# Township to streamline water rate-setting process

Plymouth Township officials, facing a possible 40-percent hike in the wholesale price of water, haven't yet decided if they'd pass those costs on to customers — township residents and business owners.

But the Board of Trustees indicated Tuesday how it might pass an increase along, voting 6-0 for the first reading of a procedural change that would set water and sewer rates by resolution rather than by ordinance.

The plan, an amendment to the township's water and sewer ordinance, strikes water and sewer fees from the ordinance and calls for them to be set by resolution. A final vote is scheduled for the next regular board meeting on Tuesday, July 12.

Clerk Joe Bridgman, who brought forth the proposal, said water and sewer charges are the only fees not currently set by resolution, and that he wants to create a fee schedule that includes all township fees, not only water and sewer rates but also those for building permits, site plan reviews and Freedom of Information Act requests, for example.

"The whole concept is to put everything into one neat, clean document that is formatted the same," Bridgman said Thursday. The fee schedule would typically be reviewed by the board twice a year, he said, once during budget-making time every fall and another every spring.

The move would also streamline the rate-setting process, as resolutions are passed with one vote, while ordinance amendments require two votes, one after a first reading and one after a second. Resolutions can also take effect immediately, while ordinance changes only take effect once the change is published in a legal notice.

Bridgman said he would publish a notice each time the fee schedule is to be reviewed by the board, even though resolutions aren't required to be detailed in legal notices.

"My intent here is not to not let the public know," Bridgman said at Tuesday's board meeting. "We definitely need to make sure we're noti-

# **District: Bids** don't necessarily mean privatization

In order to qualify for an extra \$1.9 million in school funding under Gov. Rick Snyder's school reform plan, school districts have to at least look outside their own staff for non-academic services such as transportation and custodial.

Plymouth-Canton Community Schools officials want to grab a share of that money if they can, but even if that weren't the case, according to the interim superintendent, they'd probably still be looking at privatizing busing and custodial contracts.

"it's not just a matter of complying with the law," said Jeremy Hughes. "It's a matter of looking at the best interests of the district. I don't want to sound like we're just doing it because of the law."

According to James Larson-Shidler, the district's assistant superintendent for business operations, seeking bids for both transportation and custodial contracts is simply a matter of due dili-

"(The law) is part of it, but we're also bench-marking to see what the going rates are (for services)," Larson-Shidler said. "We're trying to see if there are options out there."

That doesn't mean, though, the district is about to go private.

"As far as I know, there are no (immediate) plans to privatize," Larson-Shidler said.

That's not making the members of the transportation and custodial unions any more comfortable, especially with bids for transportation due June 22. The district, as part of trying to solve an \$18 million budget deficit, cut 21 jobs from the custodial staff. And the advertisement officials ran concerning seeking bids for services has the district's 150 bus drivers on

The drivers, who staged an informational picket a couple of weeks ago down the street from the E.J. McClendon Education Center, have been pressing the board not to privatize.

"I'm asking you to ride with us and see what we do," bus driver Phyllis Maycock urged board members Tuesday. "We've taken (pay cuts), we work 11 hours a day and get paid for six."

William Barber, the chief steward for the International Union of Operating Engineers Local 324, said the district came to the union in May and let them know bids would be sought. He said union members found that "kind of disheartening," because they were never asked for concessions.

"I have to prepare (union members) for the possibility (of privatization), but I am guardedly optimistic we'll be able to work something out. I'd be disappointed if they're using the bid process as a bargaining ploy. At this point, what they're doing has everybody in limbo."

Snyder's plan calls for districts to seek bids on services that are deemed non-core. Barber said his members are "perplexed," in that case, by the board's decision a few weeks ago not to seek bids on legal services.

They tell us they want bids if it's not core service, but they chose not to go out for bids for legal services," Barber said. "We find that kind of strange that they'd pick and choose."

Board members have to approve the district's budget by June 30. They conducted a public hearing Tuesday, and are scheduled to pass the budget at their June 28 meeting.

## Fire response credited with saving lives, limiting damage

Michele Curry and her mother Vilma woke to the sound of a fire alarm at the Meadows Condominiums in Plymouth early Thursday. They weren't sure what was going on, but there were flashing lights outside.

"Our neighbor was like, 'There's a fire. We've got to get out," said Michele Curry on Friday, recalling the blaze that injured one woman and displaced 20 people.

"I just kind of grabbed a sweat shirt and some flip-flops, and I threw it on," said Curry. She and her mother left their first-floor condominium and went outside. "Then I could smell

The Currys were among those who evacuated the 18-unit building on Deer Court because of the fire, which

was reported by residents just before I a.m. A candle left unattended is the suspected cause; the heaviest damage was limited to three condominiums, and several others sustained smoke damage, according to the Plymouth Community Fire Department.

The three-story building was deemed repairable, and some residents, including Curry, returned to it later Thursday.

"We were able to limit it to just a little bit more than a room and contents fire" because of a quick response, said PCFD Capt. Dan Phillips. The three units most affected will have to undergo repairs, he said, and several others will need cleanup for smoke damage.

#### **TEAM RESPONSE**

Phillips credited smoke detectors with alerting residents, and police

officers, firefighters and the residents themselves for a quick and efficient evacuation. "Residents did a great job," including one man who evacuated a neighbor in a wheelchair, Phillips said.

Plymouth police officers were first on the scene Thursday, and they began alerting and evacuating residents, according to a press release from the city. They were joined by PCFD firefighters, Plymouth Township officers and units from the fire departments in Canton and Northville townships, plus Livonia and Westland.

Their help was absolutely necessary to help save everybody in that building

and save the property," Phillips said. Some residents had to be assisted out, Phillips said, and one woman, in a condominium filled with smoke, was

# Vietnam wall taps into memories in Canton stop

Gail Zillich intended to marry John Belford after he returned from his U.S. Navy stint in Vietnam.

He never came home. She never married.

More than four decades have passed, yet Zillich's memories of the man she loved hadn't faded as she stood Thursday evening in front of The Vietnam Traveling Memorial Wall in Canton's Heritage Park. She had seen his name on other Vietnam memorials, always with the same result.

"It still brings tears to my eyes," Zillich, an Ann Arbor resident, said, standing with her Canton friends, Monica McCluskey and Maureen Richter.

The longtime friends were among a large crowd that gathered for a solemn opening ceremony as the wall began a four-day stop here, a highlight of Canton's 20th Liberty Fest. The 6-foot wall stretched 288 feet across the northwest side of Heritage Park, a respectful distance from a cheerful festival crowd.


#### **LOST LOVE**

McCluskey wanted to see the name of 19-year-old Robert Bickel, one of seven young men from the Blessed Sacrament Church congregation in Rochester, N.Y., who died in Vietnam.

"He was my brother's friend," McCluskey said, recalling her days in Rochester. "He used to ride his bike over to our house. He lived on Raleigh Street."

Richter's memories of Vietnam had a better ending. She had a brother who served in the war, "but he came home."

The Vietnam Traveling Memorial Wall - a threefifths, aluminum replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. — contains more than 58,200 names. One of several Vietnam memorials, it was brought on its first trip to Michigan by wall manager



Greg Welsh of Florida after local veterans arranged the

Ted Bird, a 61-year-old Minnesota man and former U.S. Marine who served in Vietnam, often travels with the wall. He said it has a powerful effect on those who see it.

"It's like going to a cemetery," he said. "A lot of healing goes on when people see this wall."

#### **PAINFUL HOMECOMING**

Timothy Curtis, a 65-yearold Plymouth Township man and U.S. Army veteran, didn't know until he returned from Vietnam that his cousin, Clarence Chase, was there at the same time and had died seven days before turning 21.

"He was killed just a few days before I came home," Curtis

As Thursday evening's ceremony began, the Vietnam Veterans of America Chapter 528 Color Guard carried an assortment of flags, representing the branches of service, prisoners of war and the missing in action, among others, and placed them on star-shaped, white platforms. A quartet from Trinity Presbyterian Church of Plymouth led the crowd in

singing the national anthem. "It's our honor to host this most solemn of events," Jay Roberts, VVA Chapter 528 president, told the crowd. "We realize it's the only way left to thank these courageous men

and women."

wife, Jean.

Township Supervisor Phil LaJoy, who served stateside in the U.S. Marines, honored those "who sacrificed for our freedom" as he addressed the crowd. He remembered his long-ago friend Michael Blondin, a U.S. Army soldier who died in Vietnam after he had served as LaJoy's best man when LaJoy married his

"He had a baby and was married," LaJoy said of Blondin.

Retired Canton Public Safety Director John Santomauro, a decorated U.S. Marine platoon sergeant who received a Purple Heart during his 1967-68 combat stint in Vietnam, gave an eloquent speech as keynote speaker as some in the audience wiped tears from their eves

#### **FEAR FACTOR**

Santomauro recalled the noise and smell of combat and the ambushes, the patrols,

the hunger, the thirst, the fear. Yet he also remembered the camaraderie and friendship that has "carried us for the rest of our lives."

"Who we are, and what we have learned about life, is the result of service in the war," Santomauro said, adding that the lessons of the battlefield cannot be taught in academic classrooms or daily life.

He concluded his address by saying those listed on the Vietnam wall "will always be part of us."

U.S. Army Vietnam veteran Cliff Tholen read a poem, simply titled Names, saying, "They won't be forgotten, enshrined are they all, those 58,000 names on the wall."

His cousin John Spencer, a Canton Township employee and Army veteran who served in Vietnam, described the "tears and cheers" of troops as they climbed aboard aircraft that took them away from

"Those 58,000 names up here never got to experience that," Spencer said. "They came home in metal boxes."

As the ceremony closed, Wayne Byrum, the Canton Police Department chaplain, said he felt as though he stood on sacred ground near the wall and its names.

"They had lives like you and me," he said. "They had hopes. They had dreams."

Dreams. Just like Gail Zillich and John Belford had. Dreams of marrying. If only he of the month, the chief said. had lived.

The Vietnam Traveling Memorial Wall remains open for visitation 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Friday and Saturday, and 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday, when a closing ceremony is scheduled.



# PCA breaks ground on athletic expansion

Back when boys and girls' basketball were played in opposite seasons, the smallish athletic facilities at Plymouth Christian Academy served well enough.

Now, with both sports being played in the same season, the situation is no longer tenable, so the school is doing something about it.

School officials broke ground last week on a \$350,000 addition that will allow PCA the space it needs to house home and visiting athletes.

"We never really had the need," said Dr. David Butler, the retiring head of school. "We had the visiting team in the girls' locker room and our team in the boys' locker room."

But with the switch in seasons, there are, at times, as many as eight teams vying for locker-room space. It's space PCA didn't have.

What the school did have was "a number of parents who wanted to help," Butler said. Donations large and small, including a \$50,000 from the Ilitch family, came in from various donors, including what Butler said were "some large gifts" made anonymously.

"They're very generous, and our kids really benefit," said Butler. "We're very thankful for their thoughtfulness and generosity."

## Tonda earns EPA energy honor

Since August 2009, students and staff at Tonda Elementary School have reduced energy use at the school by more than 35 percent and helped the district save some \$1.3 million in energy costs.

And the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has noticed.

The EPA honored Tonda with its Energy Star award after the school reduced its greenhouse gas emissions by at least 35 percent, reducing energy use by turning off lights in unused rooms, lowering the thermostat during winter months and installing new plumbing and lighting fixtures that use less water and energy.

Those efforts have helped Tonda save some \$24,000 in the last two years, an energy performance officials say lands them in the top 10 percent of elementary schools nationwide. "This is a significant award for Plymouth-Canton schools," said John Landis of Energy Education, the environmental consultant the district hired to help district buildings reduce energy consumption. "Tonda is running on 62 percent of the energy they were using two years ago. Tonda has been the pace-setter for P-CCS."

Kurt Tyszkiewicz, who was Tonda's principal when the school earned "green school" status and who now serves as the interim director of student services for the district, said the Energy Star recognition shows students and staff at the school continue to make energy efficiency a top priority.

"When we became a green school two years ago, the staff and students made a commitment to helping the environment," Tyszkiewicz said. "This is just a continuation of that."

# Grass-roots leaders honored as VIPs

Sheila Paton has talked in front of the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education, she's testified before legislative committees, and she even was a key speaker at an education rally in Lansing.

# Fundraiser delivers \$11,000 of help for Hunter

Hunter Donegan was determined to make an appearance at the fundraiser held for her benefit Thursday night at The Crow's Nest in Canton, but Lisa Misenko, the family friend organizing the event, cautioned her it might not be possible.

After all, she reasoned, Hunter was in surgery only Monday to have her left leg amputated above the knee after doctors found a large tumor in the bone. Doctors wanted to keep Hunter, but gave her a list of goals she had to achieve if she wanted to go home.

Hunter, 10, achieved all of them and rolled through the door in her wheelchair right on cue Thursday night.

"That was definitely the highlight of the night," said Misenko, whose daughter goes to school with Hunter. "She insisted on being there."

While Hunter's presence may have been the top highlight of the evening, a very close second must have been the support. According to Misenko, the line to get into The Crow's Nest was not only out the door, it extended all the way to Canton Center Road. Cars from visitors filled more than one surrounding parking lot.

And the support also translated well into dollars. The event raised some \$11,000 to benefit Hunter's family, her grandparents Dale and Pat Bennett, to help cover not only Hunter's medical expenses, but refurbishing of the Bennetts' Canton home to accommodate the changes in their granddaughter's life.

The money came from a variety of mini-fundraisers: The sale of lime green (Hunter's favorite color) wristbands, feathers attached to hair by stylists from The Q Salon in Plymouth, inspirational stones, car decals, a silent auction, a 10-percent donation from the owners of The Crow's Nest, and the proceeds from a 50/50 raffle which drew some \$1,500.

According to Misenko, the gentleman who won the raffle donated his share right back to Hunter.

"There was a huge outpouring of people," Misenko said. "That tells me there's a very generous heart out there that goes above and beyond in a crisis, even in tough financial times. We had teachers and staff from



the elementary and middle school, friends from church and people who didn't even know Hunter or her family."

One of those Hulsing staffers in attendance was reading interventionist Meghan Riedl, who was Hunter's kindergarten teacher.

"We just wanted to come out and show our support for her and her family in these difficult times," Riedl said. "We wanted to show her how much we love her here at Hulsing."

The next fundraiser to benefit Hunter and her family is set for July 14 at Skatin' Station. Tickets are \$6, which includes skate rental All proceeds will be donated to Hunter. Skatin' Station is located at 8611 Ronda Drive in Canton.

rescued by firefighters who went into the unit, took her to the balcony and carried her down a ladder. The woman was taken by ambulance to a local hospital, where she was treated for smoke inhalation, Phillips said.

#### **SHOOTING FLAMES**

Curry, a minister at Detroit World Outreach in Redford Township, said she and her mother, a retired nurse, couldn't see how serious the fire was until they got outside. It had apparently started at the end of the building opposite their condominium.


The flames were high, Curry said. "It reminded me of the movie *Backdraft*, where they were coming out of the window," she said.

Phillips said the blaze was under control in about 45 minutes. But firefighters were on the scene for longer doing "overhaul," he said: checking for hot spots and making sure the fire didn't reignite.

Curry said evacuated residents were on the scene until about 4 a.m., when firefighters told them they wouldn't be able to return immediately. Most of the evacuated were able to stay with relatives; the Currys and several others were put up in a nearby motel by the Salvation Army's Plymouth Corps.

#### 'THEY REALLY CARED'

Curry praised police, firefighters for their response and support, and said Salvation Army workers were "really trying to make everyone feel

comfortable and at ease."
The Salvation Army provided refreshments, blankets and a minibus in which residents, many in robes and night-gowns, sat to keep warm, she

"It could've been a lot worse, but you felt like they really cared," she said.

In her sleep, Curry said, she had initially dismissed the

alarm, as one might a train whistle or a distant car alarm. But her mother woke her up, she said. She said she felt calm throughout the ordeal, and that she was praying for the comfort of neighbors whose homes and possessions were at the center of the fire.

"I always felt calm," she said. "I had the peace of God just in the midst of everything,

Laurie Aren, director of family and community ministries for the Plymouth Corps, said that while her organization is monitoring the situation, no aid drive for those displaced by the fire appears to be needed.

# Colbeck bill would speed permit process

State Sen. Patrick Colbeck, R-Canton, is spearheading a new initiative he believes will speed up the time it takes for businesses to start-up, expand and hire by reducing unnecessary regulatory rules and streamlining the permitting process.

Coleck's T.I.M.E.D. (Time Is Money Economic Development) initiative focuses on ways to get the government off of the critical path in the construction permitting process so that businesses can go from concept to construction in a shorter time period. The initiative will also focus on the need to minimize the likelihood of litigation.

"It looks at economic development from the perspective of time, and in the case of business development, time is money," Colbeck said. "Sometimes the timing of a project is just as important, if not more so, than money. If you can't get your project completed on time you risk losing business. If we are serious about creating jobs in Michigan we need to get government out of the way and make it easier for businesses to start-up and expand."

Colbeck said the state's current regulatory and permitting process "is a disaster." The state of Michigan, he pointed out, has more than 700 forms pertaining to business development. Wading through this sea of forms is daunting to businesses of all sizes, but it

especially confounds small businesses with limited resources.

"We need to set up Michigan as a destination where we get people to work right away, which means we need to have the buildings they are working in developed and constructed as quickly as possible," Colbeck said. "That also means we still need to protect the environmental resources that help to make Michigan a destination state. We need to do so, however, in a much more streamlined manner than we do today that will treat businesses as customers and not as the enemy."

Colbeck said he's in the process of defining timing benchmarks in support of this initiative. He would like to hear from any local businesses that have encountered delays or obstacles in their permitting processes. spends between \$200 and \$300 on a required legal ad once an ordinance is changed. That compares to perhaps \$30 for an ad that would give notice that the fee schedule is to be reviewed, he said.

The Detroit Water and Sewerage Department, which sells water wholesale to the township, has announced plans to raise the price by 40 percent, from \$17.60 to \$24.67 per thousand cubic feet, beginning Friday, July 1. A thousand cubic feet is about 7,480 gallons.

The price hike is the largest this year for any of the more than 120 communities to which Detroit sells water. The township is challenging the increase, and discussions between the city and the township continue, Supervisor Richard Reaume said

Thursday.

The township's current retail water price — what it charges residential and business water customers — is \$3.10 per thousand gallons; with a sewage fee of \$5.25 per thousand gallons, township customers usually pay \$8.35 per thousand gallons for water and sewer service.



## Lawmaker earns accolades for school funding efforts

State Rep. Kurt Heise, R-Plymouth, may have stopped by the Wayne-Westland school board meeting Monday evening to talk politics, but he walked away with the "heartfelt thanks" of the school dis-

"We're well of Mr. Heise's efforts in the school aid initiative and Wayne-Westland's language," said school Superintendent Greg Baracy. "He recognized our situation and went to work for us. I can't thank him enough for what he has done for Wayne-Westland."

Heise was instrumental in getting a portion of Wayne-Westland's equity funding returned to the district after it had been axed from the school aid budget by Gov. Rick

for one year, that it's a oneyear fix, but I take it to mean we have another shot at it next year," said Heise, whose 20th District includes the entire city of Wayne.

He was one of four Republicans to vote against the entire school aid budget, telling board members that it was because of "the damage it was doing to all districts."

"The all-day kindergarten mandate will impact Plymouth-Canton and Northville Schools severely," he said. "Hopefully better days are ahead, and I can bring the money back to the district."

Heise added that lawmakers are busy with other educational reforms. The House has sent a package of four bills to the Senate that would reform teacher tenure laws.

"The consensus is that the current teacher tenure law isn't working well," he said. "Originally the idea was to get rid of teacher tenure, but I think a compromise will be worked out, but we need your input on this. I don't think anything will be done during the summer."

Heise added that he has yet to see the draft of the redistricting map and is unsure if Wayne will continue to be in his district. However, any

changes are 1 1/2 years off, he

Baracy described Heise as great listener." He met with him in February related to the equity funding Wayne-Westland receives. He said Heise sought out a lot of data about Wayne-Westland in his push to help the district.

"I can say without question he was there for us," said Baracy. "We understand why he voted no on the budget even though it included the Wayne-Westland language. We're just

thankful for all his hard work." "He truly is what a legislator is and should be," added school board President Skip Monit. "He worked for the people of Wayne-Westland and for the kids.

Baracy said that the district will have its legislators in at a later date to honor them for what they did.



# Family pleased with Orlewicz decision

The family of the victim in the grisly November 2007 Canton murder that once drew headlines as a "thrill kill" thinks there might be a light at the end of a very long, very tiring tunnel.

And, for once, they think the light might not be attached to an oncoming train.

Kim and James Sorensen of Westland, who've lived with the nightmare of their son's murder for nearly four years, were delighted by Tuesday's Michigan Court of Appeals ruling that Jean Pierre Orlewicz, the Plymouth Township man convicted three years ago of killing their 26year-old son, Daniel, is not entitled to a new trial.

'We feel good about this," said James Sorensen, "We feel very gratified that the court found in favor of the prosecution. This has been going on for over three years, so it is nice to know it's almost over."

The appellate court's decision reversed one made by Wayne County Circuit Judge Bruce Morrow, who ruled in December 2009 that Orlewicz's attorneys were correct in saying the convicted killer's rights were violated when original trial judge Annette Berry didn't allow psychiatric testimony in the original trial.

Morrow agreed, saying Berry's decision denied Orlewicz — now serving a life sentence with no possibility of

parole - his right to effective counsel by not allowing psychiatrists to testify. According to Orlewicz's lawyers, psychiatrists would have told the jury about Orlewicz's mental condi-

tion at the time of the killing. Orlewicz's appeals attorney, Elizabeth Jacobs, has said psychiatrists would have testified the brain of a 17-year-old is not fully developed and therefore children that age are less culpable than adults.

"I'm very disappointed as a lawyer, and the family is very disappointed," Jacobs said of

the appellate decision. "We believe strongly in these issues and will be taking them to the Michigan Supreme Court."

The Sorensens feel just as strongly about the psychiatric issues, calling the defense's contention about the development of a 17-year-old brain "scary and laughable."

"Should we therefore never hold anyone under 17 responsible for their actions?" James Sorensen said.

Orlewicz's appeal didn't follow a normal track once it got to the Michigan Court of Appeals. A three-judge panel heard the original arguments back in September. But the panel was reduced to two members after Gov. Rick Snyder appointed Brian Zahra to the Michigan Supreme Court in January. The two remaining members couldn't agree on a decision.

"The other two were at loggerheads," Jacobs said. A new panel reviewed tapes of the original September

arguments, then heard addi-

tional oral arguments June 8. The second panel published its opinion Tuesday. In rendering their opinion, judges said, in part, "(Morrow) erred in granting defendant's new trial, and we reverse that grant."

"Defendant has not presented to us any errors or infringements of his rights that warrant reversal, and he waived his public trial issue," the panel ruled. "We therefore affirm defendant's convictions and sentences."

Jacobs was quick to say the fight isn't quite over. She will appeal to the Michigan Supreme Court, probably by the end of July. That prospect is unpleasant to the Sorensens, but they feel confident in the outcome.

"We know there is still the Michigan Supreme Court, but I feel that's just a formality," James Sorensen said. "I just can't see them overturning the Appellate Court decision.'





# Senior year's her springboard to future

Lindsay Lipa runs extremely fast. But she also walks the walk.

The 17-year-old Lipa just graduated from Canton High School, where she did it all — especially her senior year.

She was in the National Honor Society, was part of the homecoming court and reached the Division 1 state meet in track and field, where she earned All-State honors in the long jump (an event she never did until mid-season).

Oh yeah, there were Advanced Placement classes, maintaining a 3.7 grade-point average, working at Einstein Bagel in downtown Plymouth and acting in "Fools," a fall school play.

"My role was this angry old woman who was a vendor, and had a negative attitude all the time, constantly yelled," said Lindsay with a big laugh. "And her name was Yenchna."

#### DON'T HOLD BACK

The only child born to Bill and Cindy Lipa explained why it was important to be here, there and everywhere instead of giving in to a case of senioritis as others undoubtedly did.

"I guess my senior year I wanted to make it really count, and I just wanted to do as much as I could," said Lipa, who will run track at Cornerstone University next year. "When I did go out for the play it was because 'I'm a senior, why not? What am I going to lose?'

"And then I gained so many friendships from that," she added. "I would never have talked to people, ever. And homecoming court was the same thing."

That approach certainly had a big fan in Cindy Lipa.

"Bottom line, she's always been grounded and know-

The way Lindsay competed

with the varsity girls track and field team probably topped the whole thing off. Although Lipa started running track at Central Middle School, she focused on running sprint relays and the high jump at Canton.

That is, until Chiefs cocoach Brad Waidmann needed her to compete in the long jump at the KLAA meet in mid-May.

Her first attempt at it was pretty good: second place with a jump of 17-feet, 1-inch.

a first-place mark of 17-6.5,
merely one-half inch shy of the
school record and earning her
a trip to the DI state meet at

Rockford High School.

"When I got to states, at prelims I was really nervous and I barely made it into finals (seventh; the top nine make it)," she stressed. "And then, in the actual finals, is when I just gave it my all and jumped 17-4.25 (fourth, good for All-State honors)."

Lipa probably wished she could have been long jumping throughout high school.

"It's really fun," Lipa said.
"You just run really fast, I love to sprint. High jump helped with it, too, because I know how to get up. So incorporating sprinting and jumping up is like a perfect mix."

She also reached the state meet in the high jump and as part of the 400-meter relay team with Robyn Piwowar, Gabby Williams and Elena Valetti.

"I was the anchor. I was really cool with that, too," Lipa continued.

#### LOVES TO LEAD

Being a co-captain was another feather in her cap. She shared those duties with seniors Rachael Martin, Bianca Kubicki, Chelsea Smith



# Tyler, meet Stanley

### Ex-Whaler Seguin hoists Cup as NHL rookie

A season ago, Tyler Seguin was attending school at Plymouth-Canton Educational Park, leading the Plymouth Whalers to the OHL playoffs and a sure bet to be selected either first or second in the NHL Entry Draft.

All of that seems a long time ago now for the 19-year-Seguin, who Wednesday night celebrated a Stanley Cup championship with his teammates on the Boston Bruins.

But there were many in the Plymouth Whalers organization keeping tabs on Seguin as he closed in on the unthinkable — a title in his rookie season.

"Here's a kid who just 12 months ago was going through the draft process and didn't know which team he'd be drafted to and if he'd play in the NHL<' Plymouth assistant general manager Brian Sommariva said. "I'm sure this is a dream come true for Tyler. I was still in shock last night."

Seguin's former junior coach, Mike Vellucci, told Sean Fitz-Gerald of Canada's National Post that he remembered talking to Tyler about the pros and cons of being picked second by Boston instead of No. 1 by Edmonton in the 2010 draft.

"Everybody wants to go No. 1 overall," Vellucci told Fitz-Gerald, "and I remember saying at the time, 'Look at it this way — you don't get too many chances to go No. 2 overall and possibly play in a Stanley Cup.'

"I think it's just a great opportunity for him. It's something that he deserves, he's worked very hard for it."

During the regular sea-

son Seguin (who tied for the OHL points lead with 106 in 2009-10) struggled a bit. He scored 11 goals and assisted on 11 more in 74 games for the Bruins.

One of his season highlights before the playoffs was scoring a goal in early February against the Detroit Red Wings at Joe Louis Arena, with many friends and former Plymouth teammates watching.

The gifted centerman then sat out the first two playoff series this spring, but really came into his own during the Eastern Conference finals against Tampa Bay with a two-goal, two-assist game. He finished the playoffs with three goals, four assists and seven points in 13 games.

Seguin could not be reached for comment.

# Run, throw, jump - All-Observer team does it all so well

FIRST-TEAM INDIVIDUALS Adam Clay, jr., Franklin: The junior broke a 41-year-old school record with a toss of 55 feet, 7 inches at the Yosilanti Relays.

Clay also went undefeated in dual meets and was Livonia City and Kensington Conference champion. He qualified for the state finals with a regional runner-up toss of 55-0.5 and placed ninth at the Division 1 state meet (52-5).

"He consistently threw over 50 feet all season," coach Pat Koelzer said. "Adam was one of our most improved athletes this season. He exceeded expectations early on with his record-breaking throw, then consistently put up points for us. Adam would be the first to say he expected more from himself at the state meet, but he will use his experience as a motivator for an even better senior year."

Jon Aneed, sr., Stevenson: The senior saved his best for last placing fifth in the Division 1 state meet with a personal best toss of

Aneed also placed first in the KLAA Association, second in the City and Kensington Conference, and was third in the regional.

"Jon finished off his high school career throwing four of six of his best throws ever at the state meet," coach Scott Shaw said. "Jon is very competitive and competes well in pressure situations. Over the last four years he and coach Tim Gabel have worked well together, and it was nice to see it pay off at the state meet."

Tom Norris, sr., Farmington: Norris was one of Farmington's leading throwers throughout his career and was a state qualifier this year in the discus. He had an area-best throw of 139-10. Norris was second in the OAA Red Division (135-10) and the West Bloomfield regional

"Tom has been a key member of the track and field team all four years," coach Kim Sturm said. "He, along with his fellow throwers, has helped to score many points toward winning four city, three league and one regional championship the team has accomplished. He has been league champion several times in both the shot put and discus. This year was his strongest year and concluded with a top-10 finish in the state in the discus.

Ben Spreitzer, sr., Canton: Another versatile and talented senior cocaptain for Canton, Spreitzer earned D1 All-State honors in the high jump, finishing seventh (6-5). But that wasn't his best performance, having reached the 6-6 mark during the season.

Spreitzer, who was second in team scoring, was first at the regional, second at the KLAA meet and third at the Steeb Meet of Champions. He also was a force in other events, running the 110 high hurdles in 15.4 seconds, the 300 intermediate hurdles in 39.9 and as part of the 1,600-meter relay team that earned second-team All-Observer honors.

"Ben Spreitzer was a four-year man for us and he improved each and every year," Richardson said. "He comes from a great family, his older brother ran for us for four

"Ben is going to Michigan State and we hope that maybe he'll even continue his athletic career there." James Vincent-Taylor, sr.,

Farmington: The senior standout was a two-time state qualifier in the long jump. He moved up three places this year in the Division 1 finals and finished third. Vincent-Taylor also is one of the area's best sprinters, and he anchored the sprint relay teams. He is the OAA Red champ in the 100 and the runner-up in the 200.

"James has had a wonderful season and career in track and field at Farmington High School," coach Charles Bridges said. "James' season had two major highlights, breaking Olympic gold medalist Warren "Rex" Cawley's long jump record from 1959 with a leap of 22-11 and earning first-team, all-state honors in the long jump.'

Nick Alaniva, sr., Canton: Alaniva was the Chiefs' leading scorer with an outstanding season capped by earning Division I All-State in the pole vault with a third-place mark of 15 feet, one inch.

That set a school and Plymouth-Canton Educational Park record. Alaniva's versatility was another plus, with excellent showings in the long jump (21-2.5 personal

best), 400 and 800 relays. Other top accomplishments for Alaniva, who has a 4.0-plus GPA, included first-place finishes in the regional and conference meets and

the Steeb Meet of Champions. "Nick Alaniva is a prime example of a guy who is willing to work harder than he has to because he wants to be so good," coach Bob Richardson said. "He was just

PAIN IN THE NECK Most neck pain does not come from the cervical vertebrae, that is, the bones of

the spine that originate from the neck. The main sources of neck pain are the muscles in the upper back particularly the trapezius, and the deeper muscles, the splenius and rectus capitus. When these muscles contract for a prolonged period, or go into spasm, the result is neck pain. The usual causes of neck muscle pain are physical strain or emotional tension.

Doctors will start their evaluation by an inquiry of how long the patient spends in front of a computer or had experienced an accident that resulted in a whip lash injury. The physician will ask about personal events that may have left the patient eeling that the weight of the world had fallen on their shoulders While most neck pain comes from a muscle source, the neck vertebrae can cause

a problem. Most often, the pain radiates down the arms, rather than staying focused in the neck area Treatment of neck pain follows from the cause. For a neck injury the first line treatment is cervical traction. The patient places his or her head in a special sling

while a counterweight of 30-35 lbs applies a pull that opposes the contraction of the neck muscles.

Neck pain from tension may respond when the doctor discusses the cause with the patient. Anti-anxiety drugs such as Valium may help, muscle relaxants do not. If the doctor believes the neck vertebrae are the source of pain, then imaging of the spine with x-rays, CT or MRI is in order.

on the tour.

Poster, a pastry chef at The Suburban Collection in Novi, gardens organically, which is one requirement of backyard habitat certification.

"We love homegrown organic vegetables. They taste good. My grandson loves to make pickles, so we have to grow cukes," she said. "In Northville we had just a few tomatoes and herbs."

She turned an old dog run into a "children's garden" where she grows broccoli, squash, pumpkin, garlic, horseradish, beans, cucumbers, tomatoes and celery in Livonia.

Vines sprout from a tire that was used as a swing, but now rests on its side.

"I have my son's old Tonka trucks that I use as planters and a little wagon with flowers in it," said Poster, who describes her mix of flowers and family artifacts as "a memory garden." It includes an old milk bucket, with an intact label, that came from her great-grandmother's farm.

#### TRASH TO ART

She also turns found objects into garden art and planters. Two of the eight bowling balls that decorate plant stands in flower beds and line the driveway alongside sunflowers were rescued from the trash at a garage sale.

"One I glued jewelry to. One I painted. My grandchildren and I covered one with foreign coins that I had picked up at an auction."

Poster said she keeps her gardening "casual" and tries to make the area stress-free as she works. When a family of skunks took up residence under a shed a few years ago, she simply played rap music "24-7" to drive them out. It worked. The skunks "have never come back."

# Dishwasher problem still hot

ollowing my recent column on why the glasses appear all fogged up in dishwashers, I received an e-mail from Donald which made a lot of sense to me.

Remember that I said I was going to North Dakota and South Dakota and those states did not have the phosphate ban imposed on them. I did purchase two large boxes of Cascade dish-

washer detergent which said nothing different on them from what you purchase in Michigan.

Donald's e-mail says: "I just got around to reading your article about phosphate-free detergents. About a year ago, when the formula change was first announced, I did a little research on the topic. After looking at the Cascade Web site and several other sources, I concluded that the formula change was universal throughout the country. It's probably not real-

istic to think that manufacturers would market different products in different states. Many large retailers maintain distribution centers that serve multiple states. I can't imagine them stocking different products for different states, especially with the Feds nipping at their ankles and probably looking for ways to make states comply. I found Lemishine on Amazon and intend to give it a try. Keep up the good work!"

Well Donald, when I received your e-mail I told myself, this guy is way ahead of me. But regardless, I put the old detergent away and we immediately began to use the stuff I purchased in South Dakota. I figured that if it's the same it won't be long before the glasses get all foggy

again. It's been three weeks now and the problem still is not happening.

It appears that the dishwasher detergent sold in the other states where the phosphate is not banned is still containing phosphates. I thought your studies made a whole lot of smarts but it appears that the manufacturers are going to the trouble of shipping different detergents to individual states. I think my glasses are living proof of that fact and I will soon interview a lady representing a soap company. I will get to the final conclusion one way or another.

Summarize: Phosphate is banned in 16 states. It's no longer a part of dishwasher detergent. As a result, glasses come clean but are foggy. To resolve this problem, add a teaspoon of Lemi Shine mixed into the detergent. Problem solved. Lemi Shine is becoming available in many

# Think twice before recommending a friend

Want to refer a friend? Even though it can seem like just a small favor in a tough job market, it's important to think carefully before recommending a friend to someone in your professional network. Referring a friend to a former colleague or someone in your network is fairly simple for most people, but if your friend is less than stellar at the job, it can backfire and reflect poorly on your own career, experts say. Because you know your friends from a mostly social perspective, vouching for them on the job may affect your credibility with someone in your network.

Here's what to consider before recommending a friend:

#### How well you know your friend

Referring someone whom you've met just a few times or haven't been in contact with in years could be risky. Before you press "send" and pass on his resume, it's important for you to evaluate what you know about the person and how he acts in the workplace. "Consider first if you know the person well enough to recommend them," says Chris Posti, president of outplacement firm Posti & Associates.

#### His employment history

Even if you've never worked with your friend, finding out his employment history before sending out a recommendation is a good move. Think about it objectively before making a decision. Don't refer the friend if "your friend's general employment history is spotty for reasons you know to be

a current or former boss, this could result in the company asking for a formal referral. Consider whether you would "be willing for that employer to contact you concerning your friend," Dunkin says. It's easy to empathize with a job seeker, but formally vouching for his skills on the job is a more serious decision. If you're not up for it, consider just providing a



negative," says Ann Dunkin, the operations manager at Attorney Resource Inc. who handles human resources issues. Should your friend get a negative reputation on the job, it could put you in an uncomfortable position.

#### Would you vouch for him to human resources?

contact's email or phone number but asking your friend to not mention your name.

#### **Examine vour own reputation**

Sometimes there are other more personal reasons for asking that your name not be mentioned. Your own reputation at the company or with a former boss can influence how your recommendation is perceived, Posti says. "Maybe

your friend doesn't know that you are not on good terms with your boss or that your work is just average," he says. "Your friend may be better off pursuing the job on his or her own." So even if you're totally positive about your friend's candidacy, recommending him may still not be your best bet.

#### Predict your own working relationship

Before making a recommendation, think ahead to what your working relationship would be like down the road. For example, if your friend works for your current company and is now reporting to you, it's important to feel comfortable with the new dynamic. Or if the friend is a gossip, it can be valuable to keep him or her away from your current boss. Ask yourself, "Does the person know any skeletons in your closet that might be spilled out over drinks at the company's Christmas party?" Posti says. Before passing on his resume, think carefully about how it could affect your career.
