Calling beckons new PCA chief

When Mark Wood left the 800-student Christian school he shepherded in Boise, Idaho, a few years ago, he didn't figure his retirement was a permanent thing.

He was right. So when God came knocking, Wood, of course, answered the door. Earlier this year Wood, a retired U.S. Air Force officer with a Ph.D. in education from Liberty (Va.) University, accepted the calling as the head of school for Plymouth

Christian Academy. He replaces Dr. David Butler, who retired after

the 2010-11 school year. "I wasn't retired in the sense I was going to play golf the rest of my life,' Wood said with a smile. "I'm 55 years old, and I think I have something

left to give." He decided to give it to PCA, a 600-student K-12 Christian school on Joy Road in Canton. His previous experience was at

the two-campus Cole Valley Christian School in Boise (he also led a small school in Albuquerque, N.M.), a post he took so his wife, Janet, could be near her twin sister.

That was all after a lengthy Air Force career during which he was both an enlisted man (a security policeman and a recruiter) and an officer (he did missile duty in Montana), where his last assignment was leading the U.S. Air Force Honor Guard in Washington, D.C.

He was in line for a promotion, though he hadn't yet taken it, when "God made it clear to me He had other work for me to do."

That's when he went to Albuquerque and, ultimately, Idaho. The couple moved to Mt. Morris, Mich., to take care of Janet's mother, and Wood took up residence as an adjunct professor with Liberty University and a part-time pastor for his church.

Developers from Salem eye township water

The developers of a large residential and retail neighborhood planned for Salem Township want to study the possibility of buying water from Plymouth Township instead of constructing their own well system.

But they would only propose such a deal if it would be a "win-win" for both parties, one of the developers told Plymouth Township officials Tuesday.

"We're not asking for a single penny from Plymouth Township," Steven Fisher, representing developer Salem Springs LLC, said at Tuesday's Board of Trustees meeting. Fisher was not on the board's agenda for Tuesday, but trustees heard him during the public comment segment toward the end of the meeting.

Fisher said his company may be able to save money by buying water from the township rather than building a well system, and that he wants the company's engineering consultants to study the issue. "It can only be a win-win situation" in order to move forward, he said. "I want to prove that" with the study.

Salem Springs is planned for about 200 acres west of Napier and north of M-14, Fisher said.

Township officials reacted warily -- and seemed a little puzzled about what Fisher was asking them.

Treasurer Ron Edwards said Plymouth Township is in a delicate time in its relationship with the city of Detroit, from which it buys

water, over consumption patterns and the wholesale water rate.

Detroit sought to impose a 40-percent wholesale increase earlier this year, but township officials bargained that down to about 18 percent, passing along only part of that to its residential and business customers. The township is also in the midst of system upgrades that officials say will help it offset spikes in demand during peak periods, which can lead to higher wholesale rates.

"We can't jeopardize this," Edwards said, adding that he's uncertain if Detroit officials would agree to a watersale plan.

Fisher said several times that he's aware of the township's negotiations with Detroit. "We understand that and we don't want to interfere with that," he said.

But a water deal with Salem Springs could help the township with wholesale rates, Fisher said, if, for example, the new development included a water storage tank that could be tapped by Plymouth Township.

That prompted Trustee Steve Mann to scoff that any water sold to the development wasn't likely coming back.

Ultimately, Mann told Fisher that the study's consultants could obtain information about the township's water system through Freedom of Information Act requests, and that any discussion about Plymouth Township selling water to Salem Springs should involve Salem Township officials.

Realtors help Missouri tornado victims rebuild

Dave Efird lost his automobile repair shop, tools and equipment, and a "mini museum" of car-related collectibles, including several vintage models, to a tornado last spring, but the response from a Plymouth Township real estate office is helping him stay in business.

"It blew everything away," Efird, owner of Efird's Automotive Service, said of the May 22 tornado in Joplin, Mo. The twister, one of the deadliest in U.S.

history, claimed more than 150 lives and reduced thousands of buildings to rubble, including his auto shop.

That's where Keller Williams Realty stepped in, through its KW Cares program, which aids agents and employees and their families in times of crisis.

Employees at the Keller Williams Plymouth-Canton office on Ann Arbor Road raised more than \$1,400 of the \$2,120 sent to Efird from the company's regional office. Corporate headquarters in Austin, Texas, chipped in another \$5,000, and

the money allowed Efird to buy equipment and move into a temporary shop so he can stay in business while he rebuilds.

'It's amazing'

"It got me opened back up," Efird said recently during a telephone interview. "Basically got

me back in where I am now." "It's amazing what they did," said his wife, Cheryl Efird, an agent at Keller Williams of Southwest Missouri in Joplin. "Until you go through a disaster, you really don't understand it, and you don't know what you need."

"We're excited for them," said Lloyd O'Dell, a Realtor and the operating principal at the local Keller Williams office. "We're glad we were able to help out."

After the tornado, O'Dell said, regional Keller Williams management asked each of its local offices to donate a \$100 gift card that would be forwarded to the Efirds.

"I have a great team here, and they thought they could do better than that," O'Dell said. They ended up raffling off an iPad, sell-

'Miss Kristen' closes chapter on storytime career

It wasn't like Kristen Kostielney to cry when she sang her goodbye song, the same one she always sings to end her children's storytime sessions at the Canton Public Library.

Unable to fight back her tears, she had to stop singing and start over Wednesday evening during her rendition of Time To Say Goodbye To All My Friends.

Because this time, it

really was goodbye. Kostielney, the library's program specialist for children, tween and teen services, ends a 21-year career Monday, one that began when she was hired as a part-time page when she was only 16.

Known fondly as Miss Kristen to thousands of local children who came to know her and love her over the years, Kostielney is leaving to become a Head Start teacher of children ages 3 and 4 at the Campagna Center in Alexandria, Va., a town where her husband, Craig, has found an accounting job.

"I always said if I ever left here, I wanted to work in a Head Start classroom," Kostielney,

37, said. Yet she feels emotional leaving Canton, where she has lived since age 5 when her family moved from Maryland after her father got a job with Ford Motor Co. She leaves behind cherished relatives, co-workers and library patrons.

"I consider everyone family here," she said.

Cause for tears

The feeling is mutual. Canton mom Lalita Mishra said her daughters — Pragya, 7, and Jaya, 5 — will miss Kostielney's storytime sessions, book clubs, Halloween parties, handson science programs and other children's projects. Pragya cried when she was told Miss Kristen was leaving.

"She has left a good impression on my daughters," Mishra said. "She is so interesting, and it has helped the kids so much. She even showed them how to make ice cream. She is like their best friend. Every time we go to the library, they want to see her.'

Kostielney has no children of her own, but she leaves behind close-knit family members who live within a three-mile radius in Canton — parents Beverley and Denis Tierney; sister Stephanie Tierney; and sister Kim Witten, brother-in-law Mike Witten, and their daughters Abby, 10, and Emily, 7.

New phase

Sitting in the library prior to her last storytime, Kostielney's eyes teared up several times as she described her bittersweet feelings of leaving so many people who love her for a new phase of life she admits "is really exciting."

Kostielney attended two area elementary schools - Fiegel Elementary School in the Plymouth-Canton district and Wayne-Westland's Walker-Winter — before going to St. Mary Catholic School in Wayne and

graduating from Ladywood High School in Livonia.

She was only 16 when she became a Canton library page, and she continued working part time as she earned her education degree from Eastern Michigan University. She stayed with the library as she did her student teaching at Isbister Elementary in Plymouth and as she worked part time as a preschool teacher for Plymouth Children's

Nursery.

Kostielney accepted a full-time library job 15 years ago when her position as children's program specialist was created, and she has never regretted her decision.

"I have awesome coworkers and awesome patrons," she said. "I've made great friends. They have really made me part of their life.

Her library family honored her Thursday evening with a farewell par-

"Kristen has been such an asset to the library --to the community - that it is very difficult to see her go," said Anne Heide-mann, department head for children, tween and teen services. "She has touched the lives of so many of the children and families in Canton, and we have been so lucky to have her with us for so many years. While I'm quite sad to let her go, I know that Kristen is making an exciting move and that she will certainly shine and bring the enthusiasm and expertise she is known for to children and families in a new community."

Bigger scope

Library statistics indicate Kostielney has had 95,285 on-the-job interactions with children, though that number includes repeat patrons. It's common for her young fans to stop her in grocery stores and restaurants.

"I love the kids," she said. "Kids are so honest. You can't fake them. They either like you or they don't."

Kostielney has broadened the scope of her library duties by working with outside organizations such as Canton Leisure Services, Starfish Family Services, the Plymouth Whalers, Canton Farmers Market, preschools and day care centers. Sometimes she has taken programs on the road; sometimes the groups come to her.

She also has been involved in her community through the Canton Kiwanis Club and St. Thomas a'Becket Catholic Church.

Reflecting on her 21-year library career, Kostielney said she has no regrets. Her successor hasn't been chosen, but Monday marks her last day — a day she chose because she wanted to attend the International Talk Like a Pirate Day program.

"I wanted to end with a fun program," she said. One with smiles - and perhaps a few more tears though it seems both

are deserved in equal

measure.



Veterans get benefit help at summit

Air Force Reservist Dawn Neagos of St. Clair is pretty sure neither her father nor her father-inlaw, both retired military veterans, knew exactly what kind of benefits they were entitled to following their long military careers.

That's why Neagos made the long drive Thursday for the Canton Community Foundation's second annual Veterans' Summit at Laurel Manor in Livonia.

The first day of the two-day program was designed for attorneys and legal advocates; the second day was devoted to providing information about benefits and programs available to veterans and their families.

"Having all the information in one location is just essential," said Neagos, whose father-in-law was a World War II Navy man and whose father is a Vietnam-era Army veteran. "You can spend hours and hours online just trying to find the right person. It's discouraging. My father-in-law never knew, so now my mother-in-law, who is now a widow, is certainly missing out on any number of benefits."

CCF President Joan Noricks said the summit "narrowed the gap in Michigan's lack of continuing legal education," and drew some 50 veteran and legal advocates for the first day (up from 30 last year) and some 215 veterans (up from 150) for the second day.

For the second consecutive year, the CCF received a grant from the Holbrook Charitable Trust to sponsor the forum.

"This program is the

only one of its kind in Michigan," Noricks said. "The foundation is proud to lead the way in informing veterans about the benefits they have earned with their service."

The second day of the summit, designed as an informational day for veterans wanting details about available services/ benefits, featured a variety of vendors talking about VA benefits, compensation, disability compensation, medical services and E-benefits.

There was also a panel discussion featuring a variety of Veterans Affairs and Disabled American Veterans groups. The program targeted the approximately 350,000 veterans who live in metropolitan Detroit.

So many people "don't

know what they were entitled to," said James Fausone, managing partner of Legal Help for Veterans, PLLC, in Northville and a member of the CCF's board of directors.

The first day is as important as the second day, Fausone said, because it allows veteran and legal advocates to get certification necessary in dealing with the mounds of red tape that often accompany finding out about benefits.

"It's a huge federal bureaucracy," Fausone said. "The veteran trying to sift through it on his own is probably going to be unsuccessful.

Air Force Col. (Ret.) James Hoefel hadn't needed his veterans' benefits much until recently, when he encountered some

health issues and went to the VA Hospital in Ann Arbor and then the University of Michigan Hospital. The Westland resident said he came to the summit because he had "cer-


tain interests" and believes there are benefits about which he could learn.

"I got a bag full of information. ... I'll spend hours going through it," Hoefel said. "The information

is very useful and, of course, there's a comfort factor being around other veterans."

Readers form election panel

While the Plymouth and Canton Observer editorial staff will, as always, put together an endorsement in the race for the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools Board of Education, voters are going to get an additional opinion from five of their own.

Five residents of the local community make up the Observer's first Reader Election Endorsement Panel, a group formed to put together to help readers understand the issues and the candidates.

The panel was formulated after 15 candidates, an unusually high number for a local school board race, filed to run for the four open seats in the Nov. 8 election

"It's something we've thought about putting together for a long time," said Observer publisher Susan Rosiek. "Having that many people step up to run for the board told us there was a tremendous amount of interest in this election. We wanted to tap into that."

The five members of the panel:

 Kary Amin of Plymouth — The 50-year-old Amin is the vice president of Nova Environmental, Inc. He cochaired committees for the last three school bond campaigns and sat on the facility director

selection committee. He owns a bachelor's degree in geology, with a teach-

ing certification. • Eric Brown of Canton

--- The 46-year-old HR representative for Blue Cross-Blue Shield Michigan is a charter member of the Plymouth-Canton Committee for Diversity and Inclusion. Brown, who has a son and a daughter attending Plymouth-Canton schools, owns a bachelor's degree from Eastern Michigan University.

 Carol Pastrick of Plymouth — The 67year-old former educator is new to the area, having lived in Plymouth

for about a year. Pastrick, who owns a master's degree, wants the district to "remain a topperforming school sys-

• Ryan Hayes of Plymouth — At 22, Hayes is the youngest member of the reader panel. He is a graduate of Salem High School and is currently working toward a bachelor's degree at Wayne State University. Hayes has worked on projects with both the Lions Club and the Plymouth Salvation Army.

 Bob Burger of Canton — the 44-year-old Burger, who grew up in Livonia, has a son at

Plymouth High School and a daughter at Pioneer Middle School. He's been involved with the Sunflower Subdivision Board of Directors and has been a volunteer coach for the CEBL. His kids also play for the Canton Soccer Club.

Some 15 people applied for the five-member panel. The panel will interview the candidates. observe them in candidate forums and formulate their own endorsement, which will be published before the elec-

Legislators push for bill hearing

State Sen. Patrick Colbeck, R-Canton, and State Rep. Kurt Heise, R-Plymouth, have formally requested a hearing in the Senate Committee on Local Government and Elections on legislation they introduced that would consolidate school board member elections to coincide with the November general election.

The school districts would still be free to hold millage elections on other dates at their own discretion.

The legislators sent a formal request to the chair of the committee where the bills are currently assigned asking for Senate Bills 426-427 (Colbeck) and House Bills 4005-4006 (Heise) to be given a hearing. The bills are double bluebacks - identical language introduced in both chambers of the Legislature.


"There are many reasons I support the concept of consolidated elections, chief among them being the savings to our school districts,' Colbeck said. "This is funding that can be redirected to our classrooms."

"This is commonsense legislation that will save money, increase voter turnout, and provide more information on school board candidates," said Representative Heise. "It puts more money in the classroom and improves efficiency."

Both legislators said school districts will see a cost-savings from this legislation. It has been estimated by the Senate Fiscal Agency that by "piggybacking" school elections onto the general election in November, school districts across the state will save up to \$7 million annually.

The House Fiscal Agency projects that current school board elections cost between \$25,000 and \$50,000 for a stand-alone election and \$5,000 to \$10,000 when added on to an existing millage election. Requiring school board elections to be held at the same time as the general election in November, they said, eliminates the need for the school districts to hold additional elections and incur additional costs.

Additionally, the legislators said, turnout for the November elections is consistently higher than school elections in February or May. Moving the school board elections to November will mean higher voter participation in electing school board members.

Shoe shop expands downtown Plymouth footprint



Online shopping can save on shoe leather, but a business in downtown Plymouth is successfully combining the two.

Pete's Shoe Repair & Leather, tucked into a storefront at the back of a building on Main Street, recently expanded into another storefront a few steps away, where its Internet shoe sales are based. Owner Rimon Warra has been selling high-end men's shoes in his shop for about seven years, but it's on the Internet where sales are really taking off, he said.

Warra and son Nick, who is in charge of Internet sales, say they can offer top-quality shoes at better prices than other online stores, and even at lower prices than manufacturers offer through their sites.

"All the factories know what we do, and they sell us, because we bring them a lot of business," Rimon Warra said Friday at his newest storefront, where Nick Warra and Mike Palo, director of operations, process Internet orders and prepare

them for shipping.
Pete's Shoes ships
around the world, and
doesn't charge for ship-

ping within the U.S. The new storefront stocks the most commonly sold shoes (and Rimon stocks shoes in his repair shop as well), but many Internet orders are shipped direct from the factory, Nick Warra said.

When they're not working on orders, Nick Warra and Palo are looking at other shoe store websites and doing price analyses, trying to find a competitive edge.

They also learn the shoes, which come from factories around the world, including in Brazil, Spain, Portugal and, yes, even the U.S. Customers often ask specifically for U.S.-made shoes, Nick Warra said (Allen Edmonds makes a lot of them).

"A lot of people want to know where their shoes are made, so we definitely have to know that," he said.

Nick Warra started dabbling in Internet shoe sales to make a little money while attending college, and he used to work from home. Now, with computer skills and an accounting degree from Madonna University, "there's no looking back," he said.

Pete's Shoes currently sells shoes from Allen Edmonds, Johnston & Murphy, Florsheim, Bacco Bucci, Mezlan and Mephisto, a French company. With the addition of the latter, the Warras said, they started selling women's shoes for the first time. They're working to build relationships with other manufacturers.

ers.
"Around here, they buy
a high-quality shoe," the
elder Warra said. "This is

what they want."
Although sales now provide more business than repairs, Rimon Warra doesn't see an end to his specialty. "I'm happy with my fixing shoes still," he said.


So are his customers, Warra added. Warra says a lot of regulars buy shoes from him, later have them resoled or reheeled, and still later buy another pair. "Repeat customers have been nonstop to my store," he said.

Pete's was opened in 1949 by Pete Mucci, who sold the business to Rimon Warra just over 20 years ago. He rents both of his storefronts from Jim McKeon, a long-time downtown Plymouth property owner. "He's one of the best landlords anybody can find," he said.

ing 100 \$20 tickets and netting more than \$1,400 after expenses.

Regional managers liked the outcome so much, they plan a similar iPad raffle to raise even more money, he said.

'We want to help'

Keller Williams also emphasizes local community service, O'Dell said, and sets aside one day each May for local projects sponsored by its offices around the country. This year, he said, his agents and employees held a food drive, and in 2010 they donated labor and materials to landscape the office of a nonprofit that offers grief counseling.

"It's important for us,"
O'Dell said. "We work
here, we live here and we
want to help the community."

Cheryl Efird said other agents in her office who were affected by the tornado were similarly "adopted" through KW Cares, including some whose homes were totally destroyed.

Getting her husband's shop reopened, she said, was crucial. "We were having 30 and 40 calls a day from his customers," she said. Insurance isn't providing enough to cover the losses and restart, Dave Efird said.

Efird's Automotive Service was started by Dave Efird's late father, Al, in 1965 and has been in the family ever since. The destroyed building on East 20th Street in Joplin had been its home since 1994.

The building sat between two storage 'facilities, and the tornado "churned everything up like a blender" and left debris from those storage units, and from other businesses, on the property, Dave Efird said.

Of the 16 cars parked there that day, six of them his and the rest belonging to clients, "five cars left the building, as Elvis would say it." Others were found heavily damaged and scattered about on other properties. His restored 1953 Lincoln Cosmopolitan "went from a four-door sedan to a four-door semi-convertible," he joked.

Time to rebuild

As the property is paid for, Dave Efird said, the current plan is to rebuild Efird's Automotive on the site. But cleanup isn't yet complete, he said, and construction firms there are plenty busy.

"There's starting to be some building coming back, but it still looks like a war zone," Efird said of the Joplin area as a whole. "There's still some debris that's not cleaned up."

The tornado destroyed several schools and displaced more than half of Joplin's schoolchildren, Efird said. High school juniors and seniors, for example, now attend classes at a local mall.

The Efirds have 10 grandchildren attending local schools. "They seem to have adjusted extremely well, I would say," Dave Efird said.

May 22 was a Sunday and — luckily — Efird's was closed. "If it would've hit during the week ... there would've probably been casualties," Dave Efird said.

Earlier this year, Wood got a call about the PCA opening from someone in this area whose brother had been attached to Wood's school in Idaho. Wood felt God's hand in the details and applied.

"God found me, I wasn't trying to find a job," Wood said. "I want to obey God, and God said, 'Wood, this is next.' I will work hard until He is done with me."

That sense of faith stood Wood well during

the interview process. A 12-member panel talked to about a dozen candidates on the phone and brought three of them in for face-to-face interviews. Wood was a unanimous choice.

"He just seemed to have such a sweet spirit about loving the school and loving the Lord," said Jim Rich, chairman of PCA's Board of Regents, who led the hiring process. "That's what makes the difference at PCA, the spiritual essence of our program. We thought (Wood) was the right fit for PCA at this point in time."

Wood said he spent three days touring the facility and talking to people. In that time, he said, he met students, faculty, parents and staff.

He said he was impressed with the quality of the education — "Almost every student who graduates goes on to college," Wood said — and the quality of the people involved at both ends, those delivering the education and the students receiving it.

"What makes this school the best is the character of the students, which is a reflection of the character of the parents, which reflects the character of the faculty," Wood said. "The solid, Godly character makes this the best school in the area."



County officials break ground on new jail

Wayne County Commissioner Joan Gebhardt (D-District 12) joined Chairman Gary Woronchak, County Executive Robert Ficano and Sheriff Benny Napoleon in a ground-breaking ceremony Thursday on a \$300 million state-of-the-art jail facility.

The new 715,000-squarefoot Wayne County Jail will be located downtown across from Frank Murphy Hall of Justice on property bordering Gratiot, St. Antoine, Clinton and the Chrysler Service Drive. It is scheduled to open July 2014.

"It is the responsibility of the Wayne County Commission under the county charter to

approve contracts and ensure that the people's best interests are in order with a project of this magnitude," said Gebhardt, who made motions on several fronts to see the project through. "The Commission has done its job and I have to feel excited about the jobs this will bring to so many hard-working families in our area."

According to Gebhardt, the new jail will save the county money by using new technologies and the latest best practices for prisoner movement and supervision, and will also create safer environments for prisoners and employees.

"I say with confidence that we have done our job well, and we stand here as partners in this ambitious and outstanding venture for which we are breaking ground today," Woronchak said.

It is also estimated that more than 2,000 jobs will be created by the project, which is one of the largest construction initiatives Wayne County has launched in several years.

The facility will have 2,192 beds and house prisoners who would currently be in two downtown jails and a jail in Hamtramck. The downtown jails, built in 1929 and 1981, are expected to be demolished. The fate of the Hamtramck facility, in operation since 1991, remains unclear.

Video visitation will be one new feature for the facility as prisoners will now be able to meet with relatives and clergy from their cells by way of cameras and television screens.

"Building a new jail isn't cause to celebrate," Ficano said. "What we are saying is in these economic times, you have to look at everything in terms of improving efficiency and cutting costs. That's what this project will do."

Wayne County, in an effort to stimulate local economic activ-

ity, used a consulting firm to prequalify contractors. Presently, approximately 425 potential contractors have been prequalified. Of those candidates, 60 percent are Wayne Countyand City of Detroit-based.

"There is no question this center is crucial to alleviating many of our fiscal issues," Sheriff Napoleon said. "We know that we cannot incarcerate our way out of the ills plaguing our county. However, we can take the measured steps to streamline our system so that money we have available is being used to its utmost bene-

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

Duration of Permit: Renewal. This section provides for the duration. renewal and expiration of a telecommunications permit.

75.12 Permit Terms and Requirements.

Construction Permit. This section provides that a Permittee shall not commence construction upon, over, across or under the Public Utility Easements and Rights-of-Way without first obtaining any required construction permit.

75.13 Use of Public Utility Easements and Rights-of-Way By Permittee.

Pavement Cut Coordination/Additional Fees. This section provides that a Permittee shall coordinate all construction work in the Public Utility Easements and Rights-of-Way with the Township.

VIOLATION AND PENALTY. SECTION II.

This section provides that any person or entity who violates the provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and may be fined not more than Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars or imprisoned for not more than ninety (90) days, or both, at the discretion of the Court.

SECTION III. SEVERABILITY.

This section provides that any unenforceable section can be severed from the

SECTION IV. REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES.

This section provides that all Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

SECTION V. SAVINGS CLAUSE

This section provides that adoption of this Ordinance does not affect proceedings, prosecutions for violation of law, penalties and matured rights and duties in effect before the effective date of this Ordinance.

SECTION VI. PUBLICATION.

This section provides that the Clerk for the Charter Township of Plymouth shall cause this Ordinance to be published in the manner required by law.

SECTION VII. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This section provides that this Ordinance, as amended, shall take full force and effect upon publication as required by law.

When Air Force Airman First Class Christian (Chris) Lopez was deployed to the Middle East last April, his wife Amber, 18, was pregnant with their second child and due in September. Converting from traditional IRA to Roth makes sense

Q: Dear Rick: I read your recent column about Roth conversions. I think it would make sense for me, but I want to share my situation. I am divorced and presently unemployed. I am hoping to get a job next year. I have been living on the money I am receiving from my divorce. None of the money from my ex-husband is taxable. Last year, I had zero taxable income. I am guessing that this year I will also have no income. I am a nurse, so I should have no problem getting a job next year. I have about \$20,000 in a traditional IRA. I'm in my late 30s and don't plan on touching the money for years down the road. What do you think. Should I convert?

A: I think you are a perfect candidate to convert vour traditional IRA into a Roth IRA. The fact that you had no taxable income last year and probably will have none this year provides you with a great

only a portion? Depending upon your deductions and exemptions, you should be able to convert a significant portion of the money without any tax liability. Without question, at a minimum, that amount of monev should be converted. The issue is whether the portion of money that may be subject to income tax should be converted. Since you will start working next year, and as a result

will have taxable income,

at a minimum, you will

be in the low tax brack-

et. Because the money you would have to pay taxes on in the conversion would only be taxed at the low bracket, it makes sense to convert the entire amount this year. This will allow you to turn tax-deferred money into tax-free money, which will provide you with a substantial benefit down the road.

There is, however, one caveat. You must have the money to pay the taxes on the taxable money from the conversion without touching the amount converted. If you meet that criterion, then my recommendation would be to convert the entire amount.

For those in a low tax bracket or with little taxable income, converting a traditional IRA into a Roth IRA is something that should be considered. Always remember that when it comes to converting, you do not have to convert the entire IRA. You

can convert as little or as much as you want.

It is important to remember that the conversion must be completed before year's end. It's not like a new contribution in which you have until April 15, 2012. It typically takes about two days to complete this transation — from the time you notify your custodian until completion.

However, don't forget that custodians get extremely busy near the end of the year and it's not unusual that the same transaction that may take just a couple of days to complete in September may take more than two weeks to complete in December. Therefore, even though you still have plenty of time to do the Roth conversion, you don't want to wait until the last minute.

The major advantage of a Roth IRA is that the money grows tax-free, not tax-

deferred. When you withdraw money from a traditional IRA, that money is taxable to you. That is not the case with a Roth IRA.

Another benefit, which

in many situations can be substantial, is that Roth IRAs are not subject to minimum required distributions. As opposed to having to withdraw money at 701/2 with a traditional IRA, you can let that money grow tax-free for as long as you choose. Also, with a traditional IRA, if there is money left over upon death, your beneficiaries would pay income taxes on the distribution when that money is eventually withdrawn. If it was a Roth IRA, the distribution would be tax-free to your beneficiaries.

Roth IRAs are great investment tools, and more and more people ought to take advantage of them. A Roth conversion is relatively easy and straightforward and can save you money on taxes, but most importantly, it makes sense economically. Good luck!



McCotter's Social Security fix: allow personal savings accounts

Congressman Thaddeus McCotter, R-Livonia, believes Social Security can be saved from insolvency by allowing for personal savings accounts and cutting other federal programs.

McCotter introduced legislation, HR 2889, Monday aimed at allowing all workers, age 50 or younger, to create personal savings accounts eligible for "reasonably flexible investment" in the free market.

The accounts would be administered through the federal government and the current level of benefits would be maintained.

McCotter said participation in the accounts would be voluntary, and a minimum return on investment would be guaranteed. "We will not go further into debt, and there's no cost to the taxpavers," McCotter said of his bill.

'Like refinancing a house'



Funding for the accounts will come from cuts and elimination of other federal programs, expected to be identified in companion legislation, and efficiencies realized from block granting specific federal programs to states, McCotter said.

"It's like refinancing a house," he said. "You have to find the savings to pay down the debt." McCotter added that a majority of Americans don't want their benefits cut, taxes raised or the retirement age raised.

McCotter, who is also running for the Republican nomination for president, introduced his bill the same day that the Republican presidential candidates debated on CNN. McCotter, who has low poll numbers compared to the other candidates, was not invited to the debate.

McCotter noted that the

other candidates debated over "who called Social Security what" instead of discussing solutions. "The media didn't want to give any story to solutions," he said of the coverage of the debate.

The chief actuary of Social Security, Peter Goss, confirmed that the legislation, if implemented, would eliminate future deficits while satisfying current obligations.

Higher benefits

The actuary predicted that 100 percent of participants would choose the personal accounts because they would yield higher benefits, but he could not estimate the cost of a federal benefit guarantee. The Social Security trust fund is expected to be solvent through 2036.

According to former Reagan administration appointee Peter J. Ferrara, if the McCotter plan were enacted, it would generate "the single largest spending and debt reductions of government in world history." Ferrara appeared Monday with McCotter to discuss the legislation.

McCotter's legislation is supported by Americans for Tax Reform, Americans for Prosperity and 60Plus.

He hasn't discussed his proposal yet with other congressional members, nor his fellow Republicans, but he is looking for bipartisan support.

McCotter said his bill would not raise payroll taxes, affect current benefits for recipients or increase the retirement age. "I hope we can find out (about support) at some point. If not, I would ask which one do you want to do," he said. McCotter remains opposed to increasing taxes, impacting benefits or raising the retirement age.

With the changing demographics and the issuing of funding Social Security in the balance, McCotter believes lawmakers need to fix the system.

"Otherwise, our kids will lose faith in the system," McCotter said. "That's always danger-

Wildcats out-Fox Churchill, 41-0

Despite going into halftime with a 14-0 lead Friday, Plymouth football coach Mike Sawchuck wasn't happy with much of what he saw.

So he went into the locker room at the break and challenged his team to get down to business and play what he called "Wildcat

The Wildcats did just that, riding the legs of running back Donte Fox to an easy 41-0 win over visiting Livonia Churchill, unbeaten Plymouth's fourth straight win.

"We made a lot of mental errors in the first half, and I wasn't happy with that," Saw-chuck said. "We said (at halftime) we need to out-physical them, and they did."

The Wildcats got off to a quick start when Stefan Turrentine laid a hit on Churchill running back Romello Brown, who fumbled the ball. Plymouth's Tyler Goble scooped it up and rumbled 35 yards for the game's first touchdown with 6:52 left in the first quarter.

When Fox scored two minutes later on a 1-yard run to give Plymouth a 14-0 lead, it looked like the Wildcats were going to

dominate. Not so, according to their coach.

'We weren't that dominant in that first half," Sawchuck said.

But they were in the second. Turrentine returned the second-half kickoff to the Wildcats' 46, but a 5-yard facemask penalty moved them to the Chargers' 49. That's when Fox took over, gaining 32 yards on five carries over the seven-play drive. The drive was helped when Plymouth quarterback Shaun Austin's pass bounced off the hands of his intended receiver, Matt Janke, and nestled in the arms of teammate Nate Emminger for a 9-yard

gain that kept the drive alive. Fox ended it two plays lat-

er, scoring the Wildcats' third touchdown after hitting the middle of the line, then squeezing through a crowd on a 14-yard scamper.



"Both teams can swing and terminate," Grenier said. "Canton played some great defense. They're a good team and they showed it tonight."



What to look for

The Dhrunas' questions about what kind of stick to buy were quickly handled by the Play It Again staff, led by store ownermanager Chuck Jones.

He demonstrated how to make sure a stick is the proper length, both for safety and function, by holding the stick vertically (from the floor up) next to Devan.

But the knob was a few inches above the recommended length, which is nose level when a player is standing in shoes.

Jones told Chet that sticks of proper length correspondingly rise to a player's chin when on

When the family left the store to take Evan to hockey practice, they had a different stick in tow, one that was the right length for safe, comfortable use. It was a \$12 CCM model.

Those kinds of exchanges are happening regularly throughout September at all Play It Again locations, as part of the North American chain's "Keep 'Em Safe" program.

The impetus for the program is a survey conducted by the Mayo Clinic, citing that more than 18,000 youth players are treated annually for hockey-related injuries. One of the main culprits: illfitting equipment.

But Jones said hockey moms and dads can get the same guidance and expertise throughout the

"We do it 365, but this is a promotion we've been doing," Jones explained.

"We've been doing this for several years, actually. We're really encouraging this because it's the first part of the hockey season.'

According to Jones, it is not uncommon for customers to walk in with a bag of used hockey equipment that they need to decide what pieces are keepers or not.

"We've had people come in trying out equipment who were not sure if it fit them," Jones said. "So we give them our best shot at how it should fit. It's mostly with the beginners. They get a bag of equipment from a cousin, or a friend, or neighbor. Sometimes it fits and sometimes it doesn't.

"So we go through it with them and find stuff that fits them, and they can trade in the other stuff toward something that might fit them bet-

Among the more-recurring discussions are about proper fit for helmets and doing a checklist of sorts with hockey pants and other slightly worn gear to make sure everything is where it should be.

"Hockey helmets are all adjustable and they (new hockey parents) don't know that," Jones noted. "Their kids might have been playing for a couple years and they come in and say 'My kid needs a new hockey helmet.' We look at it and say 'Hey, you still got room on this. We can open it up and make it bigger for you, you don't have to trade this in.

"They're tickled to death because they don't have to put out that \$25to-\$100 on a new helmet."

Jones stressed that the Play It Again employees know what to look for when someone is looking at, or bringing in, used stuff.

"There's different levels of equipment, so we show them the different features on each piece of equipment that might protect their son or daughter better," he explained. "Or, if (equipment) is used, sometimes it's too worn out. There are pockets in the pants that hold different pads, and sometimes they lose them (pads). If they get it from a friend, they didn't know it was missing until we told them."

Affordable option

Youth-league coaches also refer parents looking to properly outfit novice players.

"We got several coaches that have been pretty loyal to us for years," Jones said. "They recommend their new players come here."

For families not wanting to empty the bank to get their kids started on the ice, having an option like Play It Again is golden.

"We got our skates here, our gloves here," Chet Dhruna said. "Some of the things we get as rental equipment, but slowly as we know he (Evan) is going to commit to it we buy things along the way."

If Evan decides to stick to other sports he plays (baseball, soccer, swimming), the Dhrunas can smile knowing that what they spent wasn't too much. "That's the nice part," said Chet with a knowing nod.

Besides, the folks at Play It Again Sports also have anything they might need for those sports, too.

One boy's journey

Family deals with illness through scrapbook, friends and humor

Evan Westphal's great adventure started Jan. 11 at William Beaumont Hospital in Royal Oak.

The Livonia boy, then a first grader at Hoover Elementary, was diagnosed with lymphoblastic leukemia just 12 days before his seventh birthday and faced months of chemotherapy, IV medicines, injections and spinal taps.

His adventure included missing school for all but 22 days last semester and foregoing baseball for at least this year, thinning hair and the expectation of three years in treatment.

Evan, now a second grader in the "maintenance" phase of treatment, has taken most of the journey with a smile

on his face. "The whole thing is not a good experience," said his mom, Janice Westphal. "But to put it in the positive, it's all how you look at it. You've got to get through it one day at a time. It's an adventure. It's not one I'd choose to go on, but it's one I can't change. So, you've got to make the best of it. We do everything with a sense of humor.

"Maybe we're different. I don't know. One of the

nurses said to my mom that one of the reasons he's doing as well as he is, is the attitude we have."

Westphal, her husband Phil, a UPS truck driver, older son, Alex, a freshman at Stevenson High School, and grandparents Bob and Donna Burnham, try to make life as normal as possible for Evan. They never hide information about his medical condition from him and they make sure he gets answers to his questions, which has helped him undergo medical procedures - such as painful intermuscular shots — with understanding

and a few tears rather than fear.

Evan knows all of his medications, their colors, and their purpose, in addition to what the numbers on his blood count results mean.

"He won't let them put him to sleep until they tell him what medicines they are giving him and what color it is. It has gotten to the point where the doctors walk in and they give the count sheet to him first. He wants to know what's going on. He has learned things that no 7year-old boy should have to know. But he wants to know what's going to happen, when it's going to happen and how it's going to happen. He has always been that kind of kid."

Collecting memories


His interest in his own treatment led Westphal to create a scrapbook, "Evan's Adventure," full of photos and mementos of his cancer experience. She had scrapbooked other family milestones and vacations, but didn't even consider one on the topic of his hospitalization and treatment until she realized that he might want one as a keepsake.

"I like it because it helps me explain things to other people," Westphal said. "You don't want to totally relive everything, but the people you meet are so phenomenal that you want to remember them. If you look at it, it's not sad."

Colorful pages show photos of his doctors, nurses, family members, his room - decorated in a penguin motif - and Evan, mostly smiling. Tapes, used when his port is accessed, bear a nurse's drawings and fill one page. Photos documenting a spinal tap are laid out on another page.

"Evan wanted to know what it was like when he got a spinal tap. So I asked if I could take pictures, "Westphal said. "Evan is mad that I didn't get a picture of the needle in his back. He wanted to see what it looks like."

Helpful toys

She said he also wanted to transfer that knowledge to his stuffed animal companion, Chuck, the Chemo Duck, a toy that a hospital social worker obtained for him. The duck comes complete with a port for IV medication, play needles and other items, including a head scarf for its owner. Evan never wore it, preferring a baseball cap to the scarf.

Westphal also secured a pair of stuffed animals — big and little monkeys — through the There's a Monkey in My Chair program. Evan keeps the lit-



His monkey's sponsor, a woman from Kansas named Marge Green, reached out to members of her church, encouraging them to send messages and prayer cards regularly to Evan.

Evan's "adventure" hasn't been all needles and pills.

Through a program called Chemo Angel, two women from Oregon and Florida periodically send gifts and cards. His favorite teacher, Charles "Mr. O" O'Laughlin, physical education instructor at Hoover, sent Evan assorted athletic balls and other physical fitness items and a golf pro, Jay Rammler, has taken him under his wing with

golf lessons. His classroom teacher took him to lunch for a little oneon-one time and a family friend bakes muffins for him every week.

Westphal, who was diagnosed with multiple sclerosis in 2007, wears three medical awareness bracelets - for leukemia, MS and IV ports

doesn't shy from talking about Evan's leukemia. When he was diagnosed, she reached out through Facebook for support and information. She said online social media kept her in touch with the "outside world" during long periods at Beaumont Hospital with Evan.

When the family planned a trip to the Toledo Mud Hens game with Thrivent Financial, Westphal mentioned her son to the trip's organizers. The next thing she knew, Evan was chosen to throw out the first ball at the game.

"I was a little nervous and it felt weird to be on the field," Evan said. "I got quite the applause, too."

Westphal said the pitch bounced, but went straight and over the plate.

"It made mom cry," she said. "It bounced and the guy kind of caught it on the bounce," but it went straight and over the plate."

WHY INJECTIONS STOP WORKING Steroid injections represent good therapy, particularly in osteoarthritis of the knees. However, anyone who has experience receiving injections over time can attest, injection therapy is uneven in its results, eventually working hardly at all. Why is this the case?

A tire is losing its tread, but the mechanic can keep the car running by putting air into the tire each time the tire goes flat. The first instance of a flat tire, followed by putting air back in, allows the car to run for another six months. The next time the mechanic puts air in the tire, the car goes for 3 months. The next time the tire needs air, the process lasts for possibly a month to six weeks.

What happens each time the mechanic attends to the flat by putting in air, is that the tire being used, loses even more tread, which in turn makes the tire even more vulnerable to nails and rocks on the road which in turn, makes having a flat tire even more likely

Eventually, the owner of the car has no choice but to replace the tire.

The same sequence holds for joint injections for knee, and other joint osteoarthritis. Each injection allows the person to carry on with an impaired joint. But, the capacity to use the knee comes with a price: the joint because of further use. deteriorates further. Eventually the joint wears out to the point that injections cannot overcome.

When injection provides only 2-3 weeks or less of relief, then the patient must look to joint replacement as the therapy of





The ABCs for keeping a home healthy

Children often come into closer contact with their environment than adults. They put their fingers in their mouths, crawl on the floor, and touch, taste and breathe things without knowing if they are harmful. Because their organs and respiratory, immune and neurological systems are still developing, children can be more sensitive to harmful substances such as certain chemicals, particles and allergens, according to the Greenguard Environmental Institute.

Dr. Alanna Levine, Fellow of the American **Academy of Pediatrics** (FAAP), reminds parents that allergy symptoms typically begin during childhood. In fact, the Asthma & Allergy Foundation of America warns that allergies are the most frequently reported chronic condition in children, limiting activities for more than 40 percent of them.

Levine recommends following the ABC's - Avoid, Balance and Change — to help maintain a healthier home environment for children.

A is for avoid: Whenever possible, avoid irritants that often trigger allergies, such as products made of feathers or down. Use hypoallergenic pillows on your child's bed, and limit exposure to perfume, talcum powder, hair spray, air fresheners, fabric softeners or other strong odors or sprays. Strong fragrances and odors may aggravate allergy symptoms, so be sure that children prone to allergies are not



in the house when spraying fragrances or using strong cleaning products.

B is for balance: Maintain a consistent balance in the home to help minimize allergens. Keep the windows shut and use central air conditioning during high pollen seasons to help protect children from pollen parti-

and weeds release into the air. These particles can harbor in the eyes, nose, and airways, causing allergy symptoms to flair for those allergic to pollen. Also, give children washable, non-allergenic stuffed toys when possible, and be sure to wash the ones played with the most on a weekly basis,

C is for change: Change items that are easy to neglect but are important for maintaining a healthier home, such as leaky faucets, pipes and other high moisture areas that are common places for mold growth. Don't neglect the air in the home either. Change your filter every three months, and use a high performance filter. For those with carpet in the home, vacuum it often and thoroughly, and change the vacuum cleaner bag on a



Over the years, hiring managers have born witness to every hiring, interviewing, resume, cover letter and negotiation mistake there is.

You know what these blunders are. We've told you several times. Yet you (and hundreds of other job seekers) continue to make common job search mistakes.

From those who see your mistakes over and over, here are 16 common job search mistakes to avoid -- and some of them may surprise you.

1. You don't keep your options

"Candidates tend to think that if they interview for a job they will get an offer, so they do not apply and interview for multiple positions," says Joanie Spain, director of public relations and career services, School of Advertising Art, a graphic design college. "They wait until one plays out completely, putting their job search on hold until knowing for sure they didn't get the offer. "By having many more irons in the fire, you diversify the risk and disappointment that is inevitable when any single opportunity disappears," adds Roy Cohen, author of "The Wall Street Professional's Survival Guide: Success Secrets of a Career Coach."

'You also present yourself as a more

passionate and energetic candidate.

you're in the flow of information and ideas -- and that makes you more valuable.

2. You turn up your nose at job descriptions

"Entry-level candidates are reluctant to apply for a position unless the job sounds like their 'dream job' or they have all qualifications listed," Spain says. 'Rather than going on an interview to get more information, they base decisions about applying on the job description alone. They fail to see that all interview experience is good experience, or that, until there is an offer on the table, there is no decision to make.

3. You haven't perfected the thank-

"Don't be too verbose with a thankyou note after an interview. Sending out a version of "War and Peace" can come across as desperate and needy for a job. However, sending a one or two sentence thank-you note comes across as flippant, not well thought-out and potentially shows indifference regarding the job to the employer," says Mike Barefoot, senior account manager at Red Zone Resources, a recruitment firm. "We encourage candidates to keep them to four to eight sentences.

4. You don't check your references "Always give out references that you've pre-screened. We sometimes see candidates give out references that were never checked with and the references feedback isn't always kind," Barefoot says. "Also, make sure they're predominantly managers. An occasional colleague is okay, but contemporaries and friends really don't carry that much weight in helping you land a position.'

5. You've got poor business acumen

"Managers are becoming more savvy and are taking candidates out to lunch for interviews. They want to see how you treat a restaurant staff and see the 'real' you. If you're rude to them or don't seem appreciative for their hard work to make your meal pleasurable, managers wonder how you'll treat contemporaries you work with,' Barefoot says.

6. You have a messy briefcase "A messy briefcase can imply the person is unorganized, messy and unprepared, and that their work will be less than optimal," says Ronald Kaufman, author of "Anatomy of Success." "Someone who is neat, clean, organized and prepared in all areas conveys they're serious about getting a job and

working.' 7. You discount temporary positions

"Many employers coming out of a recession want to hire on a temporary or temp- to perm- basis. We have already seen several contractors be offered permanent positions after they have proven themselves," says Jeffrey Weinstock, Esq. president, Rhodes &

Weinstock, a recruiting firm. "Not only will the temporary position pay some bills, think of it as an audition for a potential perm position, or at least a way to get a good reference for another position.

8. You have a bad attitude "Poor attitudes come through in telephone calls and in interviews. If you are not positive, why would a potential employer want to hire you?" asks Weinstock. "It may take some time, but by being positive, by doing all the right things, by seeing each position as an opportunity, it

9. You include too much work history

will happen."

"Many job seekers over 40 think that they have to take their work history back to their first job out of college," says Cheryl E. Palmer, career coach and résume writer. " All that is needed is the last 10-15 years of your work history.' 10. You use your work email address on your resume

"Some people do not regularly check their personal email, so they use their employers' email instead," Palmer says. "This sends a negative message to potential employers that the job seekers will not hesitate to use their equipment for personal use.'

11. You take "no" as a final answer "No" usually only means "no" for that position, says Bruce Hurwitz, president and CEO, Hurwitz Strategic Staffing, LTD. "If you are rejected for a job you should send a thank-you note, thank the employer for the opportunity, and wish them well. No one does that. When the next opening comes around, he'll remember you," says Hurwitz. 12. You lack tact

"Be determined without being pushy. Calling or emailing to ask about the status of your resume or interview can be a double-edged sword," says Rod Hughes, director of communications, Oxford Communications. "A tactful follow up can place you top of mind with the hiring manager, while incessant calling or emailing can push your resume right off the table." 13. You don't search for yourself

on the Internet "Your would-be employer is probably going to look you up online, so you should know what is out there," says Amanda O'Brien. vice president of marketing, Hall Web Services, "Clean up what you can. check your privacy settings on social networks and if it is something you can't get down off the internet, you may want to consider talking to the company about it.'

14. You have a 'death by bullets' resume

"Bullets are great but they need context. Keep them to one line, focused on a result and include a figure like a fact, percentage or number," says Adriana Llames, author of "Career Sudoku: 9 Ways to Win the Job Search Game." "Or, put the information in a short summary of the position.

15. You've got a scattered strategy

"Looking for a job in any industry

and with two or three resumes is going to get the same result as the strategy: scattered," Llames says. "Job seekers with a clearly defined, focused and organized strategic approach to their job search end up with clear results -- and a new job." 16. You think it's about you It is not about you and your need for a job -- it is about the

prospective employer and their need to run a successful business and make money, says Lori B. Rassas, employment attorney and author of "Employment Law: A Guide to Hiring, Managing and Firing for Employers and Employees.' "Many applicants mistakenly believe

they will be an appealing candidate if they explain they will accept any type of job offer at any because they have been laid off, unemployed for an extended period of time, have children in college, or are having difficulty making the mortgage payments," she says. "Even if all of those circumstances are true, candidates need to craft a different message, focusing on how they can benefit the employer by saving them money, streamlining processes, creating additional sources of revenue and bringing overall value to the company.' Car Report

FINALLY, SUNNIER DAYS FOR TOYOTA AND LEXUS

Many things are looking up for Toyota and Lexus these days, including encouraging upticks in the brands' inventory situation, buzz around a couple of fast-selling models, and anticipation about their

planned handful of new-model introductions later this year. More than

anything else, the new 2012 Camry has Toyota executives

thinking upbeat. "The initial response has been excellent," said Jeff Bracken, vice president of sales for the Toyota Division. Consideration of the new model on Edmunds.com, he said, has been "the highest ... for any **vehicle** in more than three years. And in just one week, more than 50,000 people have raised their hands and said they're considering a new Camry."

Partly as a result, Toyota decided to pull forward its "onsale" date for the car at dealers from early October and to begin shipping Camrys to them from the company's Georgetown, Ky., manufacturing complex any day now. By the middle of October, sticking with its original schedule, Toyota also plans to begin building a Camry Hybrid at the plant.

True, Toyota's August sales declined by about 1 percent from July. Sales of one individual model after another were down for the month from 2010 and remained down for the year to date because of how Toyota's global supply and manufacturing network was ravaged by and after the earthquake and tsunami in Japan in March.

But amid the industry's general gloom over disappointing August results, Toyota had some room for encouragement. For one thing,

executives noted that all North American production will return to normal levels this month for the first time since March, ensuring that it won't be long before inventory shortages stop handcuffing Toyota dealers and discouraging sales of their

Fourth-quarter production in North America is planned for 15 percent higher than a year earlier. Reflecting these rising expectations for availability, Toyota planned to extend its current generous incentive program through September.

At the moment, Toyota's inventories stand at about a 36day supply of cars, versus a normally desirable level of between 40 and 50 days for Toyota Division vehicles, and only up from 34 days a month earlier. "That's a positive trend and much better than where we thought it would have been," said Randy Pflughaupt, Toyota's group vice president of sales

administration.

"It is keeping pace with market demand ... By the end of December we'll certainly be making lot of progress toward a comparable level" of inventories to ayear earlier, he said. "It might be a little bit into the first quarter of next year before we see inventories at essentially prior levels."

Prius was perhaps more directly sacked by the manufacturing disruptions in Japan than any other vehicle, but Pflughaupt reported that Toyota was "on pace" to deliver all of the 36,000 Prius units that executives had promised for the U.S. market this summer. In the meantime, in August Toyota was able both to increase Prius sales and to increase the level of dealer inventories of the car.

Lexus was the only brand to report increased year-to-year sales, a 6-percent jump over August 2010. The end of the

summer traditionally is a brisk time for luxury brands because of closeouts of versions from the old model year, and Lexus basically saw its supply pipeline restored to vigor just in time to participate more or less fully.

Sales of the CTD200h hybrid sedan continued to surpass initial expectations from its introduction early this year. "Our launch plan was to sell 1,000 a month, but we're selling more than double that number, said Mark Templin, general manager of the Lexus Division. "It's bringing new young buyers into the family, about 40 percent who are younger than 45 years old, and about half of them are new to Lexus."

Overall Lexus production "improved dramatically" in August "and will continue to rise," he said. Lexus production will be 18 percent higher in the fourth quarter than a year ago, Templin said. Specifically, output of the RX, the leading luxury SUV, will rise by 140 percent in the fourth quarter in Toyota's Canadian assembly plant over original plans for the period, Templin said.

Beyond September, Toyota and its dealers are looking forward to the planned introductions of a handful of new models before the end of the year, including the Camry Hybrid, the larger Prius V, a new Yaris subcompact and the allnew Scion iQ. Early in 2012, Lexus plans to launch an allnew GS sedan, first of a number of new and updated products that are in its pipeline.




