# About face

# Students honored for turning things around

When Samantha Thompson's mother died some five years ago, she was angry — at life, at her mom, at pretty much everything.

A Fenton resident at the time, Thompson at one point failed every class she was taking She was soon shuffled to different school districts, including Clarkston and Dearborn Heights, before landing in the Plymouth-Canton Community

It was in Dearborn Heights where her life really spiraled downward. Her studies suffered, she started making bad choices, hanging out with what she now calls "the wrong people." She was busted stealing at Westland Shopping Center and ended up in the Growth Works program for troubled teens.

And it was in Plymouth-Canton where she started to turn it all around. That's why she was one of 25 students honored Thursday at the 13th annual **Turnaround Achievement** Awards ceremony.

"After my mom died, I was very angry at everyone," acknowledged Thompson, a senior at Salem High School. "I started making pretty bad choic-

better - Allie Suffety of the coed Student Service Center (now an interim assistant principal at Salem High School). Suffety's friendly manner and honest counsel helped Thompson, now a mostly A-B student, see the error of her ways.

"He offered a friendly hand," Thompson said of Suffety. "He'd talk to me about things I really needed to talk about.

Thompson downplays his role, pointing out that Thompson, like the other students honored the last 13 years, saw things that needed to be changed and developed the desire to change them.

Her success, Suffety said, finally came because she started believing in herself.

"Samantha is indicative of the power of buying into something," Suffety said. "She's been somewhere where it's difficult to find a sense of self. The one thing she did (to succeed) is buy into herself.

That's the crux of the reason all of the students are honored at the Turnaround Achievement Awards. Sponsored annually by Community Bowling Centers, the awards are designed to recognize students who have made a significant change in their lives. They're celebrated for the changes they've made, whether they were in their academic or personal lives.

# Police could cut outreach programs

The Plymouth Township Police Department's community outreach may be curtailed as township officials look for savings to balance a recession-related revenue

Police Chief Tom Tiderington, following a Tuesday meeting with the Board of Trustees, said that while no final decisions have been made, programs like the citizens police academy, the police booth at Plymouth's Fall Festival, and having officers speak to homeowners groups could be dropped or cut back in order to save money.

"We're not going to be able to do all of the things that we've done in the past," Tiderington said. He said he would attempt to staff community programs with officers already scheduled for duty, without having to call others in on overtime.

We'll have to look at the requests as they come in and make a determination," he said. Trustees on Tuesday appeared to be supportive of that direction.

'We can't provide everything we've provided in the past, and we know that," said Trustee Kay Arnold.

Tiderington said he will draw up for board members a list of major community outreach activities and their estimated costs

The police TEAM program (Teaching Educating and Mentoring), which provides resource officers to public schools in the township, appears to be safe. Two officers work in the program, with the principal resource officer spending 60 to 70 percent of her work week on it, the chief said.

TEAM officers interact with students, teachers and parents and handle schoolrelated issues ranging from parking problems to bomb threats, Tiderington said. Without them, he told the board, officers on regular patrols would have to spend time in the schools responding to such issues. The police department has 30 officers, including the chief, as officials decided against filling a vacancy due to budget concerns. In addition, an officer was laid off late last year, just a few months after being hired. The police budget is about \$4 million this

Tiderington said he has not been authorizing overtime except when needed to investigate major crimes or when the department faces a shortage of officers available for patrol.

The trustees' Tuesday meeting, which had been planned the previous week, came on the day Gov. Jennifer Granholm announced nearly \$350 million in state budget cuts, including cuts in aid to communities. The move means the township will lose nearly \$97,000, according to a Department of Treasury document.

'We've cut all around here, and it's not going to get any better," said Treasurer Ron Edwards. He estimated the township stands to lose as much as \$300,000 this year if the state aid cut trend continues.

"Right now, I'm trying to save as many dollars as I can around here," he said.



# Former band director takes reins of Alabama college band

The fact Amy Boerma won't be directing either of her bands the rest of the year at the Plymouth-Canton Educational Park didn't keep her from fronting a band

Boerma, currently on paid administrative leave pending reassignment, spent Friday and Saturday leading an all-star concert bands at the Jacksonville (Ala.) State High School Honor Band concert this weekend.

Boerma, who until recently had headed up the wind ensemble and varsity bands at P-CEP, is excited for the

Alabama opportunity.

"I've never done anything like this, and I think it's going to be a blast," Boerma said. "These are the top players from all over Alabama and Georgia."

According to Clint Gillespie, assistant director of bands at Jacksonville State, the concert features 476 musicians chosen from some 1,500 applicants from Alabama, Georgia and a couple of schools in Tennessee, all recommended by their band directors and chosen by faculty at the university.

The students were divided into five different bands, spent the day rehearsing Friday and then put on a concert for a huge crowd including between

7,000 and 8,000 parents at the university's Pete Matthews Coliseum.

Boerma was chosen to lead one of the five bands - the "White" concert band - based on the reputation she developed in 14 years leading various bands in the Plymouth-Canton system.

"We knew her through her excellent work with the concert bands," Gillespie said. "She's always received superior ratings with all of her groups, whether they were the younger or the older groups. Word travels quickly in the music world when you're good."

Boerma, who once turned down a chance to direct at the Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp because of scheduling conflicts, was excited about being able to take on this opportu-

"I'll be working with the top kids coming in and choosing to spend two days to put together a concert," Boerma said before departing. "It's kids who love to play their horns and want to make music. It'll be a lot of







# High school students find reward working with others

They're high school kids from two totally different programs who come together during the school week to play Wii, shoot some hoops, toss around a football and

even fly kites. It's an eight-week pilot program that pairs students from Cambridge Alternative High School with high school-aged teens in Garden City's autistic program. The program draws students from the 34 school districts in Wayne County, including the Plymouth-Canton community.

After three weeks of interaction, the program is showing promise of being offered as a class in the 2009-2010 school

"It seems like a really good fit to mold the two programs together," said Debbie Eves, assistant director of adult and community education. "We wanted to get students more integrated into the high school, many come from other districts."


The Cambridge students, who have to have better grades and be community minded, teach their Burger counterparts to be good sports and show them coping skills by playing games, taking community walks or trips to the store. In the process, they build up their own self-esteem and improve their competencies.

Brandon Coffey of Westland was one of those students who "wasn't on the right path," but has changed a lot since enrolling at Cambridge. He's "done a 180" and is applying it to the program, he said.

He likes interact with the kids and gravitates to those who want to be by themselves. He's been able to get one boy who isn't always willing to participate to shoot some hoops.

"I love it, I look forward to doing it," said the 18-year-old. "It's something I enjoy doing."

Working with the Burger students isn't anything new for 17-year-old Carlton Smith of Detroit. His mother works with special needs people. He helps the Burger

students play basketball and catch a football. Gabriel Young II of Detroit adds Wii and UNO to the mix. His favorite activities is a split between basketball and playing Wii Guitar Hero and bowling.

They're really good at it, they win most of the time and I'm not trying to let them win," he said. "They beat me at it."

According to Burger teacher Eric Selix, the program is something that can be looked at with the restructuring of the autistic program. Older students will be moved to Burger West, with the Burger center on the east side of town housing toddlers through middle schoolers.

"It's something we looked at doing now with a look to the future when the organization is more homogeneous," he said. "It's a cooperative relationship that can extend itself through the years."

The students have done some cooking, had a birthday celebration and done some community walks to local stores to work on group skills in a retail setting. There also may be a trip to the Wayne Recreation Center pool for a swim day.

"I think that'll be really fun," said James Rollinson of Westland who has helped the Burger students pick out food at the Kroger store on Middlebelt and how to use a crosswalk not "run through the parking lot."

The students are keeping anecdotal logs, jotting down what they see happening. The data will be used to evaluate and enhance the program.

We want it to be rewarding for the students," said Eves. "We may be able to create a class with credit as along as the data supports it and shows students are getting something out of it."

Taraylen Ford of Dearborn has learned a few things from the interaction.

"It really has taught me take advantage of life and to respect people who are different from me," she said. "At first, I was kind of nervous, it was the first time I was around people with special needs, but I've learned their language now. My student relates more to me because I've learned his language."

Burger teacher Carrie Olson said the two groups of students getting together has brought about change. The Burger students seem to be more willing to break out of their patterns.

"One student recently started being closer to the group.," she said. "He's off in a corner and he's still not part of the group, but he is closer to the group. He's becoming more socially aware."

The program lasts 90 minutes and Eves said they're finding the students are getting "a lot of altruistic rewards" because

"They now think 'I'm here because I'm needed, 'I'm here because someone is counting on me," she said. "And it gives them something bigger to count on. I think it's been rewarding for everybody."






But Broas, who is majoring in textile design, said CCS is considered one of the country's leading art schools and has a challenging program that meets her needs.


It was the first time the Salvation Army collected food from Belleville, one of the five areas - Plymouth, Plymouth Township, Canton and Northville being the others -





# Rep shares officials' frustration over cuts

BY MATT JACHMAN OBSERVER STAFF WRITER

Local officials are frustrated that, at a time when they're already cutting budgets, the state is withholding money for which they'd planned, meaning further belt-tightening.

The local government is where the rubber meets the road when it comes to municipal services," said Plymouth City Manager Paul Sincock about delivering those services with less money.

"This stuff is changing on a daily basis, and it's becoming very, very difficult," said Plymouth Township Treasurer Ron Edwards. "We're trying to do the best we can to deliver the services."

The two were responding to Tuesday's executive-order budget cuts by Gov. Jennifer Granholm, which will mean the loss of about \$36,000 for Plymouth, which is in the final two months of its fiscal year, and nearly \$97,000 for the township.

Sincock said Plymouth officials have been scaling back for some time in anticipation of the current downturn. The state, however, has procrastinated, he said.

"Lansing's very slow to react to their budget issues," Sincock

Rep. Marc Corriveau understands.

"Obviously, times are tough

and they're all concerned, as we are at the state," said Corriveau, a Democrat from Northville who also represents Plymouth and Plymouth Township in the state House of Representatives. Corriveau met with officials from communities in his district on Friday morning.

But given the state revenue shortfall, which Granholm's office blamed on the recession and the shakeup in the domestic automobile industry, the House and Senate appropriations committees were "left with no choice" but to approve the governor's cuts, Corriveau said. The cuts totaled almost \$350 million.

Corriveau didn't disagree with Sincock's assessment.

"I think he's frustrated," Corriveau said. "For the last, going on a decade, local municipalities have been getting less and less from the state." It's a longstanding financial problem that's been passed from Legislature to Legislature, he said.


"I'm doing my best to rightsize state government," he said. Corriveau said he's optimistic about job-creation efforts but that it will be a while before the results take root and show up in the treasury.


"We just need to keep working together," he said.


suppliers have shipped parts without getting paid," McElroy said. "Which in a sense is like a loan, but unsecured. If a company goes bankrupt, generally they're flat out of luck.

"But, Yazaki almost certainly will get its money back," he said. "The federal government has agreed to funnel money through Chrysler and General Motors to pay their suppliers. The federal government has also made money available to suppliers to guarantee their receivables.

"Even if Chrysler doesn't pay the money, the federal government will pay them." Chrysler also owes Johnson

Controls Inc., of Milwaukee which has facilities in Plymouth Township - \$50.3 million, which is third on the list of the top 50 unsecured creditors. Other unsecured creditors of Chrysler include Visteon Corp. in Van Buren Township, \$25.6 million; Varity Kelsey Hayes in Livonia, \$10.1 million; and GT Technologies Inc. in Westland, \$5.1 million.





Q: Dear Rick: I heard that General Motors, in their latest restructuring plan, was doing a reverse stock split. Can you explain a reverse stock split? I currently own 1,000 shares of General Motors stock.

A: General Motors has filed a new plan of reorganization with the Securities and **Exchange Commission that** 



stock split is a 2-for-1 which means that for every one receive two

shares of General Motors and they had a 2-for-1 stock split, you would have 2,000 shares.

The opposite happens in a reverse stock split. Following the split, you own less shares. According to the plan proposed by GM, the split is 1for-100. That means for every 100 shares of General Motors stock you own in the new reorganized company, you will receive one share of stock. So instead of owning 1,000 shares you would own 10 shares.





"When he hit that home run, it changed everything. It put us right back in the game. It was a huge hit."



# Will it be easy to get ripped off?

any years ago when I first started writing this column I used to tell you stories about homeowners being ripped off by different service industries and how involved I was in getting restitution for these consumers.

Yes, most of these were appliance cases, but there were other fields as well and basically I went to wherever Esther Shapiro, the past direc-

tor of Detroit Consumer Affairs, asked me to go. Many times I acted as an expert witness for homeowners who filed a claim with their local district court

with a copy of the Michigan Consumers Protection Act. This was the tool that people could afford to use in small claims cases when trying to right a wrong without the expense of hiring an attorney. I can tell you that in all of the many cases, when I was helping a consumer who had been ripped off by an appliance repair company, that customer got their money back plus some. This is not the way it's going to work from now on. The Consumer Protection Act isn't worth the paper it's written on.

Frank Kelley, the long standing attorney general in Michigan was in office when the Consumer Protection Act became law in 1976. He says he's sick over what has happened to this Michigan law which was praised as the best there was in the whole country. I am tired of legislators who profess their desires to help others and give back to their country, but are pulling the

wool over everybody's eyes. Today we have an attorney general who loves to see his name in lights and doing seminars on worthy projects which might just propel him to be the governor someday. Where has he been? Why hasn't he helped the very consumers who voted him into office? Isn't his job designed to protect the people?

#### **EXEMPTED BUSINESSES**

Every year I receive the complaints list of businesses that are most often listed in communications with the attorney general's office. For the past 10 years, the list has usually been the same. Now here is what is totally bewildering: The Michigan Supreme Court has ruled that businesses regulated by other laws are no longer subject to the Michigan Consumer Protection Act. Some of the exempted businesses are: Banks, mortgage brokers, debt collectors, finance companies, home builders, home improvement contractors, new and

used car dealers, auto repair shops, funeral homes, plumbers and electricians. Now here is something that is absolutely strange! Some of these industries I've just mentioned are the worst of the worst. How can they be exempted?

Does all this mean that we consumers have to depend on the agencies in Lansing that regulate these different industries? As far as I'm concerned, they've done very little these past 25 years. Michigan now ranks as one of the two most unprotected States in the country when it comes to consumer protection laws.

No longer will the Michigan homeowner be able to stand in front of a magistrate and hold up a copy of the Consumer Protection Act and profess to a court of law that what a certain company did to them is against the law. You will have to hire a lawyer to do what you could at one time do yourself. Maybe it's time Frank Kelley took up residence in his old office. The first question I would ask Mr. Kelley is, "Frank, how many of our current state legislators are attorneys?"



Adventure '09" game. Now in its sixth year of operation, this high-tech treasure-hunting game lures people armed with GPS units to find caches hidden in 11 Huron-Clinton Metroparks. Eleven volunteers put the game together this year by hiding a cache, or a box with trinkets or treasures inside, in their assigned park. "The Metroparks was one of the first park systems in Michigan to encourage geocaching, and we wanted to help out," said Greg Crump, of Harrison Township, this year's game coordinator. "We've received many good comments from other geocachers on how much they enjoy the Metroparks game, and that we are carrying on the tradition. This is truly from the heart; everyone really looks forward to doing the Metroparks game." Volunteers have hidden caches at Hudson Mills, Huron Meadows, Indian Springs, Kensington, Lake Erie, Lower Huron, Metro Beach, Oakwoods, Stony Creek, Willow and Wolcott Mill Metroparks.

To get started, find the game location coordinates of the MGA09 caches listed on www. geocaching.com. A game brochure, with the crossword puzzle, can be downloaded from this site or the Metroparks Web site, www.metroparks. com. An annual picnic/geocaching event will be held on Saturday, Sept. 12, at Indian Springs Metropark.

Geocaching, or treasure hunting with a GPS unit, is an international sport. A cache is a hidden box that typically contains a visitor's log plus trinkets, such as toys, knick-knacks or refrigerator magnets. Thousands of caches are hidden worldwide. Players are honor-bound to leave a treasure if they take a treasure from a cache. Once the cache is found, cachers can sign the

log, and post their find on the geocaching Web site.

# Mothers provide strong role models for their children

Mothers teach children valuable life lessons. The Observer & Eccentric communities are filled with women who work hard to support their families while silently demonstrating a compassion for all human beings.

Juliann Tuthill of Canton let us know about Gladys Gotts, who turned 104 on May 4. A few may remember the family's farm on Ridge, between Ford and Cherry Hill, where the Gottses grew sweet corn and melons and raised milk cows. Her daughter Dorothy Richards especially admires the strength her mother showed when Richards' father Percy died at age 53 and Gladys had to sell the 80 acres of land in the 1960s. "I was 20-something when dad died, but had a younger sister still at home," said Richards, 76, of Canton. "My mother went to work at Julian on the corner of Canton Center and Ford as a clerk. It was a gas station and sold groceries like a party store. She waited on customers and dished up ice cream. She wasn't a person to complain and always had a smile on her face."

A friend eventually got Gladys a job at the Ford plant in Ypsilanti.

"She worked in the office until she retired as a secretary," Richards said. "She persevered. She's a durable strong woman, but gentle. She's very healthy except for breaking her hip at 100. She asks for no help at all at the assisted living home. She doesn't complain."

Becoming a father made Brian Spuck appreciate his mother Alice even more. Alice and Earl Spuck married in 1971 and raised two sons in Canton.

"You don't reflect upon the sacrifices they made to help you achieve your goals or dreams," said Brian Spuck, of Rochester Hills. "It's positive reinforcement that you can do it. They have confidence in us. That goes for my dad, too."

#### TRAVELING TOGETHER

Brian Spuck's memories of family trips remain today, including ones to compete with his Livonia soccer team.

"We took family trips to northern Ontario to my mom's family cottage, where we learned to appreciate the outdoors and nature," Spuck said. "We would take soccer trips. My soccer team would travel to Colorado, Florida, out east to Virginia and New York. It was a financial and time commitment from the time I was 5 through high school. I remember them being coaches when I was younger and just being there, my mom teaching my younger brother Doug's soccer team.

"They gave us the confi-

dence to know the difference between what's right and wrong, taught us to treat people the correct way, and to do the right thing. When you become a parent, you appreciate how much your parents have done for you and continue to do for you and the sacrifices they make. My dad would drive me from Canton to Utica for soccer practice in rush hour three days a week. They put our development first. What we learned from them we apply to the next generation.


Brian's wife Angie couldn't agree more. Her parents, Laurie and Jack Downs of Garden City, raised three children. Brian and Angie have three children as well — Katrina, 5, Matthew, 3, and Sophia, 20 months.

My mom is the strongest person I know," Angie Spuck said. "She's the oldest girl of six siblings and helped raised her siblings after her youngest sister had a closed head injury at 10. 



# Boot camp is the solution to dog's behavioral problems

fter Clancy's stellar performance in the St. Patrick's Day Parade in Royal Oak, my sister, Gwen, and I thought our worries were over. Finally our big blond Irish Wolfhound walked perfectly and never once tugged on the leash or ran off even though there were many distractions in this ultimate test of our obedience train-

ing. Clancv was the prime example of a well-trained dog. In the following months though he showed his true colors. Clancy once again was the

poster child for bad boys. We'd just returned from shopping at Joe Randazzo's market in Westland when he pulled an entire bunch of broccoli from the bag on the counter. He ate all three stalks and left the rubber band which

held the vegetables together. It was apparent that over the winter he'd forgotten all of his lessons. It was time to call Bonny Wainz, our trainer. She suggested we send him to boot camp to learn a few manners before he stole something poisonous or ran into the street and got hit by a car because he pulled the leash from our

Clancy left for Bonny's Boot Camp without looking back. He'd been working with Wainz for some time so he wasn't apprehensive about leaving with her. For Gwen and I it was a different story. Clancy had never been away from us since he was 8 weeks old. We

didn't want him to feel abandoned but we'd never forgive ourselves if he were hurt or killed.

Wainz tailors her program to the individual dog and only works with one dog at a time in the boot camp. Clancy was about to learn he was no longer in charge.


#### **SETTLING IN**

Day one she let him explore her house and meet her dogs, Windy, Fireball and Eclipse, before beginning training. Normally she places the dog in a crate before and after each session but Clancy was too big so he stayed in the kitchen. This seemed like an ideal alternative since "counter surfing" is one of his problems. Wainz spent a lot of time making and then leaving bologna sandwiches on the counter for him to snatch. The lesson reinforced the thinking that she was leader of the pack.

"While I was making the sandwich I declared two feet of space around me like an alpha dog declares a boundary while they're eating so no other dog can approach. If he came too close it was a body block and an 'Aaaat' (verbal warning)," said Wainz, owner of Alternative Canine Training. "Then I tried to set him up and left the room with a bologna sandwich on the kitchen table."

Wainz hid around the corner with her mystical acoustic bag which she threw at his feet to startle him when he went for the sandwich. The bag contains a chain inside but doesn't hurt the dog.

"It interrupts him so you can praise him for good behavior by saying 'good boy."

Every day Wainz set him up with different foods like liverwurst. Clancy was so clever he started stealing only when no one was watching so she had to set up a surveillance camera. For those who don't have equipment Wainz suggests placing food on a plastic bag or something that makes noise so you can hear the dog trying to steal.

In between the kitchen lessons, Wainz worked with Clancy on sit, stay, down and come. He already knew these but didn't always respond. Next she taught Clancy to walk on a loose leash and finally off leash.

#### COLLAR TUG

"Before you can teach them anything you have to teach them to respect and listen to you. You have to get their attention. To walk on a loose leash they have to watch you. If they're ahead they're taking the leadership position," said Wainz. "They have to respect the narrow spaces like door-

ways to go outside. They need to know that leaders go first through narrow spaces. I used the old-fashioned European way of teaching him by continually working to get him to come off leash by attaching a clothesline to the collar and then tugging on it when the dog fails to come when

For the real test, Wainz took Clancy to a dog park in Royal Oak and then walked him around the city. He passed with flying colors. Eight days after beginning the boot camp he was a welltrained dog, but what would happen when he returned home? Wainz showed us how to claim back our house from this stealing pooch. We blew up balloons and placed them on the kitchen counter and table to scare Clancy away from the broccoli we'd left there. Each program or

boot camp is tailored to the dog's problems. It worked. The moving objects left him leery of the broccoli. Next we walked through our neighborhood off leash. When he strayed I'd correct him with a Aaaat.

Wainz guarantees the training and I'm sure we'll need refresher sessions but I think we're on our way to having an obedient dog. Clancy has a strong personality so it just took longer than our first three wolfhounds. I just didn't think he would be 3 years old.

#### **Arthritis Today**

The causes of joint and muscle aching include rheumatoid arthritis, lupus arthritis, gouty arthritis, osteoarthritis and psoriatic arthritis. This list is just the beginning of reasons why one can experience aching and swollen joints. A number of infections such as Parvo B 19 virus can present as arthritis; numerous medications can cause side effects that appear exactly like rheumatoid arthritis or

Yet despite the list of known reasons for joint aching, instances occur when the doctor cannot find the cause of a patient's joint pain. At times, a thorough evaluation of the patient's history, physical findings, x-rays, other imaging and laboratory studies do not provide the information necessary for a diagnosis.

And without a diagnosis, a doctor is hard put to give a patient appropriate medications to treat the arthritis.

In such a case, how can a patient deal with the pain? First, the individual can be relieved that no underlying cancer, tumor or potentially life threatening problem exists. A thorough and sustained workup would uncover such conditions. Second, the individual should know that the vast majority of unsolved joint conditions eventually resolve. The body remains very good at healing itself.

Finally, the person with aching of unknown cause should make an effort to keep active, including daily exercise. Once the doctor has eliminated serious disease as the cause of arthritis, one can be assured that activity will not cause impairment. Rather, activity becomes the medicine of choice.





# Patients to benefit from hospital's residency program

Patient care has changed since Dr. Kenneth Grimm was a resident at the University of Michigan Health System in the mid-1990s. While good teachers have always emphasized the importance of communication and the patient-doctor relationship the two qualities became essential to training after the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education, which evaluates


and accredits medical residency programs in the United States, established six core competencies. Beginning in July 2010, St. Mary Mercy Hospital in Livonia will follow the guidelines when implementing a graduate medical education residency program through an affiliation with the University of Toledo College of Medicine. About a year ago, Grimm began working with third year medical students. The move to train residents elevates St. Mary's status as

a provider of medical education.

A family physician, Grimm co-directs the St. Mary GME program with Dr. Jeffrey Yanez, an internist. Both are on staff at the hospital. Grimm earned his undergraduate degree at Johns Hopkins University in Marvland, medical degree from the University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia and was chief resident at U-M. He is an instructor at U-M and the University of Toledo and taught in the residency program for the Oakwood Health System for 10 years. He practices family medicine at Infinity Primary Care at the St. Joseph Mercy Health System's Medical Center in Canton.

St. Mary will initially offer residencies in family and internal medicine with the intent to expand specialties. Length of residencies vary depending on the specialty.

"Graduate medical education is a huge step for the hospital," said Grimm of Canton. "The University of Toledo already has students rotating right now. They don't have degrees yet. The residency program to start in 2010 is to train those graduated from medical school. They have a restricted educational license. They have to do a residency program and eventually sit for exam and become board certified. Two years of residency are required before you get a license from Michi gan in family medicine. You wouldn't want a doctor to take care of you from just reading from a book. They can write prescriptions and orders but in a supervised setting. They will have an encounter videotaped with a patient. In family medicine we take the patient-doc-

tor relationship very seriously. bedside manner and communicating so the patient can understand you, not looking at disease but the patients."

Initially 12,000 patients a year will benefit from the residency program which is part of an agreement with Saint Joseph Mercy Health System and the university. St. Mary is a member of the Saint Joseph system

"Over the last 20 years residency changed to center more on the patient, providing high quality patient centered care," said Yanez who started his residency in 1989 and is currently on staff at St. Joseph Mercy Oakland. "A graduate medical program benefits patients, gives a whole different look and feel to the

hospital. There's an additional person asking about their history, when did your pain start. It's continuing medical education with daily conferences, case reviews. This should enhance patient care. For physicians there's nothing like an inquisitive student asking you why. My job is to have a resident for three years, to evaluate the residents to make sure the community is getting the finest care possible. Did the resident explain everything to you well? Did they wash their hands before they examined you?"

In addition to increasing the quality of care, the residency program is expected to bring about 300 jobs to the area and add up to \$30 million a year to the local economy.

"We've been planning the program in earnest for about two years," said David Spivey, president and CEO, St. Mary Mercy Hospital. "It evolved as a natural next step in the evolution of our hospital. We've grown every year, made investments in technology. It's going to allow us to more completely fulfill our vision to be a comprehensive community hospital. We expect only to grow over time. The residency program will bring faculty on, create educational opportunity for medical students. We've long been involved in training nursing students through relationships with Schoolcraft College and Madonna University, radiology techs, lab techs, physical therapy. For the longer term we hope from a strategic point many of the residents will stay in southeast Michigan and St. Mary and St, Joseph Mercy Health System.

Grimm fears that in the future demand for primary care physicians could exceed supply.

We're going to face work force issues," said Grimm. "The medical system is training about 90 percent in speciality, only 10 percent primary care. The program is going to increase the number of primary care physicians. Primary care residents usually stay in the area they train. I expect 50 percent will stay. For people in the area, that means improved quality of care. It's very good now but takes it to the next level with more ready access to primary care."

Since 2006, Buick's most elegant and, thus, high-priced, sedan has been the Lucerne. Replacing the LeSabre and Park Avenue when it launched as a 2006 model, the Lucerne remains planted firmly as Buick's flagship

The Lucerne is what Buick execs are calling "the contemporary embodiment of Buick's tradition of style, comfort and performance." However, any prestige associated with the Lucerne is due to its gene pool. The Lucerne shares its structure and chassis with its more popular, higher-classed corporate cousin, the Cadillac DTS.

The Lucerne also benefits from its kin, by being built alongside the DTS at General Motors' award-winning Detroit-Hamtramck Assembly Center.

This facility earned consecutive quality awards in 2004 and 2005 from J.D. Power and Associates -- a company that provides consumer ratings. In 2006, the plant finally won the coveted Bronze Quality award by placing third in quality among all plants in North and South America.

All those accolades don't translate into auto sales for the Lucerne, though. Being categorized as an entry-level luxury sedan, the Lucerne faces direct competition with fan favorites like the Chrysler 300, Ford Five Hundred and Mercury Sable. The Lucerne offers an attractive package, but lacks the refinement associated with luxury cars.

The current Lucerne is available in four trim levels: CX, CXL, CXS and Super. The CX comes with 16-inch alloy wheels, keyless entry, full power accessories, cruise control, power driver seat, an MP3-capable CD stereo with an auxiliary audio jack, satellite radio, steeringwheel audio controls and an auto-dimming rearview mirror.

The CXL adds 17-inch alloy wheels, leather upholstery, dual-zone automatic climate control, heated outside mirrors and a power passenger

The CXS comes with 18-inch alloy wheels, the Magnetic Ride Control adaptive suspension, driver-seat memory, heated front seats, a power tilt-telescoping steering wheel, a Harman Kardon audio system, a heated steering wheel, rain-sensing wipers, rear parking sensors and remote vehicle start.

The Lucerne Super, which we'll review in another column soon, adds a firmer version of the adaptive suspension, unique wheels and exterior styling touches, suede interior accents and a heated wood steering wheel.

Optional on all Lucernes are a CD changer, a sunroof, a lane departure warning system and a system that warns the driver when other vehicles enter the Buick's blind spots. Available on all but the base CX model are heated and cooled seats and a navigation system, while the CX and CXL can be equipped with a front bench seat that increases capacity to six people.

Four exterior colors added in 2008 were White Diamond, Crystal Red, Dark Mocha Metallic and Dark Crimson Metallic.

The Super features a cocoa/shale mixture, with cocoa on the instrument panel upper trim, door upper trim, steering wheel, carpet and floor mats, and shale on almost every other interior



room for five adults, or six with the optional front bench seat, the **Buick Lucerne is** one of the largest cars on the road. It offers something else not many of its imported competitors don't - the choice of either a V6 or V8 engine.

trim including seats, instrument panel lower trim and door lower trim. The cocoa/cashmere offering changes the look by placing cashmere on just about every other interior trim, including seats, instrument panel lower trim and door lower trim.

The CX and CXL are powered by a V6 that pushes out 197 horsepower. In addition, there is a V8 engine available on the CXL and standard on the CXS that is good for 275 horsepower; on the Super it's tuned to make 292 horsepower. All Lucernes share the same four-speed automatic

For whatever drawbacks it may have, the Lucerne has been highly touted for premium safety since it debuted. The current model keeps this reputation intact.

In National Highway Traffic Safety Administration crash tests, the Lucerne earned a perfect five-star rating for its protection of the driver and front passenger in frontal impacts. A four-star rating was given for side-impact protection of front and rear occupants.

There's a reason for these great ratings. The Lucerne's safety is provided by a litany of standard safety features. Every trim comes with anti-lock disc brakes, traction control, a tirepressure monitor, front side-impact airbags and full-length, head-protecting side curtain airbags at no added cost. But that's where the trims' safety similarities end. The invaluable stability control system and brake-assist features are only standard on the CXS and optional for the V8 version of the CXL.

The Lucerne's safety is matched by its practicality. The available touchscreen navigation

system uses signals from global-positioning satellites to locate the Lucerne's position and display it on a virtual map. This priceless device is integrated into the instrument panel for easy access. The system also lets you know where the nearest locations of gas stations, restaurants and other points of interest are upon your request.


Added navigational support is provided by OnStar's Turn-by-Turn navigation system - a standard feature installed on all Buicks. The Turn-by-Turn service allows drivers to talk in real time to an OnStar advisor, who in turn downloads complete step-by-step directions to the vehicle through the OnStar system. Audio cues are then automatically played through the vehicle's stereo system. This will allow drivers to reach their destination worry free, without even taking their hands off the wheel.

Overall, with the exception of a heated steering wheel, an upgraded version of OnStar and the offering of a few new color schemes, the current Lucerne is the same old, same old as previous models.


