Museum nets nearly \$47,000 on Web

The Plymouth Historical Museum received a welcome financial boost through last month's Community Foundation for Southeast Michigan online fund-raiser.

The Plymouth Historical Society, which supports the 26,000-square-foot museum on Main Street, took in nearly \$47,000 during the fundraiser, according to preliminary figures. The Community Foundation

matched every \$2 donated with \$1 of its own during the Aug. 18 fundraiser; the donation site was open through the end of the month for gifts that weren't matched.

"We had to cut back significantly on expenses in this year's budget" because of the economy, said Elizabeth Kerstens, the museum's executive director. "This is going to help us tremendously."

Kerstens said the money is slated for the museum's general operating expenses. The museum's budget for its current fiscal year, which began June 1, is about \$148,000.

Although some Historical Museum donors would have contributed regardless of the Community Foundation effort, the foundation's matching funds Aug. 18 stretched proceeds by half again as much, Kerstens said.

In all, more than \$3 million was raised Aug. 18 for 75 participating arts and cultural organizations in the region, despite technical problems that caused delays. With Community Foundation matching funds of almost \$1.6 million, the total came to nearly \$4.8 million, foundation

spokeswoman Theresa Fraley said.

Donors were able to designate,
through the Web site, which organizations they wanted to assist.



Spirited start

Staffers rally as schools near opening

Over the summer, Tonda Elementary School fourth-grade teacher Amy Caudill read a book titled, *Teach Like Your Hair's on Fire*, and found it inspirational.

When the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools hosted their annual "First Day" observance Tuesday at Compuware Arena in Plymouth Township, Caudill put her renewed motivation on display, cheering the start of school complete with pompons and a refreshed attitude.

"To love what you do so much you could feel like your hair is actually on fire ..." she said. "I'm really excited about this year"

Caudill joined some 2,300 teachers, administrators, bus drivers, food service workers and staffers of every hue Tuesday for the annual start-of-school rite, heretofore held at the Gloria Logan Auditorium at Salem High School.

With such a large staff, though, administrators went looking for a place where everyone could get together at the same time. They put together a program that included presentations from corporate partners, the Plymouth Salvation Army and other featured speakers designed to start the school year off on a positive note.

"We've never been able to get all the teachers and staff together, so we needed a bigger venue," said George Belvitch, the district's director of elementary education, who put the program together. "I

New eatery sets up at Cafe Bon Homme spot



serve alcohol by the glass and now is awaiting a green light from the state.


Two of the partners, Kevin Montagano and Jeff Jepko, the chef and general manager, say they intend the Rock to be a comfortable neighborhood place and a good fit for downtown Plymouth. They say they plan to emphasize food over alcohol.

"For me, the restaurant and the food served is the most important aspect," said Jepko, who has decades of experience in local restaurants, including 20 years as chef and part owner at Little Italy in Northville.

"The bar is secondary." Jepko, who has been doing catering and spending time with his family since he left Little Italy last year, said downtown Plymouth is a good place to concentrate his efforts at one restaurant, rather than be involved in several at a time, as he had been earlier in his career.

"I just think it's going to be a great opportunity. It's going to be a great addition to downtown," Jepko said. A Waterford resident, Jepko said he likes downtown Plymouth's bustling streets, friendly people and "great vibe."

Montagano, who has diverse business interests but no other restaurants, said he envisions the Rock as a comfortable place for families, for weekday busi-

ness luncheons or for just hang-

Jepko said the Rock's menu will include staples like soups, salads, pastas and burgers, made from scratch. Offering a variety of food styles and homemade, rather than precooked, fare, makes for good value in recessionary times, Jepko said.

"With the way the economy has gone, we need to open a place that is much more valuedriven," he said. "Nobody's spending money like they used

Jepko said he will use local ingredients, such as produce, when possible. "When great Michigan produce is in the market, I don't think there's any better," he said.

The Rock will have separate bar and restaurant areas, with table seating in the bar, and television sets in the bar for cable news and sports fans.

Patio seating — in the back, on restaurant property, not the sidewalk — is also planned.

The new restaurant's name, Rock Bar and Grill, poses a conflict with Boulders, on Ann Arbor Road and Harvey, where the new owners want to rename it Plymouth Rock Bar and Grill. On Wednesday, Montagano said he had registered both names with the

Cafe Bon Homme's would-be successors haven't been able to make a go of it so far. One deal to sell the restaurant fell through at the 11th hour, and a Mexican restaurant, Mariachi Dos, closed its doors last October after just five months amid reports of liquor violations and bounced employee paychecks.

Secretary of State moves to Lilley site

Canton will be home to one of the largest Secretary of State offices in Michigan as early as October, officials said Tuesday.

The new, 6,000-square-foot West Wayne County PLUS office will be housed in the Golden Gate Shopping Center on Lilley south

It will replace a smaller facility set to close a little more than three miles away in another shopping center, Canton Landing, on Ford just west of Sheldon.

"It will help us better serve our customers," Secretary of State spokeswoman Kelly Chesney said Tuesday from Lansing.

Laura Calukyan, a representative for Golden Gate Shopping Center LLC, said the company has been told the office will be one of the largest in Michigan with an estimated 800 to 900 customers a day.

"It's going to have a lot of high traffic," Calukyan said.

On Tuesday evening, workers could be seen remodeling the new facility on the township's north side, in hopes it will be ready for an October opening.

"I feel great about it," Golden Gate Shopping

Center owner Nick Tufenkjian said. "In this economy, I feel very good about it."

A temporary sign advertising the new facility already was hanging on the front of the build-

Bill Miller, a 72-year-old Canton resident, said as he walked across the shopping center parking lot that he lives a similar distance between the current and upcoming PLUS offices. He said he didn't have a preference for the location, as long as state officials keep it in Canton.

"I'm glad for that because I find it very convenient." Miller said.

According to a state Web site, PLUS offices offer services such as expanded Wednesday hours 9 a.m. to 7 p.m., optional self-service stations that allow customers to renew vehicle tabs without waiting at the counter, and more payment options.

Chesney said the new office will serve the same area but provide a better environment due to the larger facility. She said there are no plans to pull out of Canton.

"What we will be doing is relocating in Canton," she said. "We'll still be serving the Canton area, just at a new location."







Police probe 'suspicious' city fire

Police and fire officials continue to investigate an Aug. 21 fire that damaged a house on Beech near Evergreen in the city of Plymouth.

Plymouth Lt. Allen Cox called the fire "suspicious" but said he could not release information on its point of origin or how it is believed to have started.

Firefighters from Canton and Northville townships assisted Plymouth Community Fire Department firefighters with the blaze, on the afternoon of Aug. 21, as PCFD firefighters also handled multiple runs. There were no injuries.

Fire Chief Mark Wendel said the house sustained smoke and flame damage, with the heaviest damage to a bedroom at the back of the house. He said firefighters found four potential points of origin.

Sticky fingers




The picnic has become a Lions tradition where children and grandchildren play games and adults share good will.

City right to take time in chief search

When Plymouth Police Chief Wayne Carroll retires Oct. 30, Lt. Al Cox shifts to the big chair to head the department on an interim basis.

Cox, who's been with the department since 1998 and currently serves as its chief detective, is a no-brainer choice to fill Carroll's shoes in the short term. But it won't surprise us, after the city commission does its due diligence and looks for Carroll's permanent replacement, to see Cox still sitting in the chair for years.

But first, city officials will take a look to see who else is available, keeping in mind the kind of department they want to have and the sort of people they want to serve in it.

City Manager Paul Sincock said, "We're not in any rush," and they shouldn't be.

Not only are city officials now looking for a new police chief, they're also scouting ways to save money both in police and fire services. Regionalization is a concept in which commissioners have been interested, and they are reportedly still looking for ways to do it.

Police service is unlikely to change. Plymouth has a distinct, hometown identity, and many locals believe their own police department — and the community policing style it incorporates — fits in well with that.

It's a political hot button, and commissioners — particularly those seeking re-election — might not want to test voters' resolve on it.

While city officials study it, Cox will be getting on-the-job chief training. If he fits the community and the community fits him — and there's no reason to believe it won't — he'll have the inside track on the permanent gig.



While it is encouraging that Senate and House committees are beginning to seriously consider health care reform legislation, it is critical that the U.S. Congress takes action and passes real health care reform in the next few months.

America is facing a health care crisis caused by a combination of skyrocketing costs and an insurance system that leaves 47 million of us without any coverage. The current health care system is endangering both our economy and our health, and voters have made it clear that they want change. According to a study reported in The New England Journal of Medicine, 70 percent of Americans surveyed believe the health care system needs major changes, if not a complete overhaul.

Health care reform legislation must guarantee quality, affordable health care to all U.S. residents. It is universal coverage that will determine the humanity of our system, and all Americans must have health care coverage, including the choice of a quality, affordable public insurance plan. In addition, it is essential that comparative data on treatments, benefits packages and medical outcomes be made publicly available so that individuals can make informed health decisions.

As a nation, we are spending \$1 out of every \$6 we earn on health care. Legislation must provide effective cost controls, equitable distribution of services and allow for efficient and economical delivery of care. Offering everyone a government administered health insurance plan like Medicare that would compete with private health insurance plans will be key.

Achieving this kind of comprehensive, system-wide reform will take a shared effort by citizens and Congress. Senators Levin and Stabenow and Representative McCotter, need to support real health care reform.

This would give regular employees a five-day work week (with weekends off) and part-time employees would be used for Saturday delivery, vacations, and the additional work force for Tuesday and Thursday residential needs.

Reduced gas, vehicle miles and hours in suburban and urban would provide substantial savings over current costs. This would be a "modified" six-day delivery, which is a "twist" on current postal thinking. The feasibility of 'every delivery, every day,' is no longer logical.

When the Democratic convention was on and they nominated President Obama, I was so moved that Sen. Kennedy came from Massachusetts and delivered that speech to the American people. I was so moved. I was fortunate to know someone that was there, and when all the people held up the Kennedy signs, I wanted one so bad. Again seeing him get up out of his bed and doing what he did, I was amazed.







Big tests early for Salem netters

It's not exactly fair to open a season dealing with two Top 10 state powerhouses in eight days.

But Salem varsity boys tennis coach Bill Nelson figures facing some of the best should bolster his own up-and-rising KLAA-Central squad.

"It's tough to get past Northville and then we have Novi when we come back to start school next week," said Nelson. whose team started the season Tuesday with an 8-1 home loss to the Mustangs. "... We'd like to think we can compete with them. We'll see."

POWERFUL DUO

That the pairing of Foster and Perrin came out with the three-set win did not surprise Nelson. "I think the (No. 1) doubles team is by far the most powerful we have and that we have had for a couple years."

In singles flights, a gritty performance by Salem junior Brett Foster could not stop Northville senior Melvin Joseph from posting a 6-2, 6-2 victory

But Nelson liked the way Brett Foster, also the No. 1 singles player in 2008, battled his opponent.

"Brett, he just grinds it out," Nelson

noted. "If he has to hit 40 balls, he'll hit 40 balls."

Salem freshman Jacob Scott lost 3-6, 3-6 at No. 2 singles to senior Tim Wasielewski.

Similar losses took place at No. 3-4 singles: Dion Walker, a junior, dropped a 2-6, 1-6 match to senior Steve Irvine; senior John Kang fell 2-6, 2-6 to senior Nick Kalweit in the four slot.

Northville's overall talent and experience won out in the No. 2-5 doubles matchups. Those results were as follows: No. 2, Andy Steinman-Mike Keum lost 3-6, 3-6 to Albert Chen-Bryce Groshek; No. 3, Cody Hazen-Alek Zultkowski lost 3-6, 0-6 to Matt Satterfield-Phil Lee: No. 4, Zenik Pelekh-Greg Selewski lost 3-6, 0-6 to Jordan Blough-Alex Hsu; No. 5, Tyler Foley-Vishnu Rajendran took it on the chin from Austin Weaver-Rahul Raj, 1-6, 1-6.

the coach noted. "He's a great doubles player, with good reaction and (good) hands at the The coach didn't want to single out anybody else, other


than to say there are many newer players who could make an impact. Another winning season would only enhance the fun





Links golf in Ireland

If you ever have the chance, go to the Emerald Isle and experience "links" golf. The game originated in that setting in Scotland and is not that common for us in Michigan. We do have some samples of it around the state including the Gailes Course at Lakewood Shores resort in Oscoda and Arcadia Bluffs on Lake Michigan to name a couple. If you need tree lined fairways to enjoy your golf avoid links golf. But if you want to try your hand at managing your game through the mounds and valleys of a links land, you might find it to be an extraordinary experience.

Over the past three years, the Golf Association of Michigan has partnered with Sullivan Golf & Travel to take groups to Ireland. The last two years we traveled to southwest Ireland and played the following courses: Waterville, Tralee, Ballybunion, Lahinch, Dooks and

Old Head. As noted, trees are quite scarce on these courses but you might be surprised to learn that Palm Trees can be found at Waterville (apparently the Gulf Stream moderates the temperature enough for these trees!).

When playing these courses, it is always good to have at least one caddie serving your group. While they tend to carry doubles, a foursome can be served nicely by a single caddie who carries two sets of clubs but is able to provide direction to all of the members of the group on the tee when you are faced with the inevitable blind shot. While not common to have blind shots on courses in Michigan, it seems to be very much the norm in Ireland and can be found on many of the golf holes off the tee — aim for a distant mound or hill or church steeple. At Lahinch Golf Club, there is a par 5 hole (named "the Klondyke") that requires a long second shot over a

large hill covered in heather (very long and unforgiving grass). On the crown of the hill is a small hut where a club employee spends their day. with a red flag. As you learn, the hole you are playing crisscrosses the 18th fairway and you cannot hit your shot until it is clear and you receive the

red flag to play away! Presuming you succeed making it over the hill with your second shot, you have a fairly simple third shot into the green but don't be too long as you may cozy up to the stone wall behind the green or worse, over the wall onto the road. The next hole is a 185-yard par 3 called "the Dell." The right half of the green is visible from the tee and the left is hidden by another very tall hill covered in heather. There is a white aiming stone positioned on top of the hill that serves as your target. Depending on wind direction and strength, your caddie will direct you to aim at or to the right or left of the stone. If your

distance control is accurate, you should find your ball somewhere on the dance floor.


As noted above, the wind is a huge part of the experience on a links course. Since you are not protected by trees and located along side the sea, the wind has such an impact that the preferred ball flight is a lower trajectory that helps to minimize its impact. While it can be maddening to have your ball blown off track into the heather and worse, it is such fun to correctly assess its impact and to hit your ball to your target by correctly gauging its impact. At Ballybunion, we played on what seemed to be an extremely windy day. I estimated it to be a 3 club wind. When I asked my caddie if he had this strong of wind frequently, he smiled and replied that this was a relatively calm day and I should see what it would be like when it really blew. That day, it took a full driver to reach the green on one of the par 3's


into the wind. I was humbled to think what it would be like to play "when it really blew.'

Beyond the wind, the heather and the blind shots, your visit also includes a visit with the gorse. If you hit your ball into the heather, if you can find it, the best you can typically do is hit your ball back into the fairway with your sand wedge. This will work most of the time. But with gorse, a plant that is a dark green, sprawling, prickly shrub, if you find the ball, chances are likely that you take a drop for an unplayable lie.

While it is interesting to look at, avoid at all costs. Golf in Ireland has proven to be an addicting experience that is truly extraordinary. Beyond the golf, the people, the food and the Guinness are beyond compare!



Learn about baking with fruit at farmer's market

Shirley Chrisman has a surefire method for removing peach skin.

"When I peel peaches, to make easier, I hold them under hot running water for a few seconds. The peel will come off easier," said Chrisman, who works in the bakery and store at Kapnick Orchards, south of Tecumseh.

"Peaches are at their peak. We have wonderful peaches for baking, canning, cobblers, anything."

Kapnick is among the farms, greenhouses and orchards that sell fresh produce and plants at Garden City Farmer's Market from 8 a.m.-2 p.m. every Wednesday.

This Wednesday, Sept. 9, a representative from Kapnick Orchards will offer a seminar in "using fresh fruits in baking" at 10:30 a.m. at the market, located in the Garden City Town Center Plaza, Ford Road and Middlebelt. Market shoppers can bring a lawn chair and join the outdoor class.

Although Chrisman isn't scheduled to teach the session, she has a few tips of her own on using fresh fruit.

"You want it to be fresh and you want it to be ripe. Most peaches, when you buy

them, aren't ripe yet. They need to set out room temperature on newspaper and

She said peaches are perfect now for use in jams and jellies. She prefers freezer jam because little cooking is required.

"You just take your fruit and peel it and cut it up. You can mash it. I put it in the blender," she noted. "And then you need Sure-Jell. You stir the peaches in a bowl with sugar, add boiling water to the Sure-Jell mix and stir the Sure-Jell into the fruit. It makes the best strawberry and peach jam. Even cherry jam. It tastes like the fruit itself.

"I just put it in jars in freezer but you can put it in plastic containers."

Her recipe calls for two pounds of peaches, washed, peeled and cut into small pieces, four cups of sugar and one box of Sure-Jell. The sugar is stirred into the mashed two cups of fruit and allowed to stand for 20 minutes. The Sure-Jell mix goes into a cup of boiling water.

"You stir it constantly and then stir it into the fruit and sugar mix for three minutes."

She allows the mixture to cool off for 23 hours before packing it into freezer

Preservation Wayne has friends beyond Detroit

Tiger Stadium in Detroit may be long gone, but members of Preservation Wayne believe in saving the city's other historic buildings. They have a lot of allies from Detroit's suburbs.

"Oh, definitely," said Karen Nagher, executive director of Preservation Wayne. "More than 50 percent of them are (suburban dwellers). The memories, for one thing.'

Founded in 1975, Preservation Wayne's mission is to preserve, promote and protect neighborhoods and buildings that define Detroit's character. The group began as a campus organization at Wayne State University, and has been an independent corporation since 1988.

Redford resident Nagher noted suburban dwellers often grew up in the city, or their parents did. "The architecture's definitely part of it." The Saturday morning and Tuesday evening tours draw well, including some folks in their 50s who may move back downtown.

"They don't have to drive out to, say, Rochester" after attending city events, she said of those who may take a small condo in the city. The condo can be used by friends as well.

"There's a lot going on in Detroit," said Nagher. Members and staff are proud of the Honor Award of the **National Trust for Historic** Preservation.

The membership, volunteers and staff address issues of urban planning and historic rehabilitation through many services and activities. The best known are the Detroit Heritage Tours including the city's Historic Theater District, downtown, Eastern Market, the Midtown area, New Center, Auto Heritage and Cultural Center.

Tours provide historic information and offer stories on what makes Detroit unique. They also address issues of current development in Detroit. Tours were named the "Best Walking Tours in Detroit" by Metro Times in 2003.

The recent annual theater tour filled up, included many repeat visitors, Nagher said. The tour includes the Fox,

Fillmore (former State), former Oriental, Michigan (now a parking garage), Opera House where lunch is also served, Music Hall, and the Gem Century, a small theater by Hockeytown.

The group also does Fisher Building tours including its theater, depending on the status of stage productions. "The Fisher Building is a beautiful place," she said.

The organization is doing some custom tours, with components of each tour. Some groups have their own buses.

Preservation Works! workshop forums are often presented on historic rehabilitation and adaptive use to help put "unemployed" buildings back to work. Workshops are produced in partnership with banks, development firms, planning organizations and city agencies.

Preservation Wayne has worked with the Detroit Public Schools' Art Centered Education and is doing more with students, she said. Members and staff have participated with the Michigan Opera Theatre's Learning at the Opera House series, and cooperate with other organizations sharing common interests, such as Friends of the Book Cadillac (and nowgone Madison-Lenox Hotels), Detroit Synergy, and the Detroit Metro Convention and Visitor's Bureau. Nagher also cites the University Cultural Center Assocation, which focuses on the Midtown area.

Preservation Wayne is going through some struggles growing its membership, Nagher said, with nearly 400 households and businesses as members. "We can always use more volunteers." Volunteers don't just lead tours, but also help with office work, publicity, Web site and more. There's plenty going on here."

Preservation Wayne's internship program offers training in the many aspects of historic preservation management. The organization's services and benefits include a referral service of restoration specialists and suppliers and assistance for historic renovation projects.

An annual awards event honors outstanding projects, organizations and people in the city's historic development community.

Condo mortgage standards stricter

Q: I am a new developer of a condominium and I am wondering what the recent changes are regarding rules on condominium

A: Recently, Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac have tightened standards for mortgages on new condominiums. In March of 2009, Fannie Mae said it would no longer guarantee mortgages on condominiums and buildings where fewer than 70 percent of the units have been sold, which was up from 51 percent. Fannie Mae also won't purchase mortgages

of the units. Freddie Mac has apparently implemented similar procedures. Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac have also boosted fees on mortgages for condominiums. Buyers without a minimum of 25 percent down payment have to pay closing cost fees equal to 0.75 percent of their loan, regardless of their credit score. However, Fannie Mae said it would drop that fee in August 2009 for cooperative apartments and detached condominiums. Obviously, it is important to check with your lending institution before you commence construction. These new rules make it even more important than ever to vigorously enforce collection policies in every community


Q: We are a first-time homebuyer, and are wondering if we can take the tax credit on the purchase of our principal residence through the use of a land contract?

A: Although it is not certain, the provision of the Internal Revenue Code in question defines a "purchase" to which the credit applies as "any acquisition" with certain exceptions that are not relevant. Under Michigan law, a land contract is an acquisition since the purchaser gets equitable title to the property. The courts in Michigan have also found that the rights accruing to holders of equitable title in Michigan are substantially the same as rights granted to fee title holders. For example, equitable title obtained pursuant to a land contract by a vendee can be bought, sold or mortgaged by the vendee. You are best advised, of course, to get an opinion from your CPA or tax attorney.
