

# City officials ponder tax collection fee

Plymouth officials are considering adding a 1-percent fee to property tax bills in order to help pay the administrative costs of taxation, such as assessing property, processing bills and collecting taxes.

Plymouth is one of the few communities in Wayne County that doesn't impose the collection fee, and it hasn't done so for more than 25 years, according to city officials.

A "tax administration fee" of up to 1 percent is allowed under state law, and communities have options on how the fee can be levied. It can be made to apply to the entire tax bill or to parts of it, and it can be levied only on summer bills, only on winter bills, or on both, officials said.

The move would raise nearly \$216,000 annually if

added to the city's entire tax levy, according to finance director Mark Christiansen. Homeowners whose house has a taxable value of \$100,000 would pay an additional \$41 on a roughly \$4,100 annual tax bill.

### 'Time to vote'

Mayor Dan Dwyer said city officials have discussed the topic for years at budget time - they are currently finalizing the budget for the fiscal year that begins in July — and need to bring it to a vote. Dwyer said he's personally leaning against the fee, but that he understands the reasons some support it. The city has been tightening its spending, including shrinking the city work force through attrition, for several years.

"Whether I support it or not, I do think it's time to put it to a vote," Dwyer said.

## Planners: Wall can come down, but park a must

The Daisy Wall, the last remnant of the 1880s Plymouth factory where Daisy Air Rifles were made for decades, may be one step closer to coming down.

Or, it may not. The Plymouth Planning Commission voted Wednesday night to recommend an extension of a planned unit development, or PUD, at the Daisy Square condominiums off of Union Street, a project that was begun in 2003 but remains unfinished because of a weak housing market. The agreement is with Joseph Freed & Associates, a Chicago development

But the planners' recommendation to the Plymouth City Commission removed the PUD requirement that the factory wall be preserved and used in a loftstyle condominium building, and also removed the provision that called for that building to be built in the first place. It also said that

the area set aside for that building should be converted to green space, and priority given to developing it into a park.

'We need momentum' Freed has sought for more than a year to be absolved of having to preserve the Daisy Wall as it requested an extension of the PUD, while some neighbors and Daisy Square residents have complained the wall has become an eyesore and the area around it has been poorly maintained.

"We need forward momentum," Beth Foley, who is on the homeowners association board for Daisy Square townhouse owners, told planners. "The only way for this to move forward is for that wall to come down.

Foley said she and fellow Daisy Square residents have supported preservation efforts, such as the Plymouth Preservation Network's plans for a small park with a pavilion that would incor-







## Salem senior in math Olympiad

For the second straight year, Salem High School senior Peter Su has qualified for the United States of America Math Olympiad.

And, after falling short last year of qualifying for a chance to go to a summer camp that could lead to a spot in the International Mathematical Olympiad, Su is waiting on this year's results to see if he landed a spot this time around.

"It's really intense," Su said. "The questions are insane."

Su flew through the first two levels the American Mathematics Competition and the American Invitational Mathematics Exam. But he again found the USA-MO test - a fourand-a-half hour exam spread over two days challenging

Su said the difference is the types of problems. Problems on the USAMO move from needing numbers to answer to using proofs. Proofs, Su said, are harder answers to provide.

"I just haven't had much experience working with that type of problem," Su said. "I'm not sure how to attack them."



about 500 students out of 12,000 **AIME** participants

are invited to take the USAMO. The top 12 USAMO participants are declared winners and honored at ceremonies in June at the National Academy of Sciences, the National Science Foundation and the Mathematical Association of America Headquarters in Washington, D.C.

Approximately 30 of the highest scoring USAMO participants will be invited to a Mathematical Olympiad Summer Program and a team of six students will be chosen to compete in the International Mathematical Olympiad as part of the **United States Math** Olympiad team.

First, though, Su has to get past the USAMO.

"The problems are really insane when you get to the USA-MO," Su said. "It takes it to a whole other level. You look at a problem and think, 'I don't even know where to start."



Schewe, however, said the bank has no say over what planning commissioners decide, as it is not a party to the PUD. He said that while removing the requirement that the wall be preserved may make the project more marketable, it doesn't shut the door completely on preserving the wall in some form.

### 'Let this be a lesson'

The Plymouth Preservation Network's Wendy Harless, however, sounded discouraged Wednes-

"Please let this be a lesson learned," Harless told commissioners. "The Daisy Square has been a poster child for what not to do in historic preservation."

The PPN had developed the park-and-pavilion idea, and had committed money and fundraising efforts toward the estimated \$250,000 price tag. but was looking for financial help from Freed, which company officials have said would not be forthcoming.

A Freed representative, in seeking to have the wall-preservation provision removed in late 2010, had said it was too badly deteriorated and that saving it would be too costly.

Commission chairman Jim Mulhern said Friday that he was still hopeful the wall can be saved.

"I still think there's the possibility the PPN will have the opportunity to work with another developer," he said.

## Dad convicted in son's abuse

Canton stay-at-home father Anthony Sewejkis is facing sentencing May 25 after he was convicted of first-degree child abuse for causing near-fatal injuries to his 4-monthold son, Hunter, last Dec. 7 inside their three-bedroom rental home on Michigan Avenue.

Sewejkis was found guilty by a Wayne County jury that returned its verdict Thursday morning following deliberations that began Wednesday afternoon. He could face 15 years in prison when he is sentenced by Judge Margaret Van Houten.

"I feel wonderful about the outcome," said maternal grandfather Sal Alongi, who, along with wife Theresa, has custody of Hunter, now 9 months

old. "I'm extremely happy. It brings some closure. Unfortunately the most (Sewejkis) can get is 15 years, but Hunter's got a life sentence.'

Seweikis was accused of slamming Hunter's head against a carpetcovered hardwood floor while the child's mother, Leanne Garlick, was working for an Ann Arbor taxi service.

The injuries caused brain damage and left Hunter partially blind and partially paralyzed. Wayne County Assistant Prosecutor Lora Weingarden said Tuesday in court that it's unknown to what extent the child will recover.

Alongi and Garlick sat in Van Houten's courtroom Thursday morning when the jury returned its verdict. An emotional Alongi was escorted out after he yelled "yes!" and

applauded the decision. "I couldn't help it," he said. "I later apologized

to everybody.' Weingarden hailed the jury's decision to find Sewejkis guilty as charged.

"We're pleased with the verdict," she said Thursday. "We feel justice was done."

Defense attorney Kelly D. Watson said he is likely to advise Sewejkis to consider an appeal.



"There are legitimate points of view on both sides of it."

The topic is expected to be on the agenda for the Plymouth City Commission's next regular meeting, on Monday, May 21.

Dwyer said he considers the charge an extra tax, not a fee, because property owners wouldn't have the option of not paying. Because the city collects taxes for other taxing entities, such as schools, the county and the Plymouth District Library, largely without compensation (the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools district reimburses some costs, City Manager Paul Sincock said), he understands the logic of charging for that work, the mayor said.

But "you're not getting paid by those other entities, you're getting paid by the people you're collecting the tax from, and that's why I struggle with it," Dwyer added.

If commissioners decide to levy the fee but exclude the city's portion of the tax bill, it would raise about \$144,000 a year, Christiansen said. The city would have to document its costs and could collect no more through the fee than is spent on labor, computers, materials and other expenses related to assessing and collecting taxes, but Christiansen said he's estimated those costs at about \$230,000 a year, above the total of \$216,000 the fee would bring.

"There's no community around right now that wouldn't be looking for \$200,000," the mayor said.

#### Fee widely used

Indeed, according to a chart provided by Sincock, 37 communities in the county levied the fee in some fashion in 2011 and only six did not. The way the fee was imposed varied widely, with a few communities charging a fraction of it, some charging it on summer bills but not on winter, or vice versa, and some charging it only on the portion of taxes passed on to specific entities, such as Wayne County or the county's **Regional Education Services** Agency (RESA). In Plymouth Township, the fee was added to the winter tax bills but not the summer.

If the charge is imposed, the mayor said, it has to go directly to tax administration expenses.

Dwyer said he may support imposing some fee if generalfund money now used for tax administration is earmarked for the city's pension obligations to retirees who retired under the defined-benefit system. The city has phased out that system in favor of a defined-contribution system similar to a 401(k).

Commissioner Mike Wright said he is in favor of the fee.

"I wish I didn't have to be," he said. "From my perspective, what we're facing is the need for some revenue enhancement."

### 'Tough call'

Wright said he has been opposed to the fee in the past, but has changed his mind after years of cost-cutting through city work force reduction, merging departments and functions, partnering with other communities for services, and innovations like the geo-

thermal system at the Plymouth Cultural Center, which is saving on utility bills.

"It just seems to me it comes to a point where reasonable people just have to accept the fact that revenue enhancement becomes necessary," he said. Deficits are projected for future budgets, he said, and the proposed budget for 2012-13 doesn't include some badly needed initiatives, such as increasing the size of Plymouth's 15-officer police force.

Wright said he would favor of imposing the entire 1 percent, and would not limit the money offset by the fee to any particular program.

"Frankly, this is a tough call, so I would understand if a majority of my colleagues would rather not," he said.

High School (they too are members of the 2012 All-State Team along with Emily Southern of Canton High School and Brett Jia of Plymouth High School)—Peter earned a perfect 2,400 on the SAT and qualified for the United States of America Math Olympiad, Not to be outdone, Scott nearly aced the SAT, too, scoring 2,340.

The twins, the sons of Xiang Su and Hong Jiang of Canton, are now looking forward to getting, as Peter put it, a "fresh start."

"You wipe everything clean, and take what you learned in high school to the next level," Peter said. "I'm excited to see if I can do more than I did in high school. I want to make a larger impact."

As does brother Scott. And though they aren't exactly sure where that impact will be, they do know they want to get involved in something to do with "green" technology.

They're both concerned with what they see as an increase in global warming.

"People say it isn't as bad or it doesn't even exist, but it exists," Scott said. "We need to step up our research to develop new materials to deal with it. It really is serious."

They've reached a level of success few students hit, according to district officials. When ACT officials told the district of the four perfect scores, they said less than onetenth of 1 percent of all test-takers earn the perfect score. In the current class, for instance, 1.6 million students took the test nationwide and only 588 earned the perfect 36.

### Aiming high

What sets the twins apart, according to their teachers, is the brilliance they display without "acting the part."

"They have the kind of personality you'd want them to have," physics teacher Angela Brown said. "It's a brilliance without the arrogance that sometimes comes with it. They're helpful with everybody in class. They gladly help without pushing themselves on people."

Now they're turning that success toward the future. Ten years from now, Peter Su hopes to either have started a company using materials he's researched and developed himself, or being a professor at university where he can have his own lab to focus on his own research.

Scott, on the other hand, could see himself starting his own company, but could be just as happy just doing "the pure research" part.

"I could make a good impact, and that's a good way to do it," Scott said.

## Mom learns 'priceless lessons' from children

Raising children is hard enough when they're healthy.

But it becomes much more challenging when one of your children has special needs or one of your children is terminal-

Audrey Collett of Livonia has both — a 12year-old daughter, Madison, who is cognitively delayed because of a chromosomal abnormality; and a 17-year-old daughter, Rachel, who has a rare form of bone cancer and is now in hospice care.

She also has two healthy children, Andrew, 20, and Hannah, 10.

People who know Audrey, including a neighbor, a sister and a Livonia resident who prays for the family in her prayer group - marvel at her strength.

"I would be in my bed with a pillow and blanket over my head, balling my eyes out and asking, 'Why me?'" said the neighbor, Tami Neimeister, who has a 21-year-old son with special needs and two healthy children, ages 14 and 12.

"I know what I have to deal with. I cannot imagine having a terminal child also. I give her such

"I don't think I could survive what she's going through," said Castillo, who has two healthy sons, ages 16 and 17.

"She has a way of swallowing it, going through it, accomplishing what she needs to get done."

The Livonia resident whose prayer group at St. Aidan Catholic Church prayers for the Collett family raised six children of her own.

"I've been amazed at how strong Audrey is," she said, adding she's only met her once but follows her posts on Facebook and Care Pages.

"To me both of them, mother and daughter, are absolutely amazing."

Rachel graduated from Churchill High School during a special ceremony in January, after

But she doesn't let them get to her. "It's the small stuff that I don't have time to worry about anymore," she said.

Audrey said it isn't being strong that gets her through each day. "I think it's fear of not moving forward, of not doing something. You just got to keep moving forward," she said, of finding things to help Rachel, finding things to make her life

What helps, she said, is the support of the community, her family and her friends. Just when she thinks she can't get through another day, someone text messages her an encouraging thought, drops by the house or brings over a meal.

"It seems like it always comes at the right moment when I need it the most," she said.

"I really don't think I would be able to face each day without the support of the community and my friends.'

Madison was the first of her children to show signs of illness, Audrey said. "She had seizures from the time she was a baby up until just a few years ago" and "she wasn't reaching her milestones physically or mentally."

The family, which includes Dad Roy, a truck driver, was living Up

North in Johannesburg at the time. They decided to move to Livonia when Madison was about 3 so they could be closer to her doctor in Ann Arbor and Livonia Public Schools, which had more to offer their specialneeds daughter.

"I guess it was God's plan," Audrey said. "Four months after (they bought a house in Livonia), Rachel was diag-

### **Looking for reasons**

Audrey had noticed visible changes in Rachel's jaw and chin just after Christmas 2005. Rachel was a sixth-grader at Johnson Elementary at the time. The diagnosis was a rare form of osteosarcoma.

Despite trying every kind of conventional and "fly-by-night homeopathic" treatment, they were only able to slow down the cancer, not stop it, Audrey said.

It has spread throughout her body. She is living at home under hospice care to help manage the pain.

Audrey said she often wonders why two of her four children are ill. "You search for reasons why. Was there something I did or something I didn't do that could have prevented it? It's something I've asked every-

A believer, she said she trusts God that "there's a meaning to all this.

"Maybe one day through what I've experienced, I'll be able to help someone else," she said.



Bosch, minster general of the Felician Sisters, came all the way from Rome to receive an honorary doctorate. She was joined by honorary doctoral degree





## Rescue team prepares for its next emergency

It's not too often that someone gets trapped in a trench or pinned under a mountain of debris from a collapsed building, but specially trained rescuers are ready when it does happen.

And, they're honing their skills through special training operations every month.

The Western Wayne County Urban Search and Rescue team is a highly skilled special response unit made up of 47 first responders from 21 jurisdictions, including Livonia, Farmington Hills, Canton, Redford, Plymouth, Garden City, Northville, Novi and Westland.

Tuesday's training exercise entailed a scenario in which a person was trapped in a trench.

"We see this when people are working and they're not in a trench box," said Farmington Hills Fire Chief Corey Bartsch, who administered the exercise.

An eight-foot deep hole was dug on the Greenmead property in Livonia for the training. The over-night rainfall perfectly simulated a reallife scenario in which the walls of the trench began to give way, requiring rescuers to place large wooden support panels and cross beams inside the trench.

Local DPW crews were on hand to participate in the training.

'We're looking to partner up with our DPWs, to get them involved in a response when needed,' said Bartsch, who noted the DPW assistance was critical in the December 2010 Frank's Furniture Store explosion in Wayne. "The DPWs were there,

moving debris out of the way. A lot of people don't realize the DPW plays a really big role. They're truly first responders, just like police and fire are. They bring the equipment and the expertise that we don't have."

#### 'A learning experience'

Bryan Pickworth, road maintenance supervisor at the Farmington Hills DPW, said the training exercises are important for everyone involved.

"It's a learning experience for all of us, knowing exactly what they need in a situation like this," he said. "Anything we can do to help out, especially in an emergency situation — there's nothing like hands-on experience.

The WWUSAR had just received equipment on Tuesday to connect to a Vactor truck, for use in the rescue training exercise.

Livonia Fire Department Lt. John Orzech, incident commander, said the exercise was going quite well.

"We always try to

improve in every scenario," he said. "This is going exceptionally well, considering we just got the equipment this morning."

#### Collaboration

The WWUSAR team trains and provides rescue in the areas of trench, rope, confined space and building collapse. The team was formed in 2006 and operates similarly to the haz-mat multi-jurisdictional response team that was established in

The specialized services are too expensive for local communities to provide individually, so the partnerships are needed and vitally important, noted Bartsch.

"We've been looking for regional methods to provide an exceptional service at a reduced cost," he said

Recently, that partnership has expanded to include emergency physician Chris Mason, a doctor at St. Mary Mercy Hospital in Livonia and former police officer.

"The planning, delivery and coordination of medical care outside the four walls and bright white

lights of the hospital is important," said Mason, who joined WWUSAR in

He serves as the team physician and is able to set protocol for medical care in emergency situations. He participates in disaster training around the country and is the medical director for the Michigan Tactical Officers Association.

Mason said St. Mary Mercy is supporting the WWUSAR team by providing response-readiness testing for team members, including blood work and hearing tests, for example.

He said he's glad to be on the team.

"This is a terrific group of people from 21 agencies that come together for the greater good of western Wayne County, he said. "It's amazing that you can get this many people together from different agencies and cooperate as a team."

The WWUSAR, since formed, has responded to trench rescue/recovery calls in Detroit and Van Buren and a search rescue operation following a tornado that struck an apartment complex in Plymouth. The team was on stand-by following the recent tornadoes in Washtenaw County and

Dundee. In the meantime, the

team keeps training and anticipating the next call.

"It's important for all of our members to show up to (training) because it sharpens our skills and allows us to anticipate each other and the situation," said Bartsch.






"They're right there with the teams of previous years," Novi coach Marsha Reid said. "The hardest part with our seniors this year has that they have a lot of people gunning for them.

"There was pressure in the beginning," said Arm-stead, asked about being a varsity starter as a ninth grader. "But the girls have really welcomed me and it's helped a lot."



Amy Slitti and Emily Tabor are mirror images of each other.

In some ways, their households are, too.

Slitti and Tabor are twin sisters, age 36, who grew up in Farmington. Both are married — Slitti to John and Tabor to Brett — and each has three children, ages 5,7 and 9. Their kids' school art projects paper the kitchen walls in Slitti's Livonia home and line a hallway at Tabor's house in Canton.



The cousins have played together at each other's homes for years.

How will she cope with girls as teens? "I'm moving out," she

quipped. "And it may happen as early as next year."

The treatment of gout appears easy. Textbooks and web articles on the topic will say that preventing gout requires taking colchicine, now called ColCrys, for an attack and thereafter using allopurinol or Uloric daily. The reality is far

In a tradition that had lasted a thousand years, for an acute attack a physician prescribed colchicine at one tablet an hour until the attack cleared, the patient took 12 pills or diarrhea ensued. Only in the last 3 years, with the use of the newer formulation ColCrys, have physicians found that patients with acute attacks of gout need only take 3 colchicine tablets: two tablets at once, and if needed, one tablet an hour later. The patient takes no more colchicine tablets thereafter.

However, ColCrys only puts a brake on an acute attack of gout. The real goal of therapy is to lower the level of uric acid, the constituent that causes gout, to a sufficiently low level to

prevent even the threat of a gouty attack.

The medicine, allopurinol, can do just that. But it takes time, and often several adjustments in the allopurinol dose before a physician finds the dose that will bring the serum uric acid to a safe level and keep it that way. Furthermore, while patient and doctor are working out the proper dosage, flares of gout may occur, disrupting the journey to a proper dose, and causing the patient yet another episode of pain and incapacity.

In time, physician and patient arrive at the allopurinol dose appropriate for the patient's gout, but the process is hardly ever simple and always needs surveillance.

is somewhere in this computer of mine. This "thing" is not like a washing machine where I once pulled my friend Steve's silk undershorts out of his pump. My organizational skills don't allow me to hit a button and pull up specific column. I'm sorry. That advertisement with the supposed garberator was meant to entice more sales for that brand of product. I protested that it implied that someone might throw a turkey carcass into the dishwasher and it would not matter how much food could be left on a dinner

The appliance service industry loved that ad because now they were being called to homes to repair this cheap little metal cutter blade located on top of the motor assembly. Most service technicians were advising consumers to remove this blade or fur-

ther problems would continue to cause expensive repairs. Enough said about how much the manufacturers care about dependability.

In a recent interview with Gregg Stebben, an editor of menshealth.com, he talked about the proper way to load a dishwasher. There is no doubt that bacteria will grow inside the dishwasher. It will work its way into the rubber door seals and the scientific world is doing a lot of work to determine what sickness is produced in a dishwasher. Gregg points out that dishes should be clean going into the dishwasher and if you are not going to operate it immediately, you should rinse them in a sink full of water with a shot glass of bleach mixed into that water. 



## 10 Questions you should ask in an interview

When preparing for an interview, most applicants concentrate on formulating well-crafted answers to potential questions from their interviewers However, not many realize it is just as important to prepare a few good questions they themselves should ask during the interview.

"When interviewing job applicants, I often learn as much from the questions they ask as from the responses they give," John Langland, president of Langland & Langland Consulting, says. "What potential employees inquire about reveals what they deem important -- as opposed to merely answering my questions with information they think I will find important."

What can asking questions in an interview do for you?


- Show your interest in the position and the company
- Give you an active role in the interview
- Offer explanations about the position and the company, which helps you decide if you want to work for that
- Showcase the depth of your knowledge and help you guide the discussion into a particular area of expertise

Langland suggests preparing at least three questions in advance and taking notes during the interview to record the responses. "A few insightful, knowledgeable questions can speak volumes about you and distinguish you from other job candidates," he says. "However, as important as asking questions is asking bad questions, such as, 'How many vacation days does the company offer?' is worse."

Langland advises asking these 10 questions during your next interview:

#### 1. What are the top three tasks you want the candidate to perform after being hired?

This gives you a concrete idea of the projects you will be working on if



hired. Often job ads list general qualities and capabilities the position requires, but the answer to this question will lay out the actual specifics of the job.

#### 2. Why did you choose this company?

The answer will help you determine the organization's strengths and weaknesses with this insider's perspective.

3. How do you see me benefiting the company?

This tells you exactly what they're looking for in a candidate and where they see your strengths.

#### 4. Is there room for growth and advancement?

This points to your drive and initiative and underscores your intent to secure a career, not just a job.

#### 5. Are there opportunities for professional training or further education?

This shows a willingness to learn and adapt as changes in the position or

industry occur. Adaptability is very important in today's fickle employment market and may make you very valuable to the company should a reorganization occur.

#### 6. How will I be evaluated and by whom?

This provides insight into the company's corporate culture and the department structure in which you will be working.

#### 7. What is the general culture of the company?

This can tell you if you will fit into the organization. If they're strictly a "suit and tie" operation and you're all about comfort clothes, you may want to rethink the position.

#### 8. Are there other job responsibilities not mentioned in the ad?

This reveals exactly what the ad meant when it said: "...and other duties as assigned." Will you be helping other departments in a pinch? Making coffee? These are things you should know before going any further in the candidate selection process.

#### 9. When will you be making a decision on the successful candidate?

Knowing this helps you gauge when to follow up on the interview.

#### 10. May I call you if other questions arise?

This keeps the door open for further communication.

The interview is an artful conversation designed to help both parties learn more about each other in an effort to decide if the candidate and the position are a good match. Use it as an opportunity to spotlight your accomplishments and determine if the job is right for you.






