After decades of barreling down the wrong path wth electric cars that were completely powered by punchless batterres, and could reach all of 50 miles per hour for a range of a couple of hundred miles, the global automotive industry finally has figured out that all-electrics never were the answer to maktheir fleets As it turns out, the answer lay in creatmg "hybrids" that combine an auxilary battery with conventional internal-combustion gasoline engine Toyota and Honda were the first to field hybrid cars in the United States, and now the Big Three are in hot pursuit The automotive market will never be the same
somewhat of a disappointment For example, there are serious complaints that owners of the Toyota Prus and the Honda Cuvc hybrids are findung actual mileage performance is 20 to 25 percent lower than the Envronmental Protection Agency's labtested -- and eye-popping - -fuel-economy results Consumer Reports found that the Civc, for exammiles a gallon less than what the EPA ratings called for This reality check also makes the economic attractiveness of hybrids a little shaky, snce with that mileage and even at \$2-a-gallon gasolne, it would take 12 years to recoup the higher cost of a hybrid Civic versus a similarly equipped gas-engine
model model
But the industry's real problem these days seems to be keeping up with demand stoked orgmally over the summer by $\$ 2$-a-gallon gasoline And ove the short term, the next few years, auto makers might be introducing so many new hybrid models that they will face shortages of supplies of the robust batteries that help power the cars Theyre
made manly by three companies Japan's Sanyo
and Panasonc, the Cobasys, which is
 ocal technology company Energ Devices Inc , based in Troy
For now, For now,
hybrids already have reached a sort of watershed, the way I see it That's becuase, for all practical purpos- The Honda Civic Hybrid is rated at $46 \mathbf{m p g}$ city and 51 mpg on es, they can now be
eviewed and evalu ted just like any other mannstream automoble I recently evaluated amplishment was more than pleased by the car's overall perform ance For a $\$ 20,315$ strcker price (and EPA ratings of 46 mpg in the city and 51 on the highway, dublous as those maght be), you're gettung a nifty machine In fact, in its most signficant comparison with a conventional vehicle, on one of those particu Detrot, after sitting outside all night, the Civic tarted right up like a charm But the subcompact, gasolne-powered vehicle sittung right next to it on the driveway sturred nary a bit The battery was completely dead that morning, snuffed out by a more or less typical winter day I was impressed by Che Cric
Designers of hybrid vehicles also have learned a lot in just the last couple of years about how to remove things about these vehicles that are unnecessary reminders to their drivers that there's some thing different about the vehcle theyre occupyng It was the orginal Prus, I belevee, that had a push button starting device on the engine --very strang when youre used to a key -- and a huge, lighted
flow chart on the dashboard showng the various paths of energy into and out of the battery, brakes
and other components of the vehicle so that a pas senger, presumably, could keep track of when the Prus was using the battery's energy and when it was rechargng the battery
Honda -- whose first hybrid was a two-seater tats old-reliable fleet vehicles into a hybrid, to negate such oddities The drver uses a key to start up the Cive hybrid much like he or she would any other vehicle And theres no blarnng flow chart showing the paths of energy through the hyond powertrain, instead, as part of the instrument panel, Civic includes a man gane -- very whe ther the fuel "charrng" or "assisting"
While Civic's mileage might not be all that the EPA cracked it up to be, I was stlll very impressed It seemed that you could drive the Civic hybrid for days and days without really worryng about mak ing sure the gas tank was full enough Tur por many of the gasolne-powered cars that it competes with in that segment
My only complaint was that Civic hybrid took longer to heat up than I would have liked That may be the one area where the vehicle's hybrid nature is a big disadvantage

This is an opportunity to learn about what cold is, what cold does You know, what's going on and why are my cheeks red in the cold? Or why does the water freeze when the sun 1 s out?" said Erin Mattımoe, public programs manager at the museum,
 - experiences high attendance - a minimum of 600 visitors dally - during the week of The Big Freeze The program centers around hands-on demonstratoons that reveal scientific prncuples behind cold temperatures and include making ice-cream in Zıploc bags "Its a great, great science activity", sald Mattimoe "And, of course, you get to eat the ice cream"
The museum also provides take-home directions for ice-cream making

## Waitin' on a scene

In 2005, expect rock bands to get more emotional and draw inspiration from fresher sources
That's the word from some keen observers of the metro Detrot and national music scenes
"Phat" Matt, 89X FM music director, said young bands with emotional lyrics and vocal styles are winning more attention from radio histeners
"The Used, Taking Back Sunday, My Chemical Romance and Underoath have the most rabid fans as we come into 2005," he said "They are grouped into a 'screamo' category - personally I think that label is knd of dumb, but you hear it a lot
"The appeal is two fold The music alone is incredibly attractive Soft loud dynamic songs that have great melodies, chord changes and even the return of some gutar solos The lyrics are emotional and direct. Vocal styles can change from a whisper to a scream in just a few seconds The main thing is the realness of the songs and the bands The songs are direct and speak to the auduence in a real way The bands are real They hang out with the audience more than ever before and after shows, so a strong connection is made"
Willy Wilson has a unque perspective as host of the Rhythm and Blues and Beyond show on $1019-\mathrm{FM}$ WDET, and as promoter for The Magic Bag on Woodward Avenue in Royal Oak, which presents top local and tourng rock and Americana bands
"People are tıred of being force fed music like Briney

Spears or the Simpson sisters That's why record compamies are having a hard time, they're not developing bands," Wilson said "People want to be challenged with ther music"
He said this explains the rise of The White Stripes, who create music from sources of inspration that include traditional blues "I'm glad to see bands like the White Strpes dong so well," sard Wilson "It encourages kuds to pick up a gutar and make music.'

Last year around this tme, some predicted The White Strpes' success would spark more attention to bands lumped in the "Detroit Garage Rock" bag, particularly The Von Bondes, pegged as the next big thing from Detroit Some sadd that if The Von Bondies could make it big after The White Stripes, even more Detroit bands could follow

It dıdnt happen - at least not yet. The Von Bondres Pawen Shoppe Heart got serous attention both nationally and internationally, but therr popularity did not swell to the level anticipated by some rock writers
"I think they're a really great band and have a lot of potential They didn't sell multi-milhons of records, but if you look you see growth from the first to the second record, and I can't wart for the next record," Wilson said.

Wulson notes that some popular Detrot bands labeled Garage Rock such as The Drtbombs and The Detroit Cobras aren't really Garage Rock at all, since they explore funk and R\&B
"On other trends to look for m 2005, there's almost a
