Weather doesn't dampen Plymouth's debut Mardi Gras

It wasn't Rio de Janeiro or New Orleans, but Plymouth on Saturday debuted its own pre-Lenten party - Michigan style.

The city's inaugural Mardi Gras festival, held downtown and in Old Village, is being called a success, despite cold temperatures and a blizzard that may have made some think twice about attending.

We kind of knew the weather could be a factor, and we planned for it accordingly," said John Buzuvis, assistant operations director for the Downtown Development Authority, which sponsored the event.

Mardi Gras featured more than 60 participating businesses, street performers, headline musicians Steve King and the Dittilies, who played in Kellogg Park, and, with a nod to the Big Easy's Mardi Gras, bead-collecting.

Buzuvis said some attendees took advantage of the weather by making snowmen or pulling their children to the festival on sleds.

At E.G. Nick's on Forest Avenue, business was brisk and Cajun menu specials were popular.

"I thought it was a pretty good day," said chef Frank Agostini, who is also a partner in the restaurant.

Township home values drop 8.5 percent

Property assessments have been arriving in the mailboxes of Plymouth Township homeowners this week, and nearly two-thirds are seeing a bright spot - lower taxes - in the housingmarket slump.

A widespread decline in property values means an estimated 65 percent of township homeowners are seeing the taxable value of their home drop, Supervisor Richard Reaume said. That

translates into lower **Coming Sunday:** taxes, as the tax rate City assessments will be applied to

lower taxable values on the tax bills that will go out this summer and next winter.

The decline in the state equalized value of homes across the township averaged nearly 8.5 percent, said Tracy Martin, an appraiser with Wayne County Appraisals, which does assessment work for Plymouth Township. The SEV represents about half of a home's market value.

In specific neighborhoods, the decreases ranged from between 6 percent and 11 percent, Reaume said. The value of commercial and industrial properties also declined, Martin said, both by an average of about 5.5 percent

The slump presents a challenge for Reaume and other township officials, as they are anticipating a drop in tax revenue for next year of more than \$1 million.

We know that values are going down," Reaume said Tuesday. "We're anticipating at least \$1.2 million less."

The township collects roughly \$8 million a year in property taxes; other revenue in its annual budget of about \$13.7 million comes from state revenue sharing, fees for services, court fines and other miscellaneous sources.

Reaume said the township began cutbacks this budget year in order to offset part of next year's expected shortfall.

The cuts include a layoff in the police department, keeping another police job and three fire department jobs vacant, reducing the work hours and cancelling the health benefits for seven employees (a move being challenged by the workers' union), eliminating benefits from the deputy clerk's compensation package, and optional pay cuts for elected officials (all but Clerk Joe Bridgman) and Trustee Mike Kelly agreed to

Reaume said the savings should total about \$600,000 for the year, with another \$600,000 for next year.

"We are very thin here. We were already thin," he said. "This has always been a very frugal community."

Reaume said the expected revenue shortfall could grow because of economic factors such as business closures. 'That is not a good picture," he said.

Guard takes plea in supervisor's death

A former guard at Scott Correctional Facility has taken a plea deal in the December 2007 shooting death of his supervisor. Darren Johnson pleaded

guilty to second-degree murder and felony firearm charges in 3rd Circuit Court. Johnson admitted to killing Lt. Joseph Candie at the Shell gas station at Five Mile and Beck. Police say Johnson shot Candie at least a dozen times during a heated argument at the gas station.

Sentencing for Johnson, 45, of Redford Township is set for March 13.

The shooting took place in the early morning hours of Dec. 19, 2007, shortly after Candie and Johnson had left work. Candie's fiancée testified at Johnson's



preliminary hearing she was on the phone with Candie just before the incident and heard him greet Johnson, who had followed Candie into the station.

Later that day, Johnson was found on Belle Isle, bleeding from an apparently self-inflicted gunshot wound. A note claiming any blood that may be spilled could have been avoided" was found in Johnson's truck.

Prosecutors said the note had been written while Johnson waited in the prison parking lot for Candie





revolver ... and (Candie) is walking to his car," the note read, according to assistant prosecutor Christine Kowal, who read portions of the note into the record at Johnson's preliminary hearing. "The war is on." Candie, 39, a 14-year vet-

eran of the Department of Corrections, spent the three years prior to his death at Scott, where he was a shift commander on the midnight shift. He had previously worked at the Western Wayne Correctional Facility down the street, which was closed a few years ago.

Johnson was hired May 1, 1988, and had spent his entire career at Scott, according to Department of Corrections officials.

The average home value in Plymouth Township is now about \$260,000, Reaume said, down from a 2005 high of \$307,000.

Some township homeowners, about 35 percent, are seeing an increase in taxable values by the inflation rate of 4.4 percent, even though SEVs declined. That's due to Proposal A, the voter-approved measure that changed Michigan's property tax system and allows some taxable values to rise in a declining market. In such cases, the taxpayers typically have owned the home for longer than those whose homes' taxable values are declining, so the taxable value has been "capped" to protect the owners

from big tax increases. Only for homesteads with multi-acre lots did SEVs increase this year, Reaume





Dem lawmakers announce plan to make government accountable



Slavens said former lawmakers who left the state Legislature to become lobbyists "are not playing by the right set of rules."

When a legislator becomes a lobbyist, sometimes within days after leaving office, it raises troubling questions," said Slavens. "Our residents deserve lawmakers who will stand up to the community and the state governments that work for them. We need to make sure they don't have their eyes on their next paycheck after they leave office."

Corriveau was involved in attempting to pass some of the same legislation last year, but it was stalled in the Senate.

"Michigan is one of three states where

lawmakers don't have to disclose any of their personal assets," said Corriveau. "(If the bill passes), you'll see us posting some of the things that we have in our personal lives so that my constituents know that the decisions we're making were done for their best interest and not for any political

House Speaker Andy Dillon (D-Redford Township) said with many people facing job losses and home foreclosures now is the time to pass the package of bills.

These are important reform measures that will go a long way to restoring the public's confidence in their representatives and leaders in Lansing," said Dillon.

Dillon said despite the effort being thwarted by the Republican-controlled Senate last year, he believes getting a positive vote on the measures this year are "fairly good."

State Sen. Bruce Patterson (R-Canton Township) said he remembers being a member of the state House and introducing bills for the sake of publicity.

"This is more a solution looking for a problem," Patterson said. "More than attending session we should be looking at who accomplishes what, who is valuable to the system. We have an obligation to do good work, not just busy work.

Instant alerts from police increase awareness, public safety

Knowledge is power, and police in Plymouth and Plymouth Township are using an e-mail alert system to empower residents with knowledge that can help keep them safe.

Silent Partner Alert lets police quickly inform large numbers of people of dangerous road conditions, school emergencies, continuing crimes and other ongoing events, plus offer safety tips. Launched in the Plymouth area last fall, Silent Partner has provided advice on avoiding purse-snatchings and a warning about a scam aimed

at getting account information from Community Federal Credit Union members, among other alerts.

"This is our way of letting them know what is going on in the township," said Officer Jamie Senkbeil, who manages Silent Partner for the township under the supervision of detective Sgt. Steve Rapson.

Subscribers sign up for Silent Partner by providing an e-mail address; the addresses are compiled and used to send out the alerts en masse.

Recent alerts from the township have included a warning about black ice on local roads (there had been several spinouts), a notice that added traffic enforcement would be focused on a particular subdivision, and information on the phone "phishing" scam targeting credit union customers.

"That was a very successful

alert," Senkbeil said.

Some subscribers reported receiving the scam phone call after reading the Silent Partner warning, Senkbeil said, and thus were ready for it. Some even stayed on the phone and gathered information to provide to police.

"It helped our detective bureau with the investigation," Senkbeil said. (The scam attempts appear to have stopped, she added.)

Silent Partner also alerted local subscribers when a man approached a group of schoolchildren, and, after a spate of purse-snatchings, gave tips on how women can guard against such thefts, Senkbeil said.

There were 551 subscribers

to the Plymouth and Plymouth Township Silent Partner system as of Wednesday morning, and Senkbeil would like to see that number increase.

"We would love to have that number larger. We would love to have more people subscribe to this system," she said.

Subscribe to Plymouth Township and Plymouth's Silent Partner network through the police department link on either community's Web site, or directly through the provider's Web site, www.silentpartneralert. com. Although telephone and textmessage alerts can be chosen, the Plymouth-area network only offers e-mail alerts.

Suspected shoplifters arrested

Plymouth Township police recovered more than \$1,400 worth of apparently stolen merchandise after making four arrests Friday afternoon in a shoplifting incident at the Kmart on Ann Arbor

Many of the packaged items appeared to have been taken from stores in Plymouth and Canton townships, a Plymouth Township Police Department report said, including an Aco hardware store, a Hallmark and CVS and Rite Aid drug stores. Merchandise that could be identified as coming from specific companies was returned to them, police said. The report did not detail the merchandise.

The items were found in six shopping bags that were sitting in a 1998 Ford Escort that officers stopped in the Kmart parking lot shortly before 5 p.m. because its occupants were suspected of shoplifting, the report said.

ng, the report said. A Kmart security employee reported seeing one suspect, later identified as a 41-year-old Inkster woman, in the store's health department concealing contact lens cases and packages of lip balm in her purse and a bottle of vitamins in her coat pocket, police said, while a boy acted as a lookout. The boy was later identified as the suspect's 12-year-old son, police said. The items stolen from Kmart were recovered; police said they totaled \$71.23.

Two other women, 20 and 18, both of Romulus, were arrested in the same incident, police said.

license plate, a police report said.


Stopped south of Ann Arbor Road, she initially gave a false name, police said.





District right to look at programs

When the Florida Marlins won the World Series in 1997, team ownership - forced by economic conditions not of its own making - decided it was better for the franchise as a whole to tear down its foundation, get rid of its expensive players and start fresh.

When new administrators moved into the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools hierarchy, bringing a fresh set of eyes to the budget picture in the district, they decided — forced by economic conditions not of their own making - some programs needed review and, perhaps, change.

Faced with legislation that was going to force them to send out existing contracts for bid anyway, the new administration decided at least one of those programs - the food service program - could be done more efficiently in-house rather than with a contractor.

The decision raised eyebrows, and a few hackles, because Sodexho, the management company that had ably run the program for more than 20 years, has been a good partner. The program has been a solid revenue stream, having returned some \$78,000 to the district as recently as last year.

Still, the program was going to face some challenges. First, the legislation that required a re-bid was surely going to bring in some other food-service hopefuls; in today's economy, it's possible Sodexho would have lost the contract anyway.

Secondly, the program — which produces some 1.6 million meals a year, according to district officials - was beginning to see a decline in meals served, which would have triggered rising prices. The district wanted to avoid that and, in fact, believes it can actually

save some 5 to 6 cents per meal.
So James Larson-Shidler, the district's new assistant superintendent for business services, had a consultant come in to crunch some numbers and offer an opinion on whether the district could run the program more efficiently in-house. The consultant looked at the books and offered an opinion: Yes, you can.

Here's the rub that raised the aforementioned hackles: The consultant was reportedly a friend of Larson-Shidler's from Toledo. That friend, the story goes, is now in line to replace longtime food services director Teresa Allen, one of three Sodexho employees whom the district can't rehire because the Sodexho contract makes it cost-prohibitive.

We agree that would look fishy, but Larson-Shidler has been adamant no such move is being contemplated. The hiring of a new food services director, the district has adamantly proclaimed, will be an open process. There's no reason to doubt that.

Meanwhile, some 85 of 88 food-service workers are keeping their jobs. The district plans no cuts in staffing, and would probably rehire the three Sodexho employees, including Allen, if the company would provide contractual relief to do so.

In a frighteningly stagnant economy, a school district already facing a potential \$3 million deficit is duty-bound to look everywhere for possible savings. Looking at programs such as food service, transportation and the like keeps cuts out of the classroom, at least for now.

Finding efficiencies in non-educational areas - even popular, well-run ones like the food service program - vs. forcing educational side effects such as increased class sizes?

Which do the critics find more palatable?

School funding

We, as residents of Michigan, are experiencing one of the most severe recessions in our state's history. The private sector has experienced a dramatic reduction in business activity and, as a result, jobs have been lost, benefits reduced and wages cut back.

Private-sector employees (taxpayers) have been forced to make great economic sacrifices. The purpose of this letter is to illustrate how public employees (in this case, teachers) could participate in an effort to share the sacrifice.

This economic crisis has resulted in diminished tax revenues both for our schools and state and local governments. Michigan hit double-digit inflation last month at 10.6 percent, the highest monthly rate surge since 1984. The state bled 173,000 jobs in 2008. Housing prices have collapsed and a lockup in lending has created the worst financial crisis since the 1930s. University of Michigan economists are forecasting that by the end of 2010, the auto industry will employ less than one-third of the workers it did 10 years ago.

This contraction in the state's revenue base will continue into the foreseeable future. Revenues are a function of the number of working taxpayers, the number of profitable businesses, the level of salaries, wages and benefits paid and the level of tax rates.


We are facing a critical time in our history, with the possible collapse of our auto industry. Not only have jobs been lost, but in the case of the automobile industry, higher-paid workers are being replaced by lower-paid ones. The federal government has demanded a further reduction in UAW wages and benefits as a condition for federal loan assistance. Salaried automobile employees and retirees also have experienced significant benefit eliminations and reductions.

In my opinion, a decision to raise taxes while not significantly reducing costs does not constitute an equitable solution for private-sector employees and retirees. Any business entity with a declining revenue base is required to make a commensurate reduction in costs or that entity will eventually collapse.

While I place tremendous value on the role teachers play in our community, I continue to observe limited, short-sighted attempts to reduce costs in our school system. One example of this is the elimination of teaching positions (thereby increasing class size) and valuable programs. These cost-saving measures don't make sense because they further erode the revenue base (thereby exacerbating the problem) and have a profoundly negative impact on our children's education.

When one looks into the educational budget of our local schools, it becomes abundantly clear there are more sensible, effective means of cost reduction. For example, the largest portion of the educational budget is in wages and benefits. In my local community (Plymouth-Canton) the 2008-09 budget for salaries and benefits for teachers is \$97 million (fringe benefits account for 30 percent of the total). Automatic "step" salary increases are given to teachers annually. These automatic, annual increases range from 4.7 to 8.7 percent for the first 10 years of a teacher's career (with a bachelor's degree). These are not merit-based, but are automatic, based strictly on seniority.

In Plymouth-Canton's case, elimination of these step salary increases alone would save approximately \$2.3 million in annual cost increases. Also, given that benefits provided to teachers add 42 percent to salary compensation, a benefit freeze could be implemented. A benefit or wage freeze for other administrative and support positions could also provide additional savings (wages and benefits for all personnel represent 88

percent of the total school budget).

Longer-term action should then be a comprehensive, impartial evaluation of salaries and health care benefits as compared to competitive plans provided in the private sector and to teacher salary and benefit levels in other states. Also, a structural review of administrative costs supporting the classroom should be undertaken. These actions would demonstrate that public-supported employees recognize the exceptional financial burdens placed on the backs of Michigan taxpayers and are willing to make a meaningful "shared sacrifice."

It would be refreshing to have a public forum to discuss this matter and I would call upon our leaders to do so. While I discussed the educational system extensively, I believe this is a fairness issue that is applicable to all state government. It is critical that dialogue should begin now and not be tabled for future discussion.

The real reason I am writing this letter is to let the community know that she has been a no show at the PCCS board meetings. Following is Mrs. Gonzales' attendance record:

- Regular board meetings: absent on 10/14/08, 2/10/09.
- Special board meetings: absent on 12/02/08

- Executive board meetings: absent on
- **■** Curriculum committee meetings: absent on 10/10/08, 11/07/08, 12/05/08, 1/09/09 and 2/06/09.

■ Policy committee meetings: absent on 10/23/08, 01/29/09 and 2/19/09.

From September 2008 to present, Mrs. Gonzales has missed four of 13 board meetings, equivalent to a 23-percent absentee rate. Mrs. Gonzales sits on Policy and Curriculum Committees as well, a part of her duty as an elected school board official. Mrs. Gonzales has missed eight of 12 of those meetings, a 66-percent absentee rate for those committee meetings.

Is this what we expect from our elected officials? I do not think so, although there is one benefit from this: Our school district has saved \$360 by not having to pay her the \$30 stipend for her meetings she gets compensated for attending.

Probably the most important meeting she missed was an executive meeting on Feb. 12 to begin contract negotiations. All this absenteeism has occurred in a six-month period of time. Mrs. Gonzales, I think it is time you show up for work that the residents have elected you to do, or resign. In the real world you would be, as Donald Trump puts it so well, "Fired!"



Dietrich Lever, who unfortunately for KLAA foes won't be a senior for two more years, added 11 points for the winners. "Senior Night' is big for the guys — they





Lepper pulls inspiring reversal on adversity

ike a lot of Americans, I'm constantly searching for a dose of inspiration to help offset the gloomy headlines and dismal economic forecasts that greet us like menacing clouds most mornings.

That's why I paid extra close attention to the words of Salem wrestler Sam Lepper during a recent interview I conducted with him in a second-floor Salem classroom, just a stone's throw from the wrestling room where the senior's inspirational story has been written

While Lepper is not a hero — at least in the police officer/firefighter/Spider-man sense of the word — his uplifting story of perseverance, resilience and ultimate triumphs can teach us all a thing or two about executing a stunning reversal when adversity seems to have both of our shoulder blades pinned to the mat.

In the beginning ...

Following the urging of a football teammate his freshman year at Salem, Lepper joined the school's

At least 35 times that winter — he's not sure of the exact number — Lepper

competed in varsity matches in the 160-pound weight class.

And every time each of those 35-plus matches ended, the referee lifted the right arm of Lepper's triumphant opponent.

Lepper went 0-for-the-2005-06 season.

No relief

The grueling practices that fell in between the series of losses weren't trips to Disney World either, Lepper remembered.

"I was usually paired up at practice with Jeremy Epley my freshman

Beginning Sunday, March 1, customers coming into Dunk N Dogs Spa in Livonia can not only wash their dog but pray. The Rev. Claudia Barber says as long as pets are under control and not trying to eat their neighbors, they're welcome to attend All Creatures Universal Life Church. The service allows humans to worship with their pets.

"I think it's a really good idea," said Sharon Robinet, spa owner. "People like me who are single and have a lot of animals do almost everything with their animals. They go almost everywhere with me. Now I can incorporate them into my spiritual life."

Robinet likes the idea so much she's renting space to Barber at a reduced rate. As a business owner. the Redford woman spends long hours away for home so it was only natural that when Barber approached her with the idea of holding services at the shop, she was all ears.

For many church-goers, Sundays usually mean leaving their pets behind to attend to spiritual needs. Not anymore. Beginning March 1 and every Sunday thereafter, Barber will be holding regular services for pets of all kinds and their owners in the 1,000-square-foot indoor

dog park at the spa which usually functions as a self serve pet wash and doggie day-care, grooming and obedience training facility as well as a cat rescue.

'What's nice is we're all animal people. We've all been to church where you line up in the parking lot for a blessing but it's only once a year and never inside. Why not have a weekly service where people can come with their animals?" said Robinet. "We have no idea how many people will be there or what kind of animals they're bringing so we decided everybody has to be on a leash or in a crate or carrier. We don't want birds or cats to set off the dogs."

Barber says pets must be up-todate on vaccinations and friendly to people and other pets. She plans to bring her four dogs and six birds to

"My pets have done so much to help me spiritually as well as emotionally to connect more to God that it's a shame I have to leave them home. I want them to share this part of my life with me. In addition to leading the services she provides Christian counseling for owners whose pets are ill or have died.

"It's not a fancy church atmosphere. I didn't approach any churches but wanted to have a place where there wouldn't be a problem if a dog has an accident," said Barber, of Dearborn Heights. "I've already had several people respond to the flyers I've been putting out. I've sent e-mails to all the rescues trying to get the word out and put ads on Craig's List.

"I believe what the bible says that God created all the creatures, human and otherwise. Jesus said when the smallest sparrow falls God knows. I believe they will be in heaven, that all creatures go back to





CHALONE AVA

Although Monterey County may be the most diverse of all California growing regions, when it comes to temperature, the Chalone AVA has the most variability due to its lack of coastal influence.

During July and August, temperatures hit 90 degrees, but overall from April through October the range is 55 to 72 degrees. Due to elevations exceeding 2,300 feet, Chalone AVA has relatively warm

nighttime temperatures. Add this to a general aspect of Monterey County, that grapevines tend to produce buds about two weeks earlier than other regions and harvest, typically begins two weeks later then other regions. This means that grapes remain on the vine approximately a month longer, producing smaller berries with concentrated flavors.

CARMEL VALLEY AVA

Hill, \$60.

Hillside vineyard locations in the Carmel Valley Ridges make this region special. Hillside vineyard locations and those at higher elevations generally have warmer nightime temperatures also.

Carmel Valley experiences more hours of afternoon fog-like conditions than any other AVA in Monterey County. Grapes remain cool and retain acid that makes them ideal food companions.


The seaside town of Carmel and the Carmel Valley AVA should not be confused. The AVA is rugged back country with high elevations above 1,000 feet and steep slopes with granite terraces.

2007 Galante Vineyards Sauvignon, \$25, may seem a strange "pick" given what we've just written about red wines, but if you like sauvignons with lots of grapefruit and lime aromas with spice and vanilla notes and a long, satisfying finish, seek out this wine.





Realtors keep their spirits up in tough market

Local Realtors agree it's a tough time to keep their enthusiasm, but they focus on helping clients keep their chins up.

"Since I've joined this team, I'm very optimistic," said Realtor Nancy Austin, with Keller Williams Realty. Her license is in Saline, but she works leads in western Wayne and southern Oakland counties.

Buyers are there," said Austin, a Canton resident. "Most of them are first-time buyers." In her 25 years in the field, she's enjoyed working with first-time buyers.

"Absolutely, without a doubt," Austin said of this being the toughest time in her profession. When she started, interest rates were 17-20 per-


"This is triple the difficulty level. It's much more difficult than anything I've ever been through."

One person she knows calls Austin "Pollyanna" for her relentless optimism. "I put on my blinders and I just keep on going. I pray a lot. I make sure I surround myself with positive people.

"I know what has to be done and I do

it. You've got to keep going." She's fortunate in that 80-90 percent of her business comes through referrals, based on her data bank "of wonderful clients." She joined her current team last August "and almost immediately started to notice a differ-

Team leader Andy Piper is Internetsavvy. "He is just phenomenal," Austin



said. "That's made a big, big difference. I get leads almost every day."

She'd been with her old team 12 years, and it was tough but necessary

Agreeing it's a challenging time is Dale E. Smith, executive vice president of the Western Wayne Oakland County Association of Realtors. "Very much so," said Smith, a West Bloomfield resident.

Once professionals get over the initial shock, they can hone up on learning new skills to assist clients. The Farmington-based association offers extensive training, some in new areas.

"We're finding our members enjoy

coming to those classes," Smith said.

There's training on unintentional leasing, generally a different discipline focusing on helping the homeowner and including legal implications. WWOCAR offers basic courses in commercial real estate, through an alliance with the Commercial Board of Realtors.

WWOCAR has new appraiser courses, and a number of appraisers have joined the association. Smith noted sales numbers are improving, although property values remain in decline.

"I'm finding that our members are much more active than they were even two or three months ago," Smith said. He finds it's human nature to get

depressed over the current market; Smith has focused on visiting real estate offices to let pros know what's available, including client help for foreclosure and bankruptcy issues.

Realtor Will Weaver of Century 21 Town & Country in Troy has been in the field 11 years.

"It is tough to stay motivated," said Weaver, a Madison Heights resident who agreed this is the toughest market he's seen. Waking up with the thought of helping is necessary: "Then you feel a little better," he said.

Weaver finds it's best to get to the office daily by 9 a.m., pick up the phone and find people in distress. If he talks to two-three homeowners daily and helps them, he gets help as

"Then it can build more motivation for the next day," Weaver said. "That's really the most important thing. The more people you can help, the more help you'll get yourself."

Weaver doesn't see Michigan's housing market improving soon, not until 2011 or 2012. "Our economy is centered around the auto industry," he said, noting layoffs in the Big Three. An extra house selling tomorrow will improve statistics for sales, but he doesn't see days of properties moving quickly coming soon.

Weaver is a state-certified real estate educator, including the Foreclosure Avoidance Comprehensive Training program. In training he's received and given, his focus is helping agents and homeowners avoid foreclo-

Check with lawyer to protect interests

Q: One of the units in our condominium which owes our association assessments is being foreclosed upon by an assignee of the mortgage company. Our lien was recorded prior to the time of that assignment from the first mortgagee to the new mortgage company. Do we have any recourse?

A: In several decisions in which our firm has been involved, we have been successful in getting a circuit

necessary in protecting the interest of the association visà-vis mortgagees who are, of course, engaged in foreclosing condominium units. You are best advised to consult with an attorney knowledgeable about community association law and mortgagee priority to ensure that your interests are protected.

Q: Our developer has walked away from the project and left us with only a mortgage company to assist in the operation of the association. The mortgage company doesn't want to assume any of the back responsibilities of the developer and says that it has no such responsibility. What do you think?

A: It of course depends upon the facts of each case including the manner in which the mortgage company took over from developer. The mortgage company may well be a successor developer and may well have liability for many, if not all, of developer's responsibilities depending upon the nature of the arrangement between the mortgage company and the developer and the number of units that the mortgagee took over from the developer. You are best advised to consult with an experienced and aggressive community association attorney who will have the ability to negotiate vigorously with the mortgage company as frequently they have the power and willingness to play hardball with community associations who they presume


"They actually honeymooned in Toledo," explained Diehr. "But they've made up for it since."

But that doesn't mean you shouldn't enjoy all the hoopla surrounding the actual event.







HOW TO BUDGET FOR YOUR WEDDING

1) Establish a budget, by determining how much you can afford to spend, providing some "wiggle room" for expenses which end up higher than expected.

2) Monitor your spending. Some experts suggest setting up a separate wedding account, with all wedding expenses drawn solely from this account. Your monthly statement will then provide an itemized list of

how much is being deposited and spent.

3) Be ready to spend more, because inevitably, there will be expenses you either hadn't expected or hadn't budgeted enough for. Examples: overtime fees at the reception, tipping the vendors, a larger guest list than anticipated. Make small changes to your personal lifestyle to offset the higher wedding costs.

4) Stick to your guns. Even though you need to be prepared to spend more, you need to be very cautious about spending more for vendors who try to "up-sell" their services. Couples are encouraged to prioritize what they want before meeting with vendors.
