Hopefuls face off at candidate forum

Voters in the city of Plymouth who want to know more about the six candidates running for the city commission in the November election get a chance to find out Tuesday night.

That's when the League of Women Voters of Western Wayne County sponsors a candidates forum at the Plymouth District Library. All six candidates were invited to the 90minute forum, which starts at 7:15 p.m.

The candidates will be vying for four open seats in the Nov. 6. election. Two sitting commissioners — Gerry Sabatini and Dave Workman - will be challenged by DDA chairman Michael Wright, former commissioner Anthony Guilliom, local Realtor Christopher Lynn and write-in candidate Jason Vorva.

Mayor Dan Dwyer and Commissioner Michele Potter are term-limited and can't seek re-election.

Each candidate will be given one-minute opening and twominute closing statements, and will be allowed two minutes to respond to questions. The questions will be submitted by the audience on note cards provided by the League.

Voters who can't attend the forum, but who wish to ask questions, can submit questions by going to the League's Web site at www.lwvnww.org and pressing the "contact us' button.

League officials are working with Plymouth High School staffers to tape the forum. The tape will be provided to both Comcast and WOW cable stations for broadcast a number of times before the election.

Boy says he pursued ex-teacher charged with having sex with him

The 15-year-old boy that Stephanie Ann Stein has been accused of having sex with testified Friday morning that he still has feelings for his former teacher.

"Yes," the teen replied when Stein's defense attorney asked him if he loved the 31-year-old Canton woman.

The boy, who had Stein as his teacher two years ago at Plymouth Christian Academy, took the stand at 35th District Court during her preliminary examination.

The teenager testified that he pursued a relationship with Stein and said he had to convince her to be intimate with him.

'She said she probably shouldn't do it," he said.

The boy testified that their relationship began in February and ended earlier this month.

Stein, a mother of two young children, resigned from her part-time teaching position at PCA in June.

Accused of having sex with the boy at his house, her mother's house and at a hotel, Stein, who was accompanied to court by her husband, was bound over on two counts of third-degree criminal sexual conduct, each a 15-year felony; one count of using the Internet to communicate with a minor to commit a crime, a four-year felony; and one count of distributing obscene material of a sexual nature to a minor, a two-year felony.

When cross examined, the boy admitted that he had been untruthful about some aspects

ship with his former teacher and that he put a virus on Stein's computer, so he could monitor its use. He also asked his former

of his relation-

teacher to send him an explicit picture of herself to his cell

phone and she complied. In his earlier statement to police, the teen said he "made" Stein have sex with him but when he was questioned Friday about whether their encounters were forced, he testified that Stein

acted out of her own free will. Stein left court abruptly after the judge set her circuit court arraignment on the information for Oct. 12 in Detroit.

If the case goes to trial, Assistant Wayne County Prosecutor Lora Weingarden said the teen, who no longer attends PCA, will be expected to testify again.

"He wasn't thrilled about testifying (at the preliminary examination) but he knew once he was subpoenaed that he had to be here," she said.

PCA, located on Joy Road in Canton and run by Calvary Baptist Church, has been backed by the support of its parents. School officials have said they used proper procedures when hiring Stein.

The relationship between the two unraveled when the boy's mother caught Stein at her home during the summer. Stein, who has been issued a \$50,000 personal bond, was ordered to have no contact with minors who aren't her children.

Coming of age

Former foster child has overcome adversity

Jasmine Millwood and her sisters spent a good deal of their childhood bouncing around the foster care system.

They'd go to one foster familv, and then children's services agencies would try - unsuccessfully — to reunite them with their biological parents. When it didn't work out, the girls were shipped back into the foster care system.

They suffered physical abuse and mental abuse, the kind children's services officials say can cripple a child's self-esteem and confidence.

That's why it was so special for Millwood, 19 and a Plymouth Township resident, to step onto the stage at the McMorran Place Theater in Port Huron last weekend for the Miss Michigan USA pageant.

It was, she said, the latest step in her journey to overcome her upbringing and showed, she thinks, that she's all grown up.

"I've never done anything like this before," said Millwood, a Canton High School graduate now attending Schoolcraft College. "Until I was a freshman in college, I didn't have any confidence. Me being up on stage in a bathing suit is a side of me nobody's ever seen."

AN ACCIDENT?

Millwood's physical participation in the pageant was almost accidental. She got a letter in the mail and was going to discard it before a conversation with her best friend, Lindsay Burke, who urged her to reconsider.

Burke, 19 and a Canton resident, knew Millwood's life story, and thought entering the pageant might be a way to show how much her friend had overcome. After some cajoling, Burke was able to convince Millwood to enter.

"She's been through so much in her life, with her childhood and everything," Burke said. "It's not something she would have done. If she hadn't called me, I'm sure she would have just forgotten about it. But I told her, 'Why not do it, have fun, meet some new friends and have a good time?

Locals wait for state solution

While local government officials weren't too concerned about a possible short-term state government shutdown as legislators battled over how to resolve a \$1.75 billion budget deficit, local business owners were planning to feel the pinch in the pocketbook.

"We've been told they'd suspend liquor operations, just stop deliveries," said Veno Hesano, owner of Pilgrim Party Shoppe on Ann Arbor Road. "We're scheduled to get a delivery Tuesday. We could sell what we have on the shelves, but that may be it.

We have officially been told that in the event of a partial state government shutdown, the lottery terminals won't operate after the close of business on Sept. 30," he added. "At that time, we would have to secure all lottery tickets and supplies, and there would be no cashing of lottery tickets."


Plymouth-Canton Schools administrators watched closely as the state Legislature contemplated a resolution to the fiscal crisis before Monday's deadline for a balanced budget.

The biggest question for the district is whether any shutdown — short or long — would force delays in the next state foundation allowance check, due Oct. 20.

"We could probably limp through October if it was delayed," said Patricia Brand, assistant superintendent for business services. "If we had problems with the Nov. 9 payroll, we would probably delay paying vendors and pay employees. We could use our line of credit, but it's limited, about a payroll's amount of money."

Brand said each payroll period totals about \$4.5 million in salaries.

Developer keeps promise to Plymouth Masons

In a traditional ceremony that dates back to 1738 in Scotland, members of the Masons Plymouth Rock Lodge No. 47 laid the cornerstone of the Park Side project on Penniman Avenue Tuesday morning.

The event took place on the site of the former Plymouth Masonic Temple, demolished nearly a year ago to make way for the modern, three-story

Masonry isn't a building. It's people and a way of life of those people.

"It's great they've asked us to come and lay the cornerstone in the old, traditional way," he added.

Following the invocation, about a dozen Masons and representatives of Meridien Development — owners of Park Side — watched as the cornerstone was cemented in place on the southwest corner of the building, and in ceremo-

nial fashion was found to be square, level and plumb.

The Plymouth Masonic Temple, constructed in 1927, was home to the Plymouth Rock Lodge until a couple of years ago, when upkeep costs of the old building made it necessary to sell the property. Meridien bought it for a reported \$1.2 million.

"When we purchased the building, we promised the Masons we would uphold the traditions of the Masons, and do something that showed respect for the traditions of the Masons and city of Plymouth," developer Fabian Ciavaglia of Meridien said. "It was very important to us to keep our promise.

"When the building is com-

pleted, we plan to put a plaque on the first floor in honor of the Masons, and maybe use some of today's pictures as part of the display," he added.

As for the \$4 million project, Ciavaglia said it's on schedule.

"By the end of the fourth quarter, we should be ready for residents to move in, we have about half sold," Ciavaglia said of the 18 condos on the second and third floors which range from \$260,000-\$300,000. "We're still negotiating with a couple of tenants on the first floor."

Ciavaglia said he's negotiating with a restaurant and wine shop for the main floor.

Bathey finally a done deal

After nearly 30 years, the 16-acre tract of land known as the Bathey property is about to be back on the Plymouth tax rolls.

Mayor Dan Dwyer is expected to sign a deal with executives of Connektiv Communities of Royal Oak Monday afternoon, completing the sale of the land for a reported \$2.27 million.

Connektiv originally agreed to purchase the property in March 2006 for \$3.1 million. However, as a result of the current economic conditions that are forcing homeowners to sell their homes for less money, commissioners lowered the price earlier this year in an effort to get rid of an eyesore along Mill Street.

"Given the economy and the increasing debt we've incurred on this property, we just wanted – at this point – to get it back on the tax rolls to recover our costs, which is just over \$1 million when it's said and done," Dwyer said. "It's an eyesore, and not fair to that neighborhood."

As part of the deal, Connektiv promised to tear down the old factory by the end of the year. As for when construction could begin, Dennis Griffin of Connektiv said he's not certain, considering the current economy.

"It's tough across the entire market, but I think we have a competitive advantage because of the appeal of Plymouth as a traditional, suburban location," Griffin said. "The plan is for mixed use, but we don't

know what the proportion of the uses will be."

Connektiv currently has two condominium projects under construction in Plymouth, one on Amelia Street and the other on Hamilton. Both have been stalled because of slow housing sales.


The city gained ownership of the Bathey property in January 2003 after a lengthy court battle with former owner William Flynn, who failed to pay \$3 million in back taxes, interest and penalties over a 20-year period.

Dwyer said after the city recoups about \$1 million in back taxes and related costs, the remainder will be divided among several taxing authorities, including Wayne County, Plymouth-Canton Schools and Schoolcraft College.

With the city netting about \$1 million from the deal, Dwyer said the only decision commissioners have made is to use about half of it to increase the rainy day fund.

"We (commissioners) know we want to cap our rainy day fund to about \$1 million," Dwyer said. "The only other decision we've made is to not use the money to increase any long-term costs, such as hiring more staff."

According to
Finance Director Mark
Christiansen, the city's
rainy day fund – which
can only be used in dire
emergencies - is \$550,000.
Christiansen said the fund
legally can be as high as 15
percent of the general fund
budget, which would cap it
at about \$1 million.







I was just about ready to jump back into the market and then all of a sudden the market

shot up. Should I wait? I wish I knew what was going to happen with the market over the short run. but I don't. The market is volatile and irrational in the short run. My general view is if your goals are long term then it makes sense to jump in. After all, there is just as good a chance it goes up over the next few months as it goes down. Investors should never attempt to time the market. They should make decisions based on goals and objectives.

We live in a world where everything changes constantly. Two months ago, the Dow broke through the 14,000 mark for the first time in history. Everyone

the economy. If fact, many pundits were discussing. when the market would hit 15,000. A month later, the Dow fell

below 13.000.

At that point in time, TV commentators were talking doom and gloom and the conversation was not how high the Dow would go but how low it would go.

I've been to a couple of your library speeches and enjoy your straightforward approach to investing. I was at a talk by another financial adviser and when your name came up he was not happy. He said that you must get paid by no-load mutual fund companies to promote their funds. Do vou?

No. I have never received any sort of compensation for any investment that I recommend whether it is on my radio show, column or in my office.

A lot of financial advisers, or as I prefer to call them financial salespeople, don't like me because I tell investors to be aware of fees and costs.

For as long as I have had the privilege of doing my radio show and writing my columns, I have had to put up with people who are not happy with my message.

As I have stated may times in the past and I'll confirm it once again here, I receive no compensation whatsoever from any mutual fund family or mutual fund association.

There are three types of financial advisers commission-only, feeonly and those that charge both commissions and fees. I am a fee-only financial adviser which means my sole compensation comes directly from my clients. Whether my firm consults on investments. or actually manages the client's portfolio, we receive no compensation whatsoever other than directly from our

clients.

I have chosen this path because I believe it does not create a conflict of interest.

A financial adviser who charges commissions makes his/her compensation from buying and selling securities and in many cases also receives what is known as trailers.

Trailers are typically paid by mutual fund companies or variable annuities to the adviser for as long as an investor maintains that investment. So, if you buy a variable annuity, year after year money from your account in the form of higher fees is paid to the salesperson.

I believe commissions create a conflict of interest because you don't know if the salesperson is working for your interest or for their own. In addition, when the company

offers sales incentives such as free trips to sell certain products it creates additional

conflicts. That said, the best commission salespeople I know never worry about commission, they worry about taking care of their clients. Unfortunately, too many commission-based salespeople only look at what ends up in their pocket.

I always have and always will work only on a fee-only basis. I want it clear that my loyalty is not to the underlying investment but to the client.



It wasn't something the old Jasmine Millwood would have done. The lifelong foster child hadn't developed the grit necessary to face situations like that. From an early age, Millwood and her sisters — twin Camai and older sister Fawna — began moving around the foster care system. There were three or four homes, plus the two-year stint reunited with their biological father and stepmother, where the physical and mental abuse got bad enough for Millwood to refer to it as "an extreme child abuse case ... one of the most horrendous in Michigan."

TO THE RESCUE

They were finally rescued — Millwood's word for it — by their uncle, Richard Reaume, with whom they spent time in between foster homes and have, since 1997, lived permanently.

"Foster time was the worst time of my life," said Millwood, who said she weighed 52 pounds and measured 52 inches when she left her father's care. "My uncle rescued us. He didn't intend to adopt us, but he realized how hard it was for us to keep moving around. He put his life on hold and said he would take us.'

Reaume, who had taken care of the children at various times through their struggles, finally realized if they were to have any stability at all, it was going to be with him.

"They'd go to a foster home, then they'd try to unite them with their father or mother, and it wouldn't work, and they'd go back to a different foster home," said Reaume, now the Plymouth Township supervisor. "They were yo-yo children ... bouncing around the system. They'd go to a foster home, then they'd try to unite them with their father or mother, and it wouldn't work, and they'd go back to a different foster home.

"After quite a few years, it became apparent their biological parents weren't going to succeed in straightening out their lives," Reaume added. "They weren't in a stable environment, so I volunteered to become their foster parent, and I took them in.'

OPENING DOORS

And, ultimately, adopted them, an adoption arranged by Orchards Children Services, the caretakers of the Millwood file who by then had come to symbolize the troubled lives they'd led.

Ironically, it was largely this group she'd come to despise as a child that made her participation in the pageant possible. The day after she e-mailed someone at Orchards that she'd be participating in the pageant, Orchards CEO Michael Williams called to say the group would

"Our No. 1 philosophy is that any child who's been in Orchards will always be an Orchards child, because we think it's important that no child feels left out," Williams said. "(Millwood's) experiences were up and down. We talked with her about what needs to be done to change the culture for adults and children, what she can

share to help other children."

Orchards, according to Millwood, has now opened so many doors." She gave a speech at the Detroit Red Wings Alumni Dinner. She hopes to set up a "small, pageant-like event" for foster children, and start a program about selfconfidence and goals.

It will be good, according to Williams, for other foster children to see examples of Millwood's success.

"A lot of kids who come here, some of the challenges they face, sometimes their families, who are supposed to love you the most hurt you," the Orchards CEO said. "Kids feel hopeless ... Kids see someone who has overcome that and been successful, and they feel hopeful."

Millwood said she's also finished a 250-page book, largely about life with her biological father, that she started as a seventh-grader.

The last chapter gives me goose bumps," she said. "I found the strength and confidence in the depths of my soul.'

Her participation in the pageant taught Millwood something she loves to share with other children as a spokeswoman for Orchards Children's Services.

"I've never been emotional about my past, I was never shy telling people what happened, Millwood said. "But with all that has happened, it really hit me - never, ever give up on your dreams. You can do something great."


Schryer, 62, will be among the former teachers and administrators on hand when East Middle School celebrates its 50th anniversary Thursday, Oct. 4.

Canton woman accused of murdering child to stand trial

Carol Poole, the Canton woman accused of intentionally causing the death of her 2-year-old foster daughter, will stand trial Jan. 7.

Poole, 42, has been charged with felony murder, first-degree child abuse and involuntary manslaughter in the September 2006 death of Allison Newman.

On Tuesday, Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Ulysses W. Boykin failed to make an immediate ruling on defense attorney Mark Satawa's request to suppress statements that Poole made to Canton Police in the hours after the child was rushed to the hospital.

Boykin is expected to issue a written decision by Oct. 12.

Satawa previously called in a forensic psychologist who testified that Poole was so emotionally distraught at the time of the questioning that she was unable to give a voluntary statement.

"She was under such enormous strain that she really didn't know what she was saying," Satawa said.

Wayne County Assistant Prosecutor Jerry Dorsey IV countered that Poole, who is being held in Wayne County Jail, was able to gather her



thoughts well enough to offer police four different stories for Allison's injuries, including

Poole that she bumped her head in bed, fell in a bath-

tub and fell from a vanity. The last story Poole told, which she says is the truth, is that she and Allison were playing "whirlybird" when the child accidentally fell

over a second-story balcony. "Mrs. Poole is a liar," Dorsey said repeatedly in court Tuesday.

During the proceedings, Poole's eves filled with tears as she glanced at her husband, Alan, and at one point, she buried her face in her hands and sobbed.

While Satawa and Dorsey waited for Boykin to set a trial date, Allison's paternal grandfather, Kenneth Newman, rested his head on his knees and cried.

On Monday, Boykin rescheduled the hearing to Tuesday because Newman and Satawa got into a confrontation outside the courtroom.

"Sometimes emòtions run high but this is a court of law," Boykin said.

Michigan Eye Doctor Helps Legally Blind

Dr. Sheldon Smith helps those with macular degeneration and other eve conditions keep reading and driving.

By Elena Lombardi For most of us, activities like reading, knitting, driving or playing cards seem like simple tasks, but for those who don't see well, these tasks can be difficult or even impossible. People with visual limitations from conditions like glaucoma, diabetes, cataracts or macular degeneration are said to have low vision.

However for many of these people, Michigan Optometrist Dr. Sheldon Smith has the answers they have been seeking.

"People don't know that there are experienced doctors who can help them with specialized low vision care," says Dr. Smith.

Dr. Smith, a Low Vision Specialist, helps people who have lost vision from these types of eye diseases. A Fellow of the International Academy of Low Vision Specialists, Dr. Smith is one of a select group of doctors serving the visually impaired.

"Many people are told by their doctor that nothing more can be done for their eve condition, but there are ways to improve vision" says Dr. Smith. "We fit specially designed devices to help patients meet their

"They can even help with driving" the doctor explained. Michigan is one of 46 states that allow bioptic telescopic glasses for driving. Mr. Charles Willim age

81 of Taylor MI came to get his driver license restored after macular degeneration reduced his vision to 20/70. Dr. Smith fit him with special driving telescopes that improved his vision to 20/ 40. A few weeks later Charles passed his road test and is now a licensed driver again. "Those telescopic glasses are pretty darn good" he said.

Buddy Standafer age 70 of Westland had diabetic eye problems. He came to reinstate his driver license and read better. His regular vision was 20/200 but with special driving telescopes he saw 20/50. Prismatic reading glasses got him reading newsprint. Two months later his license was restored. "Now I see the traffic lights much better. I am happy to be on the road again. I tell a lot of people about Dr. Smith" Buddy said.

Special prismatic reading glasses and microscopes are another way to help make reading a little easier. There are as many low vision devices

as there are various activities. Dr. Smith also counsels his patients on using sun filters and nutritional supplements to safeguard the vision from getting worse.

Special glasses and telescopes range in price from \$600 to \$2,500. "Every patient is unique, with different amounts of vision and individual goals," says Dr. Smith. "My objective is to help each patient do what matters most to them. Whatever the goal, I try to match it with a device to meet that need. People really improve their quality of life and independence."

"I can go without it right now, I have enough money in the bank," said Edwards, who received a \$360,000 revenuesharing payment in August, with another due at the end of this month. "It's sad to see how it could affect federal services for people, including those living in our community."

Plymouth Finance Director Mark Christiansen said the city received its last revenue-sharing payment of \$153,000 earlier this month. The next payment isn't scheduled to arrive until November.

"The reality is a state shutdown doesn't affect us directly, like it does a lot of agencies," Christiansen said. "We don't directly provide services that rest solely on funding from the state."




Shut it down







Taormina, a former All-America swimmer at the University of Georgia, is attempting to make history by becoming the first woman to qualify for the Olympic Games in three different sports.

In the 1996 Summer Games in Atlanta, Ga., Taormina captured a gold medal when she swam the third leg of the women's 4 x 200meter freestyle relay. She also finished sixth and 23rd, respectively, in the women's triathlon at the 2000 Summer Games in Sydney, Australia and Athens, Greece.

Her top modern pentathlon performance in 2007 came back in March when she earned a silver medal in the World Cup (No. 2 event) in Cairo, Egypt.

Fearful mom must deal with past

I was sexually abused as a child but never told anyone. Now I am the married mother of a daughter that is afraid to leave her with her father because I will not let what happened to me happen to her. When I was her age a family member

would get me alone and I cannot stand the thought of that happening to my daughter. We have no contact with this person but I am still afraid of everyone, including my husband. I know that my husband would never do that to her - he's not like that. He's a kind and loving man but I can't get the fear out of my head. He thinks that I think that he's a bad father and it hurts him that he can't take her anyplace without me. I never let him change diapers or give her a bath and I know that he feels hurt but I can't help it. I want to trust him but I'm afraid of what might happen if I'm wrong. I won't let my daughter get hurt like I

did. I feel quilty and worried all of the time and I wonder how long it will be until my husband leaves me over this. Please help me.

This letter is not really about your husband or your daughter so much as it is about you and the negative impact that the abuse that you suffered has had on your sense of security, control, and trust. Because of the vile betrayal that you endured in your past you feel unable to let your guard down in the present. If you do, you're afraid that your daughter will face the consequences.

The stress and anxiety that you are living with must be unbearable. This stress must also be having a significant impact on your husband and daughter's daily functioning and interactions. In essence, this pain that you are carrying around is also hurting those that you love.

I can't even begin to address the fears that you have regarding your husband and daughter because it is clear that you have never had the opportunity to deal with this abuse. I commend you for the courage that you have shown by contacting me with the intention of addressing these horrible experiences. It is this kind of strength and effort that is required if you are to truly deal with your past and move into the present. I strongly encourage you to contact a therapist so that you can begin the healing process, not just for yourself, but for your husband and daughter as well.

It is not uncommon for victims of abuse to keep these experiences to themselves. Sometimes this is out of fear of the abuser and other times it is for fear that they themselves would be blamed or seen in a negative light if the abuse were ever revealed. The truth is that there is no shame in being the victim of abuse, that dishonor is reserved for the victimizer. And when these experiences and the negative beliefs that accompany them are allowed to fester, the emotional and behavioral difficulties that result are increased dramatically.

So again, I strongly encourage you, and every other victim of abuse, past or present, to contact a qualified mental health professional. As difficult as this may seem, it is a far better alternative to the price that is paid for silence. And only through the therapeutic processing of these events can a person begin to re-establish their sense of self, security and

Is it permissible to discipline a child that is playing at your house but is not yours? There is a neighbor girl that comes to my home and lies, cheats and steals. She talks back to me and does not respond when I speak to her. I don't know what to do. I've tried speaking to her mother about these issues with little response. My daughter wants to play with her, but I am not willing to tolerate such behavior in my home. What can I do?

In the first place, I would not discipline a child that was not mine unless I had discussed the matter with the other parent and had come to some sort of an agreement. There are far too many concerns that are raised by this approach. To be safe, I am not recommending this as the best course of action.

I believe that the most effective plan is to establish a policy that whenever these behaviors are demonstrated and she does not respond to your intervention with the appropriate level of respect, she will be asked to leave and will not be invited back for a specified period of time. I would discuss this rule with her and each time she comes over and I would enforce it with firm consistency (which means each and every time without exception).



aurie Palazzolo never dreamed the short documentary she wanted to produce about Polish-American dance hall musicians would turn into a feature-length film focusing on the culture in Detroit in the 1900s.

As a young girl, Palazzolo remembers her father, Ted Gomulka, leaving the house to play trumpet three to four nights a week with his brother Wally, friend Stanley (Stas') Wisniach, and musicians whose names would become well-known not only in halls, beer gardens and clubs, but throughout the Detroit area.

Palazzolo and chief editorial adviser and researcher Susan Tyszka sorted through some 3,000 photographs from the era, eventually selecting the 1,700 used in the film along with interviews of musicians and footage of the assembly



Benefit supports Angela Hospice programs

Dorothy Scannell believes when one person gives it inspires others so she's hoping Ethel Standley's story motivates Angela Hospice supporters to revisit the 60s at the Light Up a Life benefit Saturday, Oct. 13, at Rock Financial Showplace.

The 93-year-old Standley is receiving end-of-life care from Angela Hospice, but during World War II she served the country as a Navy Wave and most recently donated a bus to the Lutheran Home-Livonia where she lives. Another woman read about it and donated a bus to her home.

"When people hear what other people do it transforms their lives," said Scannell. "Ethel glows when she hears how many people enjoy going out on the bus.

Angela Hospice is not only caring for Standley as she battles congestive heart failure, but takes some of the burden off Scannell who is her caretaker. The two were in the service together and stayed friends through the years.

"When my husband had to go into hospice, I had heard so much about Angela I asked the hospital if I could switch the provider to Angela," said Scannell, 88. "They try to make people comfortable and take the stress out of it. When I had a problem with a bill last week they told me they would take care of it. The volunteers are very helpful. Ethel's legally blind so she's not sure who is the person caring for her when they walk into the room. The nurse from Angela Hospice comes in and checks on her and leaves notes for me.'

Pat Bracken brought Angela Hospice in for her father Paul Garanich in 2002 and her mother in July. Bracken's father suffered from lung cancer he developed from black lung exposure in Pennsylvania. Her mother was diagnosed with colon and pancreatic cancer April 1. She died July 24. Thanks to Angela Hospice Bracken, her sister Cyndi Garanich and brother Andrew

Garanich were able to find comfort in the days before and after their deaths.

"Dad was under mom's care. Angela was great," said Pat Bracken of Redford. Bracken is business coordinator at Henry Ford Medical Center in Plymouth. "They gave mom all the support and knowledge she needed to take care of dad. They came in and gave her a break when needed. The support helped her through that. You pick up the phone and they're there. That helped the family greatly. With mom we took care of her. We all work. We rotated shifts and were able to do that because of Angela. Anytime I called them with a question at night I got an answer immediately. Towards the end they were there not just for mom, but for the family. Afterwards they called immediately to check on us. You really can't say enough about them. It take special people to do a special job."

All proceeds from the Light Up a Life benefit the many caring programs of Angela Hospice. Development manager Alice Barringer and a committee are making sure guests have fun

while supporting the nondenominational nonprofit. She's planning to wear a blue and white checked jumper that looks like a 1960 Catholic school girl's uniform. She hopes guests dress in 1960s attire as well. Limbo and best dressed look of the 60s contests are just part of the festivities. The Dom Polski (Polish home) halls served as gathering places for Polish Americans.

'I could visualize the entire film," said Palazzolo of Farmington. "I jokingly say we're like the reality show of filmmakers. We had nothing to work with. We were recycling index cards. It was a long process."

The film follows the publishing of her book, Horn Man, distributed by Wayne State University Press. Palazzolo began writing about the musicians when her father became ill in 1998. Five years and more than 100 interviews later the book was published.

Ted Gomulka, who had recorded on the Decca label, wrote the music for songs like There's a City Called Hamtramck on the back of his pay stubs. Her mother Ruth would then write lyrics.

Tyszka's mother and sister frequented the halls where the musicians played. She has a box full of dance programs from St. Cyril, St. Bartholomew's and Veteran's Hall along with the Grande, Graystone and Arcadia ballrooms.

"On weekends there were at least 100 dances going on in halls, empty stores. They would take the streetcar from Hamtramck," said Tyszka. "People went every weekend."

KEEPING STORIES ALIVE

Palazzolo didn't want the story of the dance hall days to die. She believes there is a large audience for the film. According to the 2000 U.S. Census, Michigan was second in the country with some 855,000 people of Polish

On Oct. 6, she presents the film at the Civic Center in Farmington. The Hot Club of Detroit opens the program.



Once the book was published in 2003, Palazzolo realized that someone needed to tell their story on film. At the time she was taking care of Wisniach. The accordionist had quit playing his instrument two years before. Palazzolo flew out to California where Wisniach had been living and brought him back to Michigan. Wisniach resumed his love affair with music, playing three nights a week at Luigi's in Farmington and then four nights a week at Fonte D'Amore in Livonia.

During this time, Palazzolo reunited Wisniach with the Club Polka band he led for many years on the Channel 7 television show of the same name. The film revisits the era and the spirited dance music sprung from Polish

"It was the second generation who created the American art form, the polka culture," said Palazzolo. "They became musicians playing

jazz, swing, Big Band, and the polka sound. The film talks about the horn which is not used in Poland in folk music, neither was the accordion. They developed their own sound.

"Stas' was one of the greatest musicians to have come out of Detroit. He was the only musician to have his own show with my uncle Wally Gomulka. They brought polka music to a larger audience. It was quite a phenomenon, people dancing to the polka, a variety show with popular singers, comedians, classical dancers and musicians, jazz musicians like Dizzy Gillespie with polkas interspersed throughout the show."

PROCESS TOOK TIME

The Dom Polski film was four years in the making although for two years on hold when the money ran out. Palazzolo did receive a couple of small grants through a private trust fund for the Community Foundation for Southeastern Michigan, and a mini grant from the City of Detroit.

The music licensing costs are very high, several hundred dollars per song," said Palazzolo. "If it were on TV it would cost thousands of dollars, a major theater even more. I negotiated it in a licensing agreement."

Wisniach served as Palazzolo's inspiration. He lost the use of his legs after spine surgery in 2001 which left him in a wheelchair.

"He told me I could do it and never to give up believing in myself," said Palazzolo. "The film premiered in April at the Village Theater in Canton and we're bringing it back by popular demand. We had the east side premiere May 11 at the American-Polish Century Club in Sterling Heights. It was a complete sellout. The third showing was there in June, the fourth in July. People are still calling and asking where it will be shown. We wanted to have it in Farmington at the Civic Theater because it's an art deco style theater and fits with the time period depicted in the film."



house for \$33,000 and reno-

vated it in the 1980s. "Social night was Wednesday night. There were Palm Sunday brunches, spaghetti dinners catered in, and bocce courts," said Greco. "We outgrew it quickly.'

When Greco assumed the presidency in 1990, he had a dream.

The club bought the land east of I-275 in 1991. The new 26,000-square-foot club house and banquet facility was opened in 1994.

"People kept saying the club's going to die. I said, No, the club's not going to die. It took a lot of working together, excavators, construction people.

"We didn't have a lot of money," added Fedrigo, a past president. "We raised dues and instituted a \$1,000 lifetime due which quite a few people took advantage of and we asked everybody to help.'

Bloomfield Hills photographer even makes bugs look good

It's easier to ask Judy Yaker where in the world she hasn't photographed animals.

"I haven't been to Antarctica and Australia," she answers. "I'd like to go to Australia. I've been to Fiji, but I didn't have a camera then."

Laser treatment relieves enlarged prostate symptoms

The Holmium Laser is allowing Dr. Surendra Kumar to treat his patients without the use of a scalpel. The Westland urologist avoids traditional surgery

whenever possible to treat enlarged prostates. Technological advances in medical devices continue to reduce hospitalization and recovery

times as well as blood loss during procedures not to mention pain and discomfort.

'Open surgery is a fairly bloody procedure. Patients may need transfusion before or after," said Kumar who specializes in the treatment of prostate disease at Oakwood Annapolis Hospital in Westland.

"The Holmium laser has been used for prostate treatment since the early '90s but was only about 60 watts. The 100 watt laser became available four years ago. I started using it to avoid doing an open surgery or a TURP (transurethral resection of the prostate). With the laser there are minimal complications, little or no bleeding, minimal discomfort. With a TURP a patient would stay in the hospital about three days, open surgery about seven days. There's a huge difference. Patients don't need any narcotics after the procedure."

The Holmium laser is a major

advancement in the treatment of benign enlargement of the prostate (BPH), according to Kumar. So far, he's successfully treated 150 patients with enlarged prostates. Kumar expects laser usage to grow in the future as the population ages.


"It's used to relieve obstruction for an enlarged prostrate. From age 50 and on men start to develop benign prostate hypertrophy. They have trouble urinating. Eighty percent of men in their 80s will have enlarged prostates and one in four will need treatment," said Kumar.

"If it's small enough it may be taken care of with medication like Flomax. When they get larger or complications start and medications are not working at all, they need a surgical procedure. The standard surgical procedure (TURP) scrapes out the prostate gland from inside, but you can only remove a certain amount of prostate on the inside then open surgery is necessary."

While most of Kumar's patients are in their 60s and 70s, men in their 80s and 90s could benefit from the minimally invasive procedure.

Henry Jackson was in his mid-60s when urination became so difficult he went to a Belleville Health Clinic physician who referred the Ypsilanti man to Kumar. Five weeks after receiving a Holmium Laser treatment Jackson is amazed the procedure required no incision and only a two-day hospital stay.

"I had absolutely no pain at all and I got up myself to walk in



the evening of the surgery," said Henry Jackson. "Since then I've had no problems urinating."

Kumar expects the next generation of lasers to be even more effective.

"It's always better and better. I'm always looking forward to getting more powerful machines," said Kumar. "It's not experimental. We already have

seen the advantages mainly because of the fact there's no discomfort. After treatment they are not having any trouble urinating. Patients are able to sleep through the night. Before treatment they keep waking up many times because the bladder can't empty completely."

Bring your present medicines. Bringing the bottles is even better than a list. In listing a

medicine, you may make a mistake in name or dose. The bottle label gives the information a physician needs. Knowing what you are taking now provides a doctor with data that may help in diagnosis and prevents him from giving you a new medication that may interfere with your present medical program. List your allergies to past medications or other allergies you have experienced to







9 to 5 not taking you where you want? Try public relations career

Pamela Young of Redford Township is director of university communications for Eastern Michigan University, and has been on the job there 10 and a half years.

Young worked at the Detroit Medical Center and at an architectural engineering firm as well. She holds a bachelor's degree in journalism from the University of Michigan-Ann Arbor, and a master's in economics and international policy from the University of Detroit Mercy.

"It can be a very, very fulfilling career," she said of public relations, agreeing students considering the career need certain basics. "They should really have a curiosity about things they don't know about." A public relations pro needs a writing background, and it's good to work on a school newspaper, she said.

"Read, keep up with current events." You'll need to learn a lot about the organization once you get the job, she's found.

"It makes them a better public relations person," Young said.

A lot of EMU students want to go into special events. "One year, a lot of students wanted to go into sports public relations." Now, there's a lot of interest in nonprofits like hospice.

"I'd like to see more of them consider educational PR." Don't limit yourself is advice Young gives to future PR pros.

"It was absolutely one of the most fulfilling positions I've ever had," she said of her time at the DMC. Consider health and education public relations positions, Young recommends to stu-

Her department is doing publicity for EMU's new marketing plan/brand campaign, which has "Education First" as the tagline.

Denise Semion of Plymouth Township is chief of communications for the Huron-Clinton Metroparks, where she's worked eight and a half years. She's also worked for a state mental healthy agency 14 years, mostly in public relations, and for the state Department of Natural Resources for five years.

Versatility is one of most exciting things, she's found. "Your pen can take you just about anywhere."

Work outside the box, and be willing to take assignments you may not be trained for, as it makes you more marketable, added Semion.

"Now I'm writing about having fun in the great outdoors. How fun is that?" said Semion, who earned a bachelor's degree in psychology/ sociology from the University of Michigan-Dearborn. "I think it's been a very exciting field."

She likes giving out a news release and seeing the story in the newspaper. "That's quick gratification to see your work in print in the paper or on the Internet.'

She likes working on a big news story, doing interviews for radio/TV. "It gives you something different to do every day," said Semion, whose husband is in media relations for Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan.

Most public relations pros have a communications degree, Denise Semion noted. "There's a lot of writing opportunities there, and communication opportunities." Web writers will be in demand, she believes. "If you have the ability to see a story and make it newsworthy and pitch it to the media, you've got a hit. It's fun to

see those successes come together," Semion said.

Because public relations covers many kinds of tasks, there is no single set of "ideal qualifications."

Most people think of public relations executives as highly articulate and imaginative. Yet public relations executives themselves stress judgment as the most important single qualification needed. A public relations practitioner is a "counselor whose advice and services are often sought when an organization faces the prospect of trouble," according to the Web site of the Public Relations

Society of America. Therefore, it is important to develop the capacity to think analytically under pressure, to draw out necessary information, and to express persuasive practical solutions. Other qualities needed include: imagination, for coping with present problems and anticipating future ones; communication skills, with demonstrable competence in writing; personal confidence for successful face-to-face contacts with individuals and groups; sensitivity to other people, both diplomacy and a more than ordinary ability to place oneself in the shoes of another.

You can kill yourself to get to the top (and crash and burn when you reach the peak), or you can create sustainability in your life and in your company. If you don't want to experience early burnout, stress-related illness, turnover of valuable staff and daily financial pyrotechnics, then you have to change your mind-set from the daily game of competition to the daily practice of sustainability for your career and your organization. The paradox is, to do that you may have to turn your work habits upside down and do things in a different way. You're already smart, fast, and good — but you can be smarter, faster, and better by trying these counterintuitive strategies:

To be smarter, focus on what you already do well. Most people think getting smarter is all about mastering things you're bad at — such as a technology program, or public speaking skills. Instead, look at your strengths and what's working — and then build on them.



Stop using the brain you know. Get out of your comfort zone. If you're a linear thinker, try free associating and being spontaneous. If you're a logical, left-brain type, try drawing your problem and its possible solutions on a whiteboard. If you're detail oriented, try seeing the problem from a bird'seye view — its long-term issues and ramifications.

Play dumb. Surround yourself with experts. Brainstorm with colleagues, coaches, mentors, experts, and friends. The smartest people are those who know that others may be even smarter. Ask questions — lots of them.

To work faster, slow down. Take naps. Take vacations. Leave at five o'clock. Don't work on weekends. Work shouldn't feel hard. If it does, you're doing too much, moving too fast, and not replenishing your energy — which means it will take you longer to accomplish tasks.

To solve a vexing problem, daydream. Studies show that our most creative thinking occurs when our theta brain waves spike — as they do while we daydream. Stare out of the window for five minutes, or close your eyes and be still.



To accomplish more tasks, do only one. Studies show that multitasking actually reduces the total brainpower available for both tasks. Switching from one task to another also costs time, so you get less done.

To be masterful, stop striving for perfection. Perfectionism is enormously consuming of time and energy. It results in dreadful analysis-paralysis that is the enemy of good decision making.

To improve your work ethic, create a "play" ethic. Commit to making work more fun. The more you enjoy yourself at work, the more energy you cultivate for work projects.

To build a cohesive team, find differences. Embracing differences forms bonds. Think in terms of differences of opinion, culture, skills, thinking styles, age, and experience. Each of these offers an opportunity for a smarter team.

To be more profitable, give it away. Individuals and companies that are philanthropic or focused on making their community and world a better place attract backers, supporters, fans, and loyal customers, colleagues, and clients.





s Linda Solomon was busy preparing to launch her new book "The Key," she locked herself out of her office. Solomon called Birmingham Locksmith, and when Bob Rovinsky opened the door, he was delighted to see the room spilling over with all the keys she had collected for the book.

"He started telling me all kinds of key stories, and showed me a key on his key ring that belonged to his late grandmother's home," Solomon said. "He agreed that keys represent turning points in people's lives."

Solomon was so impressed by Rovinsky's enthusiasm, she invited him to speak about the history of keys at her Borders Birmingham book signing on Oct. 19.

In her second book, "The Key: Celebrated People Unlock the Secrets to Life" (\$17.95, Stewart Tabori & Chang), Solomon asked more than 50 celebrities to offer 'keys' to various life lessons. Solomon shot creative, black and white photos of keys to accompany every quote.

She carefully selected each key and its setting to represent the personalities in the book.

Dolly Parton's "Key to Staying on Top" is adorned with an ornate rose, and is sticking out of a jelly jar.

"It reminded me of Dolly, because she's so down to earth," Solomon said.

Aretha Franklin's "Key to Staying on Top" is an antique clock key placed at the center of a 45 recording of "Respect." Edsel Ford's "Key to a Legacy" is a set of vintage Ford keys shot atop a leather car seat. Hilary Duff's "Key to Being Grounded," is a True Value hardware key thrown on the ground.

Solomon, a Bloomfield Hills-based author and photojournalist (full disclosure: she started her career at the Observer & Eccentric) said she has always been intrigued by keys. She saved the key to her five-year diary, her first car and her Honeymoon suite. While the inspiration for her book began there, she had to embark on a quest to find more.

Solomon's mother produced a velvet pouch full of keys from her grandmother, and her sister, Today Show Entertainment

Correspondent Jill Rappaport, dug up hotel keys she had kept from family vacations.

"I hit every flea market, antique show, estate sale. It was hard to find physical keys to match the messages," Solomon said. "They're all very symbolic."

It took Solomon a year to gather all the materials for the book. She collected quotes via e-mail, tapping everyone from actors (Tim Allen) and athletes (Tiger Woods) to authors (Elmore Leonard), journalists (Katie Couric) and businesspeople (Donald Trump). Solomon has extensive connections, gained in part through photographing the Academy Awards for more than 20 years, and shooting her first celebrity book "People We Know, Horses They Love."

Most everyone she approached reed to contribute, but the celebrities had no idea she would use photographs of keys alongside their words.

"I didn't tell them. They all trusted me," she said. "People think I'm using their portraits. That's the fun part, it will be a little bit of a surprise for everyone."

Many people urged her to use photos of the celebrities, but Solomon stuck to her vision.

"I wanted to do something totally different. It's all about the metaphor so I didn't want to use faces to distract from the words," she said. "I think we're living in times where we're starved for affirmations and looking for wisdom. These people really have something to say."

Even her agent advised her that photos of the celebrities, many of whom Solomon has shot before, would be an easier sell.

Perhaps that's why the book ends with Solomon's own "Key to Staying Focused."

The image is of a key engraved with the name Solomon, placed atop the lens of her first camera, a Brownie Starflash she got as a gift from her parents when she was a child.

Her quote reads: "With every goal, give it a hundred and fifty percent. Never be dissuaded by rejection. Remember it's just one person's opinion, and that person is wrong."

"The Key: Celebrated People Unlock the Secrets to Life," will hit bookstores in early October. A portion of proceeds will benefit the fight against breast cancer.





Club Med Cancun, oh, how I love thee

Those of us who like to pretend we're more interesting than we really are often claim ourselves as citizens of the world. But still, it means something: we try to shed our normal lives to embrace and care for the cultures of the lands we visit.

While traveling, I try to stay at locally-owned hotels - preferring authenticity to generic atmospheres, but surprisingly not everyone does. Local owners usually help show me the "real" part of an area.

This has worked well in St. Lucia, Santo Domingo, The Grenadines and other Caribbean islands.

Now let's talk about Cancun and the Yucatán

Every once in a while, a vacation is more about relaxation than a journey. Some are about de-stressing.

Of course, Cancun is primarily a tourist area, so where better to shed my "independent only" hotel rule and opt for an all-inclusive resort?

Enter: Club Med.

I've avoided the place for years thinking it's "unauthentic" and therefore unappealing. How wrong. I'm in love

If you want complete relaxation, this is it. It's perfect for friends, couples or families. But I say ... go with

I paid about \$1,000 for eight days and seven nights. When I arrived I was greeted at the front desk with a cold glass of iced tea (it's safe to drink the water) plus a cool, damp towel to freshen myself from the four-hour flight. How sweet.

There I was surrounded by beauty: the perfect clear

and warm Gulf of Mexico, rooms modernly designed in dark pink, deep orange, black and white accents; black-tiled bathrooms and showers; ceramic tiled floors covering nearly the entire grounds of Club Med; a huge wooden deck extending far beyond the pool and into the outdoor lounge donned with black and turquoise sofas some with private canopies for sun protection.

Here are some of the highlights:

Indulge - I splurged about \$300 for a facial, body scrub plus a one-hour anti-stress massage. You can get it

on a secluded beach or opt for the spa.

Food - Sometimes I'd leave the resort for authentic Mexican restaurants. More though, it was nice just to visit the lavish Club Med buffet before swimming each morning. For breakfast I'd have black beans, French chocolate breads, fresh fruits like coconut, melons. mango and papaya, plus hash browns with salsa verde (spicy green sauce), and more. Dinner buffets were as good as high-end Las Vegas hotels. And being a vegan, even I had at least a dozen choices each night including

heart of palm salads, fresh guacamole, cold carrot soup, hot onion soup, sushi hand-rolled to order, tofu with soy, pastas, and on and on. If buffets aren't your thing, there are two other restaurants.





Lastly, one afternoon I saw a group of professional women giggling at the bar. I realized they turned giddy whenever Ely, the worldly manager walked by (imagine JFK Jr. wearing linen beach clothes.) Everything was beautiful at Club Med. Try it.




