

Wonderland Center Opens 10-Day Anniversary Party Thursday

Fifty-seven merchants who comprise Michigan's third-largest regional shopping center are looking forward to a 10-day anniversary party that promises to be on of the liveliest ever staged in this area.

The birthday party, marking the fourth anniversary of Wonderland Center, opens tomorrow. Flushed with the success of four years' steady growth and customer-acceptance, the giant, 57-store shoppers' mecca will open the celebration with a

gala musical revue, a 1964 automobile show and a three-day value demonstration. Through special arrangements with the auto industry, the center will present "Motors and Music," a 45-minute musical and comedy revue. The show, featuring top radio and TV talent,

will be presented in the center's mall on Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Two performances, one at 8:15 and another at 8:45, will be given each night. Stars to appear heading the cast are Jan Wynn, popular WJR songstress, TV comedian Paul Lennon, and

Doug Kerr, rising young recording star. WKMH disc jockey Robin Seymour will act as master of ceremonies for the show, which will also feature appearances by The Top Siders, Don Mills and the Bob Durant orchestra. As an added attraction, the

Franklin High School dance band will appear at the center for the first time on Friday. The stage show has been planned as a dual salute to Wonderland's anniversary and to the Motor City's 1964 line-up of automobiles. In addition to a showing of

nearly all 1964 models Wonderland will present an exhibit of several custom cars including the Thunderbird "Italian," the Chevy Sting Ray and the Ford Cobra. The auto exhibit, which opens Thursday, will continue through October 27. Ernie Epps, promotional di-

rector for the giant center, announced that the second of these color TV sets to be given away during the birthday party will be awarded Saturday, at 8 p.m. Registration blanks, available at the Center's Color TV theatre, in the Civic Room, will be accepted at the Federal Department Store until 7:30, Saturday.

Expansion Planned

Drawing for the third set, awarded by Montgomery Ward, will be held Saturday, October 26. The color TV theatre is open daily, including Sunday, from noon to 9 p.m. All colorcasts are shown free of charge.

Wonderland came to Livonia in 1959. The multi-million-dollar center occupies some 60 acres at the busy Plymouth Road and Middlebelt intersection. The center is composed of 57 of the nation's best-known retailing outlets and is currently planning further expansion.

This week will see the addition of a new ladies' apparel shop—Burton's Gal. The Lerner Shops, specializing in ladies' and children's apparel, is scheduled to open in mid-November.

Owned and developed by Henry Alper and Abe Green, Wonderland ranks as Livonia's largest taxpayer. The center provides full- and part-time employment for nearly 1,100 persons.

1,500 From 7 Area Schools To Attend College Night

More than 1,500 students and parents from Plymouth and six area high schools are expected to attend the annual district College Night program in Plymouth High School on Thursday, Oct. 24, from 7:30 to 9 p.m. The program is under the

supervision of the Guidance Department of Plymouth High and more than 50 colleges and universities will have representatives on hand.

All students planning on continuing their education beyond high school are urged to partici-

pate. It will be the only opportunity to meet representatives from Michigan colleges, universities, business and technical schools. A few out-of-state schools will have representatives present.

High schools participating

include: Plymouth, Bentley and Franklin from Livonia; Redford Union and Thurston from Redford Township, Garden City and Clarenceville.

Admission requirements, costs, housing, scholarships and campus life will be covered during the program. It will include three 25-minute sessions, allowing students to visit three choices of colleges.

Counselors in charge recommend that students make their choices ahead of time and list the questions they want answered so that there won't be any undue delays.

The Redford Raiders split with Southfield Jayhawks in Little League football action on the Thurston High athletic field last Saturday.

The Junior Varsity rolled to a 37-0 triumph over the Southfield jayvees but the varsity ran across a real tartar and dropped a 27-13 verdict.

The Raider Pony team came out on the short end of a 12-0 count against the Dearborn Lions.

John Gast and Kurt August were the big guns for the Raider jayvees. The former tallied four times on end runs and the latter broke loose for 40 yards for his touchdown and then scored later on a short run.

The Jayhawks controlled the ball throughout the first half of the varsity contest, scoring three touchdowns and two extra points for a 20-0 lead.

Ron Barringer brightened the Raider hopes early in the third quarter when he raced 32 yards for a touchdown. Later in the final stanza, Bill Bashara connected on a 27-yard scoring pass to Craig Mutch. But Southfield came back in the closing minutes to make the final score, 27-13.

The Pony team learned the hard way that last week's Dearborn victory wasn't a fluke. The Lions turned the trick again despite some fine play by Steve and Craig Bovak.

The Raiders will be idle next week but travel to East Detroit on Sunday, Oct. 27.

St. Agatha Wins Biggest Victory

"The greatest victory of my coaching career." So spoke Dave Brazil last Sunday afternoon after his St. Agatha high football team had rallied for a 20-14 victory over Orchard Lake St. Mary's.

Few had given St. Agatha much of a chance against the Lakers.

Hadn't Orchard Lake beaten Royal Oak St. Mary, the defending champ which was favored to repeat as divisional champion?

And how about the fact St. Agatha has only 90 boys in its high school, while up at St. Mary's they can select their football team from 270 young men?

So the odds were stacked against St. Agatha.

But it was Homecoming Day for the Townshippers. The floods were tremendous. The queen, as usual, was an eye-ful.

This was the game St. Agatha wanted to win more than anything else.

It mattered not that Orchard Lake St. Mary's marched 83 yards for a touchdown the first time it got the ball.

Nor did St. Agatha fall flat on its face after St. Mary's had pulled into a 14-13 lead in the third period.

The kids from the Township parish were determined and their determination paid off.

They were spurred on by the fact that their star defensive lineman, Ron Zimmerman, suffered an injury during the week and will be lost for the rest of the season which closes at Pottiac St. Michael next Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

They were spurred on, too, by the fact that no St. Agatha grid team in the last few years has lost more than two games in one campaign.

Three running plays netted St. Agatha three yards. It was fourth down and seven on the Lakers 32.

The next play was a corker. Bob Krupanski spun to his left on a reverse and wasn't touched until he crossed the goal line. Mike Steen converted and St. Agatha had its 20-14 win.

However, it took an interception by Chuck Roemer of a St. Mary's pass on the St. Agatha 35 with three minutes left to seal the triumph.

Orchard Lake went in front early, moving from its own 17 to the St. Agatha four from

where Frank Rompel drove for the TD. With the conversion, St. Mary's led, 7-0.

A few moments later, Steen returned a kick 20 yards to midfield. Peck picked up four, Steen flipped seven yards to Roose and then Steen ran nine more.

With the ball on the St. Mary's 30, Steen dropped back and hoisted a nifty pass to Gregg Brauer for the touchdown. Peck ran the point and the score was tied at 7-7.

St. Agatha picked up a St. Mary's fumble on its own 45 to start another TD drive. Peck ran for 10 and a 15-yard penalty put the ball on the Orchard Lake 30. After Steen scooted 12 yards off tackle, Steen shot an 18-yard TD pass to Krupanski.

The missed try left the score at 13-7.

Orchard Lake went ahead in the third period on a steady march capped by Bernie Stee's four-yard, scoring plunge. When Rompel made the point, St. Agatha lagged, 14-13.

How the Townshippers went on to win already has been detailed.
