The exhibit, The Secret Lufe of Suburbua Paintungs by Deborah Sukenuc, runs through Oct. 10 at the gallery on the campus of Oakland Universty
"It's as 1f the house somehow
depicts who lives unside," said Dick Goody, the gallery's durector "It's a metaphor for the kind of hife we live" ${ }^{\text {" }}$

But Sukeme's work is open to interpretation, sard Goody "T'm ust giving you a handbook. She likes the idea that the viewe completes the painting" And with so many familiar styles of homes depicted, suburban Detroit residents will rehsh fleshing out the bigger picture

Theres nothing wrong with having a skin-deep good time
That's why the fun factor guides play selection at Broadway Onstage, a nonEquity professional theater company in Eastpointe
"We don $t$ do much of the off-the-wall kind of stuff," sard Molly Dodge, director of the theater's latest production, Dead Certain "We like to present obviously entertaining kinds of pieces We like comedres, mystenes and musicals"
Dead Certain, a psychological thriller and mystery written by Marcus Lloyd, opens Friday and runs through Oct 9
"Mysteries are entertaining because people can lose themselves in the action, and they enjoy trying to figure them out," said Dodge, a resident of Livonia. "And this one will keep them guessing uatil the last five minutes"

The two-act play revolves around just two characters Michael, an out-of-work actor played by Kevin T Young of Detroit, and Elizabeth, a theater-obsessed exdancer portrayed by Juhe Brock of Clawson While Michael is a struggling actor who appears to have missed his chance at stardom, Elizabeth is now bound to a wheelchar
The plot begins when Michael accepts an mvitation through his agent to travel to Elrabeth's country home in England to act
out a play she has written Soon enough, it becomes clear Elizabeth is obsessed with Michael, and the twists and turns begin

It's very much a cat-and-mouse game," said Dodge "She is toying with him"
However, as the action contmues, the power shifts By the second act things turn a little bit and hes playing her Nearng the play's end, its anybody's guess who wins out
"The last five minutes, when everything comes to a conclusion, is my favorite moment," said Dodge "People will not expect it"
But, hey, this is theater thats all about the ride

For many people, a might out rarely mvolves enjoying the works of ingenous composers like Beethoven performed by the most talented artists in the world

Maybe that's why the Chamber Music Socrety of Detroit's mam series has become one of the hottest tickets in town Sold out for the past two years, the society is thriving in a seemungly country-wide classical music drought.

Lois Beznos, Society president, sard people are clamorng to get tuckets for the series, now in its 61st year, which runs from Şeptember 2004 through May 2005 Because trckets for the mam semes were sold out so quickly this year, Beznos sald the Chamber added a three-concert piano semes, expanding the sernes from its usual nune shows to 12
The Chamber wanted to give more people the opportunnty to get trekets, some of which are still available, she said With concerts on Nov 20, Feb 19 and March 11, the
piano series features performances by Krystian Zimerman, Jonathan Biss, Emanuel Ax and Yefim Bronfman Beznos attmbutes the Chamber's success to the caliber of the performung artists, the gracious, acoustrcally outstanding hall and the warm, finendly atmosphere.
"It's an all-around wonderful expenence, Beznos sald
Or perhaps it's the chamber music works performed by a small group of musicrans, each playng a dufferent part - that's responsible for soarmg ticket sales
"It's intmate, moving, beautfful, excitung and passionate music", Beznos sald "And the people get very involved in the performances"
Thus year, a performance by famed celhst Clive Greensmith, a member of the Tokyo String Quartet, opens the Main Series season on Sept 10 Greensmith also is recipient of the Chamber's recently announced Cindy and Harold Dartch Endowed Chaur in Cello Performance
A London native who came to the US in 1988, Greensmuth has been playing the cello
since age 8 , when his musically mclined parents rented him a factory-made cello
'After playng the cello for a year and a half, I knew what I wanted to do', he said. 'I knew I wanted to play the cello forever"

Before joming the Tokyo String Quartet in 1999, Greensmith was the principle cellist in one of London's top orchestras, the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, and did a lot of freelance chamber music. Also, he taught cello at the Yeudi Menuhn School m London and the San Francisco

## Conservatory of Music.

Now living in Westchester, NY, and a teacher at the Yale School of Music along with the other quartet members, volist Kazuhide Isomura, first volinist Martn Beaver and second volmust Kikuel Ikeda, Greensmith said he loves working in a quartet.

But when the Northville Victorian Festival rolls around the decision becomes impera tive

The annual event taking place in the city s downtown area Sept 1719 encourages atten dees to dress in proper period atture
Helping appropriately outfit revelers is fes tival participant Sonia Swigart

Swigart organizes the Victorian Festival clothing sale
Clothrers gather inside the church at the historical Mill Race Village every year offer ing traditional Victorian apparel

We mvite anybody that has period appro prate clothung for chuldren or adults to come and sell their garments Swigart sa1d We have several ladies that come from out of state that collect things all year and we have sever al ladies who do their own sewing making different costumes

Since the ball has been eliminated from the 2004 festival lineup Swigart satd many of the dems offered at the afternoon Sept 12 event will focus on day wear She added many of the available items will focus on the 1890s a period the majority of Northville revelers choose their apparel from
Dresses pinafores and bonnets will be on ste for little girls and knickers suspenders vests and caps for little boys

Usual sale finds for women will include blouses skirts and one prece dresses and baggy pants with a limited supply of caps and suspenders for the men Swigart sadd occa sionally Victorian era mens suits will be brought to the sale

Eye catching hats a festival must is another hot item

There will be a lot of fancy hats for the women Swigart said Hats during the later part were much more flamboyant

Items avallable at the sale will vary in price The prices are incredibly farr Swigart said It as certainly like buying a prece of art
Depending on the time involved and the level of adornment a woman $s$ costume may be assembled for $\$ 50$ to $\$ 300$

The sale organizer said some items like chuldren s suspenders are avalable for about $\$ 2$

Swigart sadd she personallv puts together a
new outfit each year And if she doesn $t$ change her whole ensemble she always cre ates a new hat She is still working on this year s creation

I think I am going to shop at my own sale she saud
Generally less than one dozen clothiers offer therr goods at the annual event an amount perfect for the nearly 200 customers each year

We will have hundreds of people wating in line to purchase clothing Swigart sard They are lined up almost to the gate
The even organizer sard groups of 20 to 30 people are let into the church at a time main taming some level of order
The annual event under Swigart s direc tion has occurred since the late 1990s This year the sale will take place 1 to 4 pm Sunday Sept 12

We always hold it the weekend before the festival so if somebody doesn $t$ have therr act together they have that last chance to grab something to wear she sald

## Festival has come a long way

The Plymouth Fall Festival grew out of a community family picnic, sponsored by the Plymouth Rotary Club The idea for the picnic was suggested by Don Lightfoot, a member of the club's Youth Activities Committee Lughtfoot proposed that Rotary sponsor a chicken barbecue to rase funds to buy equipment for a playground at the end of Wing Street.
About 500 people attended the event, held at the Playground on May 20, 1956 During the outing, President elect Don Sutherland of the Rotary Club presented the playground equip ment, and Mayor Russell Daane accepted it for the City
A second picme was held June 9, 1957, at the Hamilton Street Playground As in the preced ing and succeeding years, Rotarians prepared and served the 500 chickens used that year The price of the meal, consisting of barbecued chucken, corn on the cob, potato chips and cof fee was $\$ 2$ for adults, and $\$ 125$ for children The profit, $\$ 505$, was again spent for playground equipment
The site for Rotarys Thrd Annual PlymouthCommunty Chicken Barbecue, held Sept 18,1958 , was the athletic field of Plymouth High School (now Central Middle School) Tickets that year were reduced to $\$ 150$ for adults and $\$ 1$ for chuldren
The purpose was to raise money for Rotary s Youth Benefit and Community Service Fund and to extend a welcome to our neighbors to visit Plymouth
No festuval was held in 1959 From these three barbecues, held on neighborhood play grounds, grew the first Fall Festival, which took place in the fall of 1960
Frank Arlen, who was very thorough, went at the job of charmg the first Fall Festival like a time-study man and efficiency expert. We not only applied some of the ideas we had picked up at Manchester, he introduced some thoughts of his own
He automated 'serving line and improved cooking techmques at the charcoal pits The first Fall Festival in Plymouth was a huge suc cess
The first Fall Festival took place in Plymouth on Sunday, September 11, 1960, from 1230 pm


Face painting has become a popular attraction at the Plymouth Fall Festrval, which dates back to the mid-1950s
to 6 pm The good weather, ordered by Rotary's chaplain, the Reverend Henry Walch, came as scheduled, and the festival got under way
The City had agreed to close Pennuman Avenue, between Main and Union The con crete block barbecue pits were set up in the parkng lot, owned by Chuck Finlan, adjacent to the Penn Theatre Pacnic tables and chairs were set up m Kellogg Park which was colorful ly decorated by members of the Rotary Club
The eighty members of the Rotary Club had sold tickets, at $\$ 150$ for adults and $\$ 1$ for chil dren, buttonholing their relatives, friends, customers and anyone else with whom they came in contact
Eventually, the Fall Festival was more than the Rotary Club could handle on its own Other organizations were invited to join in the event and a Plymouth Fall Festival Board encompass ing more than Rotary was established The Festival was expanded from the one-day event sponsored by Rotary, to a several day affar with many segments of the communty repre sented
There is no doubt, in terms of sheer numbers, that the Plymouth Fall Festival has exceeded the wildest expectations of its early planners Those who serve on the Fall Festival Board have no easy job in ploting the event
