ous protections - guard ralls will help keep drvers of ous protections - guard rals will help keep drivers of
the wrong side of the freeway, making drnking/driving ven more socially unacceptable, rage isn't something to still apples
But there are also some less-obvious lessons It's mportant to remain a defensive driver, scanning the stuation, experts say, to limit our distractions - passenger conversations, cell phones, eating, CDs, even DVDs, etc

ver my years in this business, I ve read a lot
of sad stornes But one of the saddest ran last week in The Detrot Newes It reported the results of an EPIC-MRA poll on the attituctes of Michigan parents toward their kids education
and today's economy The findings are, frankly, terrifyng
Only 27 percent thunk a good education 1 s
essental for gettung ahead
Around a quarter say that a good career choice for therr children is "whatever makes the happy' Only 8 percent chose "successful"
Nearly half of parents don t think ever
 needs a college education
© Fewer than 5 percent think careers in engmeernng or com-
puters are worthwhle for therr children
The disconnect between these parents and hard cold realty is
astonshing Don't they know that the high-payng, musclehat the high-paynng, muscie-
based, low-skulled jobs of the past are evaporating? Don't
they realize parents in China they realize parents n Chna
and Inda see that therr kds need to learn the math, science and thinkkng skllls essential in
compettive economy? the new globally compettitve economy? No wonder Gov Jennifer Granholm pounded the poduum at the Detrott Economic Club last
week "Wake up" she barked at Michigan parent No wonder state economic czar Davd Hollister keeps warnng that a high school education just isn't enough for Michigan kdds to make it And no wonder that economists, busmess lead-
ers and journalists are all waving the red flag of alarm In past, I've groused at the governor for benng reluctant about the knds of radical dragged, kicking and screaming, into the 21st century But on this fundamentally mportant 1ssue, she's been absolutely right from the start

together a heavyweight commisson on higher education in Michigan I served on on - and found it a disturbing but energizing experience
We found that only 22 percent of adults in We found that only 22 percent of adults in

recommended that Michugan take all the steps necessary to double the number of college gradu

## DIRECT OR MMDRECT?

Direct heat means the fire is directly below the food This arrangement works well for grilling thin, tender foods such as hamburgers boneless chicken breasts fish fillets and sliced vegetables These foods develop golden brown and del clous surfaces in the same amount of time that it takes to cook their centers just right Generally speaking it is best to use direct heat for foods that rilling time
Indrect heat means the fire is off to one side of the grill or better yet on opposite sides of the grill and the food is cooked over the unlit part Large foods uch as turkeys prime rib and rrangement because the indrect heat cooks them evenly from all sides allowing their centers to cook just right befor therr surfaces are overdone Generally speaking it is best to use indirect heat for foods that need more than 20 minutes of grilling tıme

| Some food fads seem to makers determined to clunce makers determined to clutter up our kutchen counters Currently, the hot new gadget is the sandwich grill or panini press Smilar to the waffle iron, some versions produce a crisp, thin-toasted sandwich that can be addictive <br> Most Italıans prefer panmı filled with thin slices of mozzarella cheese and tomato, plus fresh basil leaves, though these crustless sandwiches may contain another kind of cheese and grilled vegetables, or a shice of proserutto Although sometimes eaten cold, more often the sandwich is brushed lightly winth olve oil and heated on a presses the panino while making it crisp and golden on both sides at once <br> Itahans consider the American grilled cheese sandwich a panino As with other panim, the secret to its perfection is welghting it down But this does not necessarly require a special grill You can just as easily place a heavy, cast iron skillet on top of the sandwich as it cooks, turning the panino once To make several panmı at one time, I use the hinged contact grill so many of us have, though it does not press the sandwiches as firmly as the skillet <br> Italians consider panını a snack Despite what they claım, Europeans do snack But they do it more wholesomely and modestly than Amerrcans They go to a coffee bar, for example, to enjoy a savory panino plus a cup of espresso, usually while standing up Most Americans stıll snack on fat-laden chips by the handful, along with a sweetened beverage, while doing other things, so preoccupied that the calories we consume barely register on our minds |

Arready so ar this year, hybrnd sales have more than
doubled compared with a year earlier, as gasoline prices have risen $23 \%$ compared with the same point in 2004 All told, nearly 25 hybrnds from a dozen carmakers are due in showrooms by 2008 And hybrid sales should top 200,000 vehcles this year, accordng to JD Power \&
Assoclates Toyota's top US executive, Jm Press, has Assoclates Toyotas top US executive, Jim Press, has
even been quoted as sayng that virtually everything sold in the Amencan market within 20 years will be a hybrnd
But how far hybrnds really carry us into the automotuve future - and at what point something like hydroge gee next few years
There are a number of issues that the hybrnd "movement' needs to confront before it's anointed the industry's technological messiah They include the fact that purchasing a hybrd over the conventionally powered
version of the same vehicl stull costs $\$ 3,000$ to $\$ 5,000$ more - a hefty upfront premium that, for 10 w at least, will restrict consumer interest in hybrds to mostly upscale Amerncans who are very dedicated to the envronment and to the nations energy independence Another speed-mperered fuel conomy may not be all that has been advertised
But in the meantime, tt's clear to see how quickly hybrid products have been advancing just by gettung in them and drivng them for awhile One major advance that the mdustry seems to have made collectively, for tone down the vsual and operating differences between

hybrids and conventionally powered vehcles Hybrids inthybrrds and conventonally powered vehicles Hybrids in-
tally attracted attention because of therr novelty, and buyers wanted to be acknowledged for therr cutting-edge darng by finends and family That's why early versions ncluded a complicated readout on the dashboard that would inform the driver when energy was being consumed from
the on board battery pack and when, through brakng the on-board battery pack and when, through brakng
athatither means, the battery was being replenished Now, however the idea is to make hybrids same as manstream as possible by soft-pedaling the differences between hybrnds and their conventional counterparts
Honda already has excelled at this Its new 2005 Accord Honda already has excelled at this Its new 2005 Accord terms of makng you forget that you're drving a hybrid You'll simply notice little, ff any, difference between the Accord Hybrid and the regular Accord in terms of how they drve and otherwse function for you and your pas sengers And that is a major accomplishment demonstrating its mastery of powertrauns It has such an easy familarity in large part because it uses a conven tional automatic transmission instead of the continuously varable transmıssion favored by other auto mak-
ers What this means is that you get a gearbox in the Accord Hybrid that feels normal compared wrth other hvbrids seamless transmissions

2005 Honda Accord Hybrid
What Wccord hybrid system known as IMA, for integrated motor assist - always uses the gas engine, then kicks in the electric motor for more power when needed Agan, this virtually elmmanates the differences in operation and 'feel" from the conventional Accord In fact, the Accord-"

strates everythng that there is to like about the Escape as a mid-sized SUV, and it seems to go forever on a single tank of gasoline

group, The Marvelettes
"I would've never thought that after all these years someone would be portraying me in a play," Dobbins sard "And I never thought so many people from the media would want to talk to me I never thought anyone would remember me, even the (Marvelettes) You never what will happen in life"
Now That I Can Dance was created whth support from the Motown Historical Museum and the University of Michıgan Arts of Citizenship program It's based on the oral histores told by Marvelette Katherme Anderson Schaffner, Vandella Martha Reeves and many other Motown pioneers

According to the National Survey of First-Year Seminar Programming (2001) University of South Carolina National Resource Center for The First-Year Experience and Students in Transition of the 1013 institutions responding to this survey $33 \%$ reported an increased persistence to the sophomore year as a result of first-year seminar programs and a $154 \%$ increase in persistence to graduation
Christine Benson student life coordinator sald that this first-year cohort gives us a small group in which to focus our efforts with more emphasis on examining what works best for our students
Ongoing efforts will be based upon the work that has been completed to date by a University-wide task force who conducted an inventory of what policies practices and systems are in place to ensure the success of first-year students The completion of a report card was the groups culminating assignment followed by a plan of action to address future specific instriutional goals
