy in the room
'When this storm is over, we'll be in a new ice age," he warns several serious-faced government officials before embarking on his journey
By then, the box office will already have been heating up, and thats all that really seems to matter

# 'The Princess Bride' plays with classic fairy tales

The story goes that novelist and screenwriter William Goldman's two young daughters both asked him to write a story for them One wanted a story about a princess and the other wanted a story
about a bride His Solomonic response to this paternal dilemma was to write The Princess Bride, which was first published as a novel and then released as a film in 1987
Directed by Rob Remer, this is a film that did moderately well upon release, but it has subsequently gathered a loyal and

somewhat cultish followng
Perhaps the best way to describe it is as a somewhat twisted farry tale, and appropriately enough, it begns with a kindly grandfather telling his grandson a somewhat bizarre bedtıme story We then enter right into the story itself, and it is full of all the things that we have come to expect from farry Andre the Giant (the late tales, along with a wresting star), Mandy few things we Patınkin and Wallace might not expect Shawn are featured in
In many ways, 'The Princess Bride the basic story 15 as timeless as it is predictable - a beautiful princess is kidnapped and will soon be forced to marry an utterly odious prince The only man who can possibly rescue her from this fate is her one true love, who assembles around him a group of ragtag adventurers to help him in his romantic quest However, the detalls of the story are far from predictable and part of the fun of watching the film is seemg any number of classic fary tale elements
turned on their heads (Shrek did much the same thing )

## ECLECTIC CAST

The film is also graced by the kind of eclectic cast that is well-suited for portraying farry tale characters The hero is the farr-haired Cary Elwes and two of his sidekicks are Andre the Giant (the late wrestling star) and Mandy Patinkm, an expert swordsman who is on a mission to find the six-fingered man who kulled his father Billy Crystal plays a kvetching wizard and the immensely watchable Wallace Shawn plays a duplicitous hunchback

William Goldman considers himself primarly a novelist, but he is one of the most respected screenwriters in Hollywood (having written Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid, Chaplan, The Stepford Wives, All the President's Men, and so on) and this particular screenplay is peppered with any number of memorable lines that aficionados of the film enjoy quoting back and forth to one another Is it an unlikely story filled with unlikely characters engaged on an unlikely quest? Sure it is But if you happen to enjoy a certain amount of suspension of disbehef with your movies, The Princess Brde will more than repay your willingness to go along for the ride

# Play by Play is fast and furious theater 

One thing's for sure, Play by Play cuts to the chase
The annual 12 hour marathon of short stage works, hosted by the Heartlande Theatre Co, is scheduled for Saturday, June 19, at Oakland University's Studio Theatre in Rochester Hills
"A lot of people come to see an actor in a particular play, but what happens is that they get sucked in, said Jan Radcliff, co-founder of the festival and theater company "Its like eating potato chips or something"
The reason Short plays get to the point, never putting our lean, TV tuned attention spans to the test
And if what's on stage at the moment doesn't enthrall you, there's another fast and furious drama, comedy or satire just around the corner, Radcliff said
The average time length of each of the 19 original plays debuting this year is 10 minutes with some as short as three minutes 'The maximum is 15 minutes she sard

But each work stands on its own Radcliff added 'We look for short scripts that are miniature plays"

Stagehands have become adept at making quick set changes, and play directors are allowed only a single laun dry basket of props
'We ve kind of perfected this system for changing a stage space very quickly These things move like clockwork" Radehff said
The upshot One hour of play-watch ing nets three to four works, half of which were penned by local playwrights

Among them is Kim Carney, a nation-ally-produced playwright whose work has been presented at the Purple Rose Theatre in Chelsea, Planet Ant in Hamtramck and Performance Network in Ann Arbor
Carney's short play Les Gets More is set to run during Play by Play 5 p m and 1030 p m one hour time slots

The festival's lineup is as diverse as it is fast-paced, which is another reason for the event's growing popularity Radchff said
"We make a concerted effort to compose a festival with a very diverse line up, and I mean that in every way from genre to theme"

This year's Great Lakes Chamber Music Festival, scheduled June 12-27 at 10 venues across southeastern Michigan, takes up the multi-medra musical experience

The festival's June 25 concert at the State Theatre in Detront showcases The Elements Quartet performing Snapshots The program is composed of short preces by 16 contemporary com-

## posers

The catch Each musical work was inspired by one of the composer's personal photographs, each of which is shown during the compositions per-
formance
"The quartet has deliberately attempted to establish a unque performance profile, not being content simply to put together yet another program of the greatest classical hits," saıd James Tocco, artistic director of the festival
The Elements Quartet, which strives to make chamber music appealing to contemporary audiences, commissioned the project as a way to increase understanding of the themes and emotions explored in music.
Tocco described the presentation as a "brilhant concept,' adding that "because of the unusual nature of this program - plus the fact that we think it will also have great appeal to young people - we have decided to present it at the State Theatre"

The show marks the festival's first performance at the Detrort venue, but the addition isn't surprising, given the event's growth in its 11-year history

## HOW IT BEGAN

The festival began with a handful of artists doing four concerts at two venues in Bloomfield Townshıp, St Hugo's Chapel and Temple Beth El, both of which continue to host the programs
'Nobody knew whether or not we woald be successful, Tocco sald "It turned out that there was a substantial crush of people at the performances in the smaller chapels to the extent that we put up charrs outside the halls and opened the doors to accommodate the overflow
The following season, organizers scheduled repeat performances, two evenings instead of one The third year brought the addition of Kirk in the Hulls in Bloomfield Township as a venue, and an


Pianist and leading chamber musician Ruth Laredo performs at this year's Great Lakes Chamber Music Festival extended festival run of two weeks with double the number of featured artists
More recently, the festival has located its Saturday evening performances in the Seligman Performing Arts Center at Country Day in Birmingham
'Our festival is now listed among the most prominent summer festivals in the country, said Tocco, who is artist-m-residence at the Cincinnatı College-

## Out of chaos comes genius and melody

Before Ryan Adams stole my heart, Stephen Malkmus was my Jordan Catalano Mysterious and talented (and hello, hott' - with two ts), his band Pavement changed the way I histened to music
In Perfect Sound Forever The Story of Pavement Britsh journalist Rob Jovanovic (Justın, Charles \& Co
Publishers) discusses what has become one of the most nythical bands of the last decade
Deemed by many as a slacker band for smart people, Pavement has always been vocal about fighting this image The facts have always rested in their music
The art rock band created five full-length albums that re chantıc, melodic and, ultımately, beautiful Smart-ass and intelligent lyrics set over crashing guitars and oft-kite drums made them a sing-along noise band It is a jumble
of confusion that makes perfect sense
Taken from press clippings and numerous personal ntervews, Jovanovics biography is the first book written with full cooperation of all of Pavement's members No mall feat considerng frontman Malkmus notoriously avoids discussing his former band, founding member Scott Kannberg has moved his focus to Preston School of Industry, and perma-gron bassist Mike Ibold is a recluse
Outside of their music, Pavement have always been known for their ambiguties Here is a band avoided doms major press interviews until late in its career Fans didn't ven know the members' real names for years They lived off the mystery they created It became legendary The book aums to take this jumble of confusion and give us a straight answer
What emerges is a lesson about an mdie band that
efused to set out a framework for beng one Jovanove is obviously a fan of Pavement and his admı ration for them shmes in his writing He is nothing if not thorough He asks the right questions - about second drummer and admitted alcoholic Gary Youngs removal from the band, about the way band members learned Pavement had called it quits These tidbits are wholly edifyng and engaging He delves deep into each of the bands recordings - from early EPs (like the first, Perfect Sound Forever) to more major indie releases and provides a detailed discography of everything a member of Pavement has ever touched And diehard fans will geek out with the plethora of zme reviews that grace the pages
But the downside is that Pavement is still very good at keeping up a facade
Some parts of the interviews can still feel he wading through forced media manipulation Look over in the cor ner, they sometimes seem to be sayng, don t look at Malkmus reported controlling personality or the rumored fighting with The Smashing Pumpkms

And, yet, who can blame them? The story for them has always been about the music - a true indie rock principal Reading about music can sometimes feel like looking at art in the dark. Great music writing will motivate you to isten to the band And ultimately, when I set down Perfect Sound Forever, I went straight to my stereo to pop in Woree Zowee

It's known as one of Detrort's hppest little night spots Ambiance is the reason the unpretentious, creative types come to The Buddha Lounge
This romantic spot is in a tiny strip mall with a big sign, so it's easy to find Once mside, tt's obvous that this intımate bar was formerly a Chinese restaurant
The carpeting is black, and the booths are sleek and boxy Orange and white Oriental paper lamps and candles help create a relaxed atmosphere for enjoyng conversation and drinks with friends If you want to mingle and meet new people, hang out at the bar area and order a sake or cocktail from the smiling bartender
There's no dance floor, but people occasionally groove along the asles separating two rows of booths while histening to DJs mix ambient tunes For a more intmate vbe, hang out in the partally curtamed Chill Room that has sofas and a coffee table Buddha draws mostly people in their 20s and 30s What everyone seems to have in common is they know the Buddha isn't a meat market - the crowd is frendly, smart and hip The attre leans toward stylish casual You'll see a little bit of highenergy club wear, some people start at the Buddha and leave to nsit other downtown clubs
But be forewarned Once you're at the Buddha, you'll feel as if you've been allowed into a secret haven and you won't want to leave
