# Schools seek help with master plan

Plymouth-Canton Community Schools Board of Education members and administrators are hoping lightning can strike twice.

Months after getting a health dose of assistance from members of the community in preparing the district's 2010-11 budget, officials are looking for more help from residents as they work to refine and develop a master plan for the direction of the district going forward.

In revising the district's mission and vision statements, Supt. Dr. Craig Fiegel and his staff are looking for considerable input from the community.

"Getting the community involved is critical," Fiegel said. "We need to understand that our schools belong to the community, and (residents') perspective is critical to how we move forward in the future."

Fiegel and his staff have broadened and expanded both the mission and vision statements, moving things around and trying to set a course for the district to better serve its students in the future.

For instance, the current mission statement states simply the district is "dedicated to providing educational opportunities for each student to achieve personal excellence and to become a productive contributing citi-

The proposed language expands on that concept a little, adding such a goal will be accomplished by "ensuring each student receives comprehensive instruction, innovative programs and learning opportunities that develop the whole student intellectually, personally and socially."

The proposed language moves discussion of "partnership with the community" into the vision statement, which now incorporates elements such as "culturally relevant inclusive learning environment" and "a comprehensive program from which our students will graduate with the skills necessary to be a contributing member in a global society," among other tenets (the full text can be found on the district's website at www.pccs.k12.mi.us).

## Big step: First Step to build new housing facility

The ceremonial first shovelfuls of dirt may have been turned over for the new emergency residential housing First Step will add to its Family Center in Wayne, but help is still needed.

Formerly known as First Step: Western and Downriver Wayne County Project on Domestic and Sexual Violence, the Plymouth-based nonprofit is still looking for in-kind and financial donations to complete the \$5.5 million project which will be built behind its Family Center on 4400 Venoy at Annapolis in Wayne.

"People who need help won't come to an old, dark building, they'll be able to stay in a building that matches the spirit of the program," said Theresa Bizoe, associate director of First Step. "It's just incredible all of the little things that have come together for this."

The organization has raised \$4.5 million, due in large

## **Ex-scout leader** bound over on sex charges

A 49-year-old former Boy Scout leader faces trial after a 35th District Court judge Friday bound him over on a variety of charges he used his position to coerce two teens into criminal sexual conduct.

Judge Michael Gerou decided after several hours of testimony there was enough evidence to send William Hoefling to Wayne County Circuit Court for trial. Hoefling, the former

scoutmaster of a Boy Scout troop based at Our Lady of Good Counsel School in Plymouth, faces a Sept. 3 arraignment at the Frank Murphy Hall of Justice in Detroit.

He faces one count of child sexually abusive activity, a 20-year felony, two charges of fourth-degree criminal

sexual conduct, each a two-year felony, and a variety of charges of using the Internet to commit a crime and distributing sexually explicit images or activity. The criminal sexual conduct

charges were reduced from second degree because the victim was 16 when the alleged incidents occurred.

"The defendant was in a superior position to the Scouts involved," Gerou said. "There was a pattern of secrecy involved. The prosecutor's comments ... were sufficient" to warrant binding the case over.

Hoefling, who remained free on bond, is accused of inappropriate conduct with a 16-year-old member of his troop. The victim testified Friday that Hoefling, who had been an assistant scoutmaster in the troop before assuming the scoutmaster position, had supplied him with alcohol on several occasions and had, on two separate occasions, touched him inappropriately.

The first incident, the victim testified, happened in August 2009 in the parking lot at the Canton Meijer. Hoefling, the victim testified, had picked him up at the Plymouth District Library and driven to the Meijer, where they shopped for alcohol and Hoefling, the teen testified, agreed to pay for it.

While sitting in the defendant's van, the boy said, Hoefling began "rubbing my back ... my chest and stomach" before fondling him.

The two exchanged a variety of e-mails and Facebook messages





about the incident, he testified. Then, in October, the two were scheduled to take part in a Boy Scout camping event in Metamora. Hoefling, the boy testified, used conversations and e-mails to arrange for the boy to sleep in his tent, where the pair consumed more alcohol and the touching incident was repeated.

"(Hoefling) used the Internet to make and arrange meetings," Prosecutor Qiana Lillard said. "He used his position of leadership to carry out his inappropriate behavior. That's predatory conduct like no other.'

A second victim, also 16, testified he and Hoefling had a conversation about a pornographic website, and that Hoefling encouraged him to bring up the site on Hoefling's computer. The boy had "run away" from a domestic situation in his own home, he testified, and had been taken in at Hoefling's home

As the pair talked about various aspects of the teen's life, he testified, he told Hoefling about the website and Hoefling, he testified, urged him to bring up the site.

Defense attorney Kimberly Stout pointed out that, as soon as the website was brought up on the computer, Hoefling moved away from the screen, something the teen did not dispute.

During her closing argument, Stout said Hoefling had not used the Internet to arrange any sexual activity with the first victim, and had been counseling and "trying to give comfort" to the second.

This is far too important to this man's life to allow it to be painted with such a broad brush," Stout argued. "It's a 20-year felony and a sex registry offense. I think there's a serious lack of evidence to bind

"It's a mistake these days to take children into your home," she said. "Everything is subject to interpretation."

At the conclusion of the hearing, Stout made a motion — which Gerou granted - to remove herself from the case, citing a breakdown in the attorneyclient relationship. Hoefling did not argue the point, and Gerou told him a new attorney would be appointed to him until such time as he could hire a new one.

## Decision in township assault allegation weeks away

It could be several weeks before Wayne County Prosecutor Kym Worthy's office decides whether to pursue charges over Plymouth Township Clerk Joe Bridgman's allegation that he was assaulted by Treasurer Ron Edwards.

Maria Miller, Worthy's spokeswoman, acknowledged the Monday receipt of a warrant request, saying only that it had to do with an incident in the township. It will be weeks before anything is decided one way or another, Miller said.

Michigan Attorney General Mike Cox's office had been investigating Bridgman's complaint at the request of township police, and turned over its report to Worthy's office last week, a Cox spokeswoman said.

Bridgman accuses Edwards of trying to take him to the floor just outside his office shortly before the July 20 board meeting, a charge Edwards denies. No one was hurt; Bridgman said Eric Bacyinski, the deputy clerk separated the two.

Edwards was reportedly upset that Bridgman's office had distributed to fellow Board of Trustees members

copies of a certified letter to Edwards, received at township hall, that rescinded a job offer from the city of Warren.

Edwards says the certified letter had been opened before it reached him, and that he is planning a U.S. Postal Service investigation. Bridgman says neither he nor anyone in his office opened the letter.

## Trial delayed for mom accused in baby death

The trial of a Plymouth Township woman accused of killing her newborn daughter was postponed for a month on Thursday when her attorneys sought more time to prepare a defense.

Judge Daniel P. Ryan, in Wayne County Circuit Court, rescheduled the trial of Emily Portellos for Tuesday, Sept. 21. Jury selection in the nearly twoyear-old case had been scheduled to begin Thursday.

Portellos, 30, is accused of suffocating her baby daughter at her home in October 2008. She was arrested the following month and remains in the Wayne County Jail on a \$1 million bond.

Legal proceedings in the case have dragged on since the defendant's preliminary hearing in late 2008. Portellos had been represented by Henry Scharg, but the two parted company

in March, just before another scheduled trial date.

Her defense team is now made up of Gerald Evelyn, Juan Mateo and Demetra Christos. The prosecution is represented by Lora Weingarden.

Portellos is charged with firstdegree murder, second-degree murder and first-degree child abuse. A conviction of firstdegree murder carries a mandatory sentence of life in prison without parole.

## Service corps paints mural as way of saying thank you

When fifth-sixth-graders walk through the doors of Farmington Elementary School on the first day of school, they'll be greeted by a Big Cat Roar mural, a thank you gift from the Plymouth YMCA and Girls on the Run.

Teens involved in the Y's Summer of Service program were at the school this month to paint a mural that they designed to fit in with the school's new Big Cat ROAR theme.

"Rose McCurry did a great job getting all five elementaries involved in the Girls on the Run event, she did a fantastic job and was so passionate," said team leader Heather Jones of Canton. "We wanted to give back to her and to the community. We asked if they wanted a mural and here we

McCurry, coordinator of the district's Discovery Center, got 70 girls from the district's five elementaries and raised money to provide scholarships for 20 of them to participate in the noncompetitive 5K run held in Plymouth on Father's Day. The Garden City girls who ran with their buddies were among the largest contingent in the run.

The high school students — from John Glenn in Westland, Plymouth, Salem and Canton in Canton, Northville and Henry Ford Academy — designed the more than six-

 designed the more than sixfoot long mural and then used "oops" paint from Lowe's and Home Depot and what they brought from home to paint it.

which has done a lot of work at food banks and Habitat for Humanity. During the summer, it becomes Summer of Service with each week having a different theme. The mural was done during art week. The kids sign up for the weeks they want and get credit for service

"It looks good on a resume," said Tori Randolph of Plymouth. "My mom says it looks good on a college application."

"We like them to be a good person, that's what we aim for," said Danielle Foley of Redford.

The mural is in contrast to others painted by retired teacher Anne Tobias and Carol Manore. Some of their artwork is geared to younger grades. The Summer of Service mural is meant for older students. It features a tree with roots that flow along the bottom and blend into a sidewalk that leads to outer space.

"We did it in sections," said Foley. "A couple of the kids did the trees, some drew space, others projected the ROAR letters on the wall. They learn to work together with this."

"I'm an artist, it's something I like to do," said Gabrielle Burgess-Smith of Belleville, who was mixing blue and

black to create a gray as the blue sky faded into black. "I've done something like this in my bedroom before. This is really fun, but you have to have the right brushes."

"I helped her with her room, she did her whole room," said Asha Wright-Ford of Canton, a junior at John Glenn High School. "I did a future book. I was the author and she was the illustrator. We're best friends."

Thirteen teens worked on the mural, that featured the Big Cat ROAR — Respect Others, Act Responsibly — in the center.

Donnie Seyfried from Salem High contributed the space idea, but worked on the grass where it lifted up into the sidewalk. He's somewhat of a veteran of Summer of Service, having done a week last month and some time a few years ago.

"I like the people I meet," he said. "The leaders help give us direction so we understand what we need to do."


Like Seyfried, Emma Boylan has worked with the group in the past. A senior at Northville High School, she did two weeks last year and one this year.

## **Shoplifter grabs new TV sets from CVS**

An employee tried to stop him, the report said, but was hampered because the

store was busy at the time. A witness told the manager that, once outside, the thief walked to the east side of the store, got into a blue Ford Escort and rode off.

"In the process of reviewing what existed, we took a little different approach," Fiegel said. "We made our vision statement one with a broader look; it's how you get to accomplish the mission. We identified things that would make that possible."

To get there in the end, the district is looking to set up a committee to delve into the Dynamic Planning Process. The committee is expected to be made up of some 50 members and will meet six times between September and late November. The meetings are expected to last about six hours apiece.

There's a questionnaire on the district's website for prospective committee members; Fiegel said applicants will be chosen so "the committee is diverse and reflective of the

district and the community." "As we navigate through this process, we'll take input and see if it addresses what needs to be addressed," Fiegel said. "Overall, these are the things that will guide us."

It's not dissimilar to the process the district used to come up with its budget. The participatory budget process, which involved members of the community serving on a variety of committees, was largely praised by board members for helping come up with its 2010-11 budget.

Board President Steven Sneideman said he hopes for the same kind of success from this process.

"Now that we have (the budget process) under our belt, it'll make it easier to go through this process," Sneideman said. "What's exciting is we're reviewing our mission and vision and adding in some beliefs we didn't have before that will better define what our job is in the district. That will give us a strong start in defining what the goals are for our schools."

increases," said Wayne County Executive Robert Ficano, who participated in the ground breaking. "This facility will empower victims of domestic violence and provide them with security and safety."

The new residential facility will be attached to the west side of the Family Center and be capable of housing up to 50 people. The 12 apartment-like suites will have a private bath, small kitchen and living areas, and there will be common areas. The building be able to use the commercial kitchen in the Family Center which also

provides programs, counseling resources and support for survivors.

"It's designed to give our survivors more privacy, more dignity and more personal space," Bizoe said. "It's a whole new model for helping survivors of domestic violence."

There also will be an outdoor play area as well as a heated garage where people can come to get clothing and furnishings donated to First Step, Bizoe added.

The new facility is a far cry from previous First Step emergency housing. Initially, the agency used a former group home at Five Mile and Sheldon and then bought a former nursing home on Ridge west of Beck. The latter facility, which First Step used for more than 20 years, is closed due to its condition and the families are in temporary housing until the new facility is ready some time in the spring or summer of 2011. The old building is slated to be torn down and the 10 acres it sits on sold, according to Bizoe.

In 2008-09, First Step served 16,480 individuals. It provide 8,730 nights of sheltering and handled 18,757 crisis calls on its 24-hour helpline. It also provided 6,508 hours of counseling for adults and 1,569 hours for children.

"This building is long overdue," said Ellis, who has led the organization since its early days in a white house at Nankin Mills in Westland. "We are so grateful to all of the generous individuals, groups and government entities who gave time, and financial support to make this campaign a success."

Unlike the two former buildings, the locations of which

were kept secret, the new facility will not be in hiding, due in part to the availability of information through the Internet and GPS technology. However, the agency will be "universally vigilant" to protect survivors and their families with secure parking and good security, Bizoe said.

"In this day and age, you do have to protective, but by hanging a sign out front of the Family Center, more people who need us will find us," she said.

For now, First Step's staff and volunteers are looking for people to help in raising the remaining \$1 million to finish and furnish the new facility.







## Income tax applies to severance; IRA conversion depends on individual

Q: Dear Rick: I am single, in my mid-50s and have been unemployed since the beginning of the year. My main source of income is severance pay which continues until the end of the year. Is my severance pay taxable? Would it make sense to convert my existing IRA into a Roth IRA? I'm thinking of taking classes at a community college to qualify for a job. Can I deduct the cost of classes on my tax return?

A: I would love to give you good news with regards to your severance pay, however, I cannot. Your severance pay is subject to ordinary income taxes. Whether you receive a lump sum severance check or it is paid over time, it is still taxable. In fact, many people are surprised to learn that depending upon one's individual situation, unemployment benefits are taxed.

Because your severance pay is subject to income tax, make sure your former employer is withholding money for income tax purposes or that you are making estimated payments.

The first is you must have the money to pay the tax (you must pay taxes on the money that you are converting) without touching the money. This year, the rules are somewhat different because you have options. You can spread your conversion tax liability over 2011 and 2012 or pay the entire tax liability in 2010.


There is no one best option. The key is determining what best fits your individual tax situation.

Secondly, make sure that converting the money won't throw you into a higher tax

bracket. And finally be sure you are able to leave the money in the Roth IRA for a minimum of five years. If you meet those qualifications then a Roth conversion makes sense. However, keep in mind that with the job market still difficult at best and with little improvement expected in the near future, you must consider whether you want to use your resources to go through the conversion. I think it is important that you consider your cash flow needs over the next few years before you do the conversion.

Look at your individual situation to make the determination as to whether your tuition is deductible or not. The key is whether it is continuing education, which is deductible, or education that qualifies you for a totally new position or job, which is not deductible. Good luck!

goals for the sheriff's department are downsizing, "cutting at the top," with fewer command staffers, and working with the community.

To cut costs, Milton said some inmates can do work programs. Supervised inmates can provide maintenance in and around the jail, such as cleaning and grounds maintenance.

"They would be supervised working outside the jail." Inmates are screened for tethers now, she said, and some work in the jail under supervision.

The GED program must be revived, she said, along with implementing new programs such as parenting and anger management classes.

"A lot of them are eventually placed on some type of probation" and often required to

have a GED. "There are classrooms in the jail."

GED classes were held in the past, Milton said. "I'd like to get that going again." She doesn't want inmates sitting

Milton also lists on her website: improving working relationships between the jails, Probation Department, and the legal system to create an open line of communication that will allow departments to exchange critical information concerning programs such as probation, boot camp, tether, drug rehabilitation and work release.

"I would like to see the sheriff's department working with the community leaders," she said. Some cities have paid for their inmates to go up north, she said, such as Livonia and

Redford. That's done to avoid early release.

"The taxpayers are spending money through the jail space," Milton said. "I'm going to work with them and keep their pris-

oners like we're supposed to." She also wants the sheriff's department to have services to aid cities in townships facing hostage situations or other emergencies. "I want to make our services available to these departments. We should be the backup they need."

Milton acknowledged her Democratic competitor, Napoleon, has more name rec-

"It may be. I'm kind of hoping to be the David in David and Goliath," she said. "I really don't know how that's going to pan out." She's campaigning hard and meeting voters "so they can see and know what their choices are."

"It is a challenge, I can't campaign while I'm working." She does a lot weekends and other off-hours. "I'm thankful to have a supportive family. My children have been learning a lot."

"I think I do," have an honest chance of winning the job. She's staying positive, "very focused."

"This is just all so exciting and overwhelming. I'm learning so much." Milton hasn't met Napoleon, and has no issues with work or colleagues, "thankfully."

She's holding a fund-raiser Aug. 25 and will continue to campaign through Nov. 2.

## Local customizing shop gets in on Dream Cruise action

Fans of customized vehicles - particularly Ford Mustangs - gathered in Plymouth Township Friday to rev up the excitement over Saturday's Woodward Dream Cruise.

The event was the Pre-Cruise Pump Up, hosted by MRT, which designs and builds parts for customizing cars and trucks. MRT employees, and many customers who had traveled to the Detroit area for the Dream Cruise, showed off their rides in the parking lot; radio station 88.1 FM, the student station at Plymouth-Canton Educational Park, was broadcasting live; and a cookout and a cruise

to Dairy King, in downtown Plymouth, were planned.

The Pump Up started casually in 2006 when some friends called MRT founder Scott Hoag to ask if they could stop by his shop on the Friday before the Dream Cruise, which they planned to attend.

"It's grown into an annual event," said Hoag a former Ford Motor Co. engineer who used to run Ford's Mustang engineering team.



## Quarter-century mark rolls up at Station 885

Station 885, a dining mainstay in Plymouth and its Old Village neighborhood, is marking 25 years in

The family owned causaldining restaurant, which has a railroad theme and sits next to tracks frequented by freight trains, is run by Robert Costanza and his mother, Joyce, who founded the restaurant in 1985 with her husband, Jerry, who died in 2003.

It's the day-to-day "total family involvement," Robert Costanza said, that's key to Station 885's success.

"You don't achieve that without being here keeping an eye on things," said Costanza, 44, who started out at Station 885 as a dishwasher when it opened.

The Costanzas boast four generations in the business, starting with Erminio, 98, Robert's paternal grandfather, who stops in regularly to check the pizza dough. Joyce Costanza, 70, still keeps a full schedule, and three of Robert's children also work there.

Robert said he "knew from day one" that he wanted a career in the restaurant business.

"My career day was, 'I'm going to be a restaurateur," he said.

The family also owns La Bistecca Italian Grille in Plymouth, which is run by Robert's brother, Jerry Costanza Jr.

Station 885 was a shotand-a-beer joint of the same name, frequented by railroad workers, when the Costanzas took it over in 1985.

The place has its roots in Jerry Sr.'s longtime success in the restaurant business, which began in 1961, when he partnered with father Erminio and opened a pizzeria near Plymouth and Farmington roads in

Livonia. It was a dine-in and carryout place, and even had a drive-up window.

"Jerry was really ahead of his time in many ways," Joyce Costanza said. He often made 200 or more pizzas a night, she said.

"He definitely had a passion for this business, Robert Costanza said.

Jerry Sr. went on to work in several area Big Boy restaurants, and was eventually the owner, or part owner, of six of them. Joyce was a manger.

Station 885 gave them the chance to try out their own concept - home cooking, much of it from the family's Italian-American heritage - instead of a concept borrowed from Big Boy.

They liked Plymouth's quaintness, Robert Costanza said, and had a hunch they could make a go of it in

"We knew that people were going to like our family din-ing concept," he said. The

restaurant underwent five expansions in its first 10 years.

His father's philosophy, Robert Costanza said, was that if you take care of customers, they'll take care of you and business will take care of itself. That outlook

fit well in Plymouth, he said. "I think it's like a great kind of feeling in Plymouth. People kind of look after their own here," he said.

'We feel blessed to have made countless friends and business associates, and they are the ones that make opening the doors a pleasure each day," Joyce Costanza said.

Station 885, at 885 Starkweather, is offering \$8.85 dinner specials Monday through Thursday, and is raffling off a September weekend in Chicago for two that includes travel by Amtrak train, two nights at the Omni Hotel and two tickets to see the Detroit Tigers play the Chicago White Sox.

work, he'll need yeoman's duties from the offensive line. As of Wednesday, it featured 6-6, 250-pound junior Eric Jipping and 6-2, 240-pound senior Josh Allen.

"Some of those stronger players, I think they'll be able to handle going both ways for four quarters. it's the other guys I am more concerned about for the long term of the season."

He knows that a big challenge will be helping players stay healthy despite the unavoidable heavy lifting they'll have to do.





## Triathletes lose their hair for charity

You've got to keep moving if you want to finish an Ironman Triathlon, a 2.4-mile swim, 112-mile bike ride and 26.2mile run in 17 hours or less. But members of the Detroit Iron Triathlon Team will break from their busy training schedule Friday, Aug. 27, to just sit still and lose - their hair.

Shave to Save, Detroit Iron's sixth fund-raising event for The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society (LLS), will be held at BlackFinn Restaurant and Saloon in Royal Oak. Heads will be shaved and locks (gals only) will be clipped to raise funds for blood cancer

"I did it last year and it takes far too long to grow back. It certainly is a sacrifice. Let's say, I just don't date for a few months afterwards because it doesn't look good," said Detroit Iron founding member Stuart Baskin, laughing. "I have five hairdressers coming from Edwin Paul Salon (Grosse Pointe Woods). If someone wants to jump in and says, 'it's a great cause, I'll do it,' we're more than happy to have their head shaved also."

A Farmington Hills resident, Baskin is the triathlon coach for the Team in Training (TNT) program of LLS. He and 13 other TNT alumni, many of them past or present coaches, formed Detroit Iron last year. The group has grown to 50 members. They train together, compete in various triathlon events and raise funds and awareness for charities.

lon before but I'd been involved in different sports for a while ... I do this for fun," said Detroit Iron founding member Jason Lyngaas of Royal Oak. "We're training six or seven days a week — short and long training sessions. You try to vary it so you're not doing the same thing all the time.

Baskin races and raises funds in honor of his wife, Janet, who died in 2002 after a long and hard battle with breast cancer.

'We'd do the Walk for the Cure every year and then one year I said, 'I'm going to run in your honor.' I had never been a runner. I was not that active," Baskin said. "I started running one block at a time, then two blocks, then a mile, and I fell in love with running."

**BECOMING A COACH** 


A friend asked Baskin to sign up for a TNT-sponsored bike ride around Lake Tahoe in 2006. Baskin was so impressed with the Team in Training program that he did an Olympic distance triathlon, a half Ironman and a full Ironman in 2007, and the following year he agreed to coach.

'With TNT we take people from the couch to an Olympic distance triathlon. We give them a training plan, we work together, we motivate each other. It gives you a connection to honor people who have survived cancer ... we find, too, that you make lifelong friends," said Baskin, who recalled a 55year-old non-active couple who was skeptical at the TNT informational meeting, but completed the triathlon. "Michele said, 'thank you. This was one of the biggest events of our life, and you were totally true, it is a life-changing experience.'

"It's a rarity in life that we get a chance to inspire people, and through being a TNT coach, I have a chance to inspire, all for a great cause," he said. "One day we're going to beat cancer, it's just a matter of time. I keep saying, I'll raise money so people smarter than me will come up with a solution."

## Pets, owners will have a ball at annual Paws in the Park

Paws in the Park returns to Canton next weekend for two days of all things canine.

That's more than 11 hours of dog entertainment and activities, dozens of vendors and nonprofits, and hundreds of dogs.

Bring your best four-pawed friend on-leash to the park and don't miss these organizations and events:

#### **HUMANE SOCIETY OF HURON VALLEY**

Kittens at a dog event? Deb Kerr of the Huron Valley Humane Society (HSHV) says the shelter likely will have "lots" of young felines for adoption.

"Probably not many cats," she said, adding that most are a bit finicky when it comes to travelling. "We'll have dogs — small, large, different kinds. Whoever is here that hasn't been adopted."

The HSHV shelter, located in Dixboro, is full and also has 181 animals in foster care. Adoptable dogs will take turns walking with handlers among the crowd at Paws in the Park. They'll wear easily identifiable capes that say they're available for loving, new homes.

Kerr encourages adopters to bring along their existing dogs to the event to make sure they'll get along with potential new family members.

"We like to do dog-to-dog interaction," she explained. "The ideas is to

keep them in the home. If you take a dog home and they don't get along, it's likely you'll bring the dog back.'

The adoption process, which includes an application, interview and interaction with the dog, takes about an hour.

Kerr said visitors also can check out adoptive dogs at Paws in the Park and wait until they visit the shelter to make a commitment.

"Many people come here (the shelter) as a destination for adoption. We adopted out 122 last week, which is great. But we took in 149. Ninety were strays and the rest were owner relinquished."

HSHV also will offer a low-cost micro chip clinic, tips on what to do if you lose your dog, and behavior

#### **RESCUE GROUPS**

Michigan has its own version of the Utah-based "Dogtown" sanctuary for

It's called Mackenzie's Animal Sanctuary, in Lake Odessa, located between Lansing and Grand Rapids. It's one of three rescue groups, along with The Buster Foundation — a pit bull-focused organization - and North Star Border Collie that will be on hand with adoption information at Paws in the Park.

"I think right now we have about 95 dogs," said Amanda Parrish, marketing and PR director for the organization that serves only canines. "We don't accept owner surrenders or strays. We find it's most effective to work with other animal organizations that have to euthanize. We go out every week and take in as many as we can. '

The group finds homes within a 150-mile radius of its campus, which includes 14 play yards three "real

life" rooms that resemble living room areas for training, pools and an agility and gymnasium area.

It doesn't allow on-site adoption at events like Paws in the Park. The adoption process requires the potential adopter to visit the shelter twice. A MacKenzie staff member also visits

"We're not just going to place a dog in any home," Parrish said. "We want to make sure they match up with the right family and environment - that it's a good fit.

"We had one lady who was interested in a dog. The first two visits went well. She was looking at a 65-pound dog. Then we went to her home and there was no room to get through the house. We told her to clean up and make room for a dog before adopting."

Because of its "thoughtful and thorough" adoption process, it has a low return rate of dogs: four in the past five years.

O'Brien said kissing contestants do get plenty of paper towels to clean up the slobber.

#### RESISTING CHANGE

The ability of orthopedic surgeons to replace a worn knee joint with an excellent replacement has a success rate of over 90%. At the same time, American hospitals, have gained experience in postoperative knee replacement care, and patients remain hospitalized only 2-3 days after surgery

Patients ambulate with a walker within a day after surgery and rehabilitation to the point of walking with no aids or only a cane is a goal most patients achieve within six weeks. If a person cannot undertake rehabilitation at home, facilities are available for convalescent care and physical therapy that prepare a patient for independent living within a month after surgery. Yet many people after seeing their x-rays revealing the advanced state of arthritis of their
